## INTRODUCTORY.

The seventh and last full biennial report of this Department was issued in 1905. A statutory change required a report in 1906, but it so closely followed the seventh that detail was omitted.

### THE ANNALS OF IOWA.

The third series of this publication has reached the seventh number of the eighth volume. It is an eighty page periodical issued quarterly, devoted to Iowa and western history and biography. It is sent to all Iowa public libraries free of charge and is exchanged for such newspapers and historical periodicals as come without other cost to the Department. It, in this way, amply repays the expense of its publication aside from the value of such original contributions as appear in its pages.

No publication covering the same period of time contains as much of the original thought of witnesses of the formative stages of Iowa life. Materials abound which are ready to be delivered to the public through this journal. Little effort is made at securing the deductions of scholars but the accumulation of the simple, primary facts of early and present day conditions are sought, the theory being that ultimate adequacy of treatment of most phases of Iowa history will depend on information thus gathered. No effort at embellishment is made. The journal was admitted to the second class mailing privilege in April, 1908, reducing the cost of circulation from about \$150 to a little less than \$20 per year for editions of 1,500 numbers.

### NEWSPAPER FILES.

Files of 286 Iowa newspapers and of 29 from outside the State currently received have been regarded the most valuable feature of the Department. They are regularly bound, indexed and filed in an easily accessible manner. Not a question of importance in any section of the State escapes discussion and record here. The files are consulted daily throughout the year by students, editorial writers and statisticians. Very frequently calls for their use are made by litigants.



In addition to the current files the Department has during the past year been strengthened by the purchase of a file of *The New York Herald* covering practically the entire period from 1848 to the present time. From the Library of Congress we have received on exchange account eighty-six volumes of *The Philadelphia Press*, 1889-1907, also volumes of *The Louisville Courier-Journal*, *Boston Morning Journal* and *New York World*. From Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Dean the Department has received a file of *The Storm Lake Pilot*, Vols. I.-XX., with the exception of Vol. XVI., covering the period 1870-1890. Mr. R. H. Moore of Ottumwa has donated files of *The Louisa County Gazette*, *Fairfield Home Visitor* and *Brighton Pioneer*, and *Moline (Ill.) Review*. From Mrs. John H. Charles of Sioux City files of *The Sioux City Weekly Journal*, *The Weekly Times* and *The Weekly Tribune*. From Mr. J. B. M. Bishop of Toledo eighteen volumes of Tama county papers. Mr. Bishop sent us a card asking whether we would be interested in old papers; he was cleaning house and would gladly send them. This illustrates the narrow escape of a valuable collection, the benefits of which will never be known in our generation.

## LIBRARY.

At the inception of the Historical Department library interests were far from what they now are in Iowa, as elsewhere. The Department early began the especial collecting of books and pamphlets on western history, slavery, war of the rebellion, the American Indian, genealogy, county and other local history, and early maps, confining its efforts to such works as may more strictly be classed as direct evidence, as distinguished from comment or impression of writers. While additions are now made on all of these lines special attention is paid to the genealogical department, which it is desired to make one of the strongest in the middle west, and also to the collection of Iowa material, including writings of authors now or at any time residing in Iowa. The library already has a fine collection of early and rare Iowa pamphlets. Many of its volumes are gifts to the Department. As many as can be, with the funds available, have been added by purchase. There have been, within the last three years, added to the collection 2,181 books and pamphlets, making a total of 16,363.

## MANUSCRIPTS.

Of manuscript materials the Historical Department possesses, and continues to acquire, a wealth. The well known and priceless Aldrich Collection of autographs was made at the private expense of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Aldrich and by them presented in 1884 to the State as a foundation for what is now the Historical Department of Iowa. In this fireproof building and in bindings of fine materials and workmanship the private correspondence and papers of many famous Iowa and other American men and women form incomparable memorials. It is believed that no monument is more appropriate, lasting or artistic than these. Their former owners are thus honored and the benefits conferred upon the future generations must be infinite. Among the most important and extensive collections not heretofore reported may be named those of Gen. Grenville M. Dodge, the eminent soldier, engineer and railroad builder of Council Bluffs, Iowa; Mr. Barlow Granger, one of the early and active lawyers at "the Raccoon Forks," whose documents are rich in land transactions, especially those relating to location of claims and the acquisition of patent titles. Dr. Gideon S. Bailey, the intimate friend of leading old line Iowa Democrats after 1837 for sixty years. His documents disclose the career of a local politician, a United States marshal during the last years of the territory and first of the State of Iowa, a service in both branches of the Iowa legislature and a candidacy for Congress. The personal manuscript narrative of Col. Thomas Wilson, once a resident of Iowa, covering his experience in the consular service of the United States for several years following 1881 at Ghent and other European stations. There are thirty-one volumes of his travels and explorations in Europe in his study of prehistoric man. They contain original observations on the art and architecture of the various cities and countries in which he served. All these documents are available to individuals presenting proper credentials and explaining the purposes of their investigation.

