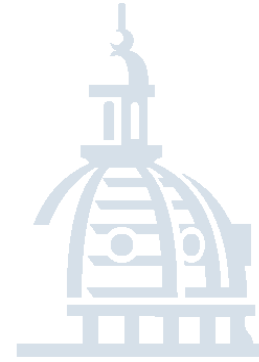




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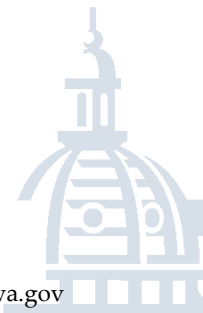

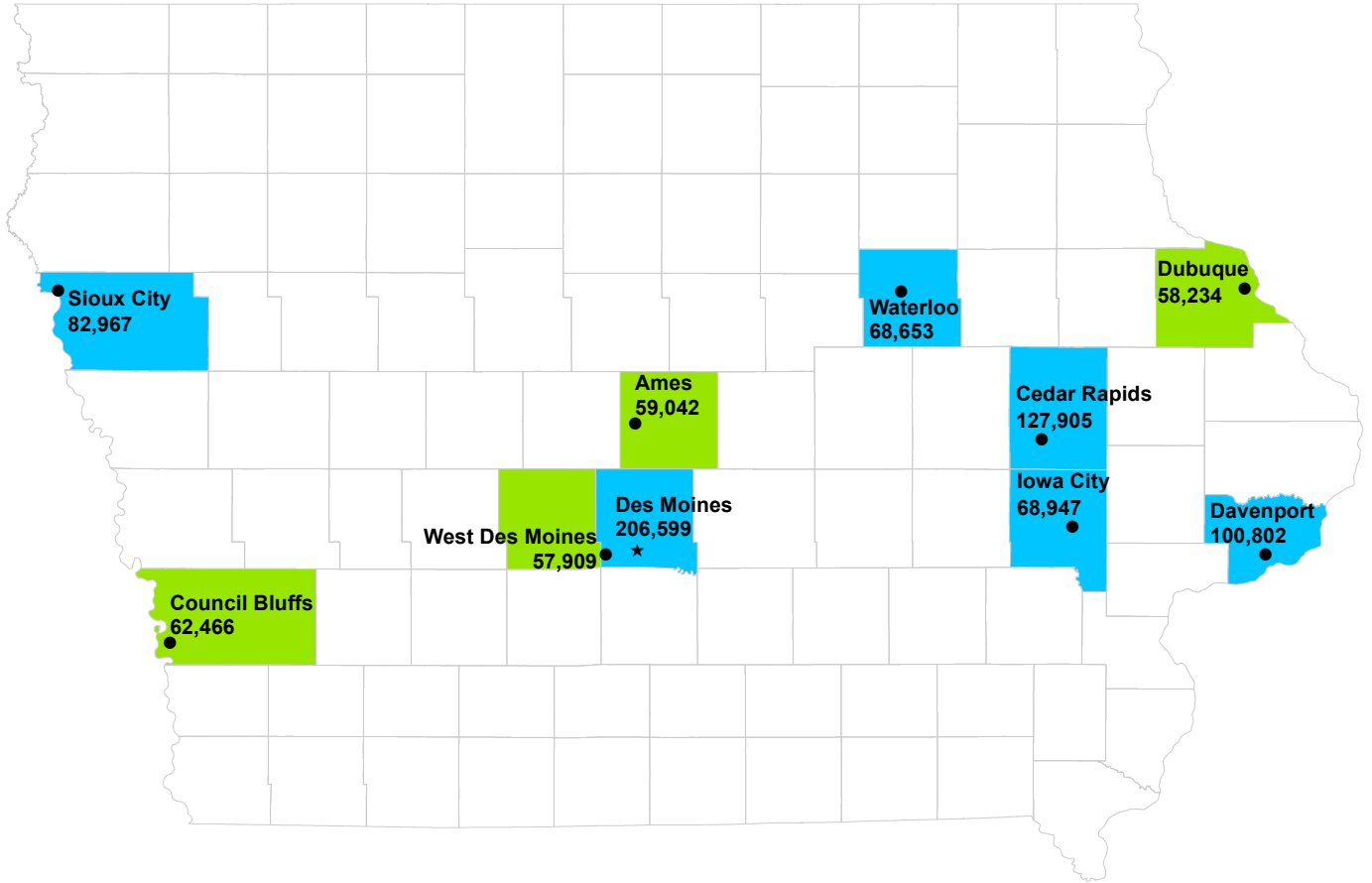

- This chart represents the total fund balance of the General Fund on a GAAP basis of accounting and includes both reserved and unreserved fund balances for FY2002 - FY2010 and spendable and nonspendable fund balances for FY2011. Reserved fund balances are those that have a statutory restriction on the expenditure of the funds, while unreserved fund balances have no statutory restriction. Nonspendable fund balances include inventories, prepaid items, noncurrent receivables and principle on endowments. These resources cannot be spent because they are either not in a spendable form or are legally required to remain intact. Spendable fund balances include resources that are available for spending and further classified as restricted, committed, assigned, or unassigned, based on the level of spending constraint, if any.
- Fund balance information is of central importance to bond rating analysts when conducting credit reviews. Users of financial statements examine fund balance information to identify the available current financial resources that can be used to repay long-term debt, reduce property taxes, add new governmental programs, expand existing ones, or enhance the financial position of the government.

State Appropriation: General Fund resources provided to address the needs of salary adjustment.

Identified Need: Department of Management determination of the need prior to the General Assembly appropriating the funds, based on a comparison of budget and projection per each employee's position.

Difference: The total surplus or deficit after matching the need to the resources provided.

Prorate: If this equals 100.0%, resources met or exceeded the need, and the balance reverted. If less than 100.0%, resources were less than the total need.

Notes:

- FY 2000 The appropriation reflects a reduction of \$2.7 million in HF 2039 (FY 2000 Deappropriation Act).
- FY 2002 The total appropriation reflects two Iowa Code section 8.31(5) appropriation reductions by the Governor totaling \$38,800 and the utilization of \$9.0 million from the Underground Storage Tank Fund.
- FY 2003 The total appropriation included \$41.1 million from Regents demutualization funds and the Underground Storage Tank Fund.
- FY 2004 The Board of Regents employees did not directly receive salary funding. The total appropriation includes a \$13.5 million transfer from Medicaid and the \$2,900 Iowa Code section 8.31 reduction.
- FY 2006 The total appropriation includes the \$2.4 million increase from HF 882 (FY 2006 Standing Appropriations Act).
- FY 2007 The total excludes the Board of Regents and Judicial Branch.

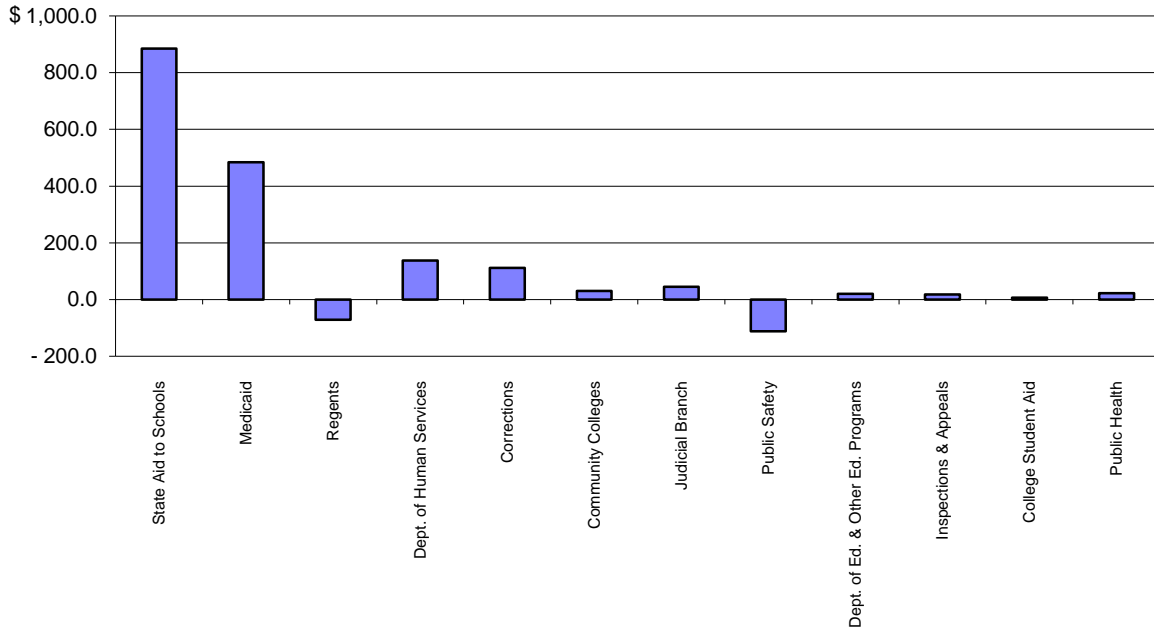

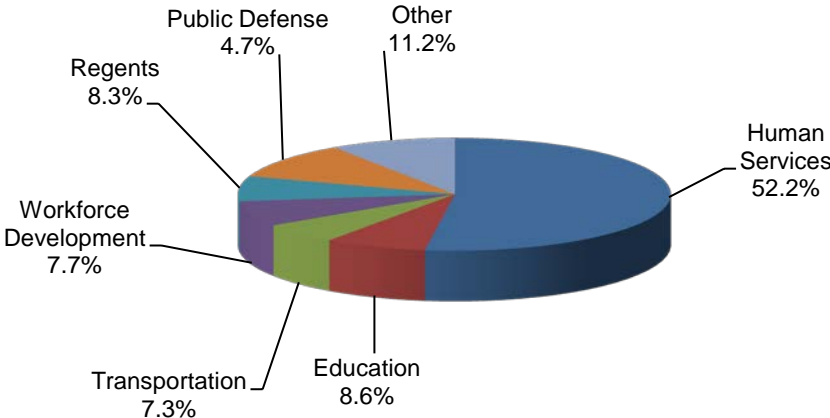

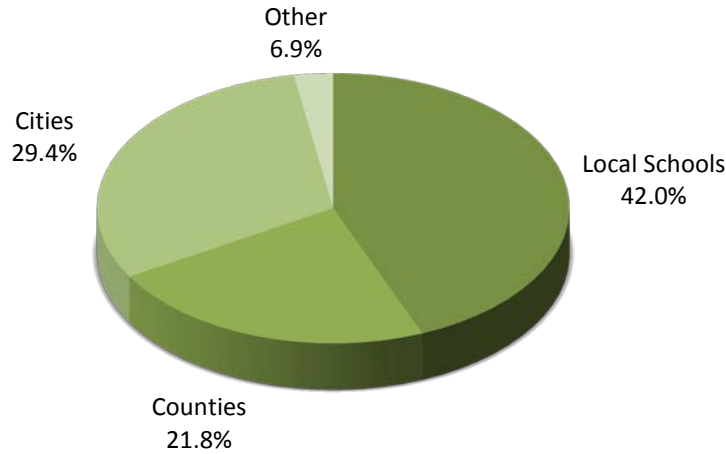

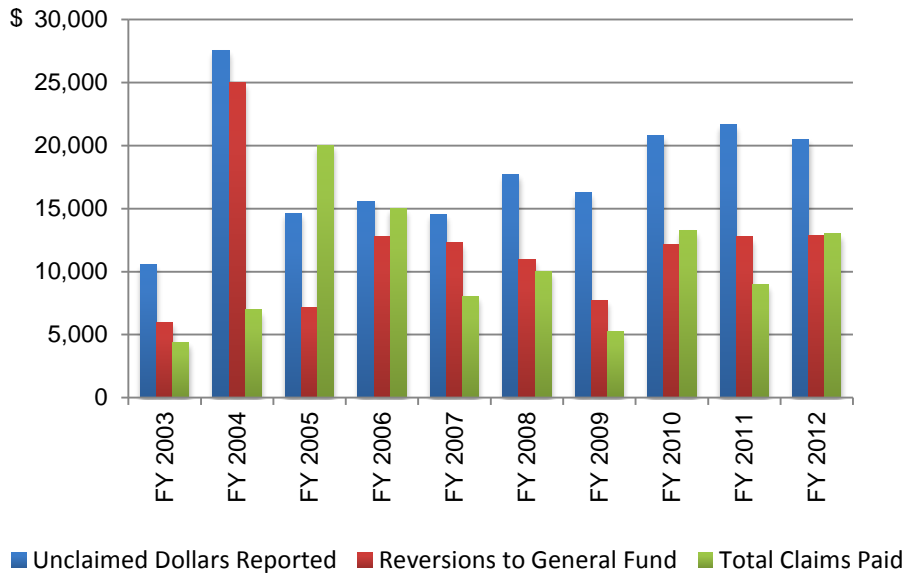

- 1) The RCF received \$540.0 million in net proceeds in FY 2002 from securitization of tobacco settlement payments from the Master Settlement Agreement.
- 2) The RC2 received \$100.5 million net proceeds in FY 2006 after the refunding of the RCF bonds. Appropriations were first made from it in FY 2007.
- 3) The FY 2009 PBF received \$130.7 million in net proceeds from bonds issued and secured with judicial fines and fees.
- 4) The RBC and RBC2 received net proceeds of \$545.0 million and \$150.0 million, respectively, from bonds issued in 2009 and 2010. Appropriations from the RBC were made for FY 2009, although the funds did not become available until FY 2010.
- 5) The TRF was created during the 2006 Legislative Session and receives a standing appropriation of \$17.5 million from the General Fund. In FY 2009 through FY 2011, the TRF received its funding from the RIIF instead of the General Fund. - 6) The VIF was created during the 2004 Legislative Session and received \$15.0 million from the RIIF in FY 2006 and and FY 2007, and \$50.0 million from the RIIF in FY 2008. The appropriations from the RIIF to the VIF have been subtracted to avoid double counting. During the 2008 Legislative Session, the VIF was eliminated effective FY 2009, and the remaining balance was transferred back to the RIIF.
- 7) The General Assembly sometimes appropriates from other sources for the purposes of infrastructure. In FY 2011, \$6.6 million was appropriated from the Cash Reserve Fund for infrastructure projects related to flood recovery. Also in FY 2011, \$2.0 million from the Underground Storage Tank Fund was appropriated for passenger rail. In FY 2013, \$5.0 million was appropriated for community college infrastructure from the Mortgage Servicing Settlement Fund. These are one-time appropriations and are not regular sources of infrastructure funding.

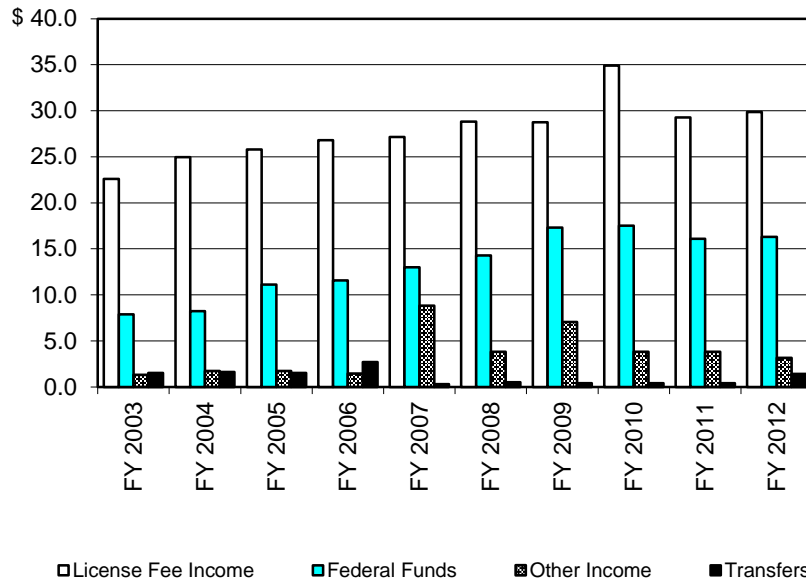

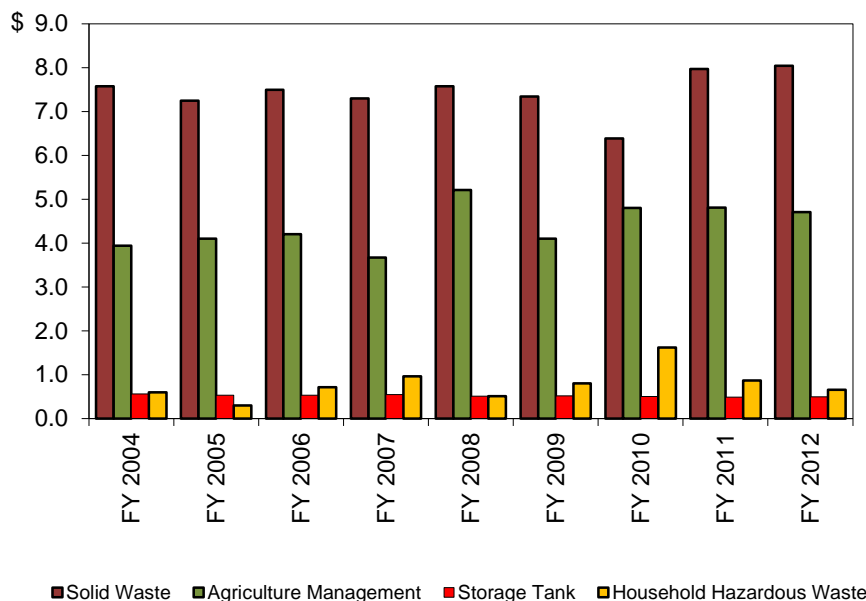

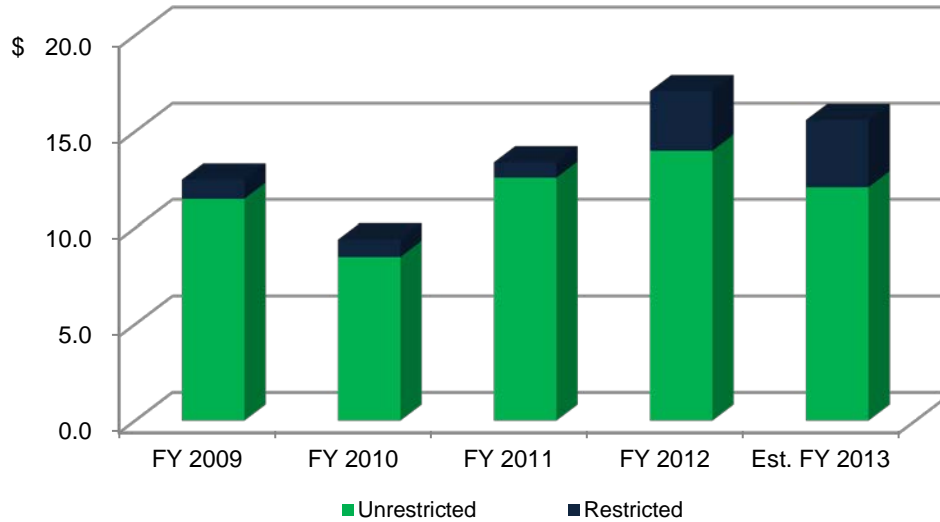
GROUNDWATER PROTECTION FUND INCOME - IOWA (in millions)

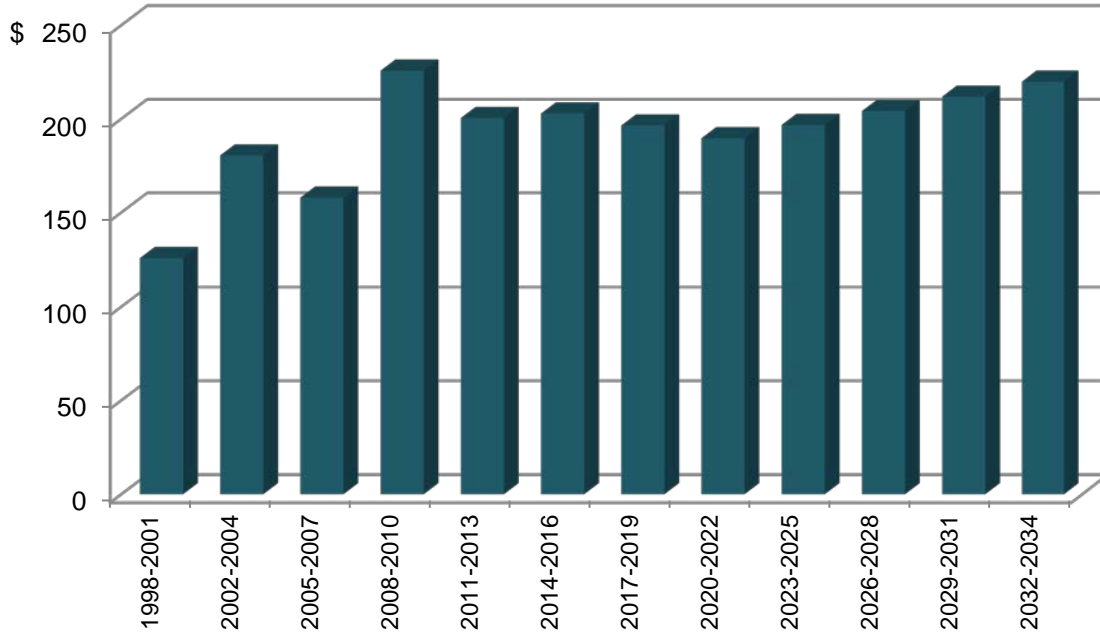

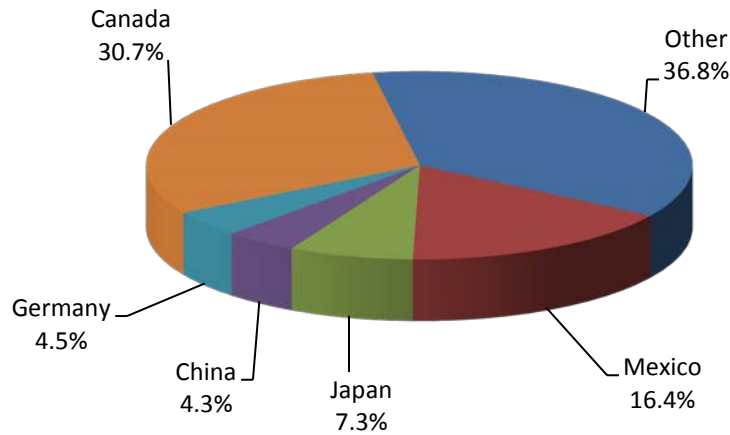

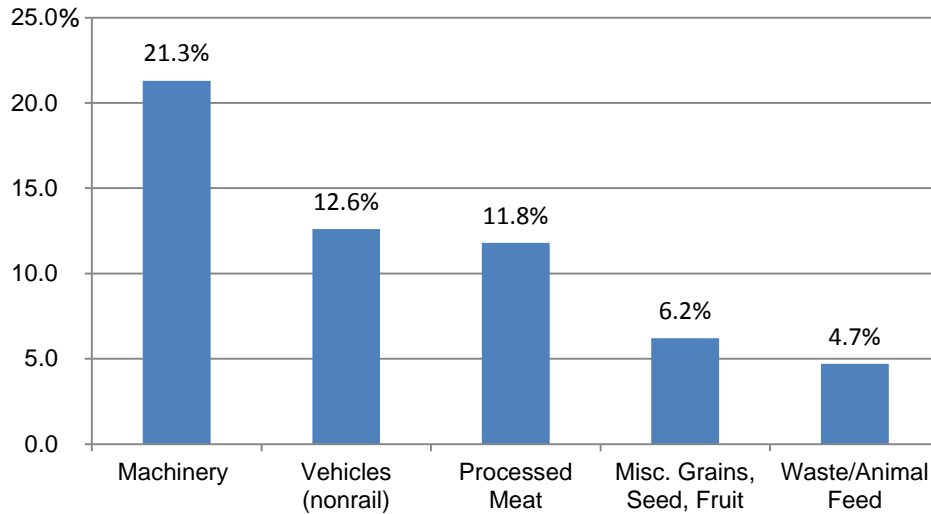
**DISTRIBUTION OF IOWA'S

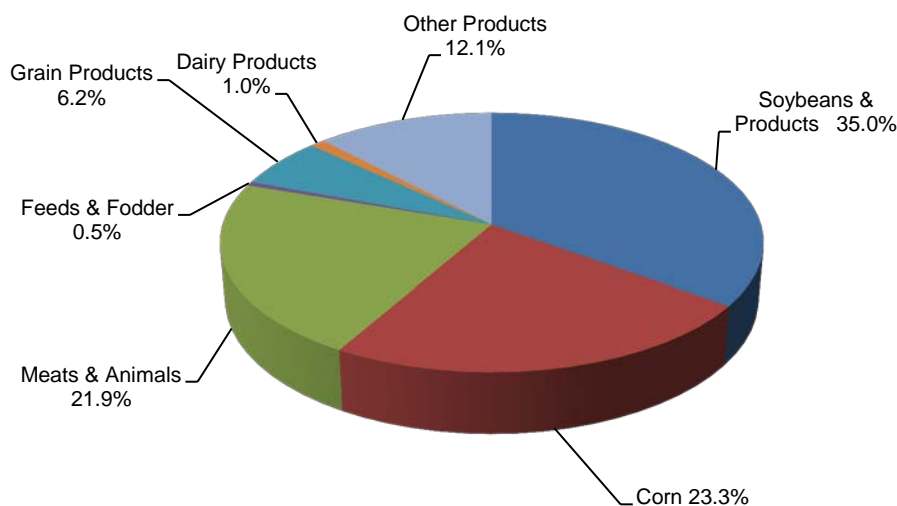
**TOP FIVE IOWA EXPORTS OF

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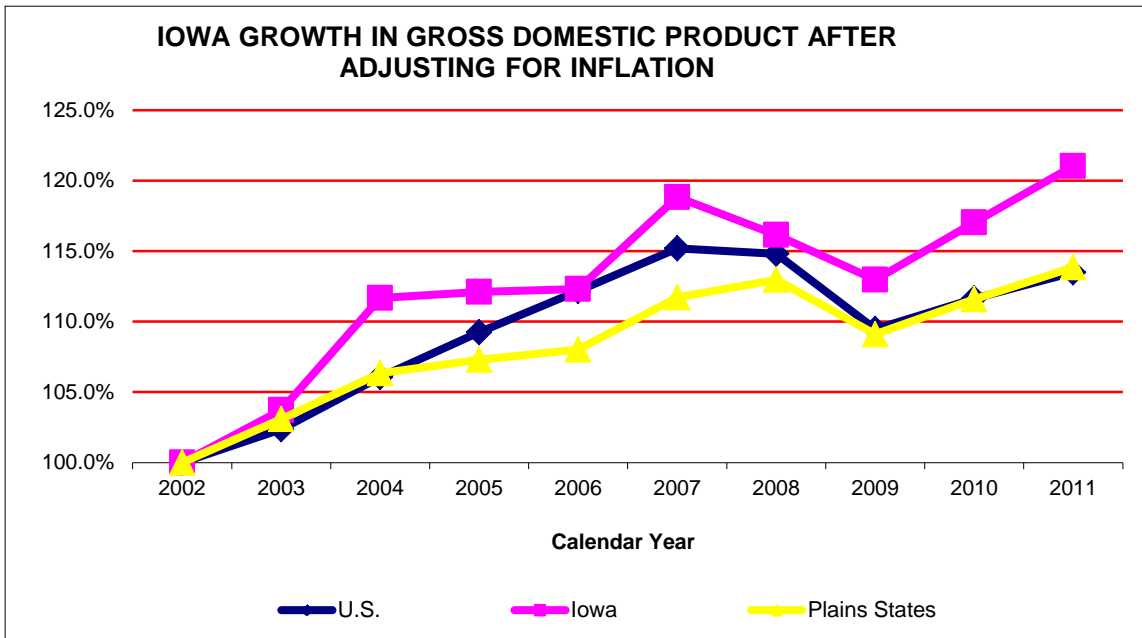
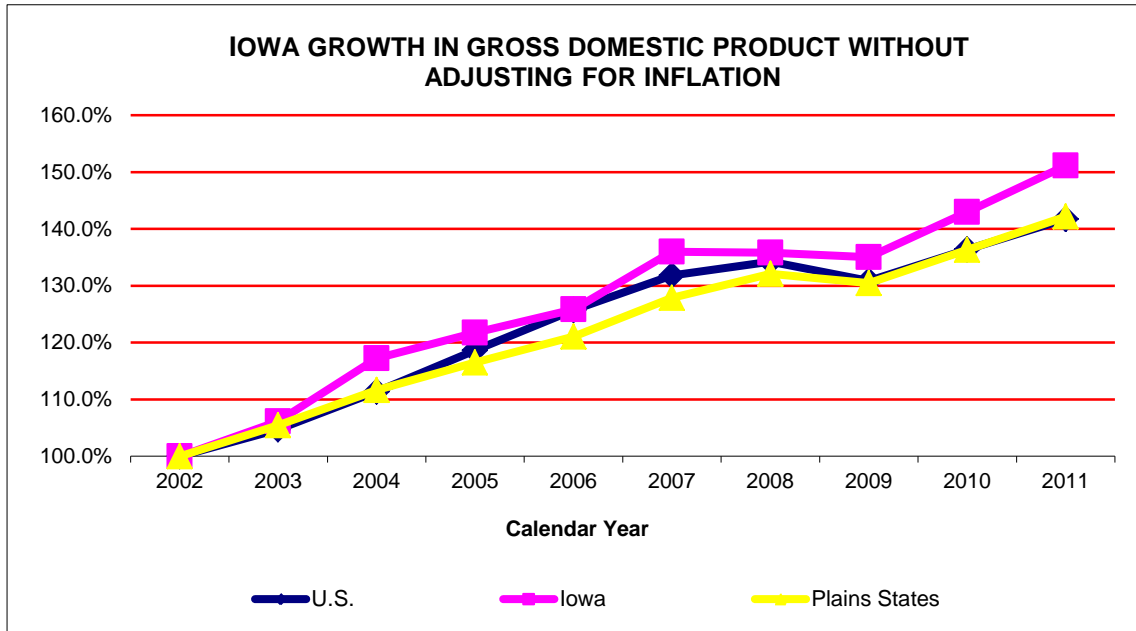

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GROWTH IN GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCTS



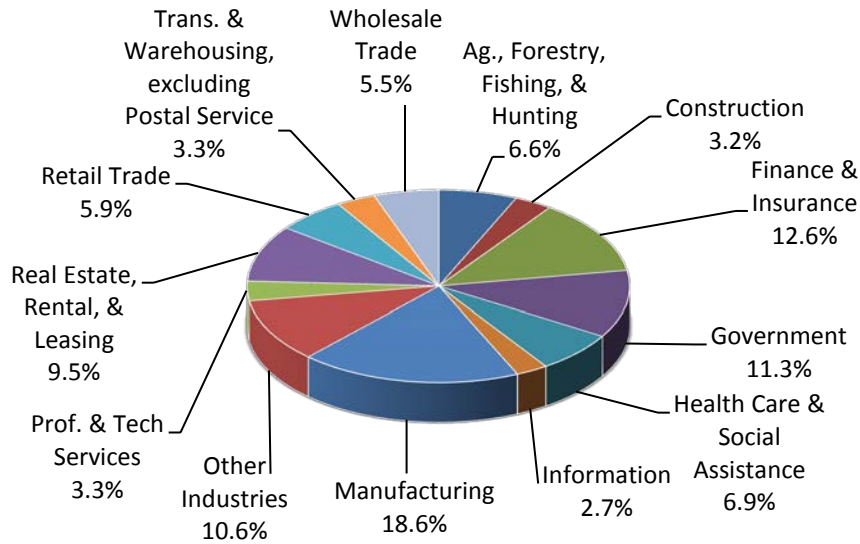

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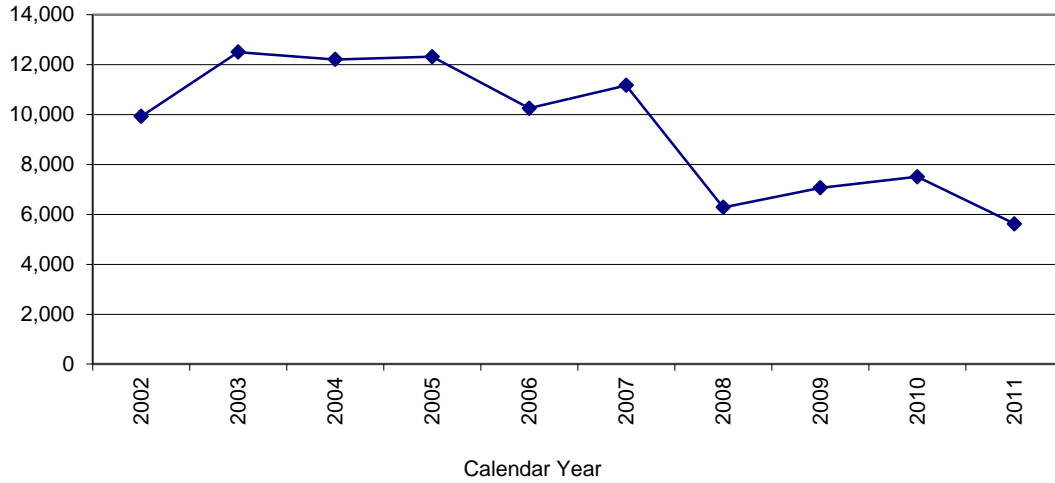

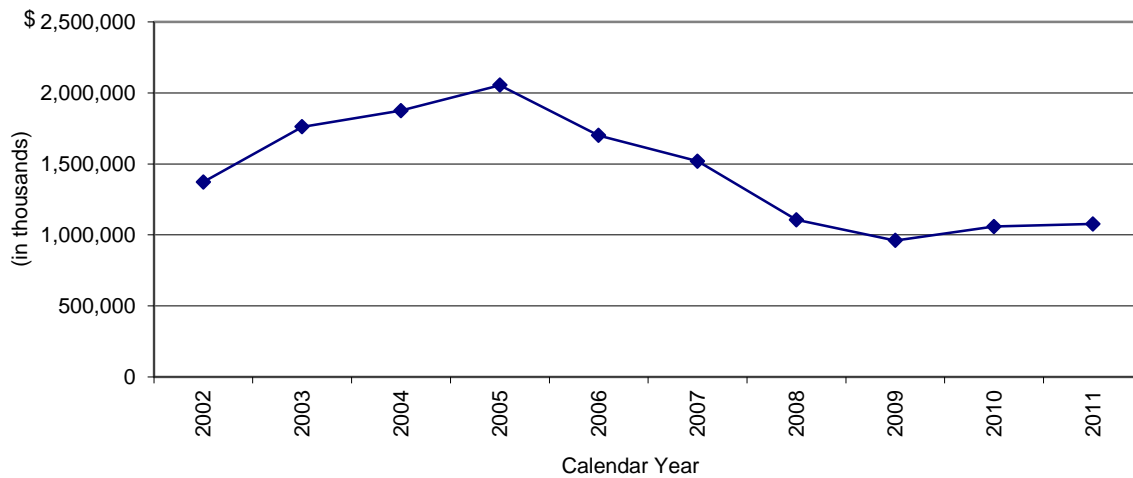

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IOWA SINGLE UNIT HOUSING PERMITS ISSUED

