ments as required, and of any default which may appear from his examination of the treasurers' books.

Sec. 1797, amend by changing in the fifth line the words "board" to "boards," and "district" to "districts."

Sec. 1826, last clause, amend to read as follows: "But this section shall not apply to any city, town or village."

Sec. 1579, amend to read as follows: "He shall cause to be published after adjournment of each regular session of the general assembly, a sufficient number of copies of school laws, or such portions thereof, as he may deem necessary, including all amendments and additions made by the last general assembly, to furnish each school-house of the state with a copy, to be kept in said school-house, under the control of the sub-directors, or board of directors. He may cause to be published, from time to time, not oftener than once in four years, all of the school laws, with such decisions rendered by him, as he may deem advisable; and he shall furnish each county superintendent with a copy for his office, and according to the population of the county, not less than ten nor more than fifty copies.

In accordance with section 9 of chapter 129 of the laws of the Sixteenth General Assembly, I incorporate in this report the report of the State Normal School, at Cedar Falls.

## ABSTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS.

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### ADAMS COUNTY.

W. W. ROBERTS.

School-Houses.—Several good frame buildings have been erected during the past year. The buildings at Prescott, completed during the past year, and the building at Brooks, built during the past year, are both beautifully located. The building at Brooks will seat two hundred pupils; the one at Prescott, some less. The houses built in the rural districts are commodious, well constructed, and seated with patent seats. There are five or six schools in the county soon to be reported as graded schools.

Teachers and Teachers' Wages.—Financial embarrassment and other causes have led boards of directors during the past year to reduce teachers' wages somewhat in some of the townships and districts, and many experienced teachers are retiring from teaching. Their places are filled generally by young teachers and others who teach "just for the present" with but little desire to prepare themselves for the work.

Normal Institutes: Library and Graded School Work.—
The normal institute is generally attended by the professional teachers and those aspiring to graded school work and the effects mentioned under "teachers and teachers' wages" are counteracted to a great extent by the good work accomplished at the normal institute. Teachers manifest considerable interest in matters pertaining to a teachers' library and teachers' associations.

## APPANOOSE COUNTY.

### J. W. CARY.

Our normal institutes have been a success. Attendance large.

The attendance thereon should be compulsory. Re-examinations should be indiscriminately enforced. We have many hard working and worthy teachers. A large number attend school part of the year. Of the one hundred and forty-four enrolled at our county normal, forty attended, not as teachers, but as students seeking superior drill. Five small school-houses built within the two years; four on improved plans; all too small. A fine two-story school-house-three roomstwo commodious entrance rooms or wardrobes; one may be used as a recitation room, if needed; cost, \$3,000; built at Cincinnati. Several townships have put a price on the different grades of certificates. The holding intact the teachers' fund is not understood, nor is the dividing of it done in accordance with the law. The school year should begin September 15. The six months required by law can then be put in and closed with annual report. Have tried to secure a uniformity in methods of teaching. Teachers' associations are popular. The district secretaries have been prompt with their reports. The treasurers have given trouble, delaying reports, and in the incorrectness of them. The treasurer's office should be disposed of; the county treasurer is sufficient. The majority of the independent districts, formed from sub-districts, have been a great source of trouble. A consolidation should take place at once. I have had trouble to keep officers to do the business; could not get a sub-director in some places. Our director plan needs remodeling. Fewer school officers would be a blessing. The Moulton normal and high school-a part of the public school-is a success, and a power for good in the county. Many teachers are spending spare weeks at this school.

The success of county supervision demands some good standard of qualification for the office, and a different method of election.

## BENTON COUNTY.

## MISS S. BLACKBURN.

I have used every available means to secure correct data for this report; but I find upon comparison, that the amount "on hand" as reported last year, in many instances does not correspond with the same item this year. But I have no means of determining which statement is erroneous. With the three legal divisions of the school fund, and the frequent changes of school officers, it is simply impossible to make a correct financial report.

Quite a number of school-houses have been erected during the past year, most of them after improved plans, and all of them have been seated with good patent seats. Many of the old buildings have been repaired, and the old seats replaced by new and comfortable ones.

A course of study was prepared and submitted to the people and teachers about a year ago. It met with quite general favor. I think its best result has been a tendency toward uniformity of work among teachers.

A system of monthly reports by teachers has been adopted, which not only proves a valuable aid in supervision, but is a great incentive to excellence in punctuality and attendance.

## BLACK HAWK COUNTY.

### J. S. GEORGE.

The raising of the grades of certificates has produced a very beneficial effect upon our teachers and schools.

It has incited our teachers to more application and study, and I can plainly see that they are giving much closer attention to their school work. I find the people generally in favor of elevating the

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standard of their teachers and schools, and I also meet, in my efforts to accomplish this, much to be desired end, not a little opposition from teachers.

I have been sorely tried in a few instances by teachers and their relatives continually asking, and even demanding, particular favors.

I have been forced to the conclusion that nepotism is, perhaps, as common here as in many other parts of the state; but by the strict observance of law and official instructions, I have it, in a great measure, under subjection.

We held our normal institute this spring, having an attendance of two hundred and five members, and it proved in all respects a success.

The number would have been much greater had it not been for prevailing sickness at the time, and that a number of schools were in session.

The state normal school is in a very prosperous condition, but is much in need of more room. An appropriation should be made by the state this winter for its enlargement.

The state can well feel proud of this institution, and should give liberally towards its encouragement and support.

In the compiling of my report I have labored, as usual, under great embarrassments in procuring prompt and correct reports from the school secretaries and treasurers.

The difficulty will continue to occur until the legislature affords to the superintendent some relief. The law as it now is renders him completely powerless, and if he is refused reports by these officers, he has no efficient way provided to enforce compliance with the law.

I often wonder why our law makers are so dilatory and lax, concerning these important regulations.

It is to be hoped that our legislature will act wisely and promptly in this matter.

### BREMER COUNTY.

### H. H. BURRINGTON.

Having been county superintendent six years, my position has enabled me to watch the practical workings of our school system. We may justly feel proud of our common schools. They are the surety and defense of our national life, and the efficient means of our national prosperity. We ought to do all that we can to sustain them and to increase their efficiency.

My experience has suggested some improvements in our school work, and some amendments to our school laws.

It must be confessed by those that are acquainted with school reports, that there is a painful waste of school money, or rather, a loose and careless way of keeping account of school money. School boards, and especially district treasurers, fail in many cases, to keep and give a correct account of school money that comes into their hands. To remedy this, the county superintendent should be made the guardian of all school money.

It seems to me that some changes might be profitably made in the duties of the county superintendent, both in examining teachers and in visiting schools. As the law now stands, one day in every month, and only one, is provided for examination of teachers. In the spring and in the fall, more time is needed for this work than in mid-winter and mid-summer. Further, the law requires the superintendent to visit every school in the county, large or small, whether doing well or not. More discretion should be given him in this matter.

My work has been to me exceedingly pleasant in every department of my labor—in examining teachers—in visiting schools—in talking to children—in visiting with their parents—in counseling with school directors—in gathering up the statistics and keeping a record of the schools—in working out the various reports, and in conducting the extensive correspondence of the office. Teachers have been uniformly kind and courteous to me in my official work, and school directors and other officers have been always ready to carry out my plans or to en

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gage in any work that promised to increase the efficiency of our schools.

In visiting schools, I have necessarily been much from home, but have always found a pleasant home amongst the friends of the schools. I have traveled over the county a great many times, and have found the hospitality of teachers and patrons peculiarly generous and cordial. I owe a debt of gratitude to the people of Bremer county that I can never repay. I shall ever hold them in grateful remembrance.

## BUENA VISTA COUNTY.

### J. D. ADAMS.

A disposition seems to exist throughout the county to reduce the wages of teachers. A reduction of about five dollars per month has been made during last year in every township in the county except in Nokomis district township, where wages are same as last year, thirty-five dollars per month for first class; and during summer in that township every sub-district employed teachers holding first class certificates, and an association of directors and teachers met once every month. The result was better schools than where wages were reduced and less interest manifested.

## BUTLER COUNTY.

## J. W. STEWART.

The educational interests of this county have been materially advanced since my last annual report. Much of this has been done by keeping constantly before the people the condition of the schools; by holding teachers' meetings every month during the time the schools are in session; by securing the adoption of a uniform course of study

in all our schools, and requiring each teacher at the close of the term, to leave in the register of the school, a record of the classification and progress made during the term, thus enabling the teacher who follows to take up the work at the point reached by his or her predecessor. A change of teachers does not change the whole work of the school; the teacher's work is planned, the classification is easily effected, and the teacher can permanently organize the school the first day.

In my efforts for the advancement of our schools, I have had the hearty co-operation, of a majority at least, of our boards of directors and the encouragement of the patrons of our schools.

The number of faithful and competent teachers is increasing every year, and we no longer hear it said, "a third grade teacher is just as good as a first grade." Our fourth normal institute was well attended, and the teachers in attendance decided that it was the best institute ever held in the county. The attendance was nearly forty per cent. above that of last year, and a good interest was manifested by those in attendance from its commencement until its close.

But very few new school-houses have been built during the past year. The citizens of the enterprising village of Greene have almost completed a beautiful and commodious school-building. This house when completed will cost about six thousand dollars, and is in fact the model school-building of the county. Old school-houses have been repaired and reseated, grounds enclosed, and much has been done to make our school-buildings more inviting and the surroundings more agreeable.

But the great problem yet to be solved is, what means can be devised to secure prompt, correct and reliable reports from district secretaries and treasurers? I have tried a great many ways, during the past six years, but this year finds me as far behind with my report as before.

I hope that you or our next legislature may be able to solve this question,

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### CALHOUN COUNTY.

#### A. CALHOUN.

I submit this report knowing that it is very defective. I have done all that I could to obtain correct reports from the district secretaries, but I have failed.

I have no confidence whatever in the reports of the average district secretary. The average compensation of teachers per month can not be obtained from their reports, if we wish to distinguish between male and female, as they do not show how many months any one teacher has been employed. I have copied this item from the secretaries' reports although I know that in some cases it is not correct. The same may be said of the average cost of tuition.

