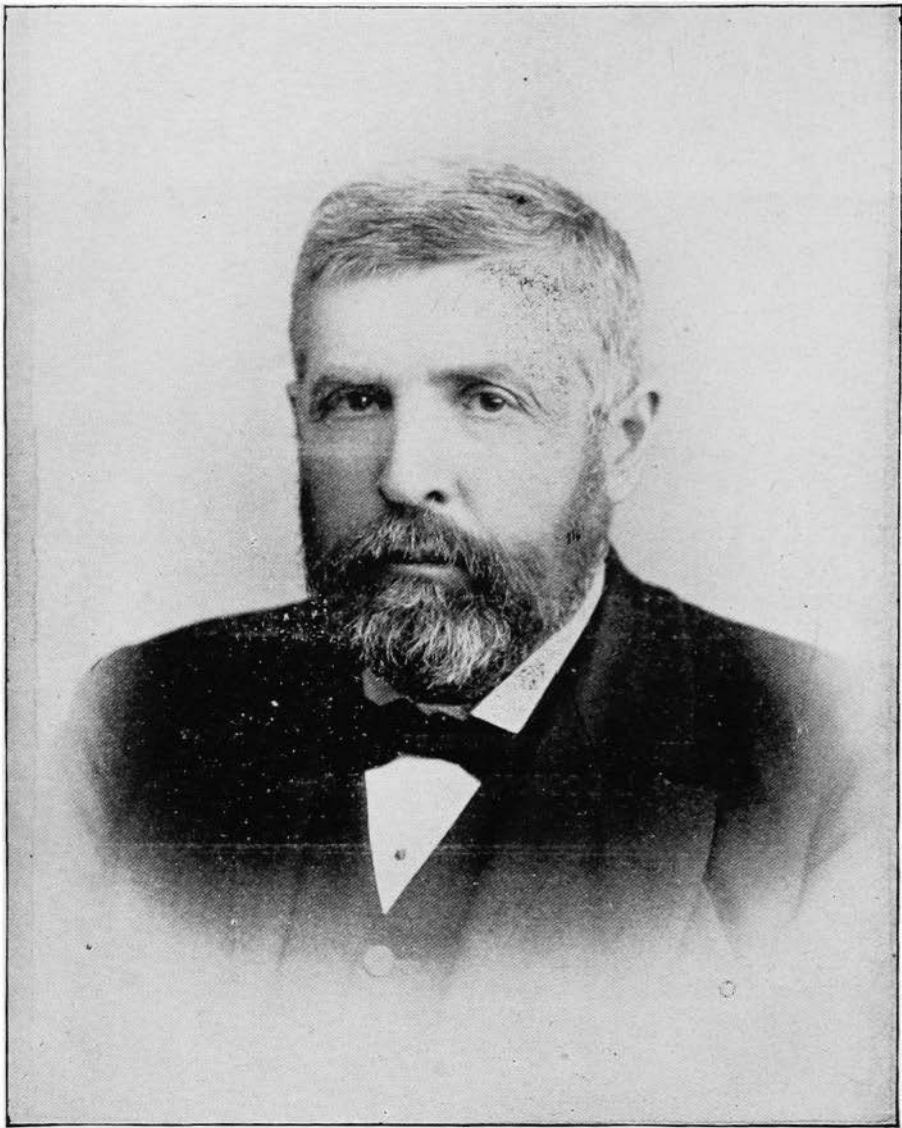

EIGHTH GOVERNOR OF IOWA, 1872-1876.

THE IOWA CAPITOL.

The first act for the erection of a new capitol building was passed by the Twelfth General Assembly and approved April 6, 1868. Under its provisions, the census board, which was composed of the governor, secretary of state, auditor of state and state treasurer, was authorized to procure plans and specifications by advertising "at least twenty days in two daily newspapers in this state, and in one newspaper in each of the cities of Chicago, New York and Philadelphia."

The board held a meeting on the 20th day of June, 1868, and authorized the publication of a notice that plans and specifications would be received by the governor for three styles of building, as follows:

First.—Plans based on a cost of \$1,000,000.

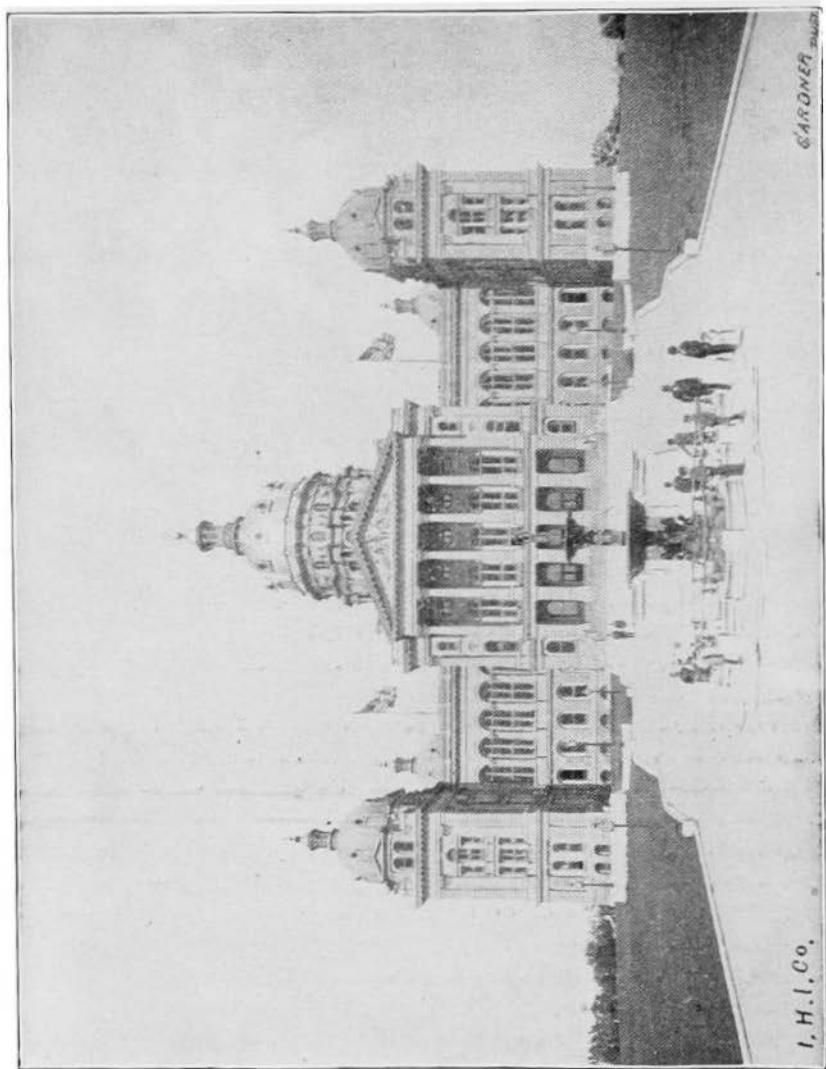
Second.—Plans based on a cost of \$1,500,000.

Third.—Plans based on a cost of \$2,000,000.

The foregoing publication was made by authority of the board in the Daily State Register, Daily Davenport Gazette, Daily Chicago Tribune, Daily New York Tribune and the Philadelphia Press.

The board ordered that the time for the reception of such plans and specifications by the governor be limited to September 1, 1869. About fourteen plans of the styles designated were submitted, "three of which were adopted by the board," and the drawings and specifications were presented to the Thirteenth General Assembly for its consideration. The plans thus adopted were presented by W. W. Boyington, of Chicago, and J. C. Farrand, of Des Moines, based on the estimated cost of \$2,000,000, \$1,500,000 and \$1,000,000, the two first being drawn by Mr. Boyington and the latter by Mr. Farrand.

An act entitled "an act to provide for a state capitol" was then passed by the general assembly and approved April 13, 1870. It became a law by publication in the Daily Iowa State Register and the Des Moines Daily Bulletin April 15, 1870. Under its provi-



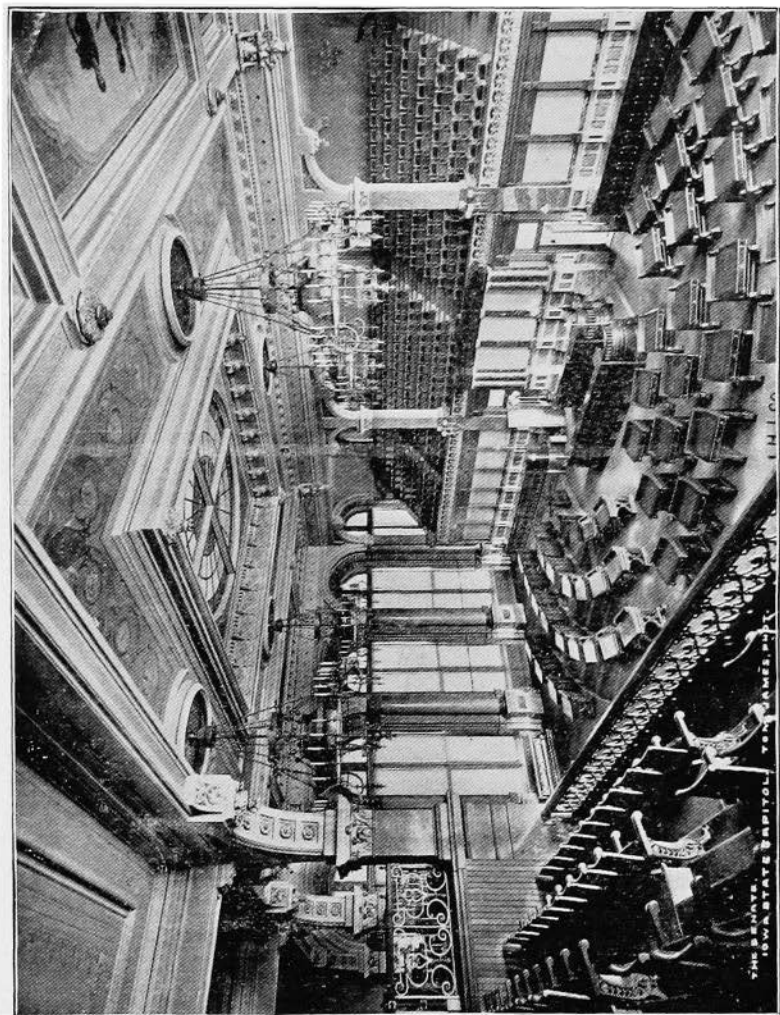
CAPITOL BUILDING.

sions a board of commissioners was established consisting of the governor, who was president *ex-officio* thereof, and six other members to be chosen by the senate and house of representatives in joint convention. In addition thereto two commissioners for the state at large were named in the bill, Gen. G. M. Dodge and Hon. James F. Wilson. They were to continue in office for two years and until their successors were elected and qualified. They were to carry out the provisions of the foregoing act, and each member, excepting the governor, was to receive as compensation for actual services performed \$5 per day and traveling expenses.

In joint convention on Wednesday, the 13th day of April, 1870, the Thirteenth General Assembly elected the following named gentlemen as members of said board of commissioners: James Dawson of Washington county, Simon G. Stein of Muscatine, James O. Crosby of Clayton, Charles Dudley of Wapello, Col. J. N. Dewey of Des Moines, and William L. Joy of Sioux City. They met in the senate chamber at Des Moines and organized as a board on the 25th day of May, 1870, elected A. R. Fulton secretary *pro tem* and entered upon the discharge of their duties as such commissioners.

The board was authorized to employ an architect to assist in determining "upon one of the plans for a capitol selected by the census board" "or some modification thereof" the cost of which was not to exceed the sum of \$1,500,000, and to proceed with the work of construction in the manner provided by law. Accordingly Edward Clark of Washington, D. C., architect of the United States capitol, was employed in August, 1870, to act in the foregoing capacity. The board submitted to him the three plans adopted by the census board, together with one prepared by Messrs. Cochrane & Piquenard of Chicago, Ill., with instructions "to suggest such modifications and make such revision of estimates as they should deem best, in order to fully determine that the expenditure under the plan which might be adopted, should not exceed \$1,500,000."

