

Introduction

Citizen commitment to the arts in Iowa is growing. There are more community arts councils, arts fairs and crafts festivals than ever before. The number of concerts, theatrical productions, dance presentations and visual arts exhibitions has increased. Many teachers are aware of some of these arts resources and are integrating them into the curriculum; others need help in locating the resources, then making use of them.

This guide attempts to foster a greater spirit of cooperation between educators and citizens in the community who believe that learning in and through the arts is a basic need of each individual student. It is designed to assist educators in identification and utilization of available arts resources. It is a listing of organizations which are interested in helping students enjoy and understand the arts. More than a listing, the guide provides strategies for the use of arts resources and guidelines for evaluating the educational effectiveness of a variety of community arts programs in the schools. Teachers of any subject matter at any developmental level can use the guide to enhance the arts education potential for handicapped, as well as non-handicapped students.

Art and music teachers, superintendents and local arts councils across the state were asked to identify arts organizations. Each organization suggested was contacted to find out specific services available. Those organizations which responded and indicated a willingness to work with schools and students are listed. Organizations not listed are those which either were not identified initially, did not respond, or replied that they did not work with students at the present. Although the guide lists only groups, there are many individuals throughout the state who are deeply committed to improving the quality of arts education.

This guide should not be viewed as an end product, but as the initial step in a continuing process of community and school cooperation to expand the use of the arts in cognitive and affective learning.

Using the Guide

Arts resources are categorized into six divisions: Community Arts Councils, Creative Writing, Museums, Music/Dance, Theatre/Film and Visual Arts. In each division, local resources are listed alphabetically according to Area Education Agency (AEA). State and national resources are described separately.

- 1. Peruse the JDR Guidelines for Effective Education.
- 2. Determine the AEA in which your school district is located.
- 3. Select a division of arts resources which can be integrated into your curriculum.
- 4. Review the resources listed for your AEA under the division. Descriptions are brief, so contact organizations to see what other services they provide.
- 5. If you cannot find an appropriate resource in your AEA, consider contacting a state or national organization or one in a neighboring AEA.
- 6. This guide is only a beginning; there are many more resources in every community. Familiarize yourself with their services.
- 7. Other possible resources include:
 - Public Libraries: books, films, filmstrips, slides, tapes, records, an information center for arts events

Chambers of Commerce: knowledge of arts agencies

Civic Organizations: sponsor art functions

Colleges and Universities: sponsor performances and some faculty members will serve as resource people.

JDR 3rd Fund Guidelines for Effective Education

I. Highest Level of Educational Effectiveness:

- A. The form, content and structure of the program grow out of a cooperative effort by school personnel (teachers, curriculum specialists, administrators), artists and arts organization representatives, and are related to and supportive of the content of teaching and learning in the schools.
- B. Programs are planned as an on-going series of related educational events.
- C. The program includes the participation of artists who serve as resources to teachers and students in a variety of direct teaching and learning activities. These include creative experiences or demonstrations of the techniques, skills and talents indigenous to their particular profession.
- D. Preparatory and follow-up curriculum materials planned specifically for the program are provided to the schools. These materials result from work done jointly by school representatives, artists and arts organization educational staff. Related visual and written materials and resources such as slides, recordings, tapes, films, reproductions and teachers' guides are available in the schools and used by teachers in classrooms.
- E. In-service training is available to teachers in order that they have a general understanding of the arts organization, its purposes, its resources and the nature of its services in terms of curriculum development.
- F. Orientation and training are available to artists and arts organization educators so they have an understanding of the nature of schools, the content of the educational program, and the learning characteristics of students at different age levels.
- G. As a result of the foregoing, the arts event becomes part of the process of teaching and learning, not just a "field trip," time off from school work or another assembly program.

II. Middle Level of Educational Effectiveness:


- A. The content of the program is planned by arts organization educators with some help from school personnel, but is not focused on the content of school studies.
- B. Programs are isolated and sporadic events.
- C. Contact with artists is limited.
- D. Some preparatory materials are provided to the schools for the arts events. Few related materials are available in the schools.
- E. No in-service training is available to teachers. Often they have no more information about the arts events or organization than the children they accompany.
- F. No training is available to artists or arts organization educators. They assume an automatic interest or curiosity on the part of teachers and children. Capability to work with different age groups is learned on the job by trial and error.
- G. The arts event is of some value to children and teachers, but remains separate from the larger educational program of the schools.