Much of the amount reported as "paid teachers since last report," was for services rendered during the preceding year. In other cases the teachers have not all been paid for their services during the year reported; hence if we attempt to determine the average cost of tuition from the amount reported as "paid teachers since last report," in one case it will be too great and in the other too small. I think that the treasurers' reports are all correct except those from Jackson and Greenfield townships.

## CASS COUNTY.

### H. A. DISBROW.

I take pleasure in transmitting herewith a report of the schools of Cass county and a statement of the finances as compiled from the reports of district township and independent district treasurers.

These reports are, I think, except in a few instances, correct and reliable. An examination of the financial statement shows that notwith-

standing the hard times, our people are fully alive to the work of building up in Cass county a sound school system; and accordingly they contribute liberally of their means to do it.

Besides repairing old houses and furnishing new patent seats for them, ten new and commodious houses have been erected the past summer, to meet the wants of our school-going population, and yet they are not all supplied.

But the thing most needed in our county, is good efficient teachers. The people from all over the county are asking me to send them good first class teachers to teach their winter schools.

The fact is, we have not half as many second class teachers even, as we ought to have, and first class teachers are still fewer in number. I look with hope to our normal schools to furnish better and more efficient teachers.

The law ought to be so changed as to compel teachers to attend the normal school, and also to prohibit a person from teaching, with a second class certificate, for a longer period than one year; and with a third class certificate for a longer time than eight months. Teachers must improve, or the intelligence of the country will stand still.

## CEDAR COUNTY.

### MISS E. E. FRINK.

If ninety-eight county superintendents tell you of the "vexation of spirit" that they have experienced in consequence of the tardy and inaccurate reports which they have received, you will doubtless excuse me, if I say nothing on the subject; but if my own report is incorrect and faulty, please attribute it,—as Mr. Toots says,—"to circumstances over which I had no control."

The educational work in this county is so far from being what I want it, and hoped to make it, that I feel unwilling to say much about it, believing it is better to say nothing, than to speak of it disparagingly. Our greatest needs are, a higher grade of scholarship, and a better knowledge of the improved methods of teaching.

Our normal institute this summer was much more largely attended

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than the one a year ago, and the interest manifested and work accomplished cannot result otherwise than for good. A desire was expressed that we raise the grade of work for the A class, and after due deliberation it was decided to add natural philosophy, physical geography.

and American literature to the course of study for that division.

Since my last report we have held five educational meetings in different parts of the county. The results have shown that they were productive of good. Our custom has been to provide a lecture for Friday evening, and Saturday has been devoted to class exercises and general discussion of educational topics.

This year we have been proffered one or more columns in one of our county papers, "to be devoted to the promotion of education in general, and Cedar county in particular." The column is under the supervision of a corps of editors composed of teachers of the county.

Several new school-houses have been erected during the past year, and in every instance an effort has been made to construct them in accordance with the best plans. They have all been furnished with patent seats and furniture, and a sincere desire seems manifested to make the school-life of the children pleasant and desirable. The schools usually are deficient in apparatus. But even this is being remedied in many districts.

I hope that the next term's work will reach more nearly my ideal of school work.

## CERRO GORDO COUNTY.

### M. H. KLING.

Having been appointed to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of my predecessor, I commenced to perform the duties of the office, May 1, 1877.

My first work was the visitation of schools, seeking thereby to form an opinion of the results accomplished by the average teacher. In many cases the schools were under good management, and in others the teachers seemed to have very inadequate conceptions of the requirements of the profession. The beneficial results of our last year's

institute were noticeable in a large number of the schools of our county. This year's institute was an acknowledged success, and all are free to admit that in this county the institutes are doing a great deal to prepare the teachers for the proper education of the children.

At the close of the institute, a teachers' library association was organized, which is now in good working condition, having thirty volumes in its library and holding monthly meetings, at which digests of books read by teachers, are given, with other exercises.

During the past year the number of schools in the county has increased ten per cent. The number of teachers has decreased ten per cent.; but those teaching have increased forty per cent. in teaching ability, and desire to perform effective work. The prospect is very encouraging. The probabilities are that, with the activity generally manifested, the schools will continue to increase in general efficiency.

## CHEROKEE COUNTY.

#### R. L. ROBIE.

During the last two years, several of the poorest school-buildings in the county have been replaced by new and comfortable ones, and others have been built to accommodate new sub-districts, so that now our school-buildings, with one or two exceptions, are in good repair. They are also well seated with patent desks, and many of them are supplied with maps, etc. The practice of gradually raising the standard of qualification, pursued by my predecessor, I have continued to follow, and since March, 1877, have used the uniform state questions with good results. We have had a supply of good teachers for all the schools during the two years, and though commencing with an average of eighty per cent., for first class, have raised to ninety per cent, on much harder questions, and find, as a rule, that the teachers more than keep pace with the advance. This earnest work being done, is due, I think, to the influence of our very successful institutes, conducted by Prof. L. T. Weld. The attendance increased from fortythree in 1875, to eighty in 1876, and ninety-nine in 1877, with a good

proportion of male teachers. The interest increased in a similar proportion as each one seemed unwilling to miss any part of the exercises unless compelled to do so. The result has been a greatly increased number of efficient teachers, and a greater interest in teachers' work throughout the county. This much has been accomplished in spite of the grasshopper raid which seriously injured Cherokee county for two seasons. Its effect is apparent from the number of school children in the county in each year, being 1,460 in 1875, 1,957 in 1876, and only reaching 1,987 this year, while the population rapidly increased in previous years. It has also caused lower wages and fewer months' school in some townships. The township reports caused much less trouble this year than last, and it is hoped are correct. The financial condition of the townships is good; most of them being out of debt, and with money on hand.

## CLARKE COUNTY.

### H. A. TALLMAN.

Owing to sickness and the backwardness of school officers, I am somewhat late, but have done the best I could under the circumstances.

The schools are prospering finely, and we hope to be able to do efficient work this winter.

## DELAWARE COUNTY.

#### R. M. EWART.

I cannot say that the accompanying report is correct, but I have endeavored to have it represent the facts as nearly as possible. Many of the treasurers did not send in their reports in time, and when received they were not properly made out.

Another thing that causes trouble in some of the reports, is the custom of borrowing from one fund to make up for deficits in another. I am of the opinion that there should be some manner adopted by law of proving and correcting the accounts in the several districts, otherwise it is impossible to have the reports correct. I find also that there are a great many more mistakes in townships organized under the independent system than there are in the district townships. A speedy return to the township system is necessary.

We are trying to keep up with the march of education, and have many things to encourage us in our efforts. Five normal institutes have been held in the county. Each one shows an increase in attendance and interest. The present year two hundred and nine names were enrolled, a number almost equal to the whole number of teachers employed in the county during the year. An unusual degree of interest has been manifested, and we look for corresponding results in the schools.

A county association is organized and has generally two sessions each term. The attendance varies from fifty to one hundred and fifty teachers. The time is occupied with lectures, essays, discussions and a general experience meeting. Local organizations are likewise held in several places.

All the schools have been visited the past year and many three or four times. In visiting schools we had in view a close scrutiny of the teacher's work to see how far he was able to govern and instruct, and to detect and correct errors. We also aimed to give encouragement wherever merited and to awaken enthusiasm in the school and community. To further the latter movement educational meetings were held in many places and were addressed by the superintendent or some prominent teacher. A general discussion of school matters followed, and often much interest was developed.

There are still many things at work to retard the progress of the schools, prominent among which we would mention, a dropping off from year to year of qualified and experienced teachers, whose places must be supplied with inexperienced persons; a laxity on the part of many school officers and parents, causing irregularity and other drawbacks; and poor wages in some localities. Our encouraging features are that our graded schools are all in the hands of well qualified teachers, and many of the country schools are likewise supplied with teachers of superior merit. A deeper interest in school matters is gradually growing. Some school officers are devoting time and energy to

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the work, and are adopting necessary reforms. Several of the country schools are having fall terms, and it is hoped the custom will soon become universal. A long summer term extending through the months of July and August, results in scarcely any profit.

## DES MOINES COUNTY.

### E. S. BURRUS.

I truly regret that I have not been able to forward my report sooner, but it has required no little vigor and perseverance to collect and collate the necessary material, having in several cases to go in person to obtain reports, and in others to return many for correction. However, I flatter myself that my report this year is much more full, complete and accurate than that of last year, although there are some discrepancies on the part of the treasurers' reports of the different funds on hand at last report, from those of the present. The last treasurer's report was not filed in this office until October 8.

In my examination of teachers during the last year I have complied strictly with the instructions of the state superintendent, granting certificates only to those capable and competent and of proper age, in consequence of which we have had a very thorough and efficient set of teachers in this county.

Our normal institute was more largely attended than that of any previous year. Over one hundred teachers were enrolled, being about double that of any former enrollment.

### DICKINSON COUNTY.

### H. C. CRARY.

Our county is one of those which suffered most severely the effects of the recent destruction of crops by the grasshoppers. The damage done is far-reaching in its results, and our educational interests felt it very much. Up to last summer there was, I think, no county in our section whose school interests were in a better shape, but with the advent of the grasshoppers we lost many of our citizens; were compelled to close many of our schools; and the burden of the expense of free education, before freely carried by our people, was felt to be greater than they could bear. Instead of being able to report our usual advance in educational matters this year, we feel thankful to be able to say that the scourge is past, and we still preserve our school system intact. Our people are rapidly coming back. The schools are filling up, and we are now preparing for an advance along the whole line. One incidental advantage of our depressing times has been, that while the number of schools has diminished, the number of applicants for the position of teacher has increased; enabling us to make a more careful selection, and I venture to say that of the thirty teachers now holding certificates, selected as they have been from three times the number of applicants, there is scarcely one who has not both zeal and knowledge enough to make her instruction of decided benefit to her papils.

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## DALLAS COUNTY.

### A. DILLEY.

My report is late and imperfect, and I do not know that future ones will be any better unless some plan is devised to induce school officers to make correct reports at the proper time, or at least to keep their books in such a manner as to furnish data from which the county superintendent can make the reports himself.

