

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



DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE.

In Congress, July 4, 1776.

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed July 4, 1776.)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal: that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such forms, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have

returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiclary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armles, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of the states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicted government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundared our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of effuelty and perfidy scarcely parallel in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and meanaminity; and we have conjured them, by the tles of our common kindred, to disayow these usurpations, which would inevitably

interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectifude of our intentions. do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ough to be totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and of all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

(Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 11, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed Sept. 13, 1788.)

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1 All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

- (1)* The house of representatives shall be composed of members SEC. 2. chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors In each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.
- No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.
- [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.] ** The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the cogress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware onc, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.
- When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election, to fill such vacancies.
- (5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of empeachment.
- SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.
- (2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and

of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

- (3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen
- (4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.
- (5) The senate shall choose their other officers, and also a president protempore, in the absence of the vice-president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.
- (6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- (7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.
- SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.
- (2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.
- SEC. 5. (1) Each bouse shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.
- (2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.
- (3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.
- (4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.
- SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.
- (2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall nave been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United . States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.
- Sac. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

- (2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall not be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.
- (3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repeased by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.
 - SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:-
- (1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for the common detense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.
 - (2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;
- (3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;
- (4) To establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;
- (5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;
- (6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;
 - To establish post offices and post roads;
- (8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;
 - (9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;
- (10) To define and puntsh piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;
- (11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;
- (12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;
 - (13) To provide and maintain a navy;
- (14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;
- (15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repei invasions;
- (16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;
- (17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent

of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and-

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

- (2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.
 - (3) No bill of attainder or expost facto law shall be passed.
- (4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.
 - (5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.
- (6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.
- (7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.
- (8) No title of noblity shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.
- SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque or reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.
- (2) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the congress.
- (3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

- SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:
- (2) Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit scaled to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the

president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority, then, from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, post.]

- (8) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.
- (4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.
 (5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death,
- (5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or loability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.
- (6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.
- (?) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation;
- "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the constitution of the United States."
- SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.
- (2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress, may by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.
- (3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.
- SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them; and, in case of disagreement between

them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

- SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.
- SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.
- (2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consula, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress shall make.
- (8) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.
- SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.
- (2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

- SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.
- SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.
- (2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall fee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fied, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.
- (2) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.
- SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

- (2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.
- SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; provided that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

- All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.
- (2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.
- (3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE IL

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and selzures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense,

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor probibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people,

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose, shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation,

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or

other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

- SEC. 2. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an cath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in an insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given ald or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.
- SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.
- SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate. legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

- Section 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.
- SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies; provided, that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.
- SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Fortyninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and vice-president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president is elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

MAGNA CHARTA.

THE GREAT CHARTER OF ENGLISH LIBERTY GRANTED BY KING JOHN AT RUNNYMEDE, JUNE 15, 1215.

John, by the grace of God, King of England, Lord of Ireland, duke of Normandy and Aquitaine, count of Anjou; to the archbishops, bishops, abbots, earls, barons, justices, foresters, sheriffs, prevosts, serving men, and to all his bailiffs and faithful subjects, greeting. Know that we, by the will of God and for the safety of our soul, and of the souls of all our predecessors, and our heirs, to the honor of God and for the exalting of the holy church, and the bettering of our realm; by the counsel of our venerable fathers Stephen, archbishop of Canterbury, primate of all England and cardinal of the holy Roman church; of Henry, archbishop of Dublin; of the bishops William of London, Peter of Winchester, Jocelin of Bath and Glastonbury, Hugo of Lincoln, Walter of Worcester, William of Coventry and Benedict of Rochester; of master Pandulf, subdeacon of the household of the lord pope; of brother Aymeric, master of the knights of the Temple in England; and of the noble men, William Marshall, earl of Pembroke; William, earl of Salisbury; William, earl of Warren; William, earl of Arundel; Alan de Galway, constable of Scotland; Warin, son of Gerold; Peter, son of Herbert; Hubert de Burgh, seneschal of Poictiers; Hugo de Neville, Matthew, son of Herbert; Thomas Basset, Alan Basset, Philip d'Aubigni, Robert de Roppelay, John Marshall, John, son of Hugo, and others of our faithful subjects:

- 1. First of all have granted to God, and, for us and for our heirs forever, have confirmed, by this our present charter, that the English church shall be free and shall have its rights intact and its liberties uninfringed upon. And thus we will that it be observed. As is apparent from the fact that we, spontaneously and of our own free will, before discord broke out between ourselves and our barons, did grant and by our charter confirm—and did cause the lord pope Innocent III to confirm—freedom of elections, which is considered most important and most necessary to the church of England. Which charter both we ourselves shall observe, and we will that it be observed with good faith by our heirs forever. We have also granted to all free men of our realm, on the part of ourselves and our heirs forever, all the subjoined liberties, to have and to hold, to them and to their heirs, from us and from our heirs:
- 2. If any one of our earls or barons, or of others holding from us in chief through military service, shall die; and if, at the time of his death, his heir be of full age and owe a relief: he shall have his inheritance by paying the old relief;—the heir, namely, or the heirs of an earl, by paying one hundred pounds for the whole barony of an earl; the heir or heirs of a baron, by paying one hundred pounds for the whole barony; the heir or heirs of a knight, by paying one hundred shillings at most for a whole knight's fee; and he who shall owe less shall give less, according to the ancient custom of fees.
- But if the heir of any of the above persons shall be under age and in wardship,—when he comes of age he shall have his inheritance without relief and without fine.
- 4. The administrator of the land of such heir who shall be under age shall take none but reasonable issues from the land of the heir, and reasonable customs and services; and this without destruction and waste of men and goods. And if we shall have committed the custody of any such land to the sheriff or to any other man who ought to be responsible to us for the issues of it, and he cause destruction or waste to what is in his charge; we will fine him, and the land shall be handed over to two lawful and discreet men of that fee who shall answer to us, or to him to whom we shall have referred them, regarding those issues. And if we shall have given or sold to any one the custody of any such land; and he shall have caused destruction or waste to it, he shall lose that custom?

tody, and it shall be given to two lawful and discreet men of that fee, who likewise shall answer to us, as has been explained.

- 5. The administrator, moreover, so long as he may have the custody of the land, shall keep in order, from the issues of that land, the houses, parks, warrens, lakes, mills and other things pertaining to it. And he shall restore to the helr when he comes to full age, his whole land stocked with plows and wainnages, according as the time of the wainnage requires and the issues of the land will reasonably permit.
- Helrs may marry without disparagement; so nevertheless, that, before the marriage is contracted, it shall be announced to the relations by blood by the heir himself.
- 7. A widow, after the death of her husband, shall straightway, and without difficulty, have her marriage portion and her inheritance, nor shall she give any thing in return for her dowry, her marriage portion, or the inheritance which belonged to her, and which she and her husband held on the day of the death of that husband. And she may remain in the house of her husband, after his death, for forty days; within which her dowry shall be paid over to her.
- 8. No widow shall be forced to marry when she prefers to live without a husband; so, however, that she gives security not to marry without our consent if she hold from us, or the consent of the lord from whom she holds, if she hold from another.
- 9. Neither we nor our balliffs shall seize any revenue for any debt, so long as the chattels of the debtor suffice to pay the debt; nor shall the sponsors of that debtor be distrained so long as that chief debtor has enough to pay the debt. But if the chief debtor fail in paying the debt, not having the wherewithal to pay it, the sponsors shall answer for the debt. And, if they shall wish, they may have the lands and revenues of the debtor until satisfaction shall have been given them for the debt previously paid for him; unless the chief debtor shall show that he is quit in that respect towards those same sponsors.
- 10. If any one shall have taken any sum, great or small, as a loan from the Jews, and shall die before that debt is paid,—that debt shall not bear interest so long as the heir, from whoever he may hold, shall be under age. And if the debt fall into our hands, we shall take nothing save the chattel contained in the deed.
- 11. And if any one dies owing a debt to the Jews, his wife shall have her dowry, and shall restore nothing of that debt. But if there shall remain children of that dead man, and they shall be under age, the necessaries shall be provided for them according to the nature of the dead man's holding; and, from the residue, the debt shall be paid, saving the service due to the lords. In like manner shall be done concerning debts that are due to others besides the Jews.
- 12. No scutage or aid shall be imposed in our realm unless by the common counsel of our realm; except for redeeming our body, and knighting our eldest son, and marrying once of our eldest daughter. And for these purposes there shall only be given a reasonable aid. In like manner shall be done concerning the aids of the city of London.
- 13. And the city of London shall have all its old liberties and free customs as well by land as by water. Moreover we will and grant that all other cities and burroughs, and towns and ports, shall have all their liberties and free customs.
- 14. And, in order to have the common counsel of the realm in the matter of assessing an aid otherwise in the aforesaid cases, or of assessing a scutage,—we shall cause, under seal through our letters, the archbishops, bishops, abbots, earls, and greater barons to be summoned for a fixed day—for a term, namely, at least forty days distant,—and for a fixed place. And, moreover, we shall cause to be summoned in general, through our sheriffs and balliffs, all those who hold of us in chief. And in all those letters of summons, we shall express the cause of the summons. And when a summons has thus been made, the business shall be proceeded with on the day appointed according to the counsel of those who shall be present, even though not all shall come who were summoned.

- 15. We will not allow any one henceforth to take an aid from his freemen save for the redemption of his body, and the knighting of his eldest son, the merrying, once, of his eldest daughter; and, for these purposes, there shall only be given a reasonable aid.
- 16. No one shall be forced to do more service for a knight's fee, or for another free holding, than is due from it.
- 17. Common pleas shall not follow our court, but shall be held in a certain fixed place.
- 18. Assizes of novel disselsin, of mort d'ancestor, and of darrein presentment shall not be held save in their own counties, and in this way: we, or our chief justice, if we shall be absent from the kingdom, shall send two justices through each county four times a year; they, with four knights from each county, chosen by the county, shall hold the aforesald assizes in the county, and on the day and at the place of the county court.
- 19. And if on the day of the county court the aforesaid assizes can not be held, a sufficient number of knights and free tenants, from those who were present at the county court on that day, shall remain, so that through them the judgments may be suitably given, according as the matter may have been great or small.
- 20. A freeman shall only be amerced for a small offence according to the measure of that offence. And for a great offence he shall be amerced according to the magnitude of the offence, saving his contenement; and a merchant, in the same way, saving his merchandize. And a villein, in the same way, if he fall under our mercy, shall be amerced, saving his wainnage. And none of the aforesaid fines shall be imposed save upon oath of upright men from the neighborhood.
- 21. Earls and barons shall not be amerced save through their peers, and only according to the measure of the offence,
- 22. No clerk shall be amerced for his lay tenement except according to the manner of the other persons aforesaid; and not according to the amount of his ecclesiastical benefice.
- 23. Neither a town or a man shall be forced to make bridges over the rivers, with the exception of those who from of old and of right ought to do it.
- 24. No sheriff, constable, coroners, or other balliffs of ours shall hold the pleas of our crown.
- 25. All counties, hundreds, wapentakes, and trithings—our demesne manors being excepted—shall continue according to the old farms, without any increase at all.
- 26. If any one holding from us a lay fee shall die, and our sheriff or bailift can show our letters patent containing our summons for the debt which the dead man owed to us,—our sheriff or bailiff may be allowed to attach and enroll the chattels of the dead man to the value of that debt, through view of lawful men: in such way, however, that nothing shall be removed thence until the debt is paid which was plainly owed to us. And the residue shall be left to the executors that they may carry out the will of the dead man. And if nothing is owed to us by him, all the chattels shall go to the use prescribed by the deceased, saving their reasonable portions to his wife and children.
- 27. If any freeman shall have died intestate his chattels shall be distributed through the hands of his near relatives and friends, by view of the church; saving to any one the debts which the dead man owed him.
- 28. No constable or other bailiff of ours shall take the corn or other chattels of any one except he straightway give money for them, or can be allowed a respite in that regard by the will of the seller.
- 29. No constable shall force any knight to pay money for castleward if he be willing to perform that ward in person, or—he for a reasonable cause not being able to perform it himself—through another proper man. And if we shall have led or sent him on a military expedition, he shall be quit of ward according to the amount of time during which, through us, he shall have been in military service.
- 30. No sheriff or bailiff of ours, nor any one else, shall take the horses or carts of any freeman for transport, unless by the will of that freeman.

- 31. Neither we nor our balliffs shall take another's wood for castles or for other private uses, unless by the will of him to whom the wood belongs.
- 32. We shall not hold the lands of those convicted of felony longer than a year and a day; and then the lands shall be restored to the lords of the flefs.
- 33. Henceforth all the weirs in the Thames and Medway, and throughout all England, save on the sea coast, shall be done away with entirely.
- 34. Henceforth the writ which is called Præcipe shall not be served on any one for any holding so as to cause a free man to lose his court.
- 35. There shall be but one measure of wine throughout the whole realm, and one measure of ale and one measure of corn—namely, the London quart;—and one width of dyed and russet and hauberg cloths—namely, two ells below the selvage. And with weights, moreover, it shall be as with measures.
- 36. Henceforth nothing shall be given or taken for a writ of inquest in a matter concerning life or limb; but it shall be conceded gratis, and shall not be denied.
- 37. If any one hold of us in fee-farm, or in socage, or in burkage, and hold land of another by military service, we shall not, by reason of that fee-farm, or socage or burkage, have the wardship of his heir or of his land which is held in fee from another. Nor shall we have the wardship of that fee-farm or socage, or burkage unless that fee-farm owe military service. We shall not, by reason of some petit serjeanty which someone holds of us through the service of giving us knives or arrows or the like, have the wardship of his heir or of the land which he holds of another by military service.
- 38. No balliss, on his own simple assertion, shall henceforth put any one to his law, without producing faithful witnesses in evidence.
- 39. No freeman shall be taken, or imprisoned, or dis-seized, or outlawed, or exfled, or in any way harmed—nor will we go upon or send upon him, save by the lawful judgment of his peers or by the law of the land.
 - 40. To none will we sell, to none deny or delay, right or justice.
- 41. All merchants may safely and securely go out of England, and come into England, and delay and pass through England, as well by land as by water, for the purpose of buying and selling, free from all evil taxes, subject to the ancient and right customs—save in time of war, and if they are of the land at war against us. And if such be found in our land at the beginning of the war, they shall be held, without harm to their bodies and goods, until it shall be known to us or our chief justice how the merchants of our land are to be treated who shall, at that time, be found in the land at war against us. And if ours shall be safe there, the others shall be safe in our land.
- 42. Henceforth any person, saving fealty to us, may go out of our realm and return to it, safely and securely by land and by water, except perhaps for a brief period in time of war, for the common good of the realm. But prisoners and outlaws are expected according to the law of the realm; also people of a land at war against us, and the merchants, with regard to whom shall be done as we have said.
- 43. If any one hold from any escheat—as from the honour of Wallingford, Nottingham, Boloin, Lancaster, or the other escheats which are in our hands and are baronies—and shall die, his heir shall not give another relief, nor shall be perform for us other service than he would perform for a baron if that barony were in the hand of a baron; and we shall hold it in the same way in which the baron has held it.
- 44. Persons dwelling without the forest shall not henceforth come before the forest justices, through common summonses, unless they are impleaded or are the sponsors of some person or persons attached for matters concerning the forest.
- 45. We will not make men justices, constables, sheriffs, or bailiffs, unless they are such as know the law of the realm, and are minded to observe it rightly.
- 48. All barons who have founded abbeys for which they have charters of the kings of England, or ancient right of tenure, shall have, as they ought to have, their custody when vacant.
- 47. All forests constituted as such in our time shall straightway be annulled; and the same shall be done for river banks made into places of defence by us in our time,

- 48. All evil customs concerning forests and warrens, and concerning foresters and warreners, sheriffs and their servants, river banks and their guardians, shall straightway be inquired into in each county, through twelve sworn knights from that county, and shall be eradicated by them, entirely, so that they shall never be renewed, within forty days after the inquest has been made; in such manner that we shall first know about them, or our justice if we be not in England.
- 49. We shall straightway return all hostages and charters which were delivered to us by Englishmen as a surety for peace or faithful service.
- 50. We shall entirely remove from their balliwicks the relatives of Gerard de Athyes, so that they shall henceforth have no balliwick in England: Engelard de Cygnes, Andrew Peter and Gyon de Chanceles, Gyon de Cygnes, Goeffrey de Martin and his brothers, Philip Mark and his brothers, and Geoffrey his nephew, and the whole following of them.
- 51. And straightway after peace is restored we shall remove from the realm all the foreign soldiers, cross-bowmen, servants, birelings, who may have come with horses and arms to the harm of the realm.
- 52. If any one shall have been disseized by us, or removed, without a legal sentence of his peers, from his lands, castles, libertles or lawful right, we shall straightway restore them to him. And if a dispute shall arise concerning this matter it shall be settled according to the judgment of the twenty-five barons who are mentioned below as sureties for the peace. But with regard to all those things of which any one was, by king Henry our father or king Richard our brother, disseized or dispossessed without legal judgment of his peers, which we have in our hand or which others hold, and for which we ought to give a guarantee: We shall have respite until the common term for crusaders. Except with regard to those concerning which a plea was moved, or an inquest made by our order, before we took the cross. But when we return from our pilgrimage, or if, by chance, we desist from our pilgrimage, we shall straightway then show full justice regarding them.
- 53. We shall have the same respite, moreover, and in the same manner, in the matter of showing justice with regard to forests to be annulled and forests to remain, which Henry our father or Richard our brother constituted; and in the matter of wardships of lands which belong to the fee of another—wardships of which kind we have hitherto enjoyed by reason of the fee which some one held from us in military service;—and in the matter of abbeys founded in the fee of another than ourselves—in which the lord of the fee may say that he has jurisdiction. And when we return, or if we desist from our pilgrimage, we shall straightway exhibit full justice to those complaining with regard to these matters.
- 54. No one shall be taken or imprisoned on account of the appeal of a woman concerning the death of another than her husband,
- 55. All fines imposed by us unjustly and contrary to the law of the land, and all amerciaments made unjustly and contrary to the law of the land, shall be altogether remitted, or it shall be done with regard to them according to the judgment of the twenty-five barons mentioned below as sureties for the peace, or according to the judgment of the majority of them together with the aforesald Stephen archbishop of Canterbury, if he can be present, and with others whom he may wish to associate with himself for this purpose. And if he cannot be present, the affair shall nevertheless proceed without him; in such way that, if one or more of the said twenty-five barons shall be concerned in a similar complaint, they shall be removed as to this particular decision, and, in their place, for this purpose alone, others shall be substituted who shall be chosen and sworn by the remainder of those twenty-five.
- 56. If we have disselzed or dispossessed Welshmen of their lands or liberties or other things without legal judgment of their peers, in England or in Wales,—they shall straightway be restored to them. And if a dispute shall arise concerning this, then action shall be taken upon it in the March through judgment of their peers—concerning English holdings according to the law of England concerning Welsh holdings according to the law of Wales, concerning the holdings in the March according to the law of the March. The Welsh shall do likewise with regard to us and our subjects.

- 57. But with regard to all those things of which any of the Welsh was, by king Henry our father or king Richard our brother, disseized or dispossessed without legal judgment of his peers, which we have in our hand or which others hold, and for which we ought to give a guarantee; we shall have respite until the common term for crusaders. Except with regard to those concerning which a plea was moved, or an inquest made by our order, before we took the cross. But when we return from our pilgrimage, or if, by chance, we desist from our pilgrimage, we shall straightway then show full justice regarding them, according to the laws of Wales and the aforesaid districts.
- 53. We shall straightway return the son of Llewelin and all the Welsh hostages, and the charters delivered to us as security for the peace.
- 59. We shall act towards Alexander king of the Scots regarding the restoration of his sisters, and his hostages, and his liberties and his lawful right, as we shall act towards our other barons of England; unless it ought to be otherwise according to the charters which we hold from William, his father, the former king of the Scots. And this shall be done through judgment of his peers in our court.
- 60. Moreover all the subjects of our realm, clergy as well as laity, shall, as far as pertains to them, observe with regard to their vassals, all those aforesaid customs and liberties which we have decreed shall, as far as pertains to us, be observed in our realm with regard to our own.
- 61. Inasmuch as, for the sake of God, and for the bettering of our realm. and for the more ready healing of the discord which has arisen between us and our barons, we have made all these aforesaid concessions,-wishing them to enjoy forever the entire and firm stability, we make and grant to them the following security, that the barons, namely, may elect at their pleasure twentyfive barons from the realm who ought, with all their strength, to observe, maintain and cause to be observed, the peace and privileges which we have granted to them and confirmed by this our present charter. In such wise, namely, that if we, or our justice, or our bailiffs, or any one of our servants shall have transgressed against any one in any respect, or shall have broken some one of the articles of peace or security, and our transgression shall have been shown to four barons of the aforesaid twenty-five, those four barons shall come to us, or, if we are abroad, to our justice, showing to us our error; and they shall ask us to cause that error to be amended without delay. And If we do not amend that error, or, we being abroad, if our justice do not amend it within a term of forty days from the time when it was shown to us, or, we being abroad, to our justice: the aforesald four barons shall refer the matter to the remainder of the twenty-five barons, and those twenty-five barons, with the whole land in common, shall distrain and oppress us in every way in their power,--namely, by taking our castles, lands and possessions and in every other way that they can, until amends shall have been made according to their judgment. Saving the persons of ourselves, our queen and our children. And when amends shall have been made they shall be in accord with us as they had been previously. And whoever of the land wishes to do so, shall swear that in carrying out all of the aforesaid measures he will obey the mandates of the aforesaid twenty-five barons, and that, with them, he will oppress us to the extent of his power. And, to anyone who wishes to do so, we publicly and freely give permission to swear; and we will never prevent any one from swearing. Moreover, all those in the land who shall be unwilling themselves and of their own accord to swear to the twenty-five barons as to distraining and oppressing us with them: such ones we shall make to swear by our mandate, as has been said. And if any one of the twenty-five barons shall die, or leave the country, or in any other way be prevented from carrying out the aforesaid measures,-the remainder of the aforesald twenty-five barons shall choose another in his place, according to their judgment, who shall be sworn in the same way as the others. Moreover, in all things entrusted to those twenty-five barons to be carried out, if those twenty-five shall be present and chance to disagree among themselves with regard to some matter, or if some of them, having been summoned shall be unwilling or unable to be present; that which the majority of those present shall decide or decree shall be considered binding and valid,

just as if all the twenty-five had consented to it. And the aforesaid twenty-five shall swear that they will faithfully observe all the foregoing and will cause them to be observed to the extent of their power. And we shall obtain nothing from any one, either through ourselves or through another, by which any of these concessions and liberties may be revoked or diminished. And if any such thing shall have been obtained, it shall be vain and invalid, and we shall never make use of it, either through ourselves or through another.

62. And we have fully remitted to all, and pardoned, all the ill-will, anger and rancour which have arisen between us and our subjects, clergy and laity, from the time of the struggle. Moreover we have fully remitted to all, clergy and laity, and—as far as pertains to us—have pardoned fully all the transgressions committed, on the occasion of that same struggle, from Easter to the sixteenth year of our reign, until the re-establishment of poace. In witness of which, moreover, we have caused to be drawn up for them letters patent of lord Stephen, archbishop of Canterbury, lord Henry, archbishop of Dublin, and the aforesaid bishops and master Pandulf, regarding that surery and the aforesaid concessions.

63. Wherefore we will and firmly decree that the English church shall be free, and that the subjects of our realm shall have and hold all the aforesaid libertles, rights and concessions, duly and in peace, freely and quietly, fully and entirely, for themselves and their heirs, from us and our heirs in all matters and in all places, forever, as has been said. Moreover it has been sworn, on our part as well as on the part of the barons, that all these above mentioned provisions shall be observed with good faith and without evil intent. The witnesses being the above mentioned and many others. Given through our hand, in the plain called Runnymede between Windsor and Stanes, on the fifteenth day of June, in the seventeenth year of our reign.

PREAMBLE.

