

PAIN-KILLER ALMANAC AND THE FAMILY RECEIPT BOOK FOR 1868 Editor's Historical Introduction

This is the tenth in the series of century-old almanacs reproduced by offset process from the outstanding collection housed in the library of the State Historical Society of Iowa. The Pain-Killer Almanac is representative of almost a score of patent medicine almanacs in the Society's collection, the front covers of eight of which appear on the inside and outside back cover of this reproduction. The popularity and longevity of these patent medicine almanacs in Iowa is attested by the fact that in our library several represent runs of from ten to forty years. Milton Drake compiled a list of fifty different 19th Century patent medicine almanacs for James H. Young's The Toadstool Millionaires (Princeton University Press, 1961). A number of those listed continued publication well down into the 20th Century.

The first free patent medicine almanac was issued in Buffalo in 1843 for Bristol's "wondrous panacea" Sarsaparilla. Almanacs such as Bristol's, Sloan's, Jayne's, and Ayer's were printed by the millions. The Ayer's Almanac appeared concurrently in fifteen different language editions and was distributed well into the 20th Century. It was Ayer's proud boast that its Sarsaparilla was "the only one of all the advertised Sarsaparillas which the World's Fair officials would allow to be exhibited at the great Columbian Exposition."

Many of the almanacs owned by the Society were distributed by such local concerns as Jackson Drug Company in Keosauqua and J. Stong in Kilbourn. These almanacs usually advertised the products of one patent medicine company. Eastman & Westcott of Iowa City, on the other hand, distributed The Family Medical Almanac for 1858 which advertised Dr. Wistar's Balsam of Wild Cherry, Dr. Guysott's Extract of Yellow Dock and Sarsaparilla, Dr. Osgood's India Cholagogue, I. V. Hardy's Eyebalm, Mexican Mustang Liniment, Wells' German Condition Powders, McAlister's All-Healing Ointment or World Salve, and the only "sure and safe" remedy for dyspepsia — Oxygenated Bitters.



THE ZODIAC.

The Zodiac [from ζόδιον, diminutive of an ζώον, animal] is an imaginary belt in the heavens, 16° or 18° broad, in the middle of which is the ecliptic, or sun's path. It contains the twelve constellations, which once constituted the "twelve signs of the zodiac," and from which they are named. The zodiacal circle is supposed to be of very ancient origin, though it is first mentioned by Arlstotle. About a century later, Autoleus speaks of it. Aratus, in his astronomical forms, names the zodiacal circle, and enumerates its twelve signs; and states that six of them rise and six set every night.

It was anciently believed that the heavenly bodies exerted a powerful influence over the feelings and actions of all the animal creation, and especially over the destinies of mankind; that the relative position of these, at the hour of the birth of the child, gave cast to his character, and through life influenced his fortunes, brought him health and success, or misfortune, disease, and even death. The influence of the position of the sun and moon in the signs of the zodiac was believed to be especially powerful over the success or failure of enterprises commenced or carried on at such times, as well as over the health of the particular parts of the body, which each particular sign was supposed to represent, which is shown in



SHORTEST AND LONGEST DAYS.

At Berlin, London, and Paris, the longest day is 161 hours, and the shortest 71; at Stockholm and Upsal, 19½ and 4½; Hamburg and Dantzic, 17 and 7; St. Petersburg and Tobolsk, 21½ and 2½, Archangel, 22½ and 1½; at Torneo, 23 and 1; at Wardedhus, in Norway, and at the North Cape, daylight lasts from the 21st of May to the 21st of July, without interruption, and at Spitzbergen the longest period of day lasts 3½ months.

DIRECTIONS FOR THE USE OF

THE PAIN KILLER.

The Great Family Medicine of the Age.

USED INTERNALLY AND EXTERNALLY.

For Coughs.—Mix one teaspoonful of the Pain Killer with three tablesoconfuls of molasses, and take two or three teaspoonfuls of the mixture every half hour, till relief is obtained; bathing the throat and upper portion of the chest (and sides, if sore from coughing) freely with the Pain Killer, and inhale it from the hand.

