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REPORT.

STATE OF IOWA, AUDITOR'S OFFICE, DES MOINES, Nov. 4th, 1867.

To the General Assembly of the State of Iorea:

In compliance with the laws of the State, I have the honor to submit herewith the following report of the business transacted in the office of Auditor of State, beginning Nov. 6th, 1865, and ending Nov. 2d, 1867, both days inclusive:

The balance remaining in the Treasury, at the close of the fiscal year Nov. 4th, 1865, was \$47,236.62.

There was received into the Treasury during the past two years, including the above balance on hand, \$1,412,395.19, and the disbursements by the Treasurer during the same period amounted to \$1,314.654.74, leaving in the Treasury Nov. 2d, 1867, \$97,740.45.

I would (as in former Report) estimate the interest on delinquent taxes, additional assessments, amount from Peddlers' licenses, and the sale of laws, equal to interest on Auditor's warrants, unavailable taxes and erroneous assessments, and consequently have made no reduction for any of last named items. The Bonds of 1858, \$200,000, due January 1, 1868, are provided for. The State Treasurer has already paid \$114,000, and the balance will be

promptly redeemed when presented. The equalized valuation of real and personal property in 1865 was \$215,063,101; this year it is \$256,517,184, showing an increase of \$41,453,783. An extra levy of 1½ mills would more than pay our entire State indebtedness, except the amount due the Permanent School Fund, and this indebtedness can only be considered as a debt due from one fund to another. We have not a single outstanding warrant that is drawing interest.

MOTH.-REMARKS AND SUGGESTIONS.

ARREST OF FUGITIVES.

The expenses attending the arrest of fugitives from justice is now made payable out of the General Contingent Fund. This, I think, should not be so, for the reason that these expenses may absorb a large portion of the Fund that is created for the purpose of paying for necessary repairs and improvements upon State House and grounds, for postage, fuel, lights and all necessary expenses not specifically provided for. The expense incurred in arresting a single fugitive from justice a short time since amounted to nearly \$1,000. These arrests are frequent, and the expenses for the same cannot be estimated very well for the next two years. Permit me to call your attention to our present laws in regard to arresting fugitives. They require amending in several respects, particularly in regard to the expenses incurred. In issuing a requisition for a fugitive from justice the Governor should have authority in certain cases to make the parties procuring the requisition bear the expense of the arrest and return of the fagitive. This power is frequently used to force debtors into this State in order to collect money from them, and in such cases I think the parties benefited should pay the cost.

I would suggest that the law be so amended as to give the Governor some discretionary power in regard to the expenses in such cases; and at the same time let the law provide for the payment of expenses without the necessity of future and special appropriations for this purpose.

CLAIMS OF SECOND AND THIRD IOWA INFANTRY VOLUNTEERS FOR AMOUNT PAID FOR GREY UNIFORMS.

Chapter 123, acts of Eleventh General Assembly, makes an appropriation to refund to the soldiers of the second and third infantry regiments \$14.25 each, the amount paid by them for grey uniforms. The Adjutant General issued his certificate to all applying, that were entitled to the same, certifying that the soldier named therein was entitled to receive from the State of Iowa the above amount.

I have considered it my duty to refuse payment on these certificates on account of the following provision contained in the same section of the law making the appropriation, viz.: "Provided that no payments shall be made under the provisions of this Act until the General Government refund to the State the amounts stopped against the pay of said regiments for said clothing."

The claim of the State against the General Government for this clothing has been returned endorsed "suspended," consequently the U. S. Government has not "refunded to the State the amount stopped against the pay of said regiments for said clothing."

I would suggest that this last provision of Sec. 1, of Chap. 123, be repealed. It will require only about \$13,500 to pay these certificates. The State of Iowa is able to pay these brave men this small pittance, on demand, and wait on the General Government for the amount, much better than the soldier can afford to wait for the adjustment of our claims against the General Government.

