BIENNIAL REPORT.

STATE OF IOWA, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, DES MOINES, June 30, 1883.

His Excellency, Buren R. Sherman, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

Sir-I have the honor to submit my report for the biennial period ending June 30, 1883, with accompanying papers.

ORGANIZATION.

The organization of the Guard has not changed since my last report. It still consists of forty-six companies; forming two brigades, of three regiments each. I would not recommend any increase except the addition of two companies to the first regiment, Col. Beeson's.

There is now, however, an urgent necessity for authority to replace with new organizations companies that fall below the proper standard of efficiency. The law that prohibits this was needed when it was enacted; because it was the only way open to reduce the force, and reduction had to be accomplished before the Guard could have a creditable existence. Iowa was among the first states to abandon artillery and cavalry and to reduce its infantry so that the State could support it. Almost all the older states have adopted the same policy; and the disposition to decrease the numbers and increase the efficiency is now everywhere evident. The present law has worked the reduction its framers contemplated; and now that this is done, there no longer exists the need of the provision preventing the acceptance of a new company that is good, in place of an old one that is bad. Notwithstanding the law against new companies, as the Guards have steadily improved, and continued to grow in favor, applications to form them have been received at the rate of one each week.

Therefore, if the provision above suggested is made, it must be hedged about with such guards and checks as will guarantee to the State the admission of companies organized by men who understand the nature of their obligation when they take it, and who are willing and competent to perform it. No new company should be organized at a town that is not certainly able to maintain it, nor should a company be accepted until it uniforms itself, is provided with an armory, and presents the requisite number of men both morally and physically up to the standard that Iowa is making her Guard.

Our companies have usually about forty active members. They can, under the present law, be increased to sixty-four, and the addition of that number of recruits would not long effect the efficiency of the force; thus while the State maintains but about twenty-three hundred men, should it demand it, it could, almost immediately and without legislation, have the service of thirty-three hundred.

ENCAMPMENTS.

The First Brigade, General Lyman Banks commanding, camped at Muscatine, from July 3d to 8th, 1882, and the Second Brigade, General C. S. Bentley commanding, camped at Waterloo, June 19th to 24th, 1882. These cities were selected on account of their being favorably located for concentrating the commands, and by reason of the liberality of their citizens in offering prizes for the best drilled companies, and contributing toward the incidental expenses of the camps.

The daily routine of duty by each brigade was about as follows: Reveille, 6:00 A. M.; Breakfast, 6:30 A. M.; Surgeon's call, 7:30 A. M.; Guard Mounting, 8:00 A. M.; Company Drill, 8:30 A. M.; Dinner, 12:00 M.; Battalion Drill, 2:00 P. M.; Supper, 6:00 P. M.; Dress Parade, 6:30 P. M.; Retreat, 8.00 P. M.; Tattoo, 9:00 P. M.; Taps, 9:30 P. M.

Your presence one day in each camp, and your review of the troops, gave substantial encouragement to the men, and afforded you the opportunity to judge of their drill, discipline and other soldierly requirements.

The total expenses of these camps were \$8,978.83, \$3,438.56 of which was for transportation, and \$3,565.18 for subsistence in camp; the remainder being for subsistence en route, camp equipage, etc., as itemized in the table of disbursements attached to this report.

The aggregate attendance of both brigades was one thousand seven hundred and five men, thus making the total cost per man \$5.26, and

the cost for subsistence \$2.09, or forty-two cents per day for each man. In this connection, I beg to call your careful attention to a comparison with the expenses of the New York encampments being held about the same time:

It is proper to state that New York, like Massachusetts and many other states, pays her men for their time in camp, and that \$22,400.96 of the amount of total expenses was for this purpose. Also, that three of her regiments were in camp six days, two seven and one eight, and that our camps were for but five days.

The good fortune of our Guard in having had no changes in the commanding officers of brigades or regiments, contributed largely to the valuable instruction and general success of the encampments. These officers, all of whom were in active service during the war, and none of whom have been officers in the National Guard for less than five years, nor in their present grades less than two years; have acquired such a fund of military information as to make their services almost invaluable.

Of course the encampments of '82 could have been better, but not without a greater expenditure of money. I can find no record of any state even attempting to camp so many men with so little money.

There is a very general feeling that there should be some compensation for the time spent in camp. Many young men working on salaries lose their time while on this duty, and feel that if they meet all the other requirements, that for this the greatest draught on their time, they should have some pay. In no way could discipline be more improved than by giving some pay for this service, even though it be but little. A system of graduation has features to recommend it.