III. Low Level of Educational Effectiveness

- A. The content of the program is accidentally determined by the fact that the arts organization has a special event it feels has some significance for the schools and the schools decide to send all fifth grade classes and their teachers to it.
- B. Programs are single, isolated, unrelated events or activities.
- C. Artists are not involved as resources to teachers and students in the program.
- D. No preparatory or follow-up materials are available.
- E. No in-service training is available for teachers.
- F. Arts organization representatives do not work with teachers and students since their regular responsibilities make very heavy demands on their time, or the schools have not made appointments for their classes in advance.
- G. Educationally, the arts event is of dubious value to students and teachers.

AEA Media Centers



State legislation in Iowa in 1974 established fifteen area education agencies. Each of these agencies provides media services to supplement the K-12 media services available in the local school districts.

Each of the AEA media centers is required to have the following: materials lending library, professional library, curriculum laboratory, production services, personnel (staff), facilities, delivery system and consultative services.

A materials lending library consists of print and non-print materials that are available on a free loan basis. Materials are delivered at least twice a week to each of the schools served.

Iowa Arts Council

The Iowa Arts Council (IAC), founded in 1967, is dedicated to developing arts resources in Iowa and to making the arts accessible to all Iowans. The agency is governed by a 15-member board appointed by the governor. Five panels of professional artists with expertise in the areas of music, dance/theatre, visual arts, community arts and education advise the board. A 12-member professional staff, located in Des Moines, administers IAC services and programs throughout the state.

The Council pursues its goals through a three-part approach of programs, services and grants-in-aid.

Iowa Arts Council Programs

Programs are designed to systematically involve lowans with the arts. They are primarily oriented toward groups and organizations.

Artists-in-Schools — The IAC's Artists-in-Schools program places professional artists in the fields of poetry, dance, visual arts and crafts, folk arts, theatre, film and architecture in the classroom setting. Artists work with teachers to broaden the scope of the K-12 school curriculum and to increase understanding of the arts. Local, state and federal sources share the costs.

Arts and Older Iowans, Arts and the Handicapped, Arts in County Facilities — Under these programs, artists-in-residence provide weekly visits/classes for the benefit of special groups within the community. Libraries, recreation departments and local arts councils are the most frequent sponsors. The IAC provides funds for such programs on a first-come first-serve basis.


Solo Artists — Individual artists in several disciplines are available through the IAC for one-day workshops, demonstrations, festivals, etc., Local sponsors and the IAC share the cost. Request the solo artist brochure from the Council for details.

Touring Arts Team — A team of five to seven artists makes a six-week tour of Iowa towns with populations of less than 1,500 each summer offering workshops on a variety of arts forms for people of all ages. Interested communities should contact the IAC by March 31 to be included on that summer's tour schedule.

Touring Art Exhibits — Several exhibitions, featuring the works of lowa artists, are available through the Council for tours of public sites in the state. Local sites must meet minimum security and spatial requirements. Scheduling is usually arranged six to eight months in advance

Touring Performers — Iowa artists are available through the Council for demonstrations, theatrical presentations, concerts, recitals and other types of performances. Fees are shared by the IAC and local sponsors. Contact the Council for a brochure listing the artists available.

Regional and National Touring Performers — The Affiliated States Arts Agencies of the Upper Midwest, of which the IAC is a member, offers Iowa communities opportunities to sponsor performances by major artists of the upper midwest region. Past tours have included performances by the Guthrie Theatre group, the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra and the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre. The Affiliation also coordinates the Dance Touring Program of the National Endowment for the Arts, bringing nationally known dance companies into the state for performances and teaching residencies.



Iowa Arts Council Services

IAC services include consultations, publications and a modest library of slides and films for loan.

Consultation — The community arts consultant works with local community groups to help them assess their needs and resources and to set short and long-term goals. The fiscal officer answers questions about incorporation and non-profit status, grant applications and bookkeeping problems. Council members and staff are also available as speakers and workshop leaders. Communities and non-profit groups seeking technical expertise on a specific problem may apply for a short-term artist-in-residence grant to bring in a consultant not on the IAC staff.

Publications — The *Iowa Arts News*, an eight-page, bi-monthly newsletter, is available free upon request. It contains all official notices of the Council — grant deadlines and awards, meeting dates, etc. — and provides information on Council activities. The *Programs/Services/Grants-in-Aid* brochure gives detailed information about agency offerings. The *Guide to Program Support* offers guidelines on IAC granting procedures. IAC publishes a number of other miscellaneous publications, including the *Annual Calendar of Summer Art Fairs*, listing more than 50 arts fairs and festivals held in the state each year, and the *Community Arts Manual*, a collection of articles and "how-to" information for communities interested in starting arts councils.