## MUSEUM.

While this term may technically include the art, autograph, manuscript and some other collections, we restrict it to the objects illustrating natural and political history, prehistoric and recent. Objects acquired bear authentic history and tend to demonstrate some fact or process in the development of life in Iowa and the west or some enterprise in which Iowa or its citizens have been



directly interested. No abnormalities nor freaks are received. Every object is placed where it may be easily seen and to it is attached a label exactly setting forth its identity and history. Thus an object or a series is a lesson silently, persistently impressing itself upon the mind of the visitor, regardless of his degree of intelligence. The educational influence on the fifty thousand who annually visit the collections must be incalculable. Claim is laid to the best modern methods of administration. Notwithstanding paucity of help, lack of contingent funds, remarkable expansion and inevitable embarrassment from the loss of the Curator's controlling influence, the Museum is surely entitled to favorable comment. Acquisitions continue to be made of the most valuable character. They come almost entirely by the free gift of the people. With those most desired often come some of less importance which we might dispose of by way of exchange had we authority to do so. The receipt of loan items is not encouraged except where such will fill a gap in a series or where there is some equivalent consideration. Limited case room and the expense of labels weigh against objects which are not the absolute property of the State. Such method must eventually provide a most useful and valuable institution.

In the spring of 1908, the Department explored a mound in Boone county, Iowa. It was 90x110 feet in extreme dimensions and 14 feet high. Every precaution was taken to accurately record its original appearance and its every disclosure. Prehistoric stone works and other marks of the intelligence of the unknown race were of great interest. A detailed report is in course of preparation by Mr. Van Hyning who had immediate charge of the work. We wish to publish this as soon as the time can be spared from the pressing duties of installing the new museum. The Historical Department should have authority to acquire and hold in trust for the people of the State options on the right of exploring, if not the title to, all such works. Prompt survey of them should be made. Such works are being leveled rapidly and the expense of thoroughly exploring them is so great that science must certainly lose a vast opportunity. Already a number of burial grounds and town sites of the prehistoric inhabitants of the State of Iowa which are known to have been situated in the rich alluvial plains of our streams have been obliterated by the processes of agriculture. Those on the hills will not much longer remain.

Notwithstanding the increase of 3,700 feet of floor space and 1,200 feet of display cases the remarkable volume of collections of real value even now exceeds our ability to fully display. There is ample room for and great need of no less than 11 cases such as have been provided at an expenditure of \$130.00 each.

Mr. R. D. Hoyt, of Seven Oaks, Florida, was employed for a period of seven weeks during the summer of 1908, and remounted in a splendid manner 159 birds then owned by and in storage of the Department, adding, during the time, those of 53 birds and 8 mammals collected by the Department.

#### ART COLLECTIONS.

There were 87 portraits in oil in the collection at the last detailed report, to which there have been added 22 within the last three years. This total of 109 portraits in oil of Iowa citizens who have distinguished themselves in behalf of better things for the State and the Union was visited by more than 10,000 persons in the ninety days following August 20, 1908. A small catalog or guide of the collection was issued in August, 1908. There should be, by way of ornamentation and protection to the very valuable collection, a slightly bronze railing about the room and there should be a complete restoration of the wall coverings and improvement of the lighting system as later herein detailed.

In the month of August, 1908, there was installed and opened to the public what we have denominated the Black and White collection, consisting of such portraits as are not listed as oils and as are not displayed in the drawers of the Aldrich Collection of autograph letters and portraits. This Black and White collection forms one of the most beautiful apartments in the building and is so lighted and arranged as to permit close inspection of its contents. Here for the first time has been displayed in a single collection photographs or other good likenesses of nearly two thousand legislators and other eminent Iowa men.

A number of portrait busts and statues await the completion of the corridors and rotunda to be assembled in what we have denominated the Statuary Hall. Here should be assembled replicas of all Iowa public sculpture.

The Department petitioned the Executive Council to place on the handsome new reading room walls the canvasses once forming frescoes on the Supreme Court Room ceiling. This they did and restored a work that was once, and again becomes, very popular.



