REPORT ON PARDONS

APPLICATIONS FOR PARDONS SUBMITTED TO THE BOARD OF PAROLE UNDER SECTION 5626, SUP- PLEMENT TO THE CODE, 1913.

In compliance with Section 5626, Supplement to the Code, 1913, notices have been published of the applications for pardons of the following named prisoners, convicted of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to imprisonment in the penitentiary for the term of their natural lives, and said applications have been referred to the Board of Parole for their investigation and recommendation.

PARDONS

JAMES R. BLAKE, Guthrie County. Sentenced at the February Term, 1914, to serve a term of six months in the county jail, for the crime of assault with intent to commit manslaughter. Pardon was recommended by the presiding judge, county attorney and a large number of citizens of Guthrie county, and same was granted on the 10th day of April, 1915.

NATHAN RAINSBARGER, Marshall County. Committed to the penitentiary at Anamosa on December 10th, 1887, under sentence for the term of his natural life, for the crime of murder in the first degree. Notice was published, as required by law, and the application for pardon was referred to the Board of Parole for investigation and recommendation. The Board of Parole reported adversely to granting clemency. Upon full consideration of the whole record in connection with said report, I reached the conclusion that Nathan Rainsbarger should be granted a pardon, conditioned upon his good conduct in all respects, and that a compliance with the conditions imposed for a period of three years should be deemed sufficient evidence of his good faith and should have the effect of converting the instrument into a full and complete pardon. Said pardon or parole was executed on the 23rd day of August, 1915. Thereafter, and on the 28th day of December, 1916, the said Nathan Rainsbarger having up to said time

in all respects fully complied with the conditions, and being fully convinced that he would continue the life of a law-abiding citizen in advance of the expiration of the time originally fixed, I, for these reasons, felt it my duty, under the provisions of the constitution empowering me so to do, to grant a full pardon. Pardon was granted on the 28th day of December, 1916.

FRANK RAINSBARGER, Marshall County. Committed to the penitentiary at Anamosa on the 15th day of March, 1887, under sentence for the term of his natural life, for the crime of murder in the first degree. Notice was published, as required by law, and the application for pardon was referred to the Board of Parole for investigation and recommendation. The Board of Parole reported adversely to granting clemency. Upon full consideration of the whole record in connection with said report, I reached the conclusion that Frank Rainsbarger should be granted a pardon, conditioned upon his good conduct in all respects, and that a compliance with the conditions imposed for a period of three years should be deemed sufficient evidence of his good faith and should have the effect of converting the instrument into a full and complete pardon. Said pardon or parole was executed on the 23rd day of August, 1915. Thereafter, and on the 28th day of December, 1916, the said Frank Rainsbarger having up to said time in all respects fully complied with the conditions, and being fully convinced that he would continue the life of a law-abiding citizen in advance of the expiration of the time originally fixed, I, for these reasons, felt it my duty, under the provisions of the constitution empowering me so to do, to grant a full pardon. Pardon was granted on the 28th day of December, 1916.

LOUIS CHIRIKOS, Cerro Gordo County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 6th day of January, 1914, for the term of his natural life, for the crime of murder in the first degree. Notice was published, as required by law, and the application for pardon was referred to the Board of Parole for investigation and recommendation. The Board of Parole recommended that a pardon be granted, basing such recommendation upon the conclusion that the evidence was insufficient to convict of murder in the first degree. Pardon was granted on the 23rd day of October, 1916.

EARL MADDEN, Union County. Committed to the Reformatory at Anamosa on the 4th day of June, 1915, for a term not exceeding three years, for the crime of conspiracy. This pardon is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, a detailed statement of the reasons for recommending the pardon being on file with the records in connection with the case. Pardon was granted on the 2nd day of December, 1916.

SUSPENSIONS

HENRY SEYMOUR OLESON, Woodbury County. Convicted at the October Term, 1913, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole to aid the United States authorities in deporting the said Seymour Oleson to Canada. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of March, 1915.

JACK HARVEY, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the November Term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole to aid the United States authorities in deporting the said Jack Harvey to England. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of March, 1915.

SANDER PETERSON, Webster County. Convicted on July 11, 1912, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of transferring Sander Peterson to the Cherokee State Hospital, it being the opinion of the prison authorities that he should receive treatment at the hospital. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of March, 1915.

