HON. SAMUEL MERRILL, GOVERNOR OF IOWA, AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE MILITIA THEREOF,

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my report as Adjutant-General, Inspector-General, and Acting Quartermaster-General of the State.

In the appendix accompanying, will be found the following documents:

(A.) Roster of the Commander-in-Chief and Staff.

(B.) Returns and statements of the Adjutant-General and Acting Quartermaster-General, of ordnance, ordnance stores, etc., from Jan. 14, 1868, to Jan. 1, 1869. These include report on distribution of arms, accoutrements, etc., of A. Q. M. G. Department; report of ordnance stores returned to United States; report of ordnance stores issued during the year 1868; report of ordnance, ordnance stores, etc., received in 1868; and report of ordnance, ordnance stores issued and remaining on hand at this date.

(C.) Statement of expenses of Adjutant-General and Acting Quartermaster-General's Department, paid by Adjutant-General.

(D.) Militia returns of 1868.

A very large portion of the expenses of the Quartermaster-General's Department were incurred in securing the arms, etc., belonging to the State, which had, prior to the war, and more particularly during and since the war, been scattered along our southern,

western and northwestern borders. A large number of the arms and many of the accoutrements, etc., were lost, stolen, or destroyed, or had been ruined by being stored in cellars and in damp store-houses, without any attention to their repair or care, during the last few years. Many individuals who had years since become responsible for the safe keeping or return of arms, had died—some of them in the service—and many had removed from the State. On some of the returned muskets I have expended, in accordance with law, a considerable amount, for their care and repair. I shall have to complete the collection, and after collection, I think it would be best to dispose of them by sale, public or private, reserving only two or three thousand stand of arms, of best patterns, with accoutrements, for an emergency. The demands of the Militia for arms, under the present law, will not be very extensive. The expenses for the first six months of 1869 in the Quartermaster-General's office will be considerable. They will dwindle down to a small sum in the last six months of 1869, unless some unexpected emergency arises.

GRAY UNIFORM OF SECOND AND THIRD IOWA INFANTRY.

On the 14th day of February, 1868, the following circular was issued by this department :

CIRCULAR.

STATE OF IOWA,

Des Moines, February 14, 1868. }

PAYMENT OF MONEY TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SECOND AND THIRD IOWA INFANTRY FOR THE "GRAY UNIFORMS."

The Eleventh General Assembly passed the following law :

AN ACT to provide for the refunding of certain moneys to the Second and Third Regiments of Iowa Infantry.

WHEREAS, In the year 1861, the State of Iowa furnished the second and third Regiments of Iowa Infantry Volunteers with a suit of gray uniform, which at the time it was received was understood by the members of said regiments to be a gift from the State; and,

WHEREAS, By an arrangement entered into between the General Government and the State of Iowa, many of the second, and a majority of the third regiments of Infantry paid for the said suit at the rate of \$14.25 each; and,

WHEREAS, Soon after said suit had been received, an order was promulgated by the War Department prohibiting the wearing of any uniform other than blue; and,

WHEREAS, By virtue of said order the gray uniform was abandoned, and entirely lost after having been worn about two months; Therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa*, That there be, and is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the refunding of any and all moneys deducted for said suit; *Provided*, that no payments shall be made under the provisions of this act, until the General Government refund to the State the amounts stopped against the pay of the said regiments for said clothing.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Adjutant-General to ascertain, by referring to the original rolls now on file in the office of the Paymaster-General of the U. S. A., the amount so deducted, and from whom; and that he be required to make out certificates for the amount deducted, as shown by said rolls, for all members of said regiments who shall thus be by him found entitled to the same; and if any member so entitled to said certificate be dead, the same shall be given to his widow if any; if there be no widow, then his child or children, if any.

SEC. 3. That the Auditor of State be and is hereby directed to issue warrants on the State Treasurer for the amounts as certified to by the Adjutant-General.

