Hon. Leslie M. Shaw, Governor and Commander-in-chief:

SIR—I have the honor to submit my report of this department for the biennial period ending November 30, 1901, together with the accompanying papers.

MILITIA.

The number of persons in the state subject to military duty as shown by the return of the county auditors made to this office, is as follows:

For the year 900.....	309,625
For the year 1901.....	316,430

THE IOWA NATIONAL GUARD

On November 30, 1899, consisted of two full regiments, Fiftieth and Fifty-second, one troop of cavalry, three companies of the Forty-ninth and one company of the Fifty-first. Since that time the nine other companies of the Forty-ninth and eleven companies of the Fifty-first have been reorganized.

The following companies have been mustered out since my last report:

Company M, Fifty-second regiment, Cherokee, May 3, 1900.
Company A, Fiftieth regiment, Keokuk, November 19, 1900.
Company F, Fiftieth regiment, Ft. Madison, July 10, 1900.

Company H, Fifty-first regiment, Des Moines, December 3, 1900.
Troop A, Des Moines, August 5, 1901.

And there have been organized to take their places the following:

Company M, Fifty-second regiment, Sac City, June 6, 1900.
Company A, Fiftieth regiment, Albia, March 14, 1901.
Company F, Fiftieth regiment, Burlington, July 16, 1900.
Company G, Fifty-first regiment, Winterset, March 11, 1901.
Company H, Fifty-first regiment, Stuart, March 29, 1901.



leaving one vacancy in the Fifty-first, Company A. There is now being organized in Des Moines a company to take the place of Company A, Fifty-first regiment, mustered out.

There have been no steps taken as yet to reorganize a troop of cavalry.

At the present time there is a total of organized guard, including officers and enlisted men, of 2,474.

ANNUAL INSPECTIONS.

The companies and bands of the National Guard are annually inspected at their home stations by the Inspector-General and his assistant. I refer you to their reports for further information.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

For the last two years there have been held on the state rifle range at Cedar Rapids, schools of instruction in rifle practice under the command and direction of Col. Thomas F. Cooke, general inspector of small arms practice. A detail from each company was transported and subsisted there with good results. I also refer you to Colonel Cooke's report for further information.

In addition, rifle practice is maintained at company stations on their home ranges, the season closing November 30th of each year.

ARMS.

The Iowa National Guard at the present time is armed with the Springfield rifle, calibre 45, which have been remodeled and repaired by the ordnance department of the United States, but are today absolutely useless as an arm for troops. None of them are fit to be fired upon the range or at an enemy. Arrangements have about been completed whereby the guard will all be equipped with the U. S. magazine rifle, calibre 30, within the next year and the old arms turned in to the United States government.

ENCAMPMENTS FOR 1900.

The four regiments were fully reorganized and regimental encampments were held as follows:

Fifty-first regiment, Col. James Rush Lincoln, commanding, at Red Oak, August 1st to 8th, inclusive.

Fifty-second regiment, Col. W. B. Humphrey, commanding, at Perry, July 25th to August 1st, inclusive.

Forty-ninth regiment, Col. W. G. Dows, commanding, at Cedar Rapids, August 8th to 15th, inclusive.

Fiftieth regiment, Col. H. H. Caughlan, commanding, at Ottumwa, August 15th to 22d, inclusive.

Troop A, Des Moines, Capt. H. H. Polk, commanding, encamped with Fifty-first regiment, at Red Oak.

ENCAMPMENTS FOR 1901.

The Forty-ninth regiment, Col. W. G. Dows, commanding, and the Fiftieth regiment, Col. H. H. Caughlan, commanding, encamped together at Dubuque, from July 23d to 30th, inclusive. Col. W. G. Dows was commander of the camp. The weather was so extremely hot and dry that camp work was almost impossible.

The Fifty-first regiment, Col. James Rush Lincoln, commanding and the Fifty-second regiment, Lt.-Col. S. J. Parker, commanding, encamped together at Council Bluffs, from August 14th to 22d. By direction of your excellency, the adjutant-general assumed command of the camp, thus giving the colonels all their time to devote to drill and discipline of their respective commands.

GUARD FUNDS.

The balance on hand or unexpended on November 30, 1899, at the close of the last biennial report was \$37,410.45. During this biennial period just closed, the guard has been fully reorganized and equipped, making expenditures larger than common; then the last legislature amended the military code directing payment for company drills at company stations, not exceeding twenty cents per week to each officer and soldier who attends. No additional appropriation was made to carry out the provisions of this act, so we were compelled to pay for the same from our annual appropriation, thus reducing our fund for general expense some \$15,000 per annum.

Section 2214 of the Code.—Appropriation—"There is appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$50,200 per annum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the support of the guard," etc.

The expert accountants employed by the state upon examining the books of the auditor and adjutant-general's office, insisted that the intent of the act was that all moneys not drawn under this section on October 1st (the taking effect of the Code) were not necessary, and reverted by operation of law to the treasury, and that the auditor of state should charge off the balance, and on or about June 1, 1901, the auditor charged off accordingly, and at a time when our necessary expense was the greatest. This guard appropriation should be made without any strings to draw it

back, as it is impossible for all the bills contracted during the annual period, term to be audited and paid before October 1st. Many bills that were paid in 1900 were contracted in 1899 and should have been paid from balance on hand November 30, 1899. Drill pay is audited and paid semi-annually, the same with armory rent. Armory rent becomes due March 31st and September 30th for the six months preceding, so that the fund becomes liable but is not drawn upon for some time after due.

DRILL PAY AND CAMP PAY.

It is a custom among some of the companies to divert this money from its proper channel by vote of the company or by some rules of the civil organization. The evident intent of the drill pay was to encourage the men to attend drills at company stations and should be paid to them instead of going into company funds. The latter method defeats the very object in view.

Camp and drill pay should only go into the company fund by unanimous consent of those concerned.

WAR CLAIMS.

The claim of the state of Iowa against the United States for money expended in aiding the United States in equipping, subsisting, and maintaining the volunteers from Iowa in war with Spain, amounted to \$149,518.46. Of this amount the United States has refunded to the state, through the auditor for the war department, \$92,760.27, leaving a balance due the state for money advanced of \$56,758 19. The adjutant-general has had these claims in charge and has made two or three trips to Washington to confer with the auditor for the war department and looking after the payment of these claims. There is no provision for the payment of the expense of looking after these claims, and in my judgment there should be appropriated by this general assembly, an amount sufficient to pay the expense of some person to look after the repayment of the money to the state.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

First.—I again recommend the purchase of a permanent camp ground by the state. It should be centrally located. This would necessitate a special appropriation and the money thus expended would be saved to the state in a few years.

Second.—That an appropriation be made for the purpose of building an arsenal and adjutant-general's department on the

lot east of the capitol, designated for that purpose, large enough to comfortably store the property, records, books and papers of the department, and sufficient office room for the adjutant-general and his office force. For four years the state has been paying \$700 per annum for store-room to store the property of this department, outside of the office and store-rooms in the capitol. An appropriation of not less than \$50,000 for an arsenal would relieve the capitol building of its congested condition and greatly improve the military department.

The extremely hot weather during the Dubuque camp made it impossible to do much work, especially in the afternoons. Excellent care of the men was taken by the officers, as shown by the small sick lists.

The accident I met with shortly after I reached the Council Bluffs camp, necessitated my returning home at once, so I am not able to make any detailed report on this camp.

There is always trouble in any camp as to the supply of lumber and straw. An ample supply is always purchased by the Quartermaster-General, but the last companies on the ground always have to wait for a fresh supply. There is a regulation allowance of these articles and it is known to a foot of lumber and a pound of straw to what a regiment is entitled. The Quartermaster-General should issue the proper amount to the regimental quartermaster, and he should personally see that the company quartermaster sergeants get exactly what is due them. No more and no less. The lumber should be measured and the straw weighed, and carefully issued, and not dumped in one pile and the companies allowed to take all they can carry away. I have seen men allowed to fill bed sacks to bursting, well knowing they were depriving others of their allowance, while making a very uncomfortable bed for themselves. Such actions are pure, unadulterated "hogghishness" that should be corrected by a little sharp discipline. Much of this trouble will cease if the quartermasters will only do their duty.

"The mounted officers of each regiment should be required to drill mounted one hour each day, in order that their mounted work may be uniform and of a strictly military character." (Report of Gen. Lincoln, 1897.)

Colonel Lincoln put this in practice in his regiment this year to the great benefit of his mounted officers.

There is too little preparation on the part of company, battalion, and regimental commanders. They should constantly study the drill regulations, explain fully all movements and correct all errors. But little can be learned at drill unless this is done. It is a good idea immediately after drill to assemble the officers of the command and talk over in a friendly and gentlemanly way the errors and mistakes.

A reasonable amount of outpost and advance guard duty should be required in camp, but not to the neglect of battalion and regimental drills which are a great aid to discipline; whereas if all the time is given up to field work discipline is impaired and more harm than good results.

Guard duty is not up to the standard in our camps. It should be studied and practiced during the winter months. The inspector's department should make it a part of their work to ascertain the proficiency of the companies in this work, mark on it, and include it in the rating. The men who walk post show they have much to learn regarding their duties as sentinels. This instruction can and should be given at the home stations. Our manuals are very full and complete on the subject and the same instruction now given in non-commissioned officers' school might be given to the privates. Not only should the ceremony of guard mounting be taught, but reliefs should be posted, and the company officers should question sentinels on all general orders, which they should be made to commit to memory. This should be kept up till all are proficient.

The khaki coat, trousers, and shirt should be issued for field work in camp.

The state should purchase its own camping ground, and not in the immediate vicinity of any city or village. We will always be cramped for drill ground on any private, rented land. This year the cost for the two camps was in the neighborhood of one thousand dollars. This includes rent, damage, erection of temporary buildings, and other incidental expenses. It would be far cheaper for the state in the long run to own permanent camp-

ing grounds. A number of cities and towns have already begun preparations for a campaign to secure the camp grounds in case the legislature passes an act establishing it.

The Adjutant-General should take command of all camps. This will enable the regimental commanders to devote more time to the instruction and drill of their commands and relieve them of administrative duties that take up so much of their time when they are in supreme command. When two or more regiments are camped together the ranking colonel is loath to interfere with discipline and work of a regiment other than his own.

A progressive system of work and instruction should be ordered and the Adjutant-General in person see it is carried out. If any work is omitted a full, written report should be demanded from the regimental commander.

There are three things our camps can dispense with to the good of the service, viz: Sutlers, Y. M. C. A., and women.

There is nothing the sutler sells the men would not be better without. The ration is sufficient for the authorized enlisted force in camp and does not need to be eked out with poor ices, ice cream, and so-called "soft drinks" that are worse than slops and ruinous to the stomach.

The Y. M. C. A. are not required in camp to either handle mail or advertise themselves on elaborate letter-heads erroneously printed. It should be part of camp instruction for a command to care for its own mail. In the short week of camp it is not really necessary to write many letters and the men should be taught to look out for themselves in regard to writing materials, stamps, etc.

As to women living in camp, it is a difficult subject to properly treat. But if they do not know or care that they are a nuisance, underfoot, and a detriment to the good work and benefits expected of camp, they have so far unsexed themselves as to be for once on an equality with men and should be plainly ordered to stay out of camp. They become a nuisance as soon as they leave home with a command, crowding the cars to the discomfort of the men, and in camp they not only crowd the grounds, but eat to the detriment of the company messes, and I have never heard of their "chipping in" to help out the mess.

If railway conductors would do their duty and check up the transportation it would keep many "hangers-on" out of camp.

Company commanders should be severely censured for allowing unauthorized persons to travel on state transportation, or live on the state ration.

Camp should not be made a military picnic.

"Only regularly enlisted men and commissioned officers of the National Guard will be allowed to wear the uniform of the guard in the camps of the Iowa National Guard, and any person found in uniform, not authorized to wear the same, will be arrested and dealt with according to law." (G. O. No. 13, 1897.)

This paragraph should be republished and enforced. In our camps this summer there were an unusually large number of unauthorized persons wearing the uniform. It detracts from the military appearance of camp, cheapens the uniform and is an annoyance to officers as regards courtesies.

There are always a few men in our camps who do not seem to care that their disgraceful acts bring the whole guard into disrepute. It is usually impossible to locate these offenders personally, but their company is readily

ascertained and the company commander should be held responsible for the actions of the members of his company. If he cannot properly command and control his men he should be court-martialed and dismissed from the service. A few examples will make captains more careful and discriminating in the material they enlist. The regimental commander can do much to prevent such breaches of discipline.

There are certain organizations in the guard it is not safe for a railway company to transport, especially home from an encampment. Such companies, next year, should either be deprived the privilege of camp, or mustered out of the service.

The department should encourage all mounted officers to own their own horses, by furnishing transportation to and from camp, as well as feed and care for them while in camp. The officers will be better mounted, do better work and it will cost the state less than to rent a new lot of untrained animals for each separate camp as is now done to the discomfort of all concerned.

There are some changes that should be made in the Code this winter.

Bands.—Increase size and add a cook. (See A. R. 1901, par. 273.)

Officers, Term of Office.—Should be for life, or during good behavior, with an old age limit.

Signal Department.—Much better work will be done in this department if one full company is authorized, with a Captain, four Lieutenants, eight Sergeants, sixteen Corporals, and as many privates as the Commander-in-chief may think necessary. Then give this company drill pay, armory rent, etc.

Such a company could be organized in Des Moines, and would soon become very efficient. Camp details could be made to serve with each regiment.

Disabled Guardsmen.—Several states have laws making provision for compensation and indemnity to guardsmen who may be disabled, or killed, while in the performance of military duty. I most earnestly recommend that similar action be taken by our legislature.

The revised army regulations of 1901 should be procured as soon as possible and issued to all officers and organizations.

Armory rent should be paid direct to owner by the Adjutant-General. The present system causes much delay and trouble and brings the Adjutant-General's office into much unmerited disrepute.

It is subversive of discipline to have the recruiting committee of a company do more than investigate as to the applicant's character and report what they find to the company commander. It is unmilitary for either committee or company to vote on applicants. The company commander, alone, is responsible for the men he enlists. Some company commanders are so tied up by their by-laws in this respect that they are not even "figure-heads," and on account of this defect some companies have been demoralized and eventually mustered out.

All officers, and especially company commanders, should pay more attention to orders and instructions issued from the office of the Adjutant-General. They should not only read them carefully when received, but make a study of them and endeavor loyally to execute them. There is great laxness in the guard in this respect.

More time and attention should be given at the home stations to gymnastic, setting up, and bell-bar exercises. The men should be encouraged to practice such exercises at their homes and when not in ranks. The set-up of a soldier, more than anything else, is what marks the regular from the militiaman.

As my predecessor has so well said, "Our guardsmen are a strong, able-bodied set of young soldiers, but carelessness in their carriage causes them to look less vigorous than they really are."

The Commander-in-chief should confine the selection of his staff to officers of the guard who have been conspicuous for efficient service in the line. This would be a great encouragement to the guard and assist materially in the discipline of the same.

A complete equipment for four full regiments of infantry, two troops of cavalry, and two light batteries should be kept on hand, stored in the state arsenal. The state should always be prepared to fully equip its troops.

An arsenal should be built large enough to comfortably store the property pertaining to the military department, with sufficient office room for the Adjutant-General and his office force. This department has never had suitable store-rooms, and it will facilitate business to have the office and store-rooms in the same building.

Two batteries of artillery should be organized in Des Moines. The increased allowance from the general government will soon enable this to be done and our Code provides for it.

Two troops of cavalry should be organized in country towns where the young men own their own mounts. Cavalry cannot be maintained in cities where the men have to depend upon livery stables for their mounts. Men can be enlisted for the cavalry who live quite a ways from the armory. It is not necessary to fully equip the troop when first organized. This can be done gradually and later as credit accrues with the general government.

Enlistments should be limited to men who live within a certain distance from the armory. For infantry and artillery no man should be enlisted who lives more than a mile outside the corporation line of the city his company armory is in. We now have officers and men in our companies who live miles away from the armory and in adjoining towns. Such cannot get to drills, weekly, and are a detriment to the company. If an order is published requiring this it should apply to future enlistments only.

"Among the problems most difficult of satisfactory solution, confronting company commanders in the Iowa National Guard, is that of providing suitable armories for their companies. In the larger cities and towns this can only be done by their assuming the burden of a financial obligation far in excess of the amount guaranteed them by the state for this purpose. In the smaller towns it is usually impossible to procure suitable quarters for armories without building expressly for that purpose." (Adjutant-General's report 1895.)

This problem is still unsolved in Iowa, and it is the greatest handicap the guard now has. Armories do not need to be expensive. Thirty-five hundred dollars will build as good a drill hall as is necessary. Such halls should be paid for by either the state, or the county or town in which the company is located. The removal of this burden will add much to the efficiency,

strength, and permanency of the company. I, therefore, earnestly recommend that suitable action be taken by our legislature.

There should be issued to every organization, a uniform stencil with indelible ink, for marking clothing and equipment.

The cavalry equipments now in use by the private riding club known as the "Lincoln Huzzars," should be called in and be stored in the arsenal till required to equip a cavalry troop. The U. S. regulations forbid any such use of government property and our Code is also explicit on this subject. "All uniforms and other military property furnished by the state, or for which an allowance has been made, shall belong to the state, and shall be used for military purposes only." (Section 2202 Code.)

In rating the companies at the annual inspection too much credit is now given for the care of property and the keeping of books and records, and not enough to the drill and discipline. I recommend a decided change in this, and that "extended order" be included.

"It is generally conceded that the system of electing officers is pernicious. It places the officer in a position in which, dependent upon the votes of subordinates for promotion, popularity must sometimes be achieved at the expense of discipline; and often bitter discord is engendered by the rivalries of regimental politics, from which it may require years to recover. It is doubtful if efficiency and discipline can ever be attained, as long as the election system prevails." (Prize Essay. Col. Britton.)

I fully concur in the above.

"The Washington dispatches state that the forthcoming report of the Secretary of War will suggest plans for the radical reorganization of the militia of the different states. Regularly every year for more than a decade suggestions have been made for the betterment of the militia service. The plans coming from Washington almost invariably have included a proposition practically to make the state soldiers a sort of subsidiary force of regulars. There has been always strong objection made by many people to the war department scheme because of the thought that it might lead up to the maintenance of a great standing army. The national guardsmen themselves know best the weaknesses of the state service and how best to put strength in the place of weakness.

"The first great step toward making a strong militia is to so fix the tenure of office of the commissioned officers that they shall not be dependent for their positions upon the caprices of the men whom they command. The officers should be appointed and not elected, and should hold office during good behavior. More than this they should be paid enough to make them take a deep interest in their work. As it is to-day a national guard officer does not receive enough money in the course of a year to pay for a respectable fatigue uniform. It is not within the range of reason that a man should hold the same disciplinary hand over subordinates upon whom he is dependent for his position that he would hold were he independent of the thought of officers' election rights and the men's votes. There are many things which might be done to improve the national guard service, and most of these things can be done by the states themselves." (Editorial, *Chicago Tribune*.)

The above seems so true to me I could not help putting it in this report and endorsing the same.

The uniform courtesy and consideration I have received from the members

of the guard, during my five year's service with it have been very grateful to me and fully appreciated, and I also wish to thank you for your courtesy and assistance during the last four years.

In severing my connection with the guard, as I expect to January 1st, I would like them one and all to know that I shall always have a warm place in my heart for them and be interested in all they do. They are a splendid set of young men and the state may well be proud of them.

I hope my service with them has been beneficial. It has not only been a pleasure to me, but also an experience of great benefit.

REPORT OF GENERAL INSPECTOR SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

To the Adjutant-General, Des Moines, Iowa.

SIR:—I have the honor to report that in compliance with G. O. No. 8, A. G. O. c, s., I assumed command of the State Range on June 8, 1901.

I found the camp made, the mess running and the work on the range about completed. Everything was in readiness for firing by Sunday noon.

The program laid down was successfully carried out, and in addition, some firing was had at Disappearing Targets and a Company Field Practice was illustrated. The additional day's time enabled us to accomplish much more work than heretofore.

