PART II

REPORT OF PROGRESS

The progress of the Iowa National Guard since my last report has been more than satisfactory. This, I believe, is due largely to the increasingly high personnel, both commissioned and enlisted, who constitute the Guard of this state. Our officers realize the importance of developing an *esprit de corps* in their particular unit; of continually building up the morale and that the psychology of leadership is "Character, common sense and good judgment, understanding of men, executive ability, knowledge, and presence." The enlisted men of the Iowa Guard are members because of a desire to prepare themselves for the defense of the nation; they are recruited from the best young men the state produces, they, and their officers, give of their time, their energy, sacrifice their vacation periods to attend annual camps, and have the determination to "carry on," at personal expense and sacrifice. It is, therefore, not at all surprising that the Iowa Guard shows improvement each year.

However, I desire to emphasize the following analysis of the situation, in reference to continued progress:

Our present National Defense Law establishes an *economical* and democratic military policy thoroughly consistent with our national traditions. It provides for a small Regular Army, to be augmented by a great citizen force in the event of a national emergency. This is our traditional policy. But, in the past, these larger war forces have been demobilized, and returned to their civil pursuits, with no thought to a possible future emergency. The National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, as amended, wisely provides that the frame work of the larger, war organization, shall be established and developed in time of peace, in so far as this is practicable through the voluntary service of our patriotic young men. The Army of the United States, as defined in the new law, comprises:

- The Regular Army
- The National Guard
- The Organized Reserves.

It will therefore be seen that the Army of the United States is divided into three components, of which the National Guard is the second; however, in time of major emergency, it in reality becomes the first line of defense, or the first component to answer the call for active duty, due to the great demand which would be made on our small regular army, in matters pertaining to administration, supply, and training. There can be no other analysis.

It therefore becomes the duty of every patriotic citizen to encourage the development of the three components referred to, each within its proper sphere. The National Guard, particularly, needs encouragement by the State. Their progress and success absolutely depends upon an adequate appropriation being made by the legislature for their support. When consideration is given to the true value of the National Guard to the State, this is very little to ask in return for the great, unselfish sacrifices made by the individuals composing this volunteer force for the preservation of law and order, and further, when proper appreciation is given to the fact

that the Federal Government expends approximately three (\$3) dollars to one (\$1) dollar expended by the State for the support of the Guard, in that the Federal Government assumes the expense of paying, arming, equipping and training the National Guard, leaving to the States their right, under the Militia Clauses of the Constitution, to select their own officers and to determine and fix the location of the units and headquarters within their respective borders. Upon the State devolves only the expense of officering, recruiting, providing and maintaining suitable armories, storage and stabling facilities for equipment and animals furnished by the Federal Government, and for general administration, overhead upkeep expenses of the respective headquarters and organizations.

Generally speaking, our fellow citizens fail to adequately appreciate the importance of the National Guard, not only to the Government but to the State, and accord it adequate support. I therefore trust that you will urge upon the Director of the Budget to approve the estimates of this department for the next biennium period, and give your official and personal approval to the askings contained therein.

CHANGES IN COMMISSIONED PERSONNEL

The following table of changes in Commissioned Personnel, covering the fiscal years 1923-24-25 and 26, is indicative of the progress and stability of the Guard of this state, in that it shows the officers of today have the Guard spirit, they have accepted the responsibility of Guard Service as one of the obligations they owe to their country, their state and to themselves, and in consequence they stay in the Guard, thus insuring a corps of officers who increase in efficiency and value each year.

The same improvement is shown among the enlisted personnel, in that our turnover of enlisted men, is now approximately 39% of which 73% are new enlistments and 27% re-enlistments.

INSURANCE

Some provision should be made by the State for an Insurance Policy for each officer and enlisted man, which will protect him and his dependents against any expense or financial loss incurred through injury or sickness contracted while on military duty.

National Guardsmen voluntarily give their services to the State and the Federal Government, and receive very little compensation from either source; it is but just that this protection should be provided.

The State of Maryland has passed a law, under which the Adjutant General's Office of that State has been able to arrange with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, for group insurances, under which each member of the Guard may secure Group Life Insurance including Total and Permanent Disability Benefits at a very low cost to himself. Regardless of age or physical condition, all active members of the Guard are eligible for this protection, *Without a Medical Examination*, but at least 75% of the entire strength must have accepted it, in order to make the insurance effective.

Under this plan, members of the Guard will be eligible for the following amounts of Life Insurance:

- (a) Commissioned Officers\$5,000.00
- (b) Noncommissioned Officers..... 3,000.00
- (c) Privates 2,000.00

The attractive feature of this program is the *very low* cost of this insurance protection. The cost will not exceed \$2.00 per \$1,000.00 of insurance for each calendar quarter. Thus, a private, for illustration, will receive \$2,000.00 of life insurance for only \$4.00 per quarter, or \$16.00 per year, which can be deducted from his quarterly drill check.

BENEFITS

Not only is the life of each Guard member insured, but in addition it is a protection to any insured member of the Guard who may become totally and permanently disabled due to sickness or accident from any cause anywhere contracted while this insurance is in force and prior to reaching the age of 60; payments to be made as follows:

Such payments will be made during the continuance of the disability. If death occurs during disability, any installments remaining unpaid will be paid in a lump sum to the beneficiary.

The low cost, the protection assured, and the benefits to be derived should certainly appeal to every member of the Guard.

The 186th Ambulance Company was originally organized and stationed at Iowa City, Iowa, but on receipt of authority for the organization of a Hospital Company, it was decided to redesignate the 186th Ambulance Company at Iowa City as 186th Hospital Company, and reorganize the 186th Ambulance Company at Ida Grove.

34TH DIVISION HEADQUARTERS AND STAFF

During the year 1921 this office received advice that the 34th Infantry Division would be organized in the states of Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, and that Iowa, with the consent and agreement of the other states concerned, would be allocated the Division Headquarters, and Command. This office immediately took the necessary steps which would insure absolute agreement on the question of the ultimate Commanding General, and adequate division of the various staff positions, when the Division was sufficiently organized to qualify it for its headquarters. I am happy to say all states concerned were unanimous in their support of the selection of our outstanding citizen and soldier, Mathew A. Tinley, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, then Brigadier General, Commanding the 67th Infantry Brigade, Iowa National Guard.

Early in 1924, War Department authorization was received, to complete the organization of the Headquarters and Staff, 34th Division. This office immediately placed the nomination of Brigadier General Mathew A. Tinley, before Acting Governor of Iowa, the Honorable John Hammill, who approved same at once; the nomination was then placed before the Governors of Minnesota, North and South Dakota, and received their approval, and was forwarded to the War Department for final action. On July 14, 1924, General Tinley was commissioned and Federally Recognized, as Major General and placed in command of the 34th Division, National Guard, and the following staff positions allocated to the states as listed here below:

As men become available, each regimental adjutant will prepare, Regimental Headquarters Building, officers bath houses and enlisted men's bath houses, for the reception of the troops.

5. During the four (4) day advance period, each supply officer will draw the advance rations and supplies for his regiment in bulk, store them in his regimental storehouse, and make issue to the units of his regiment on their arrival.

6. Previous to arrival of troops on opening day of Camp, the regimental adjutant will detail an officer, as billeting officer, who will meet all trains and direct all units of his regiment to their quarters.

7. During the four day advance period motor trucks will be furnished in the number needed, for the various activities, by the Camp Q. M. Each regimental Service Company, will be required to furnish drivers for same, and all trucks will be returned to the Q. M. pool each night.

8. The following officers and enlisted men will be attached to the organization indicated for rations, during the advance period.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men—Hq. Co. 67th Inf. Brig.—to Service Co. 133rd Infantry.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men—Q. M. Det.—S. S. C. & D.—to Service Troop 113th Cavalry.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men—186th Ambulance Co.—to Service Co. 168th Infantry.

The Camp Hospital Head Nurse—to Service Company 168th Infantry.

9. On and after the *Opening Day of Camp*, the Camp Q. M. will make issue direct, to all units not belonging to regimental organizations, all rations and supplies.

10. It must be thoroughly understood by all regimental supply officers, company commanders and mess officers and mess sergeants, that no purchases of supplies by them will be paid for by this department, unless they are purchased on written order, signed by the Camp Q. M. All merchants in Des Moines and vicinity have been notified of this ruling.

11. The following allowance of animals will be furnished during the camp period.

12. Each Regiment will be held responsible for the disposal of its garbage, including the Regimental Canteen.

The garbage of the Brigade Hq. Co., will be disposed of under the direction of the regimental commander 133rd Infantry.

The garbage of the Ambulance Company, will be disposed of under the direction of the regimental commander 168th Infantry.

The garbage of the Brigade Hq. and the Hospital, will be disposed of under the direction of the regimental commander 113th Cavalry.

The Camp Q. M. will provide for the disposal of garbage of the Q. M. Det.

All garbage, tin cans, glass bottles, etc., will be deposited in the G. I. cans of each unit. These cans will be hauled, at such time and under

such regulations, as the Camp Sanitary Officer may publish, by regimental teams or trucks, to Dump Grounds to be designated by Camp Q. M.

Ashes, will be dumped by kitchen detail in low places around mess halls and kitchens, under the direction of company, troop, or detachment mess officer.

13. *Ice*, will be issued each day, early in the morning, at the ice house on rifle range, by the Camp Q. M. The road permitting, regimental trucks will haul ice from ice house and deliver to each unit of the regiment, roads not permitting use of trucks, the regimental wagon and team will be used.

14. A Q. M. corral, will be established, and a Q. M. motor truck pool will be operated.

All trucks and animals, will be returned to corral at noon and night. Animals will be fed, and both animals and wagons will be inspected. Each regiment will use the same animals and wagons, during the entire camp, and will be held accountable and responsible for their proper use and care.

Each Regiment will be issued the following motor transportation:

One (1) Liberty Truck.

One (1) F. W. D. Truck.

One (1) Light Truck.

One (1) Dodge Passenger Car.

No motorcycles will be furnished.

Each regiment will use the same trucks during the entire camp period, and it is suggested that the same drivers be detailed during the camp, if it is possible to do so. *It is emphasized*, that when a truck is in need of repairs, or adjustment, the driver be instructed not to attempt repairs or adjustment. He should communicate with the officer in charge of pool and a repair truck will be sent to put the truck in order.

Extreme care should be taken to avoid accidents, in starting the engine, and in driving. Drivers will be cautioned in this respect.

A surplus of trucks will be maintained at pool, to make replacements and furnish additional transportation when necessary. To obtain any additional transportation it will be necessary for the regimental commander to requisition same from the Camp Q. M. and indicate the reason therefore.

All trucks will be returned to the pool each evening, to be inspected, oiled, greased, and filled with gasoline. No objection exists, to each regiment keeping the trucks assigned them, in regimental area, but they must be turned in each evening for the purpose indicated above.

15. *Brig. General M. A. Tinley* will be designated as *Camp Commander*, and all troops ordered to duty at Camp Dodge will be under his immediate command.

16. *This department* will accomplish the preliminary arrangements incident to preparation of Camp site, buildings, etc., and will command the camp prior to arrival of the Camp Commander.

17. *Regimental and separate organization commanders* will issue the necessary orders to their respective organizations covering the details given above, and they will also issue such orders as they may deem necessary covering train orders, personal equipment to be taken to camp by

both officers and men, and such other orders as will insure the prompt, efficient and successful mobilization of their command.

18. *No organization will be excused from camp*, without special authority from the Secretary of War.

(a) An organization coming to camp under strength, will do so with the understanding that the officers cannot qualify for pay.

(b) *Transportation Requests* will be furnished the company, troop and detachment commanders by this department. They will be exchanged by him for railroad tickets. Additional instructions relative to this subject will be attached to the request when forwarded to the various unit commanders.

(c) *Travel Subsistence* for enlisted men *will not* be allowed, but in lieu thereof, a full days ration will be issued on arrival at camp. This will necessitate each man providing himself with a lunch for the period of travel. No allowance is authorized for expense incident to assembling men at Armory, or for their maintenance, other than from date of departure from home station to date of return thereto, both dates inclusive.

(d) The following records and office supplies will be brought to camp:

Two Steel filing cases.

Morning Reports.

One Typewriter.

All Training Manuals.

Field Desks—containing—

A list in duplicate of officers and men attending camp.

Pencils.

A list in duplicate of officers and men absent from camp, with statement as to cause of such absence.

Typewriter paper.

Carbon paper.

Service Records of enlisted men.

Enlistment Papers of enlisted men.

(e) The company, troop, battery or detachment field desk, typewriter and filing cases, will be carried in passenger coach.

(f) The morning report will show the number and grade of officers and men, on the left side of the report, and will give the name of each officer and man under "*Remarks*," on the right side of report. On last page of report under "*Record of Events*," will be shown the date and hour of departure from home station and arrival in camp.

(g) Each organization is entitled to transport 150 lbs. of baggage for each man, and will consist of, wearing apparel, bed rolls, packs, and personal effects. All other equipment, such as machine guns and accessories, saddles, ammunition, kitchen utensils, and any other equipment not checkable, will be listed in triplicate showing *each article, its weight, and description*. One list will be given the R. R. Agent, at home station; one list will be given Camp Q. M. on arrival at Camp; and one list will be retained for organization files.

(h) *Each organization*, will bring the entire equipment for their *field ranges*; it will not be necessary to bring the field range, as each kitchen will be provided with a permanent cooking range, also the following:

G. I. Cans (Garbage).

Brooms, rakes, mops, scythes, etc.

Enough overcoats to equip their guard detail.

Dish towels, and all other kitchen supplies to properly care for their kitchens.

(1) Details in connection with the mobilization, transportation, training schedules, etc., not covered in this letter, will be communicated in subsequent letters.

On the first day of camp organization or detachment commander will certify to the Range Executive Officer (Major Fred S. Hird) the names of two enlisted men of their organization, who by performance at home station, has demonstrated they are the best rifle shots in the organization to which they belong. This will provide a representation from each organization of the guard armed with the rifle, who will enter the final competition at camp. In order that these representatives will fire under like conditions it will be necessary to organize a range personnel of sufficient size to operate 47 Targets on the morning of the competition, which will be August 16th (Governor's Day). Assuming four classes of fire, two hours will elapse from firing the first shot until firing of the last.

The following will be the course for the competition:

200 yds.—slow fire, 10 shots for record (Standing).....Target A
 200 yds.—rapid fire, 10 shots for record (Sitting or Kneeling from Stand-
 ing)Target D
 300 yds.—slow fire—10 shots for record (5 Standing—5 Kneeling)..
Target A
 300 yds.—slow fire—10 shots for record (Prone)Target A

The foregoing covers all positions and all classes of fire.

Rules governing the competition will be prepared and published during the camp period.

2. *Company and Detachment Commanders are directed to make careful selection of the men entering this competition, as the Governor desires that the man winning the prize, is the best individual rifle shot from among all enlisted men of the Guard of this State.*

Subject: Duty of Instructors and Sergeant Instructors at National Guard Encampments.

References: Sec. 96 National Defense Act. (Par. 65 N. G. Regulations).
National Guard Regulations Pars. 368; 412; 414; 417; 459; 460; 462; 464; 1018; 1021.

Training Memo No. 2, 7th Corps Area, 1924.

1. With a view to securing uniformity in the conduct of instruction and training of National Guard organizations and the correct use of instructors and sergeant instructors, this Memorandum has been prepared.

2. It is desired to place upon the proper National Guard Commander as much responsibility as practicable. Programs are to be prepared and submitted to Corps Area Headquarters through Adjutants General for approval. These approved programs will then be carried out as completely as possible. In the preparation and execution of these programs the services of instructors should be fully utilized.

3. Instructors are being ordered to camp to report to the Commanding Officer of the camp and are subject to his control in all matters not in conflict with the regulations governing instructors.

Sergeant instructors are similarly ordered to an encampment for duty as assistant instructors, mainly for duty as assistants to the instructors.

4. It has been found from experience that officer instructors may generally be used to best advantage by designating one of them as senior instructor and assigning the remainder as circumstances require.

This senior instructor should be the officer, regardless of rank and grade, who is best qualified to perform the duty. Other things being equal, the officer on duty in the State, whose troops are in camp, should be selected. This senior instructor becomes executive officer of the commanding officer in matters pertaining to instruction and training. As such, in the name of the commanding officer, he assigns instructors and sergeant instructors to specific organizations or duties.

The senior instructor should observe the progress of instruction, report to the Commanding Officer departures from the approved program, and make recommendations as to methods of instruction, etc., when he is not authorized, in the name of the commander to take action.

When two or more separate organizations are in camp at the same time it usually will be advisable to have one senior instructor, for the camp as a whole, to co-ordinate all the instruction and to have one or more instructors assigned to each separate organization. In the latter case each organization should be handled on the same principles as a camp of a single organization.

For convenience instructors should be quartered in close proximity to each other in such groups as will facilitate conferences and interchange of information and the transmission of orders.

5. Sergeant instructors will not be quartered with the organizations with which they are normally on duty during the armory training period. They should be provided with suitable and adequate tent space near the instructors under whom they have been assigned for the encampment and they should be attached to a conveniently located organization for messing.

(b) In this connection, the following extracts from letter Hq. 7th Corps Area, dated June 27, 1924, are repeated:

5. This department will accomplish the preliminary arrangements incident to preparation of camp site, buildings, etc., for reception of troops, and will also direct the activities of the advance detachments.

6. Regimental and separate organization commanders, will be expected to issue the necessary orders to cover, train orders, and personal equipment to be taken from home station to camp, by both officers and enlisted men.

7. *No Organization will be excused from Camp* without special authority from the *Secretary of War*.

8. It is suggested that your headquarters be prepared to issue, the first day of Camp, the necessary Camp Orders, covering the following special points.

(a) Provost and Interior guard and Camp Hq. Guard.

(b) Camp Sanitation—(This to cover latrines and bath houses, both officers and enlisted men, and provide orderlies therefore. Swimming pool and pavilion. Arrangements are being made to retain the civilian life guards now on duty with the Play Ground Association, and also check room force, the policing will be done by the troops.)

(c) Requests for Electrical, Plumbing and other utility repairs will be made through Camp Headquarters only. The Adjutant General's Department will provide an electrician and a plumber who will be available for the supervision of all repairs in their respective lines. Regimental Commanders will furnish the necessary help to accomplish repairs when called upon to do so.

(d) The Governor and Commander in Chief has indicated his desire to give a prize (to be announced later) to the best individual shot among the enlisted men of the Iowa Guard. The Camp Commander will arrange the program for *Governor's Day August 16th*, to permit the following, beginning promptly at 8:30 A. M.

Each organization or detachment commander will certify to the Range Executive Officer, the names of two enlisted men, who by performance have demonstrated they are the best shots in the organization to which they belong. This will provide a representation who will enter the final competition at Camp.

In order that these representatives will fire under like conditions it will be necessary to organize a range personnel of sufficient size to operate 47 Targets the morning of the competition. Assuming 4 classes of fire, two hours will elapse from firing the first shot until firing of the last, by firing two men per organization.

The following course is recommended:

- 200 yds.—slow fire—10 shots for record (Standing) Target A.
 - 200 yds.—rapid fire—10 shots for record (Sitting or Kneeling from Standing) Target D.
 - 300 yds.—slow fire—10 shots for record (5 Sitting—5 Kneeling) Target A.
 - 300 yds.—slow fire—10 shots for record (Prone) Target A.
- The foregoing covers all positions and all classes of fire. Rules govern.

ing the competition will be prepared and submitted during the camp period.

Officers for range, coaches, and Pit, and enlisted men to man the firing points and Pits, will be provided for the competition.

9. Constructive criticisms and suggestions are invited toward making the preliminary arrangements as complete as is possible. It is realized that the successful final mobilization at Camp depends on the completion of the advance preparations, and every effort is being made to anticipate every detail.

Subject: Annual Encampment—*Correcting Encampment Letters No. 2A, 2B, 3A, 5 and 7.*

To: Camp Commander, Regimental Commanders, and all organization Commanders.

1. The above referred to *Encampment Letters* are hereby corrected, in so far as the dates of Camp are concerned.

They should read *August 4 to 18 inclusive*, except in certain cases to be announced later, and for the following reasons.

(Organizations not having letters referred to as 2A, 2B and 3A will correct only Nos. 5 and 7).

Letter from Militia Bureau, dated July 9, to this department through Hq. 7th Corps Area, and received in Des Moines July 16th, sets the dates for Camp as August 4 to 18th inclusive, except as provided in M. B. Cir. Letter, dated Feb. 20, 1924; viz.:

(a) "Where troops can leave their home stations any time after 12:00 A. M. (Midnight) and arrive at their camp prior to noon on the opening day of the encampment, they will be authorized a camp period of not to exceed 15 days.

(b) Where troops cannot leave within the above stated period and it is necessary for them to leave prior to midnight in order to arrive in camp prior to noon of the opening day of the encampment, they will be authorized one additional day each way for travel from home station to camp and return, but in all not to exceed 17 days for their camp period including travel."

2. Our estimates for camp have been cut by the Militia Bureau, accordingly. Our train schedules will have to be refigured to determine what units will be authorized the 17 days, and what units can be brought to camp within the limit set.

This department had every reason to expect that the 17 days would be allowed, but in view of the decision above quoted, and the delay in it reaching us, we are now obliged to revise much of our preliminary work and instructions.

Encampment Letter No. 11A.

Subject: Care and Maintenance of Buildings.

To: All Regimental and Separate organization Commanders.

1. On the opening day of Camp, there will be completed for each unit of the Guard ordered to Camp Dodge, a permanent kitchen and mess hall. These buildings are constructed of tile laid on concrete foundations, with concrete floors in kitchens and supply rooms, and wood floors in mess halls and office rooms.

2. This department is responsible for the proper use of the buildings by the troops, and is under the law, in sole charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes.

3. To properly preserve the buildings constructed at Camp Dodge, and reduce to a minimum, the cost of repairs, upkeep and maintenance the following will govern:

(a) By reason of the material used in the building walls, no nails, screws, or hooks will be driven in any such walls. Responsible Commanding Officers will issue the necessary orders to their commands covering the above.

(b) No objection exists to each unit having a sign on their building, which will show the Company, and Regiment to which they belong, and the city in which they are stationed. These signs can be hung from the roof edge over the door, or can be placed on the roof ridge. It was contemplated having one size of sign for all units, so that the buildings would present a uniform appearance, but for reasons unnecessary to state, it is impossible to accomplish the original plan, consequently each regimental commander, the commanding officer of the Hq. Co. 6th Infantry Brig., the 186th Ambulance Co., and the Q. M. Detachment S. S. C. & D. will follow their own inclination in the matter of size, design and lettering of signs.

(c) The funds available for the construction, did not permit the contracting for painting the woodwork, doors, and partitions in Reg. Hq. Bldgs., or mess halls and kitchens. This should be done to prevent warping and splitting of woodwork, and it is suggested that each unit bring enough paint of a uniform color, to properly protect their own building.

(d) Desks, tables and benches other than are now provided for mess hall and kitchens, will have to be constructed from funds other than state or federal.

(e) Any and all improvements, additions, or comforts that individual units or organizations desire to provide, will be authorized, if presented to this department, through proper channels, and provided such improvements do not in any way injure the buildings.

