





Statehood




State Flower: Wild Rose

Points of Pride

Iowa takes pride in education. Higher learning isn't just something that happens after graduation; for the past two decades, Iowa youth have led the nation in college entrance exam scores. Three world-class state universities, 62 public and private colleges and 28 community college campuses offer excellence in education as well as public cultural and sports events.

Although Iowa is thought of as an agricultural state, manufacturing is the largest source of personal income. Services, retail/wholesale trade and government follow.

With more than 100,000 farms, Iowa harvests more grain than any other state. One-fourth of America's pork and 4 percent of the nation's grain-fed beef come from Iowa. A single Iowa farm family

grows enough food and fiber to feed 279 people — one-fourth of whom live overseas.

Iowa ranks 30th in population and 23rd in land area, yet it ranks:

- First in pork production
- First in corn production
 First in grain and dustion
- First in grain production
- · Second in soybean production

Not only does Iowa help feed the world, it recognizes the importance of food production to world peace. Iowa's Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Norman Borlaug founded The World Food Prize as an annual, international reminder of the profound global impact of food production and distribution.



State Bird: Eastern Goldfinch

The lithe, little "yellow canary" is plentiful in Iowa, often staying through the winter.



State Tree: Oak

Abundant and beautiful, the oak anary" is prized for its contributions to wildlife ecosystems.



State Rock: Geode

A rare and beautiful rock, geode means "earthlike." When broken open, a sparkling lining of mineral crystals is revealed.

Herbert Hoover

Herbert Hoover was the 31st president of the United States and first president born west of the Mississippi River. Today, Hoover's birthplace in West Branch is a 186-acre site and national historic landmark, and the final resting place of President and Mrs. Hoover.

Oscar-winning actor John Wayne was born Marion Robert Morrison in Winterset, where you can visit "the Duke's" boyhood home and experience his place in Hollywood history.

Glenn Miller

Glenn Miller was the founder of the Glenn Miller Orchestra and popular hit-maker of the swing era. His birthplace in Clarinda has been restored with period furnishings and is open for visitors.


Mamie Doud Eisenhower

Iowa Past

Louisiana Purchase

The word "Iowa" comes from the American Indian tribe of the same name. Iowa was part of the Louisiana Purchase, a deal arranged between President Thomas Jefferson and Napoleon Bonaparte of France that brought a vast tract of the continent under the control of the United States. The area was closed to white settlement until the early 1830s.

Lewis and Clark Expedition

Early explorers included the famed Lewis and Clark. Sergeant Charles Floyd's was the only death on that historic journey. A monument stands in Sioux City near the spot where Floyd was buried.

Steamboat Era

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Steamboat paddlewheelers reigned supreme on the Mississippi and Missouri rivers in the 19th century. The steamboat Bertrand sank in the Missouri near what is today the town of Missouri Valley. Excavated in 1969, the cargo is now on display in a fascinating exhibit at the De Soto National Wildlife Preserve Visitors Center.

Early State Government

After white settlement began with the Black Hawk Purchase, Iowa became part of Michigan Territory. When Michigan achieved statehood in 1836, Iowa then became a part of Wisconsin Territory. Finally, two years later, Iowa Territory was carved out of the area of Wisconsin Territory west of the Mississippi River. The first Iowa Territory legislature met in Burlington before a territorial capital city was finally selected in Johnson County. In Iowa City, the government seat was established in a grand structure known today as Old Capitol. Built in the early 1840s, Old Capitol served as the last capitol of Iowa Territory and the first capitol of the state. Under the 1857 Iowa constitution, the seat of state government was moved to Des Moines, a more central location.

Diverse Traditions

People from many different cultures have made Iowa their permanent home, from western pioneers and new overseas immigrants to those fleeing oppression on the "Underground Railroad." Iowa's folklife heritage is a many-colored quilt of fascinating traditions from around the world.

Immigrants

Journeying from eastern states or from the "Old Country" across the Atlantic, the European immigrants came to Iowa to find fertile fields and the freedom to exercise their traditions in peace. Several Iowa communities offer excellent collections that give insight into the pioneer experiences of locally important nationalities, including the Vesterheim (Western Home) Norwegian-American Museum, in Decorah; the Danish Immigrant Museum, in Elk Horn; and the National Czech and Slovak Museum and Library, in Cedar Rapids.

The Mormon Trail

The Mormon Pioneer Trail — blazed from Illinois to Utah, beginning in 1846 — is perhaps the single most important journey made in America's history. As the intrepid people braved the hazardous journey west, they passed through the southern tier of Iowa counties, leaving a lasting impression on the area's cultural history.

The Amana Colonies

The people of the Amanas, founded by a religious group from Germany, farmed in the European fashion — living in the village and going out to the fields to work, rather than living on separate farms. Today, thousands visit the Amanas to experience the Old World wavs.

Underground Railroad

People fleeing the tyranny of pre-Civil War slavery in the Old South passed through Iowa on the Underground Railroad, a chain of safe houses that led to liberty. Today, you can visit homes that helped speed so many to freedom, including the Lewelling Quaker Shrine in Salem, an 1840s stone house where you can see hiding places used by people fleeing slavery; the Hitchcock House in Lewis; the Todd House in Tabor, often visited by John Brown, and a place where massive munitions were stored for Kansas' free state fight; and the Jordan House in West Des Moines, refurbished to include 16 period rooms, a railroad museum, and a museum dedicated to the Underground Railroad.

Grant Wood Scenic Byway


Iowa native Grant Wood is celebrated as the painter of America's most famous work of art, "American Gothic," the archetype of the regionalist artistic movement. Travel eastern Iowa's rounded hills and colorful woodlands, and you'll see the places that inspired "Stone City" and other legendary Grant Wood paintings. A PICTURE-PERFECT PLACE: adventurous caves, relaxing bed-and-breakfast inns, canyonlike cliffs and barges navigating the mightiest river of them all.

Take Highway 64 from Anamosa to Maquoketa; follow the 428 loop or take Highway 62 to Andrew, then E17 and Z15 to Springbrook and Bellevue.


River Bluffs Scenic Byway

The northeast Iowa "loop tour" is its own destination. Breathtaking bluffs, tree-topped hills, roller-coaster roads and meandering rivers pull you along on a northeast Iowa adventure. **Eagles soar** above prehistoric American Indian mounds — mysterious effigies created in the shapes of birds and bears. Link up to the Great River Road, a long, winding path along the scenic and **LEGENDARY MISSISSIPPI RIVER.** Experience main street charm; dig into antique treasures.

Follow Highways 18, 13 and 150 in a loop from McGregor through Elkader, Fayette, West Union and Clermont.

Woodlands Scenic Byway


Magnificent state forests welcome you to southeast Iowa. Back roads curve among vast hills, deep forests of sturdy hickory and oak, and mirrorlike farm ponds that reflect **TOWERING EVERGREENS.** Follow the westward trek of early Mormon pioneers. You may meet a horse-drawn buggy near Bloomfield, where Old Order Amish go about their traditional ways. Nearby Amish shops offer keepsake quilts and home-baked goods. Visit the historic **VILLAGES OF VAN BUREN** — steamboat ports of call on the Des Moines River.

Stay on Highways 2, J40 and 63 between Donnellson, Keosauqua, Bloomfield and Blakesburg.

Western Skies Scenic Byway

Go west for wide-open roads, fresh country air and generous sunshine. Under a prairie sunset, experience larger-than-life horizons, rolling meadows, QUIET VALLEY COMMUNITIES, terraced fields and riverbanks along roads that stretch through miles of Americana. Western Iowa's open roads and boundless horizons invite exploration. Watch for AUTHENTIC WINDMILLS and Danish villages, apple orchards and nature preserves.

East of I-29, pick up Highway 30 at Missouri Valley. F32 takes a northern route through Woodbine, Panama and Westphalia to Highway 59; or follow 30 east to Highway 44 through Portsmouth, Harlan and Kimballton. Elk Horn is south of 44 on 173; or stay on 44 to Guthrie Center and Panora; pick up P28 south to Stuart to get back on I-80.

The Loess Hills of western Iowa



Loess Hills Scenic Byways

Explore the rare and spectacular natural landscaping of the Loess Hills region of western lowa, a fragile place of unique prairie flora and wildlife, farms and villages, nestled together among the catstep hills. Bluestem and scarlet sumac ripen under the big skies

atop this rich yellow-brown loess — ancient soil gathered by winds of a receding age of ice into a high wall that follows the vast Missouri River Valley. The rugged range rises abruptly from the flatlands on the west and melts into the rolling plains on the east, extending 200 miles.

The Loess Hills Scenic Byways is a mosaic of designated roads that pass through this region in a general north/south direction, paralleling Interstate 29.

Follow the Loess Hills Scenic Byway signs along extreme western Iowa counties. North of Sioux City, follow Highway 12. Take Highway 982 south of Sioux City; Highways 175 from Onawa, 127 between Magnolia and Logan, 183 between Soldier and Council Bluffs, and Highway 275 south of Council Bluffs.



Mormon Trail

The Mormon Pioneer Trail — blazed from Illinois to Utah, beginning in 1846 — is one of the most important journeys made in America's history. As the intrepid people braved the HAZARDOUS JOURNEY


west, they passed through the southern tier of Iowa counties, leaving a lasting impression on the area's cultural history.

From 1846 to 1869, tens of thousands of Mormons followed the early trail from Nauvoo, Illinois, across southern Iowa and onward to the Valley of the Great Salt Lake, a 1,200-MILE ADVENTURE. They traveled west to find a place where they could maintain their religious and cultural identity in peace. In so doing, the "Saints" — as the Mormons called themselves — opened new lands once considered worthless desert and created thriving communities.

The tour route is marked with the Iowa Mormon Trail signs, and follows Highways 2, 34, 25 and 92 from Nauvoo in the east to Council Bluffs in the west.