## DUBUQUE COUNTY.

#### N. W. BOYES.

Blank reports were sent to all the district secretaries and treasurers during the first week of September, but it seems impossible to get the secretaries and treasurers to comply with the law in making the returns. The first reports were sent to my office on the 12th and 13th of September, and the last ones on the 16th and 17th of October. Many of the reports, when received were almost incomprehensible, (especially the treasurers' reports) but by comparing them with the last report and the county treasurer's and auditor's books, and in several cases helping the treasurer to make his report, I believe that I have succeeded in accounting for every dollar of school money.

It would be well if the law was changed so as to consolidate the school-house and contingent into one fund. They are raised by tax and should be levied uniformly.

I am of the opinion that the district treasurer should always be chosen outside the board of directors.

Independent districts should be allowed to establish their boundaries without regard to congressional lines, especially village districts.

No changes in the number of school districts have been made during the past year. Comparatively few changes have been made in our corps of teachers, but a few important ones have taken place, viz: in the Dubuque high school and the Dyersville school.

We did not enroll the usual number in our institute this year, mainly on account of the bad weather during the last week it was held, but what was lacking in numbers was fully made up in enthusiasm and good works. Those who failed to attend and hear the valuable and highly entertaining lectures on physical science, given by professors W. J. Shoup, A. B. Poor, J. M. Walsh, C. B. Van Slyke and F. I. Pillsbury, have missed a treat that would have done them good to the end of their days. At the close of the session, emphatic resolutions, endorsing the institute system, and recommending that all teachers, both city and country, attend, were passed unanimously.

I fully endorse the system of electing the county superintendent of schools, by the vote of the electors of the county, and am absolutely opposed to taking it out of their hands and giving it to boards of directors, or electing even at school elections. The voters of Iowa are not so partisan as to choose a person on account of his politics, without special regard to his qualifications and fitness for the place.

## EMMET COUNTY.

#### FRANK DAVEY.

There are so many superintendents throughout the state whose advantages for forming practical ideas on the common school question, are so far superior to, and so much more extensive than my own; and the scope here given to superintendents to advance wise saws and suggestions is so wide, and so very likely to be filled in most cases, that your biennial report is doubtless in a fair way to be sufficiently cumbersome without the introduction by me of some hobby upon which to air myself.

The normal institute is being recognized as an avenue of much benefit, and I am happy in the statement that teachers and school officers are beginning to appreciate it.

## FLOYD COUNTY.

### MRS. H. R. DUNCAN.

Floyd county has two teachers' educational associations, one for each side of the county, meeting alternately and often; also a county educational society which convenes once a year, and is not confined to teachers alone, but is patronized by the public generally. These organizations are well sustained, and with the normal institute which convenes every summer, gives us all much to think about and enjoy educationally.

The school property is generally well cared for. Several new school-houses have been built during the past year, and nicely furnished with modern furniture.

Teaching and teachers, we believe, are progressing. Sub-directors are adopting the plan of retaining their teachers, term after term, in the same place, which is much like engaging them by the year. This is a good sign. An efficient teacher should be kept as long as possible. I am glad to notice, too, that the teachers thus sought after are those who are wide awake, and most prompt in the teachers' associations and institutes.

Oral instruction enters largely into the schools throughout the county, introducing physiology, geography of our own state, and the primary branches. Music and drawing are becoming popular in all grades.

This, and indeed much of all that seems encouraging in our educational work, is due to the influence of the normal institute. The last term of our institute, which closed the eighth of last September, was, we are sure, a "harvest." The members voted unanimously that it was the most profitable they had ever attended in the county, and their own punctuality and general enthusiasm attested the candor of their expression.

The books of the secretaries are kept with a fair degree of accuracy, their reports, however, are very often much behind time.

Among the treasurers there is a great lack of system. Reports frequently appear with the debits and credits unbalanced, and giving the

amount on hand at last report, very different from that which the last report actually shows. These discrepancies are as frequently against the treasurer as in his favor, thus proving conclusively that the error results, not from design, but an imperfect understanding of the theory of accounts. What is the remedy for this state of things?

### FREMONT COUNTY.

### T. J. BRANT.

It seems an impossibility to obtain an accurate financial report from some of the districts; and why? It is caused by the change of treasurers during the year, by which one is put in who is not familiar with keeping accounts nor with school affairs.

There must be some remedy for this, or there never will be a correct report from some districts. Many of the secretaries neglect to report the changes during the year and at regular time in accordance with section 1736 and notes.

During the year 1876, fourteen new school-houses were erected; one brick, \$18,000; one brick, \$7,000, and twelve frame at an average cost of \$800.

This year, 1877, there were five new houses erected and arranged according to the latest improvements.

The interest manifested in many localities in the cause of education, is visible where commodious and substantial structures have been erected upon the plan of the most improved methods. But what we deplore more than anything else is the small attendance in many districts, of less than half the number of school age. We find too many parents that are very careless and indifferent about these vital benefits to their children. And whither can we go for a remedy for this evil? How are we to teach them? Compulsory edution is the only panacea that will reach every household or parent in the land.

Another hindrance to the progress of our country schools, is this great curse—frequent change of teachers. It is useless to comment upon this.

Our normal institute of four weeks was a success this year. An attendance of two hundred, and greater interest than ever before.

In our opinion county supervision has much to do towards exciting an interest for education among the masses.

Our teachers are few in number, but much better in quality and steadily improving. One source of annoyance and complaint is favoritism of directors in employing a relation, friend or acquaintance, whether well qualified or not; sometimes not considering the authority of county superintendent nor certificate, and allowing them to begin teaching without certificate. There are too many cases of this kind that need legislation or enforcement of law. We wish to express many things here, but must be brief.

Every effort on our part will be made with our friends in the cause, the coming year, to achieve more satisfactory results.

## GREENE COUNTY.

#### D. HEAGLE.

We have now in Greene county 108 schools, all but three of which are ungraded. Our graded schools have been doing good work; and generally it may be said of them, that they have improved in character, and one or two of them not a little; particularly in certain branches of study, and the lower departments. Somewhat the same thing is true, moreover, of our ungraded schools in every part of the county; and generally speaking, I think it may be said of all our school interests, that never before were they in as prosperous and hopeful a condition as now.

During the year we have had two teachers' gatherings; one a general county convention held in March, at Grand Junction, which was very largely attended, and was altogether the most enthusiastic and important meeting of the kind ever held in the county. The effect of it, as I have observed during the summer, has been really good, particularly in keeping alive an interest for improvement among the teachers.

The other gathering was our regular annual normal institute. This was held at Jefferson, the county seat, and lasted four weeks, beginning the 13th of August, and with an attendance present the first day of one hundred and sixteen. The whole number enrolled was one hundred and sixty-two.

Special features of interest were not only the unusually large attendance and the enthusiasm of the teachers, but the excellent and practical instruction given, the model school had in connection with the institute, the superior character of the public lectures, and the happy manner in which everything seemed to pass off, every succeeding success appearing to be greater than the one before it. Already, I can see that the effect of this school is most salutary for our school interests in general; and I wish to say of it further that with nothing of an educational character ever had in the county have our people seemed to be so generally pleased as they have been, and still are, with this. Of our many educational defects and deficiencies we have not room here to speak; so, I will only add that one of the chief of the these matters is the insufficient pay still given to teachers in nearly all of schools. They should on the average receive fully \$10.00 more per month wages than they do.

The teachers and others, with the county superintendent, have, during several months of the year, sustained, and I think profitably, an educational department in one of our county newspapers.

And now, as the present year ends my official term as county superintendent, I wish to say, in closing, that I have enjoyed the work much better than I anticipated; and as I have labored, I know, earnestly for the welfare of the schools in Greene county, so I still shall cherish the interest in them and will always rejoice to see them prosper.

## GUTHRIE COUNTY.

#### G. C. MILLER.

I have had less difficulty this, than previous years to secure accurate reports from district township officers. The reports of district township treasurers are generally correct. More difficulty is experienced in receiving reports from the officers of the small independent districts.

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This is attributed to the fact that competent men are generally elected in district townships, while in some of the smaller independent districts, responsible men who are competent to keep the simplest forms of accounts and make reports can not be found. It certainly is a discredit to our school system to elect men to school offices who can neither read nor write, although such is frequently the case. A compulsory school law is the remedy. In one township of six independent districts, I was compelled to visit four of the treasurers and assist them in making reports.

REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS.

I consider the normal institute as no longer an experiment, but a part of our grand school system which we cannot afford to cripple by unwise legislation. The teachers and people are beginning to realize the necessity for more thorough preparation for the work of the schoolroom. Teachers are generally coming up to the higher standard required, and the demand for better qualified teachers is increasing.

I approve of the method of uniform examinations recently adopted, and hope that the same plan will be continued. Am in favor of some other method for the examination of teachers for our high schools or advanced schools in cities. Not unfrequently teachers are employed for these schools who are not sufficiently qualified for this grade, while at the same time they are qualified for the district schools, and have passed the required examination and received a certificate from the county superintendent authorizing them to teach in any of the schools in the county.

One great detriment to the progress of our school is the careless employment of teachers. Sub-directors frequently do not consider the wants of the district, in employing teachers. In a school for four or five small pupils, there will be found a teacher of experience, capable of teaching a class in some high school, while perhaps in an adjoining district will be found a school of large scholars, well advanced, but taught by a young and inexperienced teacher, holding a third grade certificate. The result is a failure in one or both of the schools. Is there no practicable remedy for this evil?

## HANCOCK COUNTY.

#### A. R. BARNES.

The normal work has been of great benefit to our schools during the past two years. The second and third grade teachers attend more generally than those holding first. Most of these lower grades have obtained their education in our common schools, and are lacking to a greater or less degree the more essential requisites, viz. : methods of instruction and discipline. They are well aware of this, and having an opportunity of receiving practical instruction embrace it cheerfully and work with a will, and the good results are found in our schools. All teachers should be compelled to attend these normals. This would reach a class of persons whose memories are so good that they can pass a third grade examination, but who do not have any enthusiasm for the work nor any higher aim than the repleaishing of their pocketbooks, and never read any educational works nor attend any meetings of the association or normal.