Subject: Bases for Machine Guns.

1. So as to insure a maximum of efficiency in firing machine guns on the range, it is desired that the following suggestion be followed by all machine gun units of the two regiments above indicated.

"All machine gun companies will construct "T" bases for their guns, at home stations, and bring them to camp this year. Each base should be made of 2 x 4 with trail leg mortised into cross leg. Each base should be made for a certain tripod and marked so that the dial on the tripod will be about 12 inches from the ground when the trail and leg are against the blocks."

2. The officer in charge of machine gun training during the camp period, will give the necessary instructions covering the use of "T" bases.

3. Regimental Commanders will issue orders necessary to accomplish the purpose indicated.

R. 1922, to transfer to hospitals in the city of Des Moines such patients who in your judgment cannot be given the proper care in Camp and you will arrange with such hospital authorities, at lowest cost consistent with proper care for the necessary hospital and medical attendance during camp period and for such time after as is found necessary.

Subject: "Defense Test Day" September 12, 1924.

To: All Officers, Iowa National Guard.

1. The Secretary of War has designated the sixth anniversary of the Battle of St. Mihiel, September 12, 1924, as the date for a "Defense Test" which will demonstrate the effectiveness of the Mobilization plans that have been worked out under the direction of the War Department.

This is going to afford an opportunity for assemblies and ceremonies involving renewed public manifestations of loyalty and practical patriotism. The Governor of Iowa will in due time, issue a mobilization order that will mobilize all National Guard troops under his jurisdiction and will call on all citizens of the state to assemble and by some patriotic exercises, renew their allegiance to their country and to their flag.

I inclose a Bulletin that will explain in detail, the reason for the "Defense Test" and for the assembly of citizens in every city, town and community.

All unit commanders of the Guard of this State, will take the necessary actions to insure that they have an *Armory Drill* ordered for September 12, 1924. The drill so ordered may be counted for the purpose of *armory drill pay*, provided the number of officers and men in attendance is in accordance with the law and regulations.

Each officer will carefully read over prior to September 12, 1924, Army Regulations 120-10 and 130-10, and certify to the Adjutant General prior to the date above given that this requirement has been complied with.

Each National Guard Organization take appropriate action toward arousing local and wide spread interest in the day.

The Governor has appointed a State Committee, and local committees are being formed. These committees will arrange all details connected with the celebration within their own community.

As soon as you know who your local committee is, it is desired that you offer your services to them as advisory and assist them in arranging for parades, etc.

You will endeavor to enroll for the day, men of military age, and have them assemble with your organization. If possible to do so, these men should wear a badge or arm band indicating they are a part of your unit.

(c) The guard will be by company, except as special work on terrain exercises or range work necessitates temporary change from this plan. When in the regimental commander's judgment the interior guard can be cared for by the details left in Camp, he may use the guard company as he may desire.

(d) However, the importance of training in guard work must not be underestimated. It must not become a perfunctory matter. The same attention must be paid this type of instruction as any important branch. The regimental, battalion and company commanders will give daily attention to the manner in which their respective organizations are performing this duty, and show a decided improvement over the past years, in this portion of the annual field training.

(e) A roster will be maintained at Camp Headquarters of all Field Officers, and each day there will be on duty, a Field Officer of the day. The Field Officer of the Day will have under his supervision all Patrols, Provost and Interior Guards. He will take cognizance of the general guard of the camp and of any irregularities reported in or about the camp.

(f) Field Officers of the day will be appointed by the regimental commanders from each regiment for the following periods.

168th Infantry—August 5 to 8 inclusive.
133rd Infantry—August 9 to 12 inclusive.

113th Cavalry—August 13 to 17 inclusive.
Commanding Officers of the regiments will furnish these headquarters with a list of the field officers of the day and their period of duty.

V. PATROLS AND PROVOST GUARDS—Commanding Officers of the 133rd Infantry, 168th Infantry and 113th Cavalry, will furnish guard for the following:

133rd Infantry: Post at each entrance to camp from the north, and guard at Interurban station.

168th Infantry: Post at entrance to driveway to pool. Post at entrance to Commanding General's quarters. Post at gate on entrance road, just east of Des Moines Ave.

113th Cavalry: Mounted guard patrolling main highway east of camp south to Hyperion Club north line, and north to end of brick pavement.

The Commanding Officer of the regiment furnishing the Field Officer of the day, will detail four orderlies of the guard for duty at these headquarters.

VI. CAMP SANITATION—Will be under the supervision of, and in accordance with the regulations issued by the Camp Surgeon.

Camp Surgeon's orders on Sanitation will be immediately prepared and published to the command in a Camp Bulletin.

Each organization will publish to their commands Sanitary Orders in compliance with Camp Surgeon's Order, and will govern and control any situation peculiar to their immediate command.

Each organization commander will be held responsible for the regulations covering, slopping of water about the various taps, care of latrines, appointing proper details to clean same, and the detail of orderlies on duty to enforce regulations issued to avoid waste of water in shower section, and insure proper use of latrine section. Each unit will prepare grease traps for the removal of grease and solid material before liquid slops are poured into kitchen sinks.

Special Orders for government of the swimming pool will be issued by the Camp Surgeon, copies of which will be pasted on each company bulletin board and on bulletin board at pool.

Airing and sunning of tents, contents and the ground under the tents will receive the constant attention of organization commanders. Elimination of soiled or fouled clothing, foodstuff, or other articles that would be objectionable, is required.

VII. CEREMONY AT RETREAT: To avoid the experiences of the past in connection with the playing of the National Anthem at Retreat, the following will prevail:

The "Star Spangled Banner" will be played by the Band at the Camp Flag Pole only, and immediately after retreat has been sounded by trumpeters of Regiment, Battalion or Squadron on parade. The final close will be the evening gun.

Subject: Iowa National Guard Encampment, 1924.

The Iowa National Guard, less the artillery units, went into its annual summer encampment at Camp Dodge, August 4th, 1924, under the command of the undersigned. The encampment lasted until Monday, August 18, 1924.

The encampment, in many respects, was the most successful of any held during the last four years. The troops were preceded into camp by detachments from each regiment, which arrived three days ahead of the main body of troops, preparing the camp for the regiments, drawing the necessary supplies and otherwise making all arrangements possible so that the least time would be needed before starting the men into their training. The plan proved, eminently successful. The incoming troops moved into their quarters with surprising ease, found warm meals awaiting them, and were relieved of the usual worry and discomfort incidental to making camp.

Perhaps the greatest factor towards making camp this year such a successful one was the new construction which has been completed since last year. Each unit, with its mess halls, found a comfortable place for meals, a shelter from the elements during storms, satisfactory store-rooms, office spaces, and, above all, sanitary kitchens and dining rooms. These buildings did much towards building up the morale of the troops, and keeping them in a satisfied condition. The new regimental headquarters buildings, which were ready for partial use a year ago, were completed and functioning well and the permanent latrines satisfactory.

The men and officers were quartered in tents, arranged according to the general plan of the camp.

The outstanding event of the camp, outside of the training the men received, was the review of the troops, Saturday, August 16, in honor His Excellency, the Governor of Iowa, Honorable N. E. Kendall, accompanied by the General of the Armies, John J. Pershing. This event, wit-

nessed by thousands of visitors to the state's encampment site, took place on the drill field west of the camp. Among the visitors were Maj. Gen. George B. Duncan, commanding the Seventh Corps Area, Brig. Gen. Halstead Dorey, commanding Fort Des Moines, Col. Harry A. Eaton, chief of staff of the Seventh Corps Area and the members of the Governor's staff.

Although there was considerable inclement weather during the period of the encampment the training progressed well, and the work on the rifle range was reported by Major Fred S. Hird, range executive officer, as showing the steady improvement that has been noted for the last few years. On Governor's Day the competitive shooting took place with the following results:

1. Examinations of the water supply of Camp Dodge during the period of the encampment, August 4-18, 1924, have been made as follows:

These examinations show that the water as it is leaving the pumping station is of good quality in spite of probable defective chlorination during at least a part of the time on account of the condition of the apparatus. An examination of the roof of the reservoir showed it to be in apparent good condition, and locked securely. Evidences of contamination in the water of the camp hospital as shown by the presence of gas forming bacteria would suggest contamination of the reservoir which might have occurred before or during the repair of the roof. It is apparently not a heavy contamination.

2. Examination of ice taken from the inside of a cake supplied to the camp hospital showed:

When it is considered that the samples of the pool water were usually taken after or during use, and that most of the samples were taken at the deep end of the pool while the fresh water comes in at the shallow end, it will be seen that the pool water has been unusually good.

4. In regard to the camp water supply it is recommended that provisions for the men at the machine gun range be made so that they may

have water easily available and nearer than the main pumping station; that the reservoir on 1000-foot hill be thoroughly cleaned as soon as opportunity offers, and in any event before the next camp period; that the chlorinators be placed in perfect condition before the opening of the next camp period, and that such spare parts for the two chlorinators as are likely to be needed shall be obtained so that there need be no delay in the event that the water of the wells should be found to be intermittently or continuously contaminated.

5. In regard to the ice supply, it is recommended that the ice be put up as early as possible in the season in order to avoid putting up ice that has been flooded, or otherwise objectionable on account of the dirt it carries.

6. In regard to the sanitation of the pool, it is recommended that the present method of control and treatment be continued as it has shown itself to be adequate and satisfactory.

Subject: Encampments Iowa National Guard—1925.

To: All Officers—Iowa National Guard.

1. The provisions of "Encampment Letter No. 1—1924" will govern mobilization for annual camps during the current year 1925.

2. Extracts from letter M. B. 354. 1 Gen.—33 dated Feb. 2, 1925, are repeated for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"Training Camp Period, 15-17 Days.

1. The following information regarding the 1925 Field Training camps of the National Guard is published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

a Where troops can leave their home stations any time after 12:00 M. (midnight) and arrive at their camp prior to noon on the opening day of the encampment, they will be authorized a camp period of not to exceed 15 days.

b When troops cannot leave within the above stated period and it is necessary for them to leave prior to midnight in order to arrive in camp prior to noon of the opening day of the encampment, they will be authorized one additional day each way for travel from home station to camp and return, but in all not to exceed 17 days for their camp period including travel.

c All troops whether starting before or after midnight should leave their home stations, where transportation facilities permit, at such an hour as will place them in camp early in the day. The return movement should be started at such an hour as will place all troops at their home stations within the 15 or 17 day period for which payment is authorized.

Advance and Rear Detachments.

2. When there is urgent need of sending an advance detail to prepare camp or for leaving one behind to close it, not to exceed the following will be authorized:

a For regimental or similar organizations, either one of the following:

(1) Service Company, less the band, or

(2) At the rate of one officer for each battalion and three enlisted men for each company. They may be taken from any or all companies.

b One officer and three enlisted men for each separate company, or similar unit.

c For camps for brigade or larger groups, in addition to the allowance above authorized, not to exceed two staff officers and six enlisted men for each brigade is authorized.

d The above details may be used for not to exceed two days in advance of and two days after close of camp. These days are additional and not a part of the 15-17 day periods.

Estimate of Strengths Attending Camps.

3. No State has all units filled in peace strength and it is therefore certain that no State will send all units to camp with such strengths. To submit an estimate based on peace strength attendance is to deprive some States of the use of funds badly needed for training activities, as the overestimate and unused funds, particularly during the latter part of the fiscal year, are not known until too late to transfer same, and the funds are lost for National Guard training purposes. Approximately 94% of the officers and 81% of the enlisted men attended camps during 1924.

4. Attendance estimates for units attending camps should be based upon the strength actually attending in 1924 plus 5% for a reasonable increase. An estimate of 5% increase over last year in the attendance of each unit should provide ample funds for its organization or State. It is not the desire of the Bureau to restrict attendance in any way and in the event that approval estimates do not provide sufficient funds, a supplemental estimate may be submitted.

a Estimates for newly organized units, which have never attended camps, should provide for the anticipated strength reasonably expected to attend camp."

Subject: Annual Encampment, Iowa National Guard, 1925, Preparation for and preliminary instructions.

To: The State Q. M. U. S. P. & D. Officer, Regimental Commanders, Adjutants and Supply Officers.

1. *Encampment Letter No. 1*, series 1925, designates time and places for Iowa National Guard Encampments, for the current year.

2. The U. S. P. & D. Officer has prepared estimates for Federal funds based on the requests indicated in *Encampment Letter No. 1*, for all camps.

3. The State Q. M. will prepare state payroll to cover the base pay for the following officers, covering the period at Camp Dodge, July 29th to Aug. 1st inclusive.

Brigade Supply Officer—67th Infantry Brigade.

Regimental Adjutant—168th Infantry.

Regimental Supply Officer—168th Infantry.

Regimental Adjutant—133rd Infantry.

Regimental Supply Officer—133rd Infantry.

Regimental Adjutant—113th Cavalry.

Regimental Supply Officer—113th Cavalry.

4. Subject to authority from Hq. 7th Corps Area, the following advance details will report July 29th, to the Adjutant General at Camp Dodge, Iowa.

Service Company, less band, 168th Infantry.

Service Company, less band, 133rd Infantry.

Service Company, less band, 113th Cavalry.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men Hq. 67th Inf. Brig.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men, Q. M. Det. S. S. C. & D.

1 Officer and 3 enlisted men, 186th Ambulance Co.

In the event proper authority is received, the following will govern:

(a) The Regimental Adjutants will be responsible for the advance details of their respective organizations, and for the careful and efficient preparation, of all mess halls, kitchens, and headquarters buildings, the distribution of canvas, poles and pins, and the laying out of the camp area allocated to their organizations.

(b) The officers of the advance details from Hq. Co. 67th Inf. Brigade, the Q. M. Det. S. S. C. & D., and the 186th Ambulance Co., will be held responsible for the same details as indicated in par. (a) above, except in the case of the 186th Ambulance Co., who will be responsible for the preparation of the Camp Hospital in addition.

(c) The Regimental Supply Officers will during the four day advance period, draw the rations and supplies for his regiment and be prepared to issue from his regimental store house, to the units of the regiment, immediately on their arrival. The Camp Q. M. will issue direct to all units not belonging to regimental organizations.

(d) In view of the various demands which will necessarily be made on the advance details, and for the purpose of harmonizing the work in connection with advance preparation, the Regimental Adjutants will each day of the four day advance period, furnish the following details from their respective regiments: Two (2) men—to report to Ambulance Company Officer—Preparation of Hospital and assist in preparing Ambulance Company kitchen and mess hall. Two (2) men—to report to Brig. Hq. Co. Officer—Prepare Brigade offices and Brig. Hq. Company kitchen and mess hall. Twelve (12) men—to Camp Q. M.—Issuing and distributing

tents, poles, pins, cots, etc. Four (4) men—to Major Fulton, O. D. to layout camp, line up streets, etc.

All men in excess of the above, will be detailed by the Adjutant of each regiment to prepare the mess halls and kitchens of their respective regiments, and assist Supply Officers.

5. During the fifteen (15) day period, Aug. 2nd to 16th inclusive, the following instructions are published and will be followed:

(a) No bills for supplies of any description, contracted for by officers or enlisted men, will be recognized or paid by this office, unless they are purchased on written order, signed by the Quartermaster.

The Q. M. is directed to notify all merchants, in and around Camp Dodge and Des Moines, of this ruling.

(b) The following will be the allowance of animals allocated for all Camp activities:

To each Regimental Supply Officer—Two (2) wagons, two mules or horses each.....	12 animals
To Brigade Hq. Co.—One (1) Wagon, two mules or horses for use of Camp Hq., Brig Hq. Co. and Ambulance Company.....	2 animals
To Camp Headquarters—6 riding horses.....	6 animals
To each Regimental Headquarters—5 riding horses.....	15 animals

Total 35 animals

(c) Each Regimental Supply Officer will be held responsible for the removal of all garbage, tin cans, glass and other refuse from his regiment, including regimental exchange.

(d) The Brig. Hq. Co. Commander will be held responsible for the removal of all garbage, tin cans, glass and other refuse, from Camp Hq., Camp Hospital, Ambulance Company, and Brigade Hq. Co.

(e) The Camp Q. M. will be held responsible for the removal of garbage, tin cans, glass and other refuse from Q. M. Det. and will provide for the final disposition of all garbage, tin cans, glass and other refuse.

(f) All garbage, tin cans, and glass will be deposited in the G. I. Cans. All other refuse will be piled at point where it can be picked up and hauled to dump ground. G. I. cans will be hauled and emptied, under such regulations as the Camp Surgeon may publish, to dump ground, designated by the Camp Q. M. Ashes will be dumped by kitchen detail in low places around kitchens and mess halls, under the direction of company, troop or detachment commanders.

(g) Condition of the road permitting, ice will be hauled from ice house by regimental trucks, otherwise by regimental teams. Ice will be issued under the direction of the Camp Q. M.

6. All trucks and passenger automobiles will be held in a transportation pool, under the control and direction of the Camp Q. M.

The supply officer of each regiment, and separate detachment, will requisition, each day, from the Camp Q. M. his quota of trucks for his regiment or detachment, and furnish drivers from his service company.

All trucks will be returned to the pool each night for inspection and supply of gas, oil and water. All horses and mules, and wagons will be returned to Q. M. Corral, each night. The truck quota for each regiment will be as follows:

1—Liberty Truck.

1—F. W. D. Truck.

1—Light Truck.

1—Dodge 5 Passenger touring car.

Each regiment will use the same trucks during the entire camp period, and it is suggested, that the same drivers be detailed each day. A surplus of trucks will be maintained at the pool, to make replacements and furnish additional transportation when necessary. The Camp Q. M. will furnish trucks for all other units, in the number necessary.

7. Camp Headquarters, will maintain a Camp Utilities Department. All plumbing and electrical utilities in need of repairs or attention, will be reported to Camp Headquarters at once. The Utilities Department will make all repairs, and may call for details from the regiment, in which the trouble occurs, to assist.

8. The Utilities Department will make a daily inspection, and any damage to buildings, plumbing, electrical equipment, etc., not due to natural causes, will be charged to the organization occupying such building, and the cost of replacement or repairs will be charged to such organization and deducted from their per capita allowance then due.

9. Greater care must be exercised in the supervision of latrines and bath houses, Regimental Commanders will be held strictly accountable for the proper care and protection of these comforts.

10. This office will accomplish the preliminary arrangements to prepare camp site, and will command prior to arrival of Camp Commander.

11. Regimental and Separate organization commanders will issue the necessary orders to their respective organizations, covering the details herein published, and they will also issue such orders as they may deem necessary covering train orders, personal equipment to be taken to Camp by both officers and men, and such other orders as will insure the prompt, efficient and successful mobilization of their command.

12. No organization will be excused from camp, without special authority from the Secretary of War.

(a) An organization coming to camp under strength, will do so with the understanding that its officers cannot qualify for pay.

(b) Transportation requests will be furnished the Company, troop, battery or detachment commander, by the U. S. P. & D. Officer. These requests will be exchanged by the Company Commander for railroad tickets. Additional instructions will be attached to the request by the U. S. P. & D. Officer, covering, amount of baggage authorized, amount and classification to be shipped as freight, preparation of bills of lading, etc.

(c) Travel subsistence for enlisted men *will not* be allowed, but in lieu thereof, a full days ration will be issued on arrival at Camp. This will necessitate each man providing himself with a lunch for the period of travel.

(d) No allowance is authorized for expense incident to assembling men at armory, or for their maintenance, other than from date of departure from home station and return thereto.

- (e) The following records and office supplies will be brought to Camp.
Two (2) Steel filing cases.
One (1) Typewriter.
Field desk containing—Pencils.

Typewriter paper.
Carbon paper.
Service Records of Enlisted men.
Enlistment papers.
Morning Reports.
All training manuals.
A list in Dup. of officers and men attending camp.
A list in Dup. of officers and men absent from camp, with statement as to cause for such absence.

- (f) The Company, troop, battery or detachment field desk, typewriter and filing cases will be carried in passenger coach.

(g) The morning report will show the number and grade of officers and men, on the *left* side of the report, and will give the name of each officer and man under "Remarks" on the right side of the report. On the last page of report under "Record of Events" will be shown the date and hour of departure from home station and arrival in Camp.

(h) Each organization is entitled to transport 150 lbs. of baggage for each man, and it will consist only of, wearing apparel, bed rolls, packs, and personal effects. All other equipment, such as machine guns, and accessories, saddles, ammunition, kitchen utensils and any other equipment is not checkable. It will be listed in triplicate showing *each article*, its weight and description. One list will be given R. R. Agent, at home station, one list will be given Camp Q. M. on arrival at Camp, and one list will be retained for organization files.

(i) Each organization will bring the entire equipment for their field range; it will not be necessary to bring the range, as each kitchen is equipped with camp cooking range. In addition each organization will bring the following:

G. I. Cans (Garbage). Brooms, rakes, mops, scythes, etc. Dish towels, and all other kitchen supplies to properly care for kitchens.

13. All provisions of this letter, not in conflict with previous orders and conditions at Camp Knox, will be observed by the Artillery Units, Iowa National Guard.

14. Details in connection with mobilization, transportation, training schedules, etc., not covered in this letter, will be communicated in subsequent letters.

1. All accidents or illness resulting in personal injuries of any material nature, will be cared for by the Medical Corps on duty at Camp. Should such injury or illness extend over the period of the Camp, a report will be promptly made to the Adjutant General, who will provide relief under the provisions of Sec. 452—Chapter 28, Code of Iowa, 1924.

2. Only such cases as require medical or surgical treatment of a nature that cannot be administered or performed at the encampment will be sent to civilian hospitals for treatment. This action will be taken only on the recommendation of the Chief Surgeon, Iowa National Guard, or in the absence of the Chief Surgeon, on the recommendation of the Senior Medical Corps Officer of the Regiment or similar organization.

3. Report of hospitalization in civilian institutions will be made immediately to the Adjutant General by the officers authorizing same, and will state name, rank or grade and organization of the officers or enlisted man so cared for, and the cause for hospitalization. Expenses of hospitalization will be settled by the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer in accordance with the provisions of Article XVII-K N. G. R. 1922, as changed by Changes Nos. 7-20-21 and 24, or by Sec. 452—Chapter 28, Code of Iowa, 1924.

3. The Division Commander, 34th Division, will arrange through the local Examination of all Artillery Officers at Camp Knox, Ky. Medical Corps at Fort Snelling, for the Annual Physical Examination of officers of the 34th Infantry Division Staff.

4. The Senior Medical Officers of all units, Iowa National Guard, will file with Chief Surgeon's Office, completed forms No. 52 and 52-a, immediately after close of Camp, showing disposition of all cases treated and physical condition of patients at close of tour of duty, in accordance with Army Regulations.

(a) *Rifle*:—Those men who have completed the prescribed preliminary "Rifle Marksmanship Course." Those men who have completed six (6) hours instruction prior to arriving in Camp, provided they can satisfactorily pass the preliminary test as prescribed in Par. No. 53, T. R. 150-5.

(b) *Machine Gun*:—Only those men will be allowed to fire the "Qualification Course," as can satisfactorily pass the prescribed examination as provided for in Par. 54, T. R. 150-35.

