
LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

INTRODUCTORY.

During the past two years accessions to the resources of the Historical Department have mainly been made in the following directions:

First.—Works containing the data of state history, as files of Iowa newspapers and magazines, early territorial and state laws and documents, works of state and western history and biography, county histories, the publications of our religious bodies and educational institutions, and miscellaneous pamphlets.

Second.—Publications of neighboring states on similar lines, so far as it has been practicable to secure them in the way of exchange.

Third.—Official, state, national and general publications relating to the slavery question and the war for the Union.

Fourth.—Works relating to the Indian tribes of North America, but more especially to those in the valleys of the Mississippi and its tributaries.

Fifth.—The publications of the United States census bureau from the foundation of the government, almanacs and other statistical works.

Sixth.—Works of American history and biography.

Seventh.—Museum materials.

Eighth.—Manuscripts, autograph letters and portraits—an extension of "The Aldrich Collection," the original gift upon which the Historical Department was founded.

Lists of the various collections will be found under appropriate headings.

IOWA NEWSPAPERS.

The feature of most value in the collections of the Department is unquestionably the files of Iowa newspapers, for they contain more of the data of our history than can be obtained from any

other source. The law imposes upon the department the duty of securing at least two from each county, but in my judgment a copy of every paper published in Iowa should be found in our historical collections, though the limitations of space would make this impracticable at the present time. The historical organizations at the capitals of Kansas, Minnesota and Wisconsin are also aiming to secure a copy of every newspaper published in their respective states. We have upon our shelves 1,348 bound volumes of newspapers, the most of which were published in Iowa. In order that our resources in this direction may be known to our people, I present full lists of the bound volumes, as well as of the current newspapers and periodicals coming to the Department. In several instances, editors of Iowa newspapers have presented or loaned their office files, preferring that they be safely preserved in the capitol to the risk of destruction by fire. It is a rule of the office to attend promptly to culling any data from these volumes that may be required by journalists throughout the state for use in their columns. No other sources of information in the historical rooms are more frequently consulted. It very frequently occurs that reference is desired to files of Iowa journals which it has been impossible to obtain; but while it is to be regretted that our collections are not more extensive, no effort in that direction has been spared by the Department.

HISTORICAL WORKS.

It has been the aim of the Department to add constantly to its resources as a working historical library, as far as possible, by solicitation first, and by a prudent use of the appropriation, with the concurrence of the trustees. In collecting works of western and general history, publications relating to slavery, the war for the union, the Indians, and the census from the foundation of the government, I am certain that no effort possible under the circumstances has been omitted. I am confident that our purchases have been made with as liberal discounts as are ever conceded to any class of purchasers outside the trade, while many works of great value have come as gifts.

THE ANNALS OF IOWA.

The publication of this quarterly magazine of Iowa history and biography has been continued, as directed by the board of trustees, at their January meeting in 1893. It is sent to each

organized library in the state, to the Iowa newspapers received at the historical rooms, to contributors to its pages, to donors to the collections, and to such historical societies as send their publications here. It thus serves a most admirable purpose in securing these exchanges and thereby increasing the historical collections of the state, aside from the valuable matter contributed to its pages. In several instances applications for *THE ANNALS* have come from foreign countries, including the University of Tokio, Japan.

THE ALDRICH COLLECTION.

Six cases have been provided for this gift of autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits, and they were practically filled nearly two years ago. I am confident that there are now on hand letters and manuscripts, with many portraits, more than sufficient to fill another case. It is my intention to extend this work and fill eight cases, should two more be authorized by the trustees, and adequate space provided for them. I have caused some of the more notable manuscripts to be bound in fine turkey morocco, with gold lettering on the side. These volumes are not only very attractive as specimens of the art of book-binding in Iowa, but possess much historical value. The gifts of Hon. John A. Kasson, Hon. Geo. F. Parker, Hon. William Penn. Clarke, ex-Governor C. C. Carpenter, Thomas Bailey Aldrich, Joel Tuttle, Mrs. Governor Larrabee, Mrs. Laurel Summers, John Bach McMaster, the late Bishop Phillips Brooks, William Michael Rossetti, Prof. Ernst Haeckel, and the late Earl of Selborne, are especially noteworthy and valuable. Materials for this work are rapidly accumulating, and hundreds of specimens are yet to be arranged in the cases or for binding into volumes.

