

- The four largest tax sources (personal income, sales, use, and corporate income tax) comprised 84.9% of total tax and other receipts in FY 2003. In FY 1997, the percentage was 84.0%.
- Personal income tax accounted for 47.9% of total tax and other receipts in FY 2003 and 45.7% in FY 1997.
- General Fund total net receipts and transfers increased 9.2% from FY 1997 to FY 2003. From June 1997 to June 2003, the Consumer Price Index increased 14.6%. From Calendar Year 1997 to Calendar Year 2002, per capita income in Iowa rose 23.8%.




### IOWA LOTTERY REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES FY 1986 - FY 2003 (in millions)

- From the Lottery's inception, in August 1985, the Iowa Lottery had sales of \$3.04 billion, awarded \$1.65 billion in prizes, expended \$577.7 million on operations, and transferred \$827.8 million to the State as profits including \$136.0 million in sales tax.
- Total sales, excluding sales tax, increased from \$81.7 million in the Lottery's first year (FY 1986) to \$178.9 million in FY 2003. Along with the increase in sales, profits and sales tax transfers increased from \$27.6 million in FY 1986 to \$48.0 million in FY 2003.
- The decrease in revenues since FY 1996 can be attributed, in part, to increased competition for gambling dollars.



- Unclaimed Property is any financial asset that has been abandoned by its owner for an extended period of time. The time period varies by asset type.











### **OUTSTANDING OBLIGATIONS IN IOWA BY PURPOSE**




- The most commonly reported purpose category for cities in FY 2003 is "Utilities/Sewers" (29.5%).



### IOWA FISH AND GAME REVENUES (in millions)




Over the past ten fiscal years, the Fish and Game Protection Fund has received a total of \$287.7 million in revenue. Of this amount, 62.4% was from license sales, 23.5% from federal funds, 5.4% from transfers from other funds, and 8.7% from other revenue (interest, land management, and donations).

# IOWA GROUNDWATER PROTECTION FUND INCOME (in millions)




- The Groundwater Protection Fund was established in 1987 to prevent groundwater contamination from point and nonpoint sources. The Fund has four accounts (Solid Waste, Storage Tank, Agriculture Management, and Household Hazardous Waste) that receive funding from the payment of fees by sanitary landfills, fertilizer and pesticide retailers, and other businesses as specified in the Code of lowa.
- Revenue to the Agriculture Management Account was reduced by \$1.0 million for FY 2003. Funds were transferred to the General Fund as specified in HF 2627 (FY 2003 Second Omnibus Appropriations Act). The Fund allocation to the Leopold Center was reduced by \$1.0 million for FY 2003.

(in millions)




- Sources of revenue for the Iowa Finance Authority General Fund include fees, interest, and excess money generated through bonding activity. The Fund may be used by the Authority for any lawful purpose, with expenditure at the discretion of the Iowa Finance Authority Board.
- The restricted fund balance represents those portions of the total fund balance related to certain reserve funds released to the Authority upon restructuring of certain bonds.
- The designated fund balance represents the portion of the total balance set aside to reflect plans for future utilization within lowa Finance Authority housing programs.
- The unrestricted fund balance provides additional security for the Authority's general obligation bonds outstanding and coverage of administrative costs.
- From FY 1986 to FY 2002, the total unrestricted General Fund balance, as a percent of total lowa Finance Authority general obligation bonds outstanding, has risen from 3.5% to 9.9%.