S. B. YOUNG, Keokuk County. Convicted at the May Term, 1913, of the offense of burglary, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole to permit the said S. B. Young to return to his home in the State of Virginia. Suspension issued on the 6th day of April, 1915.

HARRY MORRIS, Story County. Convicted at the June Term, 1912, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Harry Morris is to be turned over to the parole officer of the State of Pennsylvania. Suspension was issued on the 28th day of June, 1915.

CHARLES LEWIS, Benton County. Convicted at the March term, 1913, for the offense of breaking and entering a freight car, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles Lewis is to go to the home of his relatives at Waukesha, Wisconsin. Suspension was issued on the 14th day of August, 1915.

ROLLY RULEY, Appanoose County. Convicted at the October Term, 1913, of the offense of embezzlement, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This

suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Rolly Ruley was placed under the supervision of his mother at Fort Scott, Kansas. Suspension was issued on the 30th day of August, 1915.

GEORGE MCCREES, Polk County. Convicted at the November Term, 1914, of the offense of perjury, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, members of the Board of Supervisors, and other county officials. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of October, 1915.

GEORGE JOHNSON, Scott County. Convicted at the January Term, 1914, of the offense of a common thief, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the authorities of the State of Illinois are to transfer the said George Johnson to Cook County, Illinois, for prosecution on the charge of murder. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of October, 1915.

HENRY BROWN, Woodbury County. Convicted at the September Term, 1913, of the offense of receiving stolen property, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and there under the said Henry Brown is not to return to Sioux City, but is to locate elsewhere. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of October, 1915.

ALBERT ELVIN KISSINGER, Des Moines County. Convicted at the September Term, 1913, of the offense of obtaining money under false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the Reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Albert Kissinger returned to the home of his brother in Peoria, Illinois, who assisted in securing suitable employment. Suspension issued on the 14th day of October, 1915.

FRANK McNAVIN, Wapello County. Convicted at the April term, 1911, of the offense of obtaining goods by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Frank McNavin returned to his home at Wilkesbarre, Pa. Suspension was issued on the 23rd day of October, 1915.

GENOR BEESON, Linn County. Convicted at the March term, 1913, of the offense of manslaughter, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed eight years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Genor Beeson returned to his relatives in Minnesota, who provided a home and cared for him. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of November, 1915.

LOUIS CHRISTOPHER, Dubuque County. Convicted at the May term, 1913, of the offense of rape, and sentenced to serve a term of life in the Penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Louis Christopher went to the home of his daughter in St. Paul, the relatives having agreed to care for him and provide a home, he being almost totally blind. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of November, 1915.

FRED TISHHAUSER, Dallas County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the purpose being to aid the United States authorities in deporting the said Tishhauser to his native country of Switzerland, as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 23rd day of November, 1915.

H. A. HOLTON, Dubuque County. Convicted at the June term, 1913, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said H. A. Holton is to go to Omaha, Nebraska, where he is to be cared for by friends, he having been confined in the tubercular ward at the prison hospital. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of January, 1916.

HARRY LARSON, Polk County. Convicted at the May term, 1915, of the offense of attempt breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said Harry Larson and deport him to his native country of Sweden as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of January, 1916.

AAGO HANSEN, Black Hawk County. Convicted at the April term, 1915, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said Aago Hansen and deport him to his native country of Sweden as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of January, 1916.

JOHN PENNEY, Emmet County. Convicted at the November term, 1899, of the offense of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to serve a term of life in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the application for pardon or parole having been referred to the Board for investigation and recommendation, and their report being that the sentence be suspended and that John Penney be permitted to go to the home of his sister at Hastings, Nebraska, where employment was provided. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of February, 1916.

GEORGE SALVAGE, Story County. Convicted at the January term, 1916, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, it appearing that the said prisoner has been indicted in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts upon a charge of murder in the first degree, and this suspension is granted for the purpose only of permitting the authorities of said State to prosecute said charge against him. Suspension issued on the 26th day of February, 1916.

OLLIE WITT, Wayne County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, of the offense of keeping house of ill fame, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Ollie Witt returned to her husband and family at Emerson, Nebraska. Suspension issued on the 28th day of February, 1916.

RAPHAEL DAVILLA, Wapello County. Convicted at the January term, 1915, of the offense of breaking and entering a railroad car, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said Raphael Davilla and deport him to his native country as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 31st day of March, 1916.