While good scores were made at each range, there were but few large aggregates; Capt. Armstrong, Co. K, 52d Regt., had the best string, 48 at 200 yds., 44 at 300 yds., and 46 at 500 yds., a total of 138 out of a possible 150; Lieut. Bonebright, Co. C, 52d Regt., was second with 132 points, and Capt. Whipple, Co. G, 49th Regt., third with 121 points, each at the same distances and equal number of shots. All of these are well over 80 per cent. Lack of time prevented these men finishing their scores by firing at 600 yds. The results of the skirmish firing were some better than last year. The four best runs were as follows: Sergt. Fee, Co. D, 51st, 56; Sergt. Reichmann, Co. K, 49th, 47; Capt. Armstrong, Co. K, 52d, 44; and Sergt. Kiesel, Co. K, 50th, 42; twenty shots each, possible 100.

The highest aggregate with the Revolver, 159, was made by Capt. Smith, Inspector Small Arms Practice; Capt. Shaw, Co. K, 49th Regt., second, 158 points; Capt. Haynes, Co. E, 50th Regt., third, 156; all close to 80 per cent of the possible 200. The average scores were much better than the preceding year.

The work on the Disappearing Targets was very good although this was their first trial in the state to the best of my knowledge. Sergt. Harless, Troop A, made the possible 25 at both ranges; Capt. Haynes, Co. E, 50th, made 24 at 100 yds., and 25 at 200 yds; seven others made possibles at 100 yds. This work cannot help but be valuable for instructed shots, and more attention should be given to it.

Forty-two men were in line for the Company Field Practice. Owing to the lack of 30 cal. ammunition, a little over one-half were armed with the U. S. Magazine Rifle and the rest with the Springfield. On account of the shortness of the range, the first volley was delivered at 600 yds., otherwise the Firing Regulations were followed. Several of the men had seen active service in the Philippines with the 51st Regt., but this was the first time any

of them had participated in this practice with ball cartridges. The targets were placed on the level ground in front of the dump. Scarcely any of the prone figures could be seen owing to the high grass; 930 shots were fired and 112 hits made. Seventeen of the 42 figures used were not hit and several of the others only had one hit each. On the other hand, other figures were hit from 22 to 26 times each. It is evident that the men fired at those silhouettes, which, owing to slight variations in the background or the angles at which they were set, were in plainest view. Another lesson on the importance of cover. Major Fisher was in charge of the firing line, Major Hume of the support and reserve, and I had the general command.

The opinion expressed in my report last year as to the poor condition of the Springfield Rifles now in the hands of the State Troops, is confirmed by the reports of the Company Officers and our experience on the range. Some companies report that after careful test they have found only four rifles out of the forty issued that could be depended upon for range work. In one case the enlargement of the chamber was so great that eight out of ten cartridge cases were ruptured lengthwise by firing. These cases were repolished brass and the ammunition either very old or else it had been sadly neglected. But in the same rifle at another time, four original copper cases out of ten fired, were split in the same manner.

Further proof is given in the comparison of the scores made with the Springfield rifle, with which the men were all familiar and have used on the range, and the scores made with the magazine rifle. While some of the men had been armed with the latter during the Spanish-American war, none of them had had target practice with it and to the majority it was entirely new. Under these circumstances a superiority of over 12½ per cent at all ranges in favor of the magazine arm is remarkable, especially when we consider the great difference in the pull of the two pieces and that most riflemen prefer the Springfield for fine target work at ranges not exceeding 600 yards. No sighting shots were allowed in either case.

The general government must have a large number of Springfield rifles in store, among which a sufficient number of serviceable pieces could be found to equip the National Guard, who are certainly entitled to better weapons than those now in their hands.

The new sights are a great improvement to the magazine rifle for range use and were generally found to be accurate at the four ranges. This has not been the case heretofore. With this arm the tendency is still to shoot high and to the left.

Mr. Chas. Newton, formerly of the old First Regt., Iowa National Guard, representing the Laflin & Rand Powder Company, was present with a liberal supply of ammunition loaded with their smokeless powders for trial on the range. They gave excellent satisfaction and were much liked by those using them.

Corp. Louis Sauer, Ordnance Corps U. S. A., through the courtesy of Major S. E. Blunt, Commandant of Rock Island Arsenal, was present and rendered valuable assistance through the week, especially with the magazine rifles.

The discipline and behavior of the details were good. They went about the work with hearty good will and all seemed to do their best. I find the

command of such men as we have each year at the range a decided pleasure rather than a task.

The officers of this department present, Captains Smith, Karns and Cushing, together with camp staff, rendered loyal and efficient service. The mess was excellent, not too expensive and meals were always on time. The machinery of the school never ran smoother.

I desire to express my appreciation of the liberality of yourself and your predecessors toward those schools. I have never asked for anything that has not been cheerfully furnished and everything possible has always been done to help make them a success.

Copies of the orders issued and the tables of comparisons spoken of herein accompany this report. The muster rolls, duty rosters and morning reports were sent you direct from the camp.

I. The following paragraphs of Army Regulations as modified by general orders from the War Department, are adopted for the Iowa National Guard, and published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

DISCHARGES.

When a company commander enters under the head of Character, "Service not honest and faithful," he will also enter "Right to apply for redress expressly waived," or, "Approved finding of a board of officers," as the case may be. (A. R. 148 and Circular 3, A. G. O., 1896.)

CHEVRONS.

Those for the overcoat of infantry shall be made of white cloth instead of dark blue cloth, as heretofore. (Uniform Regulations, par. 30 and G. O. 2, A. G. O. 1900.)

I. The annual inspection of all companies, troops and regimental bands of the Iowa National Guard, at their stations, is hereby ordered to be held on such dates as may be designated to each organization by the Inspectors, Col. J. A. Olmsted, Inspector-General, and Maj. A. L. Rule, Assistant Inspector-General, giving not less than three days' notice.

II. Inspections will be most thorough, with a view of determining the proficiency of officers and non-commissioned officers, the facilities for and manner of caring for state property, and to what degree each organization is prepared for active and immediate service. The Inspectors will particularly investigate and report upon the following subjects:

First.—Strength of company; number present; number absent with leave; number absent without leave; number residing within one mile of the armory; number residing a greater distance; probable number that could be assembled, fully equipped for active service, within twelve hours from the receipt of order by the company commander; ceremony of inspection; condition of arms and equipments; condition and quality of uniforms and blankets; number of uniforms serviceable; condition and manner of keeping books and papers, including the first sergeant's roll book; condition and manner of keeping the mess outfit; condition and adaptability of armory; method of numbering, individually, each separate article of clothing and equipment, and the condition of said marks on same; appearance, bearing, discipline and instruction of the company.

Second.—Each company will be exercised in and marked upon the following; formation of company, school of the soldier, bayonet exercise, setting up exercises, manual of arms, firings, movements by company, movement by platoons and ceremony of guard mounting; drill regulations must be strictly complied with.

Third.—The zeal and efficiency of company officers; whether they possess the requisite professional knowledge for the proper performance of their duties; whether they observe the system of instruction and treatment of subordinates enjoined by the regulations.

Fourth.—The instruction, regularity of attendance and proper performance of duty of all non-commissioned officers; whether they have been regularly appointed and have received their proper warrant from the regimental commander; whether they habitually occupy their proper places in the formation of the company and discharge the duties of their positions as prescribed in the regulations; their knowledge of their duties as guides and file closers.

Non-commissioned officers not showing proper knowledge of, or attention to, their duties will be recommended to their regimental commanders for reduction to ranks.

Fifth.—Company musicians will be examined as to their knowledge of the service calls.

Sixth.—The condition, place and manner of keeping the state property with reference to its security against fire, theft, damage or use for private purposes. They will verify exhibit of public property with last property return and make detailed report of all shortages.

III. Company commanders are directed to have all state property, for which they are accountable, at their armories at the time of the inspection, and see that it is arranged in such manner that it may be readily inspected and verified.

VI. The inspectors will also perform the duties of a board of survey on such property as may be submitted to them for that purpose by company commanders.

V. Company commanders having unserviceable property they desire inspected and condemned, with a view to having it replaced by issue of new property, will submit the same to the inspectors for that purpose.

VI. Muster rolls will be sent direct to company commanders from this office. They will be prepared in triplicate by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of enlistment of the men; these rolls must contain all the names of the present members of the company appearing on the last muster roll, following which will be entered the names of all men who have subsequently enlisted up to and including the date of inspection, after which will appear the names of those discharged, with date and reason for such discharge.

VII. Regimental, staff and non-commissioned staff officers will report for inspection and muster with companies nearest their respective stations.

VIII. As a means for the better preparation of their companies for the inspections herein ordered, the attention of all company officers is called to General Orders No. 5, from this office, series 1899. Also to the following paragraphs of Army Regulations: 3, 255, 256, 267, 278 and Article of War 128.

FIRING REGULATIONS FOR SMALL ARMS.

I. Upon the recommendation of the general inspector small arms practice, Iowa National Guard, the "Firing Regulations for the United States Army," edition 1898, as modified herein or by subsequent orders and instructions, are adopted for the instruction and government of the troops of this state.

II. The adaptation of the manual for the service magazine rifle, calibre .30, to the Springfield rifle, calibre .45 will apply to these regulations. Where magazine fire is indicated—as in the last halt of the advance in skirmish firing—an equal number of shots will be ordered and fired as rapidly as possible. Attention is also called to the fact that the remarks in

the regulations upon trajectories, changes of sights and points hit, do not apply to the Springfield rifle and Buffington sight.

III. The regular practice season will commence upon the first day of April, and end on the last day of November of each year. No record firing will be permitted except between these dates.

IV. Aiming and position drill and gallery practice will be had in the armory for the instruction of recruits and all who do not thoroughly understand the principles of rifle shooting, before they fire upon the range. Experienced shots may be excused from gallery practice, but they will find the practice of the aiming drill will increase their steadiness and lessen their fatigue upon going to the range. Regimental inspectors of small arms practice will report as to the compliance of company commanders with this paragraph.

V. Company commanders will allow their commands such preliminary practice as time and the supply of ammunition will permit, but in no case less than that designated in par. 187. Recruits will begin firing at 100 yards. Par. 189 will not be enforced.

VI. Each shot fired with state ammunition must be carefully entered upon score sheets, or in a book kept for that purpose. These scores will be preserved until the opening of the subsequent practice season. All record scores will be entered in the record book, S. A. P., furnished by the state.

VII. The state record course will consist of two scores of five shots each at each of the ranges, 200, 300 and 500 yards. The Springfield rifle, cal. .45, as issued by the state, with a trigger pull of not less than six pounds, will be used for all record firing. The target's position and the number of shots in each position will be as designated in chapter 2, part 1, of the regulations. Until the present stock of the elliptical bull's-eye targets are exhausted, they may be used or the figures may be pasted in the proper position upon the backs of these targets and the sub-divisions indicated as shown in plate VIII, page 3.

VIII. The classification under state rules will be as follows: Those having an aggregate of 120 points, sharpshooters; 96 points, marksmen; 81 points, first class; 66 points, second class; less than 66 points, third class; men not firing, fourth class.

IX. Soldiers qualifying as sharpshooters or marksmen under state rules will be encouraged to endeavor to qualify under the army rules for the recruit class. See pars. 190 to 194, page 68, chap. II, page 69, and chap. IV, page 89, of the regulations.

The aggregate required in this firing for the rifle is 560 for a sharpshooter and 448 for a marksman. Only these two grades will be classified under army rules. Soldiers who have qualified as sharpshooters or marksmen under army rules, will not be required to shoot thereafter and will be reported and credited in their respective classes so long as they remain in the service. Where the qualification was in a previous season, only the total score, and the year made, will be given on the report and on the lists. If the course laid down for the subsequent season class is followed the aggregates required are one-half of the above, or 280 for a sharpshooter and 224 for a marksman. See the following paragraph also.

X. No selection of scores will be permitted and when a soldier commences his record firing at any distance, all shots fired at that range up to

the required number will be his record. A score must always be completed or the remaining shots counted as misses. *No man will be permitted to fire for record at longer ranges who fails to make 40 per cent of the possible score at 200 yards.*

In known distance firing no soldier will be permitted any preliminary or additional firing at a particular range on the day on which his regular practice is subsequently to be held at the same range, as it is not intended that he should utilize either his preliminary or additional practice as sighting shots.

In like manner "preliminary" and "record" skirmish firing should not be done by a soldier on the same day, and after skirmish firing for record is commenced it must be completed without further practice.

Record firing once commenced or completed cannot be changed to "practice" and a new series of record scores commenced. There can be only one series of record scores each season for each man.

If a soldier fires for record under both state and United States rules, the first two record scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards are his state record scores, and these scores must be included in his record for United States classification.

XI. No certificates will be issued, but marksmen's pins and sharpshooters' crosses will be issued and worn as laid down in pars. 452 and 453. Those won under the state rules will be of bronze, army rules, of silver.

XII. Attention is called to par. 165, (which does away with all sighting shots,) to par. 200, which forbids the use of the gun sling, and to pars. 430 and 433, which provide for the marking and scoring of ricochet shots.

XIII. The regular allowance of ammunition for a company shall be 2,000 rounds of original cartridges, or their equivalent in value, each season. Companies practicing with 75 per cent of their strength shall be entitled to 1,000 rounds in addition. Upon failure to satisfactorily account for ammunition previously issued, the allowance of any organization may be reduced or withheld. Field and staff officers and members of non-commissioned staffs and bands will be made such an allowance of ammunition as they can reasonably make use of. The attention of all concerned is called to the great increase of available ammunition possible by drawing the component parts of the cartridge and reloading the empty shells. This course will more than double the allowance. All empty shells will be preserved as long as they are serviceable for reloading. Each company should keep 1,000 rounds of original ammunition constantly on hand for emergencies. An allowance of not exceeding 100 rounds per annum of revolver ammunition, cal. .38, will be made to each officer and soldier armed with that weapon.

XIV. Failure to instruct 50 per cent of the total strength of the company in firing at 200 yards, each season, will render the company liable to be mustered out of service as falling below the standard of efficiency of the Iowa National Guard.

Failure to forward reports when due without a reasonable excuse will render a company commander liable to suspension.

XV. In arriving at the general standing of each company or regiment at any inspection, its proficiency in small arms practice will be marked on a scale of 25 per cent of the possible figure of merit for the inspection.

XVI. Firing in the armory and on the local range is a military duty.

and will be required of all soldiers. Company commanders may prescribe such regulations, not inconsistent herewith, for the carrying out of the purposes of this order as they may deem necessary and the local conditions may require. All record scores must be filed in the presence of a commissioned officer. Commanding officers are held responsible for the instruction of their commands in the practical use of the rifle. The study of the firing regulations is enjoined upon all soldiers. Its contents should be as familiar as those of the drill regulations.

XVII. The following supplies are furnished by the state and will be issued on receipt of proper requisition, viz: Firing regulations for small arms, iron targets, brushes, round balls, powder and primers for gallery use; for range use, lubricated bullets, powder, primers, original ammunition, paper targets, cloth covers and iron frames for D, E and F targets, pasters, score sheets, record books, sand glasses, reloading tools and wooden wiping rods.

All requisitions for the above articles will be sent direct to the inspector of small arms practice on duty with the regiment. He will make a record of the items and forward the requisition with his recommendation thereon direct to the general inspector of small arms practice, who will forward it to this office for final action.

XVIII. An annual allowance of \$15 for the construction and maintenance of a rifle range for each company will be made upon receipt of claim. Claims will be made to show distance of the range from the armory number, condition and style of targets, range houses, etc., the ranges at which firing can be conducted, and an itemized statement of expenditures for rent, materials and labor for the year. These claims to be forwarded direct to the regimental inspector of small arms practice, who will endorse and forward, through the general inspector, to this office. Payment may be withheld if all the reports due have not been made or the range has not been used by 50 per cent of the company.

XIX. At the close of the season each company commander will make upon the blank furnished by the state, his report of the record firing done by his command, commencing with the name of the soldier making the highest aggregate score and so on in consecutive order without regard to rank. The names of the men not firing need not be entered. The "aggregate strength" must equal the number reported on September 30th of the current season, and in addition the number of men firing for record who were discharged prior to, or enlisted after, said date.

XX. Men who did no record firing but who fired for practice at 200 yards, may be included in the report the same as though they had fired for record, but at that distance only. In all other cases scores reported for record must have been so declared before they were fired.

XXI. The number of qualifications of each sharpshooter or marksman in his class will be indicated on the company reports and on all lists. The dates will be given when soldiers are entitled to a date bar.

Any deviation from the requirements, such as the failure of an officer to join in the certificate, etc., should be explained in the report.

One copy will be forwarded direct to the regimental inspector small arms practice, to reach him not later than December 10th. A report is required whether any firing was done or not.

Scores of the field, staff, non-commissioned staff and band of any organization will be reported to the inspector of small arms practice of that organization by the company commander at the station at which the scores were made. These scores will be consolidated upon a company blank by the inspectors and counted in the aggregate of the organization to which the officer or soldier belongs.

Company commanders will keep the score sheets and books so that the record claimed may be verified with the minimum trouble by the officers making the annual inspection at the company stations, and by the inspectors of small arms practice at the annual camps. The record book and score sheets will be taken to camp each year and turned over to the inspector on duty with the regiment for examination. He will return it to the company prior to breaking up of the camp.

XXII. Attention is called to the failure of the printers to furnish an index and to complete the model record as to the skirmish firing and aggregate for the year in the record books, small arms practice. The former can be improvised on the front fly leaves or a thin index could be fastened in the book.

Companies failing to receive their insignia in a reasonable time after the publication of the consolidated report of the record firing for any season should make requisition therefor through the regimental inspectors small arms practice. Delay in issuing date bars is usually occasioned by the failure of the company commanders to report the years of qualification.

The regimental inspectors will prepare a consolidated report of the regiment in triplicate. One copy, with the company reports, to be sent direct, not later than January 1st, to the general inspector of small arms practice, one copy to the regimental commander and one copy retained. Each copy will be accompanied by a list giving the names and total scores of all sharpshooters and marksmen and the number of their qualifications in this class, arranged in consecutive order commencing with the highest score.

Any errors, omissions or failures to comply with the regulations will be noted on the company reports and the necessary corrections made in red ink. Upon the return of the report from the general inspector's office, regimental inspectors will call the attention of the company commanders to the notations with a view to their correction in the future.

XXIII. The general inspector will prepare a consolidated report of all the troops in duplicate; one copy, together with copies of the lists and regimental reports, will be forwarded to these headquarters not later than February 1st for publication in orders, and one copy retained.

He will return the company reports to the regimental inspectors, after completing his report.

XXIV. All inspectors are expected to verify the reports passing through their hands and make corrections where necessary.

The average per cent of scores need not be carried beyond regiments nor to more than two places of decimals.

All reports will be accompanied by such observations and recommendations as its maker may deem proper.

As promptness is one of the chief military virtues, no officer will delay his report for an inferior. It is the duty of the commanding officer to see

that soldiers are not deprived of the decorations they have won by the failure of the proper officers to forward their reports on the date specified.

The regular channel for orders, reports and correspondence relating to small arms practice is through the department; but inspectors will furnish copies of important matters to the commanding officer of the organizations with which they are on duty.

All reports and copies required in these regulations are the property of the state, and will be turned over to their successors by the officers having them in charge.

All inspectors are expected to keep in touch with the organizations under their care and to be thoroughly familiar with the regulations of this department. By careful study and practical experience they should fit themselves to become instructors in the art of military shooting. It will be the policy of the department to require practical tests of their efficiency, in all capacities, from time to time. Those falling below a reasonable standard of efficiency will be ordered before examining boards with a view to vacating their commissions.

XXV. The assistant inspector of small arms practice will perform such duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the general inspector of small arms practice.

XXVI. All previous orders, regulations or instructions relating to small arms practice, are hereby revoked.

The following act of the General Assembly of the State of Iowa is published for the information and government of all concerned:

I. That section 2213 of the code be amended by adding thereto the following:

"That there shall also be paid to each officer and soldier for attendance at company drill at the company station, the sum of ten (10) cents per hour and not exceeding twenty (20) cents in any one week, provided, that from any money due any officer or soldier for attendance at company drills, shall be deducted the sum of ten (10) cents per hour and not exceeding twenty (20) cents in any one week for absence without leave from any such drills "

II. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of section one of this act the auditor of state is hereby authorized to draw warrants upon the state treasurer upon the certificate of the adjutant-general approved by the governor.