- Fiscal Year 1998 through FY 2001 data represents actual payments received by lowa after adjustments for volume and inflation. Fiscal Year 2002 through FY 2025 data represents anticipated payments without adjustments for volume and inflation.
- In addition to the annual recoveries depicted above, Public Financial Management projects that Iowa will receive a bonus of approximately \$237.3 million from the Strategic Contribution Fund for Iowa's contribution to the litigation and settlement of the tobacco lawsuit. The bonus will be paid to the State over a ten-year period beginning FY 2008.
- Pursuant to the tobacco settlement agreement, attorney fees for lowa's outside counsel will be paid by the tobacco industry in addition to the payments outlined above. The fees paid to lowa's outside counsel will not impact lowa's scheduled payments.
- Tobacco recoveries are adjusted annually for inflation and sales volume. The payments are compounded annually by 3.0% or the Consumer Price Index, whichever is greater. The payments are also adjusted due to fluctuations in the volume of cigarettes sold in the domestic market, as a function of the participating manufacturer's market share.
- lowa securitized 78.0% of anticipated tobacco recoveries in October 2001. The net tax-exempt proceeds (\$540.0 million) were placed in the Restricted Capitals Fund of the Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund. These funds are used for litigation payments, qualified capital projects, and certain debt service. The net taxable proceeds (\$39.6 million) were placed in the Endowment for Iowans Health Account, to create an endowment for future appropriations for health-related programs. The 2001 General Assembly also created the Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust, which provides a mechanism to appropriate funds from the Endowment for health-related programs.

- 1) House File 2615 (FY 2003 Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust Fund Act) deappropriated \$27.1 million from the Endowment for FY 2003. The Act also transferred \$9.0 million in FY 2003 wagering tax receipts from the Endowment to the Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust.
- 2) Senate File 458 (FY 2004 Standing Appropriations, Salary Provisions, and Statutory Changes Act) deappropriated \$28.3 million from the Endowment for FY 2004. The Act also transferred \$20.0 million from the Endowment to the General Fund. The Act also commits future General Fund receipts to reimburse the Endowment up to \$101.8 million. Current law also requires an additional \$40.0 million for the Student Achievement/Teacher Quality Act to be repaid to the Endowment.
- 3) House File 2627 (FY 2003 Second Omnibus Appropriations Act) transferred \$9.0 million from the Endowment to the General Fund in FY 2003.
- 4) House File 685 (FY 2004 Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust Fund Act) transferred \$5.2 million from the Endowment to the Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust Fund.
- 5) In June 2003, R. J. Reynolds Company was downgraded to below investment grade. This activated a "trapping event." The payments from all tobacco companies associated with the 78.0% securitization will be held by the trustee in a trapping account after the required fee and debt service obligations are met. The payments will be held in the trapping account for a minimum of one year after the downgraded company is upgraded to investment grade or until 25.0% of the outstanding principle of the bonds is reached. Therefore, it is estimated the Endowment will not receive any Tobacco Settlement Residuals in FY 2004.



- In CY 2002, exports to France increased more than 25.0%.



# CY 2002 TOP FIVE IOWA EXPORTS OF MANUFACTURED AND PROCESSED GOODS (in millions)







- Stated in constant 2001 dollars, Iowa's Gross State Product was \$73.4 billion in 1981 compared to \$90.9 billion in 2001.
- After adjusting for inflation, Iowa's Gross State Product grew by 23.9% between 1981 and 2001. The plains states grew by 50.7%, and the U.S. grew by 69.5%.

# IOWA GROWTH IN GROSS STATE PRODUCT AFTER ADJUSTING FOR INFLATION



- The relative contribution of industries to lowa's Gross State Product has changed over the past three decades:
  - Manufacturing (durable and nondurable combined) makes up 21.0% of lowa's Gross State Product, a decrease of 4.4% since 1981.
  - Farming, forestry, and fishing declined from 13.0% of the Gross State Product in 1981 to 3.8% in 2001.
  - Services industries grew from 10.9% of the Gross State Product in 1981 to 17.8% in 2001.
  - Financial, insurance, and real estate increased from 13.2% of the Gross State Product in 1981 to 16.1% in 2001.
  - All levels of government combined grew from 10.5% of the Gross State Product in 1981 to 12.4% in 2001.





### **IOWA HOUSING PERMITS ISSUED BY NUMBER OF UNITS**




- Nearly 70.0% of new housing permits issued are for singleunit dwellings.


