

PROTECTING THE BYWAY

The Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation (INHF) in partnership with the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT) recently prepared a visibility analysis of the Great River Road (July, 2002). Their goal was to identify highly visible sites deserving of land protection within the scenic corridor and take actions to protect the identified areas.

Along the Great River Road, existing public lands and contiguous woodlands larger than 1,000 acres in size were selected. The large woodland areas are important habitat for Neotropical birds migrating along the river.

The project report includes a map of each of the 10 counties along the Mississippi River with a color-coded Visibility Analysis. To request a copy of the INHF map for zoning considerations, contact Lisa Hein at 515-288-1846.

The Iowa MRPC is proud to work with INHF and IDOT in protecting views like these for travelers along the Great River Road National Scenic Byway.



MASTERPIECE IN THE MAKING

The Iowa MRPC also partners with the Mississippi River Trail, a National Millennium Trail on a 10-state cycling route.

When completed, it will travel over 2,000 continuous miles between the headwaters of the Mississippi at Lake Itasca, Minnesota and the Gulf of Mexico, winding its way through lowa. Cycling route signs, featuring the "MRT" logo, identify the route along those segments completed.



The MRT is one of 16 National Millennium Trails. It traverses a diverse landscape of bottomland and upland forests, river bluffs and flood plains, expansive fields of corn and miles of river that in the spring and fall serve as the flyway for migratory birds.

According to a recent (March 2, 2003) *Des Moines Sunday Register* Editorial by Andie Dominick about the MRT, "NOw its time for lowa to get on board. An indepth analysis of lowa has determined a route for the path that will include both off-road trails and bike lanes on roadway shoulders. New construction will hook into existing trails including the Heritage Trail in Dubuque and the Riverway Trails in the Quad Cities. The importance of the MRT cannot be underestimated. The Mississippi River is a frequently forgotten gem of lowa."

The MRT is a chance to attract millions of visitors on bikes to see America on the road outside your door.
