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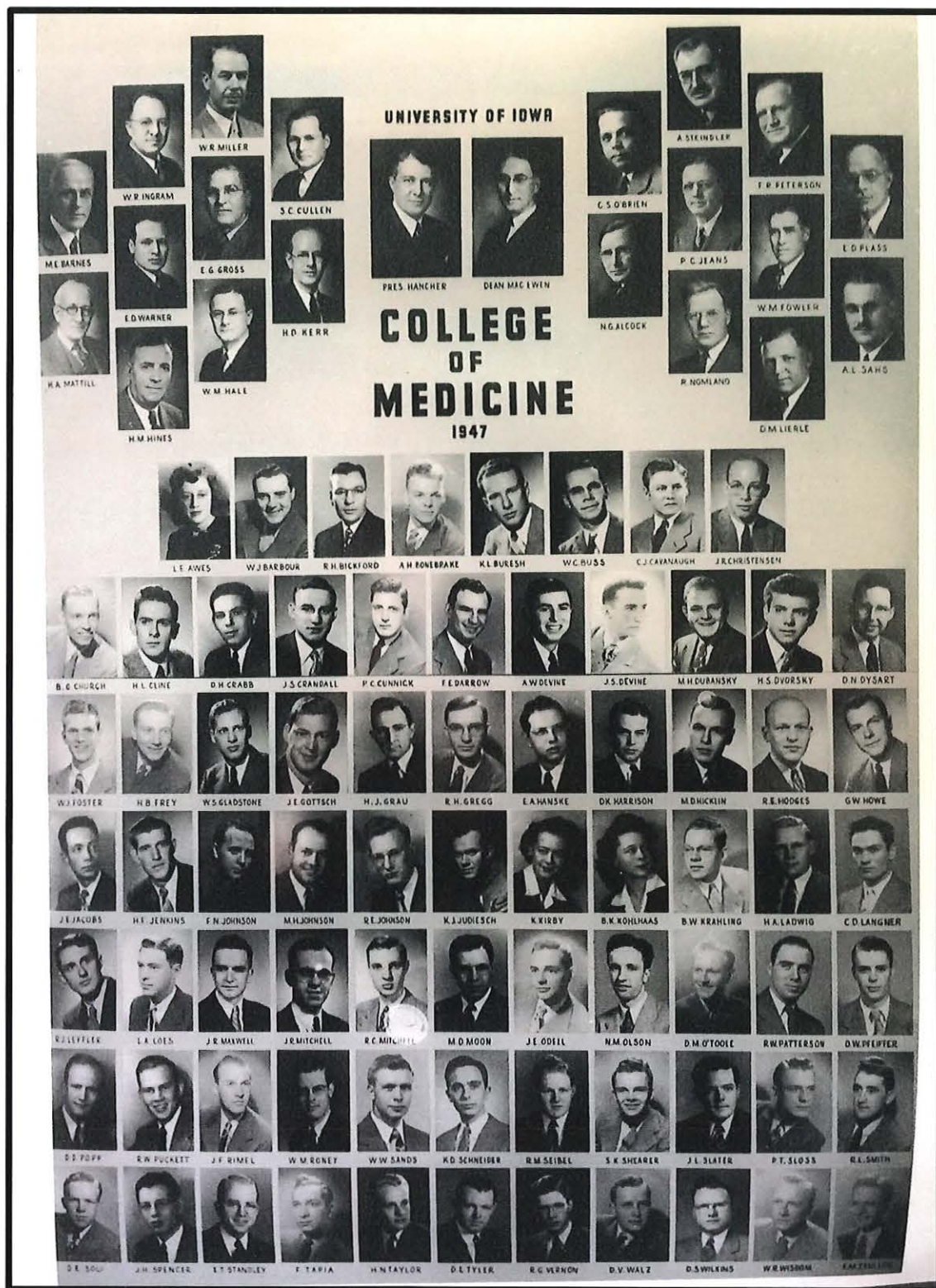

