To me is intrusted the enforcement of the law. Recognizing with profoundest gratitude the confidence of the people in promoting me to the highest position within their gift, it shall be my chiefest aim to merit their generous favor. Having no other, as I could have no worthier, ambition I shall strive by faithful earnestness, and with all possible impartiality, to do my whole duty, so that it may truthfully be said of me, he was "faithful to his trust."

*Fellow citizens*, the success of all government depends at last upon the loyal efforts of the individual citizen. However perfect our system, however wholesome the law, however favored in surroundings, if the citizen be indifferent, and through his indifference the government falls into the hands of the few, thus sapping the very foundations of our theories, the superstructure must inevitably fall. I hold the doctrine that each who assumes the responsibilities of citizenship has grave duties to perform, from which he could not, and should not shrink; and so long as the citizen is vigilant in the demands and exercise of his political rights, no danger can ensue; the liberties of the people are secure, and the permanency of free government is assured.

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## AUDITOR'S REPORT.

STATE OF IOWA,

To HON. JOHN H. GEAR, *Governor of Iowa*:

SIR—The following report of the financial affairs of the State and of the public revenues and expenditures for the biennial term commencing October 1, 1879, and ending September 30, 1881, both days inclusive, is herewith respectfully submitted.



## GENERAL REVENUE.

At the date of the last biennial report there was in the State treasury \$74,187.37. The receipts for the fiscal term ending September 30, 1881, were \$2,514,262.08, or a grand total of \$2,588,449.45 for the past two years; an increase of \$254,375.52 in the period. The receipts were derived from the following sources:

For a more detailed statement of items of the foregoing, examine Statement No. I.

It is proper that I should say the collection of taxes for the past two years has been closer than ever before in the history of the State. After an examination of the reports made to this office I estimate the

total delinquent tax due from counties at \$90,000. Of this amount not more than fifty per cent can be relied upon as available. In making this estimate I base my calculation upon the semi-annual reports made in last June by county auditors and reports of treasurers as to subsequent collections. While I do not pretend that the estimate is a correct one, I believe it is very nearly the fact.

The total expenditures during the period, for all purposes, as is shown in Statement No. II, amounted to \$2,409,897.71, leaving a balance in the treasury on the 30th day of September, 1881, of \$178,551.74, distributed as follows:

There was of general revenue held by county treasurers and not paid over, on the 30th day of September, as reported to me, \$103,405.64. In this report Humboldt, Pocahontas and Osceola counties made no report later than September 1st. For other items of cash due the State see Statement No. VIII.

Chapter 199, laws of 1880, authorized the Governor, Auditor and Treasurer of State to negotiate a loan to complete the payment of the war and defense bond debt not provided for by special levy. In accordance with the power conferred the committee, on the 20th day of June, 1881, borrowed \$125,000, at four per cent interest, on one year's time. The amount of the special levy collected and paid over up to July 1st was \$162,662.73. This added to the sum borrowed gave the sum of \$287,662.73. There was transferred from the general revenue \$9,837.27, making a grand total of \$297,500, with which all the war and defense bonds were paid, except \$2,500, which have not been presented, as yet. There will be probably \$40,000 realized from the delinquent special tax levy of one-half mill tax, leaving a balance of \$87,500 to be transferred from the general revenue to pay the debt of \$125,000, which matures June 20, 1882.

In order to save a vast amount of unnecessary labor, both in this office and in the several counties of the State, and to prevent mistakes and confusion, I recommend that the legislature so amend the law as to consolidate the war and defense special levy with the general revenue.



The total amount for which the State is liable is \$372,935.19. The following are the items:

The disbursements from the treasury during the period amounted to the sum of \$2,409,897.71, of which \$2,015,149.67 was from the general revenue for redemption of warrants, \$10,063.45 for interest on warrants. Statement No. I will show for what purposes the balance was disbursed.

I have pursued the policy of frequently ordering in from the counties the money reported on hand. The responses have usually been prompt, and as a result I have the honor to report that not a solitary warrant has been indorsed for interest this year. Four years ago the reports show that \$10,524.71 were paid as interest on warrants; two years ago \$27,328.36 for the same purpose, and this one \$10,063.45. In the future I believe the warrants of the State may be kept at par and paid without interest, unless extra demands are made upon the treasury by enactments of the legislature. In view of that possibility, I am clearly of the opinion that a slight increase of the levy is a sounder policy than to permit warrants to be indorsed for interest, or in any manner impair their value.