III. This act, being deemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect on and after its publication in the Iowa State Register and the Des Moines Leader, newspapers published in the city of Des Moines, Iowa.

To enable this office to comply with the requirements of the above act, company commanders will hereafter render to this office quarterly drill reports, suitable blanks for which will be issued in the near future. The first report will be made for the quarter ending June 30, 1900.

The following, Title XI, Code of Iowa, 1897 (amended by the Twenty-eighth General Assembly, approved April 16, 1900), containing that part of the law relating to the militia of the state and the Iowa National Guard, is published for the information and government of all concerned.

Company commanders and all officers charged with the enforcement of this code are directed to cause the same to be read to their commands and posted in a conspicuous place in the armory, where all can have access to it and familiarize themselves with its provisions.

CHAPTER 1.

SECTION 2167. **Who constitute—exemptions.**—The military force of the state shall consist of all able-bodied male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, not exempt from such service under the laws of the United States, except honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines of the United States, who shall be exempt from military service in this state at their option. The assessors shall return to the auditor with the annual assessment a complete enumeration of such persons, which may be revised and corrected by the board of supervisors at its June session in each even-numbered year, or at such other time as the governor may direct, and the auditor shall certify to the adjutant-general a true copy of such corrected list, and in each odd-numbered year he shall certify the number of names on the list. But no person having conscientious scruples against bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace.

SEC. 2168. **Iowa national guard.**—The active militia shall be designated "The Iowa National Guard," hereinafter referred to as "the guard," recruited by volunteer enlistments, and shall consist of four regiments of infantry, and, at the discretion of the commander-in-chief, of two batteries of artillery and two troops of cavalry, and the necessary staff departments, with such other officers and enlisted men as are hereinafter prescribed.

SEC. 2169. **Governor to call out.**—When a requisition shall be made by the president of the United States for troops, the governor, as commander-in-chief, shall order into service the national guard of the state, or such portion thereof as may be necessary, and, if insufficient, so many of the militia as is required, designating the same by draft if a sufficient number shall not volunteer, and shall organize the same and commission officers therefor; and while so in service the national guard and militia shall be subject to the same regulations and receive from the state the same compensation and subsistence as the army of the United States receives.

SEC. 2170. **When.**—The commander-in-chief shall have power in cases of insurrection, invasion or breaches of the peace, or imminent danger thereof, to order into the service of the state such of its military force as he may think proper, and under the command of such officers as he shall designate.

SEC. 2171. **Sheriff may call.**—In case of any breach of the peace, tumult, riot or resistance to process, or imminent danger thereof, the sheriff of any county may call for aid upon the commanding officer of any military company within his county, immediately notifying the governor of such action, and such officer shall order into service the military force, or any part thereof under his command, in aid of the civil authority.

SEC. 2172. **Command.**—The command of any force called into service under this chapter shall devolve upon the senior officer of such force, unless otherwise ordered by the commander-in-chief.

SEC. 2173. **Enlistments.**—All enlistments therein shall be for three years, and re-enlistments for one, two or three years, as the soldier may elect, and made by signing enlistment papers prescribed by the adjutant-general and taking the following oath or affirmation, which may be administered by the enlisting officer, to wit: "You do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you will bear true allegiance to, and that you will support, the constitution of the United States and that of the state of Iowa, and will, as a member of the Iowa national guard, serve the state of Iowa faithfully during your term of service, unless sooner discharged, or you cease to be a citizen thereof, and that you will obey the orders of the commander-in-chief and of such officers as may be placed over you, and the laws governing the military forces of Iowa."

SEC. 2174. **Staff of commander-in-chief.**—The staff of the commander-in-chief shall consist of an adjutant-general, quartermaster-general, inspector-general, commissary-general, a surgeon-general, a judge-advocate-general, a general inspector of small arms practice, a chief of engineers, a chief signal officer, a military secretary, and seven aides. They shall be appointed and commissioned by the commander-in-chief, and shall hold office until their successors are appointed and commissioned. The adjutant-general shall have rank of brigadier-general. In time of peace, the chiefs of departments shall have rank of colonel, the military secretary shall have rank of major, and the aides shall have rank of colonel.

SEC. 2175. **Adjutant-General.**—The adjutant-general shall issue and transmit all orders of the commander-in-chief, and shall keep a record of appointments, of all officers commissioned by the governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and his duties. He shall reside at the capital and hold his office at the pleasure of the governor; except in times of war or public danger, he shall perform the duties of quartermaster-general. He shall have charge of the state arsenal and grounds, and receive and issue all ordnance stores and camp equipments on the order of the commander-in-chief. The adjutant-general shall furnish at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as shall be approved by the commander-in-chief. He shall in each odd-numbered year make out a detailed report for the preceding two years of the transactions of his office, the expenses

thereof, and such other matters as shall be required by the governor, who may at any time require a similar report.

SEC. 2176. **Quartermaster-General.**—When a requisition shall be made by the president of the United States for troops upon the state, the adjutant-general shall also act as quartermaster-general, and as full compensation as adjutant-general and acting quartermaster-general shall receive a salary from the state the compensation of grade of colonel of the army during the time said troops are in the service.

SEC. 2177. **Regiments—officers of.**—A regiment shall consist of not less than eight nor more than twelve companies. A colonel and lieutenant-colonel of the regiment and a major for each battalion shall be elected by the officers and enlisted men of the regiment, and each officer shall hold office for five years, or until his resignation shall have been accepted or he is dismissed by sentence of court-martial.

SEC. 2178. **Regimental staff—band.**—The regimental staff shall be appointed and commissioned by the governor on recommendation of the regimental commander, and shall consist of an adjutant, with rank of captain; a chaplain, with rank of captain; a quartermaster, with rank of captain; a commissary of subsistence, with rank of first lieutenant; and an adjutant, with rank of first lieutenant for each battalion. The commander of each regiment shall appoint by warrant, countersigned by the adjutant, the non-commissioned staff, consisting of a regimental sergeant-major, and a sergeant-major for each battalion, a quartermaster-sergeant, a commissary-sergeant, a color sergeant, an ordnance-sergeant, and a chief trumpeter. The commissions of regimental staff officers shall expire when the officer nominating them, or his successor, shall make new nominations for their respective offices, and such nominations shall be confirmed by the commander-in-chief. Each regimental commander may cause to be enlisted and organized a band composed of a chief musician, two principal musicians, a drum major, and not more than twenty privates, under the leadership of such chief musician. The members of such bands shall be subject to the same regulations as other enlisted men. The regimental commander, on the recommendation of the captain, shall appoint the non-commissioned officers of each company, by warrant countersigned by the adjutant.

SEC. 2179. **Company—officers of.**—A company of infantry shall consist of a captain, a first lieutenant, a second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster-sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two cooks, two musicians, and not less than forty nor more than sixty-four privates and non-commissioned officers. A troop of cavalry or a battery of light artillery shall have the same officers and non-commissioned officers, one farrier, one blacksmith and one saddler. In time of war or public danger the commander-in-chief may increase the enlisted strength of such companies as he may deem necessary. The company officers shall be elected by the officers and enlisted men of the company, and shall hold office for five years unless their resignation shall have been accepted, or they are dismissed by sentence of court-martial.

SEC. 2180. **Election of officers.**—All elections of company officers shall be ordered by the regimental commander. All elections of field officers shall be ordered by the commander-in-chief. Such orders shall be sent to the commanding officer of the company in which said election is ordered,

who shall issue his order for such election, giving at least six days' notice thereof, by posting in three public places accessible to the members of his command, and, where practicable, the same shall be published in one or more newspapers in the county where said company is located. All voting shall be in person and by ballot, and a majority of all votes cast shall elect. The senior officer present at such election shall preside. The returns of elections attested by the presiding officer shall be made within five days from the date thereof to the commanding officer of the regiment, who shall promptly forward the same through military channels to the adjutant-general, who, upon approval of the commander-in-chief, shall issue commissions accordingly. At the organization of a new company, the election shall be conducted under such regulations as the adjutant-general shall prescribe.

SEC. 2181. **Medical and staff departments.**—The medical department, in addition to the surgeon-general, shall consist of a deputy surgeon, with rank of lieutenant-colonel; one surgeon, with rank of major, and an assistant surgeon for each regiment, and an additional assistant surgeon for each twelve-company regiment. Assistant surgeons for the first five years of commission shall have rank of first lieutenant; after which they shall have rank of captain. The enlisted men of the medical department shall consist of a hospital steward for each regiment and one acting hospital steward for each regiment, and one acting hospital steward for each assistant surgeon, and such number of privates as the commander-in-chief may prescribe. The other staff departments, in addition to the heads of the departments and personal aides and regimental staff, shall be as follows: An assistant inspector-general, with rank of major; an assistant inspector of small arms practice, with rank of major; and an inspector of small arms practice, with rank of captain; an engineer officer, with rank of first lieutenant; a signal officer, with rank of first lieutenant, for each regiment; and such non-commissioned officers and enlisted men, as the commander-in-chief may prescribe, for engineer and signal departments. The commander-in-chief shall detail the officers and enlisted men of the staff department for duty with regiments upon recommendation of their respective chiefs. All staff officers, except heads of departments, aides to the commander-in-chief, and regimental staff, shall be appointed and commissioned by the commander-in-chief for five years on the recommendation of the chiefs of their respective departments, selected by examination under such rules as the chiefs may prescribe.

SEC. 2182. **Rules.**—Every company and regimental band may make rules for its own government, not in conflict with this chapter and general orders or regulations, subject to the approval of the regimental commander.

SEC. 2183. **Term of service—resignation—discharge.**—Every officer of the guard shall be held to duty for the full term of his commission, unless his resignation shall have been sooner accepted, or he shall have been dismissed by sentence of court-martial. Every enlisted man of the guard shall be held to duty for the full term of his enlistment from the time he becomes an active member thereof, unless regularly discharged for good and sufficient cause by the regimental commander, approved by the commander-in-chief. All members thereof, serving the full term for which they are commissioned or enlisted in the guard, shall, on application, be entitled to an

honorable discharge exempting them from military duty except in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 2184. **Parades—encampments.**—The guard may parade for encampment or drill not less than three nor more than ten days annually, by company, battalion, regiment or brigade as ordered by commander-in-chief.

SEC. 2185. **Transportation.**—The quartermaster-general shall provide transportation to and from the encampments and points of active service.

SEC. 2186. **Discipline.**—The organization, equipment, discipline and military regulations of the guard shall conform to the regulations for the government of the army of the United States, except as otherwise provided. The commander-in-chief may at any time change the organization of regiments, battalions, or companies so as to conform as nearly as practicable to the organization of the United States army, or that prescribed by the authorized military authority of the United States, or by authority of congress.

SEC. 2187. **Field duty.**—The commanding officer of any force of the guard in active service, or at any encampment, may require those under his command to perform any field or camp duty.

SEC. 2188. **Penalties.**—Any person who shall trespass on the encampment grounds or the camp grounds of the guards in active service or interrupt, molest or interfere with any member of the guard in the discharge of his duties, or sell any malt, spirituous or other intoxicating liquors within one mile of such encampment or camp, except under permit already issued by lawful authority, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and the commanding officer of such force may order the arrest of such person and cause him to be delivered to a peace officer or magistrate as soon as practicable.

SEC. 2189. **Special duty—drill.**—The commander-in-chief may, whenever the exigencies of the public service require it, detail any officer or soldier for special duty, and the expenses and proper compensation therefor may be paid under such provisions as the commander-in-chief may prescribe. The regimental commander may order semi-monthly or weekly day or evening drill by the companies of his command, but the members shall receive no compensation therefor.

SEC. 2190. **Arms, equipments and ammunition.**—Upon the organization of any company or regiment of the guard, on the requisition of its commanding officer and the approval of the governor, the adjutant-general shall issue necessary arms, equipment and ammunition, and the commanding officer shall deliver to the adjutant-general a bond therefor, payable to the state, in sufficient amount, with sureties to be approved by the governor, conditioned for their proper use, and, upon request of the proper officer, for their return in good order, wear, use, unavoidable loss and damage excepted. All arms and other property issued by the state shall be kept at the company or regimental armory.

SEC. 2191. **Inspection—school of instruction.**—Such inspections and schools of instruction for officers and enlisted men of the guard shall be held as the commander-in-chief may from time to time direct.

SEC. 2192. **Embezzlement of state property.**—Any officer or soldier of the guard knowingly making any false certificate or muster or false return of state property in his hands, or wilfully neglecting or refusing to apply all money drawn from the state treasury for the purpose named in the requisition therefor, shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary.

not exceeding five years, or by fine in the amount of money not so applied, or both such fine and imprisonment, and all costs of prosecution.

SEC. 2193. **Uniforms.**—The guard shall adopt the uniform of the army of the United States, subject to such modifications as shall be prescribed by the commander-in-chief. The field, staff and company officers thereof shall provide themselves with the uniform prescribed within ninety days from the date of commission.

SEC. 2194. **Penalty for failure to return arms, etc.**—Every member of the guard who shall wilfully neglect to return to the armory of the company, or place in charge of the commanding officer of the company to which he belongs, any arms, uniform or equipment, or portion thereof, belonging to the state within six days after being notified by said commanding officer to do so, shall be fined not more than fifty dollars or imprisoned not more than thirty days.

SEC. 2195. **Fines for absence or misconduct—suit for.**—Every soldier absent from any tour of active service, parade, drill or encampment, without leave or sufficient excuse, shall be fined two dollars for each day of absence; and, for any unsoldierly conduct during any such service, he may be fined not more than ten dollars. Such fines shall be collected by civil action in the name of the state for the use of the company to which the soldier fined belongs; but in no case shall the state pay the costs of such action. Any company or band may impose such fines upon its members as it may think proper in its by-laws, which may be enforced in the manner above provided.

SEC. 2196. **General courts-martial.**—Any member of the guard charged with a military offense, as defined in this chapter or in the articles of war and general regulations governing the army of the United States, or any regulations promulgated by the commander-in-chief under authority of this chapter, may be tried by a general court-martial ordered and appointed by the commander-in-chief. The organization of the court and the forms of procedure shall, as far as practicable, be those prescribed in said articles of war and regulations. The punishment fixed in the sentence shall not be other than dismissal or dishonorable discharge from the service, reduction to the ranks if a non-commissioned officer, suspension from duty and forfeiture of compensation, or confinement for a period named in the sentence, or reprimand, according to the gravity of the offense. Witnesses duly served with subpoena, signed by the judge-advocate, shall appear and testify as if duly served with subpoenas to appear and testify in the district court, and shall receive the same fees and mileage therefor, to be taxed as costs, which, with other necessary expenses of the judge-advocate and the court, shall be taxed and certified by the president of the court-martial, and paid by the state treasurer upon the auditor's warrant issued therefor to the judge-advocate, who shall pay the expenses of the trial.

SEC. 2197. **Inferior courts-martial.**—Inferior courts-martial are hereby authorized, and the constitution, composition, jurisdiction and proceedings thereof shall be assimilated to courts of the same nature in the army of the United States, but no stoppage of pay or confinement shall exceed that provided for in similar courts by the United States army regulations.

SEC. 2198. **Sentence.**—The proceedings of all general courts-martial shall be submitted to the commander-in-chief, who shall approve or disap-

prove the same, or he may mitigate or remit any punishment imposed by the sentence of said court. The proceedings of inferior courts-martial shall be approved or disapproved by the commanding officer, who may in like manner mitigate or remit the punishment fixed in the sentence. In all cases the record of the proceedings of the court-martial, with the order of the commander-in-chief or commanding officer accompanied therewith, shall be preserved as a permanent record in the office of the adjutant-general.

SEC. 2199. **Military board.**—An examining board of three or more competent officers, appointed by the commander-in-chief, shall convene at such times and places as he shall direct, whose duty it shall be to examine into the capacity, qualifications, propriety of conduct and efficiency of commissioned officers who shall be ordered before it, and, upon the report of said board, if adverse to such officer and approved by the commander-in-chief, the commission of such officer shall be vacated. No officer shall be eligible to sit on such board whose rank or promotion would in any way be affected by the proceedings, and two members at least shall be of equal or superior rank to the officer examined. If any officer shall refuse to report himself before said board when directed, the commander-in-chief may, upon the report of such refusal by such board, vacate his commission.

SEC. 2200. **Military organizations.**—It shall be unlawful for any body of men, other than the regularly organized volunteer militia of this state and the troops of the United States, to associate themselves together as a military company or organization within the limits of this state without the written permission of the governor, which he may at any time revoke; but this provision shall not prevent civic, social or benevolent organizations from wearing uniforms and swords.

SEC. 2201. **Payment for uniforms.**—Uniforms in kind may be issued by the state under such provisions as the commander-in-chief may direct, or, in lieu thereof, there may be annually paid to each officer and soldier of the guard the sum of four dollars, to be paid under like provisions, but in no event will the state be liable for the payment of any money in lieu of uniforms, or for any purpose contemplated in this chapter, unless such payment can be made without exceeding the annual appropriation provided by this chapter.

SEC. 2202. **To belong to state.**—All uniforms and other military property furnished by the state, or for which an allowance has been made, shall belong to the state, and shall be used for military purposes only, and each officer and soldier, upon receiving a discharge, or otherwise leaving the military service of the state, or upon demand of his commanding officer, shall forthwith surrender such state military property in his possession to said commanding officer.

SEC. 2203. **Allowance for headquarters.**—There shall be allowed annually for postage, stationery and office incidentals, to each regimental headquarters the sum of twenty-five dollars, and to each company headquarters the sum of ten dollars.

SEC. 2204. **Allowance for company and band.**—There shall be allowed annually to each company and band for armory rent, fuel, lights and like necessary expenses, the sum of two hundred dollars.

SEC. 2205. **Regulations.**—The commander-in-chief is authorized to make and publish regulations for the government and discipline of the guard, not in conflict with existing laws.

SEC. 2206. **Companies may be disbanded.**—The commander-in-chief shall disband any company of the guard when it shall fall below a proper standard of efficiency, and he may order special inspections with a view of determining such efficiency.

SEC. 2207. **Words construed.**—In this chapter the word "soldier" shall include musicians and all persons in the guard or in the militia when called into service, except commissioned officers, and the word "company" shall include battery of artillery and troop of cavalry.

SEC. 2208. **Loan of arms to schools and colleges.**—Subject to such regulations as the governor may direct, the adjutant-general may loan the surplus arms and accouterments of the state to military schools and colleges in good standing within the state which include military drill in their course of instructions; but when any arms or accouterments are delivered to such an institution, the proper officers thereof shall deliver to the adjutant-general a bond to the state in such amount and with such sureties as the governor approves, conditioned for the proper use of such arms and accouterments and the return of the same in good order, wear and use excepted, upon the request of the adjutant-general.

SEC. 2209. **Exemptions and privileges.**—Every officer and soldier of the guard shall be exempt from jury duty and poll tax during his term of service, and, except in cases of treason, felony or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during his attendance at drill, parades, encampments, active service, election of officers, and in going to and in returning from the same. The uniform, arms and equipments of every member of the guard shall be exempt from attachment, execution or sale for debt or taxes.

SEC. 2210. **Penalty for injuring or disposing of arms, etc.**—Every person who shall wilfully or wantonly injure or destroy any article of uniform, arms, equipment or other military property of the state, and refuse to make good such injury or loss, or who shall sell, dispose of, secrete or remove the same with intent to sell or dispose of it, or shall unlawfully break or enter any armory or place where any such arms or equipments are stored, with the intent to remove the same therefrom, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding two months, or by both fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 2211. **Compensation of adjutant-general and assistants.**—The adjutant-general shall receive an annual salary of two thousand dollars in times of peace, and there shall be appointed a record clerk in the adjutant-general's office, who shall have charge of the war records under direction of the adjutant-general, who shall receive a salary of twelve hundred dollars per annum, and such assistance shall be employed in the adjutant-general's and quartermaster-general's department as shall, in the opinion of the commander-in-chief be actually necessary, and any person so employed shall receive for the time actually and necessarily on duty such compensation as the commander-in-chief may prescribe.