Dragoon Trail

Dragoons were lightly armed cavalry soldiers who scouted Iowa soon after the BLACK HAWK PURCHASE (1832) put the area under the control of the United States government. Following the course of the Des Moines River, the Dragoons blazed a trail

through newly acquired lands that would soon become the state of Iowa. Dragoons established outposts from present-day Des Moines to Fort Dodge in the spring and summer of 1835.

Today, you can again travel this **BEAUTIFUL** "GREENBELT" area, a 200-mile corridor along the Des Moines, Boone and Raccoon rivers. By following the Dragoon Trail signs, you can trace the most scenic portion of their route, from just below Lake Red Rock to Fort Dodge and Webster City. Points of interest along the way include Lake Red Rock, Ledges State Park, the Kate Shelley High Bridge and Dolliver Memorial Park.

Look for signs in downtown Des Moines on the east side of the Des Moines River, on Highway 316 and County Road G40 near Lake Red Rock/Knoxville, Highway 415 near Polk City, and Highway 20 near Fort Dodge.



Great River Road

As one of the most famous — and longest — scenic and historic drives in the United States, the GREAT RIVER ROAD is a federally designated route covering 3,000 miles of federal, state and county roads that generally follow the Mighty Mississippi

FROM CANADA TO THE GULF OF MEXICO. Look for the pilot wheel signs to guide you along Iowa's segment. Pass through national wildlife refuges, observe the workings of the immense system of locks and dams, discover some of Iowa's oldest communities or ride a riverboat.

Highways 26, 52 and 99 make up segments of the route, along with many county roads.



Lewis and Clark Trail


To find a passage from the Mississippi River to the Pacific, President Thomas Jefferson was eager to explore new lands — the LOUISIANA TERRITORY — recently acquired from Napoleon Bonaparte. From 1804 to 1806, Captains Meriwether Lewis and William

Clark led 40 soldiers and boatmen on an EPIC JOURNEY sponsored by the United States, under Jefferson's directive. On this historic adventure, Lewis and Clark mapped the land, recorded its resources and made contacts with native inhabitants.

The Lewis and Clark Trail follows the Missouri River along the western border of Iowa. Here, the explorers held a council with chiefs of the Oto and Missouri tribes at a place they would call "Council Bluffs." Travelers can follow the trail along the Missouri by interstate that takes the 1990s explorer to marinas, nature preserves and historic parks.

SERGEANT CHARLES FLOYD'S was the only death to occur during the historic expedition. A monument stands in Sioux City near where Floyd was buried.

Watch for the Lewis and Clark Trail signs along Interstate 29 as it follows the Missouri River.

Iowa requires nothing beyond the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) requirements for insurance.

Fuel Tax



DAY ONE

Morning

Arrive at the beautiful Villages of Van Buren. Discover the heritage of Iowa's riverboat era through antiques, crafts and historical landmarks.

Afternoon

Become a World War II fighter pilot for the afternoon at the Airpower Museum in Ottumwa. The museum has approximately 20 aircraft on display in the museum, including a World War II glider pilot's display and other models.

Evening

Enjoy a musical or other theatrical production in the 1900 Pella Opera House. Overnight in Pella.

hen you visit western Iowa, you enter the gateway to the Old West and the home of the first great American group tour: the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Ever since





IT'S WESTERN IOWA A-Z!

Agriculture

So you think Iowa's all corn, cows and soybeans? Well, you can eat those words along with apples, peaches, berries, pumpkins, squash and other goodies at the orchards and produce farms in Iowa's Loess Hills, alongside the Missouri River. If you want a good look at farming, visit the Garst Farm Resort near Coon Rapids. Besides being an actual farm, the Garsts' host overnight visitors. For farms of a different sort, tour Tremmel Nursery in Earling, Dunlap Hardwoods and the Garwood Christmas Tree Farm north of Crescent, the Prairie Pedlar near Odebolt, where wildflowers are raised, and Nedville's Ostrich Farm. To see what farming of yesteryear was like, visit the Carstens Memorial Farm near Shelby, and for a peek at the future, see upcoming farm implements at the largest implement display of all at Spencer's Clay County Fair, which is also the nation's largest county fair.

Business and Industry

No question about it, much of the business in western Iowa is related to agriculture ... Sioux Bee Honey in Sioux City, Cookies BBQ Sauce in Wall Lake, Jolly Time Popcorn and Noble Popcorn, too ... but other items are also made here. In various communities in northwest Iowa, K-Products manufactures outerwear, while in Orange City, Diamond Vogel creates a rainbow of paints sold nationwide. Also in Orange City is Angel Aircraft, a corporation that designed and manufactures a bush-plane used by missionaries in remote parts of the world. In Rock Rapids, Cayel Craft assembles the "Cadillac" of ambulances.

Climate

Like any other part of the Midwest, if you don't like the weather, just wait awhile. But don't expect us to predict exactly what's going to happen. Although winter snowfall averages 30 inches, sometimes we've reached temperatures in the 70s in February or had to wear jackets in June. Our summers are warm and sometimes humid, and our winters are cold and dry. We find plenty to do whatever the weather. You can expect tulips blooming in Orange City in the spring, kids playing baseball in the summer, leaves turning colors on fall days, and snow under your skis at Mt. Crescent in the winter.

Democracy

The municipal buildings of western Iowa include some of the finest you'll see. The Woodbury County Courthouse at Sioux City is the nation's largest example of a municipal building designed in the Prairie School style of architecture. Nearby is the newly restored City Hall, which houses historical displays, including a diorama of the town's elevated railroad. At Sidney, the picturesque courthouse commands the town center on its own square, and the red tower of the Montgomery County Courthouse rises high above Red Oak.

Ethnic Diversity

Don't let the windmill at Elk Horn throw you. It's not Dutch; it's Danish. You're in the middle of the nation's largest rural community of Danish immigrants. If you don't believe it, check out the Danish Immigrant Museum on the edge of town. Then take in the German villages near Carroll, the Scottish Festival at Mt. Ayr, the Irish at Emmetsburg, the Tulip Festival in Orange City, the Loess Hills Indian Market and Fine Arts Festival in Council Bluffs, and the Swedish museum at Stanton. That's only part of the state's diversity.

estivals

Looking for "festive" things to do in Iowa? Take in the Big Band sound during the Glenn Miller Festival at Clarinda, the famous musician's hometown, and dance to the thumping beat of brass bands at the polka fests in Harlan and Humboldt. Celebrate spring with Tivoli Fest in Elk Horn and Stanton's Skona Maj, and have a "bon jour" at Le festival de L'Heritage Français at Corning. Roll along during the Fat Tire Festival at several communities located along the Wabash Trace Nature Trail and celebrate the arts during the week-long Rivercade alongside the mighty Missouri in Sioux City. Kids of all ages love attending Kinderfest at Manning, as well as flying their creations at Sac City's Kite Tournament, and watching the Wild West action at the Sidney Championship Rodeo. Winter's cure for cabin fever comes with these prescriptions: the Winter Games at Okoboji, the Winter Funfest at Storm Lake, and Estherville's Winter Festival.

Gaming

The casinos of western Iowa — Harvey's Kanesville Queen Casino Riverboat, Ameristar Casino Riverboat and Bluffs Run Casino in Council Bluffs; WinneVegas in Sloan; Casino Omaha in Onawa; and the *Belle of Sioux City* riverboat in Sioux City — are a sure bet for fun! Pull in the winnings at the slots; try your hand at roulette, craps, poker, keno and blackjack; or wager on greyhounds year-round. Some of the casinos have accommodations, and their eating facilities range from snack bars to superb restaurants.

ollywood

Lights, camera, action. Every summer, tinseltown celebrities come to Denison to help conduct week-long seminars at the festival named for the hometown gal who went on to win an Oscar — Donna Reed. Want to learn how to direct a play, a television show or a movie? What about writing a soap opera? Would you like to take a lesson in acting, voice music or hoofing in front of the lights? Then here's where you want to be.

owa's American Indians

With place names like Pottawattamie, Sioux Rapids, Nishnabotna and Pocahontas, you can't go anywhere in western Iowa without being reminded of this region's American Indian heritage. At Blood Run, a historic site in Lyon County, you'll see where one of the largest trading centers of the Oneota culture existed for several hundred years until the early 1700s. At Glenwood's Mills County Historical Museum, you'll see one of the largest collections of American Indian artifacts in Iowa. You can visit a re-creation of an earth lodge there, too.

ousting

The Renaissance Festival of the Midlands features jousting of all types — verbal and otherwise — every summer in Council Bluffs on the campus of Iowa Western Community College. Once you pass through the city gates, you're transported to the 15th century. Rat-catchers beseech your business (in a "kinde and goode" manner), the pleasant smells of fine food waft around your head, royalty nods to you while courtiers play musical instruments, and the kids make merry as knights in shining armor battle each other.

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Want to see the world's largest coffeepot? Then watch the water towers. As the hometown of an actress famous for TV coffee commercials, Stanton honored her by constructing its water tower in the shape of a coffeepot. Looking for a lot of bull? Then check out Albert, a statue in Audubon honoring the state's beef industry. Council Bluffs has a 56-foot-tall golden spike, commemorating the one used on the nation's first transcontinental railroad, which began here in the 1860s. Speaking of kingsize, the Battle Hill Museum of Natural History at Battle Creek has a 565-pound clam, among several thousand other items — including an elephant skeleton and a giraffe — in its collection.

andscape

Iowa's rolling Loess Hills were formed at the end of the Ice Age thousands of years ago when windblown soils piled alongside the Missouri River, forming dunes that are now the highest pure-loess hills found in only one other place in the world: northern China. Vegetation makes the hills appear to be covered by open fields, prairie and woodlands.