Film/Slide Loan Service — The IAC library has nearly forty films, many depicting IAC programs, film making techniques and Iowa subjects. These award-winning film shorts and films are available for loan to non-profit organizations. Nearly 2,000 art slides are also available to non-profit groups. Borrowers pay only the cost of round-trip postage.

Iowa Arts Council Grants-in-Aid

The IAC Grant-in-Aid program is open to individuals and non-profit, tax-exempt organizations seeking support for arts projects. Major grants, those exceeding \$500, are awarded in February each year. Letters of intent are due the preceding December 1; and applications, the preceding January 10. Programs may not begin until the following September. Mini-grants, those less than \$500, are made at the discretion of the executive director as long as funds are available. The Council occasionally offers special incentive grants through funding from the National Endowment for the Arts. Notices of such grants are published in the *Iowa Arts News*.

lowa Public Broadcasting Network

The Iowa Public Broadcasting Network (IPBN), established in 1967, consists of eight television transmitting and one translator station. The network is governed by the State Educational Radio and Television Facilities Board, a nine-member group, three of whom are appointed by the governor; three by the Iowa Board of Public Instruction; and three, by the Iowa Board of Regents. The IPBN staff of 110 includes 78 full-time engineers employed at the transmission sites.

Funding for the network comes from state appropriations (70 percent), Corporation for Public Broadcasting grants (20 percent) and private grants (10 percent).

About half of IPBN's programming comes from the Public Broadcasting Service in Washington, D.C.. Another 40 percent is syndicated and the rest is self-produced. IPBN programming regularly features music, dance, drama and other arts by world renown performers.

Educational Television

During the day IPBN's in-school programming offers students, as well as home viewers, a chance to learn from the worlds of literature, music and art.

The Short Story introduces viewers to the best American short-story writers and compares them to their counterparts in other countries. Each program is essentially a short "made for television" adaptation of a literary work. The series helps viewers develop an appreciation of the English language and suggests to them that if they enjoy the video presentation they might also enjoy the print version and other works by the author

Music explores different music concepts, exposing viewers to a variety of styles of music ranging from vocal to instrumental, from jazz to Gregorian chants. Each program ends with an opportunity for viewers to apply what has been presented, to view and listen as music is recreated by the National Symphony Orchestra, conducted by series host Murry Sidlin.

Images & Things is designed to give viewers a clearer understanding of art and its relationship to life. The series directs attention to the aesthetic and humanistic aspects of art. The programs are produced for both visual enjoyment and learning — to delight the eyes and ears; to excite the mind; to evoke positive, personal, divergent responses from the audience.

Evening Viewing

During the evening IPBN broadcasts a number of programs presenting the best in dance, drama and music.

Each Sunday evening, IPBN broadcasts one of the following musical programs: *Previn and the Pittsburgh, Evening at Symphony* or *Evening at Pops*. Andre Previn, Arthur Fiedler and Seiji Ozawa bring their particular styles to the direction of these three musical organizations. Guest artists often join the conductors for works of both contemporary and classic composers.

Great Performances presents the best in music, dance and drama. Each Wednesday evening, such notables as Sir Georg Solti, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the American Ballet Company and others present their own special form of "art."

IPBN also telecasts a number of special live events from the Metropolitan Opera House and from Wolf Trap Park.

lowa Public Radio

With the recent addition of KWIT, Iowa now has eight public radio stations, six FM and two AM. KWIT at Western Iowa Technical College in Sioux City and KCCK at Kirkwood in Cedar Rapids are governed by the Iowa Board of Public Instruction. The Iowa Board of Regents oversees the rest.

The stations are funded primarily by state and federal grants. Listener contributions are welcomed.

Much of what is heard on the stations comes from National Public Radio or syndicators. The stations do produce about 10 percent of their offerings and frequently share these programs with other public radio stations in the state.

Public radio programming includes a variety of instrumental and vocal music. Listeners can wake up to the works of Bach, Beethoven and Wagner and drift off to sleep at night to the accompaniment of jazz. Master musicians regularly heard on public radio include the Chicago Symphony, the New York Philharmonic, the Boston Pops, the Philadelphia Orchestra and many others.

Special series introduce listeners to the lives and works of great artists such as Arturo Toscanini. *All Things Considered*, a National Public Radio news commentary program, brings listeners news and features about the arts and profiles of artists, musicians, painters and writers. And *The Book Club* presents readings of fiction and nonfiction, new and old.
