#### **Summer 2017 Update**

# Status of Data Collection & Reporting

- On June 30, 2017, we closed out cases
  of violent deaths that occurred in
  CY2015. Data for this year was
  collected only on deaths that occurred
  in lowa's seven largest counties. Death
  Certificate data was 100% complete,
  ME reports were 97% complete and LE
  reports were 90% complete. We were
  pleased with our efforts to obtain as
  many LE records as possible to close
  out the year!
- For CY2016, we expanded data collection to all violent deaths in Iowa.
   By early August, there are 620 cases entered in the database. Of them, death certificate data is 95% complete; ME records are 88% complete, and we are now requesting LE reports.
- CY2017 cases have started rolling in already. There are 302 cases we have received so far. Our death certificates are received monthly from IDPH Vital Records, which allows us to upload them within 1 2 months after the death. The lowa State Medical Examiner is now sending all ME records electronically, decreasing the amount of time to initiate those data elements. We are so grateful to our colleagues in IDPH Vital Records and the IOSME for their strong support of the IA VDRS

The IAVDRS is finishing work on a special report to be issued in the coming month. Stay tuned for more information!
