Award recipients came from nearly every part of the state, and their projects ranged from articles and books to events, exhibits and a documentary.

Iowa cities, counties and land-use districts are eligible to apply if they have signed a Certified Local Government agreement with the **State of Iowa and the National Park Service**, are in good standing and have a current annual report.

Draft applications can be submitted by Aug. 12 for a courtesy review.

Final deadline: Sept. 6.





Goldie Field Trip:
Montauk Historic Site
2 p.m. July 9

The Montauk Historic Site was the home of former Iowa Gov. William Larrabee and his wife, Anna. **Explore the grand estate**, which is filled with artifacts, original furnishings and art, and then walk the grounds and trails overlooking the Turkey River Valley. This program is **recommended for children 8-12 years old** who are members of Goldie's Kids Club.

Iowa History 101:
**"Printing and Performing Citizenship:
Black Activist Cultures in Iowa"**
Noon July 14

Mila Kaut will discuss how Black women's practices of institutional citizenship in **AME churches** and the **Iowa State Bystander** shaped the priorities and possibilities of Black activism in Iowa. Kaut, a Ph.D. student at Northwestern University and co-organizer of the **Iowa Colored Conventions Project**, will consider the historical lessons this late 19th-century activist culture might lend to ongoing struggles for racial equality.

Goldie Field Trip:
Iowa State Capitol

This tour will focus on many types of art found throughout the capitol, which was built in 1886. The historic building and seat of power features a **275-foot gold-leafed dome** and **four smaller domes, woodwork and a grand marble staircase**. After the tour, guests will create their own paper mosaics and explore the public grounds surrounding the building. Iowa History 101:
"From Coal Palace to Closing the Plant: Coal and Community on the Lower-Des Moines River"
Noon July 28



Join **Kevin Mason**, a Waldorf University associate professor of history, as he explores the **history of coal in southeastern Iowa**. Incorporating elements of his 2021 walk across Iowa (pictured) to follow the route of the 1st United States Dragoons, Mason's presentation will focus on how early observation of coal deposits paired with boosterish enthusiasm to develop a significant Iowa industry. The talk will highlight early exploration, dispossession, industry development, the **Ottumwa Coal Palace**, and diverse communities including **Buxton**.

Goldie Field Trip:
Plum Grove Historic Home
2 p.m. July 30



Take a guided tour of Plum Gove, the home of **Iowa's first territorial governor, Robert Lucas**. Learn about the Lucas family and the history of Iowa as a territory and early statehood. Lucas built the seven-room Greek Revival house in 1844 using local materials. It was once part of an 80-acre farm, but it's now nestled in an Iowa City neighborhood and furnished with authentic period artifacts common in 1844-1853. This program is **recommended for children 8-12 years old** who are members of Goldie's Kids Club.

Iowa History Book Club






Dakota in Exile


7 p.m. Dec. 1

Robert Hopkins was a man caught between two worlds. As a member of the **Dakota Nation**, he was accused of taking up arms against U.S. soldiers when war broke out with the Dakota in 1862. As a Christian convert and preacher, his allegiance was often questioned by his fellow Dakota. Illinois State University professor of history **Linda Clemmons** joins Annals of Iowa editor **Andrew Klumpp** for a discussion about this difficult time in U.S. history.
