Interstate Welcome Centers

Locally Owned Welcome Centers

These centers are open year-round and are as diverse as their communities. Visit them to learn more about local attractions, as well as other state sites. Each center offers free travel information, clean public restrooms and gift shops filled with unique Iowa products.

Amana: Amana Colonies Visitors Center

Located near Amana, this Welcome Center offers the Old World charm of the Amanas. Look for free tourist information and folk art displays.

Amana: Amana I-80 Welcome Center

Authenticity sets the mood at this Welcome Center. Sit on an actual pine bench from the Amana Church Society while watching videos about Amana and other Iowa attractions. Visit the gift shop and take home authentic hand-crafted Amana gifts.

Bloomfield: Davis County Welcome Center

It's "Open House" at the 1910 Sears and Roebuck home that serves as the Davis County Welcome Center. Shop for local crafts, including items made by the Amish community.

Burlington: Port of Burlington Welcome Center

The beautiful Mississippi River provides a scenic backdrop for this historic building that was once used for loading river barges with coal. Pick up souvenirs at the Iowa Gift Shop, or watch a video on local attractions.

Iowa Welcome Centers (continued)

Dows: Dows Depot Welcome Center, Mercantile Store and Blacksmith Shop

This 1896 restored Rock Island Depot and Welcome Center features free travel information, gift shop and museum. Stop off at the turn-of-the-century Mercantile Store for Iowa products and crafts of all kinds.

Dubuque: The Port of Dubuque Welcome Center

Located in Dubuque's historic Ice Harbor, this Welcome Center offers an Iowa-products shop, River Museum and travel information.

Elk Horn: Danish Windmill Welcome Center

Built in 1848 in Norre Snede, Denmark, this windmill was reassembled here, in the heart of the largest Danish settlement in the United States. The gift shop features both authentic Danish products and Iowa products.

Elkader: Osborne Welcome and Nature Center

The Nature Center includes hiking trails, an exercise trail and a wildlife exhibit. The Welcome Center features displays on art, history and culture. Visit the "Iowa Room," an Iowa-products store.

Emmetsburg: Emmetsburg Welcome Center

An Irish community, Emmetsburg hosts an annual St. Patrick's Day party. Stop at the Welcome Center for Iowa products and information.

Lamoni: Southern Iowa Gateway Welcome Center

This "gateway to the state" Welcome Center features a playground area for children and exercise equipment for adults. Historical displays offer information about the area, and the Iowa gift shop sells souvenirs.

Le Claire: Mississippi Valley Welcome Center

Designed in the style of an old riverboat captain's home, this Welcome Center sits high on a bluff overlooking the juncture of the Mississippi River and Interstate 80. Enjoy the historical display and new art gallery.

Missouri Valley: Harrison County Welcome Center

This historic complex features an 1853 log cabin, 1868 school, harness shop, broom factory and displays on agricultural, pioneer and American Indian history.

Sioux City: Sergeant Floyd Riverboat Museum and Welcome Center

Built in 1932, this National Historic Landmark was once a flagship of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers construction fleet. Now permanently dry-docked, its second-deck museum chronicles the golden years of Missouri River navigation. You'll find tourist information on the main deck and former engine room.

Last week a friend visited the office of one of our Sesquicentennial staff members. She picked up the 1996 Sesquicentennial Calendar of Events, which lists more than 1,100 activities taking place throughout Iowa during this Sesquicentennial year. Then, she looked around the office, staffed to its peak with 12 very hardworking people.

She shook her head. "How are you ever going to get all these things done?" she asked. The answer came at once from a chorus of grateful voices: "Volunteers! We couldn't do it without them."

When we call Iowa's Sesquicentennial a grassroots celebration, this is what we mean. From the beginning, the 25-member Iowa Sesquicentennial Commission understood that we could not possibly do it all alone — nor would we want to. We purposely designed our observance around the idea of partnerships, so that thousands of Iowans would have the opportunity for hands-on participation in planning local and statewide projects.

At the heart of our volunteer structure are the members of our 99 county commissions. Representing almost every municipality in the state, many county commissioners have been at work for more than two years. They plan and carry out hometown projects, promote local sales of license plates, and serve as liaisons between the state commission and the organizers of Sesquicentennial-endorsed events in their counties.

In addition, thousands more people are hard at work putting together projects, like our program in the Smithsonian Institution's Festival of American Folklife in Washington, D.C., and its restaging here as the Festival of Iowa Folklife on the State Capitol grounds in August; the Iowa 150 Mississippi River Adventure canoe caravan from Allamakee County to Lee County, also in August; and, of course, our Statehood Day celebration next December.

Some of our most active volunteers are your friends and neighbors who represent Iowa Bankers Association member banks. Throughout the year, they will be encouraging Iowans to "Celebrate Our State" by promoting Iowa Tourism and hosting the *Iowa Voyager* exhibit trailer in their communities.

Not surprisingly, our volunteers share a unique community spirit and excitement. After all, by coming together this way, they are not only observing an important historic event, they are placing their own stamp of experience on it. That's right. Our volunteers are literally making history.

During the summer months just ahead, there will be countless opportunities to participate in Sesquicentennial activities near you. 
