SIR: In compliance with the provisions of Section 1720 of the Code, I herewith present to you Part III of the Forty-first Annual Report relating to the business of life insurance as transacted by Fraternal Beneficiary Societies and Orders operating in this jurisdiction under the provisions of Chapter 9, Title IX, of the statutes of Iowa.

This is the second year in which the reports made by these societies have been printed in a separate volume from the regular life, assessment life and accident companies and associations.

During the year 1909 these orders have kept pace with the life insurance activities in this state as well as the country at large, and perhaps at no period of their existence has the system of fraternal insurance claimed the attention of life insurance people as during the past year. More attention has been devoted to their rates and their possibilities of carrying out the spirit as well as the letter of their contracts, and perfecting the system in its many details.

But recently in New York City a committee on fraternal societies of the National Convention of Insurance Commissioners met the representatives of several fraternal societies, and decided upon several features to a tentative bill preparatory to its presentation for enactment by the several state legislatures at their sessions the coming winter, prominent among which are the following:

- 1. That annual valuations and publicity should be made not as a test of solvency, but to show conditions to members of societies, said valuations to begin January 1, 1912.
- 2. Valuations as of January 1, 1918, properly certified, shall be submitted to the home insurance department and triennially thereafter. If valuation shows a deficiency the society must reduce the deficiency at least 5 per cent during each triennial period. Failure to reduce deficiency will permit the state insurance department to take steps to corect the condition or wind up the society.
- 3. The national fraternal congress tables of mortality shall be the standard for valuation or any higher standard upon which societies shall have calculated rates of contribution.

4. After passage of the bill no new society shall be incorporated or admitted which does not provide for stated periodical contributions sufficient to provide for meeting the obligations contracted when valued upon the basis of the national fraternal congress tables of mortality or any higher standard, with interest assumption not more than 4 per cent per annum.

While this is an advance step towards bringing about many reforms necessary in the fraternal field, it is conservative rather than radical, and the fact that it was discussed and accepted by the societies in attendance goes far towards establishing the fact that such societies are giving the subject much thought, through those in management, looking towards bringing their several orders alongside, so far as relates to safety and endurance, of the strongest and best of the insurance contingents in the insurance system.

During the year 1909 the following changes occurred in fraternal circles in Iowa:

The Modern National Reserve of Charles City, Iowa, which commenced business in 1903, was merged with the Highland Nobles of Waterloo, Iowa.

The Home Guards of the World, of Marshailtown, Iowa, originally organized in 1904, merged with the Homesteaders of Des Moines, Iowa.

It is with deep feelings of regret that I announce the final retirement of the Grand Lodge of Iowa Workmen of Waterloo, Iowa. This order was incorporated June 14, 1874, having commenced business under very adverse circumstances in 1872. Operating from the very start upon inadequate rates and having failed to make the progress hoped for by its promoters, it soon reached its highest membership record and gradually receded until but 625 members were left upon its rolls, and its death claims because of the advanced age of its membership, became a burden too great to be borne. All debts having been paid in good faith, a small remaining balance in the treasury was distributed pro rata among the surviving members.

On February 14, 1910, the Common Brotherhood of America, Des Moines, Iowa, was admitted to do business. This is the first Iowa fraternal admitted under the provisions of Chapter 86, Laws of the Thirty-second General Assembly. It starts out with rates based upon the National Fraternal Congress Table of Mortality, as demanded by that statute.

The usual examination by representatives of this department during the past year discloses the fact that all the Iowa fraternals are prosperous, some of them marvelously so, and I believe that they are all in the hands of excellent managers, and the prospect for the coming year, as well as the general future, bright indeed.
