GOVERNOR'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS

N. E. KENDALL

Members of the Senate and House of the Thirty-ninth General Assembly:

It is impossible for me adequately to acknowledge my indebtedness to the generous people of Iowa for the great distinction they have conferred upon me. I am profoundly impressed by the tremendous obligations which I assume at this hour, and in all humility of spirit I look for light and leading to the great Governor of the Universe.

I cannot be indifferent to the fact that I am inducted to this station after a political contest of unexampled asperity, in which personal antagonism and partisan rancor were acutely aroused. This was regrettable, of course, but a tranquil philosophy enables one to forgive the aim and to forget the wound. As I undertake the exacting labors of this exalted office not a single sentiment of animosity actuates me toward anybody who may have assailed me in the campaign just concluded. Is it not permissible, therefore, that I invite those who have opposed me to unite with those who have sustained me in magnanimous rivalry to fortify the welfare of our beloved commonwealth to whose fortunes we are all so devotedly attached? Iowa is a grand State, and deserves to be grandly governed. Her citizenship is the most enlightened, the most patriotic, the most progressive, beneath the stars and stripes. It is fairly entitled to every blessing that can be attained through the manifold agencies of organized society. I enter upon the weighty responsibilities of the Governorship without pledge or promise of any description to any individual or group of individuals upon any subject whatsoever. I confess allegiance only to my solemn covenant with the whole electorate to render in return for the preferment bestowed upon me the uttermost that in me lies toward an honest, efficient and economical administration of their affairs. I know where attention will be focused in the months immediately to come, and I expect to be subjected to a high degree of accountability. I shall abide the severest scrutiny

of my public conduct, for I shall be merely the temporary servant of the sovereign people, amenable to them for every official act. I shall accept with hospitality always their advice and counsel, for I am deeply persuaded that no man has been sufficiently endowed by the Creator to perform alone the difficult duties of this position. Therefore, the Executive office will, while I occupy it, belong to the men and women of Iowa irrespective of race, creed or color. With an assured reliance upon the beneficent favor of Almighty God, I invoke the helpful co-operation of my fellow citizens.

It is not the legitimate function of an inaugural address, as I conceive its true character, to indicate a definite legislative program to be pursued by the General Assembly. Without offending the occasion, however, I may present some general observations, to be followed later by specific recommendations as their propriety may be manifest.

This Legislature has inherited from its predecessor the revision of the Code—a task of immense magnitude and incalculable importance which cannot longer be deferred. The way to revise the Code is to revise it, as expeditiously as may be, with a maximum of care, at a minimum of cost. The work cannot be unduly hurried, but it should be entered upon at as early a date as practicable, and prosecuted with all possible diligence to its early consummation. It is doubtful if it can be entirely accomplished within the limits usually assigned to a regular session, but such progress may be made that a subsequent session, if necessary to complete it will be of comparatively brief duration. When it is remembered that there is involved not merely the verification of the Compiled Code with its 9,589 sections, but a most searching inspection of every phrase embodied in the 253 bills submitted by the Code Commission, the labor entailed upon you may be partially appreciated. The procedure now in contemplation has been formulated by your committee after the maturest deliberation by those best qualified to consider the subject, and I believe it is the most feasible one that can be adopted in the circumstances.

You as the General Assembly and I as the Executive will grievously disappoint the just expectations of the State if we fail to institute the most rigid economy in all expenditures of every character. The people are staggering under burdens almost too oppressive for them to support, and while they are compelled to practice a judicious frugality themselves, they are in no mood to tolerate a prodigal extravagance in those they have selected to represent them. The period of our convening is a critical one, in which retrenchment

rather than expansion must be our unvarying policy. We have not yet entirely sobered from the intoxication engendered by the war, during which feverish time we became accustomed to calculate in billions, and it is humiliating to condescend to compute in thousands. We shall be solicited for appropriations aggregating a stupendous total and every asking must be sharply investigated. Concerning each appropriation requested at our hands certain fundamental tests may well be applied: (1) Is it necessary that it be granted at all? (2) Is it necessary that it be granted to this extent? And (3) Is it necessary that it be granted now? If, without impairment of the public interest, it can be denied altogether, or diminished in amount, or postponed to a more prosperous season, the alternative should be embraced as the case may be. We are the disbursers of the funds of the State, and it has no revenues whatever except those extracted directly or indirectly from the pockets of the taxpayers. We must not allow the current levy to be increased while the cost of everything the people have to buy remains abnormal, and the price of everything they have to sell continues to decline. We are the trustees of a sacred trust, and we owe it to the voters whose agents we are to transact the business to which they have commissioned us as carefully and as prudently as we would transact our own.

I believe that some reforms can be initiated whereby the expenses of government may be materially reduced, and I intend to suggest one or two topics for consideration.

I start with the various boards, bureaus and commissions which have been created by law, and in respect of them I have to say that in my judgment they are altogether more numerous than is warranted by good administration. They have been created from time to time as in recent years the activities of the State have multiplied, and because those activities have not been properly systematized and co-ordinated. The result, as might have been apprehended, is overlapping of duties, duplication of powers, confusion of authority, and the waste which unavoidably accompanies such disorder. My study of conditions has confirmed me in the opinion that some of these agencies could be suitably consolidated with others, and thereby a saving effected of several hundred thousand dollars annually. I enjoin upon the General Assembly a thorough and complete analysis, either by itself or through a competent committee, of the State's revenues and disbursements; of the departmental organization now existing; and of all matters incident to the fiscal management of the commonwealth, to the end that a more improved business system

may be introduced into the administration of our financial affairs. In the meantime I offer the following for your earnest reflection:

1. The reorganization of the Board of Agriculture and the enlargement of its functions to include those now exercised by:

- The Iowa State Poultry Association
- The Horticultural Society
- The Weather and Crop Service
- The State Apiarist
- The Commission of Animal Health
- The State Entomologist
- The State Dairy Association
- The Beef Cattle Breeders' Association
- The State Veterinarian
- The Corn and Small Grain Producers' Association.

2. The reorganization of the State Board of Health and the enlargement of its functions to include those now exercised by:

- The State Food and Dairy Commission
- The Commission of Pharmacy
- The State Oil Inspector
- The State Board of Dental Examiners
- The State Mine Inspectors
- The State Board of Optometry Examiners
- The State Fire Marshal
- The State Boat Inspectors.

3. The reorganization of the State Library and the enlargement of its functions to include those now exercised by:

- The State Historical Department
- The State Library
- The Library Commission
- The Bureau of Public Archives
- The Academy of Sciences
- The State Conservation Commission.

4. The reorganization of the Board of Control and the enlargement of its functions to include those now exercised by:

- The Board of Parole.

