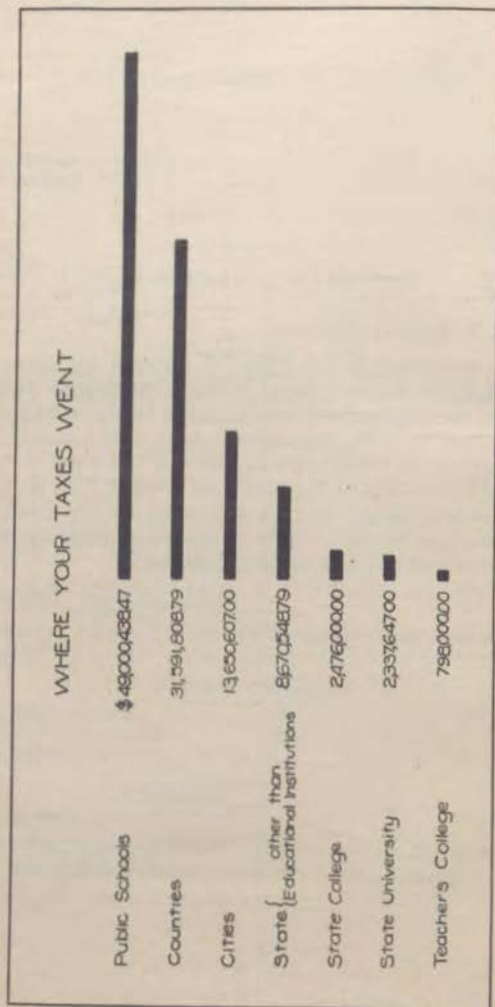
LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

BIENNIAL REPORT OF THE IOWA STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Iowa State Board of Education is required by law to make a report to the Governor and to each General Assembly.

With all of the confusion and distress incident to the post-war period, it is significant to note that there has been no let-up in the matter of sending children to school in Iowa. At no time has Iowa lost sight of the fact that the only hope of the future of this commonwealth lies in the direction of adequate schooling for her children. Indeed, the average daily attendance in the public schools of the state has actually increased during this period of depression. There are more than 72,000 students now enrolled in the high schools of the state. Not only that, but the communities have increased, enormously, their investment in education. The actual increase in the cost of operating the common schools and the high schools of the state during the past two years has been approximately *nineteen million dollars*. Millions have also been spent for the erection of better and ever larger school buildings.

While it is true that vast sums of money are being expended for more or less trivial things, yet it is a fact that, during this period of depression, communities of the state have been willing to tax themselves almost without limit for the purpose of providing better facilities for the education of their children. In Iowa communities, tax levies of 75 to 100 mills for school purposes are common, while some are as high as one hundred and twenty mills. This willingness to make every sacrifice for education, at this time, is strikingly revealed in the attitude of parents and students in the matter of college education. Apparently no sacrifice has been too great to keep the son or daughter in college. The college walls have been literally bursting in an attempt to meet this demand. The one great unifying demand in Iowa is the demand for education, overshadowing all differences of politics, religion or prosperity.

This board reported to the Thirty-ninth General Assembly the fact that, during the preceding biennium, there had been a great increase in the demand for higher education in the institutions supported by the state; and certain additional appropriations were made. However, so much doubt was expressed as to whether or not this growth would continue, that little provision was made for buildings.

It is of interest to note that the increase in attendance today in the three state institutions over a corresponding period two years ago, is as follows:

State University at Iowa City.....	1,324
*State College at Ames.....	401
State Teachers College at Cedar Falls.....	691

This increase would have been still greater had it been possible for students to secure suitable living accommodations and had they been admitted, freely, to all of the classes. Because of crowded conditions, prospective students have been unable to make satisfactory arrangements.

To care for this increase alone it has been necessary to provide additional facilities for a student body considerably larger than the entire attendance of many first-rate universities, such as Princeton University or Dartmouth. The increase alone has been as large as the total attendance in three or four excellent foundation colleges in Iowa.

The combined total attendance in the state institutions this year will be more than eighteen thousand. If gathered together, they would make a town similar in size to Marshalltown or Fort Dodge.

Since this board meets the General Assembly but once in two years, it is under the absolute necessity of estimating its needs for the future. The money voted by the Forty-first General Assembly will not be available until July, 1925. Hence it becomes our duty to analyze each factor involved in the program of higher education at the three state institutions in order to report to you the demands of the public.

The state has not only provided facilities for collegiate preparation along a wide range of activities in the arts and industries, including preparation for teaching, for farming, for medicine, law, dentistry, engineering, nursing, and other widely diversified interests essential to our modern civilization; but, through the joint activity of the federal government, a program of adult education, touching tens of thousands of people, has been developed. This adult educa-

*Because the unusual financial depression has affected agriculture so seriously during the past two years, many farmers have been unable to send their children to college. This condition has prevented a larger enrollment in the division of agriculture in the Iowa State College. There is abundant evidence now that because of improved financial conditions, many more students will enter the State College next year; and, as a result, the enrollment will be much larger. Already the increase is showing itself in different ways.

tion reaches the farmer, the school teacher, the house-wife, the business man, the prospective mother. In addition to this, there is being carried on a program of investigation and experimentation, touching the fields of the prevention and cure of animal diseases, the control of harmful insect pests in the growing of grain, the study of better methods of nourishing children, the study of the control of the natural resources of the state—building material and water power—the diagnosis and cure of bodily and mental disease, and the like.

In addition, through the activities of the Perkins and the Haskell-Klaus laws, thousands of the state's unfortunate, wasted by deformity and disease, are receiving remedial attention at the University Hospital to enable them to go out to take their places in society.

Thus, it may be seen that Iowa has created agencies under the direction of the Iowa State Board of Education that vitally affect every home in this commonwealth, not alone through instruction of students of collegiate grade, fitting them for productive service in society, but through adult education of a nature calculated to be of specific assistance in meeting the practical issues of the day—scientific investigation in the use and control of the material resources, as well as those connected with the very life of the state; also the problem of health and efficiency, including remedial care of the deformed and crippled. Indeed, at Iowa City, since the passage of the Perkins law, nearly twelve thousand children have received treatment at the hands of the best experts the state could secure.

Perhaps no other state in America has set up demands necessitating a program of such broad significance; but it is a fact that these institutions, working three hundred sixty-five days in a year, apparently never are able to catch up with the insistent demand throughout the length and breadth of this state, for *additional service*—class room instruction, farm demonstration, baby clinics, and hospital care.

