# REPORT OF THE RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS

STATE OF IOWA,

BOARD OF RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,

DES MOINES.

To the Honorable B. F. Carroll, Governor of the State of Iowa:

We have the honor to submit to you herewith the Thirty-second Annual Report of this Board, as directed by law. The Commissioners desire to call your attention to the tabulations of the reports of the various railroad, electric inter-urban, express, terminal and bridge companies, also the decisions and statement of closed cases for the year just ended.

#### CONDITION OF ROADS IN IOWA.

Many of the railroad companies operating in Iowa are constantly improving their tracks, bridges and buildings. The Board believes that more work should be done along this line than has been done. At no time, in the interest of "economy" or to reduce expenditures in any given period of time, should a railway company permit any of its rolling stock or motive power to remain out of commission for lack of necessary repairs. Locomotives and cars should at all times be kept in as near perfect condition as possible in order that during a period of unusual movement of grain and stock, Iowa shippers might be supplied more promptly than has been at times the experience of the past. This Board has repeatedly made known its wishes to the railroad companies in this respect. It is known that the larger railroad companies operating in Iowa have ordered much additional rolling stock and the Commissioners have reason to believe that unusual demands for cars in the future will be met by the carriers in Iowa much better than they have been in the past.

# MILEAGE OF STEAM ROADS.

The column of the comparative statistics referring to the mileage of steam roads in Iowa, shows a net increase of 45.88 miles. The only new line reported, however, is that portion of the St. Paul & Des Moines Railroad from Iowa Falls north to Mason City, 43.80. The Muscatine, North & South reports an increase of mileage due to an error in former reports of 2.95. The Wabash reports a decrease of .02 of a mile, but give no reason for it. The Davenport, Rock Island & Northwestern reports a decrease in mileage of .01 of a mile, due to changes in connections with other roads. The Newton & Northwestern shows a decrease of .30 miles, due to error in 1908 report. The C., M. & St. P. Ry. Co., shows an increase of .13 miles, due to a rearrangement of tracks at Vining and Gladstone stations, and the C., B. & Q. R. R. Co. shows a decrease in mileage of .67 miles, because of track taken up at Fontanelle.

Of the steam mileage report for 1909, 38 miles is operated by both steam and electricity, being that part of the Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern Railroad over which are operated both steam and electric cars.

#### STATISTICS.

The secretary of this Board was reappointed a member of the Committee on Statistics, reporting to the National Association of Railroad Commissioners. Since the date of the last report, this Committee has held several meetings and up to this time no satisfactory solution has arisen for the division of earnings and expenses by state lines. Investigations are still being carried on and it is hoped by another year to have a plan outlined that will prove fairly satisfactory to state railroad commissions and to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Earnest efforts have been made to have the figures presented by this Board in its Statistical Report, absolutely reliable in every way. Every table has been balanced, and every railroad company's accounts as reported to this Board, have been balanced. This means a great deal of painstaking work and has resulted in finding many errors that would otherwise have been perpetuated by being published.

The statistics of steam railroads, electric inter-urban railways, bridge companies, terminal companies and express companies have been compiled separately. This has meant a great increase in the

time necessary to make this report properly, but we believe the arrangement will be appreciated by the public.

A number of comparative tables are published in this portion of the report, the figures in all cases being taken from the sworn statements of the carriers reporting to this Commission. In the statistical portion of this report will be found all information in detail which has been verified as stated.

# COMPARATIVE STATISTICS.

The following tables will be found of interest, as they cover the subjects embraced from 1878 to 1909, inclusive:

#### TERMINAL COMPANIES.

The number of terminal companies operating in Iowa remains the same as last year, viz: six. These companies, so reporting, show an increase in their mileage of 8.71. The Des Moines Union shows an increase in mileage of 7.93, of which 1.15 is single track. This increase is due to resurvey and reclassification of track. The Des Moines Terminal shows an increase of .67 miles, which was new line constructed during the year. The Union Terminal Company of Sioux City shows an increase of .24 miles, new line constructed during the year. The Sioux City Terminal Company shows a decrease of .13 of a mile, due to an error in the 1908 report.

The comparative table follows. This comparative table also indicates the stock and debt, earnings and operating expenses. Full details of the operations of the terminal companies will be found in the statistical portion of this report.

#### BRIDGE COMPANIES.

The bridge companies show an increase in the mileage of 1.41. This increase is due to a resurvey of the Sioux City Bridge Company's line showing that much greater mileage in 1909 than was reported in 1908.

The following comparative table will show the mileage, earnings, operating expenses, stock and debt of bridge companies, the fuller statistics being given in the statistical portion of this report.

#### ELECTRIC INTER-URBAN RAILWAYS.

By reference to the comparative table showing the mileage of electric inter-urban lines in Iowa, it will be noted that there has been an increase of 116.73 miles. This includes 10 miles of the Albia Inter-Urban, a new line; 104.32 miles credited to the Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern Railway, due to the addition of the Newton & Northwestern Railway of 102.2 miles and the Ames & College Railway with a mileage of 2.10; an error in previous years of .02 miles, which makes a total of 104.32. The Waterloo, Cedar Falls & Northern Railway Company also shows an increase of 3.27 miles, being new line built during the year. The Cedar Rapids & Iowa City Railway shows a decrease in mileage of .86, formerly reported as owned, but which mileage is in fact leased and should not be included in the report of miles owned.

Fuller reports concerning the operation of electric inter-urban lines will be found in the statistical portion of the report.

# EXPRESS COMPANIES.

In the statistical portion of this report will be found such data as we were able to secure from express companies operating in Iowa. The Commissioners do not believe that these statistics are all that they should be, but expect to continue their efforts to get such information as will enable this Board to determine the actual financial operations of the express companies, so far as the State of Iowa is concerned. This being the first year that the express companies have filed regular reports with this Board, necessarily the returns are not as full or as complete as they should be. We hope to remedy this in future reports.

#### WRECKS.

The Board is pleased to report that during the year just closed no serious wreck has occurred upon railroads in Iowa involving great loss of life or personal injury. Reports of accidents occurring upon railroads are made promptly to the Board by railroad companies and are kept on file for reference.

#### HIGHWAY AND FARM GROSSINGS.

For many years this Commission has requested clear and specific authority to determine what shall be a safe and adequate crossing by roadways, public and private, over railroads. The courts in this State have defined that under the present statute the legal crossing in Iowa is "an adequate grade crossing." This Board has endeavored, where it was believed it should be done in the interest of public safety, to compel the construction of over or under-grade crossings. Under this general rule of the courts, however, the Board has been defeated in its attempts to enforce its decisions, for the reason it was shown by testimony that "an adequate grade crossing" could be constructed in a reasonable place. This Board should have positive authority to order over or under crossings, public or private, whenever it is found that the public safety and convenience demands it.

The Commissioners have been confronted with a peculiar condition many times during the past few years, wherein railways have protested that certain highway crossings were unsafe and could not be made safe without a relocation of the highways where they crossed the railways. In most of these cases the Commissioners have been able to induce the county board of supervisors to change the highway in order that a safe crossing might be made. Of course, the Board could have no jurisdiction to compel county supervisors to relocate highways, but it is suggested that in the interests of public safety the laws relating to highways should be so amended that this peculiar condition could be taken care of by some properly constituted public authority, without the necessity of court procedure. It should not be necessary for a railway company to appeal to the courts to protect it against county supervisors who were insisting upon a crossing at a dangerous location, when by a slight change in the highway a safe and adequate crossing might be established.

#### RAILROADS CROSSING EACH OTHER.

The Board begs leave again to refer to this subject as touched upon in its Thirty-first Annual Report:

"There is considerable doubt in the minds of the members of the Board what authority it may have to determine the method and manner of one railroad crossing another. Section 2063 of the Code provides that the court shall determine the proper method where one railway company

desires to cross with its tracks those of another at grade. There seems to be no statute granting any specific authority to any tribunal, unless it be the general statute creating the Board of Railroad Commissioners and giving such Board general supervision over railways, etc., to determine the question of crossing one railroad by another, overhead or undergrade. This Board should have specific authority in all cases to determine the proper method and manner of crossing one railroad by another, under all circumstances and conditions."

#### DRAINAGE.

The question of proper drainage for farm lands, city property and public highways, wherever such drainage is obstructed or alleged to be obstructed by railway companies' construction, is one that is frequently brought to the attention of the Board, and while, in a general way, the Commission has assumed some jurisdiction in such cases, the Board believes that its powers and duties in reference to this subject should be made clear by legislative enactment. This does not refer, of course, to the question of county ditches or drainage canals but to purely local conditions which have not specifically been provided for by statute.

#### TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE.

The Board would recommend that the Railroad Commission be empowered to regulate telegraph and telephone companies, inserts as their service, rates and charges are concerned. These public util ities are in no sense local, except telephone exchanges within town limits, and at present there is no state authority over them, relating to service or charges.

# SPEED OF STOCK TRAINS.

Chapter 115 of the Laws of the Thirty-second General Assembly provides:

"That it is hereby made the duty of all common carriers of freight within this state to move cars of live stock at the highest practicable speed consistent with reasonable safety, and the reasonable movement of its general traffic."

Section 2 of this Act provides that:

"In order to enforce the duty prescribed in section one, the board of Railroad Commissioners shall immediately and from time to time investigate the practice of the common carriers with respect to the movement of live stock; and if it ascertains at any time that the common carriers or any of them are not moving cars of live stock with the proper speed, then upon notice to any such common carrier or carriers, the said board shall prescribe the speed at which and the conditions under which cars of live stock shall be moved within this state by any such carrier or carriers. \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

Under the provisions of this law the members of this Board have from time to time inquired of shippers whether they were experiencing any difficulty in having live stock moved promptly within the State. Up to this time no such complaint has been made and the Board has not found that there has been any occasion for complaint in respect to the movement of live stock from point to point within the State.

#### PROTECTING HOME INDUSTRIES.

The complexities involved in the making of intrastate freight rates make the subject an exceedingly difficult one. It will be remembered that selfishness has not been eliminated from the business world. A superficial investigation of intrastate rate making might lead one to believe that frequently the interests of different classes of business conflict.

Many shippers of live stock, grain, etc., desire an exceedingly low interstate rate in order to earry the products of Iowa to the great distributing markets on the lake and seaboard. Many of those engaged in manufacturing industries desire a low interstate rate on the raw material to be shipped from outside the state, and a high interstate rate on the manufactured product in order to keep their competitors out of the territory of Iowa.

Many of those interested in the coal mines of Iowa and in their operation believe that Iowa coal interests require a high interstate rate in order to protect them from the competition of coal mined in Illinois and other states.

An application was made to this Commission, requesting a revision of the intrastate rates on grain and flour. Many shippers objected to this because of certain interstate rate features connected with these products, and before the case could be heard it was practically withdrawn.

The above instances are cited merely to show that the problem of making rates which will be perfectly satisfactory to all parties in interest upon the principle which governs in Iowa, is a very difficult one. The first principle which ought to be adopted by an Iowa rate making body and which ought to be and always has been in the mind of this Commission in every rate adjustment, is that every Iowa industry should be protected to the utmost limit of the power of this board. The Commission believes that if the doctrine of protecting home industries is good for the nation, it is good for the state. Every manufacturing interest in Iowa should be fostered and encouraged and Iowa shippers should not be placed, in any respect whatsoever, to any disadvantage as compared with a shipper who lives outside the state. If this principle be correct, and we believe it is, this board should use its power and its influence in building up home industries to the end that the raw material produced in Iowa should be manufactured at home, thus giving employment to Iowa labor and investment for Iowa capital.

As an illustration of our theory we have constantly contended that it was wise to foster and encourage packing houses all over the state. In order to do this there should be an exceedingly low intrastate rate on live stock, especially hogs. We believe that wisdom requires the rate making power of this Commission to be so used as to enable packing houses to slaughter the hogs of Iowa at home and ship the manufactured product. In order to accomplish this purpose we have been less interested in the interstate rate on hogs than in the intrastate rate. It is much more important, in order to maintain packing houses in Iowa, that the freight rate within the state for short distances be a low one, than it is to have the interstate rate so low that it will result in taking the hogs raised in this state to Chicago and other distributing centers for packing purposes. This theory is simply in perfect harmony with the doctrine of protecting home industries which undoubtedly reflects the thought and belief of a large majority of the people of Iowa. We believe in extending this theory still further to the encouragement of manufacturing enterprises throughout the state of Iowa.

It is the opinion of this board that if the rigidity of the Iowa Distance Tariff could be lessened to some extent and it was given flexibility at the discretion of the Board in many instances industries could be fostered in this state which would tend greatly to upbuild, without any injury whatever to those which already exist or to the people of Iowa.

#### DEMURRAGE.

The Commission begs leave to report that the committee appointed by the National Association of Railroad Commissioners, upon which committee this Board was represented by one of its members, reported a uniform set of demurrage rules to the National Association meeting in Washington in November, which report was adopted by the convention. These rules will undoubtedly be promulgated in the various states by railroad commissions and by the railroad companies for interstate business, and the Board believes that many of the perplexing problems that have arisen because of conflict of rules and misunderstanding of conditions will thereby be solved. The Commissioners believe these rules in their application will be found of benefit to shipper and carrier alike, and are vastly superior to anything in effect at the present time. It may be that in actual practice it will be necessary from time to time to slightly amend these rules, but with an understanding of uniformity when such amendment is made, it will affect all alike.

The proposed rules are herewith printed in full:

#### RULE I.

#### CARS SUBJECT TO RULES,

Cars held for or by consignors or consignees for loading, unloading, forwarding directions, or for any other purpose, are subject to these demurrage rules, except as follows:

- (a) Cars loaded with live stock.
- (b) Empty cars placed for loading coal at mines or mine sidings, or coke at coke ovens.
- (c) Empty private cars stored on carrier's or private tracks, provided such cars have not been placed or tendered for loading on the orders of a shipper.

Note.—Private cars while in railroad service, whether on carrier's or private tracks, are subject to these demurrage rules to the same extent as cars of railroad ownership.

(Empty private cars are in railroad service from the time they are placed by the carrier for loading or tendered for loading on the orders of a shipper. Private cars under lading are in railroad service until the lading is removed and cars are regularly released. Cars which belong to an industry performing its own switching service are in railroad service from the time they are placed by the industry upon designated interthange tracks and thereby tendered to the carrier for movement. If such

cars are subsequently returned empty they are out of service when withdrawn by the industry from the interchange; if returned under load, railroad service is not at an end until the lading is duly removed.)

#### RULE II.

# FREE TIME ALLOWED.

- (a) Forty-eight hours (two days) free time will be allowed for loading or unloading on all commodities.
  - (b) Twenty-four hours (one day) free time will be allowed.
  - 1. When cars are held for reconsignment or switching orders.
- 2. When cars destined for delivery to or for forwarding by a connecting line are held for surrender of bill of lading or for payment of lawful freight charges.
  - 3. When cars are held in transit and placed for inspection or grading.
- (c) Cars containing freight for trans-shipment to vessel will be allowed such free time at the ports as may be provided in the tariffs of the carriers.

#### RULE III.

# COMPUTING TIME.

Note.—In computing time Sundays and legal holidays (national, state, and municipal) will be excluded. When a legal holiday falls on a Sunday, the following Monday will be excluded.

- (a) On cars held for loading, time will be computed from the first7 a. m. after placement on public-delivery tracks.
- (b) On cars held for orders, time will be computed from the first 7 a.m. after the day on which notice of arrival is sent to consignee. On cars held for unloading, time will be computed from the first 7 a.m. after placement on public-delivery tracks and after the day on which notice of arrival is sent to consignee.
- (c) On cars containing freight in bond, time will be computed from the first 7 a.m. after permit to receive goods is issued to consignees by United States collector of customs.
- (d) On cars containing freight subject to state inspection, time will be computed from the first 7 a.m. after inspection by state officials.
- (e) On cars to be delivered on any other than public-delivery tracks time will be computed from the first 7 a. m. after actual or constructive placement on such tracks. See rule 4 (Notification) and rules 5 and 6 (Constructive placement).
- (f) On cars to be delivered on interchange tracks of industrial plants performing their own switching service, time will be computed from the first 7 a.m. following actual or constructive placement on such inter-

change tracks until return thereto. See rule 4 (Notification) and rules 5 and 6 (Constructive placement.) Cars returned loaded will not be recorded released until necessary billing instructions are given.

#### RULE IV.

#### NOTIFICATION.

- (a) Consignee shall be notified by carrier's agent in writing or as otherwise agreed to by carrier and consignee, within twenty-four hours after arrival of cars and billing at destination, such notice to contain point of shipment, car initials and numbers, and the contents, and, if transferred in transit, the initials and number of the original car. In case car is not placed on public-delivery track within twenty-four hours after notice of arrival has been sent, a notice of placement shall be given to consignee.
- (b) When cars are ordered stopped in transit the party ordering the cars stopped shall be notified upon arrival of cars at point of stoppage.
- (c) Delivery of cars upon private or industrial interchange tracks, or written notice to consignee of readiness to so deliver, will constitute notification thereof to consignee.

#### RULE V.

#### PLACING CARS FOR UNLOADING.

- (a) When delivery of cars consigned or ordered to private or industrial interchange tracks can not be made, on account of the act or neglect of the consignee or the inability of consignee to receive, delivery will be considered to have been made when the cars were tendered. The carrier's agent must give the consignee written notice of all cars he has been unable to deliver because of the condition of the private or interchange tracks or because of other conditions attributable to consignee. This will be considered constructive placement. See rule 4 (Notification).
- (b) When delivery can not be made on specially designated publicdelivery tracks, on account of such tracks being fully occupied, or from other cause beyond the control of the carrier, the delivery will be made at the nearest available point accessible to the consignee and the consignee so notified.

#### RULE VI.

#### CARS FOR LOADING.

(a) Cars for loading will be considered placed when such cars are actually placed or held on orders of the consignor. In the latter case

the agent must give the consignor written notice of all cars which he has been unable to place because of condition of the private track or because of other conditions attributable to the consignor. This will be considered constructive placement.

(b) When empty cars, placed for loading on orders, are not used, demurrage will be charged from the first 7 a. m. after placing or tender until released, with no time allowance.

#### RULE VII.

#### DEMURRAGE CHARGE.

After the expiration of the free time allowed, a charge of \$1 per car per day, or fraction of a day, will be made until car is released.

#### RULE VIII.

#### CLAIMS.

No demurrage charges shall be assessed under these rules for detention of cars through causes named below. If, through error, demurrage charges are assessed or collected under such conditions, they shall be promptly canceled or refunded by the carrier.

#### CAUSES.

#### (a) Weather interference.

- When the condition of the weather during the prescribed free time is such as to make it impossible to employ men or teams in loading or unloading, or impossible to place freight in ears, or to move it from ears, without serious injury to the freight.
- When shipments are frozen so as to prevent unloading during the prescribed free time, or when, because of high water or snowdrifts, it is impossible to get to cars for loading or unloading during the prescribed free time.

# (b) Bunching.

- 1. Cars for loading.—When, by reason of delay or irregularity of the carrier in filling orders, cars are bunched and placed for loading in accumulated numbers in excess of daily orders, the shipper shall be allowed such free time for loading as he would have been entitled to had the cars been placed for loading as ordered.
- 2. Cars for unloading or reconsigning.—When, as a direct result of the act or neglect of carriers, cars destined for one consignee, at one point, and transported via the same route, are bunched in transit and delivered in accumulated numbers in excess of daily shipments, claim to be presented to the carrier's agent before the expiration of the free time, the consignee shall be allowed such free time as he would have been en-

titled to had the cars been delivered in accordance with the daily rate of shipment.

#### (c) Demand of overcharge.

When the carrier's agent demands the payment of transportation charges in excess of tariff authority.

#### (d) Delayed or improper notice by carrier.

Note.—When notice has been given in substantial compliance with the requirements as specified by the rules, the consignee shall not thereafter have the right to call in question the sufficiency of such notice unless within twenty-four hours after receiving the same he shall serve upon the delivering carrier a full written statement of his objections to the sufficiency of said notice.