SEC. 2212. **Compensation of officers and men.**—The military force, when in the active service of the state in time of insurrection or invasion or

Immediate danger thereof, shall be paid the following compensation for every day actually on duty: Each field and staff officer, four dollars; every other commissioned officer, two dollars and fifty cents; every non-commissioned officer, two dollars; every other enlisted man, one dollar and fifty cents; and necessary transportation, subsistence and quarters; the same to be paid out of any money especially appropriated for that purpose. When in actual service of the state in case of riot, tumult or breach of the peace or imminent danger thereof, pursuant to the order of the governor, they shall receive the same compensation, transportation, subsistence and quarters, to be paid out of the state treasury, and for such services rendered upon the call of the sheriff, they shall receive the same compensation, transportation, subsistence and quarters, to be paid from the treasury of such county; claims being audited and allowed in the former cases by the executive council, and in the latter by the board of supervisors, at its next session.

SEC. 2213. **Compensation during encampments and drills.**—For the time spent in each annual encampment or drill, compensation to be paid under such provision as the commander-in-chief directs, and graded according to length of continuous service therein, shall be allowed as follows: To each officer and soldier of less than three years' continuous service, one dollar per day; to each officer and soldier of more than three years', and less than five years', continuous service, one dollar and fifty cents per day; to each officer and soldier of more than five years' continuous service, two dollars per day. That there shall also be paid to each officer and soldier for attendance at company drill at the company station, the sum of ten (10) cents per hour and not exceeding twenty (20) cents in any one week, provided, that from any money due any officer or soldier for attendance at company drills, shall be deducted the sum of ten (10) cents per hour and not exceeding twenty (20) cents in any one week for absence without leave from any such drills.

SEC. 2214. **Appropriation.**—There is appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of fifty thousand two hundred dollars per annum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the support of the guard under the provisions of this chapter not applying to active service, which shall be drawn by a warrant, drawn by the auditor of state on the state treasurer, upon the certificates of the adjutant-general approved by the governor, showing for what purpose each draft is to be or has been used, and no indebtedness shall be created in excess of such annual appropriation.

Pool Targets for bull's-eye shooting with the rifle and revolver at all ranges will be open during the first three days at such times as the officer in charge may designate. Tickets for this firing will be sold by the Statistical Officer at 10 cents each or 12 for \$1 00. Each day's receipts will be divided pro rata among those making bull's-eyes on that day.

The Regimental Team Match will be shot on the fourth day by teams of six from each regiment. Each competitor will fire ten shots at each of the ranges, 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards and make two skirmish runs of twenty shots each.

The teams will be selected from the men present by the Inspectors of Small Arms Practice on duty with each Regiment. They will also act as Team Captains.

IV. The rifle used for the matches will be the Springfield, Cal. .45 as issued by the State, with a trigger pull of not less than six pounds.

For the revolver match any military revolver with plain open sights, using full service charges and not less than three pound trigger pull.

For the bull's-eye shooting any military rifle having plain open sights, but without alteration, may be used.

The State will furnish ammunition for the .45 Cal. Springfield Rifle and the .38 Cal. Colt Army Revolver only.

V. Each company commander will detail two men, preferably one officer and one non-commissioned officer, for this duty.

In making these details attention should be given not only to excellence in shooting, but to steadiness and good soldierly habits and conduct.

The ranking officer or soldier of each detail will be in command and will be held strictly responsible for its conduct and discipline enroute to and from the range and during the meeting. He will report in person to the Commander of the Camp upon arrival and prior to leaving at the conclusion of the tour. He will furnish the Camp Adjutant with a roster of his detail immediately after reporting. He will not delay the journey unnecessarily.

No allowance will be made for meals or transfer of baggage enroute

Details will appear in fatigue uniform with leggins, blankets, woven belts, rifles, and officers with revolvers. Overcoats or mackintoshes should be carried.

VI. The company details will report for duty to the Camp Commander at the State Range not later than 6:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, June 12th. The Camp Staff and Inspectors will report at such time as they may be directed by the Officer in Charge.

VII. Company details will be allowed per diem for four days. Transportation, ammunition, quarters, subsistence, cots, camp chairs and water buckets will be furnished. Other toilet articles must be furnished by the men. Company commanders will at once notify this office of any choice of routes for transportation.

They rank as privates, but will be carried on the roll below lance corporal and ahead of musicians.

II. UNIFORM.—Officers of the staff departments as provided for in section 2181 military code, will wear the uniform prescribed for officers of general staff.

The insignia for officers' undress coat will be as follows:

For officers of general staff and staff departments, the word IOWA in letters of gothic condensed design, three-fourths of an inch in height, to be followed by a period, embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar one inch from its edge and midway of its height, and their distinctive insignia, without wreath, one inch high, embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar about one inch from the word Iowa.

For all infantry officers crossed rifles one and one-half inches long and one inch high with regimental number in upper angle and the abbreviation (Ia) of the word Iowa in the lower angle embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar, about one and one-half inches from its edge and midway of its height. Regimental staff officers, in addition, will wear the distinctive insignia of their department fastened to the collar about one-half of an inch from the regimental device.

For cavalry officers, crossed sabres with regimental number and state designation the same as infantry.

III. Company commanders are authorized to make requisition for uniforms to complete number to forty-four for enlisted men.

IV. All officers of the staff departments will upon notice of assignment report without delay by letter to the commanding officer of the regiment to which they are assigned for duty.

I. The following proclamation has been received from the Governor:

To the people of Iowa:

Again we are called upon to mourn the loss of one of the men who have filled and honored the first office in the commonwealth.

John Henry Gear, a Senator of the United States and a former Governor of Iowa, departed this life at 4 o'clock and thirty minutes of the morning of Saturday, July 14, 1900, at the seat of the national government.

The departed statesman has filled a large place in the history of Iowa for several decades. After a successful business career, he was chosen a representative in the general assembly, in which body he soon became a leader. Being twice re-elected, his was the unique honor of being a second time chosen speaker of the house of representatives. Thence he passed to the executive chair.

The memory of his administration of the state's affairs remains with the people as that of a watchful and energetic executive. More recently, he rendered distinguished services in both houses of congress, at last passing from earth while yet, although somewhat advanced in years, in the plenitude of usefulness.

A resident of Iowa, to use his own language at the close of his retiring message to the general assembly, "before its name began to designate a political division of the earth," he was one of those who, as he said of the first of his predecessors in announcing the death of the latter, "laid well the foundation in this prairie wilderness of a mighty state, destined to be the home of millions of people." Thus identified with its interests, he witnessed all its growth, and did his full share, both as a private citizen and in a public capacity, towards the advancement of the commonwealth. An honorable business man, an energetic and fearless executive, a prudent and sagacious legislator, active, industrious, and alert in the interests of his constituents to the last, he enters upon rest full of years and honors, and in the enjoyment of the well-earned confidence of the people.

As a tribute of respect to this illustrious Iowan, I direct that the flags on all the public buildings of the state be placed at half staff until after the day of the funeral, that the executive offices be closed on that day, and that appropriate military honors be rendered by the Iowa National Guard to the memory of its former commander-in-chief.

I. On and after January 1, 1901, no officer of the National Guard (Governor's staff excepted) will be commissioned by the Commander-in-chief, till he shall have duly qualified for the office to which he may have been elected or appointed, before a board of not less than three nor more than five officers of the National Guard; said board to be appointed by the commander-in-chief, under section 2199 of the Code, and within thirty days of the said election or appointment. If the report of said board is adverse to said officer, and approved by the commander-in-chief, no commission will be issued and the election or appointment becomes annulled.

II. The following rules are prescribed for examination of officers to determine their fitness for promotion and are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

The examining board shall be composed as follows:

OFFICERS OF THE LINE. The board will consist of not less than four members, the junior of whom will act as recorder. One member will be a medical officer and two will be senior in rank to, and as far as practicable from the same arm of the service as the officers to be examined.

OFFICERS OF THE ENGINEER, SIGNAL AND SMALL ARMS DEPARTMENTS. The board will consist of not less than four members, one of whom will be a medical officer, and two of the same department, when practicable, as the

officer to be examined, and senior to him in rank, the junior of whom will act as recorder.

MEDICAL OFFICERS. The board will consist of three medical officers, senior in rank to the officer to be examined, the junior of whom will act as recorder.

On organizing the boards, the recorder will swear the several members, including the medical officers, faithfully and impartially to examine and report upon the officers about to be examined, and the president of the board will then swear the recorder to the faithful performance of his duty. Proceedings will be made separately in each case.

Previously to the swearing of the board, members thereof may be challenged, for cause stated to the board, the relevancy and validity of which shall be determined by the full board, according to the procedure of courts-martial in like cases. The record will show that the right to challenge was accorded. If the number of members is reduced by challenge or otherwise to less than three, the board will adjourn and report the facts to the Adjutant-General, through the president of the board for the action of the commander-in-chief. Medical officers will not take part in the professional examination except in the cases of surgeons and assistant surgeons. They will make the necessary physical examination of all officers and report their opinion in writing to the board. All questions relating to the physical condition of an officer shall be determined by the full board.

If anything should arise during the examination requiring the introduction of evidence, the inquiry shall proceed upon written interrogatories as far as possible, the board determining to whom questions shall be forwarded. When, in the opinion of the board, it becomes essential to take oral testimony, the facts should be reported to the Adjutant-General for the necessary orders in regard to witnesses to be summoned from a distance. Witnesses examined orally will be sworn by recorder.

All public proceedings will be in the presence of the officer under examination; the conclusions reached and the recommendations entered in each case will be regarded as confidential.

Before proceeding with the physical examination, the officer about to be examined will be required to submit, for the information of the board, a certificate as to his physical condition. In event of no cause for disqualification existing, the certificate will take the following form:

"I certify, to the best of my knowledge and belief, I am not affected with any form of disease or disability which will interfere with the performance of the duties of the grade for promotion to which I am undergoing examination."

The physical examination will be thorough and will include the ordinary analysis of the urine.

Defects of vision, resulting from errors of refraction, that are not excessive, and that may be entirely corrected by glasses, do not disqualify, unless they are due to, or are accompanied by, organic disease.

When the board finds an officer physically incapacitated for service, it shall conclude the examination by finding and reporting the cause which, in its judgment has produced his disability, and whether such disability was contracted in the line of duty.

Whenever the board finds an officer disqualified for promotion from any cause, the record will contain a full statement of the case.

When the board finds an officer qualified for promotion it will be stated in the following form:

"The board is of the opinion that.....has the physical, moral and professional qualifications to perform efficiently all the duties of the grade to which he has been elected (or appointed), and recommends his promotion thereto."

The record in each case where an officer is found physically disqualified shall be authenticated by all the members, including the medical officers, and the recorder. In all other cases the medical officers will not be required to sign the proceedings. If any member dissents from the opinion of the board, it will be so stated.

During oral and practical examinations all the members, excepting the medical officers will be present.

Written examinations may be conducted in the presence of one member of the board, or the recorder, for which purpose the board may be divided into committees, before whom the examination shall be conducted from day to day until completed; after which the board will reassemble to consider its finding.

Papers should be given out so that everything in the hands of the officer being examined may be answered before a recess or adjournment. A statement showing that such was the procedure during the written examinations will be embodied in the record. Questions prepared by the board will, for convenience of the reviewing authority, indicate where answers may be found.

Boards are authorized to ask any questions, selected from the publications recommended herein for study, deemed necessary during the progress of the oral, written, or practical examinations. Where blackboards or other illustrations will facilitate the oral and practical examinations, their use is authorized. Examinations will be conducted in a sufficiently exhaustive manner to determine not only that the subject is thoroughly comprehended, but the degree of proficiency of the officer being examined, and until the board is positively satisfied as to his ability to impart instruction in the various subjects. In case of unpropitious weather, practical exercises may be postponed from day to day, but never omitted or materially curtailed.

Whenever the oral examination of any line officer is unsatisfactory in any subject the board will at once proceed with a written examination in that subject, and in case the officer is not found proficient, the questions and answers will be attached to the proceedings.

Commanding officers at or in the vicinity of which boards may be appointed to meet, will, without further instructions, furnish, upon request of the board, such available troops and material as may be required by boards in the execution of this order. When it is not practical to obtain the requisite troops and material for the complete practical examination as prescribed, oral and written examinations will be substituted by the board for the portion omitted.

At the conclusion of his examination, each officer shall sign and submit a certificate in his own handwriting to the effect that he has not received assistance from any unauthorized source, or communicated or transcribed any of the questions or problems submitted for his use during the examination.

In written examinations a numerical value will be given to each question. In the oral and practical examinations a numerical value will be given to each subject. When both oral and practical examinations are required in the same subject the board will allot the value to be credited to each part.

It is assumed that an average of twenty questions will be asked in each subject, but the board is not limited to that number.

It is desirable that the questions be selected indiscriminately in each case, to the end that each officer undergoing examination may have a different arrangement of questions, even when simultaneous examinations of a similar character are being conducted.

III. It is expected that examining boards will apportion the subjects to members in such a manner as to insure thoroughness in conducting examinations. It should be borne in mind that the object of the examina-

tions is to determine the actual professional fitness of officers for promotion. Mere cramming is not a desirable feature in the examination of mature and generally well educated men. Boards should so conduct examinations that the qualifications for promotion will be developed by the officer's ability to make practical application of all he has learned, rather than the committal to memory of equations and data which he would under ordinary conditions obtain from books of reference. Correct understanding of theory is indispensable, but should in all cases be coupled with the ability to make practical application of the knowledge. The use an officer has made of his opportunities in the past will be taken into consideration.

To this end, whenever an officer is ordered for examination for promotion, the commanding officer under whom he is serving and the commanding officer of his regiment shall, without further instructions, furnish to the examining board, in writing, any facts relating to any disqualification through the failure of an officer to make proper use of his opportunities for perfecting himself in his professional duties, or otherwise. Troop and company commanders will report any facts relating to lieutenants which, in their opinion, should be brought to the knowledge of examining boards. Such reports will be thoroughly inquired into by examining boards and given due weight in determining upon the fitness of officers for promotion. In the absence of any detrimental reports from commanding officers, or from the records of the Adjutant-General's office, all officers will be presumed to be of good character, and no testimonials or letters to that effect will be required, submitted to, or attached to the proceedings of examining boards.

The proceedings of examining boards will be forwarded to the Adjutant-General for the final action of the Commander-in chief.

The report of school of instruction in small arms firing at State Rifle Range near Cedar Rapids, June 11 to 14, 1900, is published for the information of the Iowa National Guard.

To the Adjutant-General, Des Moines, Iowa:

SIR—I have the honor to report that in the compliance with G. O. No. 10, A. G. O. c. s., I assumed command of the State Rifle Range on June 10, 1900.

I found the camp erected, the mess running and the work on the range well under way. Everything required was completed and in readiness for the firing Tuesday morning, June 12th.

All of Tuesday, and Wednesday and Thursday mornings were devoted to firing at rectangular targets. Skirmish firing was had on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons. The officers' Revolver Match was shot in less than two hours Thursday morning. Friday was devoted to the Regimental Team Match.

Men were allowed to pool their shots fired in the Individual Matches during all of the first three days. Considerable interest was manifested in this firing and I think it will become more popular as soldiers realize that a poor or medium shot is liable to have as many bull's eyes in a certain number of shots as a fine shot making a much better score.

Fine scores were made at the first three ranges on the rectangular targets, but the individual aggregates were low, Corporal Harless of Troop A, being the only man with an aggregate of 80 per cent, which should be reached by good shots in competition. No really good skirmish scores were made and the majority was very low.

The Revolver Match was very interesting and indicated the need of this practice by the Iowa officers. Some good scores were made but the aggregates were low, none equaling 80 per cent of the possible.

The Team Match was a very pretty competition and was anybody's match until the last shot was fired. The detailed scores will be found attached hereto.

Judging from the reports of the officers and the rifles brought to the range, it is evident that the arms now in the hands of the Iowa Guard were in very poor condition when received from the arsenals, and do not begin to compare in usefulness with those taken into the United States service in the spring of 1898. This being the case all efforts on the part of company commanders to have each man use the rifle assigned to him for drill upon the range should be abandoned. A careful test of all the company rifles should be made and the six which are in the best condition

should be used for all firing. In some cases it will be necessary to combine parts of different rifles in order to have even so few in serviceable condition.

The new firing regulations were observed and seemed to be practical and popular. The figure targets were used for the first time in the state and gave satisfaction. In their use great care must be taken to have the marker's shelter high enough so that shots can not go over it and below the target, thus scoring a miss that should be a 4 or 5. On the other hand the shelter should not be so high as to mask any considerable part of the figure. More attention will be given this point on the State Range another year.

The physical condition of the Range is as good as could be expected on leased land. In my judgment six more targets could be mounted and used successfully in the present pit, thus nearly doubling the capacity of the present range. The state should buy this or other property and have a Range which could be gradually brought into perfect condition. I understand that the law increasing the national appropriation for the Militia requires that it shall be armed with the same rifle as the regular forces. As this will mean the present magazine gun, commonly called the "Krag," or some other high power rifle, the difficulty of procuring local ranges will increase. This will necessitate the state providing ranges where considerable bodies of troops may become familiar with the use of their weapons with safety to the surrounding inhabitants. But local ranges should be maintained wherever possible, even at increased expense to the state, and this should be one of the considerations when placing new companies.

The Remington Arms Company very generously and without solicitation presented a beautiful Remington-Lee .30 Caliber rifle with bayonet and ammunition for test at the range and requested that it be given as a prize under such conditions as I might prescribe. After a consultation it was decided to make this the first and an additional prize in the Individual Match with the rifle. It was won by Corporal Harless of Troop A, who in firing with it for the first time at 600 yards made a score of 42 out of a possible 50. It is the first of the high power rifles which I have tested which shoots as it is sighted, and gave general satisfaction to those who tried it at the firing points.

Representatives of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company and the Laffin & Rand Powder Company were present during the meeting and generously furnished opportunities to test their respective arms and ammunition, both of which were equal to the high reputation of the makers. I found a general interest among the details in the subject of new rifles and smokeless powder.

Owing, doubtless, to the number of new men, the camp was not so quiet and there was more going "up town" than usual at the schools heretofore, but the discipline and behavior were good and no complaints of bad conduct reached me from any source.

Every company and troop was represented by details. Many visitors were present and participated in the firing. There was much enthusiasm and many vowed to do better next year. Taking into consideration that this was the first meeting since 1897, the number of new officers and men,

the poor condition of the rifles, and the loss of many old and tried shots from the service, I think that the competition was a success and will do much to reawaken interest not only in rifle firing but in the work of the Guard generally.

Copies of all orders issued, a list of prize winners and the detailed scores of the Regimental Teams are attached hereto. The first show the routine of duty and the Camp Staff, which was very efficient and like yourself, did all in their power to make the meeting a success.

Inspections will be most thorough, with a view of determining the proficiency of officers and non-commissioned officers, the facilities for and manner of caring for state property, and to what degree each organization is prepared for active and immediate service. The inspectors will particularly investigate and report upon the following subjects:

First.—Strength of company; number present; number absent with leave; number absent without leave; number residing within one mile of the armory; number residing a greater distance; probable number that could be assembled, fully equipped for active service, within twelve hours from the receipt of order by the company commander; ceremony of inspection, condition of arms and equipments; condition and quality of uniforms and blankets; number of uniforms serviceable; condition and manner of keeping books and papers, including the first sergeant's roll book; condition and manner of keeping the mess outfit; condition and adaptability of armory method of numbering, individually, each separate article of clothing and equipment, and the condition of said marks on same; appearance, bearing, discipline and instruction of the company.

Second.—Each company will be exercised in and marked upon the following: formation of company, school of the soldier, bayonet exercise, setting up exercises, manual of arms, firings, movements by company, movement by platoons and ceremony of guard mounting; drill regulations must be strictly complied with.

Third.—The zeal and efficiency of company officers; whether they possess the requisite professional knowledge for the proper performance of their duties; whether they observe the system of instruction and treatment of subordinates enjoined by the regulations.