Parents will not long tolerate inability of the institutions to provide instruction for the son or daughter who is anxious to go forward in collegiate or professional preparation. In a program such as medicine, which requires seven years of preparation, the loss of a year means too much to be considered.

It is said that last year Columbia University refused admittance to more than ten thousand students. Since Columbia is a privately-endowed institution, there may be no obligation, but the very purpose of the creation of these state-supported educational institutions in

Iowa was to make it possible for the youth of the state to receive an education when they are ready for it. Other states will not do the job for Iowa.

The problem involves many of the elements of a great business corporation. In the carrying out of a program on such a large scale, it is increasingly apparent that the cost is determined almost wholly by forces outside our own choosing. It costs more to heat ten buildings than five buildings; it costs more to provide instruction for ten thousand than five thousand, and the same is true of other factors in the situation.

Iowa's problem is shared by other states. Michigan and Illinois came to the saturation point somewhat earlier than did this state. We have attempted to profit by their experience as well as our own.

After a most painstaking analysis, drawing upon all available information, the Iowa State Board of Education has prepared estimates representing its judgment as to the lowest possible amount of money that should be appropriated by this General Assembly in order, measurably, to provide the service demanded by the citizens of this commonwealth.

It will be necessary to continue all present expiring appropriations; and, in order to care for all of the contingencies for support, maintenance, up-keep and instruction, it will also be necessary to increase the amount for support and specials about one million dollars for each year of the biennium.

Two years ago the Iowa State Board of Education presented to the legislature the demands for buildings and grounds for these institutions. In the confusion of the deflation period, the Board of Education was unable to convince the General Assembly that there would not be an actual decrease in attendance during this biennium. Thus, the institutions were not prepared to meet the great influx of students demanding consideration.

Despite every attempt on the part of the board to meet local conditions, hundreds of students were unable to find suitable living conditions in the communities of these schools; and, after class rooms were filled, certain departments were forced to refuse admission to students. In Iowa City, it has been necessary, not only to build a wooden shack to house classes, but to rent store buildings, dwelling houses, and one of the churches, in order to provide seating capacity necessary for instruction. A wooden shack has been erected to house hospital patients. The Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts at Ames has been compelled to construct four tempo-

rary buildings to accommodate the increased student body. These buildings are frail wooden structures and the fire risk on the campus is greatly increased thereby. The institution has converted a railroad station into class rooms.

There is no mystery about the matter of housing students. One cannot carry on education without a place for students and instructors to assemble for their work. During the last biennium, Kansas, Illinois, Minnesota and Michigan all found themselves in the same situation as did Iowa. It is significant that in each of these states large sums of money were appropriated to meet this necessity. Michigan received, for the university alone, about five million dollars. They are asking for an additional seven million this year, to meet their growing demands.

We can not postpone provision for the needs of Iowa and, at the same time, permit students to freely enter the institutions. The alternative is for the legislature to limit attendance and thus deny thousands of young people admission to the institutions.

The laying out of a program of higher education involves many business angles that place a premium upon the ability to look forward to a period of five or ten years, as in the case of a private enterprise. This being true, most of the states have come to adopt a program to cover a period of years. Consequently, the Board of Education must take up with the General Assembly the problem of how this issue must be met. It is, perhaps, not within our province even to suggest methods by which the money necessary to meet the demands of these institutions shall be raised. We may, perhaps, be permitted to express the hope that some method may be found which will not place any additional burden upon any basic interest. But, at any rate, it is imperative that a number of buildings be erected at these institutions within the next two years.

To carry out the wishes of the people in so far as they affect the institutions at Iowa City, Ames and Cedar Falls, it will be necessary to increase the building appropriation each year of the biennium a little more than a million and a half dollars. These demands are not the demands of the Board of Education; they are not the demands of the General Assembly; they are the demands of the people of Iowa whom we both serve.

As we conceive it, this board was created to inform the General Assembly, from time to time and from first-hand information, as to the needs of these institutions. This we have ever tried to do. As we look at it, we are simply bringing to your attention the demands

which the fathers and mothers of this state are making at Iowa City, Ames and Cedar Falls, for instruction, for housing, and for service.

With our observation of the fact that local communities are spending from fifty to one hundred twenty mills for school purposes and that communities are, almost without exception, meeting whatever demands become apparent in the matter of buildings and equipment, it seems certain to us that the demands of the public in connection with the higher educational institutions will be promptly met by the Fortieth General Assembly.

We are confident that even this short brief would be unnecessary were it possible for the members of the General Assembly to have intimate knowledge of the demands of the state on these institutions and of the known cost of meeting these demands.

The Iowa State Board of Education made the following recommendation which appears in the Second Biennial Report to the Governor and the Thirty-fifth General Assembly, regarding the normal school situation in this state:

"The facilities for the training of teachers for the rural and elementary schools of Iowa are inadequate, and the board recommends to the legislature the establishment of additional normal schools to aid in this great work, perhaps the greatest which the state has to do."

At the meeting that was held on December 7, 1922, the following resolution was unanimously approved:

"Resolved: That the State Board of Education recommends to the Fortieth General Assembly the establishment of three normal schools within the next six years; one to be located in the northwest part of the state, one in the southwest part and one in the southeast part; only one to be provided for and established in each biennial period."

DESTRUCTION OF ARMORY

On the night of December 16, 1922, the splendid armory located on the campus of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts was destroyed by fire. The building was used by about 1,300 boys. These students were divided into divisions and reported at various hours during the day for military instruction.

In addition to this, the building was the headquarters of the State Corn Show, and it was used by the Little International Live Stock Show.

The loss of few buildings on the campus would be felt as keenly as the loss of this one. The construction of a new building should be commenced at once, and for this purpose an emergency appropria-

tion will be asked for early in the session of the Fortieth General Assembly. If possible, the new building should be completed and ready for occupancy by the time school opens in September, 1923.

OLD CAPITOL

The Thirty-seventh General Assembly made an appropriation of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of fireproofing the Old Capitol. Because of war conditions and the high cost of labor and building material, the work was delayed until recently. When actual operations were commenced it was found that conditions were much worse than had been anticipated. The cost of the necessary steel and concrete material needed is considerably more than the original appropriation.

As directed by law, the State Board of Education has submitted a special report to the governor, giving complete details, together with recommendations. It is estimated that, in order to carry out the original plans of fireproofing this building so that it will be available for use, an additional appropriation of \$50,000.00 will be necessary.

