REPORT OF STATE VETERINARY SURGEON

I have the honor to present the following report of the work of the Iowa Commission of Animal Health for the biennial period ending June 30, 1922.

The function of the Commission of Animal Health and the duties may be described as follows:

To protect the health of the domestic animals of the state, to determine and employ the most efficient and practical means for the prevention, suppression, control and eradication of dangerous contagious or infectious diseases among domestic animals; and for this purpose it is authorized and empowered to establish, maintain, enforce and regulate such quarantine and other measures relating to the movements and care of animals and their products; the disinfection of suspected yards, buildings and articles, and the destruction of animals as it may deem necessary, and to adopt from time to time all such regulations as may be necessary and proper.

This regulatory work calls for the inspection and tuberculin testing of cattle in cooperation with the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, and supervising and tuberculin testing of dairy cattle from which milk and milk products are sold or offered for sale in liquid or condensed form for human consumption in cities and incorporated towns that have ordinances requiring same.

TUBERCULOSIS

Bovine Tuberculosis—This disease is widely prevalent, existing in all sections of the world where cattle are raised, and recorded in Iowa statistics for the last thirty-five years, continues to be the greatest disease control problem of our time.

On account of the possibility of infection to human subjects from bovine sources, now recognized as a well established fact in many instances of tubercular children, and also on account of the large number of carcasses condemned as unfit for human food because of the extent of tuberculosis lesions found therein, the disease operates as a large factor in raising the price of beef and dairy products to the consumer.

The significance of the well established fact of the possibility of infecting the human subject and of the great waste of food products, was the original basis of the appeal from human sanitarians and the live stock industry of North America to the Federal Government to inaugurate a campaign for its extermination.

In 1917, the U. S. Congress appropriated \$500,000 for the payment of indemnities on tubercular cattle and the expenses of operating. In 1918 the demand for the work increased to such an extent that U. S. Congress increased the appropriation to \$1,500,000.

In September, 1918, the United States Bureau of Animal Industry entered into an agreement with the Iowa Commission of Animal Health to cooperate with the State of Iowa to control the spread of tuberculosis, with the view of eventually eradicating the disease from the cattle in the state. With this aim in view, the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, in September, 1918, established an office in Des Moines, Iowa, with a working force of three men.

The Thirty-eighth General Assembly of the State of Iowa appropriated the sum of \$100,000 to be used by the Commission of Animal Health for the control and suppression of all contagious diseases, and the paying of indemnity on animals slaughtered on account of tuberculosis.

The requests for this work became so numerous that the amount of money appropriated by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly was insufficient to meet the demand, and it became necessary, if the state should attempt to take care of the many applications from various cattle raisers in the state, that the appropriation be increased.

The question was taken up by the Thirty-ninth General Assembly. The result was that that honorable body very liberally increased the appropriation \$150,000 annually for the biennial period ending June 30, 1923. By this the Commission of Animal Health was empowered to use \$250,000 annually for the control of all contagious diseases and the paying of indemnity to owners of cattle slaughtered on account of being affected with tuberculosis.

The following is the amount of work accomplished by this department in cooperation with the United States Department of Animal Industry for the biennial period commencing July 1, 1920, and ending June 30, 1922.

On July 1, 1920, there were 49 tuberculosis-free accredited herds in the state; 177 herds that had passed one clean test, and a total of 1,550 herds under supervision.

June 30, 1922, we have 779 herds fully accredited, representing 23,649 head of cattle; 3,500 herds that have passed one clean test, representing 51,690 head of cattle, and 1,478 herds tested that

showed infection, representing 38,458 head of cattle; a total of 5,757 herds, representing 113,797 head of cattle under supervision.

This amount of work could never have been accomplished had it not been for the loyal support and the untiring effort put forth by the Bureau of Animal Industry in fulfilling the conditions set forth in the cooperative agreement entered into by the Federal Government and the State of Iowa. The U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry in this biennial period paid \$283,373,28 in indemnities on animals slaughtered on account of being tubercular.