Fourth.—The instruction, regularity of attendance and proper perform-

ance of duty of all non-commissioned officers; whether they have been regularly appointed and have received their proper warrant from the regimental commander; whether they habitually occupy their proper places in the formation of the company and discharge the duties of their positions as prescribed in the regulations; their knowledge of their duties as guides and file closers.

Non-commissioned officers not showing proper knowledge of, or attention to, their duties will be recommended to their regimental commanders for reduction to ranks.

Fifth.—Company musicians will be examined as to their knowledge of the service calls.

Sixth.—The condition, place and manner of keeping the state property with reference to its security against fire, theft, damage or use for private purposes; also whether or not it is habitually kept in armory as required by law. They will verify exhibit of public property with last property return and make detailed report of all shortages.

III. Company commanders are directed to have all state property, for which they are accountable, exhibited at their armories at the time of the inspection, and see that it is arranged in such manner that it may be readily inspected and verified.

IV. The inspectors will also perform the duties of a board of survey on such property as may be submitted to them for that purpose by company commanders.

V. Company commanders having unserviceable property they desire inspected and condemned, with a view to having it replaced by issue of new property, will submit the same to the inspectors for that purpose.

VI. Muster rolls will be sent direct to company commanders from this office. They will be prepared in duplicate only, and carry only the names of the members of the company at date of inspection. Men discharged since last muster are not entered on this roll.

VII. Field and staff, members of non-commissioned staff, and officers and enlisted men of staff departments will report uniformed and equipped for inspection and muster with companies at their respective stations.

Adjutant General, Des Moines, Iowa:

SIR—I have the honor to submit my report for the year 1900, enclosing herewith the report of the assistant inspector.

I was unable to spend any time at the State Rifle Range at Cedar Rapids this year, being in the midst of my inspection of the Fiftieth Regiment at the time of the meeting.

The time has come to arm the Guard with a modern rifle. Those issued since the Spanish War are in very poor condition.

Nothing is more discouraging to a soldier than to have no confidence in his arm.

There is nothing equal in importance to target practice, for a soldier who is not a good shot is of little use.

Congress is now agitating the subject of issuing the "Krag" to the Guard. When this is done I think it would be a good idea to insist on each and every company having a home range, with much practice on the same, and that any company without a range and a good target record be promptly disbanded; and that hereafter in organizing new companies a target range be made one of the first requisites.

At my inspection of the companies this year, at the home stations, I found seventeen without ranges.

In arriving at this rating the following were considered:

Police of company grounds, dressing of tents, folding of blankets, care of mess furniture, mess boxes, kitchens, garbage pits, sinks and tents, promptness at formation, guard mounting, guard duty, general conduct, military courtesy, discipline, drill, military appearance, care of rations, arms, equipments and uniform.

As the camp attendance is entered in the rating at the inspection at the home stations, it is not given here.

As all four of our colonels are experienced soldiers and conducted their camps in accordance with regulations and orders, I have omitted most of the praise due, for want of space, and confined myself to criticism.

The encampment of the Fifty-second Regiment, Col. W. B. Humphrey commanding, was at Perry July 25th to August 1st.

This regiment is weak on guard duty. The wearing, by officers, of volunteer khaki uniforms detracted from the military appearance of camp, as did also the ununiform use of tent flies, and the placing of the colors in a rack in front of the regimental headquarters, in violation of A. R. 219. Two companies used mattresses, which marred the appearance of the camp. All should be supplied with bed-sacks, and a regimental order be issued prescribing some uniform way of arranging and dressing tents.

The regiment deserves special praise for the thorough police of the camp. The grounds were kept scrupulously clean.

The quartermaster's department was noticeably well handled, and for this great credit is due Capt. H. J. Martin.

The camp of the Fifty-first Regiment, Col. J. R. Lincoln commanding, was at Red Oak August 1st to 8th.

It is not in the interests of discipline to camp the band and the non-commissioned staff on the headquarter's line.

The flying of the flag from a box kite instead of a pole was more novel than military. It is not pleasant to see "Old Glory" trailing on the ground and children romping with it.

All the rears in this camp were too far away, which is a bad thing for the health of the command.

The policing of company grounds was quite generally neglected and there was want of care of arms and equipments.

The camp of the Forty-ninth Regiment, Col. W. G. Dows commanding, was at Cedar Rapids, August 8th to 15th.

Both the parade and camp grounds were too small, and the sinks were too far from the company streets.

The sanitary condition of this camp was most excellent, due to the personal supervision of the colonel commanding, to whom great credit is due.

A large number of men were allowed to return to their homes before the close of camp—a practice that should be entirely stopped. Except for the most urgent necessity all should remain in camp the full time.

The military bearing, appearance and courtesy were excellent. Decidedly the best of the four regiments.

The doubling of the guard details for guard-mounting only, which was kept up daily for instruction, is a most excellent idea, and I would like to see it adopted in the other regiments.

There were some volunteer's khaki uniforms worn by the officers off duty that injured the military appearance of the camp.

The camp of the Fiftieth Regiment, Col. H. H. Caughlan commanding, was at Ottumwa, August 15th to 22d.

The weeds on both the camp and drill grounds were a great nuisance, and I hope hereafter, before a camp ground is located, it will be arranged to have the grass and weeds cut just before camp.

It is very un military and subversive of discipline to have the non-commissioned staff in the headquarters' mess, and if a regimental commander does not appreciate this, it will be in the interest of discipline to have this custom corrected by a general order from the Adjutant General's office.

There was a lack of water in this camp that should be guarded against in the future.

The quartermaster's department was very poorly managed, which caused annoyance and hardships to all.

A regimental quartermaster should be selected with a view to his special fitness for the position, and there is no part in the service that is so hard to fill with credit and good will to all. Every one in the regiment is more or less dependent upon the usefulness and efficiency of this officer.

A regimental commander should not hesitate to change his quartermaster if, after fair trial, he is not found suitable, and the officer so relieved should feel it no disgrace, for a good quartermaster is "born and not made," and it is only after trial the proper man can be found.

There was an unusual and disgraceful amount of indulgence in intoxicating liquor and destruction of private property in this camp. Both are certainly on the increase in this regiment. Prompt, strict measures should be taken to correct it. The people of Iowa do not care to have their money used for a drunken debauch, and it is not good policy to let the Guard hear this through the legislature, as they certainly will if such conduct is continued. All members of the Guard are indirectly injured by such conduct. I think it would be in the interests of good order and discipline to let this regiment understand that if there is not a decided improvement in the next camp the regiment will be deprived the privilege of going to camp, or be disbanded.

I think it a good plan, as was done in some of the camps, to detail non-commissioned staff officers for clerks in the regimental adjutant's office. It is a practical education for them that will result in great good to the regiment.

The inspector of small arms practice has but little to do in camp and might be detailed to assist the lieutenant-colonel to instruct the regiment in

the details of guard-mounting. Sentinels should be repeatedly visited by these officers and the officers of the guard day and night. The sentinels should be instructed thoroughly and then repeatedly questioned to see that they understand their instructions.

The state should supply mess tents and tables of a uniform pattern for each company and band. The makeshifts now used mar the military appearance of the camp.

I think that any company that fails to show, in camp, reasonable proficiency in company drill, military courtesy and guard duty should be liable for a special inspection with a view to muster out. Seventy-five per cent. of the aggregate strength of a company is the least attendance that can justify the expenditure of the money used in camp instruction. Any company that has less than this average attendance in camp should be disbanded, unless it can be shown, on thorough investigation, that special and proper reasons prevented it.

The military appearance of our camps is marred by the ununiform methods of arranging the tents. This can only be corrected by a general order from the adjutant-general's office. No mattresses should be allowed in camp, but all required to use the bedracks. A simple tent rack should be issued for the rifles, and men required to keep their rifles in them and not strew them about the camp as they did in the Fifty-first this year. Every detail for the arrangement of the tent should be laid down in the order.

The "set up" of the whole Guard is poor. There should never be a drill at the home station without ten minutes of some kind of gymnastic drill to get the shoulders back and the heads up, and the men should be encouraged to practice such exercises at their homes and when not in ranks. The "set up" of a soldier, more than anything else, is what marks the regular from the militiaman. Daily in camp this drill should be practiced for ten minutes immediately after reveille roll call. A week of this work will undoubtedly improve the carriage of the men, and it will do the officers no harm to take part in the same.

In this connection I wish to call the attention of the Adjutant General to the lax manner in which some of our examining surgeons are performing their duty. At least twenty five per cent. of the Guard are below the standard physically and would be rejected if re-examined for enlistment in the Regular or Volunteer Army. The state has paid the surgeons this year, over \$690.00 and is entitled to a better return for the money expended.

Many of the men have complained to me that it is impossible for them to leave their business the last and first of the month. Would it not be well to remember this in arranging date of camps. I personally have never been able to see any reason why our camps should be held in July and August, the hottest months of the year and the very time when many, who can get away, would like to take a trip out of the state to the mountains. June or September, either, or both, seem to me more suitable months for our encampments.

The Y. M. C. A. had a reading and writing tent, with newspapers, stationery and ice water, in each camp. Such club rooms are a great comfort to the men, but I would prefer to see them supplied by the state, with the

Chaplain in charge. It is not a good idea to have, in camp, any institution that is not completely under the control of the commanding officer.

INSPECTIONS AT HOME STATIONS.

The inspections at the home stations, this year, show the companies in a very unsettled condition, and in order that they make any showing at all I had to make the standard very liberal. Next year the standard will be higher and the markings will be lower, for better work. But as all will be treated alike this will work no injustice in the grading.

Soon after the reorganization many officers and enlisted men found they could not, with justice to themselves, and the Guard, remain in. Either their business interfered, or they had lost all interest. Some thirty-four officers have resigned, twenty-two of these company commanders, and over 1,100 enlisted men have been discharged. All of which interferes seriously with discipline and instruction. I think we can, from now on, look for a more settled condition and better results.

The property is in better condition, and the records better kept, than before the Spanish war.

Company commanders should urge their officers and non-commissioned officers to purchase Boardman's Guard Manual, and have recitations in the same, as hereafter, at the home inspections, they will be examined pretty thoroughly on this subject.

To enhance the value of inspections it is suggested that regimental commanders call the attention of the company commanders to our recommendations, and require them to report, after sixty days, what steps they have taken to correct defects, etc. Otherwise we will probably find the same defects at our next annual inspection and time, trouble and expense is wasted.

Owing to a peculiar combination of circumstances, I have been unable during the year to make a complete and satisfactory inspection of Troop A. It is my understanding they have done very little mounted work.

The drill reports in your office do not show whether the work has been mounted or dismounted. I recommend that this be required hereafter, and that mounted work be insisted upon, and if it be found the majority of the members neither own mounts nor have means or facilities to hire, that the troop be disbanded. There are a number of towns anxious to organize a cavalry troop, furnishing their own horses.

With the increased appropriation of the general government, we can now afford to keep up two troops of cavalry and two batteries of artillery, and I recommend these organization be at once mustered in.

For various reasons, but especially on account of lack of interest of either officers or men, or both, it has been necessary to muster out this year the following companies:

- M, Fifty-second, Cherokee.
- F, Fiftieth, Ft. Madison.
- G, Fifty-first, Creston.
- H, Fifty-first, Des Moines.
- A, Fiftieth, Keokuk.

The most successful commanders, company, battalion and regimental, are those who explain the movements before attempting to execute them, and who, after the execution, explain and correct errors. In fact, this is the only way to gain any benefit from drill. To be able to do this an officer must daily read and study his drill regulations. It is surprising what a few minutes a day regularly devoted to this will accomplish.

The members of the Guard, officers and enlisted men, are weak on the details of a sentinel's duties. More attention should be given this subject at the home stations.

Now that we have arranged in General Order 17, current series, for examination before commissions will be issued, I think the time has arrived for a change in the Code making the term of office during good behavior, with an old age limit. Then company officers, especially, will not be good officers three years only, and "good fellows" the balance of their time, hoping to be re-elected.

In arriving at the general standing of each company and regiment, its proficiency in small arms practice is marked on a scale of 25 per cent, and the scores attained at the home inspections are reduced to a possible 75.

This gives the general standing as follows. Possible 100.

I respectfully offer the following recommendations:

First.—That a compendium of all orders and decisions now in force be issued at once. Our company commanders are badly handicapped for lack of the information such an order would contain. There being no files of back orders for issue, and those that were in the hands of the companies before the Spanish War having been destroyed, it is not to be wondered at that so many officers are ignorant of the requirements of this office as regards the details of their duties.

Second.—That hereafter when arrangements for camp grounds are made it will include the cutting of grass and weeds just before camp, to avoid such trouble as we had this year at Ottumwa.

Third.—That the adjutant-general in person take command of all camps. This will allow regimental commanders to devote their entire time to the instruction and drill of their commands, and relieve them from the administrative duties now requiring so much of their time.

Fourth.—That all members of the Guard be instructed that if they go to camp they must remain the whole week unless in very exceptional cases, sickness and death. Too much laxness in this matter injures the discipline of camp.

Fifth.—That bedsacks be issued to all companies for use in camp, and that the use of cots and mattresses by enlisted men be forbidden.

Sixth.—That bathing facilities be provided in camp. This can be done at slight expense when the water is piped to the camp from the city water-works, as it generally is, or can be. I do not need to elaborate on the comfort and health of such facilities for camp where men spend hours drilling during the heat of the day on dusty drill grounds.

Seventh.—That garbage barrels be used hereafter in camps. These were used in two camps this summer, and were a great improvement over the old way of using a pit. The state should supply plenty of crude carbolic acid for disinfectant in camp, and this must be provided beforehand, as it is generally impossible to procure it in sufficient quantity at the town near the camp.

Eighth.—That companies that have no range or suitable drill hall be mustered out. Towns that take so little interest in their companies should be deprived of them.

The uniform courtesy I have received from the members of the Guard during the year is very grateful to me and fully appreciated.

The duty required of an inspector of making unfavorable criticisms, at times, is not a pleasant one. It has been my aim to record conditions impartially, and in such manner as to produce the best results. The comments have been made with no desire to find fault, but, on the contrary, in the nature of instruction. In such a sense I am sure they have been accepted by all those imbued with the true military spirit, and who, therefore, have at heart the real interests of the National Guard of the state.

I respectfully call your attention to the report of the assistant inspector, herewith enclosed, especially to his recommendations, which I fully endorse in every particular.

I desire to express my appreciation of the thorough work of the assistant inspector, Maj. A. L. Rule, and the great assistance he has been to me. I much regret that he is unable to continue his work in the department.

I also desire to express my obligations to clerk H. V. Rule for his most excellent work in camp.

The detailing of a clerk, in camp, for the inspector's department is in the interests of efficiency and discipline, as it relieves the inspectors of much routine, clerical work, and gives them time for other work of more importance to the Guard.

I wish to thank you for the courtesy and assistance I have received from you on all occasions, enabling me to perform all my duties with pleasure.

Claim for allowance for maintenance of range will be enclosed with report of firing at close of target season and will be forwarded to Adjutant-General for payment when the report of firing has been examined and found correct.

To the Adjutant-General, Des Moines, Iowa:

SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith the consolidated report of the Small Arms Practice of the Iowa National Guard for the season of 1900.

When the results attained are compared with those reached prior to the Spanish-American War they are rather disappointing. But when we remember that this is the first record firing in three years; that on account of the war and the subsequent reorganization of the Guard, the enlisted men now in the service are largely recruits without previous military training; and count up the large number of experienced shots who have left the service; we have no cause to complain.

If more of the company commanders would take hold of the range work with the knowledge and zeal shown by the few Captains who appreciate the duties of their positions there would be no trouble in surpassing all past records.

Nine hundred and fifty one men, or 37 per cent. of the force, fired at 200 yards, a falling off of 23 per cent. from the last year of record firing, 1897, with which all comparisons are made.

Not quite 15 per cent. or 377 men completed the State course, a loss of 507.

Captain Johnson, Co. M, Forty-ninth, was the only man qualifying under the United States Rules, there are only seven United States sharpshooters and five United States marksmen reported as being in the service. I think that there must be a number of qualified men who have failed to report.

Under State Rules there are sixty-nine sharpshooters and 106 marksmen as compared with 243 sharpshooters and 343 marksmen in 1897.

There is no great difference in the proficiency of the regiments. As in 1897 the Fifty-second Regiment, then the Fourth, leads, having 298 men 44 per cent. firing, 131 completing the State course and a proficiency of 22.6. The Forty-ninth Regiment is second with 188 men firing, 122 completing the course, and a proficiency of 20.9. The Fifty-first Regiment had 208 men firing, 58 completing the course, and a proficiency of 17.9. The Fiftieth Regiment is last with a proficiency of 15.5, although it had the second largest number on the ranges, 257 and 66 men completed the course.

The five companies having the highest proficiency are Co. M, Fifty-first, Captain Logan, 84.5; Co. A, Forty-ninth, Captain Thrift, 82.6; Co. K, Fifty-second, Captain Armstrong, 62.3; Co. C, Forty-ninth, Captain Hahn, 55.4, and Co. K, Forty-ninth, Captain Shaw, 53.6.

Every man of Co. A, Forty-ninth, Captain Thrift, fired on the range, and Co. F, Fifty-first, Captain Wetherell, and Co. B, Fiftieth, Captain Dalzell, had only one man each who did not fire.

No report could be obtained from the following companies, although every effort was made by the Regimental Inspectors, viz: Cos. E, H and I, Forty-ninth regiment, Co. A, Fiftieth Regiment, Cos. G and H, Fifty-first Regiment, which two were mustered out December 3rd, 1900, and Cos. C, E and I, Fifty-second Regiment. Means should be adopted to compel officers to furnish the required reports or leave the service. A number of reports were received much later than seems necessary. The reports generally were in poor condition and many of them show that General Orders are either not read or are deliberately disobeyed.

The proficiency of an organization, as shown in this report, was found by dividing the sum of the aggregate scores of its members by its total strength. Where qualifications under United States Rules are reported, one-fourth of the aggregate United States scores was added to the sum of the State scores before dividing. This method gives credit to the organization for every point made by each man and is thus a constant incentive to complete the firing and to make every shot a good one.

I would respectfully recommend that in the future the claims for the annual range allowance accompany the company reports at the close of the season; that they be considered and paid at that time only and that failure to file reports or claims on time, without an acceptable excuse, forfeit the allowance. This will make Par. XVIII. of G. O. 6 A. G. O. 1900 effective.

The officers of the department have been zealous in the discharge of their duties and have aided me in every way possible. I desire to thank them all.

SUBORDINATION TO CIVIL AUTHORITY.

1. The military shall be in strict subordination to the civil power.
2. Respect for the civil authorities is the duty of all citizens, and especially those in the military service.

MILITARY DISCIPLINE.

3. All persons in the military service are required to obey strictly and to execute promptly the lawful orders of their superiors.
4. Military authority will be exercised with firmness, kindness and justice. Punishments must conform to law and follow offenses as promptly as circumstances will permit.
5. Superiors are forbidden to injure those under their authority by tyrannical or capricious conduct, or by abusive language.
6. Courtesy among military men is indispensable to discipline.
7. Deliberations or discussions among military men, conveying praise or censure or any mark of approbation towards others in the military service, and all publications relating to private or personal transactions between officers are prohibited.
8. The following are the grades of rank of officers and non-commissioned officers in Iowa National Guard:

An officer commissioned to lower rank than that previously held by him and having formerly held the same rank as that given in new commission will take rank from date of first commission in the same grade, provided his service has been continuous in this, or higher grade.

1. Governor, commander-in-chief.
2. Brigadier-General.
3. Colonel.
4. Lieutenant-Colonel.
5. Major.
6. Captain.
7. First Lieutenant.
8. Second Lieutenant.

9. Sergeant-Major (regimental).
 10. Quartermaster Sergeant (regimental.)
 11. Commissary Sergeant (regimental.)
 12. Ordnance Sergeant, post quartermaster sergeant, hospital steward, first class sergeant of the signal department, chief musician, chief trumpeter, and principal musician
 13. Battalion Sergeant-Major.
 14. First Sergeant and Drum Major.
 15. Quartermaster Sergeant (company.)
 16. Sergeant and acting Hospital Steward.
 17. Corporal.
- In each grade, date of commission, appointment, or warrant determines the order of precedence.

COMMAND.

