


American Gothic House Eldon, Iowa

Parodied thousands of times, "American Gothic" is one the world's most recognized images. The State Historical Society of Iowa has restored the

American Gothic House to its 1930 appearance.

Celebrate Gothic Day in Eldon the second Saturday in June every year. Visit the various gift shops in Eldon. Eat home-cooked meals at Jones Cafe on Main Street. Eldon is located in the Des Moines River Valley where outdoor enthusiasts will find hiking, fishing and hunting opportunities.

The original "American Gothic" painting is owned by The Art Institute of Chicago. Nan Wood Graham, Grant Wood's sister and model for the painting, collected parodies which are housed at the Davenport Art Gallery. Other Wood paintings and prints can be seen at the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art, Davenport Art Gallery and Des Moines Art Center. Anamosa and Stone City host an annual Grant Wood Art Festival.