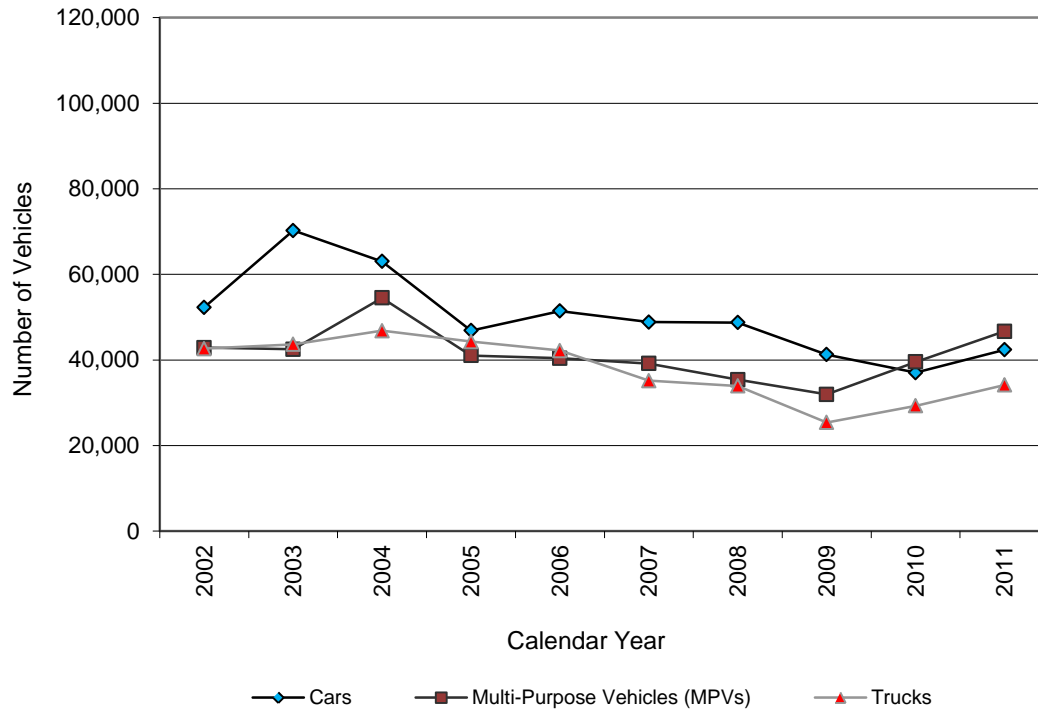


VALUE OF IOWA SINGLE UNIT HOUSING PERMITS ISSUED

SALES OF CARS, TRUCKS, AND MULTI-PURPOSE VEHICLES IN IOWA



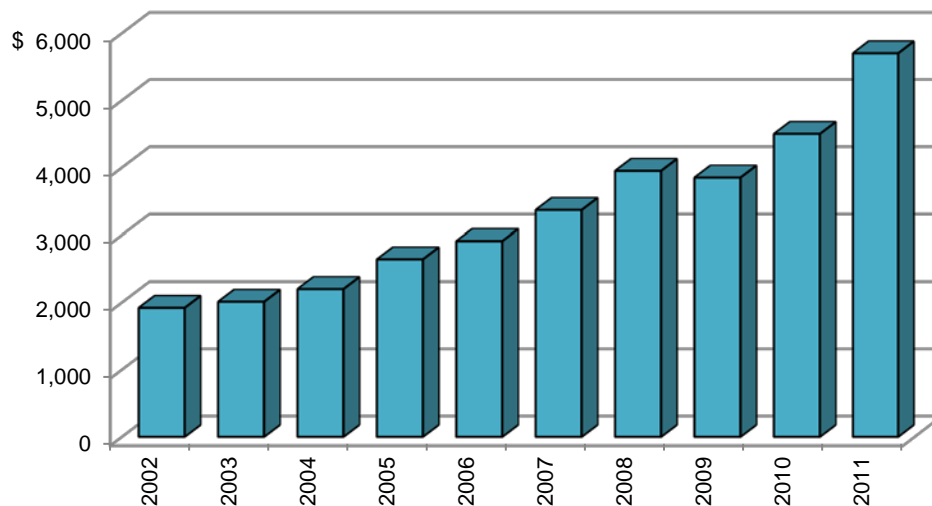

FARM REAL ESTATE IOWA AVERAGE VALUE PER ACRE



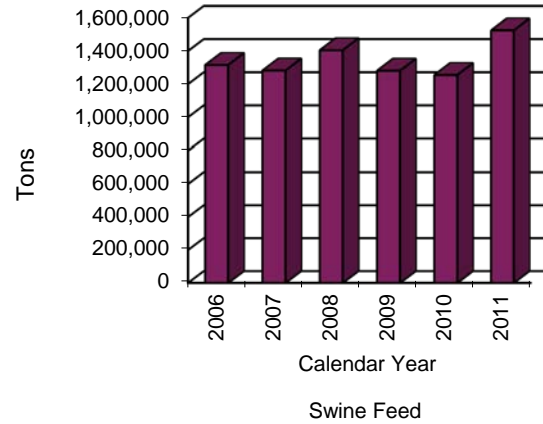
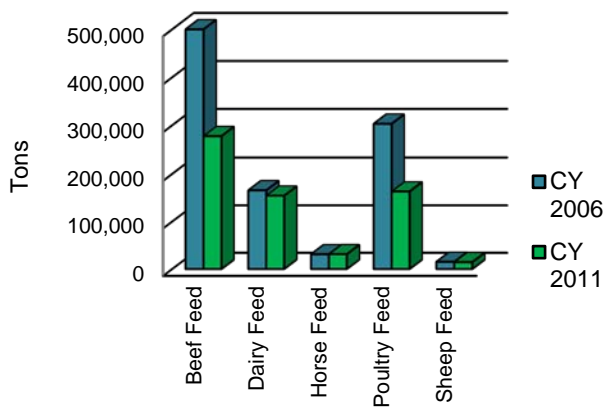

ANIMAL MIXED FEED TONNAGE IN IOWA

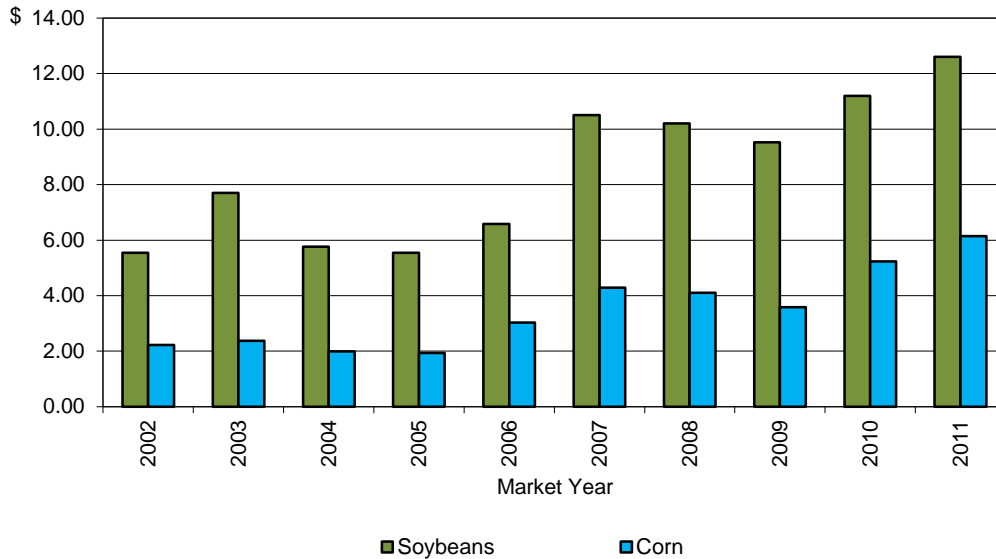

CORN AND SOYBEAN MARKET YEAR IOWA AVERAGE PRICE PER BUSHEL



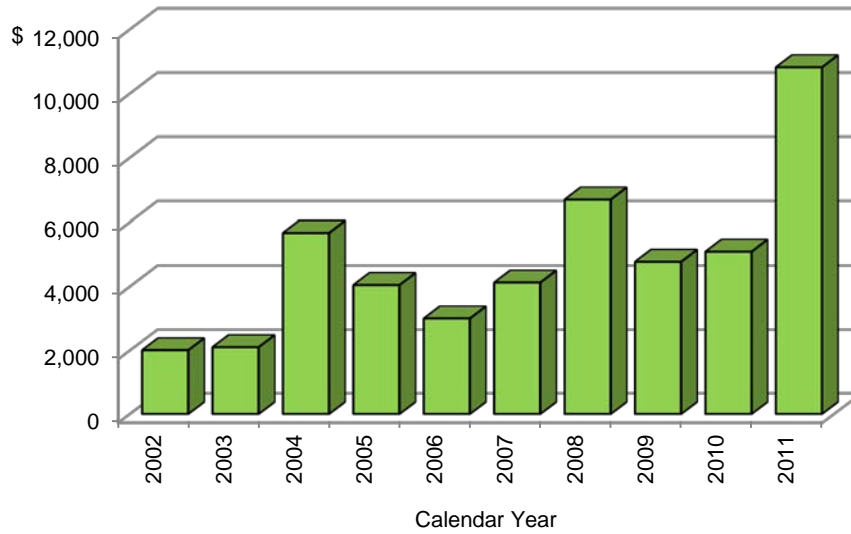

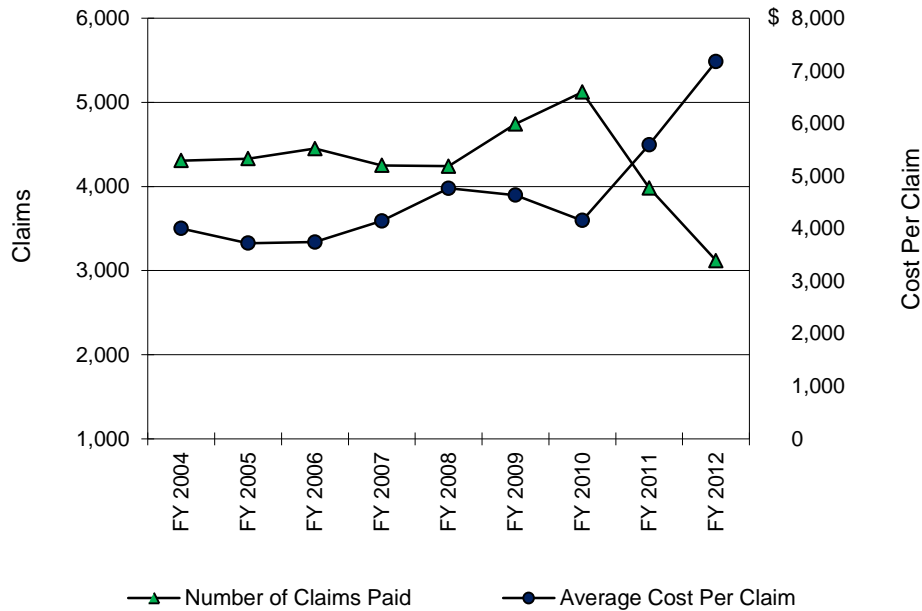

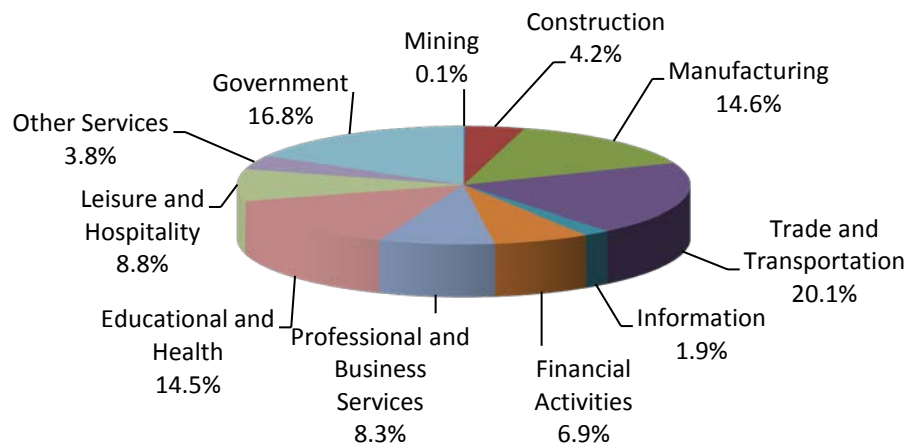

August 2011 - August 2012**

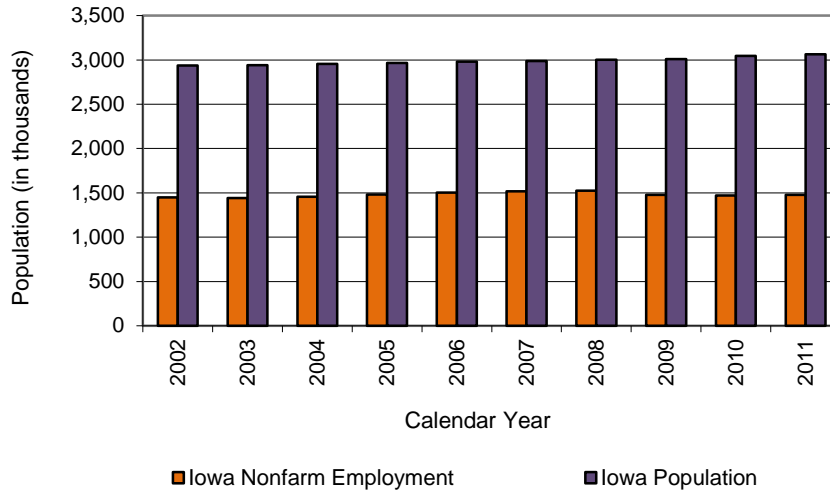

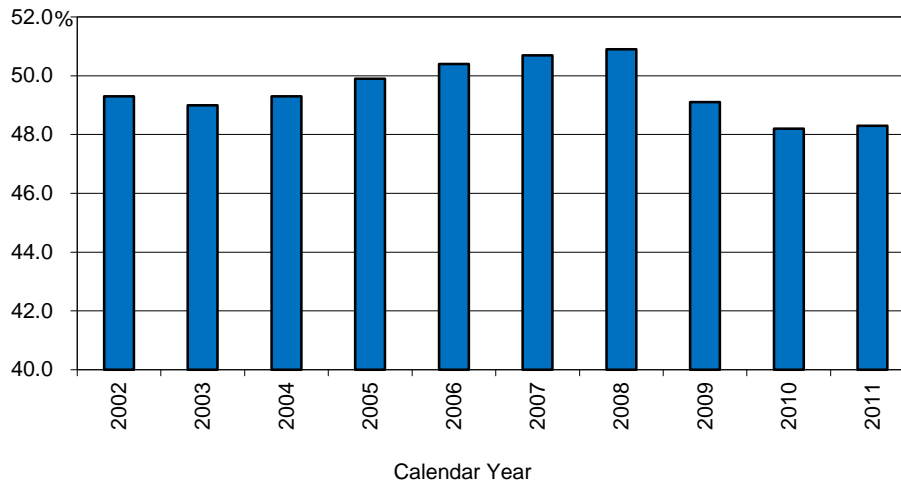

NONFARM EMPLOYMENT COMPARED TO TOTAL IOWA POPULATION (Calendar Year)

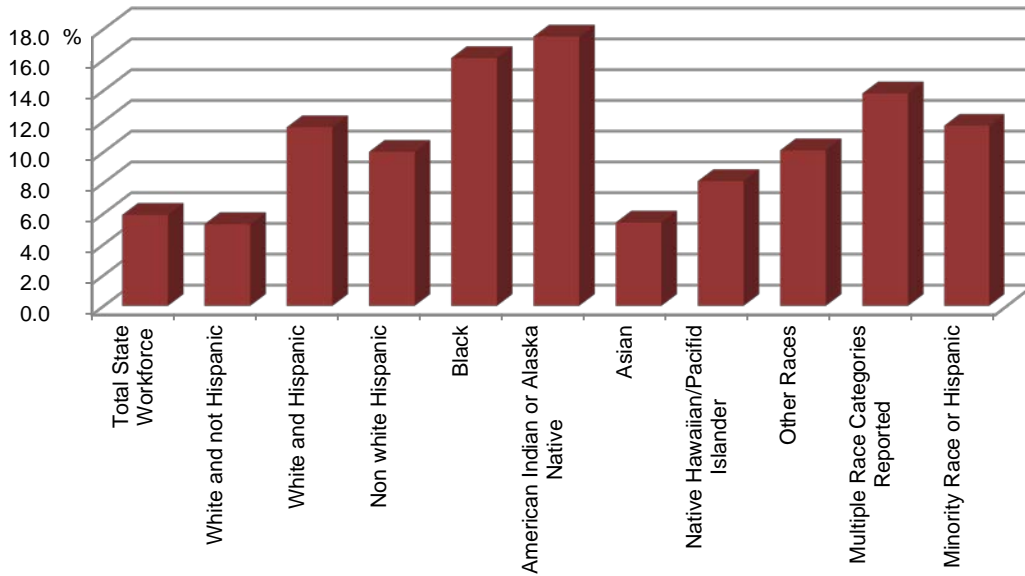


PERCENT OF IOWA POPULATION EMPLOYED IN NONFARM OCCUPATIONS (Calendar Year)

Calendar Year 2011**



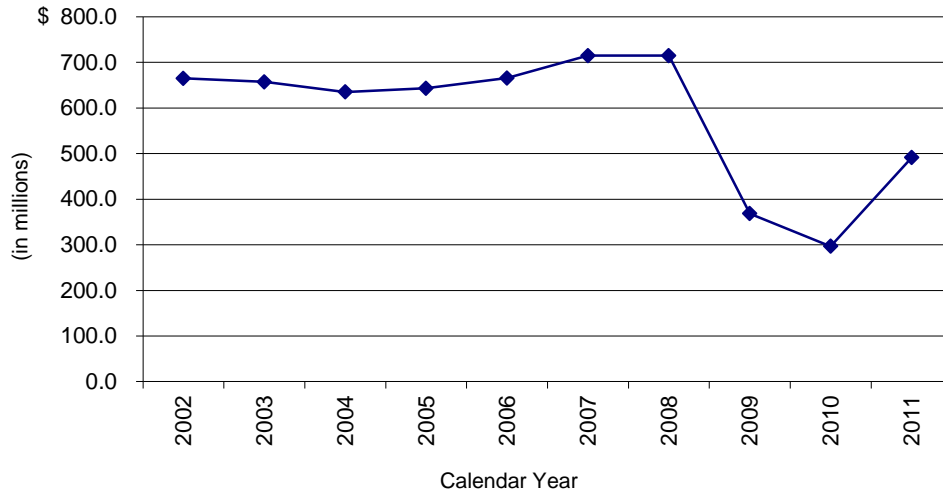

UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FUND IOWA BALANCE AS OF DECEMBER 31 (in millions)



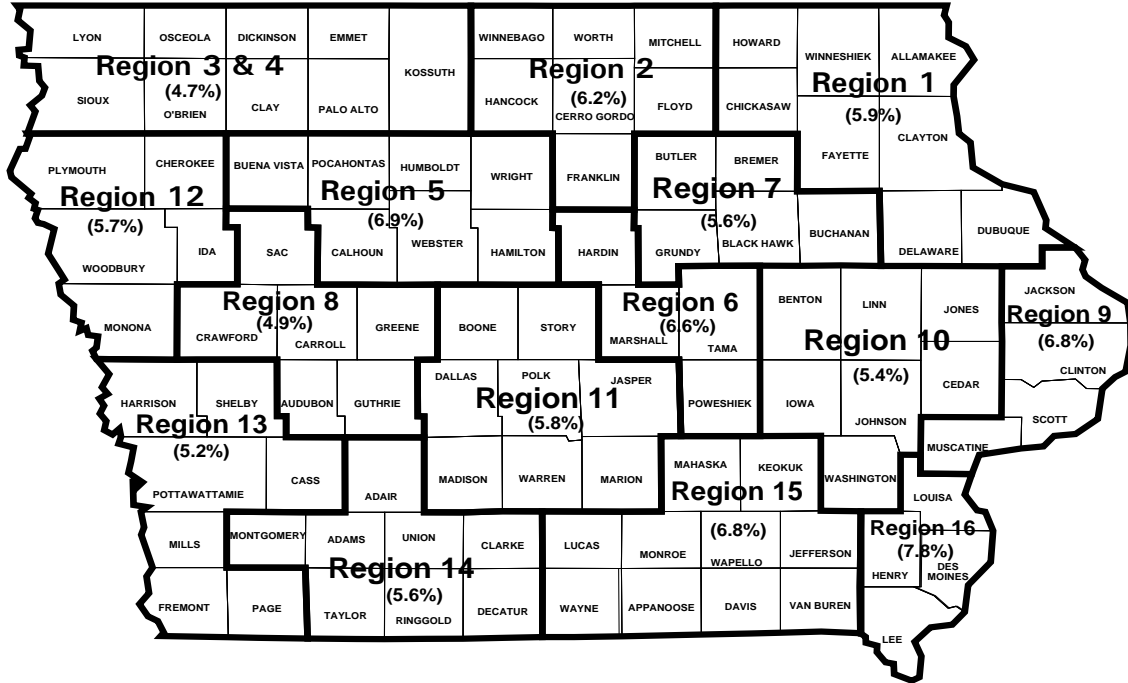

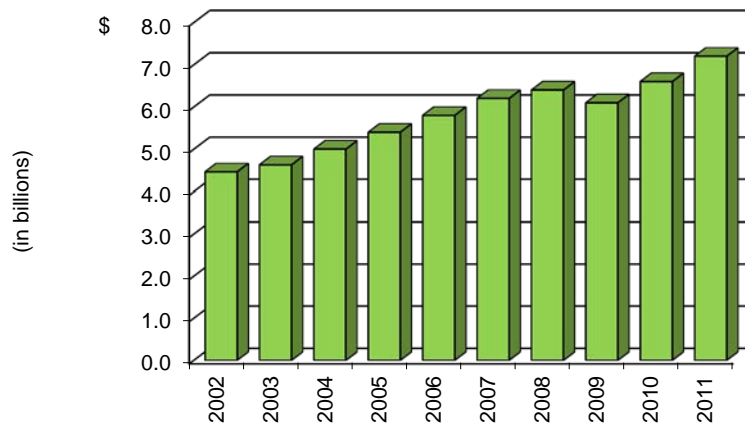

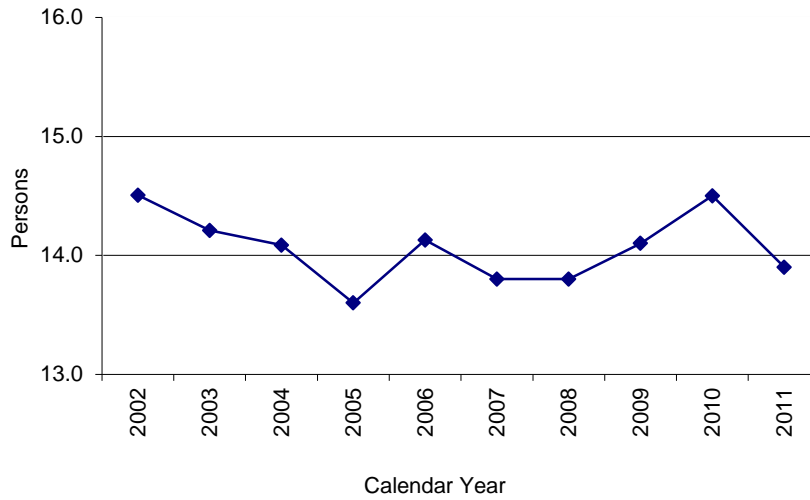

STATE PARK ATTENDANCE IN IOWA (in millions)