9. Command is exercised by virtue of office and the special assignment of officers holding military rank who are eligible by law to exercise command. Without orders from competent authority, an officer can not put himself on duty by virtue of his commission alone, except as contemplated in the 24th and 112th articles of war.

10. The functions assigned to any officer in these regulations by title of office devolve upon the officer acting in his place, except when otherwise specified. An officer in temporary command shall not, except in urgent cases, alter or annul the standing orders of the permanent commander without authority from the next higher commander.

11. An officer who succeeds to any command or duty, stands in regards to his duties in the same situation as his predecessor. The officer relieved will turn over to his successor all orders in force at the time, and all the public property and funds pertaining to his command or duty, and will receive therefor duplicate receipts showing the condition of each article.

ELECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS.

12. All officers of the Iowa National Guard are elected or appointed as provided in sections 2174, 2177, 2178, 2179 and 2180 military code.

Elections for field officers are ordered by commander-in-chief for company officers by regimental commander.

Voters must sign tally sheet when they cast their ballots.

No enlistments shall be made after election order is received until after election is held.

EXAMINATION OF OFFICERS.

13. No officer of the National Guard (Governor's staff excepted) will be commissioned by the commander-in-chief, till he shall have duly qualified for the office to which he may have been elected or appointed, before a board of not less than three nor more than five officers of the National Guard; said board to be appointed by the commander-in-chief, under section 2199 of the code, and within thirty days of the said election or appointment. If the report of said board is adverse to said officer, and approved by the commander-in-chief, no commission will be issued and the election or appointment becomes annulled. The examination of officers will be conducted under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the commander-

in-chief. If an officer does not appear for examination when ordered he shall be deemed to have failed.

14. Non commissioned staff officers are appointed by regimental commander. Company non-commissioned officers are appointed and reduced to ranks by regimental commander upon recommendation of company commander.

15. Company commanders will at once report to the Adjutant General any change in their non commissioned officers.

SERGEANTS, FIRST, AND COMPANY QUARTERMASTER.

16. The Captain will select the first sergeant from the sergeants of his company, and may return him to the grade of sergeant without reference to higher authority. A separate warrant as first sergeant will not be given. (A. R. 258 and 259.)

17. Company quartermaster sergeants are selected by the company commander, in the same way as first sergeants, from the sergeants of the company.

A separate warrant as quartermaster sergeant will not be given.

LANCE CORPORALS.

18. To test the capacity of privates for the duties of non-commissioned officers, company commanders may appoint lance corporals, who will be obeyed and respected as corporals. No company shall have more than one lance corporal at a time, and they are on the same footing regarding reduction as corporals. (See Army Regulations 261.) A lance corporal will wear the uniform of a private with a chevron having one bar. (A. R. 257, and G. O. 42, A. G. O. 1897.)

COOKS.

19. The two cooks authorized by section 2179 of the Code will be enlisted the same as other soldiers are enlisted, and after joining their companies will be appointed as cooks by the company commander, and will be subject to reduction by the company commander for incompetency or misconduct. They rank as privates, but will be carried on the roll below lance corporals and ahead of musicians.

CORRESPONDENCE.

20. The allowance for postage and stationery as provided in section 2203, Code, is paid semi-annually, March 31st and September 30th. Officers receiving this allowance are expected to provide suitable stationery for official correspondence.

21. An official letter should refer to one subject only. Letters of transmittal will be used only when necessary, and when used must refer only to the matter transmitted; none are required with rolls, returns, or periodical reports. (A. R. 752.)

22. A sheet of letter paper ($8\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ inches) will be used for a communication requiring but a single page. When more pages are required for the body of a manuscript communication, additional sheets will be used, so that the last or outer page may be left entirely blank. (A. R. 753.)

23. Letter paper will be folded in three and foolscap in four equal folds parallel with the writing. The inner or left edge of the sheet is the top

when folded; the left fold of the outer page is the first fold. The first fold will be used exclusively for a brief analysis of the contents of the communication, the office marks, and note of enclosures. (A. R. 754.)

24. All officers and non-commissioned officers must file for reference all official letters.

LETTER HEADINGS.

25. Printed letter headings for regiments, companies and troops will contain only the designation of the regiment, company, or troop, post office address, and blank date. Names of officers or other persons will not be printed on letter headings for use in any branch of the military service. (A. R. 512 as amended by G. O. 8, A. G. O. 1898.)

SIGNATURES, OFFICIAL.

26. Official communications will be signed or authenticated with the pen. Signatures will be plainly and legibly written, with the rank and regiment or corps of the writer annexed. The attention of all concerned is especially called to the following correct official signatures:

27. Officials who forward communications will always endorse thereon their approval or disapproval, with remarks.

28. Orders.—Regimental orders are designated general (or special) orders, according to character.

29. General and special orders are numbered in separate series, each beginning with the calendar year or at establishment of headquarters.

Copies of all orders issued by regimental commanders will be forwarded at their dates or as soon as practicable to the adjutant general.

30. Orders issued by commander of battalions, companies, or detachments are denominated "orders" and are numbered in a single series.

31. Circulars are numbered in a separate series.

32. Orders for any body of troops will be addressed to its commander. They will be executed by commander present and will be published and copies distributed as required by regulations.

33. Five copies of general orders are sent to company commanders; one copy for the company file, one copy each for the three company officers, and one copy to be posted on the company bulletin board, after having been read to the company by the company commander.

34. All officers and non commissioned officers receiving orders must preserve them for future reference and to be turned over to their successors.

OFFICIAL ETIQUETTE.

37. The rules of official etiquette are not simply arbitrary regulations established without reason, but are founded on the experience of years among the most self-respecting and honorable men. When officers and men are thrown together, at times under trying conditions when orders are quickly given and prompt obedience demanded, personal irritation is apt to occur, and if the laws of courtesy be allowed to be laid aside, serious misunderstandings may arise. To avoid this, civility in personal intercourse and in official correspondence is rendered obligatory by the customs of the service and the regulations.

38. The manner in which military courtesy is observed is the touchstone applied to officers and enlisted men, and decides at once whether they be disciplined soldiers or simply unformed and uninformed amateurs; the attention of all concerned is therefore called to the following on this subject:

39. Officers salute each other and enlisted men salute officers on all military occasions, and in armories at all times, even if neither be in uniform, the junior officer or the enlisted man saluting first.

40. When under arms, armed with the sword the salute is present sword; armed with the rifle, rifle salute is executed; when not under arms or armed with sword not drawn, the salutes is rendered with the hand.

41. In saluting with the hand, the left is used when the officer passes by the right of the saluter; in all other cases, or if mounted, the salute is given with the right hand. Officers salute with the left hand only when the right hand is engaged.

42. Before saluting at a halt the position of attention is to be assumed; when meeting or passing an officer, the position of a soldier on the march; in either case the coat should be buttoned and, if smoking, the cigar or pipe should be removed from the mouth.

43. When addressing or being addressed by a superior commissioned officer, the officer or enlisted man halts, if not already at a halt, faces and salutes the superior officer. At the close of the interview or of the report, before parting, a salute is again rendered.

44. The first motion of a salute is made six yards before passing an officer, and the hand is not dropped until the salute is acknowledged or the officer is passed.

45. The rifle salute is prescribed for individual soldiers with arms, except sentinels, who salute by presenting arms.

46. When officers remain in or about the same place, salutes are not repeated, but a respectful conduct is maintained until they leave.

47. Prisoners on parole or under guard are not privileged to salute.

48. In the trenches and on outpost duty troops render no honors but personal salutes between officers and enlisted men are not omitted, unless they cause exposure to danger.

49. On fatigue duty the officers and non commissioned officers in charge salute; the men do not cease work to salute unless spoken to or they are by themselves, some distance from their party, and without implements in their hands.

50. Officers of foreign services; of the army, navy, marine, and volunteers, of the United States; officers of the national guard of other states and of the militia, will be saluted in the manner prescribed for saluting officers of the national guard of this state.

51. The president of the United States; governors of states and territories; the vice-president, members of the president's cabinet, the chief justice and the speaker of the house of representatives, of the United States; the lieutenant-governor and the speaker of the house of representatives of this state, are saluted as general officers of the national guard.

52. Officers inside of a house or tent, although visible from the outside, are not saluted.

53. Any mark of attention shown by an enlisted man to an officer must be acknowledged by the latter.

54. At a reception outdoors, it is proper to uncover if the person receiving be uncovered. At an official reception or social occasion indoors officers uncover, though in full uniform.

55. Officers in full dress at dances, receptions, dinners, etc., should wear their swords; while actually dancing or sitting at table, the sword may be laid aside.

56. Enlisted men address officers by the grade the latter hold; officers addressing other officers do the same, except when addressing a lieutenant, to address whom as "Mister" custom has sanctioned. Abbreviations of titles, as for instance "Cap" for captain, "Maj" for major, etc., are highly unmilitary and an indication of the worst bad manners.

57. When several officers are in company the right should be accorded to the senior in walking or riding; when entering or leaving a house or camp and it be necessary, the junior should secure admission or passage for the party; in entering a room the senior precedes, in departing the junior of the party leads when the senior has indicated his desire to leave; juniors take seats when the senior is seated, and rise with him.

58. Officers, subordinate in rank to the commanding officer, visiting a military camp, should, soon after their arrival, call upon the commanding officer to pay their respects, making their official visit brief. When ranking the commanding officer, they should call or notify him of their presence, when he will return their call, or make the first call. If the ranking visitor should be a general officer, the commanding officer will call, accompanied by all the officers of the post, in uniform.

59. When a civic functionary entitled to a salute arrives, and does not call on the commanding officer, the latter, as soon as informed of the former's presence, should call on him.

60. For the purpose of paying honors the halls and drill rooms in an armory, and a porch, or veranda, are considered as outdoors.

61. A mounted officer or enlisted man before addressing a superior officer not mounted, dismounts.

62. At formation of the company (I. D. R. 187) the first sergeant brings his piece to the right shoulder before facing about to salute and report the result to the captain. At parade, at commands by the adjutant: 1, first sergeants; 2, front and center, etc., first sergeants bring the pieces to the right shoulder at the command, first sergeants, and retain it there until they return to their posts. At guard mounting on marching details to the parade ground, first sergeants keep the piece on the right shoulder on halting the details, and until they take post behind their supernumeraries.

63. At guard mounting, non-commissioned officers of the guard bring the piece to the right shoulder at the command, non-commissioned officers, by the adjutant, for bringing them to the front and center, and retain the piece on the shoulder until they take posts.

64. At guard mounting, the old guard awaits the approach of the new guard at the order, and presents arms from the order; the arms of the new guard are brought from the right shoulder to port arms, when its head is opposite the left of the old guard, and to right shoulder arms as soon as its rear has passed the right of the old guard, arms being brought to the order

upon halting, in accordance with the general rule. The old guard is brought to order arms after the new guard has passed. The new guard having been dressed, arms are presented by both guards from the order, and returned to the order from the present.

65. The detachments of the old guard having come in and formed on its left, the old guard is moved forward with the guide to the right, arms at the right shoulder, and brought to port arms, after the command, fours right, and to right shoulder arms, after having passed the new guard, the latter standing at present arms while the old guard is passing.

66. At reviews, each company is brought to port arms, by command of its captain, "at the point indicated" (I. D. R. 667) and the right shoulder arms is resumed successively by companies when about fifty paces beyond the reviewing officer.

67. A non-commissioned officer in command of a company retains his post on the right of the right guide when the battalion is in line; he has the post of the captain when the battalion is in column.

68. At parade, before bringing the company to parade rest, he brings his piece to the right shoulder, steps two paces to the front and faces to the left; having given his command, he faces to the left, steps to his place in rank, comes to the order, faces about and comes to parade rest. At inspection, when ranks are open, his post is on the right of the right guide.

69. In exercises in the manual, non-commissioned officers commanding companies or platoons, and non-commissioned officers acting as non-commissioned staff officers of a battalion and armed with the rifle, execute only the order and parade rest; in rendering honors, the present and order; while marching, the right shoulder and port.

70. When passing in review, a non-commissioned officer commanding a company or platoon executes the rifle salute; when commanding a company or detachment separate from a battalion, or other command, on passing the colors or any person entitled to compliment, he salutes in the same manner, first bringing his command to port arms.

71. An officer in command of an armed detachment, saluted by passing officers, enlisted men, or sentinels, acknowledges it simply by a personal salute.

72. Armed troops passing a guard (or sentinel), a general officer, or a body of armed troops, will be brought to port arms and the commanding officers (and if the troops consist of more than one battalion the battalion commanders) will salute the guard, general officer, or each other, but all officers will salute the colors as they pass them; if, however, one body of the troops be at a halt, it will be formed into line and brought to present arms. If the troops carry no colors, or are on a regular march, only the commanding officers thereof salute each other, bringing their commands first to attention if at rest or, as they should be on a march, if at route step. On drill and during formation no salutes are rendered.

73. In camp, or at an inspection in camp, the tents and company streets are the company quarters, and when an officer enters the quarters the non-commissioned officer in charge, or the first man who perceives him, salutes, giving first the command "attention," which is executed and maintained by all until the officer leaves the quarters; the attention is, in this case, the salute.

74. The regulations require that every officer and enlisted man, not in ranks, when passing the national colors, carried by troops or placed on the stacks of arms on the color-line, or when they pass him, should salute them. The salute is rendered as already described if armed with rifle or drawn sabre; by uncovering if not thus armed.

75. The reviewing officer, his staff and others accompanying him salute the color by uncovering, whether the color salutes or not; the reviewing officer alone returns the salutes of commanders of battalions and all higher units.

76. The band, after passing the reviewing officer, turns out of the column and takes post in front of the reviewing officer, continues to play until the regiment has passed, then ceases playing and follows in rear of the regiment.

77. When the rank of the reviewing officer entitles him to the honor the color salutes at the command present arms, given or repeated by the Major of the battalion with which it is posted; and again, in passing in review, when six yards from the reviewing officer. The color is raised when it has passed six yards beyond the reviewing officer.

78. The color salutes in the ceremony escort of the color and when saluting an officer entitled to the honor, as prescribed in A. R. 389 and 390, but in no other case.

79. At a review whenever the Colonel faces the line to give commands, the Majors face at the same time; they resume their front after seeing the movement executed. At the command present arms, the Colonel's staff salute at the command of the Colonel. The Colonel and Majors salute after resuming their front. When the colonel faces the line to give commands, the staff and orderlies do not change position.

80. In line, when the color salutes, the march or flourishes are sounded by all the field music; in passing in review, by the field music with the band that is halted in front of the reviewing officer, the band continuing to play.

SPECIAL RULES FOR INDOORS.

81. For the purpose of paying honors, the meeting rooms of an organization are considered as indoors.

82. Coming indoors, the salute consists in uncovering, unless the officer or soldier entering should be under arms, or on armed duty, in which case he salutes as if outdoors.

83. In quarters, or anywhere indoors, soldiers are supposed to be uncovered, as they would be in their civilian homes.

84. When an officer enters the quarters or place indoors where there are enlisted men, the one who notices him first gives the command, attention, upon which all come to attention, and the senior non-commissioned officer joins the officer; the position of attention is held until the officer, who acknowledges the same by the hand salute, has left. If there should be anyone covered, he uncovers at the command, attention, unless he be under arms and on armed duty, in which case he comes to attention only. Should the officer remain in the place, he uncovers, unless under arms. In the case of an officer so remaining, the men resume their employments, and come again to attention at the command of the non-commissioned officer attending the officer, when the latter is about to leave, and the officer then covers, if uncovered, and returns the salute. When seated at meals, the

men do not rise, but interrupt the meal and preserve silence, until their mark of attention is returned by the officer.

LEAVES OF ABSENCE.

85. No officer shall absent himself from his command for a period of more than ten days, without obtaining a leave of absence, which can only be granted by the commander-in-chief.

86. When the troops are on active duty, an officer shall not absent himself from his command for any period, without obtaining leave. Under these circumstances leaves, not exceeding three days, may be granted by the highest commander on duty with the troops.

87. An application for leave of absence, or for an extension of the same, shall be made through proper channels, addressed to the Adjutant General; and shall state the period for which the leave or extension is desired, and whether the applicant desires to leave the limits of this state or of the United States. Intermediate commanders will endorse their approval or disapproval on the application before transmitting the same.

88. In no case will leave of absence be granted so that a company be left without a commissioned officer; nor shall a leave of absence be granted to an officer during a season of active operations (including annual camps of instruction) except on urgent necessity. Where compliance with this regulation is impossible, it shall be the duty of the officer to tender an immediate resignation.

89. Leave of absence commences on the day the officer is relieved from duty, and the expiration of the leave must find him at his post.

90. Leaves of absence will be granted in the form of special orders, and no officer will consider himself on leave until he shall have received a copy of the order granting the same.

91. An application for leave of absence or extension thereof, on account of sickness, must be accompanied by a certificate, in prescribed form, from a medical officer; if possible, from one attached to the command of the applicant.

92. Officers visiting other states or foreign countries, whether on duty or leave, will avail themselves of all proper opportunities to obtain military information, especially such as pertains to their own branch of the service. They will report the result of their observations to the Adjutant General, on their return to duty, or sooner if practicable.

93. An officer returning to duty from a leave of absence must report immediately in writing through superior commanders, to the officer by whom his leave was granted, and forthwith make himself acquainted with all orders issued during his absence.

94. When a company commander leaves his station, if for a day only, he should notify the company officer next in rank that he will command the company in his absence, and leave with him (or where he can readily get at them) all records and returns, and also arrange to have his official mail go to this temporary company commander.

RESIGNATIONS.

95. A resignation tendered by an officer will be forwarded through his commanding officer or chief of department, who will endorse his approval

or disapproval and forward through military channels to the Adjutant General. Until duly accepted the officer will not be considered out of service.

9. Upon receipt of the resignation of a company commander or other accountable officer, an order will issue accepting resignation to take effect ten days after date of order and officer will be directed to transfer property and funds on or before the date fixed. The acceptance of resignation or discharge from service does not relieve from responsibility for property or funds and officer and bondsmen will be held liable until full accounting is made.

RETIRED OFFICERS.

97. All commissioned officers of the Iowa National Guard who shall have held continuous rank in the state military service for a period of ten years, or who shall have served fifteen years therein, since the year 1861, or who shall have performed highly meritorious service for a shorter period, may, upon their honorable retirement from service, be carried upon a roll established and maintained in the Adjutant General's office. "The roll of Retired Officers," and shall be entitled to wear, on state occasions, the uniform of the highest rank which they may have held.

ENLISTMENTS.

98. All men desiring to enlist, in the Iowa National Guard, will be examined by a surgeon, and will not be accepted unless they are able bodied, free from physical defect, disease or malformation, and physically able to perform military duty.

99. This physical examination will be certified to on the back of each enlistment paper, by the surgeon making the same.

100. Applicants for enlistment in the Iowa National Guard must be between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five years, of good character and habits, able bodied, free from disease; and must be able to speak, read and write the English language.

101. All minors must have the written consent of father, only surviving parent, or legally appointed guardian, before physical examination is made.

102. Enlistments must be confined to persons who are citizens of the United States, or have made legal declaration of their intention to become citizens thereof.

103. Applicants are required to satisfy the recruiting officer regarding age and character, and should be prepared to furnish the necessary evidence.

104. For infantry and artillery the height must be not less than five feet four inches, and weight not less than one hundred and twenty-eight (128) pounds, and not more than one-hundred ninety (190) pounds.

105. For cavalry the height must be not less than five feet four inches, and not more than five feet ten inches, and weight not to exceed one hundred and sixty-five (165) pounds.

106. It is not necessary that the applicant should conform exactly to the figures indicated above, a variation of a few pounds either side of the standard in the minimum and maximum weights, and of a fraction of an inch in chest measurements being permissible if the applicant is otherwise in good health and desirable as a recruit.

107. An enlisted man, who has contracted in the line of duty infirmities that may raise a question of physical eligibility to re-enlistment, but not such as to prevent his performing the duties of a soldier, may be re-enlisted, by authority of Adjutant-General, on application of the company commander, made through the proper military channels. Men may be re-enlisted within thirty days after discharge, without re-examination, provided no apparent disability exists.

108. The examining surgeons at the different stations will be designated by Adjutant-General upon recommendation of Surgeon-General, and will examine recruits only upon presentation of order (form 45) properly completed and signed by company commander.

