#### GEODE STATE PARK

"Hey! come on, we're going out to Geode!" This is repeated time after time in southeast lowa as families and friends pack picnic baskets and swimsuits and head for a fun day in the sun at one of southeast lowa's most popular state parks.

The geode stone for which this park is named brings "rock hounds" to the area in search of this elusive prize. A display of geodes, with mysterious crystal formations in their hollow cavities, can be seen at the campground. Please remember that it is illegal to remove geodes and other natural materials except mushrooms, nuts, fruits and berries from state parks.

Several hiking trails challenge the outdoor lover at Geode. The main trail starts at the north end of the lake and follows it all the way to the dam. Part of this trail has been developed into a nature trail with a printed brochure identifying points of interest. This trail is accessible from several picnic areas along the lake. Another trail begins at the dam on the west side of the lake and ends at picnic shelter number one.

The Skunk River forms a portion of the south boundary of the park. Years ago, the Skunk was a highway to riverboats as they traveled up river from the Mississippi to the towns of Lowell and Oakland Mills. A pioneer cemetary once overlooked the scenic river in this area.

## **FISHING**

The prime attraction of the 1,640 acre park is Lake Geode, a 205 acre lake built in 1950. Over the years, the lake has become well known for excellent fishing for largemouth bass, bluegill, crappie, channel catfish, bullhead, red-eared sunfish, and tiger muskie.

## **SWIMMING AND BOATING**

The beautiful beach is a popular spot for sunbathers and offers supervised swimming. Refreshments can be purchased at the modern beach concession building. Bait can be purchased at the boathouse where boats and canoes may be rented; a boat ramp is nearby.

#### **PICNICKING**

Geode State Park is one of the most scenic and popular picnicking spots in southeast lowa. Several open picnic shelters are available for group use. These may be reserved for \$15 through the park ranger.

#### CAMPING

There are 200 campsites with enough variety to suit anyone's tastes (80 sites have electricity). There are two modern shower buildings and a sewage dump station in the campground. No reservations are necessary, but campers must obtain a camping permit by self-registration at the campground.

# **NEIGHBORING TOWNS**


**New London** is about six miles north of the park. Just east of New London on U.S. 34, a county road turns south and leads to the main entrance.


The park may be reached from Middletown on Iowa Highway 78 or from Lowell on County Road J-20. **Denmark** and **Danville** are also close to the park.