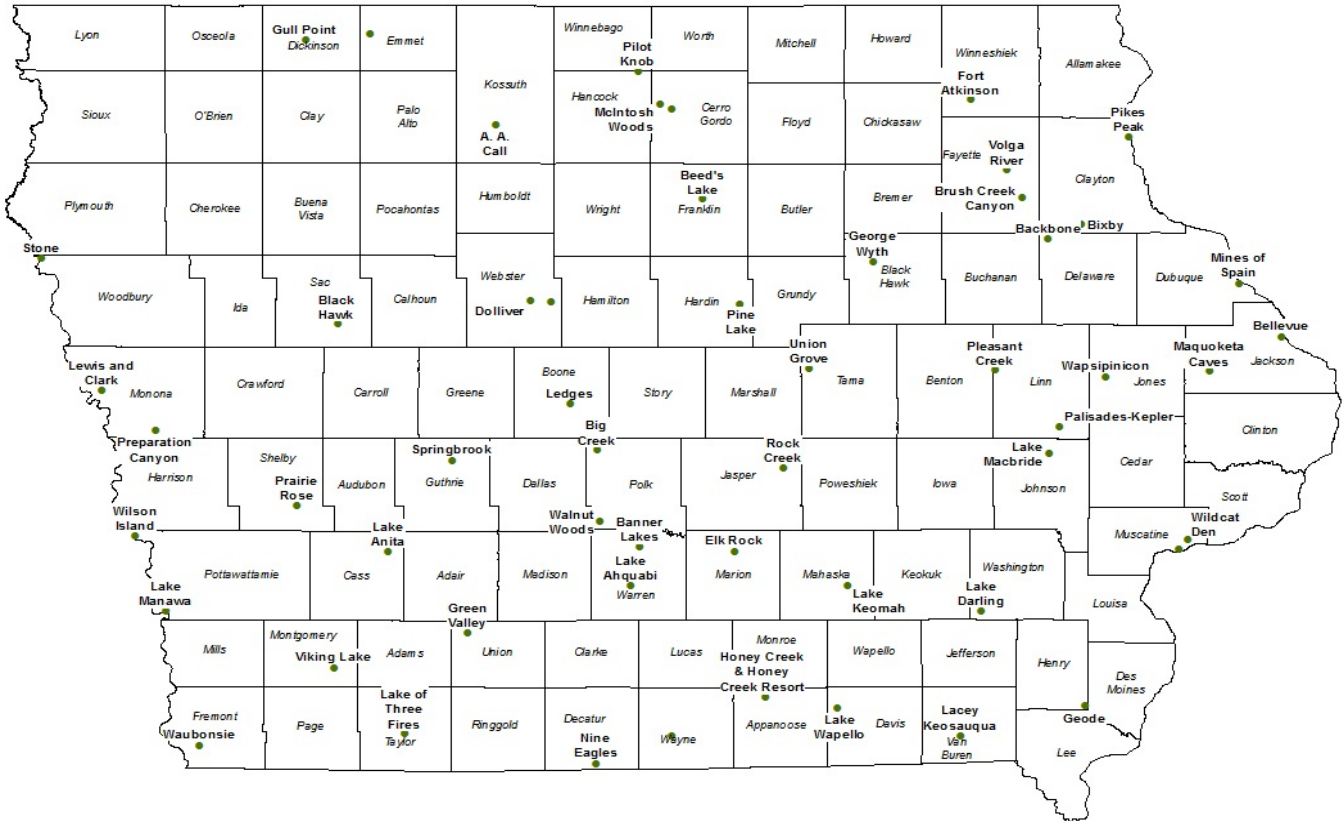

LOCATION OF STATE PARKS



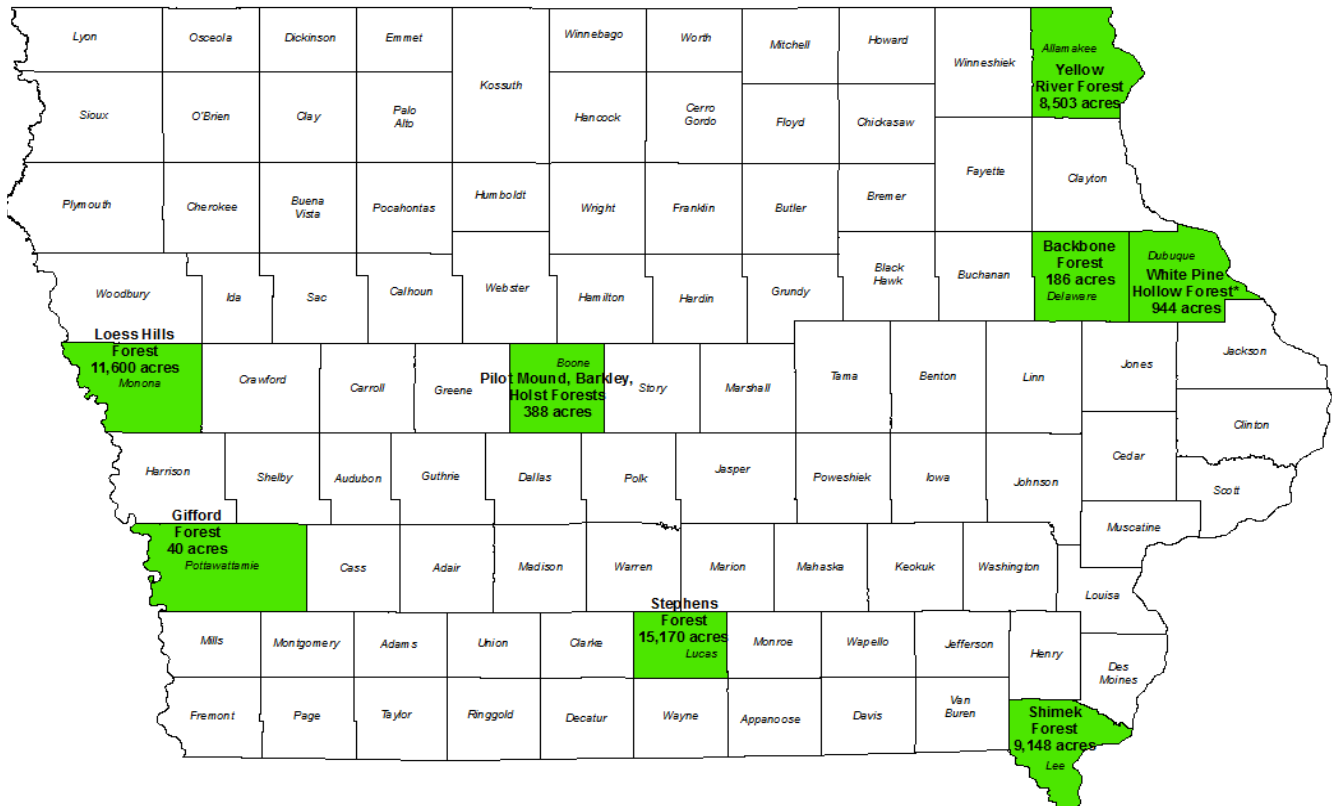

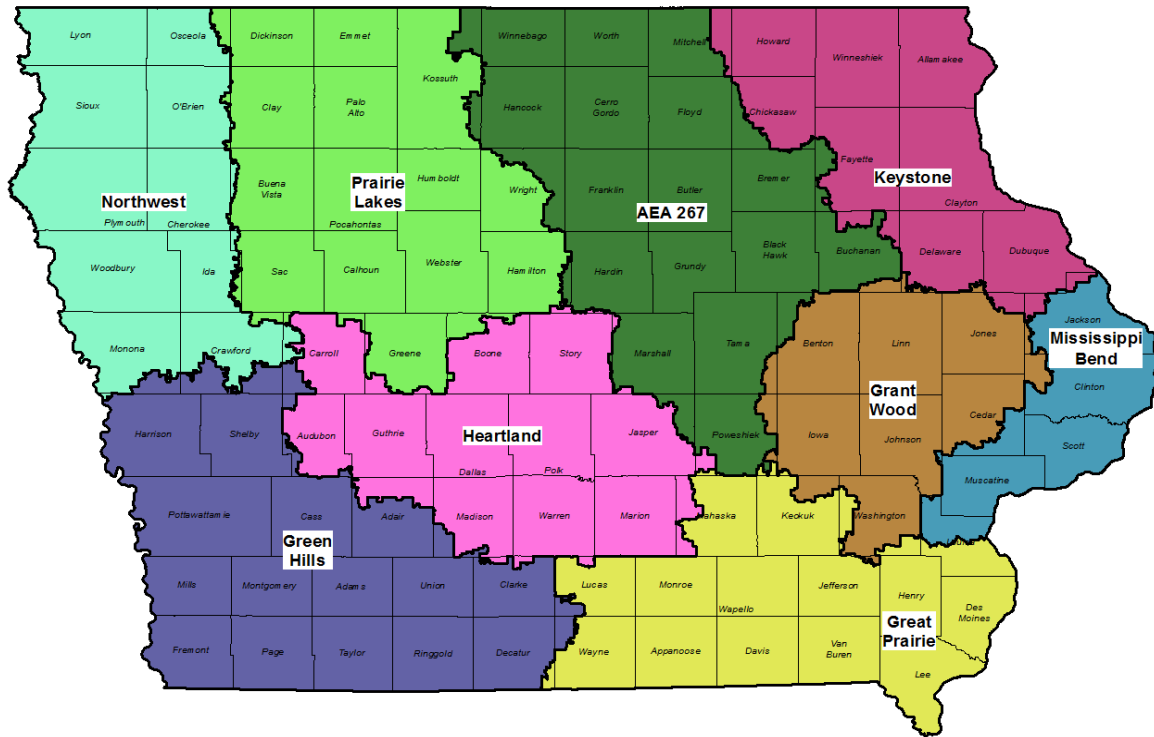

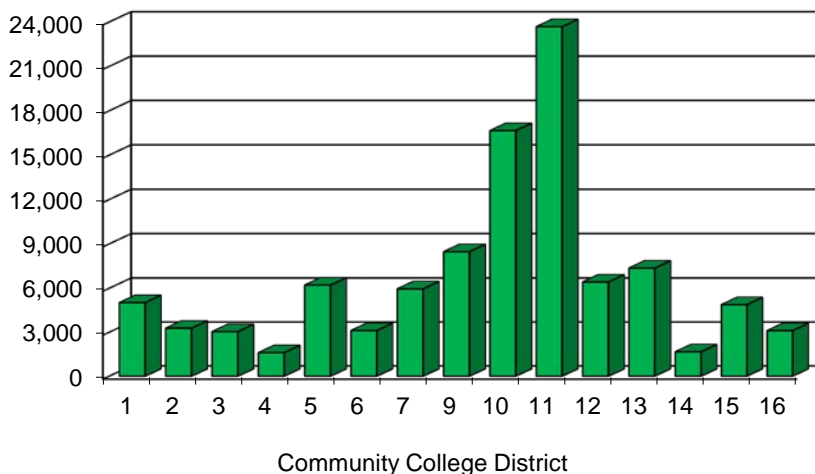

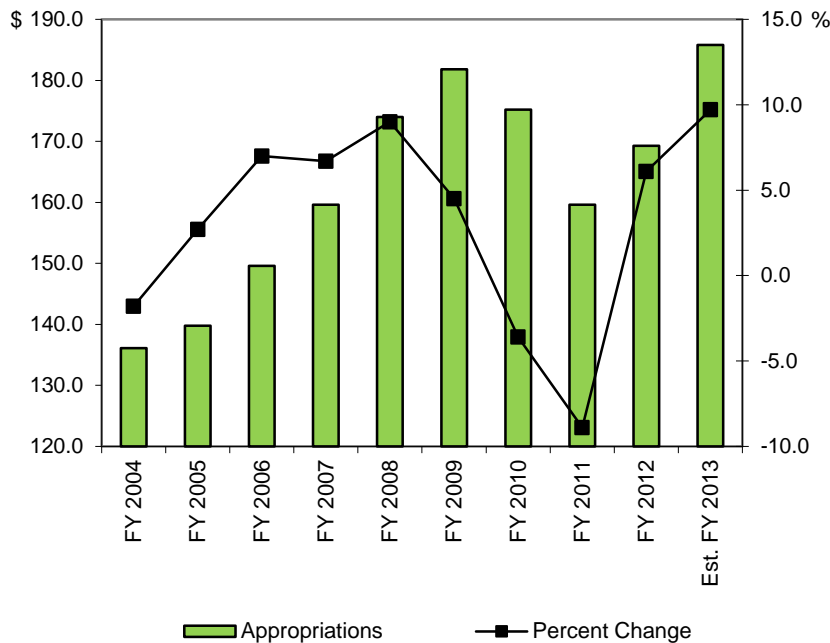

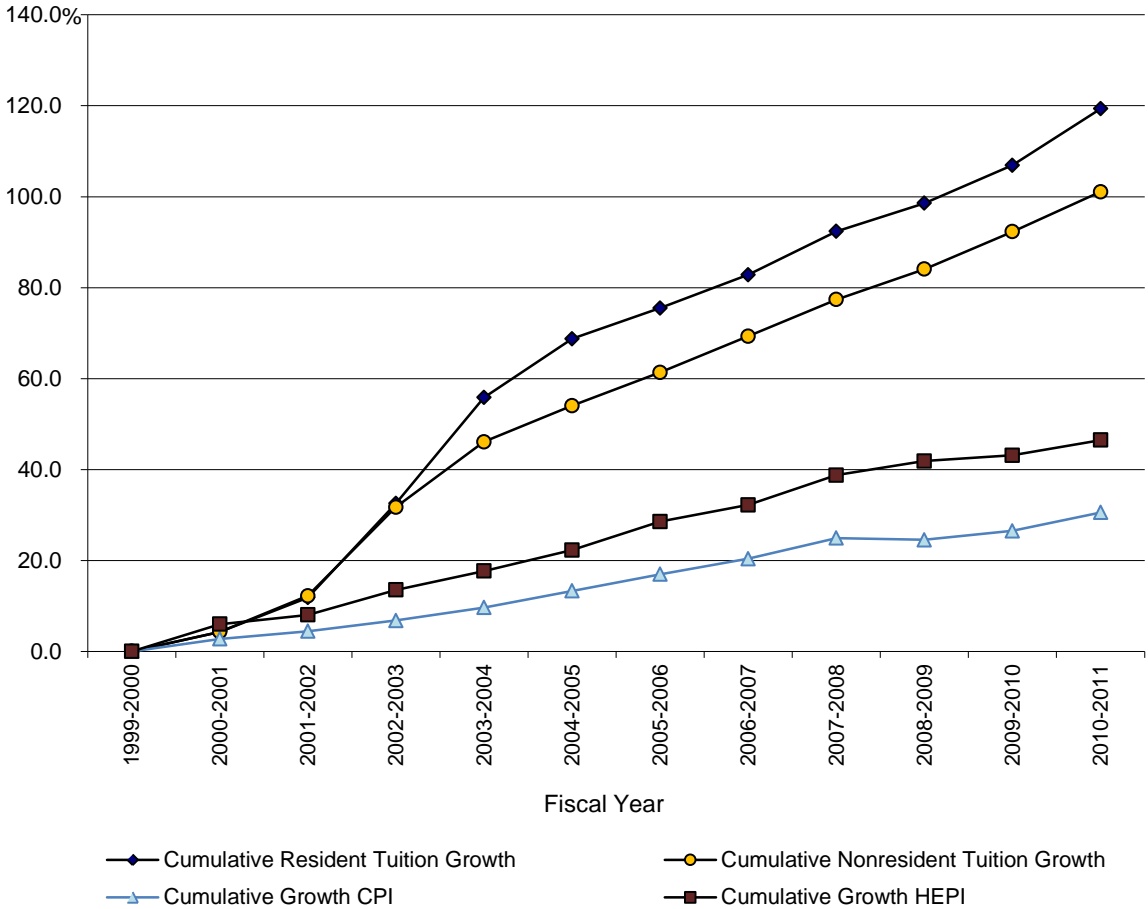

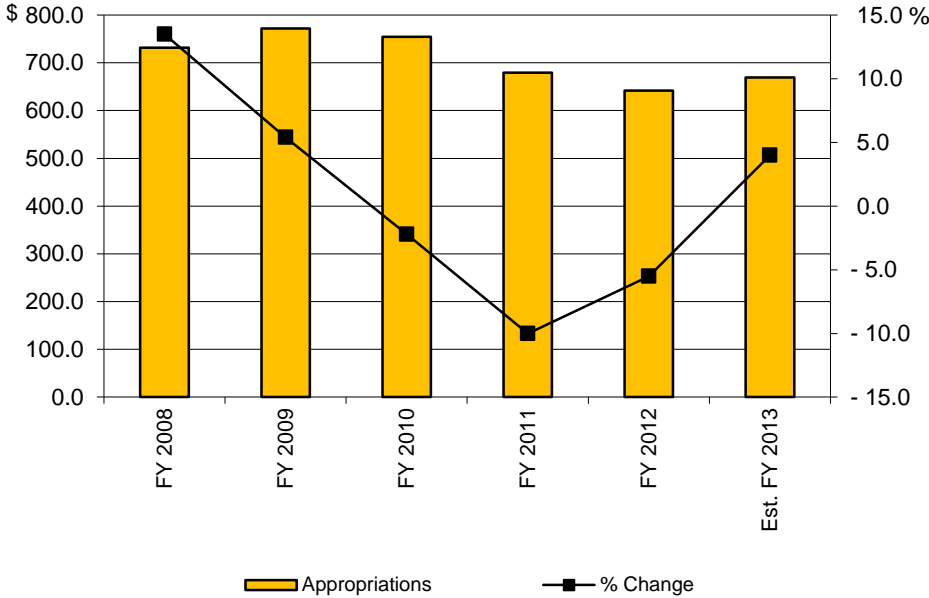

(\$ in millions)**



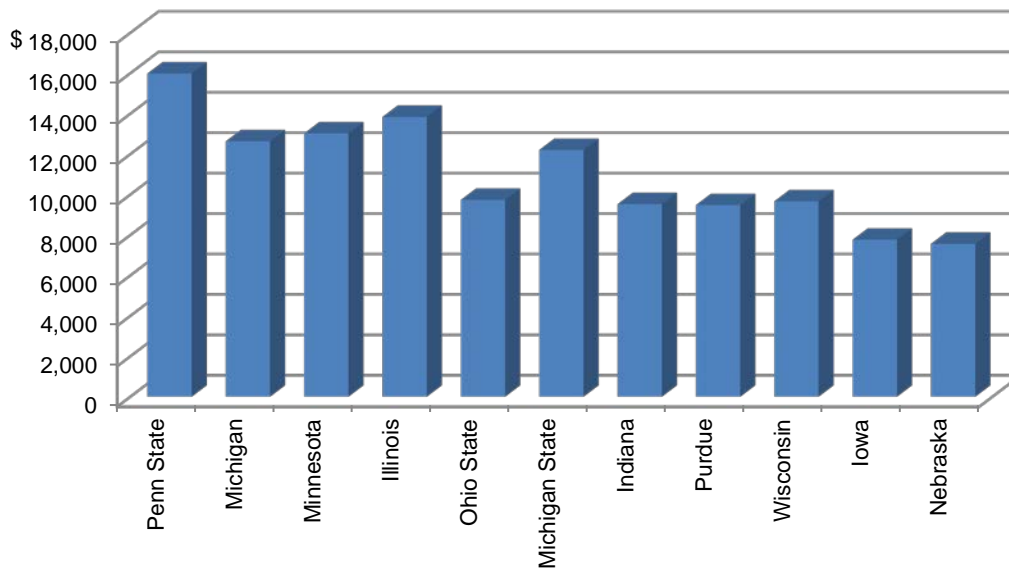

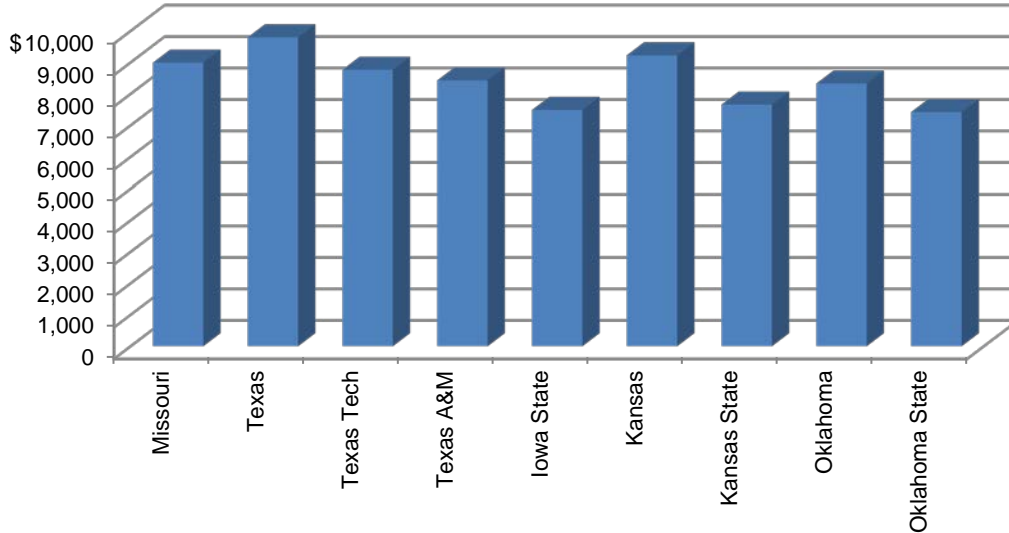

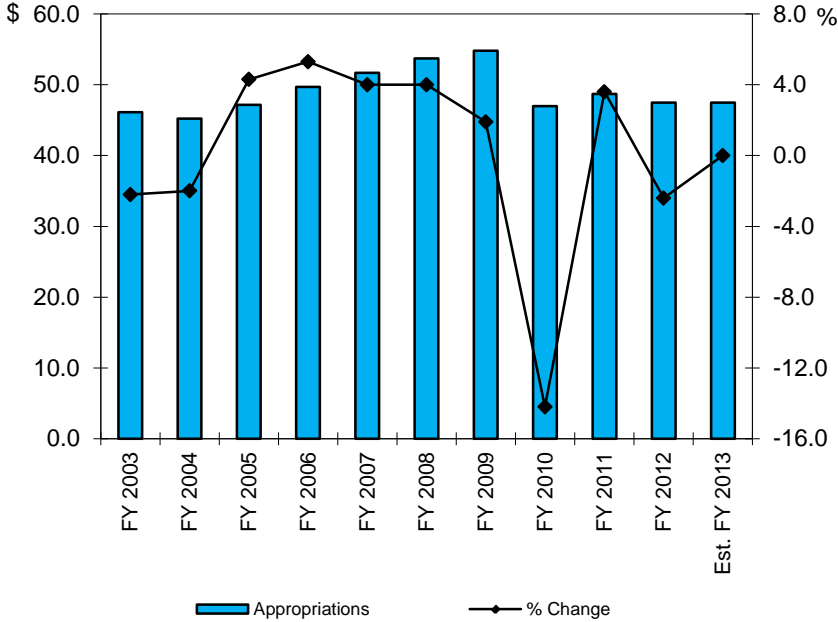

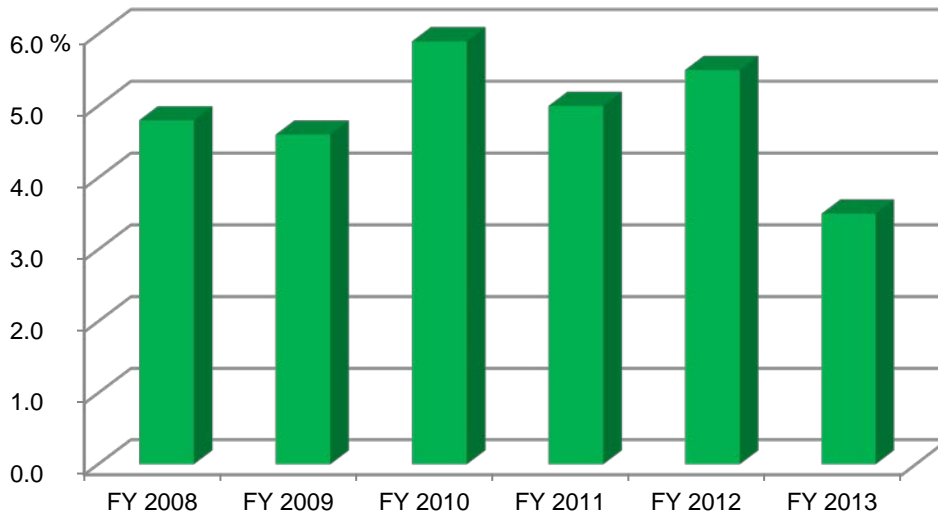

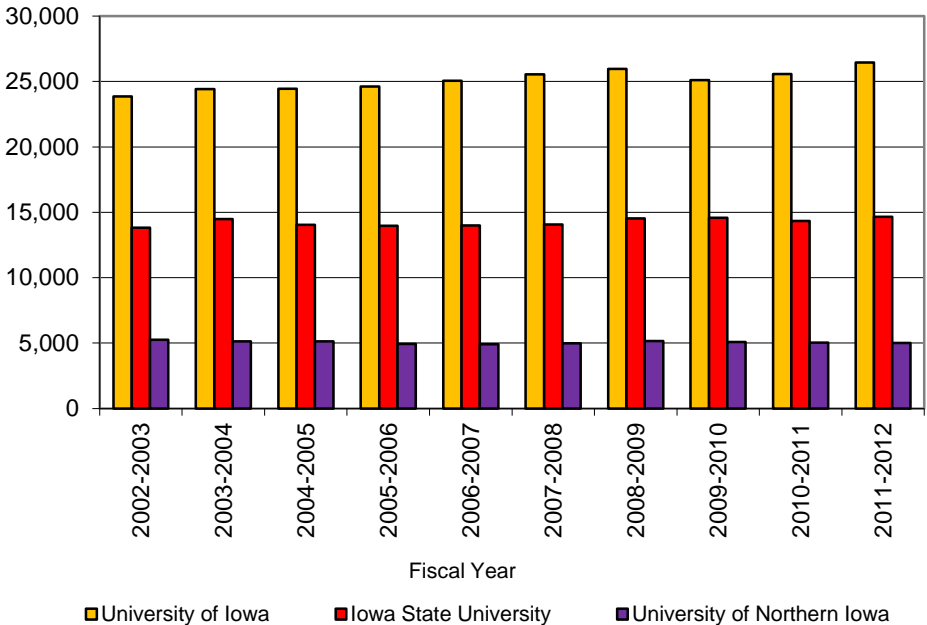

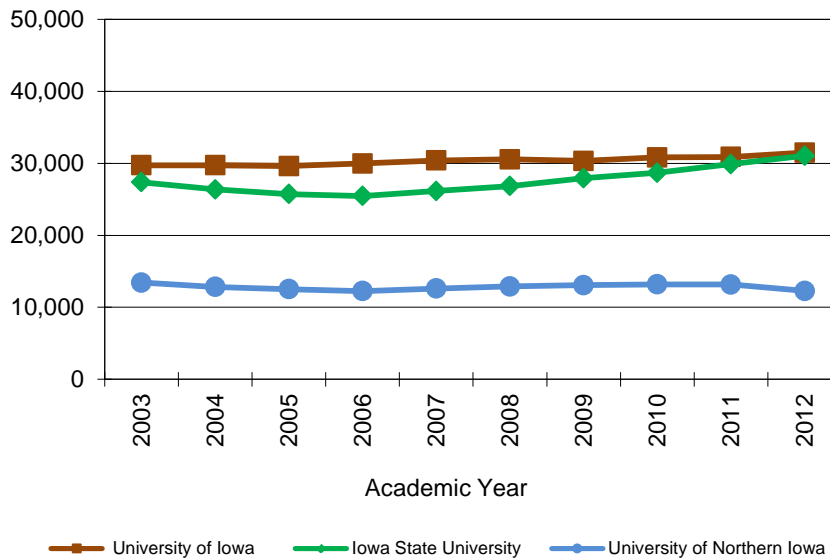

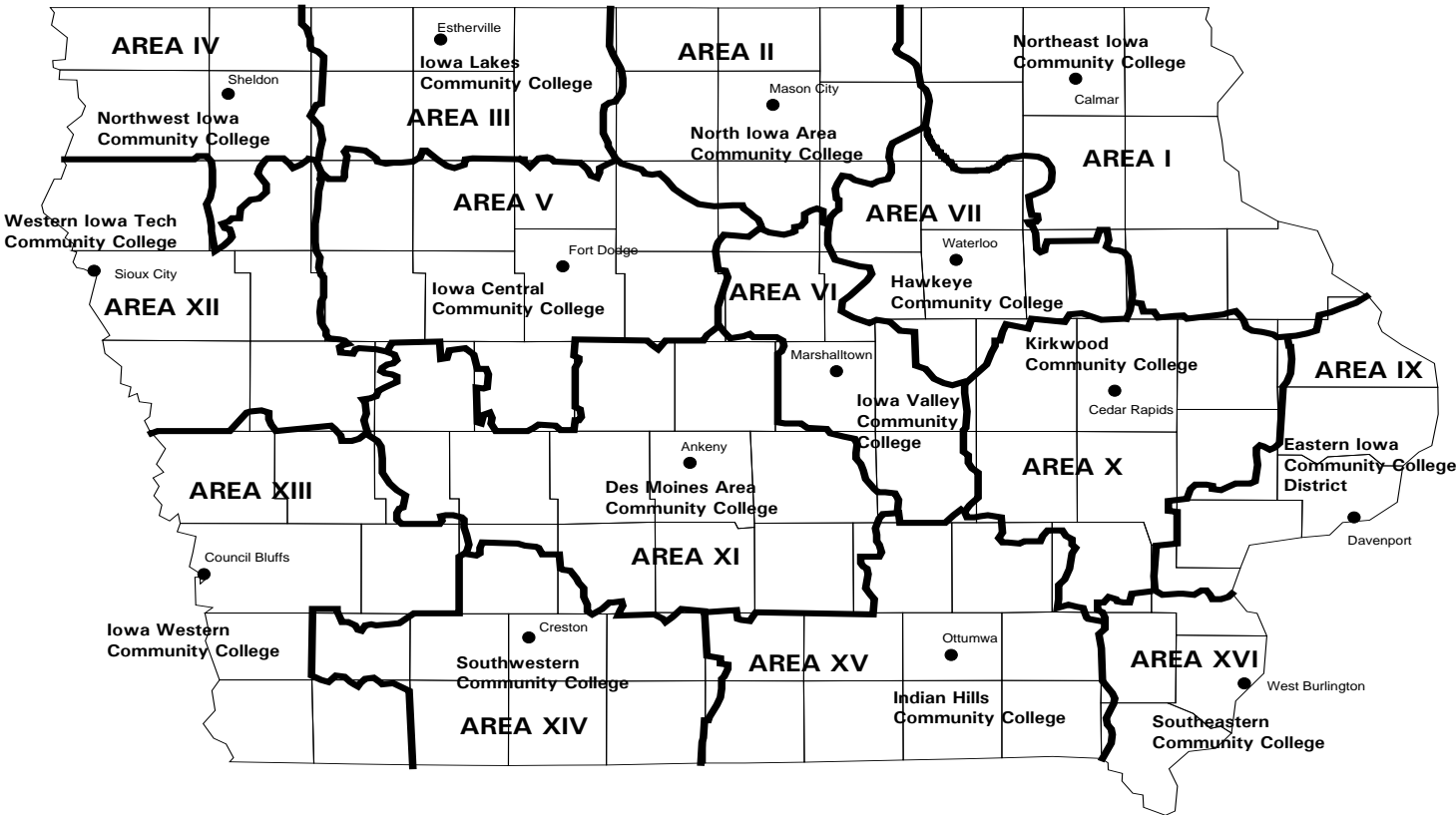

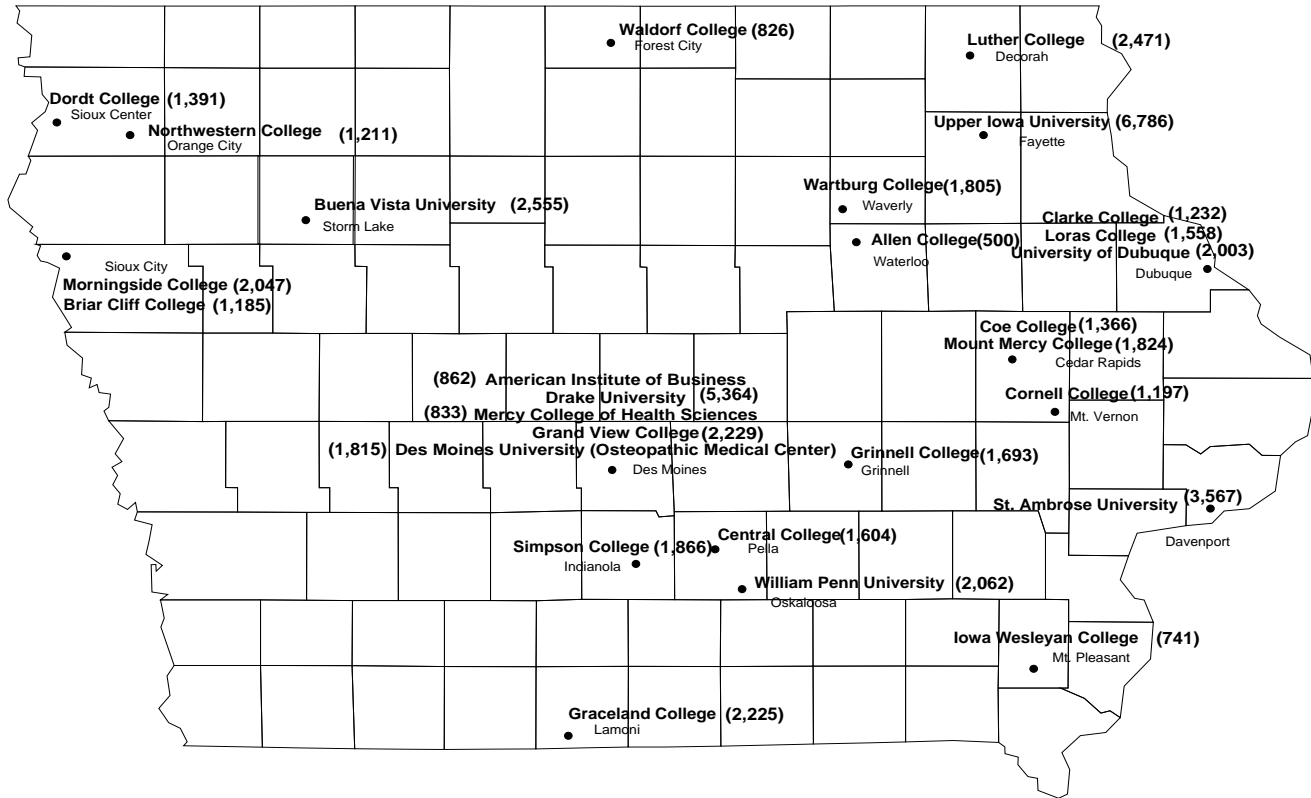


IOWA COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICTS

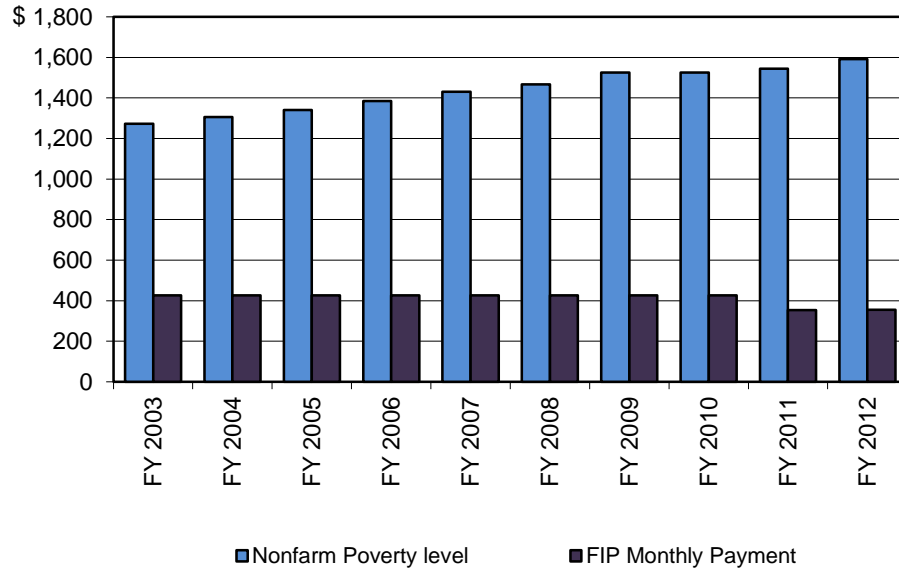

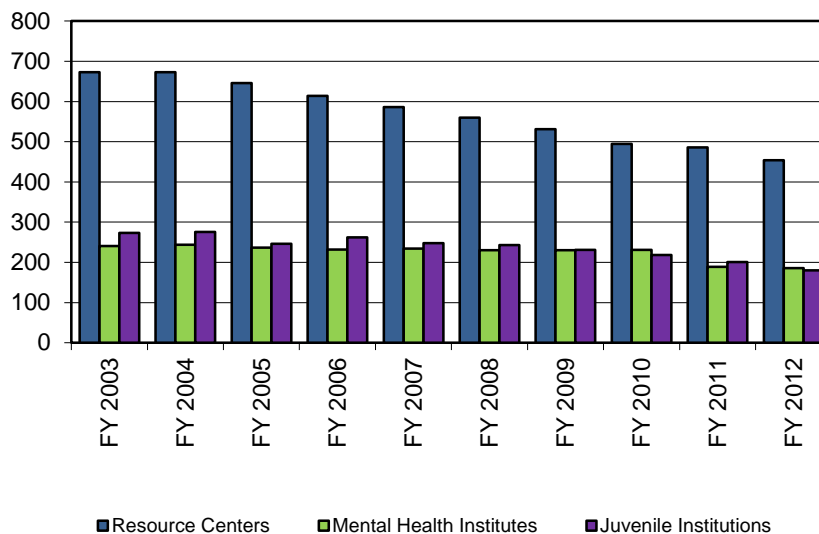

AVERAGE DAILY CENSUS IOWA HUMAN SERVICES INSTITUTIONS



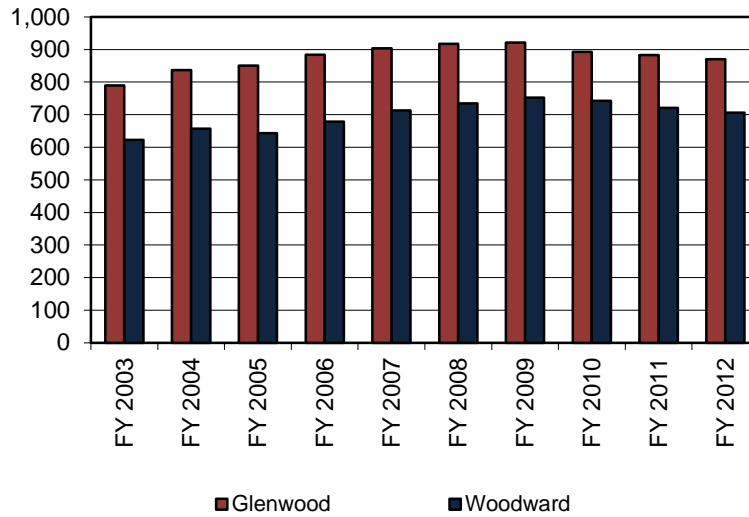

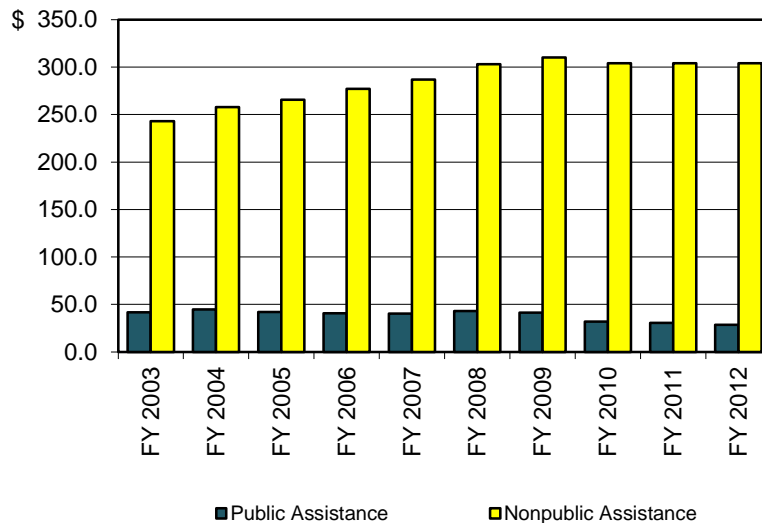

- 1) Public Assistance collections include repayments from the Family Investment Program (FIP) and include Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) collections made on behalf of other states.