With this report we wish to place upon the Fortieth General Assembly full responsibility for the answer to these demands, on the part of the state.

BRIEF ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDA-
TIONS FOR INCREASED APPROPRIATIONS

STATE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA
INCREASES

A. Maintenance Appropriations, Beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Educational Support (for each year of the biennium).....\$167,000.00

With an increase of more than 1,300 in the student body of the undergraduate and professional colleges of the university during the last two years, it has not been possible to provide sufficient instruction to meet the needs. Neither has it been possible to furnish adequate space or facilities for effectively carrying on the program.

During the past year it was impossible to provide instruction for all students who applied for such subjects as biology, geology and dentistry.

From the nature of the case, we cannot borrow money or incur indebtedness; hence the necessity of carefully estimating our future needs. The money from the Forty-first General Assembly will not be available until July 1, 1925.

With an increase of 200 per cent in the last decade and a knowledge of the fact that there are more than 72,000 students in the Iowa high schools, an increase of 9,000 within the past two years, it is not safe to infer that there will be less of an increase in the next biennium than in the past. Our estimate is that this will be in excess of 1,500, an average increase of less than two for each high school in the state. Even casual inquiry among parents and students reveals the amazing extent to which high school students expect to go to college.

This increase in attendance affects the various parts of the institution differently. For example, our estimate is that it will require a large part of the \$167,000 set forth above to meet the specific needs in the College of Liberal Arts alone, which now registers about 3,500 students. A relatively small amount of this money will be needed to operate the College of Pharmacy, which now registers approximately 100 students.

These students are preparing for all kinds of service, ranging from that of physician or teacher, with a six or seven-year course; lawyer or chemical engineer, with a five-year course; banking or Liberal Arts graduation, with a four-year course, to that of a pharmacy graduate or a nurse, with three-year courses.

Detailed estimates have been made in each college, showing the amount necessary in the field of instruction, and for equipment, supplies, repairs, heat, light, water, reference material, and the like.

2. College of Medicine (for each year of the biennium).....\$25,000.00

With the increasing demands for instruction in the College of Medicine and the increasing cost of laboratory service, it will be impossible to maintain instruction of a satisfactory type to meet the needs of the state without this increased appropriation.

3. College of Education (for each year of the biennium).....\$20,000.00

Acting on the counsel of the Survey Commission which made a special investigation for the Board of Education a few years ago, the College of Education has been developing along the lines calculated to train school superintendents, supervisors and high school teachers. In order to meet the competitive demands in this field to the end that this department of the university will maintain the standard already set, this increase is necessary.

4. The Graduate College (for each year of the biennium).....\$25,000.00

The demand for instruction in the Graduate College has increased greatly in recent years. In fact, it has more than doubled within the biennium. Many of the graduates of the smaller colleges of the state have found it to their advantage to take advanced work at the university. Indeed, the Graduate College has come to be one of the outstanding features of the work in the university. The students registered in the Graduate College this year represent more than 250 different colleges. New information in the fields of medicine, chemistry, engineering, dentistry, pharmacy, physics, nutrition, and the like, is primarily the outgrowth of special activities on the part of the Graduate College. This is the training school for specialized workers and college teachers. With the great increase in attendance in higher educational institutions in recent years, a tremendous burden has been placed on the Graduate College for the recruiting of college faculties. To meet the demands of this college will require the appropriation recommended.

5. Summer Session (for each year of the biennium).....\$25,000.00

The attendance at the University Summer Session has grown by leaps and bounds, the increase during the biennium being more than fifty per cent. During the past year the attendance was considerably larger than the combined attendance of the whole institution a dozen years ago. The university has always attempted to maintain the

summer session with a modest cost, employing the minimum number of instructors at reduced salaries; but in recent years, with the great growth of summer session teaching throughout the country, it has been increasingly difficult to maintain the school on this level; and in order to meet the demands during the biennium, it will be necessary to make the appropriation recommended.

6. Equipment and Supplies (for each year of the biennium)....\$20,000.00

With each increase in the student body comes the necessity of spending more money for supplies and material. This fund is distributed over more than forty different departments of the university.

7. Repair and Contingent (for each year of the biennium)....\$20,000.00

The university is operating at the point of highest pressure; and with the repairs, changes and adjustments constantly necessary in a plant the size of this, it is essential to make an increase in the repair and contingent fund to take care of these emergencies.

8. Buildings and Grounds (for each year of the biennium).....\$20,000.00

As the plant expands and service increases, additional money must be expended for such items as heat, light, fuel, janitor service, and the like.

9. Administration (for each year of the biennium).....\$10,000.00

With the tremendous increase in attendance in recent years, we now find it necessary to increase the clerical help in the administrative offices, including the registrar, secretary, treasurer, auditor, etc. The amount of correspondence necessary is almost unbelievable.

10. Library (for each year of the biennium).....\$20,000.00

The increase within the past two years in the attendance in the College of Liberal Arts has been phenomenal. This college now registers about 3,500 students. With this increase comes the necessity for additional library service, books, bulletins, binding, etc. The amount stated represents the minimum. Within the next few years it will be necessary for us to spend much more on our library if we are to provide our students with facilities comparable with other first-class institutions.

11. Soldier Tuition (decrease for each year of the biennium) . \$10,000.00

12. Commerce (For each year of the biennium).....\$25,000.00

Since the organization of the College of Commerce, the increased enrollment has been remarkable. The competition for service

of instructors competent to teach in the practical fields of banking, taxation, and other similar work, is so great as to make it almost impossible to maintain a first-class College of Commerce with anything less than the appropriation asked for. Unless funds are available, the State University will be compelled to limit the attendance in this college.

13. Child Welfare Research Station (for each year of the biennium)\$5,000.00

The Child Welfare Station, established by the Thirty-sixth General Assembly, has been one of the most popular departments of the university and has attracted attention everywhere. The funds provided have proved to be inadequate, and but for the annual gifts that have been made by outside agencies to this department it would have been impossible to go forward without additional state support. In order to care for the work now needed in this department it will be necessary to make a slight increase in support.

SUMMARY

Thus it will be seen that the university is asking, for maintenance, a renewal of all expiring appropriations and a net increase of \$367,000 annually during the next biennium. This sum is much less than the corresponding askings for increases from the Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth General Assemblies, and it represents the minimum needed to care for the students in attendance. The policy of the Board of Education to budget all expenditures makes it possible for us to determine pretty clearly the various increases that will be necessary in order to take care of the growth of the university.