(c) *Automatic Rifle*:—One non-commissioned officer, the Automatic and Assistant Automatic Rifleman in each Rifle Company or Troop will be required to fire the prescribed Course.

(d) *Howitzer*:—Only those qualifying in the "Expert Test" as prescribed in Section V. T. R. 150-40, will be allowed to fire the "Qualification Course."

(e) *Pistol*:—All officers so armed will fire the prescribed "Course."

Only those enlisted men who can satisfactorily pass the test prescribed in Par. 59 W. D. 1050, will be allowed to fire the "Course."

"Pit Details"

All organizations firing, will furnish the personnel necessary to operate and care for all targets assigned them. Each "Range Officer" will provide an officer from his regiment to command the "Pit Detail," while his regiment is on the range. This officer will receive instructions for operating target material from the "Ordnance Officer" or his "Assistant," and will not permit the "Pit Detail" to leave the pits until inspection has been made of same by the "Ordnance Officer" or his "Assistant," he will be responsible for the "Pit Detail" being in the pits, and to have the material in operating order not later than the time set for "Commence Firing," for the proper policing of pits prior to leaving them.

"Hours of Firing"

Infantry:—Firing will commence not later than 7:30 A. M. daily, and will continue for a period of not less than eight (8) hours, exclusive of the noon hour. Organizations will remain on the range the entire day, the noon meal being prepared and brought to and served at that place.

"Records and Reports"

Records will be kept as prescribed by regulations appropriate to each Arm. Individual score cards will be kept in the possession of Company, Troop or Detachment Commanders when not actually in use at the firing points. They may be used for verification of scores in competition but under no circumstances whatever will an organization commander return to his home station without these cards. Each organization commander will submit to his regimental commander, not later than forty-eight (48) hours after completion of practice a report in duplicate, showing scores by ranges and aggregate scores of each person firing.

"Conduct of Firing Line"

The conduct of all persons, at, or on, the firing points will be governed by T. R. 150-10, and only those men actually firing and the necessary scores will be allowed on the firing points at any time firing is in progress.

"Instruction in rear of Firing Line"

All men not actually firing will be grouped by Battalions or Squadrons for instruction, and will not, at any time, be allowed to interfere with those at the firing points. Instruction will be conducted by qualified instructors, unit schedules definitely provides for this instruction and assignment of subjects therein.

"Firing by Officers"

All Company, Troop and Detachment officers will be required to fire the "Course" prescribed for their organizations, but will fire only during the last relay. One officer from each organization will be assigned the duty of keeping targets filled at all times. All other officers will report for group instruction.

"Supplies"

"Range Officers" will see that the necessary ammunition and paste

for targets are in readiness for firing to start at the specified time. This material will be drawn from the respective Regimental Supply officers as desired by the "Range Officers."

"Ranges and Equipment"

Major Robert L. Fulton, Ordnance Department has been detailed as "Camp Instructor of Small Arms Firing and Range Executive Officer." He will take measures as will insure the various ranges used are in readiness and equipped with such target material as will be adequate to carry on all practice at all times. He will have all material in first class operating condition and will provide for the maintenance throughout the entire practice. He will from time to time inspect and supervise work being done on the ranges preparatory to practice and will see that all weed cutting, preparation of butts to minimize recochet bullets, firing points, signal and telephone communications are in first class condition. During the Encampment, he will perform the duties of Camp Instructor of Small Arms firing, giving instruction in the use and care of Small Arms, and will arrange to give demonstrations in the care of this material at various times, to insure an intelligent working knowledge of same. As Range Executive Officer, he will have direct supervision of all ranges, equipment and manipulation of same, will arrange for matches of competition in Individual, Company, Troop or Detachment, Battalion or Squadron and Regimental Shoots, and will arrange for other matches incident to, and regarding certain trophies to be competed, for:

"Governor N. E. Kendall Trophy"

(a) *This Trophy presented by Ex-Governor N. E. Kendall, then Governor, shall under provisions of presentation be competed for annually.*

(b) *Who shall compete:*—All organizations of the Iowa National Guard armed or practically armed with the service rifle.

(c) *When fired:*—This competition shall be held during the annual encampment, and on such days as provided in orders for firing of record course, as prescribed by rifle marksmanship for record.

(d) *Computation of Scores:*—All scores made in firing the record Course shall be computed by organization commanders, at the end of the prescribed firing period, as follows:

"All scores fired for record in each organization, whether or not the entire course has been completed by each individual, shall be added and the total shall be divided by the strength of the organizations commissioned and enlisted present on the first day of the encampment, as shown by the "Morning Report." The organization having the highest average so computed, shall be declared the winner and shall hold the Trophy for a period of one (1) year. Band Sections of Service Companies or Troops shall not be included in computing the strength of organization from which they come."

Promptly upon completion of firing, organization commanders will compute scores as above described and turn same over to their respective regimental "Range Officer."

(e) *Awarding of Trophy:*—The respective regimental "Range Officers" after receiving reports of their organizations, shall convene at the call

of the Senior Officer and they shall after checking reports, refer their report to the "Kendall Board" who will make the final announcement.

The "Kendall Board" consists of the following officers:

"National Matches 1925—Camp Perry, Ohio."

Attention is directed to Bulletin No. 7, War Department, dated May 18, 1925, which authorizes the attendance of a State Rifle Team, representing the Iowa National Guard, at the National Matches, Camp Perry, Ohio, Sept. 4th to 20th inclusive, 1925. The team will be composed of the following:

1—Team Captain.
1—Team Coach.
1—Range Officer.
10—Principals.
2—Alternates.
Fifteen (15)—members in all.

To hold the position the Iowa State Rifle Team now holds will require hard work on the part of all concerned. It is therefore necessary that each Company, Troop and Detachment commander, go through his organization and list each of his men who can devote the time necessary to prepare for, and to go to Camp Perry. These men must go into training at once, habits be regulated, vices if any eliminated, and exercises tending to develop affected muscles regularly indulged in. This to be in addition to the actual home station range firing, position and aiming drills.

Not later than the second day at Camp, Company, Troop and Detachment commanders will submit to the "Range Executive Officer" the names of men of their organizations who have agreed to devote the necessary time. These men will be held at Camp from Aug. 20 to Sept. 2nd inclusive, at State expense and will participate in such elimination shoots as will determine a final selection for the Camp Perry Team.

"Supplementary"

A conference between the Camp Instructor of Small Arms Practice and Range Executive officers, and the several Range Officers and their Assistants will be held not later than the second day of Camp, for the purpose of conferring on any matters incident to the range work in all stages during the encampment.

IV. CAMP AND INTERIOR GUARD—The Commanding General, 67th Infantry Brigade, and the Commanding Officer 113th Cavalry, will furnish Camp Guards for the following posts:

- Post No. 1—Main Entrance to the Camp.
 - Post No. 2—At Entrance drive to Swimming Pool.
 - Post No. 3—At Bathing Pool entrance gate.
 - Post No. 4—At Intersection of Des Moines and 7th Sts.
 - Post No. 5—At South Arsenal Building, extending from R. R. tracks, east to Depot St., south to south end of south frame warehouse.
 - Post No. 6—At North Arsenal Building, extending from R. R. tracks, east to Depot St., north to north end of north frame warehouse.
 - Post No. 7—On road containing the War Trophies, extending from the first trophy on the north to the last trophy on the south.
- Guard detail for Post No. 1, will be furnished by the 113th Cavalry, and will consist of the following: Between the hours of Reveille and Retreat this post will be a *one guard post* in charge of a Sergeant. Between the hours of Retreat to Reveille the post will be increased to a *two guard*

post, in charge of a commissioned officer and two non-commissioned officers. These guards will be dismantled.

Field Officers of the Day will have supervision over all Camp Guards and Interior Guards. They will take cognizance of the general guard of the Camp and of any irregularities observed by him or reported to him. A roster will be maintained at Camp Headquarters of all Field Officers of the Day. The Field Officers of the Day will be detailed by the Regimental Commanders of each regiment for the following periods:

168th Infantry August 2-3-6-7 and 11th
 133rd Infantry August 4-5-8-9 and 10th
 113th Cavalry August 12-13-14 and 15th

Commanding Officers of the regiments of the command will furnish these headquarters with a list of the Field Officers of the day, detailed by them, giving their name, organization and their period of duty.

INTERIOR GUARD will be performed by each regiment in their own area. Areas of each regiment are hereby designated:

133rd Infantry: the area included within the following boundaries: Des Moines St., from north line of camp, south to 7th St., west to Depot St., north to north line of camp, and east to Des Moines St., and including area occupied by officers quarters, regimental headquarters, and officers bath houses, and guard at North gate on Main St.

168th Infantry: the area included within the following boundaries: Des Moines St., from 7th St., south to south line of building No. 45, west to north end of Cavalry Corral, to Depot Street, north to 7th St., and east to Des Moines St., and including area occupied by officers quarters, regimental headquarters and officers bath houses.

113th Cavalry: the area included within the following boundaries: Des Moines St., from north end of building No. 44, south to south line of camp, west to Depot St., north to north end of corral and east to Des Moines St., and including the area occupied by officers quarters, regimental headquarters building, officers bath houses, Utility Officers house and barns.

The Guard will be by Company, except as special work on terrain exercises and rifle range work necessitates temporary changes, in which event the Regimental Commander may, in his judgment, provide the Interior Guard from the details left in Camp.

Latrines and Latrine Guards: Latrines for each regiment are hereby designated:

133rd Infantry—Latrines Nos. 85-86-87-88.

168th Infantry—Latrines Nos. 89-90-91-92.

113th Cavalry—Latrines Nos. 93-94-95.

Each regiment will detail each day two men for each latrine building designated, who will report to the Commander of the Guard each evening, immediately following Guard Mount, as Latrine Guards. These guards will wear side arms and will exercise the same authority as regular guard posts. They will be on duty from 6:30 A. M., to 10:30 P. M. They will be on duty 4 hours on and 4 hours off, and need not be held at Guard House while off duty. The Commander of the Guard will be held responsible for the condition of the latrines and bath houses. In this connection Brigade Headquarters Co., will furnish their quota of Latrine Guards

to the 133rd Infantry, and the 186th Ambulance Co., will furnish their quota of Latrine Guards to the 168th Infantry.

DUTIES OF LATRINE GUARDS

Scrub out and clean up latrines and bath houses each morning and have ready for inspection at 8 A. M. They will keep the buildings in condition for inspection any hour of the day thereafter.

To govern the conduct of the men using the building, so that only toilet paper is used, that no foreign matter is thrown in the bowls, that might clog same. To report any repairs which might become necessary. To allow no rags, clothing, etc., to be left in bath house.

They will keep the vicinity of the bath house clean of all refuse, paper, etc. The area in and around the buildings will be faked, and placed on one pile near pavement where the Service Co. detail can pick it up and haul away.

CAMP GUARD ORDERS

No. 1. Post at Main Entrance Gate: During the day the guards at this post will control the traffic entering the Camp. They will allow no speeding or fast driving into or out of the Camp.

They will see that all traffic into the camp keeps on right of road, and those going out on the left side of the road.

They will keep all peddlers or vendors from entering the camp.

They will keep all taxi cabs or hired vehicles outside the camp. Taxies, busses and other vehicles for hire will load and unload passengers outside entrance gates.

During the night all vehicles will be stopped and occupants will be verified as being soldiers or guests. Taxies will not be permitted to carry passengers into the camp at night. No unnecessary delay or discourtesy will be shown in passing authorized officers or enlisted men.

No. 2. Post at entrance drive to swimming pool: This post will control traffic only. It will prevent speeding or fast driving and will prevent traffic congestions at Camp Headquarters entrance. This post will not stop or challenge any officer or enlisted man day or night, except in cases of disorder, speeding, etc.

No. 3. Post at Bathing Pavilion and Pool: This post will not allow any one in the pool or buildings, after pool is closed for the night. During the day the Guard will not allow anyone in the pool unless the life guards are present and on duty. Any orders given by the Special Sanitary Officer in charge of the pool, in addition to these orders, will be obeyed by the Guard on Post No. 3.

No. 4. Post at Intersection of 7th & Des Moines St., will be alert for fires and disorders in the vicinity of the Hospital. This post will not stop or challenge any officer or enlisted man coming in or going out of Camp either day or night, except in case of disorder or speeding automobiles, motorcycles or other vehicles.

Nos. 5 and 6. Post at South and North Arsenal Building, will in cooperation with each other at North Arsenal Building, maintain order, prevent congestion of automobiles and control traffic in the area between the buildings, and at the R. R. Depot. These posts will allow no solicitation for Taxi business at this point, they will allow no parking of any but

camp automobiles in the area around Arsenals and Warehouses. At night they will be alert for fires, and will allow no one but authorized persons to enter any of the Arsenals or Warehouses.

No. 7. Post, at War Trophies, will patrol the entire area in which this material is stored, they will permit all persons to inspect, take pictures, etc. *They will not permit* any person or persons to move any of the trophies, except on written order of the Camp Q. M. Copy of which they will turn over to the Officer of the Guard. The importance of training in Guard Work *must not* be underestimated. It *must not* become a perfunctory matter. Regimental, Battalion and Company commanders will give daily instruction and attention on this subject, and will observe the manner in which their respective organizations perform this duty.

V. **CAMP SANITATION:** will be under the supervision of the Camp Surgeon. The Camp Surgeon's recommendations on Sanitation are here by published to the command and will be complied with, without deviation. Each Regiment or independent unit will be responsible for the area occupied by them.

Grass and Vegetation of all lands within the area occupied will be cut and trimmed in uniform manner by the responsible organization or unit.

Wood, Coal and Kindling will be kept in boxes or neat piles behind the west end of the Mess Halls.

Tents will be furled and all bedding exposed to air and sunshine at least every fifth day, weather permitting.

Clothing, which is soiled, or fouled food stuff, or other articles that would be objectionable, will be eliminated from all tents.

Kitchens, floors will be kept clean by scrubbing with soap and water daily. *Offener if necessary*. *Work table* and all kitchen utensils, *must* be free from grease and dirt. *Special care* will be given to the removal of grease and debris from between boards on table. Knives and other kitchen utensils will be kept scoured and bright.

Kitchen and Mess Hall must be kept free from flies.

Ice Boxes will be cleaned daily. Store rooms will be kept clean and free from debris at all times.

No personal or company equipment of any description will be kept in kitchen store rooms.

Suitable Grease Traps, will be constructed, through which all kitchen slops will be strained, so as to extract the grease and food debris before emptying into sewer.

Each Kitchen will have two cans or vessels at outside water taps, one containing hot soapy water and one hot clear water, for the purpose of washing mess kits after each meal. Mess Sergeants will see that hot water in cans is changed frequently, to avoid accumulation of grease.

A hole, approximately the size of a bucket, will be dug just outside the kitchen under ice box drain, this hole to be filled with pieces of rocks, cement, coarse gravel or pieces of tile, to receive the drip from ice box.

A Rack to hold garbage cans, mops and brooms will be constructed 15 feet from kitchen, parallel and opposite to cement platform. East line of rack to be on west line of kitchen. Lumber for this purpose may be obtained from kindling pile on west side of Motor Transport Building.

Garbage will be burned in kitchen range, whenever possible.

Garbage which cannot be burned, will be placed in garbage cans on the garbage racks, and hauled away daily. Covers to garbage cans must be in place at all times. Covers and cans will be washed both inside and outside with lye water, and kept free from grease and dirt.

Regimental Exchange, and surrounding grounds must be kept clean and **FREE FROM LITTER AT ALL TIMES**. This responsibility is placed upon the commissioned officer in charge of exchanges. Nothing will be sold which will in any way be detrimental to the health of the command. In case of doubt with regards to the soundness of fruit, etc., regimental surgeons will be consulted.

No Canteens or Exchanges will be permitted on the rifle range, and no cold drinks of any description will be taken by troops to the range.

Civilian Venders will not be allowed in camp or on the range, except by written order from the Camp Commander.

Unit Commanders, will give instructions on the proper use of drinking water by marching troops. These instructions will be given at *First Drill Formation*.

Latrines and Bath Houses of officers and enlisted men will be kept in clean and sanitary condition at all times. Toilet paper only will be used and sufficient supply will be kept in latrines, reserve supply will be kept at Guard tents. There will be a Latrine Orderly on duty at each enlisted men's Latrine, from reveille to taps, for the purpose of keeping the latrines and baths in a clean and sanitary condition, and one orderly from each regiment to care for the officers latrines and bath houses of each regiment.

The following instructions are published, and all latrine orderlies will comply therewith.

a. Scrub out and clean latrines and bath houses each morning and have them ready for inspection at 8 A. M. They will be kept in like condition for inspection at any hour of the day thereafter.

b. Insure that nothing but toilet paper is used. (In case of shortage toilet paper, extra supply will be obtained at guard tent.)

c. Prevent refuse, such as fruit peelings, melon rinds, food stuff, bottles or other foreign matter, being thrown in stool bowls, or on floor.

d. In case drain in bath house or in latrines becomes clogged, the orderly will report same to Commander of the Guard, who will report same to Camp Headquarters at once.

e. *No clothing*, rags, etc., will be left in bath house.

f. Vicinity of bath house and latrines will be raked each day and all refuse paper, etc., will be gathered and placed in pile near pavement, where regimental trucks or wagons will pick it up, and cart to Camp dump.

g. *Wash Benches* in bath houses are the only authorized places for washing of clothing.

h. *A supply of brooms*, pails, etc., will be kept in the guard tent, to be issued by the Officer of the Guard, and returned to him when not in use.

i. *The Officer of the Guard* will be responsible for the proper observance of these instructions. All latrine orderlies will be under his jurisdiction, and they will form a part of the guard, reporting to the Officer of the guard each evening at the Guard Tent immediately after Guard Mount.

They will wear side arms, and will enforce the provisions of this order, with the same authority as is exercised at regular guard posts. A copy of this order will be posted on the bulletin board of each unit, and in each latrine and bath house building.

SWIMMING POOL

- a. The pool will be open from 9 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock at night.
- b. The Officers Dressing rooms in the pool pavilion will be open for ladies of the camp from 10 o'clock until 11 o'clock in the morning, daily.
- c. Troops will not be allowed to enter the pool until at least an hour after mess.
- d. The police of the bath house, and grounds in an around the pool will be completed by 9 A. M., each day.
- e. All persons using the pool will take a thorough shower bath before entering the pool.
- f. The use of the pool will be forbidden all persons who are suffering from colds, sore throat, skin infections, or who show evidence of old sores, inflamed eyes, or other conditions which may cause bacterial infection, liable to be transmitted to other persons.
- g. The *Special Sanitary Officer* in charge of the pool, will insure proper inspection by a competent officer or non-commissioned officer of all bathers.
- h. Spitting and blowing the nose into the pool will not be permitted.
- i. *Expert Civilian Life guards* will be on duty during bathing hours, and they are authorized to enforce the provisions of this order, assisted by the military personnel on duty. All rescue work will be left entirely to those guards, unless they call for additional aid, in which event they will be assisted by those present. Swimmers will not interfere with the life guards in the performance of their duty. The military guard will assist the life guards in keeping order at all times.
- j. A guard post will be established in the area between the Pavilion and the pool, for the purpose of preventing any person from entering the pool unless the life guards are on duty, and to assist in enforcing these regulations.

k. Captain Jack J. Hinman is designated as Special Sanitary Officer, in charge of the Bathing Pool and Pavilion. He will arrange with the Camp Commander for such guards and assistants he may deem necessary in addition to those mentioned in this order.

VI. *CEREMONY AT REVELLE AND RETREAT*—The Headquarters Company 67th Infantry Brigade, will furnish one (1) non-commissioned officer and two (2) privates each day for Camp Flag detail, to raise and lower the flag. This detail will wear side arms. (See Sec. 17-Par. 344-345, Manual for Non-commissioned officers and Privates 1917.)

There will be a Reveille and Retreat Gun, which will be fired by a detachment of Headquarters Company 67th Infantry Brigade, consisting when practicable, of a Corporal and two privates. The morning gun will be fired at the beginning of the first march. The retreat gun will be

fired at the last note of retreat. (See Sec. 18-Par. 346, Manual for Non-commissioned officers and Privates 1917.)

Camp Utility Officer, Harry Fuhr and Camp Electrician, Chas. Beck, will accompany him. They will, under the supervision of the Camp Inspector, check all Camp Utilities, they will call his attention to any and all abuses, unauthorized alterations or additions, which may affect the efficient operation of such utilities.

The Camp Inspector will make a written report to the Camp Commander each day, which will embody the deficiencies and irregularities found, and where located, and also his recommendations for corrections and improvements.

Subject: Care of Building and Ground.

The following regulations on the above subject are published for the information and guidance of the Command. All company, troop and separate organization commanders will designate some member of their unit to be responsible for the closing and securely fastening all shutters when a storm threatens, either day or night as the case may be. Wind storms in the valley where this camp is situated become so violent that there is grave danger the shutters will be blown off.

Kitchen doors at street entrance open against the ice boxes. Authority is given to take these doors off by drawing hinge pins and the door stored in store rooms. Care must be taken in doing this, as the doors will be rebung by each unit the last day of camp.

Regimental Supply Officers will give the necessary orders to truck drivers which will insure all trucks driving only on pavement or between buildings. No trucks or automobiles will be allowed to drive or park in front of kitchens for any purpose. The reason is obvious, as all water valves and shut offs and connections are located in front of the buildings, heavy trucks are liable to break such connections and serious damage

result. Supply Officers will be held strictly responsible for damages due to this cause, and the cost of repairs will be charged against the regiment occupying the area in which the damage occurs.

It is emphasized that the sod in tent areas, around mess halls and kitchens and around any other buildings, *will not be* skinned or destroyed from courses other than natural wear and tear.

Care must be exercised in the use of showers in bath houses. Where spring valves are used, the lever will be pulled only enough to furnish necessary water. Where turn valves are used, they will be turned off as soon as the user is through. All faucets will be kept closed when not in use. Latrine Guards will be instructed to enforce this regulation.

"Time of firing of the above matches."

REPORT OF 34th DIVISION ENCAMPMENT

Subject: Report on Field Training Camp, 34th Division Headquarters and Staff, 1925.

To: C. G., Seventh Corps Area. (Through Lieut. Col. Lucius C. Bennett, Inf., Senior Instructor, St. Paul, Minn.)

1. In compliance with paragraph 23, sub-paragraph c, Training Memorandum No. 1, Seventh Corps Area, February 25, 1925, the following report on the Field Training Camp, 34th Division Headquarters and Staff, is submitted:

a. The Field Training Camp was held at Ft. Snelling, Minn., Sept. 6-20, 1925.

b. Organization attending the camp—34th Division Headquarters and Staff, 15 officers, no enlisted men. Three officers, Q. R. C., attended the camp and were trained with the 34th Division Staff. Total attending—18 officers—no enlisted men.

c. The following named officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army, were on duty as instructors:

e. The camp was held in the cantonment area on the Fort Snelling, Minn., reservation. The buildings assigned were adequate and suitable for messing, quartering, and class room work. The terrain of the reservation is suitable for terrain exercises and tactical walks.

f. No equipment, other than personal, was taken to the camp nor will any be required at future camps of this kind, if held at Fort Snelling. Horses, saddle equipment, cots, class room paraphernalia, etc., part of the post equipment, were supplied

by the commanding officer, Fort Snelling, for the conduct of the camp.