The county superintendent should be appointed for a term of at least four years, by an educational board, which would make qualifications the basis of appointment. Our financial statistics would be much more correct and proportionately more valuable if our school treasurers were necessarily good book-keepers.

The patrons of the schools of this county manifest a commendable degree of interest in our school work, both by taxing themselves and by encouraging and upholding teachers and superintendent in all well taken steps towards bettering their condition.

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## HARRISON COUNTY.

#### S. G. ROGERS.

My annual report submitted is very defective in several particulars, I am well aware; but it is as correct and complete as I could make it from the reports received from the secretaries and treasurers of our forty-six school districts in the county. The densest ignorance seems to prevail among the school officers in regard to the proper manner of making these reports, especially the treasurers' reports. Their loose and illegal mode of transacting business pertaining to their offices, in many cases makes it next to impossible to make a satisfactory report. even with the best intentions, while in numerous instances I am quite sure the faulty document signifies something worse. I know of school districts in this county where the school treasurer has not made a fair, full, and lawful settlement with the board for five years or more. Settlements at the proper time are evaded upon some trivial excuse, and settlement goes over to another year. The board members are changed wholly or in part in the meantime, and the same old game is played over again, or some new device is adopted to the same end next year, and so on indefinitely or until a change takes place in the treasurer's office, when some money and a few unintelligible papers or account books are turned over to the new man.

Another abuse: The school treasurer is generally (for reasons I need not dwell upon) the man of greatest wealth and influence in the board, and not unfrequently influences the board, upon the plea of economy, to lessen the number of months of school, cut down teachers' wages, defer needed repairs or improvements about the schoolhouse or yard, &c., his real motive being to keep the money in his own hands for use and prevent its disbursement.

The average condition of the schools of this county cannot, I think, fall much below that of the best in the state. Our school houses are well built, well furnished, sufficient in number and comparatively new.

Of teachers we have our share of the best. The principals at Magnolia, Logan, Missouri Valley, Dunlap and Woodbine, are experienced and successful men, fully up with the spirit of the age, daily exhibiting in their schools the very best modern methods of instruction. Four of our leading teachers are sought for as institute conductors in adjoining counties, and a considerable number of the best teachers in the country districts are the well-trained pupils from these schools. We have our share of poor teachers too. When I say that fully fifty per cent. of the teachers in the county are unfit to be teachers at all, I only express my settled conviction derived from what I have seen and heard.

The normal institutes held in the county regularly for a long term of years, have done much to advance our educational standard. We have been very fortunate in securing superior conductors, almost without exception. Instead of employing those who have sought us, we have selected from the very best men of established reputation, from six months to one year ahead.

Your instruction to county superintendents not to grant certificates to children under certain ages, meets my most hearty approval, and it has certainly worked a great benefit to the public in this county. It is approved by a large majority of our best citizens and tax payers. Only a few individuals, who would like to make their children contribute to the family support by staking them out on the school fund, object to it. I hope it may become an established regulation.

The examinations sent out, too, from the state office have aided me greatly in raising our standard in this county. Disappointed applicants find less fault and acquiesce with a better grace when tried and found wanting upon these tests, than upon any which are gotten up at home. Further it does much to bring about uniformity in the different counties of the state, which is greatly to be desired.

## HENRY COUNTY.

#### J. W. PALM.

The state questions have been steadily growing in favor in this county. The opposition to their use, manifest at first, has wholly abated. Many at first thought them too critical and not practical. It was the opinion of many well informed people and staunch friends to the cause

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of education, that these questions had their source too high up, and overshot the end at which they were aimed. This objection, generally valid, was found to be unjust in this instance. The questions seem to have been framed to meet even a passive public sentiment half-way, and no gap has been left, (as charged), between the awakened wishes of the people on the subject of education, and the spirit and purpose of the state lists.

Public sentiment in Henry county, as I think, everywhere, responds most readily and with a relish of self-interest and personal pride, to any effort looking to a more efficient organization of our schools. The absorbing topics of the late war, and the settlement of questions growing out of it, gave for years a political bias to public thought, to the neglect of the abiding interests of peace, paramount among which is the question of popular education. Thought and legislation are now looking in the direction of our public schools, as the especial ward of the nation, and the increased efficiency of our schools is earnestly desired and confidently expected. The publication of the state questions is a pioneer movement, and if indorsed throughout the state, as in Henry county, should be sedulously fostered and steadily continued. The fault, if any, is not with the plan but in its application, which can be corrected by improving the efficiency of county supervision, "a consummation devoutly to be wished."

## HOWARD COUNTY.

### O. N. HOYT.

I would call attention to two or three embarrassing obstacles to progress in our schools. I mention them because I think they are not peculiar to this county. Every intelligent county superintendent has felt the same difficulties.

1st. The attendance at our schools is only about one-half the enrollment. Can no method be devised to increase the attendance? We have in our grand state of Iowa an excellent free school system, surely the people who have made the law have the right to see that its objects are not defeated. If they have provided instruction for the children of

the state, it would seem that they have a right to compel parents and guardians to secure to the youth the benefits of this instruction.

2d. Our teachers are generally embarrassed by the diversity of text-books brought into the schools. The population of many communities is constantly changing, new families coming in and old ones going out, and sometimes the teacher finds at the beginning of the term almost as many different text-books as there are families in the community. Every country teacher knows something of the great annoyance and inconvenience attending such a state of things. Cannot we have some plan that shall give us a system of uniformity? I offer no suggestions as to how that shall be done but hope the state legislature will give the subject the consideration it merits.

3d. The compensation received by the county superintendent is totally inadequate. I feel free to say this now, as I am about to leave the office. It is not in keeping with the importance and dignity of the office. To bring our schools up to the highest point of efficiency a first class man is needed; but that order of talent cannot now be obtained. Excellent young men may be induced to take the office as a stepping stone to something else. A man fully competent may take it in connection with some other business, but it is desirable that a salary sufficiently remunerative be paid so that the office may command the best talent in the profession.

## HUMBOLDT COUNTY.

### L. J. ANDERSON.

I think that the interest in schools is gradually advancing in this county, yet it is not what it ought to be. We need better teachers, better school officers, and I do not know but it would be to our interest to have compulsory education.

Several new school-houses were built the past summer-all of the latest and most approved style. The county is well supplied with houses, but some are in poor condition for winter, while nearly all are minus necessary apparatus.

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### IDA COUNTY.

### T. S. SNELL.

The schools in this county are mostly small. Owing to the sparsely settled condition of our county, some pupils reside so far from school that it is impossible for them to attend; but in all such cases where there are five or more pupils in a neighborhood the boards of directors rent a room and employ a teacher; but still with this privilege there are many who are deprived of school facilities. Leaving out those who are unable to attend on account of distance, our average attendance would be good indeed.

School-houses are well built and well furnished, and in most cases well taken care of by the school officers. Some new school-houses have been built this season—all good substantial buildings. I have yet to hear of the first case of grumbling because school-taxes were large, or in favor of abolishing the office of county superintendent. We have some good teachers, but some are not what they should be in regard to the later and better methods of teaching. But this defect is being remedied by our normal institutes, of which we had a very successful one in our county this year; every teacher was in attendance. The people are alive to the interest of the schools and aid the school officers very much in their work.

## IOWA COUNTY.

#### G. INGRAM.

My report has been delayed by the delay of district secretaries and treasurers, many of them not reporting till the middle of the present month.

I think I can say truthfully that the schools of Iowa county are keeping pace with the times. Last year, when times were a little

hard, the people thought to economize, and as is generally the case, commenced at the schools. But they scon found this to be false economy, and this year the wages of teachers are better.

Four new school-houses were built in 1876, and six in 1877. Also, Millersburg, Victor and Ladora, have enlarged their old buildings so that they have now good buildings and plenty of room. These buildings have all been erected upon the most approved plan. Many of our old farmer directors are also becoming convinced that because they sat on benches without backs, is no reason that their children should, and are putting in the patent seats.

Our normals for the past two years have been very successful; they have been largely attended, not so largely as in some of our neighboring counties, perhaps, but our county is not so populous as some of them, and the teachers expressed themselves very generally satisfied.

We have held a few local teachers' meetings in different parts of the county with very good results. The teachers seemed very much interested in them, and they created a better feeling in the neighborhoods towards the teachers and schools by the patrons. One great difficulty I have had to contend with has been to keep boys and girls out of the schools as teachers.

Our schools suffer very materially from frequent changes of teachers; and directors exercise very little judgment in selecting teachers. They seem to feel that the first applicant should have the preference, without any consideration of fitness for the place, or anything else.

## JEFFERSON COUNTY.

#### MCK. ROBINSON.

I herewith submit my second annual report, which I believe to be correct, with the exceptions of Maple Grove, Pleasant Hill No. 8, Union No. 2, Polk and Union, whose books have been so badly kept that nothing reliable could be obtained from them. I have therefore compiled my report from the best information that I could obtain.

The schools of the county are in a very prosperous condition, being conducted by live and energetic teachers, whose endeavors give to the future promises of high intellectual attainments.

There have been five new school-houses erected in the past two years, and many of the old ones refitted and newly furnished, making them both attractive and comfortable.

The people generally are alive to the educational interests of the county. The high schools have been well attended. Parsons college, under the management of Prof. Wilson, has grown rapidly into public favor, and is destined to wield a wide influence in the interest of popular education. Our normal institute, held in August, was well attended, and the enthusiasm of the teachers generally proved their zeal for the cause in which they are engaged.

## JONES COUNTY.

### O. E. ALDRICH.

The past year has been a prosperous one for the schools of Jones county. Teaching is becoming a more permanent profession, and experience enables the teachers to do better work. Our normal institute was well attended, and was interesting and profitable. An able and instructive course of lectures was delivered, among which was one by our superintendent of public instruction, whose lecture and visit was highly appreciated by our teachers.

Our school property has been greatly increased by erecting a new and commodious house at Strawberry Hill, and at Monticello a magnificent school building, costing \$20,000.