THE MUSEUM.

In the original apportionment of space to the different parts of the work of the Historical Department the north room was set apart for the Museum. It contains the collections of birds, mammals and insects, aboriginal pottery, small arms, shot and shell from the Rock Island arsenal, map models from the U. S. Geological Survey and Bureau of Ethnology, and many miscellaneous objects. It has been found necessary, however, owing to the constant increase of our collections, to place two large book-cases upon the walls of this room. The cases for the Indian collection, prehistoric stone implements, minerals,

corals, etc., for the same reason, have been placed in the east room, which had been devoted to the collection of autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits. This mixing of the collections has been unavoidable, owing to the fact that it has been necessary to utilize every foot of our very limited space.

UNSERVICEABLE CANNON.

An effort to obtain some specimens of heavy ordnance in use during the war of the rebellion, but now superseded by more recent inventions, and out of date, was cordially seconded by U. S. Senator William B. Allison, and Hon. J. A. T. Hull, representative in congress from the Fifth district, through whose efforts an act was passed, authorizing the secretary of the navy to transfer three pieces from the Portsmouth, N. H., navy yard, to the Historical Department. At the request of Hon. John A. Kasson, the Secretary of the Navy kindly consented that this transfer should be made from the Washington navy yard, thus making a large saving in the expense of handling and transportation.

THE NEED OF MORE SPACE.

The act of 1892 founding the Historical Department, assigned to its use the three southeast rooms in the lower story of the capitol. These rooms are now not only insufficient to contain the constantly increasing collections, but the lack of space greatly interferes with further work in every direction. It has for some time been necessary to find storage for books, documents, newspapers, portraits, and other valuable property, coming to the department. It would seem to have been amply demonstrated that the state of Iowa may easily come into possession of historical, art and museum collections quite equal to those of neighboring states, if this one deficiency can be supplied. There are doubtless in every county collectors in various directions, many of whom would be glad to freely give their treasures to the state, upon the simple conditions that they shall be placed upon free public exhibition and preserved from waste. Such has been the experience of other states, and to this abundant resource is largely due the wonderful success of the most famous collections and museums throughout the world. Our state university possesses one of the finest natural history museums in the west—surpassed in fact, by none in the nation in the excellent quality of its materials—the foundation of which was a collection freely given by an Iowa

boy—W. T. Hornaday—whose fame is now world-wide. There is no doubt that the Department has lost during the past year fully \$25,000 worth of historical and museum property, the owners of which would have hailed with gladness the opportunity to thus place it in the care of the state. Probably the average annual loss in the future will not be less, and some of these losses will involve historical materials the value of which is beyond estimate. With the increase of knowledge and wealth in our state we may anticipate quite as much generosity in these directions as has so spontaneously benefited other communities.

In the introduction to the first biennial report from this Department occurred the following paragraphs which are even more pertinent at this time:

That the State should build up and fairly maintain a great historical museum, wherein to secure as large collections as practicable in state and national history, literature, art, military relics and mementos, natural history, geology, archaeology, numismatics, etc., as it is practicable to bring together, would seem to have become the settled belief of the people. Such an institution should be kept growing, for 'a finished museum is a dead museum.' There is apparently no end to the amount of materials which may be readily obtained for this purpose. The great need is a place in which they can be safely kept and conveniently exhibited.

A Memorial Hall would seem to be a great public necessity, if the State is to make any provision to do honor to the memory of her peerless soldiers, or the hardy pioneers who opened up her magnificent domain to settlement and civilization. If such an edifice were erected it would afford ample space for the historical collections, as well as those in the other directions enumerated above. No other work at the capital would furnish more of the means of instruction to the people or be more cordially welcomed by them.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

During the past two years the Department has been the recipient of many generous gifts—as well as indebted for opportune and kindly assistance in various directions. In addition to the brief mention of individual credits in our lists of accessions and donors, I wish to place on record my sense of especial obligation to the following distinguished persons:

PREHISTORIC STONE IMPLEMENTS.