IOWA SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME,

Chapter 92, Acts of 11th General Assembly, appropriates eight and one-third dollars per month for each orphan supported at the "Home." We have drawn warrants on the State Treasury for the support of the Orphans' Home amounting to......\$101,864.58

I would suggest that Section 8 should be so amended as to have the tax raised for the Orphans' Home merged into the General Revenue, and appropriate the necessary amount for the support of the Orphans' Home and Trustees' mileage, to be drawn from the last named fund.

COUNTY AUDITOR.

The District Clerk is ex-officio Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, and in counties that have a population exceeding five thousand his duties are entirely too ardnous. As an apology for not making to this Office the reports required by law, we frequently receive such letters as these from the District Clerks: "District

Court will soon be in session, and I have so much to do to get ready for it that it will be impossible for me to attend to making out the reports due your Office until some time after Court adjourns;" or "District Court is coming on, and I have the Tax List to make out, and cannot possibly attend to looking up the discrepancy in our School Fund account;" or "our School Fund accounts are so tangled up that I cannot possibly take time to correct them. My time is so taken up with other matters, that the Board of Supervisors will have to appoint some person to straighten out this account." I do not find fault with the Clerks, but I do find fault with the system that overtasks them.

If we had County Auditors, to relieve our District Clerks of the duties now imposed upon them as Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, I am confident our County and State accounts would be kept more correctly, and the reports due from County to State offices would be received in time to present to the Legislature. As it now is, it is impossible to get the necessary reports from county officers in time, and many of them are necessarily prepared so hastily that they are not at all reliable. Create the office of County Auditor and this serious difficulty will be swept away. The County Auditor could act as Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, have charge of the School Fund account, make out Tax List, keep account of Tax sales, and make settlements with the County Treasurers.

In counties that have a population of upwards of five thousand there will be plenty to do both for the District Clerk and the County Auditor. It is true that in sparsely settled counties, one person can discharge the duties now imposed upon our District Clerk, and there would be no necessity for paying a County Auditor; but this difficulty could be easily obviated by making the District Clerk eligible to hold both offices as is the case with Treasurer and Recorder.

The report of settlement with County Treasurers is to this office a very important matter. Section 798 of the Revision of 1860 makes it the duty of the Board of Supervisors at their regular meeting, in January and June of each year, to make a full and complete settlement with the County Treasurer, and to make and certify to the Auditor of State all credits to the Treasurer tor double and erroneous assessments and unavailable taxes, also

all dues for State Revenue, interest collected, additional assessments, all revenue collected and amount of revenue delinquent. The Supervisors seldom attend to this duty, leaving it to the Clerk to look after. The consequence is that from some counties there have been no reports received for years. The Clerk says (and justly too) that it is the business of the Board to attend to making these settlements, and between the two this office is deprived of reports that it is almost impossible to get along without; indeed we can tell little or nothing of the accounts of those counties. I would suggest that if the system of County Auditors is not adopted that you make it the duty of the Clerk to settle with the County Treasurer, on the first Monday of January of each year, submit the settlement to the Board of Supervisors for approval, and promptly report to this office. To make this effective, some penalty should be attached for non-performance of this duty. It is impossible to keep our accounts correctly with the counties without receiving these reports regularly.

INSURANCE.

Insurance against loss by fire, accident, death, &c., has become a very important branch of business. The fortunes of individuals and families have become involved in it to such an extent as to make it the imperative duty of our Legislators to see that the interests of the insurance are properly cared for, and the business of insurance safely and successfully managed. It is the duty of the State to require the corporations of this State to organize with capital sufficient, and to be managed with such skill and honesty, as to fully warrant the confidence, that is necessarily required to be placed in them in order to have them compete with Insurance