Two years ago the legislature based its calculations for income for the ensuing two years upon the assessed value of the property of the State without deducting the exemptions allowed by law for fruit and forest tree culture. When the levies of taxes were reported by the

several counties there was a deficiency in round numbers of \$10,000 for the biennial period. This deficiency reduced the estimated receipts of the treasury, as calculated upon by the last General Assembly.

The last report from this office showed balances due from counties on account of insane expenses, blind, deaf and dumb, and Orphans' Home clothing accounts, of \$81,851.64. For this amount the State had issued warrants, and paid them out of the general revenue. This report shows on same accounts the sum of \$52,322.15, most of which will be paid into the treasury before this report is in print. Owing to the date fixed by law for the several institutions forwarding bills, the amount could not be certified to counties in time for them to make remittances before the period closed.

The estimates for expenditures for the two years ending September 30, 1883, I have named at \$1,787,550. The estimated receipts for the same period are put at \$2,202,700, leaving a surplus of \$415,150, as against \$37,995 in the last report. A part of this apparently wide difference is accounted for in this way: In the last report the war and defense debt of \$300,000 was estimated in the expenditures and \$42,000 to pay interest on the same. During the session of the Eighteenth General Assembly provision was made for levying a special tax, by which \$200,000 of the war and defense debt was provided for, and the reduction in interest is \$37,000, thus accounting for \$237,000 of the difference of surplus between the two reports. I have gone over the probable expenditures and receipts carefully and am of the opinion that they are as nearly correct as it is practicable to make them from the known facts in each case. The conclusion must be, to the reader's mind, that the financial condition and future outlook for the State are good and cheering. Were it not for the new capitol, which is nearing completion, the levy of State tax might be reduced one-half mill and still be ample to produce revenue enough to keep the credit of the State at par.

I desire to call attention to one other matter that, in my opinion, should be considered by the legislature. As the law now stands, all traveling and transient doctors are required to pay a license of \$100 annually before practicing their profession in the State. This license is to be obtained of the county auditor, as are peddlers' license. So far as I am advised, very little, if any, revenue has been realized from this source. I recommend that the law be so amended that the license shall issue for one year, and by the Auditor of State, to whom the fee shall be paid, and accounted for as are other fees.

## ASSESSMENT OF PROPERTY.

The theory of equal taxation of all property, not exempt by law, is one of the pillars of a republican form of government. Under our present law equality does not exist. To illustrate: A buys real estate and gives a mortgage upon the purchased premises to secure deferred payments, or borrows money and mortgages his home to secure the payment; he is not permitted to deduct his indebtedness from his assessment. B loans money to A and when the assessor attempts to list his "moneys and credits" for taxation, the law permits him to deduct what he owes and pay on the balance, if any. B may thus deduct debts owing for the purchase of real estate from the amount loaned to others, while A, who does not have "moneys and credits," must pay upon the full amount of his real estate the same as if entirely paid for. Again, the provisions of law are such that while A pays his full proportion of tax upon the real estate, B, who holds the mortgage given by A, must pay upon it as "moneys and credits," provided he has no debts with which to offset the amount. In the one illustration there is double taxation, and in the other none at all. In either case equal taxation does not obtain. I believe the law should be so amended as to remedy the contradiction between the doctrine of equal taxation and the fact as practiced under the law.

Another serious defect in our system of taxation is felt all over the State because of the practice of boards of supervisors and assessors ignoring the plain provisions of the law. It is declared that all property shall be assessed at its "true cash value." Instead of this plain statute being obeyed, assessors find the true cash value and then enter upon their books one-third of the amount as the value for taxation. Thus a practice has grown up which entirely overrides the law authorizing and directing the assessment of property. The plea is made in defense of this practice that if property is assessed at its full cash value, authorities in counties and towns will levy the full percentage authorized and thus overburthen taxpayers; therefore, to prevent boards of supervisors and city authorities from oppressing taxpayers, assessors are forced to stultify themselves by disobeying the laws of the State. Vigorous efforts were made by my predecessor to remedy this unlawful way of listing property, but without success. I know of no power that the Auditor of State possesses to secure a reform in this respect, therefore I ask the legislature to amend the law authorizing the levy of taxes by reducing the present authorized levy from six and four mills to three and two.