- d. If future staff camps are held at a military station, it is believed that all equipment necessary for the conduct of the camp may be procured at the station, rendering unnecessary the shipment of any equipment thereto for the purpose of training.

2. This camp afforded the Division Commander and Staff the valuable opportunity to become acquainted and to get together for the first time. The spirit manifested throughout the entire period was excellent, and interest was maintained to the last. Each staff officer conducted a conference on the duties of his office, and the results obtained showed that considerable thought and study had been devoted to the preparation. At the beginning of the twenty-four hour staff problem, it was apparent that each officer had the correct conception of the task in hand. This conception of the method of procedure in division staff work having been inculcated, the task of training the staff has been simplified. The results obtained at this camp indicate, in my opinion, that the Headquarters and Staff is ready to proceed with a more detailed study of staff work and of the component parts of the division.

3. Due to the fact that this camp was the first field training camp for the division staff, I believe that the method of training employed—devoting the first week to conferences and the second week to practical work—was the correct method as it coordinated the training and gave each officer a fair understanding of the duties and teamwork necessary. As to future camps, I believe that a maximum of time should be devoted to practical work, and a minimum of time to conferences. When conferences are necessary for the discussion of certain principles, the conference should be followed by an illustration of the principles discussed. The method recommended—that of more practical work—presupposes that there will be few, if any, changes in the personnel of the staff, and that repetition will be unnecessary at the next camp.

4. a. It is recommended that the Field Training Camp for 1926, be held either late in July or during the month of August, as it is believed that this will be the best time to secure a full attendance. Due to the nature of the civilian occupation of the members of the staff, it seems to be the consensus of opinion that sometime prior to September, is the most desirable.

b. As to location, the camp should be held at a place where there are no other military activities to destroy interest, and to interfere with the training. Fort Snelling has ample facilities for housing, and equipment for training the Division Headquarters and Staff. It is recommended that the 1926 camp be held at that place.

c. The number of instructors detailed was in excess of the requirements of the camp. It is recommended that the number of instructors for the 1926 camp be from five to eight officers and two enlisted men for clerical work. Should members of the Organized Reserves be trained with the 34th Division Staff, it is believed that eight instructors will be sufficient for forty students.

d. It is recommended that all brigade commanders, and all members of the supply, technical and administrative staffs attend the camp in

1926. This will give those officers a more comprehensive view, and a better understanding of the functioning of the division, and the parts they are to play therein.

REPORT OF 67TH INFANTRY BRIGADE ENCAMPMENT

Pursuant to provisions of G. O. No. 11, Par. IV, dated A. G. O., Des Moines, Iowa, July 15, 1925, and Encampment Letter No. 8, dated A. G. O. June 12, 1925, the undersigned assumed command of all troops ordered to Field Training at Camp Dodge, Iowa, on August 2, 1925. The officers of the State Staff Corps and Departments mentioned in G. O. No. 11, Par. IV, your office all reported on the opening day and performed the duties to which the above order assigned them, in a very satisfactory manner.

The advance detachments provided for in G. O. No. 11, Par. 11, your office had reported and under your direction had completely prepared

the camp for the reception of troops. So well had their work been done that by evening of the day of arrival, every organization of the Infantry Brigade had its area clean and in order; the men had been fed with an abundant hot meal and were greeting their buddies in the other organizations or were looking for entertainment which was being provided by the Chaplains of the different regiments. The cavalry regiment, although working under the same arrangements and conditions had cared for their horses and provided the food for the men but were unable to put camp area occupied by them in a condition creditable to the organization. It required several days to correct this condition.

The different organizations ordered to Camp Dodge arrived more nearly on time than during any previous year. With the exception of the Howitzer Company of the 133rd Infantry all organizations were in camp by 12:35 P. M. The Howitzer Company above mentioned had the misfortune to have a car of their train derailed on the Inter-Urban line between Des Moines and Camp Dodge which delayed their arrival until 1:30 P. M. The practice of requiring the organizations ordered to camp to leave their home stations at an hour which enables them to arrive in camp by noon of the opening day again proved its worth and the same procedure is recommended for future mobilizations at Camp Dodge.

On account of the early arrival in camp on the opening day, the careful and thorough work of the advance detachments and the fact that each organization knew that it was going back to the same area they had occupied the previous years the troops were able to immediately adjust themselves and begin their schedules on the morning of August 3d, and with slight adjustments, due to rain on parts of three days, they were maintained throughout the camp.

Following up the excellent work on combat leadership which was begun at the officers school held at Camp Dodge June 23-27 the schedules for the field training were so arranged that the leaders of the fire units were first taught their duties in combat; then the training progressed to the duties of the leaders and the personnel of the tactical units in combat. As a result of stressing combat training the entire personnel became intensely interested in the work and I am confident that there never was a training period for the Iowa National Guard in which the individual soldier entered into the spirit of the game with better interest and maintained it to the close of the camp. On all occasions it was noted by the Camp Commander that the men were conducting their field work just as carefully as if they were under the fire of enemy machine guns and artillery.

Additional regular army instructors were assigned to the camp so that the infantry was provided with a senior instructor and three instructors for each of the regiments. The cavalry was provided with a senior instructor and four instructors. One was assigned to brigade headquarters who gave valuable assistance in the handling of the terrain exercises. There was also an instructor for the Medical Detachments. All of these instructors without exception took a genuine interest in our training, were most efficient, and their efforts to give us the most

possible of instruction in a short time of field training showed wonderful results.

The health of the camp was excellent throughout the entire period. No severe accidents of any kind occurred nor was there any serious illness. Two cases of appendicitis developed which required operation. These were conducted at the Iowa Methodist Hospital in Des Moines. The camp hospital was functioning at all times and was ready to care for any emergency cases should they have occurred.

Thursday, August 6th was the day set aside on the schedule as Governor's Day but soon after Governor Hammill arrived on the grounds the weather changed and a rain started which continued the remainder of the day so that the program for his review could not be carried out. He however returned to camp on Sunday August 9th when the review was held at 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon with at least ten thousand persons present to witness the event. The review was held on the field west of the arsenal buildings. The two regiments of the 67th infantry brigade, with Brigade Headquarters and Headquarters Company, the cavalry regiment and the 186 Ambulance Company passed the Governor in review in a very creditable manner. The review was marked by the presentation by Governor Hammill of the 25 year medal of the Iowa National Guard to Lieutenant Colonel Wilbur S. Conkling, Medical Department.

Immediately following the review the Governor, State Officials and visiting officers from Fort Des Moines were entertained at a dinner at Camp Headquarters after which the Governor held a reception for all of the officers of the command.

The time devoted to range work was curtailed to some extent from previous years training but due to the efficient work of Major Robert L. Fulton, Ordnance Dept., and executive officer in charge of the range firing more was accomplished in the shorter time allotted than on previous years.

Each year as the organizations of the Iowa National Guard come to Camp Dodge for their field training they seem to quickly adjust themselves to their surroundings which are very pleasing and comfortable. This is also carried on into the amusements of the camp. So well do the Chaplains of the regiments and the Y. M. C. A. function that very few of the men desire to leave the area during the tour of duty. These conditions reflect in better control of the men while they are away from home station and result in better training.

In summing up the camp proved to be successful in every way and the Camp Commander was proud of the manner in which everything was carried out. He desires at this time to voice his appreciation of the efficient work of the camp headquarters staff and the wonderful cooperation from them in bringing out the results attained.

I am attaching herewith the reports of the commanding officers of the two infantry regiments and the Chief Surgeon of the camp. The recommendations which they make are concurred in by the camp commander.

1. All companies of the regiment reported at Camp Dodge on or before the time scheduled, Aug. 2nd, and moved out on time scheduled, Aug. 16th, without confusion.

2. During the entire tour of duty there has been a splendid esprit de corps and the cooperation between the various units and departments has been excellent, the utmost harmony having prevailed during the entire period. The officers and men of the command were eager to avail themselves of the instruction provided by the regular army personnel and I believe there has been more accomplished in the actual military training of both officers and men, especially in combat principles, than in any previous tour of duty of the same duration.

3. The policing, sanitation and general condition of the 168th area has been the best in my experience in the National Guard. The work on the rifle range was especially good.

4. In the recreation of the men, other than boxing, wrestling and swimming, the regiment has been greatly handicapped by lack of proper accommodations for the field events, there being no baseball field or track available, consequently very little field or track work could be given the men. This lack of provisions for athletics is a serious handicap and unless they can be provided by the state, will result in this important phase of training being dropped for lack of interest on the part of the men. I recommend that the Adjutant General be requested to provide an athletic field with cinder track and baseball diamond for each regiment.

5. Much extra work has been required in disposing of debris and paper. Recommendation is made that small battalion incinerators for burning this debris in the rear area of each battalion be provided. It was only by constant effort that the latrines were kept open; it is believed that a general overhauling of the sewer system should be made before another training period.

6. There is a lack of maneuver ground and steps should be taken to secure additional ground on the north of the area from the U. S. Government.

Subject: Report on Annual Field Training Period.

To: The Commanding General, 67th Brigade, Iowa N. G.

1. Pursuant to verbal instructions of the Commanding General 67th Brigade, Iowa N. G., the undersigned submits the following report in connection with the 1925 Field Training period of the 133rd Infantry: The Service Company, less the band section reported in Camp Dodge July 28th, four days in advance of the regiment, for the purpose of preparing the area assigned to the regiment. Captains Grahl, R1 and Donovan, R3 arrived with the advance detail and completed arrangements for the reception of troops. This policy is to be commended. The fact that canvas was drawn in advance, and that five days rations were placed in the company kitchens, added greatly to the comfort of the arriving troops.

2. The Regiment arrived in Camp Dodge Sunday August 2nd in excellent shape, and was at once assigned to quarters. With the exception of the Howitzer Company, the Regiment arrived more nearly on time than in previous years. The delayed arrival of the Howitzer Company was caused by a rail accident between Des Moines and Camp Dodge, but fortunately did not result in any accidents.

3. Monday, the Regiment commenced the training as outlined in Training Memo. No. 1, Hq. 133rd Infantry, and with but few exceptions, was carried out through the entire period. Three officers of the Regular establishment reported for duty with the regiment Sunday August 2nd, as Instructors, and the Regimental Commander desires at this time, to commend the officers for their helpful hints and instruction. The officers in question, Captains Scales, Ostrander, and Johnson were at all times ready with advice, and the Regimental Commander especially desires to commend them for their professional qualifications. I especially desire at this time to thank Captain Allan Johnson, D. O. L., who has been assigned to this Regiment as Instructor, for the most excellent help received from him. He has, at all times, been ready to give advice, and answer questions, and has by his tact, and diplomacy, endeared himself with the officers of the Regiment.

4. The Regiment spent two days on the Target Range, and while the firing was carried out with precision, the lack of preliminary instruction was noticeable.

5. The Officers and enlisted men have again demonstrated that they have been exceedingly quick to learn and apply the instruction given from time to time, and it is my opinion that the organization as a whole, would quickly become efficient for actual field service in time of emergency.

6. The activities of the Regiment are handicapped by the lack of suitable terrain for parade and combat exercises, and steps should be taken to acquire additional ground. It is also my opinion that heaters should be provided for the latrines used by the enlisted men. An ice cold bath is not attractive to many of the men, and I believe that a supply of hot water would be conducive, to cleaner wearing apparel and personal appearance.

7. The rations that have been issued to the Regiment this tour of duty, have been most excellent, and has resulted in a contented and well fed organization. Mess Sergeants are becoming more and more familiar with the ration, and cooks are in the main, acquiring the knack of preparing tempting and palatable meals, all of which go to make a happy and contented family.

8. The Regimental Commander at this time, desires to thank the Commanding General and all of the Staff for the many courtesies shown the Regimental Commander and the Regiment. Your Staff has at all times been most helpful and considerate, and it has been a pleasure to be a unit of your Brigade organization, and I trust that next year I will be able to report to you, a better organization than I now have.

9. In conclusion, I desire to make the following recommendations: That additional terrain be obtained for parade and drill purposes, that hot water heaters be installed in the bath houses used by the enlisted men, and that the number of instructors assigned to the organization be increased to five.

Subject: Special report of the Camp Surgeon.

To: Commanding General, Camp Dodge, Iowa.

1. Special Sanitary Report is herewith submitted.

2. SANITATION.

a. The general sanitation of the camp was excellent. The grounds were well policed, with the exception that at times more debris was allowed to accumulate in the rear areas than seemed necessary.

b. The kitchens were, as a general rule, in a very satisfactory condition. Some were excellent, the majority very good, while a few were unsatisfactory. The noncommissioned officer from the cooks and bakers school, proved a very valuable adjunct to the Medical Department in maintaining better kitchens. The food and cooking was generally good and satisfactory.

c. The latrines showed a marked improvement over previous years, due in the opinion of the Chief Surgeon, to the supervision of the guard. However, there is still room for improvement and some of the officers

of the guard did not seem to fully appreciate their responsibility and neglected to properly instruct the guard on duty. In spite of all the precautions taken, some of the latrines were stopped up by the use of material other than toilet paper.

d. The sanitary condition of the corrals and surrounding ground was very satisfactory.

e. The sanitation of the pool and bath house was excellent. However, the men failed to avail themselves of the use of the pool to extent that should be expected.

f. The canteens and ground surrounding were generally in good condition, with the exception of the sleeping quarters of the civilian employees.

3. HEALTH OF THE COMMAND.

a. The health of the command was most excellent, there being no serious illness or accidents and no epidemics of infectious or contagious diseases developed during the entire 16 days. Two cases of appendicitis developed which required operation, both were successfully performed at the Methodist Hospital. One injury, lacerated wounds of the head. One severe case of poison ivy and one case of epilepsy which for a time was suspicious of being hydrophobia. These were the only cases treated outside of the Camp Hospital and all will be able to return to their home station within five days after the end of the tour of duty. All other cases were returned home with the command. There were seventy-six cases treated in quarters and hospitals, with a loss of 238 days. The sick of Regiments being from the following units:

113th Cav., quarters, 2 men, 17 days—Hosp., 10 men, 27 days.

133rd Inf., quarters, 29 men, 65 days—Hosp., 13 men, 33 days.

168th Inf., quarters, 7 men, 26 days—Hosp., 15 men, 70 days.

There was a total of twenty-seven cases of venereal disease discovered during camp as follows:

113th Cav., 1st inspection, 1; 2nd inspection or developed during camp, 1, with a total of 2.

133rd Inf., 1st inspection, 11; 2nd inspection or developed during camp, 5, total 16.

168th Inf., 1st inspection, 5; 2nd inspection or developed during camp, 4, total 9, making a grand total of 27 cases.

3. INSTRUCTION OF MEDICAL UNITS.

a. All medical units followed the drill schedule which had been prepared by the Senior Sanitary Instructor in as far as was possible, it being necessary at times to change the schedule by reason of the activities of the companies to which the medical unit was assigned. The regimental detachments and the Ambulance Company performed all duties which fell to their lot in a satisfactory manner.

4. RECOMMENDATIONS.

a. That an effort be made to secure a noncommissioned officer from the Cooks and Bakers School for each Regiment during the period of training.

b. That another latrine be erected in the rear of the first squadron

of the 113th Cavalry, and that the third present latrine from the South be assigned permanently to the 168th Infantry.

c. That an effort be made to have the officer of the guard more fully appreciate his duties regarding the instruction of the guard posted at the latrines.

d. That some steps be taken to encourage swimming upon the part of the enlisted men, in order to secure full value from the money invested in the Swimming Pool.

e. That a receptacle be placed next to the road in the rear of each company or troop street to receive the debris which accumulates in this area and which is scattered and blown around when not hauled away promptly.

My dear Governor:

I am submitting, herewith, my report of my trip to Camp Knox, Ky., for the purpose of attending the annual encampment of the 185th Field Artillery, Iowa National Guard.

Accompanied by Major H. D. Coe, Q. M. U. S. P. & D. Officer, I left Des Moines over the C., R. I. & P. Ry., at 11:45 a. m., Sunday, August 23rd, and arrived in Louisville, Ky., at 8:30 Monday morning, where we were met by Colonel Ward, Commanding 185th Field Artillery, with automobile. We started immediately for Camp Knox, which is located about 35 miles from Louisville, and in the Kentucky mountains. On arrival at Camp Knox we changed to uniforms, called on the Commanding General, and then went out to the ranges where the troops were firing their problems.

I found the Iowa troops quartered in the best area in the camp, which had recently been vacated by the C. M. T. C. students. The barracks, mess halls, bath houses, etc., were in excellent condition, the windows being all screened, the mess halls equipped with tables and chairs, and many other conveniences were provided.

In addition to the Iowa troops, there were encamped the 37th Division and 62nd Field Artillery Brigade Ohio National Guard, the 53rd and 54th Machine Gun Squadrons, Kentucky National Guard, one regiment Cavalry, Kentucky National Guard, and two Tank companies belonging to the 37th Division.

On Wednesday, August 26th, the Iowa troops participated in a review held in honor of the Governor of Ohio, the receiving party consisted of the Governor of Ohio, Major General Robert L. Howze, Commanding 5th Corps Area, Major General Benson Hough, Commanding 37th Division.

Brig. General Harold M. Bush, Commanding 67th F. A. Brigade; Brig. General Altman, Commanding Fort Benjamin Harrison, Brig. General Henderson, Adjutant General Ohio, and Brig. General Louis G. Lasher, Adjutant General of Iowa. One of the most interesting and instructive problems fired by our troops was the one fired with airplane observation. Two planes from Wilbur Wright Field, Fairfield, Ohio, were assigned for this purpose. This event, which was quite unusual in National Guard training, added greatly to the morale of the Iowa Units.

The presence of the U. S. P. & D. Officer, Iowa, made possible the efficient handling of the financial and property accounting, and the handling of the entraining for departure for home station.

The troops were paid before leaving camp and all financial obligations were settled.

It is recommended and urged that the Governor plan to spend at least one day, next year, with the Iowa Artillery Troops, during their encampment period.

I arrived in Des Moines the evening of Thursday, August 27th, well satisfied and proud of the 185th Field Artillery, Iowa National Guard.

SECTION VIII—SWIMMING POOL REGULATIONS FOR ALL CAMPS. REGULATIONS FOR THE CAMP SWIMMING POOL

August 2, 1925.

In the interest of safety from mechanical injury and communicable diseases to the users of the camp swimming pool the following regulations are promulgated and will be strictly enforced:

POOL HOURS:

The hours during which the pool will be open for use by members of the command will be 9:00 A. M., to 12 noon; 1:00 P. M., to 5:00 P. M.; 6:00 P. M., to 9:00 P. M.

The general public will be admitted from 9:00 A. M., to 6:00 P. M. When admitted the public will pay the fee which has hitherto been charged, and they will be subject to all of the regulations established for the men of the Iowa National Guard.

The use of the pool at any other hours than those specified is prohibited. The guard will see that no unauthorized person is in the pool, bath house or the enclosure when the pool is not open for use.

CONDUCT OF BATHERS:

All bathers will take a thorough shower bath before entering the pool. Such bath will be taken with soap and warm water when practicable and will be taken with the body uncovered. Particular attention will be paid to the hair, feet, buttocks and arm pits. Evidence of insufficient bathing will result in denial of entrance to the pool enclosure.

No persons who are suffering from communicable diseases will be permitted to use the pool. Persons who have venereal diseases, colds, sores, boils, inflamed eyes, or other evidences of such condition will be excluded. Persons who have paid fees for the use of the pool and

are excluded for the reason that they are believed to be suffering from communicable infections will receive their money back on application to the superintendent of life guards.

No person who has an open wound or large area from which the outer skin has been removed will be allowed to use the pool on account of the possibility of infection.

A matron will be stationed in the women's dressing room, and a guard in the men's dressing room to see that persons who are to use the pool take ample shower baths as provided above and that persons who have communicable infections are excluded as far as possible from use of the pool. They will require the bathers to maintain order and to keep the dressing rooms in a proper state of cleanliness.

A guard will be stationed at the entrance of the pool to see that all persons entering the pool show evidence of adequate bathing and that the work of the life guards is unhampered.

Roughness in the pool is prohibited. Pushing persons into the pool, ducking others, running about the pool edge and any sort of violent games likely to lead to injury to others or the participants will be immediately punished by expulsion from the pool enclosure.

Spitting into the pool water, or blowing the nose into it is prohibited. Life guards will be obeyed by all persons within the pool enclosure. They will under no circumstances be interfered with in the performance of their duties. The persons using the pool will not act as volunteer life-savers because such action is likely to interfere with the prompt rescue of the endangered person and may result in endangering the would-be rescuer as well as others.

Proper order will be maintained at all times. Littering the vicinity of the pool enclosure and bath house by papers, and other debris will not be permitted. Smoking will not be allowed within the pool enclosure. Persons in street clothes will be excluded from the pool enclosure except when engaged in the performance of official business.

GUARD:

A guard detail of a corporal and five men from one organization will be provided each day for police and guard of the pool. They will report to the Special Sanitary Officer, or in his absence to the civilian Superintendent of Life Guards, at 8 A. M.

The grounds and bath house will be carefully policed by 9 A. M.

At 9 A. M., the detail will be posted as follows:

Corporal: In charge of detail and relief.

Post A. Vicinity of steps from east drive way. Duty: Maintenance of order in vicinity of steps, entrance to ladies dressing room. Assist guard on Post No. 3 in the control of traffic and parking of cars. Jointly with D maintain order on porch.

Post B. Inside of men's shower. Duty: Supervision of bathing. Inspection of men and boy bathers. Maintenance of order and cleanliness in dressing room and locker room.

Post C. At gate to pool. Duty: Inspection of all bathers for evidence of adequate bathing, particular inspection of feet for cleanliness.

Maintenance of order in pool enclosure. Enforcement of the orders of the life guard. Assisting the life guards in an emergency.

Post D. Vicinity of West steps. Maintain order and prevent littering of space in vicinity of steps, and about concession building. Jointly with A maintain order on porch and in space between bath house and pool enclosure. Prevent damage to shrubbery. Send back any cars entering pool drive from lower entrance.

Extra man: To act as relief on instruction of corporal.

Hours of the guard detail: The guard will be continuously on duty from 9:00 A. M., till 9:00 P. M., with the exception of from 12:00 noon to 1:00 P. M., and from 5:00 to 6:00 P. M.

In view of the long hours of the detail they will be permitted to occupy chairs in the vicinity of their posts so long as this does not interfere with the prompt discharge of the duties involved.

The guard detail will wear side arms.

Equipment for the police of the pool and bath house will be supplied by the Superintendent of Life Guards.

Upon completion of the duty for the day the guard will report to the Special Sanitary Officer, or in his absence to the civilian Superintendent of Life Guards and they will then be instructed to return to their organization.

I.

Under the provisions of my letter, dated May 12, 1925, and authorized by your Excellency on May 26, 1925, a school for all officers Iowa National Guard was held at Camp Dodge, Iowa, June 23 to 26 inclusive. The purpose of the school is to bring the officers, from all arms included in the

Iowa National Guard service together at one time, and give them a course of intensive training preparatory to the annual camp in August.

