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REPORT OF COMMISSION.

COMMISSIONERS OF PHARMACY FOR STATE OF IOWA, 7
DES MOINES, November 30, 1895.

To His Excellency, Frank D. Jackson, Governor:

We have the honor to submit the eighth biennial report of the commissioners of pharmacy as required by law; the work of the board; its doings; a correct abstract of the state pharmacy register to date, and a complete list, by counties, of all registered pharmacists who are in active business in each county.

We have raised the requirements of applicants for examination from one year's practical experience under the supervision of a registered pharmacist to two years. Four years ago no time was required in practical pharmacy before an applicantcould take the examination. Three years ago the board madea one year's requirement, and one year ago advanced it to twoyears, and we have no doubt will, in the near future, again make the requirements in practical work longer, and thus extend the advancement of the profession.

In our last report we had five hundred and seventy-one (571) green seal certificates in force that were registered without examination when the pharmacy law was enacted. This year we have only four hundred and seventy (470), being 101 less. Of this number twenty-four have died and the others have retired from the business. There were one thousand six hundred and thirty-nine (1,639) registered pharmacists in active business as proprietors in the state September 15, 1893; there are at this time one thousand seven hundred and fifty (1,750), showing a gain of one hundred and eleven (111) proprietors in two years. Estimating the number of proprietors who are in partnership, we think there are about one thousand four hundred and fifty (1,450) drug stores in the state.

In our last report we showed seven hundred and twenty-one permits to sell liquors under chapter 35, laws of 1890 in use. In this report we show there are seven hundred and ninety (790), showing a gain in the permits in force of ten per cent. This gain comes from counties where the prohibition law was not enforced before the Martin law went into effect, and no doubt that law caused many druggists to take out permits in order to protect themselves.

The present law regulating the sale of liquors by registered pharmacists is most rigid, and if enforced would restrict the sale of liquors by drug stores to the actual uses as medicine and not a beverage. In our opinion the large majority of the druggists in the state would be pleased to see this law enforced by the proper authorities.

REGULATIONS.

DES MOINES, December 1, 1895. Regulations Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 15, 19, 20, 23 and 24, having become null and void are omitted. (See regulation No. 10.)

> [GOVERNING SALE OF PARIS GREEN.] REGULATION No. 5.

The sales of Paris green (i. e., arsenic and its preparations), being one of the poisons included in schedule A, section 9, of chapter 75, of the acts of the Eighteeth General Assembly. should be entered in the poison register. It is, therefore, unlawful for any person except a registered pharmacist to retail the same for any purpose whatever.

[RELATING TO THE SALE OF HOMEOPATHIC MEDICINES.] REGULATION No. 6.

The sale of homoepathic medicines (not proprietary) properly comes under the regulations of the pharmacy law. The sale, therefore, of any quantity of arsenic, aconine, nux vomica, belladonna and other poisonous preparations enumerated in schedules A or B, section 9, should be sold as herein required. A technical construction is warranted in the sale (except as provided in section 9) of a single bottle of these remedies, notwithstanding the contents of an entire bottle proved harmless, as the purchase and use of several bottles of the same might prove fatal.

[TIMES AND PLACE FOR EXAMINATION.]

REGULATION No. 8.

As Amended May 1, 1895.

Examinations will be conducted at Des Moines, Oskaloosa, Sheldon and Hawarden on the first Tuesday of each month.

Blank applications can be obtained of either commissioner or secretary, and should be filed with the commissioner, or secretary before whom the applicant will appear, in advance of examination day.

[CANCELLATION OF CERTIFICATES FRAUDULENTLY OBTAINED.]

REGULATION No. 9.

As Amended October 15, 1887.

When the commissioners of pharmacy have cause for believing any improper aid was made use of by registered pharmacists, who passed examination on answers subscribed under oath before notaries public, or any person acting under official instruction, or before a commissioner of pharmacy, they will summon such registered pharmacists before either one of the commissioners, or the board of commissioners, for a supplementary examination, to verify the papers upon which such decision of their competency was based; and if they fail to reasonably verify such original examination when notified, the

commissioners will cancel their certificates and will strike their names from the register. And all persons registered "without examination," or "by examination," upon false representation, or by fraudulent means, will be stricken from the register whenever the board receives notice of conviction, as per section 11 of the pharmacy law.

[REGULATIONS ANNULLED.]

REGULATION No. 10.

As Amended April 27, 1888.

Changes in the pharmacy law make some new regulations necessary, and render some heretofore made unnecessary. Therefore all regulations and parts of regulations in conflict with latter regulations are annulled.

[REVOCATION OF CERTIFICATES ON TRANSACTION OF COURT RECORDS.]

REGULATION No. 11.

As Amended June 10, 1887.

In all cases hereafter brought before the commission of pharmacy for the purpose of revoking certificates of registration, as provided in sections 7 and 9, of the pharmacy law, when said cases are based on court records, the prosecution will be required to file with the secretary of this board certified copies of the same, showing final judgment of conviction under the taw relating to the adulteration of drugs, chemicals and medicinal preparations, as provided in section 7, or to the law relating to the retailing of poisons, as provided in section 9 of the pharmacy law; and that the convicted parties be identified by giving the number of their certificate; whereupon written notice will be served on the convicted registered pharmacist to show

cause in writing, if any, why his or her name should not be stricken from the state pharmacy register.

[RELATING TO ITINERANT LICENSES.]
REGULATION No. 12.

Section 10, chapter 75, acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly, as amended by chapter 137, acts of the Nineteenth General Assembly, entirely governs the licensing of itinerant vendors of appliances of any kind for the treatment of diseases or injury. The words "any itinerant vendor," applies to each traveling agent or seller who travels from place to place selling such appliances, and not to the manufacturer, unless said manufacturer also acts as an itinerant vendor.

Licenses under this section are transferable for the unexpired term by the last owner of said license sending the same to the secretary for record of transfer and endorsement thereon.

[FORFEITURE OF REGISTRATION.]

REGULATION No. 13.

As Amended May 10, 1888,

Druggists and pharmacists who were registered without examination forfeit their registration when they have voluntarily sold, parted with, or severed their connection with the drug business for a period of two years; should such party who has forfeited his registration wish to re-engage in the practice of pharmacy, he is required to be registered by examination as per section 5, and no renewal certificates will be issued to delinquents unless they file an affidavit showing that they are legally entitled to the same.

As Amended September 9, 1886.

The sale of "Rough on Rats," or any vermicide containing poisons included in schedule A, section 9, of chapter 77, of the acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly, as amended, should be entered in the poison register. It is, therefore, unlawful for any person except a registered pharmacist to retail the same for any purpose whatever.

[PROPRIETARY MEDICINES CONTAINING INTOXICATING LIQUORS.]

REGULATION No. 17.

As Amended April 24, 1890.

All bitters, cordials, elixirs, wines, etc., put up in the form of proprietary medicines, that can be used as an intoxicant, can

only be sold by persons authorized to sell intoxicating liquors, and then only in the same manner as any other intoxicating liquor, by requiring purchasers to apply as per form "E." Adopted April 24, 1890.

[DOMESTIC REMEDIES.] REGULATION No. 18. As Amended April 24, 1890.

The words, "such other domestic remedies," as referred to in section 4, chapter 83, laws of 1886, are hereby construed to mean: The so-called non-secret remedies. The law itself provides that same "do not include any intexicating liquors or poisons," Adopted April 24, 1890.

All pharmacy regulations to take effect and be in force in ten days after the date of their first publication in the official circular of the commissioners of pharmacy.

PROPRIETARY MEDICINES CONTAINING POISON.

REGULATION No. 22.

Under the provisions of chapter 83, laws of 1886, all proprietary medicines containing poison can only be sold by registered pharmacists as provided by the pharmacy law and pharmacy regulations.

REGULATION No. 25,

Applicants for registration by examination will be deemed "competent and fully qualified" as provided in section 5, chapter 75, laws of 1880, and entitled to certificate as registered pharmacists, when having at least two years practical experience in a drug store or pharmacy; provided, that the actual time spent in a recognized college of pharmacy will be considered as practical experience but no more than one year of such time will be allowed, or, if a graduate of a recognized medical college at least three years in the actual practice of medicine, and when upon examination they shall give further satisfactory evidence of fitness.

Applicants for registration under 21 years but not less than 18 years of age, having had a practical experience of at least two years in a drug store or pharmacy, or college as above specified, who have upon examination given satisfactory evidence of qualification, will be registered as assistant pharmacists and certificates issued accordingly; and said certificates of assistant pharmacists will, upon application be exchanged for certificates of regular registration when the holders thereof shall have arrived at the age of 21 years.

SPECIAL NOTICES.

As Amended May 10, 1888.

The commissioners desire to call the attention of all registered pharmacists to some of the important points of the law.

First.—That none but registered pharmacists can conduct a drug store or pharmacy; they must be the principals and managers of the store in all its management; neither can they allow any one not registered to sell medicines or poisons, or dispense physicians' prescriptions, except under their direct supervision.

(See supreme court decision, State v. Norton, page 33.)

Second.—Sales of medicine and poisons can only be made by proprietor, principal or clerk who is a registered pharmacist and who is required to keep a record of all poisons sold, included in schedule A.

Third.—The certificates of all registered pharmacists must be conspicuously posted in the place of business or pharmacy which they are conducting, or in which they are employed, with the renewal certificate placed in the lower left hand corner and change of locality certificate (if they have changed their locality) in lower right hand corner of each certificate, to show to the public that their certificate of registration is in full force and effect.

Fourth.—Under decisions of supreme court and amendments to section 4 of the pharmacy law (chapter 75), all registered pharmacists who were registered without examination (green and red seal certificates), forfeit their registration when they have voluntarily sold, parted with, or severed their connection with the drug business for a period of two years at the place designated in certificate of registration; that is, those who voluntarily sever their connection with the drug business and remain out of the business for a period of two years forfeit their registration, and those who have voluntarily sold out their business or removed to another place prior to April 19, 1888, forfeit their registration in two years from the day they sold out or severed their connection with the drug business at the place designated in the certificate of registration. All such

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who wish to re-engage or continue in the practice of pharmacy are required to be registered by examination. Provided, however, that any such pharmacists who have sold or may sell out their business at the place designated in their certificate of registration and remove to another place in the state, after April 19, 1888, and re-engage in the drug business within a period of two years from the time they sold out or severed their connection with the drug business, and have paid their annual renewal on or before the 22d day of March of each year, their certificate will remain in force. Provided, further, that pharmacists registered without examination (green or red seal) who may voluntarily sell, part with, or sever their connection with the drug business, at the place designated in their certificate of registration, after July 4, 1890, will not forfeit their registration if they remain out of business for a period of two years or more, but their registration will remain in force as long as they keep their certificates renewed annually.

Fifth.—All registered pharmacists when they change their locality are required to notify the secretary of the commission, and have their change of locality recorded, otherwise they are liable to a fine for each month's delinquency, and when so delinquent their certificates are not in full force and effect. (See secretary's notice No. 3.)

Sixth.—A registered pharmacist's certificate is regarded "in full force and effect" when he holds a renewal of his certificate from March 22d to March 22d of the current year, and change of locality certificate if he has changed his location, unless subsequently forfeited and revoked. (See opinion of attorney-general.)

Whereas, Annual renewals are not required or issued for the first part of a year preceding the 22d day of March, the pharmacist's certificate of registration is evidence that it is in full force and effect from the date of its issuance to the following 22d day of March; however, the certified statement up to date of the secretary of the commission of pharmacy, under official seal of said commission, is regarded the best legal evidence as to whether a person is registered or not.

SECRETARY'S NOTICE.

No. 1. Before correspondents write for opinions they should first study the law, regulations and decisions, as compiled and published by the board, and then make separate specific statements of facts, and not expect opinions on general statements.

No. 2. N. B.—It may not occur to registered pharmacists the amount of time it takes in looking up the records of a registered pharmacist without having the number of his certificate, as well as the difficulty sometimes in identifying his name without his number. It is impossible to keep a correct alphabetical list of names, owing to the constant change, some names retiring and new names being added. When we have the number of a certificate we can turn to the records in a moment on the numerical list.

Having frequently made the request heretofore, we again earnestly request all registered pharmacists when corresponding or desiring any matters of information from this office to give the number of their certificates with their names.

No. 3. As the secretary is accountable for all fees accruing under the law, according to the records of the office, a record of change of locality cannot be made and certificates issued, unless the fee required by law accompany the application for such change. 16

IOWA PHARMACY LAW.

CHAPTER 75.