5. The revision of Chapter I, Title XXXIV of the Compiled Code in such fashion that the designation of special officers as authorized by Section 9055 and 9059 shall be made exclusively by the Attorney General, upon whom is devolved the primary duty of law enforcement.

It is altogether probable that some of the consolidations I have indicated may not be the most desirable that can be achieved, and that others more feasible may be devised. I dismiss the discussion with the reminder that on April 25, 1914, the Committee on Retrenchment and Reform filed with the Secretary of State a "Consolidated Report on the Investigation of Existing Procedure Incident to the Transaction of the Business of the State." It is an elaborate treatise with somewhat extended recommendations and it is available for examination by the Legislature. The subject is one of infinite complexity, but we must grapple with it fearlessly and without delay. It is incumbent upon us to answer the imperative demand for a scientific systematization of the business of the State, for a reduction in the number of those managing its activities, and for a curtailment of the expenses incident to its operations.

I advert next to the legislative department itself. From my observation and experience in the past I am perfectly convinced that as compared to previous General Assemblies, at least Thirty-five Thousand Dollars can be saved at this session if it shall be determined to engage only such assistants to attend upon the Senate and House as are absolutely essential to their efficient operation. The situation respecting the matter is thoroughly understood, and the mischief inherent in it cannot be extenuated. At the hazard of incurring the displeasure of some who hope through your indulgence to arrange comfortable connections with the treasury, I venture the assertion that the employment of a sizable army of superfluous committee clerks, stenographers, messengers, and janitors, is a scandalous squandering of the public money which should not be further countenanced. This appeal may be ridiculed in some quarters as attacking an abuse negligible because insignificant, but I know that the consistent application of sensible business principles to the machinery of legislation will encounter the unqualified sanction of the folks at home. The ancient motto was: "He serves his party best, who serves his country best." The instant maxim is: "He serves his State best, who saves her people most."

The law authorizing the exemption of property from taxation is, in my opinion, too liberal in its provisions, and in many instances operates to relieve from the expenses of government those best able to bear them. A searching examination of the subject should be instituted at once, to the end that all shall be required fairly to contribute to the burdens imposed upon the entire community. An illustration of the inequity which now exists may be discovered in the statute which recites:

"That in determining the assessed value of bank stock the amount of obligations issued by the United States Government . . . actually owned by a bank or trust company, shall be deducted."

This exemption has been the subject of general discussion throughout the State during the past year, and its injustice is almost uniformly conceded. I believe it to be entirely indefensible in morals, and I trust that its repeal may be speedily effected by the General Assembly. In this connection I submit that if any property heretofore liable to taxation is to be allowed immunity from assessment, the modest dwelling house of the man of limited resources should be favored as an encouragement to the more universal ownership of family homesteads in the State. While I am on this subject I may say that our laws governing the levy and collection of taxes are archaic and unworkable. They ought to be rewritten and modernized, and one forward step in that direction would be to declare all property assessable at its actual value. The revision should be radical enough and far reaching enough that equality of the sacrifice involved in the payment of taxes may be reasonably approximated.

The present law governing corporations organized for pecuniary profit should be visited with drastic amendments. The past three years in Iowa have witnessed a saturnalia of stock jobbery which has plundered the people and disgraced the State. It perplexes the ordinary imagination to comprehend the magnitude of the spoliation which has been brazenly practiced upon unsuspecting investors. The vast sums which have been enticed from confiding citizens through various schemes represented to supply an industrial necessity and guaranteed to produce fabulous dividends, are appalling. In some instances the corporations fostered were conceived for legitimate purposes under reputable management, and almost without exception they have succeeded. But more often they were concocted not to establish industries or to benefit stockholders, but to enrich the conscienceless promoter who frequently divided the loot with some local abettor who furnished respectability for the vicious enterprise. By the enactment of the Peterson law we were a pioneer in prohibiting the issuance of stock except for cash or its equivalent; but expert cunning is ever ingenious and as we omitted to appoint a maximum amount which might be absorbed in promotion outlay, our State has become a rendezvous for every crooked exploiter in the Mississippi Valley. In any remedial legislation which may be contemplated the difficulty will be to abolish the fraudulent traffic of the professional

swindler without interfering with untrammelled opportunity for meritorious development. I believe we can accomplish substantial reform by extending our statute to cover domestic as well as foreign corporations, and by

- (1) Requiring every corporation and individual stock salesman to procure a license from the Secretary of State.
- (2) Exacting an ample bond from corporation and salesman alike, to be available to any injured party for civil recoupment.
- (3) Denouncing false representations as a felony, punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary.
- (4) Providing that every note taken for stock or bonds shall recite the fact plainly on its face.
- (5) Limiting to a settled per cent the amount that may be diverted to expense of promotion.

Other expedient amendments will doubtless occur to you as the territory to be amended is thoughtfully surveyed.

The authority now enjoyed by the Insurance Department over organizations nominally under its jurisdiction is so limited as to be almost farcical. It may approve the articles of incorporation of insurance societies when they have been certified by the Attorney General as formally prepared, but thereafter it has no further control over the company until after its stock is negotiated, its assets converted into securities for deposit, and application made for the statutory license to transact business. This supervision is wholly incompetent. The powers of the Department should be augmented to constitute complete authority over the company from its inception throughout its entire career: with discretion to restrict promotion expenses, condemn improper promotion literature, and exclude companies from the State unless organized and conducted in compliance with its regulations. The whole field of insurance law should be closely explored, and such changes made as will more completely protect the people of the State both in investment and in indemnity.

The Act of Congress of June 2, 1920, providing for the rehabilitation of persons disabled in productive industry, their return to civil employment, and allotting federal funds in amounts equal to those appropriated for the purpose by the respective States, should have our immediate attention. No phase of vocational education is more directly occupied with the conservation of social and individual welfare. Vocational rehabilitation embraces all the ideals of vocational

education in general, which are summarized in the one word "efficiency." Some definite action toward the rehabilitation of injured persons has been entered upon in twenty-four States, and seventeen have already availed of the legislation enacted by Congress. My predecessor has accepted the law provisionally, as contemplated in the act, and the State Board of Vocational Education has proceeded properly to the preliminaries necessary to avail of the money tendered by the government for the fiscal period of 1920-1921. Everything has been done that can be done without your action. The money has been certified to the State for this very admirable educational work, and we ought to make it possible to begin the retraining at once of the unfortunates who are to be benefited. Society, through the instrumentality of the State, must make every possible provision for those of its individual members who are handicapped by disability, in order that they may be readjusted to another occupation in which they may be self-respecting and self-supporting citizens rather than the recipients of public or private charity. Such provision for the re-education of injured persons is the most economical form of industrial insurance, and withal so humanitarian in its nature as to evoke the approval of the best conscience of the age. I recommend the subject as one worthy your early action.