Mr. Clark made his report thereon December 19, 1871, and so far as it related to the exterior, was based upon the design prepared by Messrs. Cochrane & Piquenard and which, with some of the modifications suggested by Mr. Clark, was the one finally adopted.

SENATE CHAMBER.

On the 21st day of October, 1870, Messrs. Cochrane & Piquenard were appointed by the board general architects and superintendents of the work at a salary of \$3,600 per annum.

Mr. Fulton, having been elected secretary, received a salary of \$50 per month. from May 25, 1870. Afterwards, his whole time being occupied with the duties of the office, his salary was increased to \$100 per month, from June 25, 1871.

James Appleyard, of Detroit, Mich., was appointed local superintendent, and his salary fixed at \$3,500 per annum, payable monthly.

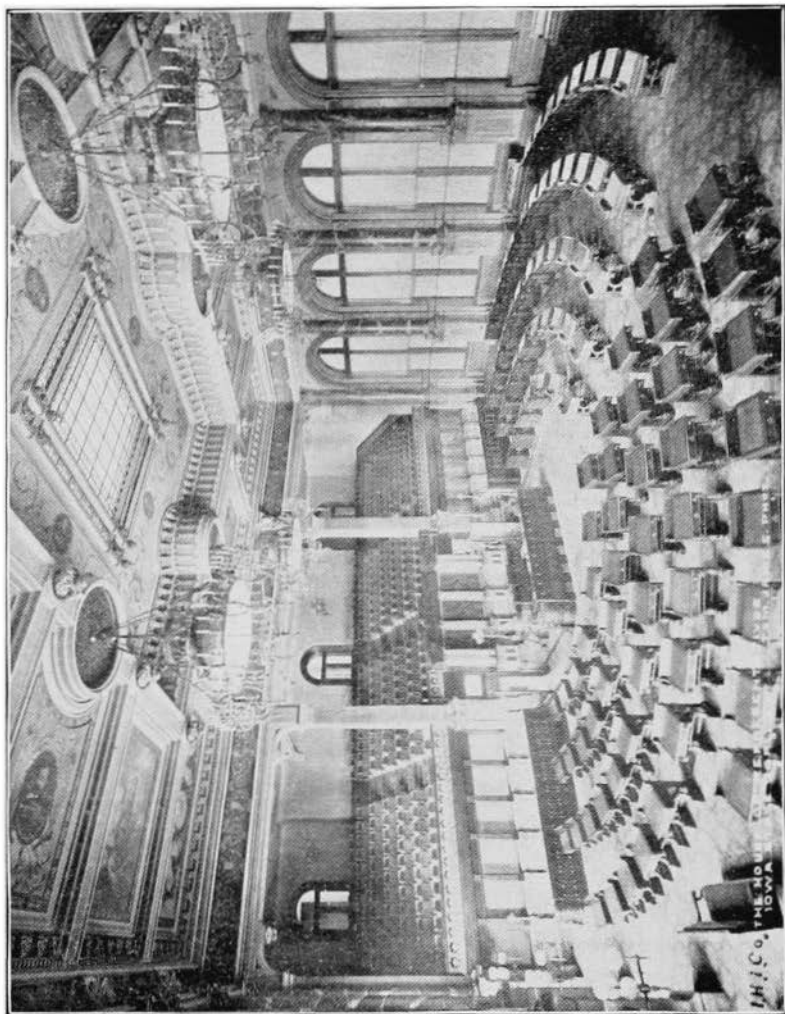
The board began the construction of the capitol in June, 1871, and under its supervision most of the excavating was done and more than half of the foundation walls were built. The laying of the corner stone took place with imposing ceremonies on the 23d day of November, 1871. The following distinguished gentlemen delivered addresses commemorative of the occasion: Hon. James F. Wilson, Hon. Samuel Merrill, governor of Iowa. and Hon. John A. Kasson. A poem was read by the Hon. J. B. Grinnell.

The corner stone was cut from granite obtained in Buchanan county, Iowa, and presented for that purpose by David Armstrong, of the same county. Its dimensions are 7x3x3 feet.

The board of commissioners was reorganized by an act of the Fourteenth General Assembly, approved April 10, 1872, which amended the former act and established a board of commissioners, consisting of the governor, who was to be *ex-officio* president of the board, John G. Foote of Des Moines county, Maturin L. Fisher of Clayton county, R. S. Finkbine and Peter A. Dey of Johnson county.

This board was charged with the execution of the provisions of law having reference to the erection of the capitol. It was specially made the duty of the board to remove any part of the original foundation which in its judgment "did not conform to a proper standard of material and workmanship." The commissioners decided that the stone which composed the foundation was "unsafe for the foundation of a massive structure designed to endure a thousand years." The whole cost of taking down the wall and rebuilding it with good material was \$52,353.76.

The first meeting of the new board was held on the 17th day of April, 1872. Mr. Fulton, secretary to the old board, was continued

in office till February 1, 1873. When he resigned, Ed Wright was elected to succeed him.

Mr. Appleyard was discharged as local superintendent in December, 1871. It was therefore necessary for the board to select a superintendent to succeed Mr. Appleyard. Mr. Robert S. Finkbine acted in that capacity, as chairman of an executive committee, during the year 1872.

At the extra session of the legislature in 1873, a joint resolution authorizing the board to appoint one of its own members local superintendent or overseer was passed, and immediately thereafter the board unanimously elected Mr. Finkbine to that office at a salary of \$3,000 per annum, which included his compensation and traveling expenses as commissioner.

Mr. John G. Foote was appointed superintendent of finance.

On the 3d of September, 1872, Mr. John C. Cochrane resigned his position as one of the architects and Mr. A. H. Piquenard was appointed sole architect.

Mr. Piquenard died at his home in Springfield, Ill., on the 19th day of November, 1876. One of his colleagues, Mr. Hackney, paid him the following tribute: "What loss the state and the world of art sustained in his death cannot be estimated. He was a man scholarly in his attainments, grand in his conceptions and abounding in expedients, standing at the first rank in his profession."

On the last day of January, 1877, Messrs. Bell & Hackney, who had been assisting Mr. Piquenard, were elected to succeed him. The work was completed under their supervision. Mr. Bell resigned his position on the 18th day of December, 1883, to accept the appointment of supervising architect of the treasury department at Washington. Mr. Hackney had sole charge of the work from that time.

On the 5th day of February, 1879, Maturin L. Fisher, a member of the board, died at his residence in Clayton county. He was a prominent and useful man in the public affairs of the state for many years. Cyrus Foreman, of Osage, was appointed by the governor to succeed him. He qualified as such commissioner on the 27th day of March, 1879. This was the only change in the membership of the board since its organization, save the different governors who were *ex-officio* presidents thereof.

The stone for the foundation was furnished by Messrs. Tuttle &

Robertson, of Des Moines, from the Madison County quarries near Winterset. The stone for the basement story is from the old Capitol quarry in Johnson county, in the vicinity of Iowa City.

The Ste. Genevieve Sand, Stone and Granite company and J. A. Gaines & Company, of Carroll county, Mo., furnished the stone for that part of the building above the basement.

The outside steps and platforms are the "Forest City" stone, from near Cleveland, Ohio. The rails are the Sauk Rapids granite.

The pilasters and piers in the interior of basement are from Anamosa, in this state, and Lemont, Ill.

All the columns, piers and pilasters in the corridors of the first story are from Lemont, Ill.

The red granite columns in the second story are from Iron Mountain, Mo. The dark colored granite in base and cap of pedestals is from Sauk Rapids, Minn., while the carved capitals, pilasters and piers are of Lemont stone.

STATUARY.

Beginning with north of library door: History, Science, Law, Fame, Literature, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth, and Progress.

The first door to the left as you enter the senate chamber is the entrance to the stairway leading to the dome.

All the rooms on third floor are committee rooms, of which there are twenty-nine in number.

The dome is covered with a gold leaf, at a cost of \$3,500.

The pictures on the ceiling of the supreme court room are of the type of the Greek Mythology.

No. 1. North end, the leading figure, Justice on her throne. To her left stands Columbia, ever ready to sustain her decisions by word or deed. The figure to the right of Justice rejoices that the decision is in her favor. The sitting figure on the right denotes sorrow as the decision is rendered against her, but is content when she finds by examining the law that the decision is according to law. To the left is a mother explaining to her son the laws

No. 2. Columbia reigning on her throne. Above the globe, in unity with the Goddess of Justice, the patrons of the state come to pay them their homage, bringing with them little children,

which represent the territories. Iowa, who is a special favorite in Columbia's household, is seen sitting on the steps of the throne with club and coat of arms, ever ready to defend her friend (the Union), Columbia, in case of need. In front of the throne is chiseled in everlasting rock the memorial date 1776, the foundation of the republic. The American eagle is proudly soaring over all, holding in his talons the historical emblem and in his beak a streamer on which is inscribed, "E Pluribus Unum."

No. 3. Justice and Peace represented as ruling over the land, bringing prosperity and plenty, culture and happiness; while on the other, rebellion is restrained and smitten down by Justice's strong arm (General Grant).

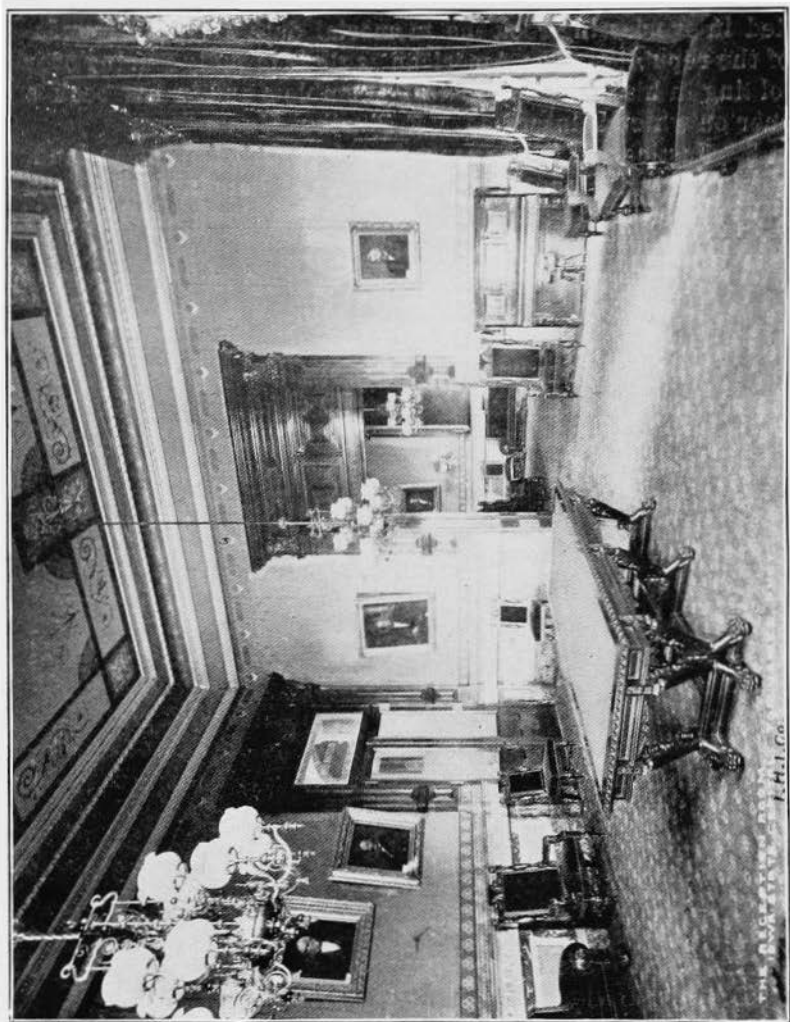
No. 4. Represents Ceres, the Goddess of Agriculture.

