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"CELEBRATE OUR STATE"

Iowa turns 150 on December 28, 1996, Statehood Day. When you get to be that age, they have a name for it: Sesquicentennial (Sess-kwi-sen-tenn-ee-ull). Iowa's Sesquicentennial is a historic event — and a celebration of the rich promise of days to come for the people of Iowa.

Every county and city in Iowa is planning a celebration for the state's big birthday. So no matter where you visit, you're going to find us in an extra festive mood. We're going to light the sky with fireworks. Lead the parades of local pride. Restore our great historic structures and create new works of art. We're going to celebrate our past and prepare for our bright future. Claim our place in history and gain a head start on our next 150 years. Hundreds of events are planned so you can be part of the pageant. Here are just a few examples:

Paddle into history on the *Iowa 150 Mississippi River Adventure*. A fleet of 500 canoes will navigate more than 300 miles of "Old Man River" from New Albin to Keokuk on a 14-day voyage, August 4 – 17.

In Southeast Iowa, Scott County invites you to "150 Days of Celebration." This Sesquicentennial Salute will kick off with a parade on May 25 in Davenport/Bettendorf. The opening day will be followed by dozens of special events, concerts, exhibits and projects that culminate in the grand finale weekend — the *Big River Rendezvous*, October 10 – 13, with riverboat adventures on water – featuring the *Delta Queen* – and festivals on land.

The *Tri-County Triathlon* challenges athletes to swim, run and bicycle their way through Central Iowa's Boone, Webster and Hamilton counties, October 3 – 5.

In the nation's capital, the Smithsonian Institution — also celebrating its 150th year — is putting the spotlight on Iowa. Our folks and way of life will be a main attraction at the Smithsonian's Festival of American Folklife. More than a million people will learn about Iowa in Washington, D.C., June 26 – 30 and July 3 – 7, 1996. As a premier statewide

Sesquicentennial celebration, the Iowa exhibit will then move from the Smithsonian to the Iowa State Capitol Grounds where it will be enhanced and restaged as the 1996 Festival of Iowa Folklife, August 22 – 25. Free and open to the public, this festival will feature concerts, great storytelling, hands-on workshops with traditional musicians, ethnic and regional dance performances, and opportunities to learn the special techniques of great Iowa cooks and craftspersons.

Iowa will lead the nation in 1996 in celebrating the anniversary of the Mormon pioneer exodus of 1846 (another 150 -year anniversary!). Iowa communities will host grassroots celebrations throughout the year honoring the courage and sacrifice of the Mormon pioneers. From June 23 – July 13, the *Iowa Mormon Pioneer Trail*

the state to view the routes and sites of the original Mormon pioneers. Choirs, special programs, symposiums, and local pioneer celebrations will commemorate the great exodus.

From the Iowa State Fair to RAGBRAI to the Iowa Games, this is the year Iowa's favorite events

become part of a yearlong Sesquicentennial birthday bash! If you tour through Iowa during this milestone year, you'll see a progressive, 21st-century state built upon Iowans' Midwest heritage. That's worth celebrating!

1995, a historic partnership with the Iowa Division of Tourism was initiated when the Iowa Bankers Association (IBA), and its 500 member banks, agreed to distribute the new *Iowa Travel Guide*. With the tremendous support shown by local banks, distribution reached nearly 100,000 in just one month.

- Publishing a year of special monthly newsletters, which will be available only in bank lobbies. The newsletters will feature upcoming Tourism and Sesquicentennial events, explore Iowa's rich history, and include letters and articles by state leaders.
- Distributing the 1996 Iowa Sesquicentennial/ Tourism Calendar of Events.
- Providing first-point distribution of the 1996 *Iowa Travel Guide*.
- Sponsoring a 24-hour, toll-free hotline for information about Iowa Sesquicentennial and Tourism events.
- Hosting special in-bank promotions of Iowa Sesquicentennial/Tourism merchandise; the commemorative edition of Iowa, A Celebration of Land, People & Purpose; and the celebration of Statehood Day.

- Historic preservation projects and tourism promotions that highlight our special places and our hospitality.
- Educational programs that will help us pass along all of these wonderful insights and experiences to future generations.

SESQUICENTENNIAL DEBUT

"It's stupendous, it's outstanding, it's beyond all my expectations of what it would be!" Those were just some of the words Governor Terry E. Branstad used

E. Branstad used to describe the Sesquicentennial Debut in Iowa City on Statehood Day, December 28. After months of anticipation, Iowa's yearlong celebration of 150 years of statehood is finally under way.

The kickoff activity took place at the Old Capitol, where a typical government day in 1846

was re-created by a host of state lawmakers and officials. More than 4,000 people watched actors in 1846 attire, including Governor Terry E. Branstad, Lt. Governor Joy Corning, former Governors Robert D. Ray and Norman Erbe, as well as other statewide elected officials and dignitaries. Period music was provided by the City High School Quartet and the Boland-Dowdall Duo.

The afternoon provided children of all ages and their families with a variety of entertainment, including hands-on art activities, storytelling, the Eulenspeigel Puppet Theater and folk singer Dave Moore. The day was capped off with festive birthday cake — 940 pieces of cake were eaten in just 20 minutes — and a stunning winter fireworks show.

The All-Iowa Birthday Debut rounded out the evening with entertainment by the Kuhlmann Sisters of Des Moines. Some 950 guests took part in the festivities at the Iowa Memorial Union. The culinary history of Iowa was featured with four food stations, each representing a different 50-year period of time. Guests enjoyed venison stew, sausages and cheeses, and a variety of sweets at the dessert station.

The highlight of the evening took place at 8:00 p.m. when the Kuhlmann Sisters led the crowd in singing "Happy Birthday" to Iowa. Governor Branstad, Sesquicentennial Chair and former Governor Robert D.Ray, Cochair C.J. Niles, and Sesquicentennial

Executive Director Scott Raecker gathered around a birthday cake, shaped like Iowa, to blow out the candles as 1,500 balloons dropped from the ceiling. It was a moment which will long be remembered.

Scott Raecker summed it up when he said, "We're just absolutely thrilled with the response we've had!" Indeed, the Iowa Sesquicentennial Commission has now set the stage for what promises to be a year like no other the state of Iowa has ever seen!

On December 28, 1846, President James K. Polk, signed into law a bill making Iowa the 29th state in the Union. Now, 150 years later, Iowans all across the state are celebrating the Sesquicentennial anniversary of that historic day.

The celebration will last one whole year — from December 28, 1995, to December 28, 1996. Throughout this year, Iowans are joining together for our state's greatest celebration ever. We are highlighting our accomplishments, celebrating our diversity, showcasing our progress, humbly congratulating each other for the contributions we have made to the world, and enthusiastically preparing for the future. Celebrating all these elements — and more — is making Iowa's 150 statehood anniversary a huge success.

The Sesquicentennial opportunity encourages Iowans to look back at the entirety of Iowa's collective history — from prehistoric times to 1846 to just last year.