The condition of agriculture, our dominant industry and the fountain from which flows our surest prosperity, is at this time a matter of genuine anxiety. We deservedly rank as the leading food-producing state in the Union, the average value of our farm land is greater than elsewhere, and we have a smaller percentage that is un-tillable. Here is resident the highest type of rural citizenship, and here is evinced the finest sort of rustic life. The intelligence of our farmers, the relatively large farm units, the use of labor-saving machinery, the richness of our soil, and the unfailing sunshine and rainfall, all enable us to obtain prodigious crops both per man and per acre. We are to be felicitated upon these enviable advantages which are peculiar to us over less favored sections of the country. Notwithstanding all this, our farmers in common with those of the Nation, are distressed by economic conditions which, if not corrected, will entail widespread agricultural depression from which our industrial and commercial interests cannot hope to escape. Practically all our crops are retailing now at prices far below the actual cost of production. In the case of corn, our staple cereal, the record is that the production cost last year was ninety-five cents per bushel, while the selling price is now fifty-five cents per bushel. As a consequence, many of our farmers, especially those who rented

on a basis of land and crop values prevailing a year ago, are in financial extremities, and not a few of them are confronted with the total loss of their patient accumulations. What can be done to alleviate their unfortunate predicament is a matter for the most earnest consideration. The disagreeable truth must be frankly recognized that their deplorable plight is largely due to the sweep of world-wide forces that are independent of any decree of ours. But we must not ignore the fact that the situation is serious, that our principal industry is jeopardized, and that enlightened self-interest bespeaks our utmost effort to avert the calamity which threatens. The future of our agriculture must be placed upon a securer foundation, so that our people may not again be imperiled by a recurrence of the adverse conditions which now prostrate their occupation.

More than one-half of our land is now cultivated by tenants. The increase in tenancy always has been co-incidental with the increase in land values, and it is attended by certain evils which react detrimentally both upon the producing and the consuming public. I believe we should order a most careful inquiry into the tenancy problem with a view of contriving some system which, while doing justice both to landlord and lessee, will conserve insofar as possible the virgin fertility of the soil. Intimately connected with this subject is the proposal for personal credit for tenant farmers. A considerable proportion of them are unable to utilize the most approved methods of grain and live-stock farming because of insufficient working capital. Whether the State should endeavor to provide aid for their relief is open to grave doubt, especially at the present time. But the enactment of such legislation as may be necessary to permit them to form credit associations of their own would be wise as well as useful, and both parties are committed to such action. The unquestioned right of farmers to co-operate for collective bargaining and marketing should be not only freely and promptly granted, but encouraged to its fullest development. It is understood that many co-operative associations in the State have been arbitrarily hampered in securing sites and trackage for elevators, warehouses and stockyards. I believe that common carriers should be required, under proper safeguards, to furnish all such requisites when fair remuneration therefor is proffered.

There will be vigorous insistence for the unconditional abandonment of the State-wide primary. I think it should be denied. The present statute was enacted to rectify abuses which disfigured the caucus system it superseded, and to invest the individual voter with

enhanced power in the selection of all his party candidates. The departure was excellent in theory, but experience has disclosed that it is not entirely satisfactory in practice. The criticism most urgently interposed against its retention is that as to many positions to be filled the electors cannot familiarize themselves with the respective qualifications of all those who aspire to nomination, and that particularly with regard to the secondary offices they are compelled to choose almost without information. That there is some validity in this complaint cannot be controverted, but the objection may be readily obviated by transferring these offices to a convention composed of delegates chosen at the legalized primary. In another respect I believe the law could be improved by requiring a change of party affiliation to be announced at least six months antecedent to the primary. I trust we are all in accord that such modifications should be adopted as will remove the defects which have become apparent, and at the same time secure to the citizen unshackled opportunity to register his personal choice. The principle of the primary should not be surrendered, but the law should be so amended as to render less difficult and more effective the expression of the popular will.

Our election laws, both primary and general, should fix a reasonable limitation upon the amount of money any candidate may expend in the pursuit of a public office. Congress has provided that a congressional expenditure may not exceed the salary of the office for one year, and this standard might well be accepted as a just criterion in Iowa.

As I have remarked, the physical resources of Iowa are inexhaustible, and they prefigure a material prosperity unparalleled in any similar area in the world. In agriculture, in manufacturing, in mining, we have in profusion all the elementary sources of incomputable wealth. But our boys and girls are the most valuable asset of the commonwealth, and their intellectual training as well as moral discipline is the paramount solicitude of our people. In this behalf we have done something in the past, we are doing much in the present, we must do much more in the future. Our schools are unequalled anywhere the country round, and the ascendancy they now exemplify must never be forfeited by niggardly parsimony where their vital interests are concerned. Their equipment must be so ample that the best facilities will be furnished, and the salaries must be so adjusted that teaching will become a profitable profession. If we apprehend that the modern methods of instruction are

too progressive, perhaps it may be retorted that our prejudices are too reactionary. We must not become so conservative that we decline to look at the new moon out of reverence for the old. We had good schools forty years ago—we have better schools now. We are proud of the educational institutions of Iowa, and we rejoice exceedingly at the flattering results which they annually exhibit at the expiration of each recurring year; we applaud the unselfish consecration of those who so capably administer them; and we celebrate their surpassing service in that wide diffusion of intelligence which enables Iowa to outrank all other states in the literacy of her population. We know that if our schools should be obliterated for a single cycle, happiness would disappear within our borders, and our superb civilization would revert to savage barbarism. From the kindergarten to the university we venerate them all as the last and best bulwarks of our republican democracy, and from the isolated desk in the rural community all along the luminous avenue to the highest seat of classic learning they must be supported with a generosity which shall vindicate their primacy unchallenged. "Of all that is good, Iowa affords the best."

