PARDONS

J. A. FELDMAN, Des Moines County. Sentenced at the December term, 1923, to serve a term of five years in the penitentiary at Fort Madison; for the crime of receiving stolen goods. The said J. A. Feldman was paroled from the institution on the 12th day of October, 1926, and pardon was granted on the 6th day of April, 1927.

HANS P. PEDERSEN, Audubon County. Sentenced at the December term, 1925, to serve a term of two years in the penitentiary at Fort Madison, for the crime of larceny of poultry in the night time. Pardon was recommended by the Board of Parole, the presiding judge, county attorney, sheriff of said county, and clerk of the district court, and same was granted on the 14th day of June, 1927.

ED A. PFLUG, Lee County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 24th day of March, 1925, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 7th day of January, 1927.

ROY W. NEAL, Lucas County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 23rd day of September, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 17th day of February, 1927.

FRANK LIVINGSTON, Cherokee County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 12th day of April, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of entering a bank with intent to rob. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 11th day of March, 1927.

HARVEY TOLAND, Union County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 10th day of September, 1923, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole and the trial judge, sentence was commuted to fifteen years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 30th day of September, 1927.

LORENZO HERNANDEZ, Mills County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 8th day of March, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to fifty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 4th day of October, 1927.

JAY CHAPMAN, Keokuk County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 26th day of December, 1924, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to fifteen years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 21st day of October, 1927.

JIM JACKSON, Emmet County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 9th day of September, 1919, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 21st day of October, 1927.

ED AIRHART, Story County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 19th day of April, 1913, to serve a term of life for the crime of burglary with a dangerous weapon. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 1st day of November, 1927.

ROY HUNTSMAN, Fremont County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 1st day of May, 1924, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to ten years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 11th day of November, 1927.

RAY KESSLER, Pottawattamie County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 17th day of December, 1918, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 11th day of November, 1927.

FRANK EDWARD ATWATER, Scott County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 28th day of October, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 14th day of November, 1927.

PRESTON G. WEBB, Polk County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 3rd day of February, 1923, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to ten years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 12th day of December, 1927.

FRED MCKINSTRY, Linn County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 11th day of July, 1923, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to ten years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 13th day of December, 1927.

DANIEL H. LORRAINE, Wright County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 8th day of May, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board

of Parole and the trial judge, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 15th day of May, 1928.

BERT DUNCAN, Cedar County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 11th day of October, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole and the trial judge, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 16th day of May, 1928.

JOHN DRADEN, Clarke County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 13th day of October, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 29th day of May, 1928.

HUGH JENNINGS, Polk County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 17th day of March, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 16th day of July, 1928.

CORLES BRUNTLETT, Carroll County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 21st day of February, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of entering a banking house to rob. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to thirty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 16th day of July, 1928.

RICHARD FEENEY, Scott County. Committed to the reformatory at Anamosa on the 31st day of December, 1925, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on 20th day of October, 1928.

ELMER E. GAGE, Fayette County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 6th day of December, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 9th day of November, 1928.

ALONZO ELLIS, Dallas County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 26th day of January, 1915, to serve a term of life for the crime of murder second degree. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to fifty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 9th day of November, 1928.

SUSPENSIONS

ANNA TOUCH, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1926, of the offense of liquor nuisance, and sentenced to serve six months and three hundred twenty-three days in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, and the county attorney who prosecuted the case. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of January, 1927.

ELMER HAMILTON, Page County. Convicted at the April term, 1922, of the offense of robbery with aggravation, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Elmer Hamilton was permitted to go to Missouri, where he had some land. Suspension was issued on the 4th day of January, 1927.

EMIL WEBBER, Linn County. Convicted at the March term, 1926, of the offense of larceny of motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Emil Webber returned to the home of his parents in Pipestone Township, Barrien County, Michigan. Suspension was issued on the 4th day of January, 1927.

H. D. IVEY, Chickasaw County. Convicted at the January term, 1922, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole and thereunder the said H. D. Ivey returned to Hutchinson, Kansas, to join his wife. This suspension of sentence is granted in lieu of the one issued on the 23rd day of December, 1926, as the charges against this party in Texas were dismissed. Suspension was issued on the 10th day of January, 1927.

J. J. PELAN, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1920, of the offense of incest, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty-five years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. J. Pelan was permitted to go to Nebraska to establish himself on his farm. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of January, 1927.

