#### The 2018 Iowa Women's Hall of Fame honorees are:

- **Dr. Dianne Bystrom (Ames):** Long-time director of the Carrie Chapman Catt Center for Women and Politics at Iowa State University; author; professor; mentor; researcher; advocate for women in politics and leadership.
- Ruth Harkin (Cumming): Attorney; advocate; mentor; led the effort to establish the
  Harkin Institute for Public Policy and Citizen Engagement at Drake University;
  woman of many firsts first female county attorney in Story County, first woman
  appointed Deputy General Counsel at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, first
  female President and CEO of OPIC (Overseas Private Investment Corporation),
  and first woman to serve on a number of corporate boards (including Conoco
  Petroleum Company and Bowater Company).
- Dr. Jean Jew (lowa City): Professor; emeritus faculty at the University of Iowa; researcher; fought a decade-long landmark federal sexual harassment case against the University of Iowa and won; founding member of the Iowa Women's Foundation; mentor; advocate for gender equity and combating sexual harassment in the workplace/academia.
- Dr. Peggy Whitson (Houston, TX; originally from Beaconsfield, IA): Astronaut, scientist/biochemist, researcher; first female Commander to lead an expedition on board the International Space Station; oldest woman to walk in space; holds the record for the most space walks for a female astronaut; American Astronaut spending more days in space cumulatively, than any other American Astronaut.

• Janice Edmunds-Wells (Des Moines): Life-long state and national advocate and activist for multicultural and women's health equity; former Executive Officer for the

Office of Minority and Multicultural Health at the Iowa Department of Public Health; social worker.

These awards celebrate the outstanding courage and achievements of everyday people who advance the legacy of Civil Rights in the state of Iowa. The Edna Griffin Award of Courage recognizes individuals of outstanding courage and achievement whose efforts have defied the status quo in order to advance



community and the Stanley Griffin Trailblazer Award recognizes unsung heroes who are making substantial and perhaps unrecognized contributions to the community in their daily work.

## "Count the Kicks" program is seeking participants

Nationally, 1 out of 167 pregnancies end in stillbirth. Women of color are at higher risk for stillbirth. Black women, for example, experience stillbirth at a rate of 1:94 pregnancies. Count the Kicks is committed to preventing stillbirth and eliminating racial disparities.



<u>Count the Kicks</u> is seeking pregnant African American, Asian, and Hispanic women to participate in a video encouraging women of color to track fetal movement in their third trimester and to contact their provider if they have a concern about their baby's well-being.

Count the Kicks is an evidence-based stillbirth prevention public health program of the nonprofit Healthy Birth Day, Inc. Since its inception in 2013, Iowa's stillbirth rate has decreased 26% and went from the 33rd worst to the 3rd best stillbirth rate in the country.