For a Cold.—Take one teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in a cup of hot water, well sweetened with molasses. It is better to take this dose just before going to bed. A little milk added will make it more palatable. Bathe the chest freely with the medicine, and inhale jt from the hand. Repeat the dose every twelve or twenty-four hours till relieved.

For Ferr and Aque.—Take three teaspoonfuls of the Pain Killer in about half a pint of hot water, well sweetened with molasses, as the attack is coming on, bathing freely the chest, back, and bowels with the medicine at the same time. Repeat the dose in twenty minutes if the first does not stop the chill. Should it produce vomiting (and it probably will, if the stomach is very foul), take a little Pain Killer in cold water sweetened with sugar after each spasm. Perseverance in the above treatment has cured many severe and obstinate cases of this disease.

For Asthma and Phthisic. — Same as for Cough, repeating the dose every fifteen minutes till relief is obtained. Also, wet a flannel with Pain Killer, and lay it on the throat and chest.

For Dyspepsia. — Take one teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in sugar and water, immediately after each meal. Let your diet be nourishing, but taken at regular intervals; being careful not to overload the stonach at any time, nor to eat too soon after severe exercise.

For Liver Complaint.—Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer, in sugar and water, three times a day, bathing the side and between the shoulders with the medicine at least twice a day, rubbing it in well. Spikenard, steeped in cold water, will be found useful, as a common beverage, while taking the Pain Killer for this disease.

Acid Stomach, Headache, Hearthurn, and Indiaestion, to be treated the same as Dyspepsia.

Bathing the head freely in Pain Killer will usually relieve the most severe attacks of Headache.

For Canker in the Mouth Throat, and Slomach — For a wash for the mouth and a rargle for the throat, make a strong mixture of the Pain Killer in milk and water, sweetened with loaf sugar; and take, three times a day, a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer mixed with a gill of milk and water, sweetened with loaf sigar.

For Diphtheria. — On the first appearance of the symptoms of this dreaded disease, make a gargle, using two teaspoontils of Pain Killer to a half pint of water, and gargle the throat every differen minutes, bathing with the medicine about the throat and neck. Accompany this treatment with an occasional dose of the Pain Killer in sugar and water. If promptly applied, will invariably give relief.

For Canker Rash. — Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in hot water, sweetened with molasses, three times a day, every other day, and a dose of Castor Oil on the alternate days.

For Kidney Complaints.—Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in a fill of new milk and molasses, equal parts, three times a day, bathing the body with the medicine freely wherever you for I distress. If troubled with a retention of urine, take a pill of white turpentine every day, in addition to the above, till relieved.

For Piles.—Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in milk and molasses, three or four times a day, anointing the parts affected with an ointment made of a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in a tagup filled with equal parts of sweet cream and sweet oil. This ointment can be made milder of stronger, as circumstances may require, by using less or more Pain Killer in the above-named quantity of cream and oil, always using it as strong as can be borne.

For Sick Headache and Sea-Sickness. - Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in hot water, sweetened with loaf sugar, every hour, till relieved.

For Cramp and Pain in the Stomach. — Take a teaspoonful of the Pain Killer in hot sweetened water, every half hour, till relieved; bathing the stomach and bowels freely with the medicine at the same time.

Pam'ers' Colic, Diarrhaa, Summer Complaint, and Cholera Morbus, to be treated the same as Crump and Pain in the Stomach; the dose to be repeated more or less frequently as the violence of the attack may require, bathing the stomach and bowels freely with the medicine, laid on warm with flamed. Keep the flamed moist with the medicine. The Pain Killer may be often given with Castor Oil, in such cases, with good effect.

For Dysentery. — Take a teaspoonful of Pain Killer, well mixed with a gill of hot milk and molasses, or with a tablespoonful of Castor Oil, at the same time bathing the bowels, as in Diarrhoa.

For Cholera Infantum.—To a child under twelve months, give from ten to twenty drops in warm milk and water, sweetened with loaf sugar, every hour, buthing the stomach in a mixture made of a teaspoonful of Pain Killer in a half gill of milk and water, warm. If the child be between one and two years old, use for a bath equal parts of Pain Killer and milk and water, increasing the dose accordingly. For a child over two years, use the Pain Killer clear, for a bath, increasing the dose to half a teaspoonful.