109. The fee not to exceed fifty cents for each applicant examined, to be paid through Adjutant-General's office. Claims to be presented at end of each quarter.

110. Men not re-enlisted within thirty days from date of discharge, upon expiration of term of enlistment, shall not be entitled to re-enlist for less than three years.

111. No one shall be re-enlisted who has not served faithfully during former enlistment, and who has not been honorably discharged.

112. Enlistment papers are made in duplicate and one copy must be mailed immediately to the Adjutant-General. The enlistment is not completed till this duplicate is filed in the office of the Adjutant-General.

113. No enlistments will be made in any organization of the Iowa National Guard, from the date of the receipt of an order for the election of an officer, until after the election thereby ordered has been held.

CONTINUOUS SERVICE.

114. To entitle officers and enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard to continuous service pay as provided in Section 2213 Military Code, they must have been re-commissioned or re-enlisted within thirty days from date of discharge.

115. Officers re-commissioned within thirty days take rank from date of original commission.

116. All former members of the Iowa National Guard, who volunteered and were mustered into the United States service, and who joined the guard upon its re-organization, will be given record of continuous service.

117. All former members of the Iowa National Guard, who passed the physical examination and volunteered for the United States service, but for whom there was no place owing to the difference in the organization of the Iowa National Guard and the volunteer regiments, and who joined the guard upon its re-organization, will be given record of continuous service.

ENCAMPMENT.

118. All recruits who enlist within the thirty days immediately preceding the date fixed for the encampment of their respective commands, will not be eligible for duty, and must not be transported or included in any camp musters or reports. This restriction will not extend to cases of re-enlistment where service is continuous.

119. Commanding officers of companies who issue clothing, arms, or equipment, or furnish transportation or rations to any man or substitute not regularly enlisted in the Iowa National Guard, and permit him to go into camp, will subject themselves to trial by court-martial.

120. Company commanders are expressly forbidden to take into camp more than three officers and forty-four enlisted men, including cooks and musicians; neither shall any man be furnished transportation who is not physically able to perform the full duty of a soldier at time of going into campment.

121. Officers or enlisted men who after going into camp fail to remain during the full tour of duty then ordered, will not be entitled to any pay for period pre-ent or transportation to return to their station. Exception will only be made in event of death in officer or soldier's family or other providential contingencies. Before approving application for furlough, or leave from camp, the commanding officer must inform the applicant of this regulation.

FURLOUGHS AND PASSES.

122. A regimental commander may grant furloughs to the enlisted men of his command, in such numbers, and for so long a time, as he shall deem consistent with the good of the service. Ordinarily, however, not more than one tenth part of a regiment should be on furlough at one time; and, except in cases of imperative necessity, no furlough should be given for more than six months. Whenever it becomes necessary for an enlisted man to absent himself from his company for a longer period than six months, it shall be his duty to apply for a discharge, the acceptance or rejection of which application shall rest with the judgment of the regimental commander.

123. A furlough commences on the day specified, and its expiration must find the soldier ready for duty with his company.

124. Furlough blanks in the prescribed form will be furnished by the adjutant-general, and are to be carefully kept in the custody of regimental commanders and chiefs of departments, by whom only they are to be signed as issued. They will never be issued in blank.

125. Applications for furloughs will be made in writing, addressed to company or detachment commander, who will endorse thereon approval

or disapproval, and forward them to regimental headquarters or chief of department.

126. Furloughs will be sent to soldiers through their company commanders.

127. A soldier in camp or upon other duty, desiring to absent himself for not more than twenty-four hours, will apply personally to the first sergeant of his company for a pass. The first sergeant will fill out the pass in the prescribed form and hand it to the company commander for signature, after which the first sergeant will carry it to the adjutant for approval, in the name of the regimental commander.

128. When troops are on duty, under law or orders, the highest commander present with them will regulate the issue of furloughs and passes as deemed for the good of the service. In cases of emergency, passes may be granted for seven days, but not longer.

129. Blank forms for passes will be furnished from the adjutant general's office, and will be kept in custody of first sergeants. In the absence of printed forms, passes may be written.

130. Company commanders are charged with the promulgation of these regulations to each and every member of their respective commands.

TRANSFERS.

131. Transfers of enlisted men will be made upon the application of the soldier approved by his commanding officer and by the commanding officer of organization to which transfer is desired and forwarded through military channels to adjutant-general and if approved order for transfer will issue.

DISCHARGES.

132. The company commander will, before submitting the discharge certificates to the regimental commander, inform the soldier of the character he intends to give him. Should the soldier feel that injustice will be done him thereby, he may at once apply for redress, to his company commander, who will immediately convene a board, composed of the other commissioned officers of the company present at the station, and the first sergeant, which board will determine the facts in the case. The company commander will briefly note the finding of the board, if approved by him, on the discharge. In all cases where the company commander deems a soldier's services unfaithful, he should, whenever practicable, notify the soldier at least thirty days prior to discharge, of the character which he intends to give, in order that the soldier may have ample opportunity to apply for, and be heard before the board. In such cases the proceedings of the board, showing all the facts pertinent to the inquiry, will be transmitted, through the regimental commander, to the adjutant general. (A. R. 148, and G. O. 10, A. G. O., 1897.)

133. When a company commander enters under the head of Character, "Services not honest and faithful" he will also enter "Right to apply for redress expressly waived," or "Approved finding of a board of officers," as the case may be. (A. R. 148.)

134. Discharges are not made in duplicate. Enter under head of Character:

"Excellent,"

"Good,"

"Fair," or

"Indifferent;" and

"Service honest and faithful," or

"Service not honest and faithful," as the case may be, with such other remarks as may be pertinent

135. The cause for discharge must be clearly stated, such as:

"Expiration of term of enlistment;"

"Permanent removal from station;"

"Permanent removal from state;"

"Inability to attend to military duty on account of newly acquired business engagements;"

"Willful absence from company drills."

136. Names of officers or enlisted men should not be dropped from the rolls until approved discharge papers are received from the Adjutant-General.

137. In the case of men who are discharged for expiration of enlistment, their papers must be forwarded in time for approval and return before the day of expiration.

REGIMENTAL ORGANIZATION.

138. The field, staff and line officers and non-commissioned officers of the Iowa National Guard as provided by law, are as follows:

139. For each regiment of infantry, colonel, lieutenant-colonel, three majors, regimental adjutant, rank, captain; three battalion adjutants, rank, first lieutenants; one quartermaster, rank, captain; one commissary of subsistence, rank, first lieutenant; one chaplain, rank, captain.

NON-COMMISSIONED STAFF.

140. One sergeant major, three battalion sergeants-major, one quartermaster-sergeant, one commissary sergeant, one ordnance sergeant, one color sergeant.

141. The Adjutant or other officer designated by regimental commander shall give bond in sum of \$500 for the property issued for use of non-commissioned staff, and stores shall be issued only upon the requisition of responsible officer.

BANDS

142. Regimental bands shall consist of a chief musician, two principal musicians, a drum major, and not more than twenty privates, to be enlisted under direction of regimental commander under same regulations as other enlisted men.

143. The chief musician will be responsible for all public property issued for use of the regimental band, and shall give bond therefor in the sum of \$500. He shall make financial statements, property returns and reports as are required.

144. All stores required for equipment of bands will be issued upon requisition of chief musician to be forwarded through and approved by Regimental Commander.

COMPANIES.

145. Companies shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two cooks, two musicians, and not less than forty or more than sixty-four non-commissioned officers and privates.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

146. The commissioned officers of the medical department of Iowa National Guard as provided by section 2181 military code, consist of surgeon-general, deputy surgeon-general, four surgeons, and eight assistant surgeons, and medical officers will be detailed for duty with the several regiments upon recommendation of surgeon-general, by the commander-in-chief.

147. The enlisted men of the department will consist of four hospital stewards, twelve acting hospital stewards, and twenty-four privates.

148. A detachment consisting of one hospital steward, three acting hospital stewards, and six privates will be detailed for duty with each regiment of infantry. Surgeons recommend suitable persons to the surgeon-general for appointment as hospital stewards and acting hospital stewards. All appointments or promotions will be reported to Adjutant-General by surgeon-general. Physicians or pharmacists only will be recommended for appointment as stewards and acting stewards, and the enlistment of medical students as privates in detachments is recommended.

149. All applicants for enlistment in the detachments will be required to pass the same physical examination, and will be subject to the same rules and regulations as other enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard. Enlistment papers will be forwarded through surgeon-general who will endorse his approval or disapproval thereon.

150. The supplies required for the equipment of the detachments will be issued upon the requisition of surgeons, forwarded through and approved by the surgeon-general.

151. Discharges for enlisted men of the department will be prepared by surgeons in command of detachments and forwarded to surgeon-general for his signature. Character certificate shall be completed and signed by surgeons in command of detachments.

INSPECTOR-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

152. The inspector-general and assistant inspector-general shall make inspections of the Iowa National Guard and perform such other duties as the commander-in-chief may from time to time order.

SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

153. The general inspector of small arms practice shall have general supervision of the small arms firing. The assistant general inspector shall perform such duties as may be assigned to him.

154. Inspectors shall be detailed with the several regiments of infantry upon recommendation of general inspector and shall superintend the practice in the regiments with which they are detailed, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by proper authority.

AMMUNITION.

155. Requisitions for ammunition must be filed not later than April 30th each year, and will show portions of allowance desired in original or reloaded cartridges and component parts thereof.

156. The regular allowance of ammunition for a company shall be 2,000 rounds of original cartridges, or their equivalent in value, each season. Companies practicing with 75 per cent. of their strength shall be entitled to 1,000 rounds in addition. Upon failure to satisfactorily account for ammunition previously issued, the allowance of any organization may be reduced or withheld. Field and staff officers and members of non-commissioned staffs and bands will be made such an allowance of ammunition as they can reasonably make use of. The attention of all concerned is called to the great increase of available ammunition possible by reloading the empty shells. This course will double the allowance. All empty shells will be preserved as long as they are serviceable for reloading. Each company shall keep 1,000 rounds of original ammunition constantly on hand for emergencies. An allowance of not exceeding 100 rounds per annum of revolver ammunition, calibre 38, will be made to each officer and soldier armed with that weapon.

157. The following supplies are furnished by the state and will be issued on receipt of proper requisition, viz.: Firing regulations for small arms, iron targets, brushes, round balls, powder and primers for gallery use; for range use, lubricated bullets, powder, primers, original ammunition, paper targets, cloth covers and iron frames for D. E. and F. targets, pasters, score sheets, record books, sand glasses, and wooden wiping rods.

158. All requisitions for the above articles will be sent direct to the inspector of small arms practice on duty with the regiment. He will make a record of the items and forward the requisition with his recommendation thereon direct to the general inspector of small arms practice, who will forward it to the adjutant-general for final action.

159. At close of target season company commanders will clean, decap, and promptly forward to state arsenal by freight all serviceable shells, calibre 45, in their possession, with a view to having them reloaded at the arsenal. Original boxes will be used as far as possible. Each box will be plainly marked on inside of cover with company letter and regimental number. The bill of lading and invoice will be sent by first mail. When shells are not properly cleaned or decapped, the expense of cleaning and decapping will be charged against the pay account of the company failing to comply therewith.

160. Failure to turn in empty shells will deprive companies of privilege of drawing any portion of ammunition allowance in reloaded cartridges. Two thousand reloaded shells will be issued in lieu of one thousand original cartridges.

161. An annual allowance of \$15 for the construction and maintenance of a rifle range for each company will be made upon receipt of claim. Claims will be made to show distance of the range from the armory, number, condition and style of targets, range houses, etc., the ranges at which firing can be conducted, and an itemized statement of expenditures for rent, materials and labor for the year. These claims to be forwarded direct to the regimental inspector of small arms practice, who will endorse and

forward, through the general inspector, to this office. Payment may be withheld if all the reports due have not been made or the range has not been used by 50 per cent. of the company.

ENGINEER DEPARTMENT.

162. The chief of engineers shall have general supervision of the officers and work of that department. He will recommend engineer officers for detail by commander-in-chief for duty with several regiments.

163. The department, in addition to the commissioned officers authorized by section 2181, Military Code, shall consist of four sergeants, four corporals, and eight privates; one sergeant, one corporal, and two privates to be enlisted by the engineer officer on duty with each regiment, under direction of the chief of engineers.

164. In making enlistments, detachment commanders must exercise great care to secure men who are specially fitted either by occupation or experience for the engineer service. All applicants for enlistment in the engineer department will be required to pass the same physical examination and will be subject to the same rules and regulations as other enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard. The surgeons appointed as examiners at the company stations will conduct the physical examinations of the applicants for enlistment presented by the engineer officers.

165. The supplies required for the equipment of the detachments will be issued upon the requisition of engineer officers, forwarded through the chief of engineers.

166. Detachment commanders shall give bond in the sum of \$500, and will be held to a strict accountability for all public property transferred to them from this office, and in case of loss or destruction of same, the money value will be deducted from any money due the detachment from the state. To protect themselves, detachment commanders should hold a receipt from each member of his detachment for all property issued, and hold him personally responsible for the money value thereof. For this purpose a blank property book will be issued from the adjutant-general's office.

167. Discharges for enlisted men of the department will be prepared by detachment commanders and forwarded to chief of engineers for his signature. Character certificate shall be completed and signed by detachment commander.

SIGNAL DEPARTMENT.

168. The signal department of the Iowa National Guard, in addition to the commissioned officers authorized by section 2181, Military Code, will consist of four sergeants, eight corporals, and twenty-eight privates; one sergeant, two corporals, and seven privates to be enlisted by the signal officer on duty with each regiment, under direction of the chief signal officer.

169. In making enlistments, detachment commanders must exercise great care to secure men who are specially fitted either by occupation or experience for the signal service. All applicants for enlistment in the signal department will be required to pass the same physical examination and will be subject to the same rules and regulations as other enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard. The surgeons appointed as examiners at the com-

pany stations will conduct the physical examinations of the applicants for enlistment presented by the signal officers.

170. Discharges for enlisted men of the department will be prepared by detachment commanders and forwarded to chief signal officer for his signature. Character certificate shall be completed and signed by detachment commander.

171. The supplies required for the equipment of the detachments will be issued upon requisition of signal officers forwarded through chief signal officer. Detachment commanders shall give bond in sum of \$500, and will be held to a strict accountability for all public property transferred to them from this office, and in case of loss or destruction of same the money value will be deducted from any money due the detachment from the state. To protect themselves, detachment commanders should hold a receipt from each member of his detachment for all property issued, and hold him personally responsible for the money value thereof. For this purpose a blank property book will be issued from the adjutant general's office.

172. **SIGNALING.**—The signal code, as adopted for the United States Army under the provisions of General Order No. 32, A. G. O., 1896, is adopted for the Iowa National Guard.

173. The Army Code Card, one for each member of the signal department, will be issued from this office upon requisition of the detachment commander.

QUARTERMASTERS.

174. The regimental quartermaster shall make requisition on quartermaster general for the camp equipage required for use of command in annual encampment. He shall see that all labor, lumber, horses, baggage, wagons, wood, forage, and other supplies contracted for, are provided as per contract.

175. He shall keep accurate record of transactions of his office, and at close of each tour of duty render return accounting for all moneys and supplies received and issued by him, and examine and certify all bills contracted and forward to adjutant general for settlement. Quartermasters shall give bond in such sum as may be required by the adjutant general.

176. Quartermaster sergeants shall assist the quartermasters in performance of their duties.

COMMISSARY OFFICERS.

177. Regimental commissaries shall, under such regulations and instructions as may from time to time be issued by the commander-in-chief, provide the necessary substance stores when in annual camp.

178. He shall keep an accurate record of all the transactions of his office and at the close of each tour of duty render returns accounting for all moneys and supplies received and issued by him.

179. It shall be his duty to see that all supplies are furnished as per contract, examine, certify, and forward bills to adjutant general for payment.

180. Commissary officers will be assisted by commissary sergeants in performance of their duties.

181. The following table showing components of rations will be strictly adhered to:

Ration returns will be submitted to camp adjutant the day previous to date of issue, by whom they will be verified and compared with morning report, and after approval by commanding officer, will be sent to commissary officer. The hour of issue will be arranged to suit convenience of all concerned.

Necessary extra issue in excess of savings will be charged at one-half contract price and will be made on separate returns.

Savings will be credited at contract price, and money paid to organization making savings on pay roll.

BY-LAWS.

182. Every company and regimental band may make rules for its own government not in conflict with the military code and general orders or regulations, subject to the approval of the regimental commander.

183. Before by-laws become effective they must be submitted to regimental commander in duplicate for examination, and he will endorse thereon his action, and if approved, forward one copy to adjutant general's office and return one copy to company commander.

ARMORIES.

184. Armories shall be under the control and charge of the commanding officer of the organization for which they are provided.

185. All property issued must be habitually kept in armories as required by law.

186. Armory rent to sum of \$200 per annum will be allowed each company and band, and will be paid under such restrictions as may be prescribed by commander-in-chief. Requisitions for armory rent and postage are due March 31st and September 30th, but will not be paid until all reports due are filed.

MILITARY PROPERTY.

187. All military stores issued to or purchased with public funds shall be taken up on returns whether invoiced or not.

188. Company commanders and other officers and enlisted men are expressly forbidden to loan or hire out or permit to be used for private purposes any arms, clothing, or equipment furnished by the state or United States.

189. Officers receiving stores will without delay sign receipts in duplicate therefor and return both copies to the issuing officer.

190. An officer making issue or transfer of stores will immediately forward invoices in duplicate to the officer to whom issue is made.

191. Requisition for ordnance stores and quartermaster stores will be made on separate blanks.

192. Requisitions will be forwarded direct to the adjutant general, except when otherwise expressly ordered.

193. Company and detachment commanders will be held to a strict accountability for all public property transferred to them by the quartermaster general and in case of loss or destruction of same the money value will be deducted from any money due the company or detachment from the state. To protect themselves, accountable officers should hold a receipt from each member of his company or detachment for all property issued, and hold

them personally responsible for the money value thereof. For this purpose a blank property book is issued.

194. Drill or camp pay or any other money allowance due soldier or company may be stopped to cover loss of property.

95. Ammunition and material for manufacture or repairs are the only ordnance stores which are "expended," taking the meaning of the word as used in a property return. When ammunition or material for repairs or manufacture has been expended, an abstract of such expenditures is prepared; the total of such expenditures, as shown by this abstract, is entered after the words "expended as per abstract;" the date is that of the last day of the period covered by report, and the number the next to that of the last voucher entered.

196. Where stores are lost or destroyed, and can not be presented for the action of a board of survey, they are accounted for by the affidavit of one or more persons cognizant of the facts, and by the certificate of the officer responsible for the property, setting forth clearly the facts in the case, and such testimony of other officers as may be attainable. The certified statement, in duplicate, of the officer responsible for them sets forth the date when, the place where, and all the circumstances under which the loss took place, and whether or not ordinary care has been exercised. In cases where the circumstances did not come under the cognizance of the officer, the affidavit of a non-commissioned officer, or, if not procurable, that of one or more privates, covering the facts of the case, is obtained in duplicate, and filed as a voucher.

197. All arms, ammunition, clothing or equipments lost, stolen, damaged, expended without authority, or otherwise improperly disposed of, are charged on the muster and pay rolls against the officer or enlisted men found responsible therefor, and are reported in detail with price of each article affixed.

198. Whenever an officer turns over ordnance stores to another person he delivers with them duplicate invoices and upon receipt of the stores, the receiving officer returns receipts in duplicate.

199. Company commanders must not ship stores in their possession without authority from the adjutant-general or quartermaster-general's department.

200. Officers who ship arms or military stores of any description to any destination are held strictly responsible that they are so packed that under ordinary handling they can not break loose from their fastenings in the boxes, and that under no circumstances a loaded arm is packed for transportation. When loaded arms, or stores insecurely packed, are received from any officer, the receiving officer reports the facts in the case direct to the adjutant-general.