Companies organized in other States, that are now doing business in Iowa. By our laws a joint stock company may be organized and do business with little or no cash capital. No public officer is required to examine and pass upon their statements. Unlike foreign Insurance Companies, they are not required to obtain the Auditor's certificate, nor publish statements showing their condition. We have many good, reliable Companies organized in this State, but they cannot successfully compete with foreign Insurance Companies, for the reason that so many other home Companies are doing business without capital or bottom of any kind, and the public has no means by which to distinguish the reliable from the unreliable Companies. Our law requires a foreign Insurance Company to file with the Auditor of State an annual statement of its condition, setting forth the amount of its capital stock, amount of same paid in cash, how invested, and proofs of investment; also the amount of its liabilities. This statement is sworn to by the President and Secretary of the Company. In this statement they are required to show that they are possessed of at least One Hundred Thousand Dollars of actual capital invested in stocks, of at least par value, or in bonds or mortgages on real estate worth double the amount for which the same is mortgaged. Upon examination of this statement and accompanying proofs of investment, if satisfactory, the Auditor issues a certificate thereof, acknowledging their compliance with the law, and their right to transact business in this State by properly accredited agents.

This certificate and copy of the statement filed, is published, one week in three daily, and three weeks in five weekly newspapers. Every agent before doing business for any foreign Insurance Company must procure Auditor's certificate, certifying that he is duly appointed by said Company their lawful Agent and Attorney, to take risks of Insurance and to acknowledge service of process, &c. This certificate is accompanied with a copy of statement, both of which are filed with the Clerk of the County in which he is licensed to do business. The Auditor's certificate granted to a foreign Insurance Company carries with it in some sense, the guaranty of the State, of its fitness for the purposes it presumes to accomplish, and of its pecuniary responsibility. The absence of any requirement of this kind, the small amount of authorized capital stock with, which they are organized, and above all the small amount of

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cash capital paid up, will forever prevent our home Insurance Companies from acquiring permanent stability and credit. No home Company whose capital mostly consists of stock-notes, no matter how skillfully and honestly managed, has ever been able to compete with foreign Insurance Companies, and for the reasons I have given, more than half a million of money is annually carried out of this State by foreign Insurance Companies. Were our home Companies placed upon a basis that would command the confidence and respect of our citizens, this large amount of money, or at least a great share of it, would be kept in their own circle, and would add just so much more to the cash capital of our State. Many of our Iowa Companies are established on a good basis, and managed by men of the highest integrity, and best business qualifications, but for want of a law requiring any particular amount of capital to be invested, and in absence of all official reports, their standing and condition is not known outside of their own circle of stockholders.

In my opinion a law requiring each Company organized in this State to have a capital of at least \$100,000, with 25 per cent. of same paid up, and invested in stocks of par value or bonds, and mortgages secured on real estate worth double the amount for which it is mortgaged, would be beneficial to the insurer and insured, would give the people confidence in them, and would retain within our State a large amount of the money that is annually paid to foreign Insurance Companies.

24TH.—REMARKS OF CLERKS RELATING TO PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND.

ALLAMAKEE COUNTY.

The Clerk writes: As to the Reports for which you sent the blanks, I think the Board will authorize them made out at their next meeting. It will require a long time to get them up in proper shape. The greater portion of the pay for getting them up ought to be paid out of the School Fund Interest, as the hardest part of the job will be to adjust the transactions of the School Fund Commissioners.

BLACK HAWK COUNTY.

The Clerk says: These judgments are somewhat mixed, and I fear the Reports cannot show the true state of the Fund.

CARROLL COUNTY.

The Clerk says: I presume the way that the difference arose was by parties making application for an additional amount, and have given a new mortgage before the old one was canceled, and it being reported twice, as the report has been made from the notes and contracts.

CERRO GORDO COUNTY.