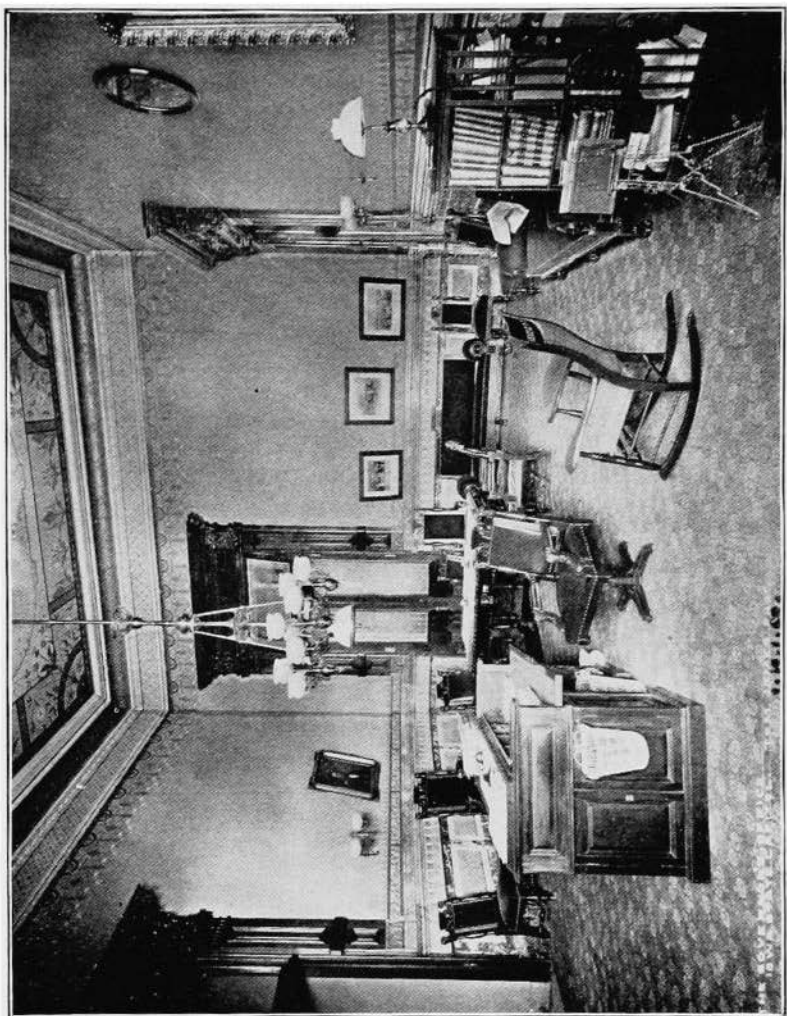

Correspondence relating to practice of medicine should not be sent to the State Board of Health.

Under an act of the legislature, every person practicing medicine in the state is required to procure a certificate from this board. Two classes of certificates are issued: A. to graduates of legally recognized medical colleges; B, to those who have passed a satisfactory examination before the board. Examinations are given by this board on the first Tuesday of February, May, August and November, at the office of the secretary, Capitol building.

Members of the board are appointed for a term of three years, one member each year. Every person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must first be examined by said board and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also his residence, together with the date of issuing certificate.

Fee for examination and certificate, \$5.

The following law relates to itinerent vendor's license:

SEC. 2594. Itinerent vendors of drugs. Any itinerant vendor of any drug, nostrum, ointment, or appliance of any kind for the treatment of any disease or injury, and all those who by any method publicly profess to treat or cure diseases, injury, or deformity, shall pay to the treasurer of the commission of pharmacy an annual fee of one hundred dollars, upon the receipt of which the secretary of the commission shall issue a license for one year from its date. Two thousand dollars annually of the money arising from the license fund, or so much as may be needed, shall be devoted to defraying the expenses of the commission, and any balance remaining shall be paid into the state treasury. Said commission shall, on the first day of January of each year, make a verified and itemized statement in writing to the auditor of state, of all receipts and expenditures of money coming into their hands by virtue of their office. Any violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor, and any person shall, upon conviction thereof, pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars. In actions or prosecutions under this chapter, it need not be proven that the defendant has not a license, but such fact shall be a matter of defense.

Two members of the board, one of whom shall be a woman, are appointed by the Governor for terms of four years, and are not eligible for re-appointment.

The board holds annually at least two public examinations of teachers, and a full record of their proceedings, as well as a complete register of all persons to whom certificates and diplomas are issued, is kept by the board.

The new code makes provision for a certificate to primary teachers of acknowledged ability and of successful experience.

Persons holding a certificate from the board are authorized, for a term of five years, to teach in any public school of the state.

Fee for state certificate, \$3, and for state diploma, \$5; fees when collected to be paid into the state treasury. If, however, an applicant shall fail in the examination, one-half of the fee is returned.

As now organized this department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical data relating to our own state and the vast territory of which it originally formed a part. So far as literature is concerned, special efforts are being made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time — works of state and general western and national history — works on the slavery question and the war for the Union — histories of all our wars from the earliest times — reports upon the census of both state and nation — works relating to the North American Indians — county histories, directories of cities and towns, earlier and later maps, Iowa pamphlets — biographies of our notable men and women, printed or in manuscript — written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements — reports, catalogues, circulars and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state — in short, every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

The department publishes THE ANNALS OF IOWA, a quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages, which will enter upon its sixth year with the number for April, 1898. This is made up of original contributions in history and biography. By direction of the trustees it is sent to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

A considerable collection of museum materials, military relics and mementoes, specimens in archeology, geology, mineralogy and natural history, has been made and placed on exhibition.

The department has secured twenty-nine fine oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, most of which have been placed in other rooms of the capitol. As works of art many of these rank very high. Several more are promised in the near future.

The historical department is supported by a permanent appropriation of \$6,000 per annum.

The government of the university is committed to the charge of a board of regents, consisting of the governor of the state, and

the superintendent of public instruction, *ex-officio*, and one member from each congressional district, who are elected by the general assembly to serve six years.

The collegiate department embraces four courses of study: Classical, philosophical, scientific and engineering. Four years are required to graduate in either one of these courses, and on completion the appropriate Bachelor's degree is granted.

In the law department the course of study extends through two years, and on completion thereof the graduate is given the degree of LL. B., and admitted to practice before the state and United States courts.

The medical department and the homeopathic medical department require the student to pursue his studies during a four years' course of six months each, and on completion of such course the degree M. D. is granted.

The dental department requires three years of nine months each, to complete the course and obtain the degree D. D. S.

The course in pharmacy extends through two years of six months each, and the degree Ph. G. is granted on its completion.

The Iowa Experiment Station was established in accordance with an act of congress, approved March 2, 1887, for the purpose of aiding "in acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects connected with agriculture, and to promote scientific investigation and experiments respecting the principles and applications of agricultural science," under direction of the land grant colleges in each state and territory established by the act of 1862 creating such colleges. This act appropriated to each state and territory, for the purpose of agricultural investigation, the sum of \$15,000 annually, and the experiment stations were thus established as a department of the

land grant colleges. They are subject to the regulations of the United States department of agriculture, and are regularly inspected by officers of that department. The results of these investigations and experiments in agriculture, including live stock and all related branches, are published in bulletins issued by the experiment stations quarterly or oftener, and distributed free to all residents of the respective states who apply for them. The work of the Iowa Experiment Station along these lines has proven extremely popular, and met with favor in all parts of the state and nation, and many foreign countries as well. The report of some of its experiments have been republished entire by foreign governments, and the demand for bulletins is so large that applicants outside of the state can no longer be supplied. These bulletins are free to farmers and citizens of Iowa.

Persons who have property or means for their support, or who draw a pension sufficient therefor, will not be admitted to the home; and if, after admission, an inmate of the home shall receive a pension, or other means sufficient for his support, or shall recover his health so as to enable him to support himself, he will be discharged from the home.

There is in connection with this institution a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the board to have the course of instruction of the highest standard. A kindergarten is operated in connection for the very young pupils.

The average number in the home the past year was 487, average age 10½ years. The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is 16 years for girls and 15 years for boys. Less than 20 per cent remain to the age limit. During the past two years 232 have been placed in private homes either with their friends or others.

A library of well-selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity the pastimes and pleasures of the children are otherwise somewhat circumscribed; we feel that they should be well supplied with good books and reading matter of suitable character for their improvement and enjoyment.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take good care of the same. Their clothing is all manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food, and a reasonable amount of luxuries, and when the funds of the different appropriations fail the support fund has to make up the deficiency, which necessarily causes a reduction of the luxuries from the table that are so much enjoyed by the children.

The school term begins on the first Wednesday in September and ends about the third week in June. It is desirable that the students enter at the first and remain until the close. They may, however, be admitted at any time, and they are at liberty to go home whenever their parents send for them.

The department of music is supplied with twenty-three pianos, one pipe organ, several cabinet organs and a sufficient number of violins, guitars, bass viols and brass instruments. Every student capable of receiving it is given a complete course in this branch.

In the industrial department the girls are required to learn knitting, crocheting, fancy work, hand and machine sewing; the boys, netting, mattress making and cane seating. Those of either sex, who so desire, may learn carpet weaving.

These advantages are free to every person, either blind or of defective vision, and of suitable school age and capacity, in the

state. All that the friends are expected to do is to pay the traveling expenses and furnish clothing. If they are unable to clothe the pupil, the necessary clothing will be furnished here and the bill sent to the county from which the pupil comes.

The Industrial Home for the Blind was established by an act of the Twenty-third General Assembly. Under the provision of this act the governor appointed a board of commissioners to select a location and superintend the construction of the buildings. Knoxville, Marion county, was selected as the site for the home, and by January, 1, 1892, it was open for the admission of inmates.

The object of the institution is for the instruction of the adult blind of the state in some suitable trade or vocation and to furnish a working home for such blind as have learned a trade or vocation and desire to remain or be employed therein. It is open to every

such blind person who has a legal residence in the state and is physically and mentally able to perform such labor as may be required in the trade or vocation carried on therein; each inmate being subject to such reasonable rules and regulations as may be adopted by the board of trustees for the government of the same. Broom making is the principal industry. Hammocks and nets are also made. All assignments of duty and allotment of work are made upon a basis of adaptation. Each works at that for which he is specially fitted, and is paid what he earns - a regular schedule of wages being paid for all labor done by the inmates.

August 29, 1896, the main or administrative building was destroyed by fire, caused by lightning. The executive council, under provision 120 of the code, made provisions for the immediate enclosure of a part of this building for temporary use, by appropriating for that purpose \$40,000. The Twenty-sixth General Assembly, in extra session, appropriated a further sum of \$72,900 to complete the reconstruction of this building. Work has steadily progressed and the building is almost ready for occupancy.

The purposes or objects of the institution are to provide special methods of training for that class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly self supporting as practicable, and to approach as near as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

PLATFORM ADOPTED.

The republicans of Iowa, met in convention, are enthusiastic in the recollection of a great victory recently won and confident in the belief that a still larger majority awaits them at the close of

the contest now opened. They review with the utmost satisfaction the campaign of last year, and congratulate not only the republicans but all the people upon the triumphant election of William McKinley president of the United States, and highly commend his wisdom and energy in directing the whole force of the administration toward the early and complete fulfillment of all the pledges of the party at St. Louis. They applaud the acts of congress in so quickly reforming the tariff from a menace against the interests of this country into adequate protection for the men and women of the United States, and with gratification they refer to the efforts of the senators and representatives from Iowa so influential in the prompt passage of this measure. Under these auspicious conditions this convention declares the following principles upon which it asks the confidence and seeks the suffrages of the voters of Iowa:

It reaffirms and adopts in every part the declaration of principles announced by the republican national convention of 1896, and it pledges for Iowa that the election in November next shall be a still more emphatic evidence of the strength and justice of republican doctrines.

It again especially declares for protection and honest money.

It demands a most rigid economy consistent with public welfare in all government, state, and municipal affairs, to the end that the burdens of the taxpayer may be lessened. It demands a system of taxation that will justly distribute among the taxpayers the amount necessary for public expenditures, and it insists that all individuals and corporations in whatever business they may be engaged shall be so taxed that they shall not escape their fair and proportionate share of the burdens. It recognizes and insists upon the broad and fundamental principles that government among men is instituted to insure a fair and equal opportunity to every human being in the struggle of life, and that to afford such opportunity selfishness must be rebuked, avariciousness held in check, and power of combinations restrained. And the republican party invokes its birth and history as a guarantee of its pledge that it exists only to do justice among men, to add dignity and comfort to the lives of the poor and to make equality of opportunities not an abstraction but a living reality.