ACTS OF THE RIGHTEENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 137, ACTS OF THE NINETEENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY, CHAPTER S. ACTS OF THE TWENTY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY, CHAPTERS 71, 81, AND 106, ACTS OF THE TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY, AND CHAPTER 36, ACTS OF THE TWENTY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY, TO REGULATE THE SALE OF MEDICINES AND POISONS.

AN ACT to Regulate the Practice of Pharmacy and the Sale of Medicines and Poisions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa;

SECTION 1. That from and after the passage of this act it shall be unlawful for any person, not a registered pharmacist within the meaning of this act, to conduct any pharmacy, drug store, anothecary shop or store for the purpose of retailing, compounding or dispensing medicines or poisons, and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to pay a penalty of five dollars for each day of such violation and cost of prosecution. Suits brought to recover any of the penalties provided for in this act (chapter 71, laws of 1888), or the acts to which it is amendatory, shall be instituted in the name of the state of Iowa by the county attorney, or under the direction and by the authority of the commissioners of pharmacy for the state of Iowa. In all cases brought under this act (chapter 71, laws of 1888), or the acts to which it is amendatory, the prosecution need not prove that the defendant has not the required pharmacy certificate of registration; if the defendant has such certificate he must produce it.

SEC. 2. That it shall be unlawful for the proprietor of any store or pharmacy to allow any person except a registered pharmacist to compound or dispense the prescriptions of physicians, or to retail or dispense poisons for medicinal use, except as an aid to, and under the supervision of, a registered pharmacist. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be liable to a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, for each and every such offense,

SEC. 3. The governor, with the advice of the executive council, shall appoint three persons from among the most competent pharmacists of the state, all of whom shall have been residents of the state for five years, and of at least five years' practical experience in their profession, who shall be known and styled as commissioners of pharmacy for the state of Iowa; one of whom shall hold his office for one year, one for two years and the other for three years, and each until his successor shall be appointed and qualified; and each year thereafter another commissioner shall be appointed for three years and until a successor be appointed and qualified. If a vacancy occur in said commission, another shall be appointed, as aforesaid, to fill the unex

pired term thereof. Said commissioners shall have power to make by-laws and all necessary regulations for the proper fulfillment of their duties under this act, without expense to the state. Except that the secretary of state is authorized to furnish suid commissioners with stationery and blanks necessary for their office. And said commissioners are authorized to administer oaths and take and certify the acknowledgments of instruments in writing.

SEC. 4. The commissioners of pharmacy shall register in a suitable book the names and places of residence of all persons to whom they issue certificates, and dates thereof. Druggists and pharmacists who are registered without examination shall not forfeit their registration when they have voluntarily sold, parted with or severed their connection with the drug business for a period of two years at the place designated in certificate of registration. Should such party wish to reengage in the practice of pharmacy, he will not be required to be registered by examination as per section 5. Provided, that registered pharmacists who remove to another locality and reengage in the practice of pharmacy within a period of two years, and have paid to the commission of pharmacy the sum of one dollar on or before the 22d day of March of each year, as provided in this chapter, such registered pharmacists shall not be required to register by examination, but his former regi-tration shall be in full force and effect. Every registered pharmacist who desires to continue his profession shall, on or before the 22d day of March of each year, pay to the commission of pharmacy the sum of one dollar, for which he shall receive a renewal of his certificate, unless his name has been stricken from the register for violation of law. It shall be the duty of each registered pharmacist, before changing the locality as designated in his certificate of registration to notify the secvotary of the commission of pharmacy of his new place of business, and for recording the same and certification thereto the secretary shall be entitled to receive fifty cents for each certificate. It shall be the duty of each registered pharmacist to conspicuously post his certificate of registration in his place of business. Any person continuing in business, who shall fail or neglect to procure his annual renewal of registration, or who shall change his place of business without complying with this section, or who shall fall to conspicuously post his certificate of registration in his place of business, shall for each such offense be liable to a fine of ten dollars for each calendar month during which he is so delinquent.

SEC. 5. That the said commissioners of pharmacy shall, upon application, and at such time and place and in such manner as they may determine, examine, either by a schedule of questions to be answered and subscribed to under oath or orally, each and every person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, medicines or chemicals for medicinal use, or compounding or dispensing physicians' prescriptions as pharmacists, and if a majority of said commissioners shall be satisfied that said person is competent and fully qualified to conduct said business of compounding or dispensing drugs, medicines or chemicals for medicinal use, or to compound and dispense physicians' prescriptions. they shall enter the name of such person as a registered pharmacist in the book provided for in section 4 of this act; and that all graduates in pharmacy, having a diploma from an incorporated college or school of pharmacy

that requires a practical experience in pharmacy of not less than four years before granting a diploma, shall be entitled to have their names registered as pharmacists by said commissioners of pharmacy without examination.

Size, 6. That the commissioners of pharmacy shall be entitled to demand and receive from each person whom they register and furnish a certificate as a registered pharmacist, without examination, the sum of 82 and from each and every person whom they examine orally, or whose answers to a schedule of questions are returned subscribed to under eath, the sum of 85, which shall be in full for all services. And in case the examination of said person shall prove defective and unsatisfactory, and his name not be registered, he shall be permitted to present himself for re-examination within any period not exceeding twelve months next thereafter, and no charge shall be made for such re-examination.

SEC. 7. Every registered pharmacist shall be held responsible for the quality of all drags, chemicals and medicines he may sell or dispense, with the exception of those sold in the original packages of the manufacturer, and also those known as "patent medicines," and sheald he knowingly, intentionally and fraudulently adulterate, or cause to be adulterated, such drags, chemicals, or medical preparations, he shall be deemed guity of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$100, and in addition thereto, his name be stricken from the register.

SEC. 8. Pharmacists whose certificates of registration are in full force and effect, shall have the sele right to keep and to sell under such regulations as have been or may be established from time to time by the commissioners of pharmacy, all medicines and poisons, excepting intoxicating liquors.

SEC 9. It shall be unlawful for any person, from and after the passage of this act, to retail any poisons enumerated in schedules "A" and "B," except as follows:

SCHEDULE A.

Arsenic, and its preparations, corrosive sublimate, white precipitate, red precipitate, bindidde of mercury, cyanide of potassium, bydrocyanic acid, strychnia, and all other poisonous vegetable alkaloitis, and their salts, essential oil of bitter almonds, opium and its preparations, except paregorie and other preparations of opium containing less than two grains to the ounce.

SCHEDULE B.

Aconite, belladonna, colchicum, conium, nux vemica, henbane, savin, call conton root, cantharides, croosote, digitalis, and their pharmaceutical preparations, croton oil, chloroform, chloral hydrate, sulphate of zinc, mineral acids, carbolic acid and oxalic acid, without distinctly labeling the box, vessel or paper in which the said poison is contained, and also the outside wrapper or cover, with the name of the article, the word "poison," and the name and place of business of the seller. Nor shall it be lawful for any person to sell and deliver any poison enumerated in schedules "A" and "B" unless, upon due inquiry, it be found that the purchaser is aware of its poisonous character, and represents that it is to be used for a legitimate purpose. Nor shall it be lawful for any registered pharmacist to soll any poisons included in schedule "A" without, before delivering the same to

the purchaser, causing an entry to be made, in a book kept for that purpose, stating the date of sale, the name and address of the purchaser, the name of the poison sold, the purpose for which it is represented by the purchaser to be required, and the name of the dispenser; such book to be always open for inspection by the proper authorities, and to be preserved for at least five years. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the dispensing of poisons, in not unusual quantities or doses, upon the preservitions of practitioners of medicine. Nor shall it be lawful for any licensed or registered druggist or pharmaels to retail, or sell, or give away, any alcoholic liquers or compounds as a beverage, and any violations of the provisions of this section shall make the owner or principal of said store or pharmacy liable to a fine of not less than \$25, and not more than \$100, to be collected in the usual manner; and, in addition thereto, for repeated violations of this section, his name shall be stricken from the register.

SEC. 10. Any itinerant vender of any drug, nostrum, ointment or appliance of any kind, intended for the treatment of diseases or injury, who shall, by writing or printing, or by any other method, publicly profess to cure or treat diseases, or injury, or deformity, by any drug, nostrum, or manipulation, or other expedient, shall pay a license of \$100 per annum, to be paid to the treasurer of the commission of pharmacy. Whereupon the secretary of the said commission shall issue such license for one year. Any person violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction, pay a fine of not less than \$100, nor more than \$200, all moneys received for license to be reported to the auditor of state. The sum of \$2,000 per year, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the moneys so received for licenses for the expenses of said commission, all exceeding said amo int to be paid into the state treasury.

SEC. 11. That any person who shall procure, or attempt to procure, registration for himself or for another under this act, by making, or causing to be made, any false representations, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty of not less than \$25, nor more than \$100, and the name of the person so traudulently registered be stricken from the register. Any person, not a registered pharmacist, as provided for in this act, who shall conduct a store, pharmacy, or place for retailing, compounding, or dispensing drugs, medicines or chemicals for medicinal use, or for compounding or dispensing physicians' prescriptions, or who shall take, use or exhibit the title of registered pharmacist, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$50, nor more than \$200.

SEC. 12. Physicians dispensing their own prescriptions only, are not required to be registered pharmacists. Provided, that nothing in this act (chapter 83, laws 1886) shall prevent any person not a registered pharmacist, or not holding a permit, from keeping and selling proprietary medicines, and such other demestic remedies as do not include any intoxicating liquors or poisons. Nor from selling concentrated lye and potash, provided, however, that if any porson sell or deliver said concentrated lye or potash without having the word "poison" and the true name thereof written or

printed upon a label attached to the vial, box or parcel containing the same, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not more than thirty days, or by fine not exceeding \$100; but they shall not be compelled to register the sales of said lye and potash as required by section 4038, Code of 1873.

SEC. 13. This act, being deemed of immediate importance, shall take effect from and after its publication in the Jowa State Register and Iowa State Leader, newspapers published at Des Moines, Iowa.

CHAPTER 71.

TO REGULATE THE SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

AN ACT to provide for and regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors for necessary purposes, and to make more efficient the laws for the suppression of intemperance, and to repeal sections 1524, 1529, 1527, 1528, 1529, 1530, 1531, 1532, 1532, 1533, 1534, 1535, 1533, 1537 and 1538 of the Code of 1873, as amended by chapter 143, of the acts of the Twentieth General Assembly, and all that part of section two (2), chapter sighty-three (83), acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, after the words 'medicines and poisons" in the lifth line thereof; and to amend a ctions I and 4, chapter 15, acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly, and re provide penaltics and proceeding for violations of the provisions thereof.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

[NOTE.—Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19 of this chapter have been repealed by chapter 35, laws of 1890.]

SEC 20. That sections 1524, 1526, 1527, 1528, 1529, 1530, 1531, 1532, 1533, 1534, 1535, 1536, 1537 and 1538 of the Code of 1873, as amended by chapter 153 of the acts of the Twentieth General Assembly, and all that part of section two (2), chapter eighty-three (83), acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, after the words "medicines and poisons" in the fifth line thereof, be and the same is hereby repealed, and by inserting after the word poison in the fifth line of section 2, chapter 83, acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, the following words: "Excepting intoxicating liquors:" Provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed to abate any action or proceeding now pending in any court in this state for a violation of the provisions of the section hereby repealed, or to operate to bar any prosecutions hereafter brought for any such violations committee prior to the passage and taking effect of this act.

SEC. 21. That section I, chapter 75 of the acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly be, and the same is hereby amended by striking out the words "for medical use, except as hereinafter provided," at the end of said section and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to pay a penalty of five dollars for each day of such violation, and cost of prosecution. Suits brought to recover any of the penalties provided for in this act or the acts to which it is amendatory, shall be instituted in the name of the state of Iowa by the county attorney or under the direction and by the authority of the commissioners of pharmacy for the state of Iowa. In all cases brought under this act or the acts to which it is amendatory, the prosecution need not prove that the defendant has not the required pharmacy certificate of registration; if the defendant has such certificate he must produce it."

SEC. 22. That section 4, chapter 75 of the acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly be, and the same is hereby amended by striking out the words "a duplicate of which is to be kept in the secretary of state's office," in the second and third lines of said section.

SEC. 23. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Iowa State Register and Des Moines Leader, newspapers published in Des Moines, Iowa. Approved April 12, 1888.

CHAPTER SL.

TO AMEND CHAPTER 83, ACTS OF TWENTY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY.
SALE OF POISONS.