The Clerk writes, Sept. 30, 1867: Referring to the matter of difference between the accounts in your office and mine of the school funds of this county, permit me to say that I have given the matter as much of my attention at times, as I could, in order to arrive at the gist of the matter, and my delay in answering you was for no other purpose. I am fully satisfied that the amount reported by me June 1st, 1867, is correct. I have bestowed all the time on this matter that I could find, and for the next two months business in my office will be even more urgent than in the past. But as soon as I can find time I will take up the subject again, and would, if necessary, go to your place with my books and accounts, in order to have the matter fully adjusted.

CHICKASAW COUNTY.

The Clerk says: The balance sheet of settlement with School Fund Commissioner Wright is not to be found, and I have no copy of it, but it was undoubtedly incorrect, as my last Report is tested by the record of notes for 1861, on file in Treasurer's office, and correspond with it very nearly. The utmost care has been taken to have this Report show a true statement of Fund, and I cannot alter it.

CLINTON COUNTY.

The Clerk says: Yours of the 24th inst., relating to the discrepancy in our Permanent School Fund Account, is received. It has been my intention to attend to the matter just as soon as I could find sufficient leisure to enable me to do so; but I have examined the subject sufficiently to enable me to see that I cannot get a clue to the discrepancy without overhauling the entire record of School Fund receipts and disbursements from the beginning; and I have not yet found sufficient leisure, after attending to the necessary every-day business of my office, to warrant my undertaking such a job. I think you need not expect anything to be done in time for your Report.

DAVIS COUNTY.

The Clerk writes: In accordance with your request I submit-

ted your letter to the Board of the county, and they appointed a committee of investigation as follows: H. H. Trimble, J. W. Ellis, and H. A. Wonn. I hope they may be able soon to adjust the matter. I shall render them all the assistance in my power. There was a great apathy existing concerning the School Fund prior to the session of the Grand Jury. It is gone, and I hope the result will be favorable.

DECATUR COUNTY.

The Clerk says: As I have mentioned previously, I think our accounts are defective, but as yet have not had time to overhanl them thoroughly, to know precisely where the discrepancy is; but I assure you the data of this office is in very bad shape as far as School Fund matters are concerned.

DUBUQUE COUNTY.

The Clerk says: The correspondence between us in relation to the School Fund has become voluminous indeed, occasioned, no doubt, by the unsatisfactory manner in which the accounts have been kept with that Fund.

FREMONT COUNTY.

The Clerk writes: I have been unable to find any thing in any of the books, showing where the county, at any time received any permanent school money only from the sale of the 16th section. The report shows amount that the sales of the 16th section brought, which makes the fund and notes differ \$2,918.99, which amount must come from the State, as due this county, from the sale of the 500,000 acre grant.

JACKSON COUNTY.

The Clerk says: In the matter of difference between your office and this, I am not able to see where the difference is except in the Rhodes' matter. Allow me to say that the books and accounts have not been kept in a satisfactory shape to me and the Board at their June session appointed an attorney to settle up several old matters.

LOUISA COUNTY.

The Clerk says: I have examined the discrepancy (in Permanent School Fund Reports) as well as I am able to just now. The District Court is in session and I can not get time till its adjournment, when I will immediately undertake the job of correcting my account (as I think I must) to conform to your usages. I think part of the discrepancy is there, a part probably on account of shape in which the fund came into my hands, and a part on account of the notes to which I refer, in a note on the report of losses, but did not include as actual losses, which were receipted for by me (they being in attorney's hands and the receipt passed to me), as mortgage notes, but which prove to be contract notes that had been paid in Keache's time, years before, and had been passed to his successor as unpaid notes.

MAHASKA COUNTY.

The Clerk writes: I have been so hurried in my office that I have not had time to look up the discrepancy in our accounts as regards "Permanent Fund." It is going to be quite a task to look the matter all over and I write to know if a month or six weeks from now will do, before I give you a definite reply.

UNION COUNTY.

The Clerk says: Blanks for the Permanent School Fund Reports are just received. The reports required are from 1858 to 1867. A correct report can not be made from this office.

