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TONY GEIER, Black Hawk County. Committed to the men's reformatory at Anamosa on the 2nd day of October, 1918, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge, the county attorney who prosecuted the case, the present county attorney, the prosecuting witness, both Waterloo newspapers and many prominent citizens of the community, sentence was commuted to thirty years in said reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of May, 1929.

ALBERT ROTHBART, Humboldt County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 5th day of February, 1923, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 11th day of September, 1929.

ALBERT BARKER, Polk County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 10th day of June, 1924, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 14th day of November, 1929.

PETER JOHNSON, Winneshiek County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 21st day of August, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 14th day of November, 1929.

JOHN GINSKY, Delaware County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 26th day of January, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 14th day of November, 1929.

ARNOLD ZIMMER, Henry County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 15th day of March, 1907, to serve a term of life for the crime of murder, first degree. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted to sixty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 19th day of December, 1929.

EUGENE SANGSTER, Buchanan County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 9th day of October, 1923, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to thirty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 27th day of January, 1930.

EARL W. REED, Muscatine County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 4th day of October, 1927, to serve a term of life for the crime of carnal knowledge of imbecile female. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 5th day of March, 1930.

WILL CAREY, Guthrie County. Committed to the men's reformatory at Anamosa on the 25th day of October, 1918, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years. Commutation was executed on the 5th day of March, 1930.

CLIFFORD JONES, Polk County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 10th day of July, 1922, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of July, 1930.

LOUIS DEAKINS, Pottawattamie County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 7th day of October, 1920, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of July, 1930.

JOE RICKMAN, Sac County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 7th day of July, 1921, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county attorney, sentence was commuted to twenty-five years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 10th day of July, 1930.

FRANK ALPHONSO, Fayette County. Committed to the penitentiary at Fort Madison on the 2nd day of October, 1916, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon recommendation of the Board of Parole, sentence was commuted in order that the said Frank Alphonso might be taken in charge by the authorities of the United States under a warrant of deportation. Commutation was granted only for the purpose of deportation to Mexico. Commutation was executed on the 14th day of November, 1930.

FRED GENTRY, Cerro Gordo County. Committed to the reformatory on the 15th day of March, 1918, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge, the present county attorney, the sheriff of Cerro Gordo county, the county attorney who prosecuted the case, and Fred W. Marsh, former sheriff, and a number of representative citizens of

Cerro Gordo county, sentence was commuted to forty years in the reformatory. Commutation was executed on the 20th day of December, 1930.

GUS HAGEDORN, Audubon County. Committed to the penitentiary on the 29th day of February, 1924, to serve a term of life for the crime of rape. Upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the county attorney who prosecuted the case, the present county attorney, Judge H. J. Mantz, the eleven jurors in the case, and the complaining witness, sentence was commuted to forty years in said penitentiary. Commutation was executed on the 20th day of December, 1930.

SUSPENSIONS

WILBUR CROWELL, Monroe County. Convicted at the August (Vac.) term, 1927, of the offense of larceny of poultry, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Wilbur Crowell was permitted to go to Rock Island, Illinois, where he was promised employment with C. U. Scott & Son. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of January, 1929.

FRED ALLEE, Fremont County. Convicted at the January term, 1928, of the offense of larceny of poultry, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Fred Allee was permitted to go to Missouri with his father to work on a farm. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of February, 1929.

HARRY HILL, Scott County. Convicted at the April term, 1925, of the offense of larceny of motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Harry Hill was permitted to go to his parents at Aurora, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 12th day of February, 1929.

E. M. DILLON, Dallas County. Convicted at the November term, 1927, of the offense of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed one year, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, the county attorney, Mrs. J. E. Tawney, the injured party, the members of the Dallas County Bar Association, the congressional committeeman, the publisher of the Perry Free Press, G. E. Whitehead of the Chief Printing Company, and a number of representative citizens. Suspension was issued on the 15th day of February, 1929.

JIM HAWORTH, Polk County. Convicted at the November term, 1920, of the offense of robbery with a deadly weapon, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said Jim Haworth over to the authorities of the state of Missouri, where he was wanted as a parole violator from the state penitentiary at Jefferson City. Suspension was issued on the 21st day of February, 1929.

FRANK MAHER, Polk County. Convicted at the July term, 1924, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said Frank Maher over to the authorities of the state of Illinois, where he was wanted for escape from the Illinois state penitentiary. Suspension was issued on the 21st day of February, 1929.

EARL MAHER, Polk County. Convicted at the July term, 1924, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said Earl Maher over to the authorities of the state of Illinois, where he was wanted for escape from the Illinois state penitentiary. Suspension was issued on the 21st day of February, 1929.

TOM LOLIO, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1922, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said Tom Lolio over to the authorities of the state of Rhode Island, where he was wanted for escape. Suspension was issued on the 21st day of February, 1929.