201. The pecuniary responsibility being by law vested in the company commander who receipts for the property can not be transferred to enlisted men. It is the duty of the company commander to attend personally to its security, and either to himself superintend the care of same or cause it to be done by a commissioned officer. The plea that the keys of stores or chests, and the making of issues, were entrusted to enlisted men, or to civilians, without direct proof of vigilance on the part of the responsible officer, and a resort to every reasonable precaution, including frequent personal inspection

tions intended to prevent loss or damage, is not accepted as relieving such officer from liability. Evidence is demanded showing clearly the circumstances of the loss, and all the means and precautions taken to guard against it.

202. Soldiers are not permitted to take their arms to pieces except in the presence of an officer nor under any circumstances to deface the metallic or wooden parts by attempts to beautify or change the finish of the exterior. The equipments furnished to each man are fitted to him under the direction of an officer, and after fitting he is allowed to make no change by cutting straps or punching holes.

203. Belts should always fit tightly, and be worn uniformly.

204. Bayonets should fit the scabbards loosely.

ESTIMATES.

205. Estimates for clothing required for the year must be made annually by company and detachment commanders, regimental adjutants and chief musicians and filed in adjutant-general's office on or before March 31st.

206. The quartermaster-general's department will not be responsible for any deficiency in uniform or equipment if estimates are not forwarded as above ordered.

207. These estimates will be prepared on requisition blank and marked "Estimate," and will show the number of articles required to complete the number of uniforms to fifty forenlisted men in each company. The number of each article required, on hand, will also be entered.

208. No requisition for clothing or ordnance stores forwarded after order fixing date of annual camp is issued will be honored until after the camp has been held.

REPORTS AND RETURNS.

209. A careful reading of all instructions on printed forms will enable officers to prepare and render correct returns and reports.

210. Reports, returns and pay-rolls must be forwarded in three days after they fall due.

DRILL PAY.

211. Drill pay under section 2218, Military Code, will be allowed semi-annually upon drill reports and pay-rolls to be completed and forwarded on the last days of June and December. No payments will be made until rolls are properly signed by soldier, or, in case he is discharged during period covered by roll, upon his written order to pay amount due him to company commander.

212. Allowance will be made for but one regular drill each week, to be held day or night, officially designated.

213. Drill reports and pay-rolls showing attendance at company drills shall be forwarded June 30th and December 31st.

ARMORY RENT.

214. Armory rent is payable semi-annually, and requisitions are due March 31st and September 30th.

215. Ordnance and quartermaster returns and financial reports are due March 31st and September 30th, and final returns are required when-

ever, for any reason, an officer closes his accountability. Officers must verify count of all property before receipting therefor, and previous to making property returns. Any officer who fails to report loss of property on next return after loss occurs shall be deemed guilty of making false certificate in the meaning of section 1192, Military Code.

216. Quarterly reports are due last days of March, June, September and December.

217. Reports of Small Arms Practice are due at close of target season.

RECORDS.

218. Each regimental headquarters and company commander will be furnished

1 Order Book.

1 Letters Sent Book and Index.

1 Letters Received Book and Index.

1 Description and Enlistment Book.

219. These books are furnished that a correct record of all orders, official communications, appointments, elections, enlistments, and discharges may be kept.

UNIFORM.

220. All officers and enlisted men, when on duty, must wear the uniform of the organization exactly as prescribed.

221. The regulation undress uniform of the United States Army, except when expressly ordered otherwise, is prescribed for officers and enlisted men of the Iowa National Guard.

222. The following modifications are adopted and prescribed:

The insignia for officers' undress coat will be as follows:

For officers of general staff and staff departments, the word Iowa, in letters of gothic condensed design, three-fourths of an inch in height, to be followed by a period, embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar one inch from its edge and midway of its height, and their distinctive insignia, without wreath, one inch high, embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar about one inch from the word Iowa.

223. For all infantry officers crossed rifles one and one half inches long and one inch high, with regimental number in upper angle, and the abbreviation (Ia.) of the word Iowa in the lower angle, embroidered in gold or made of gold or gilt metal, fastened to each side of the collar about one and one-half inches from its edge and midway of its height. Regimental staff officers, in addition, will wear the distinctive insignia of their department fastened to the collar about one-half of an inch from the regimental device.

224. For cavalry officers, crossed sabres with regimental number and state designation the same as infantry.

225. The undress cap prescribed for the officers of the United States Army by G. O. No. 22, 1895, is hereby adopted for all officers of the Iowa National Guard, except chaplains, with the following modification: That the word Iowa, in gothic letters three-eighths of an inch in height, to be embroidered in gold on an upward curve above the eagle and between the tips of the wings.

226. As far as possible, shoes of uniform pattern and color should be worn.

227. Enlisted men leaving camp on pass or after retreat will wear forage cap with regulation device, the blouse and trousers without leggings.

The device will never be worn on campaign hat, and only removed from cap for purposes of cleaning.

INSIGNIA.

228. The service badge and decorations won at rifle practice will always be worn whether paraded in full dress or undress.

229. The badge of the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States is authorized to be worn on occasions of ceremony by all medical officers of the Iowa National Guard who are members of said association.

230. Officers and enlisted men who, in their own right or by right of inheritance, are members of military societies of men who served in the armies and navies of the United States in the war of the Revolution, the war of 1812, the Mexican war, and the war of the Rebellion, or are members of the Regular Army and Navy Union of the United States may wear, on all occasions of ceremony, when full dress is required, the distinctive badges adopted by such societies—badges to be worn on the left breast of the coat, suspended by a ribbon from a bar of metal passed through their upper ends, and tops of the ribbons forming a horizontal line, the outer end of which will be from three to four inches below the top of the shoulder, according to height of wearer. Medals of honor and the several distinctive marks given for excellence in rifle practice may also be worn in the same manner by officers and enlisted men upon all occasions of ceremony. Insignia "buttons" will not be worn.

BADGE, SERVICE.

231. A badge indicating long and faithful service in the Iowa National Guard having been adopted and approved by the commander-in-chief, the same is hereby authorized to be worn with the uniform on all occasions of ceremony by all officers and soldiers of the Iowa National Guard whose service, as shown by the records in the adjutant general's office, entitles them to it under the following regulations:

232. For all officers (both active and retired) and soldiers who have served in the Iowa National Guard faithfully for five years, the badge, to be of oxidized silver according to design in Adjutant-General's office.

233. For ten years faithful service the badge with a blue enamel bar inscribed with the words "Ten Years."

234. For fifteen years faithful service the badge and bar as for ten years, with an additional bar of red enamel inscribed with the words "Fifteen Years."

235. For twenty years faithful service the badge and bars as for fifteen years, with an additional gold bar inscribed with "Twenty Years."

236. In computing time, only service in the Iowa National Guard since April 8, 1878 (the date of the act of the Seventeenth General Assembly giving to the organized militia of Iowa the name Iowa National Guard,) will be considered.

AID OF CIVIL AUTHORITY.

237. Respect for civil authorities is the duty of all citizens, and especially of those in the military service of the state.

238. The National Guardsman must remember that it is upon him, when the civil power has failed, the state relies for the vindication of its laws and institutions imperiled from whatever cause; that, in becoming a soldier, he has lost none of the characteristics or duties of the citizen, but has assumed simply such further obligations as imperatively demand of him the conduct which shall inspire the confidence and respect of the people.

239. In case of any breach of the peace, tumult, riot or resistance to process, or imminent danger thereof, the sheriff of any county may call for aid upon the commanding officer of any military company within his county, immediately notifying the governor of such action, and such officer shall order into service the military force, or any part thereof under his command, in aid of the civil authority.

The command of any force called into service under this chapter shall devolve upon the senior officer of such force, unless otherwise ordered by the commander-in-chief. (Sections 2171, 2173. Code.)

240. Troops called into action against a mob forcibly resisting or obstructing the execution of the laws, or attempting to destroy property, are governed by the general regulations of the army and apply military tactics in respect to the manner in which they shall act to accomplish the desired end. It is purely a tactical question in what manner they shall use the weapons with which they are armed—whether by fire of musketry and artillery or by the use of the bayonet and saber, or by both, and at what stage of the operations each or either mode of attack shall be employed. This tactical question will be decided by the immediate commander of the troops, according to his judgment of the situation. The fire of troops should be withheld until timely warning has been given to the innocent who may be mingled with the mob. Troops must never fire into a crowd unless ordered by their commanding officer, except that single selected sharpshooters may shoot down individual rioters who have fired upon or thrown missiles at the troops. As a general rule the bayonet alone should be used against mixed crowds in the first stages of the revolt. But as soon as sufficient warning has been given to enable the innocent to separate themselves from the guilty, the action of the troops should be governed solely by the tactical considerations involved in the duty they are ordered to perform. They should make their blows so effective as to promptly suppress all resistance to lawful authority, and should stop the destruction of life the moment lawless resistance has ceased. Punishment belongs not to the troops, but to the courts of justice.

241. Commanding officers, when called upon to aid the civil authorities, will require the request of the civil officer to be written, and will immediately communicate by wire this request to the adjutant-general, and state what action has been taken therein.

242. If, after being called into service, no instructions be given to the military commander by the civil officer; or if there be a conflict of jurisdiction between public officers authorized to call to their aid the military force, and who shall make such call; or if contradictory, inconsistent or unlawful directions shall be given by such civil officer or officers, the military com-

mander will, if the occasion shall require the use of a military force, himself so direct the troops as to secure the public peace and the due observance of the law, agreeably to the call made upon him by the civil authority.

243. It shall be the duty of the commanding officer of any troop, battery or company in all cases, when called into service to aid the civil authority, to provide the men of his command so ordered out with a sufficiency of proper ammunition and arms in complete order for actual service.

244. Troops called upon to aid the civil authorities will be ordered out in fatigue or undress uniform, in heavy marching order. On night service and in cold weather overcoats will be worn.

245. When troops are ordered for duty in aid of the civil authorities, company commanders will provide a sufficient supply for one day of bacon, hard bread, coffee and sugar. An arrangement should be made with dealers to get these articles at any time, day or night.

246. Upon arriving at the point for duty, commanders will provide such other articles of the ration, with due regard for economy, as shall make their men comfortable in every particular.

247. Military officers, while acting in aid of the civil authorities, will enforce the most exact subordination and discipline. They will impress upon their commands the necessity of coolness and self-possession, and enjoin absolutely the order that no man shall fire without orders from his proper military superior. Officers in command of troops in the circumstances contemplated will be cautious not to weaken their main force too much by detachments, and always to have on hand a sufficient body to act with energy and decided effect, when their services shall be required.

248. Commanding officers may cause the troops to arrest all rioters and other persons found in open resistance to the civil authorities, and are empowered and required to overcome such resistance, and secure and keep the peace, by the use, if necessary, of their arms and all the power which they possess; but they are not authorized to punish any person for any offense, however amenable he may be to punishment, and they will always endeavor, by a firm and judicious conduct and the moral force of their presence, to establish the public order, if possible, without a resort to arms. To have this result, will be the best evidence of their skill and the excellence of their measure.

249. It will be an axiom for the guidance of military commanders acting in aid of the civil authorities to use no unnecessary violence, but to employ as much force only, and of such kind, as will suffice to accomplish the object for which their services have been required.

250. Military commanders, when ordered to disperse a tumultuous or riotous assemblage, will, unless special exigencies should intervene, observe the following method of proceeding: On approaching the place where the mob is congregated, or the riot is progressing, the military officer in command will request the civil officer to give notice, in a loud tone of voice, requiring all persons so assembled to disperse forthwith. Unless such notice is given by the civil officer, the military officer will himself cause such notice to be given. After waiting a suitable time to allow the mob or rioters to disperse, the commanding officer will cause the troops to advance and clear the place or disperse the rioters. In this effort he will obtain, if pos-

sible, the active aid of the civil officers, and especially the personal presence and authority of the civil officers. If the troops shall then be attacked or resisted, so as to be unable otherwise to clear the ground or disperse the rioters, they may fire or use any other means necessary to attain the end designed, but in no case will they fire without the orders of their proper military commander.

251. The order to fire will be communicated to the troops by the superior military officer in command on the spot. It is impossible to specify in advance the particulars or nature of each case of resistance or attack by rioters or persons engaged in a breach of the peace which will justify the troops in taking life. The commander must himself examine the scene of disorder, and then in view of all the circumstances, exercise a sound discretion as to the measure of force demanded. His honest and reasonable judgment in a case of apparent necessity is all that is required by the law, and his lawful command will be sufficient protection to all who are subject to his orders.

252. The troops are authorized to defend from attack of aggressors their persons, their arms, and any place or building in which they may be stationed. In case of any sudden onset on the troops, or any place or building occupied by them, or other urgent circumstances requiring instant attack or resistance the notice and other measures preliminary to the action of the troops may be dispensed with. The order to fire, in this case, will be given by the military commander on the spot; but it is not for every slight attack that the troops shall be authorized to fire; there must appear to be a necessity for so doing, and that other, less serious, measures will not suffice to secure the safety of the troops.

MEMORIAL DAY.

253. In accordance with the custom and the regulations of the Grand Army posts and veteran organizations, it is requested that the several companies of the Iowa National Guard, will assemble at their respective armories on May 30th, at the hour designated by company commanders, in uniform, fully armed and equipped, to attend memorial ceremonies. The commanding officers of each company will report to the commander of the G. A. R. Post, or the person having general charge of the memorial service, and render every possible assistance in commemorating the patriotic heroism of those who offered their lives for the preservation of the union and the upholding of the American flag.

254. It is further recommended that the commanding officer of each company appoint members of the company who were in the volunteer service of the Spanish-American war, to properly decorate the graves of their deceased comrades.

255. All orders of chiefs of ceremonies, not in conflict with orders and the military code of Iowa, will be obeyed.

256. Company commanders are hereby cautioned to carefully inspect the rifles and cartridge belts of the men before leaving the armory, and be assured that no ball cartridges are in the possession of any of the men. In firing salutes, aim high to avoid accidents.

I. The School of Instruction in Small Arms Practice for 1901 will open at the State Range, near Cedar Rapids, Monday morning, June 10th, at seven o'clock, and continue five days. The camp will be open for the reception of details on Saturday, June 8th.

II. Colonel *Thomas F. Cooke*, General Inspector Small Arms Practice, will assume command of the camp and school and is charged with the arrangement of all details thereof, including the selection of a Camp Staff, which will include the officers of his Department. Soldiers desiring details upon the Staff, will apply to Colonel *Cooke* through their immediate commanders and the Inspectors on duty with their Regiments.

PROGRAM.

III. Upon the recommendation of the General Inspector of Small Arms Practice, this school will be devoted to instruction in the care and use of the U. S. Magazine Rifle, cal. 30; the U. S. Springfield Rifle, cal. 45; the U. S. Colt Revolver, cal. 38, and the making of records, requisitions, returns and reports required in connection with Small Arms Practice. The State will furnish ammunition for the above named arms only. Magazine rifles for use during school of instruction will be issued at range.

Pool targets for Bull's-eye shooting with the rifle and revolver will be open at such times as the officer in charge may designate. Tickets for this firing will be sold by the Statistical Officer at ten cents each or twelve for

\$1.00. Each day's receipts will be divided pro rata among those making bull's-eye on that day.

IV. The Commanding Officer of each of the following named companies will detail four men—if possible two officers and two non-commissioned officers—for this duty:

Companies "A," "B," "C," "K," and "M," 49th Regiment.

Companies "B," "D," "G," "H," "K," and "L," 50th Regiment.

Companies "B," "D," "F," "L," and "M," 51st Regiment.

Companies "B," "D," "F," "G," "H," "K," "L" and "M," 52d Regiment.

The Commanding Officers of all companies not included in the above, and Troop "A," will detail three men—if possible two officers and one non-commissioned officer—for this duty.

In making these details attention should be given not only to excellence in shooting, but to steadiness, good soldiery habits and conduct and ability to receive and impart instruction.

The ranking officer or soldier of each detail will be in command and will be held strictly responsible for its conduct and discipline enroute to and from the range and during the meeting. He will report in person to the Commander of the Camp upon arrival and prior to leaving at the conclusion of the tour. He will furnish the Camp Adjutant with a roster of his detail immediately after reporting. He will not delay the journey unnecessarily.

No allowance will be made for meals or transfer of baggage enroute.

Details will appear in fatigue uniforms with leggins, blankets, woven belts, rifles, cal. 45, and officers with revolvers. Company Commanders will see to it that men carry rifles that have been carefully tested and are known to be accurate. Overcoats or mackintoshes should be carried.

V. The company details will report for duty to the Camp Commander at the State Range not later than 6:30 o'clock Monday morning, June 10th. The Camp Staff and Inspectors will report at such time as they may be directed by the officer in charge, not later than Saturday, June 8th.

VI. Company details will be allowed *per diem* for five days. Transportation, ammunition, quarters, subsistence, cots, camp chairs and water buckets will be furnished. Company Commanders will at once notify the Adjutant-General of any choice of routes for transportation.

VII. The State Range lies about one-half mile east of old Midway Park on the Cedar Rapids and Marion Electric railway, which connects those two cities.

I. Pursuant to General Orders No. 9, c. s., the Forty-ninth and Fiftieth Regiments, Iowa National Guard, will encamp at Dubuque, July 23d to 30th. The camp will be known and designated as Camp D. B. Henderson. Colonel William G. Dows will assume command of the camp and will be held accountable for the enforcement of existing orders and camp discipline.

The Fifty-first and Fifty-second Regiments, Iowa National Guard, will encamp at Council Bluffs, August 14th to 21st, inclusive. The camp will be known and designated as Camp G. M. Dodge.

Troop "A" is hereby assigned to the Fifty-first Regiment during the tour of camp duty August 14th to 21st.

II. TRANSPORTATION—Only members of the Guard and the authorized cooks can be transported on state transportation requests; no other person must under any circumstances be included.

Bands will be allowed transportation for a total of twenty-four enlisted men and two civilian cooks.

Four civilian cooks and servants will be furnished transportation to each Regimental Headquarters upon application to the Adjutant-General.

The transportation of mattresses and other unnecessary baggage is forbidden. Ample supply of bed sacks and straw will be furnished.

III. PAY—Pay and subsistence will be allowed for forty-four enlisted men, provided two enlisted cooks are included in the number. In event of there being no enlisted cooks, company commanders may, upon request to the Adjutant-General, be permitted to transport and subsist two civilian cooks. Each officer and enlisted man will be credited with the number of days, not exceeding eight, present at camp, and in this connection attention is directed to paragraphs 118 to 121 inclusive, General Order No. 5, c. s.

IV. UNIFORM. The undress uniform of the United States Army, except as modified by Par. 222 to 226, G. O. No. 5, c. s., will be worn by all officers and men while on duty. Enlisted men must comply with Par. 227, G. O. No. 5, c. s., when leaving camp on pass.

Commanding Officers will see to it that no citizen clothing is carried to camp. Officers and men are on military duty from the time they assemble at armories until they return from camp and are dismissed.

V. Officers of the Inspector General's Department will make an inspection each day before or after guard mounting and report the result thereof to Camp Commander. Battalion Commanders will accompany Inspecting Officers during the inspection of their respective battalions and company commanders at the inspection of their respective quarters.

Surgeons will make two sanitary inspections each day, one in the forenoon and one in the afternoon and report the result to Camp Commander.

VI. Daily duty reports (Form 30) will be turned in to the Inspector immediately after parade or retreat.

Commanding Officers will not report for pay for the day men who have been absent without authority from any prescribed duty for that day. To be entitled to a day's pay a day's duty must be performed.

Commissaries, and all officers acting as such, will be held strictly accountable for all rations under their charge.

VII. Immediately after the close of camp, the Commissaries will prepare and forward a consolidated report of all stores received and issued while in camp. A balance sheet showing debits and credits of each company must be submitted as part of the report.

No substitutes will be taken to camp, and Commanding Officers of companies who issue clothing, arms and equipments to any man, not regularly enlisted in the Iowa National Guard, and permit him to go into camp, will subject themselves to trial by court-martial.

Commanding Officers of companies will be charged with the number of tents and other state property issued to their commands, and a special inspection will be made of the same on the first and last day of each encampment, in order to locate the responsibility for loss or damage.

VIII. The senior Field or Line officer traveling on trains with troops without regard to regiment to which they belong, will assume command and with company commanders will be held to strict account for conduct and safety of troops en route to and from camps.
