Dear Governor Reynolds:

I am pleased to submit the 2021 Annual Report on behalf of the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission (the "Commission"). The Commission is committed to maintaining a vibrant racing and gaming industry that provides economic growth and development for the State of Iowa while continuing to promote responsible gaming and ensuring continued participation in the "Buy Iowa First" program. As always, the integrity of the racing and gaming industry in Iowa remains our highest priority.

The gaming industry reported the highest revenue year ever since casino gambling was authorized in the State of Iowa as many people looked to find alternative entertainment options amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. The facilities generated more than \$382 million in overall gaming taxes for the year and contributed over \$56 million to the non-profit licensees. Sports wagering generated an additional \$8.6 million in overall wagering taxes. In short, the industry continues to provide significant revenue to the state and has helped fund numerous projects and programs at the local level.

The gaming industry thrived in 2021, proving to be a safe and comfortable entertainment option when many competing alternatives were not open or had limited hours in 2021 due to difficulties in finding staff. Sports wagering also flourished as customers were able to register for online accounts without visiting a casino. The sports wagering market was extremely competitive as companies spent a considerable amount of effort advertising and offering cash incentives to acquire new players. Iowa saw the number of online sports wagering companies grow to 18 which also was a factor in the increased sports wagering revenue.

Capital reinvestment by operators in the Iowa gaming industry is critical to maintaining vibrant entertainment destinations that attract people from other markets, serve the local and surrounding communities for which they are located, and provide quality jobs. This has been a point of emphasis for the Commission with all licensees. While most material capital projects continued to be delayed in 2021 due to the uncertainty surrounding the pandemic and supply chain issues, we did still see some reinvestment. Lakeside Casino started a project to modernize a number of their entrances to their hotel and pre-function convention space. The overall spend at Lakeside on this project and other capital expenditures was \$2.7 Million. Grand Falls announced a \$7 Million project of their facility. The project entailed replacing the carpet, slot bases, chairs,

signage, electrical; demolition for drywall; adding drywall, lighting, decorative metal, and space for VIP offices. In addition to the announcements at these two facilities, Riverside and Catfish Bend made capital expenditures at their locations of \$3 Million.

The Commission set aside a full day in July to meet with each of the gaming companies in Iowa in an effort to create an open dialogue with the industry to better understand the challenges they are facing. These meetings proved to be fruitful for the Commission members and will help us become stronger regulators. In August, similar to other industries, the Commission heard from Iowa casino managers regarding the struggles of finding employees. Commission members acted promptly at the next Commission meeting approving a request to suspend licensing requirements for non-gaming employees for a period of 60 days to allow service industry employees to start employment more quickly.

The Commission also met with the Iowa racing industry participants with a similar goal of opening lines of communication and to obtain a better understanding of the difficulties facing this industry. The Commission received helpful information with regard to field size, race dates, handle, historical conversations, what is working well, challenges facing the industry, and ideas for improvement. Commission members will use the information from these meetings to help make the best decisions possible for this industry and may continue to gather information in hopes of establishing a long-term strategic plan for racing in the state of Iowa that everyone can support.

In December, the Commission received two socioeconomic impact reports detailing the social and economic impacts of gambling in Iowa along with providing some insight to potential economic pressures facing the industry. The reports are required to be conducted every eight years pursuant to Iowa Code. The 2021 reports can be found on the Commission's website.

As we look to 2022, the new year will provide some difficult challenges for Iowa's racing and gaming industry. Federal legislation enacted in 2020 is set to begin that shift certain regulatory tasks in the racing industry to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). The FTC will be working with the Commission and horse racing stakeholders in an effort to make this transition as smooth as possible. The industry has expressed significant trepidation as to how this will impact racing in the long run. Casinos in western Iowa will face economic pressures as casino gambling is set to begin in Nebraska. Early estimates call for an impact between 25%-40% for Iowa casinos in this area. Eastern Iowa casinos will also face competition with new developments in Illinois and Wisconsin. It will be incumbent upon all Iowa casinos to respond to this competition by evaluating their operations and considering investment and amenities at their properties in an effort to put their best foot forward.

The Commission wishes to commend its staff for their continued hard work and dedication. Additionally, we appreciate our Administrator, Brian Ohorilko, along with his staff, the DCI and the Attorney General's Office for providing the commissioners, the racing and gaming industry, and the public, thorough, timely, and accurate information and analysis. The challenges facing the Commission in 2022 continue to be daunting with the sports wagering industry growing rapidly, increased competition in certain gaming markets, and a racing regulatory framework that



# **Qualified Sponsoring Organizations**

All commercial gaming operators in lowa have an agreement with a qualified sponsoring organization (QSO) licensed to conduct gambling games. QSOs are nonprofit organizations that receive a portion of their respective operator's gaming revenue as set forth in each agreement. These nonprofit license holders reinvest in numerous charitable and civic needs in and outside of their communities. A listing of each QSO can be found on the lowa Racing and Gaming Commission's website.