Missouri River

Before Lewis and Clark led their celebrated expedition between 1804 and 1806, the Missouri River was the first highway into the Midwest for countless American Indians and fur traders and trappers. At De Soto National Wildlife Refuge, you can see an excellent display of artifacts - ranging from thimbles, fabrics, foods and lamps to shovels, boots and cannonballs — recovered in the 1960s from a steamboat that sank more than a century before on its way to the gold-mining communities in Montana. The Sergeant Floyd Welcome Center, a former survey boat of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that's now dry-docked at Sioux City, offers another great display about Missouri River boats — from dugouts and keelboats to palatial paddlewheelers and modern tugs.

Nature

See nature at its best every spring and fall, when nearly half a million snow geese, as well as many eagles and hawks, stop over on their migration at the De Soto National Wildlife Refuge. Learn more about nature in western Iowa at the Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center in the Loess Hills near Sioux City, the Lost Island Prairie Wetland Nature Center in Palo Alto County, and the Hitchcock Nature Area in northwestern Pottawattamie County.

Okoboji

A name synonymous with summer fun, "Okoboji" includes several bodies of water. The most famous is West Lake Okoboji, a spring-fed lake that's also the deepest lake in Iowa. Sailboats, classic wooden boats, fishing craft, towed inflatables, parasails and The Queen II excursion boat ply the water here. There's family fun at three amusement parks, including a classic one that's lakeside with a wooden roller coaster and a collection of old-fashioned children's rides. Resorts, restaurants and shops abound. There is also a state fish hatchery here. While you're in the area, enroll in world-famous University of Okoboji — where everyone majors in good times.

Pioneers

About 40 years after Lewis and Clark traveled the Missouri, Mormons stopped near that river in western Iowa on their way to Utah. Most clustered near Council Bluffs, then called Kanesville. Some spread out, up and down the Missouri River Valley, forming smaller communities, many of which no longer exist. These events in American history are recalled at the re-creation of the Kanesville Tabernacle in Council Bluffs. Other pioneers are honored at the Lewis and Clark Festival at Lewis and Clark State Park and during Frontier Days at the Fort Dodge Museum, a re-creation of a fort that was built when this area was little more than endless prairie.

Quilts

Quilts, old and new, checker shops such as the antique stores in Walnut and new outlets in Orange City, which hosts one of the state's largest quilting shows. Western Iowa's largest supplier of quilting materials is found in the Danish village of Elk Horn, not far from that community's windmill.

Religion

Madison County may have its covered bridges, but Carroll County has its country churches. The Ingemann Danish Lutheran Church near Moorhead is situated in the picturesque Loess Hills. One of the oldest buildings in western Iowa is the small Lutheran "Kurch" built in 1867 outside of Glenwood. Sacred articles of all denominations can be found at the Museum of Religious Artifacts at Logan and Trinity Heights in Sioux City; a 30-foot-tall stainless-steel statue of the Virgin Mary stands near a building containing a lifesize wooden carving of the Last Supper. In Algona, visit a nativity scene made by German prisoners of war during World War II, and walk through the stone artistry of the world-famous, gem-encrusted Grotto of the Redemption at West Bend.

Soda Fountains

Southwest Iowa has one of the nation's greatest concentrations of old-time soda fountains that are still pumping. Enjoy a fried-egg sundae — that's what it looks like — at Stone Drug in Hamburg, or dig into a banana split at Penn Drug on Sidney's courthouse square. In Shenandoah, you can find treats at George Jay Drug priced almost as low as they were in yesteryear, and Corning is blessed with two soda fountains just a few doors from each other — McMahon's Drug (serving Coke) and Getter Pharmacy (serving Pepsi). Besides those in southwest Iowa, there are Kehl Drug in Denison, Leah Drug in Dunlap, Mitchell Drug in Mt. Ayr, Albrecht's Pharmacy in Ida Grove, Eby Drug in Woodbine, and a renovated fountain, the Cherry Top, in the Antique Malls at Missouri Valley.

rails

The longest hike-bike trail in Iowa, the Wabash Trace Nature Trail, begins in Council Bluffs and runs for 69 miles through several communities to the south. It's also a hit with in-line skaters and horseback riders who enjoy the rolling countryside. Other routes include Brushy Creek Trail in Webster County; Raccoon Valley Trail in Guthrie County; Dickinson County Recreation Trail; Sauk Rail Trail in Carroll and Sac counties; Upper Nishnabotna Trail in Shelby County; Storm Lake Trail; the trails at Waubonsie State Park; and nine trails within Sioux City. Besides these trails, there are other types. The Loess Hills Scenic Byway runs from north of Sioux City south to the Missouri border, taking in many "sites and sights" of this famous range of hills. And there's the Inkpaduta Canoe Trail, which starts on the Little Sioux River at Spencer and flows south from there. For historic trails, visit the new Western Historic Trails Center in Council Bluffs and learn about the roles the Lewis and Clark, Oregon, California and Mormon trails played in our nation's history.

p, Up and Away

Watch them soar during the hot-air balloon festivals in Storm Lake and Creston every summer. Take off for Greenfield's Iowa Aviation Preservation Center, which has artifacts and aircraft concerning Iowa's aviation history. Among its displays are the World War II student pilot trainer, man-sized gliders, Tiger Moth biplanes, and an A-7 attack bomber recently flown by the Iowa Air National Guard. The Mid-American Air Museum, located near the Sioux City Gateway Airport, has aircraft and displays related to military, sport and commercial aviation.

Views

For vistas and views in western Iowa, few can compare with those that overlook the valley of the Missouri River, including Waubonsie State Park, Murray Hill near the town of Little Sioux, the Loess Hills Wildlife Area north of Turin, the Hitchcock Nature Area in Pottawattamie County and the War Eagle Monument in Sioux City. Enjoy other views while traveling along the Loess Hills Scenic Byway and Iowa Highway 44 as it meanders across rolling terrain.

Welcome Centers

Our Welcome Centers live up to their names, and more. At the Sergeant Floyd Welcome Center in Sioux City, there's plenty of riverboat history. A "village" — which includes a log cabin, a one-room schoolhouse, and many historical artifacts — are part of the Harrison County Welcome Center near Missouri Valley, where cherry juice is part of the hospitality. In Elk Horn, you can tour the inside of a windmill built in Denmark more than a century ago, disassembled, and rebuilt here to honor the region's Danish immigrants.

Xtra! X-tra!

So screamed newspaper headlines across the nation in 1912, when eight people were found axed to death in the J.B. Moore House in the small town of Villisca. Despite the closeness of neighboring houses and evidence that the murderer took his or her time, no one was ever convicted of the crime although there was one suspect who was acquitted. The house is now part of the Olson-Linn Museum, which also houses Iowa's largest collection of pre-1930s vehicles.

Vuletide

Celebrate midwinter cheer in western Iowa with Weihnachsfest in Manning, Julefest in Elk Horn, Sinterklass Day in Orange City, the Antique Christmas Walk and the Swedish Santa Lucia Festival in Stanton. Check out the seasonal decorations at the General Dodge House, a 19th century mansion in Council Bluffs, and Bedstemor's historical home in Elk Horn. Or join the citizens of Dunlap on their annual, mile-long pilgrimage to a nativity scene located just outside the community.

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Zenith

The highest point in Iowa was long thought to be the Ocheyedan Mound, just east of the community of Ocheyedan near the Iowa Great Lakes. However, with the introduction of sophisticated measuring equipment, the Ocheyedan Mound was "lowered" to second place. Although it's still a great place to hike through prairie grasses and flowers and look over the surrounding fields, it has been replaced by a simple rise (1,670 feet above sea level) in a farm field just north of the town of Sibley. Although on private land, this highest point in the state may be reached with the owners' permission.

DAY ONE

Morning

Arrive Sioux City. Sioux City's Art Center showcases regional and national artistic masterpieces. The center's permanent collection includes work by Inness, Stillman and Picasso. Continue on to the Sioux City Public Museum, housed in a 23-room Romanesque mansion built nearly a century ago.

Afternoon

The Sergeant Floyd Welcome Center and Riverboat Museum will introduce you to Missouri River area history. See the Sergeant Floyd Monument, a reminder of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, which passed through the area in 1804. Investigate the unusual architecture of the Woodbury County Courthouse, and view its historic murals and stained glass.

Evening

Enjoy a quiet dinner at K.D. Station, and stroll through a unique collection of shops in this restored 1910-era building. Or choose from two restaurants and hours of excitement on the Belle of Sioux City Riverboat Casino. Overnight Sioux City.

DAY TWO

Morning

Arrive Orange City. A "touch of Dutch" in most of Orange City's attractions makes its ethnic heritage apparent. Admire The Old Mill, a working Dutch windmill; tiptoe through tulip gardens; browse in quaint Dutch shops; and sample the local bakeries' mouthwatering Dutch pastries.

Afternoon

Arrive Iowa Great Lakes. Board the Queen II on big blue Lake Okoboji for a sightseeing tour around Iowa's premier resort area. Go on an afternoon shopping spree or charter a private yacht. Visit Arnolds Park Amusement Park for rides, games, arcades, restaurants and dancing.

Evening

Dine in a fine restaurant in this unique resort community, and then watch the curtain rise on a production by the Okoboji Summer Theater group. Overnight Okoboji.

DAY THREE

Morning

Visit the site of the 1857 Spirit Lake Massacre, the Abbie Gardner Sharp Cabin on West Okoboji. Then, stop to see the ever-changing gallery of masterpieces showcased at the Lakes Art Center.

Afternoon/Evening

Arrive West Bend. Visit the Grotto of the Redemption built from gems and ornamental stones. View a reconstructed pioneer sod house.


Arrive Fort Dodge. You can visit the Fort Museum and Frontier Village, and tour a replica of the fort that protected settlers from the Sioux Indians. Visit the Blanden Memorial Art Museum. Take in a movie after dinner. Overnight Fort Dodge.

THE HEART OF AMERICA

A two-day southwest Iowa adventure.



DAY ONE

Morning

Start off the day with a tour of the historic side of Council Bluffs at the General Dodge House and at the Squirrel Cage Jail, where a drumshaped set of cells once held prisoners. Also, visit the RailsWest Railroad Museum, which recalls the history of Council Bluffs when it was the nation's fifth-largest rail center.