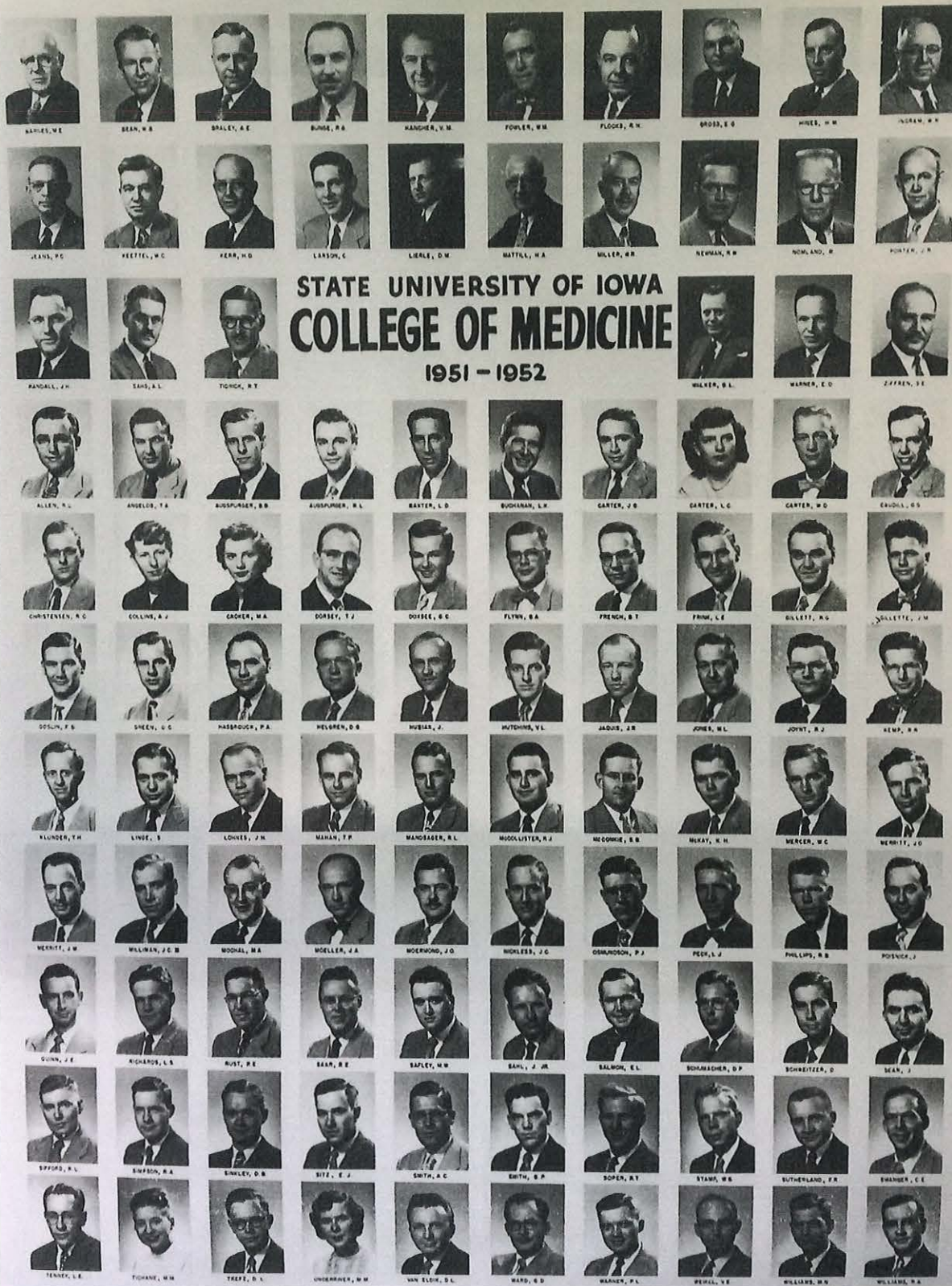

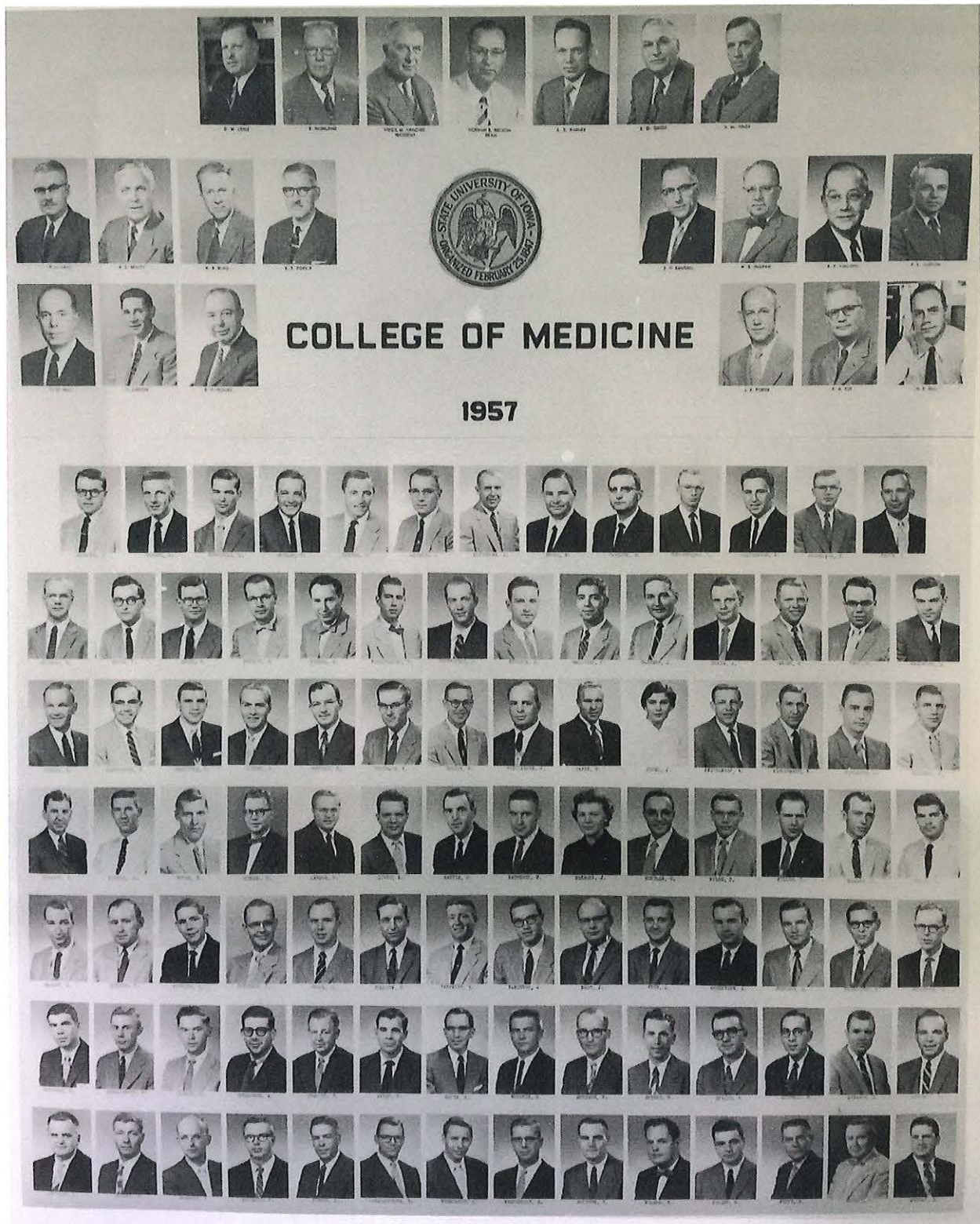

Briefly describe your clinical and research area(s) of interest:

General Adult Psychiatry & Establishing and Leading Mental Health Centers

Briefly describe your professional history and appointments:

In 1963, I established Jasper County's first Mental Health Center. I worked there five years and pioneered the use of Lithium in 1967 and 1968. I then moved to Ft. Dodge and established Webster County's first Mental Health Center. That MHC grew to cover seven countries. We established a chronic Mental Health Unit in the Webster County Home. We brought 30 chronically mentally ill patients back

to the Webster County Home's Mental Health Unit. These patients were eventually able to live on their own or their family's private homes. We established a home visitation program to follow up on and treat these patients on an out-patient basis.

What awards/honors have you received during your medical career?

I became a Fellow in 1972. Later, I was awarded a Distinguished Fellow, a Distinguished Life Fellow, and a Distinguished 50 year Life Fellow. In 2005, I received the Webster County All American Service Award.

How has the UI College of Medicine contributed to your life/work?

The U of I College of Medicine taught me the facts, methods, and ethics required to practice good medicine for rich and poor alike.