The Twelfth General Assembly has passed the following law:

AN ACT to amend Chapter 123 of the Laws of the Eleventh General Assembly relating to the "Gray Uniform," so called, which was furnished by the State to certain members of the 2d and 3d Iowa Infantry.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa, That the Adjutant-General of this State be directed to procure from the Paymaster-General, U. S. A., or from the Second Auditor of the Treasury of the United States, copies of all rolls that can be used as evidence in relation to the claims of said soldiers of the Second and Third Iowa Infantry for the "gray uniform," so called, and if said rolls, or the remarks thereon, are not satisfactory proofs to said Adjutant-General, he may take or cause to be taken, or direct to be furnished to him, the evidence of officers or soldiers in order to enable him to decide upon the validity of said claim or claims, and if sufficient evidence is taken and furnished to satisfy said Adjutant-General of the validity of said claim or claims, then the said Adjutant-General shall issue his certificate in the same manner as provided in said chapter, to which this is an amendment, and as in cases where full evidence existed on said rolls.*

SEC. 2 *In case any soldier of either of said regiments shall have been entitled to said certificate or shall have paid for said clothing and is now deceased, then said certificate for said amount shall be given to his widow, if any, and if there is no widow, to said soldier's child or children, and if said soldier died leaving no wife or child, then the said certificate shall be given to the next heir at law.*

SEC. 3. *This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Iowa State Register, Iowa Homestead and Iowa Statesman, newspapers published at Des Moines.*

To deliver the certificates provided for by law, this Department will require:

I. Proof of identity of claimant.

II. In case of the death of the soldier against whom stoppage was made for said "gray uniform," and a widow, child or children, or heir, shall claim the amount due, the following proof will be required:

(1.) If said soldier died in the service, evidence of death must be shown. This may be shown from records in the Department.

(2.) If the said soldier has died since his discharge from the service, satisfactory evidence of his death must be presented.

(3.) If the widow claims the amount, evidence must be presented that she is the widow of the deceased soldier.

(4.) If children claim the amount, evidence must be presented that they were the children of the deceased soldier, and that the mother is dead.

(5.) If other heirs claim the amount, evidence must be presented of their heirship to the deceased soldier, and that the widow is dead, or that the deceased soldier left no wife, as the case may be, and that he left no child or children.

III. If the rolls from the Paymaster-General's Department of the United States, or from 2d Auditor of Treasury of the United States, do not show that the stoppage was made for the "gray suit, evidence of two officers or soldiers will be required to show that the amount of the "gray suit" was stopped against the soldier making the claim. The statement of the two officers or soldiers must be sworn to.

Form of application of a soldier for amount of stoppage on account of "gray uniform" furnished members of the 2d and 3d Iowa Infantry and refunded under Laws of the Eleventh and Twelfth General Assemblies of Iowa.

I,, being duly sworn, on oath do state that I am the identical who was a in Company . . . in the Regiment Iowa Volunteer Infantry; that I was honorably discharged from the service on or about the . . . day of 186., and that I make this application for the purpose of obtaining the amount stopped against me on account of a certain gray suit furnished by the State of Iowa, which amount is directed to be refunded by Acts of Eleventh and Twelfth General Assemblies of the State of Iowa, and of is hereby constituted my attorney to prosecute this claim.

The State Auditor issues his warrant on the State Treasurer upon receipt of certificate from this Department, but requires the indorsement of the claimant, or evidence that the person presenting the certificate is entitled to the warrant, or properly authorized to indorse the certificate for the benefit of the claimant.

There is no necessity of appointing an attorney, if the claimant can draw up the papers in accordance with these forms, procure

the witnesses and have the application and certificate of witnesses sworn to before a notary public or justice of the peace. Then forward directly to the Adjutant-General, Des Moines, Iowa.

A guardian may make application for children.

Where the soldier was paid in hospital or "away from his regiment" and had stoppage made for the gray suit, let the facts be set forth.

State amount that was stopped. State the date at which such stoppage was made.

If it is alleged that the stoppage was made subsequent to October 31, 1861, state if any stoppage was made for any clothing on said October 31, 1861, payment or any payment prior to October 31, 1861.