Students who come to the Iowa educational institutions should be as well taught as those in neighboring states. It is a well-known fact that relatively few students come to Iowa from outside the state; fewer than is the case in our neighboring states. Certain persons have proposed that an embargo be declared against educating students from outside the state; but, as a member of the general assembly said recently, the moment the students from Nebraska, Illinois, or Minnesota were sent home, we might quite naturally expect retaliation on the part of these states which would certainly not reduce the cost of our service.

The fact is that the provisions that are made in the Iowa educational institutions are almost entirely for our own young men and young woman; but, since our boys and girls, in every service of society throughout their entire lifetime, must compete with people

trained elsewhere, it is imperative that our students be as well taught as would be the case were they to go to institutions outside of Iowa.

The bill carries the minimum amount of money to hold our own with other growing institutions and, at the same time, keep all departments open at all times to students who are qualified. By constitutional provision, Iowa, throughout her entire history, has maintained a program of public education with a fixed policy of encouraging the youth of the state to go forward with specific preparation in the arts, sciences, industries and professions. Each additional increment of students means additional instruction, equipment, supplies, class room and housing. If money is lacking to employ a staff, to purchase equipment, to build class rooms or provide housing, it is impossible to meet the demands of our citizens.

It should be noted that no increases are asked in certain departments. Indeed, in soldier tuition there is a decrease, because each year there will be less needed, as the incoming classes are not old enough to have been in the service during the war.

B. Special Appropriations for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 1925.

1. Continuation of present appropriation for Additional Equipment for Buildings and Departments and an increase of \$230,000.00

for the following purposes:

(a) Boilers, heating plant and laundry.....	\$32,500.00
(b) Warehouse and shops.....	25,000.00
(c) Hydro electric plant.....	10,000.00
(d) Chemistry equipment.....	75,000.00
(e) Liberal Arts equipment.....	7,500.00
(f) Medical equipment.....	10,000.00

(k) Water pumps, filter.....	32,500.00

(a) *Boilers, heating plant and laundry.* With the erection of the chemistry building and other increases in departments, it is necessary to expand the heating plant by the addition of extra boilers, etc. Additional equipment is necessary in the laundry department to care for the great growth in the service in this division. More than 250,000 pieces go through the laundry each month.

(b) *Warehouse and shops.* A small building is needed to house a machine shop, a plumbing shop, a steam-fitting shop, a cabinet-making shop and a garage. It has seemed desirable to combine this with

a general warehouse for the storing of emergency material in the department of buildings and grounds, and of supplies for dormitories and hospitals.

(c) *Hydro-electric.* At the present time, with the use of the water power of the Iowa River we generate much of our own electricity. It is estimated that additional equipment will save \$7,500 each year.

(d) *Chemistry equipment.* The appropriation for the Chemistry Building, made by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly, did not include provision for equipment. Although much of the equipment now used in the old chemistry building can be moved, yet it will be necessary to expend this money in order to take care of the chemistry service successfully. Modern chemical equipment becomes obsolete very rapidly.

(e) *Liberal Arts equipment.* This fund for permanent equipment in the College of Liberal Arts will make it possible to meet the various calls for permanent equipment in the departments of physics, animal biology, zoology, botany and other sciences.

(f) *Medical equipment.* It is essential that the teaching of medicine be supplemented by adequate modern facilities, which necessitates a more or less continual expense for new equipment in these various fields.

(g) *Engineering equipment.* With the constant development in the field of applied science, it is essential that new equipment be purchased from time to time to supplement the old material, in order that the students may be familiar with the newest development.

(h) *Graduate College equipment.* This fund is used to supplement the facilities afforded in undergraduate instruction in the various departments.

(i) *Pharmacy equipment.* The Pharmacy College serves as a pharmaceutical laboratory for the University Hospital. This additional expenditure for laboratory equipment will make it possible to reduce the cost of much of the pharmaceutical material.

(j) *Sidewalks, paving, sewers, grading and lighting, etc.* With the operation of the west-side plant, including the psychopathic hospital, the Men's Dormitory, the Children's Hospital, the Nurses' Home and the Armory, it is impossible to delay longer the problem of sewers and other community necessities. With the growth of this service on the west side, it is necessary to extend the university lighting facilities.

(k) *Water pumps, filter.* With the ever-increasing growth of the campus, and with the new demands upon the various parts of the plant, additional facilities for water are essential.

Sheppard-Towner Law. This law has been administered since its first operation in this state, through the Division of Maternity and Infant Hygiene at the university. In order to meet the provisions of this law, it will be necessary to duplicate the funds available from the federal government. The public demand for education as provided by this statute has been far in excess of our ability to meet it.

Buildings. With the great growth in the university in recent years, there has been such an insistent demand for money to meet the cost of additional instruction and equipment, etc., that the actual meeting of the building needs has been deferred from biennium to biennium. We are now at the saturation point in a number of departments. We have been forced, within the last twelve months, to build two wooden buildings with their attendant fire hazards. In addition to this, we have leased store buildings, dwelling houses, and the basement of a church, for classroom purposes. Added classroom space must be provided to care for the demands, or students will be turned away. The needs of the Medical College and Hospital will be met if the conditions of the gift are accepted. This acceptance will relieve certain other departments and effect a large saving in askings for buildings within the next few years, but an added classroom building for use of students in Liberal Arts, Commerce and education is essential and this can be built if the present appropriation for buildings and grounds is continued.

In addition to this, a library is imperative. With the great increase in the number of Liberal Arts students, it now becomes impossible to provide seating space for study and reading in our old building. There were fewer than 1,000 such students when that building was built. In order to meet the demands as determined by experience in Minnesota, Michigan, Harvard, and elsewhere, it will be necessary to appropriate, each year of the biennium, \$750,000 for this purpose.

Land. The ground upon which this university is situated has been purchased piecemeal—the most expensive manner possible. That is, we have constantly enhanced the value of adjacent ground and have been forced often to pay outrageous prices for such ground. It would be a source of great economy to the state if provision could be made to purchase immediately all the ground needed, and certainly any private corporation would do this; but, at the mini-

mum, we should be authorized to expend any balances that may be saved from time to time, and to have an additional appropriation of \$50,000 for each year of the biennium.