In the colossal war which but yesterday convulsed a continent, 105,000 of the bravest and best of our gallant boys were enrolled. They enlisted from every city, town and hamlet throughout the State, and every profession, business and avocation was represented in the grand army of freedom. The struggle into which they were precipitated was the most enormous in all recorded history. We engaged reluctantly, and only when it was demonstrated that our engagement was indispensable if the civilization of the centuries was to be preserved. The monstrous carnival of criminal outlawry which had paralyzed an impotent world for three years had to be stopped. They went "over there," and it stopped. The adventure was no holiday escapade, but they finished it famously, for they battled for the elimination of despotisms, and the establishment of democracies; for the extirpation of monarchs, and the enfranchisement of men. Let it never be forgotten now and henceforth throughout all the oncoming time that they who *went*, and not we who *stayed*, won the war; they by the hard article of deathless deeds, and not we by the soft argument of easy speech. Of course all of us contributed the full measure of our meager abilities, but *they* met the major danger, and *they* wrought the supreme decision; met and wrought with muscles of iron and nerves of steel and hearts of pure gold. Without regard to nationality, without respect to religion,

without reference to politics, they went forth to war for us, to war for humanity, to war for all the near and distant generations of the future. They left all, chanced all, in the holiest crusade ever chronicled in the annals of mankind, and they did not furl their flags nor sheathe their swords nor stack their guns until the malignant menace of medieval militarism was utterly eradicated from the earth. And then having rescued the world from the thralldom of tyranny which impended, they modestly discarded the uniform they had rendered immortal and quietly resumed the employments of civil citizenship. Heaven bless them every one, now and evermore! They may be depended upon to safeguard in peace what they wrested from war. Listen, if you please, to the noble and enduring aspirations which animate their hearts, as revealed by their own expression:

"To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States; to maintain law and order; to perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to combat the autocracy of the classes and of the masses; to promote peace and good will on earth; to transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy."

Those incomparable postulates command the unqualified endorsement of every patriotic American, and in my opinion they will live in the literature of liberty with the Gettysburg Address and the Second Inaugural. Dedicated as these heroic men are to this sublime program, I venture the prophecy that in the distracted time to come they will be an impregnable barrier against all the insidious forces of communism, anarchy and bolshevism which may challenge the permanency of our national institutions. How shall we requite their inestimable service? We cannot hope that whatever we may do will even partially liquidate our immeasurable debt to them, but surely it is obligatory upon a grateful people to restore, insofar as is humanly possible, every returned veteran to the favorable status he relinquished when he was summoned to the colors. The least we can do is to compensate him by bonus or otherwise for the economic disadvantages he suffered by reason of his enlistment. The privilege is one primarily belonging to the general government, but Congress has accomplished no progress in that direction. Other States are in advance of Iowa in the discharge of this peremptory duty, and we must not be derelict in embarking upon its performance. I commend the subject to the early and sympathetic consideration of the General Assembly.

I earnestly hope that among the earliest measures transmitted to me for approval will be one completely removing any discrimination that may at present encumber the statute against the unrestricted exercise by women of every prerogative now enjoyed by men. A new and notable epoch has opened, and he is without prevision indeed who is unable or unwilling to perceive its salutary significance. The nineteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States has been ratified, and we are all to be fervently congratulated upon the transcendent reform which is thus realized. Justice long delayed has been tardily awarded, and the women of America have been finally admitted to equal suffrage rights with men. From the beginning of authentic history they have ornamented the home, vitalized the school, and sanctified the church. We entertain implicit confidence that their refining influence exerted at the primary, the caucus, and the convention, will elevate our politics to a loftier level than any it has heretofore attained: and where is the skeptic who can doubt that the feminine conscience supplementing the masculine judgment will accelerate the triumph of every righteous cause. We welcome our sisters not only to unembarrassed fellowship in party organization, but to unabridged participation in public affairs. Beyond all peradventure their enthusiasm, their fidelity, and their idealism, will impart a stimulating incitement toward better and higher and purer government. In the administration which is inaugurated today the incomparable women of Iowa will be accorded abundant recognition by appointment to positions of importance and responsibility.

We are here to serve all the people—the white and the black, the high and the low, the rich and the poor, the strong and the weak, the great and the humble, the renowned and the obscure—all that mighty multitude which is the constituency of a commonwealth. They are the State which is the object of our undivided affection.

PART I

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL

GENERAL STATEMENT

There has been no change in the personnel of the Board of Control of State Institutions since our previous report was submitted for your consideration. A. M. McColl completed his term on June 30, 1919, and was selected by the Governor and General Assembly to succeed himself for the term ending June 30, 1925.

A change was made in the position of secretary to the board since last reporting to you. F. S. Treat, who had filled the position of secretary for nearly twenty years, was appointed by this board to the superintendency of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport, to take up that work March 1, 1920.

E. J. Hines, of Onslow, Jones county, was selected to fill the position of secretary. Mr. Hines assumed these duties March 1, 1920.

The institutions under the management of this board number fifteen, the same as shown in our previous report, and in addition we have the care and management of the state farm located at Clive, Iowa.

One institution, the State Hospital for Inebriates, was closed during the biennial period, and the construction and furnishing of a new institution, the State Juvenile Home, was begun during the same period. This work is referred to more in detail in another section of this report.

APPOINTMENTS BY THE BOARD

Max E. Witte was appointed superintendent of the Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda, to succeed himself, September 7, 1918, and entered upon the duties of his sixth term as superintendent.

George Donohoe was appointed superintendent of the Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee, to succeed himself, February 19,

1919, and entered upon the duties of his second term as superintendent March 1, 1919.

Mrs. Lucy M. Siekels was appointed superintendent of the Training School for Girls at Mitchellville, to succeed herself, March 11, 1919, and entered upon the duties of her third term as superintendent April 1, 1919.

George Mogridge was appointed to succeed himself as superintendent of the Institution for Feeble-minded Children at Glenwood, June 25, 1919, and entered upon the duties of his fourth term as superintendent July 1, 1919.

W. L. Kuser was appointed to succeed himself as superintendent of the Training School for Boys at Eldora, September 8, 1919, and entered upon the duties of his fourth term as superintendent September 1, 1919.

J. N. Baumel was appointed to succeed himself as warden of the Men's Reformatory at Anamosa, January 1, 1920.

H. V. Scarborough was appointed superintendent of the State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale, to succeed himself, January 12, 1920, and entered upon the duties of his third term as superintendent February 1, 1920.

M. N. Voldeng was appointed superintendent of the State Hospital and Colony for Epileptics at Woodward, to succeed himself, February 19, 1919, and entered upon the duties of his second term as superintendent March 1, 1919.

B. C. Whitehill was appointed commandant of the Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown, to succeed himself, March 13, 1920, and entered upon the duties of his second term as commandant April 1, 1920.

M. C. Maekin was appointed superintendent of the Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant, April 1, 1920, to succeed C. F. Applegate who resigned his position at that time to take up similar work in the West. Dr. Maekin became superintendent of the State Hospital for Inebriates at Knoxville, March 1, 1915, and acted in such capacity until that institution was closed.

F. S. Treat was appointed superintendent of the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport, April 1, 1920. Mr. Treat, prior to his appointment as superintendent, was employed in the department of the Board of Control of State Institutions as bookkeeper and accountant from July 1, 1898 until October 1, 1900, and as secretary to the board from October 1, 1900 until March 1, 1920, at

which time he resigned to assume his duties as superintendent of the Home.