JOSE SERVANTES, Wapello County. Convicted at the December term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said Jose Servantes and deport him to his native country as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 31st day of March, 1916.

J. R. BROWN, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. R. Brown is to be delivered to the officers of Buchanan County, Mo., for the purpose of prosecution on an indictment pending against him. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of April, 1916.

JAMES KEHOE, Woodbury County. Convicted at the January term, 1916, of the offense of conspiracy, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed three years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the statement of the prison physician being that the prisoner is afflicted with tuberculosis, and his wife having agreed to receive him and care for him. Suspension was issued on the 10th day of April, 1916.

HENRIETTE LEWIS, Webster County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of larceny from the person, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Henrietta Lewis returned to the home of her parents at Wagoner, Oklahoma. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of April, 1916.

ALBERT PARNITZKE, Van Buren County. Convicted at the December term, 1891, of the offense of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to serve a term of life in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the application for pardon or parole having been referred to the Board for investigation and recommendation, and their report being that the sentence be suspended and that the said Albert Parnitzke should go to the home of his brother at Canton, Kansas, who will give him employment. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of June, 1916.

A. H. ESPONDOLA, Linn County. Convicted at the August term, 1915, of the offense of carrying concealed weapons, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed two years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said A. H. Espondola and deport him to his native country as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of June, 1916.

CHARLES BRIGGS, Davis County. Convicted at the December term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles Briggs returned to the home of his parents at Akron, Ohio. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of July, 1916.

ALBERT HERMAN, Mills County. Convicted at the August term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Albert Herman is to be delivered to the authorities of the Reformatory at Jeffersonville, Indiana, it appearing that he is a parole violator from said institution. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of July, 1916.

ANTONIO DAMOS VASCOS, Hardin County. Convicted at the March term, 1916, of the offense of larceny from a building in the day-time, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said prisoner and deport him as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 11th day of October, 1916.

MIGAL LOPEZ, Hardin County. Convicted at the March term, 1916, of the offense of larceny from a building in the day-time, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the United States authorities are to receive the said prisoner and deport him as an undesirable citizen. Suspension was issued on the 11th day of October, 1916.

GEORGE WELLS, Boone County. Convicted at the March term, 1916, of the offense of carrying concealed weapons, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed two years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said George Wells is to go with his mother, who is locating in the State of North Dakota. Suspension was issued on the 10th day of November, 1916.

TOM GARDNER, Cass County. Convicted at the May term, 1915, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Tom Gardner is to be delivered to the authorities of the state of Illinois, it appearing that he is a parole violator from the Penitentiary at Joliet. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of November, 1916.

HARRY CLIFFORD, Woodbury County. Convicted at the August term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the Reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Harry Clifford is to be delivered to the authorities of the State of Indiana, it appearing that he is a parole violator from the Reformatory at Jeffersonville, Indiana. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of November, 1916.

CHARLES E. BALDWIN, Sioux County. Convicted at the September term, 1912, of the offense of obtaining money under false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the Penitentiary. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles E. Baldwin is granted the privilege of entering into employment outside of the State of Iowa. Suspension was issued on the 29th day of November, 1916.

SUSPENSION OF COUNTY JAIL SENTENCES.

WARREN JACKSON, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of a fine of three hundred dollars, for the offense of a nuisance. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 5th day of January, 1915.

JAMES MATURO, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of a fine of five hundred dollars, for the offense of a liquor nuisance. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 6th day of January, 1915.

JOE JESTER, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of a fine of six hundred dollars, for the offense of a nuisance. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 13th day of January, 1915.

ED. BONHAM, Madison County. Convicted at the December term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of eight months, for the offense of larceny from a building in the daytime. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, county attorney, clerk of the district court, the sheriff and board of supervisors. Suspension issued on the 27th day of January, 1915.

J. A. TREGANZA, Hancock County. Convicted at the May term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of six months, for the offense of open, obscene and indecent exposure of his person. This suspension is granted after a full hearing, at which both the state and the defendant were represented, upon the whole record of the case and upon the recommendation of many of the citizens of the county who have known the defendant many years. Suspension issued on the 5th day of February, 1915.

L. T. FORD, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of three months, for the offense of contempt of court. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge and prosecuting attorney. Suspension issued on the 9th day of February, 1915.