#### (e) Railroad errors or omissions.

#### RULE IX.

#### AVERAGE AGREEMENT.

When a shipper or receiver enters into the following agreement, the charge for detention to cars, provided for by rule 7, on all cars held for loading or unloading by such shipper or receiver shall be computed on the basis of the average time of detention to all such cars during each calendar month, such average detention to be computed as follows:

- (a) A credit of one day will be allowed for each car released within the first twenty-four hours of free time. A debit of one day will be charged for each twenty-four hours or fraction thereof that a car is detained beyond the first forty-eight hours of free time. In no case shall more than one day's credit be allowed on any one car, and in no case 'shall more than seven (7) days' credits be applied in cancellation of debits accruing on any one car.
- (b) At the end of the calendar month the total number of days credited will be deducted from the total number of days debited, and \$1 per day charged for the remainder. If the credits equal or exceed the debits, no charge will be made for the detention of the cars, and no payment will be made to shippers or receivers on account of such excess of credits, nor shall the credits in excess of the debits of any one month be used to offset the debits of any other month.
- (c) Credits earned on cars belonging to one class of equipment shall not be used in offsetting debits accruing on cars belonging to a different class of equipment. For the purpose of applying this provision, cars shall be deemed to consist of two classes: (1) Box cars, including refrigerator cars; (2) freight cars of all other descriptions.
- (d) A shipper or receiver who elects to take advantage of this average agreement shall not be entitled to cancellation or refund of demurrage charges under sections (a) and (b) of rule 8.

# (e) A shipper or receiver who elects to take advantage of this average agreement may be required to give sufficient security to the carrier for the payment of balances against him at the end of each month.

#### LONG AND SHORT HAUL CLAUSE.

There has been considerable objection by business interests of the State to the so-ealled "long and short haul clause" of the Iowa railway statute (Section 2126, Code). The legislature has made some attempts to so amend this section of the law as to enable this Board to permit the making of rates by earriers which are prohibited by section noted, under such conditions as to prevent any unjust discrimination. Owing to the peculiar situation of Iowa in the general rate structures of the country, many conditions arise which demand an adjustment of rates within the State to meet conditions over which the State authorities have no control. Where these adjustments can be made without disturbing the general rate structure within Iowa, the Board, after investigation, should have authority to permit the railway companies to do so. It is probable that Sections 2145, et seq. would have to be considered in any such amended statute, but the Commissioners believe this could be taken care of without detriment to carriers and certainly to the advantage of the shipping public in Iowa. The Board respectfully suggests that this should be considered by the next general assembly.

#### FREIGHT RATES IN IOWA.

The records of this Board will show that for years it has been lowering rates within Iowa. This has not always been done by changing the rate schedules themselves, but has been accomplished by changing commodities from a higher to a lower class in the Classification of Freights. In practically every case presented to the Board the request has not been so much that the rates be lowered upon any given commodity, but the lowering of the rate has been asked incidentally because of the rate on some other similar commodity, or because of some other conditions, a lowering was necessary in order to equalize rates. The Commissioners have tried conscientiously in all rate cases that have been brought to their attention to so adjust rates as to equalize the conditions. They believe this to be more important than constant reductions, although wherever they have believed that rates have been too high they have promptly ordered a proper readjustment of the schedules.

There are many conditions to be considered with reference to railroad operations within Iowa other than rates. Attention should be given to a careful examination of railway lines, roadbed, bridges, buildings and equipment, in order that the public should receive the safest and best service it is possible to give. This should be paramount to everything else and this Commission hopes that some provision may be made by the legislature in order that these physical conditions may be carefully investigated in Iowa, to the end that Iowa shall stand pre-eminent as a State where the first consideration is given safety of public travel and superior service in all departments of railroading.

#### EXPRESS RATES.

There is no subject concerning transportation which is engrossing the close attention of more thinking men today than the complex proposition of the proper regulation of express companies and the determination of the rates they should charge. This Board has tried faithfully to get all the information available upon this subject but has had no funds with which to conduct any original research and has been compelled to receive such testimony as has been introduced in open hearing and act upon it as best it might. The Board is not entirely satisfied with its present schedule of express rates which is in use in the State of Iowa, and is still investigating the subject with a view of determining what the reasonable and just charge shall be for transportation by express locally within this

State. Many other states, as well as the national government, are attempting to deal with this proposition, and the experience of the Iowa Commission seems to be the experience of all commissions. This Board hopes to profit by the exhaustive investigations other state commissions are making at great expense, but can not help believing that the State of Iowa should be a pioneer in this work, even though it should require a large sum of money to carry it on-

# INDUSTRY RATES.

The Commission begs leave to repeat what it said last year upon this subject:

"The board believes this commission should have authority to extend the so-called "switching zone" in cities and towns in order that industries located within a few miles of the station might have the advantage of a lower or switching rate into such city or town eliminating the mileage rates prescribed by the board for the distance it is necessary to haul the freight. The establishment of such switching rates could not act as a discrimination, and the exigencies of commerce, under these conditions, demand an adjustment of rates on this basis. Within a few miles of many of the towns in Iowa are located important and growing industries of various kinds, all virtually located within the town (in many instances actually within the boundary limits), but outside of what is technically termed switching or yard limits. This situation is often made necessary by reason of the location of the raw material required for such industries The board should be given authority to extend the switching limits to include such industries."

# EXPENSE OF IOWA RAILROAD COMMISSION.

It is perhaps not generally known that the Iowa Railroad Commission costs the people of the State less money than the railroad commission of any other state in the union having equal authority or doing anything near the amount of work. Aside from the salary of the Commissioners and the secretary and the cost of printing and binding and office supplies, the Board expends approximately \$6,000.00 a year for all clerk hire, traveling and other expenses. Despite the handicap of lack of funds a tariff department is maintained where all tariffs on all railroads entering Iowa, wherein any Iowa station is affected, are now on file for ready reference. The most complete satistical tables published by any railroad commission situated similarly are reported annually, and hundreds of complaints covering every conceivable feature of railroad operation, are handled with as great a degree of promptness as is possible under the circumstances.

The Commission has been absolutely prohibited from making any initiative or original investigations into a great many subjects that it has had a desire to take up. Five thousand dollars was appropriated in 1907 for freight rate investigation. Except for a complete revision of Iowa Classification of Freights, the amount appropriated was utterly inadequate to enable the Board to do any original research, and it has been found absolutely necessary to expend a large portion of this appropriation in employing clerks to tabulate rates and file tariffs.

One of our neighbor states, within the past three or four years, has expended more than \$125,000,00 in making original investigation into the local freight earnings upon two lines of railroad, covering but the average months of the year. This investigation is not yet completed. The disputed rates are still in the courts and the local rates today in that state are very much higher than the Iowa maximum rates as fixed by this Board.

With reference to express rates the same state has a force of men at work in New York City examining the express business insofar as that particular state is concerned, which is costing approximately \$18,000.00.

At an enormous expense, nearly \$100,000, another state has attempted a physical valuation of its railroads. Another neighbor state is conducting general researches at great expense along the line of determining the revenues derived from local business of railways and the cost incident thereto.

The State of Iowa was the pioneer in fixing rates within state limits. For twenty years and more the people of the State have been enjoying much lower local rates than any state adjoining. The Board believes the time has come when the State of Iowa should not be backward in thorough investigation of local conditons and that this Board should be furnished authority and funds with which to make careful research into railroad and express conditions with a view of determining what the just and reasonable charges should be for the services performed locally within Iowa. The funds provided should be amply sufficient in amount. It will be no small task to attempt anything like a thorough investigation when it is remembered that there are more than 10,000 miles of steam and electric railway within Iowa; and that the express business is very complicated and very little understood by any supervising authority in the United States.

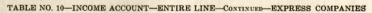

The complainant, together with a large number of manufacturing and other industries, by their proper officers, and citizens of Waterloo, Iowa, corporations and citizens of Cedar Falls, Iowa, corporations and citizens of Marshalltown, Iowa, the Commercial Club of Des Moines, Iowa, by Geis Botsford, its Secretary, citizens of Dewar, Iowa, citizens of Dunkerton, Iowa, citizens of Reinbeck, Iowa, and citizens of Green Mountain, Iowa, join in a petition to the Railroad Commission, praying that an order be entered by this Board requiring the Chicago Great Western Railway Company and the receivers thereof to increase its train service by continuing the train of the said Chicago Great Western Railway Company, which now runs from Marshalltown to Des Moines and return and known as Trains Numbers Seven and Eight, from Marshalltown to Oelwein and return, and the citizens of Cedar Falls in addition to said prayer, ask that said railway company be ordered to meet each of said trains at Wilson Junction with the trains now operating between Wilson Junction and Cedar Falls.

A hearing was fixed on said application at the office of the Commissioners at Des Moines, Iowa, on the 18th day of January, 1909, at 2 o'clock P, M.

At said hearing a large number of complainants were present, including B. F. Swisher, representing the citizens of Waterloo, F. E. Cutler, representing the Commercial Club of Waterloo, Geo. E. Rowell, representing the citizens of Waterloo, Senator Van Law, C. H. Smith, O. L. Ingledue, F. R. Benedict and E. R. Lay, representing the citizens of Marshalltown, President H. H. Seerly and Senator Wise, representing the citizens of Cedar Falls, Hon. Sherman DeWolfe, representing the citizens of Reinbeck, Senator Clausen, W. J. Lynch and B. J. Nichol, for the citizens of Green Mountain, Geis Botsford, Secretary of the Commercial Club of Des Moines, and other parties interested on the part of the complainants.

The defendant appeared by L. S. Cass, Third Vice-President of said railway company, George H. Carr, attorney for said railway company and L. M. Shipley, Division Superintendent of said railway company.

After hearing the representations of the parties and being fully advised as to the present conditions and train service given by said railway company on the line of railway and between the points involved in said application, the Board finds that said railway company and the Receivers thereof are not properly performing their duties as common carriers and are not rendering suitable, proper and adequate passenger train service to the territory involved in said complaint;

That adequate and proper passenger service to the public and the patrons of said railway requires that said railway company restore the operation of its train from Marshalltown to Oelwein and return by continuing the present train between said points, said train being the one now operated between Des Moines and Marshalltown and known as Numbers Seven and Eight.

The Board further finds that in the proper performance of its duty to the public, said railway company ought to run a train from Cedar Falls to Wilson Junction in connection with said trains Numbers Seven and Eight, so extended and continued as above set forth.

It is therefore ordered by the Board that the Chicago Great Western Railway Company and the receivers thereof, within ninety (90) days from this date, put into operation and maintain its passenger trains Numbers Seven and Eight from Marshalltown to Oelwein and return, by continuing and extending said trains now in operation between Des Moines and Marshalltown.

It is further ordered that within the time above fixed, said Chicago Great Western Railway Company and its receivers, shall run a trainbetween Cedar Falls and Wilson Junction, in connection with each of said trains Numbers Seven and Eight, so continued and maintained.

It is further ordered that said railway company and the receivers thereof, install as a part of the train which it now runs between Cedar Falls and Wilson Junction, and which is to be run under this order, a suitable, convenient and properly equipped passenger coach, and that the same be kept reasonably clean and properly warmed and lighted for the convenience of the passenger traffic.

# ORDER OF THE BOARD.

Be it remembered that heretofore there was filed with the Board of Railroad Commissioners the application of O. T. Denison as chairman of the Transportation Committee of the Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, J. S. Light, Secretary of the Citizens' Club of Carroll, the Iowa Muzzle Company of Carroll, and many other manufacturers and shippers, asking that this Board issue an order to the above named railway companies, requiring said railway companies to so unite and connect their tracks at Carroll, Iowa, as to permit the transfer of cars from the track of one to the other.

Thereafter it appears that the Chicago Great Western Railway Company has filed with the Board its offer in writing to join with the Chicago & North-Western Railway Company in the building of proper connecting tracks and to pay one-half the expenses thereof.

It further appears that each of the defendant railway companies has filed with said Board, blue prints showing proposed connecting tracks between said railway companies, which do not substantially differ.

Now on this 23rd day of March, 1909, the aforesaid application is taken up for consideration by the Board. The Board finds as matters of fact:

That the tracks of said railway companies parallel each other, as set forth in the application;

That there are no engineering difficulties in the way of track connections at said point;

That Carroll is a city of about 3,500 population;

That there are industries located on both of said lines of railway at Carroll;

That it would be a great convenience to shippers to have said tracks so connected that cars could be transferred from one track to the other.

It is therefore ordered, in accordance with Sections 2103 and 2113 of the Code, that said defendant railway companies which so parallel each other at Carroll as above stated, so unite and connect the tracks of said railway companies as to permit the transfer of cars from the tracks of one to the other.

That said track connections be made within ninety (90) days from this date and that service of notice of this order be made upon said defendant railway companies as provided by law.

# OPINION OF THE BOARD.

On the 24th day of December, 1908, there was filed in the office of the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Iowa, an application by Chas. E. Lyon, manager of the Des Moines Hard Mortar Company, for an order requiring the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company to perform its part of a contract by refunding money expended by the Des Moines Hard Mortar Company for straightening the track of said railway company along the property of said Hard Mortar Company.

Hearing of said complaint was set for Wednesday, March 23, 1909, at 10 A. M., in the office of the Board of Railroad Commissioners.

Pursuant to notice, the Board met at its office in Des Moines, Iowa. All the members of the Board were present.

Chas. E. Lyon, manager, appeared for the complainant.

Carroll Wright, attorney, and A. W. Eberhart, Division Freight Agent, appeared for the defendant railway company.

The Board, after inspecting the premises in controversy and hearing the evidence, finds that there is no substantial ground for the complaint, that if there is any issue at all between the parties, which the Commissioners do not determine, the same is indefinite and upon a question of fact, and not within the jurisdiction of the Board, and by unanimous vote of the Commissioners the application is denied.

Now on this sixth day of April, A. D. 1909, the application of the City of Des Moines being this day presented to the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Iowa, requesting said Board to view officially the site of a proposed viaduct and approaches thereto along and upon Seventh Street, West Des Moines, Iowa, and to determine said viaduct to be necessary for the public safety and convenience, and also asking of said board that it endorse its approval on the plans and specifications accompanying said application; and said board having examined said application and the exhibits attached thereto finds:

That on the 22d day of March, 1909, the City Council of the City of Des Moines, Iowa, passed an Ordinance No. 1578, declaring the necessity for the construction and maintenance of a viaduct and approaches thereto along and upon West Seventh Street, Des Moines, Iowa, over and across all of the tracks of all railways and railroads crossing said Seventh Street between the south line of Mulberry Street and a point about four hundred (400) feet south of the south line of Elm Street, and signed by A. J. Mathis, Mayor of said city on the said 22nd day of March, 1909, and that said ordinance was duly and regularly passed and that the same was duly and legally published in the Register and Leader, a newspaper published at the City of Des Moines, Polk County, Iowa, on the 24th day of March, 1909.

It is Therefore Hereby Determined by the Railroad Commissioners of Iowa, That the public safety and convenience require the construction and maintenance of a viaduct and approaches thereto along and upon West Seventh Street, Des Moines, Iowa, over and across the tracks of The Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company, the Des Moines and Fort Dodge Railroad Company, the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company, and the Des Moines Union Railway Company. Transfer track connections at Mason City, Iowa.

Application filed March 19, 1909.

## DECISION.

On March 19, 1909, the North Iowa Brick & Tile Company of Mason City, Iowa, filed in the office of the Board of Railroad Commissioners its application, asking an order of the Board requiring direct transfer track connection between the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company and the Chicago & North Western Railway Company at Mason City, Iowa, in order to better facilitate the transfer of carload freight from one of said roads to the other and for the more especial purpose of accommodating a traffic which will be noticed hereinafter in more detail.

After due and timely service of notice on all parties, on May 14, 1909, Chairman D. J. Palmer and Commissioner N. S. Ketchum viewed the premises and held a hearing at Mason City, Iowa.

R. Valentine, Secretary of the North Iowa Brick & Tile Company appeared for applicant. . Geo. W. Winter, L. W. Denison and F. S. Keeler also appeared in the interests of shippers of Mason City.

J. H. Foster, General Superintendent, W. W. Collins, Division Superintendent, A. D. Emery, Engineer and W. F. Cody, Division Freight and Passenger Agent, appeared for the respondent, the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company. The respondent, Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company was not represented at the view or hearing and said respondent has filed no objections to the granting of applicant's petition.

The objection made by the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company that public interest does not require a direct track connection between the tracks of the respondent companies herein, is not supported by the facts and merely to set out the facts in the instant case will obviate the necessity of nicely defining what is to be understood by public interest or public necessity.

The brick and tile plants of the North Iowa Brick & Tile Company, the American Brick & Tile Company and the Farmers Brick & Tile Works are located upon and along the line of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company and are not reached by the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, except by a switching arrangement through the yards and tracks of and by the Chicago Great Western Railway Company. For this switching service a charge of two dollars per car is made.

The evidence shows that a large number of cars are daily required to be transferred to and from the tracks of the respondent companies and that incident to this indirect switching movement through the yards and by the Chicago Great Western Railway Company much delay is occasioned. It is true that the charge of two dollars per car for switching cars from the tracks of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company to the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company. through the yards of the Chicago Great Western Railway Company is absorbed by the carrier in cases where the revenue on such cars so transferred amounts to fifteen dollars or more; but the Board finds a considerable shipment of brick and tile from applicant's and other plants located upon the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway where the revenue per car is less than fifteen dollars, in which case the switching charge of two dollars per car must be borne by the shipper, and this charge is, in its business effect, a discriminating burden upon the applicant herein inasmuch as there are other brick and tile plants having location upon the tracks of both the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company and the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, thus being able to make shipments of brick and tile to points on either line of railroad without having to pay for a switching service.

The further objection to granting an order on the application herein,—in substance that the intersection or junction of the tracks of the respondent companies at Mason City, Iowa, is a right angle crossing and protected by interlocking,—does not seem to the Board of sufficient weight to warrant a denial of the applicant's petition. While it may be true

that the construction of a transfer track at this right angle crossing will cost considerably more than a like track at a point where the lines of roads are parallel and that additional expense of construction and of operation will be necessary on account of interlocking, it is yet true that the use and necessity for the proposed transfer track must be given due consideration in determining what is just and reasonable and in this case the Board finds the approximate cost of constructing a transfer track at the point in question to be not unreasonable or forbidding and that such track will afford a facility fully commensurate with its cost.

On examination of the map, made and filed herein by the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company, showing survey of possible connection between the tracks of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company and the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company at Mason City, Iowa, it is clear that a transfer track may be constructed and maintained at a reasosable cost at about the junction of the tracks of the respondent companies.

It is therefore ordered by the Board of Railroad Commissioners that the respondents, the Chicago, Milwaukee & Saint Paul Railway Company, and the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, within ninety days from date, construct, maintain and operate a transfer track at Mason City, Iowa, as prayed by the petition herein.

### DECISION OF THE BOARD.

Be it Remembered, That on the 6th day of April, 1909, the above named Fort Dodge, Des Moines and Southern Railroad Company filed with this Board its application praying for an order of the Board granting it permission and authority to cross at grade the Illinois Central line of road, as more particularly set forth in the application, in which said railroad company alleges, among other things, that the Illinois Central Railroad Company has refused to permit it to cross its said line of railroad at the point desired, or at any other practical point at or near said contemplated point of crossing, or otherwise, and that there is a great and growing demand on the part of the public for the extension of its line as set forth in said application from Fort Dodge Iowa, to Gypsum, Iowa.

The Illinois Central Railroad Company resists said application in writing, and sets forth the following among other grounds for the said resistance:

1. The Board of Commissioners is wholly without jurisdiction to

grant the order prayed for in the application, or to entertain said application for reasons therein stated.

- 2. It is not necessary that the applicant in order to accomplish its purpose, cross the line occupied by the said Illinois Central Railroad Company, but said applicant may extend its line from a point on its present line south of the objector's track without crossing the line of this objector, and this route is more direct than that proposed by the applicant.
- 3. The crossing proposed by the applicant would greatly impede the traffic and travel upon the line of the objector, and the establishment thereof would be to the great detriment, damage and inconvenience of the objector.

Thereupon a time was fixed, to-wit: Thursday, May 13, 1909, for the Board to view the premises in the above entitled controversy and hear testimony offered by interested parties.

Thereupon at the time fixed, to-wit: Thursday, May 13, 1909, after having given due notice to the parties interested, the Board met on the premises to view the same and hear testimony from the interested parties The following members of the Board were present: D. J. Palmer, Chairman, and N. S. Ketchum.

The applicant appeared by J. L. Blake, General Manager, Homer Loring, President, and S. R. Dyer, General Counsel. S. J. Bennett, Mayor of the City of Fort Dodge, T. F. Breen, Charles L. Larrabee, J. J. Ryan, John B. Butler, Frank Collins, A. D. McQuilking and S. F. Ford also appeared in behalf of the manufacturers and citizens of Fort Dodge.