We, the People of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Boundaries. Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri-as established by the constitution of that state, adopted June 12, 1820--crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Molnes river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the state of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the sald Missouri river at a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sloux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sloux river, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes, north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes, until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of the said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I.—BILL OF RIGHTS.

Rights of persons. Section 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

Political power. SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

Religion. Sec. 3. The general assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates, for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

Religious test. SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office of public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as it witness, or take the testimony of, any other person, not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

Dueling. SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

Laws uniform. SEC 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

Liberty of speech and the press. Scc. 7. Every person may speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the fruth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

Personal security. SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable selzures and searches, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

Trial by jury; due process of law. SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or properly, without due process of law.

Rights of persons accused. Sec. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life or liberty of an individual, the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him; to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and to have the assistance of counsel.

When indictment necessary. SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony, and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one bundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under eath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

Twice tried; bail. SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be ballable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses, where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

Habeas corpus. SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended or refused when application is made as required by law, unless, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

Military. SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

Quartering soldiers. SEc. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

Treason. SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them ald and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

Bail; punishments. SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

Eminent domain. Sec. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made, to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[Amendment.] The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains, and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

Imprisonment for debt. SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, or mense or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a military fine in time of peace,

Petition. Sec. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives; and to petition for a redress of grievances.

Attainder; ex post facto law; obligation of contract. SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

Resident allens. See. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment, and descent of property, as native-born citizens.

Slavery. Sec. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

Reservation of rents. SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

Rights retained. SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

ARTICLE II.-RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

Electors. SECTION 1. Every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote, sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Privileged from arrest. SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such elections, going to and returning therefrom.

From military duty. SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war or public danger.

Persons in military service. SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barracks, or military or naval place or station within this state.

Insane. SEC. 5. No idiot or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

Ballot. Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

General election. SEC 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

ARTICLE III.-OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

Departments of government. Section 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments: The legislative, the executive and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

General assembly. SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and a house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be—"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

Sessions. SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be blenniat and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

Representatives. SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Eligibility. SEC. 4. No person shall be member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years; be a male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one

year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county or district he may have been chosen to represent,

Senators. Smc. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

Number and classification. Sec. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

Elections determined. SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

Querum. Sec. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a small number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Authority of the house. Sec. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense, and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

Protest. SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

Privilege. SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to or returning from the same,

Vacancies. Sec. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor, or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

Doors open. SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

Adjournments. Sec. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

Bills. SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses,

Approval. SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him (Sunday excepted), the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had

signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disproves thereof.

Majority vote. SEc. 17. No bill shall be rassed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

Receipts and expenditures. SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws at every regular session of the general assembly.

Impeachment. SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oaths or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Who liable to; judgment. SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office, but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

Members not appointed to office. SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

Disqualification. Sec. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly. But offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster, whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

Failure to account. Sec. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

Money drawn. SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

Compensation of members. SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have the power to increase the compensation of its members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

Laws, when to take effect; publication. Sec. 25. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next, after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

Divorce. SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

Lotteries. Sec. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

Acts; one subject; expressed in title. SEC, 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

Local or special laws. Sec. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns:

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

Laws general and uniform; boundaries of counties. In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, east for and against it.

Extra compensation. Sec. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject-matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

Oath of members. Szc. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, be fore they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm, as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Census. SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the inhabitants of the state.

Senators; number; apportionment. SEC, 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held follow-

ing the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

Representatives; number; apportionment; districts. SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and sight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

Ratio and apportionment. Sec. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representations, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

Districts. Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district

Elections by general assembly. SEC. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce, and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Governor. Section 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the state of Iowa.

Election and term. SEC. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Lieutenant-governor; returns of elections. SEC. 3. There shall be a lieutenant-governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant-governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant-governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant-governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

Election by general assembly. SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes, for governor and lieutenant-governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal, and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant-governor, as the case may be.

Contested elections. SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant-governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Eligibility. SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant-governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

Commander-in-chief. SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

Duties. SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

Execution of laws. SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

Vacancies. SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

Convening assembly. Sec. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

Message, SEC, 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

Adjournment. Sec. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

Disqualification. SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or Heutenant-governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

Term; compensation of Heutenant-governor. Sec. 15. The official term of governor and lieutonant-governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

Pardons. Sec. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

Lieutenant-governor to act as governor. Scc. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant-governor.

President of senate. SEC. 18. The lieutenant-governor, shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided, and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

Vacancies. Sec. 19. If the lieutenant-governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

Scal of state. Sec. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the state of Iowa.

Grants and commissions. Sec. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the state of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the scoretary of state.

Secretary, auditor and treasurer. SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V.-JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Courts. Section 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district court, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time, establish.

Supreme court. SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

Judges elected. Stc. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme courts shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

Jurisdiction. Sec. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may by law prescribe; and shall have power to Issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

District court and judge, Sec. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

Jurisdiction. SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

Conservators of the peace. SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district court shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

Style of process. SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

Salaries. Sec. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or dimnished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

Judicial districts. SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts, and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or any increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.

[Amendment.] At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

When chosen. SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts, shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

Attorney-general. Sec. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney-general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

County attorney. Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year eighteen handred and eighty-six, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Carrying into effect. SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.

The grand jury. Sec. 15. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of the grand jury.

ARTICLE VI.-MILITIA.

Who constitute. Section 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may bereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state; and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.

Exemption. Sec. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

Officers, SEC, 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII.-STATE DEBTS.

Credit not to be leaned. Section 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

Limitation. Sec. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenue; or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Lesses to school funds. SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement, or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

War debts. SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Question of incurring debt submitted. SEC, 5. Except the debts here-Inbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

Legislature may repeal. SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may at any time forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrepealable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Tax imposed distinctly stated. Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

ARTICLE VIII.—CORPORATIONS.

How created. Section 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Property taxable. SEc. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

State not to be a stockholder. SPC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

Municipal corporation. SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Act creating banking associations. SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto, shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

State bank. SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

Specie basis. Sec. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills and other issues intended for circulation as money.

General banking law. SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest-paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the city of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of such stock, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning said stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

Stockholders responsible, SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held, for all its liabilities accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

Bill-holders preferred. SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

Suspension of specie payments. SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

Amendment or repeal of charters; exclusive privileges. Sec. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.-EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

1.—EDUCATION.

Board of education. SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant-governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

Who eligible. Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

How elected. SEC, 8. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

First session. Sec. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

Limited. SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

Secretary. SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

Rules and regulations. SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published, and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

Power to make, SEC, 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed, they shall not be reenacted by the board of education.

Governor ex-officio a member. Sec. 9. The governor of the state shall be, ex-officio, a member of said board.

Expenses. Sec. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

State university. SEC, 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution, and no other.

Common schools. SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school, as aforesaid, may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

Compensation. SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the term of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

Quorum; style of acts. Sec. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the board of education of the state of Iowa."

Board may be abolished. SEC. 16. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2.—SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS,

Under control of the general assembly. SECTION 1. The educational and school fund and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

Persiment fund. SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

Lands appropriated. Sec. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or helr, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

Fines, etc., how appropriated. SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent from exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied in the several counties for which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools or the establishment of libraries, as the beard of education shall from time to time provide.

Proceeds of lands. SEC, 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts

and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly, as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

Agents of school funds. SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same that, by law, receive and control the state and county revenus, for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

Distribution. SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

ARTICLE X.-AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

How proposed; submission. Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and mays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

More than one. SEC, 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same 'me, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall yote for ... against each of such amendments separately.

Convention. SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of electates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI.-MISCELLANEOUS.

Jurisdiction of justice of the peace. Section 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to roal estate may arise), where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

Counties. SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

Indebtedness of political or municipal corporations. SEC, 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any meanur, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

Boundaries. Sec. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

Oath of office. SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

How vacancies filed. Sec. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Land grants located. SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

Sent of government; state university. Sec. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.-SCHEDULE.

Supreme law. SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

Laws in force. Sec. 2. All laws now in force, and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

Proceedings not affected. SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, plaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law, and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial, and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been had not this constitution been made.

Fines inure to the state. Sec. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeltures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

Bonds in force. SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

First election for governor and lieutenant-governor. SEC. 6. The first election under this constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant-governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

For secretary, suditor, etc. Sec. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney-general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress, and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (except the superintendent of public instruction), and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight; provided that the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

For judges of supreme court. Sec. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

First session of general assembly. Sec. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

Senators. SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

Offices not vacated. SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution (except as in this constitution otherwise provided), shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

Judicial districts. SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

Submission of constitution. SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight handred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "new constitution-yes." Those against the constitution, "new constitution-no." The elections shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of this state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twentyfifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

Proposition to strike out the word "white." SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white," from the article on the "right of suffrage." shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection, in the manner following, viz.: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box. And those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "shall the word 'white' be stricken out of the article on the 'right of suffrage?' no." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition, shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "white" shall be stricken from said article and be no cart thereof.

Mills county. SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.

Blennial elections. SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held blennialy thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, Heutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney-general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The term of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd-numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers, whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law gov. erning the time of election and terms of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and blennially thereafter.

Originally adopted in convention at Iowa City, the fifth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1846, there being 9,482 votes cast "for the constitution" and 9,035 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to congress in December, 1845, and on the 28th of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the Union. The first election for state officers was held on the 26th day of October, 1846, pursuant to proclamation of Gov. James Clarke, when Ansel Briggs was elected governor; Elisha Cutler, Jr., secretary of state; Joseph T. Fales, auditor, and Morgan Reno, treasurer.



The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$5,000 and an allowance of \$600 for house rent, and \$1,200 for services as member of the executive council.

No person shall be eligible who shall not have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attaind the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with the respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate,

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

Term of incumbent ends January, 1919,

ERNEST R. Moore, Cedar Rapids, Linn County. Born in Iowa.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed,

The Beutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and double the per diem of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state. He is elected by the people for a term of two years, and receives a salary of \$3,600 a year. He is ex officio a member of the executive council. He is also ex officio a member of the hoard of trustees of the state library and the historical department of flowa and of the state board of health.

The secretary of state countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor, and keeps a record thereof in the executive register.

The enrolled copies of the constitutions and the laws of the state, the authenticated copies of the journals of the senate and house of the general assemblies, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. He prepares for publication certain laws and resolutions passed by the general assembly, and is charged with the work of distributing the codes, code supplements and session laws.

Certificates of nomination and all papers and records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office.

All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the consolidation or abundonment of municipal corporations are transmitted to him and preserved as a part of the permanent records of his office.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations, as well as all amendments thereto, are filed and recorded in his office, and certificates of authority to transact business within the state of Iowa are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

Applications for the registration of motor vehicles are also filed with him, and he assigns and keeps a record of the numbers issued.

He edits, publishes and distributes the Iowa Official Register, and is required by law to place therein historical, political and other statistics and facts of general value, but nothing of a partisan character.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey, and other papers and documents of the state land office are in his custody. Patents for school, university, agricultural college, railroad, swamp and other lands, are prepared in the land office, and, when signed by the governor, are countersigned by the secretary of state and recorded in the patent record books in the land department. He makes a biennial report to the governor of the transactions of this department.

Iowa corporations organized for pecuniary profit, and all foreign corporations authorized to do business in this state, are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay him an annual fee of one dollar each. The secretary of state is required to send, during May and June of each year, to each corporation of record in his office, a notice, advising as to the provisions of the law, and a blank for use of the corporation in making report. On receipt of annual report and fee, the secretary of state is required to issue to the corporation an annual permit.

The registration in the office of the Secretary of State is required to be made of all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization, its agents or representatives may lawfully solicit public donations in any county, city, or township in Iowa except within the county or adjoining counties in which such association or institution is located.

An important branch of the work in the office of the secretary of state is that relating to the administration of the so-called Blue Sky Law, the same being an act passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

The statute is similar in character to those passed in many of the other states during the past fewe years, and the principle thereof has recently been upheld by the supreme court of the United States.

Although this law has only been in effect for a short time, it has resulted in great good in protecting the people of the state against gross fraud and imposition.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property.

also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheat estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the banking department, the municipal department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of lean and trust companies and building and lean associations; he appoints the bank examiners, the building and lean examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, and is also a member of the state geological board and ex-officio member of the state board of health. He is also chairman of the state board of audit.

The banking department was made a separate department by an act of the 37th general assembly which becomes effective on July 4, 1917.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the time received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the state auditor. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasury department until the depository receiving the deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof. county treasurers, auditors and superintendents of schools and all state officers, boards or commissions are required to remit to the state treasury, on or before the 15th of each month, all moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the city of Des Moines as depositories of state funds. Each bank so designated shall give bonds to be approved by the executive council, and shall pay interest on dally balances at such rate and at such times as may be agreed by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the

approval of the executive council. At this time such depositories pay interest monthly at the rate of two per cent per annum.

It is the special duty of this department to enforce the law imposing a tax upon collateral inheritances. Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the state auditor and a record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom payable, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. All accounts of each state institution under the board of control are paid by checks issued by this department in favor of the person to whom the account is payable. These accounts are not paid until after they have been audited by the board of control and an abstract of the total amount due on account of each institution and the names and postoffice addresses of the persons to whom each of the several accounts are payable has been forwarded to this department by the board of control. together with a warrant or warrants of the auditor of state to cover the total amount to be paid. The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the State Agricultural College. This fund amounts to about \$680,000 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. Only the interest may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The accounts of the department are examined once each quarter by the auditor's department and may be examined by the governor at any time. The total receipts of the department for the fiscal period ending June 30, 1916, were \$18,928,461.86, including agricultural endowment and interest fund.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years and has since 1897 occupied offices at the state house,

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly, or either house thereof, the governor, Heutenant-governor, Becretary of state, auditor, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, and other state departments.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

In addition to the above, the attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, whose duty it is to examine and pass upon the qualifications of all applicants for admission to the bar.

The clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, keep a complete record of the proceedings of the court, file all printed matter and papers in cases, issue orders to carry out the directions of the supreme court, file and enter of record opinions of the supreme court, deliver them to the reporter for the purpose of publication, and when so published and returned, keep the original on file; to collect all fees and costs as shown of record and make disbursements of same as provided by law; to certify to record and announce to attorneys rulings made or decisions rendered, and perform all other duties pertaining to his office.

The Work of the Department of Public Instruction. The duties of the super-intendent of public instruction are numerous and varied. They may be classified as educational, quasi-judicial, and ex-officio.

Educational. Among the duties of an educational nature may be named his general supervision over the county superintendents of the state, which necessitates his meeting with these officers at least twice each year, and the publication of numerous circulars of instruction and suggestion. He is at the head of the public school system of Iowa, and his duties as such leader are to ap-

point institutes, and approve institute faculties. He is required by law to promote among the people of the state a proper interest in the general subject of education. including industrial and commercial education, agriculture, manual and vocational training, domestic science and continuation work. Also to classify and define various public schools belonging to his department, and to formulate suitable courses of study therefor, and to publish and distribute such classileations and courses of study. It is also his duty to collect statistics, and report on education, and educational questions, and the condition of the public schools of the state, and to publish them in reports and pamphlets. Among the publications that have become a part of the educational needs of the state and are of national note may be named: The Manual of Methods for the Elementary Schools of Iowa, Special Day Book, Educational Directory, Proceedings of the Inwa State Teachers' Association, Summary of Standards for Approved Graded and High Schools, Approved High School Bulletin, Reference Books for the Approved High Schools of Iowa, Outlines in Agriculture, Domestic Science and Manual Training, Regulations Governing the Issuance of Uniform County Certificates, Outlines of Psychology and School Management, Outline of Music for Normal Training High Schools and Normal Training Courses in Four Year High Schools, and Iowa Day. Many others of minor importance on various subjects are published.

In order to aid him in organizing and classifying the public schools of the state, the superintendent of public instruction is permitted by law to appoint one normal training inspector, two graded and high school inspectors, and one inspector of rural and consolidated schools. He is also empowered to distribute to the normal training schools and the consolidated schools certain aid which is set aside for these schools under certain conditions. It is his duty to pass upon them finally, and to determine what schools shall receive state aid.

For the purpose of increasing the facilities for training teachers for the rural schools by requiring a review of such common branches as may be deemed essential by the superintendent of public instruction, and for instructions in elementary pedagogy, and the art of teaching elementary agriculture and home economics, provision is made for normal courses of study and training in such approved four-year high schools as the superintendent of public instruction may designate.

Judicial. The quasi-judicial duties of the superintendent of public instruction include the hearing of appeals from the decisions of county superintendents, the rendering of opinions, in writing, when requested by school officials (but in fact opinions are rendered to all who request them) and publication of the school laws and notes on the same, and pamphlets containing session laws.

Ex-officio duties. The superintendent of public instruction is ex-officio member of the Iowa library commission, president of the educational council, president of the State Teachers' Reading Circle board, and president of the Educational Board of Examiners.

As executive of the Educational Board of Examiners, a great amount of responsibility is incurred, since all licenses to teach are issued under authority of this board, and the work is conducted under his personal supervision.

Miscellaneous. In addition to the duties enumerated above he reports blennially to the governor on the conditions of the public schools of the state, and makes suggestions and recommendations as investigation and experience dictate. He must keep a complete account of the expenditures on account in his department and the Educational Board of Examiners and report the same to the executive council. He also accepts many calls from rural and city communities to meet with them and discuss such school questions as may confront the school officials. This is especially true under the present system of developing the consolidated schools, of which 230 have already been organized.

REPORTER OF THE SUPREME COURT AND EDITOR OF THE CODE.

- To analyze the official opinions of the Supreme Court (numbering fully 400 each year), and therefrom to write the syllabl and head notes to each case and to cause the same to be printed, bound, indexed and supplied with a table of cases.
- 2. To prepare and cause to be published the acts of each session of the general assembly.
- 3. To prepare and cause to be published biennially a cumulative supplemental supplement to the Code, thereby compiling all general statutes to date.
 - 4. To keep each and every section of the general statutes annotated to date,
- 5. To cause each opinion of the Supreme Court, wherever it appears as an annotation, to be cited not only under the volume and page of the official Iowa Reports but under the volume and page of all other series of reports where the same may appear. In a general way, this includes the following series of reports: Iowa Reports, Northwestern Reports, American Decisions, American Reports, American State Reports, American Annotated Cases (embracing American and English Annotated Cases), Negligence and Compensation Cases Annotated, and Lawyers' Reports Annotated.

The reporter, in his work and in all his expenditures, is under the direction of the judges of the Supreme Court.

The official reports are published, likewise under the direction of said judges, under contract with responsible bidders. The present contract expires June 1, 1920.

His regular employees are Miss Mary A, Reid, deputy, and Mrs. Maude L. Easiman, deputy, each at a salary of \$100.00 per month, and Mrs. Emma A. Snook, clerk and stenographer, at a salary of \$75.00 per month.

The powers and duties of the board of rallroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all rallroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical conditions, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent rallroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate, and report upon the annual reports filed with it by rallroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporations; to issue subpoenas, administer caths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prime facle evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause; or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before any rallway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grado crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used, consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public lands, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

To investigate and present matters with reference to intrastate rates to the board of railroad commissioners; to investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, cases involving interstate rates in which Iowa is interested,

and present the same to the interstate commerce commission if the board so directs.

The attorney general in an opinion holds that the railroad commission may, by resolution, direct the commerce counsel and his assistants to assist the department of justice in the state and federal courts, in cases involving orders made by the railroad commission.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following:

To purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers, including the state printer.

The execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs, blank books, etc.

The approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plans for liquidation of said associations,

The custody of paper and supplies for state printer and other state officers. The assessment of railway, express, sleeping and equipment car, telegraph and telephone properties.

The classification of railways.

The making of tax levies for state purposes and the certification of the same to the several county auditors.

The certification of tax valuations, fixed by the executive council, to the several county auditors.

The adjustment of property valuations between counties.

The canvass of votes cast for state and district officers.

The compilation of a state census once in ten years (next 1920).

The declaration of changes in classification of cities.

The compilation and publication of annual reports of (a) railway, express, sleeping and equipment car assessments, (b) telegraph and telephone assessments and (c) of the biennial report of expenses of all state departments.

The determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money,

The making of annual settlement with all state officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code, 1913.

The assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building.

The appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors.

The approval of bonds by depositaries of state funds.

The fixing of reserve lists of state documents and publications and the approval of requisitions for documents and publications within said reserve list.

To dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses.

To approve rules for uniformity of assessments in counties.

To approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid.

The approval of plans of doing business by certain investment companies.

The approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions.

To determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof.

STATE BOARD OF AUDIT.

The State Board of Audit was created by the thirty-sixth general assembly and is composed of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his assistants, and the secretary of the executive council or his first assistant.

It is the duty of this board to audit all claims except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the Iowa Board of Control of State Institutions and the Iowa State Board of Education. Before approving any claim it is the duty of this board to determine that such claim is fully and clearly authorized by law; that the officer, board, commission, department or executive council empowered to authorize the creation of the claim has granted or authorized the same and has certified the fact to the board of audit; that all the legal requirements have been observed, including notice and competition, if required by law; that the claim is in proper form and duly verified and that the charges are reasonable, proper and correct.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine; that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessary devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof. The board will require information relative to any and all other matters which will all it in performing its duties and protecting the interests of the state, and may require a strict compilance with said rules before auditing any claim.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier-general, who is chief of staff and acting quartermaster-general, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of major, and twelve aids who have the rank of lieutenant-colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the twelve aids may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aid in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and his duties. He holds office for a period of four years, first period starting July 4, 1915, and also performs the duty of quartermaster-general in addition to his duties as adjutant general. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes and receives and issues all quartermaster and ordnance stores and camp equippage upon the order of the commander-in-chief. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commanderin-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All mister rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the organized militia are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil and Spanish-American wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the dishursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the organized militia and as acting quartermaster-general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the militia, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the organized militia of the state as the secretary of war may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing its organized militia or by orders and regulations.

In addition to his duties as adjutant general the thirty-sixth general assembly required that he should perform the duties of custodian of the capital grounds and public buildings.

It is the duty of the custodian to take charge of and protect the capitol building and all furniture and other property connected therewith, to preserve the same from injury; to control and take care of the capitol grounds, walks, fences, trees, shrubbery, statuary and other property of the state; to take charge and have control of all buildings and grounds at the seat of government, not by law placed in charge of some other person; to appoint the necessary employes; to make sworn statement at the end of each month of expenses incurred, and to make a report to the governor on or before the last day of September preceding each regular session of the general assembly of all transactions during the blennial period,

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The office of Iowa Industrial Commissioner was created by chapter 147, acts of the thirty-fifth general assembly. The measure relates to employers' liability for personal injury sustained by employes in line of duty, fixing compensation therefor, securing the payment thereof and providing for the appointment of a commissioner and defining his duties.

The commissioner, by and with the consent of the executive council, may appoint a secretary at a salary of not to exceed \$1,500 per year, and such other clerks and employes as may be deemed necessary. The commissioner may make rules and regulations, not inconsistent with law, for carrying out the provisions of the act.

He is given the power to subpoena witnesses, administer caths and to examine such books and records of the parties to a proceeding or investigation as relate to questions in dispute or under investigation.