I with Judge Rowell spent much time in 1866, investigating and trying to correct this whole school fund record, but failed to accomplish anything. To go back of report for June, 1866, would be all guess work, as our records in the school fund account are bad and conflicting. Believe it good policy for the school fund to be loaned to the State.

WEBSTER COUNTY.

The Clerk writes: Yours, stating my report of amount of Permanent School Fund was received, is at hand. My other reports will be forwarded as soon as possible. I have had an "awful" job. The school fund of this county (or rather the records) are in a very imperfect condition.

WINNESHIER COUNTY.

The Clerk says: When I get time I will make an effort to look up the remaining discrepancy. It is no very desirable job to look up these old matters of ten or eleven years' standing, and I don't know whether I can straighten them out or not.

Prior to the passage of this law, Hon. J. Tracy, District Attorney of 1st District, had been appointed by the Court as Receiver in the suit of State of Iowa vs. James D. Eads and his sureties, on his official bond as Superintendent of Public Instruction. I have the honor to submit herewith the report of Hon. J. Tracy as Receiver, made to the Hon. F. Springer, Judge of the 1st Judicial District, and also the report of the above named Commissioners, in relation thereto:

TO THE HON. JOHN A. ELLIOTT, Auditor of State:

The undersigned Commissioners, appointed by virtue of an act of the 10th General Assembly of the State of Iowa, (Chapter 28,) to settle with the sureties of James D. Eads, late Superintendent of Public Instruction, beg leave to submit the following report:

After having ascertained the pecuniary ability of each one of said sureties, as near as could be, the amount of property owned by each, and their willingness or unwillingness to compromise, the Commissioners met at different times between the 31st day of January, 1865, and the 26th day of June, of the same year, and endeavored to make an equitable assessment against each one of said sureties, in proportion to his ability to pay. After the assessments were made, Commissioner Tracy, assisted by Charles Doerr, Esq., of Fort Madison, went to work to effect a settlement upon the basis proposed by the assessments—he reporting to the other Commissioners, and advising with them from time to time. Up to this date, (Nov. 12th, 1867) the Commissioners have effected a settlement with some twenty-two of said sureties, and have executed to them, severally, a release from the judgment the State

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holds against them, viz.: Joseph Sawyer, Samuel Dinsmore, H. M. Salmon, F. Holtzberger, Joseph Ehart, Robert McHenry, N. Mc-Collough, A. Eighinger, F. Wilze, Samuel Boyles, B. Rophol, William Witte, John Able, Lewis Pappe, John G. Swartz, Theodore Nabors, Willoughby Tibbs, John Stewart, Estate of J. Henkle, Estate of C. J. Price, B. Hugle and Jonathan Jones.

There are some twenty-five or thirty others of said sureties with whom no settlement has been made as yet. The several notes and mortgages placed by order of the Court in the hands of J. Tracy, as Receiver in the suit of the State of Iowa, against the sureties of James D. Eads, which remain unsettled, or which have not been put into jadgments, have been passed to the account of the Commissioners, and also the net proceeds of those settled and collected by him as such Receiver.

In order to make this report more intelligible, a copy of the report of J. Tracy, as Receiver, is herewith enclosed; also copy of the account of the Commissioners.

To the Honorable Francis Springer, Judge of the First Judicial District, State of Iowa :

I beg leave to submit the following report respecting the notes and mortgages placed in my hands as Receiver, by your order, in the suit of the State of Iowa, vs. James D. Eads, late Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the sureties upon his official bonds:

1. Note of James D. Eads for \$20,000.00, secured by mortgage on three lots in Fort Madison.

Judgment rendered in the District Court, at Fort Madison, for \$35,550.00.

Dr. McMurphy, who claimed to own one of the lots, with the improvements thereon, included in the mortgage executed by Mr. Eads to secure this note, was made party defendant to this suit; and upon the trial, his title to said lot and improvement was confirmed as against the State, by decree of said Court, which decree, upon an appeal being taken to the Supreme Court, was subsequently affirmed.