I find it impossible to obtain correct reports from treasurers. Seventenths of them do not agree with reports as made last year. In my judgment, all school officers should be elected in September, and blanks so printed that the district secretary could send names and post-office address to the county superintendent when he makes his annual report. A large number of districts have but one fund, and I have no means of knowing what part was received from district tax or apportionment. I did not receive two-thirds of my reports until the

tenth of October, notwithstanding blanks were sent the first week in September. I have gone after some personally, and sent dozens of postal cards. I find it impossible to visit one hundred and fifty schools, try all appeals, issue commissions to appraise school-house sites, and record the land thus condemned. I usually visit first the schools taught by inexperienced teachers, and as many more as office work will allow me to do. As a whole, our educational interests are improving in Jones county. The school-house in Greenfield township was burned, and teacher's wages were enjoined on a question of the validity of contract. The house is rebuilt, and school in session, and I recommend that they receive their public money.

## JOHNSON COUNTY.

### J. M. CURRY.

I herewith submit my annual report. Although you have given me extra time, I have been very much hurried in its preparation. I sent out the blanks in due time, and notified the district officers in a circular, of their duty. After the 20th of September I wrote to many urging them to "hurry up;" and after I received your circular, I employed a young man to help me, and we went into many remote parts of the county and "gathered them in." Yet I have not received the report of the treasurer of the independent district of Iowa City. I notified him, and called for it twice. He is responsible. If he sends it before the mail goes, I will annex it to this report.

Much of the work on this report has been done within the last three days. There may be inaccuracies in it, yet I have endeavored to make it correct. In a few instances, reports came very late, in which the amount stated as being on hand at last report did not correspond with last report, but I did not have time to return them for correction.

There are two obstacles to the advancement of the common schools of this county. The first is a want of interest manifested by parents in regard to the affairs of the schools, but I think this can be remedied by active work on the part of superintendent and teachers. The normal institute is doing much to remedy this evil. The other obstacle

is, that as a general thing our school boards are composed of men who are not qualified to fill the positions they occupy. In some instances in this county, men who cannot read, write, speak the English language, nor make the computations involved in the work of their office, are holding the responsible position of district treasurer. It is as necessary to the advancement of the cause of education that qualified men should hold the positions of district officers as it is to have a competent superintendent and well qualified teachers. I would be pleased if this matter can be brought before the legislature this winter, and some action taken upon it.

## KEOKUK COUNTY.

### H. D. TODD.

I have failed to get the report of two treasurers in time, and must send my report without them.

I think the system of independent sub-districts open to many objections. In the larger districts the taxes are very light, while in the smaller ones taxation is oppressive. It is more expensive, as full sets of records, blanks, &c., must be had for each district, and about nine times as many officers must be paid. Petty quarrels frequently arise, and are only settled after much expensive litigation. The funds, in many cases, are not properly accounted for; besides, there is considerable loss on account of the great number of frequently incompetent disbursing officers. The system appeared to work well at first in this county, but the longer it is tried the more plainly it appears that the legislature made a mistake when the system was inaugurated.

If we must have the present law in regard to independent districts, the system can be greatly simplified by having but one treasurer in a township, or let the township clerk be ex officio township treasurer; and he should keep an account with each independent district, and settle annually with the county superintendent or county treasurer.

The independent district of Delta is erecting a substantial two-story brick building, with four rooms. The intention is to organize a graded school with four departments.

Our normal institute was a grand success, and the largest ever held in the county. Two hundred and twenty-four were enrolled and paid the registration fee.

During the year, and especially during the winter term, monthly institutes or educational meetings have been held in nearly every township, in which the teachers and citizens engaged in discussing school questions of various kinds. These meetings, I think, are productive of very good results.

Our course of study for the county, which was revised last year, is doing much to systemize our schools. It aids especially the new teachers, who are apt to work at random with nothing definite in view. All the teachers with but few exceptions use it as far as circumstances will permit.

The course of study for the Sigourney schools has been revised during the year.

I give three grades of certificates; first, second and third. I like this better than to give but two; it stimulates the teachers to improve that they may get the next higher class.

Our teachers' educational library I mention with pride, as it is the result of the voluntary offering of over one hundred of Keokuk county's best teachers, assisted by a few enterprising citizens. We have over four hundred volumes of good books, costing about \$700.00. The income of the association is about twelve dollars per month. The county superintendent is treasurer and librarian.

I find the instructions of the superintendent of public instruction in regard to the age of persons to whom certificates are granted of much service to me; also, the method of having uniform examinations throughout the state, meets my hearty approval.

During the past four years about eight schools changed text-books in spelling, six have changed readers, one arithmetics, twelve grammars, six geographies, and eight histories.

### LEE COUNTY.

### W. J. MEDES.

An examination of the work of our schools for the last year, affords good ground for the belief that, on the whole, there has been substantial progress. The figures will show you that we have twenty-one more children between the ages of five and twenty-one, than last year, while we have three hundred more school children enrolled, and ninety-nine increase in the average daily attendance. While these figures give some indication of the improvement of our schools in one direction they do not show our greatest gain. This is to be found in the decided improvement in our teachers, in their qualifications and mental culture. A great share of this improvement I attribute to the institutes held in this county during the past two years. The one for this year was conducted by Prof. E. E. Holroyd, of the Keokuk schools, and to him belongs the credit of managing and carrying successfully to the end the largest, most attentive, and appreciative institute that has convened in this county for some years. He was ably seconded in his efforts by Prof. C. De Garmo, of the "Illinois State Normal," Miss M. McCowen, of Waterloo, Prof. S. E. Beede, and Miss C. Medes, of Keokuk.

I have found a strict adherence to the examination papers sent out by the state department of education has produced great good in the county. Not only has it brought good results in weeding out poor teachers, but it has proved a great benefit to good teachers in compelling them to master the subjects on which they were examined and which they were expected to teach.

Through these various agencies the grade of our teachers is constantly improving. During the month of September, seven who have taught in this county for several years, failed, and have now left the profession to make room for others. The few left who are content with keeping instead of teaching school are being silently worked out of their positions, and the time is not far distant when this class will be wholly eliminated from the ranks of professional teachers.

In some townships they have instituted teachers' associations, having for their object a drill of the teachers and a competitive examination of ten of the best scholars of each school in the township. In all cases these associations have worked well both for teachers and scholars, and during the coming year I shall make efforts to organize similar associations in every township of the county.

For the purpose of bringing the schools up to a higher standard, a course of instruction has been marked out in reading, spelling, arithmetic, geography, grammar and United States history, and efforts are now being made to have all the schools in the county follow the course.

Most of the schools have been visited, and a large majority of them, several times during the year.

I cannot close this report without calling your attention to several needed amendments to the school laws. Why not require each teacher to spend one or more days each year, at the request of the county superintendent, in visiting a school or schools designated by him? In this way teachers very defective in their methods could be sent to watch good teachers and thereby be profitably improved. Would it not be wisdom to take the office of county superintendent out of the arena of politics and provide for the election of that officer by the various school boards of the county. They beyond doubt, more than others know what is needed in the schools and would be correspondingly careful in the selection of that officer. A law is needed compelling the county superintendent to keep a personal account with each school district, including a plat of the same, the assessment, valuation, amount of taxes paid and handed over to them and all data in regard to the wealth of a district. Too many districts "go it blind," and are never able to tell how much money is at their command and hence are seldom in a position to act intelligently.

## LINN COUNTY.

#### E. JOHNSTON.

The reports of the district secretaries and treasurers are more or less imperfect, but I did the best I could with the material on hand. My report has been delayed on account of their failure to make returns according to law.

The interest in our schools on the part of parents, is increasing, and there is a general feeling that none but good teachers should be tolerated. Our normal institutes have been remarkably successful, both in attendance and interest. Much good has been done by arousing the teachers to some appreciation of their work,

The graded schools of the county have been very successful, and in the cities of Cedar Rapids and Marion our public schools will compare very favorably with any in the state.

Many changes in the school law seem to be necessary. One is that more time should be given to the county superintendent for making his annual report. The lack of promptness on the part of secretaries and treasurers, makes it difficult to complete his report at the time fixed by law.

## LOUISA COUNTY.

J. A. KENNEDY.

The institute is growing in favor.

## LUCAS COUNTY.

A. DAY.

I have no excuse to offer for the delay of my report, except nineteen of the secretaries, and twenty of the treasurers' reports were not handed in till very recently. Some I went after. In the district township of Pleasant, the board did not accept the treasurer's report till recently, consequently I never received said report till the sixth instant. In district number eight, Warren township, the treasurer did not intend to report at all. Perhaps two-thirds of the secretaries' reports were without errors. I made all corrections that were possible.

Treasurers' reports came in about as usual, behind time, and over

one-half incorrect. I made all corrections where it was possible for me to make. In numerous instances columns were incorrectly added, thereby changing amounts on hand in the different funds. It is a common thing for treasurers to transfer one fund to another on their own accord, or by authority from their respective boards. This transferring necessarily paves the way for errors hereafter. This seems to be the great source of errors in treasurers' reports. From the experience of two years in receiving and correcting treasurers' reports, I see the urgent necessity of merging the three school funds into one. They would make less mistakes, and cause less perplexity to superintendents. The fourth annual normal of Lucas county began July 16th, and continued in session four consecutive weeks. There were ninetyeight names on the roll, an increase of membership over former normals of about one-third. It is evident to my mind that the time allotted to our normals is too limited. Let us have more time for our normals, and have our teachers more proficient in their work.

## MAHASKA COUNTY.

#### J. W. JOHNSON.

THE PEOPLE AND THE SCHOOLS .- In America, the people are the makers and builders of laws and institutions. Whatever the thought and conscience of society dictates, that is our life and our condition as a people. The schools are pleasant, efficient and progressive, if the people make them so, not otherwise. Anything which can be done by educators to awaken closer sympathy, and a deeper interest in the public mind, should be done. We must have for the schools devoted labor, and a liberal purse.

COURSE OF STUDY .- The weakness of country schools is their lack of system. To overcome this evil the teachers of this county voted, at the institute of 1876, that the county superintendent should write a course of study for the country schools, and that they would do what they could to introduce and use it. The course has been printed and put into the hands of school boards and teachers. Its suggestions have been adopted by some, and by others carefully considered. By this the

question of classifying country schools has been brought forward, and is favorably received. If the educators of the state will discuss the matter and try it, a much needed reform will be commenced.