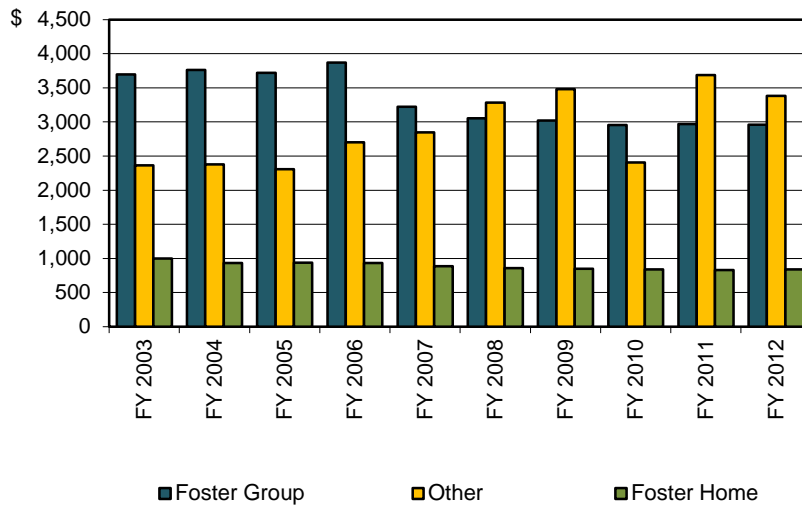

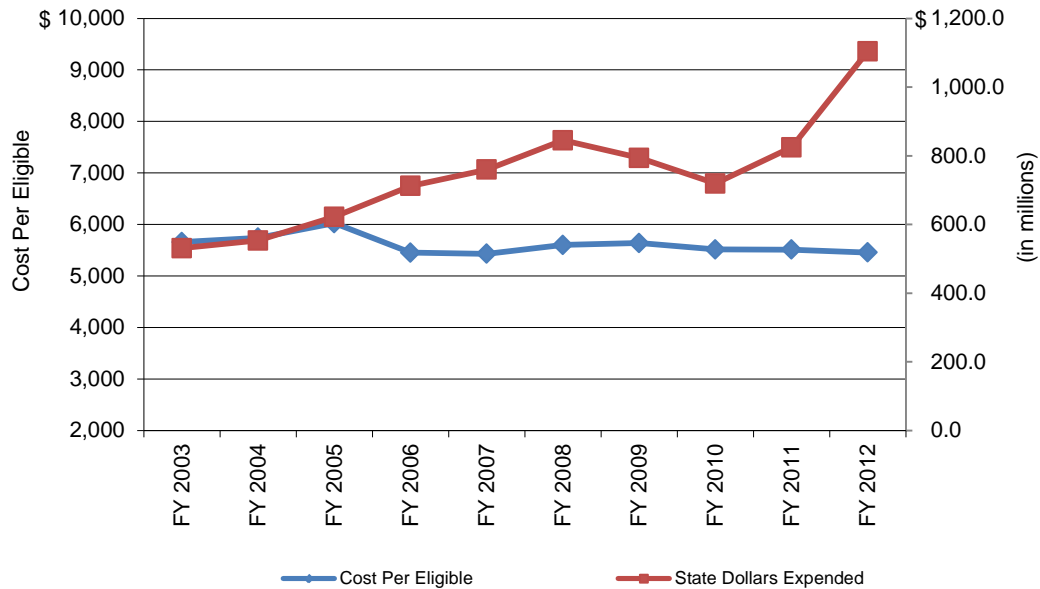

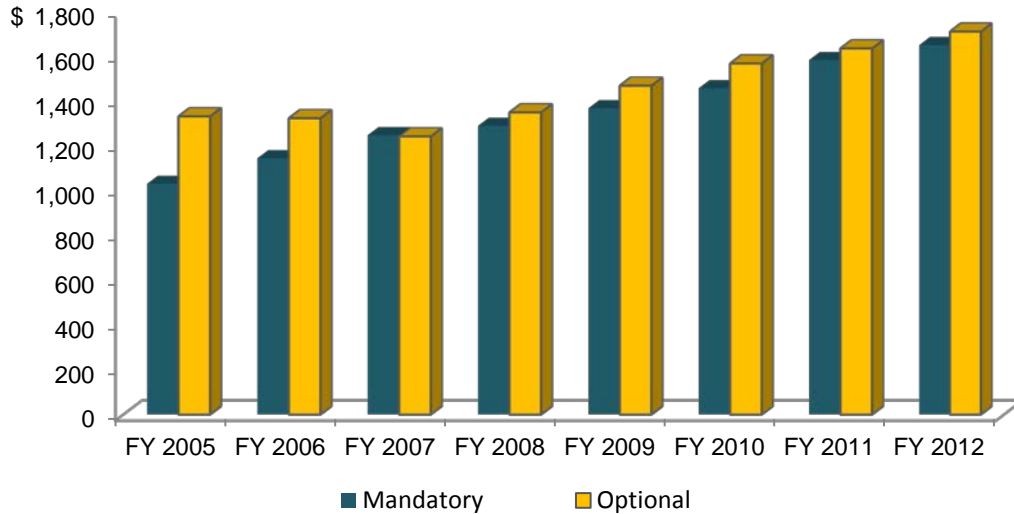

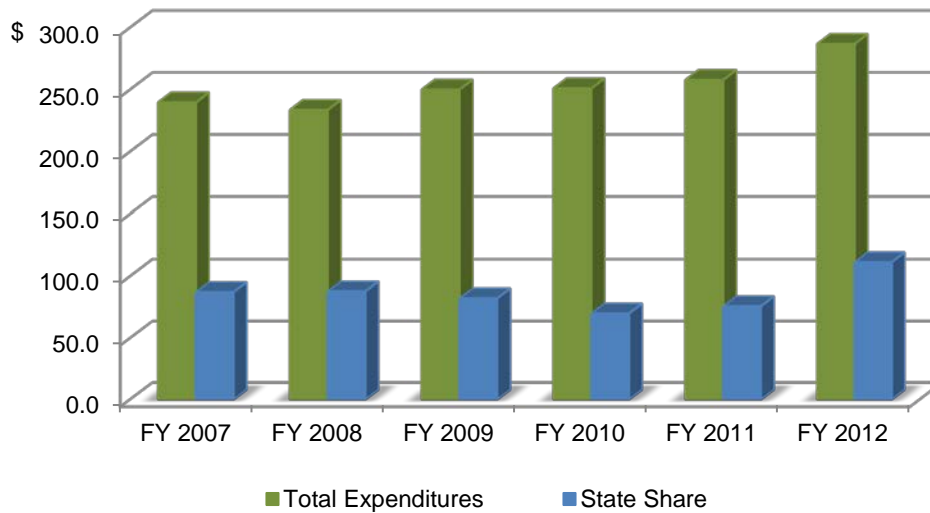

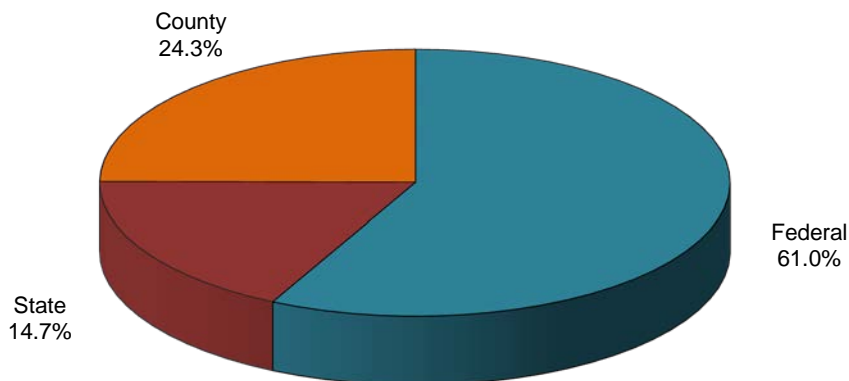

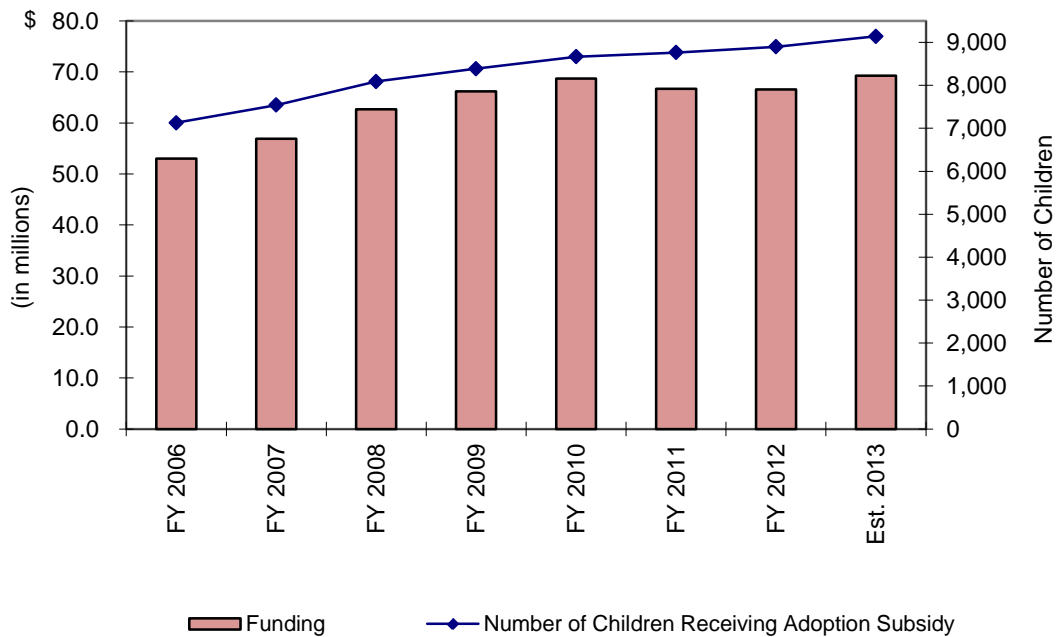

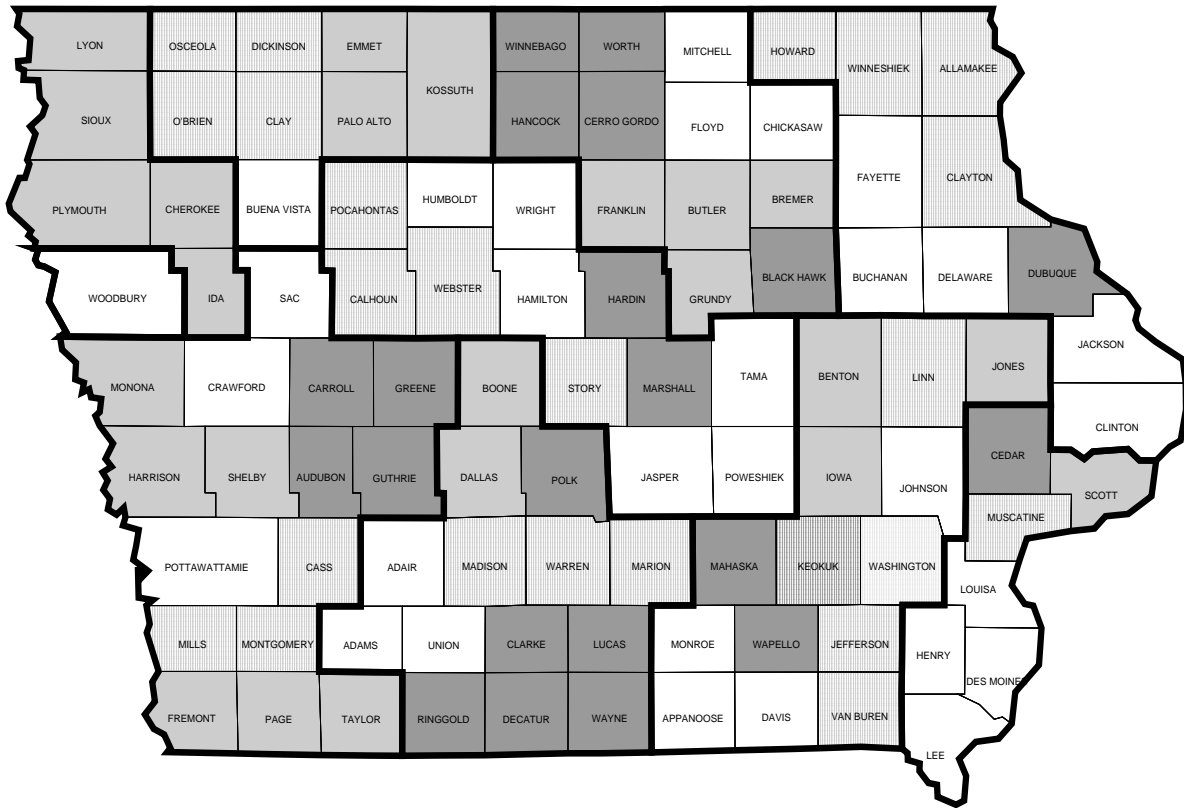

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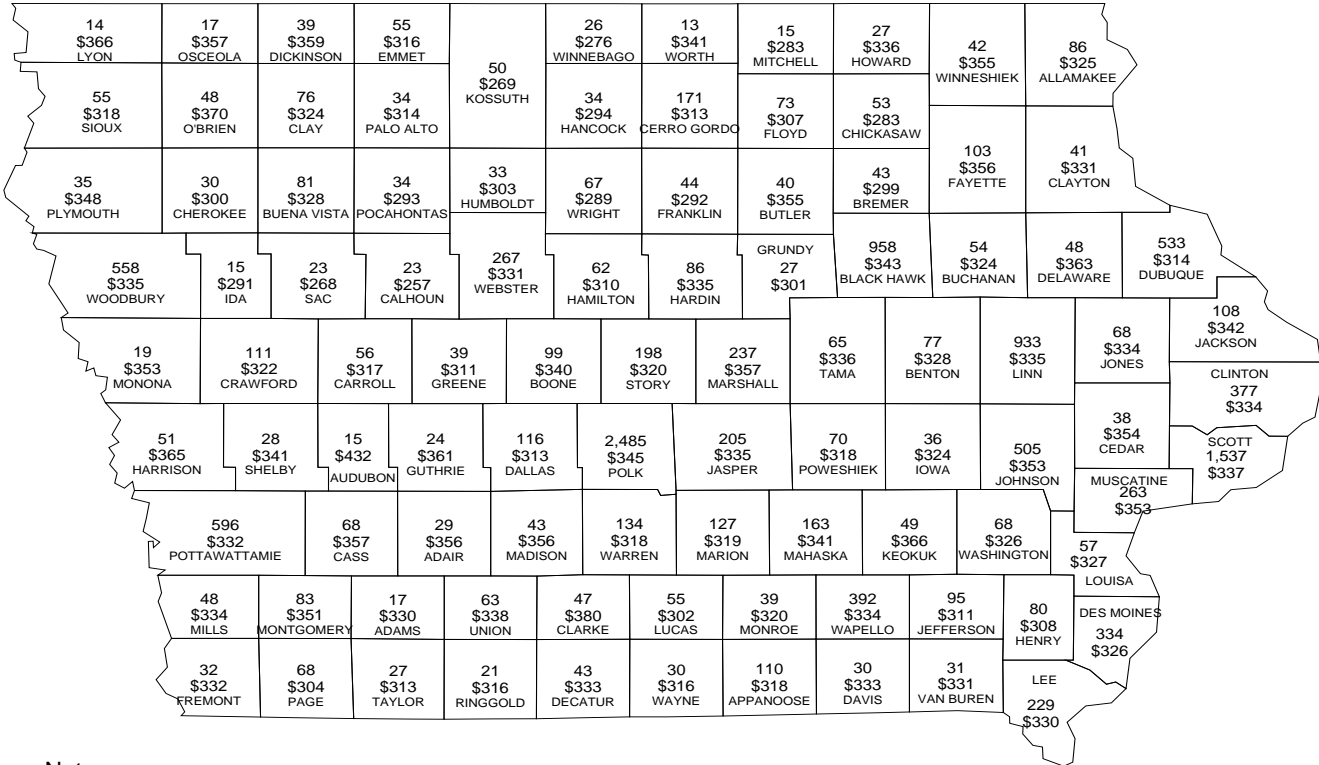

AVERAGE GRANT AND CASELOAD**



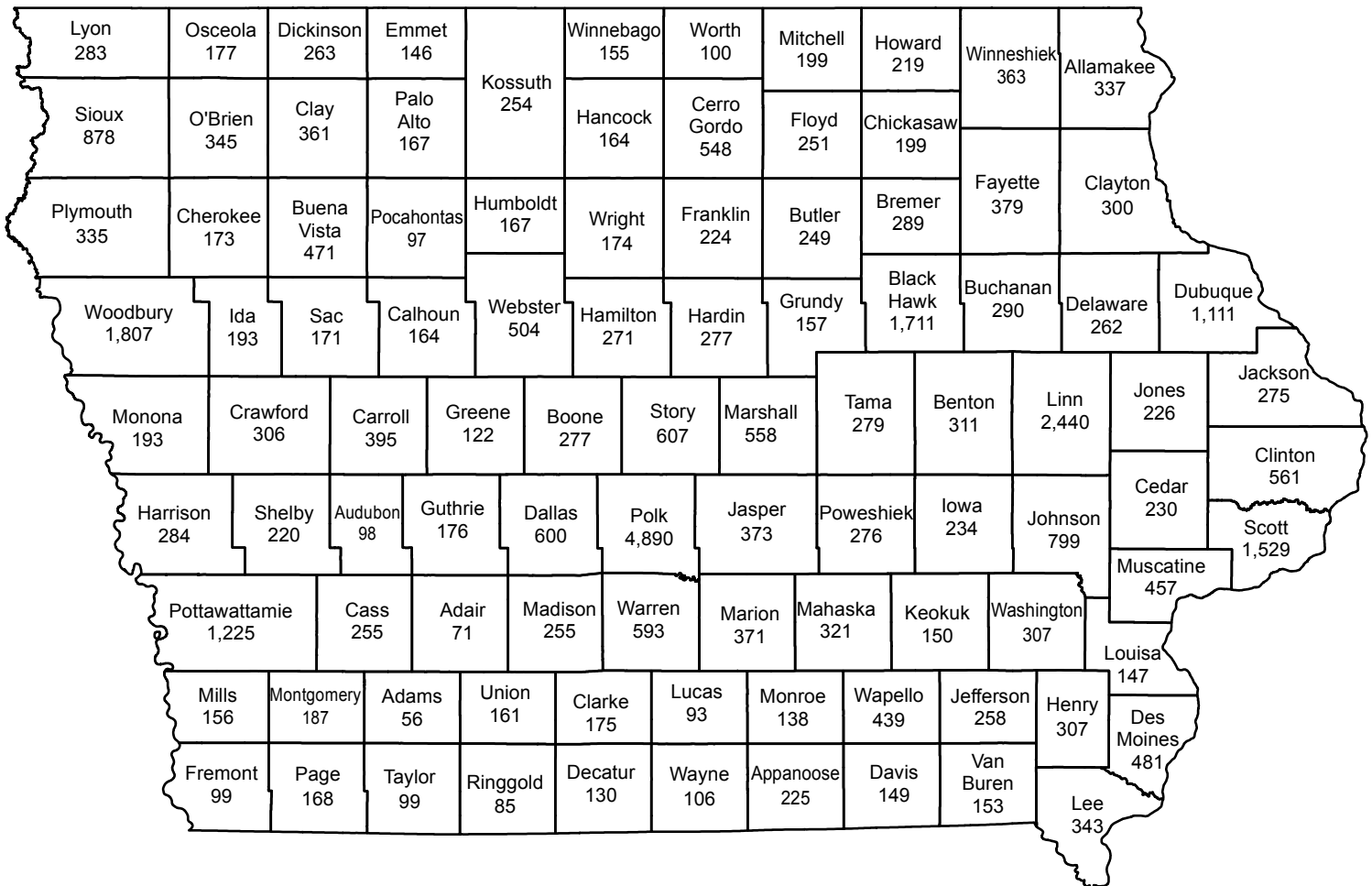

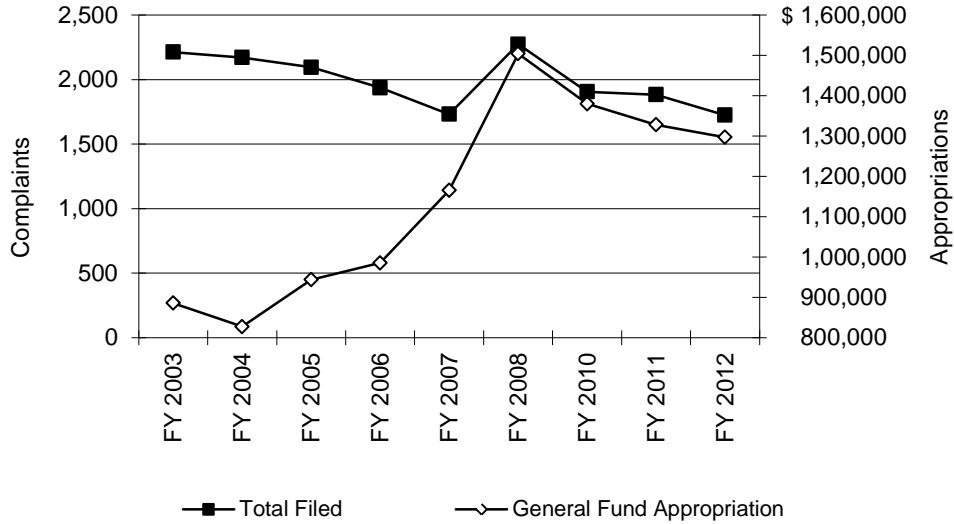

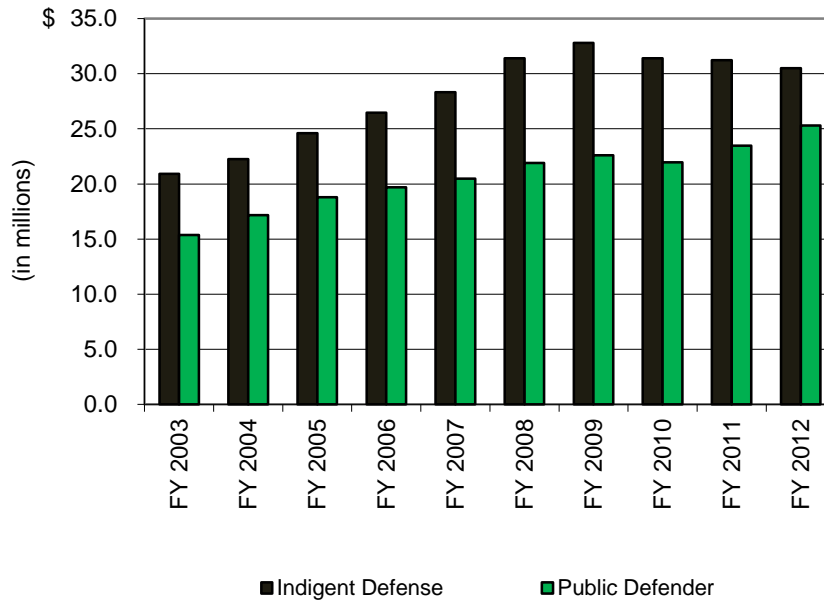

INDIGENT DEFENDANTS IN IOWA**

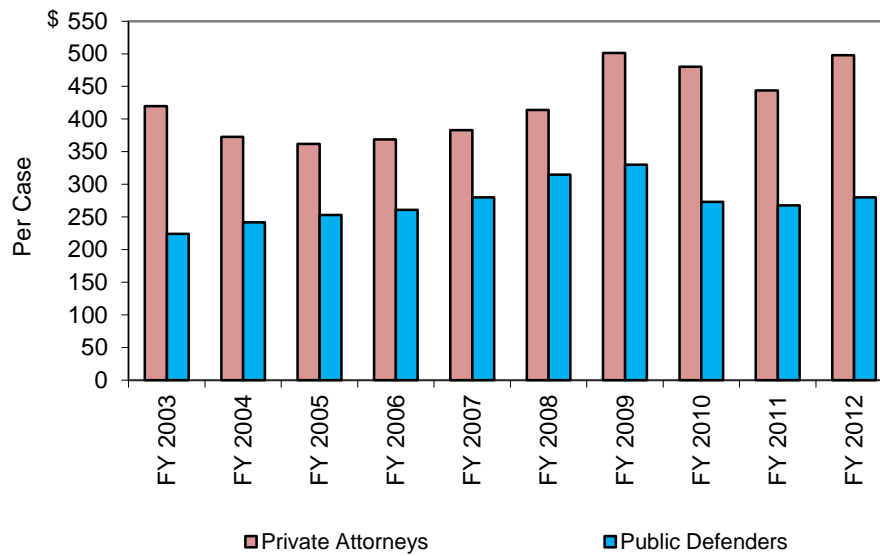

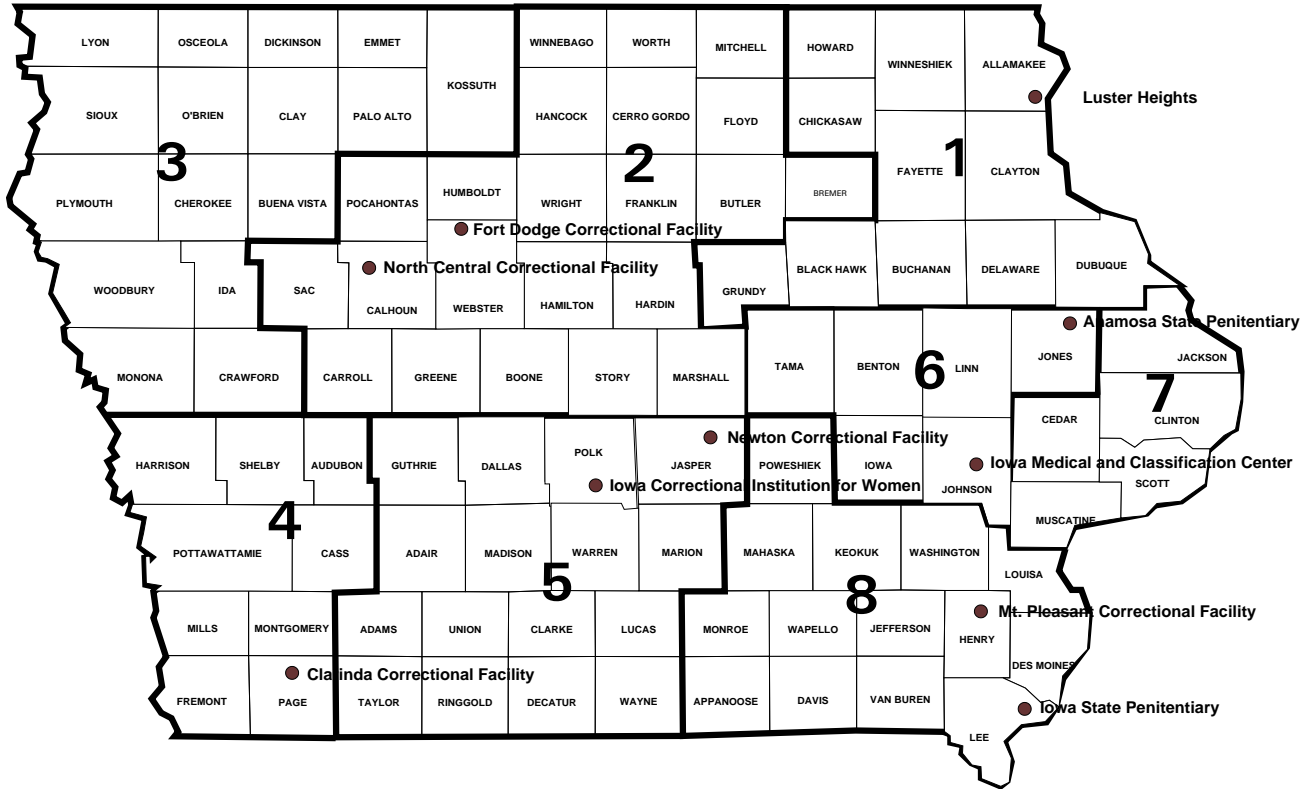
- There were 1,612,395 offenders incarcerated nationally on December 31, 2010. This is a decrease of 0.3% compared to one year ago. This is the first time the U.S. prison population declined since 1972.
- The prison incarceration rate is estimated to be 500 inmates per 100,000 residents. This is a decrease of 0.8% compared to one year ago. This rate includes all inmates held in federal and state prisons.
- States experiencing the most growth in 2010 are: Iowa, Illinois, and Arkansas.
- There were 25 states that experienced prison population decreases led by California, New York, and Michigan.
- The federal system held 209,771 inmates at year end 2010, making it the largest penal system in the country.
- California (165,062 inmates), Texas (173,649 inmates), Florida (104,306), and the federal system (209,771 inmates) together held 40.5% of all prisoners in the country.
- Since 2000, the number of federal prisoners has increased 44.3%, while the number of inmates held for state convictions increased 12.6%.
- Iowa's prison population increased 18.9% between FY 2000 and FY 2010.
- At year end 2010, privately operated facilities held 128,195 inmates, a decrease of 0.8% compared to 2009. Private facilities held 8.0% of all state and federal inmates.
- Imprisonment rates are calculated by the number of sentenced inmates per 100,000 residents. Louisiana had the highest prison imprisonment rate (867 inmates) followed by Mississippi (686 inmates), Oklahoma (654 inmates), Texas (648 inmates), and Alabama (648 inmates).
- Maine (148 inmates) had the lowest imprisonment rate.
- Iowa ranks 39th in the nation in terms of the imprisonment rate, with 309 inmates per 100,000 residents.
- Community supervision includes offenders on probation and parole. At year end 2010, approximately 1 in 48 adults in the United States was on community supervision.
- Iowa had 25,600 offenders on community supervision as of year end 2010, a decrease of 3.0% compared to one year ago. Iowa had 1,101 offenders on community supervision per 100,000 total residents.

JAILS

- There were 735,601 people held in local jails across the nation on June 30, 2011, a decrease of 13,127 (1.8%) inmates compared to one year ago. This is the third year in a row of decreases since the Bureau of Justice Statistics began surveying jails.
- The jail incarceration rate was 236 inmates per 100,000 residents at mid-year 2011, a decrease of 2.5% compared to 2010.
- Local jurisdictions reported adding 10,520 jail beds during the last year, for a total rated capacity of 877,302 beds.

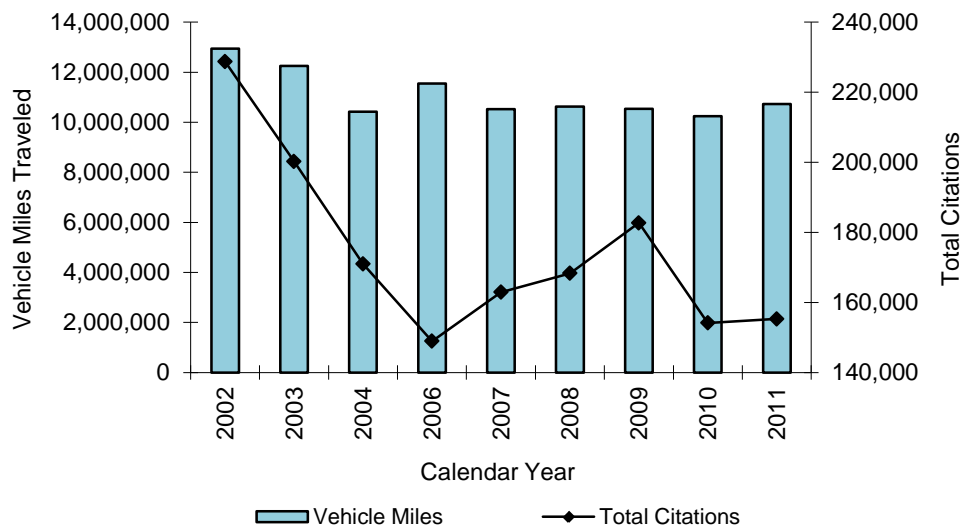

Functionally Obsolete

Bridges classified as functionally obsolete do not have land widths, shoulder widths, or vertical clearances adequate to serve traffic demand, or the bridge may not be able to handle occasional roadway flooding. While it is not unsafe for all vehicles, the older design features cannot adequately accommodate current traffic volumes or vehicle sizes and weights.

Structurally Deficient

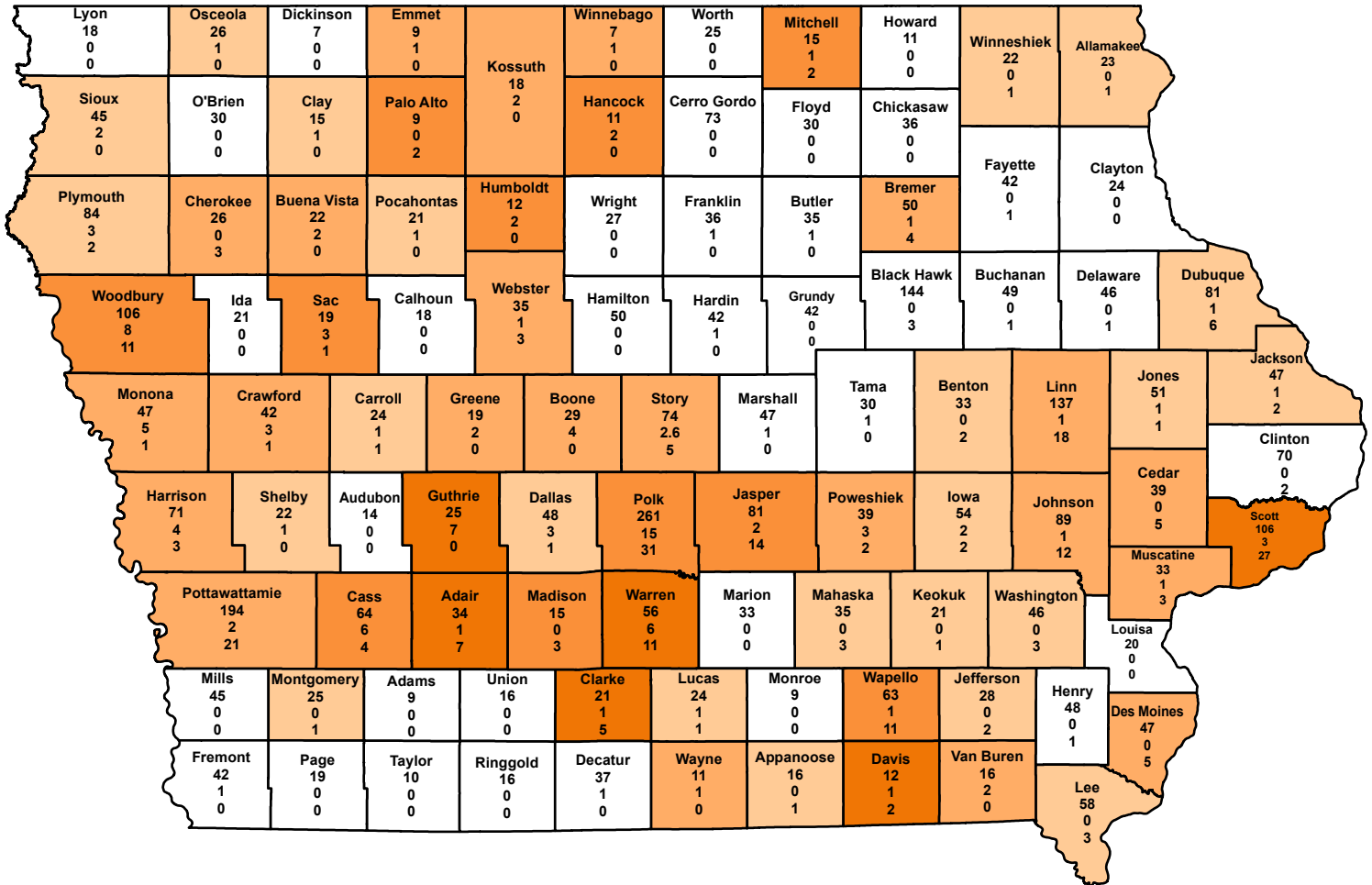
A bridge is structurally deficient if there is significant deterioration of the bridge deck, supports, or other major components. Bridges that are structurally deficient are restricted to carrying lower weight vehicles or closed if they are found to be unsafe. The classification of a bridge as “structurally” deficient does not mean the structure is unsafe and most structurally deficient bridges can continue to serve traffic safely if they are properly inspected and maintained.