HOMER H. BERKHOUS, Scott County. Convicted at the October term, 1924, of the offense of robbery with a deadly weapon, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty-five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Homer H. Berkhus was permitted to go to his mother at Corry, Pennsylvania. Suspension was issued on the 22nd day of February, 1929.

BILLIE JONES, Appanoose County. Convicted at the September term, 1926, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Billie Jones was permitted to go to Abingdon, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 22nd day of February, 1929.

CECIL L. SCHLEY, Dickinson County. Convicted at the March term, 1927, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Cecil L. Schley was permitted to cross the line into Minnesota to work for his parents on their farm. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of March, 1929.

PATRICK CULVER, Wapello County. Convicted at the March term, 1925, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Patrick Culver was permitted to go to Keenes, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of March, 1929.

J. O. OSTBY, Hancock County. Convicted at the December term, 1924, of the offense of fraudulent banking, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. O. Ostby was permitted to go to California, where he was guaranteed employment. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of March, 1929.

FLOYD McINTIRE, Polk County. Convicted at the April term, 1925, of the offense of robbery with a deadly weapon, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty-five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Floyd McIntire was permitted to go to Rockford, Illinois, where his parents reside. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of April, 1929.

JOE SPANIO, Benton County. Convicted at the September term, 1927, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Joe Spanio was permitted to go to Rochester, N. Y. Suspension was issued on the 3rd day of April, 1929.

PETER B. LEE, Kossuth County. Convicted at the January term, 1927, of the offense of larceny by embezzlement, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Peter B. Lee was permitted to go with the McCaskey Register Company of Alliance, Ohio, for a two weeks' training course and thereafter he will be permitted to represent the same company in the state of Wisconsin. Suspension was issued on the 30th day of April, 1929.

ELLIS DOVER, Marshall County. Convicted at the January term, 1927, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the re-

formatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Ellis Dover was permitted to go to his father at Brashear, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 30th day of April, 1929.

JOHN SPELLMAN, Harrison County. Convicted at the August term, 1920, of the offense of robbery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Spellman was permitted to go to his brother at Camden, New Jersey. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of May, 1929.

JOHN SPELLMAN, Lee County. Convicted at the September term, 1921, of the offense of escape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Spellman was permitted to go to his brother at Camden, New Jersey. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of May, 1929.

GEORGE D. WILSON, Washington County. Convicted at the January term, 1927, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said George D. Wilson was permitted to go to his sister at Hemmingford, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of May, 1929.

HELEN MAY KISH, Page County. Convicted at the February term, 1928, of the offense of false uttering of a check, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Helen May Kish was permitted to go to her people at Fairfax, Missouri. Suspension was issued on the 7th day of May, 1929.

HERMILO GARCIA, Cerro Gordo County. Convicted at the January term, 1928, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Hermilo Garcia was to be delivered to the duly authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico. Suspension was issued on the 23rd day of May, 1929.

HARRY BRANT, alias Harry Craft, Jasper County. Convicted at the August term, 1926, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, the trial judge and the county

attorney, and thereunder the said Harry Brant, alias Harry Craft was permitted to return to the United States Army at Fort Ringgold, Texas. Suspension was issued on the 1st day of June, 1929.

JOE HOFFEDITZ, Cedar County. Convicted at the August term, 1925, of the offense of forgery, two charges to run concurrently, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Joe Hoffeditz was permitted to go to Williamsfield, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 4th day of June, 1929.

MABLE WOLFE, Page County. Convicted at the March term, 1928, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the women's reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Mable Wolfe was permitted to go to Kansas City, Missouri, to her sister. Suspension was issued on the 11th day of June, 1929.

CLYDE E. MEREDITH, Des Moines County. Convicted at the September term, 1927, of the offense of obtaining money by false pretenses, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed seven years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Clyde E. Meredith was permitted to go to his family at Wenatchee, Washington. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of June, 1929.

CLAUDE BROCKERT, Shelby County. Convicted at the March term, 1927, of the offense of larceny of motor vehicle, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Claude Brockert was permitted to go to his people in Madison, Wisconsin. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of June, 1929.

EUGENE MOLER, Ringgold County. Convicted at the May term, 1927, of the offense of uttering a forged instrument, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed fifteen years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Eugene Moler was permitted to go to his father at Anderson, Indiana. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of June, 1929.

J. C. FOLGER, Sioux County. Convicted at the November term, 1925, of the offense of larceny by embezzlement, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said J. C. Folger was permitted to go to Los Angeles, Calif., where his family resides. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of June, 1929.

ROBERT DON CARLOS, Polk County. Convicted at the July term, 1919, of the offense of robbery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Robert Don Carlos was permitted to go to Brighton, Michigan, where his family resides. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of June, 1929.