The other two lots were sold on execution, and the sum of \$529.00 and costs realized.

2. Note of A. T. Walling & Co., with ten per cent. interest, \$2,000-secured by mortgage on "Journal Printing Office" in Keokuk, Lee County, Iowa.

Judgment rendered in District Court of Keokuk, for \$2,794.74,

Sept. 6th, 1864.

I procured the possession of the "Journal Office" on writ of replevin and then caused the same to be advertised and sold by the Sheriff of Lee county. Amount realized, \$700.00. Each member of the firm of A. T. Walling & Co. being regarded as insolvent, and each having removed from the State permanently, this judgment was compromised by Hon. J. M. Beck, paying to me for said Walling the sum of \$400.00, making the total amount realized, \$1,100.00.

3. Note of T. J. Cannon, \$1,000.00, dated October 15th, 1856, due April 1st, 1857, payable to C. J. Crego, and indorsed by Crego to James D. Eads. The note not having been protested for nonpayment, Mr. Crego was released as indorser and Cannon, the maker, as I am informed, has left the State and is insolvent.

4. Note of Boyles, Hugle, and Stemple, \$4,000.00, dated November 19th, 1856, due ten years after date, secured by mortgage on real estate in Lee county. This land was advertised for sale by Peter Miller, as Trustee, named in a prior deed of trust executed by James D. Eads, to Green Erskin, I procuring the sale by an injunction. Afterwards by an arrangement with Daniel F. Miller, Esq., Attorney for Mr. Erskin, the land was sold on the Erskin deed of trust and bid off in my name, and the amount of his claim was paid by the Board of Supervisors of Lee county. I then caused the land to be divided into small tracts and sold them at anction.

The total amount realized, after refunding the money advanced

by the Board of Supervisors, was \$792.38.

5. Note of T. J. Cannon, with 10 per cent. interest, \$6,318.87, dated December 16th, 1856, due four years from date. This note was secured by mortgage on the "Des Moines House," and the furniture in said house, in the city of Des Moines. There was a prior incumbrance upon this property to the amount of about \$13,000.00, which absorbed the whole of the property, and, as

stated in paragraph No. 3, Cannon is insolvent and has left the State.

6. Note of R. W. Rothrock, \$2,000.00, dated Nov. 19th, 1856, due ten years after date, with ten per cent. interest. This note was secured by mortgage on two hundred acres of unimproved lands in Iowa county, which I am informed is worth about \$1,000.00. I procured a judgment for the amount of the principal and interest due upon this note, at the last September term of the District Court of Iowa county, and also an order of Court directing the sale of the mortgaged premises. Rothrock left the State several years ago, and I have not been able to learn his place of residence. Messrs. J. H. Murphy & Brother, of Marengo, assisted me in procuring the above judgment. The two hundred acres of land in Iowa county was sold for taxes, a portion of which accrued before the mortgage was made by Rothrock to Eads. I redeemed the land from the tax sale, and the title is now regarded good.

7. Note of Leech & McFarland \$3,000.00, dated November 19th, 1856, due ten years after date. This note was given to James D. Eads for the purchase money for one hundred and sixty acres of land in Polk County. I found upon an examination that this land belonged to the State University, and that it was sold to Mr. Eads on credit, except the first payment of \$320.00, the deferred payments falling due and not being paid, the Trustees of the State University ordered Eads' title bond to be forfeited and resold the land. Messrs. Leech & McFarland therefore having received no consideration for the note, a suit against them would be unavailing.

8. Note of Gilbert, Burns, McBride and Paul, \$600.00, dated may 6th, 1856, due two years after date with ten per cent. interest. I brought suit upon this note in the District Court of Johnson County, Burns and Paul set up a defense to said note, and after the case had been pending for some two or three terms of Court they were released upon the payment of \$375.00; and judgment taken against the other defendants for the balance of the note and interest. I have been unable to collect anything further npon this note. Amount of judgment against Gilbert and McBride, \$803.00.