# SALES OF EXISTING HOMES IN IOWA (in thousands)

# SALES OF CARS, TRUCKS, AND MULTI-PURPOSE VEHICLES IN IOWA





# IOWA'S CORN AND SOYBEAN MARKET YEAR AVERAGE PRICES PER BUSHEL







- lowa's net farm income dropped 19.0% from 2001, but was up approximately 6.0% from 1999, and was 56.0% lower than 1996. This is due in part to a drop in government payments. From 1996 to 2002, average soybean prices decreased by 27.0% and average corn prices decreased by 13.0%.
- The Flood of 1993 increased the 1994 farm income, as grain reserves were reduced due to low production caused by the excess precipitation.







#### IOWA NONFARM EMPLOYMENT JUNE 2003





- The Iowa National Guard can be activated for a variety of reasons, primarily for the mitigation of natural disasters, but also including searches for missing persons, and security for events such as visits from elected officials and foreign dignitaries.
- In 1989, the Iowa National Guard was activated to provide aid in dealing with the crash of United Airlines Flight 232 in Sioux City, and in 1993 to aid in the mitigation of damage due to extensive flooding in Iowa.
- In 1998, the Iowa National Guard was activated for several storm responses around the State, including damage clean up at Camp Dodge.
- In 2001, the Iowa National Guard was activated after the September 11 incident for airport security, anthrax security, preparedness planning, and homeland security.
- The lowa National Guard ranks sixth in the nation, on a per capita basis, for number of deployments this year.







### IOWA NONFARM EMPLOYMENT COMPARED TO TOTAL IOWA POPULATION




### PERCENT OF IOWA POPULATION EMPLOYED IN NONFARM OCCUPATIONS



(in millions)







- The Park User Fee was repealed in FY 1989, which eliminated annual revenue of approximately \$1.2 million. For FY 2004, the Department of Natural Resources received a \$2.0 million appropriation from the Environment First Fund for State Park operations.
- The Department of Natural Resources facility maintenance receives 9.0% of the total annual REAP appropriation per year through the REAP formula as specified in the <u>Code of Iowa</u>.
- The number of owners of all terrain vehicles (ATV) continues to increase. Owners must register at the County Recorder's Office and pay a biennial fee of \$25. Funds are deposited into the ATV Fund and are used to develop and maintain ATV trails in Iowa.



- Prior to CY 1992, combination licenses were \$1.50 less than individual hunting and fishing licenses. When combination licenses became \$0.50 more expensive than individual licenses, sales of combination licenses dropped 37.4% as buyers opted for individual licenses. In CY 1995, the combination license was reduced \$2.50 to equal the combined cost of the individual hunting and fishing licenses.
- There was a fee increase for nonresident deer license fees from \$150.50 to \$200.50 and a fee increase for a nonresident turkey license from \$75.50 to \$100.50 in CY 2002. There was an increase of \$.50 for writing fees in CY 1998. This was for resident and nonresident fishing licenses; resident and nonresident hunting licenses; resident combination licenses; resident and nonresident fur harvesters, dealers, and game breeders licenses. The writing fee increase is maintained by the county recorder or vendor.
- The following fees were increased during the FY 2001 Legislative Session and were effective during CY 2002: the resident and non-resident wildlife habitats fee, resident and non-resident fishing license fees, and a new fish habitat fee that is paid by residents and non-residents.






#### **LOCATION OF STATE FORESTS**



■ During the 2002-2003 school year, the lowa average teacher salary of \$38,921 was 84.9% of the estimated national average (\$45,822) and 98.8% of the average for all the plains states (\$39,399). The gap between lowa's average teacher salary and the national average has increased by 8.3% since 2001-2002. The gap between lowa's average and the average of the plains states has more than doubled (111.5%).







