## State Park Passport recognized by America's State Parks national organization

RALEIGH, N.C. – The National Association of State Park's Directors (NASPD) has recognized the Iowa State Park Passport for extraordinary achievement among people, projects and programs in managing state park systems.

NASPD awarded the State Park Passport with a Presidential Award for Corporate Partnership, honoring the leadership and innovation of Travel Iowa and Bandwango working alongside the Iowa DNR to create the successful passport program, especially engaging park visitors safely during the national pandemic.

The free digital passport, created to mark the 100th anniversary of lowa State Parks, encouraged lowans to discover new state parks and enjoy the outdoors, plus provided discounts to restaurants and tourist attractions near each state park. Since June 2020, more than 13,000 travelers checked in more than 25,000 times. Travel lowa is part of the lowa Economic Development Authority, helping to drive lowa's tourism efforts. Bandwango is a travel technology platform that connects people to places.

"America's state parks and the people who visit them are the prime beneficiaries of the outstanding contributions from these organizations and individuals," Lewis Ledford, NASPD executive director, said. "Taking just a few moments to recognize and thank them for their efforts is the least we can do when evaluating all they have done to improve the quality of life and recreational opportunities in their communities."

The award was presented at the NASPD annual conference, Dec. 9 - 10. The conference of parks and recreation professionals was held virtually this year to share best practices in park management.

## Fish lowa program opens registration for virtual ice fishing courses



DES MOINES - The Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is offering two free virtual ice fishing courses to individuals who have little to no ice fishing experience or would like to further improve their current skills.

"If you haven't ice fished at all or are looking to sharpen your skills, then these are the courses for you," said Barb Gigar, aquatic education coordinator with the Iowa DNR.

Join the two events online for an evening of all things ice fishing. Fisheries and Law Enforcement staff with the Iowa DNR will be providing the instruction for both courses.

During the first course, participants will have the chance to learn the basics on ice safety, cold weather fish behavior, choosing a location, and basic ice fishing gear and tactics. This course will focus on panfish as the desired species. During the second course, participants will have the chance to learn about more advanced skills such as reading the ice, specialized equipment, fishing shacks and will focus on species such as bass, walleye and trout. Both courses will cover ice-fishing regulations and participants will have the chance to ask questions to DNR staff.

The courses are geared for participants 16 and older. Those under 16 must have an adult register and participate in the course as well. Space online will be limited so register right way to ensure your spot.
