PARDONS

JOHN JACOBS, Wapello County. Sentenced at the September term, 1919, to serve a term of life in the penitentiary at Fort Madison, for the crime of rape. Pardon was recommended by the Board of Parole, the trial judge, the county attorney, and a large number of the citizens and law enforcing officers of Wapello County, and was issued on the 5th day of January, 1925.

LYSLE LACEY, Polk County. Sentenced at the February term, 1918, to serve a term of life in the penitentiary at Fort Madison, for the crime of rape. Pardon was recommended by the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, and was issued on the 6th day of January, 1925.

COMMUTATIONS

MELVIN VICK, Winneshiek County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 8th day of October, 1920, to serve a term of life for the crime of burglary in the night time with a deadly weapon. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of January, 1925.

JOE WALSH, Winneshiek County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 8th day of October, 1920, to serve a term of life for the crime of burglary in the night time with a deadly weapon. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of January, 1925.

ALVIN J. FOSS, Winneshiek County. Committed to the reformatory

at Anamosa on the 8th day of October, 1920, to serve a term of life for the crime of burglary in the night time with a deadly weapon. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of January, 1925.

FLORENCE HOUSTON, Polk County. Committed to the women's reformatory at Rockwell City on the 2nd day of April, 1919, to serve a term of life for the crime of murder in the first degree. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Control, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of January, 1925.

SUSPENSIONS

F. M. HARVEY, Polk County. Convicted at the March term, 1922, of the offense of robbery and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said F. M. Harvey was permitted to go to the home of his sister at Pueblo, Colorado, where employment had been secured for him. Suspension was issued on the 2nd day of January, 1925.

EMANUEL MARTIN, Lee County. Convicted at the January term, 1922, of the offense of escape and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Emanuel Martin was permitted to go to the home of his sister at Strausburg, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of January, 1925.

L. W. HALEY, Dubuque County. Convicted at the February term, 1894, of the offense of murder in the first degree and sentenced to a term of life in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, after a commutation of sentence had been entered in the case, and thereunder the said L. W. Haley was permitted to accompany his brother-in-law, Mr. H. S. Bollman, to the state of Texas. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of January, 1925.

HUGH ROBBARD, Dubuque County. Convicted at the December term, 1893, of the offense of murder in the first degree and sentenced to a term of life in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, after a commutation of sentence had been entered in the case, and thereunder the said Hugh Robbards was permitted to go to his relatives at St. Louis, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of January, 1925.

LLOYD PATTON, Polk County. Convicted at the October term, 1919, of the offense of robbery and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the prosecuting attorney, and thereunder the said Lloyd Patton was permitted to go to the home of his mother at Middleton, New York. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of January, 1925.

PARDONS

JAMES S. FREAR, Jones County. Sentenced at the March term, 1924, to serve a term of five years in the reformatory at Anamosa, for the crime of escape. The said James S. Frear was paroled from the institution on the 14th day of April, 1925, and had less than two months left until he could be certified for final discharge. Pardon was recommended by the Board of Parole and a number of representative citizens, and was issued on the 22nd day of February, 1926.

COMMUTATIONS

CLEO MOORE, Carroll County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 25th day of October, 1920, to serve a term of life for the crime of entering a banking house with intent to rob. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 30th day of November, 1925.

WILSON DE VRIES, Clay County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 22nd day of September, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of daylight bank robbery. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said

reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 12th day of February, 1926.

WILLIAM P. HICKS, Cerro Gordo County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 17th day of June, 1924, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 8th day of March, 1926.

W. P. RAZOR, Hancock County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 5th day of March, 1919, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to fifteen years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of March, 1926.

HARRISON WOODSON, Polk County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 12th day of March, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to ten years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of March, 1926.

JOSEPH L. MOORE, Scott County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 25th day of January, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to ten years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 17th day of March, 1926.

JOHN OLSON, Dickinson County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 4th day of February, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to fifteen years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 29th day of June, 1926.

SUSPENSIONS

EARL ARCHER, Scott County. Convicted at the December term, 1920, of the offense of assault on rape, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed twenty years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Earl Archer was permitted to go to his relatives at Chicago, Illinois, where employment was guaranteed him. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of January, 1925.

PAULINE EVANS, Mahaska County. Convicted at the October term, 1922, of the offense of prostitution, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Control, and thereunder the said Pauline Evans was permitted to go to the home of her sister at Chicago, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 5th day of February, 1925.

HARVEY J. LARSON, Scott County. Convicted at the November term, 1922, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to

an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Harvey J. Larson was permitted to go to the home of his mother in Steele County, Minnesota. Suspension was issued on the 26th day of February, 1925.

MYRON YODER, Johnson County. Convicted at the August term, 1924, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Myron Yoder was permitted to go to the home of his parents at Goshen, Indiana, to finish college. Suspension was issued on the 26th day of February, 1925.

BERNARD BOYD, Dallas County. Convicted at the March term, 1924, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Bernard Boyd was permitted to go to Minnesota, where he had employment. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of March, 1925.

ROBERT COUCH, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1922, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Robert Couch was permitted to go to the home of his parents in Michigan, where he had employment. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of April, 1925.

C. A. MORGAN, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1924, of the offense of larceny from person, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed fifteen years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said C. A. Morgan was permitted to accept employment with his brother-in-law, Mr. Kline, on a paving contract in the state of Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of April, 1925.

G. V. HENDERSON, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the April term, 1923, of the offense of cheating by false pretenses, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed seven years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said G. V. Henderson was permitted to go to the home of his parents at Asbury Park, New Jersey. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of April, 1925.