The Department purchased the interesting collection of Hon. Samuel Murdock of Elkader, Iowa, embracing some fifty specimens, including axes, chisels, gouges, hammers, and several interesting but broken specimens of Iowa pottery. One of the axes weighs thirteen pounds and a half.

Five stone axes, two ancient red pipestone pipes, and twenty-five or thirty arrow heads. Presented by Mr. Charles Hazlett, of Boone, Iowa.

Small stone mortar and one small axe. Presented by Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Myers, of Boone, Iowa.

Fine polished stone chisel. Presented by Mr. W. H. Crooks, of Boone.

Fine stone axe. Presented by Thomas Bowman, of Boone, Iowa.

Stone axe found in Polk county—a most symmetrical and beautiful specimen. Loaned by John R. Shaffer.

Stone axe. Loaned by James Stinson, of Dodge township, Boone county.

A fine chert arrow point, containing fossil crinoid. Presented by Gov. Horace Boies.

Flint spear head. Presented by Capt. James H. Weaver, of Red Oak, Iowa.

Stone chisel. Loaned by Capt. M. C. Randelman, of Carlisle, Iowa.

WAR RELICS

One 13-inch seacoast mortar. This immense gun, weighing, with the carriage, 22,000 pounds, was presented to the Historical Department by act of Congress. It was cast in 1861 at Fort Pitt, Pittsburg, Pa., and mounted on the gunboat "Mathew Vassar." It was used in the bombardment of Forts St. Phillip and Jackson, below New Orleans, April 18-24, 1862, at the siege of Vicksburg, June 28 to July 2, 1863, and in several minor engagements.

One 100-pounder Parrott rifle, No. 167. This gun was in use during the war of the rebellion, being a part of the armament of the "Nipsic."

One 100-pounder Parrott rifle, No. 271, was a part of the battery of the "Tallapoosa," when she went in pursuit of the confederate steamship, "Tallahassee," in October and November, 1864.

The above guns were placed by the Executive Council on the west front of the capitol.

The saber, a small, straight sword, and a pair of gold mounted, single barreled pistols, carried by Gen. W. G. Belknap during the Florida and Mexican wars. The saber and small sword were also carried by his son Gen. W. W. Belknap, during the war of the rebellion.

A superb jewelled sword, presented by his regiment, the Fifteenth Iowa Infantry, to Gen. W. W. Belknap. An extra scabbard accompanies this sword.

The shoulder straps of Gen. W. G. Belknap, as major and lieutenant-colonel, together with those of Gen. W. W. Belknap, as colonel and brigadier-general.

These Belknap relics were kindly loaned to the Historical Department by Hon. Hugh R. Belknap, M. C., son of Gen. W. W. Belknap, of Chicago.

Gen. J. M. Tuttle's sword and revolvers. This is the historic "Sword of Donelson," with which General Tuttle led the charge of the Second Iowa Infantry on Fort Donelson, February 15, 1862. Presented by his son, Joel Tuttle, of Des Moines, Iowa.

Gen. J. A. Williamson's sword, which he carried through the war of the rebellion, with his commissions as first lieutenant, colonel, brevet brigadier-general, brigadier-general and brevet major-general, commissioner of the general land office, and commissioner to the Vienna Exposition.

Presentation sword to Col. William T. Shaw, Fourteenth Iowa Infantry Volunteers, bearing this inscription: "Presented by the officers of the Third Division Sixteenth Army Corps."

Lieutenant George Wilson's sword, carried in the Black Hawk war of 1832. Presented by his son, Hon. George Wilson, of Lexington, Mo. He also presents three autograph letters by Gov. John Chambers, two deeds to lands executed by Hon. W. L. Marcy, secretary of war, a letter signed by Gen. Z. Taylor, afterward president of the United States, with copies of sundry documents relating to the expulsion of certain settlers from the vicinity of the Dubuque lead mines, with various other papers which belonged to his father.

Springfield rifled musket, with bayonet and percussion lock, carried by Hon. G. B. Pray, of Webster City, during the war of the rebellion. Loaned by Mr. Pray.