We point with satisfaction and pride to the long record of wise and economical administration of state affairs by the republican party: to the benevolent institutions established and splendid

edifices erected and paid for, on a rate of taxation uniformly below that of our sister states.

We commend the general assembly for its earnest and thorough efforts to reduce the expenses of government to the lowest practicable point.

We indorse the capable and faithful administration of Governor Drake, and trust that he may early find complete restoration to health, and enjoy a long life in the state to which he has served with such honorable distinction upon the field of battle and in high official positions.

We congratulate the farmers of the United States in the selection of James Wilson, secretary of agriculture. His eminent fitness for the honorable place he holds and his earnest zeal for the development of agriculture combine to make him not only the pride of the state, but of the nation.

We believe in the justice of those laws heretofore enacted by republican legislatures securing to employes of railways the right to indemnity for personal injuries resulting from negligence, and we favor such legislation as may be found necessary to perfect such right and prevent its impairment or nullification in letter or spirit.

THE PLATFORM.

The democracy of Iowa in convention assembled send greeting to the nearly 7,000,000 patriots who participated and aided in the battle of the people in their struggle for their rights in the last campaign, by giving renewed expression of devotion to the principles of the democracy of the nation as set forth in the platform adopted by the democratic party at Chicago in 1896. We lay special

emphasis upon that portion of the national platform of the democratic party on the financial question, believing that the very existence of the farming, laboring, and commercial interests of this country depends upon a change of our financial policy, and we enter into the first campaign after the great battle of the people against the combined corporate and money power, in which that peerless statesman and patriot, W. J. Bryan, was our leader, with the reassertion "that we demand the free and unlimited coinage of both gold and silver at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation."

We declare that the methods resorted to by the leaders of the republican party in the late national campaign have justly alarmed the entire country. Their flagrant acts of bribery, intimidation, colonization and deception, overawed, and were intended to overawe, the electorate, and thus prevented a free and an honest expression of public opinion. We affirm this to be a direct attack upon popular government and a declaration of war against free institutions. If submitted to without rebuke the presidential office will be permanently under the domination of money and of the corrupt influences which money controls.

The purpose of these high-handed and criminal methods is evident from the results following their success, the trusts, the combines, the syndicates, the corporations, all united to make the government an agency for the promotion of their special interests and welfare. They contributed millions upon millions to Mark Hanna's campaign fund, and having triumphed by the corrupt use of these vast sums they are about to recoup themselves from the pockets of the people. The notorious, almost avowed, purpose of the tariff bill now under consideration in the senate is to repay the trusts, and the mine, the mill, and the factory barons for their pecuniary aid to McKinley; the railroads are to be compensated by a pooling law; and it is on the program, as announced by Secretary Gage, to requite the banking corporations by retiring the greenbacks and Sherman treasury notes, and increasing the interest bearing debt five hundred million dollars for their exclusive benefit. The prosperity which was promised was prosperity to these special interests, and not to the people at large. The people have not realized it, and while legislation is for the classes instead of the masses, they never will. It is to further the ends of those who do not produce, but absorb, wealth and legislation in whose

behalf is rapidly segregating society into the very few rich and the very many poor, that Speaker Reed arbitrarily refuses to permit the national house of representatives to legislate, and denies to the American people the representation in the government to which they are entitled by the fundamental law.

We point to the fact that the claims of the democratic party in the last campaign have proven true, and that the claims made by the republican party have proven false, and not one of the pledges made by that party has been fulfilled. The citizen was urged to vote for McKinley and prosperity; confidence was to be restored; the mills were to open up; unemployed men would find work; the farmer would find a profitable market for his products. All these and more were promised to take place as soon as it should be known that McKinley was elected. Months have passed since that event, and instead of the fulfillment of these promises, prosperity has not made its appearance; the mills and shops are closing down; the army of unemployed is growing larger, and the farmers of Iowa since his election are marketing their products at a less price than ever before.

We demand that the statute in operation in Iowa for more than a generation, holding railroad corporations to a strict accountability for negligent injury to their employes, shall be restored, by proper amendment, to its original scope and intent. We hold that the clause of said law, which provides that "no contract which restricts such liability shall be legal and binding," is eminently fair and just; that contracts in contravention of the spirit of this provision are against public policy and should be void; and we demand that the protection to life and limb, embodied in this provision, shall be fully restored, in order that corporations engaged in the operation of railways shall not be allowed by insurance contracts or otherwise to escape liability for their acts of negligence, or shift this just responsibility upon the shoulders of their employes. We hold that any other rule is an inducement to negligence and sets a premium on wrong-doing.

We reaffirm the position of the democratic party in this state in demanding that our state institutions be governed by a non-partisan board of control, which can intelligently comprehend their relative wants and economically and justly apportion among the whole that which their just needs demand, thus doing away with the expensive and disgraceful scramble for appropriations

and contests for preferment carried on by the officials of the several institutions before each legislature.

We denounce the scandalous looting of the state treasury recently brought to light, whereby an army of unnecessary and over-paid employes have been saddled upon the state, and other extravagances whereby the rate of taxation has been greatly increased. A public debt of nearly \$1,000,000 has been incurred, while the ability of the people to pay taxes has been diminished.

We denounce the republican party in Iowa for resorting to the last refuge of the enemy of popular government, in passing the anti-fusion act, denying the right of the majority to rule.

We denounce the republican party of Iowa for enacting and maintaining a law that permits the state printer and state binder to charge extortionate fees for work done, thus robbing the people through unjust taxation.

We demand that no state officer, whose duty it is to pass upon questions pertaining to the insurance, building and loan, banking or other corporate business, shall hold any official position or own any stock in any such corporation.

We favor such legislation as will relieve the people of Iowa from the extortions practiced by school book monopolies.

We point to the defeat of a measure to reform the taxation laws applying to public corporations, in such manner as to place upon them a fair proportion of the public burdens; we call attention to the fact that the execution of the present inadequate taxation laws by republican officials has tended constantly toward minimizing the proportion of the public burden borne by these interests, while the taxes of the rest of the people have constantly increased. We demand the passage by the next general assembly of laws to equalize these burdens by bringing under the purview of the tax gatherers intangible as well as tangible values.

We go before the people of this state with the conviction that the interests of the whole people demand a change in the policy and management of our state affairs, and we invite the co-operation of every patriotic citizen so believing.

STATE PLATFORM.

Resolved, That we, the peoples party of the state of Iowa, in convention assembled at Des Moines, this 19th day of August, 1897, hereby reaffirm and readopt the platforms of the peoples party, adopted at Omaha and St. Louis.

2. We declare that through direct legislation, as embodied in the principles of the initiative and referendum, the people will find relief from wicked laws which now distress them, and until they can so vote directly trusts and monopolies will continue to unduly influence our legislatures and courts.

3. To provide a sufficient amount of sound and flexible circulating medium whenever and wherever needed; to give immediate relief to the unemployed, thereby saving them from the evil results of idleness, want, starvation and beggary; and at the same time relieve the people from the annoyance of the tramp nuisance and the increased burdens of taxation caused by the court and state expenses resulting from filling all our state wards with these unfortunate victims of an unjust economic system, and to provide all political corporations such as states, counties, towns, townships, etc., with money needed for public improvements without interest, we demand the adoption of the non-interest bond plan which provides for the employment of the idle on public improvements, the laborer to be paid with money issued by the government to the above named political corporations to the extent of 10 per cent of their assessed value, the principal to be paid back to the government without interest at 4 per cent per year, said money to be receivable by the government at par and by law made a full legal tender for all debts both public and private.

4. *Resolved*, That we heartily indorse the Temple amendment, presented to the last legislature and by it rejected, but in this connection would most earnestly recommend to all railroad employes the general reform in railway management embodied in our platform; and also to contrast the character of their service, the hours employed, and pay received, with a similar service rendered in the postal system of the United States, on which basis we desire the railway management to be placed.

5. We demand the reduction of freight, passenger and express rates and all salaries of public officers to correspond to the present gold standard prices of the products of labor.

6. We demand the deduction of mortgage indebtedness from assessed valuations.

7. We condemn that system of judicial procedure which allows the creditor a personal judgment over against a debtor where the mortgage security fails to satisfy the judgment in foreclosure cases.

THE PLATFORM.

The national democrats of the state of Iowa, in convention assembled, declare:

First.—The doctrines of paternalism, class legislation, and debased coinage, to which each of the three contracting parties making up the free silver, populistic, triple alliance in this state, have recently pledged themselves in their several platforms, are as abhorrent to every true democrat when advocated by populists under the name of democracy, as when taught by republicans. Democracy is a necessary foe of each and we repudiate them as unworthy of the support of every true democrat.

Second.—We hereby renew our fealty to the cardinal principles of democracy, which were first enunciated by Jefferson in the dawn of the century, and which have been advocated by its great leaders from that time down to 1896, and under which it has achieved all its great victories.

The largest freedom of the individual consistent with good government, and opposition to paternalism and to all class legislation.

Equal rights to all; special privileges to none.

The support of the federal government in all its departments in its full constitutional vigor, and the preservation of the states in all their rights.

A strict construction of the constitution in the interpretation of laws, but a faithful obedience to all laws when once construed by the courts.

That taxation in all forms should be for public purposes only and not for private gain, and should be limited to the actual necessities of the government when economically administered.

The honest payment of our debts, the sacred preservation of the national honor, and a sound and stable currency.

Retrenchment and rigid economy in the public expenditures.

Third.—We heartily indorse the platform adopted by the national democratic party at Indianapolis in 1896, which states at length the foregoing fundamental principles of government.

Fourth.—We denounce the Dingley tariff bill soon to be enacted into law by a republican congress. Under the pretense of increasing the revenue it is the old republican policy of protection to the few at the expense of the many. It tends to create and foster trusts and monopolies, and we recognize in it the fulfillment of promised reward to those who supplied the party treasury. We renew our allegiance to the historic democratic doctrine of a tariff for revenue only.

Fifth.—We insist upon the continued reform in the civil service, national, state and municipal, until the spoils system is overthrown.

Sixth.—We favor a dignified, intelligent and firm foreign policy. Power and progress to the American people is involved in honorable peace with all the world. Jingoism destroys commerce, begets unrest, and encourages needless taxation in preparation for war.

Seventh.—Combinations, trusts, and monopolies, in conflict with individual rights and hostile to the development of individual and natural resources, should be suppressed.

Eighth.—We demand retrenchment and rigid economy in the administration of affairs, not only in the nation but in the state, and denounce the reckless expenditure of taxes which has resulted in a heavy debt and increased taxation to the people of our state.

Ninth.—We condemn the prohibitory and mulct legislation in this state which makes the sale of intoxicating liquors a crime, but condones the offense for money, and which discriminates against the will of the majority in certain localities, and we demand the enactment in their stead of a judicious law regulating the sale of such liquors which combines license with local option, and also the enactment of a just and proper law for the manufacture of the same.

Tenth.—We renew our demand of former years for the placing of our state institutions under a board of general control instead of the present system of management by separate boards of trustees.

Eleventh.—Our judiciary should be independent of politics, and we condemn the attempt of the Chicago convention to make it a tool of political parties to register the decree of the caucus. The judiciary will be most fearless and independent when most non-partisan, and we therefore request the state central committee to confer with the committees of other parties and with the state bar association in order to devise some non-partisan method of selection and election of our judges, and to report at our next convention.

Twelfth.—The honesty, economy, courage, fidelity, and wisdom of the administration of Grover Cleveland command not only our approval but our unqualified admiration.

State convention of the prohibition party was held at Des Moines, July 27-28, 1897.

PLATFORM.

PREAMBLE. The prohibition party of Iowa in convention assembled at the city of Des Moines, July 27-28, 1897, acknowledging Almighty God as the rightful sovereign of all men and the Lord Jesus Christ as the ruler among the nations of the earth, and to whose laws all human enactments must conform to secure the blessings of peace and prosperity, presents the following declarations of principles:

First.—We declare our sympathies, as a party of reform, to be in favor of whatever tends to make men intelligent and virtuous. We assert our purpose to be identical with that of the national constitution to establish justice, to insure domestic tranquillity, to promote the general welfare and to secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity.