W. P. BAILEY, Kossuth County. Convicted at the July term, 1925, of the offense of burglary, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said W. P. Bailey was permitted to go to Kansas City, Missouri to complete his high school education, after which he is to

attend college. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of January, 1927.

MARIAN EDEN, Linn County. Convicted at the Vacation term, 1924, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Marian Eden was permitted to take up a new residence away from her old environment. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of January, 1927.

WM. H. NEIGHBOUR, Monroe County. Convicted at the March term, 1925, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Wm. H. Neighbour was permitted to go to the United States veteran's hospital at Excelsior Springs, Missouri, for treatment. Suspension was issued on the 31st day of January, 1927.

HYMAN FOGEL, Linn County. Convicted at the January term, 1924, of the offense of burning to injure insurer, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Hyman Fogel was permitted to go to Kansas City, Missouri, where he had a position offered him and where he could be reunited with his family. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of February, 1927.

LUCILLE McMICHAEL, Montgomery County. Convicted at the January term, 1923, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Lucille McMichael was permitted to go to Detroit, Michigan, with her husband. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of March, 1927.

LUCILLE McMICHAEL, Calhoun County. Convicted at the October term, 1925, of the offense of escape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Lucille McMichael was permitted to go to Detroit, Michigan, with her husband. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of March, 1927.

KATHLEEN HENDRICKS, Woodbury County. Convicted at the January term, 1924, of the offense of illegally dispensing narcotic drugs, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and

the county attorney who prosecuted the case, and thereunder the said Kathleen Hendricks was permitted to go to the home of her sister in Omaha, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of March, 1927.

W. E. BRUNDAGE, Story County. Convicted at the March term, 1925, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said W. E. Brundage over to the authorities of the State of Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of March, 1927.

J. R. HODGES, Montgomery County. Convicted at the February term, 1923, of the offense of manslaughter, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed eight years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. R. Hodges was permitted to go to Excelsior Springs, Missouri, with his brother. Suspension was issued on the 21st day of March, 1927.

EDWARD HIRNER, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1925, of the offense of assault with intent to commit robbery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Edward Hirner was permitted to accept employment with the Buchanan Brothers Show. Suspension was issued on the 25th day of March, 1927.

WILLIAM ELLINGTON, Mahaska County. Convicted at the December term, 1922, of the offense of assault with intent to commit rape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney who prosecuted the case, and thereunder the said William Ellington was permitted to go to Kansas City, Missouri, where his wife resides. Suspension was issued on the 29th day of April, 1927.

WARREN HOMSHER, Lucas County. Convicted at the September term, 1924, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Warren Homsher was permitted to accompany his parents to California, where they expect to make their future home. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of May, 1927.

H. H. HARROLD, Wapello County. Convicted at the January term, 1926, of the offense of fraudulent banking, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the penitentiary. This

suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge, and the county attorney who prosecuted the case, and thereunder the said H. H. Harold was permitted to go to Columbus, Ohio, where he had a position offered him with the Maytag Washing Machine Company. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of May, 1927.

S. J. CINNAMON, Marion County. Convicted at the January term, 1924, of the offense of burning to injure insurer, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said S. J. Cinnamon was permitted to go to St. Joseph, Missouri, where he had a position offered him and where he could be reunited with his family. Suspension was issued on the 28th day of May, 1927.

FRANCIS KELLEY, Jones County. Convicted at the February term, 1926, of the offense of escape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Francis Kelley was permitted to go to Tripp County, South Dakota, to work on his father's farm. Suspension was issued on the 28th day of May, 1927.

JOHN HOLDPER, alias JOHN KEEVER, Lee County. Convicted at the April term, 1921, of the offense of escape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Holdper, alias John Keever, was permitted to go to Dallas, Texas, to live with his mother. Suspension was issued on the 28th day of May, 1927.

DAILY KINCAID, Polk County. Convicted at the April term, 1924, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Daily Kincaid was permitted to go to his uncle at Ovid, Colorado, who promised to give him employment. Suspension was issued on the 31st day of May, 1927.

WALTER CAPE, Linn County. Convicted at the July term, 1926, of the offense of larceny of a motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Walter Cape was permitted to go to the home of his parents in Maysville, Kentucky. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1927.

STEVE DEER, Dubuque County. Convicted at the July term, 1921, of the offense of robbery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate

term, not to exceed twenty years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Steve Deer was to be delivered to the duty authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor Immigration Service for the purpose of deportation to Serbia as an undesirable alien. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1927.