The program for the school was prepared by the Adjutant General in conference with the following officers commanding organizations larger than a Battalion.

Major General M. A. Tinley.

Brig. General Lloyd D. Ross.

Colonel Glenn C. Haynes.

Colonel Park A. Findley.

Colonel W. H. Bailey.

Lt. Col. W. S. Conkling.

Lt. Col. Knud Boberg.

Lt. Col. Harry Ward.

Certain officers of the Guard were designated to prepare detailed lesson sheets, giving under appropriate headings, a list of subjects to be covered, the questions to be asked and proper text book references noted after each subject.

The subjects to be covered were divided as follows:

1. Discipline and personal appearance.
2. Hygiene and care of the body.
3. Troop Leading.
4. Squad, Section, Platoon and Communications.
5. Fire designations, positions, arms, etc.
6. Company and Battalion.
7. Auxiliary Arms (organization, intelligence, etc.)
8. Trains, Ammunition supply, etc.
9. Marches (preparation, advance guard and position of various arms).
10. Approach, attack, etc., (all arms).
11. Medical Units (their functions).
12. Reorganization of positions (all arms).

The above subjects were submitted to all officers with instructions to prepare themselves on those subjects.

This particular school was somewhat of an innovation, as it was conducted and carried out by the officers of the Iowa Guard. They furnished their own instructors who acquitted themselves to the credit of both the Iowa National Guard and themselves.

The Regular Army Instructors on duty with the State were present as observers, and expressed themselves as highly pleased and satisfied with the results obtained.

All officers recommend a similar school for 1926, and are unanimous in their opinion it was the best school ever held in Iowa.

Subject: Four (4) Day School for Officers, Iowa National Guard.

To: Division, Brigade and Regimental Commanders.

1. Due to lack of funds the War Department has disapproved all Schools of Instruction, Rifle Camps of Instruction and Rifle Competitions, at Federal expense, for the calendar year 1925.

2. In view of the above this office contemplates holding a Four Day School for Officers, Iowa National Guard, at Camp Dodge, June 23, to 26th, inclusive, at State expense, and under the following conditions.

(a) This office will furnish transportation from home station to Camp Dodge and return.

(b) A per-diem allowance of 7.00 per day will be authorized for all officers, irrespective of grade, for five (5) days. The extra day's per diem is to cover the period of travel.

(c) All officers will be expected to report to the Commanding Officer of the School, not later than 8 A. M., the morning of June 23.

(d) Quarters will be furnished by this office, and cots will be provided. Each officer will bring his own bedding roll, etc., as no mattresses, pillows or other bedding is available.

(e) This office will arrange for and conduct the officers mess, and

each officer will be charged his proportionate share of the expense incident thereto.

(f) Service uniform will be worn. All officers will bring in addition to their personal equipment the following:

Side Arms.

Note Book.

Pencils.

All maps reading instruments they possess.

Text books covering lesson subjects, as will be indicated on lesson sheets, to be furnished each officer at a later date.

the following program was determined upon.

(a) The first two days June 23 and 24, the various branches of the service will work separately, but in co-ordinated lines of work, in the following order:

1st Day

A. M.—Reporting Arrival.

Assignment to Quarters.

Assignment to Sections and Classes.

Distribution of lesson sheets, etc.

P. M.—Preliminary lecture and lessons to each section, on short comings and irregularities. Discipline, general appearance, dress, etc. One hour and fifteen minutes practical demonstration and correction of errors. Map making and map reading, conventional signs, etc.

2nd Day

A. M.—Troop leading—basic principles—governing formation, squad, section and platoon.

Lecture and lessons on above followed by demonstration of squad and section with communication.

Lecture and lesson, general principles governing, platoon, fire designation position, arms, etc.

P. M.—Lecture and lesson company and Battalion, followed by demonstration.

Lecture and lesson Communications, establishment headquarters.

3rd Day

All work will be accomplished by the personnel of the School, together and not separately as followed the first two days.

A. M.—Lecture and lesson Auxiliary Arms—basic principles of organization, intelligence, etc., followed by practical demonstration.

Lecture and lessons, trains, ammunition supply, etc.

P. M.—Lectures and Lessons, Marches, preparation for same, advance guard, position of various arms, etc.

These lectures and conferences to develop from each arm of the service represented, and to include "Communications."

4th Day

- A. M.—Lecture and lesson, on approach, organization, attack, etc. Cavalry, Infantry, by squad, section, platoon and company. Battalion of Artillery use and location.
- Medical Units, location use and function.
- Establishment of posts of communications, shelter, etc. All followed by practical demonstration.
- P. M.—Lecture and lesson, Reorganization of Positions, passage of lines, cavalry, artillery, infantry reports made daily by each.
- Conference, general summing up of work of school.

5th Day

Pay—settling of mess accounts, departure for home station.

4. The above program requires the designation of a certain number of officers to prepare detailed lesson sheets, giving under appropriate headings, a list of subjects to be covered and questions to be asked, with proper text book references, noted after each subject. These subjects may properly be divided as follows:

1. Discipline and Personal appearance.
2. Hygiene and care of body.
3. Troop leading.
4. Squad, Section, Platoon and Communications.
5. Fire Designations, position, arms, etc.
6. Company and Battalion.
7. Auxiliary Arms (organization, Intelligence, etc.)
8. Trains, Ammunition supply, etc.
9. Marches (preparation, advance guard, position of various arms.)
10. Approach, attack, etc. (all arms.)
11. Medical Units (their functions.)
12. Reorganization of positions (all arms).

It is therefore desired that the Brigade Commander, 67th Infantry Brigade, designate such officers he desires, to prepare the lessons for Infantry subjects. The Chief Surgeon, will designate such officers he desires to prepare the lessons for M. C. subjects.

The Regimental Commander, 113th Cavalry, will designate such officers he desires to prepare the lessons for Cavalry subjects.

The Regimental Commander, 185th Field Artillery, will designate such officers he desires to prepare the lessons for the Artillery subjects.

These officers will be the directors under the Commanding Officer of their various arms, for the sections or classes, studying the lessons prepared by them. They will conduct such classes in the manner prescribed by the Commandant of the School.

All officers will be expected to prepare themselves on the subjects and lessons submitted to them in advance and they will be called upon by the

director to conduct certain phases of the lessons and practical demonstration.

5. The designation of officers indicated above will be accomplished at once, and their names forwarded, one copy to this office and one copy to Brig. General Lloyd D. Ross, 925 W. Grand Ave., Des Moines, Iowa.

General Ross will prepare a definite program to be followed by the officers selected to prepare the lessons, and by not later than Tuesday, May 19, 1925, hold a conference with the officers selected, in the Adjutant General's Office, State House, Des Moines, Iowa, for the purpose of co-ordinating the work of preparing the lessons.

This office will authorize, transportation and expenses for the purpose indicated.

6. The lesson sheets should be prepared and submitted to General Ross for his approval, and by him to General M. A. Tinley for approval, by not later than May 27th, so that they may reach this office not later than May 31, for final approval.

This office will publish them and make advance distribution to all officers, thus permitting them to prepare themselves for the School.

Subject: Comments Officers School Program.
To: The Adjutant General, Iowa.

1. I feel a very comprehensive program has been submitted and that same is just as decided upon at the recent conference. I am sure you feel as I do; much has been accomplished in the very short time all who were working on same had at their disposal. That the idea is in a measure new to all of us—hence time could not be estimated in advance. The frame work for a good course of instruction has been mapped out and its success now depends upon the team work and class arrangement.

2. With proper use of our own trained specialist and the Regular corps of Instructors on duty with the State we can arrange the classes so the greatest number of officers will be available for the various classes.

3. Co-ordination of work as laid down in Cavalry and Infantry programs on Troop Leading, Intelligence, Map Making, Map reading, Conventional signs plus the work that applies merely to each individual service will require subdivision of work, classes and Instructors. Classes must be small enough to give the Instructor an opportunity to put his "stuff" over, and so rotated that all will get the general instruction.

4. All services should have their preliminary work out of the way so that by afternoon at the latest of the third day all will be ready to take the special instruction together of the Auxiliary Arms and Specialties.

5. Fourth day should develop a good combined program—Intelligence, Medical, Map work, Establishment of Post of Command, March, March discipline, Preparation for March, Security, Use of Auxiliary Arms and Services, Approach march, Attack, Passage of Lines, Pursuit, etc.

6. Then the final wind up with special work on deficiencies, prepara-

tion for summer camp and such other work as may develop in the minds and experience of Unit Commanders.

7. If with these suggestions and such as Unit Commanders at Des Moines the schedule can be worked out without conference—well and good. If not we can get together at your order and shortly whip the affair in shape.

8. I wish to express my appreciation of the comprehensive work that has been done by the various ones who worked on the program; it is especially to be commended as they had little of definite instruction from which to get our ideas on the program. You no doubt recall the wonderful notes of mine you had to work over.

School opened on Tuesday, June 23d, with the assignment of officers to their quarters, mess hall and classes. Major General Tinley delivered the opening lecture on objects of the school and the methods to be used in reaching the objectives.

Instructors. The plan of using National Guard officers as instructors proved its worth from the start. It was clearly demonstrated that the Iowa National Guard has the material for instructors within its own ranks and that they have the ability not only to give a lecture on the subjects assigned but they also can plan and carry out practical demonstrations in connection with it.

Program. The program as outlined by the Executive Officer after consultation with the advisory board of the school and various officers which were ordered into Des Moines for consultation was carried out in every detail. All of the student officers gave strict attention to the lectures and demonstrations and showed a decided interest therein which speaks well for the success of the annual training period which soon follows the school.

Messing. The messing of the officers was very satisfactory. Major Pugsley demonstrating that an officers mess can be operated with a reasonable charge for service rendered.

Objectives. The objective of the school was to develop combat leadership and instill the principles of combat, starting with the fire units, which are the squad and section and including the tactical units which include the battalion and regiment. The work for the school was outlined with the idea that the same class of instruction would be included in the camp training program. The officers thereby getting the correct theory of combat leadership so that when they had troops appropriate to their command in camp they could proceed with the training without delay and thereby be able to impart more instruction to the enlisted men of their units.

Degree of proficiency attained. It was the universal opinion of all who attended the school that the plan of the training as carried out produced better results than any previous officers school. That those who prepared lectures and demonstrations gained by their study of their subjects and that the officers had the various subjects presented to them in such a way that they had been able to grasp the subject in a manner far beyond their expectations. It is believed that then the annual training period

will show the true value of the school and the proficiency attained by the individual officers.

Recommendations. It is recommended that a similar school be held during the year 1926 just previous to the annual training period. It is also recommended that the date of the school be determined far enough in advance in order that the program for it may be prepared and the different officers charged with lectures and demonstrations have sufficient time to get their subjects well in hand without undue study and preparation.

 12. Records and reports of the Medical Department, special stress being placed upon the sick and wounded report.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa.

In compliance with your letter of instructions dated June 29th, the following report on School of Instruction is submitted. The Schedule of Instruction as laid down prior to the departure for the School of Instruction was followed minutely. It was found that the officers were in need of the elementary instruction that the first two days afforded and considerable good was derived therefrom.

Aside from the instructive feature of the school which cannot be too strongly emphasized, this regiment gained a distinct advantage in morale in as much as it was possible to have all the officers of the regiment together for a four day period. It is not possible in the regular encampment of two weeks to improve the morale of the regiment as much as it was possible to foster it by the four day School of Instructions.

The administration of the school attained a very high degree of efficiency to the end that the officers were well quartered and well fed.

This office can offer very little in the way of constructive criticism with the exception that it strongly recommends that the School of Instruction be made an annual affair.

Subject: Observation, with reference to Officers School.

To: The Adjutant General, Des Moines, Iowa.

1. In accordance with your request in letter dated June 29th, 1925, I am herewith submitting a report as to my observations made during the school period, viz: June 23 to 27th, 1925.

2. The school opened Tuesday morning June 23rd, and the morning period was mostly spent by the officers in getting located. The first session after the noon hour was opened by General M. A. Tinley in a clearly defined outline as to why the school was ordered, and the things that were expected of the officers assembled for the school. The school it seems to me, was an innovation, in that it was conducted and carried on exclusively by the officers of the Iowa National Guard, from the executive officer, Brig. General Lloyd D. Ross, down to second Lieutenants

who acted in some instances as instructors. The program as outlined by Generals Tinley and Ross was carried out to the letter, and the instructors assigned to the various subjects, acquitted themselves with credit to both themselves and the whole Iowa National Guard.

One of the outstanding features of the school was the apparent interest shown by the officers assembled. As a rule all of the officers present were punctual, interested, and anxious to learn, these three qualifications make a school of this kind a pleasure, as well as a place of learning. Remarks were made by a great number of the officers that "It was the best school that they ever had attended," and considering the fact that the instruction was carried on entirely by the National Guard officers, it places all the more importance on the statement—A number of excellent papers or rather lectures were prepared by various officers assigned as instructors, and in each instance, they were excellent efforts and demonstrated the fact that a great deal of time had been put in on their preparation.

The messing was under the direct charge of Major Pugsley, and was well handled. There was a sufficient quantity, and the quality was good, and at this time I desire to commend the action of your office, in "mixing" the officers of the various regiments for sleeping and messing. This action was responsible for the officers of the regiments becoming better acquainted, thus insuring a more perfect comradeship.

Such officers as Major Downing, Captains Mallonee and Sawyer of the 168th Infantry and Captain Forbes, Lieutenants Grummond, Cox and Hall of the 133d certainly demonstrated the fact, that the Iowa National Guard has officers who are capable, efficient, and who are professionally qualified to instruct and to lead. Captains Rew, 133rd Inf., Sawyer, 67th Infantry Brigade and Lieutenant Grummond, 133rd Infantry, conducted a problem during the school, involving a Brigade, with Artillery attached that was most excellent in all respects. During the progress of the problem, various officers were interrogated as to the tactical principles involved, with very good results. In the mind of the undersigned, the outstanding features of the school, were as follows: The fact that the Iowa National Guard has officers who are capable of acting as instructors; the interest shown by the student officers; the absence of inattention, and the attendance, considering the fact that the annual camp of all the organizations will be held August 2nd.

In conclusion, I desire at this time, providing the availability of funds, to recommend that a school of this character be held next year. Too much importance cannot be made upon the results obtained, and the progress made.

The mess, under the direction of Major Pugsley, was exceedingly satisfactory.

Deficiencies. No deficiencies worthy of mention were observed.

Recommendations. It is strongly recommended that a similar school be conducted next year, at the same place and approximate time, and under similar conditions.

In my report for the last biennium, ending June 30, 1924, I gave a complete inventory of all land, buildings and utilities at and on Camp Dodge, to which may now be added the following:

9—Shelter stables for Cavalry Animals.....	\$21,425.00
1—Blacksmith Shop	275.00
1—Memorial Recreation Building.....	15,054.19
1—Six (6) Car Garages at Q. M. House.....	1,000.00
1—Baseball field and running track.....	200.00
1—Hay and Horse barn and out buildings.....	4,792.21

The above was accomplished at State expense. The Federal Government authorized at Federal expense, the rebuilding of all water mains in the west camp area, on which are located all buildings. This was completed at a total cost of approximately twenty thousand dollars. It is contemplated the rebuilding of the water main leading from pumping station to main reservoir during the spring of 1927, at Federal expense, provided funds are available for the purpose.

Authority and reservation of Federal Funds has been received for the construction of a new pistol range during the spring of 1927, at a cost of not to exceed four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00).

In addition to the normal duties in connection with the upkeep and maintenance of the property at Camp Dodge, the regular employees have accomplished the following:

- 1—Wrecked all old barns and out buildings.
- 2—Rebuilt sewer man holes.
- 3—Graded and graveled all roads.
- 4—Repaired pavements.
- 5—Built concrete walks at hospital, and regimental headquarters buildings.
- 6—Re-arranged the electric light wire system.
- 7—Wired all stable and horse shelters.
- 8—Trimmed all trees and shrubs.
- 9—Repaired all trucks and motor transportation used during camp.
- 10—Raised sufficient hay, oats and corn to maintain all animals kept on the reservation.
- 11—Put in plumbing, and lighting system in new recreation building.
- 12—Put in hot water plant at Hospital.
- 13—Repaired loading and unloading platforms on both sides of warehouses.
- 14—Repaired all railroad tracks on reservation.

At this time the facilities at Camp Dodge are ample to provide for the comfort of the troops, with the possible exception of proper drainage being provided in the area on which the tents are located. To accomplish this would require the services of a man with a definite knowledge of engineering, and the treatment of terrain problems which would be met.

THE ROSTER OF THE WORLD WAR AND THE MEXICAN BORDER SERVICE.

Since the Forty-first General Assembly authorized an appropriation of \$12,500.00 for the purpose of carrying on the preparation of the Roster of Iowa men and officers engaged in the World War and the Mexican Border Service, the work has proceeded under the direction of Governor John Hammill and Adjutant General Louis G. Lasher, members composing The Iowa War Roster Commission. The appropriation did not become available until July 1, 1925. Actual work was resumed September 15, 1925, when the commission employed A. M. Deyoe, Ex-State Superintendent of Public Instruction, to direct and supervise the preparation of material as provided in the law creating the War Roster Commission, passed by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly. The work has proceeded as nearly and completely as possible in accordance with the law which includes the following provisions:

1. Complete roster of all soldiers, sailors and marines of all grades who served in the army, navy or marine corps in the Mexican Border Service of 1916, and 1917 and the World's War of 1917, 1918 and 1919.
2. Appropriate Historical Sketches of the organizations in which any considerable number of Iowa men served.
3. Summary of casualties.
4. Lists of Iowa soldiers, sailors and marines captured by the enemy.
5. Those buried in national and foreign cemeteries.
6. Those decorated or cited for any cause by the United States or any of the allied governments.
7. Sketches of the selective service work in Iowa, with reference to the work of state headquarters, district, local, medical and legal advisory boards, and government appeal agents.

Our soldier and sailor boys made the supreme sacrifice; many of them to the extent of giving their lives. Some of them were taken by disease in camps, others faced the horrors of modern warfare in the trenches and on the open battlefield. We can honor them but we can never repay them in full for the service they rendered at the call of the Nation. A permanent record of the service of every man and every woman called should be prepared and published at the earliest date it can be accomplished.

Every care possible has been exercised by those in charge of the work to make the history and service records as authentic and complete as possible to date. The record of Iowa's part in the World War when published should include the latest corrected data sent out by the War and Navy Departments or that may be secured from every source. Proof copy when received from the printer should be read critically by competent

authority and provision should be made for this work. Accuracy will constitute the essence of historical value of the publication, and the state carries a moral obligation to this end. Therefore, the Forty-second General Assembly should provide for the employment of a person qualified to continue the work until publication is completed.

Copy will be submitted for publication before the close of the biennium, June 30, 1927. We urge that the publication of the History and Roster be carried out without unnecessary delay.

Division and Brigade Commanders will render semi-annually to the Adjutant General an account current, on regular form provided for the purpose, showing receipt of state warrant, date and number, amount and in the proper columns expenditures for rent, supplies, clerk hire, postage, telegraph and telephone, and miscellaneous expenses, with the proper receipts attached.

To all Regimental, Battalion and Squadron Commanders the sum of \$300.00 per year, each, or so much thereof as is necessary, when the headquarters of such commanders are maintained in a building where other military organizations are housed. A lease must be filed with the Adjutant General's office for approval, and the amount of rent called for in such lease not in excess of the allowance, will be the amount paid.

EQUIPMENT AUTHORIZED

Any .22 Caliber Rifle with metallic sights, ordinarily used in gallery target practice and not equipped with telescopic sights. Any .22 ammunition. Padded shooting coats. Tables to fire from. Mats for floor tables. Earth or sand filled shooting boxes.

TIME OF FIRING

The official Indoor Practice to begin January 5th, 1925, and to end on April 14th, 1925. These dates not however to prohibit preliminary practice which may be had prior to January 5th.

ORDER OF FIRING

First class to fire.—Officers Matches. All officers to be required to fire the record course prior to the enlisted men firing. This to acquaint them with the course to be fired and to qualify them to give instruction to other members of their respective commands. Officers Matches to be fired between January 5th and 11th, 1925, both dates inclusive.

Second class to fire.—Privates 1st class and Privates Matches, privates 1st class and privates to be divided into two classes or teams, captained by a commissioned officer. The class or team captains to choose their classes or teams alternately. This to give these men their share of firing, and to insure against any neglect of training in the fundamentals of Marksmanship. Matches to be fired between January 12th and March 8th, 1925, both dates inclusive.

Third class to fire.—Corporals Matches. These men are Non-Commissioned officers by virtue of their knowledge of certain duties, one of which is Marksmanship. They will assist in giving instructions in the Second class to fire and will fire their matches between March 9th and 22nd, 1925, both dates inclusive.

Fourth class to fire.—Sergeants Matches. These men are Non-Commis-

shoned officers by virtue of their knowledge of certain duties, one of which is Marksmanship. They will assist in giving instruction in the Second and Third Classes to fire, and will fire their Matches between March 23rd and April 6th, 1925, both dates inclusive.

Fifth class to fire.—Company or Troop Matches. This Match to be open to officers and enlisted men, and to be fired for the State Championship, carrying with it the class "A" Trophy which is emblematic of the Gallery Championship of the Iowa National Guard. Three other trophies, namely: Class "B," Class "C" and Class "D," to be awarded in the order named to the Companies or Troops whose teams have the next three high scores. These trophies to be suitably engraved and deposited with the organizations winning them for a period of one year, at the end of which time they will be returned to the office of the Adjutant General. These Matches to be fired beginning April 7th and ending on April 14th, 1925, both dates inclusive. The Company or Troop Team to consist of sixteen men to fire, the ten highest scores to count. (Any organization showing less than 60% of their enlisted having fired the prescribed course will not be allowed to participate in the final competition for the Company or Troop Match trophies.)

Sixth class to fire.—Battalion or Squadron Matches. The total aggregate score of the twelve highest individual aggregate scores fired in any of the battalions or squadrons, when added together will determine the winner of this match.

Seventh class to fire.—Regimental Matches. The total aggregate score of the twelve highest individual aggregate scores fired in any of the regiments, when added together will determine the winner of this match.

RULES IN GENERAL GOVERNING THE FIRING

Practice Firing.—Unlimited preliminary practice may be had prior to the dates set for the firing for record.

Firing for record.—A score once begun to be completed for that position without other sighting shot than those which preceded the score being fired.

Targets.—All Record Targets to be marked official, and be furnished by the Adjutant General on Requisition in time for the Record Firing, same to be paid for at actual cost from Range Funds. No firing other than for Record to be done on these targets. A sufficient number of Connoley Indoor Targets are on hand and will be furnished free by the Adjutant General, on requisition. No firing other than preliminary to be done on these targets.

Supervision of firing.—All record firing must be done under the supervision of a commissioned officer. As soon as the score is completed, the supervising officer will enter in ink or indelible pencil, the value of the hits beginning with the one of highest value and ending with the one of lowest value, on the target, cause the target to be signed by the competitor, sign same himself and then give it to the organization commander for disposition. Rank or grade must follow the name of the officer or competitors.