A man who has been at camp twice is worth more to the State than one who has been there but once. For the first encampment pay-

ment for the men might be fixed at fifty cents per day; for the second, one dollar; for the third, one dollar and fifty cents; for the fourth, two dollars, and for the fifth—the last term of enlistment—two dollars and fifty cents.

For the officers a similar scale might be adopted, based on the pay of the United States Army.

I am not sure but that it would be a matter of economy for the State to secure two permanent camping-grounds, one in the south part and one in the north part of the State. The cost, if anything, would be nominal.

A few of the advantages would be some cheap buildings that seem almost a necessity, a certain supply of pure water, plenty of fuel, and a drill-ground that we could be sure of having in good order.

I also incline to the opinion that at least one camp composed only of commissioned and non-commissioned officers would be a good thing for the Guard. There is a need of more thoroughness in the setting up of the soldier, in the performance of Guard duty, military courtesy, discipline, and the more primary features of military training.

A skeleton camp of this character, with some army officers and drill sergeants in it, would certainly be beneficial.

Regular troops being so near us, a small attachment of enlisted men might also be secured as models.

UNIFORMS.

The present system of an annual allowance for uniforms, like some other features of our law, was a necessity when it was enacted; but the State should now issue uniforms in kind. The present uniforms were secured by the expensive method of company officers, banks, or the clothing dealer furnishing the money and waiting for pay till the annual allowance was drawn from the State.

The allowance was thus pledged in advance, and now the final payments are being made on the uniforms purchased three years ago, which being generally of a poor grade, are nearly worn out, and the companies will have to again seek long credit, for which they must pay dearly; or the State, instead of individuals or banks, must become their creditor, taking their allowance and furnishing the clothing. By adopting the rigid methods of the Quartermaster's Department of the United States Army, the State can purchase uniforms that will last six years at about the same price that companies or individuals can get such as will last scarcely three years.

ORDNANCE.

Our companies all have the breech-loading Springfield rifle, and they are usually in good condition. I am now trying to arrange for repairs to supply parts that have been broken, worn out or lost.

The State has on hand some old muzzle-loading Enfield muskets and equipments, that it will never again use. I would earnestly recommend that they be donated to the Grand Army of the Republic of Iowa. Each post needs a stack of arms for purposes of ceremony, and it is eminently fitting that these guns be given to the veterans, for who among them that has ever used one of the old guns in war would, for post purposes, exchange it for the most improved modern arm.

ARMORIES.

The allowance for Armory rent, fifty dollars a year, is insufficient. There is not a town in the State where a suitable drill-room can be had for that money. Some companies take poor, cramped quarters and pay only their fifty dollars, but most of them add from their company treasury; some taking leases as high as five hundred dollars a year.

TARGET PRACTICE.

Considerable attention has been given to target practice, and many good marksman have been developed; but we have primary needs of a more important character that must be met before we can expend much of our present appropriation in this direction.

BATTLE FLAGS.

Since my last report, three old flags have been sent to the arsenal: one of the Seventeenth Iowa Infantry, by Colonel D. B. Hillis, of Keokuk, one of the Third Iowa Infantry, from Indianola, and one of the Third Iowa Infantry, by Mrs. Laura J. Pickett, of Saint Louis, Missouri.

The following correspondence was had in regard to the one last named:

St. Louis, Mo., July 28, 1883.

To the Adjutant-General, State of Iowa, Des Moines, Iowa:

DEAR SIR—In overhauling some old articles a few days ago, we discovered an old battle scarred-flag of the Third Iowa, captured by General Pat Cleburne before Atlanta, Georgia, and by him given to my sister, who was then

living in Georgia. It was folded, put away as a relic of the war, and forgotten until resurrected a few days ago. If the Third Iowa [still exists and would like to have this flag, that so plainly shows how gallantly its bearer carried it, my sister will be glad to send it to the Regiment.

DEAR SIR—Your favor of 2d instant is received, and I send you to-day, by the United States Express, the flag.