During the bienn'al period ending June 30, 1922, this department has been called upon to investigate 4,653 calls as tabulated below:

ANTHRAX

Anthrax is an acute febrile infectious disease. During the last biennium there was one supposed outbreak which at the onset looked very suspicious of Anthrax, but upon thorough investigation, it proved to be a dietetic disease in some form of forage poisoning.

DOURINE

Dourine is a malignant specific vesicular disease of the urinogenital organs of the equine species, resembling closely in all its aspects and effects syphilis in the human patient. This disease is incurable. It has been the policy of the federal authorities, cooperating with the state department, to destroy all animals affected. As a result of this policy, I am glad to state that there is no known case of this disease in the state at the present time, or at any time during the last biennium.

GLANDERS

Glanders is a contagious, usually chronic infectious disease of

horses, asses, and mules. Animals found affected with Glanders are promptly destroyed. During the last biennium there were reported to this department four cases that were suspicious of Glanders, but upon investigation the tests applied proved negative, and the symptoms attributed to other causes. Another case was reported where the reactions to the tests applied were positive. On personal investigations and tests, I found that Glanders actually existed in this stable. The afflicted horses were promptly destroyed and positive lesions of Glanders were found upon post mortem examination. This stable is under observation at the present time.

NECROBACILLOSIS

Necrobacillosis is a condition or disease found in cattle, sheep and swine, resulting from necrophorus. In cattle this infectious result is what is termed "ulcerative ano-vulvitis," a local infection. In sheep it results in what is commonly called lip and leg ulceration. This infection in swine produces "bullnose," necrotic pneumonia or necrotic enteritis. This infection is rather rare in cattle and sheep but it is quite prevalent in hogs, and in all forms responds rather readily to persistent treatment. The internal necrotic conditions found in hogs are more difficult to overcome and they cause considerable loss.

STOMATITIS

Stomatitis is a diseased condition occasionally found in cattle and more rarely in horses. It is of special interest when found in cattle because of its similarity to European foot and mouth disease, which fact makes it necessary to investigate reports very promptly and thoroughly. Such investigation is always made when reports are received stating that cattle are affected with sore mouth, and when there is the least doubt as to the nature of the infection, experimental inoculations are promptly made.

FORAGE POISONING

Forage Poisoning is a convenient term applied to various toxic conditions resulting from the use of improper feed. In some instances the causative agent seems to be chemical in nature. In other, toxins or ptomaines seem responsible for the condition, while again the condition may be due to micro-organisms, pathogenic in character. The condition commonly called "corn-stalk disease" comes under this heading. Owing to the fact that little is known of the nature of the so-called "Forage Poisoning" the only remedy

at hand is change of feed or pasturage. In some instances a certain pasture or stock field which proves injurious early in the season may become safe later. There should be continued research until the true nature of this disease or condition is discovered.

RABIES

The control and eradication of Rabies is a very important duty of this department because of its communicability to man from animals; its rapid spread if it remains uncontrolled and the extremely high rate of mortality in all species of animals in which it developes. Strict quarantine measures, the destruction of exposed animals, including the confinement of dogs in the community where the outbreak occurs are essential in eradicating the disease.

Scientists have for the last few years been experimenting with a vaccine for the prevention of rabies in the dog, and their reports on these experiments are very favorable. If this vaccine can be brought to the point where its use in the field will be practical, not only for preventive measures in the dog but in other domestic animals as well, it will be a material aid in the eradication of this disease. Many valuable animals may be saved that under our present methods either die or have to be destroyed.

SCABIES

During the last biennium the percentage of scabies in both cattle and sheep in this state has shown a very satisfactory decrease, which I believe is due to the rigid enforcement of both the State and Federal regulations relative to dipping and quarantine.

TEXAS FEVER

Texas Fever is a specific blood disease of cattle, due to a protozoon which is transmitted by the tick. Upon one occasion the tick was reported as existing on cattle recently shipped into the state from the South. This condition was soon controlled by successive dippings of the infested cattle.

HOG CHOLERA

The control of Hog Cholera during the last biennium has been upon a cooperative basis between the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry and the Iowa Commission of Animal Health. Under this system, the Bureau employs four veterinarians who are stationed at available points over the state. Each veterinarian devotes all his time to investigating cases where assistance has been requested; he makes sanitary surveys of infected premises, gives warning to neighbors, etc.

