1. What is the outcome to be achieved?
2. What populations are not achieving the desired outcome?
3. What extra challenges do priority populations face? Why aren't current activities and interventions adequate?

Evaluate disparities using data standards.	IDPH Data Standards <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Many data resources are available that assess disparities in outcomes, including the IDPH Scorecards.
Use qualitative methods to assess WHY and HOW identified disparities exist.	Participatory Methods (PMs) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Seek out those voices that are typically unheard in decision-making Position all perspectives as 'experts' on equal footing Empower community members to define, express and analyze their reality Ensures community voice is carried through planning, implementation, and evaluation phases. http://www.participatorymethods.org
Assess structural risks and strengths at the state and/or community level. Structural factors include economics, structural racism, and the built environment. Use feedback loops to assess effectiveness. Ask questions and create a dialog.	<p>Active Listening</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Strategy to make a conscious effort to create a mutual understanding and to hear the complete message being communicated <p>https://ggia.berkeley.edu/practice/active_listening</p>
Implement practical and appropriate activities driven by community engagement.	<p>Community Engagement</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Work in partnerships with key stakeholders Gather community input to drive activities <p>https://www.rwjf.org/en/library/features/achieving-health-equity.html</p>
Track the outcomes.	<p>Performance Management</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Track impact among priority populations Focus on outcomes, rather than inputs such as services

Act on evaluation findings.	Quality Improvement <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Supports activities in any phase of the program cycle • Creates an iterative cycle for continual improvement • Use QI to find ways to close or lessen the gap between populations.
