# News from the Office on the Status of Women

## October 11th is the International Day of the Girl

In December 2011, the United Nations declared October 11 as the International Day of the Girl Child. The mission is "to help galvanize worldwide enthusiasm for goals to better girls' lives, providing an opportunity for them to show leadership and reach their full potential."

This day (and movement) is based on the following beliefs:



- Girls are the experts on issues that affect girls. The solutions to these issues must come from girls. Their voices need to be centralized and elevated in social justice conversations.
- Girls from marginalized communities must be central in conversations about social justice issues involving those communities.
- Truly effective social change cannot come without girls' leadership.
- Girls' issues are intersectional. We must intentionally include people who are different from ourselves in our social change work.

## **October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month**

Since 1981, October has been nationally recognized as Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The idea was brought forth by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, an organization whose goal is to end violence against women and children.

#### What is Domestic Violence?

"Domestic violence is the willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and/or other abusive behavior as part of a systematic pattern of power and control perpetrated by one intimate partner against another. It includes physical violence, sexual violence, threats, and emotional/psychological abuse. The frequency and severity of domestic violence varies dramatically" (NCADV, 2015).



#### Statistics:

- 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been victims of [some form of] physical violence by an intimate partner within their lifetime.
- On a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide.
- 61% of bisexual women have or will experience rape, physical violence or stalking by an intimate partner, compared to 44 percent of lesbians and 35 percent of heterosexual women.
- 23.1% of gay men have or will experience rape, physical assault or stalking by an intimate partner.