Favorite memory of your time at the UI College of Medicine:

My favorite memory of my years at the U of Iowa is of the 1955 collegiate wrestling meet between Iowa and Michigan. I wrestled in my first intercollegiate match and was able to pin my Michigan opponent in 59 seconds. The following year I did not wrestle on the intercollegiate team, but I did wrestle in the intramural wrestling tournament of 1956 involving all of the fraternities. I wrestled for the Phy Bete House Professional Fraternity and won the 177 pound championship. Those were fun times.

Who was your most memorable professor and why?

Reuben Flocks. The urology professor was not the nicest gentleman but, to me at least, he was memorable. I feel certain he knew every

urological fact in the literature and he wanted all of us to know them, too.

What people or places do you remember the most about your days in Iowa City?

Our professional fraternity, the Phi Beta house was a delight. We studied together and helped each other. During the noon hour we ate from 12:00-12:30. Then from 12:30-1:00 we played 2 or 3 hands of bridge. For 30 minutes we forgot all about medicine and only worried about whether we made our bid or not. Afternoon classes started at 1:10 so we raced to get to our classes on time.

What is something that your classmates might find uniquely interesting about you?

That I chose and very much enjoyed the practice of psychiatry. All through medical school I planned to be a general practitioner. However, once I started practicing I found my greatest enjoyment in listening to patients talk about their emotional problems and I wanted to help them.

Tell us about your service to the University of Iowa:

In my community I let everyone know that I attended the U of I med school. I often spoke to community groups and told them that they and I owed much to the university. I told my patients that if they gained something from my work with them, they owed it to the U of I.

What advice would you give to a UI Carver College of Medicine student preparing to graduate?

Learn to forget and to remember. When you are with a patient, you must forget, for one hour, everything except that patient's problem or problems. Then after your patients have

been seen, you must remember each one and make the best decisions you can for each one.

What are your current activities and interests?

At 88 and 87 years of age we do not travel very much. Our children drive for us when we travel out of town. What we enjoy most is bridge or other table games. Oh, we enjoy naps, long naps. So we take long naps often. We also enjoy chatting with old friends. We use the computer when we have to, but we really enjoy the morning newspaper more than computer news.

**Briefly describe your clinical and research
area(s) of interest:**

Since retiring, I have taken on a new profession. I became a Department of Transportation-Instructor and now teach Emergency Medical Responder, Emergency Medical Technician, and am Medical Director for three high school Opportunities in Emergency Care (EMT/EMR) programs which include active teaching and testing. I have also been involved since retiring with recertification of EMT/EMR in several fire departments. I recently retired from Medical Director for the Law Enforcement Center in Brooklyn Center, MN, where I did the same. I am Regional Faculty for the American Heart

Association in Basic Life Support (CPR) and Advanced Cardiac Life Support and continue to teach actively in both. I also teach the cardiovascular portion of the Fundamentals of Critical Care Surgery Course both locally and I have taught in Bolivia, South America.

Briefly describe your historic professional appointments:

I practiced and taught cardiology at a University of Minnesota teaching hospital, Saint Paul Ramsey Medical Center (SPRMC) from 1973-1993 when I moved to the University of Iowa College of Medicine where I learned echocardiography and rose to the rank of Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine. In 1993, we returned to Saint Paul to SPRMC which had become Regions Hospital. In 1994 or 1995 I was promoted to Adjunct Professor of Medicine until I retired in 2007. During my time at SPRMC, I was co-founder/director of the Cardiac Rehab program, Director of Research for the Cardiology Section, and was named Interim Director of Cardiology for one year. I was indirectly involved in the search for a permanent cardiology director, having decided I did not wish to pursue the permanent role of Director.

What awards/honors have you received during your medical career?

In addition to the above, I was named a "Top Doc" in MN, was awarded the Excellence in Medical and Dentistry Education Award in 2005 (one in medicine and one in surgery awarded by Health Partners Medical Group yearly).

How has the UI College of Medicine contributed to your life/work?