There are numerous other duties to be performed by the commissioner and he is, generally speaking, in a large measure the administrative officer of said act.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and is charged with the execution of the laws relating to insurance. All powers vested in, and all duties imposed upon the auditor of this state, relating in any way to insurance matters prior to July 1, 1914, were on that date vested in and made incumbent upon the commissioner of insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state, covering in detail their financial condition, evidence of solvency and methods and practices of their officers and agents. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The actuary and chief examiner are in charge of the examination work which is continuous. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices. A written report of the findings of the examiners is filed with the department as a permanent record.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. A daily and monthly balance is mainained, showing the amount of securities on deposit to the credit of each company. Each security deposited is carefully examined and, before acceptance, must comply with the statutes governing investment of insurance funds. The companies and associations are required to keep their deposit up to the amount prescribed by law. No company or association is permitted to withdraw securities sufficient to bring the amount below the reserve required to be maintained on deposit. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associations on deposit in this department on January 1, 1917, was \$76,694,834.20.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance,

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations, and amendments thereto must also have his approval. No policles can be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department. The value of the supervision required to be exercised over all companies, associations and societies authorized to transact business in the state, and the surveillance of those attempting to do insurance business in Iowa, can hardly be estimated. As the insurance business in the state has increased from year to year this supervision has become the more necessary and important to the citizens of the state,

The thirty-sixth general assembly created the office of state document editor and defined his duties to be to "edit, revise and prepare manuscripts" of all state publications, and to "supervise the printing, binding and distribution of all reports, documents and publications" of the state. It was also provided that the document department then under direction of the secretary of state be transferred. The distribution of all state publications, other than those which are for sale, is under this department, and also the publishing of the legislative journals and bills. The present incumbent was appointed by Governor Clarke to take office July 1, 1915.

Chapter 132, laws of the twentieth general assembly of 1884, provided for the creation of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office.

The work as outlined in the above act was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The work was carried on with success by the different commissioners and assistants and proved its value to the commercial and manufacturing interests of the state, also to the workers who were given an opportunity from time to time to express their views on the surrounding conditions, their desires for more favorable legislation, for better sanitation, ventilation, and more efficient means of protection in the operation of dangerous machinery. These reports from the working people, strengthened by actual personal investigation made by the commissioners and exemplified in their reports, proved the necessity for periodical and systematic inspection of the factories and workshops by competent persons whose time could be devoted to their work. The frequent appeals thus made, backed by a desire on the part of our legislators that Iowa should not be relegated to the rear in the general march for improvement, resulted in the passage, in 1902, of a law providing for such inspection and the enforcement of requirements made, together with means for the support of men assigned to the work. A great step in advance was thus made and the work has progressed by using up-to-date methods, similar to those in vogue in the older manufacturing states, thus establishing the most important feature of the work of the department. All classes of establishments where labor is employed have been visited, a long list of improvements have been made tending toward both safety and comfort, and proof is evident that the money provided was well expended.

The passage of the workmen's compensation law materially facilitated cooperation between employers and the bureau because of the recognition of the principle that prevention of accidents means economy in management.

Up to the close of 1905 no efficient means of restricting the employment of children had been provided. The existing law required that children under 14 should attend school 16 consecutive weeks in each year, but children of any age could be put to work all the remainder of the year, many children of tender age were found in the factories and stores. To remedy this evil the thirty-first general assembly in 1906 enacted a law probibiting the employment of children under 14 in factories, workshops, stores and some other places specified, at any time, under penalty. The work of enforcement was placed in the hands of the commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics and his assistants. The law has been partly self-enforcing. A number of employers who had been employing children under the age limit dismissed them voluntarily. Only a few employers have shown a disposition to oppose the enforcement of the law, and when proof was given them by inspectors that they were violating it, they dismissed all under the age limit at once, thus giving no immediate cause for prosecution. A better condition prevails in Iowa now than heretofore, and by persistent effort on the part of members of the department conditions will continue to improve and a nearer approach to the Ideal condition will be attained.

In this connection it should be noted that the thirty-sixth general assembly amended the former law by including a greater number of employments in the restriction list and also limiting the hours of service of children between 14 and 16 years of age to 8 per day and 48 per week, and also restricting children in the street trades in cities of 10,000 and over.

In the line of progressive legislation by the thirty-sixth general assembly, the child labor law of 1906 was revised to harmonize with improved standards.

The thirty-sixth general assembly appreciating that modern employment is assuming more and more that which is well termed "seasonable employment," also that the idle man is industrial waste, made provision for a state free employment bureau in connection with the bureau of labor statistics.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed; thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison walls, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. The law which provided for the fixing of a definite time of prison service by the judge before whom the trial was had, contemplated punishment for the particular crime; in other words, forfeiture of liberty on account of guilt, for a length of time which in the judgment of the judge would be the penalty the man should suffer. Hence, the oft repeated remark that a prisoner "has served as long as he should be required to serve for what he did."

The maximum sentence contemplates the keeping of a man in prison not alone for punishment, but for discipline, training, education and reformation, as well as example by which others may profit or be deferred from committing crime: this involves the consideration of past life, opportunities, environment, mental ability, criminal tendencies or want of them, and evidences of reformation and change in desires and ambitions. Boards of pardon and parole have time and opportunity to investigate all these things. The object of the parole law is, that the man who gives evidence of the fact that he will be a law abiding citizen if given his liberty, shall be released on parole, always taking into account what would be a reasonable term to be served as an example. The marked difference between the definite term fixed when sentence is pronounced and the indeterminate sentence is that the first is for punishment on account of a particular crime and the second contemplates not only the protection of society, but the study of the individual and the handling of him with a view of securing reformation from other causes than simply fear of imprisonment, which is not reformation at all. On the trial of a man indicted for crime, guilt or innocence may be established by evidence, but the evidence proper to be used for that purpose will not determine what the man has been, or is, except as one may conclude from the single illegal act of which he is found guilty. The paroled man is kept under the control and supervision of the board of parole and in the custody of the warden of the prison; employment is found for him, he is placed in charge of some one whose duty it is to be in constant touch with him, to aid and encourage him, and keep the board advised of his conduct. The time he is on parole is not deducted from his prison sentence, so if returned to prison, he must serve the balance of his sentence, unless paroled again. The prisoner, however, cannot be kept in prison longer than the maximum time provided by statute for the crime for which he was convicted. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison. This reformatory method of handling prisoners had its origin in the law establishing the Elmira Reformatory in the state of New York in 1869. Now more than half of the states in the union have adopted it, and in most cases the laws closely follow the system as then approved in the state of New York. No state enacting laws providing for the maximum sentence and parole provisions has ever repealed them. No state has yet adopted the absolutely indeterminate sentence; although such a sentence was advocated by the author of the New York law and is favored by practically all criminologists and those who have had experience in prison management and administration of parole laws. The law provides that the board of parole shall have the power to parole, under such rules and regulations as it may adopt, all prisoners committed to the reformatory or penitentiary excepting those sentenced for life. When such life sentence is passed other than for murder in the first degree the consideration of those cases is primarily with the governor who, upon application for pardon or commutation of sentence, refers them to the board for advice. The law also provides that in cases of life sentence for murder in the first degree applications for pardon shall be referred to the board of parole by the governor for advice and recommendation before he passes upon them.

The office of dairy commissioner was established May 1, 1886. On July 4, 1906, the office became that of the food and dairy commissioner. On July 4, 1907, the food law became effective and the work of the department was also increased by the passage of the commercial feeding stuffs and agricultural seed law. Later enactments make the department responsible for the laws governing the sale of paint, linseed oil, turpentine, calcium carbide and commercial fertilizer. The 35th general assembly also gave the department the enforcement of the sanitary law, which provides for the proper sanitation of all food

producing establishments; the weight and measure law which provides for scale inspection and for general supervision of weights and measures and the use of such apparatus in connection with the purchase or sale of merchandise; and the cold storage law, which provides for the making of reports of stocks and gives the commissioner and assistants supervision over food products held in storage and limits the time that foods may be cold stored.

The total annual expenditures amount to approximately \$75,000. The term "food" is defined as including all articles used as food, drink, confectionery or condiment by man or beast. The inspectors employed by the dairy and food department are given authority to enter all places of business where food products are manufactured, stored or sold and all wagons used in the transportation of such products and authority is given for taking samples of any goods offered or exposed for sale within the state. The department issues licenses to all users for commercial purposes of the Babcock test. The fee for the license is \$2.50 per year for each operator. Milk inspection is extended to all incorporated cities and towns and a license fee of \$1.00 a year is required of all persons selling milk from stores or vehicles.

A license fee of \$3.00 is collected for each scale or weighing device where a fee is charged for weighing and the same license is required of all bakeries, candy factories, ice cream factories, canning factories, slaughter houses and meat markets. Cold storage plants are required to pay an annual fee of \$25. Condimental stock foods and tonics are included within the term "commercial feeding stuffs" and each manufacturer is required to pay a license fee of \$100 annually.

The state printer and the state binder are elepted by the general assembly at regular sessions biennially.

By act of the 37th general assembly the positions of Printer and Binder were abolished at the end of the terms of the present incumbents, after that time contracts will be made upon competitive bids for all printing and binding.

THE STATE PRINTER.

The state printer is required to maintain his office at the seat of government and provide a printing plant of sufficient capacity and equipment to print the laws, journals, reports and do all other printing required for the state officers, boards or commissioners having their offices at the capitol, or by or for the general assembly, under schedule prices for composition and presswork and provisions for measurement established by the general assembly and set forth in detail in the code and the session laws.

The statutes make provision for the various reports to be printed and the number of each is determined by the state document editor, subject to review on appeal to the governor and all printing which is not specifically provided for by statute is authorized and ordered by a system of requisitions, bills for same to be audited and checked by the state document editor and duly approved before ordered paid.

All paper stock used by the state printer is purchased by the state through the executive council, and the stock is in charge of the secretary of the executive council, who issues same to the state printer upon the regulstion of the latter, charging same against him, items of credit being obtained by the state printer to offset the debit charges by measurement and computation of amount of paper stock used by the printer and returned to the state in printed documents, blanks and stationery.

There is no fixed salary for this office, the state printer receiving as his entire compensation the amounts named in the schedules of prices fixed by the statutes for printing actually done and delivered to and accepted by the state. He is required to furnish a bond to be approved by the governor for faithful performance of duty, and is liable also under same for any shortage that might occur in paper stock when an accounting of same is made.

THE STATE BINDER,

The state binder is required to maintain an office at the state capitol equipped with machinery and appliances sufficient to do the state work. He is required to give a bond for the faithful performance of his duty and for state property which comes into his hands. He furnishes his own building, light, heat and power, as well as machinery.

He binds all books and publications printed by the state printer. The printed sets of laws, journals and other publications, which are to be folded, stitched or bound, are delivered to the state binder by the state printer and a receipt is given therefor. The state binder furnishes all material except paper required in book binding. All leather, cloth, thread, gold leaf, glue, paste, and other materials are purchased and furnished by the state binder without expense to the state.

The state binder receives no salary, but is paid for his work by the piece on a schedule of prices specified by law. His compensation comes from the profit on the work performed and delivered. He is held responsible for loss or damage by fire or other cause to state work which is in his possession.

On the completion of a job of binding, the books or pamphlets are delivered to the document room, the supply department, or to other departments, as the case may be, and he receives a receipt therefor for every article, book or pamphlet delivered.

The style of binding, whether to be sewed or stitched, with paper, board, cloth or leather covers, or without covers, is all specified by law and the number of copies in each style of binding is named in the statute. Some discretion, however, is allowed the document editor in regard to the number of copies of reports and documents to be printed and bound, as the demand for them may vary from year to year.

The state printer and the state binder submit their bills for work done to the document editor. He is required by law to audit the bills, and to certify to the state board of audit the amount which each of said officers is entitled to receive for the work specified. The state board of audit then makes an additional audit thereof and certifies the approved amounts to the auditor of state, who thereupon draws his warrants therefor.

The duties of the fish and game warden, as defined by chapter 15 of the code, are as follows:

He shall make blennially a report to the governor of his doings, together with such information for the protection of fish and game as he may think proper. He shall make monthly an itemized statement to the executive council under oath of all moneys expended and for what purpose, and the number and varieties of fish distributed and in what waters; also all prosecutions made under the law. He shall have charge of the re-stocking and distribution of fish to the public waters of the state, and shall impartially and equitably distribute the same. He shall faithfully and impartially enforce obedience to the provisions of the fish and game laws. He may suspend for a specified period specified portions of fish and game laws and issue permits authorizing the persons to whom said permit is issued, to take from certain designated lakes of the state, having an area of not less than two square miles, certain fish designated in said permit in any quantities and for all purposes. He shall not permit seining in said lakes between the first day of December and the fitteenth day of June.

He may grant certificates to proper parties to collect birds, their nests or eggs for acientific purposes. He shall seize and take possession, without warrant, any fish, birds or animals which have been caught, taken or killed, at any time, in a manner or for a purpose or had in possession or under control,

or have been shipped contrary to law, and shall sell the same for the purpose of paying any costs, and balance of proceeds, if any, shall be turned into the school fund of the county in which the seizure is made. He shall seize and destroy or sell without warrant or process, any net, seine, trap, contrivance, material, and substance whatever while in use or had and maintained for the purpose of catching, taking, killing, trapping or deceiving any fish, birds or animals contrary to the provisions of the fish and game laws. He may appoint such number of deputies as he may deem necessary, and their duties are to report all violations of the law, to make arrests where crime is committed In their province, and to ald the warden in the enforcement of the law. The provisions of the law make the state and game warden a state marshal, and it is his duty to ferret out offenders and bring them to justice.

By an act of the thirty-third general assembly, "no person shall hunt, kill or take any wild animal, bird or game in this state with a gun without first procuring a license." The fee for such license is one dollar a year for each citizen of the state and ten dollars a year for each non-resident or alien. The county auditors of the state issue the licenses. All licenses expire on the first of July of each year. Owners of land, their children and tenants are not required to procure a license to hunt on their own premises. Provision is made in the law for the amount of game that a non-resident may take from the state. Penalties are provided for the enforcement of the law. Another law of the thirty-third general assembly provides for an annual license under certain restrictions for the use of seines and nets in the Mississippi and Missouri rivers where they form part of the boundary line of the state.

By an act of the thirty-fifth general assembly, three district deputy wardens are provided for, to be appointed by the state fish and game warden. The state will be divided into districts with a man in charge in each as a general supervisor.

By an act of the thirty-sixth general assembly, no person shall keep game birds in possession for the purpose of propagation and sale, without first procuring a license from the State Fish and Game Warden, the fee for which is \$2.00.

The department of agriculture for the state of Iowa was created by legislative enactment of the twenty-eighth general assembly in the year 1900. The office of the department is in the northeast wing of the state capitol building, in the rooms formerly occupied by the Iowa state agricultural society (said society ceased to exist when the department of agriculture was created). The department is managed by a board, styled the state board of agriculture, of which the governor, president of the State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, state dairy and food commissioner, and state veterinarian are ex officio members; other members are a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and one member from each of the eleven congressional districts of the state. The president, vice president, and district members are chosen at the annual agricultural convention, which is composed of delegates from each of the county and district fairs, county farmers' institutes, state dairy association, horticultural society, improved stock breeders' association, and members of the state board of agriculture. The president and vice president are elected for a term of one year, and the district members for a term of two years. The secretary and treasurer are elected by the board.

It is the duty of the department to look after and promote the interests of agriculture, agricultural education, animal and other industries of the state; to investigate all subjects relating to the improvement of methods, appliances and machinery, and the diversification of crops and other products; also to investigate reports of the prevalence of contagious diseases among domestic animals, and the destruction of insects and fungus grasses, grains and other plants; the adulteration of foods, seeds and other products, and to report the results of such investigation, together with recommendations of remedial measures for the prevention of dangers resulting thereform. It is made the duty of the agricultural experiment station to co-operate with the department of agriculture in carrying on these investigations.

The passage of the pure food bill by the thirty-fifth general assembly, the bill for the regulation and prevention of frauds in the sale of agricultural seeds, and concentrated commercial feeding stuffs, passed by the thirty-second general assembly, the bills offered in the thirty-third general assembly for the destruction of noxious weeds, and the bill for the establishment of a live stock sanitary board, and the control and suppression of dangerous or infectious diseases of domestic animals, were all the results of careful investigations made by the department.

The department annually compiles and publishes the "Iowa Year Book of Agriculture." This book contains useful information upon various topics relating to agriculture, live stock, a review of the weather and crops for the pre-

ceding year, a synopsis of the work and proceedings of the state dairy and food department, state swine breeders' and state dairy associations, and such other matter as will be of interest to the farmer. It is also the duty of the secretary to carry out the provisions of the state law with reference to issuing state certificates of enrollment of all pure bred stallions and jacks and certificates of soundness for all grade stallions and jacks offered for public service, sale, exchange or transfer in the state of Iowa. It is also the duty of the secretary to prepare and send out the blanks, and receive the reports of the county and district fairs entitled to receive state aid, and the county farmers' institutes.

The thirty-third general assembly makes it the duty of the department to prepare and furnish blanks annually to the assessors for the purpose of listing the acreage and yield of farm crops, the number and value of live stock, and poultry and egg production.

By statute the state board of agriculture is made the custodian for the state fair and exposition grounds. It is also made the board of managers for the annual state fair and exposition. The state does not provide any support fund for the maintenance of the state fair, nor pay any of the yearly expenses or premiums of same, the statute providing that all expenditures connected with the holding of the fair must be paid out of the fair receipts. The title to the state fair grounds is in the name of the state of Iowa, all deeds and abstracts being on file in the state auditor's office.

The present investment of the state of Iowa in the fair grounds property, including the original appropriation of \$50,000.00 for the first frame buildings and the appropriations since 1902 for permanent buildings and additional ground total \$514.111.47.

The state fair grounds contains 283 1-3 acres, and was appraised by a committee well acquainted with real estate values in and around Des Moines, without taking into consideration any improvements, at \$459,783.03. The value of the buildings, personal property, etc., and as shown by the books of the department is \$739,606.45. Adding to this the value of real estate it gives the total value of the plant at \$1:199,389.48.

By deducting the total investment of the state in the fair grounds plant from the present value we have the surplus or profit to the state of \$855.-278.01.

This profit is largely due to the increased value of the real estate since the state acquired the title in 1885 and the many improvements added to the grounds in the past thirteen years from the profits of the fair.

Duties required of the state veterinary surgeon, include supervision of all contagious and infectious diseases among domestic animals, within the state and those in transit through the state; also to establish quarantine against infectious diseases, and to enforce laws respecting importations of stock for dairy or breeding purposes; and to co-operate with the local hourds of health and the United States department of agriculture in the eradication of contagious diseases among live stock, and take such action as the exigencies of the case may demand.

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the commission of animal health, the members of which are to be appointed by the governor and are to consist of the state veterinary surgeon, who is to be chairman and executive officer thereof, two veterinarians and two stockmen. When the terms of the members of the commission expire their successors are to be appointed, the veterinarians to serve for three years and stockmen to serve for two years.

The commission is to hold at least two meetings a year and it has power and authority to make such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the prevention, suppression and quarantine of diseases among animals in the state and those being driven or transported through or into Iowa. Such rules and regulations are to be effective when approved by the executive council.

The state veterinary surgeon and the two veterinarians on the board constitute a board for the examination of applicants to practice veterinary medicine, surgery and dentistry.

The members of the Animal Health Commission, other than the state veterinary surgeon, are to receive \$100 a year for their services and in addition thereto the veterinarians, other than the state veterinary surgeon, are to receive \$100 for their services as members of the examining board.

The accession list of the general, law and legislative reference departments of the state library on the first day of July 1916, included 142,841 volumes. The total accessions of the blennial period ending June 30, 1916, were 11,895 volumes. The historical department is separately reported.

The librarian notes with satisfaction the steadily growing utilization of the state library by advanced students of literature, philosophy, science and social problems, by debaters in the high school and colleges of the state; also by state legislators and those interested in state legislation. This satisfaction is enhanced by the steadily increasing ability of the library to satisfy the Wants of those who visit it with serious purpose. In fact the mission of the general library as a reference library—a final report for information in science the mechanic arts, the fine arts, biography, general history, literature and philosophy, is finding generous recognition with students, scholars, educators, legislators, clubs devoted to research work and the school, college and public libraries of the state. With a single additional assistant, a legislative reference bureau has been developed during the past few years, and the use made of the new bureau by legislators, legislative committee clerks and persons interested in legislation, has steadily increased to such an extent that legislative reference work must be extended and its efficiency increased in anticipation of the thereased demands certain to be made upon its resources. The thirty-fourth general assembly added greatly to the future efficiency of the state library, and contributed largely to the relief of the library board, by increasing the appropriation of the several departments as follows: The general library, from \$5,000 to \$6,000; the historical department from \$5,000 to \$6,000, and the law department and legislative reference bureau from \$4,000 to \$6,000. The inclusion of the legislative reference bureau is the first legislative recognition of that increasingly efficient area of the service beyond the appointment of an assistant for legislative reference work. The good work done without an appropriation, through aid rendered by the law and general libraries, gives much promise for the immediate future now that means are provided for its maintenance.

The law department of the state library has been materially strengthened by recent purchases bringing down to date several high-priced sets, and in other ways adding materially to the efficiency of that important department.

The completion of the valuable sets of standard periodicals, legal, scientific and miscellaneous, is one of the gratifying results of recent years, making the periodical feature of the library one of the strongest in the country.

The pressing need of the state library is a medical department that shall as effectively serve the medical profession as the library now serves the legal profession. A bill has been introduced in the thirty-seventh general assembly embodying this library need.

As now organized this department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical date relating to our own state and the territory of the middle west, of which it originally formed a part. Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time; works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy; works on the histories of all our wars from the earliest times; works relating to the North American Indians; county histories, maps, Iowa pamphiets, biographies of our noted men and women, printed or in manuscript; written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements: reports, catalogues and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state; in short, every species of data which can throw light upon local, state or western history. Two hundred ninety-five Iowa newspapers are currently received, and is endeavoring to acquire all Iowa papers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states. The library is especially strong in genealogy, local history and the history of the civil war.

The department publishes The Annals of Iowa, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages, which has now completed its twelfth volume. This is made up largely of original contributions in history and biography. By direction of the trustees it is sent free to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

In addition to the Annals, the historical department is to be credited with the following publications, viz., eleven blennial reports: "John Brown Among the Quakers and Other Sketches," by Hon. Irving B. Richman, "First Census of the Original Countles of Dubuque and Des Moines," edited by Dr. Benj. F. Shambaugh, "History of the Constitution of Iowa," by Dr. Shambaugh, Reprints of the laws of Iowa, 1838-39 and of 1839-40, and the hitherto unpublished journals of the council and house of representatives of the extra session of 1840. "Barly Settlement and Growth of Western Iowa," by Rev. John Todd, Rafinesque; life and biography, by T. J. Fitzpatrick; Downing's Civil War Diary, by Alexander G. Downing.

The department has secured one hundred and thirty-five fine oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, which are now on exhibition in the art gallery of the historical building, and has thousands of photographs and other black and white portraits and exhibits. More are promised in the near future.

The museum includes nine large cases for autograph letters, manuscripts and portraits; a collection of recent, aboriginal and prehistoric pottery found in our own state; a large collection of prehistoric implements, among which is an Iowa axe weighing 31% pounds—one of the largest ever discovered—with hundreds of flints; many teeth, tusks, and other bones of the mammoth and mastedon, all of which were found in Iowa; several large cases of birds found within our state; many Iowa mammals; a case of Indian baskets, bead work, implements and weapons, much of which were manufactured by the Mesquakte Indians of Tama county; a collection of arms—eannon, mortars, swivel suns, rifies, muskets, carbines, swords and pistols, in use during the Civil, Spanish and Philippine wars; and duplicates in bronze of most of the historic medals issued by the United States government.

Chapter 142 of the laws of the thirty-first general assembly made provision for the care and permanent preservation of the public archives by giving the state library and historical department custody of all the original public documents, papers, letters, records and other official manuscripts of the state executive and administrative departments, offices or officers, councils, boards, bureaus and commissions, ten years after the date of the current use of such public documents, papers, latters, records or other official manuscripts.

The act also provided that the public archives shall be housed in the historical, memorial and art building in rooms to be known as the hall of public archives.

Chapter 157 acts of the thirty-second general assembly provided that the executive council should superintend the arrangement, tabeling, filing and calendaring of the archives, the same to be delivered to the state library and historical department for preservation.

An act of the thirty-sixth general assembly provided that all of the duties and responsibilities of the executive council and the board of trustees of the state library and historical department with respect to the public archives are transferred to the curator of the historical department to be administered under the direction of the above board of trustees; empowers the curator to certify copies and otherwise hold the same relation to the archives transferred as, for instance, that of the secretary of state to such as originated in his office.