Reports.—Each organization commander will mail the completed cer-

tified targets to the Adjutant General only after ten or more men shall have finished their firing. The last targets fired to be mailed not later than 12:00 o'clock midnight of April 14th, 1925.

Auto Rifle Machine Gun, Howitzer and Trench Mortar firing to be done in accordance with Training regulations applicable to each arm. Scores and records to be kept and handled in accordance with the instructions for same and as given in Training Regulations governing the subject.

JUNE SCHOOL OF INSTRUCTION COURSE TO BE FIRED

Course "C" to be fired by riflemen as outlined in TR. 150-10. Mounted and Dis-Mounted Pistol Course to be fired by those armed with the Pistol and as outlined in War Department Document No. 1050. Auto Rifle, Machine Gun, Howitzer and Trench Mortar firing for instruction and exhibition only.

RANGE PRACTICE AT STATE RANGE DURING THE ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

Who to fire, and course to be fired.—All organizations armed with the rifle to fire Course "C" for Record under the provisions of T. R. 150-10.

All organizations armed with the Pistol to fire the Record Course as prescribed for that arm in War Department Document No. 1050. Pistol Marksmanship.

All men armed with the Automatic Rifle to fire Course "C" for record as prescribed for that arm in TR. 150-30. The Automatic Riflemen of each regiment to be assembled to fire the course immediately after the rifle firing has been completed by their respective regiments.

All organizations armed with the Machine Gun to fire Course "B" for record as prescribed for that arm in TR. 150-35.

All organizations armed with the 37 mm. and Trench Mortar Materiel to conduct Schools of Instruction in the training and application of this materiel, and to conduct examinations for qualifications in accordance with the provisions as prescribed in TR. 150-40.

FINAL COMPETITION WITH THE RIFLE

On the date set for the final competition each organization commander entitled to enter competitors, will cause two enlisted men to report to the Range Executive Officer as representatives for his organization. These men to be picked and who by performances have demonstrated their ability in firing as the best shots in their organization. The names of the men to be submitted to the Range Executive Officer on a date set by him and prior to the date set for the competition. The Range Executive Officer will arrange for a range personnel of sufficient size to conduct the fire of the recommended course in approximately two hours following the firing of the first shot.

INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The individual firing the highest total aggregate score in this competition to be announced as the Individual Championship winner.

COMPANY, TROOP OR DETACHMENT WINNER

The two men from any organization, firing the highest total aggregate score, determined by adding their respective total aggregate scores, that organization from which they reported to be announced as the Company, Troop or Detachment winner.

BATTALION OR SQUADRON WINNER

The highest total aggregate score, determined by adding the total aggregate scores of each man from the several Battalions or Squadrons represented, will determine the winner of the Battalion or Squadron Match.

REGIMENTAL WINNER

That Regiment producing the Battalion or Squadron winner to be announced as the winner of the Regimental Matches.

NOTE OF SPECIAL IMPORT

Present advices seem to indicate the idea that Annual Encampments should furnish more advanced training, hence, it must be kept in mind that a maximum of training in the Small Arms practice must be carried on at the Home Station Ranges, both Indoor and Outdoor. Indications are that no preliminary firing will be had at the Annual Encampment and only a minimum of time allowed for record practice.

1. The Secretary of War, through the Militia Bureau, pursuant to order of the President dated March 17, 1925, advises that no expenditures for Armory Drill Pay will be permitted from any part of the one million three hundred and thirty-two thousand dollars made available by the second deficiency act, fiscal year 1925.

2. In view of the situation involving Armory Drill pay for the remainder of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, the following is effective at once.

(a) Immediate steps will be taken by Commanding Officers of Companies, Troops and Batteries, Iowa National Guard, to discharge with honor all enlisted men in excess of the authorized maintenance strength of sixty-five (65). These discharges effective March 31, 1925. In the procedure followed, great care will be exercised in selecting men for discharge, so as to insure the retention of only the best type of soldier, with the longest unexpired enlistment contract.

(b) The Federal funds from which Armory Drill pay is authorized, are insufficient to pay for more than (5) drill periods the last quarter of this fiscal year (April, May and June). To meet this situation, all Corps, Division, Brigade or other Federally Recognized units, Iowa National Guard, will receive pay for drill attendance as follows:

April	2 drills.
May	2 drills.
June	1 drill.

Nothing in this order shall be construed to prevent the holding of as many drills as may be deemed advisable, but under no circumstances will additional drills be ordered unless all concerned are willing to volunteer for such additional drills, without pay. It is hoped that all officers and enlisted men, will continue for the short period involved, to attend at least the minimum number of four drills per month and thus main-

tain the high standard of efficiency and training the Iowa National Guard has reached.

(c) It is realized that the policy adopted, and herein published, will in some instances, cause a reduction in non-commissioned grades, and for the time indicated reduce the amount of pay of officers and men, but in view of the only other alternative that of disbanding almost a third of the units now composing the Iowa Guard, it has been determined as the best policy for meeting the situation. This office therefore, expects the unqualified cooperation of all concerned.

(d) All responsible officers are directed to post a copy of this order on the bulletin board of their organization, and have it read at at least two drill assemblies.

Subject: Instructions of The President of the United States contained in letter dated March 31, 1925, with reference to funds for armory drill pay for the National Guard during the fiscal year 1925.

To: The Adjutant General of Iowa:

1. In furtherance of instructions contained in telegram (radiogram or cable) dated Militia Bureau, April 2, 1925, with reference to Armory Drill pay for fiscal year 1925, the Secretary of War directs me to communicate to you the following for your information and guidance:

"a. The president has, by order dated March 31, 1925, authorized expenditures from the \$1,332,000.00 heretofore held in a nonapportioned status, of such sums as will, together with monies already apportioned, permit each Nation Guard unit to hold a total of forty-eight armory drills during the fiscal year 1925 in case of all such units which have been under status of Federal Recognition during the whole of this fiscal year. Units of the National Guard Federally recognized during current fiscal year will be allowed their proportionate share of forty-eight drills. Until further orders no unit will be paid for more than forty-eight drills or its proportionate share thereof during the fiscal year 1925."

2. All instructions heretofore issued contrary to the above are hereby revoked.

Under the provisions of above quoted letter great care must be taken that number of drills claimed on payroll for the quarters ending June 30, 1925, does not exceed the difference between number of drills held for which pay has been claimed during period July 1, 1924 and March 31, 1925, and the total number of drills authorized for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, which is 48 drills.

For example:

If an organization has claimed pay for 45 drills for the period July 1, 1924, to March 31, 1925, only 3 drills may be entered on payroll for the Quarter April 1, to June 30, 1925.

As this reduction in number of paid drills will affect the next three months only, it is hoped that officers and enlisted men have sufficient pride and interest in their organization to attend the necessary number of drills to keep up the high standard of efficiency of the Iowa National Guard.

All instructions heretofore issued contrary to the above are hereby revoked.

In view of the above authority it is estimated that the balance remaining on hand of the Armory drill fund allotted the state, after payrolls for quarter ending March 31, 1925, have been paid will be barely sufficient to meet the payrolls of the quarter ending June 30, 1925, on the basis indicated in above quoted telegram.

Until further orders, each unit will be authorized pay for not to exceed one drill each week during the quarter ending June 30, 1925, provided the total number of drills held by each unit during the entire fiscal year does not exceed 60 drills.

Great care must be taken when payrolls are submitted after June 30th that no roll shows more than one drill for each week nor more than 12 drills for the quarter and that the total drills for the entire year ending June 30, 1925, is in excess of 60.

This school will be participated in by all officers, Iowa National Guard.

Lt. Colonel Knud Boberg, State Staff Corps and Department AGD, is detailed as Adjutant for the School.

Major Everett L. Pugsley, QMC, S. S. C. & D., is detailed as Mess Officer, and assistant to the Quartermaster.

5. The commandant of the School, assisted by the Executive Officer, and such other officers they may desire, will prepare the program and schedule for the school, which will be based on the general scheme outlined in Memorandum No. 6, this office, addressed to Division, Brigade and Regimental Commanders.

6. The Adjutant of the School, will under the direction of the Commandant, issue all orders, make all reports, keep all records and rosters, and will assign all officers attending the school their quarters. He will keep all data in connection with and the preparation of the pay rolls, and act as finance officer for the school. He will be assisted in this

work by such clerical and stenographic personnel from the Adjutant General's office as he may deem necessary.

7. The Quartermaster will prepare and issue all transportation requests, prepare all buildings, kitchens and mess halls, in advance of the school dates. He will equip all buildings designated as officers quarters with cots. He will have water turned on and all plumbing tested and kitchen ranges and ice boxes cleaned and ready for use. He will make all purchases and keep accurate account thereof and will, assisted by the Mess Officer, conduct a consolidated mess, the expense of which will be pro-rated among the officers attending the school and settlement made at the time the rolls are paid. The following buildings will be reserved and prepared for school use:

Regimental Headquarters Building, 168th Infantry,

Regimental Headquarters Building, 113th Cavalry,

at least two and if necessary three kitchens and mess halls, located closest to the above requested headquarters buildings, for the consolidated mess. As many mess halls as may be necessary to be fitted up for sleeping quarters.

The mess bills for officers, who are employees of the State, and who in consequence, cannot under the law, receive the per diem allowance, will be rendered to this office, as a proper charge against the state.

8. The Mess Officer will give his personal attention to providing a well balanced and attractive mess. He will make requisition on the Quartermaster for all supplies necessary to insure satisfaction. He will employ the necessary cooks and assistants, waiters, etc., and be responsible for them and their duties.

9. All officers, irrespective of grade, (except those drawing pay from the state, as regular employees of the State) will receive a per diem allowance of \$7.00 per day, for five (5) days, the additional pay in excess of the actual four days school period, to cover the travel period. All officers will receive transportation from home station to Camp Dodge and return.

10. Service uniform with side arms will be worn. Bedding roll will be brought. Cots will be furnished but no mattress, pillows or blankets are available. All officers should include in their personal equipment, a bathing suit as the swimming pool will be open for use. All officers will bring with them all Training Regulations.

11. As has been indicated in par. 7, herein, a consolidated mess will be maintained under the direction of the Quartermaster. Each officer will be charged his proportionate share of the actual cost of the mess.

12. Pay rolls will be in readiness on the morning of Saturday, June 27th, for payment, and mess accounts will be settled at that time, except as herein otherwise provided.

13. Officers traveling by personal automobile will be allowed the equivalent to actual railroad fare, between home station and Camp Dodge and return. To benefit under this authority, officers will be requested to return transportation requests to the Adjutant and accomplish certificate covering railroad fare equivalent, on form prepared by the Adjutant.

14. The Senior Instructors and the officers herein designated as directors will report to the Commandant of the school not later than

seven (7) P. M. Monday, June 22, 1925, for final conference. All other officers will report to Commandant, not later than eight (8) A. M. the morning of June 23, 1925. Quarters will be available any time Monday, June 22, 1925, but the mess will not be open until Tuesday, June 23rd, breakfast being the first meal served. Quarters will be assigned by the Adjutant to each officer when he reports himself present.

15. The Quartermaster will issue the necessary transportation.

16. The travel directed, the per diem allowed, and the expense incident to the school, is necessary in the Military Service of the State.

- (d) Reading of Declaration of Independence.
- (e) Address (emphasizing the historical occasion when Congress first pledged the man power and resources of the Country for National Defense.)
- (f) Benediction.

2. It is therefore directed that all Unit Commanders, Iowa National Guard, take the necessary action to insure the participation of their Unit in the ceremonies for the day. To accomplish this, the local committee should be communicated with, and every effort made to cooperate and assist them with their plans.

Enrollment for the day will be made, the same as last year, and these enrolled men, if possible to do so, should wear an arm band indicating they are a part of your unit.

- The Forty-first General Assembly of Iowa reduced the appropriation for the National Guard of Iowa, from Five Hundred Fifty Thousand dollars (\$550,000.00) allowed for the past biennium period, to Four Hundred Sixty Thousand Six Hundred Forty dollars (\$460,640.00) for the next biennium, beginning July 1, 1925.
- This reduction can be met without seriously affecting the administration of National Guard affairs in Iowa with the following exceptions:
 - No new units can be organized in Iowa for the next two years, ending June 30, 1927.
 - All Armory Allowance will necessarily have to be reduced to meet the funds made available for that purpose; our present allowances for Armories amounts to \$234,491.68, for the past biennium and only \$225,000.00 has been appropriated for the next two years.
- It is possible that authority may be obtained from the War Department to organize the Division Headquarters Company, Headquarters Detachment and Special Division Troops, 34th Division, and that sufficient State funds may become available to insure proper support for those units.
- Beginning July 1, 1925, and up to and including June 30, 1927, all Armory allowances now in effect will be reduced 10%, and the allowances indicated here below will prevail:

ALLOWANCE FOR POSTAGE, TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH

Beginning July 1, 1925, and up to and including June 30, 1927, all allowances for postage, telephones, and telegraph, known as "Headquarters Allowance" will be reduced 10% and the allowances indicated here below will prevail:

- Chief Surgeon, not to exceed \$9.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Judge Advocate, not to exceed \$9.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Chief Ordnance Officer, not to exceed \$9.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Regimental Commanders, not to exceed \$67.50 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Reg. M. C. Commanding Officers, not to exceed \$9.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Bn. & Sqdn. Commanding Officers, not to exceed \$9.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.
- Company, Troop, Battery or other units having like administrative duties, not to exceed \$18.00 per year, beginning July 1, 1925.

It will be understood that the above allowances are the maximum, and it is expected that only so much as necessary will be expended. It is emphasized that this allowance is for postage, telegraph and telephone, only. Each officer affected will render at the end of each semi-annual period (June 30 and Dec. 31) a certified statement covering amount expended, itemized as to postage, long distant telephone and telegraph messages. He is required to file with his claim, receipted bills for tele-

phone toll charges and copies of telegrams sent, or which he received and paid for. Failure to conform to these regulations will discontinue payment of the allowance by this office, until receipt of reports, etc.

Each and every responsible officer should take the question of reduced Armory allowances before the party or parties from whom their Armory is leased, explain the situation, and endeavor to obtain a reduction in rentals to meet this situation. It must be understood, that no relief can be had for the next two years, the appropriations are made, and have become the law, governing expenditures for Armory and other allowances. This office must enforce the provisions of the law.

I. Annual Field Training Iowa National Guard. Pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 92, National Defense Act, approved June 3, 1916, as amended June 4, 1920, encampments for instruction in field training and target practice of the Iowa National Guard will be held during the following periods:

Headquarters and Staff 34th Div., to Fort Snelling, Minn.....	Sept. 6-20
State Staff Corps and Departments—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
Hq. and Hq. Co. 67th Infantry Brig.—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
186th Ambulance Company—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
113th Cavalry—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
168th Infantry—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
133rd Infantry—to Camp Dodge, Iowa.....	Aug. 2-16
185th Field Artillery—to Camp Knox, Ky.....	Aug. 16-30

Where practicable, all organizations, except advance detachments, will leave their home stations on dates specified as the first day of their encampment, and all organizations will leave camp so as to arrive at their home stations on the dates of the expiration of the encampment period in each case.

II. Advance and Rear Detachments: There will be no rear detachment retained after the close of camp, at Camp Dodge. An advance detachment is authorized and hereby ordered to report four days in advance, to the Adjutant General at Camp Dodge, for the purpose of preparing the camp for reception of troops.

The following is authorized and cannot be exceeded:

Service Company—less Band—168th Infantry.

Service Company—less Band—133rd Infantry.

Service Troop—less Band—113th Cavalry.

1 Officer and 3 Enlisted men—State Staff Corps and Departments.

1 Officer and 3 Enlisted men—67th Infantry Brigade Hq. Co.

1 Officer and 3 Enlisted men—186th Ambulance Company.

The 185th Field Artillery—are authorized a two day advance detachment and two day rear detachment, consisting of the following, which cannot be exceeded:

2 Captains or Lieutenants and 12 Enlisted men, in advance to prepare the camp.

2 Captains or Lieutenants and 12 Enlisted men, as rear detachment to close the Camp.

III. **Strength Requirements, Pay and Allowances for Field Training:** The provisions of Encampment Letter No. 11, dated July 3, 1925, will govern. Pars. 184 & 192 N. G. Regulations 1922 cover the question of authority for attendance and pay of assigned enlisted N. G. reservists.

IV. **Designation of Camp Commanders and Camp Administrative Staff—Camp Dodge.** Brig. General Lloyd D. Ross, 87th Infantry Brigade, Iowa National Guard, will, in addition to his duties as Brigade Commander, be Camp Commander at Camp Dodge, from Aug. 2 to 16 inclusive. He will establish a Camp Headquarters at Camp Dodge, and the following named officers State Staff Corps and Departments, will report to him for duty, in connection with Camp administration only:

- Brig. General Louis G. Lasher, A. G. D.—Camp Executive Officer.
- Lt. Col. Fred S. Holsteen, 34th Div.—Camp Finance Officer.
- Major Knud Boberg, A. G. D.—Camp Adjutant.
- Major W. S. Conkling, Chief Surgeon—Camp Surgeon in chief.
- Major Vernon Seeburger, J. A. D. Camp Judge Advocate.
- Major H. D. Coe, Q. M. C.—Camp Quartermaster.
- Major E. L. Pugsley, Q. M. C.—Asst. Camp Quartermaster.
- Major R. L. Fulton, O. D.—Camp Instructor Small Arms Firing & Range Executive Officer.

He will issue all orders pertaining to the discipline of all organizations during their tour of duty at Camp Dodge and all orders pertaining to the proper care, upkeep and maintenance of the camp.

V. **Preparation of Camp Site—Camp Dodge:** Major H. D. Coe, Q. M. C., U. S. P. & D. Officer, Iowa National Guard, at Camp Dodge, will prepare the military reservation for the encampment, and will make all necessary arrangements for the supply of motor and wagon transportation during the tour of field duty. He will have all plumbing, electrical and sewer utilities checked, inspected and repaired. He will have all weeds, etc., cut and raked in and around all buildings, tent areas and parade grounds.

VI. **Designation of Motor Transport Officer—Camp Dodge:** The Camp Commander will designate an officer as Motor Transport Officer, who will be in charge of the Motor park or pool, and all motor and wagon transportation from Aug. 2 to 16th inclusive.

VII. **Camp Supplies:** Major H. D. Coe, Q. M. C., U. S. P. & D. Officer, will arrange all contracts for the furnishing of necessary subsistence stores, forage, ice, wood, water, electric power and lights, extra animals, disposal of garbage, motor oil, gasoline, grease and other supplies, and for issuing thereof and accounting therefor at the encampments at Camp Dodge, Iowa, and Camp Knox, Ky.

VIII. **Transportation:** The U. S. P. & D. Officer, will make the necessary arrangements for transportation, by rail, of all troops to the designated places of encampment and return to home stations, and will furnish each commanding officer with train schedule governing the movement of his command. U. S. Government transportation requests will be used. The travel directed is necessary in the military service.

U. S. Government Bills of Lading to cover all shipments of animals, equipment, and materials to encampments and return to home stations, will be furnished organization commanders by the U. S. P. & D. Officer. Request therefor need not be made. Commercial Bills of Lading will not be used in connection with any movement of troops to or from encampments.

Complete instruction as to methods of using U. S. Government Transportation Requests and Bills of Lading will be furnished by the U. S. P. & D. Officer when these forms are issued. Strict Adherence to these instructions without deviation in any manner or for any reason is absolutely necessary.

IX. **Commutation of Rations en route to Camp:** It being impracticable to furnish rations in kind for the journey to Camp Knox, Ky., an allowance, as provided by paragraph 629 N. G. R., 1922, of \$1.20 per day, or appropriate fractional part thereof, for cooked meals, for each enlisted man, while traveling to Camp Knox, is authorized when such travel is performed and extends over regular meal hours. No allowance will accrue when the travel is performed between regular meal hours.

Attention is invited to Par. 8-a (2) Army Regulations No. 35-4520, which refers to the method of computing rations while on a travel status, as follows:

- (a) The day will be considered as beginning at midnight.
- (b) For 18 hours or over in a travel status—one whole day.
- (c) For 12 hours or over, but less than 18 hours, in a travel status, two-thirds of one day.
- (d) For less than 12 hours, in a travel status, one-third of one day.
- (e) No allowance will be paid for the first day of a journey which begins at 6:00 p. m.

Unit Commanders will submit receipted bills, in duplicate for the amounts expended under this authority, together with a certificate, in duplicate, showing the number of men making the journey, hour of leaving home station, hour of arrival at camp, and number of meals purchased, to the U. S. P. & D. Officer, who will make a refund of the amount actually expended, but in no instance to exceed forty (40) cents per meal. Unit commanders making such purchase, will place a signed statement on the certificate, in cases where the total amount of purchase is less than \$100.00, to the effect that there was no personal profit in the transaction, and in cases where such purchases exceed \$100.00 an affidavit to the same effect will be furnished. A copy of the certificate referred to, showing the number of meals purchased and for which refund is to be claimed, will be furnished by the Unit Commander to the Regimental Adjutant, who will divide the number of meals purchased en route during the first day of camp period by three, and the result, representing the number of rations, will be deducted from the ration return, and the supply officer will reduce the rations issued in kind accordingly.

Organizations ordered to Camp Dodge, will not be furnished rations in kind, nor will they be allowed commutation of rations en route, but in lieu therefor a full day's ration will be issued on arrival at Camp.

This will necessitate each man providing himself with a lunch for the travel period. No allowance is authorized for expenses incident to assembling men at Armory, or for their maintenance, other than from date of departure from home station to date of return thereto, both dates inclusive.

X. Report of Absentees: The Commanding Officer of each company, troop, battery, or detachment, will determine, prior to leaving home station for camp, the cause of absence of any member or members of his command, and immediately after arrival in camp will submit to the regimental or separate battalion commander, for transmission to the instructor assigned to duty with the organization, a detailed list of absentees, showing the cause of absence in each case.

XI. Subsistence: Rations in kind will be furnished for the periods as scheduled, by the U. S. P. & D. Officer for the encampment at Camp Dodge, and his agent for the encampment at Camp Knox, Ky., and will be issued for five day periods, with the exception of perishable articles, which will be issued daily. Preliminary ration returns on form P. & S. No. 223, for the first five day period for regimental or similar organizations, including rations for two days or four days advance detachments, as the case may be, properly signed by the Adjutant, and approved by the Commanding Officer, will be presented to the U. S. P. & D. Officer or his agent, at camp by the commanding officer of the advance detachment, so that rations may be regularly issued for use by advance detachments, and be available upon arrival of the organization at the encampment.

Any rations issued during the first five day period in excess of or under the actual strength of an organization will be adjusted on the ration return presented for the second five day period.

Any rations for which commutation is claimed under Section IX of this order, will be deducted from the ration return of the organization for the second five day period.

Rations will be obtained by the Supply Officer, 185th Field Artillery, from the local agent of the U. S. P. & D. Officer of Iowa, at Camp Knox, Ky.