Then head for the hills — the Loess Hills! Formed by windblown particles 10,000 to 14,000 years ago, these unique Loess Hills are the only one of their kind found in the Western Hemisphere.

After lunch, arrive in **Glenwood** for a tour of the American Indian section of the city's museum, which is augmented by a re-creation of an earth lodge used by the original inhabitants of the hills.

Afternoon

Enjoy scenery at Waubonsie State Park and roll through Sidney, home of Iowa's largest rodeo. After experiencing an old-time soda fountain in Penn Drug, it's on to Shenandoah, where we learn the history of the nursery industry with Earl May and Henry Fields. Next, tour the Clarinda birthplace of musician Glenn Miller, who fathered the big sound of swing.

Venture a bit farther east to a spot where some people might have asked, "Is this Heaven? No, it's Icaria." Well, it was heaven for a while near Corning, where some tried to make a Utopia-onearth come true. Top off the day with an authentic French dinner. Travel to Red Oak and overnight.

DAY TWO

Morning

Take a heritage tour on the way to **Stanton**—settled by Swedish immigrants, whose descendants created a historical center about that immigration experience and the town's early days. Remember to look up to see the famous coffeepot-shaped water tower.

Although Iowa is known for raising cattle and hogs, expect something distinctly different at an exotic animal ranch in **Mount Ayr**. Later, it's on to the community of **Afton** for lunch and shopping at some unique stores.

Afternoon

The afternoon starts in **Creston**, which has a historic village and a marvelously renovated depot. The depot holds the city hall, senior citizen center, restored waiting room and history center.

Then it's off into the wild blue yonder at the Iowa Aviation Preservation Center in **Greenfield**. Formerly a private collection, these vintage aircraft built prior to World War II are an adjunct to the state's Aviation Hall of Fame, which honors Iowans who have "dared in the air."

As the route returns to Council Bluffs, pause to visit the Hitchcock House near Lewis, a stop on the road to freedom for many men and women who braved the famous Underground Railroad to escape enslavement during the pre-Civil War years.


The last stop will be a visit to the Doll House, a century-old cottage that is home to more than a thousand dolls. Be sure to see a doll, collectible or antique that brings back memories of childhood days here in **Griswold**. Overnight in **Council Bluffs**.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION

From Donna Reed to a Danish Windmill, a three-day tour of the center of western Iowa.



DAY ONE

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Morning

Many remember the career of a young girl named Donnabell Mullenger who left her Iowa hometown of Denison for Hollywood to earn a living — and an Academy Award — as Donna Reed. Her hometown remembers her, too, with annual workshops hosted by Reed's family and nationally recognized friends in the entertainment industry.

A tour of the McHenry House, which serves as the local historical center, showcases the Oscar won by Reed for her performance in *From Here to Eternity*. Then it's off to visit the newly restored theater and enjoy treats at the candy kitchen visited often by the actress in her youth. Save time for a stop at the Dow House, too — a historic countryside mansion.

Then head for the hills — the Loess Hills! Formed by windblown particles 10,000 to 14,000 years ago, these unique hills are the only loess formations of this depth found in the Western Hemisphere.

Later, go Deutsche, visiting Iowa's German Colonies, and enjoy an authentic lunch. Tours of the area's German Catholic churches are popular among motorcoach groups.

Afternoon

Now turn southwest to Missouri Valley to visit an Iowa Welcome Center. This Harrison County facility is also home to an Iowa products store and a historical village, including an authentic log cabin, schoolhouse and little chapel.

Entering the flood plain of the Missouri River, the De Soto National Wildlife Refuge — alongside the Mighty Mo — contains a portion of the old river channel which draws hundreds of thousands of snow geese each fall as they migrate south. In turn, the geese draw thousands of people interested in watching this natural wonder.

Besides wildlife, **De Soto** is where the steamboat *Bertrand* sank at the end of the Civil War. On her way to the Montana gold fields, she contained both everyday necessities and valuable items of 19th century American frontier life. Ship and cargo soon became covered with mud, which perfectly preserved the artifacts until recovered a century later. Now these items provide a detailed glimpse of yesteryear in a climate-controlled room.

Evening

For those who enjoy the night life, an optional trip is always available — gaming and entertainment at Council Bluffs' casinos! Overnight in Council Bluffs.

DAY TWO

Morning

Begin with a tour of the 1870 mansion built by Grenville Dodge, Civil War general and railroad builder, who was director of the first transcontinental railroad.

Then it's off to the nearby community of Walnut. Some years ago, the community resurrected the local economy by banding together to sell antiques — making this Iowa's Antique Capital and a top attraction. Visitors can always find something older than themselves — guaranteed!

A couple of miles east in Elk Horn, see an authentic Danish windmill! It was built in Denmark in 1848, dismantled, shipped to Elk Horn, and rebuilt in 1976 to honor all Danes. Elk Horn is the largest rural Danish community in the United States, and the immigration story is re-created at the Danish Immigrant Museum.

Sample a Danish luncheon before visiting Kimballton. There, you'll see the statue of "The Little Mermaid." It's a replica of the one found in Copenhagen and made famous by Hans Christian Andersen.

Afternoon

Driving through the heart of "T-Bone Country," see the 45-ton statue of a Hereford bull named Albert. He stands 30 feet tall, 15 feet wide, and is Audubon's tribute to the Iowa beef industry. The town was named after the world-famous painter and ornithologist, John James Audubon, and a statue was recently erected in the park to honor him.

Stop at the Garst Farm Resort in Coon Rapids for a farm tour and draft-horse ride. Next, head for the county-seat community of Carroll for a tour of local sites and dinner. Overnight in Carroll.

DAY THREE

Morning

Stop in the small town of Mt. Carmel to take in the architectural splendor of a country church that looks more like a big city wonder. Then it's time to visit the Prairie Pedlar near Odebolt, where one of the best collections of prairie flora in the Upper Midwest is grown — in the charming flower and herb gardens by Jane Hogue, columnist for *Country America* magazine.

A mid-morning snack is served at The Inn at Battle Creek, a bed-and-breakfast established in a large, historic home that has earned AAA's three-diamond rating for excellence.

Next, visit Cherokee and the Sanford Planetarium, one of only three public planetariums in the state. No matter what time of day it is, the stars always shine here!

Onawa's Casino Omaha offers an all-you-can-eat buffet. One of Iowa's first casinos, this is where visitors find winning entertainment and elegant style, with a full array of gaming excitement. Adair Budget Inn Best Western Jesse James Inn

griculture

If it's Des Moines in August, it must be the Iowa State Fair — the granddaddy of them all! This central Iowa event has been made into a movie three times, two of which were Rodgers and Hammerstein musical productions. Iowa State University in Ames is a world leader in agricultural research, education and extension services. Living History Farms in Greater Des Moines tells the amazing story of how Iowans transformed the fertile prairies of the Midwest into the most productive farmlands in the world, and depicts more than 300 years of agricultural heritage in five historical time periods. The World Pork Expo in Des Moines draws thousands each year. Madison County is famous not only for its covered bridges but as the home of the Delicious apple. Some of the finest blue cheese in the country comes from Maytag Dairy Farms near Newton, and the south Iowa community of Allerton is home to the New Zealand milk-processing plant.

Business and Industry

Quality products are made at these central Iowa companies: Maytag washers in Newton; Frigidaire washers and dryers and Beam central vacuums in Webster City; Uncle B's Bakery bagels in Ellsworth; Archway Cookies and Fareway Foods in Boone; Kraft General Foods Jell-O pudding snacks in Mason City; Hy-Vee Foods in Chariton and Des Moines; Vermeer Manufacturing and Pella windows and doors in Pella; Lennox Industries in Marshalltown; Winnebago Industries in Forest City; and publishing giant Meredith Corporation in Des Moines, a city also known as the third-largest insurance center in the world.

Climate

Iowa's weather appeals to everyone — sooner or later! Diversity of season is a great reason to love Iowa's climate. A typical year brings 266 sunny or partly cloudy days, and 99 cloudy days. Winter snowfall averages 30 inches and relative humidity averages 72 percent. Summer means fragrant grass and freshpicked fruit, lazy naps and quick-paced walks, floating in boats and batting at balls. Fall provides cool, crunchy-leaf days, pumpkin faces and cinnamon spices, hayrack rides and harvest moons. Winter brings silver white mornings and hot chocolate evenings, family skating and daredevil sledding, rosy cheeks and warm wraps. Spring means tiny buds and baby birds, gentle breezes and welcome rains, newborn gardens and airborne kites.

Democracy

Iowa's 99 counties were established in the last century as part of a county government system that placed each county seat within one day's travel by horseback. In some circumstances, the selection of the county seat town was "duked out" with multiple elections, court cases or, in one notorious instance, a wrestling match! Thirty-four counties make up the Central Iowa Tourism Region. Every four years, all eyes are on Iowa during its primary caucuses to monitor the outcome of the straw poll — the first-in-the-nation test of candidate strength in the race for president. Political history is still in the making - and open for viewing — at the spectacular gold-domed Iowa Capitol in Des Moines.

Ethnic Diversity

Iowans hail from a variety of nationalities, ties that are still apparent today. Amish settlements in Davis and Lucas counties preserve the traditional "no frills" lifestyle of this culture, and those traveling in these counties are as likely to see horse and buggies as they are to see automobiles on the roadways. The story of Pella's Dutch heritage is featured in the Klokkenspel located just off the town square. This animated musical clock accompanied by a 147-bell carillon depicts the story of Dominie Scholte and his wife Mareah's journey from Holland and the establishment of the community of Pella. The Meskwaki settlement near Tama brings Iowa's rich American Indian heritage alive, and the Scandinavian past of Story City is celebrated each year with an annual festival. Those in Ackley "relish" their heritage with Sauerkraut Days held every June.

aith and Religious Beliefs

Iowa was part of the pathway used by Mormons en route from Nauvoo, Illinois, to Salt Lake City, Utah, in the mid-1800s. More than 80,000 Mormons traveled the Mormon Trail, and as the Mormons crossed Iowa southeast of Corydon in 1846, William Clayton composed the hymn "Come, Come, Ye Saints." In the heart of Des Moines sits St. John's Basilica, one of only 33 basilicas in the country, and in 1979 in Greater Des Moines, Pope John Paul II held mass at Living History Farms. Pure and simple faith guides the everyday lives of the Amish residing in settlements in Davis and Lucas counties. Davis County is also noted as the place where the first Rebekah Lodge in the world was established.