Besides the historical department the state library and the Iowa library commission are accommodated in the magnificent historical building which is now completed.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time the mining of coal in this state was in its infancy. But few large mines were in operation and the tonnage of coal was small as compared to that of the present time. Then but one inspector was needed. Owing to the growth of the coal industry the twenty-first general assembly amended the mining laws and provided for three inspectors, and gave the governor power to divide the state into three inspection districts. Today the entire time of the three inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general condition of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

In 1900 Iowa produced 5,117,285 tons of coal and employed 13,041 men, and in 1915 the coal production amounted to 7,530,088 tons, and 16,869 men were given employment in and around the mines. Between 250 and 300 mines are in operation in the 22 counties, which are divided into three inspection districts.

The first district includes the counties of Appanoose, Lucas, Taylor, Monroe (part), Wayne, Page and Adams. Mr. W. E. Holland of Albia, Iowa, is the inspector in this district, where mines employing 7,840 men, and producing 3,207,491 tons of coal during the calendar year 1915, are located.

The second district comprises the counties of Mahaska, Marlon, Monroe (part), Jasper, Keokuk, Van Buren, Davis, Jefferson, Wapello and Warren, Mr. Rhys T. Rhys of Ottumwa is inspector for this district. 1,846,065 tons of coal were produced by the mines of the second district in 1915, and employment was given to 4,142 men.

The third district comprises the counties of Polk, Webster, Boone, Greene, Guthrie, Scott and Dalias. Mr. Edward Sweeney of Des Moines is the inspector. During the calendar year 1915, the mines in this district produced 2,376,532 tons of coal and employed 4,385 men.

The State Board of Mine Examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

Under the provisions of the law the board of dental examiners must hold one or more meetings annually for the examination of applicants for Beense. An applicant must be in possession of a diploma from a four years high school or its equivalent, also for a reputable dental school (reputable being construed to be a college that maintains a course equal to that recommended by the National Board of Dental Examiners). No European diplomas are accepted. The fee for examination is \$20.00.

The passing grade is 80%. Practical examination in operative and prosthetic dentistry; written examination in anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, therapeutics, materia medica, anaesthesia, histology, hygiene, bacteriology, prosthetic dentistry, oral surgery, metallurgy, operative dentistry, orthodontia and jurisprudence.

The fee for interchange license is \$25.00 for exchange certificate is \$5.00. Iowa has reciprocity with District of Columbia, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wisconsin, Tennessee, Illinois, Missouri and Vermont.

Upon the payment to the board of the fee of \$25.00 a renewal license is issued to any one who failed to record his license with the county cierk within six months after its issue.

Duplicate license is issued to any one whose license has been lost or destroyed; fee for same is \$2.00.

The dental board is under the law concerning boards and commissions which provides that all moneys collected must be turned into the state treasury each month. A bill for expenses and per diem must be rendered to the executive council each month.

The members of the board receive \$10.00 per diem with expenses while the board is in session, but per diem and expense cannot exceed the amount of fees received from applicants.

Under the provisions of the law the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issues certificates to those qualifying.

The examination fee is \$25.00.

An applicant for examination must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state of Iowa: must be 25 years of age or more and of good moral character; must be a graduate of a high school with a four year course, have an equivalent education, or pass a preliminary examination by the board; must have had at least three years of practical accounting experience, at least one of which shall have been as a public accountant.

The board may register the certificate of any person who is the lawful holder of a certified public accountant's certificate issued under the laws of another state which extends similar privileges to certified public accountants of this state, or to holders of degree of certified public accountant or chartered accountant or the equivalent thereof, issued by any foreign government provided that the requirements of such certificate or degree are, in the judgment of the board, equivalent to those provided for lowa.

Practicing as a certified public accountant or chartered accountant or posing as such without having secured the necessary certificate is made a misdemeanor under the law.

Persons granted a certificate to practice, must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000.00.

Every person who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must be a registered pharmacist and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also their residence, together with the date of issuing their certificate.

Fee for examination and certificate, \$5.

The license fee for itinerant vendor of drugs is \$100 a year, and they are transferrable upon assignment and payment of a fee of one dollar to the secretary of the board.

The penalty for selling without a vendor license is not less than \$190 nor more than \$200.

COMPENSATION.

The members of the board receive \$900 per year and railroad expenses for services as members of the state board of health, medical examiners, embalmers, nurses and optometry. The sanitary engineer, who is also a member of the board receives the sum of \$2,500 per year, and necessary traveling and incidental expenses. The secretary receives \$2,000 per year, \$2,400 as secretary of the board of health, \$300 as secretary of the board of embalmers, and \$300 as secretary of the board of medical examiners; the assistant secretary \$1,200 per year; chief clerk \$900 per year; the director of the bacteriological laboratory receives his compensation from the state university. The chemist of the board has never received a salary but has received fees, but the office of state chemist has been abolished, and all chemical and general laboratory work is to be done hereafter in the state bacteriological laboratory provided for the state board of health by the legislature and is located at the state university, Iowa City, Iowa.

The state board of health has a general supervision of the lives and health of the people of the state and has power to make rules and regulations respecting the public health and declare that such rules and regulations when made shall have the force of legislative enactments.

The board through local boards of health establishes, maintains and releases quarantine; requires the disinfection of persons and premises exposed to contagion; supervises through its sanitary engineer the installing of water works systems, the construction of sewerage systems, and makes sanitary surveys through its sanitary engineer and the state laboratory of the board located at the state university, Iowa City. It investigates into the causes of diseases and issues to the people of the state instructions relative to the prevention of transmissible diseases and how to correct insanitary conditions in general which may exist in any part of the state.

The board also supervises the examination and registration of licensed embalmers. The result has been that the science and skill as well as the technique of the funeral director has been greatly improved and the public health has been better protected thereby. In connection with this work the board has adopted rules and regulations for the transportation of the dead so that bodies, dead of infectious diseases, may be so prepared as to be shipped without interference or danger to any point in the United States, Canada, Mexico, or Cuba. The rules for the shipment of corpses are the same in the countries just mentioned—the benefits of which can hardly be appreciated unless one is unfortunate enough to require such services.

The board also supervises the examination, and licenses those who desire to practice nursing as registered or graduate nurses.

It is required to make rules and regulations for the inspection of petroleum products; to determine the manner and methods, and to prescribe the instruments and apparatus to be used for the government of inspectors. Such rules and regulations shall be approved by the governor, and when so approved shall be binding upon all inspectors. It is the duty of the state board of health, to examine lamps and apparatus to be used, as shall be presented to such board, and test said lamps or apparatus, and if it shall find any lamp or apparatus to be safe, said board shall enter the findings of the board upon the records of the proceedings of said board. It is further made the duty of the board to fix a standard of purity of oils and other illuminating materials to be used in mines and to establish regulations for testing the same, and when so determined and established shall be recognized by all of the courts of this state.

It is the duty of this board to dispose of unclaimed bodies by directing to what medical college of the state such bodies shall be sent for anatomical purposes.

In addition to the above specified duties the board supervises the disinterment, burial and transportation of all dead bodies within the state and keeps a record of such disinterments and burials.

The board also has a thoroughly equipped and up-to-date bacteriological laboratory at Iowa City, in connection with the state university, where upon short notice tests are made to determine the presence of tuberculosis, typhoid fever, diphtheria, rables, etc., and where the best methods of disinfection are determined.

The physicians of the board of health and its secretary are constituted the members and secretary of the board of medical examiners and as such, determine the standing of medical colleges, examine their graduates, and license those who pass satisfactory examinations as physicians and osteopaths, with authority to refuse to issue certificates and to revoke those issued under certain specified conditions and the board also issues certificates on reciprocity with other states and is authorized to grant itinerant licenses.

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH LABORATORY.

The thirty-second general assembly, in providing for the state hygienic laboratory, made an appropriation of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) annually, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the salary of the director, assistants and the running expenses of the laboratory.

At the first meeting of the state board of health following the passage of chapter 101, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, it was decided at that time, on account of limited funds, a great deal of work which the laboratory should do in the interests of the public health must be postponed, and that the work of the laboratory must be limited to the routine diagnostic work in connection with diphtheria, typhoid fever, tuberculosis and rabies. Because of the action of the thirty-second general assembly, in appropriating six thousand dollars (\$6,000) annually, the laboratory is able to do more and better work than formerly. The bacteriological and chemical analyses of public water supplies are problems of great importance and the state board of health feels that these should receive more attention in the future than in the past, hence it would recommend that the secretary and the director of the bacteriological laboratory be consulted freely when the public health is eminently concerned as in epidemics of typhoid fever. On such occasions the director of the laboratory shall make or cause to be made an investigation of the epidemic and have such bacteriological and chemical analyses of water and other substances made as are necessary to the finding and the removal of the causes of such epidemics. The rapid diagnosis of a certain infectious disease like diphtheria, being of such great importance in order that proper treatment may be begun as soon as possible, the board has devised a method (which places the diagnosis outfits for the collection of material, in the hands of every physician) by establishing one or more culture stations in every city and town in the state where the diagnosis outfits are kept constantly on hand and given free of charge to all physicians.

Examinations are held in June and at such other times as may seem necessary.

Correspondence relating to practice of medicine or osteopathy should be sent to the secretary of this board.

Every person practicing medicine or osteopathy in the state is required to secure a certificate from this board.

Every physician or osteopath itinerating within the state is required to procure a special license.

The board is authorized to issue two classes of certificates; first to physicians, and second to esteopaths.

DEPARTMENT OF VITAL STATISTICS.

Compensation: State registrar receives no compensation; assistant receives 5900 per annum.

Indertakers and coroners are required on or before the 5th day of each month to return to the state registrar certificates of death that have come under their professional or official notice for the month preceding. Clerks of district court report, on forms prescribed by the registrar, all marriages and divorces recorded in their respective offices, and the city, town and township assessors collect the record of all births which they file with the clerk of the district court, and he reports the same to the registrar.

HOTEL INSPECTOR,

J. B. Heefner, Des Moines, Inspector of Hotels.

The civil engineer member of the state board of health was made inspector of hotels by an act of the thirty-third general assembly, but the thirty-skth general assembly amended the law and made it obligatory upon the part of the state board of health to appoint a hotel inspector, who shall devote all of his time to the inspection of hotels, and his office shall be located with the state board of health. Capitol building. The hotel inspector when appointed has power with the consent of the state board of health, to appoint deputies.

His salary is fixed at \$1,500.00 a year and it is made his duty to inspect every hotel once each year, or oftener on complaint of three or more patrons, and to require that the law relative to proper construction, fire escapes and cleanliness be enforced. Each hotel inspected is required to pay a fee to the inspector, which is to be turned into the state treasury.

STATE BOARD OF OPTOMETRY EXAMINERS.

The board consists of three optometrists appointed by the Governor from a list of registered optometrists recommended by the lowa State Association of Optometrists and one physician member of the State Board of Health appointed by the Governor. The Secretary of the State Board of Health acts as Secretary of this Doard.

The terms of all members of the board are for one year and expire June 30th each year. The members of the board receive five dollars a day for time actually employed. They also receive necessary traveling expenses. The fee for examination is fifteen dollars. Provision is made for the board upon the payment of a fee of ten dollars, to license without examination those who have practiced optometry continuously in the state for more than five years, provided application was made within six months prior to the passage of this act. Applicants are required to possess certain qualifications before they are admitted to examination. The board meets in the offices of the state board of health in the capitol building. The act creating the board does not apply to merchants or dealers who sell glasses as merchandise and who do not profess to be optometrists.

The law which provided for the organization of the Iowa Geological Survey outlined its work to be that of making "a complete survey of the natural resources of the state in their economic and scientific aspects, including the determination of the characteristics of the various formations and the investigation of the different ores, coals, clays, building stones and other useful materials."

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water resources, deposits of valuable minerals and other like topics. At present reports have been published on eighty-five counties of the state, including an area of 48,645 square miles. As fast as a sufficient number of counties are studied the reports on them are gathered together and published as one of the annual reports of the survey, together with maps of the counties included, showing roads, streams, towns and the various geological formations.

The second line of work has been the carrying on of special investigation of the various mineral resources of the state. Immediately upon the organization of the survey the coal deposits were made the object of study and what was known of their structure, character and the modes of their exploitation was published as volume II of the survey reports. More recently a fuller account, made possible by the greater development of the coal fields, together with papers on related subjects, has been issued in volume XIX. In the same volume are given the results of an extensive study of the peat deposits of northern Iowa. The gypsum beds of Fort Dodge also received early attention as did the lead and zino deposits of northeastern Iowa and the deep waters of the state. The preliminary report on gypsum is given in volume III and a more comprehensive report is found in volume XII, in connection with the report on the geology of Webster county. A report on lead and zinc appeared in volume VI and the result of a later and more detailed study of the Dubuque county deposits was incorporated in the report on the geology of that county, as found in volume XI.

What was learned of the deep wells of the state in the early studies was published in volume VI, and the subject has been studied continuously ever since. A report embodying all known data has been issued recently as volume XXI. The clays of the state received attention and are described in volume XIV, the quarry products are discussed in volume XVII, and the results of studies of the limestone, sand and gravel deposits of the state, with special reference to their value for road building and concrete purposes, are given in volume XXIV. A subject which will be of increasing importance as Iowa becomes more of an industrial center is that of water power. This is being made the object of close study and it is hoped to issue a report shortly. A green amount of work remains yet to be done before our knowledge of the geology of the state is complete, as much of the earlier study was of necessity largely reconnaisance work and needs to be supplemented by the results of later work done under more favorable conditions. Reports on the geology and physical geography of the entire state are now in process of preparation.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the elevations above see level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage projects. Farts of Hamilton, Boone, Story, Dallas, Polk, Warren, Marion, Mahaska, Lucas and Monroe counties have been covered. These maps are printed by the federal government and may be purchased at a cost of ten cents each from the United States geological survey or from the Iowa geological survey. They are bounded not by county lines but by meridians of longitude and parallels of latitude and each map covers about 225 square miles. Topographic surveys were made in the northeast part of Iowa by the United State Geological Survey a number of years ago and the maps covering this area are available also.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the Traveling Library previously under the State Library was transferred to the Commission.

The executive officer of the Commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the Commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries, and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, and the selection and purchase of books, in their classification and cataloging, the installation of modern methods and records whereby the efficiency of the library is greatly increased, the encouragement and information of library boards and the instruction of librarians. In addition addresses are made by the secretary before library boards, teachers' meetings, farmers' institutes and other public gatherings in the interest of libraries and reading throughout the state. All this help is available to communities and libraries without charge except the entertainment of the organizer when employed in a library.

- (2) The second activity of the Commission is the Traveling Library which is made up (a) of fixed groups of 50 volumes each for general reading by adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go where they are reloaned to individual borrowers free of charge; (b) of a general loan or subject collection for the use of students desiring material on specific subjects; (c) of books for the blind in New York Point loaned to any blind reader in the state; (d) of study club outlines and syllabi to assist in the preparation of programs; (e) picture collections for study club or exhibit purposes. These are all loaned with no charge except the cost of transportation, the books for three months and the pictures and outlines for two weeks,
- (3) A periodical clearing house is also maintained by the Commission for the purpose of adding small libraries in completing sets of standard periodicals without cost. (4) The work of publication includes the Iowa Library Quarterly, leaflets, lists and other material helpful in giving library information and increasing the reading of good books throughout the state.

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which constituted the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. From 1904 until 1913, work was carried on under this law.

The thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration in the state and created a commission of three men as outlined above. The office of the commission is located at the lowa State College and the duties prescribed by the law are such that an extensive organization is necessary. Under the law as amended by the thirty-sixth general assembly the duties of the commission are as follows:

First. To devise and adopt plans of highway construction suited to the needs of the different counties of the state.

Second. To disseminate information and instruction to road officers of the state.

Third. To issue an annual report to the governor relative to the opera-

tions of the commission.

Fourth. To appoint such assistants as are necessary to carry on the work of the commission.

Fifth. To make investigations as to conditions of road and bridge work in the counties.

Sixth. To have general supervision over the county and township officers in the state and to enforce the provisions of the road law.

Seventh. To devise plans and conduct negotiations between railroad and local officials for the elimination of danger at railroad crossings.

Eighth. To assist county boards of supervisors and the attorney general in defense of patent suits.

Ninth. To have charge of the survey and administration of meandered lakes.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly.

The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any building or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated condition, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arean or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrected.

Provision is made for the appointment of a deputy fire marshal at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars a year, and of a state inspector or inspectors,

known to be competent and skilled in the inspection of buildings and their contents, and of such other help as may be necessary. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by the mayor of incorporated cities and towns, and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns. An appropriation of \$18,500 a year is provided for defraying the expenses of the office.

The directors for the odd-numbered districts are elected in the even-numbered years, and those for the even-numbered districts in the odd-numbered years.

Any resident of the state is eligible to membership in the society. The secretary will on application furnish information relating to membership.

The annual meeting begins on Tuesday before the second Wednesday in December of each year.

The society publishes an annual report full of valuable and interesting papers.

The object of this society is the promotion and encouragement of horticulture and arborculture in the state by the collection and dissemination of practical information regarding the cultivation of such fruits, flowers and trees as are best adapted to the soil and climate of the state. The rooms of the society are kept open at all times for the reception of visitors. All communications on horticultural topics will be promptly answered by the secretary.

STATE FORESTRY COMMISSIONER.

WESLEY GREENE, of Scott county, secretary of the state horticultural society is ex-officio state forestry commissioner. His address is Des Moines, Iowa. He serves as commissioner without compensation. The law authorizes him to appoint deputies to serve without salary for each county or group of counties, who shall assist him in the performance of his duties, and also make report to him annually of forestry matters for the use of the horticultural society.

The object of the law is to encourage the planting of forest and fruit trees in the state. The act provides that any person owning land in the state may plant or select a tract of land not less than two acres in area for a forest reservation, provided there shall not be less than two hundred forest trees growing on each acre and that cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats and hogs are not permitted on said reservation.

A fruit reservation shall not be less than one or more than five acres in area and can be claimed for a period of eight years after planting; provided that there are not less than seventy fruit trees growing on each acre, under proper care.

Forest and fruit tree reservations are assessed at a taxable value of one dollar an acre.

Any landowner in this state wishing to enter a forest or fruit tree reservation, or both, should do so when the assessor is listing property for assessment.

The state board of law examinors was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901. The attorney-general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board, and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. Under the statute the supreme court may also appoint from time to time, when necessary, temporary examinets to assist the commission, who shall serve for one examination only.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that havolved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant falls to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such fallure. Each applicant is required to pay an examination fee of five dollars, and one dollar for his certificate of admission.

The state is divided into fourteen inspection districts which may be changed as the exigencies of the service may require.

An inspector is appointed by each inspection district, one of which is designated as chief inspector, who exercises supervision over the entire inspection service of the state. The state fixes his bond at \$10,000.00.

Inspectors are furnished by the state with suitable apparatus for making inspection of all illuminating oils sold within the state, which includes miners' oil and oils used for illuminating boats, railway cars and street cars. A sample is taken by the inspector from each tank or barrel and subjected to a test. For petroleum oil (kerosene) the closed cup test, is used. If the vapor arising from the heating process ignites at a temperature of 100 degrees or less, the entire lot from which the sample is take is rejected and cannot be sold or used for illuminating purposes within the state. Miners' oil is subjected to a gravity test of 22 degrees, Taglibue hydrometer, at a temperature of sixty degrees Fahrenheit. Oils used for illuminating boats, street or railway cars are tested to an igniting or burning point of 300 degrees Fahrenheit.

On or before the 15th day of each month, each inspector is required to make a report to the chief oil inspector of state of all inspections made during the previous month, showing each inspection made, for whom and where made, kind of oil, number of tank, degree of test, whether rejected or approved, amount of fees collected, total of oil inspected during the month, and an itemized report all expenses incurred, amount of fees due inspectors, deputies and branders, all of which must be verified under oath and mailed, together with all fees collected, to the chief oil inspector of state, who is required to approve same before inspector's expenses can be allowed by the executive council and a warrant ordered drawn by the auditor of state in payment thereof. Deputies and branders may be appointed by inspectors when necessary, but must be approved by the executive council. No person interested in the manufacture or sale, either directly or indirectly, in petroleum products can serve as inspector, or act as surety on his official bond, which is fixed by statute at \$5,000.00. Inspectors may be removed for neglect or failure in the performance of their official duties.

All persons for whom inspections are made must report directly to the chief oil inspector of state all inspections made for them for each month.

This is compared with the inspector's report for the same month, and if any discrepancies are found, corrections are required until a complete check is secured.

Rules and regulations for making inspections are formulated and adopted by the state board of health and become effective and a part of the law when approved by the governor.

DIRECTOR OF WEATHER AND CROP SERVICE.

Appointed by the Governor. Term two years. Term expires June 39, 1918.
Salary \$1,500.

The state weather and crop service was established in June, 1890, since which date it has been maintained in co-operation with the U. S. weather bureau. Under existing statutes the director is appointed by the governor upon recommendation of the state board of agriculture, and all expenditures are drawn upon vouchers issued by the president and secretary of that board. It is made the duty of the director to establish volunteer weather and crop stations to the number of two or more in each county, to appoint observers thereat and receive reports therefrom of meterological and crop conditions; to tabulate reports for permanent records of climate and crops; to edit and cause to be printed a monthly weather and crop review; to issue weekly weather and crop bulletins during the crop season, April 1 to October 1, and to compile an annual report which shall contain a complete review and summary of the service for the year, Which may include articles and papers upon the subject of meterological science and climatology, and which shall be printed and bound in such numbers as the executive council shall direct. The director's compensation for such service shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year.

The inspectors are appointed by the governor to hold office for a term of two years from the first Monday in May in the even-numbered years. Each inspector is required to make an annual report to the governor on or before the first day of January, giving in detail the number and date of licenses granted pilots and engineers, number and kind of boats inspected, the fees received therefor, and other matters considered useful and of general interest.

The law provides that "any inspector, on the request of owner, agent or master of any boat other than a row boat, upon the inland waters of the state having a carrying capacity of five or more passengers, shall carefully and thoroughly inspect such boat, its appliances and machinery, and, if found in proper condition and safe for the carriage of persons or passengers, give his certificate thereof, including therein the number of persons or passengers that may be carried, and on what waters; which certificate, or a copy thereof, shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the boat, and any boat so inspected. and rertified shall be entitled to run for the season following the date thereof. In like manner, upon the request of any pilot or engineer for a license as such the inspector shall forthwith investigate the competency of the applicant, his acquaintance with and experience in his business, his habits as to sobriety, and other qualifications, and, if found capable of performing well his duties, and of good habits, he shall issue his certificate authorizing him to act as pilot or engineer, as the case may be, for five years from the date thereof, unless sooner revoked for cause, which revocation when made shall take effect upon the approval of the governor. The inspector may charge and require advance payment for inspection, for each sailboat, one dollar, each boat propelled by

other power with a capacity of not more than twenty persons, five dollars; those of greater capacity, ten dollars, and for each applicant for license as pilot or engineer, three dollars."

The penalty for hiring or offering to hire such boat for the carriage of passengers, without first securing the certificate above mentioned, or for permitting or receiving for carriage a greater number of persons than authorized in the said certificate, is a fine of not to exceed one thousand dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed one year, or both fine and imprisonment. The same penalty applies to anybody acting as a pilot or engineer without first having obtained a license, or having obtained such license, continuing to follow such avocation after his certificate has been revoked.

"The object of the academy shall be the encouragement of scientific work in the state of Iowa."

Membership is not limited to those giving their time to the advancement of science either in teaching or in original research, but is open to those interested in scientific subjects.

Members of the academy are divided into four groups: (1) fellows, who shall be elected from residents of the state of Iowa actively engaged in scientific work; (2) associates, residents of the state of Iowa who are interested in the progress of science, but not direct contributors to original research; (3) corresponding fellows, fellows who have moved outside the state; and (4) honrary fellows, to be elected by vote from original workers in science in other states.

Papers of general interest in addition to those that are technically scientific are presented at each annual meeting.