NORMAL INSTITUTES AND NORMAL SCHOOLS.—Every institute held in Mahaska shows the wisdom of the law. The attendance this year was two hundred and seventy-one. Among this number were one hundred persons without any experience in teaching, while more than fifty of them held first class certificates, from a careful examination. While young persons learn the theory, older teachers understand their profession better. Our colleges at Oskaloosa have organized normal departments, and are furnishing good training for teachers. We need more normal schools in Iowa.

EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION, LIBRARY, &c.—In the latter part of 1876, an educational association was formed among the teachers of the county for general improvement, and the discussion of educational topics. Two meetings are held annually for the county at large, besides local meetings in the townships. This is the best means yet discovered for rousing the people. This association also planned a library, to circulate among the members. It now contains almost three hundred books, is kept at the county superintendent's office, and does great good among the teachers. Recently branch libraries have been formed, by which to reach every part of the county.

For more than three years the teachers have kept a department in some of the county papers. In this, school questions have been freely discussed. Experience teaches that the library and educational column should be supported in every county in the state.

NEEDED LEGISLATION.—That the highest good may be accomplished by our schools, we need the following:

1. Closer and better supervision. Make not less but more of the office of county superintendent. Count that man who would abolish the office an enemy to the public schools. Place it on higher grounds. Pay more salary and command better talent. Let no person hold the position who has not had successful experience in teaching, and who does not hold a state certificate. Make state uniformity in examinations a law, and allow no examinations at irregular times. Give first grade certificates for two years, and give none without examination. In the large counties of the state the superintendent needs a deputy, and then will supervision be efficient and respectable. Remove it from politics and elect either by the people or the school boards, at the school meetings in March.

2. More efficient school officers and not so many of them. The first we can secure by keeping political influences out of school elections, securing persons who are qualified and paying them for their labor. The next legislature should make provision for paying school directors. The second can be secured by abolishing independent districts in the country, and organizing each township into an independent district, including all towns of less than three hundred, and electing a board of six members at large. The expense of paying a needless army of secretaries and treasurers, and buying them record books is unnecessary.

3. A consolidation of all the school funds into one general fund.

4. The organization of a state board of examination, for the granting of state certificates and diplomas to professional teachers.

## MARION COUNTY.

#### A. YETTER.

Another year is gone, and the result of our labors given in the accompanying tabular report. It would be unjust to say that the citizens of Marion county take no interest in education. The desire to educate and qualify the youth for high and honorable positions in life, is almost universal. A commendable spirit is manifested by our school officers, in the efforts made to carry out the liberal spirit of our school law, and as much as possible, give equal advantages to the pupils in the county.

Many of the school-houses are ornaments to the neighborhoods in which they are located; trees and shrubbery are planted and the entire surroundings made attractive; nature and art are combined to create a taste for the lovely and beautiful, and in every instance happy results are apparent. Six new houses have been erected during the year. All of them comfortable and convenient, but we would especially refer to Pella and Knoxville school-houses. The former has erected a two story brick building containing eight large rooms, a library and spacious hall, through which egress is made quietly and orderly. The heating is done by a furnace, and the furniture of the latest and most improved style. The principal of this school is enthusiastic in his work and

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every suggestion he makes is carried out by the school board; nothing is wanting. The entire cost is \$25,000. Knoxville has built two very beautiful houses this summer and will have them ready for occupancy by the first of next January.

With the exception of three, all the schools in the county have been in session six months; many have extended the term to eight and ten months, but little complaint has been made by either party. Most of our teachers, like the "apostle of the Gentiles," magnify their offices. The general intelligence of the age demands such and bids all others not to apply for positions as teachers. Popular education will never move faster than public sentiment will sustain. Popular sentiment is, therefore, a legitimate subject of education, and before our system reaches that high state of usefulness to which it is destined, our people must be duly impressed with the truth, that general inteligence, based on universal education, is the only safeguard of popular government, and thus becomes the political necessity of a free people.

Secretaries and treasurers should hold their offices five years. The frequent change of officers causes the delay and inaccuracy of our annual reports. The entire school law should be simplified, and provisions made for the formation of new districts from independent districts.

## MARSHALL COUNTY.

### MISS A. GIFFORD.

The amount of labor and care requisite in the making of annual reports of the county superintendents is good ground for expecting reliable and complete statistics of the condition of the public schools in county and state for the information and use of the people. But when it is borne in mind that the school officers from whom come the facts, are, in not a few instances, delinquent in presenting their reports to the superintendent; are, in some cases, incapable of making correct reports, and, in general, careless and indifferent as to the prompt and painstaking performance of the duty, it must be plain that the original foundation for useful inferences is very doubtful. It should be remembered further, that the superintendent is utterly helpless in the

matter, having no authority whatever to secure timely and accurate reports from ignorant or delinquent secretaries or treasurers of boards of education. He must, therefore, make the most of the facts and circumstances of the situation, surrounded with difficulties which none but county superintendents can appreciate, and in the face of a public sentiment which regards him as the responsible party in all matters pertaining to the common schools.

"Figures will not lie." The figures of this report are as truthful as the original facts will permit. I am quite willing that this report should be compared with those of other counties of the State as to points of accuracy and reliability. But I may not leave this topic without asking earnestly for legislation that will afford the people wholly reliable statistics upon which to form correct conclusions respecting the economy of the schools.

. It is not a new thing to say that school officers are not, in practice, careful to keep separate the three different school funds. Aside from the legal requirement, there seems to be little reason why they should do so. One part of the school money is as sacred as another; the whole is devoted to education. Why not reduce the funds to two, at most? Also, a different system of disbursement seems necessary, one by which all receipts and expenditures for schools in the several districts in the county could be exposed to public inspection.

The mode of school visitation, and the attendant oversight of the work of teachers, as at present pursued, while accomplishing much good, might be improved. The superintendent should have liberty to visit where his services are most needed, where, for example, the poorest teachers are liable to be found; and in this vital part of the work he should have the especial co-operation of the director, who, it is fair to presume, should be qualified for the office he accepts, but who might by counsel with the superintendent in convention of directors, called in townships or county, profit by special instructions as to intelligent visitation and observation. To secure this end the superintendent must be clothed with authority over the directors. This is practically realized in New Jersey, where the country schools are the best in the Union, as shown at the Centennial. Our legislation in this direction should be of such a character as to secure, in the speediest possible. manner, a good school in every district. To this end, the one thing needed is a qualified and practically efficient teacher. The work in the school-room is the best test of both scholarship and methods of instruction, and the teacher should be finally judged thereby. It would be well

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to pay the director for a certain number of days' visitation in each term. Upon observations made by him and reported to the superintendent, the visitation of the latter might in part be based.

Our mode of examinations needs revision. All persons examined should pay the usual dollar as a return to the county for the time and labor spent, whether a certificate is issued or not. In this way repeated examinations could be made largely to inure to the benefit of the institute fund. Are not quarterly examinations sufficiently frequent? The questions issued by the state superintendent have been of great assistance, yet the object so necessary to be attained can hardly be satisfactorily gained until the county superintendents of the several counties can agree upon a uniformity of answers to questions submitted and like standards of qualifications for the different grades of certificates issued. As matters now stand, the same teachers are often found holding a third grade certificate from one county and a first grade from an adjoining county. Teachers failing to obtain certificates in one county, find easy access to the schools of a neighboring county. And this is done upon the same lists of questions, by reason of the diverse systems of marking and the different standards fixed for qualifications. Perhaps if county superintendents themselves were required to show qualifications as to scholarship for the office, before entering upon its duties, among which the examination of teachers is most important and delicate, the standard for teachers would, in mind at least, approximate more nearly a correct ideal by which to compare results.

The normal institute in this county has been an unqualified success. From our point of view, this is the best and most useful element in the work of professional instruction, in the state. It does more for the true advancement of education in this county, and doubtless for other counties in this state as well, than any other instrumentality. It merits every possible aid to make it in the highest degree useful. From year to year it must be made a more and more efficient help to our teachers already at work, and to those preparing to teach, better to fit themselves for the school-room. And by this I am reminded of a preliminary work necessary to be done, but only in part provided for bylegislation. The home advantages of instruction in branches of learning should be such as to bring within the reach all the youth of the county free tuition in the studies of the high school.

There should be a county high school in every county, a school that should suffice for both town and county. Legislation should make it more easily attainable than is now done by the statute. Such a

school would become not only the means of gaining a fair degree of education by all the youth for all pursuits, but would also be the natural help to the teacher desiring to be educated at home. It might go farther and afford the opportunity for special preparation to teach. Why are not the ideas of county normal schools, as realized in Illinois, and county high schools, as sought to be carried out in Iowa, capable of being combined in a practicable scheme for high school instruction for the whole county?

Of the condition of the schools of Marshall county I shall add but little, knowing that under existing circumstances it is very difficult to make them what they should be. However, I am conscious of having faithfully endeavored to improve them in all respects. Keeping the welfare of the youth taught in them, uppermost in mind, it has been a first consideration with me to secure qualified teachers. When secured, I have sought to aid and encourage them in the performance of their duties. On the whole, my own labors have been well sustained and kindly appreciated by school officers, patrons, and the community generally. Looking back over the four years of my continuance in office by the favor of the people, I can safely say that while much remains to be done, much has been already accomplished for the common schools of Marshall county.

## MONONA COUNTY.

### C. N. LYMAN.

The accompanying statistics may speak for themselves. Comparisons with the figures of last year's report may be made by those who desire to do so.

This county in many portions is yet new, and imperfectly developed. The population is scattered and comparatively poor. Many are home-steaders whose title to the land on which they live is contested by the railroad company.

Many of the schools are quite small and the attendance in these very irregular. As a matter of course, the progress in these schools has been satisfactory. In many other schools, the advancement has

been marked, the patrons of the school have taken commendable interest, and the teachers have been faithful and successful. The outlook for these schools seems quite hopeful. The teachers have heartily co-operated in the endeavors to raise the standard of education among them, and the result has been a very noticeable improvement.