Gaming

Feeling lucky? Then head to one of central Iowa's two casinos — Prairie Meadows Racetrack and Casino near Altoona or Meskwaki Bingo & Casino near Tama. Prairie Meadows offers an entertainment extravaganza all year long with casino-style slot machines; seasonal, live thoroughbred and quarter-horse racing; and year-round simulcasting. Meskwaki Casino seems to offer every conceivable way to win, including slot machines, keno, roulette, blackjack, poker, craps and bingo.

ollywood in Iowa

The Bridges of Madison County was filmed in and around Winterset, home of the covered bridges featured in the romance between Robert Kincaid and Francesca Johnson, as portrayed by actors Clint Eastwood and Meryl Streep. The bridges, farmhouse and other movie sites are frequented by travelers from around the world. Visitors can march across the actual footbridge featured in The Music Man or visit the boyhood home of Mason City's own Meredith Willson. Movie goers were blown away by the hit movie Twister, which was filmed at several sites in central Iowa, and the Victorian-style home and farmstead featured in the final sequences of the film can be seen near the community of Eldora. Hollywood stars with ties to Iowa include "The Duke" John Wayne, who was born in Winterset; movie star Jean Seberg from Marshalltown; television and film star Tom Arnold from Ottumwa; stage and screen star Cloris Leachman, who got her start at the Des Moines Playhouse; and Ronald Reagan, who was the first sports director for WHO radio from 1933 to 1937, long before he went to Hollywood and then to Washington for his most famous role, president of the United States.

owa's American Indians

More than 3,300 acres of land make up the settlement area owned by the Meskwaki tribe near Tama. The color and pageantry of the tribe's heritage come to life during the annual powwow held each August. Don't miss the American Indian artifacts on display at the Iowa Historical Building and the 1700 Ioway Indian village replica at Living History Farms in Greater Des Moines.

"_ ocks" — lowa's Athletes

Olympic runner George Saling of Wayne County was the Gold Medal winner in the 110-meter hurdles in 1932. Van Meter is the hometown of famed pitcher Bob Feller. Three career no-hitters and 2,581 strikeouts paved his way to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962. Fans head to Iowa State University in Ames to watch the Iowa State Cyclones compete in Big 12 Conference sports. The North Iowa Huskies hockey team plays its home games in Mason City, and the Des Moines Buccaneers are recent national champions of the United States Junior A Hockey League. Have a ball at an Iowa Cubs baseball game or cheer on the Iowa Barnstormers as they play professional arena football indoors in Des Moines. The Des Moines Dragons, Iowa's newest sports team, are members of the International Basketball Association.

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You haven't seen the ultimate treehouse until you visit The Big Treehouse in Marshalltown — a 10-level structure complete with electricity, running water, piped-in music and charming decorator touches, all built within a silver maple tree. The giant Crusoe umbrella sculpture shelters Nollen Plaza in downtown Des Moines, and the 162-foot Mahanay Bell Tower in Jefferson, featuring 14 cast bells and carillon, offers three performances daily. The Kate Shelley High Bridge near Boone is one of the longest and highest double-track bridges in the world and is so named because of this young heroine's journey across the bridge in a violent storm to warn a passenger train of upcoming danger on the tracks. Brooklyn's "Community of Flags" features a huge, year-round, outdoor display of color anchored by a giant 20- by 38-foot United States flag on a 50-foot pole surrounded by flags from all 50 states and the armed services and other special interest flags.

andscape

The differences in terrain throughout the central region are dramatic - from flat, fertile farmland to rolling hills and forested river valleys. Wagon ruts are still evident today in many areas of south central Iowa, marking the journey of the Mormons who traveled across this area of the state in the mid-1800s. Fossils from the Devonian Period, which are more than 350 million years old, can be found at the Rockford Fossil Beds located near the north central Iowa community of Rockford. The architectural landscape of Frank Lloyd Wright can be seen throughout the downtown and historic neighborhoods of Mason City.

Musicians

The Surf Ballroom in Clear Lake is the site of the last concert by Buddy Holly, Ritchie Valens and J.P. "The Big Bopper" Richardson. The beautifully restored Surf features a monument dedicated to the memories of these rock-and-roll legends and "the day the music died." Mason City is the hometown of The Music Man writer and composer, Meredith Willson, whose works were performed by such greats as Bing Crosby. In addition, Mason City has hosted the North Iowa Band Festival for more than 50 years. Opera star Simon Estes still has ties to his boyhood home of Centerville, and band leader Lawrence Welk began his career at Drake University in Des Moines.

Native Sons and Daughters

Famous people with Iowa ties include John L. Lewis, a national labor leader in the coal mining era who is honored with the Lewis Mining and Labor Museum in Lucas; Mamie Doud Eisenhower (the wife of the 34th president, Dwight D. Eisenhower), who was born in Boone and whose birthplace is one of only two first ladies' birthplaces in the United States open to visitors; Bil Baird, an artist and creator of puppets and marionettes, including those featured in The Sound of Music, who was from Mason City; and Pulitzer Prize-winning author MacKinlay Kantor and reporter Clark Mollenhoff, who were from Webster City.

pera

Enjoy world-class opera with the Des Moines Metro Opera, featuring outstanding performances each season. Remembering his roots, opera star Simon Estes still returns to his native Iowa to regale audiences with his magnificent voice. Built in 1900, the Pella Opera House has undergone a spectacular \$2 million renovation and offers seasons of musical and theatrical entertainment featuring nationally known performers.

ioneers

The dragoons were early military scouts, and their trails follow the Des Moines and Boone rivers. Carrie Chapman Catt, from Iowa, started the nationwide suffragist movement. Franklin County had the first Rural Electric Association (REA) plant to go on line west of the Mississippi, changing life in rural America forever.

Quilting

Lamoni is known as "Quilt City," and the Valley Junction area of West Des Moines caters to quilt lovers, with stores that sell antique quilts and others that sell quilting supplies for the creation of new ones.

Rivers and Lakes

Popular in central Iowa, excursion and meal cruises include the Spirit of Greene on the Shell Rock River near Greene, the Scenic City Empress on the Iowa River near Iowa Falls and the Lady of the Lake on spring-fed Clear Lake. Colfax was famous for its natural mineral springs, reputed to have healing powers. Visitors came to Colfax from all over the world, many arriving by train, to stay in one of several grand hotels that existed then. Beauty and fun combine on the Des Moines, Iowa, Raccoon and Boone rivers, offering canoeing, boating and natural scenery. Iowa's largest lakes - Red Rock, Rathbun and Saylorville — are managed by the Army Corps of Engineers and offer outstanding outdoor recreational opportunities. In addition, Rathbun features the Rathbun Fish Hatchery, the largest warm-water fish hatchery in the world.

Symbols

Iowa's many grain elevators are often referred to as the skyscrapers of rural America and symbolize the agricultural heritage of the area. Moving down the road, you may happen upon the "Butter Cow and Calf" sculpture near Toledo, which was created by a local artist and displayed at the Iowa State Fair for 30 years. Heading on to Osceola on Highway 34, you'll encounter the "Warrior Statue," created in 1992 from red cedar to honor the American Indian heritage of the area. The "Maple Tree Farmer," a 30-foot carving depicting a farmer, a stalk of corn and chickens, is located in Hubbard. The national 4-H emblem has its roots in Clarion, and the state flag of Iowa was designed by Dixie Gebhardt of Knoxville. In Eldon, you can strike a pose at the American Gothic house, which is featured in the background of Iowa artist Grant Wood's world-famous painting, "American Gothic," symbolizing rural life.

Trails and Rails

Get "on track" at the Boone and Scenic Valley Railroad with a train ride through the beautiful Des Moines River Valley. Trainland U.S.A. in Colfax is an operating toy-train museum, which includes more than 20 Lionel "O" gauge trains traveling over 4,000 feet of track. Britt celebrates the life of those who rode the rails, with the National Hobo Convention, which has been held annually in August since 1900. Finally, follow the paths of the past on the Dragoon and Mormon trails, or travel the Lincoln Highway, the first hard-surfaced transcontinental highway.

Universities and Colleges

At Iowa State University, a pioneer of technology, scientists invented the first digital computer and the first fax machine. It is home to the largest student-organized festival of its kind — VEISHEA. Grinnell College, a highly regarded liberal arts school, was the first college west of the Mississippi. And Graceland College in Lamoni was founded by Joseph Smith III, first president of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Views and Vistas

Enjoy a breathtaking look at the Des Moines River Valley from Pella's 160-foot Cordova Park Observation Tour. Or take a ride on the Boone and Scenic Valley Railroad for a spectacular view from one of the highest trestles in the state. A riot of color entertains the eyes at Pella's Tulip Time each May. At the Iowa Arboretum near Madrid, more than 300 acres of forest feature walking trails that branch out to scenic overlooks and spring-fed streams. Colorful hot-air balloons quietly hang in the heavens over Indianola during the National Balloon Classic.

Welcome Centers

A wealth of Iowa information is available at central Iowa's Welcome Centers, including two interstate centers that operate seasonally from mid-April to mid-October and are located on I-35 near Davis City and on I-80 near Waukee. Locally operated centers that are open year round are housed in an original Sears & Roebuck home in Bloomfield, in a restored Rock Island Depot in Dows, in a facility with an agriculture theme at the Top of Iowa Welcome Center near Northwood, within a new orientation center at Living History Farms in Des Moines, and in the Southern Iowa Gateway Welcome Center in Lamoni. In addition, several other local visitor information and welcome centers are located throughout the region.