The respondent railroad company was represented by D. M. Kelleher, attorney, E. J. Steinbeck, assistant engineer, H. B. Hamals, division engineer, and H. Gillias, road master.

After viewing the premises and hearing the statements of the parties interested, the Board announced it would later fix a date at Des Moines for hearing arguments in the case, and thereafter fixed Thursday, May 20, 1909, and gave due notice thereof to all the parties interested.

Now, on this 20th day of May, 1909, the parties interested appear, the applicant by J. L. Blake, General Manager, and S. R. Dyer, General Counsel, and the objector appears by D. M. Kelleher, its attorney, E. J. Steinbeck, assistant engineer, et al., and the parties thereupon present their arguments on behalf of both applicant and objector and introduce their testimony, and said controversy is taken under advisement by the Board.

After being duly advised in the premises and considering both arguments and testimony, the Board finds the following:

- 1. The Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern Railroad Company is an interurban railroad and has already in operation an interurban line from the City of Fort Dodge, Iowa, to a point north of the proposed crossing to within about a quarter of a mile of the Illinois Central track.
- 2. The Illinois Central Railroad is a trunk line crossing the State from Chicago to Omaha, and operating about twenty-five trains per day over its line at or about the point sought to be crossed by the applicant.

- 3. The point sought to be crossed by applicant is about one mile west from the village of Gypsum, and the track of the Illinois Central from said village of Gypsum to a point not less than 2,800 feet west of the point sought to be crossed is substantially on a level and the contour of the land between said points is substantially level.
- 4. At the point where the applicant now operates its interurban line as above described, there is a gypsum plant in operation, also other plants of the same character immediately south of the track of the objector, and other plants of like character along the line which the applicant seeks to build to the town of Gypsum, and the country thereabout is underlaid with the same gypsum deposits.
- 5. The operatives of said plants number many hundreds, and all of them generally live in Fort Dodge, which is four miles and more from the location thereof, and walk from Fort Dodge to their work and back except as they can now use the line of the applicant already in operation, and the proposed line if constructed would be a great convenience to said operatives, as well as to the owners of said gypsum plants in the handling of freight.
- 6. The applicant offers, if allowed to cross at grade, to install at its own expense, of proper efficacy and modern design, an interlocking plant which applicant estimates would cost \$3,500, and the objector estimates at \$8,850, and the expense of crossing, exclusive of the interlocking plant, is estimated as not to exceed \$8,000.
- 7. The Board finds that at a point about 2,800 feet west of the desired crossing there is a gulch or ravine under which it would be possible to carry the road of the applicant at an expense of from \$40,000 to \$45,000, but the Board expressly finds that the same would not be at all practical or feasible.
- 8. At a point about one mile west of the desired crossing the applicant's line crosses under the tracks of the Illinois Central Railroad Company in going from Des Moines to Fort Dodge, and the Board finds that it would be possible for the applicant to connect with its road on the south side of the Illinois Central railroad track at said point by a very heavy fill and a deep cut and the building of a line from said point to the point it desires to reach immediately south of the line it now has in operation within about a quarter of a mile of the Illinois Central track, and requiring the building of a track about 7,900 feet in length.

The Board further finds in this connection that if such track be built the line already in operation from Fort Dodge to a point near the desired crossing could not be utilized as a link in the proposed line of the applicant and would be no part of said proposed line.

9. That an overhead crossing at the point desired by the objector would require a 3.5 per cent grade and an expense for its construction of about \$22,600.

That a subway at a point about half a mile west of the required crossing would require 8,400 feet of track and an expense of about \$43,700.

That utilizing the under-crossing already in use and constructing a line

south of the Illinois Central tracks would require the construction of a track about 7,900 feet and at a 2 per cent grade would require an expense of \$23,300, and at 115 per cent an expense of \$31,000.

That a requirement that the complainant should build a line known as a subway line or utilize its present under-crossing and build a line south of the Illinois Central tracks without utilizing its present four miles or more of road from Fort Dodge to near the point of its desired crossing, would be prohibitive. This finding, however, is based expressly upon the statements of the officers of the applicant which were made at the hearing and treated as evidence.

We reach the following conclusions of law as applicable to the facts as above found by the Commission:

### JURISDICTION.

1. The right of one railway to cross another, either at grade, over or under the same, is specifically defined by Section 2020 of the Code, and its construction is made upon two conditions, to-wit:

1st. The desired crossing must be necessary.

2d. The junior railroad company shall so construct its crossing as not to unnecessarily impede the traffic, travel, transportation or navigation on the railroad so crossed.

Section 2033-B, Code Supplement, in substance removes all distinctions between railways and provides that interurban railways shall be treated in all respects the same as other railways, and there is no distinction between "industrial railways," so called, and ordinary railways so far as this case is concerned.

No specific procedure is provided for in our Code for the enforcement of the rights and privileges granted by the section above quoted, but the uniform holding of courts lead to the fact that Courts of Equity have jurisdiction in the premises.

Generally speaking, the railroad commission has no power to enforce its own orders. This can only be done by using such machinery of the courts as is provided by statute.

In our opinion, the general powers given to the Board by Section 2113 to supervise the enforcement of statutes generally relating to railroads, give to it the same jurisdiction in the matter in controversy that it has as to all general statutes where specific powers are not clearly defined.

It is our conclusion of law that this Board has jurisdiction to make findings of fact upon all questions involved in Section 2020 above cited, together with such recommendations as it may deem proper based upon such findings, providing, however, that the recommendation or order of the Board will not enforce itself but can only be the basis of a proper proceeding before the court for its enforcement like other orders of a similar character.

2. It is unfortunate that this Board is not clearly vested with power upon the subject of railroad crossings, including not only cases where one railroad crosses another, but highway and farm crossings as well, to

the end that it may use its power in proper cases in the elimination of grade crossings, which are always a danger and a menace, but our Supreme Court has in numerous cases shown great favor to the grade crossing for reasons which were much more weighty twenty years ago than now, and there is at least an analogy between farm and highway crossings and railroads crossing each other.

Sections 2061-2-3 of the Code provide a method of compelling the installment of interlocking devices, and provide that the procedure shall be in court of equity, and Section 2063, by implication at least, grants the right of one railroad to cross another at grade providing such interlocking devices be used "as may be required to secure public safety and the preservation of the properties of the road," and the court shall prescribe the terms upon which said crossing shall be maintained after made.

We do not hold that the decisions of our courts providing that "the grade crossing is the rule in Iowa," as to farm crossings, should control the action of the Board in this controversy, yet they are worthy of mention in this connection.

3. We concede to be true the contention of the objector that this Board must find as a jurisdictional fact that the desired crossing is "necessary." The precise question at issue is what is the proper definition of the word "necessary" as found in the statute above cited.

The word without qualification is, to say the least, an unfortunate one. It could not have been the legislative intent to give to this word the meaning which is given by the dictionary.

Where the word stands alone and without qualification, it has uniformly been held, so far as we have been able to find, to mean "reasonably necessary."

We are not disposed to give to it the narrow, technical meaning claimed by counsel for the objector. To say that the word "necessary" in this statute is a synonym for "possible," could not have been the legislative intent.

Giving this word "necessary" the meaning of "reasonably necessary" we pursue the inquiry as to whether or not the facts in this case bring the applicant within the meaning of Section 2020.

4. It will be admitted that ordinarily when one railroad desires to cross another it is for the purpose of reaching territory for freight and traffic and thus benefit the public and itself.

In the instant case it clearly, appears that several hundred laborers and coal operatives would be greatly benefitted by the service of the contemplated road; that the owners of several gypsum plants now in operation would have added freight privileges from its construction and that there is a possibility of other plants being established in the vicinity which would be tributary to this road and served by it, and for these reasons we conclude that the construction of the road would be a public benefit and its construction ought to be encouraged if it can be done without serious detriment to the objector.

- 5. The condition of the objector's track is an important element to be considered. (See Railway vs. Railway Co., 91 Iowa, 16.) In the instant case the Illinois Central track for a distance of one mile east to the town of Gypsum and more than half a mile west, according to the evidence, is level and there are no ascending or descending grades, and the land on each side of its track sought to be used by complainant is level, requiring no grades.
- 6. The question of expense is also of importance, although not a controlling factor. The evidence shows that the expense of a grade crossing would be \$11,275 according to the complainant, and \$16,605 according to the objector, and as against that an over-head crossing would require \$22,600, a subway crossing \$43,700, and the south line under-crossing from \$23,300 to \$31,000.
- 7. The question of additional expense is also interwoven with the question of grades.

It is the opinion of the Board that to require the complainant to build an over-head crossing and use a 3.5 per cent grade would be unreasonable, and a 2 per cent grade as required on the south line at the minimum expense is an unnecessarily heavy grade under the circumstances.

8. It is undobtedly the policy of the law that a railroad must have the privilege of selecting its own line, at least in a large degree. If the topography of the ground was such that at a reasonable distance on either side of the desired crossing, even at a very much greater expense, an under or an over crossing could be constructed upon reasonable grade, we believe that the complainant ought to be required to use said over or under crossing.

It is our opinion that the points designated by the objector are not within a reasonable distance to be used by the complainant and properly serve the public, which it desires to serve.

We have carefully examined the cases cited by both counsel, and are satisfied that these views are in harmony with them.

9. It is our opinion, further, that the construction of a modern interlocking device of proper efficacy if installed at a grade crossing in view of the conditions as they exist will not "unnecessarily impede the travel or transportation on the railway."

We, therefore, find and recommend that the complainant railroad be permitted to cross the railroad of the objector at grade at the point desired, on condition that the complainant construct, at its own expense, an interlocker which shall be approved by this Board, and that the complainant furnish to this Board complete plans, specifications, showing the kind, character and quality of the interlocking device which it purposes to establish at said crossing at its earliest convenience and before the same is installed.

Complaint filed December 17, 1907.

Decision rendered June 23, 1909.

This complaint was filed with the Board by Geo. C. Lawrence, attorney at law, Anamosa, Iowa, by the following letter:

"Mr. Lugar Sampica, residing about four miles northwest of Anamosa, and owning land on both sides of the Chicago, Anamosa and Northern Railroad, wished me to call your attention to a matter that is causing him some trouble, with the view of having you investigate same, and do whatever is necessary to remove the cause of the trouble.

"This road was built two or three years ago, and until the spring of the present year, Mr. Samplea had a satisfactory way under a trestle along said railroad to pass back and forth from his land lying on both sides of said railroad. Some time in the spring of the present year the officers of said railroad authorized a third party who does not own any land within 20 rods of said trestle, to build a driveway for stock, inside their right of way, leading from the land of said third party to and under said trestle, thereby intrefering with the way Mr. Sampica had formerly, and said fence is built in such a way as to prevent Mr. Sampica from going back and forth from and to his land, except by going in the bed of the creek. The creek bed is soft, and is filled with quick sand, and it is only occasionally that his cattle will go into same at all. The obstruction is quite serious, and is annoying to Mr. Sampica, and he wishes same removed. He will be pleased to have you do whatever is necessary to make right, what he considers a great wrong."

# Mr. J. Wunderlich, of the respondent railway, in answering this complaint, said:

"Yours of the 17th containing a copy of a letter from Atttorney Geo. Lawrence relative to complaint made by one Lugar Sampica received. This particular matter was tried in the last term of the Jones County District Court in a case entitled Sampica vs. Hart and decided at that term. So far as we are concerned the matter is closed, and no doubt Mr. Lawrence or the Clerk of Courts of this county can inform you fully as to details of that verdict, which as I understand it, was against Sampica."

Much correspondence passed between the Board, the complainant and the railway company, with reference to this complaint, but without result, and on May 5, 1909, after due notice, the Commissioners met the complainant in person, his attorney, Mr. Lawrence, and Mr. Paul Kiene, assistant treasurer, and J. L. Kelsey, general manager for the railway company, on the premises. The Board took considerable testimony, viewed the premises carefully and took the case under advisement.

# OPINION OF THE BOARD.

In regard to this case it appears that Mr. Sampica owns land on both sides of the railway; that the railroad was built some four or five years ago; that there is an adequate crossing under the railway tracks by bridge from one part of Mr. Sampica's land to the other; that this crossing was had by him from the time the railway was built until the spring of 1907, when it was obstructed by a fence, permitting one Hart, who is

the owner of land only on one side of the railway at that point, to use the right of way of the railway company and this undercrossing to enable him to get his stock to water.

It appears incidentally that there has been some litigation between Mr. Hart and Mr. Sampica in relation to this fence. No evidence has been introduced before the Commission, however, upon this subject. The Board has no means of determining the issues that were presented, if there were any, or the nature or character of judgment or decree, if any was rendered. The Commissioners cannot indulge in presumptions which are not based upon facts properly presented to the Board. There would be no mutuality if such litigation had been had and even if the Board had been furnished with légal proof of the issues, decree and facts upon which it was based. The railroad company was evidently not a party to the action, nor was this Commission.

The statute gives Mr. Sampica, under the above circumstances, the right to an adequate crossing at a place to be designated by himself. He has no other crossing. It does not appear that there is any reasonable point, other than the undercrossing above named, where an adequate crossing could be established. The railroad company makes no objection to the place of the crossing, or its character, or its adequacy. So far as this Board is concerned there are only two parties to the procedure, Mr. Sampica and the railway company. No issue is tendered by the railway company to the application of Mr. Sampica. The Board must determine it as though the railway company itself had erected the obstructing fence and had refused to grant a crossing to the owner of the land on both sides of its track, at the point where an adequate crossing was not only in actual use, and by the conduct of the parties recognized as such, but the only place where an adequate crossing could be constructed. The railway company owns the right of way where the fence has been erected. It is the duty of the railway company to furnish this adequate crossing and clear away all obstructions, if such exist.

It is therefore the order of the Board that the respondent Chicago, Anamosa and Northern Railway Company, within ninety (90) days from this date, provide the complainant in this case a suitable crossing from one part of his farm to the other, across said right of way under the bridge referred to herein, and that he have free and unobstructed use of the same.

Wires over Railroad Tracks.

Complaint field March 27, 1909.

The telephone company in this case requested a ruling of the Board on a proposition submitted in their letter, a copy of which follows:

"We enclose herewith photographs of a crossing at Ankeny on the Boone L-U. Ry., where we would like to cross under their high voltage wires, and we also enclose photo of crossings at the same town where our company, the Iowa, the Boone County and the W. U. Tel. Co. have all crossed the way we are asking to.

"The Boone L.-U. people have asked us to go over all their wires and we object to this as we believe it is too dangerous to life and property.

"For your information we are enclosing a letter from Mr. Walker of the Mutual Tel. Co., and one from Mr. Cunningham of the D. M. L.-U. Ry., which covers the question from both a Telephone and Inter-Urban point of view.

"We would be glad to have you kindly investigate this question and if there is any further information we can furnish kindly advise,"

The Commissioners carefully considered the question submitted and held as follows:

The only jurisdiction which this Board has on the subject of stringing wires is that relating to the manner of stringing them over railway tracks. In the opinion of the Commissioners they have nothing to do with the question as to whether low tension wires should go over or under high tension wires. All that the Board can do is to see that a line of wire when it crosses the railway track, is built in accordance with its rules as to height and construction. Feed or trolley wires for electric railways must be twenty-two (22) feet above top of the rails. The Board is only permitted to protect the railroad and not protect wires from each other, it has no jurisdiction over the subject presented in the letter of the telephone company.

Petition to Change Name of Station from Elkport to Garber.

Complaint filed October 19, 1908.

DECISION OF THE BOARD.

The town clerk of the town of Garber, under date of October 17, 1908, wrote the Board that the name of the incorporated town was Garber, that the name of the postoffice was changed from East Elkport to Garber on January 1, 1908, that the town of Elkport is one mile west of the railway station building, which is inside the corporate limits of the town of Garber, that the name of the railway station was Elkport and that the town council request the Board of Railroad Commissioners to compel the railway company to change the name of said station to Garber.

The railway company, in answering this complaint, stated that while it was true that the railroad station was located at Garber, the larger town of the two, Elkport, was located directly across the river and the people of Elkport opposed any change in the name of the station by which it had been known for a great many years; that the largest proportion of the freight and passenger traffic is to and from Elkport, that to change the name from Elkport to Garber would cause a good deal of confusion and that the company did not desire to make the change in name as requested.

On December 2, 1908, the town council of Elkport presented to the Commission a petition protesting against any change in the name of the station of Elkport to Garber, stating among other things that this station had been known as Elkport since its establishment, that to change the name would create a vast amount of confusion, that it would be an injustice to the people of Elkport, as their town limits were only slightly over a quarter of a mile from the depot known as Elkport, that the business men of Elkport furnished fully seven-eighths of all business done in Elkport and Garber and received fully seven-eighths of all freight that arrives at the station of Elkport, and that the Board carefully consider their protest in determining this case.

It was shown by the books of the company that the town of Elkport furnished considerably more business for the company than the town of Garber for the six months ending in December, 1908.

The Commissioners have carefully considered this question and have reached the conclusion that Section 2106 of the Code is mandatory upon the Board and it is therefore ordered that the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company shall, within thirty (30) days from the service of notice of this order, change the name of its station known as Elkport, in Clayton County, to Garber, to conform to the name of the incorporated town, within the limits of which said station is located.

HAWKEYE TELEPHONE COMPANY.

DECISION OF THE BOARD.

Complaint was made by the railway company that the Hawkeye Telephone Company was maintaining and operating a telephone line over and across the right of way of said railway company on West Grand Avenue or the extension thereof in the City of Des Moines; that the line of said telephone company at said crossing was being maintained in violation of law and contrary to the regulations adopted by this Board, in that a telephone pole was located nearer than ten feet to the closest rail of the main line track of said railway company. The respondent, in replying to this complaint, admitted the allegation of the railway company and sought to excuse the location of the pole for the reason that a stream is located near the crossing of the public highway over the railroad and should the regulation of the Board be complied with, the pole would be in danger of being washed out, etc.

The Board directed T. H. Boylan to visit the crossing complained of and make report of the conditions thereof to the Commissioners, and on June 18th Mr. Boylan visited the crossing and found that the Hawkeye Telephone Company is now maintaining a corner pole, carrying many telephone wires, within seven and one-half feet of the nearest main line rail of the complainant company; that said pole may be relocated at a reasonable expense to comply with the rules of the Board; that said pole may be so relocated as not to be in danger by the wash of the creek, and that it may be sufficiently guyed without enchroachment upon the public highway.

The Commissioners therefore order and direct that the Hawkeye Telephone Company, within ten (10) days from the date hereof, so relocate its pole at the crossing named, that it shall in all particulars comply with the rules and regulations of this Board respecting the crossing of railway tracks and rights of way by telephone wires.

Joint Express Rates on Shipments of Cream.

Application filed May 14, 1909.

DECISION OF THE BOARD

The complaint or application in this case was as follows:

"Comes now the E. B. Higley Company and makes complaint to the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Iowa, and states:

"That complainant is a duly organized and existing Iowa corporation with its principal place of business at Mason City, Iowa; that a part of its business is dealing in cream; that it now is, and for many months last past has been, engaged in shipping cream by express from the towns of Klemme and Woden to Mason City, Iowa; that said towns of Klemme and Woden are respectively located on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway, and that neither of said towns has any other railroad facilities; that the methods and routes of such shipments are now, and at all times herein mentioned have been as follows, to-wit:

"Said shipments are delivered to the express company operating on the said Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway at the said towns of Klemme and Woden, as the case may be, and by said express company taken over said railroad to the town of Garner; at the said town of Garner the same are transferred by wagon to the express company operating on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St, Paul Railway, and by the last named express company taken to the city of Mason City over the last named railroad.

"That the distance from said town of Klemme to Garner is 6 miles; from Woden to Garner is 21 miles; and from Garner to Mason City is 21 miles.

"That at all times herein mentioned prior to May 1, 1999, the United States Express Company was operating on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway, and handled all of such shipments of cream from the said towns of Klemme and Woden respectively to the point of destination as aforesaid; that during all of said time the said express company charged complainant and received for such shipments the following express rates, to-wit:

"From Klemme to Mason City, 21 cents per hundred weight or per ten gallon can.

"From Woden to Mason City, 21 cents per hundred weight or per ten gallon can.