XII. Preparation of Pay Rolls: Federal Pay Rolls will be completed and administered in the following manner:

- (a) Three copies (one original and two carbon copies) of pay rolls will be accomplished on Forms W. D. Nos. 378 and 378 a, which will be furnished by the U. S. P. & D. Officer at the encampment.
- (b) The original will be signed by each officer and enlisted man, and the two carbon copies will have all names typewritten in the spaces provided for signatures as to receipt of pay. Date of submitting payrolls to the U. S. P. & D. Officer, will be announced in Camp orders.
- (c) Organization and unit commanders will arrange for the appointment of non-commissioned officers, in all cases where possible, prior to encampment periods, thereby reducing the change of status of enlisted men during such periods to a

minimum, which will eliminate the necessity for remarks on pay rolls, assure more rapid computation of the amounts due and the payment thereof.

Attention is invited to Paragraph 932 (e), National Guard Regulations 1922, which requires an officer or enlisted man be present at an encampment during at least one-half of the number of days authorized for attendance of the organization in order to qualify for pay. Leave of absence to an officer or furlough to an enlisted man will not be granted unless such officer or enlisted man is qualified for pay, and then only under the most extenuating circumstances. Deserters apprehended will not be forwarded to camps unless sufficient days of the encampment remain to permit them to qualify for pay. No state funds are available for pay of officers or enlisted men not qualified under this regulation.

(Enlistment and physical examination papers for each enlisted man whose name appears on the pay roll of a unit must be on file in The Adjutant General's Office, otherwise payment of Federal Pay will be withheld until all papers are received.)

XIII. Accidents, Illness, and Hospitalization: The provisions of Encampment Letter No. 13, dated July 8th, will govern.

XIV. Annual Physical Examination of Officers: The provisions of Encampment Letter No. 12, dated July 6th, 1925, will govern.

XV. Attendance at Encampments: Authority has been given by the War Department, Militia Bureau, for the following:

Major General Matthew A. Tinley, Commanding 34th Division, attendance at the encampment of the 135th Infantry, Lake City, Minn., for a period not to exceed three days, and at the encampment of the 133rd and 168th Infantry, Camp Dodge, Iowa, for a total period of not to exceed two days.

Authority has been given by the War Department, Militia Bureau, for the attendance of the Adjutant General of Iowa, at the encampment of the Iowa National Guard at Camp Knox, Ky., for a period of not to exceed six days, including travel.

Authority is also given for the attendance of the U. S. P. & D. Officer of Iowa, at Camp Knox, Ky., for a period of not to exceed six days including travel.

The above authority and attendance at camps indicated is in addition to the regular fifteen day encampments ordered for these officers.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING REIMBURSEMENT OF ALL EXPENSES INCIDENT TO TRAVEL PERFORMED BY OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN OF THE NATIONAL GUARD I

I. REGULATIONS GOVERNING REIMBURSEMENT OF ALL EXPENSES INCIDENT TO TRAVEL PERFORMED BY OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN OF THE NATIONAL GUARD—1. Hereafter all of

Officers and enlisted men, Iowa National Guard, traveling in the performance of duties connected with the Military Service of the State, under competent orders, issued by proper authority, will, unless otherwise stated in the order, be allowed actual and necessary expenses incurred. The daily expense to commence with the charge for breakfast and end with the charge for lodging.

Transportation requests issued by this office will accompany the order and no claim for railroad fare will be made or allowed, except when time will not permit receipt of transportation request, in which case, cash fare will be paid and receipt for same taken from Ticket Agent and attached to claim.

2. In the event officers or enlisted men use private owned automobiles in lieu of Rail transportation, the following allowance will be authorized for the actual mileage traveled between the points indicated in the order:

Ford, Chevrolet, Star and Small Overland Automobiles....5c per mile
All other makes.....7c per mile.

3. Claims covering expenses incurred under competent orders, will be rendered this office in triplicate, immediately on completion of the duty and shall be promptly certified to by the officer or enlisted man making the claim, to the effect that the account is correct and just, and that the amounts charged therein were actually paid by him.

4. The following Rules and Regulations published by the State Board of Audit, apply to this office and will be strictly adhered to, in making claims for reimbursement:

Rule 1: All claims for reimbursement for traveling expense must be sworn to by the claimant and approved by the head of the department or executive officer of the board or commission, or his deputy.

Rule 3: All claims must be prepared on the typewriter or in ink. If typewritten, the original must be filed. (Such additional copies of claims as are required by the officer certifying claim shall be furnished by the claimant.)

Rule 6: Where telephone or telegraph service is used, statement as to the necessity for same, and the name of person with whom communication is had must be filed with the claim.

Rule 7: Officers and employees shall be allowed such hotel and meal expenses as are actually necessary under the circumstances in each particular case, provided, however, that under no condition will persons whose employment with the state requires that they travel regularly, (except those whose expenses are paid ultimately from other than public funds) be allowed to exceed \$4.50 per day for such expense. Charge for breakfast will not be allowed when the train leaves the claimant's residence or domicile after 7:00 A. M.

Rule 8: Each item of claim for meals and hotel expense shall give the business name of place where expenditure was made, and the date thereof.

Rule 9: In all cases where reimbursement for Pullman parlor car or dining car charge is claimed the hour of departure and hour of arrival at destination must be shown. Parlor car charges will not be

allowed unless the claimant certifies that no other seat on the train was available.

Rule 11: Receipts shall be filed for all items of one dollar or over, covering incidental expenditures and for telephone and telegraph (except from booth—in which case statement to that effect may be made.)

NOTE 2: All officers and employees are required to keep expenditures at the minimum and not at the maximum. In this connection the Board of Audit has observed that in many instances claims are filed for the full maximum throughout a long period of time. This is particularly noticeable in the expense account for meals in which the maximum amount allowed is claimed day after day. This does not represent or indicate the economy which is necessary in connection with expenses incurred by reason of public service.

NOTE 4: Pullman fares and dining car meals should be charged under the heading "Hotel Expense" and railroad and bus fares should be charged under the heading "Transportation."

5. Requests by officers for authority to make official visits involving travel at State expense must be submitted at least four days in advance of contemplated date of visit to enable this office to issue the necessary orders and transportation requests.

6. All orders or instructions heretofore issued contrary to the above are hereby revoked.

FOR THE TRAINING YEAR 1925-1926..... I

1. PROGRAM OF INDOOR AND OUTDOOR TARGET PRACTICE FOR THE TRAINING YEAR 1925-1926.—The following program of Indoor and Outdoor Target Practice for the Training Year 1925-1926, including the practice to be held during the Annual Encampment 1926, is hereby published. All organizations affected are required to comply with this program.

INDOOR OR SMALL BORE PRACTICE

Beginning November 1st 1925

Preliminary Small Bore Rifle and Pistol practice will commence on the above date, and will include recruit instruction prior to actual firing. The proper method of instruction is outlined in TR 150-5 for those

armed with the rifle, and for those armed with the pistol in TR 150-25 and WD Document 1050, or in any future publication governing the subject which may be issued prior to firing. These methods should be carefully carried into execution and no matter how good a man may be on the outdoor range he should be required to take the instruction course as prescribed.

The equipment necessary to carry on the instruction, such as sighting bars, and rifle rest materials may ordinarily be picked up about the armory. This equipment is absolutely essential and indispensable in the instruction necessary to produce good shooters.

Actual practice firing will commence as soon as practicable following the conclusion of preliminary instruction and will be followed by the firing of a qualification course which will be as follows:

WHO WILL FIRE

All organizations of the Iowa National Guard except Medical Detachments.

All officers of combatant arms with less than fifteen years commissioned service will be required to fire with their organization.

MATCHES

When 60 per cent or over of an organization shall have fired the course herein prescribed, then matches may be fired to determine the Company, Troop, Battery or Detachment Championship. This match will be fired by a team consisting of 16 men to fire, the ten highest scores to count. Officers may fire in the match.

In the matches fired with the rifle suitable trophies emblematic of

Classes A, B, C and D will be awarded, to be held by the winning organizations for the period of one year from date of award.

In the matches fired with the pistol, a suitable trophy emblematic of the Military Pistol Championship will be awarded, to be held by the winning organization for the period of one year from date of award.

The Battalion or Squadron standings will be determined by adding together the twelve highest total aggregate scores fired therein.

The Regimental standings will be determined by adding together the twelve highest total aggregate scores fired therein.

RULES IN GENERAL GOVERNING THE FIRING

Firing for record: A score once begun will be completed for that position without other sighting shots than those which preceded the score being fired.

Targets: All record targets will be marked Official prior to issue and such targets will be the only ones taken into consideration when determining winners of matches.

No firing other than for record and matches will be done on Official targets.

Supervision of firing: All record firing will be done under the supervision of a commissioned officer. As soon as a score is completed the supervising officer will score the shots fired and will make appropriate entries on the target and in the proper spaces. All firing will be done in a counterclockwise manner and scoring will be as fired, eg. 10-9, 9-8, 10-7, 6-3, 8-0 Total 70, the first two shots fired being scored first, second two being scored second, etc. The target after having been scored will be signed by the competitor who will give his name in full as enlisted or commissioned, followed by rank or grade. The match official will give his name in full and rank when signing targets.

Forwarding of Targets: Each organization commander will mail completed certified targets to the Adjutant General only after ten or more men shall have finished their record firing on Official Targets. No credit will be given for scores on targets received later than April 4th, 1926, same having been fired not later than March 31st, 1926, the closing date of Indoor practice.

OUTDOOR SEASON ON HOME STATION RANGES

Course to be fired: Course "C," as outlined in T. R. 150-10 for those armed with the rifle. Mounted and Dismounted Pistol Courses for those required to fire either, or both, to be fired as outlined in T. R. 150-25 and War Department Doc. 1050 or which may be outlined in any future publication governing the subject and issued prior to firing. Auto Rifle, Machine Gun, .37 M. M. Gun and 3" Trench Mortar firing to be done in accordance with Training Regulations applicable to each arm. Scores and records will be kept and handled in accordance with provisions of Training Regulations governing same.

RANGE PRACTICE AT STATE RANGE DURING THE ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

Who to fire and course to be fired: All organizations armed with the rifle to fire Course "C" for Record as provided for in T. R. 150-10 (Only those who have completed the preliminary instruction course in rifle marksmanship will be allowed to fire.) Those completing six (6) hours instruction prior to arrival in Camp will be considered qualified, provided they can pass the preliminary test as provided in Paragraph 53, T. R. 150-5.

All organizations armed with the pistol to fire the Record Course prescribed for that arm in accordance with provisions of War Department Document No. 1050, T. R. 150-25, or of a Training Regulation anticipated to supersede War Department Document No. 1050 and which may be issued prior to firing of the Course. All officers will fire the pistol. (Only those enlisted men armed with the pistol and who can satisfactorily pass the test prescribed in paragraph 59 War Department Document No. 1050 or a superseding Training Regulation will be allowed to fire the course.)

Those individuals armed with the automatic Rifle will fire Course "B," as prescribed in T. R. 150-10 and will be given such examinations and tests for qualification as are prescribed therein. (One commissioned officer, the automatic and assistant automatic rifleman in each rifle company or troop will be required to fire the qualification Course.)

Machine Gun organization will fire Course "B," as prescribed for that arm in T. R. 150-40, all firers being given such examinations and tests for qualification as are prescribed therein. (No member of a machine gun organization will be allowed to fire the qualification course unless he can satisfactorily pass the examination shown in paragraph 54 T. R. 150-35.)

37 M. M. Gun and 3" Trench Mortar organizations will conduct such training, as is prescribed in T. R. 150-40, each person participating to be given such examinations and tests for qualifications as are prescribed therein. (Only those qualifying in the expert test shown in Section V. T. R. 150-40 will be allowed to fire the qualification.)

Regimental Commanders will arrange dates of firing between themselves, which will not be conflicting and will cause such dates to be published in their respective Field Training Program.

ANNUAL COMPETITION WITH THE RIFLE

On the date set for the Annual Competition each organization commander entitled to enter competitors, will cause two enlisted men to report to the Range Executive Officer as representatives for his organization. Those men will be picked who, by performances, have demonstrated their ability in firing, as the best shots in their organization. The names of these men will be submitted on a date set by the Range Executive Officer. Arrangements for a range personnel of sufficient strength to carry on the operation of all range details and to conclude the firing in approximately two hours after firing of the first shot will be made by the Range Executive Officer.

Rules governing the Match will be published at Camp and at a date prior to the date of firing.

INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The individual firing the highest total aggregate score will be announced as the Individual Championship winner of the Iowa N. G.

COMPANY, TROOP, OR DETACHMENT WINNER

The Company, Troop or Detachment showing the highest total aggregate score determined by adding the total aggregate scores of two (2) representative men, will be announced as winner.

BATTALION OR SQUADRON WINNER

The Battalion or Squadron showing the highest total aggregate score, determined by adding the total aggregate scores of the representative men from such Battalion or Squadron will be announced as the winner.

REGIMENTAL WINNER

The Regiment showing the highest total aggregate score, determined by adding the total aggregate scores of Sixteen (16) high representative men, will be announced as winner.

"KENDALL TROPHY"

This is a trophy presented by former Governor N. E. Kendall, while in office and will be competed for annually.

Competition for this trophy shall be held during the Annual Encampment and on firing of a record course as prescribed by Training Regulations for record. All organizations armed or practically armed with the service rifle will compete. The scores made in firing the course will be computed by organization commanders at the end of the firing period as follows:

"All scores fired for record in each organization, whether or not the entire course has been completed by each individual, shall be added and the total shall be divided by the strength of commissioned and enlisted personnel of the organization present on the first day of the encampment, as shown by the Morning Report for that day. The organization having the highest average score computed shall be declared the winner and shall hold the trophy for the period of one (1) year. Band Sections of Service Companies of Troops shall not be included in computing the strength of organizations from which they come.

Promptly upon completion of firing, organization commanders will compute scores as above described and turn same over to their respective Regimental Range Officers. The respective Regimental Range Officers after receiving the reports of their organizations shall convene at the call of the Senior officer and they shall after checking reports refer their report to the "Kendall Board" which will make final announcement.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

I desire to call attention to the change in the law relating to the auditing of claims by the State Board of Audit.

Section 393 of the Code of 1924, provided "No claim shall be audited by the board when such claim is presented after the lapse of two years from its accrual."

This statute was amended by Section 1 of Chapter 205, Acts of the 41st General Assembly to read:

"No claim shall be audited by the board when such claim is presented after the lapse of six months from its accrual".

It will be apparent from this that any claimant should use due diligence in presenting his claim before the expiration of six months from its accrual or it cannot be paid without a special act of the legislature. Prompt action by the claimant will relieve much embarrassment. I am

II. ARMORY BOARD—Authority for—tenure—duties—payment of allowances:

- (a) "Sec. 453—Code of Iowa—1924.

The Governor shall appoint an armory board which shall consist of the Adjutant General and four other officers from the active, reserve or retired commissioned personnel of the Guard. The Board shall meet at such time and places as are ordered by the Governor. The four officers so appointed shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

The board shall, for each unit of the guard, fix the rent allowances to be paid by the State for other than State owned armories, and shall acquire, contract, erect, purchase, sell, maintain, repair and alter state-owned armories subject to the laws made and provided therefor.

The board shall fix the amount to be paid to commanding officers of each division, brigade, regiment, battalion, squadron, battery, troop, company or other unit of the guard for headquarters expenses and shall provide by regulations how same shall be disbursed by such commanding officers. The actions of the Armory board shall be subject to the approval of the Governor.

The allowances made by the Armory Board shall, when approved by the Governor, be paid from the funds appropriated for the support and maintenance of the guard."

- (b) Under the provisions of the law, above quoted, his Excellency John Hammill, Governor of Iowa, under date of July 21, 1925, appointed, effective as of January 15, 1925, the following named officers as members of the Armory Board:
- Brig. General Louis G. Lasher—A. G. D. Iowa N. G.—The Adjutant General.

Brig. General Guy E. Logan—A. G. D.—Retired—Des Moines.

Major Thomas P. Hollowell—N. G. Reserve—Ft. Madison.

Major Earl Bush—Retired—Ames.

Major Ray Yenter—113th Cavalry—Iowa City.

Brig. General Louis G. Lasher—President of the Board.

Major Ray A. Yenter—Recorder.

III. ARMORY BOARD REGULATIONS.

- (a) All plans and specifications, covering construction of new armories, remodeling all buildings to be used for armory purposes, shall follow as closely as possible the requirements herein stated below, and must be submitted to the armory board for approval before such construction or remodeling is contracted for or accomplished.
- (b) All buildings constructed, leased or used for armory purposes

must, unless special authority is obtained from the armory board, be constructed of brick, cement, stone or other fire proof material, as so considered by the Fire Insurance Underwriters Association, and will conform to the following:

- (c) Adequate provision must, in all cases, be made for protection of State and Government property, against fire, theft and the elements.
- (d) Modern methods of heating and lighting are installed, and that sufficient lavatories, shower baths and water closets provided.
- (e) Every consideration will be given to the social life of the various units of the guard, and an effort will be made to provide suitable rooms, with proper furnishings, etc., to insure and encourage interest in recreational and athletic activities.
- (f) All portions of buildings leased for armory purposes and used by the National Guard will be under the direct and sole control of the National Guard organization commander, or, where more than one unit of the Guard uses the building, under the control of the Senior Commissioned Officer thereof.
- (g) All leases or contracts of lease will have inserted therein as a part of the lease or contract the following clause:

"In the event the National Guard organization, which is a party to this lease and contract, is disbanded, mustered out or is drafted or called by the President of the United States, into Federal Service under competent orders either Federal or State, it is understood and agreed by all concerned, that in the event of such disbandment, or muster out, that this lease will be canceled the last day of the month in which the National Guard organization herein mentioned, vacates the premises. It is further understood and agreed, that should the National Guard organization, herein mentioned, be drafted or ordered into Federal Service, this lease will not be canceled before the expiration of ninety (90) days after the organization has responded to such draft or call, but after such ninety (90) days have expired this lease and contract becomes null and void without further notice."

All leases will be submitted to the Adjutant General for approval before they become effective.

- (h) Requirements for maximum allowances—

The following specifications will be followed, unless specifically modified by the Armory Board, or its duly authorized representative.

1—All Buildings constructed, remodeled, or used by:

Regimental Headquarters Companies.

Service Companies.

Howitzer Companies.

Machine Gun Companies and Rifle Companies will provide the following:

Two stories or more in height.

Basement large enough for indoor rifle and pistol range.

Drill hall, not less than 50x80 ft., clear floor space, no posts, 22 ft. ceiling with balcony, if possible, 8 ft. wide, 12 ft. above floor.

Two (2) store rooms, one 16x32 for supply room, and one 16x16 ft. for heavy property.

One (1) Locker room 16x24 ft.

Two (2) Officers rooms, one 10x12 ft. and one 12x12 ft.

One (1) Non-commissioned officers room, 10x12 ft.

Club or Assembly room, not less than 20x32.

Two (2) Shower Baths.

Two (2) Toilets.

Two (2) Lavatories.

Indoor rifle range, in basement, not less than 60 ft. long, two targets wide.

2—For Brigade Headquarters Company.

Battalion Headquarters Company.

Squadron Headquarters Detachment.

Medical Detachment.

the same as above, with the following modifications:

Drill hall 32x48 ft.

One officers room 12x12.

One (1) store room 16x20.

3—For Cavalry Service Troop.

Cavalry Regimental Headquarters Troop.

Cavalry Troops.

Cavalry Squadron Headquarters Detachments.

the same as Infantry units of like size and strength, except for the following additions:

Paddock—100 ft x 100 ft.

Stables—containing two (2) box stalls, and 32 stalls, one wash rack, with water connections and drains, one water trough, storage space for 10,000 lbs. grain, and 25 tons hay and straw. Saddle room 14x14, with proper equipment to clean and care for all leather equipment, and a blacksmith shop 16x16, separated from stables.

When Squadron Headquarters Detachments have horses the above will be modified to suit the need.

4—For Field Artillery Units—a request will be submitted direct to the Armory Board, through the A.G.O., in which specific statement will be made as to their requirements, etc. The Armory Board will base their recommendations on such statement and personal survey of the situation.

(1) Armory Allowances.

Due to the reduction made by the 41st General Assembly, in the appropriations for Armory Allowances, Rifle Range Allowances, and Postage, etc., allowances, the following allowances became effective as of July 1, 1925:

Postage—Telegraph and Telephone Allowance

The allowances set out below, under this heading are the maximum, and only so much as is necessary will be expended. Each officer affected will render at the end of each semi-annual period (June 30 and Dec. 31) a certified statement covering the amount expended, itemized as to postage, long distance telephone calls, and telegraph message. Failure to render this certificate within sixty (60) days after end of each semi-annual period will cause the allowance for the next semi-annual period to be forfeited.

(j) Armory Boards and Advisory Boards Allowance:

Members of the Armory Board will, when under competent orders, be allowed transportation from home station to place of meeting and return, and a per diem of ten (10) dollars per day from which they will pay all expenses other than transportation and pullman fares. They will not appear in uniform unless the order covering the meeting for which they assemble, specifically states that uniform will be worn.

(k) Examining Board Allowance:

Officers detailed, under competent orders, to serve on boards to examine officers and enlisted men for appointment or promotion to higher commissioned grades, will be allowed transportation from home station to place of assembly and return, and will be paid the base pay of their grades from which they will pay all expenses incident to the duty, except transportation and pullman fares. Officers on the Examining Boards will appear at all times during sessions of the Board in uniform.

(l) Governor's Staff Allowance:

Officers appointed Aides on the Staff of the Governor, when on duty under competent orders, will be authorized transportation from home station and return, pullman fares, and actual necessary expenses during the period of the ordered duty. They will appear in the uniform prescribed in the order and will be prompt and punctual in attending the Governor, until dismissed by him or by his order.

IV. REGULATIONS COVERING SEC. 454-455 CODE OF IOWA—1924.

(a) Sec. 454—Rifle Ranges—appropriation:

The construction to be placed on this section of the Code, is that it authorizes the acquisition and construction of certain

specified rifle ranges or for the rental and maintenance of such ranges. It also authorizes an allowance to each unit of the Guard to cover the procurement, construction and maintenance of a rifle range (at or near their home station). The authority above indicated is, however, subject to the following:

In the first instance—The Governor may designate the location, and the expenditure therefor is allowed under the provisions of the section. Second: The payments provided under this section, are subject to there being sufficient funds available, and that the Governor has officially approved.

In view of the above interpretation of the law, the following regulations are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

1. No designation or location of regimental rifle ranges are made.
 2. The allowances for rifle, pistol, machine gun and howitzer ranges for units armed with such weapons, are as indicated in this order.
 3. The expenditure of this allowance, will be confined to rent for suitable terrain, construction work and maintenance of both indoor and outdoor ranges. Where a Federal Government range is used the allowance may be used to cover transportation to and from such range for a firing party of not less than eight (8) enlisted men under the supervision of a commissioned officer. This is for the purpose of having each enlisted man of the organization fire the prescribed course during the outdoor target practice season. Authority for the expenditure of the Rifle Range allowance for this purpose must be obtained from this office, and a monthly report of the firing conducted, the number and names of the enlisted men participating and the officer in charge, with dates of firing will be rendered this office. This report will have a direct bearing on and influence the audit of the account current of each organization in so far as it covers the expenditures from Range Funds.
- No other expenditures from this fund will be made except on specific authority from this office.