AN ACT to Amend Chapter 83, Acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, Relating to the Sale of Poisons.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Lowa;

SECTION 1. That section 4, chapter 83, acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, be, and the same is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof the following:

"Nor from selling concentrated lye and potash, provided, however, that if any person sell or deliver said concentrated lye or potash without having the word 'polson' and the true name thereof written or printed upon a label attached to the vial, box, or parcel containing the same, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not more than thirty days, or by fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, but they shall not be compelled to register the sales of said lye and potash, as required by section 4038, Code of 1873."

SEC. 2. This act being doemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect on and after its publication in the Iowa State Register and Dally Des Moines Leader, newspapers published in Des Moines, Iowa.

Approved March 28, 1888.

CHAPTER 106.

REMOVAL FROM ONE PLACE TO ANOTHER OF REGISTERED PHARMACISTS.

AN ACT to Amend Section 1, Chapter 137, Laws of the Nineteenth (19th) General Assembly, Relating to Registered Pharmacists.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That section one (1), chapter one hundred and thirty-seven (131), laws of the Nineteenth General Assembly, be amended by adding to (131), laws of the number "five" (5) in the eleventh line, the following: "Provided that registered pharmacists who remove to another locality, and re-engage in the practice of pharmacy within a period of two years, and have paid to the commission of pharmacy the sum of one dollar on or before the 22d day of March of each year, as provided in this chapter. Such registered pharmacist shall not be required to register by examination, but his former registration shall be in full force and effect."

SEC. 2. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Iowa State Register and Delly Des Moines Leader, newspapers published at Des Moines, Iowa.

Approved April 12, 1888.

CHAPTER 36, LAWS OF 1890.

RELATING TO PHARMACISTS REGISTERED WITHOUT EXAMINATION.

AN ACT to Amend Section One (I) of Chapter One Hundred and Thirtyseven (137) Acts of the Nineteenth (19th) General Assembly, Relating to Pharmaclats Registered Without Examination.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That section one (1) of chapter one hundred and thirty-seven (137), acts of the Nineteenth (19th) General Assembly, be amended by inserting after the word "examination" in the fifth (5th) line the words "shall not," and by striking out the words "who has thus forfeited his registration" in the ninth (9th) line, and by striking out the word "is" in the tenth (10th) line and inserting in lieu thereof the words "will not be." Approved May 15, 1890.

Note.-The above act having no publication clause took effect July 4, 1800.

CHAPTER 35, LAWS OF 1890.

TO REGULATE THE KEEPING AND SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

AN ACT to provide for and regulate the keeping and sale of intoxicating liquors for lawful purposes, and to repeal sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, of chapter 71, laws of the Twenty-second General Assembly as amended by the Twenty-fifth General Assembly.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. That sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 18, 18 and 19, of chapter 71, laws of the Twenty-second General Assembly, be and the same are hereby repealed, and the following enacted in Heuthereof.

SEC. 2. That after this act takes effect no person shall manufacture for sale, sell, keep for sale, give away, exchange, barter or dispense any intoxicating liquor, for any purpose whatever, otherwise than is provided in this act. Persons holding permits, as herein provided, shall be authorized to sell and dispense intoxicating liquors for pharmaceutical and medical purposes, and alcohol for specified chemical mechanical purposes, and wine for sacramental purposes and to sell to registered pharmacists and manufacturers of proprietary medicines, for use in compounding medicines, and to permit-holders for use and re-sale by them, for the purposes authorized by this act, but for no other purposes whatever; and all permits must be procured, as hereinafter provided, from the district court of the proper county at any term thereof after this act takes effect, and a permit to buy and sell intoxic-ting liquors when so procured shall continue in force until revoked according to law. Provided, further, that this section shall not be construed to prevent licensed physicians from dispensing in good faith such liquors as medicine to patients actually sick and under their treatment at the time of such dispensing. Provided, further, that in case of death or other disability of any registered pharmacist, the administrator, guardian or legal representative of such pharmacist may continue such business subject to the provisions of this act through the agency of any reputable registered pharmacist, conditioned upon there being first obtained the approval of the district court or clerk thereof. Provided, further, that before entering upon such duties such party or person shall file with the cherk of said court a bond, as herein provided, to be approved by the clerk of said court.

SEC. 3. Notice of an application for a permit must be published for three consecutive weeks in a newspaper regularly published and printed in the English language, and of general circulation in the city or town where the applicant proposes to keep and sell intoxicating liquors, or, if there be no newspaper regularly published in such city or town, such publication shall be made in one of the official papers of the county, the last of which publication shall not be less than ten days nor more than twenty days before the first day of the term; and state the name of the applicant, with the firm name under which he is doing business, the purpose of the application, the particular location or the place where the applicant proposes to keep and sell liquors, and that the petition provided for in the next section will be on file in the cierk's office at least ten days before the first day of the term, naming it, when the application will be made, and a copy thereof shall be served personally upon the county attorney in the same manner and time as required for service of original notices in the district court.

Sec. 4. Applications for permits shall be made by petition signed and sworn to by the applicant, and filed in the office of the clerk of the district court of the proper county at least ten days before the first day of the term. which petition shall state the applicant's name, place of residence, in what business he is then engaged, and in what business he has been engaged for two years previous to filing the petition; the place, particularly describing it, where the business of buying and selling liquor is to be conducted: that he is a citizen of the United States and of the state of Iowa; that he is a registered pharmacist, and now is, and for the last six months has been, lawfully conducting a pharmacy in the township or town wherein he proposes to sell intoxicating liquors under the permit applied for, and as the proprietor of such pharmacy that he has not been adjudged guilty of viclating the law relating to intoxicating liquors within the last year next preceding his application; and is not the keeper of a hotel, eating house, saloon, restaurant or place of public amusement; that he is not addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and that he desires a permit. to purchase, keep and sell such liquors for lawful purposes only. And every applicant who has at any time taken out a permit under this act, which said permit has been revoked, shall, if he again apply for a permit, file with such application the further statement under oath, that he has not, within the last two years next preceding his application, been knowingly engaged, employed or interested in the unlawful manufacture, sale or keeping for sale of intoxicating liquors.

"Provided turther, when a pharmacist has procured a permit, and by reason of the expiration of his lease, or for any other good reason, he desires to change his locality to another place in the same township, town or ward, the court may grant to him, on his petition, the right to continue business under his permit in the same township, town or ward in which the permit is granted."

SEC. 5. This permit shall issue only on condition that the applicant shall execute to the state of Iowa a bond in the penal sum of \$1,000, with good and sufficient sureties to be approved by the clerk of the court, conditioned that he will well and truly observe and obey the laws of lows, now or hereafter in force, in relation to the sale of intoxicating liquors, that he will pay all fines, penalties, damages and costs that may be assessed or recovered against him for a violation of such laws during the term for which said permit is granted. The said bond shall be deposited with the county auditor, and suit shall be brought thereon at any time by the county attorney, or any person for whose benefit the same is given, and in case the conditions thereof, or any of them, shall be violated, the principals and sureties therein shall be jointly and severally liable for all civil damages. costs and judgments that may be obtained against the principal in any civil action brought by a wife, child, parent, guardian, employer or other person under the provisions of section 1556, 1557 and 1558 of the Code of Iowa. as the same is amended and now in force, and section 12, chapter 66, acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly of the state of Iowa. The clear proceeds of all other money collected for breaches of such bond shall go to the school fund of the county. Said bond shall be approved by the clerk of the district court, under the rules and laws applicable to the approval of official bonds. If at any time the sureties or any of them on said bond shall become insolvent or be deemed insufficient by the clerk of the district court, said clerk shall require a new bond to be executed within a time to be fixed by him, and a failure of the person holding such permit to execute such new and sufficient bond within the time fixed by said clerk therefor shall cause said permit to become null and void. If the application for the permit is granted, it shall not issue until the applicant shall make and subscribe an oath before the clerk, which shall be endorsed upon the boud o the effect and tenor following:

It is and traity perform all and singular the conditions of the within bond, and keep and perform the trust coefficied in me to purchase, keep and sell intosteating fiquors. I will not sell, give or furnish in any person any intractacting liquors otherwise than as previded by law, and, especially, I will not sell or furnish my intoxicating liquors to any person who is not known to me possonally, or duly identified; not to any minor, intoxicated persons or persons who are in the hants of becoming intoxicated; and I will make true, full and accurate returns of all certificates and requests made to or received by me, as required by law; and said returns shall show every sale and deliferry of such liquors mane by or for me during the months embraced thereta, and the true signature to every request received and granted; and such returns shall show all the intoxicating liquors sold or deliberated to any and every person as returned.

Upon taking said oath and filing bond as hereinbefore provided, the cirrk shall issue to him a permit authorizing him to keep and seli intoxicating liquors as in this are provided; and every permit so granted shall specify the building, giving the arrest and number, or location in which intoxicating liquors may be sold by virtue of the same, and the length of time the same shall be in force.

SEC 8. No application for a permit shall be considered or acted upon by the court until the requisite notice has been given and potition filed as provided by this act, and each is in form and substance such as required. On the first day of the term, having ascertained that the application is properly presented, the court shall proceed to hear the application, unless objection thereto be made, in which case the court shall appoint a day during the term, but not later, when the same shall be heard; and in doing so shall consider the convenience of the court, and the interested parties and their counsel so far as the state of the business and the necessities of the case will permit.

If unavoidable causes prevent a hearing during the regular time allotted to the term, the same shall be heard and disposed of in vacation by the judge as soon as practicable thereafter. The county attorney or other counsel or any five citizens may in person or by counsel appear and resist the application. Any remonstrance or objection thereto must be in writing and filed on or before noon of the first day of the said term or by such later time as may be fixed by the court and before the date fixed for hearing, and such remonstrance shall state specifically the objection thereto. And whether resisted or objection be made or not the court shall not grant the permit until it shall first be made to appear by competent evidence that the applicant is possessed of the character and qualifications requisite, is worthy of confidence and to receive the trust and will be likely to execute the same with fidelity; and that the statements made in his application are all and singular true, and, considering the population of the locality and the reasonable necessities and convenience of the people, such permit is proper. If the application is resisted the court or judge shall hear controversy upon the petitions, remonstrances and objections, and the evidence offered, and grant or refuse such permit, as the public good may require. If there be more than one permit applied for in the same locality they shall all be heard at the same time, unless for good cause otherwise directed, and the court may grant or refuse any or all of the applications as will best subserve the public interest

SEC 7. Permits granted under this act shall be deemed trusts reposed in the recipients thereof, and may be revoked upon sufficient showing, by order of the court, or judge thereof. Complaint may be presented at any time to the district court, or one of the judges thereof, which shall be in writing and signed and sworn to by three citizens of the county in which the permit was granted, and a copy of such complaint shall, with a notice in writing of the time and place of hearing be served on the accused, five days before the hearing, and if the complaint is sufficient, and the accused appear and deny the same, the court or judge shall proceed without delay, unless continued for cause, to hear and determine the controversy, but if continued or appealed at the instance of the permit-holder, his permit to buy and sell liquors may in the discretion of the court be suspended pending the controversy. The complainant and accused may be heard in person or by counsel or both, and submit such proofs as may be offered by the parties; and if it shall appear upon such hearing, that the accused has in any way abused the trust, or that liquors are sold by the accused or his employes in violation of law, or if it shall appear that any liquor has been sold or dispensed unlawfully or has been unlawfully obtained at said place from the holder of the permit or any employe assisting therein, or that he has, in any proceeding, civil or criminal, since receiving his permit, been adjudged guilty of violating any of the provisions of this act or the acts for the suppression of intemperance, the court or judge shall by order revoke and set aside the permit; the papers and order in such case shall be immediately returned to and filed by the clerk of the court, if heard by the judge and the order entered of record as if made in court, and if in this or any other proceeding, civil or criminal, it shall be adjudged by the court or judge that any registered pharmacist, proprietor or clerk who has been gullty of violating this act or the act for the suppression of intemperance and amendments thereto, by unlawfully manufacturing, selling, giving away or unlawfully keeping with intent to sell intoxicating liquors, such adjudication may in the discretion of the commissioners of pharmacy, if such violations are thereafter repeated, work a forfeiture of his certificate of registration. It shall be the duty of the clerk to forward to the commissioners of pharmacy such transcripts without charge therefor, as soon as practicable after final judgment or order.