Meetings are held each spring, time and place being fixed by the executive

The academy publishes each year a volume containing a report of the proceedings of the annual meeting and the papers which have been presented at that time.

INSPECTOR OF BEES.

Appointed by the Governor. Term two years. Compensation \$5.00 per diem.

Term expires April 19, 1918.

FRANK C. PELLETT, of Atlantic, Cass county.

The governor is authorized to appoint a competent man as inspector of bees. It is the duty of such inspector, when notified in writing by at least three beckeepers of any locality of the existence or supposed existence of the disease known as "foul brood" among the aplaries of the locality, to at once thoroughly examine such apiarles as are reported and thus ascertain where such disease exists. The inspector is given power to make remedial orders

as provided for by statute even to the extent of causing to be burned infected colonies of bees in any aplary together with all the colonies and hives in order to prevent the further spread of the disease.

Anyone who knowingly sells, barters or gives away, moves or allows to be moved a diseased colony or colonles of bees or who exposes any infected honey to the bees without the consent of the inspector shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be liable on conviction to a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 or to imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

The inspector is required to make an annual report.

On July 1, 1917, the inspector of bees will be under the supervision of the director of agricultural extension and professor of entomology of the lowa State College, by act of the thirty-seventh general assembly.

BOARD OF VOTING MACHINE COMMISSIONERS.

Appointed by the Governor. Term five years. Compensation not to exceed \$1,500,

The voting machine commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly, providing for the use of voting machines at all state, county, city, town, and township elections. By this act the governor was authorized to appoint three commissioners, not more than two of whom should be from the same political party. The commissioners are appointed for the term of five years, subject to removal at the pleasure of the governor.

Individuals or corporations owning or interested in any voting machine may call upon the commissioners to examine the said voting machine. After such examination the commissioners are to report the results to the secretary of state, giving the capacity of such machine to register the vote of the people, its accuracy and efficiency, and its mechanical perfections or imperfections.

No board is acting at the present time.

The state historical society of Iowa was organized January, 1857. The objects of the society today are practically the same as set forth in its original constitution, "To preserve in authentic form a library of books, pamphlets, maps, charts, manuscripts, papers, paintings, statuary and other material lilustrative of the history of Iowa, * * * to exhibit faithfully the antiquities and the past and present resources of the state; and to promote the study of history by lectures, and diffuse and publish information relating to the description and history of Iowa." The activities of the state historical society of Iowa are now largely confined to critical historical research and publication.

Since its organization the society has published three different quarterly magazines. From 1863 to 1874, inclusive, it published The Annals of Iowa.

12 volumes, now called the first series. From 1885 to 1992, inclusive, it published The Iowa Historical Record, 18 volumes. From 1903 to date the society has published The Iowa Journal of History and Politics, now in its fifteenth volume.

Numerous other publications have been issued by the society, the most important of which are the Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa, in seven volumes; The Executive Journal of Iowa, 1838-1843; the Lucas Journal of the War of 1812; five volumes in the Iowa Economic History Series; eight volumes in the Iowa Biographical Series; three volumes in the Iowa Applied History Series; two volumes in the Iowa Social History Series; the Proceedings of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Constitution of Iowa; a volume entitled Amana; The Community of True Inspiration; the Territorial Governors of the Old Northwest; the Battle of Shiloh; the Holanders of Iowa; the Quakers of Iowa; the History of Senatorial Elections in Iowa; the History of Township Government in Iowa; four volumes on the History of Education in Iowa; and a volume entitled Third Party Movements Since the Civil War—With Special Reference to Iowa.

The library of the society now contains over 53,000 titles. The membership of the society now includes over six hundred and fifty active members and twenty-four auxiliary members. One hundred and fifty public and collega libraries within the state have been designated as official depositories for the publications of the Society, and sixty libraries and institutions outside of the state have been designated as exchange depositories.

Composition—Three members of the hoard are members by reason of their official position, and two (one of whom must be a woman) are appointed by the governor for a term of four years.

Meetings.—The hoard meets five times each year for the transaction of business at such times and places as the president directs. Applications of colleges for accrediting are considered each year.

Examinations—All examinations for licenses to teach are under the supervision of the educational board of examiners. There are two classes of examinations, those for uniform county certificates and those for state certificates and diplomas.

For uniform county certificates four regular examinations are held each year on the last Friday and the Wednesday and Thursday preceding in the months of January, June, July and October. Special examinations for provisional certificates are appointed by the president or the board upon the request of the county superintendent of any county in which there is a scarcity of teachers. Uniform county certificate examinations are conducted by the county superintendents.

For state certificates and state diplomas the board holds annually five regular examinations at Des Moines, one at the close of the college year in June, one at the close of the summer session, and one the last Friday and Wednesday and Thursday preceding of January, June, July and October. Examination for state certificates may be written under the county superintendent at any regular uniform county certificate examination if the county superintendent calls for questions twenty days before.

Licenses—All licenses to teach are issued by the education board of examiners. There are two general classes of licenses, uniform county and state. Uniform county licenses consist of first grade and special certificates issued for three years and subject to renewal, second grade issued for two years subject to renewal and third grade certificates issued for one year subject to one renewal, provisional certificates issued for one year, not renewable.

State licenses consist of state certificates, general and special, all of which are issued for five years and subject to renewal and state diplomas valid for life of holder.

All state certificates, first and second grade uniform county certificates are renewed for life upon proofs of at least five years successful teaching, three of which shall have been during the time said certificate (with renewals) has been in force.

Fees.—The examination fee for uniform county certificates is \$1; for state certificates general and special, \$2; for life validation of uniform county and state certificates, \$5; for state diplomas, \$5.

Registration—To be valid in any county a certificate must be registered in the office of the county superintendent.

Accredited Schools—The educational board of examiners makes regulations for the granting of certificates to graduates of the regular and collegiate courses of the state university of Iowa, the state teachers college, and the state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, and determines what other colleges and normal schools of the state are entitled to like recognition.

Library List—The board is required to prepare and publish a list of books suitable for rural school libraries, from which list the library committee of all rural schools must make selection when purchasing books for their libraries.

Organization—Pursuant to a call signed by D. F. Wells, then of the Muscatine schools, and seventeen others, a number of teachers met in the court house at Muscatine, May 10, 1854, and organized the Iowa state teachers' association, adopted a constitution and elected the following officers: President, J. A. Parvin, Muscatine; Vice-President, Rev. Daniel Lane, Davenport; Recording Secretary, D. Franklin Wells, Muscatine; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubque; Treasurer, G. W. Drake, Oskaloosa; Executive Committee, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubque; G. B. Deulson, Muscatine; Rev. W. W. Woods, Iowa City; D. S. Sheldon, Davenport, and H. K. Edson, Denmark.

The real work of the association began with its second session which convened at Iowa City, December 27 and 28 of the same year. After a very important meeting this session adjourned to meet at Davenport, September 4, 1855. When the time came for this meeting, so few wore present it was abandoned.

An educational convention was called to meet at Iowa City, June 16 to 18, 1856. At this meeting a permanent organization was effected and the constitution of the association of 1854, somewhat modified, was adopted. Since that time a session has been held each year.

At the session in December, 1905, the semi-centennial anniversary of the association was celebrated by a special campfire program, which was participated in, either in person or by letter, by many of the veterans in education in Iowa,

SUPREME COURT OF IOWA.

ORGANIZATION,

The supreme court consists of seven judges, four of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the term of two of the justices expires at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

JURISDICTION.

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of records, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

- 1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken;
- 2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action after judgment;
- An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
- 4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision:
 - 5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

^{*}Will be chief justice after January I, 1918,

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

TERMS.

There are three regular terms in each year, held as follows, to-wit: The first term beginning with the second Tuesday in January and ending with the first Monday of May; the second beginning with the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May and ending with the third Monday of September, and the third beginning with the first Tuesday after the third Monday of September and ending with the third Saturday of December.

The time allotted to each term is divided as nearly as practicable into periods of four weeks each, the first part of each period is devoted to the argument and submission of cases, and the second to consultation and the preparation of opinions. Cases assigned for each period are called in their order as shown on the term docket but no more submissions are taken for one period than in the judgment of the court can be properly considered and determined before the next succeeding session. All causes on the docket are heard at each term unless continued or otherwise disposed of by order of court.

The regular public sessions of the court are held in the supreme court room at the capitol, commencing at 9 o'clock A. M., standard time. On Tuesday and Friday of the first and second week of each four weeks' period submission of motions are taken before calling the calendar. Motions noticed for a day when the court is not sitting are taken on the next motion day on which the court sits.

Judgments of affirmance, rulings and orders in causes submitted and orders authorized by law may be made and entered by the court at any time regardless of the term of court.

APPRALS IN CIVIL CASES,

Appeals from the superior and district courts may be taken to the supreme court at any time within six months from the rendition of the judgment or order appealed from, and not afterwards. No appeal shall be taken in any cause in which the amount in controversy between the parties, as shown by the pleadings does not exceed one hundred dollars, unless the trial judge shall, during the term in which judgment is entered, certify that the cause is one in which the appeal should be allowed, and upon such certificate being filed the same shall be appealable regardless of the amount in controversy, but this limitation shall not affect the right of appeal in any action in which an interest in real estate is involved, nor shall the right of appeal be affected by the remission of any part of the verdict or judgment returned or rendered.

APPEALS IN CRIMINAL CASES.

Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken in all criminal cases within six month after the judgment is rendered; and either the defendant or the state may appeal. Upon appeal the supreme court may affirm, reverse or modify the judgment or render such judgment as the district court should have done. It may order a new trial or reduce the punishment, but cannot increase it. If the state appeals, the court cannot reverse or modify the judgment so as to increase the punishment, but may affirm it and shall point out any error in the proceedings and its decision shall be obligatory as law.

SALARY.

The salary of each justice is six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court,

THE DISTRICT COURTS OF IOWA,

There are at the present time sixty-four judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to five judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$3,500. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$8 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$1,600, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deciency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is the section of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court:

Section 225. Jurisdiction—civil, criminal, probate—successor of circuit court. The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

First. The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

Second. To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

Third. To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

Fourth. It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; provided, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

SUPERIOR COURTS.

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, whether organized under a special charter or under the general law for incorporation of cities and towns, may establish a superior court. There are at present seven of such courts, located respectively in the cities of Council Bluffs, Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$2,000, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which said court is located.

The judges of the superior courts appoint a shorthand reporter, who receives five dollars per day for each day's attendance upon said court.

The following is a copy of the section of the code, as amended, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

SECTION 260. Jurisdiction-attachments of real estate-city prisons used. Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters, except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony and separate maintenance. It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances, and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law, and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace. Writs of errors and appeals may be taken thereto from justices' courts in the township in which the court is held, and, by consent of parties, from any other township in the county. For the trial of criminal actions on information and complaint, the court shall be open at such times and under such rules as it shall prescribe. In actions by attachment, where real property is levied on by writ of attachment, the officer levying the writ shall make entry thereof in the incumbrance book in the office of the clerk of the district court, in like manner and with like effect as of levies made in the district court. Parties may be committed to the city prison for confinement or punishment, instead of the county jail, at the option of the judge. In the absence of the judge, or in case of his inability to act, then, during such time, proceedings for the violation of city ordinances may be had before a justice of the peace, residing in such city,

Superior courts shall have original concurrent jurisdiction with the district courts of the state of Iowa, in all matters pertaining to the detention and treatment of dipsomaniacs, inebriates and those addicted to the excessive use of narcotics, as provided in title XII, chapter 2-a of the supplement to the code, 1907, and the same proceeding shall be held so far as applicable. Wherever the words "district judge," "district court" or "judge of the district court" appear in title XII, chapter 2-a the same shall be construed to apply to the superior courts or the judge thereof to the same extent that the same applies to the district court or the judge thereof.

The Board of Control of State Institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Iowa Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown,

Iowa Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport.

School for the Deaf at Council Bluffs.

Institution for Feeble-minded Children at Glenwood.

State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale.

Iowa Industrial School for Boys at Eldora.

Iowa Industrial School for Girls at Mitchellville.

Mt. Pleasant State Hospital at Mt. Pleasant.

Independence State Hospital at Independence.

Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda.

Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee.

State Hospital for Inebriates at Knoxville.

Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mt. Pleasant.

Penlientiary at Ft. Madison.

Reformatory at Anamosa.

Industrial Reformatory for Females at Rockwell City.

State Hospital and Colony for Epileptics at Woodward,

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary, were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by state, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners ceased to exist.

The board publishes quarterly a bulletin of over one hundred pages, devoted to the scientific investigation of the treatment of insanity and epilepsy and the feeble-minded, and information embodying the experience of soldlers' homes, charitable, reformatory and penal institutions in this and other countries.

As provided by law, under the direction of the board the state institutions under its control are supplied with goods for their support on competitive bids, thus procuring proper supplies at the lowest market prices. An opportunity to bid is afforded anyone who asks for it.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make blennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is also required to visit each hospital once each month. It is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institution of quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employes not fixed by law, and to appoint a state architect and perform other duties provided by law.

Every resident not less than five or more than twenty-one years of age too deaf to be educated in the common schools, and every such person who is over twenty-one and under thirty-five years of age who has the consent of the board of control is entitled to receive an education in the institution at the expense of the state. Non-residents similarly situated may be cotified to an education therein upon the payment of sixty-six dollars quarterly in advance.

The session of the school begins the first day of October and continues until the last day of June of each year. Pupils should come promptly at the beginning and remain until the end of the session.

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$100 per year for each male inmate of the soldlers' home who served in any war in which the United States was engaged, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the Institution.

Persons who have sufficient means for their own support may be admitted to the home on payment of the cost of their support, which cost shall be fixed from time to time by the board of control of state institutions. Provided, however, that no person having sufficient means for his or her own support shall be received or permitted to remain in the home unless there be room for all eligible applicants who do not have such means, but pension money received by any member of the home from the United States government shall not be taken from him for his support in the home.

The regular appropriation by the state is \$16 per month for each member, and \$10 per month for each officer and employe not a member of the home.

There is in connection with this institution a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the board to have the course of instruction of a high standard. A kindergarten is operated for the very young pupils.

The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is sixteen years. Fewer than 20 per cent remain to the age limit.

A library of well selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity their pastimes and pleasures are somewhat circumsoribed.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good, comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take good care of the same. All their clothing is manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food and a reasonable amount of luxuries.

The home is supported by a regular appropriation of \$14 per month for each immate and the actual transportation charges of immates to and from the institution. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children to the extent of \$7 per month, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

The purposes or objects of this institution are to provide special methods of training for the class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as nearly as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further alms to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, replying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

There is appropriated for the support of these schools the sum of \$14 monthly for each boy and \$16 monthly for each girl inmate.

The object of the institutions is the reformation of fuvenile delinquents. They are not prisons but compulsory educational institutions where wayward boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life and where the moral intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl over ten and under eighteen years of age, excepting married women, prostitutes, or any girl who is pregnant, found guilty in any court of record of any crime excepting that of murder, may be ordered committed, if a boy to the industrial school at Eldora, and if a girl to the industrial school at Mitchellville. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence of reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

Excepting one contract entered into prior to 1915, all the prisoners of Iowa are employed either upon prison work or upon public work in accordance with the provisions of Section 5718-A 11 (S. S. of the Code). The prisoners are sent out under the direction of the warden of the respective penal institutions, subject to the approval of the Board of Control. During the past two years, prisoners have been employed at the Iowa Granite Works, purchased for the Reformatory near the town of Granite in Lyon county, upon the construction of the new Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City, in or about the Soldiers' Home at Marshalitown, in railroad construction work at the State Hospital, Cherokee, in general work at the State Hospital and Colomy for Epileptics, Woodward; at the State Custodial Farm at Citye, and upon railroad construction work at the State Hospital, Mt. Pleasant. They have also been employed under the direction of the Iowa Highway Commission upon road work at the Iowa State College at Ames, and at Clive, Columbus Junction, and Woodward.

On July 1, 1909, the management and control of the State University ,the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and the Iowa State Teachers College was assumed by the Icwa State Eoard of Education. This board consists of nine members, who are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, under the provisions of an act of the thirty-third general assembly, approved by the governor March 29, 1909, and effective on publication. By chapter 141 of the acts of the thirty-fourth general assembly, the College for the Blind was placed under the control of this board. Under the provisions of the law, not more than five members of the board may be members of the same political party; and not more than one alumnus from each of the institutions may be members of the board. As required by the act, three of the members of the board were appointed for two years, three for four years, and three for six years. Subsequent appointments on the board, except to fill vacancies, are to be for terms of six years. Offices at the seat of the state government are to be furnished the board by the executive council, and the board also maintains an office at each of the three institutions. Members of the board are not required to give bond; and they are to receive a compensation of seven dollars per day for the time actually employed in the performance of their duties not exceeding sixty days in any one year, and are also allowed mileage at the rate of two cents a mile. The board is required to have four regular meetings each year and may hold additional ones on the call of the president or secretary. The duties of the board as set out in the act are as follows:

Sec. 4. The state board of education shall have power to elect a president from its members; a president and treasurer for each of said educational institutions, and professors, instructors, officers and employes; to fix the compensation to be paid to such officers and employes; to make rules and regulations for the government of said schools, not inconsistent with the laws of the state; to manage and control the property, both real and personal, belonging to said educational institutions; to execute trusts of other obligations now or hereafter committed to the institutions; to direct the expenditure of

all appropriations the general assembly shall, from time to time, make to said institutions, and the expenditure of any other moneys; and to do such other acts as are necessary and proper for the execution of the powers and duties conferred upon them by law. * * *

Members of the board choose, from outside their own membership, a finance committee of three members, not more than two of whom shall be members of the same political party. Each member of the finance committee receives a compensation of thirty-five hundred dollars a year, and serves for three years unless sooner removed by the board. The board designates one of the finance committee as chairman and one as scoretary, and the secretary of this committee also serves as secretary of the board. The secretary has charge of the general offices and of all books and papers of the board at the seat of government. The members of the committee, in addition to their salaries, are entitled to mileage and necessary expenses. Each member of the finance committee is required to file a bond in the sum of \$25,000.00, which is to be approved by the governor. The members of the finance committee are required to visit each of the institutions once a month, and to familiarize themselves with the work there being done.

The State University of Iowa, established February 25, 1847.

An act of congress, July 20, 1840, authorized the secretary of the treasury to set apart and reserve from sale of lands in the territory of lowa for the use and support of a university to be established when Iowa should become a state. In 1846 Iowa was admitted into the Union with a constitution which provided that the general assembly should take measures to care for the lands granted and for the application of the income to support the university. In accordance with this provision the first general assembly on February 25, 1847, passed an act establishing and locating at Iowa City a state university. The capitol building and the land upon which it stood were donated to the university in view of the contemplated removal of the seat of government from Iowa City. Delay in removing the capital prevented the opening of the institution until March, 1855. The organization of departments began in the same year. From 1868 until 1860, owing to the lack of funds, the normal department was the only one in operation, and the university was reorganized in 1860. The law department was established in 1868, the medical department in 1870, the the homeopathic medical department in 1876, the dental department in 1882, the department of pharmacy in 1885, the graduate college in 1900, the college of applied science in 1905, the college of fine arts, or Mark Ranney memorial institute of fine arts, in 1911 (discontinued in 1913), and the college of education in 1913. In the course of the evolution of the university the various departments became, and now are, colleges.

From 1847 to 1870 the management of the university was in the hands of trustees, elected throughout most of the period by the legislature. In 1870 the legislature substituted a board of regents, consisting, aside from ex-officio members, of one member from each congressional district. In 1909, pursuant to an act of the thirty-third general assembly, the control of the State University of Iowa, together with that of the Iowa State Teachers' college and the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, passed into the hands of a state board of education.

The State University of Iowa is an integral part of the public school system of the state. As contemplated in its establishment, the work of the university is based upon the preparation afforded by the duly accredited high schools of the state, whose students are admitted to the undergraduate and professional courses upon the presentation of the proper certificates—except in the colleges of medicine and law, which require two years of collegiate work in preparation. The state, through the university, undertakes to furnish instruction in the various branches requisite for an education in the liberal arts, law, medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, fine arts, nursing, and engineering. It also aims to encourage research work in all departments.

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The university embraces the following coileges and schools:

Integral parts of the institution are also: The summer Session, including the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory at Lake Okoboji, the School for Library Training.

The Graduate College unites the university's equipment to advanced study and research, its courses beginning where the courses in the other colleges end. It offers work leading to the degrees of M. A., M. S., and Ph. D.

The College of Liberal Arts is the center around which the university has grown. It offers upwards of three hundred liberal and vocational courses in the arts and sciences, these courses leading to the degree of B. A. and B. S. the latter only in connection with combined courses in liberal arts and professional studies (see below).

The College of Law offers a course of three years leading to the degree of LL, B. For admission two years of study in a liberal arts college are required.

The College of Medicine offers a course of four years leading to the degree of M. D. The college is recognized by the American Medical Association in "Class A." Two years of liberal arts study are required for admission.

The College of Homeopathic Medicine offers a course of four years, leading to the degree of M. D. Its departments of surgery, obstetries and gynecology, ophthalmology, etc., materia medica, and theory and practice of medicine have been established by statute. Its other departments (anatomy, physiology, bacteriology, etc.,) are shared with the College of Medicine.

The College of Dentistry offers a course of three years leading to the degree of D. D. S. This course is to be extended to four years in the fall of 1917. The college is one of the six leading dental colleges in the country which meet the standards of the Dental Faculties Association of American Universities.

The College of Pharmacy offers a two years' course leading to the degree of B. Phar, and a three years' course leading to the degree of Ph. C.

The College of Applied Science offers courses in civil sanitary, mechanical, electrical and general engineering, and in chemistry. These are each of four years and lead to the degree of B. E. Advanced degrees are also given in C. E., M. E., etc.

The College of Education unites the various facilities of the university for the training of teachers, with special reference to administrative work and the higher positions. Its courses lead to the certificate of the College of Education.

The School of Commerce, established in September, 1914, is organized within the College of Liberal Arts and its course leads to the degree of B. A.

The Schools for Nurses are two in number, one conducted in the university hospital under the direction of the faculty of the College of Medicine, the other in the university homeopathic hospital under the direction of the faculty of the College of Homeopathic Medicine.

The School of Music is a part of the College of Liberal Arts. It offers courses in piano, voice, pipe organ, violin, band instruments, and in the history and theory of music.

The summer session of two terms, one of six weeks, from June 18 to July 28, the other of four weeks, from July 30 to August 25, is a regular session of the colleges of Liberal Arts, Education, Applied Science, and the Graduate College. The session also includes the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory and the School for Library Training.

"Combined courses" in Liberal Arts and professional studies permit the attainment in a shortened period of the double degrees of B. S. or B. A. and M. D.; B. A. and LL. B.; B. S. and D. D. S.; B. S. and B. E.; and D. D. S. and M. D.

The general scope of the college work as provided by law is as follows:

"There shall be adopted and taught practical courses of study, embracing in their leading branches such as relate to agriculture and the mechanic arts, and such other branches as are best calculated to thoroughly educate the agricultural and industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions of life, including military tactics, and, as a separate department, a school of mines, in which a complete course in theoretical and practical mining in its different branches shall be taught."

On March 22, 1858, the legislature of Iowa passed an act providing for the establishment of a State College of Agriculture.

On July 2, 1862, congress passed what became known as the "First Morrill Endowment Act." This act provided for the donation of public lands to the several states which might found colleges for instruction in the branches of learning relating to agriculture and mechanic arts. The quantity of land to be donated under the provisions of this act was 30,000 acres for each senator and representative in congress under the census of 1860. Under this grant, land to the amount of 204,309.30 acres was selected and certified to the state by the secretary of the interior. On March 29, 1864, there was approved an act of the legislature turning over to the Iowa State Agricultural College all the land above described.

In addition to this the college of agriculture received 3,200 acres of land in Jasper county, under what was known as the "Five Section Grant." All this land has been sold, and the proceeds constitute a permanent endowment fund amounting at the present time to \$686,777.97. The interest only on the fund can be used for the support of the college.