### **IOWA'S AREA EDUCATION AGENCIES**








# IOWA REGENTS UNDERGRADUATE TUITION GROWTH (Cumulative Growth Since FY 1994)








# IOWA BOARD OF REGENTS INSTITUTIONS TOTAL ENROLLMENT FALL 2003




### IOWA INDEPENDENT COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES TOTAL DEGREE CREDIT ENROLLMENT FALL 2003









- The greatest increase in per diem rates between FY 1986 and FY 2003 at the Mental Health Institutes was 79.5% at the Cherokee Institute, while the lowest rate of increase was 60.2% at the Mt. Pleasant Institute.
- The per diem rate increased by 129.6% at the State Training School at Eldora, while the rate at the Juvenile Home at Toledo increased by 110.0% between FY 1986 and FY 2003.

■ The total child support collections increased nearly 225.0% from FY 1992 through FY 2002. During this same time, the child support caseload grew by 70.0%.



 Total Outstanding Debt as of June 30, 2003, was \$1.011 billion.



### IOWA'S MONTHLY FOSTER CARE COST BY TYPE OF CARE



After a decline of 18.5% from FY 1984 to FY 1991, the number of family foster care providers increased 34.2% between FY 1991 and FY 1998. Between FY 2001 and FY 2003, the number of families providing foster care remained relatively steady, with 2,497 in FY 2001, 2,671 in FY 2002, and 2,730 in FY 2003. This is due to an increase in the average reimbursement rate, as well as expanded recruitment efforts, and expanded support services for providers.








- Iowa's CHIP Program consists of a Medicaid expansion and a separate program called Healthy and Well Kids in Iowa (hawk-i). Children who are hawk-i eligible, are served through contracts with commercial health plans.
- As of June 30, 2003, approximately 45.0% of children enrolled in the hawk-i Program were covered by indemnity insurance and 55.0% were covered by managed care insurance.
- The average monthly cost to the State of insuring a hawk-i child through indemnity coverage is \$155.87 while the average monthly cost to the State of insuring a hawk-i child through managed care coverage is \$119.30.





- In recent history, the number of children entering the Program each year is greater than the number of children reaching 18 years of age and leaving the Program.
- For FY 2004, the average subsidy for the foster care and adoption programs was 67.74% of the United States Department of Agriculture's estimate of the cost to raise a child.
- Termination of Parental Rights is required to proceed with the adoption process and receiving the adoption subsidy.







- With the prison cap in place from 1981 through 1987, the prison population increased by 14.1%. From 1989 through 2003, the prison population increased by 152.7%.





- New prison admissions in FY 2003 were a result of property crimes (31.2%), violent crimes (21.9%), drug offenses (30.0%), drunk driving and traffic offenses (10.7%), and other offenses (6.2%).
- From FY 1990 through FY 2003, new admissions for drug offenses increased 266.9%, new admissions for violent crimes increased 73.1%, new admissions for property crimes increased 32.5%, new admissions for drunk driving and traffic offenses increased 19.2%, and new admissions for other offenses increased 197.4%.
- New prison admissions include direct court-ordered commitments and probation revocations.



- In FY 2003, the total General Fund budget for the prisons was \$187.5 million. Of this amount, 79.9% was spent on personnel; 14.2% on food, clothing, and medical expenses; 2.8% on equipment, maintenance, and facilities repair; and; 3.1% on other support items.
- Since FY 1989, the State average cost per inmate per year increased by \$301 (1.6%).





- The General Assembly approved an additional 412 beds which will be operational by FY 2007 and will bring the design capacity to 7,384. There are an additional 511 medical and segregation beds that the Department does not count as available for general population use.
- The Criminal and Juvenile Justice Planning Division has issued its ten-year prison population forecast.
  - If policies and practices remain the same, the prison population is projected to reach 11,925 inmates by FY 2013.
  - By FY 2013 and without any additional prison beds, overcrowding will reach 161.5% of design capacity.
  - If the prison population reaches 11,925 inmates, five new 800-bed prisons will need to be built at a construction cost of \$50.0 million each. If five new prisons are built, the system would be operating at 104.8% of design capacity. Annual operating costs for each prison are approximately \$28.0 million.