J. R. Perkins was appointed warden of the State Penitentiary at Fort Madison to succeed himself, May 1, 1920.

R. A. Stewart was appointed superintendent of the Independence State Hospital at Independence, June 15, 1920, to succeed the late W. P. Crumbaeker, who passed away May 14, 1920, during the fifth term as superintendent. Superintendent Stewart assumed the duties of his office June 15, 1920.

A. E. Kepford was appointed superintendent of the new Juvenile Home at Toledo, September 1, 1920. Mr. Kepford was state lecturer on tuberculosis, which position he held nearly twelve years prior to this appointment.

Chas. N. Martin was appointed inspector of county homes and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, and homes for friendless children December 6, 1918, to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of H. H. McKee. Mr. Martin took up his duties as inspector January 1, 1919.

F. M. Hoeye was appointed state agent for the Training School for Boys at Eldora, August 10, 1918, to fill the vacancy, when Solon C. Vial went to a military training camp to enter the army.

S. V. Culp was appointed state agent for the Training School for Boys at Eldora, July 7, 1919.

Mrs. Belle Deming and Mrs. Henrietta D. Webber were appointed state agents, April 21, 1919, for the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport. On the same date, Mrs. Genevieve Henderson was appointed state agent for the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport and also to have charge of paroled cases from the Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City. Chapter 105 and 272 of the thirty-eighth general assembly amended the law relative to state agents, increasing the number from five to seven. Two of the above appointments were made under these sections.

No other appointments were made by the board of control for the period ending June 30, 1920.

STATE AGENTS

Since the last biennial report the board of control law, empowering this board to appoint state agents has been amended, increasing the number of agents from five to seven. Of this number, four have charge of the child placing from the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport, one of whom also has the supervision of the women paroled from the Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City: two have supervision over the boys placed on parole from the Training School for Boys at Eldora; and one has supervision over the girls placed on parole from the Training School for Girls at Mitchellville. Another state agent is needed to have charge of the child placing work for the Juvenile Home at Toledo and to assist in the work of placing boys from Eldora.

These state agents are kept busy finding suitable homes for children placed out from the Soldiers' Orphans' Home and also the boys, girls and women placed on parole from the two training schools and the Women's Reformatory. The duties of these state agents do not cease when boys, girls or women have been placed out in homes. The agents are required to visit, from time

to time, the homes where placements have been made and must know that those placed in homes are making good. The agents must also know that they are receiving proper care, treatment and education.

Since the last biennial report 284 children have been placed out from the Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport, into good homes, and 530 boys and girls have been placed out on parole from the training schools. A very large percentage of the boys and girls placed on parole make good, grow up to be good citizens, and are a credit to the community in which they live.

The state agent system makes it possible for every boy and girl in our training schools to make good if they have the desire to do so. The homes selected for them are among the best, and the large number of boys and girls placed out greatly reduces the population, which means a saving of thousands of dollars in maintaining these institutions.

During the biennial period twenty-five women have been paroled from the Women's Reformatory and have been under the supervision of a state agent.

STATE SANATORIUM, OAKDALE

We wish to impress upon you the necessity for additional buildings and equipment at this institution for the proper care and treatment of our unfortunate fellow citizens who have fallen victims of the dread disease which this institution was founded to take care of.

The present crowded condition of this institution and a very large and constantly growing waiting list, urgently seeking admission, make it imperative that the state resume the building program outlined previous to the entrance of the United States into the world war, and which the board of control has been unable to complete because of lack of funds.

No appropriations were asked for this institution in our last report except for contingent and repair, and a small amount for lectures, books and periodicals.

One new boiler has been installed since our last report.

Nothing further has been done relative to the medical and laboratory building for which an appropriation of \$45,000.00 was made by the thirty-seventh general assembly. Upon estimates carefully prepared by the state architect, the sum so appropriated was found inadequate for this purpose. An additional appropriation is needed to construct and equip this building; also an appropriation for an addition to the hospital building for advanced cases; also an amount for necessary tunnels and pipe connections, and remodeling and enlarging boiler and power house connections.

Amounts covering the foregoing will be included along with our askings for other institutions.

Splendid work is being done at the State Sanatorium in the treatment of tuberculosis and it is our wish to keep the treatment up to an A number one standard.

Because of the difficulty experienced in procuring employes for an institution of this kind, and the necessary cost for food and treatment of the patients therein, the present per capita support allowance of \$50.00 per month is insufficient. This allowance must be increased to not less than \$65.00 per month for each patient cared for, and out of this amount all salaries and wages must be paid.

EDUCATIONAL WORK

The work of the department on tuberculosis has continued under the direction of A. E. Kepford, state lecturer. Mr. Kepford occupied the position of state director for Iowa for the American Red Cross until July 1, 1919. Scores of patriotic addresses were demanded by the Red Cross and this work was carried on in connection with his work as state lecturer on tuberculosis. More than 150 lectures and addresses were delivered on the prevention of tuberculosis to approximately 20,000 people. These lectures involved a discussion of diagnosis, control and treatment of tuberculosis.

The education on the prevention of tuberculosis has taken on some new aspects, as it is now generally believed by medical experts that practically all children by the time they are seven years of age have been invaded by the germs of tuberculosis. Naturally this has led to the placing of great emphasis on the proper care of school children and children of pre-school age, the idea being to keep the physical vitality of the child normal. Public health nurses have been placed in about seventy counties of Iowa by the American Red Cross.

One of the greatest achievements of the department has been the establishment of free tuberculosis and children's clinics under the auspices of county medical societies. These clinics have been generally under the direction of Dr. H. V. Scarborough, superintendent at Oakdale, who selected for his assistants, men who were expert in the diagnosis of tuberculosis. Since July 1919, as the result of a demand, these clinics have always had a children's section. Clinics have been held at Webster City,

Fairfield, Iowa Falls, Bloomfield, Logan, Creston, Mount Ayr, Ida Grove, Wapello, Strawberry Point, Le Mars, and Keokuk.

In 1918 Polk County by a large majority voted a tax for \$100,000 to establish a county tuberculosis hospital. The board of trustees is making some progress toward the organization of this hospital.

Dubuque County is now nearing the completion of a hospital for tuberculosis which will cost when completed approximately \$200,000 and will care for eighty patients.

In 1918 Wapello County voted a tax which will approximate \$40,000 for rehabilitation and extension of the county tuberculosis hospital at Ottumwa.

Mahaska County recently established a county public hospital and a movement has been started to establish a tuberculosis annex in connection therewith.

Pine Knoll Sanatorium, the Scott County hospital for tuberculosis, located at Davenport, has been doing especially fine work and is a well-managed and efficient institution.

Tuberculosis in Iowa is rapidly decreasing, not only in the mortality but in the incidence of this disease as well.

