PARDONS.

P. C. TRUE, Wapello County. Sentenced at the March term, 1915, to serve a term of four months in the county jail, for the crime of contempt of court. Pardon was recommended by trial judge and county attorney,

based upon the fact that the Supreme Court held the law unconstitutional under which sentence was imposed. Pardon was granted on the second day of June, 1917.

FRED POWERS, Cherokee County. Sentenced at the January term, 1915, to serve a term of two years in the reformatory, for the crime of carrying concealed weapons, which sentence was upon appeal to the Supreme Court modified to thirty days in jail. It appearing that the said Fred Powers volunteered to serve his country in the United States Navy, pardon was granted on the sixth day of July, 1917.

T. H. KLEFFEL, Linn County. Sentenced at the September term, 1918, to serve a term of four months in the county jail, for the crime of lewd and lascivious acts. Clemency was recommended by the trial judge and county attorney, a detailed statement of the reasons for such recommendation being on file with the records in the case. Pardon was granted on the seventh day of November, 1918.

ERNEST RATHBUN, Ida County. Sentenced at the November term, 1917, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Clemency was recommended by the trial judge and county attorney. Pardon was granted on the record, taking into consideration the evidence introduced upon the trial and the facts and circumstances connected with the case as presented to me in support of the application for pardon. Pardon was granted on the 16th day of November, 1918.

DAVID WILLIAM MYERS, Dubuque County. Sentenced at the May term, 1918, to serve a term of six months in the county jail for the crime of assault with intent to inflict great bodily injury. Pardon was recommended by the trial judge and county attorney and a large number of citizens of Dubuque, and was granted on the 18th day of November, 1918.

O. S. MUNDORF, Pottawattamie County. Sentenced at the November term, 1916, to serve a term of one year in the penitentiary for the crime of assault with intent to inflict great bodily injury. Conditional pardon was recommended by the Board of Parole, a detailed statement of the reasons for such recommendation being on file with the record in the case. Conditional pardon was granted on the seventh day of March, 1918.

COMMUTATIONS.

PHIL CARNES, Monona County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 9th day of February, 1915, to serve a term of not to exceed five years, for the crime of larceny. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to one year, five months and twelve days, the purpose being to release the said Phil Carnes to the United States Navy, from which he deserted. Commutation was executed on the 16th day of April, 1917.

W. C. ROGERS, Pottawattamie County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison, on the 13th day of March, 1904, to serve a term of twenty-five years for the crime of murder in the second degree. Upon recom-

mendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirteen years and three months solid time in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 28th day of May, 1917.

A. B. SMITH, Union County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa, on the 3rd day of September, 1916, to serve a term of not to exceed fifteen years, for the crime of uttering a forged instrument. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to five years, ten months and eighteen days solid time in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of June, 1917.

JOSEPH BOGDANY, Monroe County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison and subsequently transferred to the reformatory at Anamosa, to serve a term of life for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 6th day of July, 1917.

IRA BOYS, Monona County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 20th day of March, 1915, to serve a term of life, for the crime of burglary. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of twenty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 6th day of July, 1917.

FRED CHRISS, Woodbury County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 10th day of February, 1910, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder second degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of twenty years. Commutation was executed on the 18th day of September, 1917.

CHARLES THOMAS, Polk County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 30th day of April, 1905, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of November, 1917.

JESSE FINLEY, Poweshiek County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 8th day of April, 1909, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 23d day of December, 1917.

A. D. STORMS, Louisa County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 30th day of September, 1898, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 22d day of December, 1917.

CHARLES GORDON, Monroe County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 2nd day of March, 1916, to serve a term of life, for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of eight years in said Penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 22nd day of December, 1917.

CHARLES A. HOLADAY, Johnson County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 12th day of December, 1902, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder second degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty-three years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 22nd day of December, 1917.

WILLIAM WEBSTER, Polk County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 27th day of October, 1909, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder second degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 22nd day of December, 1917.

THOMAS V. HOSKINSON, Muscatine County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 2nd day of January, 1912, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder second degree. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of sixteen years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 22nd day of December, 1917.

M. C. AVERY, Lyon County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison, on the 21st day of October, 1916, to serve a term of life, for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 21st day of January, 1918.

BETSY SMITH, Polk County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 30th day of June, 1894, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 24th day of January, 1918.