For Cholera. — Take a teaspoonful of the medicine in hot water, sweetened with sugar. Bathe the stomach and bowels freely with the Pain Killer at the same time. If the attack be severe, and attended with cramps and diarrhea, repeat the dose every fifteen minutes, using hot fomentations to the bowels. In extreme cases, the dose may be increased to a tablespoonful.

** In Cholera Infantum, as well as in Asiatic Cholera, the Pain Killer may be given with Castor Oil, in about equal proportions, with the most favorable effect.

For Scalds and Burns. — Keep the parts wet with the Pain Killer till the pain ceases. To heal the wound, use the salve prepared for Ringworms and Old Sores.

For Frost-Bites and Chilblains. - Bathe freely in Pain Killer several times a day.

For Sprains and Bruises. — Rub the Pain Killer well into the wounded parts, taking the medicine internally at the same time.

For Whitlows, Felons, and Boils. — Keep the part affected covered with a cloth kept moist with Pain Killer, till the pain is relieved. Take the medicine internally at the same time.

For Ringworms and old Sores.—Bathe in the Pata Killer, and then apply a salve made of equal parts of rosin, becswax, and sweet oil, inixed by simmering on a slow fire. Take half a teaspoonful in molasses and water, three times a day, during the treatment.

For Rheumatism and Neuralgic Affections. —Bathe the parts affected freely with the l'ain Killer, well rabbed fit, till the pain is relieved.

For Pain in the Side, Back, and Loins. - Treat the same as Rheumatism.

For Stings of Insects, Scorpions, Centipedes, and the Bites of Poisonous Insects.—Keep the wounded parts covered with a cloth well moistened with Pain Killer till relieved. It is well to take the medicine internally also.

For the Bites of Venomous Reptiles.— Take the medicine freely internally, in doses sufficient to keep the system well stimulated, while the wound is kept wet with the Pain Killer. The bite of the rattlesnake has frequently been cured simply by bathing the wounded part so far as the swelling extended.

The Bites and Scratches of dogs and cats are readily cured by bathing in the Pain Killer.

Wounds by Fish Hooks, or the Fins of Fish, may be cured in the same way.

Dr. Sweet says it takes out the soreness in case of bone-setting, faster than any thing he has ever used for that purpose.

Mothers will find it invaluable in the nursery, and it should always be kept at hand in case of accident. For pain in the breasts, take a little Pain Killer in sweetened milk and water, bathing the breasts with it clear at the same time. If the milk-passages are clogged, from cold or other causes, bathing in the Pain Killer will give immediate relief.

ECLIPSES.


ECLIPSES.

In the year 1868 there will be two Eclipses, both of the sus:

I.—An Annuar Eclipse of the Sux, Feb. 23. Invisible in the United States, but visible in South America, from Paragonia to the southern shorts of the Gulf of Mexico; also in the Pacific Ocean, Europe, and Africa. Eclipse begins on the Earth, Feb. 23, at 6 h. 9 m., in the morning, (Washington men times, 1m 3045, 78° 9' west from Greenwich, and in lat. 12° 50' south. Eclipse ends on, Ghe Earth, Ed. 23, at 7 minutes past aboun, (Wash. m. t.,) in long. 33° 13' west from Greenwich, and in lat. 18° 2' north.

II.—A TOTAL Eclipse of the Sun, Aug. 18. Invisible on this continent. Visible in the Eastern Hemisphere, viz.: Africa, Asia, Australia, etc.

A TRANSIT OF MERCURY over the Sun's disk, Nov. 4. Invisible in the United States. The Moon's Phases in this Almanac are calculated for the meridian of Washington to the nearest minute. Her risings, settings, and southings are given for the respective places approximately.

CAUSES OF DISEASE OF THE PULMONARY ORGANS.

Rice Biscuits.— Two tablespoonfuls of rice flour, three of wheaten flour, two of powdered sugar, a piece of butter the size of a walnut to be rubbed into the flour, as much boiling milk as will scald the mixture. Beat with the rolling pin till short; roll out very thin, and cut into rounds as large as the top of a tumbler. Bake in a very slow oven.