"That from and since May 1, 1909, the said United States Express Company has been operating on the said Chicago, Rock Island & Pucific Railway, and the Wells Fargo Express Company has been operating on the said Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway; that from and since the first day of May, 1909, the said express companies have charged and are charging complainant their respective full local rate on each of such shipments; that said rates so charged complainant for such shipments are as follows, to-wit:

per ten gallon can ......20c

"That such rates now charged as aforesaid are substantially prohibitive, unreasonable and excessive; that complainant has made application to each of the said express companies for redress and the establishment of reasonable joint rates; that said companies have respectively refused to establish any joint rates on such shipments or to give compalianant any redress whatsoever.

"Wherefore complainant prays this Honorable Board of Railroad Commissioners to take such action relative to the matters herein complained of as may be necessary and proper to equitably determine and adjust the same according to law.

"E. B. HIGLEY COMPANY, By ROBT. M. WITWER, "Its Attorney."

Copies of this complaint or application were sent to the express companies interested.

For answer to this complaint the Wells Fargo & Co. Express on June 1st filed the following:

"The defendant, Wells Fargo & Company, answering the petition of the above named complainant, respectfully shows to the Commission;

"Defendant has no knowledge of whether or not the complainant is a corporation, or of its place of business or of its practice, or of the situation of the towns of Klemme and Woden, or the local conditions in respect thereto; hence, defendant neither admits or denies the allegations in the petition in respect to such matters.

"Defendant admits that the distance from Garner to Mason City is twenty-open (21) miles, and that from and since May 1st, 1909, the defendant has been operating its express business over the line of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company, and that the defendant has charged its regular rates on shipments of cream delivered to it at Garner by the United States Express Company, which said rates are twenty (20) cents per 10 gallon can.

"Defendant denies that such rates are substantially prohibitive, unreasonable, or excessive; but defendant alleges, on the contrary, that said rates are no more than fair compensation for the services rendered.

"Wherefor, Defendant prays the Commission to dismiss the complaint in this proceeding.

No answer was filed by the United States Express Company.

On June 30, 1909, the Board fixed date for hearing this complaint at its office in Des Moines. July 21, 1909.

All parties to this case were duly notified and on date named the following named persons appeared before the Board in this case:

R. M. Witwer, attorney for complainant; W. S. Wilcox, representing complainant; H. R. Wright, State Dairy Commissioner; M. D. Smiley, Secretary Commercial Club. Clinton, Iowa; W. B. Martin, freight commissioner, Dubuque Shippers' Association, and others.

Jno. D. Ludlow, traffic manager, Wells Fargo & Co. Express.

On the same date a letter was received from M. T. Jones, Superintendent of Traffic for the United States Express Co., which follows:

"Replying to your favor of July 2d, stating that the Board will hold a hearing in the case of E, B, Highey Cempany, Mason City, Iowa, against the United States Express Company, and Wells Fargo & Company, for alleged excessive joint rates on milk and cream:

"It will be impossible for me to attend this hearing, because I have a very much more important meeting to attend in New York City, I understand, however, that Mr. J. D. Ludlow will appear at the hearing for Wells, Fargo & Company, and I presume the evidence and arguments which apply in the case of Wells, Fargo & Company will apply equally well as a defense for the United States Express Company. The service is performed by two different companies and I understand that there is wagon service also in the transfer from one company to another.

"I hope the Commission will not consider my absence from the hearing as an act of discourtesy, as I believe the Commission will do what is reasonable in the matter whether an appearance is made for this company or not.

"Yours truly,

The Commission heard such testimony as was offered both on behalf of the applicant and the respondent companies and the facts ascertained were substantially as stated in the petition, except that in addition to the statement of charges now assessed by the express companies upon the shipments in question, there is added to such charge a five cent transfer. The express companies represented made no denial of the showing made by the complainants in substantiation of their petition, with the exception that Mr. Ludlow, representing the Wells Fargo & Co. Express, stated that the defendants believed that the rates charged were no more than fair compensation for the service rendered.

After the conclusion of the hearing the Board rendered its decision as follows:

Section 2165 of the Code as amended by Chapter 111 of the laws of the 32d General Assembly provides that:

"All express companies operating and doing business in this state are declared to be common carriers, and it shall be the duty of every such express company or common carrier to transport all property, parcels, money, merchandise, packages, and other things of value which may be offered to them for transportation, at a reasonable charge or rate therefor; and all laws so far as applicable, now in force or hereafter enacted, regulating the transportation of property by railroad companies, shall apply with equal force and effect to express companies."

Chapter 111 of the Laws of the 32nd General Assembly required the

Board of Railroad Commissioners to establish a joint rate for shipments over two or more railroads for the transportation of freight.

Experss companies have been repeatedly declared by the highest tribunals to be common carriers, and as such, their duties and responsibility, so far as they themselves or the shippers are concerned, are practically identical. It is the duty of an express company as a common carrier to receive and transport packages, and the express company acts as the agent of the shipper in the same way as does the railroad company in transporting property.

The joint rate law and rules enacted by this Commission will apply to the case of the complainant, and he is entitled to a joint rate of eighty (80) per cent of the sum of the two local rates, which this Board finds to be reasonable rates under the evidence, and that a reasonable charge may be added thereto for the transfer from one depot to another.

The Board further finds that it is the duty of express companies to act as the agent of the shipper in transferring from one company to another. The complainant's petition is granted, in accordance with the findings of the Commission as above stated.

A part of lot twenty-six (26), Factory Addition to the City of Des Moines, Iowa, more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at the northeast corner of Lot Twenty-six, Factory Addition; thence south along the east line of said lot two hundred (200) feet; thence west at right angles to the cast line of said lot five-tenths (0.5) feet; thence north parallel with the east line of said lot twenty-six (26), thirty (30) feet; thence enorthwesterly on a 12° curve to the left one hundred and twenty (120) feet, to point of reverse curve; thence northwesterly on a 12° curve to the right fifty-one and nine-tenths (51.9) feet to a point in the north line of said lot twenty-six (26), twenty-five and seven-tenths (25.7) feet west of the place of commencement; thence cast along the north line of said lot, twenty-five and seven-tenths (25.7) feet to the place of commencement.

IN RE PETITION OF CHICAGO, BURL-INGTON & QUINCY RAILROAD COM-PANY, ET AL., FOR THE RAISING OF CERTAIN RATES IN 10WA.

Opinion of the Board on the Right of the Railroad Commission to Advance Freight Rates.

In this case the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company filed its application in substance as follows:

That the rates fixed by the Commission in Supplement No. 2 to Iowa Classification No. 14, effective March 15, 1909, upon the following articles be advanced:

Doubletrees, eveners, and analogous articles; baskets; confectionery; maple sugar substitute; scrap paper; leather and articles of; hides; tallow.

The application requested that the rates on these particular items be made to correspond to the rates on said items as shown in Iowa Classification No. 14 and the current Western Classification.

Full reference to this application of the railroad companies and the action of the Board taken therein will be found in the opinion of the Board promulgating Supplement No. 4 to Iowa Classification No. 14.

Substantially all railroads operating in Iowa joined in this application.

A public hearing was had on said application as prescribed by law on the 20th day of July, 1909. At said hearing the following named persons appeared on behalf of the applicants:

Geo. H. Crosby, General Freight Agent, C., B. & Q R. R. Co., T. H. Simmons, G. F. A., C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., Carroll Wright, attorney for Iowa and South Dakota, C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., A. W. Eberhart, D. F. A., C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., Jas. C. Davis, attorney for Iowa, C. & N.-W. Ry. Co., M. J. Golden, A. G. F. A., C. & N.-W. Ry. Co., F. P. Eyman, A. G. F. A., C. & N.-W. Ry. Co., F. P. Eyman, A. G. F. A., C. & N.-W. Ry. Co., J. H. Morrison, Chief Clerk Freight Department, C. G. W. Ry. Co., V. D. Fort, A. G. F. A., Illinois Central R. R. Co.

The following named persons were present and objected to the granting of the application and orally contested the case:

W. B. Martin, Commissioner, Dubuque Shippers' Association, M. D. Smiley, Secretary, Clinton Manufacturers' and Shippers' Association, John Wunderlich, Secretary Commercial Club, Cedar Rapids, E. G. Wylie, Freight Commissioner, Greater Des Moines Committee, G. A. Wrightman, Secretary Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, Merritt Greene, Marshalltown, W. T. Bailey, Marshalltown, C. L. Percival, Des Moines, L. C. Kurtz, Des Moines, and others.

The contestants tendered as an issue to complainants' application that the statutes of Iowa expressly prohibit the Board from raising freight rates above the maximum rate legally established by the schedules in force at the time the application is made and the Board is without authority in the premises.

At a former hearing by this board the question as to the authority of the Board to advance rates was incidentally raised and there were expressions from members of the Board indicating doubts upon the question and a desire to have the same clearly presented and argued by the Board.

Presumably this case was brought in compliance with the above suggestion for the purpose of obtaining the opinion of the Board as to its authority in the above respects.

The question is an important one rather as an abstract proposition than otherwise, for the reason that modern conditions all tend to a lowering of rates rather than raising them, and it is quite likely in view of the rates voluntarily made by railroads that the Board would rarely exercise this power even if it should determine that it had full authority in the premises.

It is quite obvious, however, that conditions might arise or circumstances present themselves in which justice and fairness to railroads might require an advance of some specific rate, and we can well imagine a state of circumstances which would justify the exercise of this power with considerable freedom.

For these reasons it is important to clearly define the authority of the Board in the above respects.

The power of the Board to establish maximum rates is specifically defined by Sections 2138 and 2141. The first of the above sections refers to the general maximum schedule of rates and the classification of freights and expressly provides that "The Board shall from time to time and as often as circumstances may require, change and revise such schedules, but the rates fixed shall not be higher than established by law." While no specific authority is given by this section to "change or revise" classifications, such authority is necessarily included on account of the complexity of rate making on the principle that "the greater always includes the less."

It was clearly the legislative intent in the enactment of the above section to grant authority to the Board to "change or revise" schedules or classifications on its own motion and without application therefor.

Section 2141 relates to procedure upon complaint or application and provides that "after such hearing and investigation (upon application) the Board shall fix and determine the maximum charges to be thereafter made by the railroad company or common carrier complained of, which charge shall in no event exceed the one now or hereafter fixed by law."

Thus the language or the inhibition contained in Section 2138 is "establish by law," and in Section 2141 "fix by law." The difference in etymology between the words "establish" and "fix" is too slight to be considered of importance, especially as applied to rate making, and they must be considered as synonymous.

In determining the authority of the Board it is also important to bear in mind Section 2123, by which the Board as well as courts must be governed. "All charges made for any service rendered . . . in the

transportation of  $\ .$  . . property  $\ .$  . . shall be reasonable and just, etc."

Clearly stated, the issue is as follows:

- Freight rates shall be reasonable and just to both railroads and patrons.
- The railroad commission may on its own motion "change or revise schedules, but the rates fixed shall not be higher than established (or fixed) by law."
- On complaint the Commission must fix and determine freight charges which "shall in no case exceed the one now or hereafter fixed by law."
- 4. It is contended by the contestants that the present schedules in effect were established by law, or rather established by the methods which the law prescribes, which it is claimed is equivalent to being established by law.

It is evident that the entire question turns upon the significance of the words "extablished or faced by law." In other words, are rates established by the Commission in the manner prescribed by law, in fact "established by law" as meant by the law maker? Or what is the legal meaning of the language "established by law?"

In seeking for the legislative intent in the use of these words it is proper to suggest that rates are raised or lowered in two ways, directly and indirectly. They are changed directly by changing the schedules and indirectly by changing the classifications. One method is just as complete and effectual as the other.

While it may be granted that the legislature has power to authorize a commission to revise rates only downward, yet such an interpretation has in it an inherent suggestion of injustice; is inconsistent with a law which requires and permits rates to be made which are "reasonable and just," and ought not to be adopted unless clearly required by the statute.

A rate that is unreasonably low is just as illegal under the statute as though it was unreasonably high, and it goes without saying that an unjust rate is always an illegal rate.

If it were a settled principle that the railroad commission had authority to revise schedules and classifications only downward, it would of necessity affect the mental attitude of the members of the commission. It would naturally cause a hesitation in the change of freight rates when there ought to be the utmost freedom in this respect when warranted by proper conditions, for the reason that it is a well known fact that conditions do frequently change and a rate that would be proper under certain conditions would be confiscatory under other conditions, and in the latter case the commission would be without power in the premises.

A good illustration of these changing conditions is in the movement of ice in the proper season in large quantities. At such times railroads can well afford to make a very low rate.

It is no answer to say that the established freight rate is only a max-

imum freight rate and railroads have authority to make a rate as low as they care to, if the statute absolutely requires this commission to consider a rate voluntarily made by railroads as prima facie a reasonable rate.

Another fact is worthy of consideration in this discussion. Commissioners are no more infallible than courts. A rate may be established upon an erroneous conception of facts, or upon facts not fully or properly presented and which upon more complete presentation might be found to be unreasonable, unjust and confiscatory. Such a rate would be absolutely illegal.

Parties in interest ought not to be relegated to the courts for relieft unless the statute clearly limits the powers of the commission. If the law absolutely forbids the commission from raising a rate already in use, mistakes or erroneous conclusions of the commission could not be corrected, unless possibly they were patent on their face and indicated clerical or printing mistakes.

Nothing but necessity should require the assumption that the statute limits the power of the commission in revising and changing schedules to "downward revision."

It will be presumed in the absence of a clear declaration to the contrary that when the legislature authorized and empowered the Commission to fix rates so that they should be "reasonable and just" that the commission was authorized to consider every factor which was material in determining the reasonableness and justice and is not limited to a downward revision which might be unreasonable and unjust and therefore absolutely illegal.

Considering all the circumstances, such an interpretation ought not to be adopted unless the language of the statute clearly excludes every other reasonable interpretation.

It is a well settled principle in the interpretation of statutes that the legislative intent, if it can be ascertained, shall govern.

It will be presumed, unless it clearly appears to the contrary, that the legislature intended to use the words "fix or establish by law" in the sense in which they are defined by courts.

Courts have given a well settled meaning to this term. The most elementary definition of "law" is that it must be "prescribed by the supreme power of the state," which is our legislature.

"Such expressions as 'required by law,' 'regulated by law,' 'allowed by law,' 'made by law,' 'limited by law,' 'as prescribed by law,' 'a law of the state,' are of frequent occurrence in Codes and legislative enactments and are always used as referring to statutory provisions only."

(Brickerhoff vs. Bostwick, 1st N. E. Rep., 665.)

It is unnecessary to multiply citations to show that in statutes of the character of those at issue the word "law" means statutory law, and in our opinion the word "statute" is equivalent to "statutory law" and therefore the words quoted in the section first above cited refer to schedules "fixed or established by statute."

The fact that our legislature has never attempted to create a schedule of freight rates, since the enactment of the above sections, lends something to the obscurities of this case, for the reason that all language in a legislative enactment ought to be so construed as not only to give it force but a meaning to accomplish a definite purpose.

From the fact that the legislature has never exercised its power to make a schedule of rates and there are no statutory rates in existence, the words "establish by law" in the section cited might be claimed to be meaningless if the construction given to these words by the complainant be correct.

A sufficient answer to this criticism is that the legislature has an undoubted right to establish a schedule of freight rates. In its wisdom it has thus far held this power in reserve. It may be exercised by any legislature in the future, and until it does exercise this power to make rates it properly delegates it to the Railroad Commission.

It is perfectly consistent to hold that the words "fix or establish by law" were intended merely to relate to the future and to such a time as the legislature might exercise its power to make rates, which it has kept in reserve up to the present time. The words above quoted are properly used for the purpose of showing that the legislature does not part with its power to make rates, but always holds it in reserve.

Our position is more clearly shown to be the correct one when we consider something of the history of the legislation which resulted in the enactment of the sections first above quoted, and the history of this legislation is clearly, under the holdings of all courts, a proper subject for consideration in determining the legislative intent in the use of these words.

At the time of the enactment of this legislation, two bills were pending before the legislature at the same time, one known as House File No. 373, which was finally enacted into law and which contains the sections involved in this controversy. This bill was prepared by the committee on railroads, to whom had been referred a large number of bills on the subject of railroad legislation.

At the same time the railroad committee prepared and presented House File No. 374, which was a committee bill and provided a maximum schedule of rates in Iowa.

These bills were companion bills, prepared by the same committee, and introduced substantially at the same time. The latter bill in substance expressly prohibited the railroad commission from advancing freight rates "above the maximum standard fixed therein."

For some reason which it is not worth our while to investigate, the latter bill providing a maximum schedule of rates failed of passage.

As they were companion bills, prepared and introduced by the same committee at the same time, it is fair to presume that it was the expectation of the committee that both would be enacted into law if either of them were.

It is plainly evident that the language "fix or establish by law" contemplated the fact that a maximum schedule of rates would be established by the legislature itself at the same time the law now in force should pass, and clearly shows that the legislative intent contemplated a schedule of rates established by the legislature itself and not a schedule established by a commission in the manner prescribed by law.

The failure of the legislature to establish a schedule at that time merely emphasises our contention that it decided for evidently cogent reasons to postpone the establishing of such schedule until some future time and holds its power so to do in reserve.

From all of the above considerations, we are clearly of the opinion that the legislature had in mind the ordinary and well settled legal acceptation in the use of the words "fix or establish by law" and that until the legislature itself establishes a maximum schedule the only limitation upon this commission in revising or changing the schedules is to so revise and change them that they shall be reasonable and just, and therefore legal.

CHARLES H. BRADLEY, ET AL., Dubuque, vs.

AMERICAN EXPRESS COMPANY, ADAMS EXPRESS COMPANY, and WELLS FARGO & COMPANY, EXPRESS, Application for Order for Extension of Wagon Service.

Application filed March 4, 1909.

The complaint in the above entitled case is as follows:

"The petition of the above named complainants respectfully shows:

"1st. That the complainants are residents of the city of Dubuque in the county of Dubuque, in the state of Iowa.

"2d. That the defendants are express companies with offices in the city of Dubuque, Iowa, and are engaged in the transportation of property between the various points in the state of Iowa; and also between points in the state of Iowa and points in several other states of the United States, and as such are by law common carriers subject to the provisions of the Code of Iowa as to intrastate traffic; and as to the interstate traffic, subject to the provisions of the act to regulate commerce as amended, and acts supplementary thereto.

"3d. That Section Two (2) of the act to regulate commerce declares it unlawful for a common carrier to discriminate in the transportation of a like kind of property under substantially similar creumstances.

"4th. That Section Three (3) of said act forbids a common carrier to make or give any undue or unreasonable preference or advantage to any particular locality or any particular description of traffic, or to subject any particular locality or any particular description of traffic to any undue or unreasonable prejudices or disadvantage in any respect whatsoever.

"5th. That contrary to the provisions of said act to regulate commerce and in contravention with the laws of Iowa, the above named defendants are guilty of unlawful discrimination, and give undue and unreasonable preference, by delivering goods, property, money, parcels, wares, merchandise, packages, and other things to persons, companies, firms, and corporations, in certain places and localities in said city by refusing and neglecting to deliver to all persons, companies, firms, and localities alike within reasonable limits, thereby forcing complainants and others, in certain localities, arbitrarily fixed by the defendants, in order to have delivery made, to pay a greater amount for substantially the same service, to their great damage and prejudice.

"6th. Your complainants further show that said defendant companies are accustomed to deliver consignments without extra charge to portions of Dubuque being located a further distance from their main offices in said city, and not being as thickly settled as the localities to which your petitioners would have deliveries made.

"7th. That the complainants have no knowledge or information sufficient to make a positive statement, but believe and so state to the Commission, that the conditions allike set forth exist because of a combination and agreement between said defendants to confine the localities in which deliveries are made, to certain fixed parts and places in said city, contrary to the Sherman Act of July 2, 1890; contrary to the act to regulate commerce; and contrary to the laws of the state of Iowa.

"8th. Your petitioners here refer to a letter signed by twenty users of express service who are affected by the discrimination complained of, and ask that same be made a part hereof.

"Wherefor, Your petitioners pray that in conformity with this complaint, the Board of Railroad Commissioners of Iowa request the above named defendants to cease and desist from the illegal and unjust discrimination complained of, and if said practice is not changed or adjusted so as to remove and remedy said discrimination within a reasonable time, to institute proceedings before the Interstate Commerce Commission in compliance with Title IX, Chapter Six (6), of the Code, (and to remedy the discrimination as to Intrastate traffic in compliance with Title IX, Chapter Nine (9), of the Code), and present the charges made herein, and ask that an order be made commanding the defendants to cease and desist from said violation of the act to regulate commerce, and such other orders as the Commission may deem necessary in the premises.