This flag was captured I think about the 24th of July, 1864, near Atlanta, Georgia. I was at the time a Major of Cavalry and on the staff of General Jos. E. Johnston, where I remained until I was surrendered by him in North Carolina. When General Johnston was relieved of the command of the Army I remained with him, and had nothing to do with the engagement that this flag figured in, as General Hood was in command. My sister, now Mrs. Laura J. Pickett, then Miss Laura J. Massengale, was living near Columbia, Georgia, on my father's plantation, and was on a visit to my family whom I had quartered temporarily near Atlanta, Georgia. General Pat Cleburne was a very warm friend of our family and particularly so of my sister Laura. He took this flag during the engagement referred to, and presented it to her the next day as a relic of the war. She put it away in a cedar chest and lost sight of it until a few days ago, when she accidentally discovered it. I regret it was not found long ago, for it would have been then returned promptly to its owner. My sister has written to two or three

friends, who were officers in the same engagement, and if any more facts can be had we will send them to you.

MADAM-I acknowledge receipt of your favor of 6th instant, in which you say: "General Pat Cleburne presented me, through you, a captured United States flag, Third Iowa," and request that I will give you the incidents connected with its capture. In reply I would say that nineteen years of active life have somewhat effaced the details of events occurring in 1864, when for once, at least, the "sword" was deemed "mightier than the pen" or at any rate the use of the former was found to me more necessary, as General Sherman gave us but little opportunity for employing the latter, hence General Cleburne did not find time to make a report of his operations covering the battles of 20th, 21st and 22d July of that year. But for a fortunate circumstance I would have to depend upon my memory. This flag was captured by the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth (consolidated) Texas dismounted cavalry, of Cleburne's division, on 22d July, 1864, and I find among the papers of my Adjutant's office, the original official report of Major W. A. Taylor, who commanded this Regiment, in that engagement. It was dated "near Atlanta, July 29th, 1884," and is as follows: * * * " The regiment, now almost became a skirmish line, continued forward, passing over a small stream and deep ravine, close to and under the breast works of the enemy, which was their third line, capturing the battle and State flags of the Third Iowa Infantry." This gallant officer (Major Taylor) is now a resident of Texas, but I am unable to give his address, which is to be regretted, from the fact that he could no doubt supply all the information you seek.

That the flag was not lightly obtained, will not be questioned by any one at all familiar with the history of the Third Iowa, which was organized, over nine hundred strong, in June, 1861, and shared, always with distinction, in the campaigns of Shiloh, Corinth, Vicksburg, Jackson, Meridian and Atlanta, where on the 22d of July (to quote from Ingersoll's Iowa and

the Rebellion, pages 73 and 74), "it literally fought itself out of existence,

* * and thus on the field made sacred by the blood of McPherson,
and thousands of others less distinguished, but no less patriotic, the Third
Iowa passed out of being. The remaining members of the organization,
were subsequently consolidated with the Second Iowa Infantry."

As a representative of the staff of Cleburne's division, I beg to be permitted to express my thanks for, and gratification at, your graceful action, in returning this flag to the remnant of these brave men, who so worthily upheld its honor, and relinquished in no wise the trust reposed in them, by the surrender of its colors, which was made only after the almost annihilation of the command.

REVISED ARMY REGULATIONS.

Through the kindness of the War Department and the especial interest of General R. C. Drum, Adjutant-General United States Army, who is always ready to help the militia, every company is supplied with a copy of the Revised Army Regulations.

INSPECTIONS.

Our funds have not permitted any inspection beyond what could be made in camp. In addition to these, there should be a rigid annual inspection at the company armories, and such recognition given this department as will place it on a good footing, and permit its officers to do the good work they are willing and competent to do.

REGULATIONS, BOOKS AND TACTICS.

The State should provide Regulations setting forth its requirements in detail, so that the same discipline and military usages may obtain in each command, thereby [securing uniformity that is now lacking. To further insure these results, there should be supplied complete sets of company books, with a system of forms that would at all times set forth the condition of the company and the State property in its possession. In addition to the other burdens imposed on officers and men they must buy the tactics they use. This should not be. If they give the time necessary to study the tactics, the State can well afford to furnish the money to buy them.

EXPENSES OF THE MILITIA.

Our annual expenditures are chiefly in three directions: Clothing allowance about \$8,500.00; encampments, \$9,000.00, and armory rents, \$1,480.00. As either the clothing allowance or encampment expenses are liable any year to go \$1,000 above the amounts given, there is practically nothing left for inspections, company books, boards of examination or any other purpose named in the law.

PRESENT ADDRESS OF EX-OFFICERS OF IOWA REGIMENTS.