9. Note of Elijah W. Lake, \$1,000.00, dated November 5, 1855, due April 1, 1856, payable to Daniel Gillis with two per

cent. per month as a penalty for non payment; and by Gillis assigned to James D. Eads. I caused suit to be brought upon this note in the District Court of Johnson county, and after a long and closely contested litigation in the District and Supreme Courts upon the questions of priority of mortgage liens, we were successful in establishing the priority of lien in favor of the State; judgment was rendered upon the note for the amount of the principal without costs or interest.

10. Note of Thomas Snyder, \$1,500.00, dated January 2, 1856, due four years after date, with ten per cent. interest, secured by mortgage on town lots in Iowa City; judgment rendered in the District Court of Johnson county, for \$2,370. Nothing as yet has been realized upon this judgment; the lots described in the mortgage are regarded as of but little value, and the defendant, I am informed, is insolvent. Hon. Rush Clark, of Iowa City, assisted me in the suits against Thos. Snyder, Elijah Lake, et al, and against Paul, Burns and others. A particular account of money collected, amount paid out including my fees for services, is hereto attached. All of which is respectfully submitted and asked to be approved.

According to the Report of Hon. William Crum, Treasurer of Iowa State University, made to this office in 1865, losses have occurred to the University Fund amounting to \$7,969,49. Section 3, Article 7, of New Constitution, says that "all losses to the Permanent School or University Fund of this State, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents, or officers controlling or managing the same, shall be andited by the proper authorities of the State."

Chapter 134, Acts of the 10th General Assembly, provides for auditing losses to the Permanent School Fund, but I am unable to find any law authorizing the auditing of losses to the University Fund, or for issuing State Bonds for the same. If it is intended to carry into practical effect this provision of the organic law in regard to the University Fund, it will be necessary to pass some law authorizing the auditing and paying of losses to this Fund.

34TH.-REMARKS ON SCHOOL FUND.

Chapter 110, Section 3, Acts of 11th General Assembly, provides for the payment of costs in cases where the State purchases real estate sold under execution; but in cases where the property sold is purchased by third parties for less than enough to cover principal, interest and costs, there is no provision made by law to pay such costs. In such cases as last referred to many of the counties have deducted the costs from the money received-thus using the Permanent Fund for another purpose than that provided by law. Some again have paid the costs out of the County Treasury-others have sent in their bill of costs to be audited, and paid out of the State Treasury. I have refused to pay these claims, there being no appropriation made, nor any law authorizing me to draw a warrant on the State Treasurer for the same. These cases are quite numerous, and will be occurring until all the loans made prior to the passage of Chap. 148, Acts of 1862, shall have been collected.

I think it would be well to pass an Act requiring the counties to pay these costs—or make an appropriation to pay the same out of the State Treasury. If the latter measure is adopted, I would suggest that the amount of costs in such cases should be regulated by law, at least the Attorney's fees, for I find that as a general thing it costs more to foreclose a mortgage for the School Fund than it does to foreclose a mortgage due an individual. This could be remedied by placing some restrictions on the amount of costs to be made.

LOSSES.

Chapter 134, Acts of 10th General Assembly, anthorizes the Auditor to "audit all losses to the Permanent School Fund, as provided for in Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution." The article in the constitution referred to reads as follows: "All losses to the Permanent School or University Fund of this State which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be andited by the proper authorities of the State." In auditing these losses I find it is necessary to adopt some uniform rule that will be applicable to all cases. I have ascertained from the efforts that I have already made, that it is impossible to trace out each individual case, and ascertain just where the security failed, when it was first known, that the title of the mortgagor to the mortgaged premises was insufficient, when the personal securities failed or left the State, &c., and find that there is but one way to solve this difficulty: that is by deciding that the loss to the Fund occurred when the loan was made, and accepting the date of the loan as the time of the loss. A large majority of the losses that have been reported to this office to be audited, and for which, if allowed, State Bonds must be issued, are for loans made prior to the adoption of the New Constitution. I do not feel authorized, without some further legislation on this point, to issue bonds for losses that occurred prior to the adoption of the Constitution.