- Custody scores are used in determining the security level based on the likelihood toward violence, escapes, adjustment to prison life, and the need to control the inmate's behavior. In specific cases, the Department may determine that an individual needs a different security level than shown by the custody score.
- Comparing the inmates by custody score with design capacity shows that there is a shortfall of 1,838 minimum-security beds, an excess of 734 medium-security beds, and a shortfall of 319 maximum-security beds.
- Comparing inmates assignments to design capacity shows that there are 163 more inmates than beds housed in minimum-security facilities. There are 1,390 more inmates than beds for medium-security facilities. Maximum-security beds are operating at 82.6% of capacity. This is due to the phase in of operating the new Clinical Care Unit at Fort Madison.


- The state and federal prison populations grew by 2.6% during calendar year 2002.
- States experiencing the most growth in the last year are: Maine (11.5%); Rhode Island (8.6%); and Connecticut, Colorado, and Minnesota (all 7.9%).
- Nine states experienced prison population decreases, led by Alaska (- 3.8%), Illinois (- 3.7%), Delaware (- 3.2%), and Massachusetts (- 2.4%).
- The federal system held 163,528 inmates at year-end 2002, making it the largest penal system in the country.
- California (162,317 inmates), Texas (162,003 inmates), and the federal system (163,528 inmates) together hold 35.8% of all prisoners in the country.
- Since 1995, the number of federal prisoners has increased 71.0%, while the number of inmates held for state convictions increased 27.0%.
- Iowa's prison population increased by 47.5% between FY 1995 and FY 2003.
- At year-end 2002, approximately 1 of every 143 men and 1 of every 1,656 women in the U.S. were incarcerated in a state or federal prison.
- Incarceration rates are calculated by the number of inmates per 100,000 residents. Louisiana had the highest prison incarceration rate (794 inmates) followed by Mississippi (743 inmates), Texas (692 inmates), and Oklahoma (667 inmates).
- Maine and Minnesota (each with 141 inmates) had the lowest incarceration rate per 100,000 residents.
- lowa ranks 39th in the nation in terms of the incarceration rate, with 284 inmates per 100,000 residents.
- lowa ranks 30th in the nation in incarcerating women, with 47 female inmates per 100,000 residents. lowa's female inmate population grew by 10.7% from 2001 to 2002, and grew by 7.5% since 1995.
- lowa had 2,910 people on parole as of December 31, 2002, an annual increase of 11.3%. lowa had 131 parolees per 100,000 residents. There were 31 states with a higher usage rate.
- lowa had 23,389 people on probation as of December 31, 2002, an annual increase of 6.0%. lowa had 1,057 probationers per 100,000 residents. There were 33 states with a higher usage rate.

#### **FACILITIES**

- At year-end 2002, privately operated facilities held 93,771 inmates (5.8% of state and 12.4% of federal inmates).
- State prisons were operating at between 71.0% and 201.0% of full capacity. Federal prisons were operating at 133.0% of capacity. Idaho had the lowest percentage of occupied capacity (71.0%) while Alabama's was the highest (201.0%) capacity utilization. Iowa was operating at 124.0% of designed capacity on December 31, 2002.



### COST OF LEGAL COUNSEL FOR INDIGENT DEFENDANTS IN IOWA




- Indigent persons charged with a crime receive legal representation from State employed attorneys from the Office of the Public Defender, from private attorneys who contract with the Office of the Public Defender, and from private attorneys. The latter two are paid from the Indigent Defense Fund.
- The growth in costs is attributed to the growth in the number of indigent cases. From FY 1996 to FY 2003, the number of cases and claims increased by 47.3%.
- Costs from FY 1996 to FY 2003 increased by 48.1%. The cost is increasing at a decreasing rate, generally attributed to the expansion of the Office of the Public Defender with its lower case costs.