Dormitories. Notwithstanding the fact that hundreds of houses have been erected in Iowa City in the past few years, and that the institution has developed an added dormitory for 350 students, it is a fact that hundreds of students have been unable to find satisfactory living conditions in Iowa City, and have been forced to leave. This scarcity has, quite naturally, resulted in high rental charge for rooms.

In order to meet the demands on the part of parents who send their children to the university, it has been suggested that the state lend sufficient money to build a small dormitory each year for the next few years, with the understanding that these dormitories be operated on a four per cent basis, and with the expectation of returning all of the capital thus advanced. This is a feasible proposition, and the entire amount could be amortized within a few years.

BRIEF ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATION FOR INCREASED APPROPRIATIONS

IOWA STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND MECHANIC ARTS INCREASES

A. Maintenance Appropriations, beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Permanent Collegiate Support Fund (for each year of the biennium)\$237,500.00

The increase is asked to care for the increase of enrollment and to cover additional costs made necessary by the growth of the institution, especially the purchase of more coal and other supplies.

2. Summer Session (for each year of the biennium).....\$15,000.00

From the standpoint of economy alone, the Summer Session is desirable. If this session were not conducted, the plant would be practically idle one quarter of the year. Enrollment is rapidly increasing.

3. Maintenance and Improvement of Public Grounds (for each year of the biennium).....\$5,000.00

The increase asked represents only a part of the amount needed to put the plant in good condition. At the present time, the streets of the campus are in bad condition and should be repaired in the interest of safety.

4. Soldier Tuition (for each year of the biennium) . . . Decrease, \$10,000.00

This is a renewal of the appropriation made by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly, less ten thousand dollars, and is needed to assist soldiers in the payment of college fees, on the same basis as that prevailing at the present time.

B. Appropriations for Industrial Service Work beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Engineering Experiment Station (for each year of the biennium)\$5,000.00

The increase is needed to cover the cost of publishing the results of important investigational work.

2. Agricultural Experiment Station (for each year of the biennium)\$25,000.00

The increase asked would cover the cost of only a few of the important investigations which should be made at this time in the interest of better agriculture.

3. **Veterinary Investigations (for each year of the biennium)...**\$12,000.00

This increase is needed to cover cost of investigations in the interest of reducing losses amounting to millions of dollars.

4. **Agricultural and Home Economics Extension (for each year of the biennium).....**\$35,000.00

The increase is needed to strengthen the extension work in agriculture and home economics throughout the state. The popularity and usefulness of this work are constantly increasing.

5. **Trade School and Engineering Extension (for each year of the biennium).....**\$5,000.00

Through this fund the college is able to reach many deserving young men who have been obliged to quit school early and who are ambitious to get ahead. The demands are far in excess of what can be done with the present fund.

C. *Special Appropriations for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 1923.*

(Not more than one-half of the total of the following appropriations to be available the first year of the biennium.)

INCREASED SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS

1. **Equipment and Furnishings for Buildings and Departments.**\$120,000.00

This includes equipment for the new Library and Physics Buildings. It provides, also, for adding to the equipment of other departments where additional equipment is required because of increased enrollment and increased teaching facilities.

2. **Extension of Heating System, Equipment of Heating Plant Water Plant, and Sewage System.....**\$80,000.00

Although a part of this appropriation, if granted, will be used for the enlargement of the plant, it is needed chiefly because of the worn out condition of equipment installed 20 to 40 years ago. A careful estimate shows that the college is losing about \$10,000 annually from leakage of old water pipes. A greater amount is lost in connection with the heating system.

3. **Additional Land and Buildings.**

It is obvious that a large saving can be made by the state if certain land necessary for the work of the college is secured without further delay. Land values are increasing, and it may be expected that these will even double in some cases within the next two or four years.

Buildings most urgently needed are as follows: For the Home Economics Division, which is now conducting work in eight different buildings; for the Dairy Department, which is most inadequately housed; for barns, especially for beef cattle; for engineering shops; and for the growing work of the Department of Grounds and Buildings.

BRIEF ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR INCREASED APPROPRIATIONS

IOWA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE INCREASES

A. Maintenance Appropriations, beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Teachers' Fund (for each year of the biennium).....\$25,000.00

The increase is asked to care for the increase of enrollment and to cover additional costs made necessary by the growth of the institution, especially the purchase of more coal and other supplies.

2. Summer Term (for each year of the biennium).....\$5,000.00

The increase of \$5,000 in the summer term fund is based entirely upon the development of attendance. This estimate will not meet the complete expenditures, but it is believed that the fees that will be received will take care of expenses beyond the appropriation.

3. Librarian's Salary Fund (for each year of the biennium)....\$2,000.00

This increase is needed to provide service adequate to meet the growing demands of the institution.

B. Extension.

1. Extension Service Fund (for each year of the biennium)....\$12,000.00

The extension service is of immense benefit in improving teachers who are in the service of the schools of the state, to the end that their work may be more effective. During the past two years the work has been limited because of the inability to pay for the great amount of instruction desired. In no way can the Teachers College contribute more to the advancement of the schools than by enlarging, in many definite ways, the extension courses offered during the time the schools are in session. The work done now is a guarantee of the certainty of the service for the future. Not half of the work that could be done with profit is now attempted. Knowing the greater needs of the schools through a test of this system for several years, we place here the least amount we think the college should spend in this method of improvement in elementary teaching. No state outside of Iowa has an effective demonstration of the supreme importance of this extension teaching, and many states are making plans to establish an equivalent system.

2. Extension Summer School Fund (for each year of the biennium).....\$15,000.00

The extension summer schools as a means of preparing teachers are of exceptional merit. A careful study of these schools during the past six years leads to the conclusion that in no other way can so much work be done at so little expense to the state; and for that reason we request that the funds appropriated by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly for that purpose be increased by \$15,000.00 a year, making a total of \$50,000.00 annually for the work. In no other way can the state do a better work for immediate benefit to the rank and file of teachers in the service and to those who are seeking to enter that vocation. The demand for these extension schools is continually increasing. The large attendance during the past few years shows that the people of the state approve of their organization. For these reasons, the number of such schools should be gradually increased, thereby relieving the growing attendance in the summer term at Cedar Falls.

C. Specials (For the biennium beginning July 1, 1923)

1. Heating Plant.....\$20,000.00

Two of the boilers of one hundred horse power each were installed in the heating plant in 1902. Because of their condition, and because of new buildings that are being constructed, additional heat will be necessary. To install two new boilers larger in capacity than the present ones and to repair the plant will cost about \$20,000.00.