BALTAZAR RODRIQUEZ, Cerro Gordo County. Convicted at the October term, 1925, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Baltazar Rodriquez was to be delivered to the duly authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico as an undesirable alien. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

RICHARD NERI, Polk County. Convicted at the September term, 1926, of the offense of larceny from a building in the night time, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Richard Neri was to be delivered to the duly authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico as an undesirable alien. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

NATID SALAZER, Polk County. Convicted at the January term, 1928, of the offense of larceny by embezzlement, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Natid Salazer was to be delivered to the duly authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

MODESTO GOMEZ, O'Brien County. Convicted at the September term, 1927, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole and thereunder the said Modesto Gomez was to be delivered to the duly authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

JARE MEDINO, O'Brien County. Convicted at the September term, 1927, of the offense of larceny, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Jare Medino was to be delivered to the duly

authorized agent of the United States Department of Labor, Immigration Service, for the purpose of deportation to Mexico. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

HENRY L. LAMON, alias Wm. Rogers, Jones County. Convicted at the February term, 1927, of the offense of escape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed five years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Henry L. Lamon, alias Wm. Rogers, was permitted to go to Buckingham, Colorado. Suspension was issued on the 19th day of June, 1929.

HAROLD SISK, Woodbury County. Convicted at the May term, 1925, of the offense of burglary with aggravation, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Harold Sisk was to be taken to his home in Nebraska by an agent of the American Legion Department of Nebraska for medical treatment. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

GARY KNAPP, Calhoun County. Convicted at the January term, 1925, of the offense of burglary, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Gary Knapp was permitted to go to his brother in Chicago, Ill. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

RAY JENSEN, Jackson County. Convicted at the June term, 1925, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, for the purpose of turning the said Ray Jensen over to the authorities of the state of Kansas. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

OTTO M. THYGESSEN, Webster County. Convicted at the October (Vac.) term, 1925, of the offense of forgery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Otto M. Thygesen was permitted to go to Randolph, Wisconsin, where he was offered employment. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

LEE LORAIN, Correct Name Garland Lee, Jackson County. Convicted at the August term, 1925, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Lee

Lorain, correct name, Garland Lee, was permitted to go to his relatives in Chicago, Illinois. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

RAY BOWMAN, Polk County. Convicted at the December term, 1922, of the offense of burglary by means of explosives, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed forty years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Ray Bowman was permitted to go to Seattle, Washington, to an uncle who has offered him employment. Suspension was issued on the 13th day of July, 1929.

ARTHUR SCHERER, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the July term, 1924, of the offense of robbery with aggravation, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed twenty years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Arthur Scherer was permitted to go to Omaha, Nebraska. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1929.

RALPH ROUNDS, Pottawattamie County. Convicted at the February term, 1926, of the offense of rape, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Ralph Rounds was permitted to go to Columbia, Missouri, where he was to be employed and take certain technical training. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1929.

GEORGE KEENAN, Dickinson County. Convicted at the April term, 1928, of the offense of breaking and entering, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said George Keenan was permitted to go to Watertown, South Dakota, where he was offered employment. Suspension was issued on the 27th day of August, 1929.

MARSHALL TAYLOR, Monona County. Convicted at the August term, 1926, of the offense of robbery, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed ten years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Marshall Taylor was permitted to go to Watertown, South Dakota. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of September, 1929.

ORVILLE RICKMAN, Dickinson County. Convicted at the February term, 1928, of the offense of conspiracy, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed three years, in the reformatory. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said Orville Rickman was permitted to go to Jackson, Minnesota, where he was offered employment. Suspension was issued on the 9th day of September, 1929.

JOHN VOSBURG, Linn County. Convicted at the March term, 1928, of the offense of maintaining a liquor nuisance, and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term, not to exceed three years, in the penitentiary. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the Board of Parole, and thereunder the said John Vosburg was permitted to go to Missouri to work on the farm of Warden Hollowell. Suspension was issued on the 20th day of September, 1929.

FRED WALTZ, Dubuque County. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, the county attorney who prosecuted the case, Hon. Wm. J. Goodwin, and Joe Malett, deputy sheriff. It is understood that for the same act for which he is now serving time in the county jail he has heretofore served one year, less good time, in the federal penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth. Suspension was issued on the 8th day of March, 1930.

WILLIAM CARROLL, Hardin County. Convicted at the September term, 1929, and sentenced to imprisonment in the county jail for a term of one year, for the offense of desertion after seduction and marriage. This suspension was granted upon the recommendation of the trial judge, the county attorney who prosecuted the case, the sheriff, Mrs. William Carroll, wife of the defendant, and Frank Selvest, father of Mrs. Carroll. Suspension was issued on the 18th day of March, 1930.
