

# STATE OF IOWA POPULATION AND LAND AREA STATISTICS







- This chart represents the total fund balance of the General Fund on a GAAP basis of accounting and includes both reserved and unreserved fund balances for FY2003 FY2010 and spendable and nonspendable fund balances for FY2011 and FY 2012. Reserved fund balances are those that have a statutory restriction on the expenditure of the funds, while unreserved fund balances have no statutory restriction. Nonspendable fund balances include inventories, prepaid items, noncurrent receivables, and principle on endowments. These resources cannot be expended because they are either not in a spendable form or are legally required to remain intact. Spendable fund balances include resources that are available for spending and further classified as restricted, committed, assigned, or unassigned, based on the level of spending constraint, if any.
- Fund balance information is of central importance to bond rating analysts
  when conducting credit reviews. Users of financial statements examine
  fund balance information to identify the available current financial
  resources that can be used to repay long-term debt, reduce property
  taxes, add new governmental programs, expand existing ones, or
  enhance the financial position of the government.

**Identified Need:** Department of Management determination of the need prior to the General Assembly appropriating the funds, based on a comparison of budget and projection per each employee's position.

Difference: The total surplus or deficit after matching the need to the resources provided.

**Prorate:** If this equals 100.0%, resources met or exceeded the need, and the balance reverted. If less than 100.0%, resources were less than the total need.

#### NOTES:

- FY 2000 The appropriation reflects a reduction of \$2.7 million in HF 2039 (FY 2000 Deappropriation Act).
- FY 2002 The total appropriation reflects two Iowa Code section 8.31(5) appropriation reductions by the Governor totaling \$38,800 and the utilization of \$9.0 million from the Underground Storage Tank Fund.
- FY 2003 The total appropriation included \$41.1 million from Regents demutualization funds and the Underground Storage Tank Fund.
- FY 2004 The Board of Regents employees did not directly receive salary funding. The total appropriation includes a \$13.5 million transfer from Medicaid and the \$2,900 lowa Code section 8.31 reduction.
- FY 2006 The total appropriation includes the \$2.4 million increase from HF 882 (FY 2006 Standing Appropriations Act).
- FY 2007 The total excludes the Board of Regents and Judicial Branch.







- 1) The RCF received \$540.0 million in net proceeds in FY 2002 from securitization of tobacco settlement payments from the Master Settlement Agreement.
- 2) The RC2 received \$100.5 million net proceeds in FY 2006 after the refunding of the RCF bonds. Appropriations were first made from it in FY 2007.
- 3) The FY 2009 PBF received \$130.7 million in net proceeds from bonds issued and secured with judicial fines and fees.
- 4) The RBC and RBC2 received net proceeds of \$545.0 million and \$150.0 million, respectively, from bonds issued in 2009 and 2010. Appropriations from the RBC were made for FY 2009, although the funds did not become available until FY 2010.
- 5) The TRF was created during the 2006 Legislative Session and receives a standing appropriation of \$17.5 million from the General Fund. In FY 2009 through FY 2012, and in FY 2014, the TRF received its funding from the RIIF instead of the General Fund. The appropriations from the RIIF to the TRF have been subtracted to avoid double counting. For FY 2013, the TRF received \$20.0 million from a wagering tax allocation.
- 6) The General Assembly occasionally appropriates from other sources for the purposes of infrastructure. In FY 2011, \$6.6 million was appropriated from the Cash Reserve Fund for infrastructure projects related to flood recovery. Also in FY 2011, \$2.0 million was appropriated from the Underground Storage Tank Fund for passenger rail. In FY 2013, \$5.0 million was appropriated from the Mortgage Servicing Settlement Fund for community college infrastructure. These are one-time appropriations and are not regular sources of infrastructure funding. The appropriations are reflected as "Other" above.
- 7) During the 2013 Legislative Session, the General Assembly appropriated \$37.5 million in FY 2013 supplemental appropriations from the General Fund for infrastructure projects. That amount is reflected as "Other" above.