GEORGE WRIGHT, Muscatine County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 7th day of May, 1900, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 24th day of January, 1918.

ALICE McCARL, Cerro Gordo County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 29th day of September, 1914, to serve a term of five years, for the crime of keeping house of ill fame. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of three years, seven months and twenty-two days solid time in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 18th day of May, 1918.

WILLIAM R. POTTER, Mills County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 14th day of October, 1912, to serve a term of fifteen years, for the crime of uttering a forged instrument. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 12th day of July, 1918.

L. R. VAN TASSEL, Chickasaw County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first

degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 23rd day of November, 1918.

JOHN H. CATER, Fayette County. Committed to the penitentiary at Anamosa on the 17th day of July, 1897, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 25th day of November, 1918.

WILLIAM LUCAS, Page County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 2nd day of October, 1902, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder first degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 26th day of November, 1918.

MIKE HALEN, Fayette County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 22nd day of April, 1909, to serve a term of life, for the crime of murder second degree. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 27th day of November, 1918.

HENRY BINNING, Clay County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 15th day of July, 1916, to serve a term of life, for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 2nd day of December, 1918.

LOREN FRUSH, Warren County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison, on the 5th day of April, 1917, to serve a term of life, for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 2nd day of December, 1918.

STEPHEN HYDE, Clinton County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 20th day of June, 1916, to serve a term of life, for the crime of having carnal knowledge of an imbecile female. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of fifteen years in said Penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 2nd day of December, 1918.

JOHN RIDGEWAY, Keokuk County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 17th day December, 1914, to serve a term of life, for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of December, 1918.

JOHN HOLMES, Pottawattamie County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 17th day of April, 1913, to serve a term of life for the crime of placing obstructions on the track of a railroad. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to a term of thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of December, 1918.

SUSPENSIONS.

JOHN GAINS, Bremer County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of possessing burglar tools, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Gains was to enter the employment of relatives in the State of Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 4th day of January, 1917.

OSCAR LARSON, Carroll County. Convicted at the December term, 1909, of the offense of aggravated burglary, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary, and who was subsequently transferred to the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Oscar Larson was returned to his native country of Sweden. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of February, 1917.

WILLIAM CARSTENS, Woodbury County. Convicted at the September term, 1913, of the offense of assault with intent to commit a felony, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said William Carstens was permitted to go to East Helena, Montana, to enter the employment of relatives on a farm. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of February, 1917.

PAUL HAWLEY, Dubuque County. Convicted at the June term, 1912, of the offense of obtaining money by false pretense, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Paul Hawley was permitted to go to Owensburg, Kentucky, to enter into employment which had been arranged for by the Board of Parole. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of March, 1917.

ED GIBSON, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the presiding Judge and County Attorney before commitment, and thereunder the said Ed Gibson was placed under the direction and supervision of the Board of Parole. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of March, 1917.

CARL McCUNE, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the presiding Judge and County Attorney before commitment, and thereunder the said Carl McCune was placed under the direction and supervision of the Board of Parole. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of March, 1917.

HUGH S. BEST, Warren County. Convicted at the January term, 1916, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term,

not to exceed five years in the reformatory, under which judgment he was paroled before commitment by the Board of Parole. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole to permit the said Hugh S. Best to report for duty under his previous enlistment with the First Machine Gun Company, Iowa National Guard, in response to the call for mobilization of troops, issued by the President of the United States. Suspension was issued on the 26th day of March, 1917.

MARGUERITE DENNY, Lynn County. Convicted at the January term, 1916, of the offense of assault with intent to commit great bodily injury, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed one year, in the reformatory. This suspension is granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Marguerite Denny was permitted to return to her husband in Kansas City, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 30th day of March, 1917.

LOU DORAN, Woodbury County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of conspiracy, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed three years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Lou Doran entered the employment of the Cudahy Packing Company at Salt Lake City, Utah. Suspension issued on the 11th day of April, 1917.

WILLIAM BOTENGA, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the November term, 1910, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said William Botenga was returned to Holland, under the direction of the Consul-General of the Netherlands. Suspension was issued on the 14th day of April, 1917.

HENRY WASHINGTON, Fayette County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of returning the said Henry Washington to the state penitentiary at Lansing, Kansas. Suspension was issued on the 24th day of April, 1917.