White Bread. — After all that has been said and written about good light, and the decided aversion that every one has to poor bread, — heavy, dark, and sour, or soggy, — it is surprising to see how many families never have a loaf of light bread, except what they buy at the baker's. If mothers realized how much irritability among their children arises from indigestion caused by heavy bread, they would certainly make it a point to have light bread at eny cost of time and trouble to learn. We assure our readers that the following receipt, accurately followed, will produce light, sweet bread.

Sift four quarts of flour into a pan. Put into another pan or bowl a handful of Indian meal, a little salt, and a bit of butter, or tablespoonful of nice lard. On this, pour two quarts of boiling water. Stir it, and pour the mixture on to the flour in the other pan, boiling hot. Add some cold water to make it soft enough to mold out, and then work it well with the hands, kneading it up lightly, not jamming and pounding it down hard in the pan. Let it rise over night; if in winter, near the stove. In the morning, work it up lightly into four good loaves, and let it set half an hour rising in the pans; then bake it two hours if the heat is moderate, but less if it is a very quick heat.

"Dida't you tell me you could hold the plough?" said the farmer to an Irishman he had taken on trial. "Be aisy, now," says Pat. "How could I hould it, an' two horses pullin' it away? Just stop the craytures, and I'll hould it for ye."

CHOLERA: . . . I regret to say that the cholera has prevailed here of late to a fearful extent. For the last three weeks, from ten to fifty or sixty fatal cases each day have been reported. Baked Fish.—After washing, a shad is wiped dry, inside and outside, next buttered, salted, and peppered, with bread crumbs, a little chopped parsnip, and the juice of half a lemon squeezed on the outside; then place in a bakepan and put in the oven.

Halibut, haddock, cod, or other fish, do the same way. Lat with cream of flour, butter, &c.

All Fresh Fish should be dried thoroughly with a clean cloth before putting into the fat, and should be rolled well in sifted Indian meal. Perch and trout, however, are improved by being dipped in a mixture of beaten egg and breadcrumbs. The fat in which fish is fried should not be poured into the dish when the fish is served up.

Jelly Cake. — To three well-beaten eggs, add one cup of powdered sugar, one of flour; stir well, and add one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, half a teaspoonful of saleratus dissolved in three teaspoonfuls of water. Bake in two piepans, spread as even as possible. Have ready a towel, and as soon as done, turn the cake on it, bottom side up, then spread evenly with jelly, roll up quickly, and wrap in a towel.

Garden Walks. — As many persons have at this time large heaps of coal ashes, they can dispose of them in no way to better advantage than by hauling them into garden alleys. Remove from four to six inches of dirt; and having screened the ashes, or separated the cinders, first apply the coarse stuff, then oyster shells, if you have any on hand, small stones, glass, or pieces of bricks, and top-dress with the ashes. Roll it, and you will have one of the best walks ever seen in a garden. The ashes become very hard, and are never wet, winter or summer if the weather gives the water the least chance to get away. In summer, in five minutes after a shower, there will be scarcely enough moisture to dampen the sole of your shoes. If there is not sufficient ashes for all the walks, commence with the principal ones, and in a couple of years the garden will be complete. Then, each spring after, give them a slight top-dressing of ashes, which will about consume your annual stock.

Molasses Candy. — One quart of West-India molasses, half a pound of brown sugar, the juice of one lemon. Put the molasses in a kettle with the sugar, boil it over a slow, steady fire till it is done, which you can easily tell by dropping a little in cold water: if done it will be crisp, if not, it will be stringy. A good way to judge if it is boiled enough is to let it boil till it stops bubbling. Stir it very frequently, and just before it is taken off the fire add the lemon-juice. Butter a shallow tin pan, and pour it in to get cold.