SOLDIERS' HOME, MARSHALLTOWN

The appropriation of the thirty-seventh general assembly of \$5,000.00 for the building for stores, as stated in our last report, was not sufficient to erect a suitable building for this purpose. The bids received for the erection of this building were far in excess of the appropriation made. The thirty-eighth general assembly made no additional appropriation for this building and as the Home is very much in need of a building in which to store supplies, we believe an additional appropriation of at least \$5,000.00 should be made by the thirty-ninth general assembly for this purpose.

One new 250 H. P. boiler with stoker has recently been installed at the Home. This improvement was very much needed and will help greatly in making the Home comfortable for the members.

Several applications have been made for admittance to the Home by world war veterans. Although the law governing applications for admission to the Home makes no provision for world war veterans, we were of the opinion that the intent of the law was that all soldiers were entitled to membership in the

Home as defenders of our country and have allowed their applications to pass. This law, governing admittance to the Home should be amended so as to include soldiers, sailors and marines of the world war.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME, DAVENPORT

The thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$30,000.00 for building a gymnasium. Bids received on this building by the board were far in excess of the appropriation made, therefore nothing further has been done in relation to the erection of this building.

A cold storage plant has been installed at the Home since the last report. This plant enables the institution to properly care for meats, fruits and vegetables, which it was unable to do before.

INSTITUTION FOR FEEBLEMINDED CHILDREN, GLENWOOD

Appropriations have been used as contemplated at this institution. The addition to the main building for a bakery has been completed. The equipment in this building has all been installed. One new boiler has also been installed since our last report.

Owing to the high cost of building material nothing further has been done relative to the new building for boys. This building is very much needed on account of the overcrowded conditions at this institution. The amount appropriated by the thirty-seventh general assembly was inadequate for this purpose, and an additional appropriation is needed for this building.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS, ELDORA

The thirty-seventh general assembly appropriated \$20,000.00 for a boys' cottage and furnishings. On account of the high cost of building material brought on by war conditions, nothing was done toward the erection of this building at that time. The thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated an additional \$5,000.00, making a total of \$25,000.00 authorized to be expended for this purpose. After estimates had been carefully prepared we found that the cost of the building as planned would exceed the appropriation. Therefore nothing further was done regarding this matter.

All other appropriations have been used for the purposes for which they were made.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR GIRLS, MITCHELLVILLE

The new cottage for girls at this school, for which the thirty-eighth general assembly made a special appropriation of \$40,000.00 has been completed and is now in use. This cottage accommodates thirty-five girls. It is strictly modern in every respect and is a credit to the school.

The new laundry has also been completed and all equipment installed.

The other appropriations have been used for the purposes for which they were made.

MOUNT PLEASANT STATE HOSPITAL, MOUNT PLEASANT

Appropriations for this hospital have been used as authorized. A new boiler and a stoker have been installed and repairs on boiler room have all been made, including the installation of an ash conveyor and coal crusher.

INDEPENDENCE STATE HOSPITAL, INDEPENDENCE

The new power house, for which the thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$31,600.00, has been completed and all equipment installed.

Six mechanical stokers and a coal crusher have also been installed at this institution.

The old boilers were also repaired and put in first-class condition.

CLARINDA STATE HOSPITAL, CLARINDA

The new hospital for tubercular patients, for which the thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$40,000.00, has been completed and is now in use. It will accommodate thirty patients.

On account of the high cost of material, nothing has been done with the appropriation of \$12,000.00 for a new dairy barn. The amount appropriated for this purpose is still on hand.

Repairs have been made in the heating and the sewer system. A new tile floor is being laid in the laboratory. The old floor was very unsanitary and this improvement was deemed advisable.

CHEROKEE STATE HOSPITAL, CHEROKEE

The thirty-seventh general assembly appropriated the sum of \$50,000.00 to increase and improve the water supply at this hos-

pital. After estimates had been prepared on this work the sum so appropriated was found to be inadequate. The thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated an additional \$23,000.00 for this purpose. Contracts have been awarded and work is progressing rapidly.

A new boiler and a stoker have been installed, as authorized by appropriation.

STATE HOSPITAL AND COLONY FOR EPILEPTICS, WOODWARD

A large percentage of the improvements contemplated by appropriations made by the thirty-seventh general assembly for this institution, because of the high cost of material, were carried over from the biennial period ending June 30, 1918. All of these improvements have been made during the period except the dairy barn, greenhouse and garage.

Appropriations made by the thirty-eighth general assembly have all been made as contemplated except the \$7,000.00 appropriated for additional water supply. The amount authorized to be expended for this purpose was not sufficient to complete this work. The amount set aside for this improvement is still unused.

STATE HOSPITAL FOR INEBRIATES, KNOXVILLE, CLOSED

This institution located at Knoxville, at about the end of the fourteenth year of its existence and operation, was ordered closed by the board, December 1, 1919.

The patients on that date numbered eleven only, and we did not feel justified in longer operating the hospital at the unusually large expense per capita necessary for such a small population. We therefore ordered the patients discharged and the institution closed.

The farming operations at said hospital were continued, and at this writing the outlook is for a good crop.

The dairy herd was continued at the hospital farm and the milk sold.

The food supplies on hand were transferred to other state institutions.

The institution buildings remained vacant for several months. Negotiations were then entered into with the United States Public Health Service. The government desired to rent the hospital buildings and immediate grounds, in which to care for disabled

soldiers. This was deemed an excellent opportunity to do something beneficial for the unfortunate soldier boys, as well as being an advantage to the state.

A lease for the buildings was made with the United States Treasury Department at a rental of \$1,500.00 per month, beginning June 1, 1920. This lease will terminate June 30, 1921.

Since making the lease the balance of the land, excepting that which is occupied by the brick and tile plant and the shale beds connected therewith, also has been rented to the United States Treasury Department at an annual rental of \$15.00 per acre.

STATE PENITENTIARY, FORT MADISON

The appropriations made for this institution have been used as contemplated.

The chair and furniture industry has made this institution self-supporting. A further and more complete statement of the industries in connection with this institution will be found elsewhere in this report.

A cold storage plant has been installed since our last report.

The dining-room has also been remodeled. This was a very much needed improvement.

MEN'S REFORMATORY, ANAMOSA

The appropriation of \$160,000.00 by the thirty-eighth general assembly for purchasing farm land and maintaining industries has been used as authorized. The industries at the institutions have been carried on in a practical way. A complete statement of the farm operations and industries at this institution will be found elsewhere in this report. This statement shows a handsome profit for the state.

A new cold storage plant has been installed and will mean a great saving in caring for meats, fruit and vegetables.

The old dining-room has been remodeled, which adds greatly to its appearance.

All other appropriations were used as contemplated in whole or in part as necessity required.