Under the above named law for refunding certain sums to soldiers of the 2d and 3d Iowa Infantry, I have issued certificates as follows:

The General Assembly of this State has passed the following act:

CHAPTER 123.—AN ACT to provide for the adjustment of claims of members of the First Iowa Cavalry.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa, That the Adjutant-General shall examine into the claims of any members of the First Iowa Cavalry, for services and horses, prior to July 31, 1861; where said members have

not been paid by the State, or the United States, and whenever the Adjutant-General has had sufficient and satisfactory proof of any such claim, he shall cause to be made out regular officer's pay rolls for the officers, and regular company pay rolls for the privates and non-commissioned officers, and the same being receipted by the soldier, or, in case of his death, by his administrator, or executor, or his lawful heir or heirs, or should any of the heirs be minors, then by their guardian, the Adjutant-General shall issue his certificate therefor, directed to the State Auditor, and said Auditor, upon receipt thereof, properly indorsed by the owner of the certificate, shall draw his warrant upon the State Treasurer for the amount so certified by the Adjutant-General.

SEC. 2. In case any disbursing officer of the United States Government shall pay the amount due prior to July 31, 1861, to officers and soldiers of the First Iowa Cavalry, or in case payment shall be provided for the same by an act of the Congress of the United States previous to this act taking effect, then the Adjutant-General of this State shall take no action in relation to the payment of said officers and soldiers of said regiment as is provided for in this act.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication according to law.

Approved, April 7, 1868.

To facilitate the settlement of claims under this act, this department will endeavor first to procure from the Paymaster-General of the United States, or the second auditor of the treasury of the treasury of the United States, a list of all officers or soldiers who have been paid by the United States for services or commutations (for use of horse) prior to July 31, 1861,

The proof on each claim must be full and satisfactory to this department, that the officer or soldier actually rendered the service for which payment is claimed under this law of the State, and that the horse was in local or general rendezvous, and in use for the service for which the First Iowa Cavalry was raised, and during the period for which pay for use thereof is claimed. The mere ownership of a horse which was not in local or general rendezvous, will not entitle the claimant to commutation for use of horse.

The pay rolls, when completed, must either be signed by the officer or soldier in person, or by an attorney duly authorized to sign the soldier's name.

All applications and powers of attorney should be made in duplicate.

The law does not provide for commutation of rations or forage.

Officers will make out their applications in duplicate, varying the form of application so as not to include the claim for commutation for use of horse. The application of officers must be sworn to, and supported by two witnesses, as in case of privates. Officers will be furnished with blank officer's pay rolls, on application to this department. These pay-rolls must also be in duplicate.

In case of claim made in behalf of any heir of deceased officer or soldier, the relationship and heirship must be fully stated and proved, and if others, than the widow or children apply for the amount supposed to be due, it must be distinctly stated and proved that there is no widow or child. If children make the application, it must be distinctly stated and proved that there is no widow living.

An administrator, executor, or guardian making claims, must not only prove the claim, but must furnish satisfactory evidence of appointment as such administrator, executor, or guardian.

In all cases of application made in behalf of heirs, the proof of death of the officer or soldier must be complete.

On application of a single heir, the proof must be complete that the applicant is the sole heir.

Claimants will be compelled to wait patiently until the list of payments made to the First Cavalry are received from Washington, and until pay-rolls are properly prepared. The act does not have the effect of law until July 4, 1868.

This department is compelled to adhere to these rules, as upon compliance therewith depends, in a great measure, the subsequent collection from the United States of the amounts paid out by the State.

All claimants for pay as enlisted men in the First Iowa Cavalry under chapter 120 of the laws of the Twelfth General Assembly of the State of Iowa, are requested to amend their applications by stating the fact of their muster into the United States service and the date thereof. This can be done in the ninth line of the blank form already sent out, by inserting after the word "Cavalry," the words "and was mustered into the United States service on the...day of...1861."

All widows making application for the amount due under said laws must procure a certificate like the following, which must be signed by United States Judge, U. S. District Attorney, U. S. Commissioner, U. S. Register of Land Office, U. S. Receiver or Postmaster.

HON. SAMUEL MERRILL, GOVERNOR OF IOWA AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE MILITIA THEREOF :

Sir :—I have the honor to submit my report as Adjutant-General, and Inspector-General, and acting Quartermaster-General of the State. In the appendix accompanying will be found the following documents.

(A.) Roster of commander-in-chief, and staff.