The normal institute has been a very effectual means of improvement, and has been made good use of by the teachers. In many instances, the benefit has been decided. Among the great benefits derived has been a re-awakening of enthusiasm in school work throughout the county.

The difficulties we find are those always to be found in new countries, where the schools are mixed and the population floating or not yet quite at home.

In most of the counties, no system of grading could be successfully inaugurated at present. Yet there is a hopeful tendency in that direction in some townships.

Our connection with the schools has taught us our lack of wisdom in many things, so we have no panacea to suggest for the cure of all the ills under which our educational system is suffering. But anything would be in order that would tend to awaken and promote an intelligent public sentiment among the people.

This county sends greeting to all the other counties of the state, and promises to co-operate cordially with them in their efforts to advance the cause of education.

## MONROE COUNTY.

## J. M. PORTER,

All the districts in the county except one have had the required six months' term in the last year. This one was released on account of its inability to raise funds to pay teacher.

You will see by report that many of the districts have prolonged their term considerably above that required by law. Some of the boards have shown much interest in providing maps, charts, dictionaries, and other materials. The teachers of the county show an interest

in their work by trying to qualify themselves for responsibilities they assume in the school-room. A very large number of those holding certificates attended the normal institute. The teachers of the county have organized a library association, which they intend to incorporate and place on a good basis. This association also provides for two educational meetings each year, in which they bind themselves to meet and discuss, and, if possible, provide means for the advancement of the educational interests of the county.

It seems to me that something should be done to better the reports made by district secretaries and treasurers. It is almost impossible to get accurate reports under the present system. I believe the county treasurer should disburse the funds on all the orders properly audited.

The tidal wave of economy is at present sweeping over our county in the way of curtailing teachers' wages. This is having the effect to drive some of our best teachers into other business, and is thus doing the cause a great injury. It is to be hoped this idea will not prevail for any length of time.

## MUSCATINE COUNTY.

## R. W. LEVERICH.

I found it difficult to secure reliable reports from treasurers and secretaries.

Six new school-houses have been built this year; also a new brick building at West Liberty, which will accommodate the grammar grades and high school. This building is an ornament to the town and speaks well for the enterprising and intelligent citizens.

For the purpose of securing some uniform system of work in the rural districts, I prepared a set of rules and regulations, last year, which I submitted to the boards for their approval. We met the board and teachers of each township at a meeting called for that purpose, where the school boards and teachers and all interested, had the liberty of expressing themselves on the subject, and every board adopted the system, so we now have some system in the country schools of Muscatine county. Directors meetings are held in the townships,

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which never fail to secure the attendance of the board, teachers, and patrons of the schools, all of whom take an active part in what we call revival meetings in school work.

We grant two grades of certificates: First class, ninety per cent.: the second class, eighty per cent. While this examination is necessary and proper, it is not always a guarantee that the teacher is a good instructor. I find by visiting the schools, that in some cases the teacher with the second class certificate is very proficient while frequently the reverse is true of the teacher with the first-class certificate. The part of the examination which tests the teacher's natural adaptation to school work with reference to his proficiency in presenting the branches to the class, and his ability and skill in securing good deportment, is very difficult for me. Visiting the schools furnishes an excellent opportunity to correct any mistake that I make in granting a certificate to an incompetent teacher.

## O'BRIEN COUNTY.

## A. B. CHRYSLER.

There are yet too many pupils throughout the county who are not enrolled in the public schools.

## OSCEOLA COUNTY.

### C. L. GURNEY.

Our schools are gradually emerging from the effects of pioneer difficulties. Better houses are being built and furnished with the modern improvements.

Since using state questions we have had greater uniformity of ex-

aminations. And the tendency is to raise the qualification and standing of our teachers.

A great difficulty exists in getting correct reports from our township treasurers. They seldom correspond with last year's reports, and in several townships we have had embezzlements that cause a great change in present reports. We think the township system should be changed so that our county treasurer shall disburse all school money. thereby saving several hundred dollars in each county, and with greater safety and equal convenience to our teachers.

### PAGE COUNTY.

### E. MILLER.

Although the public school system of Iowa is, in the main, good, yet there might be a very great improvement.

The improvement here suggested is that the office of district treasurer should be abolished, and all orders of a board of directors paid directly by the county treasurer. This change would increase the work of the county treasurer, but it can be done by him for less money than it can be done by the numerous district treasurers. It will not work a hardship to teachers and others whose services may be required by the said school boards. Let us see how the teacher or contractor obtains his pay. He must first procure an order,-he then starts for the residence of the treasurer, which may be in the remotest part of the district,-he finds that the treasurer is not at home,-he may be in Missouri, or some other state,-he learns when he will probably be at home,—he goes back at the appointed time,—the treasurer has been away, and has not drawn the money from the county treasury, or, if he has, matters are no better,-his money is in the bank in the county seat, or perhaps in some other county, as the writer well knows he drew his pay on one occasion at the county seat of another county; for, if the treasurer does not deposit in a bank, the money is in-

The imperfect methods of keeping the accounts by the district treasurer, in most cases, is another objection against the district treas-

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ury system. These district treasurers are usually responsible, honest farmers, but they cannot take the time to keep the accounts as they should be kept. And another objection is the frequent change in the district treasurers. Other objections might be urged, but the necessity of the change will suggest itself to any one who has been employed by a school board, and has drawn his pay, or to any county superintendent who has attempted to make an abstract of treasurers' reports in due time.

### PLYMOUTH COUNTY.

F. B. SIBLEY.

There are three treasurers' reports that I could not get, although I have used every available means except to go and overhaul the whole township business. The reports, many times, had to go back for correction, which prevented me from getting mine made out in time.

## POCAHONTAS COUNTY.

J. F. CLARKE.

I have the pleasure to state that our schools are making better progress than formerly. The old mode of instruction is giving way to a more systematic and thorough method of teaching; for this we are greatly indebted to our normal institute system.

I believe a teachers' normal training school should be held at least for four months in each year, accessible to four or more counties each, throughout the state. The teachers in western Iowa, as a generality, are unable to avail themselves of our state normal, whereas, if a school were established at home it would be gladly welcomed and largely attended.

## POLK COUNTY.

### R. S. HUGHES.

Inasmuch as school officers are very tardy in making reports to the county superintendent, it is impossible for him to make his report at the time required by law. I would recommend additional legislation on this point; and inasmuch as the law makes no provision for district treasurers to deposit the funds belonging to them, thus holding them liable for loss, having, in most cases, no safe, making it difficult in many cases to secure the services of competent men, I would recommend that the school-funds remain in the hands of the county treasurer, until paid out on the order of each school-board.

I would also recommend compulsory education, for the following reasons: 1st. Notwithstanding the ample provision made for the education of the youth, nearly three-fourths in our county of those eligible, fail to attend school. 2d. If we have the right to tax capital for the education of the children of our state, we have the right to compel those children, when in health, to enjoy the benefits of such tax. Our schools would cost little if any more if all the children would attend. If parents are too poor to furnish books, the state could furnish them at less expense than it can support said children as paupers.

## POTTAWATTAMIE COUNTY.

### F. C. CHILDS.

Most of the schools in this county are in a prosperous condition. They are, I believe, improving from year to year. We have more good teachers than ever before. I have raised the standard of qualification somewhat over that of last year, and the school boards of many townships have aided me by grading the compensation of teachers accord-

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ing to the grade of certificate. This is a good plan, as it furnishes the teacher an incentive to improvement.

About fifty school-houses have been built during the last two years. There are now one hundred and sixty houses in the county, the most of them comfortable, and many of them neat and commodious buildings.

Our normal institute was a success. It was unusually well attended, the enrollment being one hundred and sixty; fifty-six more than that of last year. The good effect of these institutes is seen in nearly every school in the county.

The amounts "on hand" of Neola township (teachers' fund) do not agree. This is owing to a mistake of the treasurer of that township in making his report of last year. This is correct.

## POWESHIEK COUNTY.

#### W. R. AKERS.

I cannot say whether this report shows a true statement of the funds in all the districts or not. In quite a number of cases you will observe that the amounts in the first column of this report which correspond to the amount on hand last year do not agree. I have referred the matter to the different treasurers, and they all say the report this year is correct, and that the mistakes occurred in the report of 1876, some of them stating that in last year's report they reported to me the amount on hand at the time of the settlements with the boards in March; and others do not know from what data they made the report of 1876. The books in many districts, and especially in the independent sub-districts, are so loosely kept that they cannot render an intelligent account of their funds.

Some of them are determined to throw all three funds together, and keep no separate account of "school-house, contingent, and teachers' fund.

I sent out my blanks before the 15th of September, and many were not returned until the 1st of October, and quite a number until I had gone for them. In some cases the amounts reported as received from the semi-annual apportionment is in excess of amount received from district tax. This I think erroneous, but the reports came in so late that it was impossible to have them corrected.

In some of the city districts they persist in borrowing from one fund to the other, rendering it impossible for me to make a true statement of the condition of the funds in the blanks furnished me on which to make my report. I have referred these back to the treasurers for correction, but they refuse to alter them, stating that their boards authorized the change and that they can make no alterations without confusion in their books.

## RINGGOLD COUNTY.

W. J. WORK.

During the past two years I have had many obstacles to contend with, and I hope my labor has not been in vain. I know there is an increasing interest among our teachers, as our normal institute gave ample evidence.

There is considerable growling at the "hard questions from the state superintendent," but time will prove their benefit, when our teachers better prepare themselves for their work. I hope that the experience of the past two years will be of great benefit to me through the coming term, and return thanks for past favors and advice.

### SAC COUNTY.

REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS.

### J DOBSON.

I have had considerable difficulty in getting my reports complete this year. I think it would be a good piece of legislation to pass an act empowering county superintendents to proceed against a treasurer or secretary who failed to make a complete report within the time required by law, and collect a fine from him, the fine to be fixed by law. The schools of the county are doing very well. The houses are mostly new or nearly so, tolerably well furnished and quite comfortable. The teachers generally are taking a deep interest in their work, and are giving almost universal satisfaction.