BERT NEAL, Jasper County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of one year, for the offense of seduction. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney and a petition numerously signed by residents in and about the town of Mingo, the defendant agreeing to contribute toward the support of his illegitimate child the amount of seven dollars per month. Suspension issued on the 16th day of February, 1915.

WILLIAM WINTERS, Floyd County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of six months, for the offense of cheating by false pretenses. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, sheriff and several citizens of the county. Suspension issued on the 1st day of March, 1915.

ORRIN L. WEEKS, Floyd County. Convicted at the September term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of ten months, for the offense of forgery. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, sheriff and a number of representative citizens of Charles City. Suspension issued on the 3rd day of March, 1915.

MAMIE CUNNINGHAM, Jasper County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of six months, for the offense of lewdness. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney and the sheriff. Suspension issued on the 8th day of March, 1915.

LOUIS THORNE, Jasper County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of nine months, for the offense of cheating by false pretenses. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney and five other county officers. Suspension issued on the 8th day of March, 1915.

J. A. WILLIAMSON, Polk County. Convicted at the December, 1914, and January, 1915, terms, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of three months and in default of payment of a fine of two hundred dollars, for the offense of contempt of court; also in default of payment of a fine of three hundred dollars for the offense of maintaining a nuisance. These suspensions are granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judges, the prosecuting attorney in the contempt of court case, and the county attorney in the nuisance case. Suspension issued on the 11th day of March, 1915.

BEN REYNOLDS, Jones County. Convicted at the March term, 1915, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of fines of one hundred dollars each in two cases, for the offense of unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, the petition of twenty reliable citizens of Anamosa, the statement of the county attorney being that under the circumstances he does not oppose clemency. Suspension issued on the 8th day of April, 1915.

JOHN DILLON McMANNUS, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1915, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of five months, for the offense of larceny of chickens in the night-time. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 17th day of April, 1915.

M. L. LYNCH, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1915, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of four months and to pay a fine of one hundred dollars, for the offense of receiving stolen property. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 6th day of May, 1915.

THOS. E. HARTSHORN, Mahaska County. Convicted at the October term, 1914, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of a fine of four hundred dollars, for the offense of violation of injunction. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge and county attorney. Suspension issued on the 12th day of May, 1915.

A. E. HIGHBERGER, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1915, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of a fine of three hundred dollars, for the offense of contempt of court. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, and the prosecuting attorney. Suspension issued on the 18th day of May, 1915.

SAMUEL MITCHELL, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1915, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of four months, for the offense of vagrancy. Convicted in Valley Township Justice Court, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of payment of a fine of twenty-five dollars, for the offense hunting wild game without procuring a license. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the justice who imposed the sentence. Suspension issued on the 1st day of December, 1916.

ED. VON KUTZLEBEN, Jefferson County. Convicted on August 15, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of ten months and to pay a fine of one hundred dollars, for the offense of breaking and entering. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, sheriff and prosecuting witness. Suspension issued on the 9th day of December, 1916.

DALE VOSS, Jefferson County. Convicted on August 15, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of ten months and to pay a fine of one hundred dollars, for the offense of breaking and entering. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, sheriff and prosecuting witness. Suspension issued on the 9th day of December, 1916.

E. J. O'CONNOR, Fayette County. Convicted at the September term, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail to serve a term

of four months, for the offense of bootlegging. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, the certificate of three physicians stating that the prisoner is in a serious condition physically, and the petition of practically all of the county officials and a number of business men. Suspension issued on the 15th day of December, 1916.

HENRY JARCK, Muscatine County. Convicted at the June term, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail to serve a term of six months and pay a fine of one thousand dollars, for the offense of contempt of court. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, and a petition signed by sixty-five professional and business men of Muscatine. Suspension issued on the 19th day of December, 1916.

FRED DONISTHORPE, Linn County. Convicted at the January term, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail to serve a term of one year, for the offense of assault with intent to inflict great bodily injury. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge, county attorney, and practically all of the county officials. Suspension issued on the 22nd day of December, 1916.

IVAN PINYON, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1916, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail to serve terms of thirty and ninety days, for the offense of larceny and malicious mischief. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the presiding judge and county attorney, it appearing that the said Ivan Pinyon is suffering from an ailment which necessitates his removal to the hospital for an operation. Suspension issued on the 26th day of December, 1916.