SEC. 8. Registered pharmacists who show themselves to be fit persons and who comply with all the requirements of this act, may be granted permits, and in any township where there is a registered pharmacist conducting a pharmacy and no pharmacist obtains a permit, if found necessary the court may grant a permit to one discreet person in such township not a pharmacist, but having all other qualifications requisite under this act, upon like notice and proceedings as pertain to permitted pharmacists and subject to the same liabilities, duties, obligations and penalties

SEC. 9. The clerk of the court granting the permit shall preserve as a part of the record and files of his office all petitions, bonds, and other papers pertaining to the granting or revocation of permits and keeping suitable books in which bonds and permits shall be recorded. The books shall be furnished by the county like other public records. Whether said permit be granted or refused the applicant shall pay the costs incurred in the case, and when granted he shall make payment before any permit issue, except the court may tax the cost of any witnesses summoned by private persons resisting said application, and the fees for serving such subpœnas to such persons when it is shown that such witnesses were summoned maliciously, or without probable cause to believe their evidence material. A fee of one dollar and fifty cents shall be taxed for the filing of the petition and one dollar for entering the order of the court approving bond and granting said application, and witnesses shall be entitled to mileage and per diem as in other cases And fees for serving notices and subporns shall be the same as in other cases in the district court.

SEC. 10. Before selling or delivering any intoxicating liquors to any person, a request must be printed or written, dated of the true date, stating the applicant is not a minor, and the residence of the signer, for whom and whose use the liquor is required, the amount and kind required, the actual purpose for which the request is made, and for what use desired, and his or her true name and residence, and, where numbered, by street and number, if in a city, and that neither the applicant nor the person for whose use requested habitually uses intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and the request shall be signed by the applicant by his own true name and signature, and attested by the permit-holder who receives and fills the request by his own true name and signature in his own tandwriting. But the request shall be refused, notwithstanding the statement to be true, and in no case unless the permit-holder filling it personally knows the person applying,

that he is not a minor, that he is not intoxicated, and that he is not in the habit of using intoxicating liquors as a beverage; or, if the applicant is not so personally known to the permit-holder, before filling the said order or delivering the liquor hosenal require identification, and the statement of a reliable and trustworthy person, of good character and habits, known personally to him, that the applicant is not a minor, and is not in the habit of using intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and is worthy of credit as to the truthfulness of the statements in the application, and this statement shall be signed by the witness in his own true name and handwriting, stating his residence correctly.

SEC 11. On or before the 15th of January, Masch, May, July, September, and November of each year each permit-holder shall make full returns to the county auditor of all requests filed by him and his clerks during the two preceding months and accompany the same with a written or prieted oath duly taken and subscried before the county auditor or notary public, which shall be in the following form, to-wit:

Every permit-holder shall keep strict account of all liquors purchased or procured by him in a book kept for that purpose which shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the commissioners of pharmacy and the county attorney and any grand juror, sheriff or justice of the peace of the county and such books shall show of whom such liquous were purchased or procured, the amount and kind of liquors purchased or procured, the date of receipt and amount soid, also the amount on hand of each kind for each two months; such book shall be produced by the party keeping the same to be used as evidence on the trial of any prosecution against him or against liquors alleged to have been seized from him or his house, on notice duly served that the same will be required as evidence; and at the same time he returns requests to the county auditor he shall file a statement of such account with such auditor except that the items of sales need not be embraced therein, but the aggregate amount of each kind shall be, and such statement shall be verified, before the county auditor or a notary public, All forms necessary to carry out the provisions of this act not otherwise provided for shall be as may be provided by the commissioners of pharmacy-

SEC 12. Every permit-holder or his clerk under this act, shall be subject to all the penalties, forfeitures and judgments and may be prosecuted by all the proceedings and actions, criminal and civil, and whether at law or in equity provided or authorized by the laws now or hereafter in force for any violation of this act, and the act for the suppression of intemperance and any law regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors and by any or all of such proceedings applicable to complaints against such permit-holder; and the permit shall not shield any person who abuses the trust imposed by it or violates the laws aforesaid, and in case of conviction in any proceed-

ing civil or criminal, all the liquors in possession of the permit-holder may by order of the court be destroyed. On the trial of any action or proceeding against any person for manufacturing, seiling, giving away or keeping with intent to sell intoxicating liquors in violation of law, or for any failure to comply with the conditions or duties imposed by this act, the requests for Hquors and returns made to the auditor as herein required, the quantity and kinds of liquors sold or kept, purchased or disposed of, the purpose for which liquors were obtained by or from him and for which they were used, the character and habits of sobriety or otherwise, shall be competent evidence and may be considered so far as applicable to the particular case with any other recognized, competent and material facts and circumstances bearing on the issues involved in determining the ultimate facts. In any suit, prosecutions or proceedings for violations of this act or the acts for the suppression of intemperance, and acts amendatory thereof, the court may compel the production in evidence of any books or pa ers required by this act to be kept, and may compel any permit-holder, his clerk or any person who has purchased liquors of either of them to appear and give evidence, and the claim that any such testimony or evidence will tend to criminate the person giving such evidence shall not excuse such person or witness from testifying or producing such books or papers in evidence; but such oral evidence shall not be used against such person or witness, on the trial of any criminal proceedings against him. Any number of distinct violations of this act may be charged in one indictment or information in different counts and all tried in the same action, the jury specifying the counts, if any, on which the defendant is found guilty.

SEC. 13. Registered pharmacists, conducting pharmacies and not holding permits, and manufacturers of proprietary medicines are hereby authorized to purchase of permit-holders intoxicating liquors (not including mali) for the purpose of compounding medicines, tinetures and extracts that cannot be used as a beverage. The commissioners of pharmacy are hereby empowered to make such further rules and regulations with respect to the purchase, use and keeping of such liquors as they may deem proper for the prevention of the abuses of the trusts reposed in such purchasers, and if the said registered pharmacist sell, barter, give away, exchange, or in any manner dispose of said liquors, or use the same for any purpose other than authorized in this section, he shall, upon conviction before any district court thereof, be liable to all the penal les, prosecutions and proceedings at law or in equity provided against persons selling without a permit, and upon any such conviction the clerk of the district court shall within ten days after said judgment or o der transmit to the commissioners of pharmacy the certified record thereof, upon receipt of which the commission may strike his name from the list of pharmacies and cancel his certificate. Provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to authorize the manufacture or sale of any preparation or compound under any name, form or device which may be used as a beverage and which is intoxicating in its character

SEC. 14. Every permit-holder is hereby authorized to ship to registered pharmacists and manufacturers of proprietary medicines, intexteating liquors to be used by them for the purposes authorized by this act

And all railway transportation and express companies, and other common carriers, are authorized to receive and transport the same upon 80:

presentation of a certificate from the clerk of the district court of the county where the permit-holder resides, that such person is permitted to ship intoxicating liquors, under the provisions of this act.

SEC. 15. A permit-holder may employ one or more registered pharmacists as clerks to sell intoxicating liquors in conformity to the permit and provisions of this act, but in such case the acts of the clerk in conducting the business shall be deemed the acts of the permit-holder, who shall be liable therefor as if he had personally done the acts, and in making returns the verification of such requests as may have been received, attested and filed by a clerk must be made by such clerk, and the clerk who transacted any of the business under the permit must join in the general oath required of the employer so far as relates to his own connection therewith. If for any cause a registered pharmacist who holds a permit shall cease to hold a valid and subsisting certificate of registration or renewal thereof his permit shall thereby be forfeited and be null and void.

SEC. 16. Any person holding a permit in force when this act takes effect may continue to purchase, keep and sell intoxicating liquors (according to law for the time provided in such permit, unless sooner revoked. But all such permits shall expire not later than January 1, 1891.

SEC. 17. If any person shall be convicted of violating any of the provisions of this act or acts regulating the practice of pharmacy or any acts for the suppression of intemperance, or amendments thereto by reason of a prosecution by the commissioners of pharmacy, the clear proceeds of all fines so imposed and collected shall be paid into the county treasury of the proper county for the use of the school fund, and the commissioners of pharmacy shall be entitled to draw from the state treasury an amount not exceeding 50 per cent of the amount of the fines so collected, to be used solely in prosecutions instituted by them for failure to comply with the provisions of this act or of the acts regulating the practice of pharmacy. And the court or clerk thereof before whom any presecution is instituted and presecuted by the commissioners of pharmacy shall certify to the auditor of state, all cases in which they have appeared as prosecutors, either in person or by their attorney, and the amount of fines imposed and collected in such cases. And the commissioners of pharmacy shall have the power to revoke the certificate of registration of pharmacists for repeated violations of this act. Said amount to be drawn from time to time upon the warrants of the state auditor, which shall issue for the payment of expenses actually incurred in said prosecution after said expenses shall have been audited by the executive council.

SEC. 18. If any person shall make any false or fict tious signature or sign any name other than his or her own to any paper required to be signed by this act or make any false statement in any paper or application signed to procure liquors under this act, the person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeaner, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty (20) dollars nor more than one hundred (100) dollars and costs of prosecution, and shall be committed until said fine and costs are paid, or be imprisoned not less than ten nor more than thirty days. If any permit-holder or his clerk shall make false cath touching any matter required to be sworn to under the provisions of this act, the person so offending shall upon conviction thereof be punished as provided by law for perjury. If any person holding a permit under this law shall purchase or procure any intexicating liquors otherwise than authorized by this act, or make any false return to the county auditor, or use any request for liquors for more than one sale, in any of such cases he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction punished accordingly.

SEC. 19. Nothing in this act shall be construed to abate any action or proceeding now pending in any court in this state for a violation of the provisions of the sections hereby repealed, or to operate to bar any prosecutions hereafter brought for any such violations committed prior to the passage and taking effect of this act.

SEC. 20. The superior courts of this state and the judges and clerks thereof shall have and exercise the same powers and duties as are in this act specified for district courts, their judges and clerks as to granting and revoking permits.

SEC. 21. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Iowa State Register and the Des Moines Leader, newspapers published in Des Moines, Iowa. Approved April 18, 1890.

SUPREME COURT REPORTS.

THE STATE OF IOWA V. NORTON.

Filed December 14, 1885.

- CRIMINAL LAW: Trial introduction of evidence before reading indictment or opening statement. The failure to read the indictment to the jury and make an opening statement before introducing evidence will not be ground for setting aside the conviction, when the defendant offered no objection to the evidence, and the indictment was read when the objection was raised
- INTOXIDATING LIQUOUS: Keeping place for sale of. It is no defense, or indictment of a druggist, who was not a registered pharmacist, for keeping liquor for sale unlawfully, that the sales were made by his clork who was a registered pharmacist, and for medical purposes only.
- 3 --- ; Fine. A fine of \$250 held not excessive.

Appeal from Hamilton District Court.

The defendant was indicted for keeping, in a certain building, intoxicating liquors, with intent to sell the same in the building in violation of law. There was a verdict of guilty, and judgment was rendered upon the verdict. The defendant appeals.

ADANS, J.—I. Upon the trial of the case the district attorney, by oversight, omitted to read to the jury the indictment, and omitted to make a statement of the case, but proceeded at once and introduced the ordence in behalf of the state, and rested. The defendant then filed a motion for an order directing his acquittal and discharge, on account of the fact that the indictment had not been read, and no statement of the case had been made, but the court overruled the motion, and allowed the indictment to be read, and offered to allow the defendant to make a statement in respect to his defense, which the defendant declined to make. The defendant insists that the court erred in overruling his motion. But, in our opinion, the defendant and a position cannot be sustained. Possibly, if the indictment had not been read at all, no conviction should have been allowed. But it was read, and the only irregularity was in the time in which it was read. That irregularity we think was waived by the defendant by his failure to interpose an objection to the introduction of evidence before it was read.

II. The defendant kept a drug store, and the liquor, alleged to have been kept with an intention to sell the same in violation of law, was kept in the drug store or in a room connected therewith. The defendant claimed that the liquor was kept for the purpose of medicine, and that whatever had been sold had been sold for such purposes; and while he did not claim to be a registered pharmacist, he offered to show that his prescription clerk was, and that all sales were made by him. But, the court, upon objection by the state, excluded the offered evidence that the clerk was a registered pharmacist. In excluding such evidence, the defendant contends that the court erred. It is provided in chapter 75 of the acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly that "it shall be unlawful for any person not a registered pharmacist to conduct any pharmacy or drug store." If the person conducting the drug store in question was the defendant, then he was engaged in an unlawful business, for he was not a registered pharmacist. But he contends that it was his clerk, and not himself, who was conducting the drug store, and that if he had been allowed to show that his clerk was a registered pharmacist, he would have shown that the business of the drug store was lawful. There is no doubt but that a person may lawfully become the owner of a stock of drugs without being a registered pharmacist. But being such proprietor is quite different from conducting a drug store. A room or building in which the business of selling drugs is conducted is a drug store, and the conductor of the store, within the meaning of the statute, is, we think, the person who has the ultimate right to control the business in respect to its continuance or discontinuance, the employment of clerks, the fixing of prices, etc. It matters not with what power a mere clerk may be clothed. He cannot be said to be the conductor of the store while his powers are merely derivative. In our opinion the design of the statute was to prohibit persons not registered as pharmacists from engaging in the responsible business of buying and selling drugs as dealers. In our opinion it was not material that the defendant's clerk was a registered pharmacist, so far as the question before us is concerned.