"Dated at Dubuque, Iowa, this 20th day of February, 1909.

"John R. Waller,
"For the Complainants."

To this complaint respondent American Express Company filed the following answer, in substance:

"It is our understanding that the petitioners or most of them, reside in what is locally known in Dubuque as The Hill District. The Commissioners are undoubtedly aware that the City of Dubuque was originally laid out up and down along the river, which still constitutes the business section of the town. Back of this there is a high hill or bluff, some 300 feet in height. As the city grew in importance and population, many of the better class of people took up their residence on the Hill, on account of the elevation and other advantages that that locality afforded for residential purposes.

"We assume that the Commissioners are familiar with the topography of the City of Dubuque and that it is unnecessary for us to go into any further details beyond stating that in order to reach the Hill District with our wagons, we would have to make a long, circuitous and steep drive.

"In establishing delivery limits in any city we necessarily, and we think properly, take into consideration, first, the business section, and second, the more important residential district, the aim and intention being to afford the people the advantages of free delivery and pick-up service within a reasonable area from our office location or railroad terminals, but there is a limit that must be established, and that limit has usually been drawn at impassable streets, sparsely settled sections, or inaccessible districts. There are few places in the country where the obstacles against free delivery and pick-up service are as difficult as they are in connection with the Hill District at Dubuque.

"By a careful investigation, it has been determined that in order to afford the residents of that section of Dubuque the advantages of free delivery and pick-up, it would be necessary for this Company to employ two additional drivers and to furnish two additional wagons, two and perhaps three horses, etc. To maintain this equipment, it would cost the express company between \$140.00 and \$150.00 a month, to say nothing of the outlay.

"From the records of the Dubuque office, we find that during the month of December, 1908, (the month during which the heaviest package business is transacted throughout the year.) there were received at that point 444 shipments for people residing on the Hill. The gross charges on this business amounted to \$200.00. Deducting from that sum the amount paid to the railroad companies for transportation service, approximately 50 per cent, we have left \$100.00, without deducting anything for terminal expenses at both ends, messenger service, or general expense for supervision.

"To have delivered these packages free, therefore, would have entailed upon the express company an expense much greater than the gross revenue left to us on this business after paying the railroad companies for the transportation, without taking into consideration all of the other expenses referred to above.

"For the month of January, 1909, we find that the total revenue on all business received at Dubuque for people residing on the Hill, was a trifle over \$100.00. After deducting the cost of railroad transportation, we are left with \$51.34, to say nothing of any other item of cost, which would, of course, represent a loss to the Company of twice as much as it would have been in December, or if the equipment had been reduced one-half, the loss would have been about the same.

"All of these facts and figures have already been presented by the express companies to the complainants and we trust they have been convinced that the present limits are fair and reasonable; that they are not discriminatory, considering the conditions that prevail; and that the expense of furnishing this service is not justifiable by the amount of business transacted, but that on the other hand the establishing of such service would be worse than confiscation."

"Our records also show that during the month of December, the gross charges on business received by this company at Dubuque, for the petitioners, amounted to \$10.77, and in January to \$6.63 only, which goes to show that the business for people residing within that district is a scattering one, which would call for the maximum amount of service, with the minimum amount of revenue."

"In the express business, we encounter sharp competition by the United States Postoffice Department in one class of business, and by fast freight lines in another. This, coupled with the competition between the express companies themselves in the securing of traffic, may be depended upon to insure reasonable pick-up and delivery service, owing to the fact that any one of the express companies, from the standpoint of natural business enterprise, are ready to extend their service whenever and wherever it can be shown that there is business to be secured upon a fair margin of profit.

"We feel, however, that the situation at Dubuque is such that a compliance with the request of your petitioners would impose a burden upon the express company that is unreasonable and unjust, and we believe that after considering the facts herein presented, the Commissioners will conclude that the position of the express company is tenable and cannot be successfully assailed on the grounds of unreasonable preference, unlawful discrimination or custom and usage.

"It is our policy and practice at all times, and in all places, to render the best possible service, justifiable by the business to be secured, for upon the character and quality of our service alone, we depend for our patronage, but we cannot see our way clear to agree to the performance of a service at Dubuque, or elsewhere, that would entail nothing but loss, nor can we believe that the Commission will seek to enforce any such condition upon us, and for these reasons we submit that the petition be denied and the complaint dismissed."

Respondent Wells Fargo & Company also answered the complaint as follows:

"The defendant, Wells Fargo & Company, answering the petition of the above named complainants, respectfully shows:

"1st. Defendant admits that the complainants are residents of the City and County of Dubuque, State of Iowa.

"2d. Defendant admits that it is a common carrier by express; that it maintains an office in the City of Dubuque, Iowa, and is engaged in the transportation of property between various points within the state of Iowa and also between points in Iowa and several other states of the United States, and that as a common carrier by express it is engaged in intrastate and interstate traffic within the state of Iowa and other states.

"3d. Defendant denies that section 3 of said complaint quotes correctly either the language or the substance of the Interstate Commerce Act, insofar as the same is applicable to the subject matter of this complaint.

"4th. Defendant admits that section 5 of the Interstate Commerce Act is in part substantially quoted in section 4 of said complaint,

"5th. The defendant denies that it is or has been guilty of unlawful discrimination in contravention of the laws of Iowa or contrary to the provisions of the Act to regulate Commerce, in respect to delivering goods, property, money, parcels, wares, merchandise, packages and other things to persons, companies, firms and corporations in certain places and localities in said city, or in refusing or neglecting to deliver to all persons, companies, firms and localities alike within reasonable limits, or that complainants or others in certain localities are forced to pay a greater amount for substantially the same service.

"6th. Defendant denies each and every allegation contained in sections 6, 7, and 8 of said complaint.

"7th. The defendant further says that the said complaint is not cognizable by the Board of Railroad Commissioners of Iowa, and that the facts stated do not constitute a valid cause of complaint to be heard or tried before the said Commission.

"Wherefore, defendant prays the Commission to dismiss the said complaint."

Respondent Adams Express Company filed its answer as follows; by letter from G. D. Curtis, its general manager:

"General Manager Zimmerman has referred to me your letters dated March 5th and March 24th, in regard to the complaint of Charles H. Bradley, et al, vs. Adams Expess Company, alleging discrimination in the delivery of packages in the city of Dubuque, Iowa. I have been looking into the matter with a view of ascertaining just what the circumstances are, in order that I might write you intelligently on the subject.

"From reports received, I quote as follows:

"A meeting was held in Dubuque, March 25th, by representatives of the Express Companies, and Attorney Mr. J. R. Waller, representing the complainants.

"It was shown at this meeting, as I am informed, to the apparent satisfaction of complainants, that for the Express Companies to comply with the request made would result in a loss of from fifty to eighty dollars per month; that the extra delivery work could not be accomplished without at least two extra wagons to cover the territory, which expense the business clearly does not warrant.

"According to statements sent me it is shown that during the period October 1, 1908, to March 20, 1909, the Express charges on shipments handled by this Company for the complainants signing the petition amount to only fifteen dollars.

"It is believed that the showing made by the Express Companies to Attorney Waller was sufficient to satisfy him at least that the request to extend the delivery limits over the territory referred to is an unreasonable one, and certainly we are satisfied it could not be done without it costing the Express Companies more to do it than they could possibly hope the charges on the business would amount to

"I trust with this explanation you will appreciate the injustice of the demand and close the case accordingly."

It appears the United States Express Company has withdrawn from the express business in the city of Dubuque, and so far as this proceeding

is concerned, the action is dismissed as to all of the express companies save those who have answered as above stated.

A hearing of said complaint was set for October 8, 1909, at 10 o'clock • A. M. at Dubuque, Iowa, and due notice thereof was given to all the parties interested. Pursuant to said notice a hearing was held at the time and place above stated.

The complainants appeared by John R. Waller, their attorney.

All express company respondents appeared by C. W. Stockton, General Counsel of the Wells Fargo & Co. Express. Also, J. B. Swift appeared as agent for the Adams Express Company and C. D. Sumney, Division Traffic Manager, appeared on behalf of the American Express Company.

After preliminary statements made by counsel for the interested parties the Board, on its own motion, made a personal inspection of the premises involved in the application for extension of the delivery district of Dubuque; after which the Board reconvened and listened to the testimony offered by parties and arguments of counsel, and thereupon took said cause under advisement.

Now, on this second day of December, 1909, the Board of Railroad Commissioners being duly advised in the premises, after due consideration finds the following facts:

The city of Dubuque is a city of from forty to fifty thousand inhabitants, lying along the Mississippi River.

The business portion of said city is built upon a comparatively level bench of land which is skirted on the west side by lofty and precipitous bluffs about two hundred to three hundred feet high.

What is termed the Hill District of the city is covered by residences and is sometimes termed the residential portion of Dubuque. The hill or residential district of the city is reached from the main, or business portion thereof by streets running up ravines, all of which are steep and some of which are difficult to ascend.

The express business done in the city of Dubuque is performed by the American Express Company, Wells-Fargo & Company Express, and Adams Express Company.

Delivery limits have at some time in the past been established by one or more express companies as the limits of free delivery and pick-up by the express companies. It is not made clear when these limits were first established, except that the same limits have been used by the express companies for more than a period of twenty years. During this entire period all express companies doing business in the city of Dubuque have made free deliveries and pick-ups within these established limits, and an agreement has existed between all express companies, whether express or tacit, that deliveries and pick-ups should be free within said limits.

Outside of said limits, deliveries have been made by parties engaged in said business and employed by express companies therefor, for which they received a compensation which was agreed upon between said parties and said express companies.

The bluffs on the west side of said city have been the boundaries of 27

instances where express companies made free deliveries and pick-ups for short distances up the streets leading to the hill or residential district. In these specific cases the limits ended at the points where the grade of the streets began to be great.

These complainants and each of them and all parties doing business in the city of Dubuque have for the past twenty years had full knowledge of the well established limits above described and their business has been undertaken and maintained with such knowledge and with reference to such limits.

At the aforesaid hearing all applications for a change of delivery limits were withdrawn, except as follows:

- 1st. Applicants desire an extension of delivery limits up Madison street to the residence of complainant Bradley, which is a very steep hill the entire distance.
- 2d. An extension upon Grove Terrace and Highland Place, Highland Place being the street above Grove Terrace and both streets leading to the Hill district.
- 3d. An extension to the territory adjacent to and bounded by a line beginning at Julian avenue and Hill street, running up Hill street to Lyon street, out Lyon street to James street, along James street west to Alpine street, south on Alpine street to Solon street, north on Alpine street to Julian avenue, east on Julian avenue to beginning.

The electric street car line runs up Hill street, which is steep and precipitous as it enters Julian avenue. No business houses exist, except store, meat market, conservatory, etc., at the junction of Hill, West Fifth and Burch streets, and two or three places of business, including a drug store at the junction of Alpine street and Julian avenue. Julian avenue is exceedingly steep upon the entire line above described.

Evidence was submitted by all the express companies interested, showing the amount of business done by each company with persons living upon the territory sought to be added to the delivery and pick-up limits and the business houses situated therein.

The figures presented to us show that the business done with residents of this territory in the past has been slight and no good purpose will be served by setting it out in this opinion in detail. We have no means of determining to what extent this business would be increased if the application of the complainants should be granted.

Evidence was produced before us as to the additional equipment which would be necessary and expenses which would be necessarily incurred by each express company in case the delivery limits should be extended as prayed by the complainants, which, in the view we take of the case, is unnecessary to be set out in detail.

We find, however, that the respondent express companies are common carriers in the city of Dubuque and their business in said city is fairly and reasonably remunerative.

We further find that said express companies can make deliveries and

pick-ups without procuring additional equipment and without any very great additional expense, considering the grade of the street and all other material facts, from Julian avenue up Hill street to West Fifth and Burch streets, and to the patrons of express companies along said line, including the business houses and conservatory at or near said junction.

We further find that there are no business houses in the territory where service is desired on Madison street or Grove Terrace or Highland Place, and but few residences; that if the delivery limits should be enlarged to include said streets, proper and reasonable service by said express companies as common carriers on said streets would require additional equipment on the part of each express company and that the revenue from said service which could reasonably be expected would be comparatively slight and not fairly or reasonably remunerative for the use of such additional equipment.

We further find that if said limits should be extended to the Hill district as requested, there would be no good reason why they should not be extended to cover the entire Hill district, which would require a very large expenditure on the part of the express companies for additional equipment, labor, service, etc., and that the revenue to be derived from the business could not possibly be expected to be commensurate with said expenditures.

Findings of Law:

Respondent Wells-Fargo & Company contends that "The facts stated do not constitute a valid cause of complaint to be heard or tried before the said Commission" and this Commission is without jurisdiction to require it to change or vary its delivery and pick-up limits.

Express companies are expressly included in the definition of common carriers by the statutes of Iowa. It is well established by an unbroken line of authorities that the obligation rests upon such a common carrier as an express company to make personal delivery of property carried by them to the consignee or other proper person. Certain exceptions have been engrafted upon this doctrine, the wisdom of which it is unnecessary for us to discuss, which will be noticed later in this opinion.

As a general propostion it is the duty of the Board of Railroad Commissioners of Iowa, under its laws, to require common carriers to perform their legal duties. There are limitations upon the duty and authority of this Commission in the above respects, however, which are not material to mention in connection with the case at bar.

The delivery by express companies of packages placed in their care is as much a part of the transportation of such packages as is that of transporting them by rail or otherwise. Transportation does not end until delivery is made.

It is our opinion and we so hold that this Commission has authority to change, modify or enlarge the limits of free delivery and pick-ups established by an express company, providing the conditions warrant the exercise of such authority.

It is our opinion, however, that only unjust discrimination warrants the exercise of such authority. Discriminations must of necessity exist constantly and everywhere in connection with the business of common carriers. To illustrate: It is perfetly obvious that express companies must establish some limit beyond which they will not grant free delivery or pick-ups. It is equally obvious that the person who lives just beyond such established limits is discriminated against as compared to one who lives just within such established limits. It does not follow, however, that there is unjust discrimination. Limits must be reasonable and the question as to whether or not they are reasonable is always one of fact and depends upon the peculiar conditions that exist in a particular case.

The underlying reason for the establishment of delivery limits is "cost of service." In determining the reasonableness of certain delivery limits "the cost of service, distance, volume of business and all other factors that may properly enter into the question of the location of the same," together with natural barriers or impediments should be taken into consideration in determining the matter. Ordinarily, natural limits such as the boundary lines of municipalities are adopted as delivery service limits. In cities, however, it would evidently be unjust to fix such natural limits. A natural barrier or impediment such as the lofty, precipitous bluffs and hills of the city of Dubuque, is surely as reasonable a boundary for delivery limits as one based upon mere distance. It is very evident that the cost of service in reaching a territory which is two or three hundred feet high, even if the distance to be traversed is very slight, might be vastly greater than a delivery two or three miles away upon a level street which was not obstructed by impediments.

The leading cases upon this subject have been ably and exhaustively considered in the opinion given by the Railroad Commission of Wisconsin, decided January 14, 1909, August H. Strauss vs. American Express Company, et al., but we do not consider it necessary to review them at this time. We express our gratitude for the careful consideration given by the Wisconson Commission to the questions involved in that case and avail ourselves of their conclusions, which appear to us to be sound.

In accordance with the above finding of facts and conclusions of law, now

It is therefore ordered that the Amerian Express Company, the Adams Express Company and the Wells-Fargo & Company Express, and each of them, within 60 days from date hereof, extend their delivery and pick-up limits from Julian avenue up and along Hill street to West Fifth street and Burch street, and that said companies and each of them deliver all express matter and perform the pick-up service to patrons at the junction of the above named streets and along the line of said Hill street and Julian avenue to said junction, received for intrastate transportation to the petitioners or any of them or other person to whom the same is directed, and that said express companies and each of them refrain and desist from exacting for such transportation service, including delivery of goods to consignees or any pick-up service, any charge or charges in excess of those charged to persons engaged in business or living in the main business portion of the city of Dubuque as hereinbefore described.

### DECISION.

In this case the railroad companies filed the following application:

To the Honorable Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Iowa:

The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company, Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company, Illinois Central Railroad Company, Wabash Railroad Company, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha Railway Company, Minneapolis & St. Louis Railroad Company, Iowa Central Railroad Company, Chicago Great Western Railway Company, Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern Railway Company, St. Paul & Des Moines Railway Company, and Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company respectfully ask for a rehearing on the following rates hereinafter specifically described, and promulgated by your Honorable Body in Iowa Commissioners' Supplement No. 3, to Iowa Classification No. 14, issued March 19, 1909, effective May 1, 1909, and that the rates and classifications therein proposed be modified on such rehearing, as hereinafter specifically pointed out, to-wit:

1st. That Index 58, Item 22-a: "Hay carriers and hay carrier returners, in boxes or barrels, L. C. L., third class," be modified so as to make the same read, "L. C. L., second class," same as Iowa Classification No. 14, and same as Western Classification.

2d. That Index 60, Item 28-a: "Grave vaults, iron or steel, L. C. L., third class," be modified so as to read, "Grave vaults, N. O. S., (including iron or steel), L. C. L., first class," same as Iowa Classification No. 14, and same as Western Classification.

3d. Index 61, Item 37-a: "Salts—Epsom, (sulphate of Magnesia) in barrels, L. C. L., third class," be modified so as to read as follows: "Salts—Epsom, sulphate of Magnesia) in boxes, casks or bags, L. C. L., second class; in tin cans, jacketed, L. C. L., first class," so as to make the said rating the same as Iowa Classification No. 14 and same as Western Classification.

4th. That Index 62, Item 7: "Sulphur and sulphur candles, in boxes or kegs, or in pails with tight wooden covers, L. C. L., third class," be modified so as to read as follows: "Sulphur and sulphur candles, in boxes or kegs, or in pails with tight wooden covers, L. C. L., second class in sacks, barrels, or hogsheads, L. C. L., fourth class; sulphur in China mats, L. C. L., fourth class," so as to make said rating the same as Iowa Classification No. 14, and Western Classification.

5th. That Index 63, Item 17: "Spring beds, mattresses (including woven wire mattresses) and wire cots, minimum weight 10,000 lbs., (subject to Rule 6-B) C. L., class three," be modified to read as follows: "Spring beds and woven wire mattresses, including wire cots, minimum weight 10,000 lbs., (subject to Rule 6-B) C. L., second class."

6th. That commodity rates on "lumber, hard and soft, lath and shingles, in straight or mixed C. L."; "sash doors or blinds in straight or mixed C. L."; "sash doors or blinds in mixed C. L. with lumber (hard and soft), lath or shingles," promulgated in said Supplement No. 3, on pages 7 and 8, be abrogated and cancelled, and the rates on said commodities as fixed in Iowa Classification No. 14, be restored.

Said railway companies represent and allege that the proposed classifications in said Supplement No. 3, on which this rehearing is asked, in so far as such

ratings are herein requested to be modified, are unfair, unreasonably low, and unjust, and the modifications herein prayed for are reasonable and just and will make the same conform to Western Classification, under which said rallway companies transact the greater portion of their business in the carriage of such commodities. Said railway companies ask to be permitted to offer testimony and present argument upon this application, and ask your Honorable Body to fix a time for hearing the same, and further ask that the ratings and classifications herein complained of be suspended and rendered non-effective pending the disposition of this application.

Intrastate or Interstate Commerce.

Shipments from Without the

State Rebilled Within the State.

DEAR SIR: The questions presented in your letter of December 17, 1908, deserve an expression of opinion on the part of this Board, as to the law governing the rebilling of freight which originates outside of this state and which is rebilled upon its arrival at a point within the state to some other point within the state.

Your letter is not sufficiently specific to enable the Board to determine the controlling facts, but in order that you may have a clear understanding of our opinion as to the law we will assume:

1st. A car of coal originates at some point in Illinois and is originally destined to Keosauqua, Iowa.

2d. The original bill of lading made out by the common carrier at the point of origin provides for the shipment of the car of coal from said point of origin to Keokuk, Iowa.

3d. When the car of coal arrives at Keokuk, Iowa, the shipper or his agent pays the freight and by the act of paying the freight, receives the car of coal, and orders it rebilled by a new bill of lading, to Keosauqua.

You will notice that in this assumption of facts it is contemplated that there should be two separate bills of lading, each a completed contract in itself, and that by the payment of freight and the receipt of the car at Keokuk, the first contract or bill of lading is fully performed, and you will notice further that this first contract is completed by the shipper or his agent and not by the agent of the company.