- It is less costly for Public Defenders to handle cases than private attorneys. The more serious and time-consuming cases are handled by the Office of the State Public Defender.
- Private attorneys' average cost per case has stabilized since FY 1999 due to the legislation limiting non-contract attorneys to the same rates as contract attorneys.
- The Office of the State Public Defender has increased caseloads from 194 per FTE position in FY 1991 to 350 in FY 2003, an 80.4% increase.




# COUNTIES SERVED BY STATE OF IOWA PUBLIC DEFENDER OFFICES



- There are 19 local offices in 15 cities. Shaded areas represent counties served by local offices. Woodbury, Polk, and Black Hawk Counties have two offices each, one for juvenile justice services and one for adult offenders. In addition, Polk County serves as the administrative office, Appellate Defender Office, and Civil Commitment Unit for Sexual Predators, and provides statewide services.
- Local offices will handle Class A felony cases in current office locations, plus the following counties: Lyon, Sioux, Cherokee, Crawford, Harrison, Shelby, Audubon, Cass, Montgomery, Page, Fremont, Winnebago, Worth, Grundy, Tama, Jasper, Warren, Howard, Chickasaw, Fayette, Allamakee, and Van Buren. Providing these services through local public defender offices, rather than using private attorneys, is a cost-containment effort.
- Local offices provide juvenile justice system services in the solid-colored or shaded counties except: Iowa, Mitchell, Franklin, Mills, Jones, Hancock, Ida, Humboldt, Boone, Wright, Clayton, Delaware, Benton, and Jones.
- Local offices provide services for misdemeanor offenses; however, the extent of these services varies from county to county based on workload and staffing. There are certain classes or types of misdemeanors for which services are specifically not provided in the following counties: Clayton, Delaware, Franklin, Muscatine, Iowa, Greene, Boone, Benton, Linn, Hardin, Calhoun, Humboldt, and Wright.

- Between 1993 and 2002, civil filings and criminal filings increased by 10.8% and 15.9%, respectively.
- Small Claims increased by 28.7% during the same period.
- In 1993, a total of 101 District Court Judges managed 144,088 new civil and criminal case filings. Each District Court Judge averaged 1,426 filings. However, by 2002, there were a total of 116 District Court Judges managing 163,536 new civil and criminal case filings. The average number of case filings for each District Court Judge was 1,409.







### AGE OF REPORTED DOMESTIC ABUSE OFFENDERS AND VICTIMS IN IOWA CY 2002



### IOWA ROBBERY ARRESTEES AND VICTIMS CY 2002







# COMPLAINTS FILED AND APPROPRIATION FOR THE IOWA CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION



- The General Fund appropriation for the Civil Rights Commission decreased 2.5% from FY 1994 through FY 2002, while the number of complaints filed increased by 7.8%.
- The Commission instituted an administrative procedure in 1989 whereby all initial complaints were answered by an investigator so that the complainant could be informed of the potential validity of the complaint. The General Assembly, through the use of federal funds, increased the number of FTE positions (investigators) in an effort to timely respond to the increasing number of complaints being filed.



# LOCATION OF IOWA'S ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES





# **IOWA JUDICIAL DISTRICTS**



## **FY 2003 IOWA ROAD USE TAX FUND REVENUE**




- Total annual revenues to the Road Use Tax Fund have increased \$307.2 million (41.0%) since FY 1994. When adjusted for inflation this represents an 11.6% increase.
- Legislation passed in FY 2002 allows fuel tax rates to change each July 1 depending on the percentage of ethanol-blended gasoline sold during the previous calendar year. The tax rate change on ethanol-blended gasoline ranges from 19.0 cents to 20.0 cents per gallon, while the rate change on gasoline ranges from 20.0 cents to 21.0 cents per gallon. Fuel tax receipts have grown 1.8% less than the rate of inflation over the past ten years.

## FY 2003 IOWA ROAD USE TAX FUND DISTRIBUTION



Funds distributed to the four road funds and the Revitalize Iowa's Sound Economy (RISE) Fund have increased 47.5% since FY 1994, at the same time that funding for off-the-top allocations has decreased 10.9%. The allocations for off-the-tops decreased substantially in FY 1996 through FY 2000, primarily the result of decreased diversions to fund the State Patrol from the General Fund. From FY 1996 to FY 2000, the State Patrol was funded from motor vehicle use tax receipts.



