Mrs. Dixie Cornell Gebhardt of Knoxville, a member of the Iowa chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, designed Iowa's state flag in 1917. The flag was created in response to Iowa National Guardsmen who saw other states' banners flying along the Mexican border during World War I.

One of the official acts of the first Iowa Legislature was to create the Great Seal of the State of Iowa in 1847. The two-inch diameter seal pictures a citizen soldier standing in a wheat field surrounded by farming and industrial tools, with the Mississippi River in the background. An eagle is overhead, holding in its beak a scroll bearing the state motto, Our liberties we prize, our rights we will maintain."

The Iowa Legislature designated the Eastern Goldfinch as the official state bird in 1933. It was chosen because it is commonly found in Iowa and often remains in the state through the winter.