(B.) Returns and statements of Adjutant-General, Acting Quartermaster-General, of ordnance, ordnance stores, etc., from January 1, 1869, to January 1, 1870. These include report on distribution of arms accoutrements, etc., of A. Q. M. G. department, report of ordnance stores issued during the year 1870, report of ordnance, ordnance stores, etc., received in 1869, statement of ordnance stores sold, lost, destroyed, and expended, and report of ordnance, and ordnance stores issued and remaining on hand at this date.

(C.) Statement of expenses of Adjutant-General and Acting Quartermaster-General's department for 1869.

(D.) Militia returns for 1869.

It will be seen by the reports of January 1, 1869, and report of January 1, 1870, that the expenses of the Adjutant-General and the Acting Quartermaster-General's department for 1868 amounted to \$7391.19, and that in 1869, these expenses were reduced to

\$1,525.09. The compensation to clerks in all branches of the Adjutant-General's office in 1868, amounted to \$2,804, and in 1869 this amount was reduced to \$1,830.

The expenses which have been incurred in the Quartermaster-General's department have been greatly increased in the collection and return of arms, accoutrements, etc., which were scattered over nearly all parts of the State, but more particularly along our southern, western, and north-western borders. It is hoped there will be no occasion for a repetition of these expenses. The lack of vitality in our present militia system would indicate that no great amount of expenditure would be needed in the distribution, care, or repair of arms. I have filed vouchers with the Auditor of State for all these expenses, in accordance with the laws of the State. It might be proper to add here, that these expenses include the postage and fuel account of the Adjutant-General's and Quartermaster-General's departments.

GRAY UNIFORM OF SECOND AND THIRD IOWA INFANTRY.

Under chapter 123 of the laws of the Eleventh General Assembly, (1866), and under the amendment thereto made by chapter 8 of the laws of the Twelfth General assembly, (1868), certificates have been issued during the year 1869 as follows:

To members of the Second Iowa Infantry or their heirs, 49 certificates, amounting to.....	\$ 688.94

It may be a question for the General Assembly to decide whether or not a further appropriation may not be necessary to meet a possible demand upon this fund. That there are many soldiers or their heirs entitled to an allowance out of this fund, I know. It is no more than simple justice that these soldiers should be paid the amount provided for, and it is certain if all who are entitled to it demand the same, that the balance of \$1,435.99, will not pay all of them.

FIRST IOWA CAVALRY CLAIMS.

Under the provisions of chapter 120, laws of the Twelfth General Assembly, I have issued certificates to officers and men of the First Iowa Cavalry, during the year 1869, as follows:

UNSERVICEABLE ORDNANCE, STORES, ETC., SOLD.

During the past year I have sold several lots of unserviceable ordnance stores and rendered an account thereof to the State, and paid the balance above expenses into the State Treasury. The amount thus paid over during the past year is \$2,081.15, for which I have the State Treasurer's receipts. In the table of "Distribution of arms, etc.," there are many arms and accoutrements enumerated which are undoubtedly lost, stolen, destroyed, or carried out of the State, and nearly all the cartridges therein named are expended.

The general government is indebted to this State in the sum of \$31,425.07 in arms, etc., and I deem it the best policy to keep them in the care of the United States.

APPROPRIATIONS FOR STATE ARSENAL ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S OFFICE.

Under chapter 102 of the laws of the Twelfth General Assembly the sum of \$9,500.00 was appropriated to be expended under direction of the Adjutant-General for grading and improving grounds around the Adjutant-General's office, for covering the areas with stone or iron, for iron furniture, for fence, and for a workshop. I filed my bond as provided for by law, and made the expenditures on improvements of the grounds, in covering the areas, and building the fence, but after some expense on the iron furniture and the workshop, I concluded that the appropriation for iron furniture could only partially effect the intent of the General Assembly, and I found by the sale of unserviceable ordnance stores, I could stop a large expenditure and obviate the necessity of a workshop. I therefore made report of my expenditures, with vouchers, to the Auditor of State in accordance with law, and returned to the State Treasury the sum of \$6,665.23.

THE MILITIA.