III. The court rendered judgment of a fine of \$250. The defendant insists that the judgment is excessive. But no good reason is shown to us why it should be reduced.

IV. It is said that the verdict is not sustained by the evidence, but we think it is. We see no error.

Affirmed.

IN THE SUPREME COURT-MAY TERM.

H. K. SNYDER v. W. E. CLOSSON, Appellant.

Appeal from Buchanan District Court-Hon. John J. Ney, Judge.

Action upon a promissory note. The case was tried without a jury, and judgment rendered for plaintiff. Defendant appeals.

BECK, C. J.—I. The defendant for answer to the petition shows that he is a resident of independence, and a dealer in proprietary medicines, having his fixed and permanent place of business in the town of his residence; that while in Charles City introducing and establishing his medicines the plaintiff demanded that he should pay \$100, for which plaintiff would

procure for appellant a lease from commissioners of pharmacy, authorizing defendant to act as itinerant vender of drugs and nostrums, and to act as a traveling "quack doctor," and plaintiff threatened that unless defendant would pay or give his note for \$100 the plaintiff would file an information against him and cause his arrest at Charles City; that to avoid the threatened arrest, though guilty of no violation of the law, as plaintiff charged, he gave to plaintiff the note in suit, which defendant alleges is wholly without consideration and void.

The court below found the following facts upon which judgment was rendered for plaintiff:

That the defendant is a manufacturer of proprietary medicines, having his permanent manufactory and residence in Independence, Iowis, on which he pays taxes into the treasury of Buchanan county. Iowa, and from which he supplies drug stores and other stores throughout the state, and also supplies such as call for his remedies, both wholesale and retail; that such business has been conducted in such manner for several years.

That during the fall of 1889, and up to September 20th of that year, the defendant attended the county fairs in different parts of the state, and at such places, for the purpose of advertising and introducing his medicines, caused a booth to be erected and had a band of music and singers, and made speeches to the people setting forth what he claimed his medicines would cure, and sold said medicines to all persons he could induce to purchase the same.

Among said medicines was a pain rollef, a dyspepsia cure and a liniment for animals, whose curative powers he stated.

That defendant claimed his said remedies would cure diseases and injuries to man and beast.

That the plaintiff claimed that such acts constituted the defendant an itinerant vender of drugs and nostrums and a traveling doctor, and threatened to cause the defendant to be arrested as such litherant vender and traveling doctor under sections 2022 and 2014 of McClain's Code.

That defendant is not a doctor, and does not claim to be one, nor does be diagnose or treat disease, except in selling his proprietary medicine as above set forth.

That, for the purpose of avoiding such arrest, the defendant gave the note in controversy, and the plaintiff, who is one of the commissioners of pharmacy, issued to him the license which is attached hereto and made a part of thes findings.

II. Chapter 75, acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly (1880), section 10 (Miller's Code, page 1286), contains this provision:

Any Itinerant vender of any drug, nostrum, ointment or appliance of any kind intended for the treatment of discusses or injury, who shall, by writing or printing, or any other method, publicly profess to cure or treat discuses, or injury, or deformity, by any drug, nostrum, manipulation or other expedient, shall pay a license of \$100 per annum, etc.

III. The only question in the case is this: Upon the facts as found by the court below is defendant subject to this statuta?

He clearly was an itinerant vender of the nostrums (patent or proprietary medicine) which he advertised, for, according to the findings of the court, he traveled to the fairs in different parts of the state and "sold his nostrums to all persons he could induce to purchase." To constitute an itinerant vender it is not necessary that the person should travel all the time and have no fixed place of sale. He may have a place of business where he sells his goods during a part of the time, and he may travel for the sale of his medicines at other times.

It cannot be said that one who has a drug store in one town of the state, which he superintends and personally manages a part of the time, may the other parts of the year travel through the state to the county fairs and put off his nostrums by the acts disclosed in the finding of facts.

Section 12 of the act just quoted authorizes any person not a registered pharmacist to sell proprietary medicine, but it does not authorize all persons to itinerate for the purpose of making such sales.

The finding of facts showed that defendant did publicly recommend his nostrums as a remedy for disease.

He thus, in the language of the statute cited, did "publicly profess to * * * cure diseases" by the nostrums he sold.

We reach the conclusion that defendant was subject to the statute and liable for the amount prescribed as payment for license.

The judgment of the district court is affirmed.

THE SUPREME COURT OF IOWA-JANUARY TERM, 1802.

THE STATE OF IOWA ON BEHALF OF THE IOWA COMMISSION OF PHAR-MACY V. F. C. A. GOERSS, Appellant.

From Marshall District Court-Hon. J. L. Stevens Judge.

Action to recover of defendent \$100 license as an itinerant vender of drugs, under section 2532, McClain's Code.

The case was submitted to the court upon an agreed statement of facts, and judgment entered against the defendant, from which he appeals upon a certificate of the trial judge, as follows:

L. John L. Stevens, judge of the district court of lows within and for Marshall county, hereby versify that the above outlied cause involves the determination of questions of law upon which it is desirable to have the opinions of the supreme court

The questions are as follows:

Pirst, -is section 232 of McClain's Code in conflict with and in violation of section 6 of article 1 of the constitution of lows, and article 1, section 8, of the constitution of the United States?

Second - Can a citizen of Iowa, being a regularly authorized practicing physician, possessed of the physician's certificate from the state board of medical examiners, under chapter lot of the laws of 1886, sell his medicines, which are prepared by him from a formula or prescription of which he is the owner and proprietor, providing such medicines do not include any intoxicating fiquors or poisons, in any county in the state wherein his said certificate is duly recorded under section 2549 of McClain's Code, and also recorded in the county of his residence under the same section, whether he is a resident of said county or not, without a license, as provided by section mill of McClain's Code, provided said sales are made by him from town to town, to all persons desiring to buy, and publicly professing to cure diseases by said medicines?

Third. -Can any person, being a citizen of lows, whether a physician or registered pliarmselst or not, sell proprietary medicines and such other demestic remedies as do not include any intoxicating fiquors or poisons in any county of the state of Iowa, where he does not reside, without a license, as prescribed by section 2023 of McClain's Code, provided such person make said saic from town to town to all persons ladiscriminately, professing to cure and treat diseases with such remedies?

Fourth, -is a person an itinerant vender within the meaning of section 202 of McClain's Code, who, being a resident of Iowa, goes about the state from city to city, publicly, by written and printed circulars and oral addresses, professing to cure disexacs and publicly advertising and selling medicines prepared from his own formula, he remaining but a few days or weeks in a place for such purpose; but who, being a duly registered physician of lows, authorized to practice medicine in any county in the state, records his cartificate in each county in which he so publicly professes to cure and sells such medicines, as provided by section 2549 of McClain's Code? J. L. STEVENS.

Judge.

GIVEN, J.-I. We first inquire whether said section 2532 is in conflict with section 6, article 1, of the constitution of Lywa.

All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms, shall not equally belong to all citizens.

Appellant's contention is that section 2532 "discriminates in favor of the citizens of one city and against all other resident merchants of Iowa," and cites in support, The City of Marshalltown v. Blum, 58 Iowa, 184, and The Town of Pacific Junction v. Dper, 64 Iowa, 38.

In the former case an ordinance which imposed a license upon persons whose business it was to sell merchandlse at retail upon the streets or from house to house, with a promise that it should not apply "to persons retailing their own productions, or of their own manufacture, if they reside in, and the goods are manufactured in Marshall county, Iowa," was held to be unconstitutional because of the proviso. In the latter case an ordinance, providing that transient merchants should pay a license, and defining transient merchants to be "every non-resident person who shall sell, exchange or dispose of any goods, wares, or merchandlse of his own, or of other non-resident owners," was held to be unconstitutional because of the discrimination in favor of resident merchants and against all others.

Section 2532, as far as applicable to the question before us, is as follows:

Any litherant vender of any drug, nostrum, ointment or appliance of any kind intended for the treatment of diseases or injuries, who shall, by writing or printing, or any other method, publicly profess to care or treat disease, or injury, or deformity, by any drug, nostrum, manipulation, or other expedient, shall pay a license of \$100 per annum.

This law is of uniform operation; it applies allike to all itinerant vendors, and its privileges and immunities are open to all venders upon the same terms. There is no discrimination in favor of the citizens of one city as against another nor against resident merchants of any place in Iowa. All resident merchants may sell proprietary medicines and domestic remedies without being registered as pharmacists, as authorized in section 2534, and are allike protected from competition with itinerant venders.

It will be readily seen that there is no such discrimination in this law as in the ordinance referred to; indeed we fail to discover any feature of discrimination in this law; it operates upon all persons and places alike and grants no privilege or immunity to any citizen or class of citizens that does not equally belong to all citizens.

It is argued that, taken in connection with section 2534 it discriminates in favor of domestic remedies and against all others. Under section 2534 any person may sell, at his established place of business, domestic remedies of any kind that do not contain intoxicating liquors or poisons, without registering as a pharmacist, but if he becomes an itinerant vender thereof, he must pay license, as required by section 2532. The regulation is as to all domestic remedies. No question is made in argument, under the constitution of the United States, and we think no question is involved in the case.

II. We are of the opinion that a physician's certificate does not exempt one who is an itinerant vender, as defined in section 2532, from the provisions of that section. That he may dispense his own prescriptions without being registered as a pharmacist, as provided in section 2534, or that he may remove to another county and practice medicine by having his certificate recorded, does not give him the right to pursue the business of an itinerant yender without paying license as such.

111. There can be no doubt but that under section 2534 any person may keep and sell at his place of business, proprietary medicines and other domestic remedies specified, without being a physician or registered pharmacist. It is equally clear that if he "make said sales from town to town to all persons indiscriminately, professing to cure and treat disease with such remedies," he is an itinerant vender and subject to the provisions of section 2532.

Under the facts stated in the fourth question certified. We are in no doubt but that a person so pursuing the business is an itinerant vender within the meaning of section 2532.

A certificate authorizing him to practice medicine in the state does not authorize him to become an itinerant vender as defined in section 2532, nor exempt him from liability as such.

The right of a physician given in section 2534 to dispense his own prescriptions without being a regular pharmacist and the right to remove to another county to practice, upon having his certificate recorded as authorized under section 2549 does not make him any the less an itinerant vender as defined in section 2532 if he conducts the business as stated in the fourth question certified.

As to who are itinerant venders see Snyder v. Closson, 50 N. W. Rep. 678. The judgment of the district court is affirmed.

SUPREME COURT OF IOWA-OCTOBER TERM, 1893.

STATE OF IOWA V. JOSHUA BURKE, Appellant.
From Davis District Court—Hon. J. C. Mitchell, Judge.

The defendant was charged by indictment as follows:

The said Joshua Burke, on the 7th day of September, A. D. 1891, in the county and other drugs to one Ass Hale, the said Joshua Burke then and there sells and vend liniments, nostrums, ofitments and other drugs to one Ass Hale, the said Joshua Burke then and there being an itherant vender of said drugs and nostrums, and did then and there publicly profess to said Assa Hale, to whom he then and there sood said drugs and nostrums, that he said drugs and nostrums, that the said drugs and nostrums then and there sold would cure diseases, injuries and deformities, the said Joshua Burke then and there not being licensed as an itinerant vender of drugs, nostrums and olutiments as required by statute.

Defendant having plead not guilty the case was tried to a jury and a verdict of guilty returned. Defendant's motion for a new trial being over-ruled judgment was entered on the verdict, from which defendant appeals.

GIVEN, J.—I. This prosecution is under section 10, chapter 75, acts Eighteenth General Assembly, as amended in section 2, chapter 137, acts Nineteenth General Assembly, and section 3, chapter 83, acts Twenty-first General Assembly.

The section as amended provides as follows: "Any itinerant vender of any drug, nostrum, ointment or appliance of any kind, intended for the treatment of diseases or injury, who shall by writing or printing, or any other method, publicly profess to cure or treat diseases or injury, or deformity, by any drug, nostrum, manipulation or other expedient, shall pay a license of \$100 per annum, to be paid to the treasurer of the commission of pharmacy, whereupon the secretary of said cummission shall issue such license for one year. Any porson violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction, pay a fine of not less than one hundred nor more than two hundred dollars."

McClain's Code section 2532.