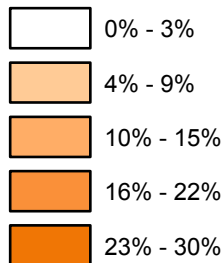

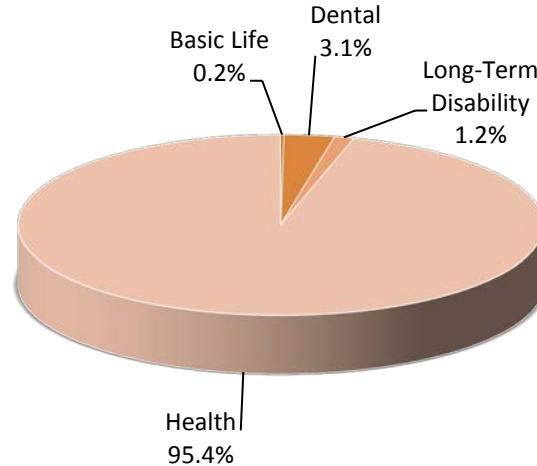

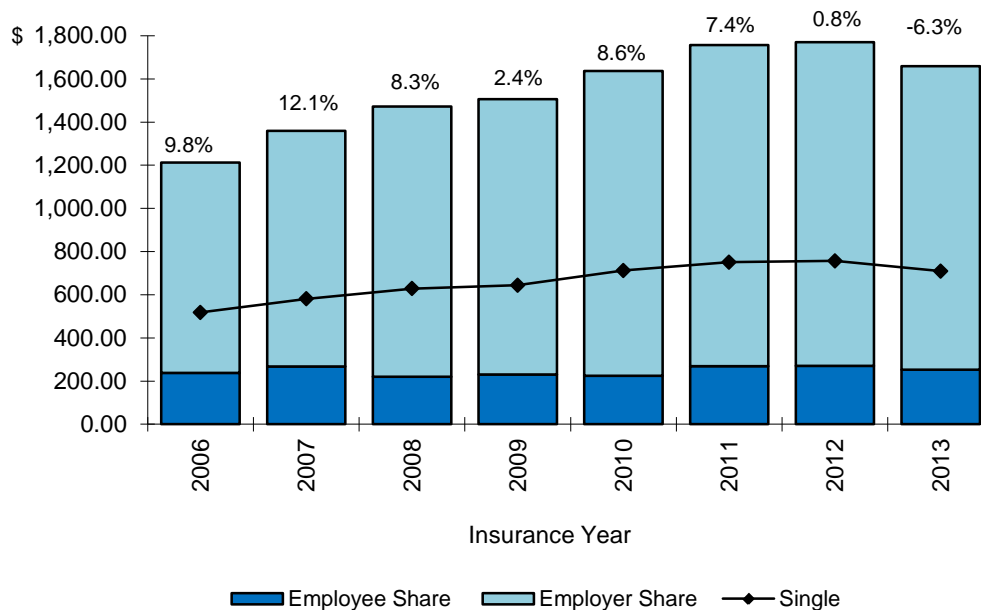

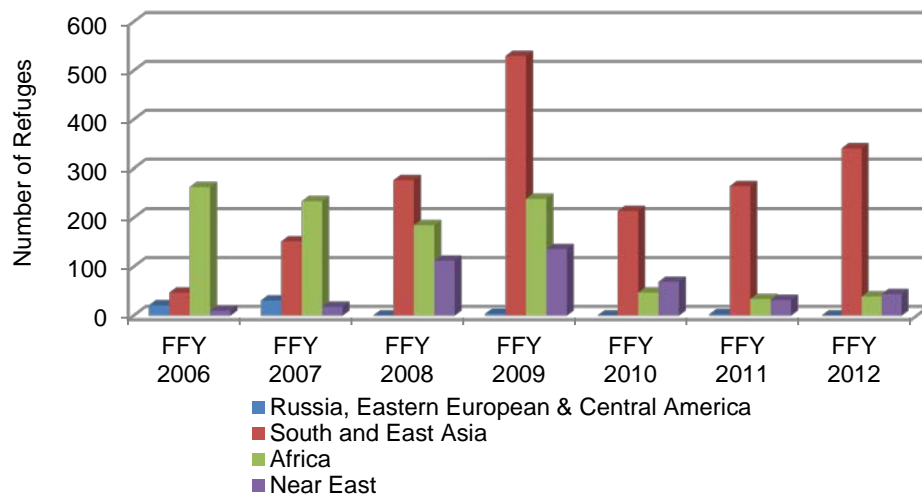

REGISTERED IOWA VOTERS BY COUNTY 2012



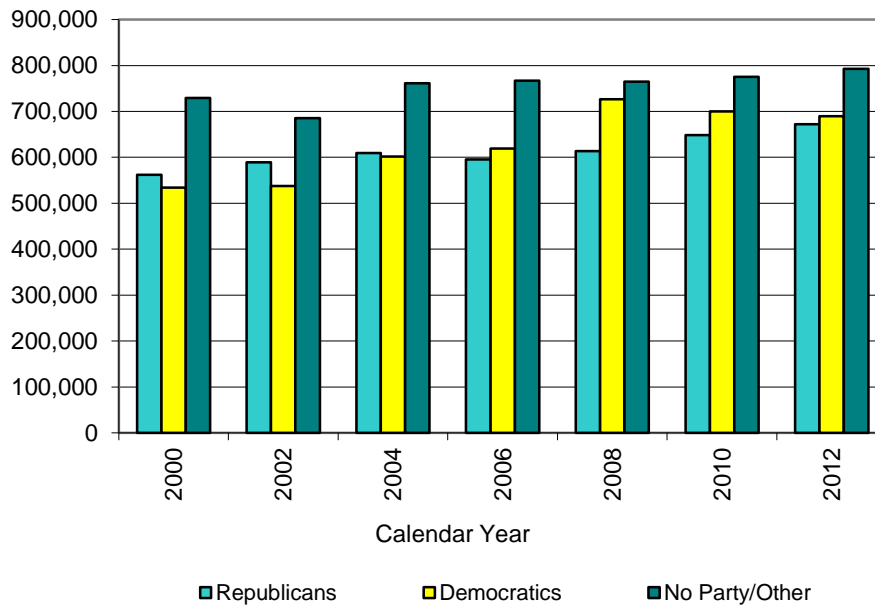

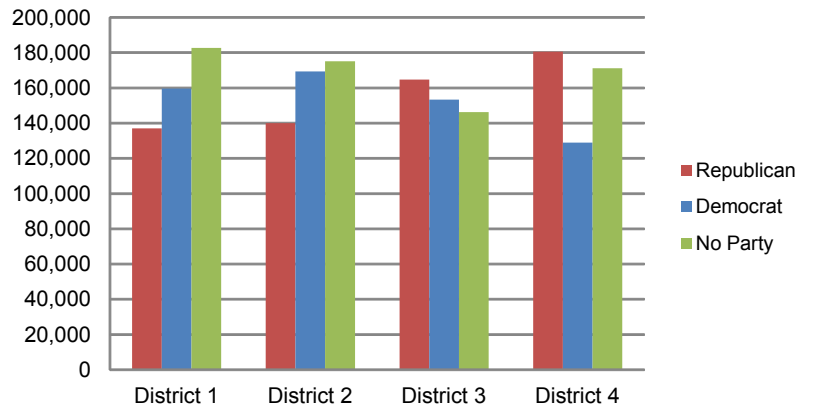

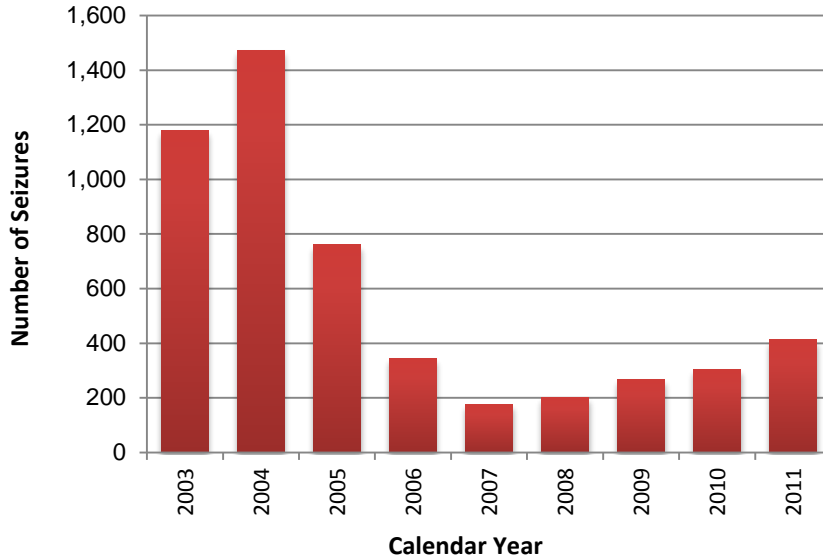

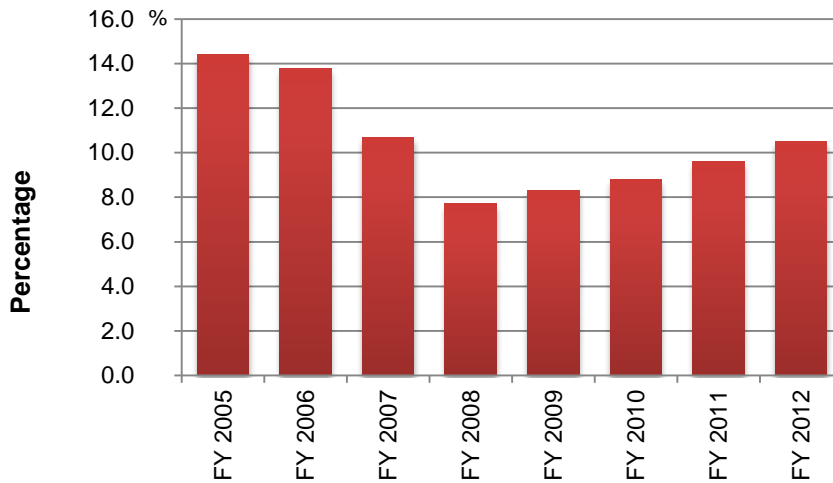
**METHAMPHETAMINE LAB SEIZURES IN IOWA

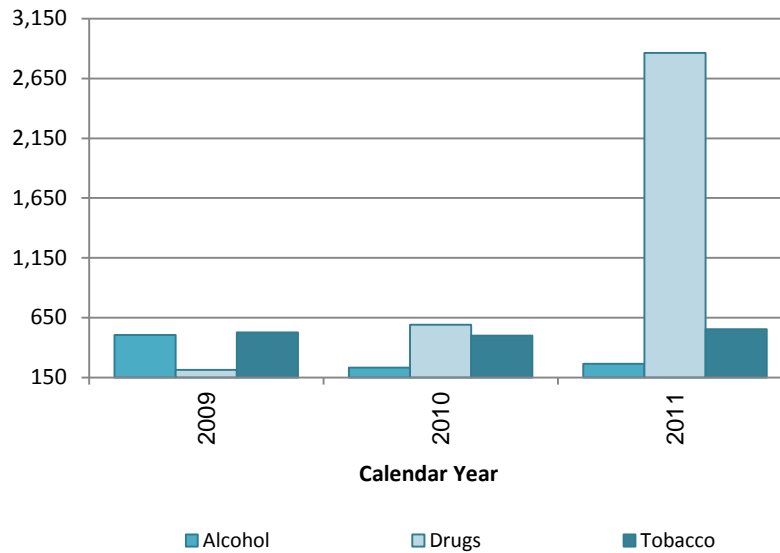

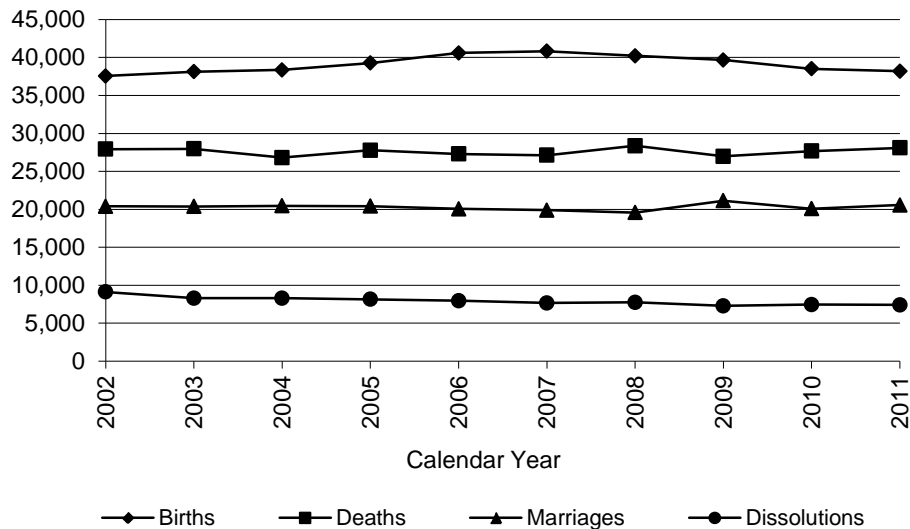

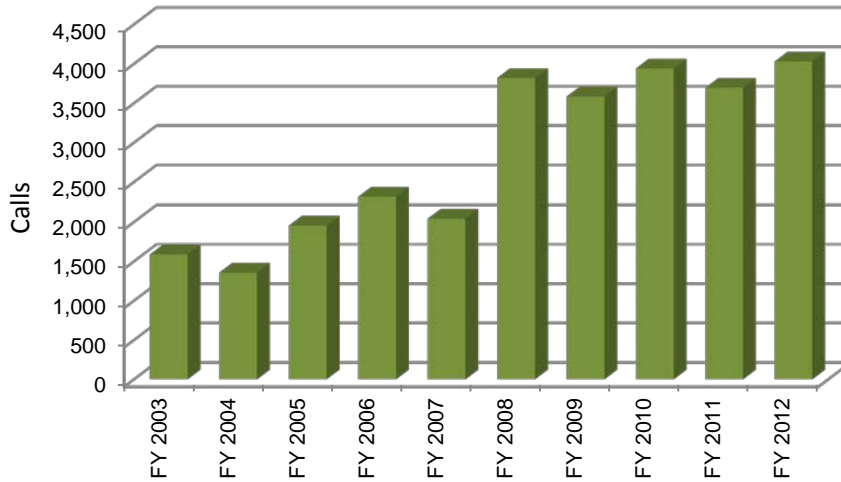

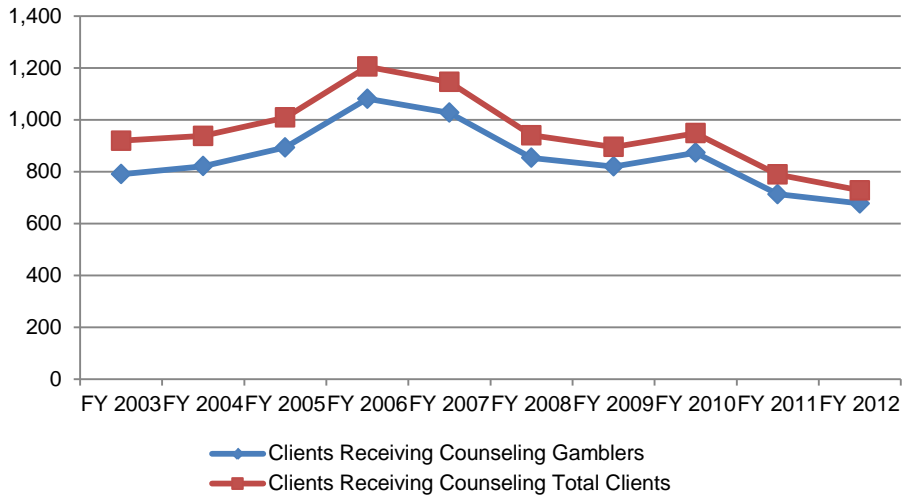

GAMBLING TREATMENT COUNSELING**



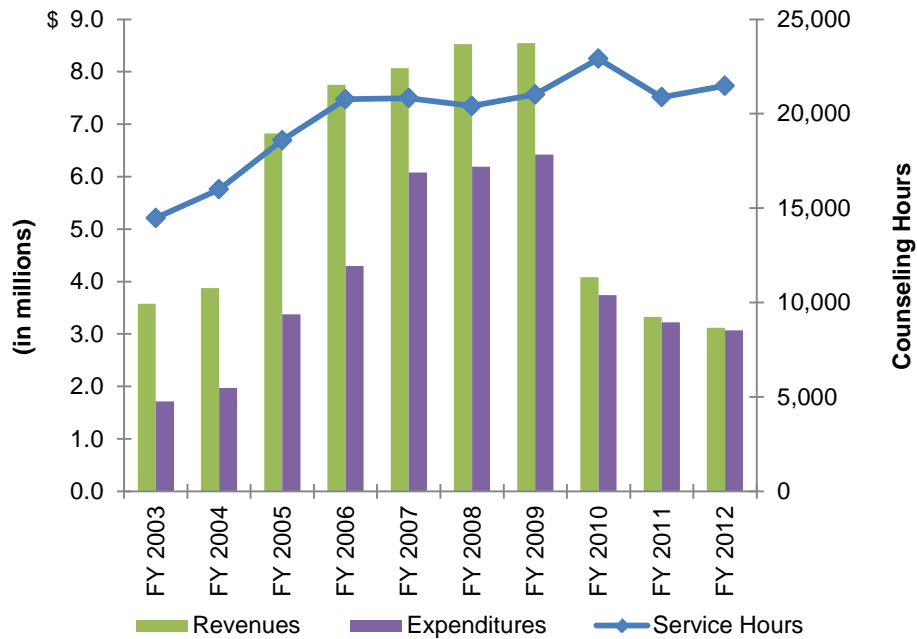

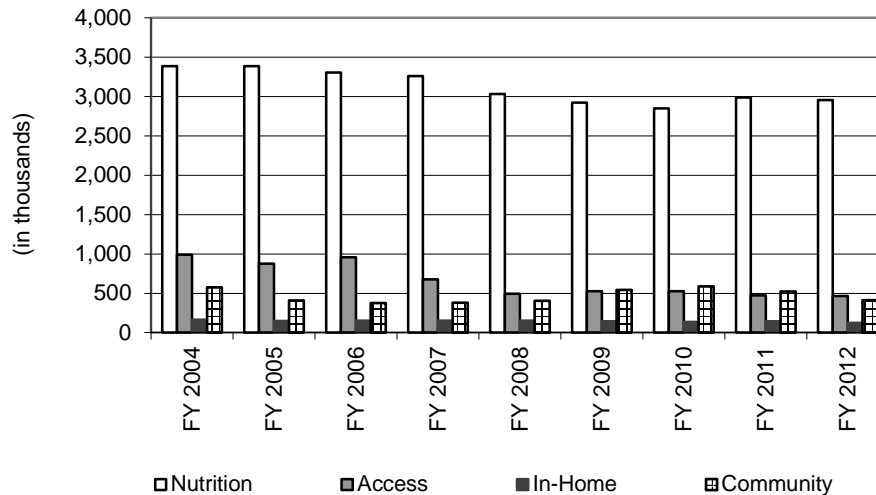

2010 CENSUS INFORMATION FOR IOWA

NATIONAL COMPARISON

- Iowa had an estimated 3,046,355 residents in 2010 according to the U.S. Census Bureau, a gain of 120,031 compared to the 2000 census. This gain of 4.1% was less than the growth rate for the nation (9.7%).
- With the exception of Illinois, surrounding state populations grew at a rate greater than Iowa in the last decade. However, their growth rates were also less than the national average.
- Ten states, (Michigan, Rhode Island, Louisiana, Ohio, New York, West Virginia, Vermont, Massachusetts, Illinois, and Pennsylvania) had a slower growth rate than Iowa.
- Six states accounted for 54.0% of the total national population growth: Texas, California, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and Arizona.
- Iowa's population increased by 10.5% since 1960. Only two states, North Dakota and West Virginia, had a smaller growth rate than Iowa during this time.
- Iowa's population growth of 27.0% during the last 100 years is the lowest growth rate in the nation during this time period.
- In 1910, Iowa was the 15th most populous of the 46 states and the District of Columbia. By 2010, Iowa ranked 30th in terms of population.

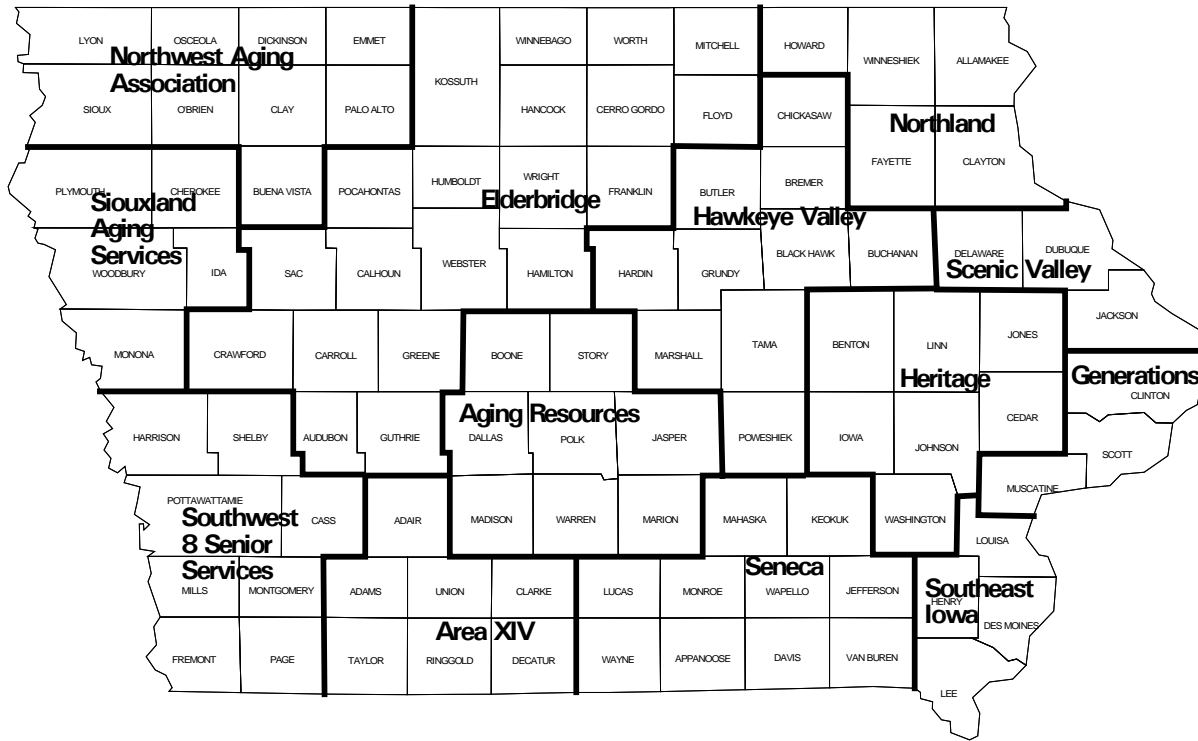
- The farm population decreased substantially while small towns remained relatively stable. The number of people living in the country, but not in small towns or on farms, increased throughout the last 55 years.
- The total number of people aged 75 years or older has increased each of the last five decades. Data from the 2010 Census indicates Iowa had more residents 75 years old or older than children under the age of 5. There are 21 other states where this occurred.
- Projections by Woods and Poole Economics, Inc., indicate that Iowa's population will continue to age and grow slowly.
- In 2010 Iowa had 947 incorporated places.
 - There were 663 places with less than 1,000 residents.
 - There were 124 places with between 1,000 and 1,999 residents.
 - There were 80 places with between 2,000 and 4,999 residents.
 - There were 42 places with between 5,000 and 9,999 residents.
 - There were 28 places with between 10,000 and 49,999 residents.
 - There were 10 places with greater than 50,000 residents.
- Twenty-two of Iowa's counties gained residents since 2000. Of these, 16 counties had increases greater than 1,000 people.
- Population gains for Polk, Dallas, Johnson, and Linn counties exceeded 10,000 people.
- Sixty-six counties experienced declining populations. Forty-four had population declines of at least 500 people. A total of 17 counties had declines greater than 1,000 people.
- Six counties had populations in excess of 100,000 people: Black Hawk, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Scott, and Woodbury. These six counties account for 38.4% of Iowa's total population.
- A total of 51.3% of Iowa's population is concentrated in 11 counties: Black Hawk, Clinton, Dallas, Dubuque, Johnson, Linn, Polk, Pottawattamie, Scott, Story, and Woodbury.

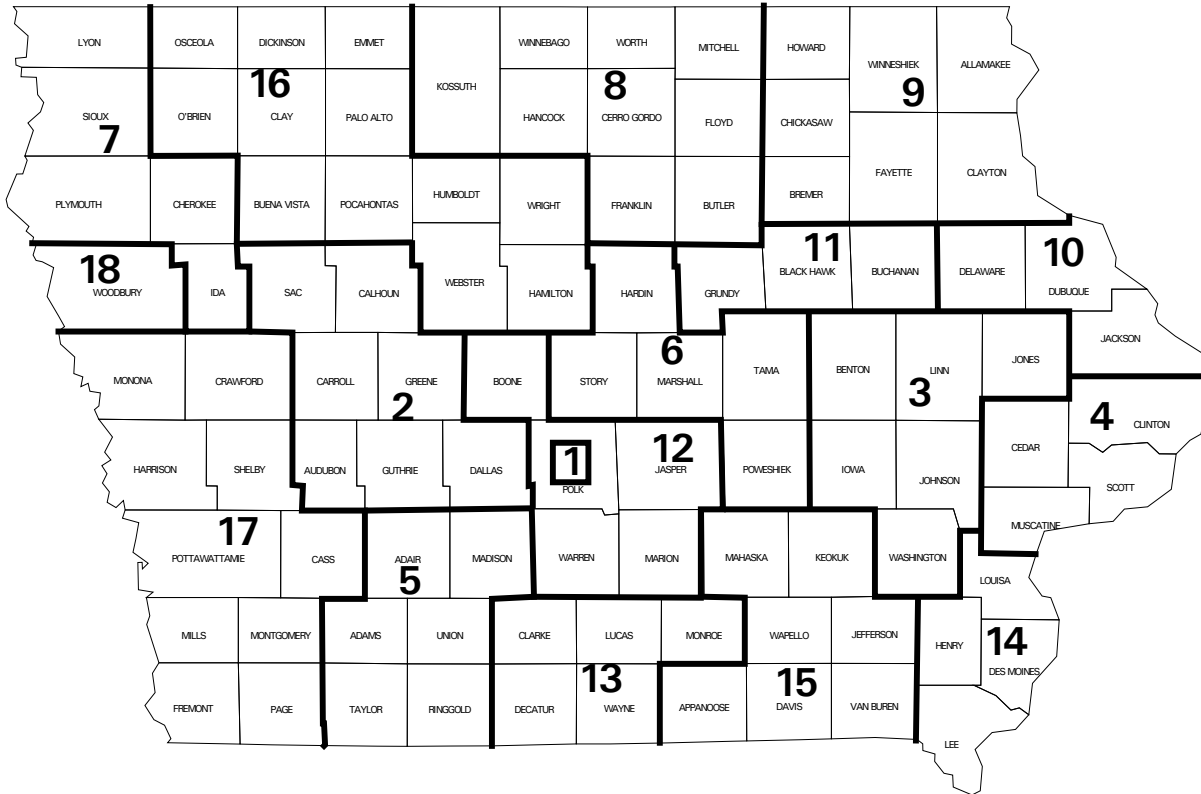

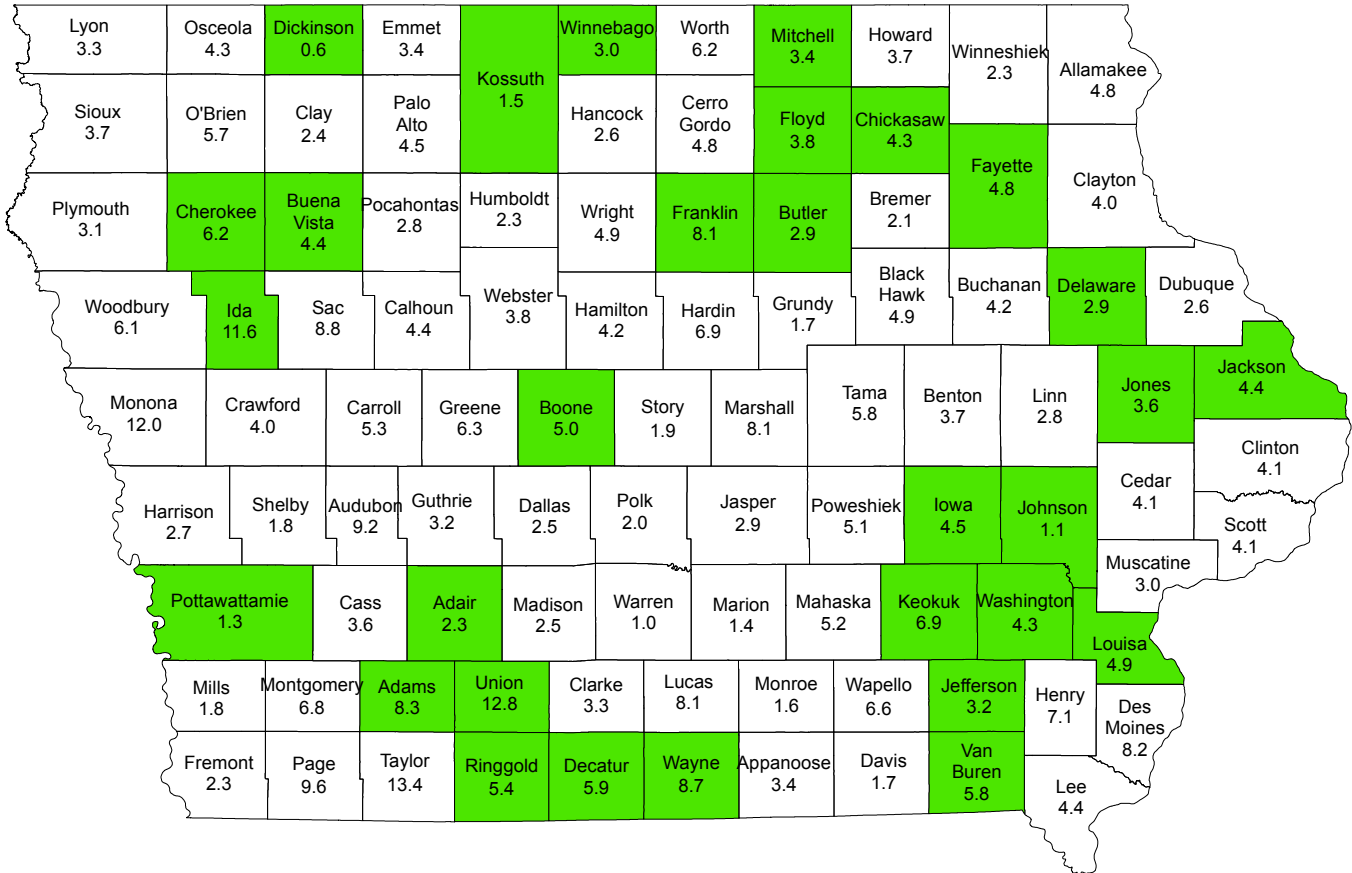

PERCENTAGE OF IOWA CHILDREN DIAGNOSED WITH LEAD POISONING BEFORE AGE SIX



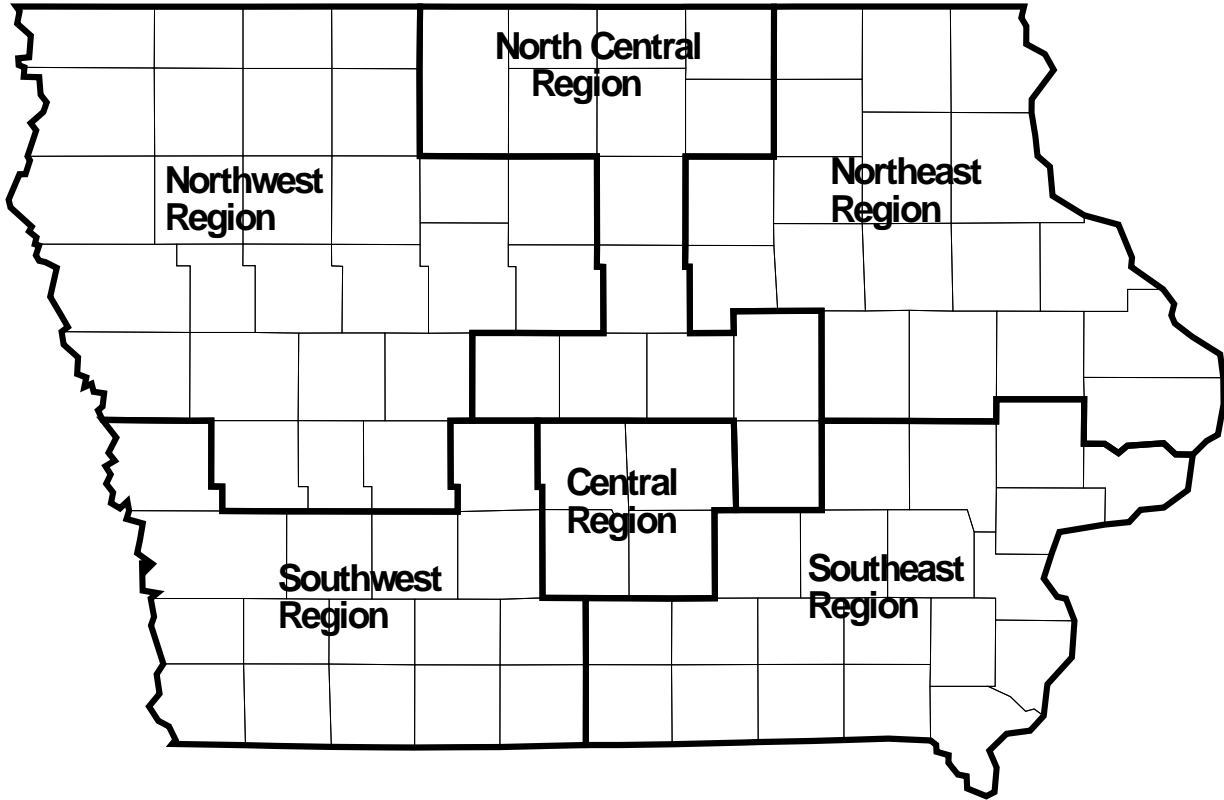

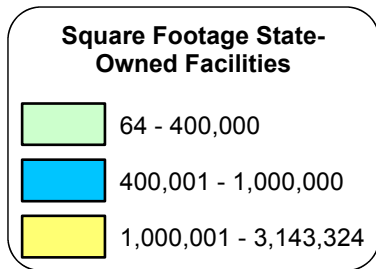

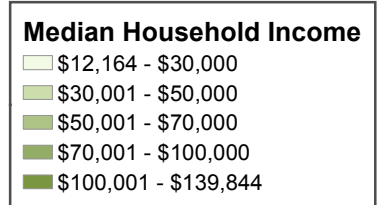
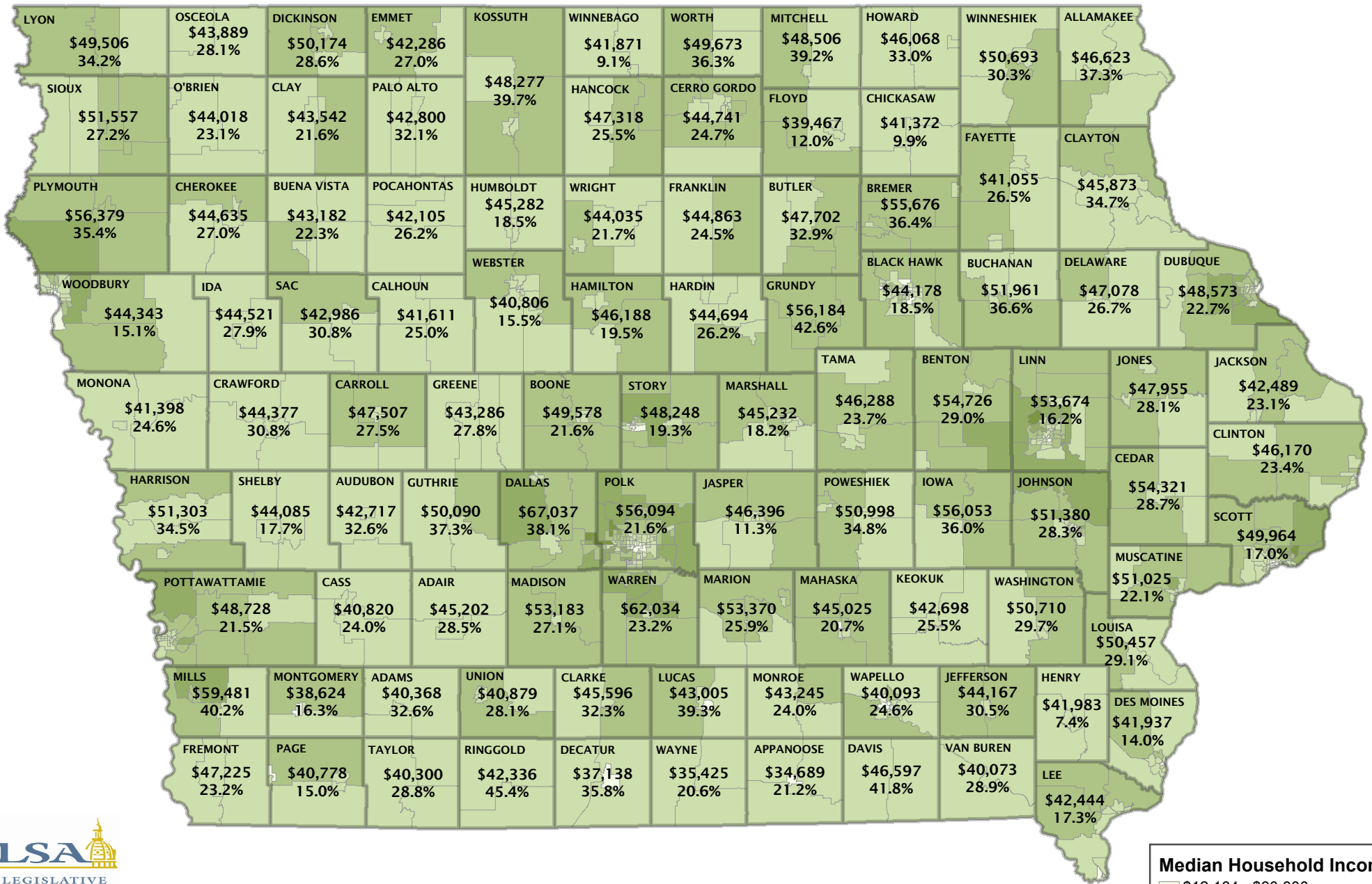
- Property tax data for cities, counties, and school districts

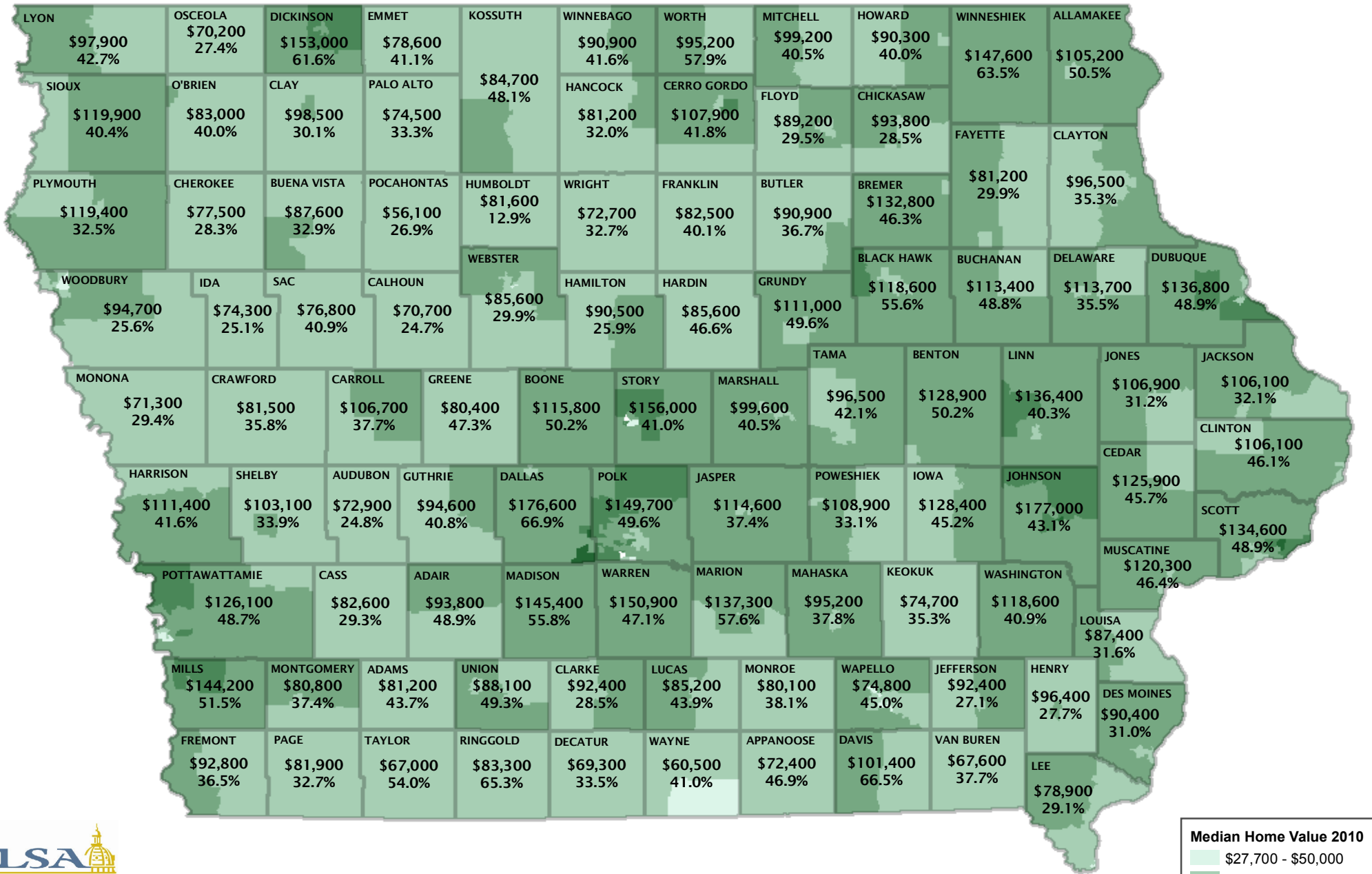
Median Household Income by Census Tract and Percent Change between 2000 - 2010 by County