My reasons for the recommendation are these:

1st. It will force boards of supervisors and assessors to comply with the laws regulating assessments and equalization.

2d. The present practice does the State credit and resources great injustice. The average reader, who is not otherwise informed, or business man accepts the reported assessed value as the true value of the material resources and wealth of the State. Surely this one-third rule in making assessments does injustice to the fair fame of the State in this way: It decreases the valuation of taxable property and increases the *percentum* of taxation. If the plain letter and spirit of the law were followed, the valuation would be increased and the per cent of taxation decreased, and still the same amount of taxes secured.

One of the greatest hinderances to the introduction of outside capital into enterprises of general utility to the people of the State, in the form of manufactures, has been, and is now, the high rate of taxation. On account of the low rate of valuation, it is not an uncommon thing to find the rate fully five, and often higher, per cent. Capitalists from outside of the State presuming that our taxes are levied upon an assessment of property at its true cash value, at once turn their attention to other States to find investments for their money for no other reason than per cents of taxation frightened them, when, as a matter of fact, taxes in Iowa would not be higher on a fair and lawful basis of valuation than they are in other States—in most cases they would be lower than in sister States. I indulge the hope that the legislature will so amend the law that necessity will enforce obedience to the plain mandates of the statute.

In my opinion, the law relating to the assessment of personal property is defective. It is entirely too vague in its provisions. A glance at Statement No. XIV will disclose the fact that the personalty is only a trifle over one-quarter what the realty is. For the past ten years the increase in personal property has been but about fourteen millions of dollars. In 1871 the value of personalty is given at \$75,201,885. In 1880 it is \$89,327,400. The burthen of taxation is laid upon the realty as three is to one, or nearly so. I think this may be accounted for because real estate is visible. It cannot be concealed or changed from one location to another about the time the assessor begins his work. I have no hesitation in saying the law is evaded, and grievous injustice done to those owning real estate by the escape of millions of dollars' worth of personal property from its equal share of taxation. Competent business men, gentlemen who have taken some pains to



ascertain the probable facts, give it as their opinion that the personalty of the State is worth three-fourths as much money as the realty.

If the present law is not explicit and strong enough to search out and bring to the assessors' books the hidden treasures of wealth in the form of bonds, mortgages, and securities of various kinds, surely the legislature should promptly enact one that will accomplish the work. The class of taxable property that escapes taxation most, is the class of property that pays the largest dividends. In justice and fairness such laws should be enacted as will force all classes and kinds of property to bear its equal share of taxation.

## RAILROAD TAXES.

The present law authorizing the taxation of railroads for the purpose of maintaining the commissioner system is one of the most troublesome and cumbersome ones possible. It provides that the Commissioners shall certify to the Executive Council the expenses of the commission, the Council shall apportion the same among the different railroads of the State according to the number of miles each company has in each county and certify the same to the proper counties. This method of collecting the tax necessitates the keeping of ninety-nine separate accounts in this office, as well as the same number in the several counties.

I recommend that the law be so changed that the taxes as apportioned among the several companies shall be paid directly into the State treasury, the same as the taxes levied upon telegraph property, and thus relieve this office, county auditors and treasurers of a large amount of work that does not improve, or even equal, the shorter plan.

## EXEMPTIONS FOR TREE CULTURE.

The law granting exemptions from taxation for tree culture is unequal in its effects and is of very little value to the State. Seven-eighths of exemptions are claimed and granted illegally. Rarely is any attention paid to the requirements relative to distances and cultivation of trees. It seems to me that the prudent husbandman needs no premium or bribe to induce him to adorn his home with useful and ornamental trees or to cultivate orchards and fruits of different varieties. In Statement No. XIV I have tabulated a column showing the amount exempted in the several counties. The aggregate sum is \$63,458.84. This amount of money should, in my opinion, bear its

equal share of the burthen of taxation. I recommend to the legislature the unconditional repeal of the law granting exemptions for fruit and forest tree culture.

## AID TO RAILROADS.

The amount of money given in the way of taxes to aid in building railroads in the State is frequently a subject of speculation and discussion. As a matter of information I have compiled the amount for the years 1879 and 1880 and tabulated them. See Statement No. XX.