(Calendar Year 2012)







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### **GROWTH IN GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCTS**











## **IOWA SINGLE UNIT HOUSING PERMITS ISSUED**




## **VALUE OF IOWA SINGLE UNIT HOUSING PERMITS ISSUED**

# SALES OF CARS, TRUCKS, AND MULTI-PURPOSE VEHICLES IN IOWA








## ANIMAL MIXED FEED TONNAGE IN IOWA



### CORN AND SOYBEAN MARKET YEAR IOWA AVERAGE PRICE PER BUSHEL







#### **UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN IOWA**



#### NONFARM EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY IN IOWA August 2012 - August 2013




#### LABORFORCE PARTICIPATION RATE

### PERCENT OF EMPLOYED POPULATION AND UNEMPLOYMENT RATE




### NONFARM EMPLOYMENT COMPARED TO TOTAL IOWA POPULATION

### PERCENT OF IOWA POPULATION EMPLOYED IN NONFARM OCCUPATIONS



(Calendar Year 2012)

















(dollars in millions)













(dollars in millions)









# IOWA BOARD OF REGENTS UNIVERSITIES TOTAL ENROLLMENT FALL 2013


# PERCENT OF THE POPULATION 25 YEARS AND OVER WITH A BACHELOR'S DEGREE OR HIGHER









## MONTHLY FOSTER CARE COST BY TYPE OF CARE









(dollars in millions)








### DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES DECATEGORIZATION PROJECTS IN IOWA






### LEGAL COUNSEL COSTS FOR INDIGENT DEFENDANTS IN IOWA

The Correctional Release Center - Newton, Clarinda Lodge, Luster Heights Camp, and the live out unit at Mitchellville are SD-1 facilities.

SD-2 facilities have enhanced perimeter fencing that may include motion detection and razor ribbon.

The Rockwell City Correctional Facility and John Bennett Unit at Fort Madison are SD-2 facilities.

#### For medium custody offenders:

SD-3 facilities have a lighted, double-fenced perimeter with a perimeter detection system.

The Mount Pleasant Correctional Facility is an SD-3 facility.

**SD-4** facilities have a lighted, double-fenced perimeter with a taut wire perimeter detection system and armed perimeter control.

The Clarinda, Newton, and Fort Dodge Correctional Facilities are SD-4 facilities.

**SD-5** facilities have a lighted wall (or double fence), a taut wire perimeter detection system, and armed towers. SD-5 facilities may also house maximum custody offenders. Anamosa and Oakdale are SD-5 facilities.

#### For maximum custody offenders:

**SD-6** facilities have a lighted wall (or double fence), a perimeter detection system that may include stun features, and armed towers.

The Iowa State Penitenitiary at Fort Madison is an SD-6 facility.