Second.—We reaffirm that the liquor traffic is a foe to civilization and to popular government; that it promotes poverty and crime; that it thwarts the will of the people and destroys our homes, and we declare anew for the entire suppression of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, and that the full power of the government should be asserted to gain this result.

Third.—We declare that the so-called regulation by license, mulct or taxation whereby a revenue is derived from this traffic, is contrary to good government, is complicity with the liquor crime and corrupting the public conscience.

Therefore, we demand the repeal of the mulct and the manufacturing laws and that a prohibitory constitutional amendment should be submitted to a direct vote of the people.

Fourth.—Experience teaches us that any political party not openly opposing this traffic will court the favor of the liquor interests, and will shape legislation to secure or retain its support.

We therefore declare for prohibition with a prohibition party back of it.

Fifth.—We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast a free and unrestricted ballot at all public elections and that such ballots shall be returned as cast, and that this sovereign right shall be denied to no citizen on account of sex.

Sixth.—We demand the protection of all persons in the right to one day of rest in seven, without oppressing those who conscientiously observe any other than the first day of the week.

PLATFORM.

The republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in national convention, appealing for the popular and historical justification of their claims to the matchless achievements of thirty years of republican rule, earnestly and confidently address themselves to the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

Effects of Democratic Control.—For the first time since the civil war the American people have witnessed the calamitous consequences of full and unrestricted democratic control of the government. It has been a record of unparalleled incapacity, dishonor and disaster. In administrative management it has ruthlessly sacrificed indispensable revenue, entailed an unceasing deficit, eked out ordinary current expenses with borrowed money, piled up the public debt by \$262,000,000 in time of peace, forced an adverse balance of trade, kept a perpetual menace hanging over the redemption fund, pawned American credit to alien syndicates, and reversed all the measures and results of successful republican rule. In the broad effect of its policy it has precipitated panic, blighted industry and trade with prolonged depression, closed factories, reduced work and wages, halted enterprise and crippled American production while stimulating foreign production for the American market.

Administration of President Harrison.—Every consideration of public safety and individual interest demands that the government shall be rescued from the hands of those who have shown themselves incapable to conduct it without disaster at home and dishonor abroad, and shall be restored to the party which for thirty years administered it with unequalled success and prosperity, and in this connection we heartily indorse the wisdom, the patriotism, and the success of the administration of President Harrison.

Protection.—We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity. This true American policy taxes foreign products and encourages home industry; it puts the burden of revenue on foreign goods; it secures the American market for the American producer; it upholds the American standard of wages for the

American workingman; it puts the factory by the side of the farm, and makes the American farmer less dependent on foreign demand and price; it diffuses general thrift, and founds the strength of all on the strength of each. In its reasonable application it is just, fair and impartial, equally opposed to foreign control and domestic monopoly, to sectional discrimination and individual favoritism.

The Wilson Law.—We denounce the present democratic tariff as sectional, injurious to the public credit, and destructive to business enterprise. We demand such an equitable tariff on foreign imports which come into competition with American products as will not only furnish adequate revenue for the necessary expenses of the government, but will protect American labor from degradation to the wage level of other lands.

We are not pledged to any particular schedules. The question of rates is a practical question, to be governed by the conditions of the time and of production; the ruling and uncompromising principle is the protection and development of American labor and industry. The country demands a right settlement and then it wants rest.

Reciprocity.—We believe the repeal of the reciprocity arrangements negotiated by the last republican administration was a national calamity, and we demand their renewal and extension on such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries, and secure enlarged markets for the products of our farms, forests and factories.

Protection and reciprocity are twin measures of republican policy, and go hand in hand. Democratic rule has recklessly struck down both, and both must be re-established. Protection for what we produce; free admission for the necessities of life which we do not produce; reciprocal agreements of mutual interests which gain open markets for us in return for our open market to others. Protection builds up domestic industry and trade, and secures our own market for ourselves; reciprocity builds up foreign trade and finds an outlet for our surplus.

Production of Sugar.—We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar which the American

people use, and for which they pay other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

Wool and Woolens. To all our products—to those of the mine and the field as well as to those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, to wool, the product of the great industry of sheep husbandry, as well as to the finished woolens of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

Merchant Marine.—We favor restoring the early American policy of discriminating duties for the upbuilding of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping in the foreign-carrying trade, so that American ships—the product of American labor, employed in American shipyards, sailing under the stars and stripes, and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may regain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

National Currency and Credit.—The republican party is unreservedly for sound money. It caused the enactment of the law providing for the resumption of specie payments in 1879; since then every dollar has been as good as gold.

We are unalterably opposed to every measure calculated to debase our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are therefore opposed to the free coinage of silver except by international agreement with the leading commercial nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained the existing gold standard must be preserved.

All our silver and paper currency must be maintained at parity with gold, and we favor all measures designed to maintain inviolably the obligations of the United States and all our money, whether coin or paper, at the present standard, the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth.

Pensions.—The veterans of the Union army deserve, and should receive, fair treatment and generous recognition. Whenever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as are best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril.

We denounce the practice in the pension bureau, so recklessly and unjustly carried on by the present administration, of reducing pensions and arbitrarily dropping names from the rolls, as deserving the severest condemnation of the American people.

Foreign Relations.—Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded.

The Hawaiian islands should be controlled by the United States, and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them.

The Nicaraguan canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States; and by the purchase of the Danish islands we should secure a proper and much-needed naval station in the West Indies.

Armenian Massacres.—The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and just indignation of the American people and we believe that the United States should exercise all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers, and American property destroyed. There and everywhere American citizens and American property must be absolutely protected at all hazards and at any cost.

Monroe Doctrine.—We reassert the Monroe doctrine in its full extent, and we reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for friendly intervention in case of European encroachments. We have not interfered, and shall not interfere, with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not on any pretext be extended.

We hopefully look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere, and to the ultimate union of all the English-speaking part of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants.

Cuba.—From the hour of achieving their own independence, the people of the United States have regarded with sympathy the struggles of other American peoples to free themselves from European domination. We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out to the full success of their determined contest for liberty.

The government of Spain, having lost control of Cuba, and being unable to protect the property or lives of resident American citizens, or to comply with its treaty obligations, we believe that the government of the United States should actively use its influ-

ence and good offices to restore peace and give independence to the island.

The Navy.—The peace and security of the republic, and the maintenance of its rightful influence among the nations of the earth, demand a naval power commensurate with its position and responsibility. We, therefore, favor the continued enlargement of the navy, and a complete system of harbor and sea-coast defenses.

Foreign Immigration.—For the protection of the equality of our American citizenship and of the wages of our workmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced, and so extended as to exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write.

Civil Service.—The civil service law was placed on the statute book by the republican party, which has always sustained it, and we renew our repeated declarations that it shall be thoroughly and honestly enforced and extended wherever practicable.

Free Ballot and Honest Count.—We demand that every citizen of the United States shall be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot, and that such ballot shall be counted and returned as cast.

Lynchings.—We proclaim our unqualified condemnation of the uncivilized and barbarous practice well known as lynching, or killing of human beings, suspected or charged with crime, without process of law.

National Board of Arbitration.—We favor the creation of a national board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employers and employed engaged in inter-state commerce.

Free Homesteads.—We believe in an immediate return to the free homestead policy of the republican party, and urge the passage by congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure which has already passed the house and is now pending in the senate.

Territories.—We favor the admission of the remaining territories at the earliest practical date, having due regard to the interests of the people of the territories and of the United States. All the federal officers appointed for the territories should be elected from *bona fide* residents thereof, and the right of self-government should be accorded as far as practicable.

Alaska.—We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the congress of the United States, to the end that needful legislation may be intelligently enacted.

Temperance.—We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

Rights of Women.—The republican party is mindful of the rights and interests of women. Protection of American industries include equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work, and protection to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and welcome their co-operation in rescuing the country from democratic and populistic mismanagement and misrule.

Conclusion.—Such are the principles and policies of the republican party. By these principles we will abide and these policies we will put into execution. We ask for them the considerate judgment of the American people. Confident alike in the history of our great party and in the justice of our cause, we present our platform and our candidates in the full assurance that the election will bring victory to the republican party and prosperity to the people of the United States.

PLATFORM.

We, the democrats of the United States in national convention assembled, do reaffirm our allegiance to those great essential principles of justice and liberty upon which our institutions are founded and which the democratic party has advocated from Jefferson's time to our own—freedom of speech, freedom of press, freedom of conscience, the preservation of personal rights, the equality of all citizens before the law and the faithful observance of constitutional limitations.

State Rights.—During all these years the democratic party has resisted the tendency of selfish interest toward the centralization of governmental power and steadfastly maintained the integrity of the dual scheme of government established by the founders of this Republic of republics. Under its guidance and teachings the great principle of local self-government has found its best expression in the maintenance of the rights of the states and in its assertion of the necessity of confining the general government to the exercise of powers granted by the constitution of the United States.

Civil and Religious Liberty.—The constitution of the United States guarantees to every citizen the rights of civil and religious liberty. The democratic party has always been the exponent of political liberty and religious freedom and it renews its obligations and reaffirms its devotion to these fundamental principles of the constitution.

The Money Question.—Recognizing that the money question is paramount to all others at this time, we invite attention to the fact that the federal constitution names silver and gold together

as the money metals of the United States, and that the first coinage law passed by congress under the constitution made the silver dollar the monetary unit and admitted gold to free coinage at a ratio based upon the silver dollar unit.

We declare that the act of 1873, demonetizing silver without the knowledge or approval of the American people, has resulted in the appreciation of gold and a corresponding fall in the prices of commodities produced by the people; a heavy increase in the burden of taxation and of all debts, public and private; the enrichment of the money-lending class at home and abroad, the prostration of industry and impoverishment of the people.

We are unalterably opposed to monometallism, which has locked fast the prosperity of an industrial people in the paralysis of hard times. Gold monometallism is a British policy, and its adoption has brought other nations into financial servitude to London. It is not only un-American but anti-American, and it can be fastened on the United States only by the stifling of that spirit and love of liberty which proclaimed our political independence in 1776, and won it in the War of the Revolution.

Free Silver.—We demand the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation. We demand that the standard silver dollar shall be a full legal tender, equally with gold, for all debts, public and private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

We are opposed to the policy and practice of surrendering to the holders of the obligations of the United States the option reserved by law to the government of redeeming such obligations in either silver coin or gold coin.

Opposed to Bond Issues.—We are opposed to the issuing of interest-bearing bonds of the United States in time of peace, and condemn the trafficking with banking syndicates which, in exchange for bonds and at an enormous profit to themselves, supply the federal treasury with gold to maintain the policy of gold monometallism.

Against National Banks.—Congress alone has the power to coin and issue money, and President Jackson declared that this power could not be delegated to corporations or individuals. We, therefore, denounce the issuance of notes intended to circulate as

money by national banks as in derogation of the constitution, and we demand that all paper which is made a legal tender for public and private debts, or which is receivable for duties to the United States, shall be issued by the government of the United States and shall be redeemable in coin.

Tariff and Income Tax.—We hold that the tariff duties should be levied for purposes of revenue, such duties to be so adjusted as to operate equally throughout the country, and not discriminate between class or section, and that taxation should be limited by the needs of the government, honestly and economically administered. We denounce as disturbing to business the republican threat to restore the McKinley law, which has twice been condemned by the people in national elections, and which, enacted under the false plea of protection to home industry, proved a prolific breeder of trusts and monopolies, enriched the few at the expense of the many, restricted trade and deprived the producers of the great American staples of access to their natural markets.

Income Tax.—Until the money question is settled we are opposed to any agitation for further changes in our tariff laws, except such as are necessary to meet the deficit in revenue caused by the adverse decision of the supreme court on the income tax. But for this decision by the supreme court there would be no deficit in the revenue under the law passed by a democratic congress in strict pursuance of the uniform decisions of that court for nearly 100 years, that court having in that decision sustained constitutional objections to its enactment which had previously been overruled by the ablest judges who have ever sat on that bench. We declare that it is the duty of congress to use all the constitutional powers which remain after that decision, or which may come from its reversal by the court as it may hereafter be constituted, so that the burden of taxation may be equally and impartially laid, to the end that wealth may bear its due proportion of the expenses of the government.