Upon the above assumption of facts, it is our opinion that the Iowa Distance Tariff governs the shipment upon the second bill of lading, being the shipment from Keokuk to Keosauqua,

We are aware that this holding is not in harmony with the early rulings upon the subject, made by this Board. The former rulings made by this Board were evidently based upon the judgment of the court in the case of Cutting vs. Florida, 46 Federal Reporter, 641, (10th Wall. 557). This case was decided in the Circuit Court of the Northern Division of Florida on June 26, 1891. The decision seems to be based upon the theory that the shipment was in fact an interstate shipment because it was one continuous journey between the point of origin and the ultimate destination, and this was not changed by the breaking of this continuous journey by the payment of freight and rebilling. In other words: That the controlling factor which determines whether a shipment is state or interstate is the original intent of the parties making the shipment. The decision is based entirely upon the language found in the opinion in the very early case of "The Daniel Ball, 10th Wall., 557." A number of cases are cited in this opinion,

citing and approving the Daniel Ball case, supra. It will serve no good purpose to review the Daniel Ball case or the other cases cited in the opinion above referred to. It is sufficient for our purposes at this time to say that a careful examination of all those cases makes it clear to us that they do not furnish any basis for the decision in the case first above cited. All the cases above referred to were decided many years ago and during the formative period of legislation relating to the control of common carriers. The conditions have very greatly changed both as to legislation and the adjudication of courts during the seventeen years since the above case was decided. If we were not entirely without authority upon the question, we would not be impressed by the reasoning adopted by the court in the case of Cutting vs. Florida Ry. Co., supra,

It is the opinion of this Board that the precise question involved has been clearly settled by the opinion rendered by His Honor, Justice Brewer, in the case of Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Ry. Co. vs. Texas, (204 U. S., 403). In the case just cited, a car of corn was sold by the Samuel Hardin Grain Co. at Kansas City. Missouri, to parties living at Goldthwaite, Texas. This car originated at Hudson, South Dakota, and was billed from Hudson, South Dakota to "Forrester Bros., Texarkana, Texas."

"At the time of purchase contract it was.....intended that the corn to be thereby acquired should go to Saylor & Burnette and should be shipped to Goldthwaite, from Texarkana, as soon as practicable."

When it arrived at Texarkana, Texas, an agent of the shipper paid the purchase price for the corn and paid the freight to Texarkana and rebilled the corn from Texarkana to Goldthwaite, Texas, and "the defendant was not a party to the bill of lading executed at Texarkana."

"The single question in the case is whether as between Texarkana and Goldthwaite, this was an interstate shipment."

The above brief statement of facts makes the case a perfect parallel in principle to the facts which we have assumed in your case.

Without quoting elaborately from the opinion of the court, it is sufficient to say that Justice Brewer holds that the first bill of lading from Hudson, S. D., to Texarkana. Texas, is an independent contract for an interstate shipment, and is fully completed when the freight is paid at Texarkana by the shipper or his

"Whatever may have been the thought or purpose of the Hardin Company in respect to the further disposition of the corn, was a matter immaterial so far as the completed transportation was concerned."

"The control over goods in process of transportation, which may be repeatedly changed by sales, is one thing; the transportation is another thing, and follows the contract of shipment, until that is changed by the agreement of owner and carrier."

The owner had a right, upon the completion of this contract to change his mind as to its ultimate destination. He could sell his product at Texarkana or retain it for his own use, or make any disposition that he saw fit to make. In the case above cited he saw fit to rebill it to Goldthwaite, Texas, in accordance with his original purpose.

"Whatever obligations may rest upon the carrier at the terminus of its transportation to deliver to some further carrier in obedience to the instructions of the owner, it is acting not as carrier, but simply as a forwarder," and upon arrival of the corn at Texarkana and the completion of the contract by the payment of the freight, "then, and not till then, did the Hardin Company have full title and control of the corn and that was after the first contract of transportation had been completed."

Both the carrier and the shipper have an absolute right to rely upon the original contract which was for the shipment of the freight, and the carrier "must conform to the liability imposed by his contract."

We believe that the reasoning adopted by his Honor, Justice Brewer, is sound, and it would serve no good purpose to set the same out in full in this opinion. It is the latest adjudication upon the subject which has been called to our attention, and we feel we ought to be bound by it, and especially in view of the fact that it is in harmony with our own judgment.

From a careful examination of all the authorities we arrive at the following

1st. It is immaterial what the purposes or intentions of a shipper may be when he undertakes to ship from a point without the state to a point within the state.

2d. A shipper has a right to ship from a point without the state to a point within the state, using a bill of lading between said points, pay the freight at the point of arrival, then make a new bill of lading or contract by rebilling to any other point within the state.

3d. In such case the Iowa Distance Tariff governs as to the rebilling and reshipment.

4th. A shipper has a right to any advantages which may be discovered by him in the way of lower freight rates in thus bringing his shipment within the jurisdiction of the laws of this state and in the application of the local distance toxiff

I think this opinion will answer all questions which may be in your mind, upon the subjects suggested to us in your letter. You will pardon the exhaustiveness of this reply, as it is made for preservation in the office and for the purpose of serving as a guide in cases that may hereafter be presented to the Commission, involving the same principle.

LOUDEN MACHINERY COMPANY, Fair- Rebilling in Transit—Request for field, Iowa.

On January 18, 1909, the Board received from the Louden Machinery Company of Fairfield, Iowa, letter as follows:

"Recently we took up with the "Q" under Chapter 114, of the Laws of the Thirty-second General Assembly, the matter of reconsigning steel shipped us from Chicago to enable us to take advantage of the local rate. They decline to permit it unless we have a representative at the intermediate point, under a ruling of Commissioner Clark which we enclose. The part which they make apply we have underscored. What is your view on this?

"We also call your attention to a notice issued by the C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., which seems in part to conflict with this same law. It is G. F. D. No. 23708."

The letter to which the Louden Machinery Company refers, having been written by Commissioner Clark, was as follows:

RULING OF COMMISSIONER CLARK CONCERNING TRAFFIC HANDLED IN CONNECTION WITH ROAD WHOSE RAILS ARE CONFINED WITHIN ONE STATE.

Advice Letter No. N-83.

To the General Freight Agents.

GENTLEMEN: Mr. E. E. Clark of the Interstate Commerce Commission under date of the 6th inst., wrote a member of this Association as follows:

"In correspondence relative to refusal of small state roads to accept as through shipments interstate traffic or participate in any movement of interstate traffic except it be delivered to them as local business, you ask whether or not a violation is involved of the law, and if so who is the violater.

In our opinion a road that lies entirely within one state is a participant in interstate traffic and comes under the provisions of the Act to regulate commerce just as much if it participates in any arrangement for through carriage

as if it participated in joint traffics. If it permits connecting carriers to collect its charges on interstate traffic and remit to it, or if it collects such charges for connections and accounts for same, it comes within the purview and jurisdiction of the Act.

If a shipment is tendered to your company consigned to a point local to such a state road and it refuses to receive from you any through shipments or to participate in any arrangement for the collection and accounting of charges, we think you would have to require the shipments consigned to your junction point and that it would be your duty to collect all of your charges upon it before you would permit it to go out of your possession. It is probable that a shipment so received at the junction point by the consignee and taken out of the custody of the carriers might be again consigned to the local point as a local shipment, but we do not believe that an agent of a carrier either state or interstate may lawfully act as a consignee or forwarding agent for the shippers. Some person other than a carrier must in our opinion intervence and take possession and custody of the property on the part of the owner or consignee thereof in order to break up the continuity of an interstate movement or interrupt the interstate character of the shipment.

There may be some doubts as to the right of this Commission to force a state road to become a party to a through interstate route and joint rate. One portion of the law says that where no satisfactory through rate exists, the Commission may require the carriers to form one; but another provision of the law says that it shall not apply to traffic wholly within one state.

It would seem therefore, that unless you can induce the carriers referred to to participate in some arrangement for through shipments moved under tariffs lawfully published and filed with the Commission and in arrangements for collection of and accounting for transportation charges it will be necessary for you to require consignment to the junction point where your lawful rates reach and there require settlement of all your charges before delivering the goods unless prepayment is required.

If a state road in its efforts to keep out from under the jurisdiction of the Act should handle such traffic in any manner that constituted participation in interstate tariffs, it would not only bring itself under the provisions of the Act but would subject itself to all of the penalties therein provided.

Your company and its connections, having shipped freight to the farthest point covered by their tariffs and having collected their lawful charges thereon for the service performed would not be liable for any unlawful act which the state carrier or its agent might thereafter commit in connection with it, provided its agent is not also agent for your company."

On January 22, 1909, Commissioner Eaton, for the Board, wrote a ruling in this case as follows, which was communicated at once to the Louden Machinery Company:

A short time since we used the following language in closing a discussion of the matter involved in your letter:

"1. A shipper has a right to ship from a point without the state to a point within the state, using a bill of lading between said points, pay the freight at the point of arrival, then make a new bill of lading or contract by rebilling to any other point within the state.

"2. In such case the Iowa Distance Tariff governs as to the rebilling and reshipment.

"3. It is immaterial what the purposes or intentions of a shipper may be when he undertakes to ship from a point without the state to a point within the state.

"4. A shipper has a right to any advantages which may be discovered by him in the way of lower freight rates, in thus bringing his shipment within the

jurisdiction of the laws of this state and in the application of the local distance tariff."

In applying this ruling it is necessary to remember that a "shipment billing" is a contract between the common carrier and the shipper and is complete in itself. When a shipment arrives at its destination on an original complete billing, and is received by the consignee, the original contract is completed. In such case the original consignee or his agent may rebill the goods to any point within the state and the latter rebilling will also be a complete contract in itself and therefore would be an intrastate transaction and come within the lowa Distance Tariff. If the rebilling is done by the consignee or his agent, the part taken by the common carrier who made the shipment on the original bill of lading, would not be that of a common carrier, but simply that of a forwarder. If the rebilling was done by the railroad company and not by the consignee or his agent, then it would be a continuous shipment from the point of origin to the point of ultimate destination, and be an interstate transaction.

The principle enunciated by the courts is that each billing is a complete contract in itself. To get the benefit of the Iowa Distance Tariff, the act of rebilling must be done entirely by the consignee or his agent and not by the railroad company. Otherwise the railroad company would be the agent of the consignee and therefore continue to be a common carrier until the final completion of its contract.

Of course it is unnecessary to say that the consignee or his agent must pay the freight before the rebilling above explained. The payment of the freight is in law a receiving of the shipment by the consignee or his agent and is necessary to complete the original contract.

Undercrossing-Farm

RULING.

Complaint filed May 25, 1909.

Closed April 29, 1909.

Complainant in this case claimed that by contract he should be supplied with under-grade farm crossing. It was not shown to the Commission that the conditions were unfavorable on this farm for the statutory crossing, and not having authority under the law to enforce the terms of contracts, the Board wrote the complainant its ruling under date of April 28, 1909, as follows:

"Your application to this Board for an undergrade crossing has been taken up for consideration. We call your attention again to our letter of May 7, 1908. This letter clearly shows the attitude of the Commission and also cites the law upon the subject, as well as the decisions of our courts.

"Our authority is absolutely limited upon the subject of farm crossings to that found in Section 2022. Applying that section to your case, it appears from the map which you have presented to us that you now have a graderossing on your farm. There is no evidence before us that it is not an 'adequate' crossing. We can well understand that an under-crossing would be greatly preferable, and if we had the authority and power we would be glad to exercise it in all cases where it is proper for the purpose of eliminating grade crossings, so far as possible in the state of Iowa. As above stated, however, our authority is absolutely limited and from the facts before us which include

your statement and the map which you have furnished us, we must conclude that your grade crossing now complies with the law and therefore we have no authority to order an under-crossing.

"You will understand, however, that upon the request to a railroad company, it is compelled to put in cattle guards and cross fences. Your letters do not indicate whether you have them now or not, but if not you can very easily procure them by making a request of the railroad company."

This was a request from the supervisors of Carroll county and the respondents, the Chicago Great Western Railway Company, for an adjustment of a difference that had arisen between the county and the railway company concerning the proper location of highway for the public safety and convenience in connection with the proposed change in the overhead bridge on the part of the railway company.

The Commissioners visited the premises in question on February 25, 1909, and after an examination of the same and of the records of the Board of Supervisors in the case, rendered their opinion as shown in the letter to the Board of Supervisors April 28, 1909. Said letter follows:

"On January 27, 1909, both the County Attorney of Carroll County, Mr. E. A. Wissler, and the Chicago Great Western Railway Company, through its Right of Way Commissioner, the late Mr. M. C. Woodruff, petitioned the Commission as follows:

"The receivers of the Chicago Great Western Railway Company have proposed to rebuild their bridge spanning the public highway and the right of way of the Northwestern Ry. Co. at a point about one-half mile west of the city of Carroll.

"They suggest a plan of a slight change in the highway that involves a vacation of a part of the highway under said bridge and a change in the traveled roadway of about thirty-three feet westerly of the present line, said change to leave roadway on a straight line for a distance of about twelve to fourteen rods on each side of railway. The suggested plan does not meet the approval of the Board of Supervisors of this county, whereupon they passed a resolution directing me as county attorney to petition your honorable board to fix a date as early as possible for an investigation of the situation, and in which request both parties to the matters involved join.

"Please advise both parties in sufficient time of your visit here that we may arrange to attend."

After due notice the Board visited the premises on February 25th, meeting the supervisors and representatives of the railway company.

While the Board of Railroad Commissioners, under the statute has no authority to act in a case of this kind, yet upon the request of the county supervisors and the railway company, they carefully examined into the

matter and expressed the opinion verbally, as they do now in writing, that the request of the railway company that the highway be changed to the point desired by such company where there is already an overhead crossing, the railway company to macadamize the road and put it into first-class condition, was a reasonable request.

The Board believes the county supervisors should accede to this request in the interest of public safety and convenience.

This opinion is expressed in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Carroll county, passed on January 27, 1909.

Highway Crossing at Grade near Glendale.

# RULING.

Complaint filed December 21, 1908. Case closed March 12, 1909. Complaint in this case was substantially as follows, and was filed by Mr. Huglin in a letter dated December 14, 1908.

"There is a matter which I have written to the railroad company about, and it is an urgent request from the people of Lockridge township and in the vicinity of Glendale. The undercrossing is two thousand feet west of the Glendale Station House and there is a surface crossing 715 feet east of the Glendale Station House. Now the people desire to have another surface crossing 740 feet west of the same building for the reason that a public highway is coming from the south and stops at the railroad at this particular point. There is a store building immediately north of the track at this point, and in order for the traveling public coming from the south to get to this store building across the track, they must turn east and travel 1,455 feet east to that surface crossing east of the Glendale Station House to get to that store building, then the road running east from the under crossing 2,000 feet west of the Glendale Station House is on the north side of the track, and parties desiring to go south from Glendale cannot now cross at a point of 740 feet west of the Glendale Station House where that road is and where that store building is, but will be obliged to travel east 1,455 feet to get over to the south side and then proceed south. Another thing. The stock yards at Glendale is on the south side of the track and a little west of the station house, and all those who are hauling in their hogs and driving their cattle from the west are obliged to come along the railroad track on the north side and drive 715 feet east of the station house to get around to the stock yards. It appears to be very inconvenient for the traveling public for these several reasons, and therefore there ought to be a grade crossing at the point of 740 feet west of the Glendale Station House. It is quite level at this point, and it would require a very little work and very little material to fix a grade crossing at this point.

The railroad company is not inclined to give us this grade crossing and Mr. Throop says that he does not think that the Railroad Commissioners would require them to do so, but I think that is very evident and a very clear case that they should put a grade crossing at this point, and if you should desire affidavits or evidence or a drawing, or further information, let me know and I can fully convince you that a grade crossing is necessary at this point."

Mr. Huglin was advised that if this highway had not been established in the regular manner over and upon the railway company's right of way, the Commissioners would have no authority to order the railway company to provide proper means for crossing their tracks. The matter was taken up by the Board with the railway company and it was contended on the part of the railway company that there was no legal highway at the point where crossing was desired.

In order to settle the dispute the Commissioners requested Mr. Huglin, the County Attorney, to furnish the Board copy of the records in the County Auditor's office, showing the establishment of the highway in question across the right of way of the railway company. Mr. Huglin, in response to that request, wrote the Board on February 12th as follows:

"I received your letter in regard to the surface crossing over the C., B. & Q. R. west of Glendale, Jefferson County, Iowa.

"You asked me for the records of Jefferson County, Iowa, showing the establishment of the public highway across the right of way at the point where we asked for a surface crossing.

"I have examined the records, and I do not find that the road running from the south was ever established across the right of way at this particular point, but I do find, according to the survey, that the road running from the south, known as the "Reeves Road" was established across the right of way a little east of the point where we desire the surface crossing, or very near the station house, and then angles on northward, and I think it would be satisfactory to the traveling public to have this surface crossing put in any place between the point we desire and the station house, so that there could be some reasonable accommodations for those desiring to cross the railroad track at this point.

"The railroad people at Burlington have the plats and all the records, and they know very well the exact location of the original highway crossing the right of way."

After further investigation on the part of the Board, and considerable correspondence, the Commissioners rendered their opinion in this case by letter to Mr. Huglin dated March 12, 1909. This letter follows in full, as it is in fact the decision of the Board.

We have considered your application for an order requiring the C., B. & Q. R. R. Co. to build a surface crossing over its tracks near the town of Glendale. As we understand the facts, there is now a surface crossing over the tracks of the railroad company 715 feet east of the Glendale Station House. There is also an undercrossing under the railroad company's tracks about 2,000 feet west of the Glendale Station House. You now desire an additional surface crossing, 700 feet west of the station and between the undercrossing and the station.

Concretely stated, you ask for three crossings over the tracks of the C., B. & Q. road, within a distance of 2,715 feet, and that two of them be surface crossings.

Several objections are made by the railroad company. Among others, it is claimed that no highway has been established at the point where the surface crossing is desired. The substance of all their other objections is that the necessities of the public do not require an additional grade crossing at the point requested.

We might readily dispose of this case upon the ground that it appears clearly from the correspondence that no highway has been established at the point where a grade crossing is desired. In such case the Railroad Commission has no authority which would warrant it to require the railroad company to put in a grade crossing at that point. We are aware, however, that this objection could be met by the people interested, by establishing a highway, and if we should put our decision upon this ground, the parties interested would be warranted in believing that if such highway were established, we would

grant their petition and order a surface crossing at the point desired. For the above reasons we prefer to place our opinion upon much broader grounds.

Conditions have changed greatly in the state of Iowa in the last twenty years. Railroads have increased their trackage facilities. The train service has been greatly increased. The increase in the number of fast, interstate trains, both passenger and freight, has been phenomenal. The modern conditions all demand that grade crossings be eliminated in every instance where it is possible. The convenience of the public at some particular point must of necessity be subservient to the greater problem of the elimination of danger to the public life. Every grade crossing is an element of constant danger and menace to the public, not only to those who travel across it, but in a much higher degree to the people who ride upon the trains, and it is the policy of this Commission to assist in every possible way in eliminating grade crossings, and in encouraging every means which will increase the safety of the operation of trains.

It is true that every crossing is a source of convenience to somebody, but in our opinion the increased convenience by the establishment of a grade crossing as desired would be far outweighed by the danger to the traveling public. We would not be willing to establish a precedent in this state that the convenience of the public required three crossings within a distance of 2,715 feet at or near a small station containing forty inhabitants, according to published reports, unless peculiar conditions required the same. No such conditions have been shown in this case as to justify such an order, or warrant such an exercise of our authority.

The above facts are in harmony with the uniform policy of the Board, and following this policy we are compelled to deny your application."

RULING.

Wires over Railroad Track. Expense of Reconstruction.

Ruling of the Board with Reference to Construction to be placed upon Section Eight of Regulations adopted by the Board of Railroad Commissioners under Chapter 109 of the Acts of the Thirty-second General Assembly.

In response to inquiry, the Board wrote Mr. E. C. Stevenson of Rockwell City, on July 8, 1908, as follows:

"In a recent letter to this Board you asked for a construction of Section 8 of the orders of the Board promulgated July 24, 1907, relating to the expense of reconstruction of telephone or telegraph lines.

Section 8 is as follows:

"Where reconstruction of wire carrying lines is made necessary to make them conform to these regulations, the expense of such construction shall be borne by the party last occupying the ground where such reconstruction is made necessary, and each party shall make all reconstruction on its own lines, unless by mutual agreement."