### NATIONAL COMPARISONS OF CORRECTIONAL SYSTEMS POPULATIONS

- **National Data.** There were 1,571,013 offenders incarcerated nationally on December 31, 2012. This is a decrease of 1.7% compared to one year ago. This is the third year in a row that the U.S. prison population declined. The federal system, California (134,434 offenders), Texas (166,372 offenders), and Florida (101,930) together held 39.5% of all prisoners in the country.
- **Federal System.** The federal prison system held 217,815 offenders at year end 2012, making it the largest penal system in the country. The federal prison system grew 0.7% from 2011 to 2012. This is a lower growth rate than the average annual increase of 3.2% over the past 10 years.
- State Prisoners. The number of state prisoners has declined for the third year in a row and that represents a shift in the direction of incarceration over the last 30 years. State prison populations grew every year between 1978 (307,276 prisoners held in all state prisons) to a high of 1,615,487 in 2009. The estimated state prison population at year-end 2012 is 1,353,198. This is a 2.1% decrease compared to year-end 2011.
- **Population Increases.** Prison systems with increases in the population of at least 1,000 offenders are Louisiana (1,538 increase) and the federal system (1,453 increase). Mississippi, Michigan, and Kentucky each increased by more than 500 offenders.
- Population Decreases. The prison population decreased in 28 states during Calendar Year (CY) 2012, with nine states reporting decreases in excess of 1,000 offenders. California had the largest decline and is responsible for about 51.0% of the decrease in the U.S. prison population. The prison population decreased by 15,035 offenders in California, or about 10.0% compared to one year ago. Texas had the next largest decline (5,852 decrease) followed by North Carolina, Colorado, and Arkansas.
- California. The state is under several federal mandates related to the care and treatment of
  medically and/or mentally ill offenders and overcrowding. The state implemented its <u>Public Safety</u>
  <u>Realignment</u> on October 1, 2011, to divert new admissions of nonviolent, nonsexual offenders to
  local jail facilities. According to the "<u>Prisoners in 2012 Advance Counts</u>" report, this policy
  change resulted in more violent offenders held in the state prison system while offenders convicted
  for drug or property crimes decreased over the last year.
- **lowa Data.** Iowa's year-end 2012 prison population was 8,733 offenders; this is a decrease of 4.2% compared to 2011. Iowa's prison population peaked in April 2011 at 9,009 prisoners. The lowa prison population has been trending downward for the last 18 months. The prison population on September 25, 2013, was 8,158 offenders, or 114.8% of capacity.
- Imprisonment Rates. Imprisonment rates are calculated by the number of sentenced inmates per 100,000 residents. The national imprisonment rate is 480 sentenced prisoners for all U.S. residents of all ages. This is a decrease of 2.4% compared to 2011. The federal rate was 62 prisoners per U.S residents of all ages, while the state rate was 418 prisoners. Men (910 prisoners) are incarcerated at a much higher level than women (63).
- State Imprisonment Rates. Louisiana has the highest imprisonment rate (893 offenders) followed by Mississippi (717 offenders), Alabama (650 offenders), Oklahoma (648 offenders), and Texas (601 offenders). Maine (145 offenders) has the lowest imprisonment rate. Iowa's imprisonment rate is estimated to be 282 per 100,000 residents of all ages; this is a decrease of 4.4% compared to 2011. Iowa ranks 39th in the nation in terms of the imprisonment rate.

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### IOWA JUDICIAL DISTRICTS AND LOCATION OF ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES



#### **Functionally Obsolete**

Bridges classified as functionally obsolete do not have land widths, shoulder widths, or vertical clearances adequate to serve traffic demand, or the bridge may not be able to handle occasional roadway flooding. While it is not unsafe for all vehicles, the older design features cannot adequately accommodate current traffic volumes or vehicle sizes and weights.

#### **Structurally Deficient**

A bridge is structurally deficient if there is significant deterioration of the bridge deck, supports, or other major components. Bridges that are structurally deficient are restricted to carrying lower weight vehicles or closed if they are found to be unsafe. The classification of a bridge as "structurally" deficient does not mean the structure is unsafe and most structurally deficient bridges can continue to serve traffic safely if they are properly inspected and maintained.