X-tra! X-tra!

Yule Time and Other Holidays

Memorable Christmas traditions include the Lighted Christmas Parade in Oskaloosa; the Victorian Stroll in Albia where 60 "living windows" depict Christmas scenes; and a Dutch Christmas celebration in Pella. An old-fashioned Fourth of July at Living History Farms is a favorite of all ages, and St. Patrick's Day wouldn't be complete without a parade in downtown Des Moines.

Zones

Iowa is in the Central Time Zone. A central Iowa "speed zone" can be found in Knoxville, which is known as the Sprint Car Capital of the World, with a half-mile track that sizzles with exciting racing action from mid-April through mid-September, and is host to the National Sprint Car Championships every August. Knoxville is also home to the National Sprint Car Hall of Fame and Museum, the world's only museum dedicated to preserving the history of "big cars" and sprint car racing. However, most Iowa highways have a speed limit of 55 mph, while the limit for rural interstates and some four-lane highways is 65 mph.

Arrive Ames. Stroll through Reiman Gardens, offering a colorful display of annual and perennial garden flowers, shrubs, and trees. Enjoy dinner at an area restaurant and overnight in Ames.

DAY TWO

Morning

Travel to State Center. Tour Watson's Grocery Store, a restored grocery and mercantile built in 1885, which contains original fixtures, oak cabinetry, and a collection of period grocery items and dry goods. Arrive Marshalltown. Journey to the top of The Big Treehouse, a 10-level delight featuring electricity, running water and decorator touches. Shop for unique gifts or take a tour of one of the Midwest's leading auction houses. Enjoy lunch at Stone's Restaurant — home of the famous "mile high" chiffon pie.



DAY ONE

Morning

Depart Des Moines for Prairie City. Visit the Walnut Creek National Wildlife Refuge — Neal Smith Prairie Learning Center. Explore the 40,000-square-foot Prairie Learning Center's state-of-the-art exhibits and audio-visual programs. The 5,000-acre restored tallgrass prairie offers a driving tour route with buffalo-viewing opportunities. For soft adventurers, the refuge includes hiking trails through native flowers and grasses and wildlife viewing. At the Scholte House, see Old World furniture, paintings, drawings and more from the collection of Pella's founder — Dominie Scholte - and his wife Mareah. For an afternoon treat, stroll the streets of downtown Pella, sample bakery-fresh Dutch pastries and browse through the shops on the square. Dinner and overnight in Pella. Depending on the season, evening entertainment options include musical and theatrical performances at the grandly restored Pella Opera House, plays or musical productions at Central College or the Pella Community Center, a private Dutch costume show, or a bonfire complete with roasted marshmallows and s'mores at Lake Red Rock.

DAY TWO Morning

Depart for Albia. Enjoy coffee and pastries and a tour of the beautifully restored First Iowa Bank Building, which features antiques, original artwork and an outdoor terrace. Stroll through Albia's 92-building historic business district, and shop at the many unique stores located on the downtown square.

Arrive Chariton. Tour the distribution center of one of the Midwest's largest grocery chains, Hy-Vee. See where fresh produce is ripened and stored before shipping to the stores, as well as frozen foods and cheeses. Enjoy an authentic Amish meal served in an Amish family home. Learn about the family bakery, and purchase breads, pies, cookies and candies before departing.

Afternoon

Arrive Winterset. Tour the covered bridges made famous by the novel and movie The Bridges of Madison County. Relive romance at Francesca's house, the farmhouse featured in the movie. Visit the birthplace of "The Duke," John Wayne. Other possible stops include Groth's Gardens, located on a century farm near Winterset and featuring over 300 varieties of mums, perennials, wildflowers and herbs; Howell Tree Farm and Dried Florals located near Cumming, featuring a traditional 1910 barn filled to the rafters with dried flowers, craft supplies, and gifts; or The Farmhouse, a 1900 herb farm and gift shop located near Grimes, where visitors can stroll through theme gardens of herbs and flowers and hear informative talks on herbs.

Evening

Arrive Perry. Evening meal and overnight at the Hotel Pattee, a beautifully restored boutique-style hotel and the cornerstone of this community's downtown district. The multimillion-dollar restoration of the Hotel Pattee was a gift to the community from philanthropist and hometown-girl-made-good Roberta Green Ahmanson, who wanted to give something back to the community that gave her a good start in life.

DAY THREE

Morning

Arrive **Des Moines**. Revisit rural life at Living History Farms, a 600-acre open-air agricultural museum. Farming lifestyles and techniques from pioneer days are featured, as well as an 1800s town and restored Victorian mansion, and a new orientation center. Valley Junction — a historic shopping district — is the next stop, where visitors can window-shop or take home any number of treasures.

Afternoon

From elegant cafes to generous buffets, a variety of cuisines are there for the choosing at **Des Moines** area restaurants for lunch. Suggested afternoon tours include the Salisbury House, a 42-room English Tudor mansion with a collection of art and treasures from around the world; the Iowa State Capitol with its beautiful gold dome; Terrace Hill, a Victorian-style mansion and home of Iowa's governor; or a "walk on the wild side" at Blank Park Zoo.

griculture

The rolling hills of eastern Iowa, etched by contour and rotation farming, create the scenic rural beauty that inspired worldfamous Iowa painter Grant Wood. Picturesque barns of every shape and size frame country roads; modern farm techniques contrast with more traditional — especially Amish — ways. Farm tours are popular throughout the region. Bring back bygone days at the Midwest Old Threshers Heritage Museums and the Midwest Old Threshers Reunion in Mount Pleasant. Major ag industries such as John Deere, Division of Deere and Co., in Waterloo highlight today's farm culture.

Business and Industry

Industry hums in regional communities. Ertl Toy Factory, Dyersville, offers tours of one of America's largest such plants. Oral B Labs, a subsidiary of Gillette, is located in Iowa City. Recycled Products makes custom designs from recycled plastics in Monticello. A nationally respected brand name originates in Middle Amana — Amana Refrigeration. And Rockwell leads in avionics engineering from Cedar Rapids. Cedar Rapids is also home to six companies with international origins. Where farms flourish, ag industries thrive as well. Familiar names include Quaker Oats Co., Cedar Rapids; ADM Corn Processing, Clinton and Cedar Rapids; and FDL Foods, Dubuque. Numerous ag-related businesses prosper in the area, from corporate livestock production facilities to small-town grain elevator seed-and-feed operations to high-tech seed processing and chemical development.

Climate

Iowa's weather appeals to everyone — sooner or later! Diversity of season is a great reason to love Iowa's climate. A typical year brings 266 sunny or partly cloudy days and 99 cloudy days. Winter snowfall averages 30 inches, and relative humidity averages 72 percent. Summer means fragrant grass and freshpicked fruit, lazy naps and quick-paced walks, floating in boats and batting at balls. Fall provides cool, leaf-crunchy days, pumpkin faces and cinnamon spices, hayrack rides and harvest moons. Winter brings silver white mornings and hot chocolate evenings, ice skating and daredevil sledding, rosy cheeks and warm wraps. Spring means tiny buds and baby birds, gentle breezes and welcome rains, newborn gardens and airborne kites.

Democracy

The 28 counties of eastern Iowa are each governed by a county board of supervisors. Burlington was Iowa's first territorial capital, and the Old Capitol Building in Iowa City was both the last center of government for the Iowa Territory and the first for the new state. Cedar Rapids is the only city to house its government building on an island.

Ethnic Diversity

Luxembourg village, Saint Donatus, boasts the largest and best collection of Luxembourg 19th century architecture outside of Europe. The Norwegians of Decorah — home to the Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum — hold a summer Nordic Fest. Discover American Indian heritage in fascinating historical attractions. The Amish settlements can be found in rural areas of Buchanan, Clayton, Fayette and Washington counties and near Cantril. German immigrants settled Oelwein and the famed Amana Colonies. Czech and Slovak influences are still found in Spillville, and the Czech Village of Cedar Rapids is a popular stop. African-American culture enriches Waterloo, Quad Cities and Cedar Rapids - and in Henry County, the Lewelling Quaker House, Salem, was once a refuge on the Underground Railroad.

Faith and Religion

The Little Brown Church, a favorite wedding spot near Nashua, was made famous in the song "The Little Brown Church in the Vale." The beautiful Basilica of St. Francis Xavier, near Dyersville, is one of only 33 basilicas in the nation. The World's Smallest Church is in Festina. Maharishi International University offers nonsectarian coeducational programs at the doctoral level. The historic Mormon Trail traverses southern counties. Religiousfounded communities include the Amish, the Mennonites and the German settlements of the Amana Colonies.