The above is a feeble illustration of the enterprise manifested by the people to secure facilities for exporting the products of the soil to the markets of the world.

## SCHOOL FUND.

The aggregate of the permanent school fund has been increased since last report in the sum of \$70,969.37 from the following sources:

The grand total reaches the sum of \$3,539,141.08, all interest bearing except \$2,266.66 which is in the State Treasury. There are in the several counties subject to loan \$3,290,659.60. Under the law of 1880 reducing the rate of interest the State realizes but six per cent. The apportionment of the interest according to the number of persons between the ages of five and twenty-one years was forty-four and one half cents, annually, per capita. For further particulars relating to apportionment, see tables. The law holding counties responsible for the payment of interest is a sound one, and entirely obviates all delinquencies to the State. There is no unpaid interest due from any county in the State.

There are several cases in counties where lands have been sold, or negotiations pending which will result in sales, that have not been reported to this office, but will be at the first of the coming year.

There is yet quite a large amount of school lands held by the State



which will be sold soon and the proceeds turned into the permanent fund. All the lands so held are salable, except, perhaps, some of the "bad" property." During the past year some offers have been made for lots in Keokuk, but the prices named were so small the Executive Council did not deem it wise to accept them.

The Eighteenth General Assembly reduced the rate of interest on the permanent school fund from ten to eight per cent. Notwithstanding the reduction to a comparatively low rate, it is found impossible to loan all the money. There are now in the hands of county treasurers \$58,325 that cannot be loaned. I recommend to the legislature an amendment to the law authorizing the counties to loan at six per cent, the borrower paying the incidental expenses. Under the present law counties receive two per cent commission of the interest for holding the fund. It would be better to give the per cent to the borrower and thus enable counties to keep the funds loaned all the time.

No losses have been reported during the biennial period, which is a fine commentary upon the wisdom of the law and the care of county auditors.

Aside from the fact that there is quite a sum of money lying idle because borrowers cannot be found, the permanent school fund of the State is in a perfectly safe, sound, and commendable condition.

#### INCIDENTAL.

There has been only a slight increase in the number of companies authorized to do business in the State since my report made in April last. There have been no failures among companies, nor heavy losses to meet in the State. Property owners who keep their property insured are more secure than formerly, because the companies are stronger than ever before. I may say there is no ground of complaint, because of lack of solvency on the part of foreign companies doing business in the State, nor of the home companies.

During this year frequent attempts have been made to work up business for companies who decline to properly enter the State as provided by law. Several such companies have their western headquarters in Chicago, and whenever they are able to secure applications for risks on Iowa property they gladly accept them, at lower rates than authorized companies will. I have been as diligent in my efforts to break up this kind of piratical work as time would admit of. Early last spring it came to my knowledge that the firm of Gibson & Co., of Co-

edar Rapids, were engaged in the illegal business of soliciting risks for companies who declined entering the State to do a legal business. In due time I secured proof positive of the complicity and illegal acts of the Gibsons. At the April term of the District Court in Linn county I sent Deputy Auditor R. L. Chase with the evidence before the grand jury of that county. An indictment was returned against A. Gibson and C. E. Gibson, and both were held to bail for their appearance at the next term of court. In the meantime the firm dissolved and ceased doing business. The senior, A. Gibson, of the firm, removed to Illinois, while the junior, Chas. E. Gibson, remained in Cedar Rapids, engaged in other business. At the sitting of the October term of the District Court, to which they were held to answer, a petition was presented to me, signed by a large number of the leading citizens of Cedar Rapids, in which it was stated that Chas. E. Gibson is a minor; that he, alone, was responsible for the illegal insurance, and obtained it—without the knowledge, consent or advice of the senior; that Chas. E. Gibson is and has been a young man of good morals and is highly esteemed by the people among whom he lives, and that his violation of the law was not intentional, but from lack of knowledge of the prohibition imposed upon companies who decline to comply with the laws of the State; asking that the young man be not prosecuted to conviction. Believing that no particular good would come by pressing the prosecution further, and that to convict the young man would leave a stain upon his whole life, and, besides, the object sought having been attained; viz., forcing a recognition of the majesty of the law, I signified my willingness to the prosecuting attorney to have the case dismissed. The petition and papers will be found on file in the clerk's office at Marion.

