EARTH LODGE PEOPLE

1973 sd. color 20 min. UNIV. OF IOWA This prehistoric Central Plains Tradition is described through a series of excavations of earth lodges dating from about AD 900-1300. Structural evidence and the interpretation of artifacts and other remains illustrates this culture. Artist's drawings then reconstruct the way of life of a people living in scattered homesites rather than the fortified agricultural villages seen in the film "Mill Creek Village People".

EYE OF THE STORM, THE (MP)4193 1970 sd. color 25 min. XEROX PROD.

Brown eyes..blue eyes..is one better than the other? This award-winning documentary records Mrs. Jane Elliott's highly successful attempts to introduce her third grade class in Riceville, Iowa, to the realities of prejudice. Color of eyes was the criterion of superiority. Each child spent one day as oppressor and one day as oppressed. The results were striking.

FORT MADISON ARCHAEOLOGY

OF IOWA The discovery of Old Fort Madison (1800-1813) under a parking lot is used as an example of the interpretation of structural remains to find out about the original Fort appearance. This was the first United States Fort in the Upper Mississippi Valley. This film shows tools and ordinary household belongings used at the fort.

GRANT WOOD

1952 sd. color 14 min. PICTURE A native of Iowa, Wood (1892-1942) brought a lively sense of humor and satire to his canvasses, a warm affection for the Iowa landscapes and the simple farmfolk among whom he lived most of his life. Narrated by Henry Fonda.

HEARTLAND, THE (MP)4927

1983 sd. color 25 min. NATL I-A Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota. These are the states

that make up the United States' heartland, including the literal center of North America. This is the region where the Mississippi River begins, where pioneers launched their great push west, where fields of grain grow beyond the horizon, and where modern cities punctuate wide-open spaces.

At the site of Iowa's Living History Farm a grain harvest festival is held in the tradition and with the methods of harvest of about the 1840's.

LAST PONY MINE, THE 1971 sd. color 23 min. ISU Documents the last days of the last mine of its kind in the USA. This country mine in Southeastern Iowa was using methods and techniques apropos to forty years ago including the use of a pony to pull the underground coal cars. MILL CREEK VILLAGE PEOPLE, THE (MP)4452 1973 sd. color 26 min. UNIV. OF IOWA H-A

The 1965 excavation at the Wittrock site shows structural evidence of a heavily fortified earth lodge village dating from about 1400 A.D. Part of the Mill Creek culture of northwest Iowa, it is comparable to the Middle Missouri Tradition of the Plains which subsequently gave rise to the Mandan of Historic times. Artifacts of bone, shell, stone, and pottery are explained against a background of artists' drawing based on ethnographic and archaeological data reconstructing the prehistoric village.

Buxton, a turn-of-the-century coal mining town, was founded by the Consolidation Coal Company and named after the mine's superintendent. Due to a shortage of labor, Blacks were encouraged to settle and work the mines. The town became known as Iowa's "black metropolis." But when the coal ran out in the 1920s, the town began to die. This documentary traces the history of Buxton and features interviews with the surviving members of the community and a look at some long lost photographs. Produced by Iowa Public Television.