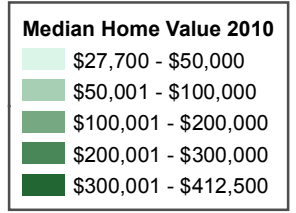


Median Home Value by Census Tract 2010 and Percent Change between 2000 - 2010



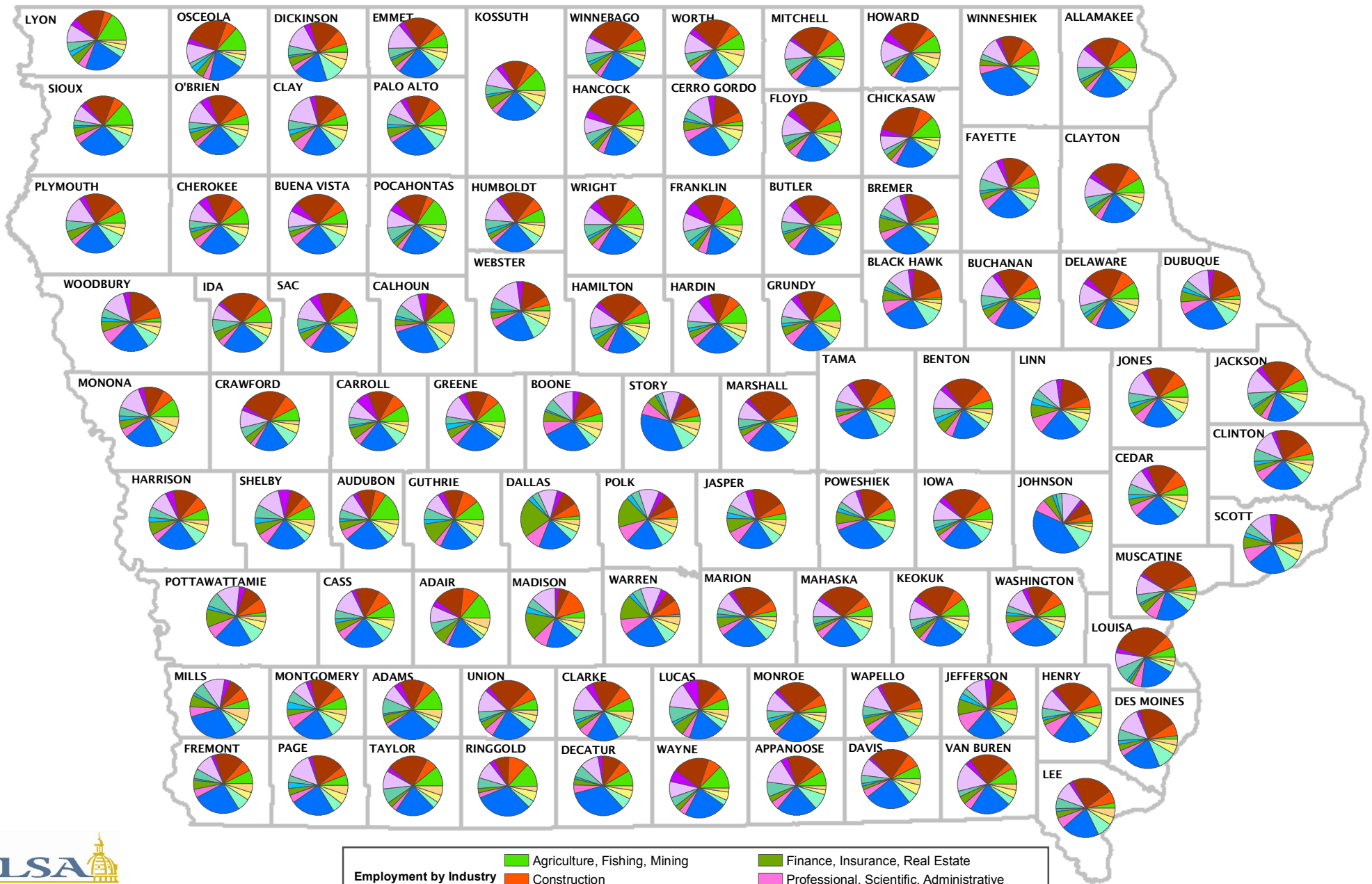

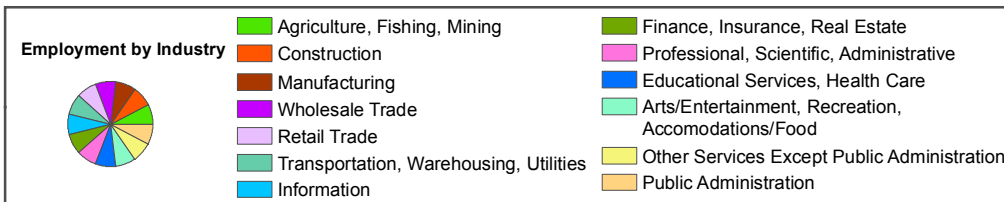


Employment by Industry by County

2010 Estimate



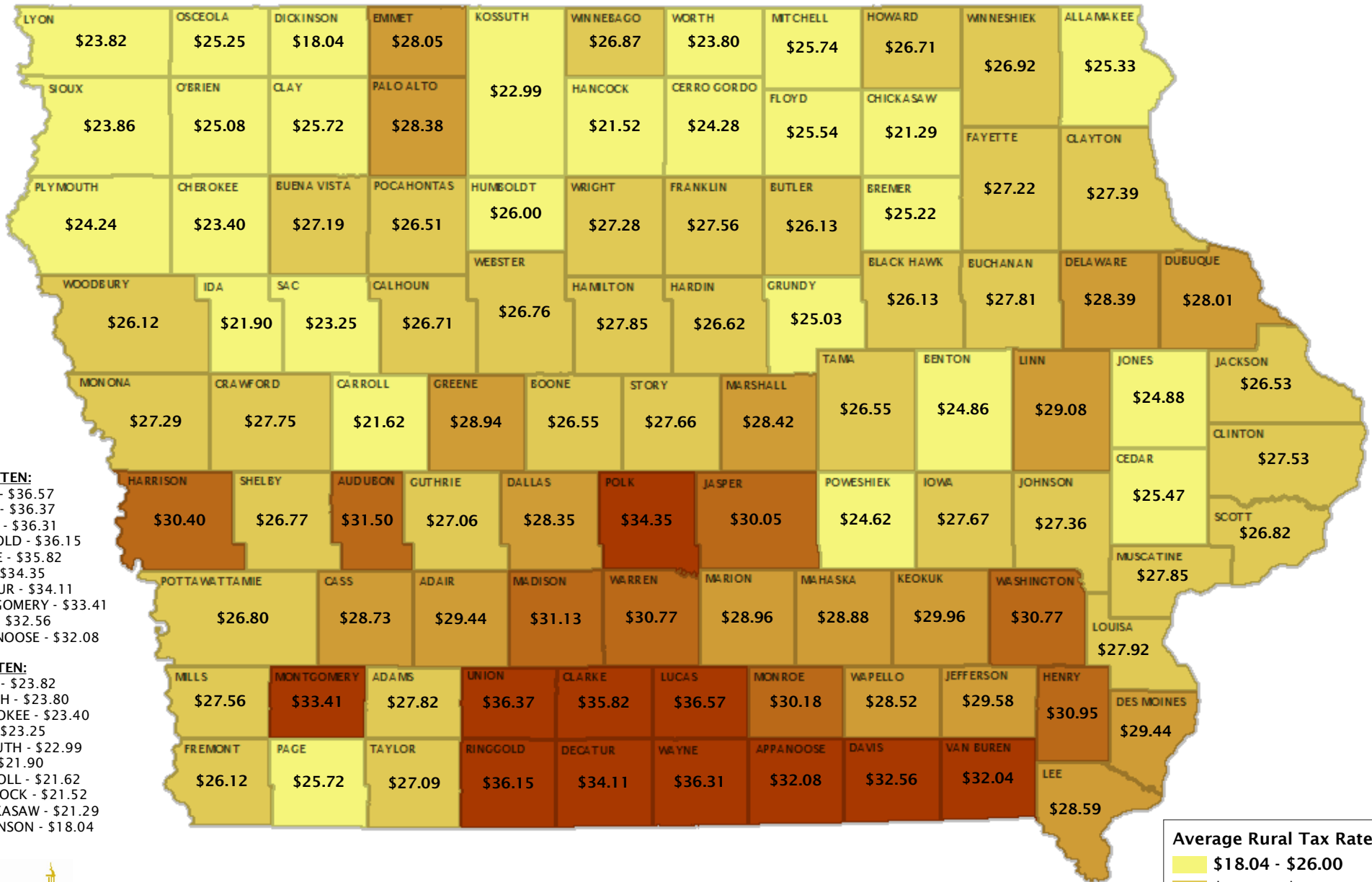

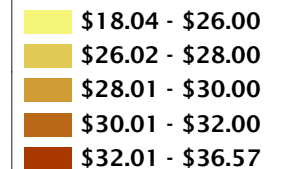

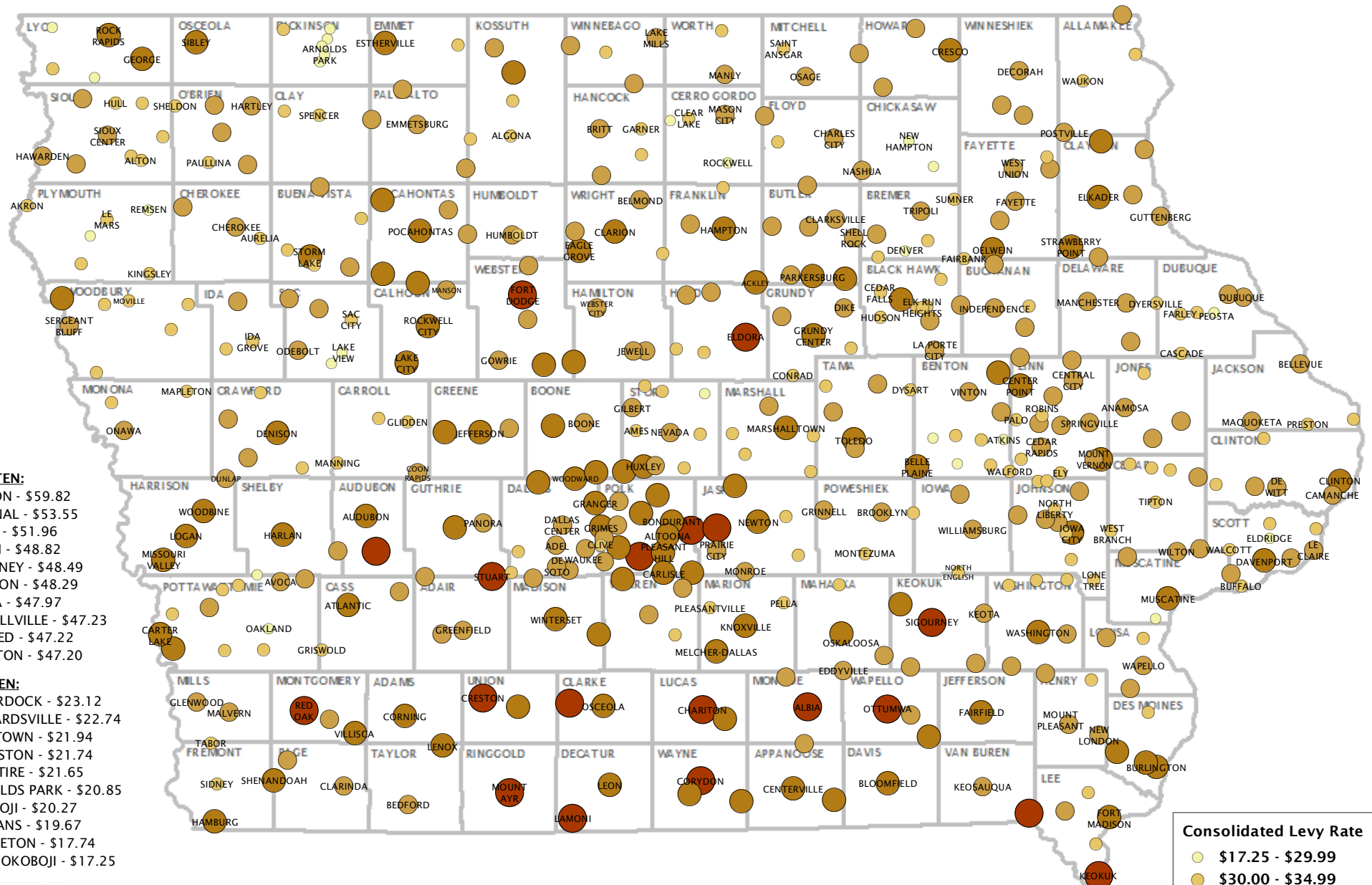
Average Rural Tax Rate

Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Cities

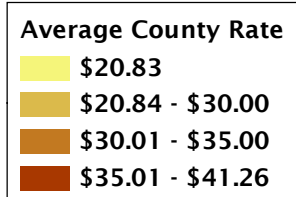
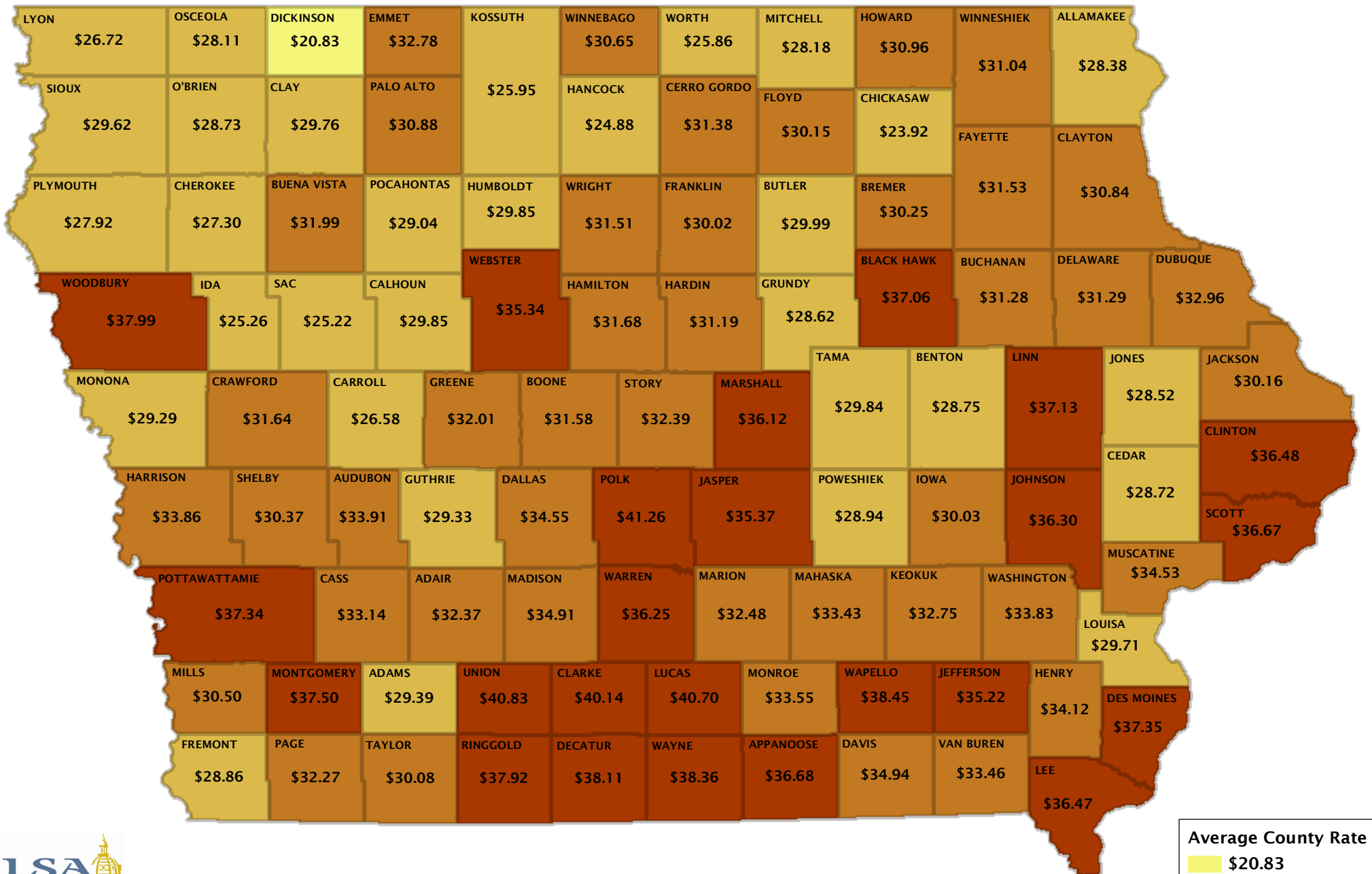

Consolidated Property Tax Rate - Average for Counties FY 2012

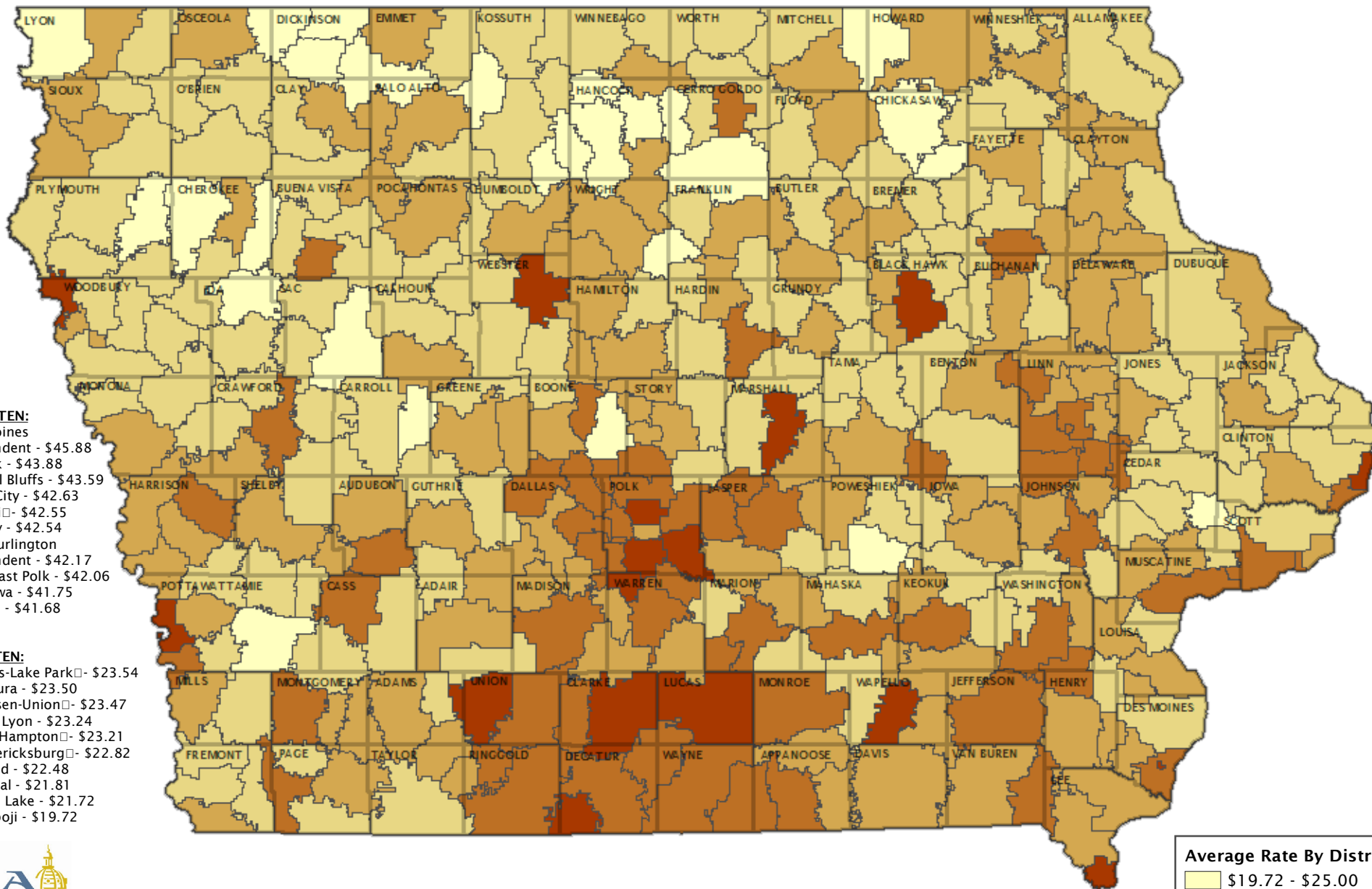

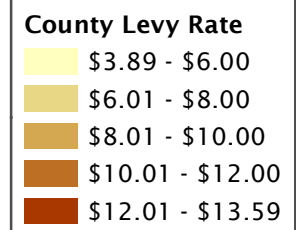

FY 2009 - FY 2012

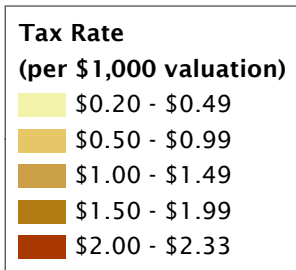
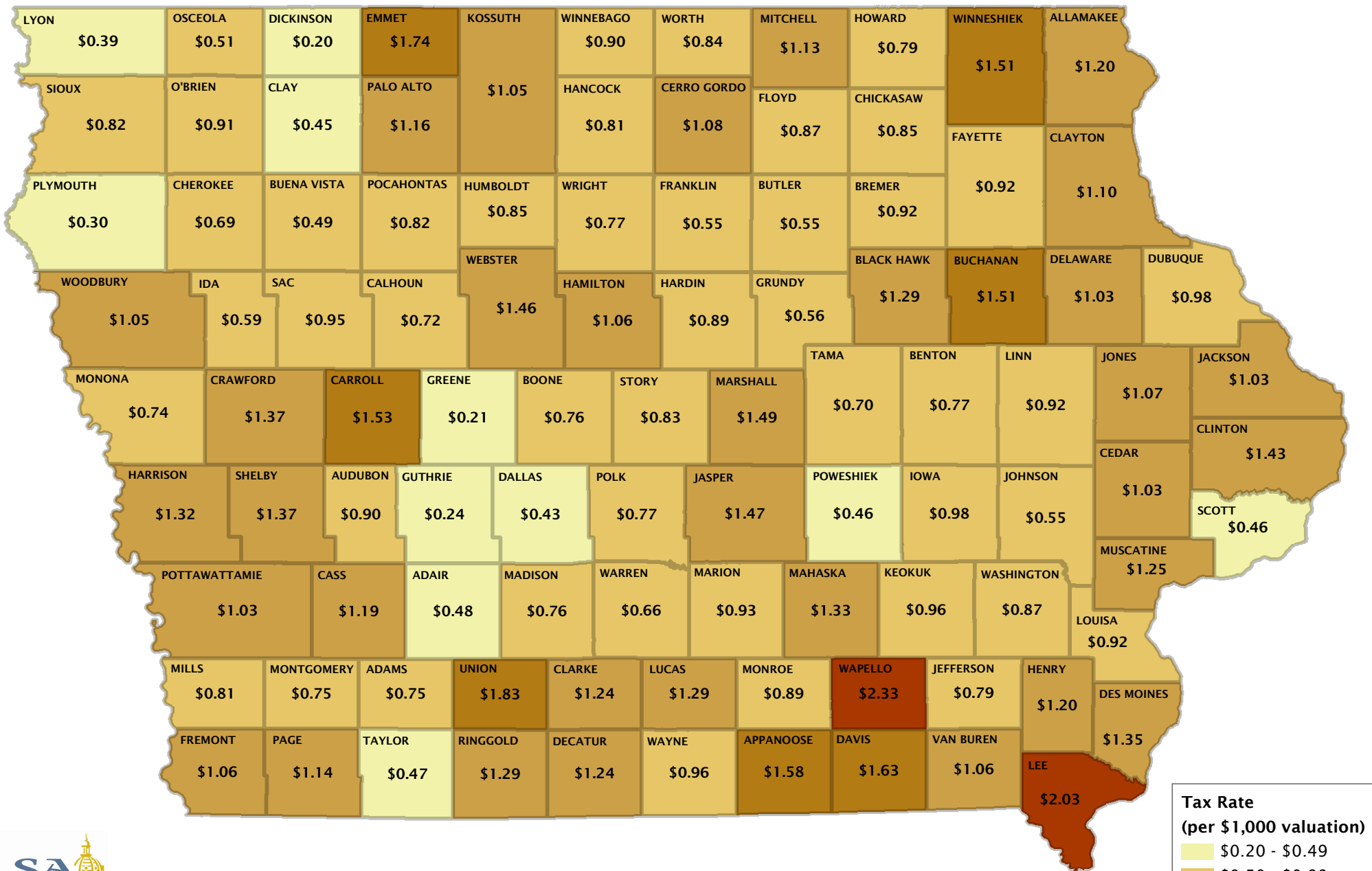

Mental Health Levy Tax Rate by County

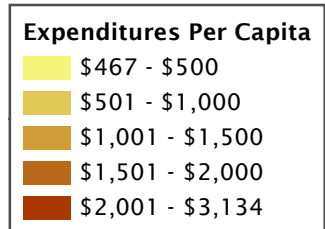
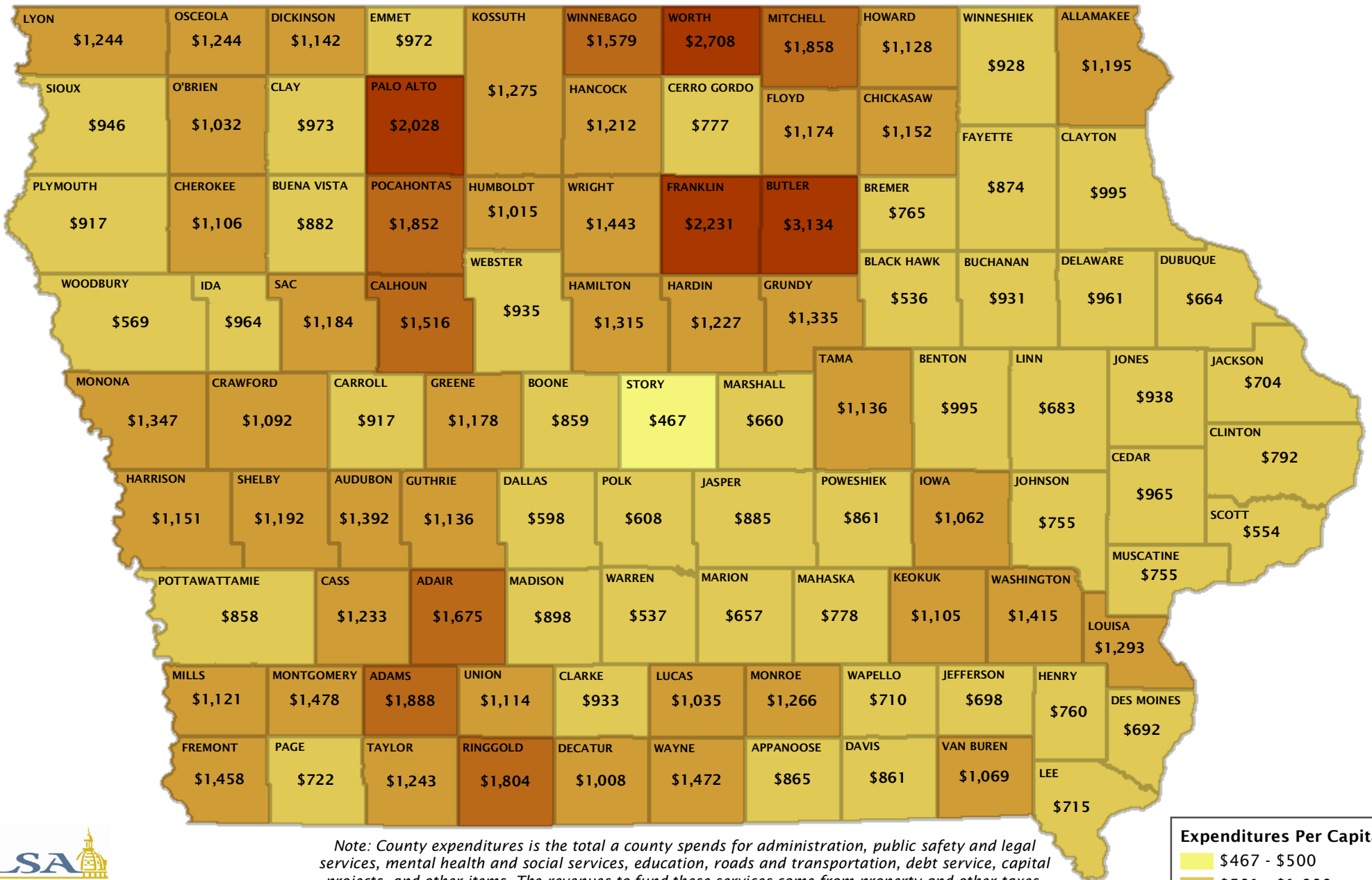

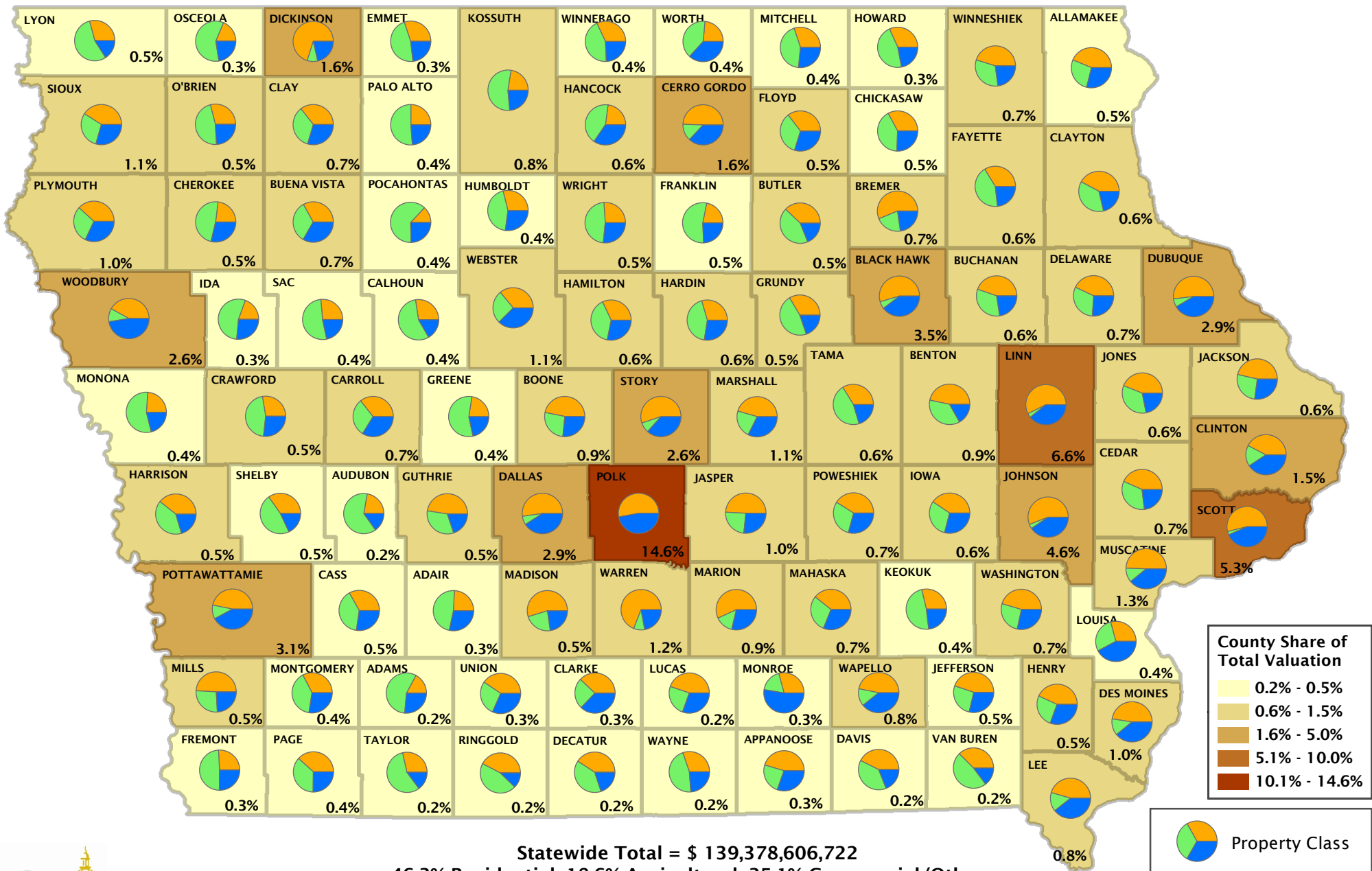
County Government Expenditures Per Capita from All Funds FY 2012

Taxable Valuation by Property Classification by County - FY 2012 and County Share of Total Statewide Taxable Valuation