■ The cost of highway construction varies depending on a number of factors, including terrain, right-of-way costs, design, and structures. The estimated cost to construct a one-mile segment of new two-lane highway may vary from \$800,000 to \$1.5 million. The estimated cost to construct a one-mile segment of new four-lane highway may range from \$1.7 to nearly \$7.0 million. The estimated cost to resurface a mile stretch of highway varies from \$130,000 for a two-lane highway to \$250,000 or more for a four-lane highway.

- Approximately 62.1% of the total vehicle miles traveled in Iowa are traveled on the primary highway system, which makes up about 9.0% of Iowa's total road system.
- Truck traffic has increased 36.4% between 1990 and 2003, and 79.0% of the truck traffic is traveled on the primary highway system.
- lowa ranks 12th in total miles of road and 5th in number of structures nationally, although lowa ranks only 25th in land area and 30th in population.



## IOWA BRIDGES ON THE PRIMARY HIGHWAY SYSTEM





# IOWA TRANSPORTATION DISTRICTS AND HIGHWAY SUFFICIENCY RATINGS




Sufficiency Rating is a number from 0 to 100 that represents the relative condition of highway segments (0 worst - 100 best). It takes into account the structural adequacy, safety, and service of each segment. The rating is used as a performance measure to identify potential reconstruction needs.









# IOWA COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK ATM RINGS & VIDEO CLASSROOMS



- The lowa Communications Network (ICN) was created by the 1989 General Assembly as a fiber optic "highway" capable of carrying all forms of telecommunications traffic including voice, data, Internet, and video.
- Installation of the ICN began in 1991 as a three-part project.
  - Part I consists of 20 connection sites. These include 15 regional centers located at each of the community colleges throughout the State, the three Regent Universities, Iowa Public Television, and the State Capitol complex.
  - Part II consists of 84 connection sites. These include separate fiber optic lines from the respective regional center to each of the remaining counties.
     These sites are typically known as County Points of Presence (CPOP or POP).
  - Part III of the ICN added over 400 additional K-12 and public library sites using leased private sector connections between Fiscal Years 1996 and 2000 with approximate costs of \$80.8 million.
- A site may have multiple classrooms. Sites that have been added by users may not be included in the project parts (Part I through III) listed above. Classrooms total 758 as of August 2003.
  - The ICN is converting to five asynchronous transfer mode rings (ATM) that
    have been installed to provide signal transport redundancy in the system
    from a star-on-star topology. The upgrade also includes a switch to MPEG 2
    coder/decoder that allows for a more efficient use of the Network's capacity.
    Funding for the completion of the upgrade was received by the ICN for FY 2003.
  - The map above illustrates ICN video connections as well as the ATM rings that
    are a part of the upgrade. This portion of the ICN is commonly referred to as
    the "Backbone," and is owned by the State. Parts I and II were completed at a
    cost of \$114.5 million funded by Certificates of Participation.







# CY 2003 REGISTERED VOTERS BY CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT









- Denison is involved in lease negotiations. Lease negotiations will begin during October for the Ringsted site. All installed sites have been gifted to the National Weather Service.
- There are three towers in Missouri that overlap coverage into Southern lowa due to State matching assistance that Missouri provided for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant. Currently, 90.0% to 95.0% of the State is covered by NOAA.




### IOWA METHAMPHETAMINE LAB SEIZURES BY CALENDAR YEAR





- The decrease in AIDS cases diagnosed in 1998 is attributable to new treatment methods, including Highly Active Antiviral Therapy (HAART).






- The 3,420 births to teens accounted for 9.1% of total lowa births in 2002.