It appeared without question on the trial that at and for several years performed to the time charged the defendant was in the employ of S. F. Baker & Co., manufacturers of proprietary medicines at Keokuk, Iowa. That he traveled with a team and wagon carrying the medicines manufactured by said company and selling the same from house to house to whomsoever would purchase.

The defendant did not hold himself out as a physician nor assume to determine what the allments of people were, but he did distribute printed circulars issued by Baker & Co., representing their medicines to be cures for certain diseases named in the circulars and the defendant represented that the medicines were as recommended.

Section 12 of said acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly provided that that act should not apply to the sale of proprietary medicines. Said section was amended by section 4 of said act of the Nine teenth General Assembly, by adding the following words: "Manufactured in the state when same are sold and distributed by agents from an established place of business."

Said section 12 as amended was repealed by section 4 of said act of the Twenty-first General Assembly, and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

SECTION 22. Physicians dispensing their own prescriptions only, are not required to be registered pharmacists, provided that nothing in this act shall prevent any person not a registered pharmacist or not holding a permit from keeping or selling proprietary medicines, and such other domestic remedies as ido not include any intoxicating liquous or poisons.

Appellant contends that said section 12, as originally enacted, is not repealed, but only the amendment thereto made by the act of the Nineteenth General Assembly, and therefore the act does not apply to the sale of proprietary medicines.

The repeal is not of the amendment alone, but expressly of said section 12, "as amended."

It is entirely clear under this view of the law and the undisputed facts that the defendant was amenable to pay the license provided and if he did not do so was guilty of the misdemeanor charged.

II. Appellant offered to prove by E. S. Baker that at his request a provision exempting manufacturers of proprietary medicines from the provisions of the act was agreed to by the pharmacy commission and incorporated in the original bill. Also to prove tertain statements of the committeemen at the time the law was passed as to its effect.

Appellant complains of the refusal to admit this evidence, but fails to point out any reason for the complaint. Surely in such a case as this, the statute is not to be restricted or expanded in its operation by agreements the pharmacy commissioner construct according to the statements of legislators except as they have expressed their intention in the law itself. There was no error in excluding this avidence.

III. After the arguments were closed the court suggested to the county attorney that he had failed to prove that the defendant had no license. The county attorney claimed that it was for the defendant to show that he had a license. He also claimed that he had a proven by the witness, Mitchell, that defendant admitted to him that he had no license. The court caused the reporter to read the testimony of Mitchell in hearing of the jury, and it appearing that Mitchell had not so testified, and the county attorney stating that he had omitted by oversight to question Mr. Mitchell on that subject, was permitted to recall Mr. Mitchell and prove by him that the defendant said he had no license. It was within the discretion of the court to allow the witness to be recalled, and there was no abuse of that discretion. The court had a right to inform itself as to what had been proven by causing the evidence to be read, and it was not prejudical to the appellant that it was read in the hearing of the jury, as it was already before the jury.

IV. The state was permitted, over appellant's objection, to examine in chief three witnesses who were not before the grand jury and none of whose names were upon the indictment. Appellant's objections were that no proper notice had been served, and for the reason that the indictment charges selling to Asa Hale alone testimony of sales to any other person would not be competent.

Notices that these witnesses would be examined were served upon the defendant in person October 11th, and on October 12th the trial was commenced without any motion by the state for leave to introduce this evidence, and without any demand on the part of the defendant for a continuance.

As to the last one of the three examined there was no other notice, but as to the other two notices in due form were served more than four days before the commencement of the trial, by reading the same to the defendant's wife and leaving copies thereof with her at defendant's house.

The first of these witnesses examined testified that defendant was selling medicines, and that he purchased from him condition powders which defendant recommended as good for cattle and horses

The second witness testified that the defendant was traveling selling Dr. Baker's make of medicines, that she bought some of the medicines, that defendant gave her a circular like the one in evidence, and said that the medicines would do what the circular and directions said.

The third witness stated that on the preliminary trial defendant testified that he was selling Dr. Baker's medicines from house to house on the recommendation of the circular in evidence which he distributed, and that the medicines were good for what they were recommended in the circular.

The defendant in his testimony states that he was selling Dr. Baker's medicines from house to house to all who were willing to buy; that he distributed circulars such as that in evidence; that he never inquired after their diseases; that he sometimes told them what kind of medicines he had and what they were recommended for, and that his recommendations were simply that the medicines were good for the diseases named in the circular.

The court instructed the jury not to consider the evidence in relation to the sale of preparations for stock.

It will be observed that while the defendant was not examined as to the transactions and declarations related by these three witnesses, he does not deny them, and admits every material fact testified to by them.

While it may be true, as stated in the objections, that proper notice had not been served, and that it was error to permit these witnesses to be examined, it was error without prejudice to the defendant, as their statements of material facts were not only uncontroverted, but were in effect admitted by the defendant.

Evidence of sales and professions made to other persons at or before the time charged was competent to show that defendant was an itinerant vender and that his professions were public.

The court properly instructed that under this indictment the jury must find that the defendant did not make a sale to Asa Hale.

Our conclusion is that there was no error prejudicial to the defendant, and that the judgment of the district court should be affirmed.

NOTES OF RECENT DECISIONS.

CONSTITUTIONAL LAW-MISSOURI STATUTE AGAINST PEDDLING WITHOUT LICENSE.-In Emert v. State of Missouri, recently decided by the supreme court of the United States, it was held that a Missouri statute (Rev. Stat. 1889, ch. 125) imposing a penalty for peddling without a license is nowise repugnant to the power of congress to regulate commerce among the states, but is a valid exercise of the power of the state over persons and business within its borders as applied to a person in the employ of the Singer Manufacturing company, a corporation of New Jersey, who went from place to place in Montgomery county, Missouri, with a horse and wagon, soliciting orders for the sale of the Singer sewing machines, having with him in the wagon a new machine which he offered for sale to various persons at different places in said county, and sold and delivered to a purchaser in said county, said machine having been made by said company in New Jersey, and was its property and was forwarded by it to Missouri to said person, as its agent, for sale on its account, and was so sold by him on account of said company, he having no peddler's license at the time. Mr. Justice Gray, who delivered the opinion of the court, says in part, after citing the early case of Howe Machine Co. v. Gage, 100 U. S., 677;

It has been strenuously argued that that decision is inconsistent with earlier and later decisions of this court upon the subject of the powers of the several states as affected by the grant of the constitution to congress of the power to regulate commerce. It becomes necessary, therefore, to examine those decisions with care, beginning with the earlier ones.

In the leading case of Brown v. Maryland (1827), 25 U. S., 12 Wheat., 429 [6:678], in which it was adjudged that a statute of Maryland, requiring, under a penalty, importers or other persons selling foreign goods by the bale or package, to take out and pay for a license, was repugnant to the constitution of the United States, both as laying an impost or duty on imports without the consent of congress, and as inconsistent with the power of congress to regulate commerce with foreign nations, Mr. Taney and Mr. Johnson, for the state of Maryland, argued that the tax was "laid upon the same principle with the usual taxes on retailers, or innkeepers, or hawkers and peddlers, or upon any other trade exercised within the states." 25 U. S., 12 Wheat., 425 [6:680].

Chief Justice Marshall, in answering that argument, said: "This indictment is against the importer for selling a package of dry goods in the form in which it was imported, without a license. This state of things is changed if he sells them, or otherwise mixes them with general property of the state by breaking up his packages and traveling with them as an itinerant peddler. In the first case the tax intercepts the import as an import in its way to become incorporated with the general mass of propcrty, and denies it the privilege of becoming so incorporated until it shall have contributed to the revenue of the state. It denies to the importer the right of using the privilege which he has purchased from the United States until he shall also have purchased it from the state. In the last cases the tax finds the article already incorporated with the mass of property by the act of the importer. He has used the privilege he had purchased, and has himself mixed them up with the common mass, and the law may treat them as it finds them. The same observations apply to plate or other furniture used by the importer. So, if he sells by nuction. Auctioneers are persons licensed by the state, and if the importer chooses to employ them he can as little object to paying for this service as for any other for which he may apply to an officer of the state. The right of sale may very well be annexed to importation without annexing to it also the privilege of using the officers licensed by the state to make sales in a peculiar way." Brown v. Maryland, 25 U. S., 12

A like distinction was recognized in the United States internal revenue act of 1822, in which "peddlers" were distinguished from "commercial brokers," and were subjected to a different license tax. Among "commercial brokers" was classed "any person or firm, except one holding a license as wholesale dealer or banker, whose business it is, as the agent of others, to purchase or sell goods, or seek orders therefor, in original or unbroken packages or produce." "Peddlers" were thus defined: "Any person, except persons peddling newspapers, bibles or religious tracts. who sells or offers to sell at retail goods, wares or other commodities, traveling from place to place, in the street or through different parts of the country, shall be regarded as a peddler under this act." Act of July 1, 1862, chap. 119, 1 64, cls. 14, 27; 12 Stat. at L. 457, 458.

In Woodruff v. Parham (1868), 75 U. S., 8 Wall., 123 [19:382], it was adjudged by this court, speaking by Mr. Justice Miller, that a uniform tax, imposed by ordinance of the city of Mobile under authority from the legislature of Alabama, on all sales by auction in the city, was constitutional, because it was "a simple tax on sales of merchandise, imposed alike upon all sales made in Mobile, whether the sales be made by a citizen of Alabama or of another state, and whether the goods sold are the produce of that state or some other. There is no attempt to discriminate injuriously against the products of other states or the rights of their citizens, and the case is not, therefore, an attempt to fetter commerce among the states, or to deprive the citizens of other states of any privilege or immunity possessed by the citizens of Alabama. But a law having such operation would, in our opinion, be an infringement of the provisions of the constitution which relate to those subjects, and therefore void." 75 U.

S., 8 Wall., 140 [19:387] In Hinson v. Lott, 75 U. S. 8 Wall. 148 [19:389], decided at the same time, it was adjudged by this court, speaking by the same eminent justice, that a statute of that state, imposing a tax of 50 cents per gallon, to be paid by the distiller, on all intoxicating liquors manufactured within the state and a like tax to be paid by the importer, on all intoxicating liquors introduced into the state for sale, was constitutional, on the ground "that no greater tax is laid on liquors brought into the state than on those manufactured within it," and "that, whereas, collecting the tax of the distiller was supposed to be the most expedient mode of securing its payment, as to liquors manufactured within the state, the tax on those who sold liquors brought in from other states was only the complementary provision, necessary to make the tax equal on all liquors sold in the state. As the effect of the act is such as we have described, and it institutes no legislation which discriminates against the products of sister states, but merely subjects them to the same rate of taxation which similar articles pay that are manufactured within the state, we do not see in it an attempt to regulate commerce, but an appropriate and legitimate exercise of the taxing power of the states," 75 U.S. 8 Wall.

In Ward v. Maryland (1871), 79 U. S. 12 Wall, 418 (20:449), a statute of Maryland. requiring all traders residing within the state to take out licenses at certain rates, and subjecting to indictment and penalty persons not residents of the state, who, without

taking out a license at a higher rate, should sell or offer for sale, by card, sample, or trade list, within the limits of the city of Baltimore, any goods, wares or merchandise whatever, other than agricultural products and articles manufactured in the state, was held to be unconstitutional, because it looped a dis-riminating tax upon the residents of other states.

In Waiting v. Missouri (1875), 5t U. S. 275 (181247), a statute of Missouri, by which "whoever shall deal in the selling of patent or other medicines, goods, wares, or merchardise, except hooks, churts, maps and stationery, which are not the growth, produce or manufacture of this state, by going from place to place to sell the same, is declared to be a peddler," and which prohibited under a penalty, dealing as a peddler, without taking out a license and paying a certain sum therefor, but required no license for selling, by going from place to place, any goods, the growth, produce or manufacture of the state, was held by reason of such discrimination, to be unconstitutional and void as applied to a peddler within the state of sewing machines manufactured without the state. Mr. Justice Field, in delivering judgment, said: "The commercial power contings until the commodity has ceased to be the subject of discriminating legislation by reason of its foreign character. That power protects it, even after it has entered the state, from any burdens imposed by reason of its foreign origin. The act of Missouri encroaches upon this power in this respect, and is therefore, in our judgment, unconstitutional and void." And be referred to the passages in the opinions in Brown v. Maryined, and Woodruff v. Parham, above cited, as supporting the conclusion. 91 U. S. 38 (27:250). The statute of Missouri, now before the court, omits the discriminating words, "which are not the growth, produce or manufacture of this state," upon which that decision was grounded.