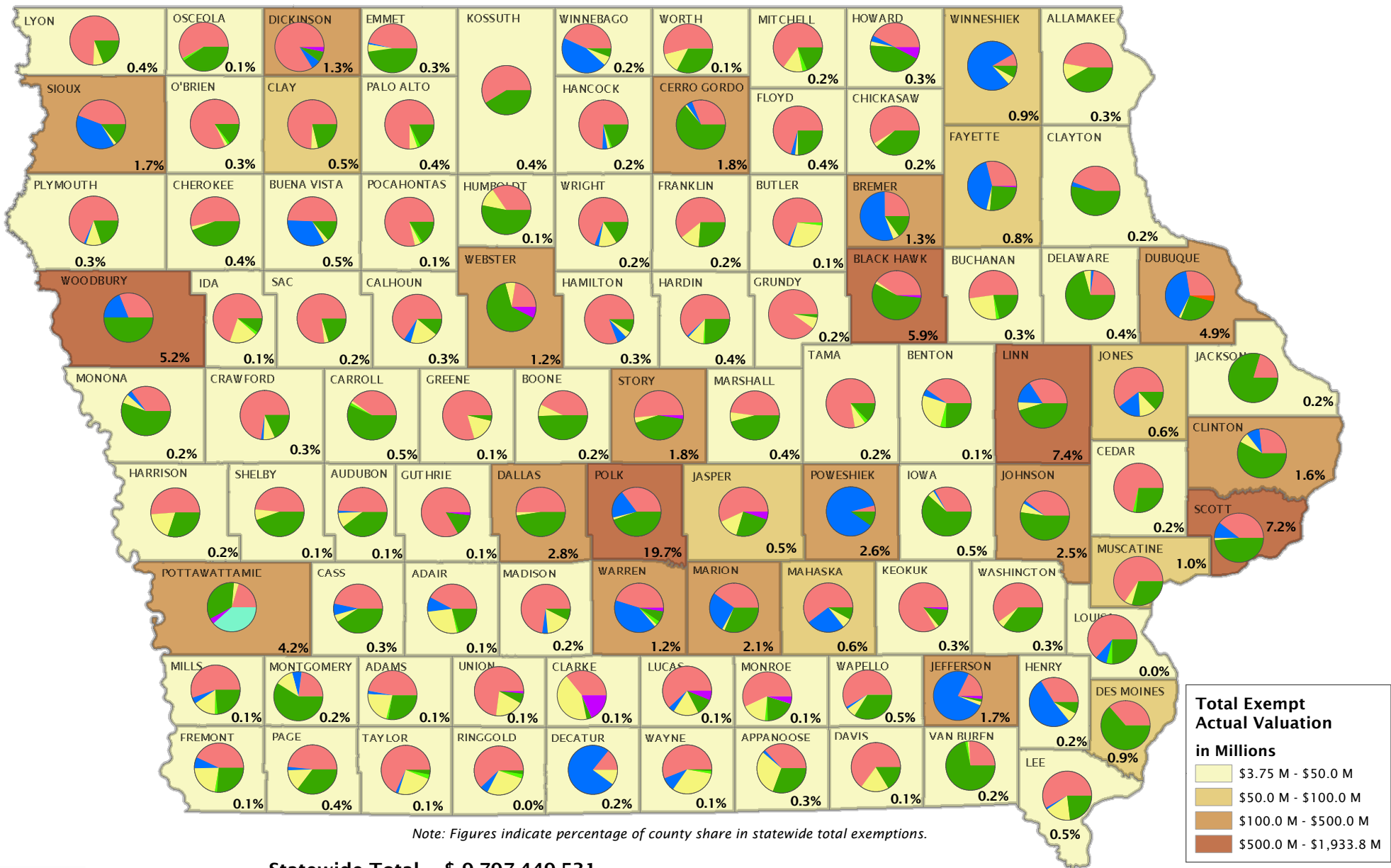

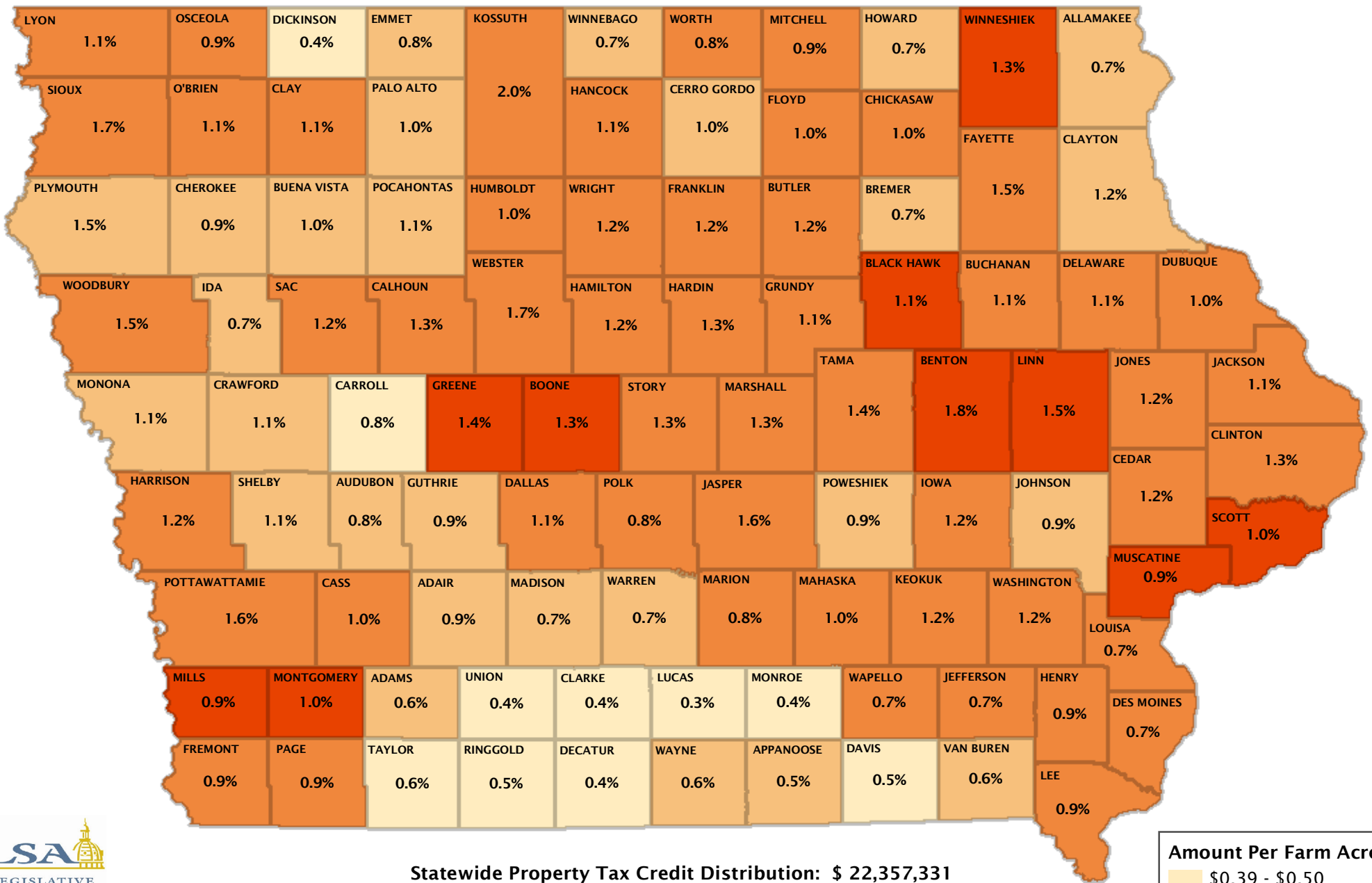

Per Farm Acre - FY 2011



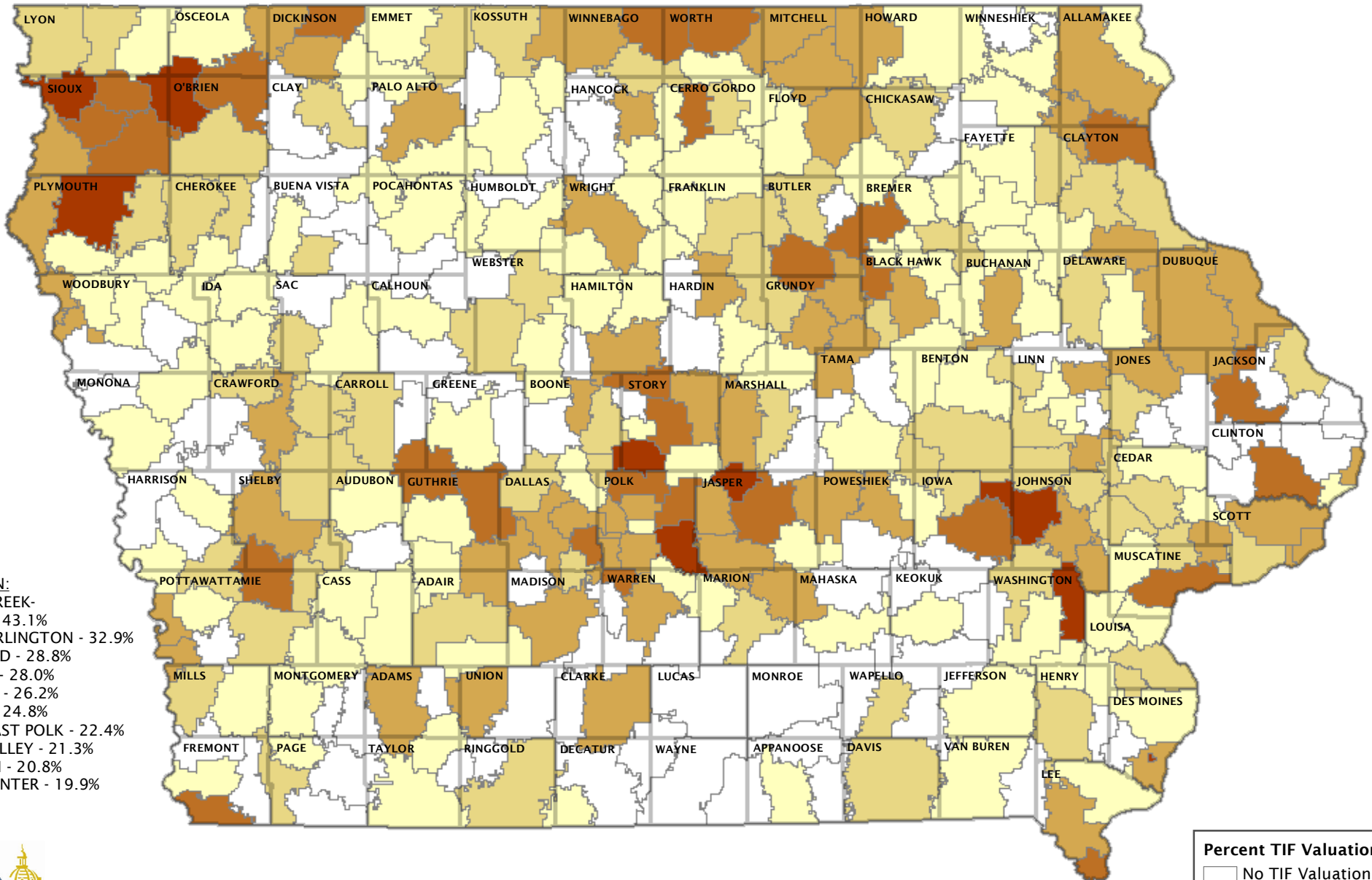

TIF Valuation as a Percentage of Total Valuation by School District FY 2012

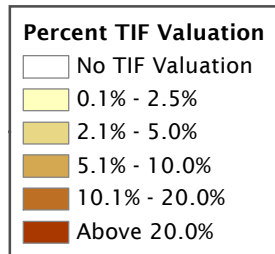

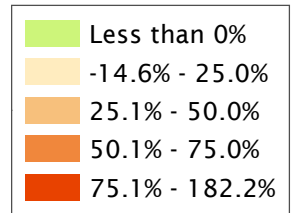
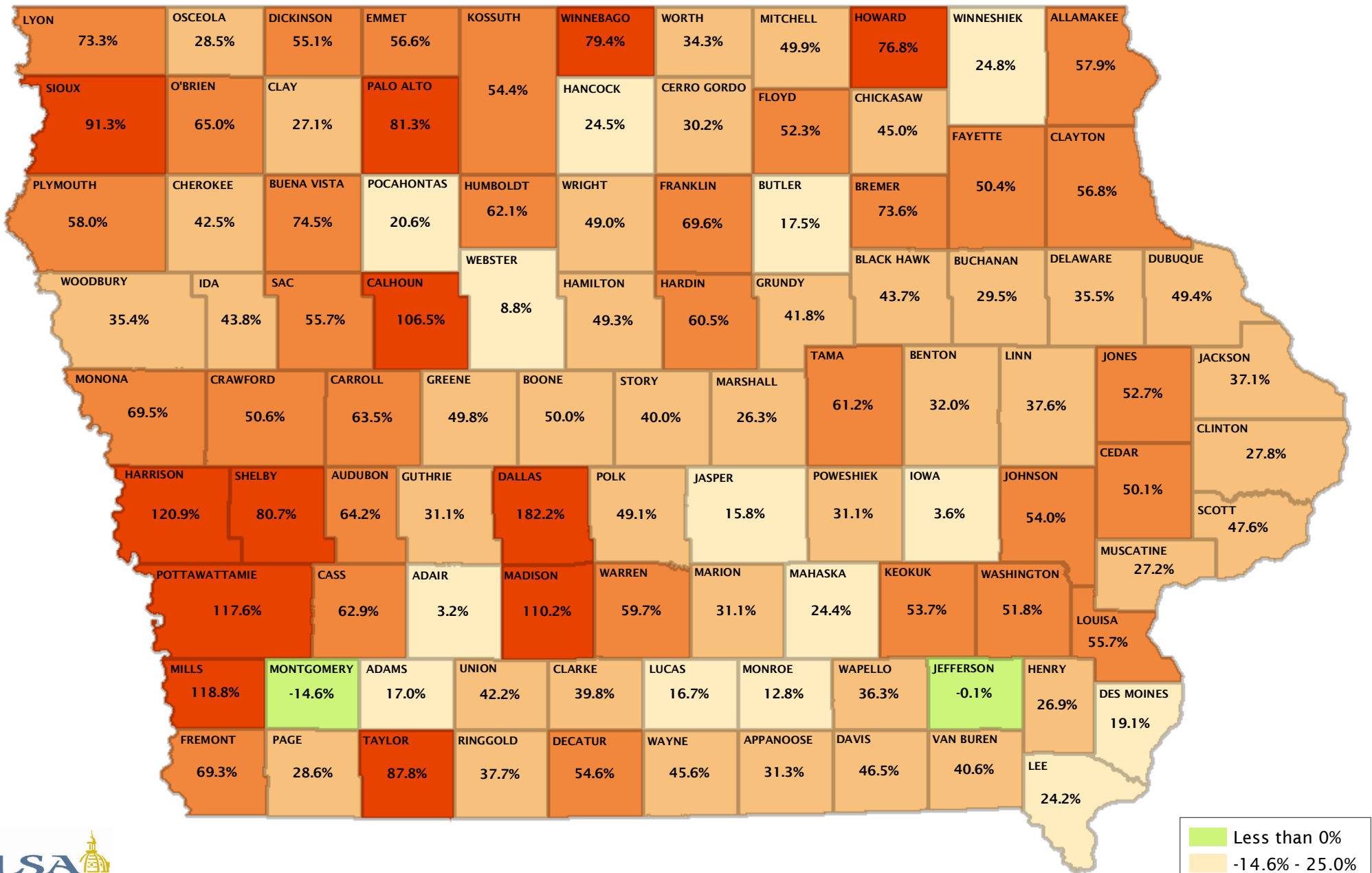

Percentage Change in State Income Tax Paid per County

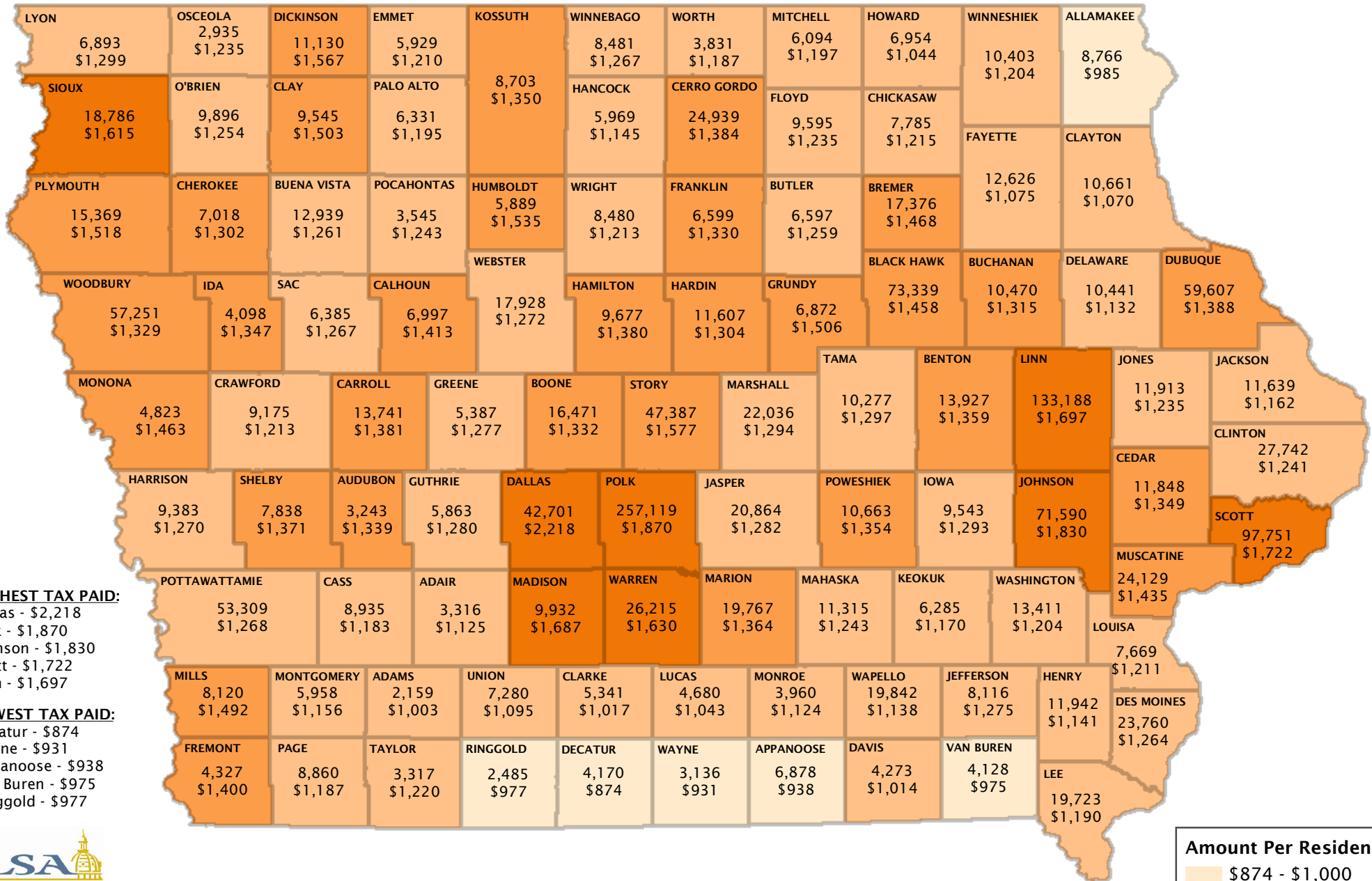

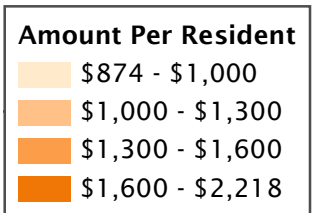

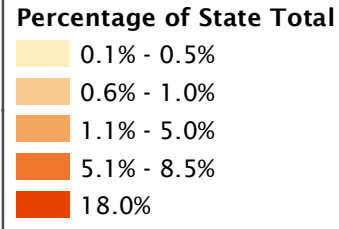

Percentage of State Income Tax Paid by County

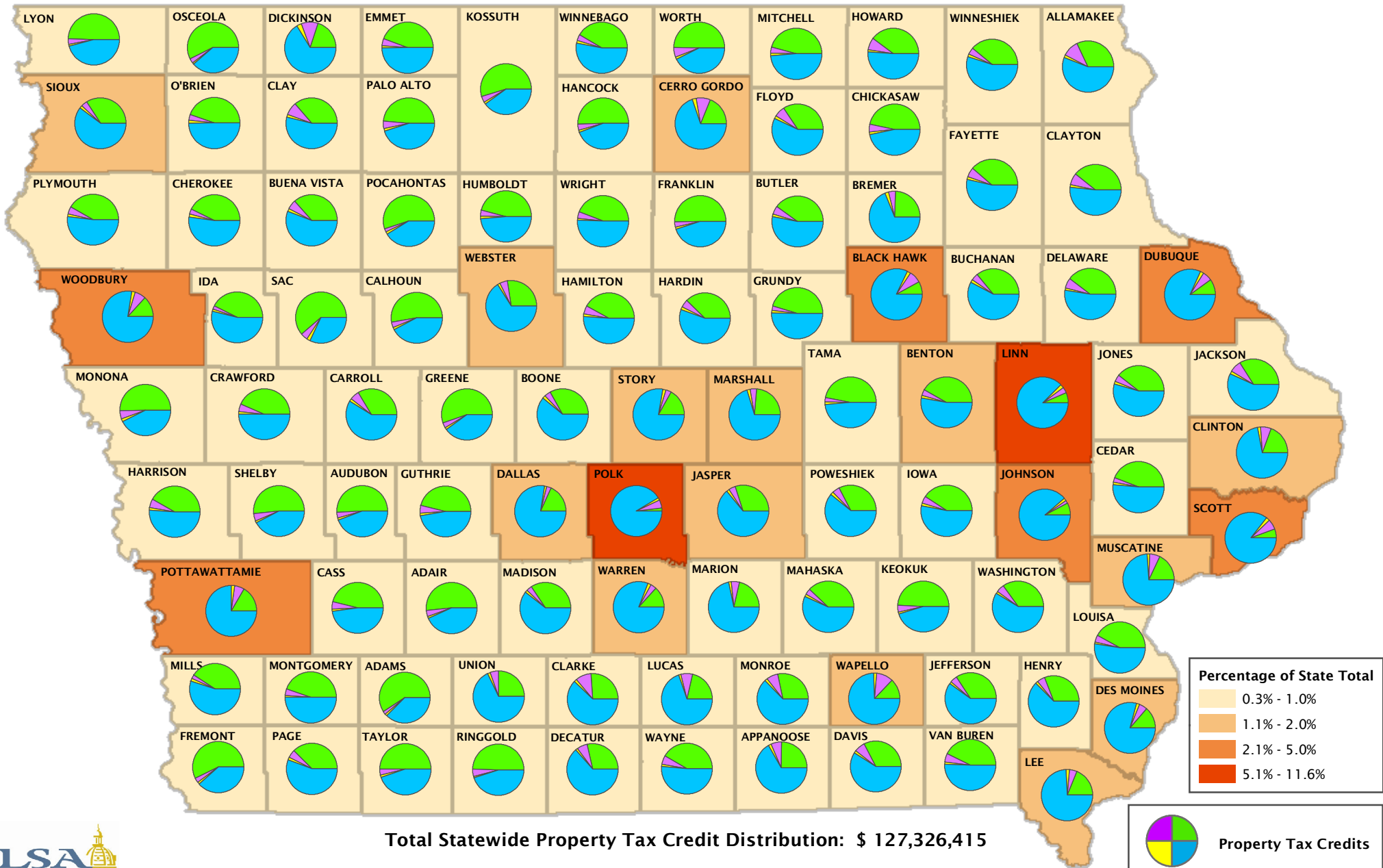

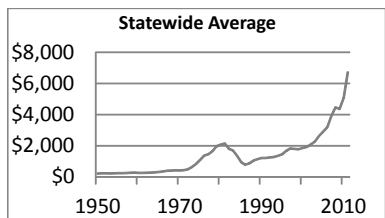

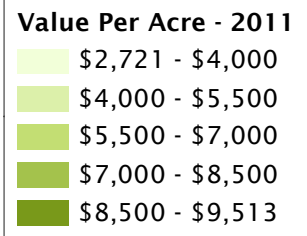
Average Farmland Value per Acre by County - 2011