Protection of American Labor.—We hold that the most efficient way of protecting American labor is to prevent the importation of foreign pauper labor to compete with it in the home market, and that the value of the home market to our American farmers and artisans is greatly reduced by a vicious monetary system which depresses the prices of their product below the cost of production, and thus deprives them of the means of purchasing the

products of our home manufactories; and as labor creates the wealth of the country, we demand the passage of such laws as may be necessary to protect it in all its rights.

We are in favor of the arbitration of differences between employers engaged in interstate commerce and their employes, and recommend such legislation as is necessary to carry out this principle.

Corporate Wealth.—The absorption of wealth by the few, the consolidation of our leading railway systems and the formation of trusts and pools require a stricter control by the federal government of those arteries of commerce.

We demand the enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission, and such restrictions and guarantees in the control of railroads as will protect the people from robbery and oppression.

Congressional Appropriations.—We denounce the profligate waste of money wrung from the people by oppressive taxation and the lavish appropriations of recent republican congresses, which have kept taxes high while the labor that pays them is unemployed, and the products of the people's toil are depressed in price till they no longer repay the cost of production.

We demand a return to that simplicity and economy which befits a democratic government, and a reduction in the number of useless offices, the salaries of which drain the substance of the people.

Federal Interference in Local Affairs.—We denounce arbitrary interference by federal authorities in local affairs as a violation of the constitution of the United States and a crime against free institutions, and we especially object to government by injunction as a new and highly dangerous form of oppression, by which federal judges in contempt of the laws of the state and rights of citizens become at once legislators, judges and executioners, and we approve the bill passed at the last session of the United States senate and now pending in the house of representatives relative to contempts in federal courts, and providing for trials by jury in certain cases of contempt.

Pacific Funding Bill.—No discrimination should be indulged by the government of the United States in favor of any of its debtors.

We approve of the refusal of the Fifty-third Congress to pass the Pacific railroad funding bill, and denounce the efforts of the present republican congress to enact similar measures.

Pension Rule Indorsed.—Recognizing the just claims of deserving Union soldiers, we heartily indorse the rule of the present commissioner of pensions, that no name shall be arbitrarily dropped from the pension roll, and the fact of enlistment and service should be deemed conclusive evidence against disease and disability before enlistment.

Admission of Territories.—We favor the admission of the territories of New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma into the Union as states, and we favor the early admission of all the territories having the necessary population and resources to entitle them to statehood, and while they remain territories we hold that the officials appointed to administer the government of any territory, together with the District of Columbia and Alaska, should be *bona fide* residents of the territory or district in which their duties are to be performed. The democratic party believes in home rule, and that all public lands of the United States should be appropriated to the establishment of free homes for American citizens.

We recommend that the territory of Alaska be granted a delegate in congress, and that the general land and timber laws of the United States be extended to said territory.

Monroe Doctrine.—The Monroe doctrine, as originally declared and as interpreted by our succeeding presidents, is a permanent part of the foreign policy of the United States, and must at all times be maintained.

Sympathy for Cubans —We extend our sympathy to the people of Cuba in their heroic struggle for liberty and independence.

Civil Service.—We are opposed to life tenure in the public service, except as provided in the constitution. We favor appointments based upon merits, fixed terms of office, and such an administration of the civil service laws as will afford equal opportunities to all citizens of ascertained fitness.

Third Term Condemned.—We declare it to be the unwritten law of this republic, established by custom and usage of 100 years, and sanctioned by the examples of the greatest and wisest of those who founded and have maintained our government, that no man should be eligible for a third term of the presidential office.

Improvements of Waterways—The federal government should care for and improve the Mississippi river and other great waterways of the republic, so as to secure for the interior states easy

and cheap transportation to tide water. Whenever any waterway of the republic is of sufficient importance to demand aid of the government, such aid should be extended upon a definite plan of continuous work until a permanent improvement is secured.

Conclusion.—Confiding in the justice of our cause and the necessity of its success at the polls, we submit the foregoing declaration of principles and purposes to the considerate judgment of the American people. We invite the support of all citizens who approve them and who desire to have them made effective through legislation for the relief of the people and the restoration of the country's prosperity.

PLATFORM.

The people's party, assembled in national convention, reaffirms its allegiance to the principles declared by the founders of the republic, and also to the fundamental principles of just government as enunciated in the platform of the party in 1892. We recognize that through the connivance of the present and preceding administrations the country has reached a crisis in its national life, as predicted in our declaration four years ago, and that prompt and patriotic action is the supreme duty of the hour. We realize that while we have political independence our financial and industrial independence is yet to be attained by restoring to our country the constitutional control and exercise of the functions necessary to a people's government, which functions have been basely surrendered by our public servants to corporate monopolies.

The influence of European money changers has been more potent in shaping legislation than the voice of the American people. Executive power and patronage have been used to corrupt our legislatures and defeat the will of the people, and plutocracy has thereby been enthroned upon the ruins of democracy.

Declarations on Finance.—To restore the government intended by the fathers, and for the welfare and prosperity of this and future generations, we demand the establishment of an economic and financial system which shall make us masters of our own affairs and independent of European control by the adoption of the following declaration of principles:

1. We demand a national money, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, without the intervention of banks of issue, to be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private; a just, equitable and efficient means of distribution direct to the people and through the lawful disbursements of the government.

2. We demand the free and unrestricted coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of foreign nations.

3. We demand the volume of circulating medium be speedily increased to an amount sufficient to meet the demands of the business and population of this country and to restore the just level of prices of labor and production.

4. We denounce the sale of bonds and the increase of the public interest-bearing debt made by the present administration as

unnecessary and without authority of law, and that no more bonds be issued except by specific act of congress.

5. We demand such legislation as will prevent the demonetization of the lawful money of the United States by private contract.

6. We demand that the government, in payment of its obligations, shall use its option as to the kind of lawful money in which they are to be paid, and we denounce the present and preceding administrations for surrendering this option to the holders of government obligations.

7. We demand a graduated income tax, to the end that aggregated wealth shall bear its just proportion of taxation, and we regard the recent decision of the supreme court relative to the income tax law as a misinterpretation of the constitution and an invasion of the rightful powers of congress over the subject of taxation.

8. We demand that postal savings banks be established by the government for the safe deposit of the savings of the people and to facilitate exchange.

Government Ownership of Railroad and Telegraph.—Transportation being a means of exchange and a public necessity, the government should own and operate the railroads in the interest of the people and on a non-partisan basis, to the end that all may be accorded the same treatment in transportation, and that the tyranny and political power now exercised by the great railroad corporations, which result in the impairment, if not the destruction, of the political rights and personal liberties of the citizen may be destroyed. Such ownership is to be accomplished gradually in a manner consistent with sound public policy.

The interest of the United States in the public highways built with public moneys and the proceeds of extensive grants of land to the Pacific railroads should never be alienated, mortgaged or sold, but guarded and protected for the general welfare as provided by the laws organizing such railroads. The foreclosure of existing liens of the United States on these roads should at once follow default in the payment thereof of the debt of the companies, and at the foreclosure sales of said roads the government shall purchase the same if it becomes necessary to protect its interests therein or if it can be purchased at a reasonable price; and the government should operate said railroads as public highways for the benefit of the people and not in the interest of the few, under

suitable provisions for protection of life and property, giving to all transportation interests equal privileges and equal rates for fares and freight.

We denounce the present infamous schemes for refunding these debts, and demand that the laws now applicable thereto be executed and administered according to their true intent and spirit.

The telegraph, like the postoffice system, being a necessity for the transmission of news, should be owned and operated by the government in the interest of the people.

Reclamation of Land.—The true policy demands that national and state legislation shall be such as will ultimately enable every prudent and industrious citizen to secure a home, and therefore the land should not be monopolized for speculative purposes. All lands now held by the railroads and other corporations in excess of their actual needs, should, by lawful means, be reclaimed by the government and held for actual settlers only, and private land monopoly as well as alien ownership should be prohibited.

We condemn the frauds by which the land grants to the Pacific railroad companies have, through the connivance of the interior department, robbed multitudes of actual *bona fide* settlers of their homes and miners of their claims, and we demand legislation by congress which will enforce the exemption of mineral land from such grants after as well as before patent.

We demand that *bona fide* settlers on all public lands be granted free homes as provided in the national homestead law, and that no exception be made in the case of Indian reservations, when opened for settlement, and that all lands not now patented come under this demand.

Direct Legislation.—We favor a system of direct legislation through the initiative and referendum, under proper constitutional safeguards.

We demand the election of president, vice-president, and United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

For Cuban Independence.—We tender to the patriotic people of Cuba our deepest sympathy in their heroic struggle for political freedom and independence, and we believe the time has come when the United States, the great republic of the world, should recognize that Cuba is, and of right ought to be, a free and independent state.

We favor home rule in the territories and the District of Columbia, and the early admission of the territories as states.

All public salaries should be made to correspond to the price of labor and its products

In time of great industrial depression idle labor should be employed on public works as far as practical.

The arbitrary course of the courts in assuming to imprison citizens for indirect contempt and ruling by injunction should be prevented by proper legislation.

We favor just pensions for our disabled Union soldiers.

Believing that the election franchise and untrammelled ballot are essential to a government of, for, and by the people, the people's party condemn the wholesale system of disfranchisement adopted in some of the states, as unrepugnant and undemocratic, and we declare it to be the duty of the several state legislatures to take such action as will secure a full, free and fair ballot and an honest count.

While the foregoing propositions constitute the platform upon which our party stands and for the vindication of which its organization will be maintained, we recognize that the great and pressing issue of the pending campaign upon which the present presidential election will turn, is the financial question, and upon this great and specific issue between the parties we cordially invite the aid and co-operation of all organizations and citizens agreeing with us upon this vital question.

PLATFORM.

This convention has assembled to uphold the principles upon which depend the honor and welfare of the American people, in order that democrats throughout the Union may unite their patriotic efforts to avert disaster to their country and ruin from their party.

The democratic party is pledged to equal and exact justice to all men, of every creed and condition; to the largest freedom of the individual consistent with good government; to the preservation of the federal government in its constitutional vigor, and to the support of the states in all their just rights; to economy in the public expenditures; to the maintenance of the public credit and sound money, and it is opposed to paternalism and all class legislation.

The declarations of the Chicago convention attack individual freedom, the right of private contract, the independence of the judiciary, and the authority of the president to enforce federal laws. They advocate a reckless attempt to increase the price of silver by legislation, to the debasement of our monetary standard, and threaten unlimited issues of paper money by the government; they abandon for republican allies the democratic cause of tariff reform to court the favor of protectionists to their fiscal heresy.

In view of these and other grave departures from democratic principles we cannot support the candidates of that convention nor be bound by its acts. The democratic party has survived

many defeats, but could not survive a victory won in behalf of the doctrine and policy proclaimed in its name at Chicago.

The conditions, however, which make possible such utterances from a national convention are the direct results of class legislation by the republican party. It still proclaims, as it has for years, the power and duty of government to raise and maintain prices by law, and it proposes no remedy for existing evils except oppressive and unjust taxation.

The national democracy here convened therefore renews its declaration of faith in democratic principles, especially as applicable to the conditions of the times.

Taxation and Tariff.—Taxation, tariff, excise or direct, is rightfully imposed only for public purposes, and not for private gain. Its amount is justly measured by public expenditures, which should be limited by scrupulous economy. The sum derived by the treasury from tariff and excise levies is affected by the state of trade and volume of consumption.

The amount required by the treasury is determined by the appropriations made by congress. The demand of the republican party for an increase in tariff taxation has its pretext in the deficiency of revenue, which has its causes in the stagnation of trade and reduced consumption, due entirely to the loss of confidence that has followed the populist threat of free coinage and depreciation of our money, and the republican practice of extravagant appropriations beyond the needs of good government. We arraign and condemn the populist conventions at Chicago and St. Louis for their co-operation with the republican party in creating these conditions, which are pleaded in justification of a heavy increase of the burdens of the people by a further resort to protection. We, therefore, denounce protection and its ally, free coinage of silver, as schemes for the personal profit of a few at the expense of the many, and oppose the two parties which stand for these schemes as hostile to the people of the republic, whose food and shelter, comfort and property, are attacked by higher taxes and depreciated money.

