IOWA VALUES FUND BEGINS TO TAKES SHAPE

The \$503 million Iowa Values Fund is designed to create 50,000 quality, good-paying jobs in the next four years. Governor Vilsack recently named 11 Iowans who will lead the initiative. The governor also appointed a seven-member marketing committee that will oversee the Iowa Department of Economic Development's efforts to position the state as an ideal place to live, work and visit. EIGHT COMMUNITIES GET INVESTMENTS FROM VISION IOWA

At its meeting in July, the Vision Iowa board approved awards to eight projects around Iowa. The state's investment came from the Community Attraction and Tourism program, a part of Vision Iowa. Twenty additional projects are vying for the less than \$5 million that remains in the CAT fund. At its meeting in June, the Vision Iowa board directed staff not to process new applications until the current requests for funding are considered.

CAT is a part of Vision Iowa that provides assistance to smaller development projects in the state. The five-year program is funded at \$12.5 million annually, ending in June 2004. The Legislature did not extend the CAT program during the recent session and special sessions. Only \$4.9 million remains in the program. CAT's parent program, Vision Iowa, has invested more than \$200 million in 10 projects around the state. About \$7.5 million is still available through Vision Iowa, although there are no pending applications. Projects that received funding in July are:

■ Anamosa Public Library, Anamosa Total project cost: \$2,272,602

Requested: \$500,000 Received: \$200,000 grant City population: 5,494 Region: Eastern

Description: The new Anamosa Library and Learning Center will feature modern computer technology, community programming space, staff offices, offstreet parking, an expanded collection and other amenities. Local citizens are currently involved in a capital campaign to replace the existing library, a 1903 limestone, historic structure that holds great sentimental value to the community but is inadequate for the information needs of a modern, growing constituency. In addition to reading and research needs, the library expects wide use of its meeting room, genealogy materials, distance education programs, and electronic resources.

■ Aurora Comet Center, Aurora Total project cost: \$462,635 Requested: \$85,000 Received: \$85,000 grant City population: 194 Region: Eastern

Project description: The Aurora Comet Center is a 6,720-square-foot facility that will include a library/media center, a gymnasium with basketball/volleyball court, a fitness center, an indoor walking track, a kitchenette, a lounge, and a meeting room.

■ Grand Opera House Restoration:

Phase II, Dubuque

Total project cost: \$1 million Requested: \$406,604 Received: \$200,000 grant City population: 57,686

Region: Eastern

Description: The home of Dubuque's largest community theater troupe is looking for a facelift with this three-phase restoration project. Phase II of the project will feature a sign, stair foyer, fly space and stage, and public restrooms. The restoration will enable the opera house to attract a wider range of national and international performing artists.

■ Kingsley Community Wellness Project,

Total project cost: \$1,994,615 Requested: \$494,615 Received: \$250,000 grant City Population 1,245 Region: Western

Description: The city of Kingsley and the Kingsley-Pierson Community School District plan to construct a new wellness center, walking and biking trail, and an outdoor all-weather track. The wellness center will contain approximately 12,260 square feet and will include an aerobics area, racquetball courts, locker/shower room, fitness area, an expanded weight room, and a physical therapy area. The physical therapy area will be leased to a private entity. The concrete trail will stretch 9,800 feet and will include a bridge.

■ LaPorte City FFA Historical & Ag

Museum, LaPorte City
Total project cost: \$170,000

Requested: \$35,200 Received: \$30,000 grant City population: 2,275

Region: Eastern

Description: Students founded the LaPorte City FFA Historical & Ag Museum was founded in 1970, The museum consists of three buildings, two of which are on the National Register of Historic Sites. The third building is in serious disrepair, putting at risk all the historical artifacts found in it. As a solution, the city is restoring a nearby building to accommodate the display items.

Rural Heritage Center of Iowa, State

Center

Total project cost: \$220,000 Requested: \$85,000 Received: \$75,000 grant City population: 1,349

Region: Central

Description: State Center's Main Street organization is planning to rehabilitate an historic building in the community's "remarkable row." Once completed, the building will be home to the Rural Heritage Center of Iowa, the Iowa Barn Foundation, the State Center Historical Society, and State Center Main Street. It will also serve as an interpretive site for the Lincoln Highway Association.

■ Wall Lake Community Center, Wall Lake

Total project cost: \$1,082,545

Requested: \$350,000 Received: \$200,000 grant City population: 841 Region: Eastern

Description: The city of Wall Lake plans to construct an 18,900-square-foot community center. Three existing buildings will be demolished, and the new facility will be constructed on the site. The facility will include banquet and a meeting hall, kitchen, serving room, staging and seating area, fitness center, senior citizen/congregate meal area, elevator and storage. The lower level of the building will contain city offices and council chambers. However, this portion of the project is financed solely with city funds.

Manson Aquatic Center, Manson

Total project cost: \$964,770

Requested: \$52,000 Received: \$52,000 City population: 1,893 Region: Central

Description: The City of Manson plans to construct a new aquatic center. The project includes demolition of the existing city pool and the construction of a new, larger facility with additional equipment and water

activity amenities.

During July's meeting the board also sent four projects into negotiations, making them eligible for a CAT award. These projects are located in Appanoose County, Calhoun County, Clayton County and the Amana

Colonies.

IOWA MEETINGS ASSOCIATION IS CREATED

Members of the Iowa Convention and Visitors Bureau Association voted recently to re-organize and become the Iowa Meetings Association (IMA), saying that the new name better represents the organization's mission. Tiffany Menke from the Newton Convention and Visitors Bureau will lead the organization, which will promote the state to meeting planners through marketing and trade show participation. Other board members include Aaron Buzza, Waterloo CVB; Karen Eischen, Pella CVB; Roger Schultz, Sioux City CVB; Abbey Larson, Okoboji Tourism; Angie Tyner, Council Bluffs CVB; Luci Ismert, Ottumwa CVB; Arlyce Musal, Quad Cities CVB and Jeanne Cole, Cedar Rapids CVB.

IMA is a membership organization made up of representatives from any lowa entities interested in the lowa meetings and convention market. Collectively, the group will market the state as a meeting destination and provide educational and networking opportunities for its members to strengthen lowa's economy through the meetings and convention market.