BRIEF ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROPRIATIONS

IOWA COLLEGE FOR THE BLIND

A. Support and Maintenance, beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Support Fund (for each year of the biennium).....\$40,000.00

This is a renewal of the appropriation granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

2. Repair and Contingent (for each year of the biennium)....\$3,500.00

This is a renewal of the appropriation granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

B. Specials. (For the biennium.)

1. Piano and Furniture.....\$4,000.00

This is \$1,000.00 less than we are receiving during the present biennial period.

2. Improvements.....\$5,000.00

This is \$1,000.00 less than was given us by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

3. Equipment.....\$5,000.00

This is \$1,000.00 less than was granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

4. Small Buildings.....\$5,000.00

During the biennium the following buildings should be constructed:

- (a) Poultry house.
(b) Garage.
(c) Rebuilding of walls of coal bunkers.

The poultry house is inadequate for the needs of the institution. Besides, its condition is such that it could not be used for instructional purposes.

There is no heated garage at the school. The state owns a car which should receive better care than is given it at the present time. Additional storage room is also needed for machinery.

One of the walls of the coal bunker is in bad condition, and it should be rebuilt within a short time.

The total askings for the Iowa College for the Blind for the biennial period that will begin July 1, 1923, as given above, are \$1,000 less than those granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly for each year of the present biennium.

BRIEF ARGUMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROPRIATIONS

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

A. Support and Maintenance, beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Support Fund (for each year of the biennium).....\$150,000.00

This amount is composed of the following:

- (a) Renewal of appropriation made by the 39th General Assembly.....\$132,000.00
(b) Increase.....18,000.00

The renewal of appropriation is needed to enable the school to continue the work that is being done at the present time.

The increase is needed for the following reasons:

(1) To operate the cottage for small children and to provide additional teachers for them. Additional help will also be needed. The cost of all of this will be about \$12,000.00 annually.

(2) During the past three years, the attendance has increased from 165 to 235 pupils. At the present time there are a good many deaf children who have not attended the school. Since the attendance is increasing each year, from 20 to 25 new children entering annually, more money is needed to pay teachers' salaries, to employ additional help, and to pay for the cost of food. It is estimated that \$6,000.00 is needed to meet this additional expense.

2. Scholarships (for each year of the biennium).....\$500.00

This is the same amount that was appropriated by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly. The Thirty-eighth General Assembly made an appropriation of \$500.00 for each year of the biennium that began July 1, 1919, to assist worthy graduates of this institution to continue their education in an institution of higher learning. The same amount was granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly. This appropriation should be renewed.

B. Special Appropriations for the biennium beginning July 1, 1923.

1. Repair and Contingent.....\$30,000.00

This is the same amount that was given by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly. The appropriation should be continued. To keep the ten buildings in good repair and to do such other work as painting, carpentry, etc., will require the amount requested.

2. Library and Book Binding.....\$1,000.00

This is the same appropriation that was granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly.

The Thirty-ninth General Assembly made an appropriation of \$1,000.00 for the biennium for the purchase of books, etc. No other appropriations have such intrinsic value for the pupils of the school for the deaf as funds devoted to this purpose. This appropriation should be continued.

3. Equipment\$48,000.00

This is \$48,000.00 less than was granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly for the biennial period that will end June 30, 1923. The amount requested will be used for the following purposes:

- (a) The gymnasium is old and poorly adapted to the use for which it was built. To modernize the building and equip it properly will require about \$15,000.00. New apparatus is also needed.
- (b) The classes in baking and cooking now occupy the best parts of the gymnasium building. Such classes should be conducted in the main building, and the rooms that are vacated should be converted into dressing rooms with lockers and baths. To re-locate the classes in baking and cooking will necessitate the use of two rooms in the main building, which must be made ready for their use.
- (c) At the present time, there is no good place to keep the hay that is produced on the farm. The mows in the barn are not large enough. A new hay shed for winter feeding is also needed.
- (d) New wells are needed badly. Because of poor casings or a diminished flow, the present supply of water is scarcely enough for the use of the school. Competent persons have stated that four new wells with suitable pumps are necessary. These will cost approximately five thousand dollars.
- (e) The heating plant needs new equipment, such as pumps and engines. The plant is old and in need of repairs constantly. Much of the plumbing in the ten buildings should be replaced.

The total askings for the Iowa School for the Deaf for each year of the biennial period that will begin July 1, 1923, as given above, are \$6,000 less than those granted by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly for each year of the present biennium.

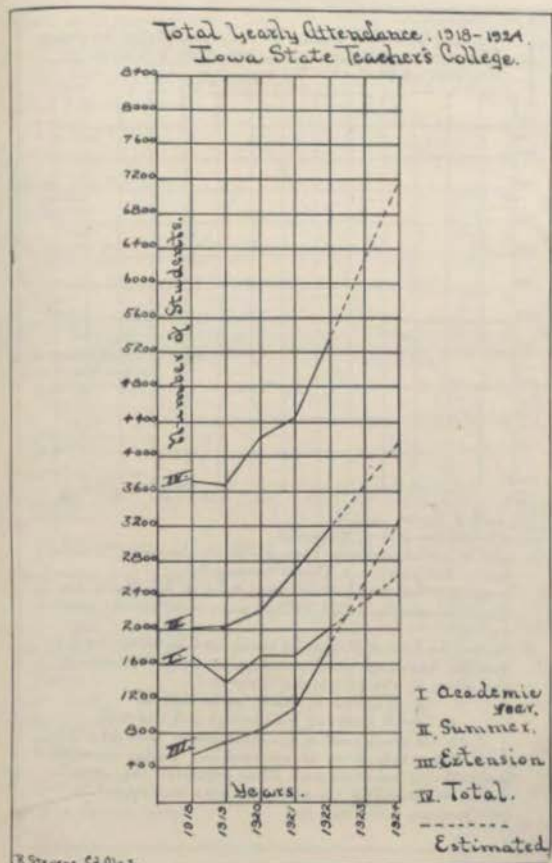

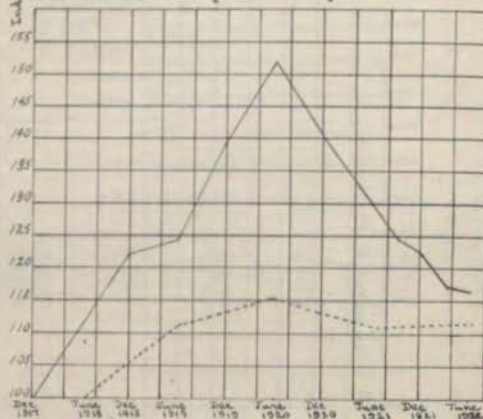

CAUSE OF BLINDNESS

Regarding the causes of blindness, I am in doubt as to whether the statute requiring a report of this character contemplates the original cause of blindness or the immediate cause. I have concluded to make the report on the original cause so far as that can be determined. It is as follows:

The above number does not agree with the number of students in the foregoing list of pupils of the Iowa College for the Blind. The discrepancy is due to the fact that in some cases the original causes of blindness could not be determined. It may be interesting to note that of the number of students admitted during the biennial period, twenty-one were either totally blind or partially blind at birth. It may also be interesting to note that the social diseases have caused more blind-

ness than any other agent. There is little hope that blindness will be entirely eliminated until men and women practice social purity, and social purity is a pledge of health and light to the child.

STUDIES PURSUED

In many respects the college for the blind follows the same line of studies as the schools for the sighted. We have not only the usual eighth grades admitting to high school standing, but the high school as well; and any boy or girl graduating from the academic department of the college for the blind is prepared to enter the State University or any of the colleges of Iowa. The course of study is practically the same as that of the schools for the sighted. Mathematics, English, History, Spelling, Writing, Geography, Science and Latin are all included in the course of study.

However, there are some important differences. In the Iowa College for the Blind, each pupil, unless excused by the nurse or the college physician, is required to take physical training work; and for this purpose an hour a day is given to the gymnasium work. I believe that this work has been of great value to the pupils at the college for the blind, not only from the standpoint of health but also from the standpoint of muscular movement. A great many blind children are naturally timid; others are inclined to inactivity because of blindness; and the training that they get in the gymnasium has been of incalculable benefit to them in overcoming either timidity or inactivity.

Every pupil is required to take some industrial work, unless there are handicaps other than blindness. This requirement is based upon two conclusions: First, we believe that such industrial work has an educational value outside of its vocational value; second, we believe that every pupil should be trained in the means of self-support. It is perhaps true that all of our pupils will not enter the vocations for which the college for the blind prepares them. Some of them will, as experience has shown, and all of them may so from the school prepared for some useful occupation along the lines of our instruction—useful at least until some more inviting opportunity presents itself. To this end, we offer courses in basket making, rug and carpet weaving, chair caning, broom making, hammock tying, piano tuning and dictaphone operating. We have done some work in the field of floriculture since the greenhouse has been built. However, as yet, the work has not been systematized and I cannot make an intelligent report along this line. We are hoping in the near future to make an intelligent and valuable use of the greenhouse for educational purposes. Willetta Huggins, of the Wisconsin School for the Blind, a girl who is both deaf and blind, has recently brought to light the importance of the sense of smell, and I am of the opinion that many of our totally blind boys and girls may come into a fine appreciation of flowers through this much neglected sense. And then, there are others who have some sight who may be able to reap some practical rewards as a result of the study of floriculture.

In this connection, I may say that we have had under consideration the establishment of a model store for the blind, where our boys and girls may be taught correct business methods, as well as some of the fundamental principles of salesmanship. Too often it is taken for granted that a blind boy or girl is limited to the simple occupations that require training in touch only, while experience has shown that blind men and women have become successful business men. It is not a question of blindness—it is the question of the boy and girl, a question of their natural tendencies, a question of their individual capacities. There have been four reunions held in Vinton since I have had charge of the work at the college for the blind. To these reunions have come blind men and women, most of them graduates of the college, from all parts of the state, as well as from other states. The most of them would be called successful. There have come suc-

cessful business men, successful lawyers, successful osteopaths and chiropractors, successful teachers, successful preachers, successful industrial workers, successful musicians, successful home-makers. The point is that we cannot, nor do we want to, educate the child contrary to his natural tendencies, provided those tendencies be wholesome and serviceable, but on the contrary, we must endeavor to draw out to full fruition the best that is in him until every static force in him for good becomes dynamic. There are, perhaps, many, many lines along which blindness is not insuperable, and I feel that our work should have a very broad educational basis.

I have referred to important differences when the Iowa College for the Blind is compared to the schools for the sighted. This is nowhere better illustrated than in the department of music. In this department, the work has a two-fold purpose: First, to train the child in a proper interpretation and appreciation of music; second, to test the pupils with reference to a musical career. Some work is required of all; and all musical studies are within the election of all, unless, in the judgment of teachers, it would be a waste of time to continue study in music. In the pursuance of these purposes, we are conscious of the fact that mistakes have been made; but on the whole, the results have been beneficial. It has led to the discovery of one or two students who may be highly successful in the field of music. We are offering, under the guidance of competent teachers, instruction in voice, violin, piano and organ. Every student is required to take some voice work; all are encouraged to test themselves in other lines. During the year, we organized among the small boys a "kinder band." It was a mere experiment in the effort to teach rhythm and tone and time. It was an experiment that succeeded beyond my expectations and the work will be extended another year. The band consisted of eight primary boys. Three of them played the mouth organ; two the bones; one the snare drum; one the triangle; and one the cornetina. After eight weeks practice these boys, under the leadership of Mr. Chas. Olson, teacher in the tuning department, played at chapel, much to the delight of all present. In this connection, permit me to say that blindness is no asset in the field of music. It is commonly supposed that the blind are more musical than the sighted. I do not believe that this is true. If the blind achieve greater results, it is because of closer and more persistent application, as well as superior instruction on the part of teachers. However, music is a wonderful asset to the blind, and should be encouraged.

TRADES TAUGHT

This part of the report has probably been made with sufficient fullness under the topic Studies Pursued, but it may not be out of place to restate them for the sake of clearness. We have been teaching the following trades:

Broom making, chair caning, pattern weaving, rug and carpet weaving, basket making, hammock tying. Besides these, perhaps not to be considered as trades, but as preparation for future occupation, there are typewriting and dictaphone operation, together with music. When dictaphone operation and typewriting are mentioned it is at once concluded by many people that they are useless as occupations for the blind, but it must not be forgotten that there are a great many boys and girls who have sight enough to enable them to correct their own work. Besides, they are not wholly impracticable for pupils who are totally blind. Experience has demonstrated that the totally blind may make successful typists and dictaphone operators. In the teaching of these occupations we have not lost sight of the great educational value of hand training through such occupations. I refer to this fact because frequently these trades and occupations seem foreign to the plans of parents for their children. However, we believe that they give important means of education in the broad sense of the term.