The remaining sections of the state are controlled by the Commission of Animal Health through the Assistant State Veterinarians of which we have one appointed in each county. They make such investigations as are made by the Bureau veterinarians, but they work on a per diem and expense basis.

The fundamental principles which have reduced cholera in the state to a minimum are:

- 1. Vaccination.
- 2. Quarantine.
- 3. Sanitation.

By vaccination is meant the use of the preventive serum and virus treatment. There is no other treatment known that will either prevent or successfully combat hog cholera. The results of vaccination depend upon the quality of the serum and virus used, method of administration and the condition of the animal to which the treatment is administered.

The quality of the serum is established by the strict federal inspection maintained at all plants doing an interstate business. The intelligent administration of the treatment necessitates a thorough understanding of both the disease and treatment.

Since only competent veterinarians possess these qualifications the most favorable results follow the use of serum and virus in their hands.

Their experience and scientific knowledge is very necessary to determine the condition of the hogs at time of vaccination.

Many unfavorable results have followed the use of serum where the hogs were too sick, the pigs too young, the dosage of serum and virus too small, etc. These irregularities are being rapidly overcome, yet in spite of them there has been a saving of 85 per cent of all hogs in infected herds given the serum treatment as compared with a loss of more than 85 per cent of all hogs in infected herds not so treated. When infected hogs are treated early there has been a loss of less than 5 per cent.

To compare the serum treatment with any other "so-called" treatment as a preventive in well herds would be ridiculous. There is no other product advocated as a preventive that its producer dare use against virulent virus.

Educational meetings have been held in practically every county in the state where hog raisers have been given instructions and practical demonstrations in the use of Anti-Hog Cholera Serum and Hog Cholera Virus. Eighty-nine counties have had one school of instructions and twenty-six of these counties have held two schools.

The instructions are being given in accordance with the Serum and Virus Law passed by the Twenty-ninth General Assembly which provides as follows:

"Written permits to administer virulent blood or virus from cholera infected hogs shall be issued by the Commission only to such persons as present satisfactory evidence that they are qualified to administer the same. Such permits may be canceled by the Commission upon it appearing that the holder thereof is no longer a proper person to administer such virulent blood or virus unless he is the holder of a valid unrevoked permit, and manufacturers and dealers shall sell to all permit holders without discriminating as to the price of the products.

"Provisions shall be made by the State Veterinarian for instruction in the use of serum and virus in each county not oftener than once each year, and he is hereby authorized and directed to make all necessary arrangements for such instruction at a convenient time and place, when there are seven or more applicants, who are residents of the county for such instruction. Persons who desire to avail themselves of such courses of instruction shall make application to the county agent accompanied by a fee of \$5.00.

"The County Agent shall forward such applications and fees to the State Veterinarian, who shall notify the extension department of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts at Ames, and said department shall within thirty days send competent instructors to such county to hold a school of instructions and demonstrations necessary and conduct examinations and forward his report to the commission immediately.

"Upon receiving such report it shall be the duty of the commission to issue permits to those instructed as provided in Section 15 of this act. Such permits shall allow the applicant to use virulent blood or virus upon animals owned by himself. The compensation of the instructors and other expenses connected with such instructions, shall be paid out of the fee received from applicants, and any surplus shall be paid into the funds of the commission.

"The Animal Health Commission may hold such school of instruction at Ames at such times as they deem proper, and shall hold the same upon the application of ten or more for such schools and at such schools no fees shall be charged and permits shall be granted to applicants as provided in Section 17, and shall hold two stated schools each year on the first Monday of January and August, respectively."

During the last biennium 6,076 hog raisers have taken the school of instructions 739 of this number have taken the instructions at the Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa, under the supervision of the Commission of Animal Health. Four thousand, four hundred and ninety-one have paid fees for the instructions as provided in Chap-

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ter 17, Sec. 1783—A. 16. Supplement to the Compiled Code of Iowa, 1921.

Four thousand, three hundred and eighty-four permits have been issued which shows that 846 failed to pass the examination and they therefore failed to receive permits.