I trust, therefore, for the interest of the School Fund, an interest that should be dear to every citizen of Iowa, that you will, at your present session, pass some act that will authorize the Auditor to audit all losses to the Permanent Fund that have occurred on losns made prior to the passage of Chapter 148, Acts of 1862. This act makes the counties partially liable for all loans made subsequent to the enactment of this law.

From reports received from a portion of the counties holding School Fund, we have clearly ascertained that losses amounting to \$16,891.17 have occurred to this fund, have been examined, sudited. and credited to the counties in which they occurred. A much larger amount has been reported, but not accompanied by what we consider sufficient evidence of all the legal measures having been used and exhausted. I am awaiting your action in regard to the constitutional provision referred to, before issuing bonds of the State for these clearly ascertained losses. You will perceive by our tabular statement of "losses" and "cash," that quite a number of counties have not reported their losses. We know from information received by former reports that the losses will far exceed the above amount. Among the non-reporting counties is Allamakee. This county reported in June, 1865, the amount of Permanent School Fund assets on hand to be \$113,144.61, and in June, 1867, they reported only \$90,474.56, showing a deficit of \$22,670.05, being a larger amount than the entire losses above reported, as audited. The difference in amount as shown by the Auditor's books of Permanent Fund charged to the several counties, and the amount as reported by the county clerks in tabular statement, page 70, can be accounted for where the amount reported is greater than that shown by the Auditor's books, by errors in Clerk's reports, assets coming into possession of the county by sale of sixteenth section, or by errors in reports of settlement made with School Fund Commissioners, on which the accounts in this office are based. To give an idea of the uncertainty of these reports and accounts, I need only state that the accounts of fifty-four of the counties that have reported do not agree with the Auditor's books. By refering to some of the letters which have been received from county clerks in regard to the condition of the School Fund accounts, (see remarks of clerks relating to Permanent School Fund), you will be convinced of the necessity of adopting some means other than those we have at present, to correct these accounts. I would send some suitable person, or go myself, to those counties whose accounts are in bad condition, but there has been no provision made for such expenses. I have bestowed much labor and time upon these accounts, endeavoring to get them adjusted, to get a starting point back of which we should never have to go. I have succeeded in some measure in accomplishing this, but there are counties from which we cannot get reports; we have furnished them with the proper blanks time after time; again there are a few counties in which the School Fund accounts have got so badly

mixed up, and require so much time to adjust, more than the county clerks can devote to it, that I am fully convinced of the necessity of sending some person to settle up their accounts. And believing that the interests of the School Fund would be greatly benefited by it, and thousands of dollars saved to the State, I would recommend that you make some provision for the necessary expense that would occur in carrying out this suggestion. Permit me to call your attention to the following facts, which I believe will convince you that this fund which the State should hold as a sacred trust, the interest accruing from which is intended to educate the children of the present and coming generation, has not been managed as any prudent, sensible man would manage his own affairs. After a careful estimate, based upon the amount of interest collected and apportioned during the last two years, I find that this fund, which the law contemplates should draw eight per cent. interest per annum, has realized only six per cent., making a loss to the Temporary Fund of very nearly \$50,000 per annum. The amount of interest due and unpaid, as shown by our tabular statements of apportionments made, was

The loss to this Permanent Fund, for which State bonds must be issued, will, in my estimation, exceed \$125,000. In view of these facts, would it not be well to take into consideration the expediency of adopting some other method of investing this fund, some system by which the principal would be secured, and the interest promptly collected.