In Cook v. Pennsylvania (1887), 97 U. 8.568 [24:1015], in which a tax upon auctioneers, imported goods in the original package, the statute under which the tax was incident and a discrimination against imported as compared with domestic goods; and the declaions in Woodruff v. Parham, Hinson v. Lott, and Welton v. Missouri, above effect, seen referred to accounteding. 97 U. 8.59, 50 [24:505, 1017].

The decision in Howe v. Machino Co. v. Gage, 100 U. s. e76 [25:754], above stated, is thus shown to have been in exact accordance with the law as declared in previous decislons. Indeed, Woodreff v. Parkam, Hinson v. Lett. Ward v. Maryland, and Welton v. Missouri, were cited in its support, 100 U. S. 679 [25:755].

That decision is no less consistent with the subsequent decisions of this court, as will appear by an examination of them.

In Webber v. Virginia (1880, U. S. 344, 12f (20.505, 506), this court, speaking by Mr. Justice Field, affirmed the doctrine that "the right conferred by the patent laws of the United States to inventors to sell their inventions and discoveries does not take the tangible property, in which the invention or discovery may be exhibited or carried into offect, from the operation of the tax and license have of the state" and the reason why a tax imposed by a statute of Virginia upon persons selling, without a license, patented articles not owned by them, was held to be invalid, as applied to sales of sewing machings manufactured in another state, was that the statute made "a clear discrimination to favor of home manufacturers and against the manufacturers of other states," 1031 U. S. 300 (19307).

In Brown v. Houston (1885), H4 U. S. 622 (ID:257), coal brought in flat-beats from Pittsburg to New Orleans was still affoat in the Missisalppi river after its arrival, in the same boots, and in the same condition in which it had been brought, and was held in order to be sold on account of the original owners by the boat-load. Yet this court ununimously decided that a tax imposed by general statutes of the state of Louisiana upon this coal was valid; and, speaking by Mr. Justice Bradley, said: "It was not a tax imposed upon the coal as a foreign product, or as the product of another state than Louisland, nor a tax imposed by reason of the coal being imported or brought into Louisianu, nor a tax imposed whilst it was in a state of transit through that state to some other place of destination. It was imposed after the coal had arrived at its destination and was put up for sale. The coal had come to its place of rest, for final disposal or use, and was a commodity in the market of New Orbians. The taxing of goods coming from other states, as such, or by reason of their so coming, would be a discrimleating tax against them as imports, and would be a regulation of interstate commerce inconsistent with that perfect freedom of trade which congress has seen fit should remain undisturbed. But if, after their arrival within the state-that being their place of destination for use or trade-if, after this, they are subjected to a general tax laid

altice on all property within the city, we fail to see how such taxing can be deemed a regulation of commerce, which would have the objectionable effect referred to." 134 U.S. 633-634 [29:398, 261].

In Walling v. Michigan 1880, 18 U.S. 446 [29:991], the statute of Michigan, which was held to be an unconstitutional restraint of interestate commerce, imposed different mars upon the business of selling or soliciting the sale of intuscinting lupors, according as the liquors were manufractured within the state, or were to be sent from another state; and this court, again speaking by Mr. Jawice Brailing, declared that the police power of the state "would be a perfect justification of the sat, if it did not discriminate against the citizens and products of other states in a matter of commerce leaveen the states, and thus usury one of the perceptives of the national legislature." In U.S. 40 (29:2001)

116 U. S. 400 (2006).

In Robbins v. Shelby County Taxing Dist. (1881). 120 U. S. 480 (2006), indeed the majority of the court held that a statute of Tennessee, requiring "all drammers, and all persons not having a regular licensed house of busidess in the taxing district, offering for the constitution of the constant of the sample." to pay a certain use from the constitution of the

But in the opinion of the majority of the court, delivered by Mr. Justice Bradley, it was expressly affirmed that a state, although commerce might thereby be incidentally affected, might pass "inspection Laws to accure the due measures of products and commodities," and "laws it or regulate or restrict the sale of articles-deemed injurious to the health or nourals of the community," and might "impose taxes upon persons residing within the state or belonging to its population, and upon avocations and employments parameter therefore, not directly concected with foreign or interestate commerce, or with some other employment or business exercised under authority of the constitution and laws of the United States," and also "taxes upon all property within the state mingled with and forming part of the great mass of property therefore," although it record not "impose such taxes upon property imported into the state trons already or from another state, and not yet become part of the common mass of property therefore and no discrimination can be made by any such regulation, adversely to the person and no discrimination can be made by any such regulation, adversely to the person or property of other states; and no regulations can be made directly affecting inter-state commerce." By U. S. any all jumes).

The distinction on which that Judgment proceeded is clearly brought out in the following passages of the opinion: "As soon as the goods are in the state and become part of its general mass of property; they will become table to be taxed in the same manner as other property of similar character, as was distinctly held by this court in the case of Brown v. Houston, 14 if. 3 62 [30:257]. More goods are sent from one state to another for sale, or in consequence of a sale, they become part of its general property and amenable to its lawer provided, that no discrimination be made against them as goods from another state, and that they be not taxed by reason of being brought from amother state, but only taxed in the usual way as other goods are. Brown v.-Houston, quan supers; Howe Masch, Co. v. Gage, 90 U. S. 36 [25/254]. Rut to tax the sale of such goods, or the offer to sell them, before they are brought into the state, is a very different thing, and seems to us clearly a tax on interstate commerce itself. The negotiation of sales of goods which are in auchier state, for the purpose of introducing them into the sales of goods which are in auchier state, for the purpose of introducing them to the state, in which, the negotiation is made, is interstate commerce." Hobbias v. Sheitly County Taxing Dist., 2a U. S. 46 (20:207).

The decision in Howe Mach. Co. v. Gage, supra, as to a peddier, carrying with him for sale goods already in the state, was thus expressly recognized, and was distinguished from the case, then before the court, of a ferminer, selling, or soliciting orders for, goods which were at the time in mother state. And in the dissenting opinion delivered by Chief Justice Waite, in which two other justices concurred, it was assumed, as incontroverible, that another providen of the same states, requiring a licease few from all peddiers within the district, could not be held unconstitutional in its application to peddiers which the district, could not be held unconstitutional in its application to peddiers which their goods from another state, and expected to go bark again. 180 (1.8, 201 [26, 1038].

In Asher v. Texas (1880, 13 U. S. 120 [33-368], 2 Inters. Com. Rep. 241; and in Breiman v. Titusville (1890, 131 U. S. 286 [38:119], the decision in Robbias v. Shelby County Tax. Dist. was followed. Asher's case was strictly one of a drummer soliciting orders on behalf of manufacturers residing in another state, and was decided upon the grounds that the drummatances in that case and in Robbias case were substantially the same.

138 U. S. 131 [30:369], 2 Inters. Com. Rep. 241. In Brennan's case, it was expressly agreed by the parties that the goods offered by him for sale in Pennsylvania were afterward sent by their owner in the other state directly to the purchasers. 135 U. S. 05 [38:739]. The case of Stoutenburg v. Hennick (1889, 129 U. S. 141 [32:367], in which an act of the logislature of the District of Columbia, taxing commercial agents, "offering for sale of goods, wares or merchandise, by sample, catalogue or otherwise," was held to be unconstitutional, as upplied to a commercial agent offering for sale goods of a Maryland house, old not substantially differ in principle or in circumstances.

In Leloup v. Mobile (1886, 137 U. S. 649 [23:211], 2 Inters. Com. Rep. 134, in which a general license tax, imposed by a statute of Alabama on a telegraph company affecting its entire business, interstate as well as domestic or internal, without discrimination, was held unconstitutional. Mr. Justice Bradley, in delivering Judgment, took occasion to observe that "there are sufficient modes in which it interral business, if not already taxed in some other way, may be subjected to tuxation without the imposition of a tax which covers the entire operations of the company," and to repeat that "this exemption of interstate and foreign commerce from state regulation does not prevent the state from taxing the property of those engaged in such commerce located within the state, as the property of other citizens is taxed, nor from regulating matters of local concern which may incidentially affect commerce." IT U. S. 467, 669 [23:244], 2 Inters. Com. Rep. 134. Sec. also, Pullman Palace Car Co. v. Permsylvania (1891), 141 U. S. 156(60), 1 inters. Com. Rep. 261 [Felcien v. Shelby County Taxing District 6082, 145 U. S. 422 [23:241], 2 Com. Rep. 262 [Felcien v. Shelby County Taxing District 6082, 145 U. S. 422 [23:241], 2 Com. Rep. 134. Cov. Adams (1895), onlice.

In Dent v. West Virginia (1889), 129 U. S. 114 [22:023], this court upheld the validity of a statute of West Virginia, requiring every person practicing medicine in the state too obtain a certificate from the state boar of health; and speaking by Mr. Justice Field said: "The power of the state to provide for the general welfare of its people authorizes it to prescribe all such regulations as, in its judgment, will secure or tend to secure them against the consequences of ignorance and incapacity, is well as of deception and

fraud," 129 U. S. 122 (32:626).

In Leisy v. Hardin (1800), 135 U. S. 100 [34:128], 3 Inters. Com. Rep. 35, a statute of a state, prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors without a license, was applied to a sals of liquors in the original packages and by the person who had brought them into the state from another state, held to be inconsistent with the power of congress to regulate commerce among the several states; and that conclusion was reached by applying to the case the rule laid down by Chief Justice Murshall in Brown v. Maryland, 25 U. S. 12 Wheat, 443 [6:687], above cited, and stated by the present chief justice in these words: "That the point of time, when the prohibition ceases and the power of the state to tax commences, is not the instant when the article enters the country, but when the importer has so acted upon it that it has become incorporated and mixed up with the mass of property in the country, which happens when the original package is no longer such in his hands; that the distinction is obvious between a tax which intercepts the import as an import on its way to become incorporated with the general mass of property, and a tax which finds the article already incorporated with that mass by the act of the importer." 135 U. S. 110 [34:132], 3 Inters. Com. Rep. 36. The decision, made at the same time, in Lyng v. Michigan, was to the same effect. 135 U. S. 161 [34:199], Inters. Com. Rep. 143. Presently after those decisions, congress, by the act of August 8, 1800, chapter 728, enacted that all intoxicating liquors or liquids brought into or remaining in a state should, upon their arrival therein, be subject, like domestic liquors, to the operation of laws enacted by the state in the exercise of its police powers. 26 Stat, at L. 313. After congress had thus, as said by the chief justice, "declared that imported liquors or liquids shall, upon arrival in a state, fall within the category of domestic articles of a similar nature," this court unanimously held that intoxicating liquors, brought into a state before this act of congress, were subject to the operation of the earlier statutes of the state, remaining unrepealed. In Wilkerson v. Rahrer (1891), 140 U. S. 545, 560 564 [35:572, 576, 577].

In Plumley v. Massachusetts, decided at the present term, the question, as stated by the court, was: "Does the fracedom of commerce among the states demand a recognition of the right to practice a deception upon the public in the sale of any articles, even those that may have become the subject of trade in different parts of the country?" After reviewing many of the cases, citing the passages above quoted from the opinions of Walling v. Michigan and in Dent v. West Virginia, and distinguished, Leisy v. Hardin, the court answered the question in the negative; and therefore hold that the

statute of Massachusetts, prohibiting the sale of oleomargarine colored to imitate butter, was constitutional and valid as applied to a sale by an agent within the state of articles manufactured in another state by citizens thereof. 155 U. S. 66, 468, 471, 64, ants.

The necessary conclusion, upon authority, as well as upon principle, is that the statute of Missouri, now in question, is nowise repugnant to the power of congress to regulate commerce among the several states, but is a valid exercise of the power of the state over persons and business within its borders.

The defendant was convicted of the crime of being an itinerant vender of drugs and nostrums, and publicly professing to cure discusses and injuries, without a license. From the judgment, which imposed a fine of \$100, he appeals.

ROBINSON, J.—The conviction of the defendant was had under section 10, of chapter 75, of the acts of the Eighteenth General Assembly as amended by section 2, of chapter 137, of the acts of the Nineteenth General Assembly, and section 3, of chapter 83, of the acts of the Twenty-first General Assembly, which contains the following:

Any itinerant vender of any drug, nostrum, ointment, or appliance of any kind intended for the treatment of diseases or injury, who shall, by writing, or printing, or by any other method publicly profess to cure or treat diseases, or injury, or deformity, by any drug, nostrum, or manipulation, or other expedients, shall pay a license of \$100-per annum, to be pull to the treasurer of the commission of pharmacy. Any person violating this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction pay a time of not less than \$400 and not more than \$200.