WOMEN'S REFORMATORY, ROCKWELL CITY

The new pathological building has not yet been completed. The additional appropriation of \$5,000.00 made by the thirty-eighth general assembly was not sufficient to complete the erec-

tion of this building. An additional sum should be appropriated for this purpose so that work on this building may be carried on to completion.

Other appropriations made were used as contemplated.

JUVENILE HOME, TOLEDO

Under the provisions of chapter 165, session laws of the thirty-eighth general assembly, an act to establish a state home for dependent, neglected, delinquent or destitute children, this board proceeded to locate and start work on buildings for such a state home.

We considered fully the advantages of the various locations suggested and, following mature deliberation, decided that the town of Toledo in Tama county, would prove a most excellent place for such home, and Toledo was selected.

The beautiful grounds and buildings of the Leander Clark College, in the little city of Toledo, no longer used for college purposes and unoccupied at the time, were donated to the state by Toledo, consisting of 18.13 acres of land and one city lot, 75x150 feet. Upon such land and lot are located three buildings, two large structures of brick and one large frame residence.

The two brick buildings are now being wholly remodeled inside and pebble-dashed outside. We expect to have all remodeling done so that the Juvenile Home will be ready for occupancy by October 1, 1920.

The capacity of the two buildings will provide amply for 150 children, and from reports received by this department from various sections of the state, court judges and other sources, the Juvenile Home will be filled to capacity very soon following the formal opening of same.

The cost of remodeling the two buildings will total \$52,000.00.

We find that the frame residence is in need of many repairs and as it is too large for use as a residence for the superintendent of the home, we recommend that the general assembly authorize the sale of said residence.

For farming operations in connection with this institution the board has purchased 103.93 acres. Three city lots also were purchased, upon which we expect to have a building for use as a power house, laundry and storehouse, located near the railway switch running alongside.

The purchase price of said lands and lots totals \$39,200.00.

The total land holdings at the Juvenile Home now are 122.06 acres and four city lots. The total estimated value of the property donated to the state by the City of Toledo is not less than \$75,000.00.

INSPECTION OF COUNTY HOMES AND PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS

This work has been carried on with good results. Close inspection has been made and many improvements recommended by those in charge. Such suggestions have generally been promptly complied with, greatly bettering the service and care of the unfortunates, who because of neglect, misfortune and old age, must find a home in such institutions.

INDUSTRIES

The thirty-eighth general assembly granted for the purchase of land and industries during the biennial period \$160,000.00 for the Men's Reformatory and \$75,000.00 for the State Penitentiary.

Of these appropriations \$158,142.08 was expended for farm land and live stock at the Men's Reformatory and \$60,239.50 for land at the State Penitentiary.

The unexpended balances in the two appropriations on June 30, 1920 were \$1,857.92 and \$14,760.50 respectively.

The operating expenses of the industries were paid entirely from the earnings and no part of the appropriations were used for their maintenance.

As outlined in the last biennial report, there are three classes of industries operated in connection with the state institutions.

There are two commercial industries, the Chair and Furniture Industry at the State Penitentiary, and the Cooperage Industry at the Men's Reformatory, which during this period have been great revenue producers for the state.

There are seven industrial departments that produce articles for state institution, use only. Clothing, shoes, tin and galvanized iron ware, printing and binding, quarry stone for building purposes and many other necessary articles are manufactured for the use of the institutions at a considerable saving over the cost if purchased ready-made. No commercial business has been attempted and no large profits are expected as the articles sold are paid for from institution support funds.

There are sixteen farms, one at each institution, which may be properly classified as industries. The operating expenses are

paid for from the support funds. The products are used for the maintenance or support of the inmates and the receipts from sales are also placed to the credit of the support funds. The total profit from the farms for the farm year of 1919, was \$351,324.66. This subject will be treated of elsewhere in this report.

CHAIR AND FURNITURE INDUSTRY

The successful management of this factory resulting in large earnings has been the chief factor in placing the State Penitentiary on a self-supporting basis, which has been accomplished during this biennial.

A large trade in chairs has been established with many of the leading furniture dealers in the middle west. The chairs manufactured compare very favorably with the product of other leading factories and good prices have been obtained.

During the last two years, 168,604 chairs were manufactured and the net sales were \$777,491.22.

The industry has earned in profits and reserves since the past report, \$375,777.24 which represents over 246 per cent of the invested capital.

June 30, 1920, the cash working balance on hand to the credit of the Chair and Furniture Industry was \$230,575.90, which is over 50 per cent more than the capital invested.

The factory provides employment for over two hundred prisoners. They received for their services after the cost of their maintenance had been deducted, \$38,134.32.

The wages earned are placed to their individual credit in a local savings bank, to be paid to them upon their release or sent to dependent relatives upon satisfactory proof.

The industry is not only a large revenue producer but also gives the prisoners valuable instruction and experience in the manufacture of chairs.

This is the largest industry and represents a capital investment of \$152,500.00.

COOPERAGE INDUSTRY

The Cooperage Industry is operated in connection with the Men's Reformatory and represents a total capital investment of \$31,935.03. The factory has a daily capacity of 1,800 butter tubs.

Although handicapped by the scarcity and high prices of good

ash staves and heading it also has made a remarkable showing. The sales were \$334,652.93.

The profits and reserves earned during the two years were \$62,818.16.

As with the chair industry, successful and experienced management is reflected in the large cash working balance derived from the sales, which on June 30, 1920, was \$64,192.47. From forty to forty-five prisoners are required for the work for which they received in wages \$8,901.84.

PRINTING AND BINDING INDUSTRY

This department has recently been moved into larger quarters in the new industrial building at the Men's Reformatory, and new machinery purchased and installed. These changes were necessary as much of the printing for other state departments, which was formerly done by the state printer or awarded on contract, is now being done in the shop at the Men's Reformatory.

Aside from the instructive employment furnished the prisoners, the benefits will largely accrue to the state in general or to those state departments having the printing done, because at the prices charged it is hardly possible for the industry to make much of a showing in money profits.

There are from twenty-five to thirty prisoners working in the printing department. The net sales were \$18,177.53.

TAILOR SHOPS

Tailor shops are operated both at the Men's Reformatory and the State Penitentiary. Nearly all of the clothing used in those institutions is manufactured and repaired in these shops.

The tailoring department of the Men's Reformatory also manufactures clothing for other institutions. The net sales to institutions for the period were \$56,752.81.

SHOE SHOPS

The shoe shops at the Men's Reformatory and at the State Penitentiary manufacture and repair all shoes worn by the prisoners. From eight to fifteen men are furnished work in each of these departments. Sales are not made to other institutions. The profits are nominal, representing the difference between the manufacturing cost and the price at which the shoes could be

purchased, which has been considerable, especially during the period of high prices.