### SCOTT COUNTY.

### C. H. CLEMMER.

The reports of the different secretaries make a fair showing for the schools of this county.

During the past year, six school-houses have been built. They are distributed as follows: two in Allens' Grove township, one in St. Claire township, one in Sheridan township, one in Blue Grass township, and one in Davenport township. In addition to the above improvements, several school-houses have been refurnished, and many others supplied with maps, globes, &c.; Walcott has established a graded school; Davenport has made additions to two of her school buildings, and expended several thousand dollars in grading the high school lot.

While the increase in the total number of persons of school age is one hundred and thirty-three, the increase in the total enrollment is four hundred and eighty-one, and in the average attendance three hundred and forty-four.

The school boards throughout the county are gradually adopting the plan of visiting in a body and examining, twice a year, the different schools under their charge. Those who have tried it are pleased with the results.

REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS.

An attempt was made to reduce teachers' wages, but it failed with few exceptions. There seems to be a determination on the part of school patrons to improve the standard of their schools. This spirit has brought about many good results, but most notably, the increased nermanency of a good teacher's situation in the ungraded schools. We have many who are now teaching for the second, third, fourth and even fifth consecutive year, in their respective schools. Our normal institute for 1877, was the largest ever held in this county, and in earnestness and enthusiasm on the part of teachers, all that could be asked for.

## SHELBY COUNTY.

### A. N. BUCKMAN,

Under the pressure of hard times, the salaries of teachers have been reduced in a majority of districts. This measure has been attended with bad effects; many of our best teachers having either gone out of the county, or out of the profession entirely. It is to be hoped that our school boards will, some day, learn that a cheap teacher generally costs them more, taking into account amount of benefit received from each, than would a teacher at fair pay. It is a fact that a poor teacher is not cheap at any price, when the child has only one hundred and fortythree days of school term in the year, and in most cases is in actual attendance not more than one-half or two thirds of that time. It is a serious matter if his time is wasted by an incompetent teacher. Whatever may have been the defects of the independent district system, it generally gave us better teachers than we get under the district township system, in which, under the plea of economy, teachers' salaries are kept at a point that will not command the best talent.

On the other hand, however, we find some encouragement in the fact that the average daily attendance, as compared with whole number of persons between the ages of five and twenty-one, is five per cent. better than it was last year. Also, that the average proficiency of our lower grades of teachers is much better than it has been heretofore. I credit this latter result partly to the use of the examination questions sent out by the state superintendent.

Sixteen new school houses have been erected or contracted for during the year. Most of the districts are settling down to the plan of sub-districts of four sections each. Experience shows that where the sub-districts are large, the smaller children living near the boundaries of the sub-district are substantially deprived of school privileges during the winter.

Our last normal institute, just closed, was attended by about twothirds of our teachers. Unfortunately the absent ones were those who most need the instruction and training that the institute was designed to give. I submit that a law compelling the attendance of all holding certificates of grades lower than first is desirable.

The school-houses are, in most cases, well seated. A few, however, cling to the old style of wooden forms; and one district in particular, has introduced a style of seat that seems to have been invented with a particular view to the discomfort of pupils.

## STORY COUNTY.

### C. H. BALLIET.

In submitting this my annual report on the educational statistics of my county, I beg leave to remark on the subject of school laws, that I find it very difficult to get the reports of secretaries and treasurers. Many of these officers are wholly incompetent; for instance, one secretary sent in his report and the only thing he had done correctly was to sign his name certifying his report to be correct. Ten treasurers' reports were received in one day and I returned seven of them for correction. The law in my opinion should require these paid school officers to meet the county superintendent at his office between September 15 and 20, of each year, and then and there make report.

The law should be amended so as to permit district townships, desiring so to do, to work under the independent system.

The people of Story county are reasonably awakened in school matters. Several new and substantial school-houses have been constructed during the past two years. Tax payers are annually raising the onerous tax of about \$71,000, for all purposes pertaining to our schools, and that without a murmur, but saying give us better schools.

We have annually held teachers' normals. These training schools have been well attended and with deep interest. All feel that the act of the legislature, providing for them was a move in the right direction. In examining teachers as in other matters I have in every respect tried to conform with the suggestions made by the state superintendent. I issue three grades of certificates and have printed respectively over them and in prominent characters "First Grade, "Second Grade," and "Third Grade." I find that "Third Grade" is more startling to the teacher than low marking on the inclined plane system. Boards of directors like it better. It is easy to be understood. Many school boards regulate teachers' wages in accordance with the certificate the teacher holds.

## TAYLOR COUNTY.

### J. B. OWENS.

There has been an acknowledged advancement in the grade of school work during the year, owing in part to the assistance given teachers by the normal institute.

A new brick building of three stories is in process of completion in the independent district of Bedford, which is to be furnished after the most approved style. The cost of the building is to be about eighteen thousand dollars.

### UNION COUNTY.

### MISS J. E. LESTER.

My report is necessarily late on account of the newly organized independent districts. I have endeavored to make my report as accurate

as possible, which is very difficult on account of the many imperfect ones from district secretaries and treasurers.

Our schools are in a prosperous condition. It has been my aim to improve the schools by furnishing better teachers, and in order to do this I have made my examinations more rigid than last year, and insisted that every teacher should attend the normal institute. I am happy to say that great good has resulted from this. I can see marked improvement in the schools over those of last year. There is an increased interest on the part of both patrons and teachers in the cause of education.

The institute was a success; indeed, I think it but just to say it was the best ever held in the county.

## VAN BUREN COUNTY.

### J. W. ROWLEY.

For the past two years the crops of this county have been very poor, in part of the county almost an entire failure. In consequence of this many improvements in school-buildings have been withheld, and teachers' wages have been reduced. Four school-houses have been built since my last report, all of which are well constructed and large enough to accommodate the future wants of the districts.

We hope the legislature the coming session will give the county superintendent power to call meetings of the boards of directors for any needed consultation. In this way the superintendent could do work that he could do in no other way, and secure uniformity in school management.

Our normal schools, we think, have been the means of creating an interest among our teachers that has never been manifested before. Our people approve of them, and as our teachers are unitedly in favor of them, their usefulness is manifested by the increased efficiency of our teachers in their work.

### WAPELLO COUNTY.

C. WOOD.

A word in relation to teachers' certificates: 'The superintendent of public instruction, very properly it seems to me, issues three grades. Under existing circumstances, I opine there is a necessity for the issuance of these three grades, although the voice of a majority of the best teachers is seldom heard in vindication of any other than first class certificates. Normal institutes would vote them down as often as they met. But our schools do not belong to the teachers; they emanate from the people who cheerfully pay heavy taxes to support them. It is true in the abstract, that every teacher should possess the erudition that would entitle him to a first class certificate, and that his wages should be commensurate with his abilities to teach and govern. But in many districts the people are so poor, they can scarcely sustain a six months' school at the lowest wages. Hence the demand for low priced teachers. Our normal institute language is as follows: "If the alternative be a poor school or no school, I record my vote in favor of no school,"

This is indeed plausible. The exact truth in the premises is, however, that the poor whom we always have with us, must do the best they can and heed facts rather than fine theories.

Normal institutes in Wapello county are becoming popular with the people and especially with the teachers. The most pleasant, profitable, and successful normal ever held in our county commenced in Ottumwa on the sixth and ended on the thirty-first of August.

## WINNEBAGO COUNTY.

### W. A. CHAPMAN.

The schools of this county are steadily improving, both as to numbers and efficiency. The teachers are becoming convinced of the necessity of making some special preparation for the work in which they are engaged. I find the normal institute to be one of the most

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efficient means for the elevation of the standard of education among our common school teachers. The institutes held in this county have been a decided success. I have taken pains to employ only such conductors and teachers as were fully up to the requirements of the times. The institute programme coming to hand early, gave our teachers a better chance to prepare for the work of the normal and most of them did make some use of it. Something ought to be done to secure a better attendance at our schools. I have made it a point to visit each school, and advise, counsel and encourage the teachers as occasion might indicate. I have endeavored to make this report as nearly correct as my data would allow.

### WINNESHIEK COUNTY.

### N. KESSEY.

During the year of hard times, our schools have not suffered as much as I anticipated. Wages have been fair, and teachers have been fully equal to former ones in efficiency and earnestness. The habit of allowing each sub-district so much money, and giving the sub-director the privilege of having as much school as he can possibly get for that money, still prevails in a few of our district townships, and is the source of considerable trouble. I hope, however, that it will soon be remedied, and a uniform length of time taught in all the schools in each district township.

The unlimited mixture of text-books is, perhaps, one of the greatest defects with which we have to contend at present, and has engaged my attention as much as any other one thing for the past two years. At their September meeting, four townships passed resolutions to adopt a uniform set of text-books, and it is hoped, more will follow in short time. Our normal institutes have been a decided success both in attendance—as report will show—and efficiency.

For our teachers' sake, I hope that our next legislature will so modify the law, that when a thorough examination is once passed satisfactorily, certain classes of certificates can be granted for a certain number of years.

### WORTH COUNTY.

### G. H. WHITCOMB.

Elder Harkins has said "figgers won't lie," but that must have been before the time of secretaries' and treasurers' reports. Had he lived in the time when secretaries reported, a certain number of scholars enrolled and an average daily attendance of three times that number, I think his faith in the weight and dignity of "figgers," would be considerably lessened. Much of the trouble with treasurers' reports arises from transferring from one fund to another, regardless of law.

At the time of my last report we had forty-nine schools in our county. We now have fifty-six, an increase of seven. With the increase of school districts, we also have an added interest in our educational matters; our last normal institute having been attended by nearly twice the number of any previous one. This interest however does not reach the masses as we wish to see it. Our average daily attendance being about one-half the number enrolled, shows that the parents do not appreciate the advantages of an education.

In the four years I have had the supervision of the schools of our county, I have tried to gradually raise the standard of qualification of teachers, and have succeeded in a measure. The questions as furnished by the state department of education have acted as a stimulus, and greatly aided me in bringing the standard up; the teachers study them fully, realizing that no one can expect to teach who is not a constant learner, keeping pace with the times.