There has been received in fees by this department for such instructions \$22,513.35.

The total expenditures of such schools were \$6,022.10, leaving a balance of \$16,091.25 which has been deposited with the State Treasurer.

RENDERING PLANTS

By an act of the Thirty-eighth General Assembly, Chapter 248, "No person, firm or corporation shall engage in the business of disposing of the bodies of dead animals without first obtaining a license to do so in the manner and upon the terms and conditions as provided."

Any person, firm or corporation desiring to engage in the business of disposing of the bodies of dead animals, by cooking or otherwise, shall file application with and receive a license from the State Veterinary Surgeon, of the State of Iowa. These licenses are for a period of one year and must be renewed annually. A \$25.00 fee must accompany each application and if a license is granted to conduct such business an annual fee of \$25.00 must be paid for such licenses.

These disposal plants must be located, built, equipped, and operated in accordance with the laws of the State of Iowa and the rules and regulations of the Commission of Animal Health. Upon application for a license to operate such a plant, the State Veterinary Department is required to make an inspection to determine if said plant is constructed in accordance with the state law. An annual inspection is also required to ascertain if the plant in question is operating in accordance with the provision of the law, and the Rules and Regulations of the Commission of Animal Health. Prior to July 1st, 1921, this department employed a Rendering Plant Inspector who devoted his entire time to the inspection of these plants. Under this method from July 1st, 1919 to June 30, 1920, it cost the State of Iowa \$2,723.47 to make such inspections. The following year from July 1st, 1920 to June 30, 1921, the total amount of expenditures was \$1,508.26.

Due to the financial depression which caused a very low price

to be placed on the products of these plants, such as hides, tankage, and grease, there was a great decrease in the number of plants operating in the state. This condition made it impractical to keep an inspector devoting all his time to this work. On May 3, 1921, I made application to the Retrenchment and Reform Committee to have the duties of the rendering plant inspector transferred to the Assistant State Veterinarians, of which there is one appointed for each county in the state. These assistants work upon a per diem and expense basis. This change was granted by the retrenchment and Reform Committee and was put into effect July 1st, 1921. Under this system from July 1st, 1921 to June 30, 1922, the total cost was \$615.56.

The Rendering Plants, I believe, have helped materially in the control of contagious and infectious diseases in the livestock in Iowa, as the carcasses of animals dying from the effects of a contagious disease can be immediately removed from the owner's premises and disposed of by cooking under high pressure which process renders the carcass waste as a sterile product. Also these plants are a help to the community from a financial standpoint, as the by-products, such as grease and tankage, have been utilized that heretofore were waste materials.

During the year 1921 there was licensed with this department 82 plants, and from January 1, 1922, up to July 1, 1922, there were 54 plants licensed, which are listed as follows:

SERUM PLANTS

The Thirty-ninth General Assembly passed a law requiring all Serum plants manufacturing and selling Anti-Hog Cholera Serum and Hog Cholera Virus within the State of Iowa, to obtain from the Commission of Animal Health a license for the manufacture and sale of their product. This law also provides that any firm, person, company or corporation before selling or offering for sale within the State of Iowa any Anti-Hog Cholera Serum or Hog Cholera Virus shall first make application to the Commission of Animal Health for a dealer's permit. To obtain such a permit, it becomes necessary that the applicant file in the office of the State Veterinarian a bond in the penal sum of \$5,000 for the use and benefit of all persons using the product who may be damaged by reason of negligence in the warehousing, handling or distribution of such product, and for the use and benefit of the state for all penalties adjudged against the principal thereon in any actions instituted in the name of the state.

A fee of \$25.00 must accompany applications for manufacturer's permit for each plant where it is proposed to manufacture anti-hog cholera serum and hog cholera virus; and a fee of \$15.00 must accompany applications for dealer's permit for each warehouse or distributing agency it is proposed to maintain. All permits shall be valid for one year from the date of issuance, and renewals thereon shall be subject to like conditions, including fees as are imposed in the case of original permits.

During the biennial period ending June 30, 1922, there has been collected in fees for both dealers and manufacturers permits, \$1,870.
