## REPORT.

To the Hon. S. J. Kirkwood, Governor of Iowa:

I hereby submit my report as Commissioner of the blind asylum at Vinton.

On the 11th day of June, 1860, I received the appointment of Commissioner and immediately entered upon the duties of my office. In order to conform to the Act of the Legislature, approved April 3, I860, requiring the plans of the building to be so changed as to bring the cost of completing the same within a specified sum, I employed Messrs. Finkbine & Lovelace, Architects, to furnish plans and specifications for the above named changes.

On the 3d day of July, I published a notice in the "Vinton Eagle" inviting proposals for enclosing and completing the building, until the 20th inst. Said notice stating that the contractor would take the building in the condition it then was, together with all the tools owned by the State, the materials on hand, and the brick contracted to the State, and that the proposals would be for a specific sum in addition to the above. I received three propositions, the most favorable of which, for the State, was that of Messrs. Finkbine & Lovelace, which I accepted, a copy of which together with a copy of the contract made with said parties is annexed.

Before making the contract for enclosing the building, I submitted the plans and specifications for the same together with the proposal of Messrs. Finkbine & Lovelace to the Governor, who approved the same by so endorsing them. I found on file in my office two contracts for furnishing brick to the State, neither of which had been fulfilled, and to both of whom my predecessors in their reports, had shown balances due. One of the said contractors, Mr. G. W. Sells, subsequently filled his contract and was paid the balance due him. The other, Mr. E. Erwin, still owes to the State eighty-five thousand brick, and has been paid according to the report before alluded to, within one hundred and forty-six dollars of the whole amount of his contract price.

This at the contract price per thousand is overpaying him two hundred and thirty-six dollars and fifty cents (\$236,50.) There is yet unpaid of the original subscription notes three hundred and seventy seven dollars and twenty-one cents (\$377,21,) all of which will be needed to pay the contractors, and very little, if any of which, will be paid except enforced by law.

Having no funds in my hands with which to pay attorney's fee, I addressed the Attorney General and the District Attorney for this Judicial District, requesting them to act for the State, both of whom declined taking any action in the premises, consequently I have been unable to collect the notes or enforce the performance of the brick contract.

It is due Mr. Erwin to state that he now informs me, that he has the balance of the brick burned and will deliver them as early in the spring as they can be used.

The contractors Messrs. Finkbine & Lovelace have completed their contract, with the exception of a part of the partition walls in the third story, which delay is occasioned by the failure of Mr. Irwin to furnish the brick contracted to the State, and to be furnished by the State to Messrs. Finkbine & Lovelace.

I would suggest an additional expenditure of about three hundred dollars on the plastering. The material for plastering at this place is of an inferior quality, and the ceilings should be guazed on with plaster paris. An area wall around the entire building should be built and the area paved, to prevent water from settling around the building, this will involve an expenditure of five hundred dollars. Out buildings consisting of a work-shop, stables, privies and two cisterns are also needed.

These if the work-shop is built of brick, and the privies and stable frame, including the vaults and cisterns will cost two thousand dollars. Should the appropriations for completing the building be made so that work early in the spring, the building could be got ready for occupancy by the middle of October.

For a statement of the account between the State and the contractors; between the State and myself, and the condition of the notes in my hands, your attention is called to the annexed exhibits.

COPY OF PROPOSITION OF MESSRS. FINKBINE & LOVELACE.

Mr. J. B. Locke, Commissioner of Blind Asylum :

We hereby propose to enclose the Blind Asylum Building, at Vinton, in accordance with the plans and specifications in your hands, for the sum of ten thousand four hundred and twenty (\$10,420) dollars, of which sum ten thousand dollars are to be drawn from the State Treasury, and the further sum of four hundred and twenty (\$420) dollars to be collected from notes in your hands; you as Commissioner, to collect the same and pay to us. We further propose to complete said building, in accordance with the plans and specifications, for the further sum of ten thousand (10,000) dollars, provided the Legislature makes an appropriation therefor.

COPY OF CONTRACT MADE WITH FINKBINE & LOVELACE.

This agreement made and entered into this twenty-sixth day of July, 1860, by and between Finkham & Lovelace, of the first part, and Jas. B. Locke, Commissioner of the Blind Asylum, of the second part, witnesseth: The said Finkbine & Lovelace hereby agree to enclose the Blind Asylum Building, at Vinton, Benton County, in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by said Commissioner, and approved by the Governor, which plans and specifications are hereby made a part of this contract, said parties to commence the said work as soon as possible after the signing of this contract, and to complete the same on or before the first day of December, A. D. 1861. In consideration of the above agreement, the said Jas. B. Locke, Commissioner, hereby agrees to pay to the said Finkbine & Lovelace the sum of ten thousand four

hundred and twenty (\$10,420 00) dollars, as follows: one thousand dollars in hand, and the balance in monthly installments, to be paid on the first of each month, upon estimates made by the said parties, in sums not exceeding the amount of work done. It is hereby further agreed by and between the said parties that the said Finkbine & Lovelace shall complete said building in accordance with the plans and specifications, for the additional sum of ten thousand dollars, to be paid by said Commissioner in similar payments to those mentioned in the first part of this agreement. The last-mentioned portion of this contract to be null and void unless the Legislature shall make the appropriation therefor as contemplated in an "Act entitled an act making further appropriations for the Blind Asylum at Vinton, approved April 3d, 1860."

In witness whereof we have hereto set our hands, this 26th day of July, A. D. 1860.