College of Medicine provided an outstanding background of knowledge and training from

which to grow upon graduation. After graduation, I completed a rotating internship at Charity Hospital in New Orleans on the Louisiana State University service. Because of my background and performance, I was offered a residency in internal medicine, surgery, pediatrics, and Ob-Gyn. Because I was interested in so many areas (and, at the time, unfocused), and ophthalmology resident suggested I spend two years in the U.S. Public Health Service in Indian Health. That provided me with a good "family practice" background, a wonderful exposure to American Indian culture, and a brief 5 month assignment to the U.S. Coast Guard during which I was ship's doctor to 110 men, and gave me a trip to Japan. That increased my interest in primary care and teaching and led me back to Iowa for residency and fellowship. From there, I went into private practice in MN but missed teaching and academic medicine so I moved to one of the U of MN teaching hospitals where I spent most of my career. As staff, I saw a number of U of I graduates come through the MN system. I saw that the U of I continued to turn out outstanding physicians. When eligible for a sabbatical, I chose to return to Iowa from 1993-1994 and subsequently stayed on staff until 1998 when I returned to MN to my previous position.

Who was your most memorable professor and why?

Walter Kirkendall as professor in renal, hypertension, and electrolyte as attending physician. He would make morning rounds with us and the patients. He would return in the late afternoon each day with one question, "What did you learn today?" It took no more than one day, responding that it was a quiet day and I

hadn't learned much. I never made that mistake again. He was an outstanding teacher among a

number of outstanding teachers.

Another I list as having an unusual teaching method was George Theil, also a nephrologist and my attending. He would push resident into arguing with him. He would make a statement that could be completely right, completely wrong, or with elements of truth and non-truth. If the resident was uncertain as to its truth, we would drop it but later in the day, research his statement because he would come back the next day and repeat his statement. He would expect us to correct him. It was never done maliciously. The way he did it was fun and a great teaching tool. I adapted it somewhat in my later dealings with housestaff.

What people or places do you remember the most about your days in Iowa City?

Joe's and the Airliner were places to go to have a beer and review tests when we got them back. The Airliner had a piano bar in the basement where we used to go on weekend nights to have a beer and sing songs. Hamburg Inns #1 and #2 were great places for a hamburger. Whetstone's was a great place to go for a coffee or a coke between classes and to cash a check. Who could ever forget Saturday football games in the stadium or basketball games in the old Armory?

What is something your classmates might find uniquely interesting about you?

I don't know how unique it is; but, I think they might be surprised that after retiring I continue to be active in teaching and in different aspects of medicine than I originally experienced. When I retired, I thought to myself that I had acquired some skills and background that would be a shame to waste just because I had retired.

Hence, I shifted to emergency medicine education. I have also been involved in teaching Wilderness Medicine. I think we need to keep both mind and body active as we get older; and, I have done both. I continue to bike nearly daily in the summer, indoor stationary bike and downhill ski, read areas of interest in cardiology as well as good books. I am even trying to learn a new language -- not always as easy as it used to be.

Tell us about your service to the University of Iowa:

The time I went to undergraduate school at Iowa was before COM and other colleges within the University looked with interest on activities such as those listed above. Therefore, I spent most of my hours working on the grades to get into medical school. I don't ever remember having an advisor or having anyone suggest to me the advisability of such activity. I don't believe I ever even had an advisor.

What advice would you give to a UI Carver College of Medicine student preparing to graduate?

Keep mind and body active, not just in their field of interest but in other areas as well.

List any current civic, community, or volunteer activities:

I have been involved in teaching CPR and first aid to churches, teachers and nonteacher personnel in the schools. I teach CPR/First Aid/Emergency Medicine to police fire departments, Boy Scout/Cub Scout leaders.