General Ed Wright described these paintings as by Fritz Melzer consisting of six small subjects and four large allegorical canvasses some ten by fourteen feet in size. The four large ones being as follows:

1. *Columbia reigning on her throne.* Above the globe in unity with the Goddess of Justice, the patrons of the States come to pay them their homage, bringing with them little children, which represent the territories. Iowa, who is a special favorite in Columbia's household, is seen sitting on the steps of the throne with a club and a coat of arms, ever ready to defend her friend (Columbia) in case of need. In front of the throne is chiseled in everlasting rock the memorable date 1776, the foundation of the Republic. The American Eagle is proudly soaring over all, holding in his beak the historical emblem "E Pluribus Unum."

2. *Justice and peace represented as ruling over the land.* Bringing prosperity and plenty, culture and happiness, while rebellion is restrained and smitten down by Justice's strong right arm.

3. *Justice on her throne.* To her left stands Columbia, ever ready to sustain her decisions by word or deed. The figure to the right of Justice rejoices that the decision is in her favor. The sitting figure on the right denotes sorrow as the decision is rendered against her, but is content when she finds by examining the law that the decision is according to law. To her left a mother is explaining to her son the laws.

4. *Ceres, the Goddess of Agriculture.*

#### ARCHIVES.

The care and collection of archives, especially of public archives, was a subject that early received the interest of those who founded and furthered historical collections in this State. The purpose took form some two years ago as touching the documentary accumulations of the various Iowa territorial and State officers in Chapter 142, Acts of the Thirty-first General Assembly which authorized and empowered the Board of Trustees of the Historical Department and State Library to provide a scheme and proceed with the work of so handling these collections that they would be safe from loss and readily available to the public. Such scheme to arrange and deposit these with the Historical Department was adopted but its execution was transferred by Chapter 157, Acts of the Thirty-second General Assembly to the Executive Council which now has the selection, classification, indexing, and arrangement of materials and

all the work appertaining thereto. The Historical Department remains the repository of the archives after they are so treated.

#### THE WORK BEFORE US—RECOMMENDATIONS.

We hold, largely as gifts of individuals, materials from the fields of art and industry, and in the form of manuscripts, papers and correspondence, that are little short of marvelous in number and value considering the brief time they have been accumulating. The task immediately before us is not alone that of intelligently increasing these collections, but also in placing them ready to the hand of those who wish, or should be induced, to use them. Labels, indexes, catalogs, classifications, in fact organization extended to new and expanded quarters and expanding opportunities is the task confronting us. Management lies in executing the plans of the founder. Patient, accurate, intelligent industry is imperatively required. In my judgment, there should be added to the housekeeping branch two janitors, and to the Museum Department an assistant.

#### COUNTY ARCHIVES.

Old files and records of some Iowa counties and municipalities are rapidly disappearing. I urgently request that the head of this Department be authorized to visit every such repository in Iowa to examine and report to the Thirty-fourth General Assembly thereon, and that there be appropriated for his use solely for traveling and hotel expenses the sum of \$1,200.00.

#### PHOTOGRAPHIC NEGATIVES.

The Historical Department should make and otherwise acquire photographic negatives. These, so prepared as to serve in illustrating lectures and fixing views of historic objects, places and persons, must strike even the least thoughtful as invaluable. A complete photographic outfit practical in the hand of any attache of the Department need cost no more than \$250.00.

#### LABELS, SIGNS, ETC.

Time and trouble of the visiting public should be saved by adequate directories, apartment signs and door labels so designed as to take nothing from the beauty of the interior. Drinking fountains of a sightly and sanitary character should be available on each floor.



A space on the second floor denominated in the original plans as a hall is admirably suited for the display of plastic objects. I have denominated this as Statuary Hall and I recommend its special equipment for this purpose. Most admirably adapted for portrait statuary are 16 niches in the corridors that vary in size, and are in series of four on the separate floors. I trust the whole interior may be so embellished as to make of these an appropriate setting for as many such portraits of eminent Iowa or other American citizens. There are niches and seats for medallions and busts in the logias and on exterior walls of the building designed to receive 12 such objects in addition to those already enumerated.

#### NEEDED CHANGES IN LIGHTING.

Some alterations should be made in the lighting system. The educational value throughout the museum and art gallery depends on adequate light. Therefore, this should be calculated from the points and planes to be illuminated. Both the old and new art galleries should be equipped with the best method of artificial lighting.

#### STORAGE SPACE.

Enclosed shelving and all sub-basement space possible should be provided for storage purposes. Heads of similar institutions have calculated that storage space should bear a relation in cubic capacity to exhibition space of at least 1 to 3. At present we have no more than a cubic storage capacity of 1 unit to 20 of show room. The plans for the building embrace two passenger and two freight elevators. The shafts for these are 10 feet square and 90 feet high. Only one passenger elevator will be needed for years to come and the other should be fitted with temporary floors and otherwise finished for storage purposes. This inexpensive improvement would not materially interfere with their intended use whenever that becomes desirable.