The college has been further aided by the general government by an act of congress approved August 30, 1880, known as the "Second Morrill Act," which gives the sum of \$25,000.00 per annum for the support of the college, and the Hatch act of March 2, 1887, and the Adams act approved March 16,

1906, which carry \$15,000 each per annum for agricultural experimentation.

For ten years the legislature made a special levy of one-fifth of a mill for the erection of buildings. This has resulted in the erection of a number of the finest and most useful buildings on the college campus. This tax expired July 1, 1915, after which an appropriation of \$150,000 per year for two years became available for erection of buildings.

In addition to this, the various legislatures have made liberal appropriations for the general support of the college.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

CHARLES FRANKLIN CURTISS, B. Sc., D. S., Director, Ames.

The Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station was established in accordance with an act of congress, approved March 2, 1887, for the purpose of alding "in acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects connected with agriculture, and to promote scientific investigation and experiments respecting the principles and application of agricultural science."

This station derives its support in part from the national government and in port from the state, as follows: For the year 1916-1917 from the national government \$30,000.00, from the state \$115,500.00.

The work of the Agricultural Experiment Station now includes the following lines of investigation: Soils and farm crops, farm management, animal husbandry, horticulture and forestry, agricultural engineering, botany, dairying, entomology, chemistry, bacteriology and rural sociology. The results of investigations and experiments along these lines are published in bulletin and circulars which are distributed free to all residents of the state who apply for them. During the biennial period ending June 30, 1916, the Agricultural Experiment Station published twenty-four (24) regular bulletins, sixteen (16) research bulletins, fourteen (14) circulars, and two (2) press bulletins, making a total of fifty-six (56) bulletins, aggregating over 766,000 copies.

The work of the Agricultural Experiment Station is of direct service to the agricultural interests of the state and nation. The results of experiment station investigations serve as the basis for agricultural instruction from the standpoint of both the college and extension work. It is now universally recognized that little progress can be made by agricultural colleges, either in teaching their students or in carrying information directly to farmers, until definite data have been secured concerning the scientific and practical problems which constitute the basis of our present day agriculture. For this reason the work of the Agricultural Experiment Station is of fundamental importance, and should receive adequate support from both the nation and the state.

ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION

INCLUDING GOOD ROADS EXPERIMENTATION,

ANSON MARSTON, C. E., Director, Ames.

The Engineering Experiment Station was established at the Iowa State College by the legislature of Iowa in 1904, to meet the demands made upon the college, by industrial, urban and agricultural interests for information and agsistance. Since its creation, its growth has been rapid, and the demands upon it have more than justified its existence.

The purpose of the station is to afford a service, through scientific investigations, evolution of new devices and methods, educational information on technical subjects and tests and analyses of materials For the manufacturing and other engineering population and industries of Iowa; for the agricultural industries of the state in the solution of their engineering problems.

for the arban and rural population of the state in the solution of the engineering problems of urban and rural life,

From the first the Station has carried on original investigations along the lines of vital Interest to the people of Iowa, and have published the results in bulletin form for free distribution. Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) annually is available for this work.

The Station is often called upon to furnish educational information of a preliminary or general character regarding engineering and industrial projects. It does not make estimates, prepare or correct sketches, plan or specifications, or supervise construction. Its work throughout is educational and does not enter in any way the field of the consulting or practicing engineer or contractor. As such service is of a public nature, the preliminary educational information is furnished free of charge, except for traveling expenses where such are incurred.

For many years the Engineeing Experiment Station has made tests and analyses of materials for state departments, counties, townships, cities, factories, corporations and individual citizens of Iowa. Such materials include cement, concrete, brick, building tile, sewer pipe, drain tile, asphalt and other paving materials, iron, steel, wood, stone, gravel, sand, clay, cement materials, fuels, water, sewage, and the like. Before the establishment of commercial testing laboratories in Iowa, the Station in an endeavor to encourage the testing of materials made charges for this work only sufficient to cover the actual cost. With the advent of commercial laboratories it becomes the duty of the Station to encourage this industry just as it encourages others. The charges for tests have, therefore, been made such that the Station will not assume the role of competitor with commercial laboratories. The Station stands ready to make check tests or to act as final authority on questions of this nature, but would prefer that all routine tests be made by outside laboratories. The amount and character of the testing work will be so restricted in the future as not to interfere seriously with the investigational work.

VETERINARY INVESTIGATIONS.

C. H. STANGE, Dean.

This work was organized under provisions made by the thirty-fifth general assembly. Considerable information concerning hemorrhagic septicemia in cattle has been secured, a serum produced and a number of herds treated. Other diseases have been studied and much time has been given to hog cholera and complications of this disease.

EXTENSION WORK.

R. A. PEARSON, President.

The extension work of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is divided into two branches—agricultural extension and engineering extension.

AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION.

R. K. BLISS, Director.

The agricultural extension work was established permamently by enactment of the thirty-first general assembly of lows. This act provided for giving lec-

tures and demonstrations on the growing of crops and fruits, on stock raising, dairying, land drainage and kindred subjects, including domestic science. Specific mention was made in this act of instruction in corn and stock judging at the agricultural fairs, institutes and clubs and aid in conducting short courses of instruction at suitable places throughout the state.

ENGINEERING EXTENSION.

K. G. SMITH. Director.

The thirty-fifth general assembly of Iowa provided an appropriation to establish this work. It includes short courses of instruction in industrial centers and correspondence courses, and special attention is given to the needs of young men wishing to better prepare themselves for expert positions in public service and manufacturing work.

HOG CHOLERA SERUM PLANT.

C. H. STANGE. Director.

This work was started under an appropriation of \$35,000 made by the thirty-fifth general assembly for the production of biological products, especially hog choices serum. The plant is self-supporting. Permanent buildings have been erected. Up to December 31st, 1916, 17,675,782 cubic centimeters of serum had been produced. This serum was used in treating 7,736 herds.

The aim and purpose of this institution is purely educational. The literary work covers a period of twelve years and is outlined similar to the work done in the public school, having a fully accredited high school. The department of music is supplied with a number of planos, one pipe organ, and a number of stringed instruments. All students who have any talent in music are given a thorough course in this department. All students are required to do work in the Industrial department. The girls are taught knitting, crocheting, fancywork, hand and machine sewing, and domestic science. The boys are taught netting, weaving, broom making, cane scating, manual training and plano tunies. These advantages are free to all blind children of school age and those who have vision so defective as to prevent them from attending the public schools, providing they are mentally normal. The school year begins the first Wednesday in September and closes the last week in May. For further information address the superintendent.

CENTRAL COLLEGE-PELLA,

In the fall of 1854 the academic department of Central University of Iowa opened for work, and by 1861 Freshmen, Sophomore and Junior classes in the collegiate department were doing regular work. During 1861-62 one hundred twenty-three professors and students enlisted in the army. Since that time the college has had a varied and checkered carrer, with many ups and downs, but has steadily continued its work and has constantly strengthened and enlarged it.

In religious affiliation the institution was for sixty-three years Baptist. In June, 1916, it passed under the control of the Reformed Church of America. It is governed by a self-perpetuating board of trustees. Rev. B. F. Brinkman of Pella, is president of the board of trustees. Rev. John W. Batley, Ph. D., is president of the institution. The college maintains the regular work, leading to the liberal arts degree; departments emphasizing vocational training and meeting the state regulations concerning these departments; Central Academy, offering the four-year course including work in Normal Training for

IOWA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE—CEDAR FALLS.

This institution is organized to give teacher education and training and does not undertake any other kind of educational work. Its courses are planned to give efficiency and capability to the students as workers in public schools. Its field of service grants preparation to high school teachers, to elementary and primary teachers, and to all kinds of special teachers now demanded by the public schools of the state. Its plan is that of a vocational school and everything that is done has a bearing upon the training of young men and women for service in the system of public education maintained in the state. Its degree graduates are admitted without conditions to the graduate schools of the universities and its alumni hold important positions in public service in every state where they are employed. Its diplomas are Bachelor of Arts in Education, Special Teacher Diplomas such as Primary, Junior College, Kindergarten, Art, Public School Music, Manual Arts, Home Economics, Physical Education, Commercial, Rural Education, Rural Teacher and Normal Course. In addition music teachers are granted diplomas for Plane, Organ, Violin and Voice.

The college year is divided into four quarters of twelve weeks each and a cass graduates at the end of each quarter, thus giving much flexibility to the courses and a superior opportunity for candidates for graduation in their practice in teaching in the training schools. The training schools are located on the campus—all grades being organized from the kindergarten to the senior in the high school—in the school buildings in the Cedar Falls city schools and in seven civil township systems in Black Hawk county. The expanse of this organization gives unusual opportunities for practical development and for the acquiring of capability in instruction.

The enrolment of students and training schools in 1915-16 was as follows: College Graduates 75, College Course Students 552, Two and Three Year Diploma Course Students 1,012, Special Students 27, Sub-Collegiate and Rural Teacher Students 2,425, Special Music Students 47. Total enrolled in Institution, 4,138. Training Schools: Campus High Schools and Grades 298, City High School and Grades 185, Rural Demonstration Schools 355. Total pupils, 833.

The extension service consists of Saturday classes meeting in the several countles of the state, receiving all day instruction in the subjects and topics approved by the county superintendent and continuing from month to month and from year to year for the improvement in scholarship and methods of the teachers in service. In 1915-16 there were 13,992 teachers enrolled in the study center classes.

The value of the permanent improvements and equipments is estimated to be \$1,500,000.00. This annual support, including building funds granted by the state in 1915-16, and including balance on hand at the opening of the year was \$402,578.85. The income from all other sources such as laboratory fees, hospital fees, student tuitions, etc., was \$103,186,52.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE CFFICERS.

WILLIAM L. HARDING,

Twenty-second Governor of state of Iewa, was born in Osceola county, on his father's farm, October 3, 1877. His parents were natives of Pennsylvania and came to Iowa in 1872. Secured a common school education and later entered the law school of the state university of South Dakota from which place he graduated in 1905. Began the practice of law at Sloux City the same year and in 1906 became a candidate for a member of the house of representatives; was elected and chosen to succeed himself in 1908 and again in 1910, serving in the thirty-second, thirty-third and thirty fourth general assemblies. Married January 9, 1907, to Miss Carrie Lamoreaux. Was elected lieutenant-governor in 1912 and re-elected in 1914. Elected governor in 1918. A republican in politics.

ERNEST R. MOORE.

Lieutenant-governor, was born in Anamosa, Jones county, Iowa, Novem-1, 1869. He moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, with his parents in 1877 and has since resided in that city. He is of Scotch-Irish stock, his parents settling in Iowa in the early fifties. Received his education in the common and high schools of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, supplemented by private instruction. Served upwards of ten years in the Iowa National Guard, resigning his commission in the fall of 1897. On the outbreak of the Spanish-American war he enlisted in Company C, Forty-ninth Iowa, as a private, and was afterwards commissioned as first lieutenant and quartermaster, serving on the staff in that capacity and seeing service in the United States and Cuba. Is a banker by profession, being president of the American Trust and Savings Bank, one of the largest banks of Cedar Rapids. Married December 25, 1902, to Winifred Evans. Has been a delegate from his county to all republican state conventions for the last eleven years. Was a delegate to the republican national convention at Chicago in 1908, which nominated William H. Taft and was secretary of the delegation and a member of the convention committee on rules. Elected representative in 1906, re-elected in 1908 and 1910. Elected lieutenant governor Nov. 7. 1916. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM S. ALLEN,

Secretary of State, was born at Hillsboro, in Henry county, Iowa, August 26, 1857. His parents were American-born, his father being of Scotch-Irish lineage, and his mother of the old Dutch stock of New Jersey. Received his early education in the graded schools of Hillsboro and then, to prepare for college, entered Denmark Academy, the first institution of advanced learning founded in the state. Attended the liberal arts and law departments of the state university of Iowa, from which institution he graduated in the year 1877 at the age of nineteen. Upon being admitted to the bar settled in Van Buren county. The first official position to which he was elected was that of president of the board of education, and then to the office of mayor, serving in these different places for several years. Afterwards was a member of the house of representatives from Van Buren county in the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-sixth extra

general assemblies. In the extra session of the twenty-sixth general assembly served on some of the most important committees of the house and was chairman of the second division of the code revision committee, having in charge the recodification of the laws of lowa, the work of this session giving to the state the code of 1897. In 1903 was a candidate for the state senate, the first convention resulting in a deadlock, and losing out in the second convention by one-half a vote. He moved to Fairfield, Jefferson county, in September, 1909, where he has since been engaged in the practice of law. He was elected state senator in 1908 from the Jefferson-Van Buren district and served in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. At the June primary in 1912 he received the republican homination for secretary of state, and was elected to that position at the following fall election. Re-elected in 1914 and 1916. He has always been a republican in politics.

FRANK S. SHAW,

Auditor of State, was bern in Stephenson county, Illinois, October 27, 1859. Received his education in the public schools of Illinois and Western (now Leander Clark) College, located at Toledo, Iowa. At the age of 16 he went to Grundy county, Iowa, working on a farm for about three years, after which he located in Grundy Center. In November, 1881, he removed to Toledo, Iowa. In 1882 he entered the employ of the Chicago & North-Western Railway Company. In 1884 he returned to Toledo and engaged in the jewelry business. In 1896 was appointed deputy county treasurer of Tama county and served as such until December, 1900, when he again entered the jewelry business, continuing in that line in Toledo and Allison, Iowa, until 1904, when he returned to Toledo, to enter the office of the county auditor as deputy, served as such two years. He then served two years more as deputy county treasurer, and in November, 1908, was elected county auditor and served in that capacity for four years. During 1913 and 1914 he was engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Was elected auditor of state November 3, 1914, and re-elected November 7, 1916. Was married June 17, 1897, to Miss Mabel L. Clarke, of Toledo, Iowa, and has five children. A republican in politics.

EDWIN HIRAM HOYT,

Treasurer of State, was born October 27, 1871, in Manchester, Delaware county, Iowa. His parents, who were born in Vermont, came to Iowa in 1853 and located in Delaware county. Attended the Manchester public schools, Iowa college at Grinnell and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, graduating from the latter institution in 1891. Took a course in commercial law and banking at Cross Commercial College, Downers Grove, Illinois. Resided in Manchester until he was twenty-one years of age when he removed to Lamont, Buchanan county, where he organized the Lamont Savings Bank, of which he was president until 1912, when he removed to Manchester, Iowa. Elected senator in 1908 and served during the thirty-third and thirty fourth general assemblies. Appointed treasurer of state May 15, 1917. A republican in politics.

HORACE MOORE HAVNER.

Attorney General, was born of American parentage near Corydon, in Wayne county, Iowa, November 22, 1871. He was reared on the farm, and after attending the public schools, entered Simpson college. He later entered the College of Law at the State University of Iowa, graduating in 1899. After his graduation he formed a partnership with

R. C. Popham, under the firm name of Popham & Havner, for the publice of law at Marengo, Iowa, the partnership continuing until Mr. Havner's election to his present office on November 7, 1916.

When the Spanish-American war broke out, Mr. Havner enlisted as a private in Company I of the Fiftleth Iowa Infantry.

In 1901, Mr. Havner married Ada Dean of Griswold, Iowa, and has two children, Ada 14 and Rachel 7. He is a republican in politics.

BENJAMIN I. SALINGER.

Was born in Wronke, Germany; emigrated with his parents to the United States at the close of the Franco-Prussian war, coming to Clarksville, Butler county, Iowa, where the family remained a short time; moving thence to Chicago. The family returned to Clarksville, where he attended the public school for a period of two years; did janitor work while attending, and worked on farms and at sawing wood when not attending. Later he attended Cornell College at Mount Vernon. He afterwards went to Waverly, and entered the law office of Gray, Dougherty and Gibson, then to Webster City where he studied in the law office of Chase and Covil for a short time. At the same time he assisted the editor of the "Freeman" in that city. At this point came the first country school which he taught some three miles southeast of Williams in Hamilton county. He next located at Spencer, Iowa, there he joined with a lawyer to take on "justice practice" because not of age. After this the subject of this sketch went to Cherokee county where he engaged in school teaching, herding, farm work, and between terms of school, working on streets of Aurelia. At this time he met Lucy M. Boylan as his pupil, and married her before either were of age. Went to the town of Manning, which was then being started. Was the first school teacher there on an arrangement by which the township had to pay one half the wages and the citizens of the town paid the other half. In the spare time justice of the peace work was done, as a member of a newly formed firm of Doty, Hughes & Salinger. The school job finally developed into that of being principal with six rooms scattered over the town. When his majority was reached he was naturalized at Carroll by Judge C. F. Loufborow, and shortly after he was admitted to the bar by the same judge on examination of a committee of the Audubon bar. Went into practice of law at Manning, and after some fifteen years moved to Carroll, remaining in the practice there until elected to the supreme bench in November, 1914, by a non-partisan election. The home of himself and wife remains at Carroll. Their children are Daisy R. Minchen, Benjamin I., Jr., and Louis Howard.

Mr. Salinger has held no other office except one term as school director in Manning and two four year terms of supreme court reporter.

Politically he has been identified with the republican party. He campaigned for it in New York in the national election of 1888; in the Pacific states in 1892; all over the country in 1896, 1800 and 1804. His first delegateship to a congressional convention was the one held at Webster City in 1888, which gave J. P. Dolliver his first nomination for congress. Mr. Salinger was the chairman of that convention. Was chairman of the state convention in 1899. It was one of the stormiest ones in the history of the party. It required 25 ballots to make the nomination for governor it finally nominated Captain Hutchinson, whom Horace Boles defeated.

SCOTT M. LADD,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Sharon, Wisconsin, June 22, 1855. His parents were American-born, though of German and English ancestry. He was reared on a farm, and after attending the common schools and an academy nearby, was a student at Beloit College, Wisconsin, for two

years, and later attended Carthage College, Illinois, from which institution he received a diploma in 1879. The year following he taught mathematics and history in Hillsboro Academy, Illinois, being associated in the management of that institution with Hon. F. H. Helsell, now of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and Emma C. Cromer, who subsequently became his wife.

He was a student in the office of France & Sedgwlck (the latter now a member of the supreme court of Nebraska) at York, Nebraska, for several months and graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1881, and in the fall of that year began the practice of his profession at Sheldon. He continued in the practice of his profession until elected district judge of the fourth judicial district of Iowa, January 1, 1887. He continued in that office until elected to the supreme bench in 1896, to succeed Judge Rothrock, to which position he was re-elected in 1902, 1908 and 1914. Judge Ladd never held nor has been a candidate for any other office save that he served as school director several years. He has been a trustee of Morningside College for many years. The degrees of M. S. and LL. D. were conferred upon him by the Carthage College many years ago and the degree of LL. D. by the State University of Iowa in 1906. He is a member of several societies for the advancement of learning and is Interested in a practical way in scientific agriculture.

He is a republican in politics.

SILAS M. WEAVER,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born December 18, 1843, in Arkwright, Chautauqua county, New York. He acquired his education in the common schools and at Fredonia Academy, Fredonia, New York. He was admitted to the bar at Buffalo, New York, May 4, 1868. In the same year he moved to Iowa Falls, Iowa, where he has since resided.

He served as representative from Hardin county in the twentieth and twenty-first general assemblies. In the twentieth general assembly he was chairman of the house judiciary committee, and in the twenty-first general assembly he officiated as chairman of the board of managers in the impeachment trial of John L. Brown. In 1886 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district and was re-elected in 1890, 1894 and 1898. In 1901 he was nominated and elected to succeed Judge Joslah, Given upon the supreme bench, becoming chief justice on January 1, 1907. He was re-elected to the supreme bench in 1908 and 1914.

Judge Weaver is a republican in politics.

WILLIAM D. EVANS.

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Marquette county, Wisconsin, May 10, 1852. His parents were both born in Wales. In October, 1858, he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools and in the fall of 1873 entered the State University. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the classical course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course, from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879 he located at Hampton. In 1886 he was elected the first county attorney of Franklin county, which office he held until 1890. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the years 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the State University. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Judge Charles A. Bishop. The governor on September 17th appointed him to fill the vacancy until after the general

election. He was elected at the general election and by reason of statute became chief justice of the supreme court in January, 1909. Was reelected in 1910 and again in 1916.

A republican in politics.

BYRON W. PRESTON,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Newton, Jasper county, Iowa, February 13, 1858. Lived on a farm until 13 years of age, then went with his parents to Grinnell, Iowa. Son of Sylvester 8, and Amelia M. Preston. Attended public school and Iowa College at Grinnell. He engaged in mercantile business at Newton and Grinnell until 1883, when he went to Oskaloosa and read law with Judge L. C. Blanchard. Was admitted to the bar in 1884. Elected county attorney in 1891 and served four years. Was also city attorney. Elected judge of the district court in 1902 and served as such until January 1, 1913. Was elected judge of the supreme court of Iowa in 1912. Married Nellie Blanchard of Newton in 1880. Has two children, a son and a daughter. Is a communicant of St. James' Episcopal church at Oskaloosa,

A republican in politics.

TRUMAN S. STEVENS,

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, 49 years ago; attended the public schools, the Guthrie County High School graduated from the Law Department of the State University and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, whore he still resides. Was appointed Judge of the Fifteenth Judicial District February 1, 1917 and to the Supreme Court May 1, 1917. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term.

FRANK R. GAYNOR.

Judge of the Supreme Court, was born September 2, 1852, in Hamilton, Canada. Moved with his parents to Iowa in 1856. Acquired his education in Professor Wood's Academy at Clermont, Iowa, Griswold College at Davenport, Iowa, and the State University of Iowa, graduating from the law department of the latter in 1877. Was associated with John T. Scott and later with John F. Talbot in the town of Brooklyn, Poweshiek county, in the practice of law. Moved to Marshalltown in 1885, where he resided until 1886, when he moved to Le Mars where he has since resided.

Was elected judge of district court in 1890 and served continuously until his election to the supreme court on November 5, 1912.

Was married to Anna C. Judd at Iowa City in 1877, and has one daughter. A republican in politics.

ALBERT M. DEYOE.

Superintendent of Public Instruction, was born on a farm near Dodgeville, Iowa county, Wisconsin, November 15, 1862; moved with his parents to a farm near Mason City, Cerro county, Iowa, in 1870. His father is a native of New York and his mother was born in England.

Mr. Devoe was educated in the rural schools, the Mason City high school and the State University of Iowa. He graduated from the university in 1887 and holds two degrees, B. S. and A. M., from this institution.

Besides experience as a rural school teacher, he served one year as principal at Rock Falls, four years as principal at Garner, nine years as su-

perintendent of schools at Britt, and nine years as county superintendent of schools for Hancock county. He was elected to the office of superintendent of public instruction at the general election, November 8, 1910, and re-elected November 5, 1912. By an act of the thirty-fifth general assembly the office of superintendent of public instruction was made to be appointive, commencing July 1, 1915, term to be four years. Mr. Devoe received the first appointment under the new law.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN,

Son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Indiana, February 28, 1869. Brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873. Attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake University, completing the law course with degree of LL. B., and admitted to the bar June, 1896. Practiced law at Keosaugua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902, Appointed by Charles Aldrich Assistant Curator of the Historical Department of Iowa, 1907. Acting Curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed Curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909. Elected Curator by Board of Trustees, June, 1913. Honorary member Iowa Chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National Sculpture Society. Member American Historical Association. A founder and member board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical Association. Member and Secretary, Iowa Flag Commission. Member and Secretary Allison Memorial Commission. Member Iowa Conservative Commission, member and director Des Molnes Fine Arts Association. Member American Civic Association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY,

Reporter of the Supreme Court, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Hardin county, Iowa. He is the youngest son of George and Maria Whitney. His mother, whose maiden name was Maria Row, and who was of German parentage, died at Union, Iowa, on May 7, 1904, at the age of eighty years and eight months. His father is of American-born parents. Mr. Whitney received his early education in the country schools. Remained upon the farm until he was about eighteen years of age. Taught school five years, the last year of which he was principal of the high school at Union. Attended school for two years at Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa. Studied law with Hon. C. E. Albrook of Eldora. Graduated from the law department of Drake University, 1890, and in the same month went to Sloux City, to attend the republican state convention as a delegate from Hardin county. He did not return home with his delegation, but located at Sioux City, where he has since been engaged in the practice of law. A few years after locating at Sioux City, he served as justice of the peace for two terms. Became county attorney of Woodbury county, January 1, 1901, holding that position continuously for ten years. Was married October 20, 1892, to Lillian Rodwell, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Rodwell of Union, Iowa. They have three children, Martin, Craig and George, Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Appointed Reporter of the Supreme Court in 1914.