I desire to again urge some action on this subject. Certainly if the true friends of the soldiers knew that such real benefits could be conferred at so little cost, they would not hesitate to aid this project. I quote from my last report:

"Inquiries as to the whereabouts of ex-officers of Iowa regiments during the war of the rebellion, do not seem to decrease, while the difficulties in finding these officers have each year materially increased. These inquires come mainly from the departments at Washington and from soldiers in search of evidence in various claims, and involve such extensive interests that I am persuaded the State could, in no way render such valuable service to its war veterans, as to cause to be prepared and published, a complete list of ex-officers of Iowa regiment now living; with their present address, and an appendix containing the names of such as have died since the war. This latter is necessary for the reason that in a claim where the evidence of an officer is material, and his death is established, other testimony may be introduced that would not be admissible, provided the officer was living. This book should be placed on file in the departments at Washington, and in the office of every county auditor in the State, and should be furnished every living officer whose name it contains, on condition that he report to this office any change of his residence. I am aware that it will take much time and labor to collect the necessary data for this work, but think that through the Iowa National Guard, county officers and soldiers known to this office who will readily appreciate the value of it to the many poor veterans who are now spending money and time in search of their officers, it can be accomplished; and the book published with comparatively no expense to the State, except the bare cost of publication."

ENROLLMENT.

The law on this subject might be so modified as to require county auditors to make annual reports only of the *number* of militia enrolled, and report the *names* when the Governor so orders.

OFFICIAL BUSINESS.

There is no decrease in application for information from the war records. They come from the departments at Washington, and from soldiers and their heirs. They can be classified as follows: Applications for certificates of service, for the dates of enlistment and discharge, for description of soldiers, names and residence of officers, for accounts of pay and bounty, for evidence of disease contracted in the service, for copies of commissions, for county or township to which enlistment is credited, and various other matters growing out of the war.

The above information is generally sought to use in pension and other claims against the government and in taking soldier's homesteads.

TIME OF MAKING REPORT.

The Nineteenth General Assembly changed the time of making biennial reports of several offices from October 1st to June 30th. Among those so changed the report of this office was inadvertantly included. For many reasons it is desirable that the time should be again fixed at October 1st, thereby permitting a report of the encampments for the year and the expenditures connected therewith, as well as other matters of importance.

SIGNAL CORPS.

Captain J. R. Lincoln, Company A, First Regiment, has drilled a detachment of his men in signals, and has given the matter such thorough attention as to have organized, entirely without State aid, a signal corps that would be a credit to any State. The members of this corps deserve great credit for so industriously studying this branch of the service when it is not even recognized by the Military Code.

CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS.

Michigan has a law permitting the enrollment of not more than one hundred and fifty contributing members in each company. It provides that they shall pay into the company treasury ten dollars as annual dues, and in return be exempt from jury duty and poll tax, in the same manner that active members of a company are now exempt. I feel sure that this would be a good law for Iowa.

CONCLUSION.

Briefly stating our greatest needs they are: first, a uniform, and pay for time at encampments; second, permission to organize two new companies, and to disband inefficient ones and organize new ones in their stead; third, an appropriation that will permit inspections, the preparation of a code of regulations, the issuing of company books and tactics, increased amount of armory rent, a more liberal expenditure at encampments, and that will relieve the officers and men of the continual expense to which they are now subjected.

I think I speak within bounds when I say the companies spend as much money to maintain themselves as the State spends to maintain them.

IV. The companies of the First Brigade will, with the exception of those stationed at Greenfield and Mt. Ayr, leave for encampment on evening and night trains of July 2d, the hours of departure of which will be hereafter designated.

V. Company commanders will report by letter direct to this office, the number of men for which they will require transportation, when requisitions therefor will be immediately forwarded. The company commanders of the Second Brigade will make this report on the receipt of this order, and those of the First Brigade, will make it so that it may reach here not later than June 24th.

VI. Company commanders will see that no enlistments are made of recruits whose desire is simply to attend the encampments, and who do not wish to do that for any of the purposes for which encampments are ordered.

Caution in this direction would not be so urgent if every man met the penalty of his own acts, but as the misconduct of any one wearing the State uniform falls in some measure upon the entire Guard, the men who stand by their companies during the entire year, doing their duty and having a soldierly pride in doing it, must have the protection above indicated.

VII. The kindly interest manifested by the citizens of Muscatine and East Waterloo, in offering liberal prizes, and giving material assistance in the preparation of camps, should have earnest recognition by all officers and men of the command, whenever opportunity is presented.