That the result of the prompt arrest of these men is good cannot be questioned. Other persons who were clandestinely doing the same kind of business were convinced that their liberty depended upon the observance of the laws governing the business of insurance, and have ceased.

It is hardly necessary to say that the law requires every agent of any and all kinds of insurance to be armed with a certificate from this office as his warrant for work. If the general public will demand of all agents an exhibit of their certificate, all questions of illegality, irresponsibility and insolvency will be settled on production. Such care on the part of the people will aid materially in effectually suppressing clandestine and piratical insurance.

Lately there has sprung up a mania all over the State for organizing mutual aid associations of one sort and another. Even associations are organized to insure a benefit upon marriage, and then, again, to pay a benefit for celibacy for a term of years. All such organizations claim that their object and purpose is charity and benevolence. As soon as organized they send out swarms of agents to solicit business and procure members. Many, if not all of them, promise sums of money at the end of a certain period, to the insured, that, in my opinion, it will be impossible for them to pay, to say nothing of the death losses to be provided for by the life associations. If there is no check placed upon this kind of wild cat insurance it is only a question of short time when disaster will overtake them. At every opportunity I have discouraged such enterprises as far as practical. I have ruled that all organizations of such as named are insurance companies, and that they should make report to this department and comply with the law by depositing three-fifths of their annual premium in this office as a sinking fund for the benefit of the insured.

In July last I addressed a letter to Attorney-General McPherson asking him to interpret the law relative to such organizations. In response he gave an elaborate written opinion, in which he sustained the rulings of this department.

The attorneys of the Iowa Mutual Aid Association, of Ottumwa, dissented from the opinion of the Attorney-general and refused to be bound by it. An agreed case was submitted to Judge Burton, who heard the case on a motion to dissolve an injunction served upon the defendants. In a long written opinion the court held contrary to the rulings of this department and the opinion of the Attorney-general. The State was represented by the Attorney-general. An appeal was taken to the Supreme Court, where I hope to secure a hearing of the case before the meeting of the legislature. If the Supreme Court confirms the decision of the court below, in my opinion the legislature should amend the law in such a manner as to force all such organizations to make report of their doings to this department, and to require them to obtain a certificate from the Auditor of State before beginning business. Unless the Supreme Court or the legislature places all such organizations under the control of the insurance department it will not be long until Iowa shall be as completely overrun with speculating companies as is Pennsylvania to-day. There, like associations are organized by the hundred, not for legitimate aid or insurance, but as speculations in human life. Instead of seeking healthy and well persons to insure

they select the aged, infirm, sick and short-lived as far preferable. Sharpers and schemers pay for policies on the lives of such as I have mentioned, and then anxiously await the few days, weeks, or months that intervene between them and the price of their infamy. Even the records of the courts of justice are stained with the histories of murders committed in order to reap in the insurance carried by some speculator in one of Pennsylvania's mutual aid associations. I do not say that any such disreputable practices exist in Iowa, but I do say that the logical result of an indiscriminate and irresponsible growth of such organizations will be to repeat in Iowa what disgraces Pennsylvania.

It is my judgment that the best interests of the State and the insurance business would be served by the creation of the office of commissioner of insurance, to whom all matters pertaining to fire, life or other insurance should be committed. An officer with no other branches of business intrusted to his control can do far better in managing the intricate affairs of insurance than can one whose attention is necessarily divided by several important trusts, as is that of Auditor of State. The amount of work and responsibility pertaining to the insurance department of this office will be partially comprehended on examining statement. The fees for the biennial period amount to \$41,512. The tax collected from foreign companies for the same time make the handsome sum of \$88,410.48, giving the aggregate amount of \$129,922.48 as the proceeds from insurance alone. In short, remove the insurance business from the Auditor's office into a department by itself.

I trust if there shall be further legislation by the incoming legislature upon the subject of fire insurance that it may be well considered and thoroughly discussed before being put in the books as law. I believe, as a whole, the law governing fire insurance is as fair and practical as, is likely to be secured. I have but one recommendation to make relative to fire insurance and that is that all companies organized under the laws of the State be required to have a paid up capital of not less than one hundred thousand dollars. The wealth and growth of the State, the very great growth of insurance business, demands security from companies commensurate with the advanced volume of business they do.