A republican in politics,

BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.

Clerk of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. His ancestors on his father's side were Scotch-Irish, while his mother's were German. When he was a mere child his parents moved to Davis county, in 1882 moved to Decatur county, having purchased a farm three miles east of Leon. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson College and Saint Joseph University, from which institution he was graduated. He worked on the farm to earn money with which to educate himself and later taught school, being for two years principal of the Decatur high school. Served as deputy treasurer of Decatur county. He has been chairman of the republican county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees.

Mr. Garrett served one year in the office of Secretary of State Martin as corporation clock. On the inauguration of Governor Cummins he was made pardon secretary. Served in that capacity until July 1, 1907, when he became secretary of the board of parole. He resigned as secretary of the parole board on March 1, 1910, to prosecute his successful campaign for the nomination for the office of clerk of the supreme court. By act of the thirty-fifth general assembly this office was made appointive. Mr. Garrett being the first appointee.

He is active in church and benevolent activities, being president of the state missionary convention of the Church of Christ.

JOHN A. GUIHER.

Son of James and Rebecca T. Guiher, was born at Waynesburg, Greene county, Pennsylvania, December 10, 1858. Attended the public schools and Waynesburg College from which he graduated in 1878. Spent one year in the law department of Pennsylvania University. Admitted to the bar in 1881. Moved to Winterset, Iowa, in October, 1883, where he has ever since lived.

He was county attorney for Madison county, Iowa, from January, 1887, to January, 1891. January 20, 1915, was appointed and qualified as railroad commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Nathaniel S. Ketchum, Elected November 7, 1916, for a term of four years.

A republican in politics.

EDWARD D. CHASSELL.

Railroad Commissioner, was born at Holland Patent, Oneida county, New York, May 25, 1853. In 1867 he came, with his parents, William and Frances Jones Chassell, to Iowa, where they settled on a prairle farm near Iowa Falls. In early life he taught school winters and worked on the farm in the summer time. He finished his education at the Iowa State Teachers' Collega, and after teaching a few years he entered the newspaper business, which he followed for several years as editor of the Casage News and of the Le Mars Sentinel. He has always been republican in politics. He served as representative from Plymouth county in the Iowa House of Representatives in 1894, 1904 and 1906. He served six years as state binder. In December, 1906, Mr. Chassell married Miss Mary Calkins, of Wyoming, Jones county, Iowa daughter of Dr. and Mrs. M. H. Calkins. In December, 1916, he was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Geo, W. Clarke, to succeed Hon. James H. Wilson, deceased.

DWIGHT N. LEWIS.

Railroad Commissioner. Born in Oskaloosa, Iowa. Son of David and Anna Lewis. His people were originally Quakers, settling in Ohio in an early day from Maryland and Pennsylvania. Mr. Lewis attended the public schools at Oskaloosa and Des Moines and graduating in law from Drake University. Was Secretary of the Iowa Railroad Commission.

from 1899 to 1911, Assistant Commerce Counse) 1911 until January 3. 1917, when he was appointed Railroad Commissioner by Governor Clarke to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Clifford Thorne, A republican in politics.

J. H. HENDERSON,

Commerce Counsel, was born in Warren county, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, on September 16, 1848, and has ever since resided in Warren county His father, P. P. Henderson, was organizing sheriff of Warren county, its first county judge, state senator in 1859-60 and was colonel of the 10th Iowa Inf. Vol. in Civil War. J. H. Henderson received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Was married to Nannie J. Spray on October 8, 1868, and to them was born four children; Dr. E. B. Henderson, of Marengo; F. P. Henderson, lawyer at Indianola; Dwight F. Henderson, electrical engineer, Spokane, and Inez S. Proudfoot, wife of Clyde O. Proudfoot, cashier of Worths Saving Bank, Indianola. His wife died on February 10, 1902. Was married to her sister, Miss Harriet E. Spray, on June 20, 1906. He was admitted to the practice of law January 12, 1870, and on September 1, 1873, formed a partnership with Senator W. H. Berry, which continued until his election as circuit judge. Member of the school board at Indianola; has been secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson College since 1869, a member of the board of trustees of that institution and its executive committee. Was delegate to the republican national convention at Chicago in 1904. Was elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy at the November election, 1885. On the reorganization of the judiciary of the state was elected district judge for the Fifth Judicial District of the state, beginning his term January 1, 1887. Reelected at the general election in 1890, and again re-elected in 1894. He resigned, taking effect January 1, 1896. Re-entered the old law firm of Henderson & Berry, at Indianola, which continued for some years, and in 1901 formed a partnership with his son, F. P. Henderson, and continued in the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson & Henderson until his appointment as Commerce Counsel, July 1, 1911. Was re-appointed and confirmed by the senate for another four year term commencing July 1, 1915. Is a member of the M. E. Church; belongs to the Odd Fellows and Mason, a Knight Templar and A. O. U. W. Served as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. of Iowa, 1906-7 and Grand Representative from Iowa in Sovereign Grand Lodge of I. O. O. F. for two years.

FRANK F. JONES.

Member of Board of Education, was born in the state of New York, August 25, 1855, of American parentage. His family moved to Illinois in 1868 and to Iowa in 1875. He acquired a high school education and at the age of eighteen began teaching school. After coming to Iowa he taught school and farmed for several years and then became a bookkeeper in a large hardware and agricultural implement store in Villisca. Remained in this store as bookkeeper and salesman seven or eight years and until he embarked in business on his own account. This venture proved a success. and the "Jones store," still owned by him, is now one of the largest hardware and implement stores in that part of the state. He is also cashler and active manager of the Villisca National Bank, which position he has filled during the last twelve years. Superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Sunday school in Villisca for many years. Has held office in the State Sabbath School Association, as state treasurer and afterwards as chairman of the executive board. Previous to his election to the legislature he had held no public office except a service of three terms on the city council, Elected representative in 1903 and re-elected in 1906. In connection with his legislative work he was a member of the commission

appointed by the thirtieth general assembly to visit the reformatories of the east and investigate the workings of the reformatory and indeterminate sentence systems of the country and report to the thirty-first general assembly. He was also a member of the legislative insurance investigating commission of 1908. Elected senator in 1912. Appointed as a member of the Board of Education in 1915. A republican in politics,

GEORGE T. BAKER,

Member of Board of Education, was born on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa. Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Connecticut, McClain's academy at Iowa City, Iowa, and the Iowa State University. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, class of 1879.

During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location construction and maintenance work after which he was chief consulting engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, Iowa, and Winona, Minnesota.

From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy building construction.

Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, as a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900.

A democrat in politics.

HENRY MARTIN EICHER.

Member of Board of Education, was born on a farm in Washington county, Iowa, in 1858. His father and mother wore German Mennonites and their business was farming. Mr. Eicher adopted the religion of his parents and in his youth attended the public schools at his home and the Eastern Iowa normal school at Grandview. He also had opportunities for education by teaching in the public schools from time to time during about five years. In 1883 he was admitted to the bar, located at Washington, and has practiced law there ever since. In 1888 he was married to Frances McKee. They have three children, two daughters and a son. He has always been a democrat, and never occupied a position above a township office except assistant United States attorney in Cleveland's administration

PAUL E. STILLMAN.

Member of Board of Education, was born in Chicago, Illinois, November 4, 1868, of native born parents. He received his early education in the schools of Chicago and of Waucoma, Iowa, where his father was engaged in the business of milling. In 1884 the family moved to Jefferson in Greene County, where the father, E. B. Stillman, became proprietor of the Jefferson Bee. In 1887 entered the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor, and graduated with degree of Bacholor of Arts in 1891. Since that time has been connected with the Jefferson Bee as editor and part owner. Has never hald public office until elected representative in 1906. He-elected in 1908 and 1910, and was chosen speaker of the house of representatives of the thirty-fourth general assembly. A republican in politics.

EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.

Member of Board of Education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local schools until 12 years of age. Then entered the German-English academy in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and took a three years course preparatory to entering the manual training school of Washington University, St. Louis. In 1891 this course was completed and he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston taking the four years course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895.

This was followed by nearly three years foreign study; two years of which were spent in Paris, France, as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Membre de L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces, Italy, Germany, and the Netherlands. Upon returning to this country, he became identified with architectural work in St. Louis and later, in 1899, opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city and surrounding territory during the next ten years. Soon after the death of his father, John Schoentgen, of the jobbing grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company, he relinquished the practice of his profession and became actively connected with the wholesale grocery business, having become in 1908 and being now vice-president of the concern.

He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt, vice-president of the State Insurance Co.

In 1902 he was appointed a member of the newly created capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins and served until the work for which it was created was accomplished. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the present board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

DANIEL D. MURPHY.

Member of Board of Education, was born of Irish parentage near New Diegings, LaFayette county, Wisconsin, August 22, 1862. He was educated in the public schools of the state of Wisconsin, and graduated from the Wisconsin state normal school. In 1883 he came to Guttenberg, Clayton county, Iowa, as superintendent of the high school, which position he held for three years. In 1887 he was graduated from the law college of the State University of Iowa, and returned to Clayton county, finally locating at Eikader, where he has been engaged in the practice of his profession as a lawyer, for the past twenty-three years. He served as county attorney of Clayton county, from 1891 to 1895; has been a member of the school board of Elikader for the past nine years, and is now serving as such member. He is a member of the Iowa state bar association, of which association he served as president in 1907 and 1908; is also a member of the American bar association, and of the American academy of political and social sciences. A democrat in politics.

WILLARD C. STUCKSLAGER,

Member of Board of Education, was born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. His parents were natives of Fayette county, Pennsylvania. His father located in Linn county, Iowa, in 1851. Mr. Stuckslager attended the public schools at Lisbon, graduating from the high school there in 1886. Then entered Cornell College at Mount Vernon, Iowa, going from that institution in 1893 to Chicago University. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Aurachter bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present is president of the above mentioned bank and also of the Mount Vernon

bank, located in the adjoining town of Mount Vernon. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past eighteen years, twolve years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirty-first thirty-second and thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

CHARLES RICHMOND BRENTON,

Member of Board of Education, was born near Dallas Center, Iowa, January 30, 1864. When about fourteen years of age, he moved to Dallas Center with his parents, where he has since resided. His ancestors on both sides of the family fought in the revolutionary and civil wars.

Was married in 1893 to Miss Carrie Woodward.

Has always been a republican and was a delegate to the national republican convention held at St. Louis in 1896.

lie has been president of the Dallas Center school board for many years and the Dallas Center high school has long been his special pride.

He has never been an office seeker and all the offices held by him have been of an honorary character. He served four years on the board of trustees of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and was a member of that body at the time of its abolishment, and was the only member of that board to be given a place on the Iowa state board of education.

Mr. Brenton and his brother are the owners of several thousand acres of Iowa lands, several banks and many other large outide investments. He has always given his attention to the new popular pursuit of farming and is one of the men who has demonstrated the possibilities, as well as the profits, to be derived from the Iowa lands. He is now vice-president of the bank of Dallas Center, a private institution, which does a larger banking business than any other hank in Iowa located in a town the size of Dallas Center.

Mr. Brenton is deeply interested in religious matters and was a delegate to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church held in Baltimore in 1908. He is a member of the Masonic order and several other fraternal organizations and has always been loyal to his community and steadfast in its interests.

PARKER KIMBALL HOLBROOK,

Member of Board of Education, was born at Onawa, Iowa, September 23, 1864, and is the son of Bernard D. Holbrook and Mary F. (Oliver) Holbrook.

He was educated in Onawa high school and the State University of Iowa, of which latter institution he was a member of the class of 1885, but did not graduate. In June, 1885, he entered the banking house of Holbrook & Bro., in which he became a partner in 1894 and has continued in that business to the present time.

He was elected regent of the state university in 1896, and re-elected in 1992 and 1998. Elected chairman of the executive committee of the board of regents in 1897, and continued in that position until the establishment of the state board of education. A republican in politics.

THOMAS LAMBERT,

Member of Finance Committe of the Board of Education, was born on a farm near Sabula, Jackson county, Iowa, February 13, 1855. His father Thomas D. Lambert, was a native of Maine, and his mother, Sarah (Guenther) Lambert was born in Pennsylvania. Received his education in a select school in Sabula, and has been a resident of that place from birth until the present time. Early in life he learned the trades of stone mason and butcher working at the former during the summer months and the latter during the winters. Also "steamboated" on the Mississippi sufficiently to secure a special pilot's license. In 1880 entered the newspaper field purchasing the Sabula Gazette which he still owns. From 1883 to 1886 he was engaged in the pork packing and grain buying business with Mr. C. B Cotton, under the firm name of Lambert & Cotton His political affiliation is with the democratic party, and in public office has served four years as city recorder, followed by eight successive terms as mayor of Sabula, He was justice of the peace over twenty years and secretary of the school hoard 1882 until he resigned to accept a position on the finance committee of the board of education, July 1, 1909. He was elected a member of the house of representatives in 1895 and 1897. Elected to the senate in 1899 and 1903, thus serving in the house in the twenty-sixth, special session of the twenty-sixth, and twenty-seventh general assemblies, and in the senate during the twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth, thirtieth, thirty-first and thirtysecond general assemblies, a record of eight consecutive sessions. one of the first to advocate one board of management for the state educational institutions and served on the legislative commission appointed to investigate and report thereon. Was a delegate to the democratic national convention in 1888.

In fraternal organizations was Grand Master of Masons in Iowa in 1899-1800, and has since acted as chairman of the board of trustees of the grand charity fund of the grand lodge. Was also supreme vice-president of the modern brotherhood of America several years.

On August 3, 1883, he was united in marriage with Miss Jennie Cotton. of Sabula.

W. H. GEMMILL,

Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in the Province of Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his paren's moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the country schools and later the South English high school, from which he was graduated in the spring of 1889. He taught a term in the country school in the winter of 1889-90. In February, 1891, he entered the Freshman Class of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, at Ames, and was graduated from that Institution in November, 1894, with the degree of Bachelor of Science. During the period of his attendance at college, he taught during the winters. Since graduation from the Iowa State College, he has done a year's educational work in history and economics in Highland Park College, one and one half year's work in history and education in Dea Moines College.

He was principal of the Gibson, Iowa, schools two and one-half years, when he was elected to the county superintendency of Keckuk county, which office he held four years. In the fall of 1901 he was elected superintendent of schools at Dallas Center, and held that position until January 1. 1911, when he resigned to accept the superintendency of the Carroll Schools. He held this position three years, when he resigned to become secretary of Iowa State Board of Education.

He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

WILLIAM R. BOYD.

Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His parents, Jasper W. Boyd and Elizabeth (Osmond) Boyd, were natives of Pennsylvania.

His boyhood was, for the most part, spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store.

After graduation he spent two years as principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa; from 1891 to 1893 was editor of the Tipton Advertiser, and from 1893 to 1909 editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican. Mr. Boyd scrved as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from April, 1899, to July, 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe College, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

ANTHONY M. McCOLL.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Caledonia, Livingston county, New York, May 19, 1858. His parents were American born, but of Scotch lineage. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912.

Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired July 1, 1913. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM D. SHEEAN.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Anamosa, Jones county, Iowa, July 7, 1867, and has spent most of his life in that city. His father was born in Boston, Massachusetts, and his mother in Illinois. Received his education in the public schools and college. Served as clerk of the district court of Jones county. Has been mayor of Anamosa several terms. At present is engaged in the practice of law. Studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1895. Married in 1891 to Miss Carrie H. Lull, who died in 1896. To them were born two daughters, one who died in infancy. Elected representative from Jones county in the 27th general assembly. Elected senator in 1912. Appointed a member of the Board of Control March 26, 1916, to succeed Col. J. H. McConlogue, and term will expire July 1st, 1921. A democrat in politics

J. H. STRIEF.

Member of the Board of Control of State Institutions, was born in Galena, Illinois, August 21, 1865. His parents located at Dubuque, Iowa, in 1865. a few years later moving to Chicago, Illinois, and residing in the latter city until 1876; in August of that year again taking up residence in Iowa, at LeMars, Plymouth county, where Mr. Strief learned the printer's trade and later conducted a weekly newspaper. In the years since 1876 he has been a continuous resident of Iowa. He located in Sioux City in 1834 and for some years was employed in the composing rooms of the daily newspapers of that city. In 1901 he was chosen secretary-treasurer of the

Iowa State Federation of Labor, which position he held for a period of twelve years. At the Des Moines convention of the Iowa State Federation of Labor, June, 1913, he was elected president of the Federation, and filled that office for a period of four years, headquarters in Sioux City, retiring June 15, 1917. His work as an official of the Federation took him to the larger cities of the state many times each year, also to cities in neighboring states, glving him a very wide acquaintance throughout Iowa. He is married and has two sons. A republican in politics. His father was born in the city of Glarus, Switzerland, in 1839, coming to this country with his parents in 1846. His mother was born in Schenectady, N. Y., in 1842.

He was appointed a member of the Board of Control by Governor W. L. Harding and confirmed by the senate of the thirty-seventh general assembly of lowa.

Legal residence, Sioux City, Iowa.

DAVID C. MOTT,

Member of the Board of Parole, was born in Washington county, Ohio, March 23, 1858. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1862, living two years In Cedar county and moving to Keokuk county in 1864. His education was obtained in the country school with one year in academy. Taught country school several terms and farmed. In 1888 bought the What Cheer Patriot. Was postmaster the last two years of President Harrison's term. Owner and editor of the Tipton Advertiser from 1894 to 1897. In the latter year bought the Audubon Republican, which he edited eight years. He represented Audubon county in the thirtieth and thirty-first general assemblies. After spending one year in the newspaper business at El Reno, Oklahoma, he bought the Marengo Republican in 1907. This paper his son, Frank L., and himself owned and published until November, 1913, when it was sold. He was appointed a member of the board of parole by Governor Carroll to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. P. A. Smith, re-appointed by Governor Clarke for the term ending July 1, 1919. A republican in politics.

GEORGE T. REDDICK,

Member of the Board of Parole, was born in Prince Edward county, Ontario, March 29, 1884. He came to Iowa in January, 1896, located in Iowa City, and engaged in the general printing business until the spring of 1911; was elected city clerk of Iowa City, Iowa, for two terms; was appointed a member of the Board of Parole by Governor Harding in April, 1917, to fill the office made vacant by the death of Dr. John E. Howe, also appointed for the term ending June 30, 1923. A democrat in politics.

WINFIELD S. WITHROW,

Member of the Board of Parole, was born September 28, 1855, at Salem, Henry county, Iowa. His education was acquired in the public schools and at Whittier College, located at Salem. In 1880 he graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa and entered the practice of law at Salem. In 1885 was elected representative in the Twenty-first general assembly, serving one term, declining re-nomination. In 1887 he removed to Mt. Pleasant, which since has been his home, continuing in the practice of the law until, under the appointment by Governor Drake, became judge of the Twentieth judicial district. He was elected for the first time in 1896, and re-elected without opposition in 1900, 1904, 1908 and 1912, resigning on April 18, 1913, to accept the appointment to the supreme

court made by Governor Geo. W. Clarke, under the act of the Thirty-fifth general assembly increasing the membership of that court. He was for twenty years a frustee of Iowa Wesleyan University at Mt. Pleasant. He was appointed a member of the Board of Parole July 8, 1916, by Governor Clarke, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of William Dennis. Term will expire July 1, 1921.

A republican in politics.

GUY E. LOGAN,

Adjutant General of Iowa, was born in Red Oak, Montgomery county, Iowa, March 11, 1871. His ancestors on his father's side were Scotch, while his mother's were descended from Irlsh and German stock. His education was acquired in the public schools of Red Oak. He worked on a farm from 1888 to 1892, at which later date he was appointed deputy sheriff of Montgomery county, which office he held until 1896. He was mustered into the volunteer forces as second lieutenant of Company "M," Fifty-first Iowa Volunteer Infantry, for the Spanish-American war, on April 26, 1898, with which organization he served in the Philippine Islands and was mustered out of the service at San Francisco, California, November 2, 1899. During the twenty-eighth general assembly he served as assistant doorkeeper of the senate. He was county recorder of Montgomery county from January 1, 1901, until June 1, 1905, at which time he resigned to accept the appointment of major and assistant adjutant general of Iowa. He served in that position until February, 1909, when he was appointed and promoted to brigadier general and adjutant general of Iowa. His term of office expires at the pleasure of the governor. A republican in politics.

ROBERT HENDERSON,

State Printer, was born at Eurlington, Iowa, in 1874, and has lived all his life in Iowa, with the exception of the time spent at Washington, D. C., from 1890 to 1902, while private secretary to Judge Walter I. Smith, then a member of congress. At the age of fifteen he began learning the printer's trade at Creston. After engaging in the printing business a few years, he turned to the editorial department of the newspaper business, and for eighteen years was engaged as reporter and editorial writer on Iowa dailies, most of the time with the Council Bluffs Nongareil, of which he was editor for seven years. His home is at Council Bluffs. He is married and has three children. A republican in politics.

JOHN MILTON JAMIESON.

State Binder, was born April 5, 1872, at Batavia, Ohio His father, Samuel F. Jamieson, and his mother, Sylvia Shepherd Jamieson, were both natives of Ohio, the former of Scotch and the latter of English descent. His parents moved to Casey Iowa, in 1880, where his father engaged in the general mercantile business. He attended public schools in Casey and Indianola and when 14 years of age entered the preparatory department at Simpson college. He was graduated from said institutions with the class of 1891, and from 1891 to 1897 was employed as a clerk in his father's store, except for a few months during the year 1895, during a portion of which time he was reporter on the Council Bluffs Nonpareil and the remainder as a temporary clerk in the office of State Superintendent Sabin. In May, 1897, he was appointed corporation clerk in the office of secretary of state by George L. Dobson. In 1899 he became chief clerk and then was promoted to the position of clerk of the state land office, which position he held during the remainder of Mr. Dobson's administration and throughout the

administration of W. B. Martin. He was appointed deputy secretary of state by W. C. Hayward and held that position for six years. He was elected state binder by the thirty-fourth general assembly for a term of two years beginning January 1, 1913, and was re-elected by the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies.

Mr. Jamieson is a republican in politics and maintains his legal residence in Casey. He was married to Stella May Young in May, 1895, and they have two children.

EMORY H. ENGLISH,

Commissioner of Insurance of Iowa, is a native of the state, and 46 years old. He devoted twenty-two years to newspaper work, during that time serving three terms as state representative from the Des Moines district.

Mr. English is a republican and was the author of the first primary election law enacted in Iowa, and also of important legislation in 1902, compelling additional reports to the state upon gross and net earnings by railways to aid in the fixing of valuations for purposes of taxation, this act being the only notable change in the railway taxation statutes of Iowa, since 1872. During his legislative service Mr. English was chairman of the Insurance Committee of the House, and introduced measures enacted by the General Assembly in 1904 and 1906 reorganizing the work of the State Insurance Department.

Completing his legislative service in 1906, Mr. English was elected by the legislature as state printer, serving six years. Upon assuming this position he disposed of his daily newspaper, the *Mason City Times*, returning to Des Moines where he has since resided. In June, 1914, he was appointed to the newly created position of Commissioner of Insurance by Governor Clarke and was reappointed and confirmed by the senate for the term ending February 1, 1919.

ORA WILLIAMS.