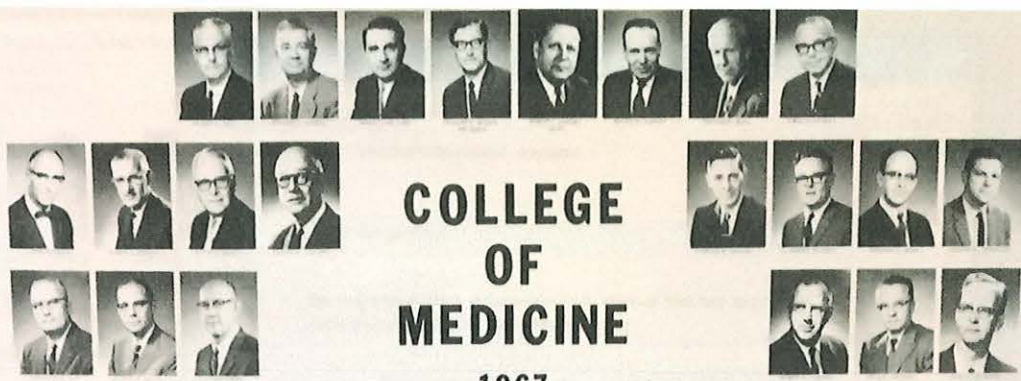

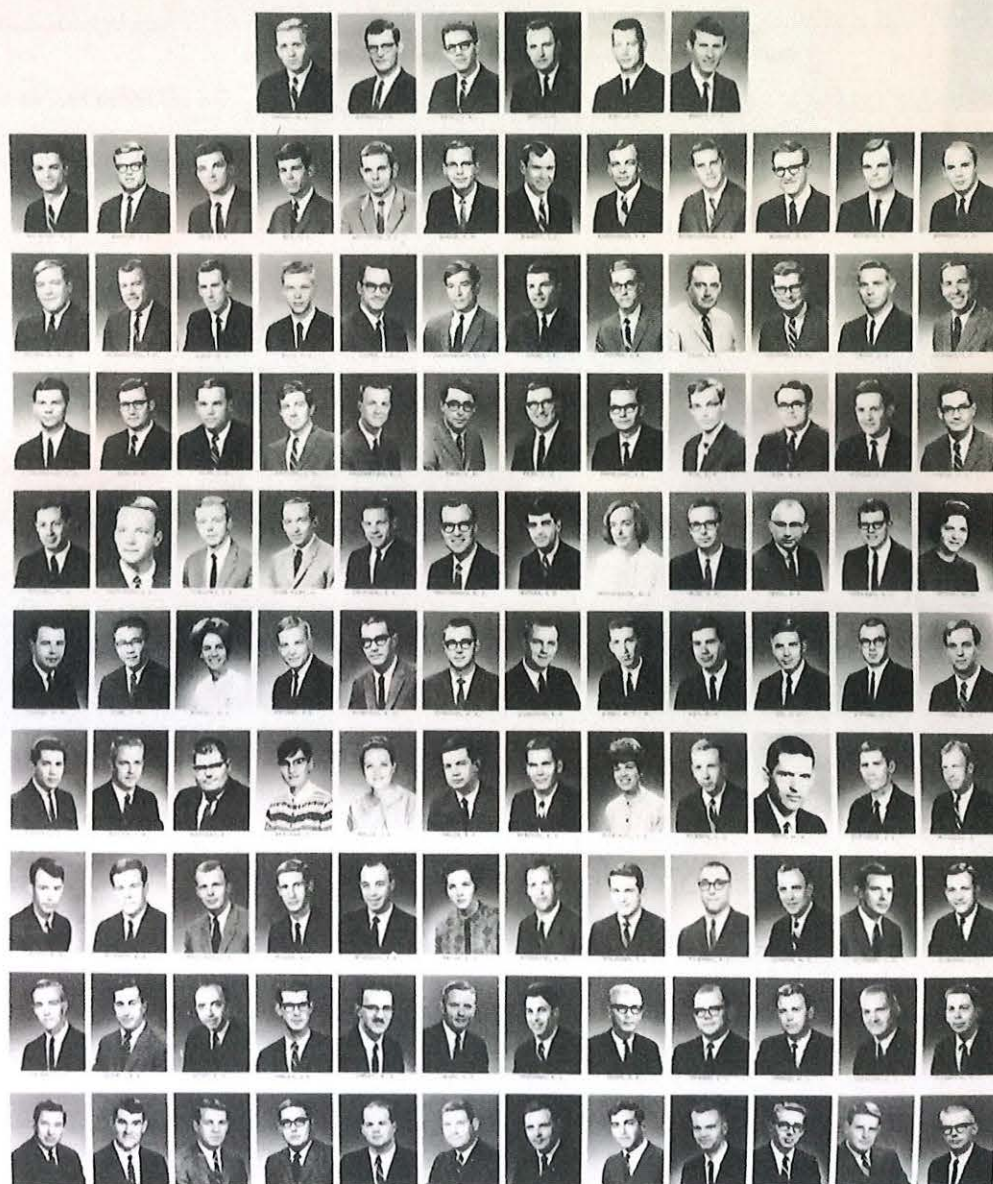

What are your current activities and interests?