JESSE BECK, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the presiding Judge and County Attorney, before commitment, and thereunder the said Jesse Beck was placed under the direction and supervision of the Board of Parole. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of April, 1917.

H. H. DUNKIN, Page County. Convicted at the September term, 1915, of the offense of cheating by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said H. H. Dunkin returned to his home in the state of Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 23rd day of May, 1917.

C. A. ANSON, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1917, of the offense of arson, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and said C. A. Anson entered into employment in Pipestone County, Minnesota. Suspension was issued on the 2nd day of July, 1917.

FRANK J. HELLER, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1917, of the offense of arson, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and said Frank J. Heller entered into employment in Pipestone County, Minnesota. Suspension was issued on the 2nd day of July, 1917.

EDWARD PIERCE, Lynn County. Convicted at the April term, 1911, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Edward Pierce returned to the home of his mother at Newark, New York. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of July, 1917.

J. H. STANDRING, Hancock County. Convicted at the May term, 1914, of the offense of forgery and diverting funds of the bank, and sentenced to serve indeterminate terms, not to exceed ten years and five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. H. Standring entered employment at Santa Ana, California. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of July, 1917.

M. T. HIDY, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1916, of the offense of larceny by embezzlement, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said M. T. Hidy returned to the home of his father, Wilber, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 10th day of July, 1917.

J. C. ANDERSON, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1915, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. C. Anderson was delivered to the authorities of the State of Kansas, for the purpose of returning him to the penitentiary at Lansing. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of July, 1917.

ROBERT LONG, Woodbury County. Convicted at the January term, 1914, of the offense of assault with intent to rob, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Robert Long was placed in the care and custody of his brother in the State of Texas, such release being from the insane department at the reformatory. Suspension was issued on the 14th day of August, 1917.

EARNEST BUSH, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the May term, 1910, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Earnest Bush entered into employment outside the State of Iowa. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of September, 1917.

WILLIAM KETRING, Webster County. Convicted at the January term, 1909, of the offense of forgery, two charges, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said William Ketring went to Goshen, Indiana, to take up work on a farm in which he had an interest. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of September, 1917.

MILTON O. WOODFALL, Des Moines County. Convicted at the November term, 1915, of the offense of obtaining money under false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Milton O. Woodfall was given an opportunity to seek outdoor activities to better his physical condition, he having developed tubercular conditions which prevented his being placed in employment under parole. Suspension was issued on the 29th day of September, 1917.

JOHN B. DU CHESNE, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1915, of the offense of larceny, concealing mortgaged property, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John B. Du Chesne was permitted to establish his home in the State of Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of October, 1917.

WAYNE O'NEAL, Wayne County. Convicted at the May term, 1916, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Wayne O'Neal was placed in the custody of his sister at Centerville, Iowa, he being released from the prison hospital, his condition being tubercular and paralytic. Suspension issued on the 19th day of October, 1917.

JOHN MILTON, Blackhawk County. Convicted at the November term, 1914, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Milton was delivered to the enlisting officer for England and Canada, he being a British subject. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of October, 1917.

SAMUEL A. ASHMAN, Bremer County. Convicted at the January term, 1914, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an

indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Samuel A. Ashman went to the home of his brother at Sacramento, California. Suspension was issued on the 29th day of October, 1917.

CHARLES SMITH, Des Moines County. Convicted at the May term, 1913, of the offense of rape, and sentenced to serve a term of life, which sentence was, on the 4th day of September, 1914, commuted to a term of fifteen years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles Smith was delivered to the authorities of the State of Illinois for the purpose of returning him to the state penitentiary at Joliet. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of November, 1917.

FRANZ MEYER, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1914, of the offense of abduction and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Franz Meyer was permitted to go to Colorado for his health, the statement of the prison physician being that he is tubercular. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of December, 1917.

CLAUDE BRASHEAR, Des Moines County. Convicted at the November term, 1913, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles Brashear was returned to his home in the state of Kentucky. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of January, 1918.

JOHN McCLARY, Dubuque County. Convicted at the September term, 1916, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John McClary enlisted in the British Army. Suspension was issued on the 22nd day of January, 1918.

LILLIAN O'BRIEN, Scott County. Convicted at the September term, 1914, of the offense of keeping house of ill fame, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory.