A bayonet sticking in an oak tree on the field of Shiloh, thirty feet from the ground. This tree is said to have been General Grant's telegraph station, and the bayonet remained there until 1894. The tree in the meantime had grown about six inches in diameter, partially imbedding the bayonet in its substance. Presented by Capt. H. I. Smith, of Mason City, Iowa.

Rebel handbill advertising for volunteers at Yazoo City, Miss., in 1862, presented by Hon. John A. Kasson.

A handbill issued by Capt. Washington Galland, of Montrose, Iowa, calling for volunteers, June 5, 1861, and by him presented to this collection.

An interesting collection of pictorial letter envelopes from the period of the civil war, including many in use both by the union and confederate soldiers. Presented by Hon. John A. Kasson.

A handbill issued by Will Porter, of Des Moines, in September, 1861, calling for volunteers. Presented by Capt. Frank E. Landers, of Webster City, Iowa.

Illuminated roster of Co. C., 24th Iowa infantry, with portraits of the three field officers, Col. E. C. Byam, Lieut. Col. J. Q. Wilds and Major Ed. Wright, and of the company officers, Capt. Silas D. Johnson, First Lieut. Jer. C. Gue and Second Lieut. E. H. Pound. Presented by Hon. B. F. Gue.

Capt. Geo. W. Beal's collection. This consists chiefly of war relics, including bayonets, sword and saber bayonets, shot, shell, pistols, revolvers, bullets, belts, bugles, chevrons, epaulets, shoulder straps, flags, and a variety of other most interesting mementoes of battlefields. Captain Beal's collection was kindly loaned to the Historical Department and it is now on exhibition in the museum.

One molar tooth of the same species, found in the Chicago & Northwestern railway gravel pit at Lake View, Sac county, Iowa, near Wall Lake. Presented by Dr. A. A. Dearing, of Boone, Iowa.

The skin of an unusually large diamond rattlesnake, from Florida. Presented by Mr. E. L. Burnham, of Des Moines, Iowa.

- A gar caught in Lake Okoboji by ex-Mayor Lane, of Des Moines, Iowa. Mounted by A. L. Johnson.
- The horns and part of the skull of a large bison, of some extinct species. From a gravel bed in the Des Moines river, a few miles below the capital.
- The petrified skull of some large animal, from an excavation in Boone county. Presented by Mr. Charles Hazlett, of Boone, Iowa.
- Two fossil fishes, from Bear river, Rocky mountains. Loaned by Mr. Charles Aldrich.
- A pair of six-pronged horns from the head of an elk killed near Fairview, Iowa, in 1837 or 1838, by Dr. Caleb Joslin. Presented by his brother, Thurston Joslin.
- A splendid stalactite and stalagmite joined together, seven and a half feet in length. Presented by Mr. Henry Lebman, of Des Moines, Iowa.
- The jaws and vertebra of a Florida shark and the sword of a swordfish. Presented by Mrs. E. J. Ingersoll, of Des Moines, Iowa.
- A large collection of geological and mineralogical specimens—several hundred—only a small portion of which have been labeled and placed in cases. Presented by Dr. Asa Horr, of Dubuque, Iowa.
- An old-time flail for threshing grain. Presented by Mr. Hugh Oosterhoudt, of Boone, Iowa.
- A sickle for reaping grain, in use sixty years ago. Presented by Mr. Michael Myers, of Boone, Iowa.
- A case of textile materials. Loaned by Mr. John R. Shaffer.
- Gold locket, containing a lock each of the hair of George Washington and Gen. Anthony Wayne. Loaned by Mr. John Wragg, of Waukeo.
- Model of a pioneer log cabin, with fifty-four miniature implements and fixtures appertaining to the same. Designed and made by Mr. Henry Young, of Des Moines, Iowa, and by him loaned to this Department.
- A collection of ancient iron nails. Presented by Mr. A. L. Johnson, of Des Moines, Iowa.
- A reputed "mad stone." Loaned by Mr. Jesse Black, of South Norwalk, Iowa.
- An ox-yoke, with bows, keys, staple and ring, complete. Presented by Mr. John Wragg, of Waukeo, Iowa.
- Interesting concretion from a Warren county coal mine. Loaned by Capt. M. C. Handleman, of Carlisle, Iowa.
- Iron stone concretion. Presented by Hon. G. B. Pray, of Webster City, Iowa.
- Six cutting implements, knives, chisels, etc., made from hardened copper, invented by Mr. S. R. Dawson, of Des Moines, who presented these samples to the Department.
- A case containing facsimiles of coins stamped at the United States mint in gold, silver and nickel, in the year 1867. Presented by Hon. John A. Kasson.
- A gold headed ebony cane presented by the citizens of Des Moines to Hon. John A. Kasson upon the passage of the bill for the erection of the state capitol in 1870.
- A cane presented by the citizens of Harford, Pa., his birthplace, to ex-Governor C. C. Carpenter, and by him loaned to the collection. This is a wonderful piece of carving; by an old soldier with his pocket knife, giving a history of the town, etc.