In fine, we reaffirm the historic democratic doctrine of tariff for revenue only.

Demands for American Commerce.—We demand that henceforth modern and liberal policies toward American shipping shall take

the place of our imitation of the restricted statutes of the eighteenth century, which were long ago abandoned by every maritime power but the United States, and which to the nation's humiliation have driven American capital and enterprise to the use of alien flags and alien crews, have made the stars and stripes an almost unknown emblem in foreign countries, and have virtually extinguished the race of American seamen.

We oppose the pretense that discriminating duties will promote shipping, and that scheme is an invitation to commercial warfare upon the United States, un-American in the light of our great commercial treaties, offering no gain whatever to American shipping, while greatly increasing ocean freights on our agricultural and manufactured products.

The experience of mankind has shown that by reason of their natural qualities gold is the necessary money of the large affairs of commerce and business, while silver is conveniently adapted to minor transactions, and the most beneficial use of both together can be insured only by the adoption of the former as a standard of monetary measure, and the maintenance of silver at a parity with gold by its limited coinage under suitable safeguards of law. Thus the largest possible enjoyment of both metals is gained with the value universally accepted throughout the world, which constitutes the only practical bimetallic currency, assuring the most stable standard, and especially the best and safest money for all who earn a livelihood by labor or the produce of husbandry. They cannot suffer when paid in the best money known to man, but are the peculiar and most defenseless victims of a debased and fluctuating currency, which offers continual profits to the money changer at their cost.

Realizing these truths, demonstrated by long public inconvenience and loss, the democratic party, in the interests of the masses and of equal justice to all, practically established by the legislation of 1834 and 1853 the gold standard of monetary measurements and likewise entirely divorced the government from banking and currency issues. To this long established democratic policy we adhere and insist upon the maintenance of the gold standard and of the parity therewith of every dollar issued by the government, and are firmly opposed to the free and unlimited coinage of silver and to the compulsory purchase of silver bullion.

But we denounce, also, the further maintenance of the present costly patchwork system of national paper currency as a constant source of injury and peril.

We assert the necessity of such intelligent currency reform as will confine the government to its legitimate functions, completely separated from the banking business, and afford to all sections of our country a uniform, safe, and elastic bank currency under government supervision, measured in volume by the needs of business.

President Cleveland Praised.—The patriotism, fidelity, and courage with which President Cleveland has fulfilled his great public trust, the high character of his administration, its wisdom and energy in the maintenance of civil order, and the enforcement of the laws, its equal regard for the rights of every class and every section, its firm and dignified conduct of foreign affairs, and its sturdy persistence in upholding the credit and honor of the nation are fully recognized by the democratic party and will secure him a place in history beside the fathers of the republic.

We also commend the administration for the great progress made in the reform of the public service, and we indorse its effort to extend the merit system still further.

We demand that no backward step be taken, but that the reform be supported and advanced until the undemocratic spoils system of appointments shall be eradicated.

Economy in Expenditure.—We demand strict economy in the appropriations and in the administration of the government.

Arbitration and Pensions.—We favor arbitration for the settlement of international disputes. We favor a liberal policy of pensions to deserving soldiers and sailors of the United States.

The Supreme Court.—The supreme court of the United States was wisely established by the framers of our constitution as one of the three co-ordinate branches of the government. Its independence and authority to interpret the law of the land without fear or favor must be maintained. We condemn all efforts to defame that tribunal or impair the confidence and respect which it has deservedly held.

The democratic party ever has maintained and ever will maintain the supremacy of law, the independence of its judicial administration, the inviolability of contract, and the obligations of all good citizens to resist every illegal trust, combination or

attempt against the just rights of property and the good order of society, in which are bound up the peace and happiness of our people.

Believing these principles to be essential to the well being of the republic we submit them to the consideration of the American people.

The national party, recognizing God as the author of all just power in government, presents the following declaration of principles, which it pledges itself to enact into effective legislation when given the power to do so:

1. The suppression of the manufacture and sale, importation, exportation and transportation of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes. We utterly reject all plans for regulating, or compromising with this traffic, whether such plans be called local option, taxation, license or public control. The sale of liquors for medicinal and other legitimate uses should be conducted by the state, without profit, and with such regulations as will prevent fraud or evasion.

2. No citizen should be denied the right to vote on account of sex.

3. All money should be issued by the general government only, and without the intervention of any private citizen, corporation or banking institution. It should be based upon the wealth, stability and integrity of the nation. It should be a full legal tender for all debts, public and private, and should be of sufficient volume to meet the demands of the legitimate business interests of the country. For the purpose of honestly liquidating our outstanding coin obligations, we favor the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold, at the ratio of 16 to 1, without consulting any other nation.

4. Land is the common heritage of the people, and should be preserved from monopoly and speculation. All unearned grants of land, subject to forfeiture, should be reclaimed by the govern-

ment, and no portion of the public domain should hereafter be granted except to actual settlers, continuous use being essential to tenure.

5. Railroads, telegraphs and other natural monopolies should be owned and operated by the government, giving to the people the benefit of service at actual cost.

6. The national constitution should be so amended as to allow the national revenues to be raised by equitable adjustment of taxation on the properties and incomes of the people, and import duties should be levied as a means of securing equitable commercial relations with other nations.

7. The contract convict labor system, through which speculators are enriched at the expense of the state, should be abolished.

8. All citizens should be protected by law in their right to one day of rest in seven, without oppressing any who conscientiously observe any other than the first day of the week.

9. The American public schools, taught in the English language, should be maintained, and no public funds should be appropriated for sectarian institutions.

10. The president, vice-president and United States senators should be elected by direct vote of the people.

11. Ex-soldiers and sailors of the United States army and navy, their widows and minor children, should receive liberal pensions, graded on disability and term of service, not merely as a debt of gratitude, but for services rendered in the preservation of the Union.

12. Our immigration laws should be so revised as to exclude paupers and criminals. None but citizens of the United States should be allowed to vote in any state, and naturalized citizens should not vote until one year after naturalization papers have been issued.

13. The initiative and referendum, and proportional representation, should be adopted.

14. Having herein presented our principles and purposes, we invite the co-operation and support of all citizens who are with us substantially agreed.

PLATFORM.

The national silver party, in convention assembled, hereby adopts the following declaration of principles:

The paramount issue at this time in the United States is indisputably the money question. It is between the gold standard, gold bonds and bank currency on one side, and the bimetallic standard, no bonds and government currency on the other. On this issue we declare ourselves to be in favor of a distinctively American financial system. We are unalterably opposed to the single gold standard and demand the immediate return to the constitutional standard of gold and silver by the restoration by this government, independently of any foreign power, of the unrestricted coinage of both gold and silver into standard money, at the ratio of 16 to 1, and upon terms of exact equality, as they existed prior to 1873; the silver coin to be a full legal tender equally with gold for all debts and dues, public and private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

We hold that the power to control and regulate a paper currency is inseparable from the power to coin money, and hence that all currency intended to circulate as money should be issued and its volume controlled by the general government only, and should be legal tender.

We are unalterably opposed to the issue by the United States of interest-bearing bonds in time of peace, and we denounce as a blunder worse than a crime the present treasury policy, concurred in by a republican house, of plunging the country into debt by hundreds of millions, in the vain attempt to maintain the gold standard by borrowing gold; and we demand the payment of all coin obligations of the United States, as provided by existing laws, in either gold or silver coin, at the option of the government, and not at the option of the creditor.

The demonetization of silver in 1873 enormously increased the demand for gold, enhancing its purchasing power and lowering all prices measured by that standard, and since that unjust and indefensible act the prices of American products have fallen upon an average nearly 50 per cent, carrying down with them proportionately the money value of all other forms of property. Such fall of prices has destroyed the profits of legitimate industry, injuring the producer for the benefit of the non-producer, increasing the burden of the debtor, swelling the gains of the creditor, paralyzing the productive energies of the American people, relegating to idleness vast numbers of willing workers, sending the shadows of despair into the home of the honest toiler, filling the land with tramps and paupers and building up colossal fortunes at the money centers.

In the effort to maintain the gold standard the country has within the past two years, in a time of profound peace and plenty, been loaded down with \$262,000,000 of additional interest-bearing debt under such circumstances as to allow a syndicate of native and foreign bankers to realize a net profit of millions on a single deal. It stands confessed that the gold standard can only be upheld by so depleting our paper currency as to force the prices of our products below the European, and even below the Asiatic, level to enable us to sell in foreign markets, thus aggravating the very evils of which our people so bitterly complain, degrading American labor and striking at the foundations of our civilization itself. The advocates of the gold standard persistently claim that

the cause of our distress is overproduction—that we have produced so much that it has made us poor—which implies that the true remedy is to close the factory, abandon the farm, and throw a multitude of people out of employment, a doctrine that leaves us unnerved and disheartened and absolutely without hope for the future. We affirm it to be unquestioned that there can be no such economic paradox as overproduction, and at the same time tens of thousands of our fellow citizens remaining half clothed and half fed, and who are piteously clamoring for the common necessities of life.

Over and above all other questions of policy, we are in favor of restoring to the people of the United States the time-honored money of the constitution—gold and silver; not one, but both—the money of Washington and Hamilton and Jefferson and Monroe and Jackson and Lincoln, to the end that the American people may receive honest pay for an honest product; that an American debtor may pay his just obligations in an honest standard and not in a standard that has appreciated 100 per cent above all the great staples of our country, and to the end further that silver standard countries may be deprived of the unjust advantage they now enjoy in the difference in exchange between gold and silver—an advantage which tariff legislation alone cannot overcome.

We, therefore, appeal to the people of the United States to leave in abeyance for the moment all other questions, however important and even momentous they may appear, to sunder, if need be, all former party ties and affiliations, and unite in one supreme effort to free themselves and their children from the domination of the money power—a power more destructive than any which has ever been fastened upon the civilized men of any race or in any age. And upon the consummation of our desires and efforts we invoke the gracious favor of Divine Providence.

PLATFORM.

The socialist labor party of the United States, in convention assembled, reasserts the inalienable right of all men to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

With the founders of the American republic we hold that the purpose of government is to secure every citizen in the enjoyment

of this right; but in the light of our social conditions we hold, furthermore, that no such right can be exercised under a system of economic inequality, essentially destructive of life, of liberty and of happiness.

With the founders of this republic we hold that the true theory of politics is that the machinery of government must be owned and controlled by the whole people; but in the light of our industrial development we hold, furthermore, that the true theory of economics is that the machinery of production must likewise belong to the people in common.

To the obvious fact that our despotic system of economics is the direct opposite of our democratic system of politics, can plainly be traced the existence of a privileged class, the corruption of government by that class, the alienation of public property, public franchises and public functions to that class, and the abject dependence of the mightiest of nations upon that class.

Again, through the perversion of democracy to the ends of plutocracy, labor is robbed of the wealth which it alone produces, is denied the means of self-employment, and, by compulsory idleness in wage slavery, is even deprived of the necessaries of life.

Human power and natural forces are thus wasted, that the plutocracy may rule.

Ignorance and misery, with all their concomitant evils, are perpetuated, that the people may be kept in bondage.

Science and invention are diverted from their humane purpose to the enslavement of women and children.

Against such a system the socialist labor party once more enters its protest. Once more it reiterates its fundamental declaration that private property in the natural sources of production and in the instruments of labor is the obvious cause of all economic servitude and political dependence.

The time is fast coming when, in the natural course of social evolution, this system, through the destructive action of its failures and crises on the one hand, and the constructive tendencies of its trusts and other capitalistic combinations on the other hand, shall have worked out its own downfall.