I have seen no occasion to change my opinion of the militia and the militia law of this State, as expressed in my report of January 1st, 1867, and in my report of January 14th, 1868, to the Governor of the State. I repeat, with some slight modification, what I then stated. The present militia law is almost a dead letter so far as any active militia is concerned. The activity and energy of those who labored for its organization during the war, has almost entirely disappeared, and this department has not the satisfaction of even receiving the returns which the law requires from the county officers, and is therefore compelled in endeavoring to comply with the requirements of the laws of this State and of the United States, to make a very imperfect and unsatisfactory return to the Governor of this State and to the War Department.—[See Report of 1867.]

We certainly ought to have in the State a few well organized and well drilled 'active' militia companies. They may be required in an emergency, and would serve as a nucleus around which volunteers could rally in case of a 'call' for them. Such companies we can not have under the present law. If the people of this State want a small militia organization only, that can not be had unless the law is made more stringent in its provisions, and unless officers and soldiers are properly paid for their service.—[See Report of 1867.]

If a regiment could be organized in each Congressional District, with companies judiciously scattered over the limits of each district, under laws which compelled company-drills for a sufficient number of days that would make the members of the organization skilled in the handling of arms and proficient in company movements, and a regimental muster once in each year for regimental-drill and evolutions, we should soon find organizations of which we should be proud, emulation for superiority in the qualities that would make good soldiers, a body of men ready to move effectually and promptly when an emergency demanded, and as before stated

in relation to well-drilled companies, the nucleus around which volunteers could rally in case of greatest dangers to the State or nation, and instructors who could educate the new recruits for new regiments.

To do this, the companies should be compelled to drill at least ten days in each year, and the regimental muster should continue at least three days. The officers should be selected from our experienced veterans of the late war, and officers and soldiers should be armed and equipped by the State, and should be well paid for their time and services. A tax of one dollar on each voter in the State would pay all the expenses of such organizations, provided the minimum of the companies was fixed at a low rate.

It is useless to urge upon a portion of the people of this State the importance of maintaining an active and efficient militia, and ask them to expend ten or fifteen days each year in that service without compensation. If the State requires a thoroughly drilled respectable, and efficient militia, it can, in my opinion, only be obtained by proper compensation to the members who compose the organizations. It has been hoped that Congress would have acted in this matter long since, under the provision of the United States Constitution "to provide for organizing, arming, and discipling the militia;" but as the remembrance of our late great danger is gradually becoming only mere history, and no warning to a large number of our people, there is a strong probability that we shall hear no more from Congress until some other danger threatens, and we find ourselves almost as unprepared to act as many of the States were at the beginning of the rebellion—without arms, without equipments, without organizations, and without discipline.

Some will object to the plan I have proposed, on account of its expense, but it is the opinion of many statesmen and soldiers, that if the State militia had been properly organized at the North at the commencement of the rebellion, and larger forces, properly drilled and efficiently armed, and under the command of good officers, could have been moved to the front without such delay as did occur, the rebellion would have been crushed in a very short period, and immense sums of money and rivers of blood would have been saved the nation.—[See Report of 1868.]

I know that some will urge against any militia organization, that we have veteran officers and soldiers among us who would be ready, in an emergency, to organize, drill, and prepare for the field, volunteers who might be called for. There is where a great mistake would be found. The tactics have changed, rules and regulations have been altered, and one of our veteran officers or soldiers would have now about as much to learn as many did at the commencement of the late rebellion. Besides the lack of knowledge, the need of practice would be evident, if we "called for" volunteers to-day, among the best of the veterans which Iowa ever furnished. We could furnish as good and brave men as ever faced an enemy, but drill and discipline and practice would be wanting.

The principal business of the Adjutant-General's office proper during the past year has been like several preceding ones, answering the inquiries of officials and late officers and soldiers of the volunteer service, or their representatives, or heirs, or their agents, relative to enlistment, muster, credit, discharge, absences, etc., of soldiers. There has also been a great demand for certificates of service, where discharges have been lost. A large portion of one clerk's time has been occupied in entering on the rosters the location of the graves of the dead of Iowa regiments who have been re-interred in national cemeteries. This has required an examination of about five thousand printed pages furnished by the United States.

Some of the correspondence and records of this Department made at an early stage of the late war should be copied, in order that they may be preserved. Many of the rosters of regiments should either be re-copied or re-bound. The constant use of some of the volumes for eight or nine years has much worn the binding and considerably defaced the record.
