lowa Workforce Development is reshaping itself to become more responsive to business needs and make it easier for lowa employers to get the help they need with their workforce challenges.

Two new division administrators and a new deputy director of employment and training joined IWD in June (although Tim Goodwin won't officially start until September) as part of a restructuring to help the agency focus more effort at becoming a one-stop center for employers' workforce needs.

"As we continue to realign to make it easier for our customers and employers to find and access workforce services in lowa, the hire of three new leaders will continue our efforts to get unemployed lowans reemployed faster, return more unemployed to the workforce, and create a one-stop customer service center for employers," said Beth Townsend, Director of Iowa Workforce Development. "Under Governor Reynolds' leadership, we want to make it easier for employers to understand and use the workforce resources Iowa provides."

IA Awards \$2.45M for Health Careers Training

The state of Iowa awarded \$2.45 million at the end of June to help 22 school districts establish Health Careers Registered Apprenticeships aimed at filling some of Iowa's most needed jobs.

The new grant program, based on the nursing/patient care program at the Career

The 2022 statewide Future Ready Iowa Summit: All Options on the Table will be held Wednesday, September 21, 2022, at the Iowa Events Center in Des Moines.

Academy of Pella, follows an innovative learning model that introduces health care opportunities to high school students with the support of virtual reality training and real-world work experience at a local nursing facility or hospital.

Gov. Kim Reynolds called the awards "an innovative opportunity to build and train our future healthcare workforce. Not only will this registered apprenticeship program combine the best available technology with hands-on experiences for high school students, but it will create long-term pathways that help keep career-ready young lowans in our state."

The eight grants will feed money to programs in 22 school districts (16 of which are launching their first-ever registered apprenticeship programs) and fund 450 apprentices.

This year's summit will feature presentations from Gov. Kim Reynolds and leaders from all over lowa representing businesses, K-12 education, higher education, economic development, workforce development, nonprofits and professional organizations. The event will include:

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
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RCM by the Numbers

lowa WORKS career planners and job search experts soon will be hitting the road to serve lowans in a whole new way: They'll be bringing the office to you.

lowa Workforce Development expects to take delivery next summer of a new 32-footlong, custom-built bus – a mobile lowa WORKS on wheels that's expected to become a valuable tool for quickly delivering workforce assistance to far-flung areas of the state.

"The pandemic caused us to rethink how we serve people across the board," said Michelle McNertney, IWD's Division Administrator for Workforce Services. "This is another great tool for our toolbox. It adds flexibility and a new way to reach people who are not currently taking advantage of the wide variety of resources and services available through the lowa WORKS centers."