We, therefore, call upon the wage workers of the United States and upon all other honest citizens, to organize under the banner of the socialist labor party into a class-conscious body, aware of its rights and determined to conquer them by taking possession

of the public powers, so that, held together by an indomitable spirit of solidarity under the most trying conditions of the present class struggle, we may put a summary end to that barbarous struggle by the abolition of classes, the restoration of the land and of all the means of production, transportation and distribution to the people as a collective body, and the substitution of the co-operative commonwealth for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder; a commonwealth in which every worker shall have the free exercise and full benefit of his faculties, multiplied by all the modern factors of civilization.

With a view to immediate improvement in the condition of labor we present the following demands:

1. Reduction of the hours of labor in proportion to the progress of production.

2. The United States to obtain possession of the mines, railroads, canals, telegraphs, telephones, and all other means of public transportation and communication; the employes to operate the same co-operatively under control of the federal government and to elect their own superior officers, but no employe shall be discharged for political reasons.

3. The municipalities to obtain possession of the local railroads, ferries, waterworks, gas works, electric plants, and all industries requiring municipal franchises; the employes to operate the same co-operatively under control of the municipal administration and to elect their own superior officers, but no employe shall be discharged for political reasons.

4. The public lands to be declared inalienable. Revocation of all land grants to corporations or individuals, the conditions of which have not been complied with.

5. The United States to have the exclusive right to issue money.

6. Congressional legislation providing for the scientific management of forests and waterways, and prohibiting the waste of the natural resources of the country.

7. Inventions to be free to all; the inventors to be remunerated by the nation.

8. Progressive income tax and tax on inheritances, the smaller incomes to be exempt.

9. School education of all children under fourteen years of age to be compulsory, gratuitous and accessible to all by public assistance in meals, clothing, books, etc., where necessary.

10. Repeal of all pauper, tramp, conspiracy and sumptuary laws. Unabridged right of combination.

11. Prohibition of the employment of children of school age and the employment of female labor in occupations detrimental to health or morality. Abolition of the convict labor contract system.

12. Employment of the unemployed by the public authorities (county, city, state and nation).

13. All wages to be paid in lawful money of the United States. Equalization of women's wages with those of men where equal service is performed.

14. Laws for the protection of life and limb in all occupations, and an efficient employers' liability law.

15. The people to have the right to propose laws and to vote upon all measures of importance, according to the referendum principle.

16. Abolition of the veto power of the executive (national, state and municipal), wherever it exists.

17. Abolition of the United States senate and all upper legislative chambers.

18. Municipal self-government.

19. Direct vote and secret ballots in all elections. Universal and equal right of suffrage without regard to color, creed or sex. Election days to be legal holidays. The principle of proportional representation to be introduced.

20. All public officers to be subject to recall by their respective constituencies.

21. Uniform civil and criminal law throughout the United States. Administration of justice to be free of charge. Abolition of capital punishment.

The figures in the table are official in about two-thirds of the states. From the other states the totals are from the statements of the complete vote as published at the state capitals. The vote for Bryan and Watson is counted in the column for Bryan, except in the case of Pennsylvania, where the vote was reported in the published table as populist. The scattering

vote in each state, while not tabulated, is counted in the total. The Bryan and Watson ticket received 110,400 votes in the country at large, or 24,089 in Alabama, 2,137 in Florida, 1,232 in Kansas, 7,320 in Mississippi, 379 in New Hampshire, 2,615 in Ohio, 6,103 in Pennsylvania, 4,525 in Tennessee, 79,252 in Texas, 2,287 in Maine and 461 in Vermont. Bryan has one elector in Kentucky and one in California. This gives McKinley 271 electoral votes and Bryan 176. McKinley's majority, 95.

The total vote for Grant in 1868 was 3,015,071, to 2,709,613 for Seymour. Grant's vote in 1872 was 3,597,070, to 2,834,079 for Greeley. Hayes had 4,033,950 in 1876, to 4,284,885 for Tilden. Garfield had 4,449,053 in 1880, to 4,442,035 for Hancock. Blaine had 4,851,981 in 1884, to 4,874,986 for Cleveland. Harrison had 5,441,902 in 1888, to 5,538,560 for Cleveland. Harrison had 5,162,874 in 1892, to 5,556,562 for Cleveland. Grant's majority was 305,458 in 1868; his plurality in 1872 was 729,975. Tilden's plurality in 1876 was 250,935; Garfield's plurality over Hancock in 1880 was 7,018; Cleveland's over Blaine in 1884 was 20,006; over Harrison in 1888, 96,658; over Harrison in 1892, 393,688.

ARBOR DAY is a legal holiday in Kansas, Minnesota, North Dakota, Wisconsin, and Wyoming, the day being set by the governor; in Texas, February 22; in Nebraska, April 22; Montana, third Tuesday in April; Utah, April 15; Rhode Island, first Friday in May; Idaho, on Friday after May 1; Florida, February 7; Georgia, first Friday in December.

Every Saturday after 12 o'clock noon is a legal holiday in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, and in the District of Columbia, and in the cities of New Orleans and Wilmington, Del., in Louisiana and Missouri in cities of 100,000 or more inhabitants; in Ohio in cities of 50,000 or more inhabitants;

and June 1 to September 30 in New Castle county, Del., and Denver, Col.

There is no national holiday, not even the Fourth of July. Congress has at various times appointed special holidays. In the second session of the Fifty third congress it passed an act making Labor Day a public holiday in the District of Columbia, and it has recognized the existence of certain days as holidays, for commercial purposes, in such legislation as the Bankruptcy act, but with the exception named, there is no general statute on the subject. The proclamation of the president designating a day of Thanksgiving only makes it a legal holiday in those states which provide by law for it.

THE REVISION OF THE CODE OF 1897.

The first code of Iowa is known as the "Code of 1851," the next as the "Revision of 1860," the third as the "Code of 1873," and the last as "The Code," being the codification and revision adopted at the extra session of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly.

Representative J. H. Trewin introduced a bill in the Twenty-fifth General Assembly to create a commission to revise and codify the laws. This bill became a law on the 27th day of March, 1894, and under it Emlin McClain, John Y. Stone, Charles Baker, H. S. Winslow and H. F. Dale were appointed.

The commission presented to the Twenty-sixth General Assembly a "Proposed Code" with an "Explanatory Report." The general assembly at the regular session, in addition to the ordinary work, entered upon the consideration of revision and codification, but when the usual time for adjournment had arrived it was found to be impossible to finish it. Thereupon a resolution was adopted setting forth the condition of the work and the necessity of its completion.

Several members of the legislature waited upon Governor Drake and secured his pledge to call an extra session for the winter of 1897.

In obedience to the call of the governor, the Twenty-sixth General Assembly convened in extra session January 19, 1897, for the purpose of completing the revision and codification of the laws. As all the laws came before the legislature for re-enactment, many changes were found necessary in order to adapt them to the changed conditions and interests of the people and to bring about many needed reforms. So the session was necessarily extended until the 11th day of May, 1897. A recess was then taken until the first day of July following, in order to allow time in which to publish the code, the laws enacted at a special session taking effect under the constitution ninety days after final adjournment.

When the bill for revision of the laws was under consideration its supporters declared it to be their purpose to secure the publication of an annotated code by the state, to be sold at a moderate price.

Towards the close of the extra session a bill was enacted providing for editing, annotating and publishing the code. Under it Mr. E. C. Ebersole was elected editor, and Senators James H. Trewin, Lyman A. Ellis, and Representatives Parley Finch, W. W. Cornwall and John T. P. Power as code supervising committee, to have general supervision of the entire work. Under authority of the general assembly, Emlin McClain was employed by the committee to annotate the code.

The first volumes were issued on the 28th day of September, 1897, and since then 11,262 volumes have been distributed by the secretary of state.

The materials used in printing and binding have been pronounced by competent authority to be of the very highest grade and the book to be the best printed and best bound code the state ever had. The printing and binding were done by the state printer and state binder, respectively.

The Code of 1873 went out of use, practically, in the year 1880, when Emlin McClain and the late Judge William E. Miller published their annotated codes. These so-called codes were mere compilations, but came into general use. The price charged by the publishers to the general public was \$11 for the two-volume edition, and later, when a supplement was added, \$13.

The code supervising committee filed its report with the Twenty-seventh General Assembly January 13, 1898, showing the cost of editing, annotating and publishing the code for an edition of 15,000 volumes, to be \$2.68 per volume. It takes about 7,000 volumes to supply the various officers who are entitled to codes free of charge, so there has been a large saving to the state. The balance of the edition will eventually be sold at \$5 per volume, yielding a sufficient profit to the state to cover the entire cost, at the same time saving to the general public more than one-half the price paid for the laws of Iowa in former years. As only about 3,738 volumes remain on hand, another edition will be needed soon.

The code has been universally approved.

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI AND INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION.

Beginning June 1, 1898, and continuing until November 1 of the same year, the Trans-Mississippi and International exposition will be held at Omaha, Neb. The idea of making a display of the resources, arts and sciences of the Trans-Mississippi region originated in an editorial in the Omaha Bee, just preceding the annual session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial congress in 1895. This congress acted on the suggestion, and initiated the movement that has finally developed into an exposition of international importance, and is destined to outrank every American display excepting the World's fair in 1893.

The exposition is controlled by a corporation with a capital of \$1,000,000; is managed by a directory of fifty members and an executive committee chosen from the directory, which has direct charge of the six departments. Z. T. Lindsey is manager of the department of ways and means, Edward Rosewater of publicity and promotion, F. P. Kirkendall of buildings and grounds, E. E. Bruce of exhibits, A. L. Reed of concessions and privileges and W. N. Babcock of transportation.

GOVERNMENT EXHIBIT AND BUILDING.

In 1896 the citizens of Omaha began active promotion of the enterprise, and organized to interest trans-Mississippi states and the general government. The Fifty-fourth congress was asked to appropriate for a government display, and the state legislatures then in session were appealed to for a similar action. The Twenty-sixth General Assembly of Iowa was the first trans-Mississippi state to act, appropriating \$10,000 for preliminary purposes, and by resolution instructing its congressional delegation to favor an appropriation by the general government. Congress voted \$200,000 conditionally that double the amount should be raised by the exposition management. The conditions were met

by the citizens of Omaha, and a government building costing \$75,000 has been erected; the president has invited the states of the Old World, Mexico, and the Central and South American states to participate. The government building will contain displays from the executive departments, the Smithsonian Institute, the Fisheries and National museum, as well as displays of its resources as a war power. By act of congress, foreign exhibits are to be admitted free of duties, and medals, emblems and appropriate devices of award are to be prepared under United States supervision.

DEPARTMENT BUILDINGS.

The great department buildings of the exposition will be: Agriculture, Fine Arts, Liberal Arts, Electricity and Machinery, Mines and Mining, Manufactures, Horticulture, Dairy, Forestry, Poultry, Live Stock, Terminal, Auditorium, and Administration. These buildings will surround or be adjacent to a lagoon, which spreads out either way into a broad basin, a trefoil in plan, banked by a peristyle of double columns and affording shady promenades. The expenditures on buildings and embellishment of grounds will aggregate \$700,000. The site of the exposition is located in North Omaha, and comprises nearly 200 acres, which is made easily accessible by three trolley lines and two steam railroads. In plan of grounds, grouping and designing of buildings and the varieties of color are attempts at originality, and materially differ from former expositions. Classic sculpture, intricate carving, statuary, colonnades, porticos, bas-reliefs, sculpture, pedaments and pedestals will contribute to the splendor of the architecture.

EXHIBITS.

Not only will every state and territory in the trans-Mississippi region contribute the best of its raw and manufactured product of soil, mine, forest, and achievements of skill, but eastern states are to be represented. Illinois, Wisconsin, New York, New Jersey, West Virginia, Georgia, Florida, Tennessee and other states will make displays under direction of state commissions.

IOWA EXHIBIT.

In May, 1897, the Executive Council of Iowa, directed by act of the Twenty-sixth General Assembly, appointed a commissioner

from each of the eleven congressional districts, to collect and make display of such resources and materials of the state as would best illustrate its highest state of intelligence and cultivation. The following commissioners were selected:

The commission organized by the election of S. H. Mallory as president, Allan Dawson as vice-president, F. N. Chase as secretary, and Geo. W. McCoid as treasurer.

In behalf of the exposition management Hon. George F. Wright of Council Bluffs, is vice-president for Iowa.

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