(b) Sec. 455—Drill Allowance—method of payment:

This section has but one construction, it specifically outlines the amount allowed, the purpose, what is necessary for each unit to qualify, and the penalty for failure to qualify. It also specifically provides that the Governor "shall prescribe the regulations governing the payment by the State and the expenditure by the unit of this allowance when approved by him." The following regulations are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

1. Drill allowance (per capita allowance) will be paid semi-annual, and the percentage will be figured as of the preceding six months period drill attendance of the enlisted strength of the organization.

2. This allowance is paid for the faithful drill attendance of the enlisted men of an organization and must be spent only for those things which will benefit the enlisted personnel. It cannot be spent for entertainment, dances, or like social activities. It cannot be spent to relieve responsible and accountable officers for property lost, stolen or destroyed, without the consent of the "Company Council" composed of duly elected officers and enlisted men. No payments can be made from this fund for per diem of officers or men for attending drills, rifle practice or other military duties usually required from members of the organization, neither can payments be made for athletics or entertainment incident thereto. Under this section all payments for military uses not otherwise fully provided for can be made, such as range expense over and above allowance made for that purpose, the purchase of ordnance and quartermaster stores, except as indicated in preceding paragraph, repairs and labor in repairing and caring for same, repairs on armories, purchase of lockers, payment on bonds of officers, cartage on military stores and property to and from depots, purchase of furniture for club rooms, text books and magazines on military subjects, etc. Expenses other than those enumerated above may be allowed by this office, if authority for same is first requested. Attention is specifically directed to Sec. III, par. 1—Armory Allowances. No payments for services indicated therein will be made from the fund herein indicated as Drill Allowance (Per capita allowance) without special authority from this office.

V. AUDIT BOARD REGULATIONS

1. REGULATIONS GOVERNING REIMBURSEMENT OF ALL EXPENSE INCIDENT TO TRAVEL PERFORMED BY OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN OF THE NATIONAL GUARD—1. Hereafter all officers and enlisted men, Iowa National Guard, traveling in the performance of duties connected with the Military Service of the State, under competent orders, issued by proper authority, will, unless otherwise stated in the order, be allowed actual and necessary expenses incurred. The daily expense to commence with the charge for breakfast and end with the charge for lodging. Transportation requests issued by this office will accompany the order and no claim for railroad fare will be made or allowed, except when time will not permit receipt of transportation request, in which case, cash fare will be paid and receipt for same taken from Ticket Agent and attached to claim.
2. Officers and enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard, or the regular army detailed thereto, traveling under competent orders, in the military service of the State and who use railroad transportation, or privately owned automobile in lieu of railroad transportation, the following will govern:

- (a) When there are railroad connections between home stations and points of ordered duty actual railroad fare will be allowed between such points as indicated in par. 1. In the event privately owned automobiles are used in lieu of available railroad transportation, a claim may be allowed, as reimbursement for use of such automobile, equal to the actual cost of rail transportation.
- (b) When no railroad connections are available, or it is specifically authorized in the order, the following allowances will be made.
Ford, Chevrolet, Star, and Small Overland, 5 cents per mile. All other makes, 7 cents per mile.
- (c) All requests for transportation for any purposes, must clearly state:
1. Whether rail connections are available.
 2. Whether railroad or automobile will be used.
 3. The kind and make of automobile.
 4. Whether or not the trip will be made alone, if not, the number and status of additional passengers.
- (d) If the additional passengers are traveling under orders similar to those of the original claimant, the original claimant can claim reimbursement for each additional passenger on the same basis as is allowed for himself.
3. Claims covering expenses incurred under competent orders, will be rendered this office in triplicate, immediately on completion of the duty and shall be properly certified to by the officer or enlisted man making the claim, to the effect that the account is correct and just, and that the amounts charged therein were actually paid by him.
4. The following Rules and Regulations published by the State Board of Audit, apply to this office and will be strictly adhered to, in making claims for reimbursement:
- Rule 1: All claims for reimbursement for traveling expense must be sworn to by the claimant and approved by the head of the department or executive officer of the board or commission, or by his deputy.
- Rule 3: All claims must be prepared on the typewriter or in ink. If typewritten, the original must be filed. (Such additional copies of claims as are required by the officer certifying claim shall be furnished by the claimant.)
- Rule 6. Where telephone or telegraph service is used, statement as to necessity for same, and the name of person with whom communication is had must be filed with the claim.
- Rule 7: Officers and employees shall be allowed such hotel and meal expenses as are actually necessary under the circumstances in each particular case, provided, however, that under no condition will persons whose employment with the state requires that they travel regularly, (except

those whose expenses are paid ultimately from other than public funds) be allowed to exceed \$4.50 per day for such expense. Charge for breakfast will not be allowed when the train leaves the claimant's residence or domicile after 7:00 A. M.

Rule 8: Each item of claim for meals and hotel expense shall give the business name of place where expenditure was made, and the date thereof.

Rule 9: In all cases where reimbursement for Pullman, parlor car or dining car charge is claimed the hour of departure and hour of arrival at destination must be shown. Parlor car charges will not be allowed unless the claimant certifies that no other seat on the train was available.

Rule 11: Receipts shall be filed for all items of one dollar or over, covering incidental expenditures and for telephone and telegraph (except from booth—in which case statement to that effect may be made.)

NOTE 2: All officers and employees are required to keep expenditures at the minimum and not at the maximum. In this connection the Board of Audit has observed that in many instances claims are filed for the full maximum throughout a long period of time. This is particularly noticeable in the expense account for meals in which the maximum amount allowed is claimed day after day. This does not represent or indicate the economy which is necessary in connection with expenses incurred by reason of public service.

NOTE 4: Pullman fares and dining car meals should be charged under the heading "Hotel Expense" and railroad and bus fares should be charged under the heading "Transportation."

NOTE 5: Tips or other honorariums will not be allowed.

5. Requests by officers for authority to make official visits involving travel at State expense must be submitted at least four days in advance of contemplated date of visit to enable this office to issue the necessary orders and transportation requests.
6. All orders or instructions heretofore issued contrary to the above are hereby revoked.

All officers Iowa National Guard, all members of Board, and all Aides on the Governor's Staff, will be governed by the provisions of this order.

7. The provisions of this order apply only to state business and the expenditure of state funds, and do not apply where Federal Funds are involved.

(Note—All expenses for annual camps, schools, etc., are paid from Federal Funds, and no allowance made under this order can be authorized from such funds.)

I. SUPPLEMENTARY INSTRUCTIONS TO GENERAL ORDERS
NO. 1, THIS OFFICE CURRENT SERIES—The following instructions are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"INSTRUCTION AND RECORD PRACTICE SEASON"

JANUARY 1st to AUGUST 31st.

The period from January 1st to April 30th will be devoted to Basic Instruction in Marksmanship as prescribed and outlined in Training Regulations, 150-5, 150-10, 150-15, 150-25, 150-30, 150-40 and War Department Document No. 1050, or any subsequent authorized publication, and by actual firing of the weapons.

The period from May 1st to August 31st will be devoted to Record Practice. Only such men as have received Basic Instruction, and have passed successfully, the required examinations and tests therein will be permitted to fire the Record Practice.

"SUPPLEMENTARY RECORD PRACTICE SEASON"

SEPTEMBER 1st to DECEMBER 31st.

This period is designated for the purpose of firing those men in the Record Practice who have not received or completed the Basic Instruction prior to May 1st, and those men who having received the Basic Instruction and have passed, successfully, the examinations and tests therein, but who failed to qualify in Record Practice during the period between May 1st and August 31st.

"All men who failed to qualify in the Record Practice prior to August

31st will be allowed to fire during the Supplementary season, provided, however, that at least 30 days, as required by regulations, shall have elapsed from the date of failure to qualify."

Reports of Individual Classification for the past two years show a percentage of qualifications very unsatisfactory and not comparative with prior Iowa National Guard records, thus indicating conclusively that proper attention has not been paid the Basic Instruction prior to actual firing.

The practice of allowing men to fire small bore or any other weapon without having first received the Basic Instruction and successfully passed the examinations and tests connected therewith will be discontinued.

The importance of "Basic Instruction in Marksmanship" as a part of the training of a soldier, must not be lost sight of. This phase of training should and will have a place in all programs and schedules for Armory Training, and responsible officers will be held strictly accountable for any deficiencies resulting from failure to include in such programs and schedules, a reasonable allocation of time for the purpose, and insure strict adherence thereto.

I. CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS* USE OF COMPANY FIELD DESKS—1. Pursuant to authority contained in Section V, Circular No. 39, A-25, War Department, Militia Bureau, Series 1925, the following instructions, in connection with the care and maintenance of records, and the use of Company Field Desks, are published for the information and guidance of all organization commanders whose units are equipped with the Company Field Desks and who are responsible for the proper care and maintenance of records:

a. The following records will be kept in the sections designated below of Field Desk "A":

(1) Lid Section:

(a) Upper Left Section:

This section will contain the following supply of stationery for use during Field Training Periods:

- 1 gross bands, rubber.
- 1 eraser, rubber, ink and pencil.
- 1 eraser, steel.
- 1 box fasteners, paper.
- 1 tin ink, black tablets.
- 1 tin ink, red tablets.
- 1 tube paste.
- 4 pencils, indelible.
- 2 pencils, lead.
- 1 pencil, colored (blue and red)
- 2 penholders
- 12 pens, steel.

Immediately upon completion of each Field Training Period the supply indicated above will be replenished and thereafter kept intact until the subsequent Field Training Period.

(b) Lower Left Section:

Property loan record, with its accompanying vouchers, i. e., shipping tickets, receiving reports, statement of charges, report of survey and inventory, audit and inspection reports.

The following supply of blank forms and stationery for use during Field Training Periods:

Blank Forms:

- 6 Property loan records.
- 30 Requisitions.
- 8 Receiving Reports.
- 30 Shipping tickets.
- 12 Charge Sheets.
- 16 Report of Survey.
- 18 Statement of Charges.
- 12 Company returns.

Immediately upon completion of each Field Training period the supply of blank forms and stationery indicated above will be replenished and thereafter kept intact until the subsequent Field Training Period.

(c) Upper Right Section:

National Guard Regulations 1922.
Loose-leaf Binder containing the revised National Guard Regulations.

(d) Lower Right Section:

Tables of organization.
Equipment table, National Guard.
Loose-leaf binder containing individual Clothing and Equipment Records.

Special Regulations No. 57 WD 1919 (until entirely revised). Any other pamphlets or documents suitable in size to be filed in this section and for which no other filing method has been designated.

(2) **Service Record Tray:**

The service record tray will contain the service record and all other individual records of each of the active enlisted men of the unit, followed by the service record and all other individual records of "Assigned Reservists," if any.

The service records will be filed in the tray as follows: In front of the guide card "Noncommissioned officers" will be filed the service records of the noncommissioned officers of the unit in each grade, the records being filed in the order of the date of warrant; following the noncommissioned officers and in front of the guide card "Privates First Class" will be filed the service records of the privates first class, in alphabetical order, irrespective of specialist rating; following this group and in front of the guide card "Privates" will be filed the service records of the privates, in alphabetical order, irrespective of specialist rating.

The remaining space of the tray may be used for the purpose of keeping blank forms suitable in size to be filed therein; such as score cards (all weapons) extract of service record and so forth.

(3) **Miscellaneous Record Tray:**

The miscellaneous record tray will contain the "Reminder" and the sections designated by the guide cards "Memoranda"—"Clothing" and "Horses" in that order, followed by the current correspondence book with document file, and company council book. Each of these sections will be used as follows:

Reminder:

The reminder will consist of the month cards and date cards which are placed in chronological order in the front of the miscellaneous tray, the month cards being in rear of date cards.

The date cards will be rotated as follows: On the morning of January 2, the date card "1" will be placed in rear of month card for "January" and in front of and next to the month card "February" the procedure being followed daily with the remaining date-cards for the month in order, so that following the 31st of January the date card 31 will uncover the January card. The former will be filed in rear of date card 30 and in front of month card "February" and the January card will be filed in rear of month card "December," leaving the "Reminder" for the month of February set up in normal order with a necessary supply of form No. 100 WDMB (Report of National Guard Duty Performed) for use for the month of February.

Note:

During the Field Training period the date cards will be rotated daily and during the armory drill period weekly or on each regular drill or formation of the organization.

A complete set of reminder slips for use in front of the month and date cards of the "Reminder" should be prepared. These slips should anticipate all items of administration in the organization in time for

their accomplishment and should be prepared of size 3½x8". An example of such "Reminder" slips follows:

EXAMPLE 1. (This reminder will be placed in front of the month cards "January" and "July")

Reminder	Articles 1, 2, and 29, 54 to 96, inclusive, and 104 to 109, inclusive, will be read and explained to every soldier at the time of his enlistment or muster in, or within six days after, and will be read and explained once every six months to soldiers of every garrison, regiment, or company in the service of the United States. (110 A. W.)
January 1st	The articles of war are published in the Manual for Courts-Martial 1921, and in paragraph 7, NGR No. 36—1924—MILITARY DISCIPLINE AND COURTESY.
July 1st	

EXAMPLE 2 (This reminder will be placed in front of the month card "January")

Reminder	Submit quarterly payroll quarter Oct. 1-Dec. 31.
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EXAMPLE 3 (This reminder will be placed in front of the month card "January")

Reminder	Submit account current for the period July 1-Dec. 31.
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Reminder slips may also be used to a good advantage in connection with the date cards and used as reminders from one drill night to the next—EXAMPLE:

On February 21, (which date is on one of the regular drill nights of the company) the Company Commander receives a communication stating that the Report of Principal of Ordnance Supplies must be submitted not later than March 1. The Company Commander has all his work outlined for February 21, and cannot take care of the Report of Principal of Ordnance Supplies until the regular drill of February 28. He directs the company clerk to place a reminder slip in front of the date card "28."

EXAMPLE

REMINDER

Prepare report of Principal of Ordnance Supplies.

On the regular drill of February 28, the company clerk rotates the date cards and the date card "28" appears to the front with the reminder slip, indicated above, and thereby eliminating the possibility of overlooking to submit the report in question in due time.

In setting up the "Reminder" the current Form No. 100 WDMB (Report of National Guard Duty Performed) which is started at the beginning of the month and kept current from day to day and drill to drill will be filed in front of the "Reminder" section; and a supply of these blanks for the ensuing quarter will be filed in sets in front of the next three month cards.

The following supply of blank forms will be kept in front of the guide card "August" for use during the Field Training Period:

3 Morning Reports.

3 Daily Sick Reports.

3 Duty Rosters.**30 Ration Returns.**

Immediately upon completion of each Field Training Period the supply indicated above will be renewed and thereafter kept intact until the subsequent Field Training Period.

The "Reminder" will also be used as a live file for the Form No. 100 WDMB destined for the permanent file, but whose disposition to the permanent file is to be postponed until these forms cease to be of current import. These forms should be filed in front of the index card of the month in which they are filed, and moved to the back of the "Reminder" with it. When the card next appears a year later these forms will be placed in the permanent file in rear of the payroll covering the period for which these forms were submitted.

Memoranda:

In front of the guide card "Memoranda" will be filed all memorandums and documents, not of permanent value, for which the filing is not directed elsewhere.

To prevent an accumulation of unnecessary or obsolete "Memorandums" and "Documents," in this section, a quarterly inspection of same will be made by the organization commander, who will at such inspection eliminate from the section all items which have become obsolete or unnecessary for future reference.

Clothing:

In front of the guide card "Clothing" will be filed the retained copy of all requisitions. Upon return from the Property and Disbursing Officer of a requisition showing the disposition made by him, the retained copy in the file may be destroyed and replaced by the one returned from the Property and Disbursing Officer. Requisitions should be numbered serially by Calendar year; that is, the first requisition of each calendar year should be numbered No. 1.

All requisitions should be retained for a period of at least one year after which they may be destroyed or become a part of the personal file of the organization commander.

Horses:

In front of the guide card "Horses" will be filed the descriptive cards of public animals pertaining to the organization. Organizations not furnished with public animals will use this section for the filing of the current "Encampment Letters" issued yearly, preparatory to each Field Training Period, by the Adjutant General of Iowa. Organizations furnished with public animals will file the Encampment letters referred to above in an improvised folder, which can be made from a property loan record card, immediately in rear of the company council book. As soon as the first Encampment letter of a new calendar year is issued all Encampment letters of the preceding year will be filed, in the first year section of the five year file, until the 1st of January of the subsequent year, when they will pass into the second year section.

Correspondence Book and Document File:

The current Correspondence Book and Document File will be filed immediately in rear of the guide card "Horses." The documents of

the "Document File" will be filed in an improvised folder, which can be made from a property loan record card, and on which should be marked "Document File." The Correspondence Book and Document File will be kept as prescribed in AR 345-620—Military Records—Correspondence Book and Document File. The closed correspondence books and their corresponding document files will be filed in the "Permanent File" and when the "Permanent File" becomes too crowded these records may, at the discretion of the organization commander, be destroyed or filed in one of the two (2) steel cases provided by the State of Iowa. Great care will be taken not to destroy documents relating to the history of the organization or individuals, or matters of future value which should be kept indefinitely in the "Permanent File."

Company Council Book:

The Company Council Book (for use in the event of a call or draft into Federal Service) will be filed behind the "Document File."

The remaining space of the tray may be used for the purpose of keeping blank forms suitable in size to be filed therein; such as Morning Reports, Daily Sick Reports, Duty Roster, Ration Returns and so forth.

Note:

File five blotters 4x8½ in rear of the date cards transferred from the current month to rear of the month card and in front of the month card of coming month, where they will serve as a division between the two months. File the blotter in use with the current form No. 100 WDMB in front of the "Reminder." Fasten a 12x19 blotter to the Capboard with thumb tacks.

b. The following records will be kept in the sections designated below of Field Desk "B":

(1) Lid Section:**(a) Upper Left Section:**

This section will contain items of stationery which may be deemed necessary to be carried therein in addition to the supply of stationery carried in the upper left section of field desk "A".

(b) Lower Left Section:

In this section will be carried a supply of blank forms and stationery suitable in size to be carried therein.

(c) Upper Right Section:

Any training pamphlets or documents, suitable in size to be filed therein and for which no other filing space has been designated.

(2) Five Year File Tray:**Five-Year File Section:**

The division cards for this file consist of the "first year," "second year," "third year," "fourth year" and "fifth year" cards, devised to separate the papers to be retained for five years.

All papers destined for file in the five year file, including "sick reports," "reports of individual classification (all weapons)" and "encampment letters" will be filed in front of the guide card "first year." The "target record" card follows the fifth year section.

On January 1, of each year the first year card will be moved to the

front of the five year file, being replaced by the second year card. The year cards will be moved forward, third in place of second, fourth in place of third, fifth in place of fourth; so that on each January 1, after the fifth year of filing, the year's discard will be found in rear of the fifth year card.

The papers in rear of the fifth year card will be removed and destroyed. In this manner all dead records will be automatically worked from the file and the first year card will be in place to receive the papers to be filed during the ensuing year.

Target Record:

In the front of the guide card "target record" in the five year file tray will be filed the individual records of target practice. When a soldier leaves the organization permanently or at the expiration of his enlistment his retained individual target record will be given him or destroyed, thereafter.

Immediately in rear of the guide card "target record" will be filed, in separate folders, which can be made from property loan record cards, all orders which have been received by the organization since its organization; i. e., one folder for orders issued by the Adjutant General of Iowa, one folder for those issued by the regimental commander and one for company, troop, battery or detachment orders. Each of the above folders should be marked as follows:

(a) Folder containing orders issued by the Adjutant General's Office, State of Iowa:

"SPECIAL ORDERS, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, STATE OF IOWA—SERIES 1920-1921-1922-1923-1924-1925-1926"

(b) Folder containing orders issued by the Regimental Commander: "REGIMENTAL SPECIAL ORDERS—SERIES 1920-1921-1922-1923-1924-1925-1926"

(c) Folder containing orders issued by the organization: "COMPANY ORDERS—SERIES 1920-1921-1922-1923-1924-1925-1926"

NOTE:

It should be understood that organizations which were organized in 1921 or 1922 would not include in the marking "series 1920-1921." Also that organization which served, at any time, in a separate battalion would have an additional folder for Battalion Special Orders.

When the "Permanent File" becomes too crowded the remaining space of this tray may be used for the purpose of filing documents or records normally destined for the "Permanent File," such documents or records may include the retained copies of Annual Armory Inspection Reports.

(3) Permanent File:

In the permanent file will be filed:

(a) In front of the guide card "Returns:"

The closed morning reports (Used during field training periods). Strength returns (The form for strength return having been replaced by form No. 100 WDMB.) This file will, therefore, contain the strength returns submitted until December 31, 1925, and the strength returns which will hereafter be submitted at the beginning and at the closing of each field training period.

(b) In the Alphabetical Section:

The extracts from service records and enlistment records of all enlisted men separated from the service.

Note 1: When an enlisted man has been discharged more than once all extracts from service records pertaining to him will be fastened together with a paper fastener and only the last copy of his enlistment record filed therewith.

Note 2: If no papers would be withdrawn from the alphabetical section, this file would, in view of the heavy turn over in the enlisted personnel of the National Guard, occupy the greatest part of the permanent file. To prevent the alphabetical section from occupying more space than is actually necessary, at the end of each calendar year the enlistment records of all enlisted men separated from the service three years should be withdrawn and placed in an improvised folder, i. e., on December 31, 1926, the enlistment records of the enlisted men discharged during the calendar year 1923, should be withdrawn and placed in an improvised folder marked as follows: "Enlistment records of enlisted men separated from the service during the calendar year 1923."

The folders containing these enlistment records will then be filed in one of the two steel cases furnished by the State of Iowa, in which all other records relating to the history of the organization, including old payrolls may also be properly stored.

(c) In front of the guide card "Payrolls:"

The payrolls followed by forms No. 100, WDMB (Report of National Guard duties performed) submitted for the period covered by each payroll; viz: Behind the payroll for the quarter ending March 31, 1926, the forms No. 100 for the months of January, February and March, 1926.

In rear of the guide card "Payrolls" will be filed the copies of the annual "Armory Inspection Reports" and if the permanent file is too crowded, then in the "Five Year File Tray."

2. The Loose-leaf binders containing the Army Regulations and Training Regulations as well as the binders containing the General Orders and Bulletins issued by the War Department and the Adjutant General's Office, State of Iowa will be kept in one of the two steel cases furnished by the State of Iowa.

3. All personnel responsible for the preparation and filing of Military records, will carefully study the instructions herein contained. All Company Clerks will be furnished with a copy of these Orders for personal study. Additional copies of these Orders will be furnished by this office upon request.

II. ANNUAL ARMORY INSPECTION—1. The Annual Armory Inspection of the Iowa National Guard will be held on the dates, and conducted by the Regular Army officers indicated below.

2. Inspectors will be extended all possible assistance. An officer, preferably the Commanding Officer, of the unit will arrange to be with the inspector from the time of his arrival until his departure.

3. All organizations will assemble at their armory, not later than 8:00 P. M., on the night designated for the inspection. All possible

efforts will be made toward securing a maximum attendance for the occasion.