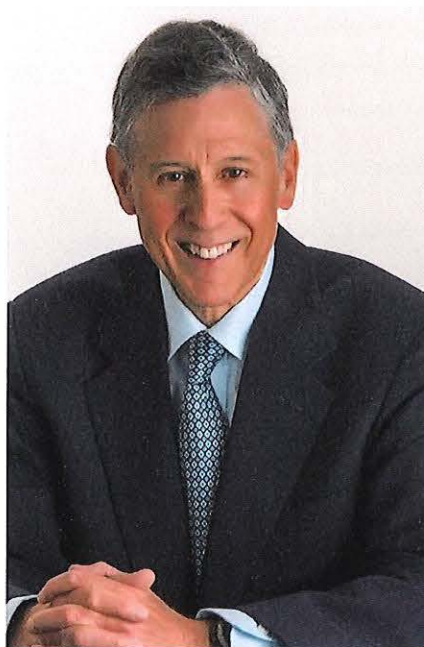
Spending time with my family, reading, and golf.

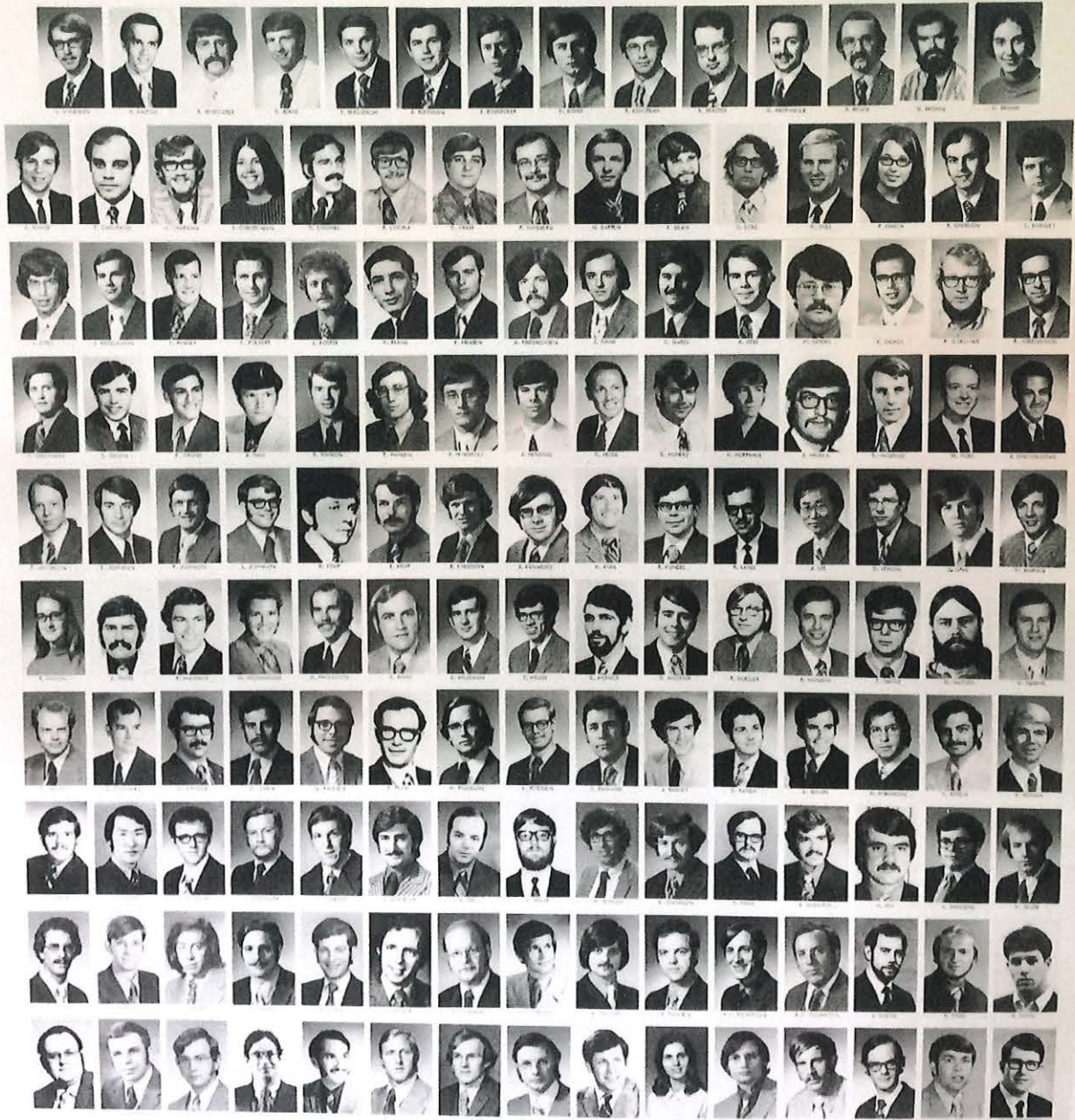

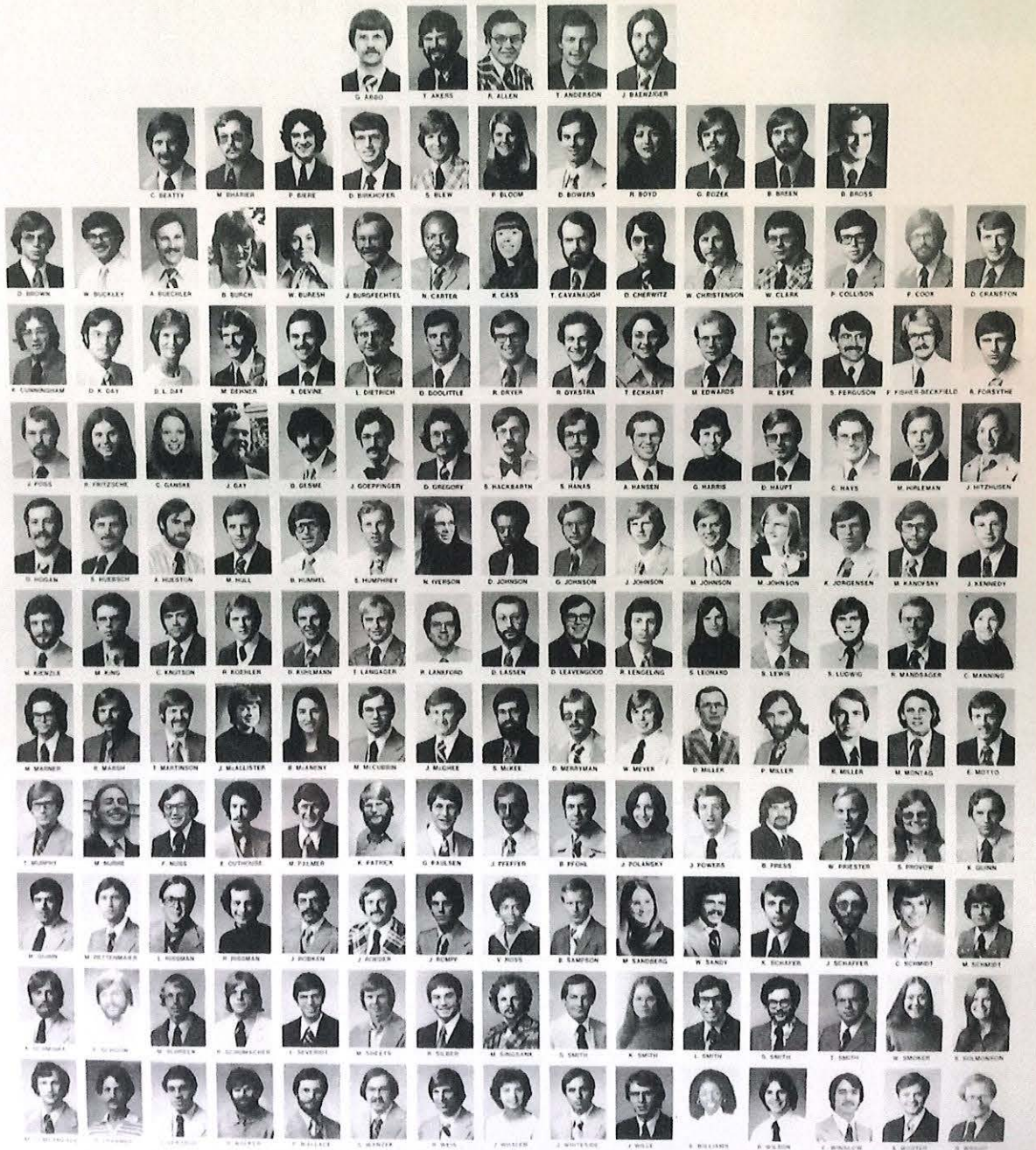