Light Tea Buns. — Take half a teaspoonful of tartaric acid, and the same quantity of bicarbonate of soda, and rub them well into a pound of flour, through a hair sieve, if leisure permit. Then work into the flour two ounces of butter, and add two ounces of crushed and sifted lump-sugar, also a quarter of a pound of currants or raisins, and (if liked) a few carraway-seeds. Having mixed all these ingredients well together, make a hole in the middle, and pour in half a pint of cold new milk. One egg, well beaten, mixed with the milk, is a great improvement, though your buns will do without any. Mix quickly, and set your dough with a fork on baking tins. The buns will take about twenty minutes to bake. From these ingredients, you ought to produce a dozen.

When cold, add half a pound of raisins chopped, two eggs, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of butter, one and a half spoonfuls of soda, one cupful of sweet milk, flour to make a thick batter; add nutmeg, cloves, cinnamon, allspice.

French Rolls. - Rub an ounce of butter into a pound of flour; mix one egg beaten, a little yeast that is not bitter, and as much milk as will make a dough of a middling stiffness. Beat it well, but do not knead; let it rise, and bake on tins.

Potatoes for Breakfast. - Take the mashed potatoes left from dinner the day before, mix them smooth with a little hot milk and butter, put them by spoonfuls into an iron biscuit-pan, previously heated, and brown them in a hot oven. They are very light and nice.

To Preserve Pineapples. - Peel a pineapple rather thickly, so that no black spots may be left, and cut it into slices of a quarter of an inch in thickness. Make a syrup with half a pound of the best lump-sugar to half a pint of water. When this is made, put the slices of fruit into it, and let them boil together for ten minutes; then carefully remove the slices with a spoon, put them into a jar, pour the sirup over them, and let them stand for two days. At the end of this time, drain the sirup off, add to it another quarter of a pound of sugar, and boil it up again, without the fruit, pouring it over it, when done, as before. Repeat this operation once again at the end of two more days, again adding a quarter of a pound of sugar to the sirup; and when cold the preserve will be ready for use. It will keep for a long time, if the air be carefully excluded, by laying a bladder over the top of the jar.

Boiled Leg of Lamb. - Trim off all the loose fat, cut off the shank, wash and wipe it dry; dredge it with flour, and tie it in a clean cloth; put it in boiling water enough to cover it. The water should be salted in the proportion of two teaspoonfuls of salt to a quart of water. Let it boil from two to three hours according to its size. Serve it with drawn butter or rich parsley sauce, whichever may be preferred, and vegetables of any kind which may be in season.

Sponge Cake. - Take sixteen eggs; separate the whites from the yolks; beat them very lightly; sift into the yolks one pound of flour, adding a few drops of essence of almond or lemon to flavor with; then add one pound and a quarter of pulverized loaf sugar; beat this well with a knife; then add the whites whipped to a stiff froth. Have ready the pans, and bake.

Apple Pudding. - Pare and stew three pints of apples; mash them, and add four eggs, a quarter of a pound of butter, sugar and nutmeg, a grated lemon. Bake it on short crust.

Orange Jelly. - Boil two ounces of isinglass in a pint and a half of water; add half a pound of fine loaf-sugar, the juice of three sweet, three bitter oranges, and three lemons; strain through a jelly bag, and mould it. Some people prefer a wineglassful of rum added, but that may be omitted.

SUPERIOR DRESSING FOR CHICKEN SALAD. - Beat the yolks of 6 eggs very light, pour over them a teacup of boiling vinegar, and return to the saucepan. stirring it constantly for a few minutes; then set it away to cool. Rub a large tablespoonful of mustard with 6 spoonfuls of oil; grate in half a potato; add a teaspoonful of salt and a little pepper; harden the whites by boiling the eggs; chop them up, and scatter among the salad; then stir all together, and pour over just before serving.

SALAD DRESSING. - Beat three eggs, add one gill of vinegar, one gill of water; place it over the fire, stirring it gently; when it begins to thicken, stir in a piece of butter the size of a shellbark, one teaspoonful of salt, and one of white sugar, and a very little black pepper. Set it in a cool place until wanted for use.

To Remove Mildew from Linen. - This can be done by mixing with soft soap, a little powdered starch, half the quantity of salt, and the juice of a lemon, and applying it to the mildew stain with a paint-brush on both sides of the linen. The stained article should then be left out on the grass day and night until the spot be removed.
