REPORT OF FIRST DISTRICT.

The First district is located in the southern part of the state, taking in most of the second southern tier of counties. The largest coal producing counties are as follows: Monroe, Appanoose, Wapello, Wayne and Lucas. There has been quite an increased output of coal during the biennial period ending June 30, 1899, especially the last half of our biennial period. The most of the mines have given their men steadier work than for several years previous, and from the outlook the indication is a continuation of good work and better prices throughout the district.

There have been several strikes, locally, within the district during the past two years, but at present things are quiet, and all places settled and working steady. There is considerable prospecting being done in this district and quite a number of large mines being opened up and equipped. There occurred quite an extensive fire at Foster in the Deep Vein Coal company's mine, which burned their top works and the majority of the timber in the shaft, also about twenty head of mules which were in the mine stable below at the time of the fire, which occurred during the night, February 11, 1898. Also, a fire occurred at Centerville Block Coal company's mine No. 2, at Numa, where the top works were all burned. At Seymour there was a fire which burned the Chicago Coal company's top works of mine No. 1.

There were sixteen new mines opened and six abandoned in this district during the past two years.

The following new mines have been opened in the last two years in the First district: Klondike Coal company's, located at Mystic; Hocking Coal company's, two miles west of Cincinnati, at Centerville; the Dewey Coal company's, the White Oak Coal company's; two miles southwest of Albia, at Hocking Valley, the Hocking Coal company's; at and near Hynes City, the Smoky Hollow Coal company's two new mines, Nos. 4 and 5; the Star Coal company's, near Albia; the Lewisville Coal company's, west of Albia, near Tower 310; and at Lucas, the Whitebreast and the Wild Rose; the Lumsden Coal company's No. B; Excelsior Coal company's; Thomas Binks & Sons'; Sullivan Bros.'; Chapman Coal company's, and Parker Coal company's. The mines abandoned are Whitebreast Fuel company's No. 10, at Chrisholm; Smoky Hollow Coal company's, at Hynes, Nos. 2 and 3; Phillips Fuel company's No. 3; Lumsden Coal company's No. 1, and Swede Valley Coal company's.

There have been thirty-two sets of scales tested during the two years just ending, nine of which were found to weigh correctly and twenty-one set were found incorrect. They were adjusted and found weighing correctly when again visited.

MONROE COUNTY.

Monroe county has long been known as one among the largest coal-prcducers in the First district. Having good railway facilities, the operators located in this county are enabled to ship coal to the far west and northwest over the C., B. & Q. railway and north over the Iowa Central railway. The largest coal-producing mines in this county are controlled by the Wapello Coal company, being its mines Nos. 1 and 2, located at Hiteman on a switch from the C., B. & Q. railway, about five miles from Albia. This company gives employment to about 550 men. The next largest mine is owned by the Smoky Hollow Coal company, and located about three miles from Avery. This company has its own line of railway from Avery up to Hines, where its mines Nos. 1, 4 and 5 are located. The company has its own engine to haul the product to the C., B. & Q. railway's main line. It employs about 450 men. Next would be the Hocking Coal company's mine, which has been in operation about one year. This mine is located on a switch from the Iowa Central railway, three miles south of Albia, and is one of the best equipped mines in the district, giving employment to 125 men. The Deep Vein Coal company has a mine located on the C., M. & St. P. railway at Foster, giving employment to 200 men. The Central Coal company has a slope located at Lockman, on the Iowa Central railway. This mine has been in operation about three and one-half years. The company has 100 employes. The Diamond Coal company's mine No. 2 is located at Hickory. Its No. 1 mine, which is the larger, is located at Coalfield; both mines loading their product on switches from the Iowa Central railway.

APPANOOSE COUNTY.

Appancose county lies along the southern part of the state, touching the Missouri line. The coal in this county lies very regular, being about two and one-half feet in thickness and of a good quality. Most of the mines are worked on the longwall system or something similar. There are more mines in this county than in any other in the state. Coal being near the surface in most places makes it quite an inducement to open mines, there being also, as a rule, very good top and bottom.

Among the largest coal companies in this county are the Centerville Block Coal company, which has ten mines in operation, located on the various railways throughout the county. Its general office is at Centerville. The Whitebreast Fuel company has its mine No. 19 located at Forbush on the Iowa Central railway. The Star Coal company's mine is located on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, at Rathbun. The Big Joe Coal company has a mine at Gladstone, on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway. The Anchor Coal company has three mines. No. 1 is located on the Keckuk & Western railway; Nos. 2 and 3 are located on the Chicago.

Rock Island & Pacific railway, near Centerville, at which place is the company's general office. The balance of the mines of this county are located within a radius of two miles of Mystic. There are also quite a number of mines around Cincinnati, and in other parts of the county.

WAPELLO COUNTY.

Wapello county has long been known as a coal producer. During the year 1898 the output was 236,100 tons. During the year ending June 30, 1899, there were produced 291,300 tons, being an increase of 55,200 tons over the first year of our biennial period. The largest companies in this county are as follows: The Whitebreast Fuel company, which has its mine No. 22 at Keb, located on a branch road connected with the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railway, employs at this mine about 200 men. The Phillips Fuel company's mine No. 4, which employs about 100 men all told, is located four miles northeast of Ottumwa, on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway. There are several large local mines within a radius of three miles of Ottumwa, some of them working as many as fifty men during the winter or cold weather season.

WAYNE COUNTY.

Wayne county has two shipping or railway mines. The Chicago Coal company's mine is located on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, at Seymour. The Seymour Coal company has a mine located on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railway, near Seymour. There are six local mines situated in the different parts of the county, most of them within a radius of two miles of Confidence.

LUCAS COUNTY.

Lucas county was, some years ago, among the largest coal producing counties in the First district, but in the past few years there has been but one shipping mine in the county. During the biennial period, however, there has been considerable prospecting done throughout the county. Among the companies drilling were the Whitebrasat Fuel company and the Wild Rose Coal company, which have both located near Lucas. The Whitebreast Foel company is putting in a steel tower and top works, being the only steel tower in the state. The Wild Rose Coal company is also putting in a modern, improved mine. There seemed to be a large pocket of coal around Lucas. There are several local mines also in this county.

ADAMS, PAGE AND TAYLOR COUNTIES.

Adams, Page and Taylor counties lie in the southwestern part of the state. While the coal is thin, being only sixteen to twenty inches in thick-

ness, it is of very good quality, and generally not very deep. There are two shipping mines in Taylor county. With this exception the rest of the mines in these counties are local mines and have plenty of trade in win'er, also during the summer season, if located near brickyards or any public works. Owing to competition from larger mines, coal sells for \$2 per ton at the mines.

WARREN COUNTY.

Warren county lies south of Polk. There are two shipping mines in this county that do a very nice business during the winter season. There are also several local mine; some of them being in operation for a number of years. The shipping mines are located near Summerset and are owned by the I and & Mining company of Des Moines; the others are owned by Summerset men.

DAVIS COUNTY.

Davis county lies near the center of the coal belt running northwest and southeast, being joined by several good coal producing counties which produce a large amount of coal. Yet the county has never been a very large coal producer: but the change in railways throughout this county may be the means of increasing the output of coal to quite a large extent. The present location of the mines in this county is near Eldon, the same being all local mines which deliver a great portion of their product to Eldon, selling the balance at the mines.