HOWARD BAKER, Ringgold County. Convicted at the October term, 1924, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, and thereunder the said Howard Baker was permitted to go to the home of his parents at Grant City, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of April, 1925.

ALBERT LEVINE, Linn County. Convicted at the December term, 1921, of the offense of robbery with aggravation, and sentenced to an

indeterminate term not to exceed twenty years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Albert Levine was permitted to go to the home of his parents at Chicago, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 22nd day of April, 1925.

THOMAS E. HOWARD, Page County. Convicted at the November term, 1919, of the offense of murder, second degree, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed fifteen years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, Hon. Earl Peters, and the statements of two attending physicians that the physical condition of the defendant demanded his removal to a higher altitude, and thereunder the said Thomas E. Howard was permitted to go to the state of Colorado. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of May, 1925.

JOSEPH HAWKINS, Black Hawk County. Convicted at the July term, 1921, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed fifteen years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Joseph Hawkins was permitted to go to his former home at St. Louis, Missouri, to enable his mother to care for him in an attempt to restore him to health. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of May, 1925.

FLOYD W. STAFFORD, Scott County. Convicted at the June term, 1924, of the offense of lewd and lascivious acts, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed three years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Floyd W. Stafford was permitted to go to his relatives in Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1925.

ROY SCOTT, Crawford County. Convicted at the May term, 1922, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Roy Scott was permitted to go to the home of his father at Sidney, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1925.

WALTER H. COUNTRYMAN, Jones County. Convicted at the September term, 1918, of the offense of incest, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed twenty-five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Walter H. Countryman was permitted to go to Missouri for the purpose of taking employment with T. P. Hollowell, warden of the state penitentiary. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1925.

WALTER A. JOHNSON, Black Hawk County. Convicted at the May term, 1925, of the offense of larceny by embezzlement and uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to the penitentiary for five and fifteen years and who was paroled before commitment to the Board of Parole.

This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole and the trial judge, and thereunder the said Walter A. Johnson was permitted to go to West Concord, Minnesota, where he has employment. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1925.

W. R. GAMBLE, Benton County. Convicted at the April term, 1924, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said W. R. Gamble was permitted to go with his mother to Michigan. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of June, 1925.

FRANK SULLIVAN, Story County. Convicted at the February term, 1924, of the offense of illegal possession of burglar tools, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed fifteen years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the letter of Dr. C. E. Thompson and letter of the trial judge, and thereunder the said Frank Sullivan was permitted to go to Illinois with his brother, who has guaranteed to care for him. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of June, 1925.

GEORGE OSMAND, Floyd County. Convicted at the March term, 1923, of the offense of breaking and entering a car, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said George Osmand was permitted to go to his home at Kent, Minnesota, where he can obtain employment. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of June, 1925.

WILLIAM BROOKS, Sioux County. Convicted at the November term, 1923, of the offense of cheating by false pretenses, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed seven years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said William Brooks was permitted to go to New Smyrna, Florida, where he has employment offered him. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of July, 1925.

EARL FEE, Delaware County. Convicted at the March term, 1924, of the offense of driving an auto without the consent of the owner, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed one year, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, and a great number of other citizens, and thereunder the said Earl Fee was permitted to go to an aunt at Wadena, Minnesota, to work on her farm. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of August, 1925.

EARL FEE, Delaware County. Convicted at the April term, 1924, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge, the county attorney and a great number of citizens, and thereunder the said Earl Fee was permitted to go to an aunt at Wadena, Minnesota, to work on her farm. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of August, 1925.

G. H. PRIEBE, Woodbury County. Convicted at the September term, 1923, of the offense of false pretenses, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed seven years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said G. H. Priebe was permitted to go to his brother at Rochester, Minnesota, where he could secure employment at once. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of September, 1925.

HATTIE HARRIS, Dubuque County. Convicted at the March term, 1924, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Hattie Harris was permitted to go to her husband at Benton, Wisconsin. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of September, 1925.

KAREL HORAN, Kossuth County. Convicted at the September term, 1921, of the offense of grand larceny, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, the county attorney and a number of representative citizens. Suspension was issued on the 23rd day of September, 1925.

NORMAN E. MILLER, Scott County. Convicted at the November term, 1921, of the offense of robbery, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, and thereunder the said Norman E. Miller was permitted to enter Albion College, Albion, Michigan. Suspension was issued on the 28th day of September, 1925.

FRANK HENLEY (Floyd Hoover), Linn County. Convicted at the January term, 1925, of the offense of carrying concealed weapons, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed two years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, and thereunder the said Frank Henley (Floyd Hoover) was permitted to go to the home of his parents at Savannah, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 31st day of October, 1925.

ROBERT WOLLERT, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the January term, 1924, of the offense of seduction, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Robert Wollert was permitted to go to Casper, Wyoming, where he had employment offered him with the C. B. & Q. Railroad. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of November, 1925.

OLIO AMUNDSEN, Pocahontas County. Convicted at the vacation term, 1924, of the offense of larceny of a motor vehicle, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Olio Amundsen was to be delivered to the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the

purpose of deportation to Norway. Suspension was issued on the 11th day of December, 1925.

JESSE F. SHACKELFORD, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1923, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Jesse F. Shackelford was permitted to go to the home of his father at Wichita, Kansas. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of December, 1925.

WILLIAM BOLIN, Scott County. Convicted at the December term, 1923, of the offense of larceny of a motor vehicle, and sentenced to an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. Convicted at the February term, 1925, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail in default of the payment of a fine of \$1,000, for the offense of liquor nuisance. \$400 of the fine having been paid, this suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge and the county attorney. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of April, 1925.