- A cane made from wood taken from the old capitol building in Des Moines. Presented by Frank E. Landers, of Webster City, Iowa.
- Four keys, one from each of the outer doors of the old capitol building, which stood on the site of the Iowa Soldiers' Monument. Presented by Maj. A. S. Carper.
- A proclamation "by Robert Williams, governor of the Mississippi Territory," offering a reward of \$2,000 for the apprehension of Aaron Burr, late vice-president of the United States. "Dated at the town of Washington, this sixth day of February, 1807." Loaned by Mr. J. P. Cook, of Bloomfield, Iowa.
- Specimen of stone of which the first Christian (Catholic) church ever erected in the new world was built. (Mexico, 1525) Presented by Hon. Theo. S. Parvin, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, May, 1895.
- Small cornice ornament from church erected very early in sixteenth century, on the summit of the famous pyramid, Cholula, Mexico. Presented by Hon. Theo. S. Parvin, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, May, 1895.
- Obsidian or volcanic glass thrown out in ages long ago from a crater at Orizaba, Mexico. Presented by Hon. Theo. S. Parvin, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, May, 1895.
- Piece of stone from the wall of monument erected to the memory of Maximilian and two generals who were shot at Queretaro, Mexico. Presented by Hon. Theo. S. Parvin, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, May, 1895.
- Case of moulds for making steel type, dating from 1844. Made by Hiram Lovelace, and loaned to the Department.
- Piece of bark from the California redwood (*sequoia gigantea*). Presented by Mr. John R. Shaffer.
- Wreck of a shot gun torn to pieces in the Pomoroy cyclone. Loaned by Mr. Theo. Dangerfield.
- An iron rake imbedded in an elm tree—the growth of wood having completely covered it. Presented by Mr. John Foley, of Anamosa.
- A large wooden tray made by James Parsons in pioneer days, and long used in his family. Presented by Mrs. Ingram, of Viola, Iowa. She also presented a buffalo horn found in Iowa in 1838, and the horn of a deer killed in 1837.
- A patent hoe of modern date, and a curious one made by a blacksmith in 1832. Presented by Mr. C. B. Hart, of Viola.
- Small rebel flag taken from a gate post near the battle field of Shiloh.
- A piece of an old stump near which the rebel general Albert Sidney Johnston fell at the battle of Shiloh.
- A lady's glove picked up on the battlefield of Jackson, Miss.
- An old spear deposited in the capitol many years ago, by whom is not known.
- Rebel flag captured July 4, 1863, by the Thirty-third Iowa Infantry. Presented by Col. C. H. Mackay.
- A brick from a celebrated old mansion in Washington, D. C. It was in front of this building that Gen. Daniel E. Sickles shot Philip Barton Key, February 27, 1839. This house was subsequently occupied by William H. Seward, James G. Blaine, and other distinguished persons; but was torn down a short time ago. Presented by Mrs. J. A. T. Hull, of Des Moines.

A star fish from the Oregon coast; leaves and flowers from the grave of Francis M. Key, author of "The Star Spangled Banner;" the cap of Orderly Sergeant Johnson Wiggins, who was killed at the battle of Winchester; a piece from the bed curtains of Benedict Arnold; some pieces of wood and stone from the grave of Barbara Freitchie, and other relics and curios. Presented by Miss Harriett L. Ankeny, of Des Moines, Iowa.