Gaming

Luck smiles on eastern Iowa, complete with exciting gaming attractions — riverboats: Diamond Jo, Dubuque; Mississippi Belle II, Clinton; Lady Luck, Bettendorf; Miss Marquette, Marquette; The President, Davenport; Catfish Bend, Fort Madison/ Burlington; and a dog track/casino: Dubuque Greyhound Park and Casino.

ollywood in Iowa

A favorite attraction in Dyersville is the baseball diamond - cut from a corn field where the movie Field of Dreams was filmed in 1988. The early struggle of labor unions was the setting for the Sylvester Stallone movie FIST, filmed in Dubuque. Country, starring Jessica Lange in the story of troubled times on the farm, was shot on location near Waterloo in the 1980s. "Star Trekkers" Terry Farrel (Lt. Dax) and Kate Mulgrew (Capt. Janeway) were beamed from Cedar Rapids and Dubuque, respectively. Phil Stong, who hailed from Pittsburgh, Iowa, in Van Buren County, had his novel State Fair turned into a movie three times — two of which were Rodgers and Hammerstein musical productions. Robert James Waller, author of The Bridges of Madison County (made into a movie starring Clint Eastwood and Meryl Streep), lived in Cedar Falls. Stage actress Lillian Russell was from Clinton; actor Nick Nolte, star of numerous feature films, is from Waterloo; and William Frawley, who played Fred Mertz on television's classic "I Love Lucy," was from Burlington.

owa's American Indians

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Prehistoric native cultures once thrived in Iowa, known to later American Indians as "the beautiful land." The accepted time line of cultural transitions follows: Paleo-Indians, 12,000 years ago; Red Ochre culture, 2,500 years ago; Hopewell culture, 100 B.C. - 600 A.D.; Oneota culture, 1300 - 1400. Important prehistorical sites reveal the wonder and mystery of these early people: Effigy Mounds National Monument, Allamakee County; the work of Red Ochre and later Hopewell cultures, supplanted by later indigenous people; Toolesboro Indian Mounds, Louisa County; cultures similar to Effigy Mounds; Fish Farm Mounds, Allamakee County; and Turkey River Mound, Clayton County. Chief Black Hawk, a famous war chief of the Sauk tribe, was born in 1767 in eastern Iowa. Other attractions of interest include the grave of Chief Keokuk, Keokuk, and the grave of Chief Tama, Burlington.

"... ocks" — Iowa's Athletes

Dan Gable, Olympic wrestler from Waterloo and formerly with The University of Iowa, was one of the most successful wrestling coaches in the NCAA. Bill Zuber, from Amana, took the mound for the New York Yankees. Allen Fauerback, from Preston, was an Olympic shot-putter. Another Iowan, Alex Karras, was a professional football player and a familiar television personality. Cal Eldred, from Urbana, went professional with the Milwaukee Brewers. War hero Nile Kinnick, a Heisman Trophy winner, is the namesake for The University of Iowa football stadium. Eastern Iowa hosts four Class A professional baseball teams: Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Clinton and the Quad Cities. USHL hockey teams take to the rink in Waterloo and Dubuque.

ingsize

If you want to wind your way down the "Crookedest Street in the World," head to Snake Alley in Burlington. Maquoketa Caves State Park offers a unique landscape form: Iowa's largest natural bridge. The steepest cable car operates in Dubuque. For sheer size, the Mississippi River is incomparable as the largest river in North America. Quaker Oats Company, Cedar Rapids, possesses the largest cereal mill under one roof. The largest Amish population west of the Mississippi can be found in Washington County. Sabula is Iowa's only island city. For a truly unique treat, see the world's largest strawberry at (where else?) Strawberry Point.

andscape

Eastern Iowa's ancient, rugged uplands and limestone bluffs provide panoramic vistas. Deep wood valleys and verdant lowlands border the mighty Mississippi River. Rolling hills and meandering streams offer unsurpassed rural beauty and tranquility.

Mississippi River

Travel the Great River Road — a long, winding path along the scenic and legendary Mississippi River. The river was a major contributor to westward expansion. Early explorers Marquette and Joliet helped open Iowa settlement via the Mississippi in 1673. Mark Twain steered paddlewheelers along her course, the subject of his internationally popular narrative, Life on the Mississippi. The river today remains a major source of transportation and recreation. Great River Lock and Dams 9 through 19 offer spectacular viewing of eagles during winter. Unique, picturesque river communities, gaming and nongaming riverboats, river museums and wildlife refuges prove there's still plenty of "life on the Mississippi."

Native Sons and Daughters

Many of eastern Iowa's children have grown up to influence music, science, literature, art and politics. The 31st president of the United States, Herbert Hoover, was born and is buried at West Branch. Orville and Wilbur Wright spent boyhood days watching the birds fly above Cedar Rapids. Grant Wood - world-renowned regional artist and creator of "American Gothic" — was born on a farm near Anamosa and grew up in Cedar Rapids. Dr. Norman Borlaug, born on a farm near Cresco, received the Nobel Peace Prize for his work developing new varieties of wheat that produce more grain. Burlington was home to three men who, in different ways, impacted our way of seeing the world. Edward Stone was the chief scientist for the Voyager spacecraft project, one of NASA's most ambitious and successful endeavors. Aldo Leopold won fame as a nationally respected naturalist and author. And Robert Noyce, founder of Intel Corp., was co-inventor of the semiconductor chip. Dr. James Van Allen, astronomer and discoverer of the Van Allen Radiation Belt around the earth, taught physics at The University of Iowa. Poet Paul Engle also taught and lectured at The University of Iowa. Bix Beiderbecke was an innovative jazz musician from southeastern Iowa. Laura Ingalls Wilder — author of the "Little House on the Prairie" series - also had ties to eastern Iowa.

Old Capitals

Mid-19th century lifestyles can still be explored in Burlington, Iowa's first territorial capital. Still standing as a reminder of Iowa's early struggles toward statehood, the Old Capitol Building in Iowa City was Iowa's last territorial and first statehood capital.

Pioneers

Noted trailblazers who passed this way include explorer and mountain man John Henry Weber, buried in Bellevue, and Buffalo Bill Cody — frontiersman, showman, Wild West legend — from the Quad Cities. Mary Ingalls, sister to Laura Ingalls Wilder, attended the Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School in Vinton. The pioneers of the Mormon Trail made their historic journey through the southern parts of eastern Iowa.

Quilts

Ethnically inspired quilting with Amish, Mennonite and German influences can be abundantly found in Buchanan, Van Buren and Fayette counties, as well as in Fairbank, the Amana Colonies and the Kalona area. Several quilt shows take place annually in eastern Iowa.

Rivers and Lakes

In addition to the Mississippi, many other rivers along the eastern border afford excellent recreational opportunities for fishing and canoeing. Some of the most scenic rivers include the Upper Iowa, Turkey, Volga and Wapsipinicon. Outstanding lakes for recreation include Lake McBride and Lake Hendricks.

Symbols

The "City of Five Seasons" emblem in Cedar Rapids denotes the fifth season as a "Time for Life." See the world's largest strawberry at Strawberry Point. Follow these routes on your way to the fun in eastern Iowa: the Lincoln Highway (old U.S. Highway 30), denoted with red, white and blue signs bearing the letter "L"; Mormon Pioneer Trail, denoted with "wagon wheel" signs; and the Great River Road, designated by white and green signs bearing a sternwheel logo.

rails and Rails

With three nationally sanctioned trails, 18 state park trails, 132 county or multicounty trails, 10 city-managed trails and two trails managed by other sources — 165 trails in all — eastern Iowa offers miles of smiles in the outdoors. Several eastern Iowa trails have been developed on abandoned rail beds. Though fewer in number, railways still maintain a big role in commerce for agricultural and mineral industries. Railroad attractions include the Hub City Heritage Railway Museum in Oelwein and La Motte Depot historical site in La Motte — Iowa's only narrow-gauge railroad depot.

Iniversities and Colleges

Two of Iowa's three state universities and more than 15 other post-secondary learning institutions in eastern Iowa offer a quality education for students from all over the world. The University of Northern Iowa, Cedar Falls, has a parklike campus on 850 acres, including the campanile, UNI-Dome, university museum and art gallery. The University of Iowa, Iowa City, boasts a major medical research center and hospital, and is home to the Old Capitol Building, the Museum of Natural History and the internationally acclaimed Writer's Workshop.

Views and Vistas

The limestone bluffs and rugged terrain in eastern Iowa afford many panoramic views. Bellevue State Park, Pikes Peak, Mt. Hosmer Park in Lansing, Eagle Point Park in Dubuque, and Effigy Mounds National Monument all provide breathtaking vistas of the Mississippi River and surrounding woodlands. Backbone State Park and Maquoketa Caves State Park astonish visitors with their spectacular views. Hayden Prairie in Howard County suggests how the terrain appeared in frontier days.

Welcome Centers

Stop in for a road break and more local travel information at any one of eastern Iowa's Welcome Centers in the Amana Colonies, Burlington, Dubuque, Elkader, I-80 Amana, Le Claire, Victor and Wilton.

Yuletide and Other Holidays

Festivities abound in eastern Iowa year round. Plan to attend one of these major events: Festival of Trees, Davenport, during Christmas season; St. Patrick's Day annual celebrations in Dyersville and parades in Cedar Rapids and Davenport; My Waterloo Days, with a Memorial Day kickoff; The Freedom Festival on Independence Day, Cedar Rapids; and the Midwest Old Threshers Reunion, Mount Pleasant, on Labor Day.

Zones

Iowa is in the Central Time Zone. Current Iowa law sets speed zones on interstate highways at 65 mph, and at 55 mph on most other state and county roads.



Four days touring eastern Iowa's agricultural heritage.



DAY ONE

Morning

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Arrive in Decorah, the home of Norwegian charm in Iowa! Tour the Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum complex, and learn about Norwegian immigrants to the United States. During the last weekend in July, activities here include Nordic Fest—a celebration of Norwegian heritage. Lunch is full of Norwegian delights at the museum restaurant.

Afternoon

A beautiful drive down rural roads in Buchanan and Fayette counties reminds the traveler of a simpler time in life. This large Amish settlement offers lovely scenery. Visit the historic Wapsipinicon Mill in Independence for a peek at ag processing of the past. In Cedar Falls, the Ice House Museum depicts the era of cutting, harvesting, storing and selling natural ice in the early 1900s.

Evening

Have fun on the farm with an old-fashioned hayrack ride and barbecue. Overnight in Waterloo/Cedar Falls.

DAY TWO

Morning

During an entertaining and informative three-hour tour, an entire tractor will be manufactured before the travelers' eyes at John Deere Tractor Works in Waterloo.

Afternoon

Travel along a scenic route through some of the world's most fertile farmland. Learn the history of a successful agricultural community at the Ray House, a Victorian home on the National Register of Historic Places in Vinton. Next, tour the Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School — once attended by Laura Ingalls Wilder's sister Mary.