TIN SHOP

The tin shop at the Men's Reformatory furnishes work for eight prisoners. The articles manufactured are principally food trays, garbage cans, buckets, coffee pots, etc. These articles are also sold to other state institutions.

STONE QUARRY

Stone from the quarry is used in all new construction work at the Men's Reformatory. Some stone is furnished to the counties and there is a small demand from other sources, but the revenue derived from sales is not large. The operating expenses are paid from the support fund and the receipts returned to that fund.

BRICK AND TILE FACTORY

This factory has not been in operation since the closing of the State Hospital for Inebriates at Knoxville in December, 1919.

The net sales during the part of the period that the factory was in operation amounted to \$27,160.61 and \$5,406.00 was paid to inmates for their services.

INSTITUTION FARMS

An improved and more detailed system of accounts, for the farms has been installed during this biennial period.

Inventories are taken at the beginning and end of each farm year, copies of which are sent to the office of the board of control. Monthly reports, classified, and showing in detail all purchases, items of operating expense, sales, receipts and other charges and credits pertaining to the farm are also required. This gives the office a perpetual inventory and record of the operations of each farm.

The figures for the farm year of 1919 show a substantial increase in production and profits over the previous year.

The state farm at Clive, although operated in connection with the State Penitentiary, is located at so great a distance from the institution that the greater part of the milk and other products are sold instead of being used at the institution. The receipts are turned into the industrial fund.

The sales of live stock and produce from July 1, 1918 to December 31, 1919, amounted to \$32,182.43 and the net profit and reserves for the same period were \$17,683.67. From ten to fifteen prisoners working on the farm received as wages \$1,228.22.

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENTS IN GENERAL

The sales for the various industrial departments aggregate over one and one-quarter million dollars and the net profits and reserves earned are more than \$450,000.00, not including the profit of the institution farms which, in addition to this amount have earned \$351,324.66 during the farm year of 1919.

Practically all of the sales made were on credit, yet in spite of the immense credit business done, not a single account has been lost.

In the financial section of this report are shown the balance sheets and profit and loss statements for the principal industries.

DAIRY HERDS

The dairy herds at the state institutions still remain to us a source of pride, no state equalling our institution herds in productiveness. Each year shows a substantial gain in production and profit. Only Holsteins are kept. The least profitable in the herds are from year to year being weeded out and only the most productive are allowed to remain. Gradually we are acquiring pure breeds, having now more than two hundred head of pure bred Holsteins in the state herds. Only the best of pure bred bulls head the herds. Milk is a cheap, good and healthful diet and each year sees more and more milk consumed at the various institutions under our management.

FARMS AND GARDENS

The yield of farm crops during the last period has been abundant and very satisfactory. By careful cultivation and increas-

ing the amount of fertilizer on the farms, the productiveness of the land has been, from year to year, improved instead of diminished. Not for years has the promise of abundant yields of farm and garden crops been better than at the present.

Largely the labor on the farms and gardens has been done by inmates of the several institutions, superintended by an efficient farm manager. Only such patients are required to labor as are able and willing to do so.

Potatoes have not been grown in such large quantities as in former years. Our experience has been that Iowa soil is not suitable for the most successful cultivation of this crop and that corn can be raised with greater satisfaction and profit than potatoes.

All of the institutions are supplied with silos which furnish a most excellent stock food at minimum cost, enabling the institutions to raise and care for large herds of cattle.

Seed corn is gathered at all of the institutions early and cured under the best of conditions, so that only first-class seed corn is planted. It is the rule to gather and carefully care for twice the amount of seed corn as will be required for the needs of the institutions.

There is much need of tiling at some of the institutions, the land being too valuable to not demand from it the largest possible returns. This should now be given attention.

Proper attention has not been given to the fences at many of the farms. As the war made all fencing material very high, this part of farm work has been delayed, but in the near future all of the state farms should be fenced hog tight, making all feed of every kind grown on the farm available for use.

The orchards and gardens have been securing greater attention with splendid results. We wish to thank the Iowa State College at Ames for the assistance and advice they have given us on our farms, orchards, gardens, and dairy herds. With their advice and support we have been able to increase production along all of these lines.

The prison farms have proven a success and have given healthful employment to the inmates of the penitentiary and the reformatory, and have added a fine profit to the treasury.

COAL

Coal is the greatest single commodity used at the state institutions and is the greatest consumer of support funds. For several years the cost of coal has been mounting higher and higher, until under the contract for the coming year, it will be far greater than ever before, and much greater than is shown in this report.

The fund accruing from this sale is to be expended for the purchase of land for the Training School for Boys, at Eldora, chapter 17, section 1, laws of the thirty-eighth general assembly.

THE STATE FARM AT CLIVE

As shown in the 1916 report of the board of control, this farm was purchased as directed by the thirty-fifth general assembly, consisting of 781 acres near Clive, ten miles west of Des Moines, at a cost of \$200.00 per acre. However, the thirty-fifth general assembly made no provision for the establishment of a custodial farm, which was under consideration when this purchase was authorized. The farm has been conducted as a prison industry, the farm work thereon being performed by prisoners transferred from the State Penitentiary at Fort Madison.

Neither the thirty-sixth general assembly, the thirty-seventh general assembly, nor the thirty-eighth general assembly made additional provision for handling this farm; neither did any one of the three sessions of the legislature make provision for the purchase of other farms for use as custodial farms, as appears to have been the original intention of those of our citizens who were promoters of said plan for working prisoners convicted of minor offenses and given jail sentences.

It appears to this board that inasmuch as it evidently is not the wish or the desire of the people of our state to maintain such custodial farms, and the further fact that the board of control finds that it is impracticable to operate the Clive farm with convicts from the Fort Madison penitentiary, because the land is located at too great a distance from the prison, we therefore recommend the sale of the Clive farm and in lieu thereof that we be authorized to purchase land near the State Penitentiary at Fort Madison and the Men's Reformatory at Anamosa, where the best of discipline can be maintained among the prisoners working on the farm and a higher degree of efficiency of work secured. Such additional land can be more successfully handled and can produce foodstuffs to an extent which will materially reduce the cost of maintaining the institutions.

You will note from the foregoing that practically every item has increased materially during the biennial period ending June 30, 1920.

INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES

In connection with the increased cost of the numerous items required at the various institutions we call your further atten-

tion to the enormous advance in freight rates, which, since June 25, 1918, aggregate 68.75%.

This increase amounts to from .50 to \$1.00 per ton on coal and on this one item alone will increase expenditures approximately \$175,000 for the next biennial period. This freight increase together with the advance in the price of coal at the mine makes our coal cost from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per ton above the price paid in 1918. This will bring the total increase in expenditures for coal alone to approximately \$600,000.00 for the next biennial period.

This increase also applies proportionately to numerous other items which it is unnecessary to take the time and space to enumerate.