The law of which Section 8 is a part, refers only to telegraph or telephone lines crossing railway tracks, and the necessity for a reconstruction of such lines is only caused by the fact that they cross railway tracks. A telephone or telegraph line "occupies ground" in our opinion, as completely as a railway track. To apply the language of the section to a specific case, for the purpose of determining who should bear the expense of reconstruction, it is only necessary to ascertain which company or corporation occupied the ground first, either by its wires or tracks.

The company or corporation which occupied the ground last is the one in contemplation of this order that created the necessity for the expense of reconstruction, and the order was intended to compel the party who created this necessity for expenditure to pay the necessary expenses therefor.

For instance, in the case suggested by you, the telephone company was rightfully "occupying the ground" covered by its telephone lines. If there had been no railway track under these wires, there would have been no necessity for raising them to comply with our order. After the ground was thus occupied, the Chicago Great Western Railway Company built

its road under these wires. In our opinion the Chicago Great Western Railway Company is the "party last occupying the ground" and this "occupancy" creates the necessity for the raising of the telephone wires and therefore should pay the expense of the reconstruction.

In our opinion, the language with which this section closes, towit: "and each party shall make all reconstruction on its own lines, unless by mutual agreement," is not in conflict with the interpretation which we have given above.

The entire section must of necessity be construed together, and all parts of it must be given a meaning, if possible, consistent with all other parts. The latter clause does not in our opinion, relate to the payment of expense for reconstruction, but simply to the labor and control of the manner of reconstruction. In other words, the purpose of the rule is not to attempt to take from any telephone or telegraph company the actual control of its lines and permit any other company or corporation to assume control for the purposes of reconstruction.

The thought evidently is that any company or corporation operating a telephone or telegraph line, has a right to do its own work in reconstructing for the purpose of using such materials and such connections as it may deem advisable in such reconstruction. If, however, the parties fail to agree otherwise, each party shall do its own work in reconstructing, but the actual expense of the same shall be paid by the "party last occupying the ground."

All other rulings on the point suggested in your letter heretofore made by the Board, are withdrawn, and any rulings made heretofore which are in conflict with the above were made without having our attention called specifically to the precise point involved.

It is worthy of mention that Rule 8 was written by a committee composed of representatives of the railway companies and representatives of the telegraph and telephone lines, and was agreed to by all parties in interest, and simply submitted to the Commission for its approval.

Wires Over Railroad Tracks-Approval of Contract.

Approval by the Board of Contract between the Bohemian Telephone Company and the Cedar Rapids and Iowa City Railway and Light Company.

On February 1, 1908, the Board approved the following contract.

WHEREAS, The Bohemian Telephone Company, a co-partnership of Linn County, Iowa, of which Joseph Benish, Jr., is president, and J. W. Janko is secretary, hereinafter known as "Telephone Company," have a telephone wire crossing the right of way of the Cedar Rapids and Iowa City Railway & Light Company, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, hereinafter known as the "Railway Company," therefore

It is agreed that for the purpose of complying with the provisions of Chapter 109 of the Acts of the Thirty-second General Assembly of Iowa, and the

regulations adopted by the Board of Railway Commissioners of the State of Iowa by authority of said Chapter 109, that the following reconstruction is necessary:

That all of said telephone wires in crossing said right of way shall consist of telephone cable placed at least three (3) feet under the tracks and surface of the ground of said right of way of said railway company; said cable to be constructed of rubber covered copper wire encased in lead, and shall be protected from mechanical injury by being placed in galvanized iron pipe. The said pipe and cable contained therein shall be brought to the surface of the ground at the boundaries of said right of way and extended to a point at least ten (10) feet above the ground of said boundary lines.

It is also understood and agreed that all future construction, reconstruction or repairs of said Telephone Company made in conveying its wires across the right of way of said Railway Company shall conform to the foregoing as to construction and location.

The expenses of removing the wires from their present location, and placing them in conformity with the foregoing specifications as to location and construction, shall be borne by the Telephone Company.

The foregoing agreement is subject to the approval of the Board of Railway Commissioners of Iowa, and if not approved by said Board, is null and void.

WIRES OVER RAILROAD TRACKS. | Ruling with Reference to Use of Spliced Poles.

Upon inquiry from P. C. Heninger of Martinsburg, Iowa; Henry Diercks of Mason City, Iowa; E. E. Elerding of Eldora and E. E. Smith, Superintendent of the C. & N.-W. Ry at Eagle Grove, the Board held that Section 1 of the rules and regulations with reference to wires crossing railroad tracks, would not permit of the use of spliced poles.

Wires Over Railroad Tracks-Exception to Rules.

In a number of cases the Board has approved of exceptions to Section Two of the regulations for crossing of railways by telegraph, telephone, electric light or other wires.

Section Two reads as follows:

"In line construction poles shall not be set further apart than 115 feet at

railroad crossings and in no case shall crossing poles be set nearer than ten feet from the nearest rail of the main line track, and shall be provided with double cross arms to be placed upon the poles in a gain of sufficient depth to maintain the cross arms at right angles to the poles."

These exceptions were granted the Farnhamville Mutual Telephone Company, Farnhamville, Iowa; American Telephone & Telegraph Company, near Des Moines; Creston Mutual Electric Light, Heat and Power Company, Creston, Iowa; the Marengo Telephone Company at Marengo, Iowa; Lamoni Telephone Company at Lamoni, Iowa; Iowa Central Telephone Company at Iowa Falls; Interior Telephone Company at Grinnell; the City of Anamosa; the Nebraska Telephone Company, Council Bluffs, Iowa.

These exceptions covered a period from February, 1908, to July, 1909.

Ruling of the Board Concerning Obligation of Railway Company to protect land adjoining right of way when making cuts.

#### RULING.

On May 26, 1909, Mr. Paul Kiene, Assistant Treasurer of the Chicago, Anamosa & Northern Ry. Co., wrote the Board as follows:

On a certain part of our right of way, at time we built our road, we made a ditch to carry away the water; from that time, after several severe storms, the ditch has become considerably wider and has gradually worked its way over until it has gotten under our right of way fence and is eating into land of the farmer adjoining. He wants us to build a retaining wall, fill in back of that so as to give him land up to our fence and set the fence in good and solid.

"Are we responsible for what the elements may do and must we entirely at our expense construct such a wall? He has made complaint to us about the matter. Originally we constructed a good ditch but as we say in the first part of the letter, several heavy rain storms since which cut it deeper and wider.

"Kindly let me hear from you in early mail and very much oblige."

The Board, through Commissioner Eaton, on May 28, 1909, replied as follows:

"Yours of the 25th to the Railroad Commission has been referred to me for reply.

"Without any doubt whatever, it is the duty of a railway company which seeks to take away a portion of a man's land for right of way purposes to hold him harmless from any injury that may be sustained by the taking of his land.

"You ask if you are responsible for what the elements may do. The action of the elements is not the primary cause of the injury. It is the ditch that is the immediate cause of all the trouble. If you will restore the conditions on the man's premises exactly as they were before you took his land for right of way purposes, then and in that case you would not be responsible for the action of the elements, but if you have left your ditch, which is an artificial construction by yourself and not by the owner of the land, in such a condition that the action of the elements can wash it away and take with it a portion of the man's land that you have no right to, you would undoubtedly be liable for the damages.

"It is your duty, in my opinion, without any question to so guard your ditch by retaining walls, embankments, etc., that there shall be no injury to the adjacent land. If land has already been taken by the action of the elements, in my opinion it should be restored or paid for.

"The right granted to a railroad to cross a man's land and appropriate it without his consent, is a very great right and it must be so exercised as to do the least possible injury.

"The above fully answers your questions, and there can be no doubt about these propositions."

Shipper Entitled to Rates via Most Advantageous Route.

#### RULING.

Upon request of G. B. Birch, G. F. & P. A., Muscatine, North & South Ry. Co., Muscatine, Iowa, the Board ruled on Nov. 16, 1909, that a shipper is entitled to the most advantageous route in making a shipment, both as to distance and rate, and that should a greater charge be made by reason of a shipment having gone a longer route or by a route that brought about a greater charge than would have accrued by a more advantageous one, then refund should be made to the shipper.

Intermediate Charge for Switching Swine in Less Than Carload Lots.

Joint Rates.

#### RULING.

Request of W. A. Follett, attorney for the Atlantic, Northern & Southern Railway Company, Atlantic, Iowa, for a ruling of the Board on the following question:

In transferring less than carload freight from one depot to another by loading it in a car and switching it from one depot to another, would the railway company be entitled to a transfer charge, as provided by Rule 5 of Joint Rate Order No. 3?

On October 8, 1909, upon this question, in a letter to Mr. Follett, the Board ruled as follows:

"Replying to yours of October 7th, beg to advise that strict construction of Paragraph 5 of Joint Rate Order No. 3, would permit the addition of the actual cost of transferring less than carload freight from one depot to another, to the freight rate. It would make no difference how this transfer was affected, provided the same depot was not used by both railway companies. Of course, if this charge should exceed what it would cost to transfer by dray, the shipper is entitled to have his work done at the lowest cost."

#### House-trimming Material-What Constitutes.

#### RULING.

Request for ruling by John Wunderlich, Secretary of the Commercial Club, Cedar Rapids, as to whether cupboard material and bookcase material, constituting a part of interior house trimmings, might be shipped with house trimmings in mixed less than carloads or carloads.

On July 10, 1909, the Board ruled as follows:

"Replying to yours of July 9th, referring to Page 80, Items 20 and 22, Iowa Classification No. 14, would advise that where Cupboard Material, Bookcase Material, etc., constituting a part of the interior house trimmings, when shipped K. D., unpainted and unvarnished, should be ratable with house trimmings.

Coal, Pea and Slack-Method of Determining.

#### RULING.

Request for ruling on proper rating to apply on coal passing through a 1½ inch screen, by the Brown Coal Company of Sioux City.

The Board ruled on August 26, 1909, that Note K to Coal Rates, as shown on Page VI of Iowa Classification No. 14, "Soft coal passing through an inch and a half screen, will be classed as pea and slack" would govern regardless of what this coal should be called by the shipper.

JOINT RATES.

Application of Rule 3 of Joint Order No. 3.

#### RULING.

On June 16, 1909, the Board ruled that where a shipment passed over two or more lines of railroad, taking different maximum rates, as provided by classification of railroads, Rule 3 of Joint Rate Order No. 3 could not be made to apply. Upon such a shipment, 80 per cent of the local rate of each company involved in the transportation would apply.

D. L. Howard, et al., Jefferson, Iowa,

Application of Joint Rate-Intermediate Switching Charge.

#### RULING.

Upon request of D. L. Howard, Secretary of the Iowa Stock Food Company, Jefferson, Iowa, the Board ruled upon the following case:

In making a shipment over two lines of railroad, in order to make the transfer of carloads from one line to another, the services of an intermediate carrier were necessary. Query: Are the railroad companies permitted to add to the 80 per cent rate the charges made by the intermediate carrier for the switching from one line to the other?

On July 26, 1909, the Board ruled as follows:

"Replying to yours of July 26th, beg to advise that this Board has repeatedly ruled that where an intermediate carrier performs a service, it is entitled to compensation therefor. Where the shipment goes over two lines, each line receiving compensation for its share of the haul, there is to be no transfer charge, unless such transfer charge is made necessary by the service of an intermediate carrier.

"In a case such as you mention, if it is necessary to do switching by some carrier other than the C., M. & St. P. Ry. Co., in order for the shipment to get on their rails so that it may be transported to its destination, the carrier doing the switching service is entitled to compensation in addition to the regular charge for hauling shipment exacted by the carrier transporting the same.

"In other words, each transportation company handling a shipment is entitled to compensation therefor, and a railway company is not required to pay from its own earnings the charges made for the necessary service performed by some other carrier."

The Board made the same ruling upon inquiry of Mr. O. W. Collins of Fort Dodge; also with reference to inquiry from Mr. Frank Cassidy, Division Freight Agent, Chicago Great Western Railway Company, Des Moines.

Milk and Cream on Passenger Trains.

#### RULING.

In this case, on June 24th, 1909, request was made of the Board to advise whether there should be any discrimination between cream and other express or baggage handled on passenger trains. In other words, would an express company be permitted to advise their shippers "We will handle cream on but one train a day and handle other express on every train each day."

The Board, in this case, on July 19th advised Mr. Hartman that the Commission believed that it is absolutely necessary to limit the handling of cream and passengers to certain trains; that it would undoubtedly delay fast, through, passenger trains if they were required to stop and handle all cream and milk shipments; that without having any specific case in mind, the Board was of the opinion that reasonable regulations with respect to handling cream and milk on passenger trains would not be unjust discrimination.

CHURCHILL DRUG COMPANY, Cedar ( Meaning of Term "Barrel" in Class-Rapids.

#### RULING.

On June 21, 1909, in response to an inquiry of the Churchill Drug Company of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the Board ruled that the term "barrel," when used in Iowa Classification without qualification, means "entirely enclosed in wood," as provided by Rule 14, Iowa Classification No. 14; that therefore, if barrels with cloth tops are used, when such package is not provided for in the classification but article in question is provided for "in barrels," the next higher rate would govern.

CHICAGO & NORTH-WESTERN RAIL-WAY COMPANY. Inquiry Relative to Duty of Railway Companies to Fence Across Streams.

#### RULING.

The ruling of the Board in this matter was made on June 10, 1909, in the form of a letter to Mr. Davis, as follows:

"If the Commissioners understand your letter, there is a pasture on each side of the railroad through which a creek runs, crossed by the Railroad with a three span bridge, and the question that you present is:

"Is the railroad company compelled to fence its right of way alongside the bridge, in order to prevent stock from passing from one pasture to the other under the bridge, when the condition of the creek would permit it?

"The section of the Code which controls such conditions is section 2057, and the portion which is applicable is as follows:

"All railway corporations owning or operating a line of railway within the state shall construct, maintain and keep in repair a suitable fence of posts and barb wire or posts and boards, or other fence which the fence viewers shall determine to be equivalent thereto, on each side of the track thereof, so connected with cattle-guards at all public road crossings as to prevent cattle, horses and other live stock from getting on the railroad tracks."

"While to the Commissioners the meaning of this section is somewhat obscured, yet it is their opinion that the words underscored modify all the language which precedes them, rather than the words "so connected with cattle-guards at all public road crossings." The legislative intent as determined by this construction would be simply to require railways to so fence as to keep stock off their tracks.

"If the section above quoted was intended to require a railway to fence its entire right of way, this would enable the railroad company to absolutely deprive all landowners from the use of bridges and trestles in enabling stock to pass freely from one part of the farm to another. The Commissioners do not believe the legislature would pass a law depriving citizens of so valuable a right.

"It is the judgment of the Board, therefore, that a railroad company may only be required to so fence as to keep stock off its track. It follows, that if in the case you present, on account of the nature of the stream and the bridge over it, it is impossible for stock to get upon the track of the railroad company, the railway company has done all that is required."

RULING OF THE BOARD.

The complaint in this case was as follows.

"Some time ago I secured a contract for supplying the state of Iowa with coal for the Clarinda State Hospital, and before submitting bid for this contract I was informed by the Burlington agent of Centerville, Iowa, that the rate on coal from Centerville to Clarinda would be \$1.10½ per ton.

"I was informed by the same party that there would be no switching charge on coal shipments to that point.

"I was awarded this contract and now the Burlington railroad demands of me a switching charge of \$5.00 per car, regardless of the size of the car."

The complaint was at once taken up by the Board with the railroad company, and Mr. W. D. Eaton, attorney for aforesaid company, made extensive answer to the same. At a later date, the Sunshine Coal Company complained that the switching charges were excessive. The Commissioners carefully examined into the whole subject and on June 23d wrote the complainants as follows:

"The Commissioners have carefully considered the complaint made by you against the C., B. & Q. R. R. Co., to the effect that the switching charge is an excessive one at Clarinda to the Clarinda Hospital.

"It appears from the evidence and records that the length of this switch from Clarinda over the main line of the C., B. & Q. R. R. Co., to the point where the switch begins and from there on to the Hospital, is substantially four miles. This must be considered by the Board as the length of this switch. It also appears that the C., B. & Q. R. R. Co. has no regular switching crew stationed at Clarinda and that in order to transport cars from Clarinda to the Hospital they must be transported from their main line, a distance of about two miles, and from there to the hospital over the switch in controversy.

"It appears from the records in this office that the present switching rate is \$5.00 per car from Clarinda to the Hospital, providing there are anywhere from one to three cars and \$4.00 per car for four cars or more. The Board finds from former precedents which have been established in this state, that considering the conditions as they exist at Clarinda, these are reasonable and fair switching rates. It must be remembered that these switching rates not only involve the transporting of the car over this distance, but going after the car when it is unloaded and bringing it back to Clarinda.

"This Board has held that for a distance of three miles under more favorable conditions, \$5.00 per car was a reasonable switching rate and this holding was based upon the personal investigation of the premises and conditions and upon evidence introduced on the subject before the Board. (See decision of the Board in case of Galvin Brick and Tile Co., Iowa Falls, vs. C. & N. W. Ry. Co., report for 1907, page 244, copy of the report being sent you.)

"The Board is compelled to deny your application."

Overcharge on Sheep in Crates.

#### RULING.

The complainant in this case stated that he had shipped three crates, containing five lambs each, the total weight of the three crates amounting to about 900 lbs.; that the railway company, by Item 20, page 78 of Iowa Classification No. 14, had assessed him a charge based on 200 lbs. for each lamb, making a total estimated weight of 3,000 lbs., at one and a half times first class.

# 442 THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

The Board ruled that sheep, in crates, would take a minimum weight of 200 lbs. per crate. Where the weight exceeded this minimum, the actual weight would govern. In no case, however, should the weight be less than 200 lbs. for each crate.

With reference to Commodity Rates, the Board took the following action:

The Commissioners ordered that a rate be fixed on Harness and Saddlery and on Glucose, fixing a flat rate for the distance across the state via the various lines to conform to the rates in effect across the state on interstate business on the same commodities, to be graded back so as to properly meet the rate now in effect upon the same commodities within the state.

Application of Northey Manufacturing Company of Waterloo, Iowa, for change in rate on Cooling Rooms, K. D. in sections, was denied.

Application of T. J. O'Neill of Harpers' Ferry, Iowa, et al., for reduced rating on White Oak Fence Posts was continued for further hearing.

Application of the Keith Furnace Company of Des Moines for an amendment permitting Pipes and Fittings to be shipped with Furnaces at the Furnace rate, was continued for further hearing.

Application of Pioneer Implement Company, Council Bluffs, Iowa, for reduced rating on power corn shellers was continued for further hearing.

Petition of G. A. Wrightman, Secretary, Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, for change of rule providing for minimum weights, was withdrawn by the petitioner. 460

Application of E. G. Wylie, Freight Commissioner, Greater Des Moines Committee, and G. A. Wrightman. Secretary, Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, that wherever Official Classification shows carload ratings where none existed in the Iowa Classification, the Board should adopt Official Classification carload rates, was withdrawn by Mr. Wrightman with the statement that specific applications would be made wherever such carload rates were desired.

Application for a ten cent rate on Sash, Doors and Blinds, 250 to 380 miles, made by Curtis Bros. & Co. of Clinton, Iowa, was granted, except that rates should be graded each way from a ten cent rate at 330 miles. It was also ordered that the lumber rate be made to correspond, except that mixed carloads of Lumber, Lath, Shingles, Sash, Doors and Blinds, should remain the same.

Application of the United States Gypsum Company, that Gypsum Rock be allowed to take the same rate as Stone, Rough Quarried, was granted.

The question of adoption of new rule for minimum charge on small shipments was cotinued for further investigation.

Application of E. G. Wylie, Freight Commissioner, Des Moines, Iowa, for a carload rating of third class on Boots and Shoes, was denied.

The question of rate for Corn Cribs, set up, requiring flat car, question having arisen on inquiry by T. H. Simmons, General Freight Agent, C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., was withdrawn.

Upon the application of Messrs. G. A. Wrightman and E. G. Wylie of Des Moines, for Commodity Rates in Iowa on the various articles named in the application which was included in and made a part of the decision in reference to Supplement No. 2, the Board ruled that wherever it was shown that a commodity moved locally in Iowa across the state, commodity rates should be made, making the same rates locally within Iowa, as shown in the Western Trunk Line Rules Circular 1-A, without disturbing other rates any more than necessary to properly grade the same.