In July, 1894, the defendant was engaged in the business of selling on commission proprietary medicines which were manufactured in the state of Minnesota by J. R. Watkins, and were owned by him until sold. He was a resident of Minnesota, and the medicines were placed in glass bottles securely corked, sealed and capped, and were brought into the state and sold in the original packages in which they were placed by the manufacturer. The medicines as prepared and as received in this state by the defendant were a legitimate subject of commerce, and were not injurious to

the public health. They were transported by Watkins from the place where they were manufactured to Harlan, in this state, where they were received by the defendant and there offered for sale. In making the sales he traveled from place to place with a team and wagrm, and while so engaged sold one of the packages to one M. B. Howe, in Shelby county, in the condition in which it was sent from Minnesota.

He did not at that or any other time represent himself to be a physician, nor assume to determine the aliments of the people; but he distributed printed circulars of Watkins' which represented the medicines to be a cure for certain diseases named in the circulars, and the defendant represented that the medicine soid by him was as stated in the circular.

At the time the business described was carried on and the sale specified was made, the defendant did not have a license as contemplated by the statute nor was he a physician or registered pharmacist. At that time Howe was a resident of this state.

The appellant contends that the acts under which he was convicted are repugnant to that part of section 8, of article 1, of the constitution of the United States, which provides that the congress shall have power to regulate commerce among the several states, and the only question we are required to determine is whether the claim thus made is well founded.

The record clearly shows that it must be regarded for the purposes of this case as conceded that the defendant was an linerant vender of drugs and nostrums without a license, within the meaning of the statutes of this state which we have set out, and that the medicines he sold were in the original packages in which they were shipped into this state.

It is true that the power vested in congress to regulate commerce among the ceveral states is a power complete in itself to prescribe the rules by which that commerce is to be governed; that it is co-extensive with the subject on which it acts and cannot be stopped at the external boundary of a state, but enters it and is capable of authorizing a disposition of articles of commerce so that they may become a part of the common mass of the property within the state. Loisy v. Hardin, 136 U. S., 100. But it has been held that state laws which do not discriminate between residents and products of a state and those of another state, which are not designed to interfere in any manner with interstate commerce, as those which are in the nature of a simple tax upon sales of merchandise imposed alike upon all persons, whether residents or non-residents of the state, are not repugnant to the constitutional provision in question.

Thus in Hinson v. Latt, 8 Wall., 158, a statute which imposed a tax of 50 cents per gallon on each gallon of spirituous liquors offered for sale in the state, to be paid by the dealer introducing it, was sustained, it appearing that a like tax on such liquors produced in the state was exacted.

In Woodruff v. Parkham, 8 Wall., 123, a tax imposed by the city of Mobile on auction sales and sales of merchandise was sustained as to sales of property brought from other states and seld at wholesale in unbroken packages. In Howe Machine Co. v. Gage, 100 U. S., 176, a statute of the state of Missouri requiring all peddlers of sewing mach ines, without regard to the place of growth or produce of material of manufacture, to pay a tax, was sustained as against a peddler who sold machines rande in Connecticut.

In Webber v. Virginia, 103 U. S., 344, it was said that there is no objection to state legislation requiring a license for the sale of sewing machines

by reason of the grant of letters patent for the invention when there is no discrimination against non-residents or their agents. In Brown v. Houston, 114 U. S., 622, the power of a state to levy a tax on

In Brown v. Houston, 114 U. S., 522, the power of a state to sory a tax on coal mined outside the state and brought within it to be sold there was affirmed.

In Plumley v. Massachusetts, 155 U. S., 461, a statute of the state of Massachusetts which prohibited the manufacture and sale of imitation butter in imitation of yellow butter produced from pure unadulterated milk or cream of such milk was sustained and held to apply to the prohibited article when brought for sale from another state where it was manufactured.

Some of these cases arose under the provisions of the federal constitution, which forbids states, without the consent of congress, to lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, but all are applicable to the facts in this case.

Some of the cited cases recognize the rule that state laws of the general nature of those approved are invalid so far as they discriminate in favor of the residents and products of the state and against the residents and products of other states.

There is no discrimination in the statutes of this state under consideration. They apply alike to itinerant renders of drugs and nostrums produced in this state and to those which come from without it, to residents and nonresidents of the state, to those who sell their own wares and to those who act for others. The primary object of the acts is not to derive a revenue for the use of the state, but, in large part at least, to protect its citizens against the solicitations and harmful practices of irresponsible and unknown traveling renders of drugs and other articles intended for the treatment of diseases or injury, who in carrying on their business publicly profess to cure or treat diseases, injuries or deformities, and thus promote the sale of their wares to the credulous. The prohibited act may be committed without any actual sale. State v. Blair, 60 N. W. Rep., 486.

That the enactment of the laws in question was within the police power of the state is affirmed in principle by numerous authorities, some of which are of long standing and cannot now be successfully questioned.

In Wilkinson v. Raher, 140 U. S., 546, it was said that, "The power of the state to impose restraints and burdens upon persons and property in conservation and promotion of the public health, good order and prosperity is a power originally and always belonging to the states, not surrendered by them to the general government nor directly restrained by the constitution of the United States and assentially exclusive. And this court has uniformly recognized state legislation legitimately for police purposes as not in the sense of the constitution necessarily intringing upon any right which has been confided expressly or by implication to the national government."

The cases of Bowman v. Chicago & North-Western Railway Co., 125 U. S., 465, and Lelsy v. Hardin, 135 id., 100, upon which the defendant relies in this case, were considered and the fact noted that the law on which they were based "inhibited the receipt of an imported commodity or its disposition before it had ceased to be an article of trade between one state and another, or another country and this."

In Plumley v. Massachusetts, supra, the case of Lelsy v. Hardin was again considered and held not to be an authority for the claim that electroargarine, a recognized article of commerce, may be introduced into a state and there sold in original packages without any restriction being imposed by the state upon such sale.

The recent case of Emert v. Missouri, 15 Sup. Ct Rep., 367, fully sustains the conclusion we now reach. That case involved the validity of a statute of the state of Missouri, which provided that no person should deal as a peddler without a license, as applied to a peddler of sewing machines manufactured in another state, and the review of the authorities and the interpretation placed upon the constitutional provision involved are in point.

The amount of the license fee required by the statutes under consideration is not excessive, and the regulations adopted by them are reasonable.

The sale of drugs, nostrums and other articles manufactured in another state and brought into this state, whether brought into this state in original packages or otherwise, is not prohibited, but such medicines may be brought into the state and sold freely. Its importation and sale is not in any manner prohibited. But if its owners select as their agent an itinerant, who, to promote sales, publicly professes to injuries and deformities, it is proper that some this responsibility be required. It was said in Brown v. Maryland, 12 Wheat, 443, that "this right of sale may very well be annexed to importation without annexing to it also the privilege of using the officers licensed by the state to make sales in a peculiar way."

So it may be said in this case that the right to sell in original packages medicines brought into this state from another does not include the right to have it sold by an unlicensed itinerant, who, to make sales, professes knowledge of the art of healing.

The statutes which apply to such sales are not in any sense regulations of interstate commerce, but a reasonable exercise of the police power of the state, which may be applied as well to articles of interstate commerce in the hands of the vender and offered for sale in original packages as to articles produced within the state.

We conclude that the judgment of the district court is right, and it is
APPIRMED.

To the numerous inquiries as to the proper fulfillment of a Registered Pharmacist's duties in regard to the sale of Poisons, we direct your attention to sections 8, 9 and 12 of the law—chapter 75, Laws of 1880, as now amended:

Notice first, that all Poisons must be distinctly labeled, as follows: (See section 9.)

Before selling or delivering any poisons, the box, vessel or paper in which the poison is contained, and also the outside whose poison is contained, and also the outside who word "POISON," and the name and place of business of the person or firm selling it.

Second, that the sale of poisons is delegated solely to Registered Pharmacists. (See section 8.)

No one except a Registered Pharmacist can lawfully sell poisons of any KIND, the only exception being Concentrated Lye and Potash, which can be sold by any person, when it is properly labeled, as above stated. (See section 12.)

Third, the sale of all poisons enumerated in Schedule "A," and all others not enumerated in Schedule "B," must be registered in the "Poison Register." The poisons enumerated in Schedule "B" need not be registered when sold.

Fourth, the purchaser's signature is not required by law on the "Poison Register," only his name; but the dispenser (the one selling) may require it, before selling or delivering, if he thinks it advisable.

SYNOPSIS OF BOARD MINUTES FROM SEPTEMBER 15, 1893, TO SEPTEMBER 15, 1895.

October 17th —Board met at their office, capitol building. All members present.

The matter of itinerant license money was taken up.

Motion made by Commissioner Pickett and secretary that hereafter when licenses are collected by the commissioner the same shall be reported to the secretary of the commission and the money paid unto the treasurer of the commission.

Carried, all voting aye.

Section 4 of the by-laws was amended by striking out the word "quarterly" and inserting the word "bi-annually" in lieu therefor.

The secretary was instructed to return J. N. Porter, Guthrie Center, his fee, \$5, for examination, October 3d, he not being eligible to examination.

Adjourned.

December 18, 1893.—Board met at their office, capitol building. Members present: J. H. Mitchell, Fletcher Howard and J. H. Pickett.

The matter of J. R. Watkins and his agents was taken up and the secretary was instructed to confer with Attorneys Charles F. Bishop, Spurrier, and one other, and find what they will charge for an opinion in this case, and arrange to have them meet the board January 10, 1894.

The secretary was instructed to conduct examinations on the first Tuesday of the month only.

The following was adopted:

Hereafter no diplomas of colleges will be recognized, and certificates of pharmacy issued thereon, unless those from colleges that require before granting said diploma four years' experience in a drug store or pharmacy, or those colleges that show to the satisfaction of the board that the character of the work done and allowed on time is fully equal to the work and time in a drug store or pharmacy, conducted by a registered pharmacist, and under said registered pharmacist's supervision, but in no case shall said time exceed one year.

December 14, 1893.—Board met at their office.

After routine business the matter of J. R. Watkins' agents was taken up, and after discussion the matter was referred to Attorneys Spurrier and Bishop for an opinion, and the secretary to forward said opinion on rounds when it reached him.

February 1st.—Board met at their office, capitol building.
All members present.

Attorneys Bishop and Spurrier were present and submitted their opinion in the Watkins case. After fully discussing the same it was decided to have Mr. Howard go to Winona to see Watkins and report to the board on February 20th.

February 20th.—Board met at their office, capitol building. All members present.

The matter of J. R. Watkins for violation of section 10 was taken up and Commissioner Howard reported that Watkins refused to take out licenses for his agents. It was then decided to bring suit against each of Watkins' agents as soon as they could be apprehended.

March 13th.-Board met at their office, capitol building.

All members present.

Three applicants appeared for examination.

Matters pertaining to the J. R. Watkins suits were discussed and the secretary instructed to write Watkins, as follows:

J. R. Watkins, Winova, Minn.:

DEAR SIR-I am instructed by our board to say that they will extend time of further prosecution of your agents until April 2d, provided your decision comes to this office by that date.

They have already granted you extenuations of time and feel they have been very lenient with you in this matter, and unless satisfactory terms are agreed to by April 2d, they will proceed to enforce the law.

March 28th, 29th.—Board met at their office, capitol building.

All members present.

The matter of J. R. Watkins was taken up and after being discussed the secretary was instructed to telegraph W. E. Young,

Watkins' attorney, as follows:

Time will not be extended. Blank applications for licenses sent Watkins

by mail. All agents must have application on file by April 2d.

The secretary was also instructed to write J. R. Watkins, as

follows:

J. R. Watkins, Winona, Minn .:

DEAR SIR-I am instructed by the board to say that time will not be extended and authorized me to forward you blank application for licenses, thinking you could reach your agents more systematically and quickly than from this office. Licenses will be issued unconditionally. There is one feature in the license issued that is favorable to you and has not been mentioned as vet, which is as follows: All licenses are transferable by sending same to secretary for recording without fee. So if perchance you have a license issued to a profitless agent you can have his license transferred to one of choice, as above stated. This places your agents subject to your commands at all times, and anyone that will not comply with your terms you can select one that will. Yours truly,

The board decided if Watkins or his agents did not take license before April 2d they would proceed to enforce the law. April 27th, 28th, -Old board met in their office, capitol building, in regular annual session to finish up work of the year.

Present: J. H. Mitchell, president; F. Howard, and J. H. Pickett.

Commissioners J. H. Pickett and Fletcher Howard were appointed auditing committee.

The secretary and treasurer's report was presented and approved by the auditing committee.

April 28th.-B. F. Erb and his attorney, Prouty, appeared and asked the board to grant certificate to Erb, claiming the law now to be such that he was entitled to same, but the board decided not, and advised Mr. Erb to come and pass examination.