RAY T. JENNINGS, Boone County. Convicted at the October term, 1926, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Ray T. Jennings was permitted to go to his parents in Brookings, South Dakota. Suspension was issued on the 16th day of June, 1927.

W. L. KING, alias ROY MCCURDY, Boone County. Convicted at the August term, 1926, of the offense of burglary, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney who prosecuted the case, and thereunder the said W. L. King, alias Roy McCurdy was permitted to go to his parents at Tulsa, Oklahoma. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of June, 1927.

JOHN A. BACHMAN, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1928, of the offense of obtaining money by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John A. Bachman was permitted to go to Welton, Arizona, where he had a position offered him. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of June, 1927.

WILLIAM CHARLES, Dallas County. Convicted at the September term, 1926, of the offense of rape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty-five years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said William Charles was permitted to go to his home at Terrell, Texas. Suspension was issued on the 29th day of June, 1927.

SLAYTON NEWMAN, Sioux County. Convicted at the September term, 1926, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and county attorney, and thereunder the said Slayton Newman was permitted to go to South Dakota with his family. Suspension was issued on the 6th day of August, 1927.

CLARENCE BUTLER, Poweshiek County. Convicted at the August term, 1925, of the offense of breaking and entering a railway car, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Clarence Butler was permitted to go to Overton, Texas, where his father resides. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of August, 1927.

WILSON DEVRIES, Clay County. Convicted at the September term, 1921, of the offense of daylight bank robbery, and sentenced to serve a term of life in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Wilson DeVries was permitted to go to his home in Cheney, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of August, 1927.

JOSEPH W. HOUSE, JR., Benton County. Convicted at the April term, 1925, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Joseph W. House, Jr., was permitted to go to Detroit, Michigan, where his relatives reside. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of August, 1927.

JOHN S. SCHNIEDERS, Dubuque County. Convicted at the May term, 1926, of the offense of fraudulent banking, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John S. Schnieders was permitted to go to Los Angeles, California, to join his family. Suspension was issued on the 26th day of August, 1927.

IVOR LEWIS, Scott County. Convicted at the March term, 1925, of the offense of larceny of a motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and for the purpose of turning the said Ivor Lewis over to the authorities of DeKalb County, Sycamore, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1927.

MILTON WELCH, Floyd County. Convicted at the July term, 1921, of the offense of larceny from a building at night time, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Milton Welch was permitted to go to his mother in Los Angeles, California, accompanied by his wife and children. Suspension was granted on account of the physical condition of the defendant. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1927.

ELEANOR DROUILLARD KEENE, Benton County. Convicted at the April term, 1925, of the offense of obtaining money by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Eleanor Drouillard Keene was permitted to go to Ontario, Canada, where she will be with her two children and make a home for her father. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1927.

JAMES HANLON, Fayette County. Convicted at the September term, 1925, of the offense of attempt to produce abortion, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said James Hanlon was permitted to go to Chicago, Illinois, where he can secure employment. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of September, 1927.

LAWRENCE BARRON, Linn County. Convicted at the November (Vac.) term, 1923, of the offense of sodomy, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Lawrence Barron was permitted to go to Kendallville, Indiana, where his sister resides. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of September, 1927.

CHARLES APPELGATE, Linn County. Convicted at the November term, 1925, of the offense of cheating by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Charles Applegate was permitted to go to Tulsa, Oklahoma. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of September, 1927.

ROBERT TRIMBLE, Linn County. Convicted at the June Vacation term, 1925, of the offense of larceny of motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Robert Trimble was permitted to go to Chicago, Illinois, to join his wife. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of September, 1927.

CHARLES FEENSTRA, Osceola County. Convicted at the May Vacation term, 1925, of the offense of larceny of a motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. WILLIAM WEBER, Jasper County. Convicted at the April term, 1926, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of five months and to pay a fine of \$600.00, for the offense of bootlegging. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge and Senator A. H. Bergman of Newton. Suspension was issued on the 17th day of July, 1928.

ROLLA REIGHARD, Guthrie County. (Temporary Suspension). Convicted at the May term, 1928, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of three months and to pay a fine of \$300.00, for the offense of illegal possession of liquor. Temporary suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, and the county attorney who prosecuted the case, until October 1, 1928, for the purpose of affording the defendant an opportunity to work on the threshing machine to support his family, with the understanding that the period of the suspension was not to be deducted from the term of his sentence.