Additionally, pursuant to Iowa Code 99F.11(3)"c", eight-tenths of one percent of the adjusted gross receipts is deposited in the county endowment fund under the control of the Department of Revenue. The money is distributed to the 84 counties in Iowa without casinos.

urthermore, pursuant to Iowa Code 99F.11(2), each QSO receives three-quarters of one percent of sports wagering net receipts.



lowa's QSOs distributed \$48,618,506 in CY21. The County Endowment Fund distributed \$13,870,805.



Note: Amounts above are from January 1st, 2021 through December 31st, 2021.






- Prairie Meadows had 84 thoroughbred live race days between April 30, 2021 and September 25, 2021 and 58 quarter horse live race days between June 18, 2021 and September 25, 2021.
- Iowa Greyhound Park (IGA) live racing dates were April 24, 2021 through October 31, 2021.
- IGA, Prairie Meadows, and Horseshoe received greyhound and horse simulcasting from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021.
- Each Wild Rose location operates an Off Track Betting (OTB) site for IGA and accepts simulcast signals from Iowa Greyhound Park. Wild Rose numbers are included with Iowa Greyhound Park.

### Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW)

Advance Deposit Wagering (ADW) is a method of pari-mutuel wagering in which an individual may establish an account, deposit money into the account, and use the account balance for pari-mutuel wagering.

DWs are authorized under Iowa Code Chapter 99D.11, and have been operating in Iowa since 2016. There are currently two active ADW licensees in Iowa: ODS Technologies L.P. d/b/a TVG Network and Xpressbet, LLC.

### **Laboratory Testing**

he Commission is responsible for ensuring that foreign substances are not administered to racing animals. In 2021, the Commission contracted with Industrial Laboratories to conduct testing on racing animals.

# Voluntary Self-Exclusion Program

he first form for the Iowa Voluntary Self-Exclusion Program was signed in October, 2004. Since then, more than ten thousand individuals have enrolled in the program, excluding themselves from wagering with or entering the gaming areas of state licensed entities.

he statewide self-exclusions Program has had several changes since it began. At it's inception, a person could self-exclude for life. Beginning July 1, 2017, a person could self-exclude for either five years or life. At the same time, a person who enrolled prior to July 1, 2017 became able to revoke their enrollment if they had been self-excluded for at least five years.



1983	•	Iowa Legislature passed the Pari-Mutuel Wagering Act, allowing qualified sponsoring organizations to apply for a license to conduct pari-mutuel wagering on horse and dog racing.  The Governor appointed the first Racing Commission.	
1985	•	Greyhound and harness racing began.	
1989	•	Horse racing began.  Legislation allowed pari-mutuel wagering on simulcast races received by a licensed parimutuel facility conducting a minimum number of live performances.  Legislation allowed the Commission to license qualified sponsoring organizations to conduct gambling games on excursion gambling boats in a county where the electorate approved a proposition by referendum.	
1991	•	First riverboat casino began operation in Dubuque.	
1992	•	Legislation removed the live performance requirement for simulcast wagering at parimutuel facilities.	
	•	Significant changes were made to gaming law, including the following:	
		Simulcast legislation was amended requiring at least 60 performances of nine live races each day of the season in order for simulcasting to occur.

	•	Change in legislation allowed excursion gambling boats to be located or operated on a natural or man-made lake or reservoir.
2007	•	Legislation enacted allowed gambling structures to be land-based and removed the requirement to be over water.
2011	•	Advance deposit wagering was allowed by the legislature.
2014	•	Legislation enacted allowed Iowa West Racing Association and Dubuque Racing Association to maintain a license to conduct gambling games without the requirement of scheduling performances of live dog races; allowed the Iowa Greyhound Association to apply for a parimutuel license to race greyhounds at Dubuque; and established the Iowa greyhound parimutuel racing fund under the control of the Commission.
	•	Iowa Greyhound Association began live racing at the Iowa Greyhound Park in Dubuque.
2015	•	Live greyhound racing ceased at Bluffs Run Greyhound Park in Council Bluffs.
2017	•	Legislation allowed patrons who had been voluntarily excluded for life from gambling facilities to request revocation of the exclusion if the exclusion had been in place for a minimum of five years.





### Admissions and Gambling Game Revenue