#### **COUNTY 2012 POPULATION ESTIMATES**




Estimated State of Iowa 2012 Population = 3,074,186





# REGISTERED IOWA VOTERS BY COUNTY 2013










#### **IOWA CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS**










# IOWA GAMBLING TREATMENT PROGRAM CALLS TO 1-800-BETS OFF


# CLIENTS RECEIVING GAMBLING TREATMENT COUNSELING




- lowa had an estimated 3,046,355 residents in 2010 according to the U.S. Census Bureau, a gain of 120,031 compared to the 2000 census. This gain of 4.1% was less than the growth rate for the nation (9.7%).
- With the exception of Illinois, surrounding state populations grew at a rate greater than lowa in the last decade. However, their growth rates were also less than the national average.
- Ten states, (Michigan, Rhode Island, Louisiana, Ohio, New York, West Virginia, Vermont, Massachusetts, Illinois, and Pennsylvania) had a slower growth rate than Iowa.
- Six states accounted for 54.0% of the total national population growth: Texas, California, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and Arizona.
- Iowa's population increased by 10.5% since 1960. Only two states, North Dakota and West Virginia, had a smaller growth rate than Iowa during this time.
- lowa's population growth of 27.0% during the last 100 years is the lowest growth rate in the nation during this time period.
- In 1910, lowa was the 15th most populous of the 46 states and the District of Columbia. By 2010, lowa ranked 30th in terms of population.

#### **IOWA FACTS**

- The farm population decreased substantially while small towns remained relatively stable. The number of people living in the country, but not in small towns or on farms, increased throughout the last 55 years.
- The total number of people aged 75 years or older has increased each of the last five decades. Data from the 2010 Census indicates lowa had more residents 75 years old or older than children under the age of 5. There are 21 other states where this occurred.
- Projections by Woods and Poole Economics, Inc., indicate that Iowa's population will continue to age and grow slowly.
- In 2010 lowa had 947 incorporated places.
  - There were 663 places with less than 1,000 residents.
  - There were 124 places with between 1,000 and 1,999 residents.
  - There were 80 places with between 2,000 and 4,999 residents.
  - There were 42 places with between 5,000 and 9,999 residents.
  - There were 28 places with between 10,000 and 49,999 residents.
  - There were 10 places with greater than 50,000 residents.
- Twenty-two of lowa's counties gained residents since 2000. Of these, 16 counties had increases greater than 1,000 people.
- Population gains for Polk, Dallas, Johnson, and Linn counties exceeded 10,000 people.
- Sixty-six counties experienced declining populations. Forty-four had population declines of at least 500 people. A total of 17 counties had declines greater than 1,000 people.
- Six counties had populations in excess of 100,000 people: Black Hawk, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Scott, and Woodbury. These six counties account for 38.4% of Iowa's total population.
- A total of 51.3% of Iowa's population is concentrated in 11 counties: Black Hawk, Clinton, Dallas, Dubuque, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Pottawattamie, Scott, Story, and Woodbury.





# PERCENTAGE OF IOWA CHILDREN DIAGNOSED WITH LEAD POISONING BEFORE AGE SIX






## POPULATION AND VITAL STATISTICS SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION SERVICE AREAS






## **Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Counties**



# Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Rural Areas by County




# Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Urban Areas by County




## **County Tax Levy Rate**



## **Mental Health Levy Tax Rate by County**




## Taxable Valuation by Property Classification by County - FY 2013



Per capita expenditures are calculated by dividing a county's total expenditures by the 2010 population. There is a negative relationship between county size (either total expenditures or population) and per capita expenditures. That is, the larger counties spend less per person for county government service, this can be attributed to economies of scale.



## **Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Cities**



### **Total Non-Ag City Property Tax Levy Rates**






## Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for School District




## **Total School District Levy Rate by School District**



### **School District General Fund Levy Rate**




## Total Property Tax Relief Aid - Rate Reduction by School District


## TIF Valuation as a Percentage of Total Valuation by School District






### Tax Rate by Township









Per Farm Acre - FY 2013



and Percent Change from 2011 to 2012 and 2008 to 2012












#### **County Road Fund Expenditures by Category**

and Per Capita amounts FY 2013



#### School District Enrollment as a Percent of Total Population



#### **Certified Enrollment Change by School District**




#### Full-Time Average Regular Teacher Salary by School District


#### Full-Time Superintendent Salary by School District

#### Salary and Benefit Expenditure per Pupil by School District






#### Community College District Expenditures FY 2006 - FY 2012


Salary Expenditures per FTEE







#### **Percentage of Cost-Burdened Homeowners**