## STATE BANKS.

The law imposes upon the Auditor of State the duty of supervising the banking interests, so far as those interests conform to the corporate laws of the Commonwealth. I have required quarterly reports from all banks organized as corporations. The last report called for covers the quarter ending September 30, 1881, and will be found tabulated.

A brief comparison between the exhibit in this report and that of my predecessor, of two years ago, may prove interesting. Then there were twenty savings banks and thirty-three other than savings banks. The aggregate amount of paid up capital then was reported as \$2,321,605.12. Aggregate assets were shown to be \$7,944,813.32. This report shows twenty-two savings banks and thirty-one other than savings banks. The aggregate of capital is \$2,256,755.12, a decrease of \$64,850. The aggregate resources are reported at \$12,838,972.83, an increase of \$4,894,159.51. The decrease in capital is accounted for by the retircay of banks with larger capital than those organized since. The increase of resources is accounted for by the growth of business.

Of the savings banks doing business at the date of last report, the Clayton County, doing business at McGregor, went into liquidation July 1, 1880, the Allamakee County, at Lansing, changed to a national bank July 1, 1881. The Sioux City also changed to national bank July 12, 1881. During the biennial period the Farmers' Loan and Trust Savings, at Iowa City, the Iowa County Loan and Savings, at Marengo, the Benton County, at Norway, the Muscatine Savings Bank, and the Marengo Savings Bank, were organized, increasing the number two since last report. Of the banks, other than savings, reported in 1879, the Nashua Bank ceased business July 6, 1880; Commercial, of Keokuk, March 1, 1880; Citizens', of Centerville, May 31, 1880; Farmers' Exchange, of Steamboat Rock, March 10, 1881; Butler County, of Clarksville, September 1, 1881; Monroe County, at Albion, September 30, 1881. The report of the Appanoose County Bank, of Centerville, was not received until too late to be tabulated in this report. Those organized and doing business according to the laws of the State are: The Bank of Lineville, Bank of Algona, Cedar County Bank, at Tipton, Marshalltown Bank, and Union Bank, at Ames.

The aggregate number of corporate banks remains the same as at date of last report. No failures nor impairment of capital has oc-

curred. The business is largely increased, and as a result of the good times the deposits are very large in the older parts of the State. There is no question but the corporate banks have the confidence and faith of the public as fully as have the national banks of the State.

At the close of the biennial period a careful and thorough examination of all the corporate banks of the State was made by H. H. Schell, Esq., of Mason City, whom I appointed for that purpose. His reports, now on file in this office, verify the reports made by the several banks on the 30th of September last. For the able and thorough work of examination I desire to thank Mr. Schell.

The savings bank act, after seven years trial, gives satisfaction to bankers and insures safety to the people who patronize them. If the same provisions of law were made applicable to all banks, bankers or brokers, who receive deposits of money, I believe there would be greater safety to depositors. It is my judgment that it would be conducive to public confidence and safety, and certainly fair and reasonable to depositors, that all private banks should report quarterly to the Auditor of State and publish a copy of the same in the newspapers of the town or city where the same are located. The public has a right to know something about the standing and resources of an institution that sells exchange or receives money for safe keeping. I, therefore, most heartily concur in what my predecessor said, in his report two years ago, relative to this subject.

## COUNTY INDEBTEDNESS.

So often are inquiries made at this office for information concerning the indebtedness of particular counties, I deemed it worth while to attempt to furnish a table in this report, showing authentically the financial standing of the several counties of the State. There being no law requiring county auditors to make such report, I presumed to trespass upon their good nature long enough to elicit the information. Accordingly, I prepared and sent out a blank to be filled and returned. Every auditor in the State promptly reported the condition of his county, and, therefore, I am able to lay before you a tabulated statement of the financial condition of the several counties in the State, which will be found in a tabulated statement.

The most remarkable thing about the table is the comparative small amount of the total debts of the ninety-nine counties of the State. The sum total of debts, including bonds and floating, is \$2,745,678.



If the amount of money on hand to pay warrants and bonds had been deducted the actual indebtedness would have shown up less than two millions of dollars, a sum not so large as is frequently owed by one individual in a business transaction. It is no more than just to say that fully one million of the sum are bonds voted by counties long years ago to assist in building railroads. For instance, Lee county has \$774,000 of that kind of a debt. I submit the table as a bit of reliable information never before compiled in the State.