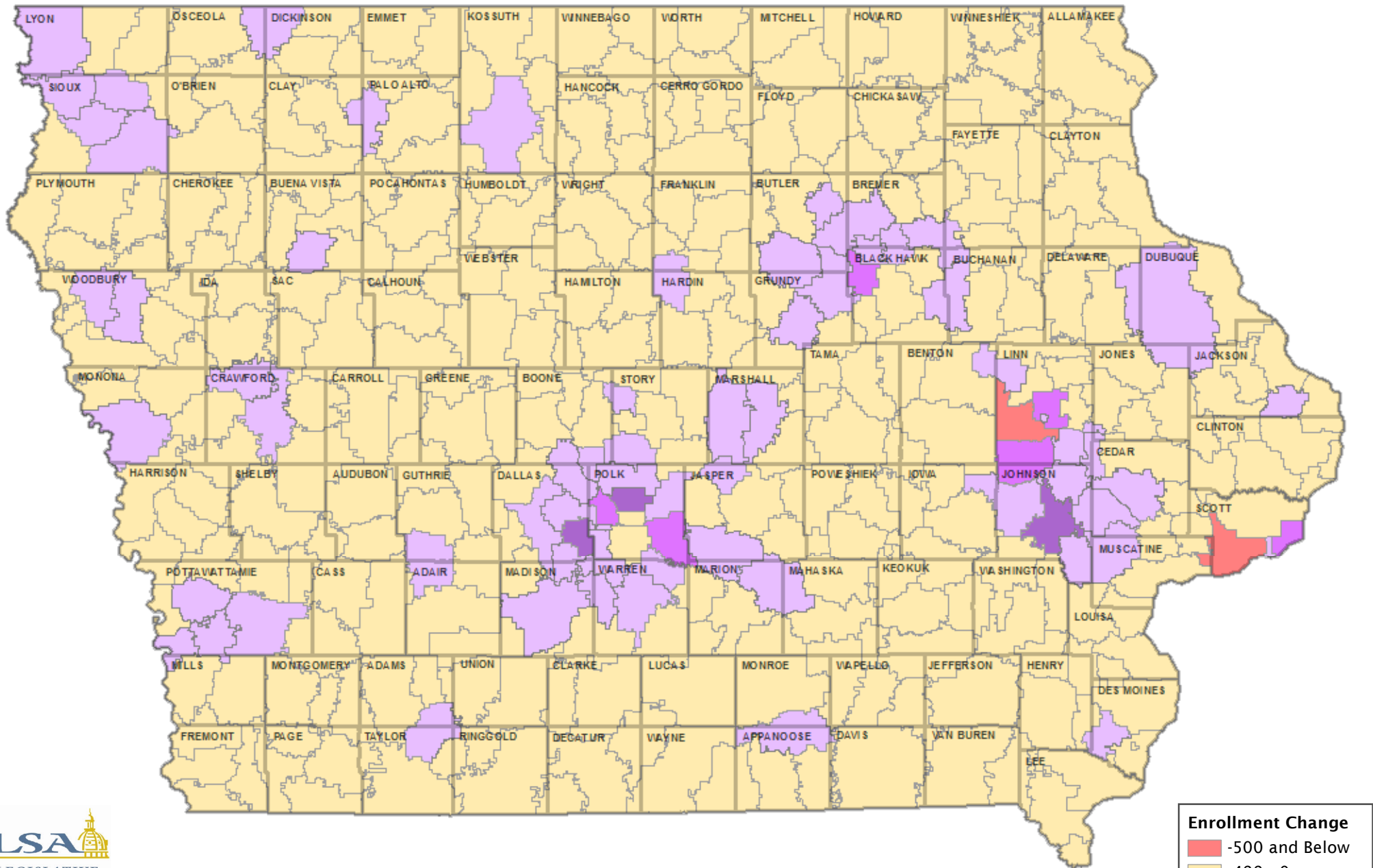

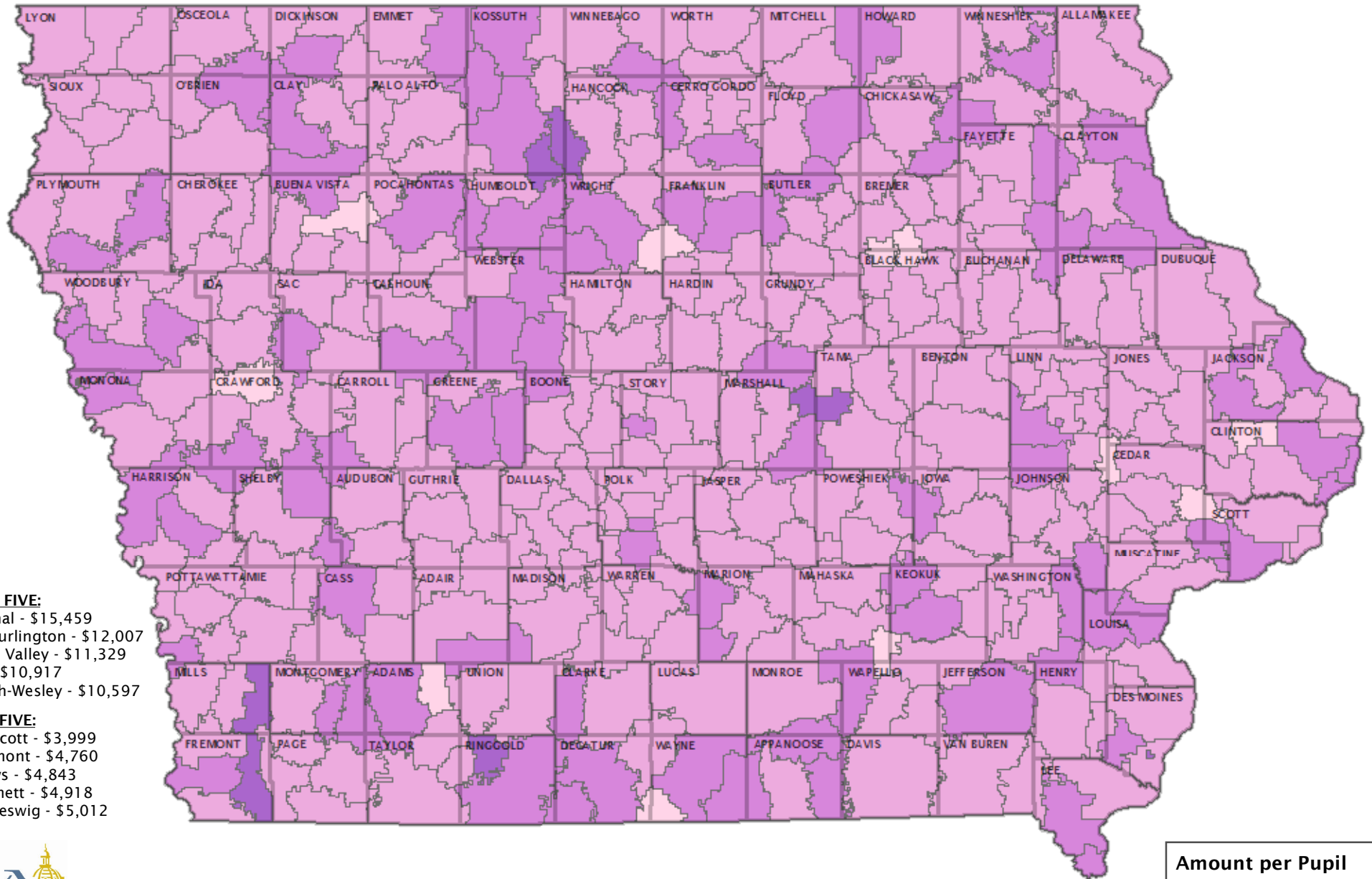

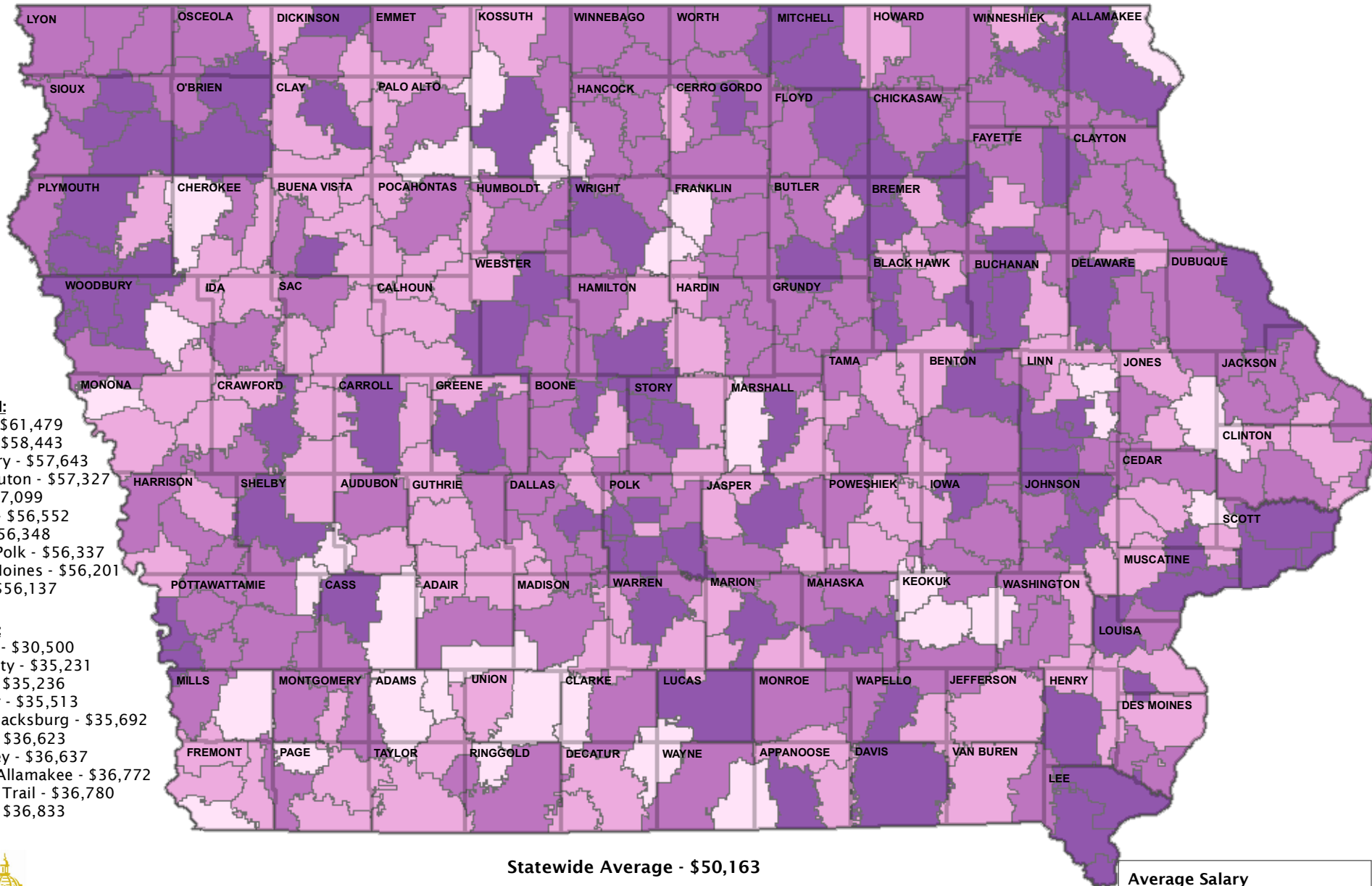

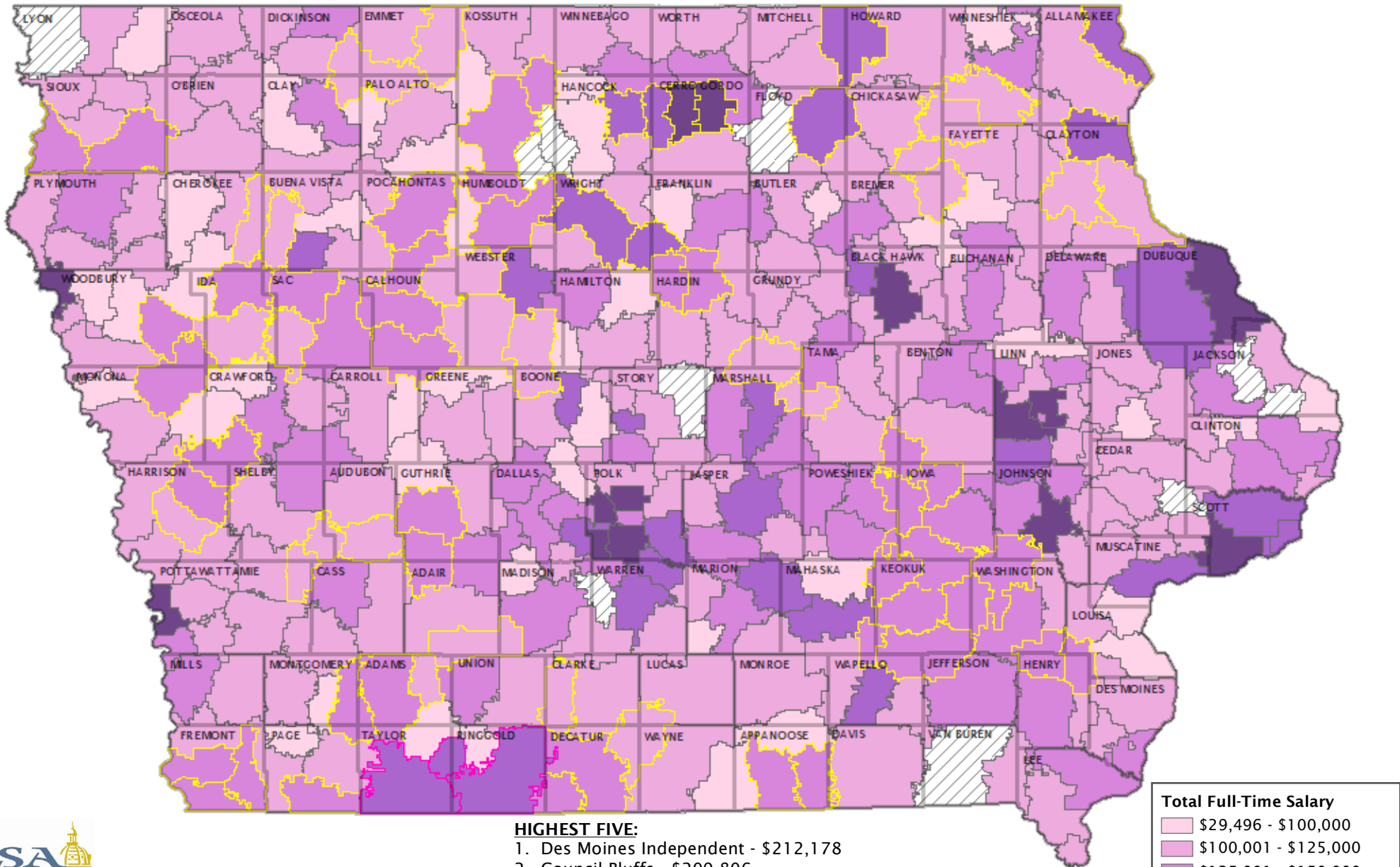

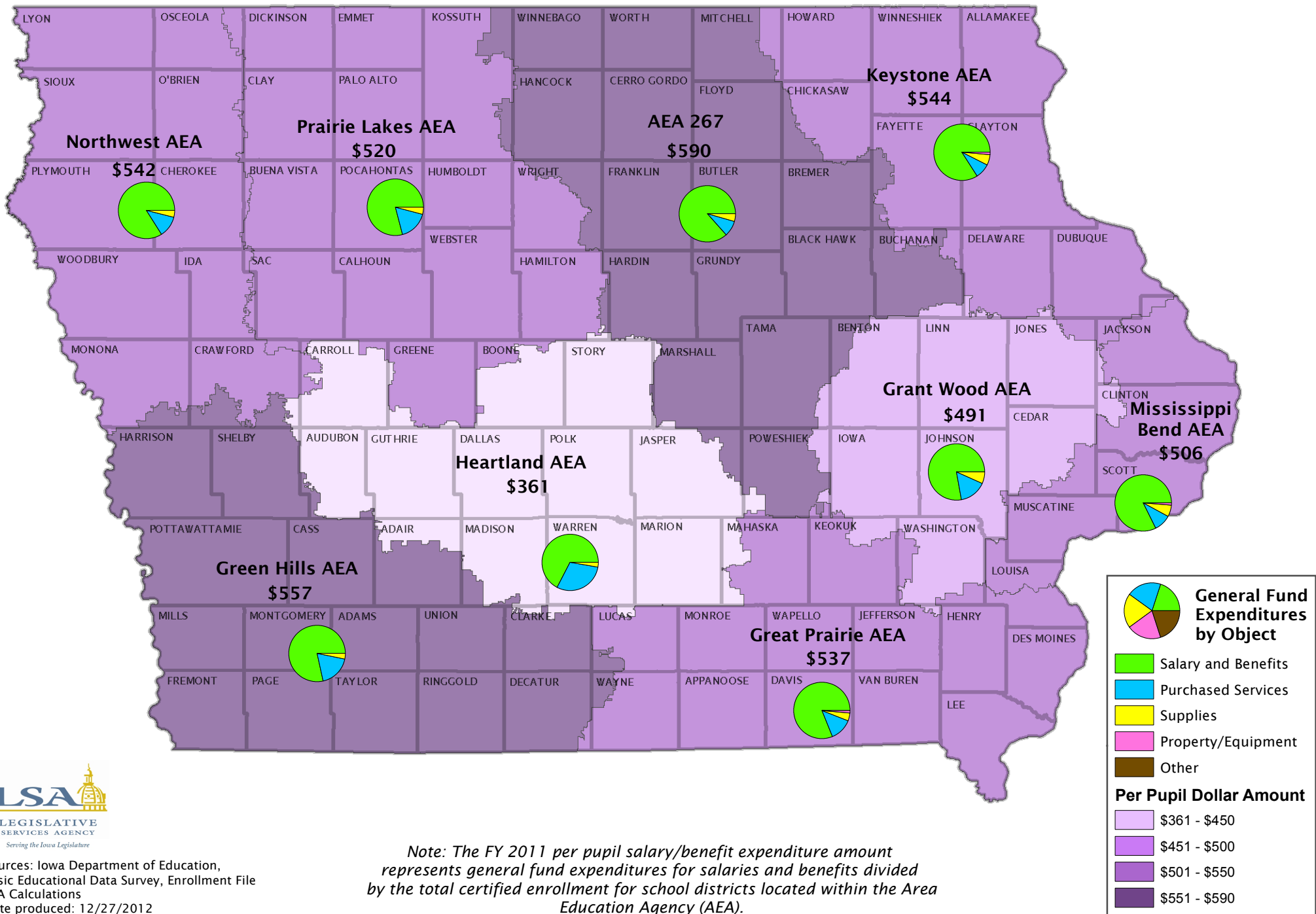

Salary and Benefit Expenditures per Pupil by Area Education Agency

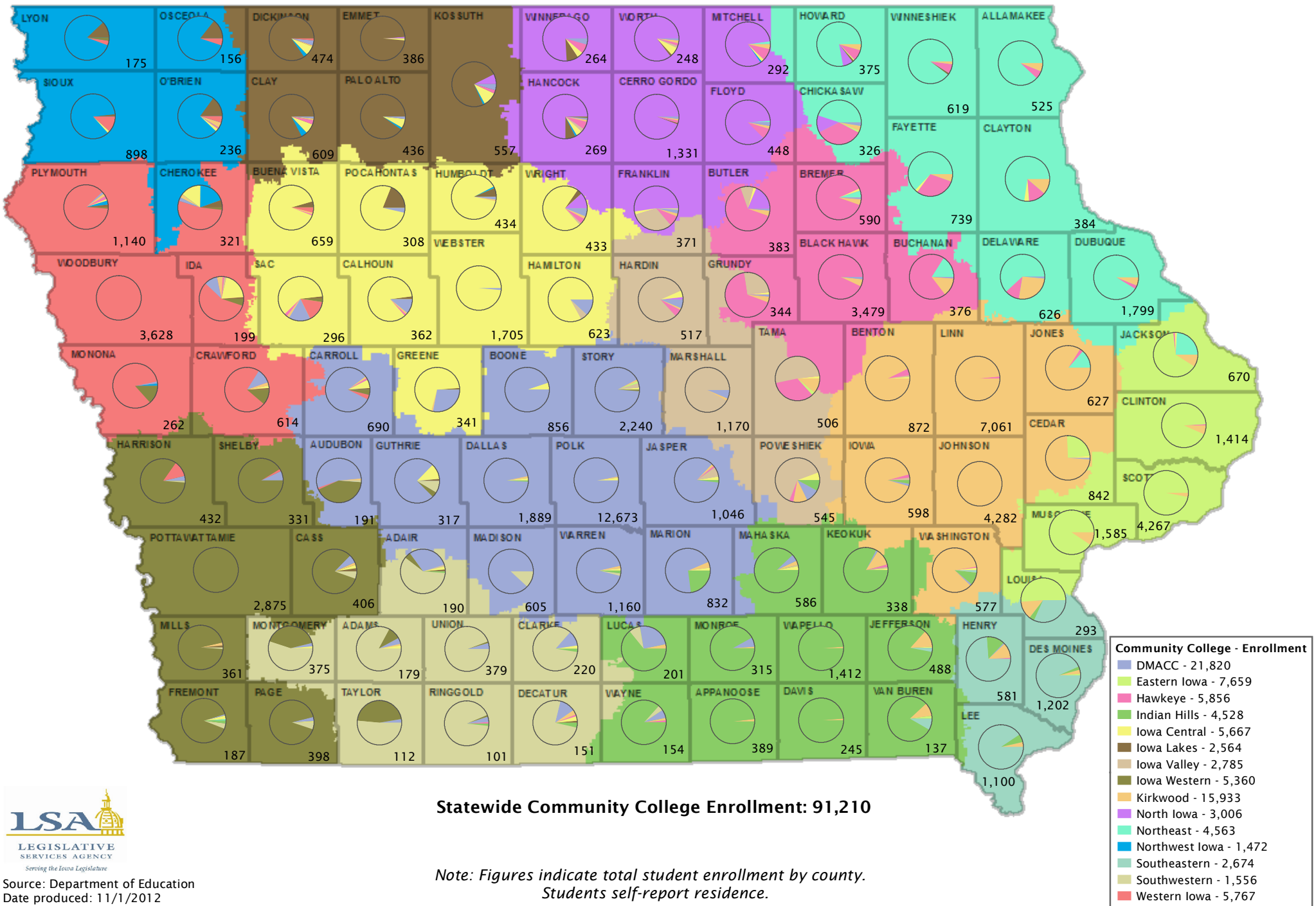

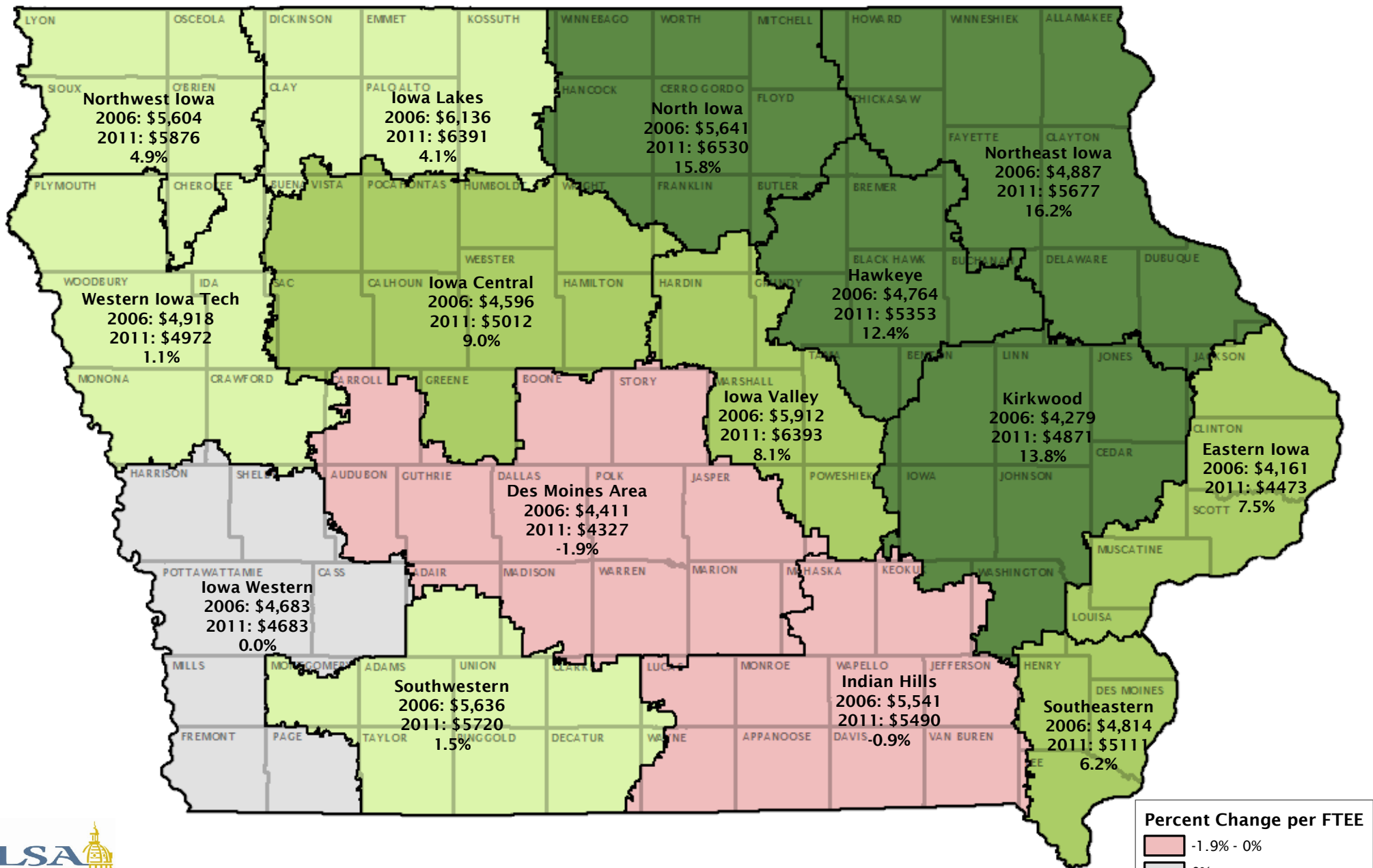
Community College Enrollment by College and County of Permanent Residence Fall 2012

Percent Change in Total Revenues per FTEE from FY 2006 to FY 2011



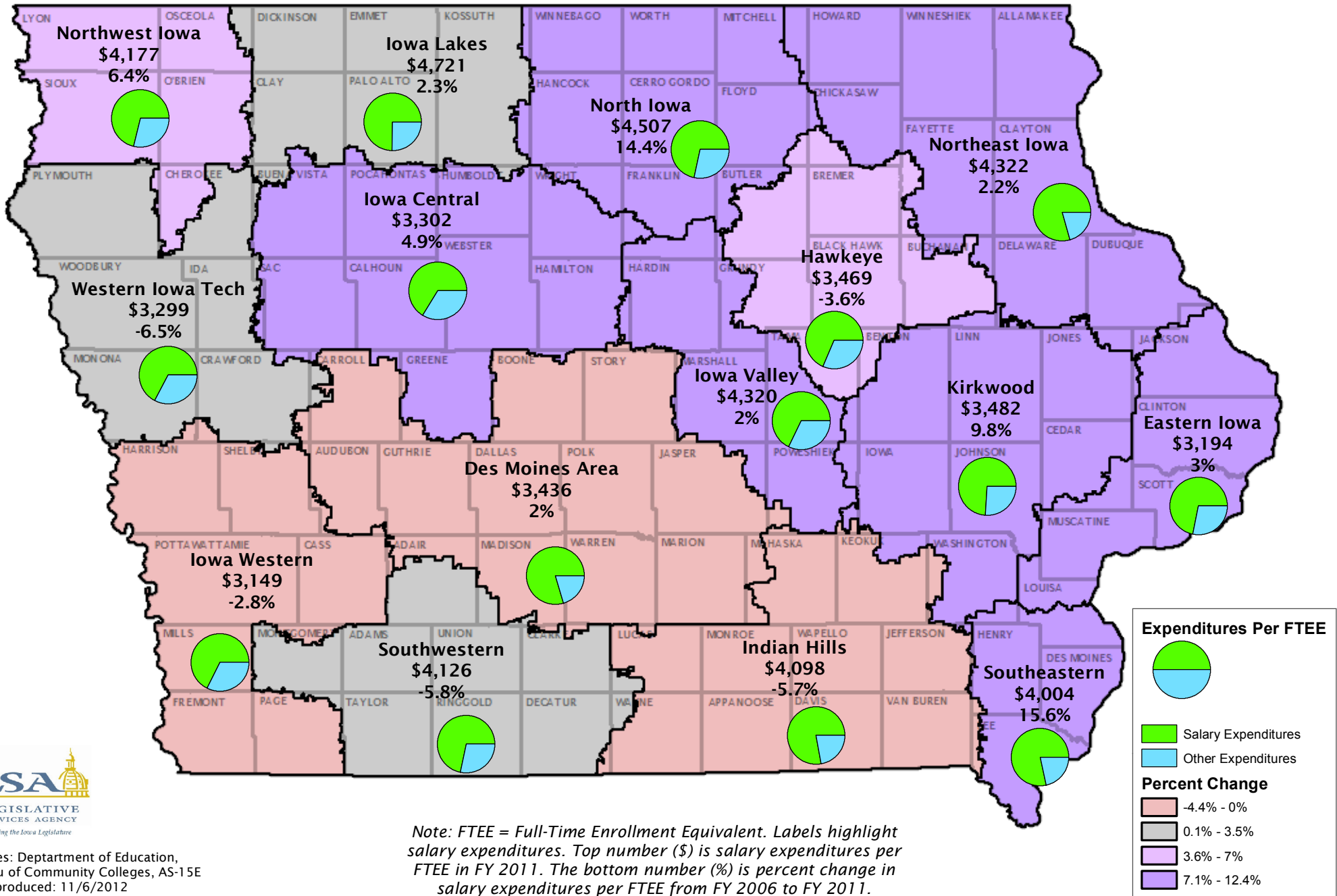

and Percent Change in Salary Expenditures per FTEE

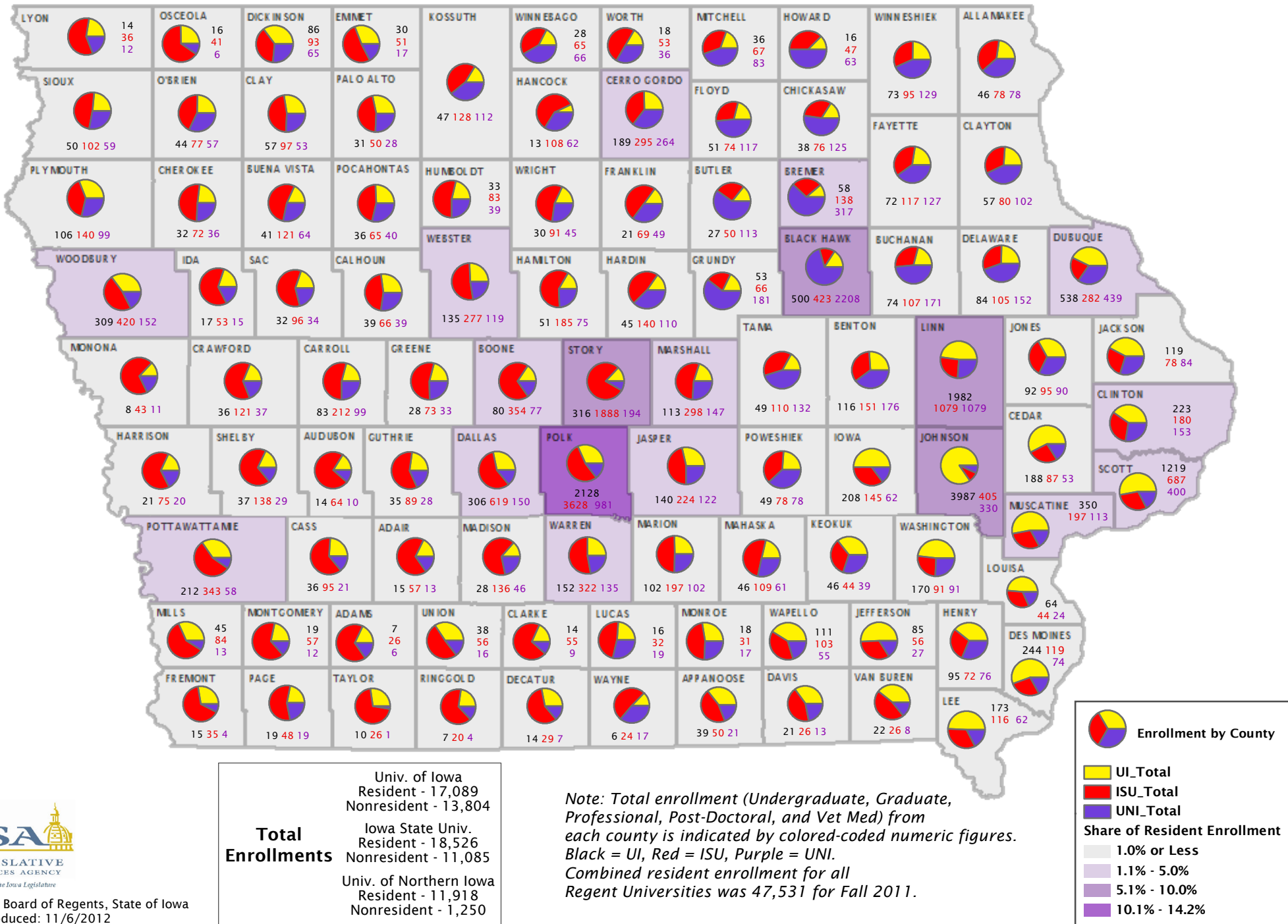

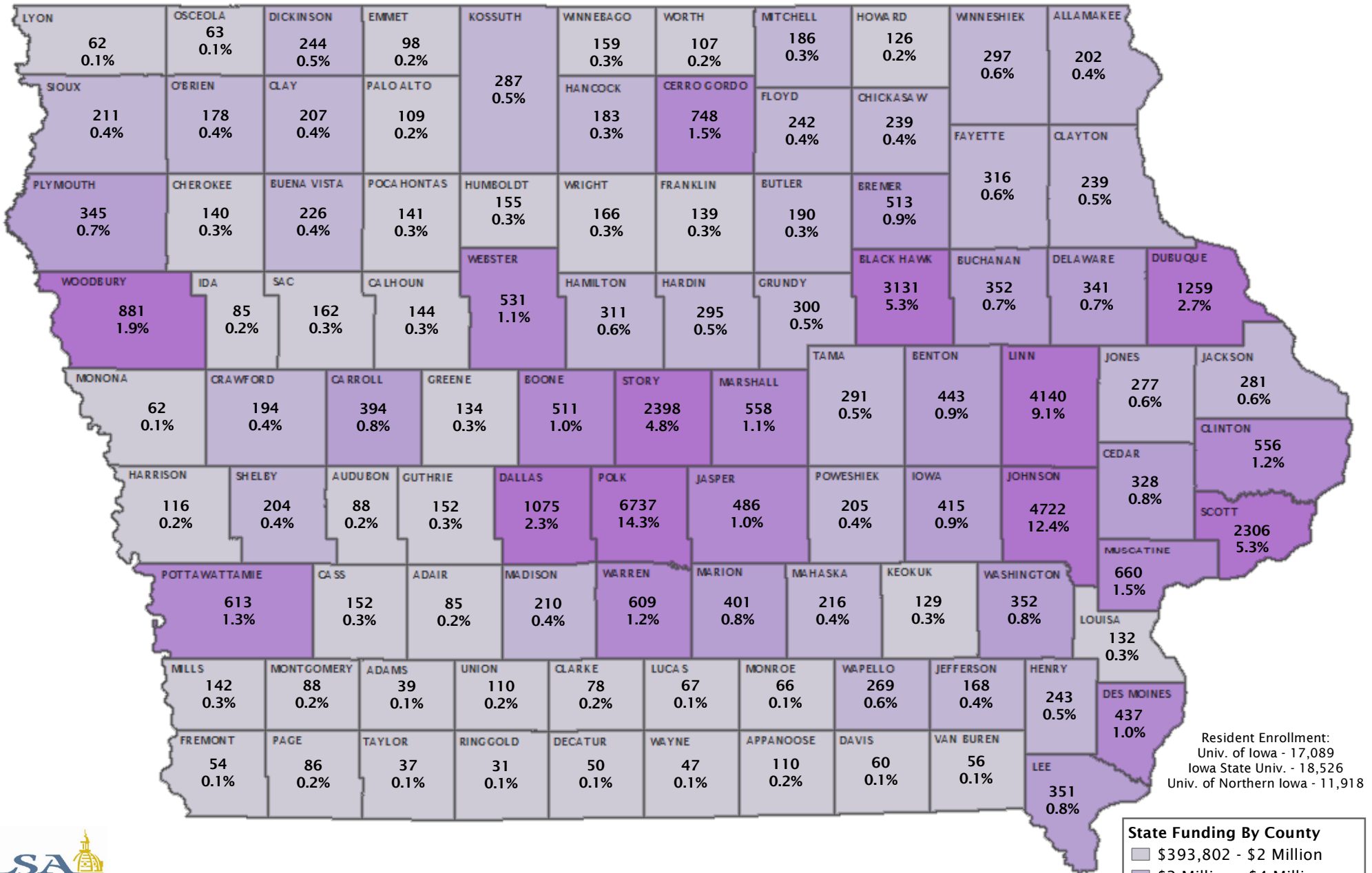
Regent Universities Enrollment by County of Permanent Residence and County Share of Total Resident Enrollment - 2011



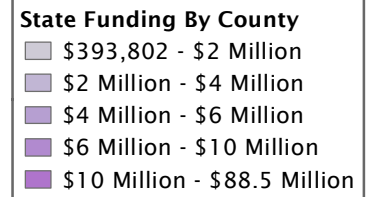

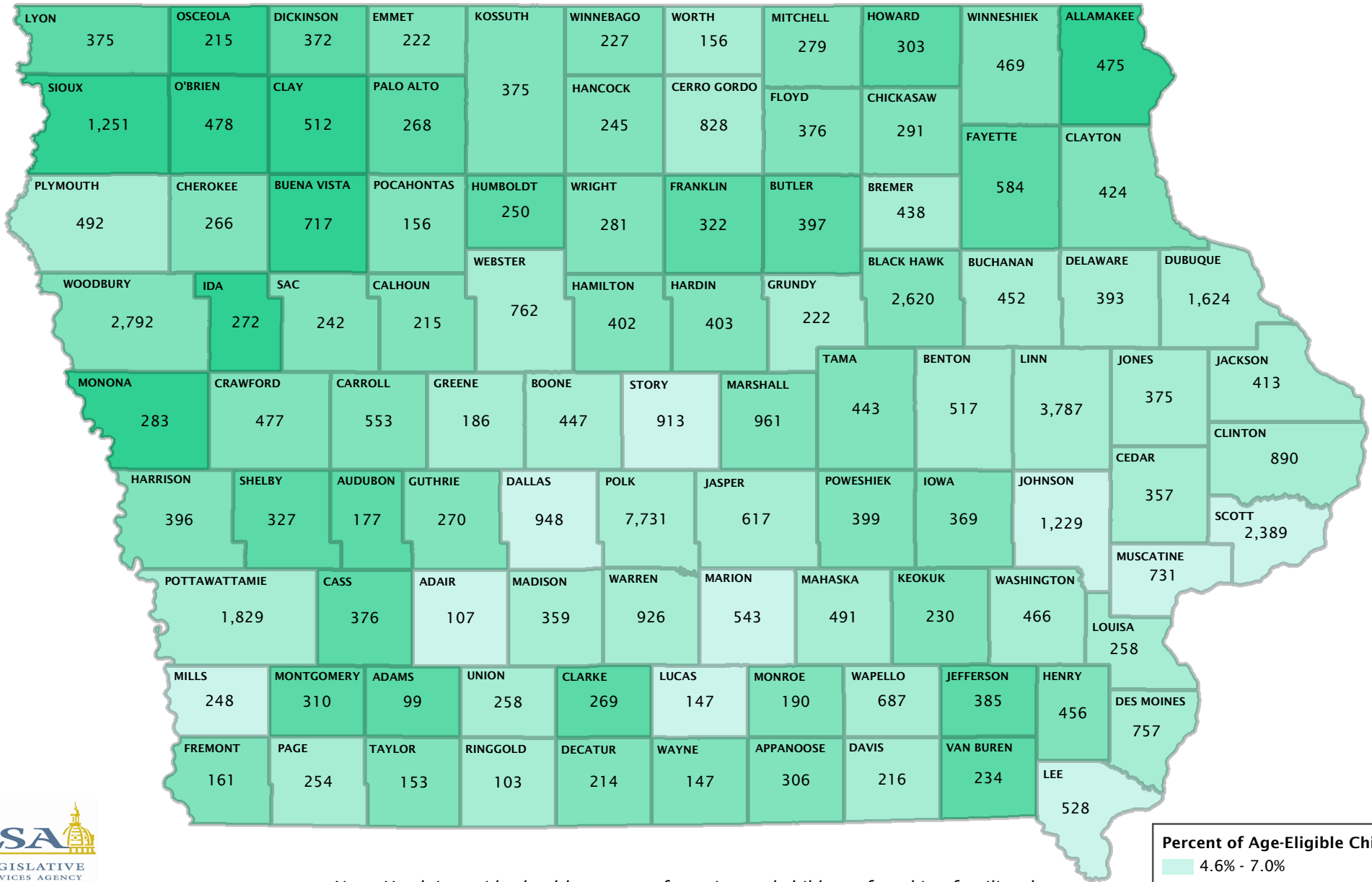

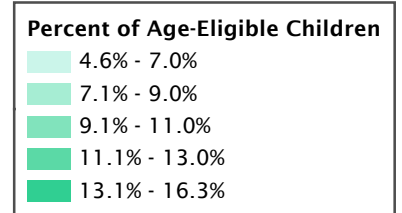

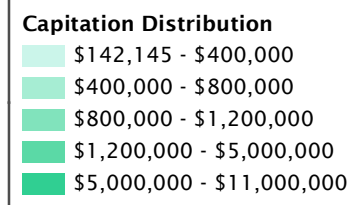
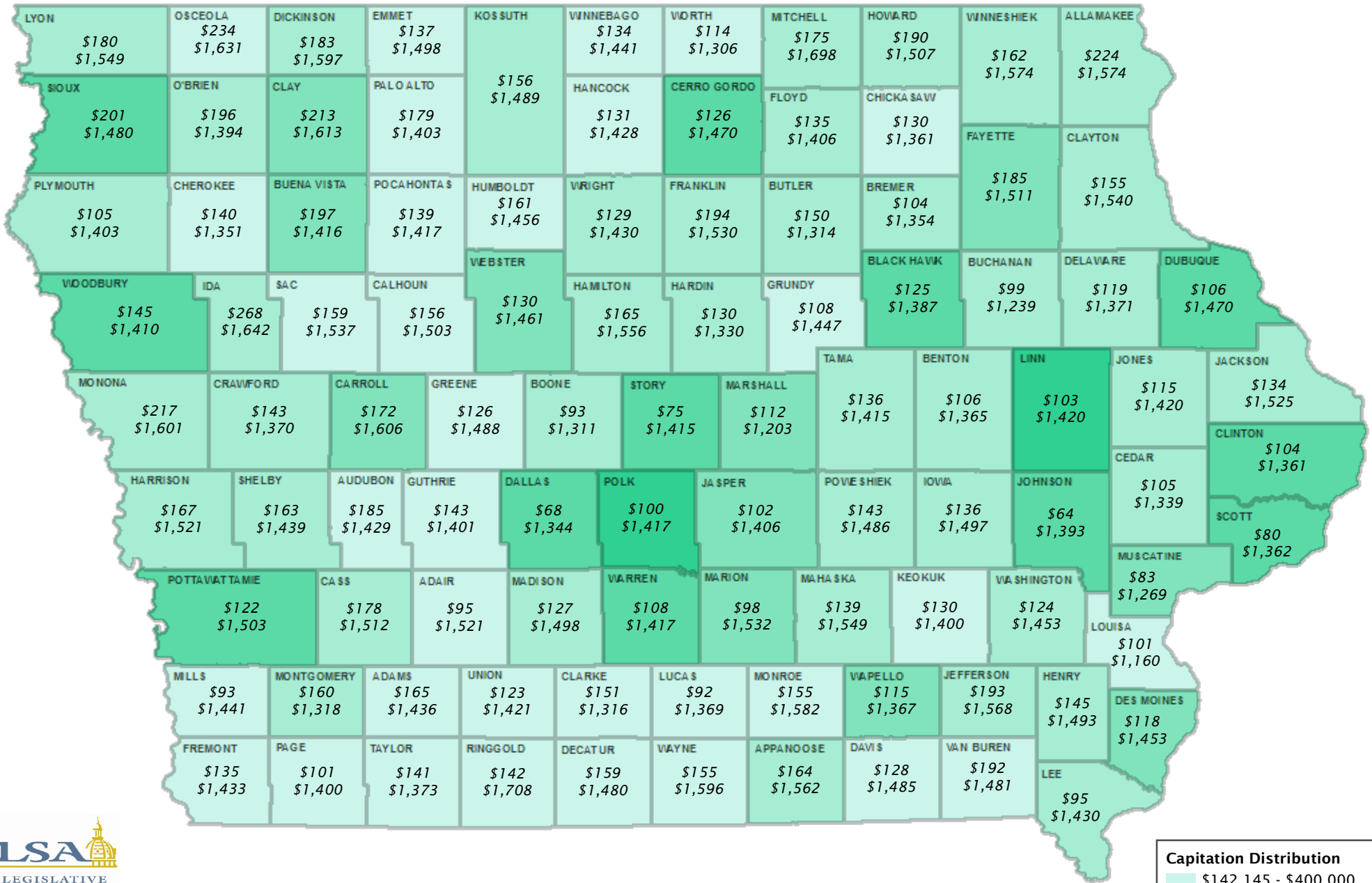

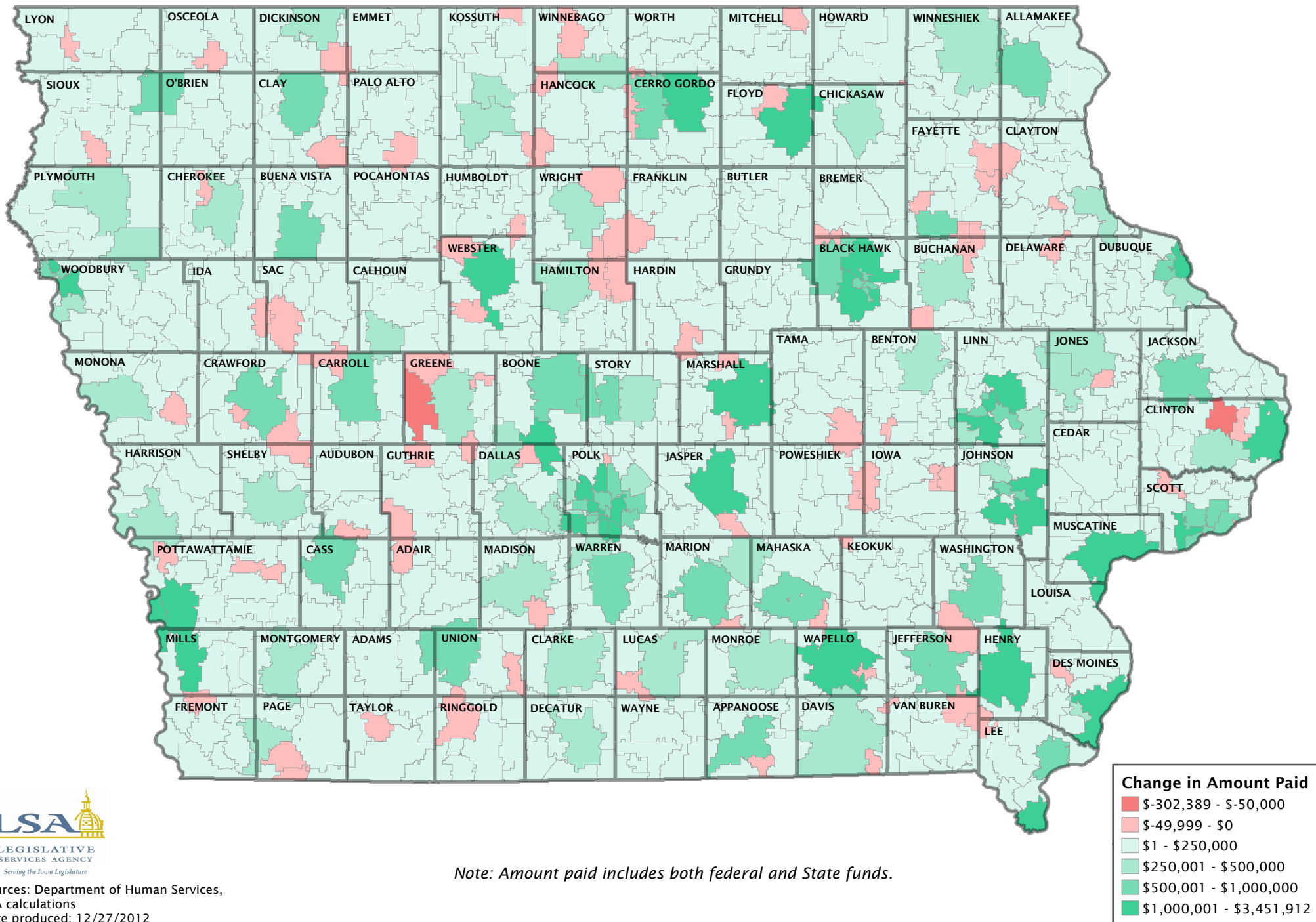