- Death Rate: Overall deaths in Iowa have decreased 0.08% from 1993 through 2002. The death indicators for infants (Neonatal, Fetal, and Infant deaths) have improved since the late 1980s, decreasing 19.7% from 1993 through 2002.
- Marriages and Dissolutions: The annual number of marriages in the State has declined 10.6% since 1993, while the annual number of dissolutions has decreased 14.8%.



# IOWA GAMBLING TREATMENT PROGRAM CALLS TO 1-800-BETS OFF




# ADMITTED CLIENTS RECEIVING GAMBLING TREATMENT COUNSELING





■ The estimated number of veterans in lowa decreased by 17.4% from FY 1987 through FY 2003. The average daily census at the lowa Veterans Home increased by 10.4% from FY 1987 through FY 2003. The decrease in the early 1990s was a result of the downsizing of the military, a decrease in funding, increasing deaths of World War II veterans, and changes in the regulations due to the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990. The increase realized since 1993 is due to the reopening of beds at the lowa Veterans Home based upon the Revenue Enhancement Program. The decrease in census for FY 2002 is due to being taken off-line during a construction project.

■ The median age of a veteran in lowa was 57 years of age in 2003. The median age of residents at the lowa Veterans Home was 71 years of age in 2003.


- lowa had an estimated 2,936,760 residents according to the 2002 census, a gain of 129,837 compared to the 1992 census. This gain of 4.6% was less than half of the growth rate for the nation (13.1%).
- Surrounding states' populations grew at a rate greater than lowa's in the last decade. However, their growth rates were also less than the national average.
- Five states (Delaware, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia) had a slower growth rate than lowa.
- Eight states accounted for 55.7% of the total national population growth: Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Texas, and Washington.
- The population growth in California (4.2 million), Florida (3.2 million), and Texas (4.1 million) was greater than Iowa's total population in 2002.
- lowa's population increased by 11.8% during the last 50 years (1952 2002). Only one state, North Dakota, had a smaller growth rate (4.3%) than lowa during the last 50 years. During that time, two states had negative growth rates: West Virginia at 7.9% and Delaware at 29.1%.
- lowa's population growth of 31.1% during the last 100 years is the lowest growth rate in the nation.
- In 1900, lowa was the 10th most populous state. By 2002, lowa ranked 30th in terms of population.

#### **IOWA FACTS**

- The farm population decreased substantially while small towns remained relatively stable. People living in the country, but not in small towns or on farms, gained throughout the last 50 years.
- People aged 75 years or older have increased each of the last five decades. During the 1990s, lowa had more residents 75 years old or older than children under the age of 5. Florida is the only other state where this occurred.
- Projections by Woods and Poole Economics, Inc., indicate that lowa's population will continue to age, and grow slowly.
- In 2002 lowa had 949 incorporated places.
  - There were 673 places with less than 1,000 residents.
  - There were 119 places with between 1,000 and 1,999 residents.
  - There were 80 places with between 2,000 and 4,999 residents.
  - There were 42 places with between 5,000 and 9,999 residents.
  - There were 26 places with between 10,000 and 49,999 residents.
  - There were 9 places with greater than 50,000 residents.
- Forty-seven of lowa's counties gained residents during the last decade. Of these, 21 counties had increases greater than 1,000 people.
- Population gains for Dallas, Polk, Johnson, and Linn counties exceeded 10,000 people.
- Fifty-two counties experienced declining populations. Eighteen counties had population declines of at least 500 people. Cerro Gordo, Cherokee, Clinton, Des Moines, Kossuth, and Lee Counties had declines greater than 1,000 people.
- Six counties had populations in excess of 100,000 people: Black Hawk, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Scott, and Woodbury. These six counties account for 36.9% of Iowa's total population in Iowa.
- Fifty percent of Iowa's population is concentrated in 12 counties: Black Hawk, Cerro Gordo, Clinton, Des Moines, Dubuque, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Pottawattamie, Scott, Story, and Woodbury.







# IOWA MANAGED SUBSTANCE ABUSE CARE PLAN REGIONS





# IOWA COMMUNITY BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION SERVICE AREAS