Evening

Enjoy a fabulous ethnic dinner at Zindrick's in the Czech Village, and overnight in Cedar Rapids.

DAY THREE

Morning

Enjoy rolls and juice at Ushers Ferry, a quaint turn-of-the-century village replica in Cedar Rapids. Experience the grandeur with a visit to one of only 18 properties of the National Trust for Historic Preservation in the United States — a beautiful Queen Anne-style mansion — Brucemore. In Iowa City, visit the last capitol of the Iowa Territory and the first Iowa State Capitol, the Old Capitol Museum. Depart to Kalona. At the Kalona Historical Village, learn about how Amish and Mennonite cultures cause the past and the present to meet daily. Lunch is served family-style in a Mennonite home. (Save room for pie!)

Afternoon

In Swedesburg, an afternoon snack of Swedish pastry awaits after a tour of the Swedish-American Museum. Travel to Mount Pleasant for a visit to the Midwest Old Threshers

Museum, where it's a step back in agricultural time. A special exhibit discusses women's contributions to the family farm. For five days ending Labor Day, this museum comes to life with the annual Old Threshers Reunion. Step back to the days of opera houses and traveling theater tents at the Museum of Repertoire Theatre Americana.

Evening

Tour Timberplain Farm and stay for supper. This first-class farming operation offers a peek into modern farming and an opportunity for an outdoor country meal with musical entertainment. Travel to **Keosauqua**; overnight at the historic Hotel Manning.

DAY FOUR

Morning

A step-on guide will offer local notes about the picturesque, historic Villages of Van Buren which are scattered along the original route of the Mormon Pioneer Trail. Enjoy shopping and watching artisans at work in Bentonsport, and see the point where Brigham Young and his followers crossed the Des Moines River on their route west. The Fort Madison, Farmington and Western Railroad Rides and Museum offer a fun ride over the river and through the woods on a full-size train.

Afternoon


In Fort Madison, take in the beauty of the Mississippi River and the excitement of gaming action aboard *Catfish Bend* Riverboat Casino. See living history demonstrations, and visit with costumed interpreters at the Old Fort Museum. Overnight in Fort Madison.

DAY ONE

Morning

Arrive **Dubuque**. Iowa's oldest city invites you to explore the past. Take a cable car to the heights of Fenelon Place Elevator, where you'll find a panoramic view overlooking the Mississippi River and three states.

Afternoon

The National Rivers Hall of Fame, Woodward Riverboat Museum and sidewheeler *William M. Black* take you back to the days of steamboats, mining and river exploration. Drift away on a Tom Sawyer-style log raft, pilot a steamboat down the Mississippi or crawl through a simulated mine shaft.

Evening

Cruise along the Mississippi on the *Spirit of Dubuque* while enjoying a prime rib dinner and entertainment. Overnight in **Dubuque**.

DAY TWO

Morning/Afternoon

Visit other Dubuque attractions, such as Harbor Place, Cable Car Square and Mathias Ham House historic site. Located 30 miles west near **Dyersville** is the site where the movie *Field of Dreams* was filmed. Run the bases yourself or pick up a baseball souvenir. Depart to **Fredericksburg**.

Evening

Ever feed buffalo by hand? Go out onto the range at Hawkeye Buffalo Ranch near Fredericksburg to see an entire herd. Stay for a buffalo steak dinner. Overnight in Waverly.

DAY THREE

Morning

Arrive Cedar Rapids. As you explore Iowa's second-largest city, visit Brucemore, a Queen Anne-style mansion built in 1885, and brush up on Iowa history at the Seminole Valley Farm and Ushers Ferry Historic Village.

Afternoon

Experience the city's Czech and Slovak heritage with lunch at the Czech Village and a tour of the National Czech and Slovak Museum. Stroll through the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art, featuring the world's largest collection of Grant Wood paintings. Visit the Science Station, a hands-on museum, and Duffy's Collectible Cars showroom.

Evening

Relax over dinner at one of Cedar Rapids' fine restaurants, then hit the malls for a shopping adventure. Overnight in Cedar Rapids.

DAY FOUR

Morning

Arrive Amana Colonies. Make the Visitors' Center your first stop for a preview of area attractions and Old World heritage of the Amana people. At the Amana Arts Center, you'll see exhibits of folk crafts and art. Get the "Big Picture" of the past at the Mini-Americana/Barn Museum, where you'll see "Rural America in Miniature." The Museum of Amana History shows an award-winning film and displays in three buildings. Take home something special from the wide selection of warm woolens at the Amana Woolen Mill and Salesroom.

Afternoon

Step back in time at the Amana Furniture and Clock Shop. Watch oak furniture take shape beneath the skilled hands of the old guild of Amana cabinetmakers, and see a complete line of grandfather, grandmother, wall and mantel clocks.

Take home a delicious hickory-smoked ham from Amana meat shops, or try tempting, bakery-fresh pastries. Tour the brewery and wineries, and toast ingenuity with a sample of rhubarb or dandelion wine.

Evening

For a taste of old-fashioned home cooking, visit one of Amana's many charming restaurants. Menus range from Wiener schnitzel and sauerbraten to country-fried chicken, served family-style in homelike surroundings. Overnight in Amana or nearby Iowa City/Coralville.



GREAT RIVER ROAD ADVENTURE

Four days following the mighty Mississippi.



DAY ONE

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Morning

Arrive Keokuk. Tour the Keokuk River Museum, featuring exhibits aboard a retired steamboat that has been designated a national historic landmark. Continue to the Lock 19, Dam and Hydroelectric Plant — the largest lock on the Mississippi River and site of an electric plant built in 1913, which still generates power. (From this point, visitors can get close views — from November through April — of the majestic bald eagles that winter here.) The National Cemetery in Keokuk is one of 12 original National Cemeteries, designated at the same time as Arlington Cemetery, and the only one of its kind west of the Mississippi. A guided tour features the Civil War section where both Union and Confederate soldiers are buried. April groups will enjoy the Civil War Reenactment: Battle of Pea Ridge an ABA Top 100 Event.

Afternoon

Travel north on the Great River Road to Fort Madison. After an early lunch, learn about the strength of the Mississippi River during a brief tour of the 1993 Flood Museum. In Burlington, stroll Snake Alley — the "Crookedest Street in the World," then tour the Heritage Hill National Historic District either by coach or on foot. This 29-block area of the city features a variety of architectural styles and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. From here, head to Mosquito Park for a breathtaking view of the Mississippi River. Continue north to Muscatine for a peek into the past at the Pearl Button Museum, where the history of the button industry — once a major employer — comes to life.

Evening

Enjoy a casual dinner, entertainment and sunset in the **Quad Cities**.

DAY TWO

Morning

Start the day at the Putnam Museum, learning about the heritage and wildlife of this region along the Mississippi River. The museum also features Asian and Egyptian galleries and a 3,500-year-old mummy — and hosts many temporary national exhibits. Spend an hour shopping and touring the historic Village of East Davenport. Farther north, stop at the Buffalo Bill Cody Homestead and see where this icon of the Wild West got his start.

Afternoon

The beautiful Mississippi Belle II in Clinton offers nostalgic riverboat atmosphere, an all-you-can-eat lunch buffet, the beauty of the Mississippi, and gaming entertainment. Following an afternoon cruise, learn the story of early Mississippi Riverarea settlers and local lumber tycoons at the Clinton County Historical Society Museum.

Evening

The night's activities will depend on the time of year: Cheer on the Clinton Lumber Kings Class A baseball team, or enjoy a performance of the Clinton Area Showboat Theatre, Clinton Symphony Orchestra or the Gateway Ballet Company. Overnight in Clinton.

DAY THREE

Morning/Afternoon

A guided tour of "Simply Beautiful" Jackson County is breathtaking. A step-on guide meets groups at the Welcome Center in Sabula — Iowa's only island city — and leads them to Bellevue State Park to enjoy a beautiful scenic overlook and butterfly sanctuary, to the picturesque Luxembourger village of St. Donatus and to Maquoketa Caves State Park to hike or spelunk. In Maquoketa, "shop 'til you drop" at Banowetz Antiques, featuring 100 dealers of fine antique furniture, toys, housewares and more. Don't worry about transporting purchases — they deliver! Enjoy a picnic lunch at one of the

parks or at one of the home-style restaurants along the way. Continue north along the Great River Road toward Dubuque, and stop at Crystal Lake Cave for a narrated guided tour of delicate and rare natural crystal formations.

Evening

Step back in time and dine in elegance during the five-course Victorian House Tour and Progressive Dinner in Dubuque. Overnight in **Dubuque**.

Morning

DAY FOUR

Enjoy a hearty Iowa breakfast, a bit of nostalgia and a big piece of pie at Iowa's oldest restaurant and pub — Breitbach's in **Balltown**. Continue a scenic tour of the Great River Road along ridges, curves, hills and limestone bluffs toward the river community of **Guttenberg**. Stop here for a tour of the Lockmaster's House Heritage Museum, one of the last remaining lockmaster's houses on the Mississippi River. Follow River Drive through town for lovely park views of the river.

Afternoon

Farther along the adventure, discover Effigy Mounds National Monument, an archaeological park that preserves more than 200 mounds — some in the shapes of birds and bears — from the prehistoric Woodland Indian culture. A ranger-guided tour and recently renovated visitor center and museum make the history and beauty of this monument come to life. Many visitors spot eagles soaring as they marvel at the view from Fire Point.

Evening

Kick back and relax with an old-fashioned hayrack ride and chuck wagon barbecue at Scenic Ridge View Exotic Animal Ranch in Harpers Ferry. End the evening with music around the campfire and the peaceful sounds of coyotes barking and owls hooting. Overnight in Marquette.

Allamakee County's scenic hills, bluff lands, rivers and streams are the perfect setting for canoeing, hunting, fishing, boating, hiking, camping and skiing. Visit Effigy Mounds, the 6,000-acre Yellow River State Forest, and Mississippi River Bluffs. For more information,