#### SYSTEM OF COMMUNICATION.

Economy of time and increase of resources would more than compensate the expense of subscription to both instead of to a single Des Moines telephone system. A severe tax on the time of our little force and upon the patience of the visiting public is the absence of some system of intercommunication throughout the building.

#### ACCOUNTING FOR MECHANICAL REPAIR WORK.

Much shifting of fixtures and other mechanical work must be accomplished before the building is exactly suited to our work. Some system of formal requisition, showing, order and report should be adopted where attention to physical equipment of this building is requested. This would facilitate business, fix responsibility, eliminate incongruous plans and injurious alterations, and promote efficiency, economy and the best interests of all officially concerned.

#### STRUCTURAL NEEDS.

The rotunda and corridors remain to be finished. Great satisfaction is expressed by the public with the exterior of the building and the interiors of the various apartments. The corridors and rotunda should be finished with a richness of effect corresponding with, if not exceeding, that of our famous Capitol building. No public structure in the State, and possibly none in the country could be made more beautiful. An estimate submitted by the architect of the building, Mr. O. O. Smith, embracing the work in marble and bronze, the only materials appropriate for the remaining details, is \$50,000.

#### PHYSICAL MAINTENANCE OF BUILDING.

The ventilating, lighting, heating and elevator service of this building calls for constant expert mechanical attention. In addition to the ordinary janitor force there should be provided for the head of the Department an employe whose duty it would be to manage these and assume responsibility for care taking of the entire building. The greatest amount of service from the whole equipment with the least risk and expenditure requires this.

#### FLAG STAFF.

There is no provision for displaying on the Historical Building the emblem of our country. The matter should receive attention and a flag staff be provided.

#### DEDICATION.

When the corridors are completed and the old entrance steps are removed the Historical, Memorial and Art Building of the State of Iowa will have been completed. I earnestly recommend that upon such completion there be held an adequate dedicatory ceremony. It would not only fitly mark the date of the complete structure but that of the first quarter century of Department activity if occurring within the next year.



## IN MEMORIAM.

The Historical Department and the people of the State of Iowa suffered irreparable loss in the death of the Honorable Charles Aldrich at his home in Boone, March 8, 1908. His body enroute to its burial place at Webster City, was brought to Des Moines and lay in state in the rotunda of the Historical Building from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m., March 11, at which time the following program was carried out:

Prayer—Dr. A. L. Frisbie, Des Moines.

Hon. Lafayette Young, Des Moines—Mr. Aldrich as a journalist.

Hon. Warren S. Dungan, Chariton—Mr. Aldrich as a legislator.

Col. George W. Crosley, Webster City—Mr. Aldrich as a soldier and patriot.

Hon. John A. McCall, Des Moines—Mr. Aldrich as a man of culture.

Judge H. E. Deemer, Red Oak—Mr. Aldrich as a conservator of Iowa history.

Governor A. B. Cummins—Mr. Aldrich as a citizen of Iowa.

The tributes paid to the founder and Curator of the Historical Department of the State of Iowa demonstrated the high and permanent place held by him in public esteem. They showed that he, more than any other individual in the State of Iowa, had instituted and stimulated the individual and public taste for the expression of science, art and literature. That his writings and collections, as also the impressive and at times almost importunate conversations he was wont to have with leaders in practical and sentimental enterprises, were to be accredited with immeasurable good. The press of the State with one voice echoed the estimate of the speakers and several of the leading journals suggested the erection of a statue of Mr. Aldrich within or upon the grounds of the Historical Building. Such a tribute would be fitting, indeed, and if undertaken, a liberal fund should be provided in order that the expression in marble typifying the life and soul of the man may be executed by a truly great artist. I venture to suggest that another and possibly more appropriate recognition of Mr. Aldrich's life work might be made by placing upon the Historical Building itself, where for all time it might endure, the name of its founder.

## ACKNOWLEDGEMENT.

In temporarily administering the office of my departed friend, the Curator, the Board of Trustees, to whom he was ever grateful, has constantly and patiently supported me. The work to which he trained Miss Mary R. Whitecomb and Miss Alice M. Steele and Mr. T. Van Hynning, has continued by them to be done in that faithful and cheerful way that made of his administration a pleasure and distinguished success. His janitor force, Messrs. L. M. Randles, J. B. Copper, and night watch, S. H. Stacy, comrades in arms of his, have remained through and have uncomplainingly performed their respective labors during and after the doubled duties of department expansion fell upon them. The public and the press of Iowa which held up the hands of Charles Aldrich have invariably extended their good will to me, and to all of these I feel that I should and I do, return my sincerest thanks.