In the table for the year 1920-1921 the value is based upon the selling price, or market price; in the table for the year 1921-1922, the value is estimated on the cost of materials used. In connection with the above tables, it should be remembered that much of the material manufactured is requisitioned by the college and therefore is not accredited to the amounts under the column, Amount Received from Sales. Besides, there still remain in the industrial rooms many articles that have been kept for exhibition purposes, or which have not been sold. Were these all to be sold the total would be very greatly increased.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

E. A. GRUVER, SUPERINTENDENT

To the Iowa State Board of Education:

I herewith submit for your consideration the thirty-fifth biennial report of the Iowa School for the Deaf, covering the period from July 1, 1920 to June 30, 1922, accompanied by statistical tables.

The biennium was a very successful one and marks an epoch in the development of the school. The employees performed their various duties faithfully and efficiently; the pupils were attentive to their work and the parents thoughtful in their relations to the school. The attendance has increased from 169 in September, 1920, to 215 in September, 1922, and 235 on October 29, 1922. This increase is due to two causes: The natural desire of parents to send their deaf children to school, and the systematic work of the State Agent, who by tactful and persistent effort has succeeded in placing a large number of deaf children under instruction. The appointment of a State Agent to enforce the Compulsory Education Law for deaf children was a good thing and is justified by results. The average age of those admitted during the biennium was about 13 years—6 or 7 years older than it should have been. This is further evidence of the great need of a Compulsory Law. The comparative attendance for 10 years, in September, is as follows: 1912-1913, 205; 1913-1914, 206; 1914-1915, 202; 1915-1916, 193; 1916-1917, 181; 1917-1918, 166; 1918-1919, 148; 1919-1920, 172; 1920-1921, 169; 1921-1922, 190; 1922-1923, 215.

A normal growth this year should make the attendance by January 1, 1923, about 250. We are instructing 65 more pupils at this time than three years ago. With the opening of the cottage next fall, 30 or 30 children, between 5 and 10 years of age, will be added. We must, therefore, make provision for about 300 pupils for the biennium.

The health of the pupils was exceptionally good, not a single death having occurred and only a very few cases of sickness. This we attribute to the good medical treatment and care; the wholesome food and comfortable housing; the systematic eye, ear, nose, throat and dental attention, and the spirit of contentment which permeates the entire school. For much of this we are indebted to the physicians of Council Bluffs who organized a consulting medical staff and under the direction of the attending physician made periodical examinations of the pupils and properly safeguarded their health.

Provision should be made for an additional supply of water, as the flow from the artesian wells is diminishing. One well has been sunk to 62 feet and a good supply of water secured, but more is necessary.

The buildings present a neat and orderly appearance. Many repairs were made and much painting done. Much more is still to be done before the plant is brought to a degree of care such as a school of this character should maintain at all times. Each department received its share of re-organization and additional equipment, so that a good foundation is laid for a better and broader line of work in the future. The old industrial building has been remodeled into an infirmary and four apartments. This leaves only the gymnasium building to be overhauled, provision for which is made in the present budget. The small building in the center of the grounds, at present being used for temporary instruction and play purposes, should be converted into additional classrooms, as the school house is overcrowded and the classes are entirely too large. The basement of the main building is utilized as an industrial department, where classes in sewing, dressmaking, printing, car-

penry, shoemaking and painting are conducted and where recently, a class in manual training for small boys has been added. These and the baking and cooking classes received much new equipment and are now well supplied with the necessary apparatus to do good work and to give the pupils proper instruction in one of the most useful departments of the school. In addition, the laundry, farm, garden and engine room received equipment and machinery of suitable character, while the kitchen and household were given liberal attention and supplied with many small things. The refrigerators were rebuilt; an ice machine was installed; a root cellar was constructed; trees were trimmed; fences were replaced; a motion picture machine added; and the library and other parts of the house were refurnished.

The direct object of the school is the education of deaf children; the chief aim of the instruction is mental development. While this development is taking place, the child is also learning to converse orally with those who hear and speak. Although conservative in the introduction of new and unproved educational devices, the school is abreast of the times, and is fairly in line with the best schools for the deaf in educational matters. In the particular methods of instruction pursued in the classrooms there have been no material changes. A large measure of success has crowned our efforts and every branch of the educational work has been advanced to a higher plane. The education of the deaf has its peculiar limitations which often prevent the full attainment of our highest ideals; but, from the progress already made, and the wholesome atmosphere pervading the school, it is not unreasonable to say that this school offers excellent facilities for the training of deaf children. A class of pupils was graduated each year, several of whom entered Gallaudet College, Washington, D. C., for a higher course, and two of whom are taking special courses in the public schools.

In this biennial period, special emphasis will be placed upon the physical development of the children, dental treatment, utilization of latent hearing in instruction, introduction of rhythm work, the further development of the industrial classes and the care and education of the small children in the cottage.

I respectfully call your attention to the following appropriations required to carry on the work of the school during the biennial period:

I wish to express my hearty appreciation of the advice and cooperation of the State Board of Education and of the Finance Committee; of the generous assistance and fidelity of those engaged with me in the work, and the courtesy of the many friends of the school who in various ways have faithfully supported it.

We will have 20 or 25 additional children whose maintenance, exclusive of teachers, will add approximately \$200.00 per month more, so that the maintenance appropriation for the next biennium should be \$12,500.00 per month.

2. To keep the buildings in good repair and to do the many little things necessary such as painting, etc., will require \$15,000.00 annually.

3. (a) The gymnasium is old and poorly adapted to use of any kind. Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) spent on it will modernize the building and equip it. The baking and cooking classes, now occupying the best parts of the building, should be removed to the main building and these two rooms should be converted into dressing rooms with lockers and baths. To re-locate the bakery and cooking classes will necessitate getting two rooms in the main building ready for use—plastering, painting, etc., with general re-modeling. The gymnasium has no apparatus.

(b) There is no place to keep as much hay as we raise and need. The mows in the barn are not large enough. We also need a hay shed for winter feeding.

(c) The water supply is diminishing rapidly. Either because of leaky and rusty casings or because the supply is limited. We need four new wells with pumps, etc., at a cost of about \$1,200.00 each. A good flow of water can be secured at 65 to 100 feet. One well has already been sunk to 62 feet and a good supply of water secured.