On showing, the Board ordered that a commodity rate on Bags and Bagging should be made, same to be sixteen (16) cents per hundred pounds for distance 290 to 380 miles, to be properly graded each way. Minimum weight to be 30,000 lbs.

Application that a ten (10) cent rate be granted across the state on Cement, (Paving and Roofing) Tar and Pitch, etc., with a minimum of 40,000 lbs., was granted for like distances with like conditions.

Same action was taken with reference to a fifteen (15) cent rate on Egg Case Fillers, with a minimum of 30,000 lbs.

Same action was taken with reference to Paper (Lining, etc.), eleven (11) cents per hundred pounds, minimum of 40,000 lbs.

Same action was taken with reference to Box Board (Paper) and Wood Pulp Board, 13.5 cents per hundred lbs., minimum 40,000 lbs.

All other applications for commodity rates were denied, except that application for commodity rate on Alcoholic Liquors in Wood, was withdrawn and application for commodity rate on Pig Iron and Iron or Steel Pipe were continued by request of Mr. Wrightman.

The application of the Lehigh Clay Products Company for a rule providing that the words "full capacity" in Rule 8 of Iowa Classification No. 14, meant "visible capacity" was denied, for the reason that the rule plainly requires that cars only be loaded to their full capacity for containing the commodity shipped therein; that such rule does not mean the "marked capacity" of car.

Application of the Cedar Rapids Commercial Club for lower less than carload ratings on Alum and Borax was denied.

Application of the same commercial club for reduced rating on less than carload shipments of Sulphur, In Boxes or Kegs, was granted.

Application of the same commercial club for reduced rating on less than carloads Epsom Salts in Barrels, was granted.

Application of the Des Moines Tent & Awning Company for a rate on Chautauqua Outfits, consisting of Tents, Poles, Camp Chairs, etc., was granted.

Application of W. B. Martin of Dubuque that Spring Beds and Wire Cots be permitted to be loaded in carload with Mattresses at carload rate of Third Class, was granted, except as to rate, which was made Second.

Application of W. B. Martin for third class rate on Iron or Steel Grave Vaults, was granted.

Application of Ketchum & Gaston of Marshalltown, Iowa, for third class less than car load rating on Potato Planters, with Wheels, on or off, etc., was granted.

Application of the Louden Machinery Company of Fairfield: Iowa, that Hay Carriers in Boxes or Bundles be given a third class less than carload rating, was granted.

With reference to the rate on Molasses Feed across the state of Iowa, which was continued from the February 18th hearing on request of shippers, there being no further presentation of the matter to the Commission, the application was dismissed without prejudice.

The action of the Board of Railroad Commissioners in all these cases was unanimous and in accordance with their action the following Supplement No. 3 to Iowa Classification No. 14, and Schedule of Reasonable Maximum Rates and Charges for Freight and Cars, was ordered printed and published according to law, the same to take effect May 1, 1909, and to include all provisions, and changes made in the classification or rates as aforesaid.

On June 29, 1909, it was ordered by the Board that date for hearing of all petitions then on file for changes in Iowa Classification be fixed for Tuesday, July 20, 1909, ten o'clock a.m. at the office of the Board in Des Moines, and that proper and legal notice of the same be given. Publication of notices, as required by law, was made and a large number of personal notices were sent interested parties by mail.

Wrightman, Iowa Manufacturers Assn.; E. G. Wylie, Greater Des Moines Committee; W. B. Martin, Dubuque Shippers and Manufacturers Assn.; M. D. Smiley, Clinton Manufacturers Assn.; J. H. Full hearing was had with reference to applications before the Board; hearing being continued over including July 21, 1909. During the progress of the hearing and at its conclusion, the Board made rulings upon various petitions as follows:

Application for rule with reference to crating vehicles was contiued and petitioners asked to amend their petition stating precisely what was wanted.

Application for wood fuel rates on white oak fence posts in car loads was denied.

Application that furnaces complete, including all parts and fixtures, castings, registers, etc.,take the same rate as furnaces N. O. S., granted.

Application with reference to rate on Power Corn Shellers, K. D., continued.

Application for rate on Coal Drills in bundles, granted.

Application for change in "prepaid" requirement in shipment of Household Goods, denied.

Application for exception to Rule 27, Iowa Classification, with reference to marking L. C. L. shipments of Brick, granted.

Application for change in Classification on Butter in Boxes and Tubs was withdrawn.

Application for rating on concrete ties was continued for further hearing.

Application for same rate on new Poultry Coops when returned to shipper as upon second-hand coops, denied.

Application for commodity rate on Vinegar in carloads, granted.

Application for modification of rule with reference to returning Agricultural Implements, etc., at half rates so as to include "branch houses," granted.

Application for change in rate on railway material, withdrawn.

Application for Fourth Class L. C. L. rate on Iron Barn Door Hangers, etc., continued for further hearing.

Application for Third Class L. C. L. rate on Corrugated Iron and Steel Culverts, nested and not nested, continued for further hearing.

Application for mixed C. L. rate on Sinks and Lavatories, passed.

Application for change in rating on Hoisting Drums, etc., granted,

Application by railway companies that L. C. L. rate on Sash Weights, Iron or Cement, L. C. L., be changed from Fifth to Fourth Class, was granted for the reason that Fifth Class is a carload class and should not apply to less than carload shipments. For the same reason, applicantion for raise in rates on Wall Cleaning Paste or Compound was granted.

Application by railway companies that Rule 35, as amended by Supplement No. 2, Iowa Classification No. 14, referring to minimum weights on Live Stock in C. L., be abrogated and cancelled, denied, except that if conditions remain the same as at present, the exception to the rule applying to shipments of Live Stock will be cancelled on June 1, 1910.

Application of railway companies that rule No. 38, promulgated in Supplement No. 2 be modified by striking out the words "or neglect," was granted.

Application of railway companies for restoration of Second Class L. C. L. on Double Trees, Eveners, etc., denied.

Application of railway companies that minimum rate on Baskets, C L. be advanced from 8,000 lbs. to 10,000 lbs., and the rating from Fourth Class to Second Class, denied.

Application of railway companies that rate and valuation rule applying on Candy, Chewing Gum, etc., be modified to read as provided by Western Classification, denied.

Application of railway companies that Classification on Maple Sugar substitutes be raised so as to take the same rating as "Sugar, Maple or Lemon." denied.

Application of railway companies that Classification on Scrap Paper be modified to take Second Class L. C. L. instead of Third Class, was denied.

Application of railway companies for modification of Classification in Leather Articles, N. O. S., etc., from Second Class L. C. L. to First Class L. C. L. was denied.

Application of railway companies that Hides, green and salted, be raised from Fourth Class to Third Class, L. C. L., was denied.

Application of railway companies that rating on Tallow in barrels or casks, L. C. L., be restored to ratings as originally provided in Iowa Classification No. 14, was continued for further hearing.

In accordance with the action taken in these cases, the Board ordered that Supplement No. 4 to Iowa Classification No. 14 be prepared showing all changes ordered by the Commission on July 20th and July 21st, 1909, herein set out, said Supplement No. 4 to include all existing Amendments to Commodity Rates and Supplements to Iowa Classification No. 14 previously made and not in conflict with the changes ordered by the Board on date last named, and that notice of the taking effect of such Supplement No. 4, be published according to law, the same to become effective as soon as proper publication could be made.

In accordance with the order of the Board as noted, Supplement No. 4 was to take effect September 1, 1909. Copy of said supplement follows:

# Cases Closed by Correspondence

No. 4009-1909.

Citizens of New Boston, or Nixon, vs. Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Location of Depot.

Filed June 15, 1906. Closed January 24, 1908.

This was an application of the citizens of New Boston or Nixon for a union depot at railroad crossing of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway companies.

A hearing upon the premises involved in the application was fixed by the Board for July 11, 1906. After giving due notice to all parties interested, the Board met at the time above stated. There were present D. J. Palmer, chairman, and N. S. Ketchum, members of the Commission. Many of the applicants appeared in person, and the railroads interested were duly represented. After inspecting the premises, hearing the evidence and being duly advised in the matter, the Board found that on account of the character of the ground, it would be impracticable to locate a union station at the point desired without incurring an expense that would be unwarranted from either a business standpoint or that of service to the public.

It was agreed by the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company that at its expense it would locate a highway which would make the depot accessible to the public.

Therefore the petition of the complainants was denied upon condition that said railway company perform its agreement as to highway within a reasonable time. When said agreement is performed this case is closed.

A. J. Byerly, Mayor, Coggon, Iowa, vs. Chicago, Anamosa & Northern Ry. Co., and Illinois Central R. R. Co.

Dangerous Street Crossing.

Complaint Filed December 17, 1907. Closed November 20, 1909.

This complaint was an application by the Mayor of the town of Coggon, asking an order of the Board of Railroad Commissioners, of the State of Iowa, requiring the Chicago, Anamosa & Northern Railway Company to build certain guard rails or fences to the north approach of the bridge on Third street over Buffalo creek, in the town of Coggon, near and upon the depot grounds of the Chicago, Anamosa & Northern Railway Company, and as grounds for such order and application therefor the petitioner alleged that said approach was unsafe for public travel.

Pursuant to notice given the mayor of the town of Coggon and the Chicago, Anamosa & Northern Railway Company, the Board met on the site of the complaint on May 5, 1909, to view the same and hear such statements as might be offered by the parties.

There was no appearance made by the town of Coggon. The respondent railway company appeared by Henry Kiene, its President; Paul Kiene, its Assistant Secretary and Treasurer, and J. L. Kelsey, its General Manager.

On view of the premises and from statements made by the parties present it appeared to the Commission that the approach to the bridge in question had been, subsequent to the filing of the complaint herein, properly filled in with dirt and rock up to the dry walls of masonry and properly guarded by substantial wing fences of posts and plank, and the Board found said approach as then constructed was reasonably safe for the public travel upon and over same.

C. S. Atkinson, Mayor of Pocahontas, et al., vs. M. & St. L. R. R., and C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co.

Train Service Between Des Moines and Gowrie.

Complaint filed December 19, 1907. Closed January, 4, 1909.

Complaint in this case was substantially as follows:

"We desire to call the attention of the Board of Railroad Commissioners to the train service of the M. & St. L. Ry, and the C., R. I. & P. Ry, as it affects us in reaching points between Gowrie and Des Moines. Owing to the fact that the trains upon these two roads do not connect at Gowrie, it is impossible for us to make a continuous trip to and from any point between Gowrie and Des Moines, and our mail service to and from such points is also seriously affected. Mail from here to those points and from those points to this place must either go to Des Moines and then back, or go around by the Northwestern railway. This service is a great inconvenience to many of the people of our town and vicinity, and they are protesting against it very strongly."

Other complaints followed, and the case was submitted to the railway companies. The line from Des Moines to Gowrle is owned and operated by the M. & St. L. R. Co., and the C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co., has trackage rights over this piece of trackage for its trains from Des Moines on its Gowrle-Sibley branch. By the the terms of the agreement between the two railway companies, the C., R. I. & P. Ry. Co. was not prepared to take on or discharge passengers at any station between Des Moines and Gowrle. The trains of the two companies were not run in such a way that passengers could leave the train of the Rock Island at Gowrle and take passage the rest of the way on the M. & St. L. without great inconvenience.

The Board had a great deal of correspondence in this case with the various complainants and the railway companies, and on September 30,

1908, addressed communications to the officials of the above railway companies, respondents in this case, requesting them to re-arrange their trackage right agreement in order to accommodate this travel. Later the Board fixed hearing for December 4th in reference to this case, and notice was generally given all interested parties. On December 1, 1908, however, the Commissioners were informed that the railway companies had reached an agreement whereby the Rock Island trains should handle passengers at M. & St. L. stations between Gowrie and Des Moines and stations on the Rock Island railway northwest of Gowrie. This closed the case.

Train Service on the Cumberland Branch of the C., B. & Q. R. R. Company.

While no specific complaint was filed with the Board respecting train service on the branch, the Commissioners discussed the conditions with the officials of the railroad company and it was suggested that train service should be re-arranged upon this branch to more nearly meet the needs of the patrons of that company. The officials of the company, in response to the request of the Board submitted the results of their investigation along this branch. This report is so exhaustive and so complete, it is deemed advisable to print the same in full.

The Board of Railroad Commissioners,

Des Moines, Iowa.

GENTLEMEN: Replying again to your letter of December 15th, I hand you herewith a record of movements of our Cumberland Branch trains during the months of September, October and November, 1908, together with a general report of the conditions existing on that branch when I took charge of the Creston Division in November, and the recommendations made for the purpose of bettering that service.

#### CUMBERLAND BRANCH.

This branch of the C., B. & Q. railroad serves seven towns, and has a total length of 47.2 miles, running in a northwesterly direction from Creston to Cumberland.

Train Service.

At the present time a mixed service of two trains each way per day is maintained. This service consists of,—

THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

Train No. 5, leaving Creston at 6:45 A. M. and arriving at Cumberland at 10:59 A. M.

This train handles passengers, baggage, mail, express and freight, and departs after the arrival of Nos. 5 and 15 (fast mail) from the east and No. 10 from the west.

Train No. 3, leaving Creston at 3:90 P. M. and arriving at Cumberland at 5:35 P. M.

This train carried passengers, baggage, mail, perishable express and freight, and provides service for passengers arriving in Creston on No. 3 from the east, Nos. 6 and 4 from the west and No. 4 from Kansas City and St. Joseph, and also receiving the mail from Fast Mail No. 7.

Train No. 6, leaving Cumberland at 6:30 A. M. and arriving at Creston at 10:05 A. M.

This train carries passengers, baggage, mail, express and freight, and makes connections at Creston with No. 6 eastbound, and No. 3 west-bound; besides providing immediate outlet for west and east bound mails. Passengers on this train can go south to St. Joseph or Kansas City on No. 3 at 2:25 P. M.

Train No. 2, leaving Cumberland at 1:55 P. M. and arriving at Creston at 5:35 P. M.

This train carries passengers, baggage, mail, express and freight, and arrives at Creston in time for close connection with Nos. 9 and 13 west-bound and No. 2 eastbound.

A record of movements of trains on the Cumberland Branch for months of September, October and November, 1908, as requested by you, follows, and a study of same will show a tendency to more closely adhere to schedule, but it is still far from what it should be and what the people have a right to expect.

As stated in my immediate reply to your letter of the 15th, I had already found that our train service was very irregular and that I had taken steps to better these conditions.

To accomplish these results it was necessary for me to consider in detail the many causes which together resulted in such a service, and begin a systematic effort to correct these faults.

Being mixed trains, and having a variable quantity of merchandise to handle at each station, it is hardly possible to make a schedule that can be adhered to, to the minute, at all times. If a schedule is made sufficiently slow to permit of meeting all these conditions, there will, at times, be too much dead time at some stations and for this one reason, it has been considered that a variation of fifteen minutes at a terminal would not be subject to censure.

At the present time we are arriving at terminals with much greater regularity than during the months of September, October and November. We found that the class of engines used on this branch had not sufficient power to handle the trains over the grades without losing time, and the same fault resulted in switching delays. One larger engine has been put in that service and it is giving good results. Another engine has just been received and was put in service this morning.

We found that stockmen had been permitted to await the arrival of the train before loading stock and that engines would be used in spotting cars for loading. This caused delays to trains, which can be avoided, and stockmen have been instructed to load cars before arrival of train on which it is to go forward.

We found that certain days of the week, when stock shipments were heavy, the regular trains could not handle these shipments and make schedule. To correct this fault, we have arranged to run extra trains to take care of these movements so as not to put more work on the regular trains than they can handle.

We found that the handling of local freight was causing serious delays to trains and to overcome this we have arranged for set out cars at four of the stations having the largest freight consignments.

We found that the work of handling loads and empties was not being properly distributed by the Chief Dispatcher; and when this was properly done, delays were avoided on some trains and the schedules of other trains were not affected by doing the work properly belonging to such trains.

The faults that I have mentioned are not yet all corrected, but progress is being made as our later records show.

On train No. 2, arriving in Creston, I find that our schedule between Greenfield and Creston, the last twenty-one miles of the trip, is too fast to bring this train into Creston on time. Our next schedule changes will be made so that this train can do as well as the other three trains.

January 1st to 15th, with thirteen running days, during which time we have had severe cold weather. No. 5 has reached Cumberland nine times on time and was held three mornings at Creston for connection with Fast Mail and one morning was delayed on account of engine failure.

During the same period, No. 3 has reached Cumberland ten times on time or not over fifteen minutes late.

No. 6 has arrived on time at Creston ten times, the other three delays being occasioned by holding this train to help No. 5 along as it was carrying mail for R. F. D. routes.

No. 2 has arrived on time at Creston three times, and of the ten delays recorded, eight were due to handling some cars from which ballast was being unloaded and to inability to make scheduled time from Greenfield to Creston, which fault can not be corrected until new schedule is put into effect.

Requests have been made that this company separate the passenger and freight business on this branch, but I believe, after visiting the various stations and conferring with the business men, that a regularity of service that can be depended upon, will do much toward quieting the complaints that have been made.

The company has taken the stand that the service as now in existence, being two mixed trains each way per day over a line 47 miles in length, is the one that will give the best satisfaction to all concerned.

The schedule arrival at Creston of Nos. 2 and 6 is such that the best possible connections can be made either east or west, and the scheduled departure from Creston of Nos. 3 and 5 is the best that can be developed for connection with arriving trains.

We contend that these mixed trains, if run on time, will give better facilities for passenger travel, will give more frequent mail deliveries and will expedite the movement of express and freight.

Were these two trains separated into a strictly passenger train, and a local freight train each way per day, there would be better passenger service once a day each way but the result of such change would be a reduction of one mail each way per day, a reduction of express receipts to once a day each way, and while giving one good passenger trip each way per day, would necessitate a slower movement of freight because of concentration of all freight, both local and car lots, on the one freight train. This train would, of course, carry passengers but being a local freight would necessarily be very irregular in its movements and would be the cause of even more complaint than is now experienced.

In case of the separation of freight and passenger business, it would of course be expected that the passenger train would be southbound in the morning and northbound in the afternoon in order to serve the people along the line as they desire, and this would compel traveling men and any others who might wish to go north in the morning, to use the local freight. This train must necessarily leave Creston in the morning to distribute freight transferred at Creston freight house during the preceding day. This train also must necessarily move south in the afternoon to take care of the stock and other shipments originating on that line so as to insure prompt movement out of Creston.

Again, a separation of freight and passenger service means delay to mails which are now handled twice a day—connections being made with both westbound fast mails; and the double express service now in existence must be reduced to one delivery per day, and that in the afternoon.

I believe a careful consideration of the many sides of this question will result in conclusions in line with the arguments herewith presented.

It will be necessary for the railroad company to fulfill its part of the agreement, namely: to see that trains are run as scheduled, and such changes must be made as will make such runs possible.

I trust that after considering this case, your conclusions will be withheld until such time as will permit the company to carry out the proposed plans for improving the service on the Cumberland Branch.

Many complaints reached the Board from the Commercial Club of Des Moines, and others, that passenger business between Des Moines and points on the Chariton and Indianola Branch of the C., B. & Q., and from stations on said branch to Des Moines was not being properly taken care of by the train service as then furnished; that the proper connections were not made at Indianola with the C., R. I. & P. branch line to Des Moines, and the Commissioners were requested to make investigation and to make such order therein as would be found just and proper.

After considerable correspondence without seeming to bring about any desirable results, the Board fixed November 2d for visiting each town upon the branch in question; looking over the situation and hearing statements made by the parties, the hearing to be continued in the office of the Railroad Commissioners on November 3rd. Notice was given to a large number of people living at the various towns upon this line, and upon request the Board subpoenaed several witnesses to appear before them on November 3rd. Upon the date named in the notice, that is, November 2d, the Board visited the towns of Indianola, Ackworth, Milo, Lacona, Oakley and Chariton, holding a hearing at each place.

On November 3rd the hearing was continued in the office of the Board in Des Moines. As there seemed to be a disposition on the part of the railroad company and the complainants to reach some satisfactory solution of the difficulties which had been presented, the Commissioners requested that the railway company and the complainants should each furnish a proposed new schedule which should provide for two passenger trains each way per day, and one strictly freight train each way per day; this in lieu of two trains each way per day as then in effect, one strictly passenger and the other a freight train which carried passengers.

The railway company submitted, in accordance with that request, their proposed train schedule as follows:
