#### Reminder: Get vaccinated for influenza now, before activity increases!

Although influenza activity in Iowa is currently low and geographic spread is sporadic, laboratories throughout the state are reporting positive influenza results. In addition, several states south and east of Iowa have reported local, regional and widespread geographic spread. If you have not already, now is a good time to get vaccinated for influenza because it takes up to two weeks to develop full immunity. It is even more important for children aged 6 months through 8 years who require two doses to get vaccinated as soon as possible because the doses must be spaced at least four weeks apart. Annual influenza vaccination is recommended for all persons 6 months and older who do not have contraindications.

#### Pertussis testing and vaccination guidelines

CADE has received several reports of pertussis in school-age children over the last couple weeks. Testing is very important to confirm a diagnosis of pertussis. The recommended test for pertussis is PCR, available at SHL and other laboratories. Serological testing for pertussis is not recommended because there is no commercial kit approved by FDA for diagnostic use. Diagnostic values of IgG to pertussis toxin have not been established, and current IgA and IgM pertussis assays lack adequate sensitivity and specificity.

To prevent spread, patients suspected or confirmed to have pertussis should stay home until five full days of appropriate antibiotic treatment, or until their cough has lasted at least 21 days.

The best way to prevent pertussis is to get vaccinated. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends a 3-dose primary series of DTaP, administered at 2, 4, and 6 months of age, followed by a first booster dose given at 15 through 18 months, and a second booster dose given at 4 through 6 years of age. Adolescents and adults should receive a single Tdap booster dose, preferably at 11 or 12 years of age.