State Document Editor, born in Dallas county, on a farm, January 16, 1882, his parents being pioneers of the county from Indiana. He attended the rural schools and later the Adel high school from which he was graduated in the first class, June, 1880. He had remained on the farm until this time, but after a year of teaching as assistant principal of the high school, he purchased an interest in a weekly newspaper and became editor. He learned the printer's trade in all its branches. In 1886 he became a reporter on the Des Moines Register and was later news editor and city editor. He was afterwards managing editor of the Sioux City Journal, then an editorial writer on the Omaha Bee, editor of the Sioux Falls Press, and for a year was editor of the Chicago Dally Review. He had been engaged in special correspondence work in Des Moines for fifteen years prior to his appointment by Gov. Clarke as state document editor upon the establishment of the document department July 1, 1915. He was reappointed by Gov. Harding and unanimously confirmed by the senate.

BIOGRAPHIES OF UNITED STATES SENATORS.

ALBERT BAIRD CUMMINS.

Republican, of Des Moines, Polk county, was born near Carmichaels, Pennsylvania, February 15, 1850; was educated in the public schools, preparatory academy, and was three years in Waynesburg (Pa.) College; the latter institution conferred the degrees of M. A. and LL. D upon him, and Corneli College, Iowa, that of LL. D.; is a lawyer by profession, and married; and was a member of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-second General Assembly of Iowa; a member of the Republican National Committee from 1896 to 1900, and Governor of Iowa from January, 1902, until elected November 24, 1908, to fill a vacancy in the United States Senate caused by the death of Hon. W. B. Allison. He was re-elected in 1903 and 1914.

WILLIAM SQUIRE KENYON.

Republican, of Fort Dodge, Webster county, was born at Alyria, Ohlo, June 10, 1868; educated at Iowa College, Grinnell, and law school of the University of Iowa; was prosecuting attorney for Webster county for five years; district judge for two years; assistant to the Attorney General of the United States for one year. He was elected to the United States Senate April 12, 1911, to succeed the Hon. Lafayettte Young, who was appointed United States Senator November 12, 1910, to fill the yacancy caused by the death of Hon. Jonathan P. Dolliver, and took his seat April 24, 1911; was elected January 22, 1913, for the term ending March 3, 1919.

CHARLES A. KENNEDY,

Of Montrose, Lee county, Representative from the First district, composed of the counties of Des Moines, Henry, Jefferson, Lec, Louisa, Van Buren, and Washington, was born in Montrose, Lee county, March 24, 1869; finishing the high school course he formed a partnership, which still exists, with his brother in the nursery business. At the age of twenty-one he was elected mayor of Montrose and served four terms; served as a member of the House in the Thirticth and Thirty-first General Assemblies, being the first Republican from Lee county in twenty-two years; was elected to the Sixtjeth, Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth congresses.

Republican in politics.

HARRY E. HULL,

Of Williamsburg, Iowa county, Iowa, Representative from the Second district, composed of the counties of Jackson, Clinton, Scott, Muscatine, Johnson and Iowa. Born on his father's farm near Belvidere, Alleghany county, N. Y., March 12, 1864. Moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa; received common school education. Bought grain, at Palo, Iowa, Moved to Williamsburg, Iowa, 1884, where he engaged in the grain business. Married to Mary

Louise Harris, June 3, 1891, and has one child. Harris. Was mayor of Williamsburg ten years. Postmaster for thirteen years. Resigned January 29, 1914. Member of Progress Club, a social and study society, for twenty-five years. Accepted nomination for congress at special election held March 10th. Elected to the Sixty-fourth congress and re-elected to the sixty-fifth congress. A republican in politics.

BURTON ERWIN SWEET.

Of Waverly, Bremer county, Iowa, Representative from the Third Congressional district, composed of the counies of Black Hawk, Bremer, Butler, Delaware, Dubuque, Franklin Hardin and Wright was born in Bremer county, Iowa, on December 10, 1867. Educated in the common schools, Iowa State Normal School, and graduated from Cornell, Mount Vernon, Jowa in June, 1893, with the degree of Ph. B. Graduated in June, 1895, from the law department of the State University of Iowa, with the degree of LL. B. Was admitted to the par in 1895. Has been engaged in the practice of law at Waverly, Iowa, ever since, the firm name being Sager & Sweet. Also a member of the law firm of Sager, Sweet & Edwards at Waterloo, Iowa. Was city solicitor of Waverly, Iowa, three years. Was a member of the House of Representatives in the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies of Iowa. Served four years on the Republican State Central committee from the Third Congressional district of Iowa. Is the owner of farm land in Bremer county and elsewhere. Interested in a number of banks in Bremer county. Elected to the Sixty-fourth Congress November 3, 1914, and to the Sixty-fifth Congress November 7, 1916. Republican in politics.

GILBERT N. HAUGEN,

Of Northwood, Worth county, Representative from the Fourth District, composed of the counties of Aliamakoe, Cerro Gordo, Chickasaw, Clayton, Fayette, Floyd, Howard, Mitchell, Winneshiek and Worth; was born April 21, 1859, in Rock county, Wisconsin; since the age of fourteen, and prior to his election to Congress, he was actively engaged in various enterprises, principally real estate and banking; was treasurer of Worth county, Iowa, for six years; was elected to the Iowa legislature, serving in the Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth General Assemblies; was elected to the Fifty-sixth, Ffty-seventh, Fifty-eighth, Fifty-ninth, Sixtleth, Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth Congresses.

JAMES WILLIAM GOOD,

Of Cedar Rapids, Linn county. Representative from the Fifth District, composed of the counties of Benton, Cedar, Grundy, Jones, Linn, Marshall and Tama, was born September 24, 1866, near that place; graduated from Coe College, Cedar Rapids, in 1892, receiving the degree of bachelor of science; also graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan in 1893, receiving the degree of bachelor of laws; is a lawyer by profession; was married to Miss Lucy Deacon in October, 1893; was elected to the Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fitth Congresses.

CHRISTIAN WILLIAM RAMSEYER,

Of Bloomfield, Davis county, Representative from the Sixth District, composed of the counties of Davis, Jasper, Keokuk, Mahaska, Monroe, Poweshick and Wanello, was born on a farm near Collinaville, Butler county, Ohio, March 13, 1875. When two years of age his parents moved to McLean county, Hilmois, where his father died in 1881. Since 1887 Davis county has been his home. He graduated from the Southern Lowa Normal at Bloomfield in 1897 and from the Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls in 1902. He taught school six years, the last two years of which he was superintendent of the Bloomfield public schools. He graduated from the College of Law of the State University of Iowa in 1905 and since that time has been practicing law at Bloomfield. Was elected county attorney of Davis county in November, 1910, and re-elected in November, 1912. Elected to the Sixty-fourth Congress November 3, 1914, and to the Sixty-fifth Congress November 7, 1916.

CASSIUS C. DOWELL,

Representative in the Congress of the United States from the Seventh Congressional District of Iowa, composed of the counties of Polk, Dallas, Madison, Warren, Marion and Story, was born in Warren county, Iowa, February 29, 1864, of American parentage. Received his education in the common schools in Warren county. Attended Simpson Collège and graduated from Drake University in the Idberal Arts and Law departments. Was admitted to the bar of the state in 1888. Was assistant county attorney of Polk county for two years, member of the House of Representatives in the Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, and Twenty-sixth extra general assemblies. And state senator in the Twenty-Inith, Thirtieth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-second extra and Thirty-third general assemblies. Was a member of the Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth Congresses.

HORACE MANN TOWNER,

Of Corning, Adams county, Representative from the Eighth District, composed of the counties of Adams, Appanoose, Clarke, Decatur, Fremont. Lucas, Page, Ringgold, Taylor, Union and Wayne, was born at Belvidere, Illinois, October 23, 1855; received a high school education at that place and a collegiate education at Chicago University, and studied law at the Union College of Law; removed to Iowa and commenced the practice of his profession at Corning in 1880; in 1890 he was elected judge of the Third Judicial District of Iowa and held that position until January 1, 1911; for several years he was lecturer on constitutional law at the State University of Iowa, and has served as President of the Iowa State Bar Association; was married in 1887 to Miss Harriet Cole of Corning. Elected to the Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth Congresses.

WILLIAM RAYMOND GREEN.

Of Audubon, Audubon county, Representative from the Ninth District composed of the counties of Adair, Audubon, Cass, Guthric, Mills, Montgomery, Pottawattamie and Shelby was born at Colchester, Connecticut, November 7, 1856; received a high school education at Princeton, Ill., and graduated at Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, in 1879; read law in the office of McCoy & Pratt, Chicago, and was admitted at Ottawa, Illinois, 16

in 1882; began the practice of law at Dodge City, Iowa; later moved to Council Bluffs and from there to Audubon in the fall of 1886; was elected judge of the district court in 1894, and re-elected in 1898, 1902, 1906 and 1910; was elected Representative in Congress at the special election held June 5, 1911, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Hon. Walter I. Smith. Elected to the Sixty-third Congress November 5, 1912, to the Sixty-fourth Congress November 2, 1914, and to the Sixty-fifth Congress, November 7, 1916.

FRANK P. WOODS

Of Estherville, Emmet county. Representative from the Tenth District, composed of the counties of Boone, Calhoun, Carroll, Crawford, Emmet, Greene, Hamilton, Humboldt, Kossuth, Pale Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Winnebago, was born in Walworth county, Wisconsin, where he attended the public schools, afterwards finishing his education at the Northern Indiana Normal School at Valparaise; in 1887 moved to Iowa; in 1906 and 1907 was chairman of the Republican State Central Committee; was elected to Congress November 3, 1908; re-elected November 8, 1910, November 5, 1912, November 3, 1914 and November 7, 1916.

Moved to Iowa in 1880. Educated in the common and high school of, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar December 7, 1887. Married Miss Laura Trimble of Adel, Iowa, June 14, 1888. Elected Representative in Congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Elbert H. Hubbard Re-elected to the Sixty-third Congress November 5, 1912. Elected to Sixty-fifth Congress November 7, 1916. Election contested by Thomas J. Steele, not yet decided.

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THIRTY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held blennially in the odd numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the thirty-seventh general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the thirty-seventh general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant-governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state and by him bound in book form, after the close of a session.

JOINT RULES OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY,

COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE.

1. Whenever either house shall amend a measure and the other house shall refuse to concur in and adopt the amendment, the house which has adopted such amendment shall either insist on or recede from the same. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. In case said house refuses to concur, the house which adopted the amendment may either recede from or insist upon such amendment, and a motion to recede takes precedence of a motion to insist. In case a motion to insist on the amendment be decided in the progative, such action shall be deemed

as receding from the amendment and so entered upon the journal of the house. In case the amendment is insisted upon, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house shall thereupon appoint such a committee. Unless another number is specified in said request, such conference committee shall consist of four members from each house. They shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairman, and having conferred freely each shall report to their respective house the result of their conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action shall be immediately reported by the secretary or clerk to the other house, the papers referred accompanying the message. In case of disagreement of the conference committee, the papers shall remain with the house which insisted on the amendment. The agreeing report of a conference committee shall be made, read and skened in duplicate by all the members of the committee, or by a majority of those of each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the committee of each house.

TRANSMISSION OF MESSAGES.

2. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the doorkeeper thereof, and shall be respectfully communicated to the chair by the person by whom it is sent,

WHO SHALL TRANSMIT MESSAGES.

. 3. All messages between the two houses shall be communicated by the secretary or chief clerk of their respective assistants.

ENROLLING BILLS.

4. When a bill shall have passed both houses it shall be duly enrolled by the enrolling clerk of the house in which it originated, and the fact of its origin shall be certified by the endorsement of the secretary or clerk thereof.

EXAMINATION OF ENROLLMENT BY JOINT COMMITTEE.

5. When the bills are enrolled they shall be examined by a joint committee of two from the senate and two from the house of representatives, who shall be a standing committee for that purpose, and who shall carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed bills, as passed in the house, correct any errors therein, and make report thereof forthwith to their respective houses.

SIGNATURE OF BILLS.

6. After the report, each bill shall be signed, first by the speaker of the house of representatives, and then by the president of the senate, in the presence of their respective houses.

TRANSMISSION TO THE GOVERNOR.

7. After a bill shall have been thus signed in each house, it shall be forthwith presented, by committee of the house in which the bill originated, to the governor, for his approval, and they shall forthwith report the date of presentation, which shall be entered upon the journal of the house in which the bill originated.

WHAT SHALL BE ENROLLED.

8. All orders, resolutions, memorials or other votes, which are to be presented to the governor for his approval, shall be enrolled, examined, signed and presented in the same manner as hills.

ENDORSEMENT OF BILLS.

9. When any bill, resolution or memorial, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected or adopted in the other, notice of such action shall be given to the house which passed the same. And each bill, resolution or memorial shall have properly endorsed thereon, at the time of its transmission, a statement, signed by the secretary or clerk, of the action which has been taken thereon by the house transmitting the same, with the date thereof.

PROCEDURE FOR SECOND INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

10. When a bill, resolution or memorial which shall have passed one house is rejected in the other, it shall not be again introduced during the session without five days notice and leave of a majority of the members of the house in which the same is sought to be introduced.

TRANSMISSION OF ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTS.

11. Each house shall transmit to the other with any bill, resolution or memorial all papers upon which the same shall be founded.

PRINTING OF BILLS.

12. When any report, bill or resolution shall be ordered printed by either house, without stating the number, three hundred copies shall be printed for the use of both houses, but when any bill or resolution which may have passed one house is ordered printed by the other, a greater number of copies shall not be printed than the house making the order shall determine.

COMMUNICATION OF PRINTING ORDERS.

13. It shall be the duty of the chief clerk of the house of representatives and the secretary of the senate, when any document, except bills and resolutions, is ordered to be printed in their respective houses, forthwith to communicate such order to the other house.

ARRANGEMENT OF ROLL CALL IN JOINT CONVENTION,

14. In all lections in joint convention of the two houses, the names of all members shall be arranged in alphabetical order, and they shall be called upon to vote in the order in which they stand arranged.

DUTY OF COMMITTEE ON CLAIMS.

15. It shall be the duty of the committee on claims in each house to keep a book of record, in which shall be entered each claim for money against the state referred to them, whether presented in favor of private persons or municipal or other corporations, entering therein the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim, the grounds therefor, with note of the evidence offered in support of the same, and the final conclusion of the committee thereon. At the close of the session said book of record shall be deposited with the auditor of state, to be kept by him, and he shall provide an index, showing the names of the claimants recorded therein. At any subsequent session the same shall be delivered, when desired, to the like committee having jurisdiction of such claims and shall always be open to the examination of the said committee of either house.

RULES OF THE SENATE.

REGULAR ORDER OF DAILY BUSINESS.

- 1. The following order shall govern:
 - Presentations of petitions and memorials, addressed to the senate or the general assembly.
 - (2) Introduction of bills.
 - (3) Resolutions.
 - (4) Communications on the president's table, including house messages.
 - (5) Reports of standing committees, in order in which they stand in the rules, except the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, rules and printing.
 - (6) Reports of select committees.
 - (7) Unfinished business before the senate.
 - (8) Third reading of bills,
 - (9) General order of the day:

PRESIDENT AND HIS DUTIES.

2. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the senate is adjourned and call the senate to order; and, if a quorum be present, he shall proceed with the regular order of daily business, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, or unless a special order for the day shall interfere therewith. He shall preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the senate. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise especially ordered. Immediately preceding the adjournment of each morning session, or, in case it cannot be done during that session, then as soon after the convening of the next following session as he may find most convenient, the president shall call for corrections of the journal of the last day's proceedings. He shall then cause any mistakes therein to be corrected by the secretary, and the journal shall then be approved.

PRESIDENT PRO TEM, ELECTION AND DUTIES.

3. The senate shall, at its pleasure, elect a president pro tem, who shall hold his office during the remaining portion of the time for which the president was elected; and when the president shall, from any cause, be absent, the president pro tem shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by the president.

MESSENGERS.

4. There shall be appointed by the lieutenant governor, at each session of the senate, to hold their positions during such session, but subject to be discharged by the president of the senate for inefficiency or misbehavior, or other reasons, in his judgment justifying such discharge, six messengers for the senate. And the president may appoint other messengers in the place of any discharged.

CALL OF SENATE AND ATTENDANCE.

5. One-fourth of the members may have a call of the senate, and absent members sent for and their attendance enforced.

MANNER OF SECURING RECOGNITION,

6. When a member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid personalities and the imputation of improper motives. No senator shall be permitted to speak more than fifteen minutes on any one question unless his time is extended by consent of a majority of the Senate.

VIVA VOCE VOTE. DIVISION.

7. When the vote is taken viva voce, questions shall be distinctly put in this form: viz: "As many as are of the opinion (as the case may be) say 'aye'." And after the affirmative voice is expressed: "As many as are of the contrary opinion say 'No." If the president doubt, or a division be called for, the senate shall divide—those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative.

VOTING.

8. Every member present when a question is put shall vote, unless he shall, for special cause, he excused by a vote of the senate; but no member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is directly and personally interested, or except by consent of the senate, in any case where he was not present when his name was called in the taking of the vote. Provided, that any member who was absent by leave of the senate may vote at any time before the result is announced.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS, WHEN IN WHITING.

9. All motions (except to adjourn, postpone, or commit) shall be reduced to writing, if required by any member of the senate. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, provided the same has not been amended by the senate, and that no amendment is pending thereto.

DEBATE. WHAT MOTIONS IN ORDER. PRECEDENCE.

10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are named; and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have the precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to the rejection of the bill.

MOTIONS NOT DEPATABLE.

11: A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, and all incidental questions of order arising after the motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided—whether an appeal or otherwise—without debate.

PREVIOUS QUESTIONS.

12. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the senate to a direct vote upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question, unless otherwise indicated by the motion and ordered by the senate, except that the member in charge of the measure under consideration shall have ten minutes in which to close the discussion, immediately before the vote is taken upon the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative, the senate shall proceed with the matter before it, the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

DIVISION OF QUESTION.

13. Any member may call for a division of a question which shall be divided, if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that one being taken away, substantive propositions shall remain for the decision of the senate. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but, a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendments to the matter attempted to be stricken out, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

WHO MAY MAKE MOTION TO RECONSIDER.

14. When a motion or question has been decided, any member having voted on the prevailing side may move a reconsideration, on the same or next legislative day. "If any motion to reconsider a bill or joint resolution is made within three days of the day fixed for the final adjournment, it shall be acted upon on the day the motion is made or the same shall be considered withdrawn."

PRINTING IN RECORD.

15. A motion to print any paper presented to the senate, may, on motion, be referred to the committee on printing, whose duty it shall be to report, at the earliest time practicable, on the propriety of printing.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS, READINGS. HOW WRITTEN,

16. Every bill shall be introduced on the report of a committee, or by leave and shall at once be given its first reading. Every bill and joint resolution shall have received three several readings previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall have its second and third readings on the same day, without a suspension of this rule; and every bill and joint resolution shall express in its title the object thereof. All rules of the senate applicable to bills shall apply with equal force to joint resolutions. Each bill and proposed joint resolution, when introduced, shall be typewritten double-space, and accompanied by two copies thereof.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS, ENDORSEMENTS, PRESENTATION.

17. Before the same is presented, there shall be endorsed on each petition a brief statement of the subject matter thereof, and on each bill and joint resolution the title thereof, and in either case the name of the senator presenting the same. In presenting a petition, the senator shall briefly state from his place in the senate chamber the subject matter to which the petition relates.

FIRST READING OF BILL OR A JOINT RESOLUTION. OBJECTION.

18. The first reading of a bill or joint resolution shall be for information, and, if objection be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall the bill (or joint resolution, as the case may be) be rejected?" If no objection be made, or the question to reject be lost, the bill or joint resolution shall go to its second reading without further questioning.

SECOND READING. COMMITMENT. CONSIDERATION ON.

19. Upon the second reading of a bill or joint resolution, the president shall refer the bill to an appropriate standing ommittee, unless otherwise ordered by the senate. If ordered by the senate to be considered by the committee of the whole, the senate shall fix the day for its consideration. If the bill or joint resolution be ordered to be engrossed, it shall be in order for its third reading any session after that day. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

APPROPRIATION FILLS. DUTIES OF COMMITTEE, TIME TO REPORT.

20. (a) All bills carrying appropriations or involving the expenditure of state funds shall be referred to the committee on appropriations, which the committee shall report back to the senate not later than the first Monday after March 1st. After the third legislative day prior to said Monday. House bills shall be reported back by said committee within three days from the reference thereto. No amendment to any bill reported by the committee on appropriations, or to any item thereof, shall be in order, except such as is germane to the subject matter of the bill, or item thereof, sought to be amended, and shall retrench expenditures and reduce the amounts of money covered by the bill or items thereof.

WHEN INTRODUCED.

(b) No bill shall be introduced in the senate after March 15th, except such bills as may be reported from standing committees as committee bills.

SCHEDULE OF APPROPRIATIONS. WHEN MADE BY COMMITTEE.

(c) On or before the first Monday after March 16th, the committee on appropriations shall prepare an itemized schedule of all appropriations recommended by the committee on appropriations, and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of members, and no appropriation bill shall be taken up for consideration and passage until the third legislative day thereafter.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND INSTITUTIONS UNDER THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

(d) Bills carrying appropriations for the state educational institutions and the institutions under the charge of the board of control shall not be introduced later than February 16th, and no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after March 1st, except by the committee on appropriations.

THIRD READING OF BILLS. ENGROSSING. VOTE ON.

21. When a question is lost on engrossing a bill, or joint resolution for a third reading on a particular day, it shall not preclude a question to engress it for a third reading on a different day. After a third reading of a bill or a joint resolution, no amendment (except to fill blanks) shall be received, except by unanimous consent of the members present; and the vote on its final passage shall be immediately taken without debate.

COMMITMENT.

22. A bill or joint resolution may be committed at any time previous to its third reading.

AMENDING.

23. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS. CONCURRENCE IN.

24. On the return of a bill or joint resolution from the house, with an amendment, it shall be placed with the third reading of bills, unless the senate shall otherwise order. On the question of adopting the amendment the vote shall be taken on the final passage of the bill, and if the amendment be adopted by a constitutional majority, no further vote is necessary.

PRINTING OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

25. All bills and joint resolutions introduced, except local or legalizing bills, shall be printed, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, and committees may order to be printed any bills under consideration by them, and any substitutes for bills or resolutions reported by them.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. WHEN IN ORDER,

26. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, on rules and on printing to report at any time, when no member is addressing the senate.

SPECIAL ORDER. WHEN CONSIDERED.

27. When any special order of the day is not proceeded with on the day assigned, it shall stand as a general order on each succeeding day until disposed of, unless otherwise ordered, but its consideration cannot be moved until that order of business is reached, when it shall be taken up in order of its file, and shall be taken up in order of precedence.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS AFTER SPECIAL ORDER.

28. When the pending question is interrupted by a "special order," it shall, upon the disposal of the special order, before the senate in the same stage as if it had not been so interrupted.

COMMITTEE CLERKS, QUALIFICATIONS.

29. Committees are permitted to employ clerks by the majority vote of the whole committee. All applicants for the position of committee clerkship shall be examined by a committee of three appointed by the president of the senate. The clerk shall be selected by such vote, and in like manner may be discharged for inefficiency, or when the services of the clerk become unnecessary. All committee clerks shall be competent stenographers and of good moral character. Any clerk may be discharged for inefficiency, immorality or indecent or unbecoming conduct, whether in or out of the senate chamber; and, upon the request of any senator or the president of the senate, made to the chairman of a committee, a meeting of the committee shall be called for the purpose of considering the question of the discharge of such clerk upon any of the grounds above specified.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEE CLERKS.

30. Clerks of senate committees, when not engaged in duties pertaining to such committees, or work assigned them by the committee chairman, shall be subject to the discretion of the secretary of the senate for any labor connected with the duties or his position or his assistants. The secretary shall, from time to time, make detail from said clerks to assist in preparing copy or correcting proof for the daily journal.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

- 31. All reports of committees on bills or resolutions shall be made in duplicate and be accompanied with the original bill or resolution to which the report relates. Provided, that this rule shall not apply to the reports of committees on enrolled and engrossed bills.
- 31-a. The chairman or clerk of a committee, except of the appropriation committee, to whom a bill is referred, shall note thereon the date of its reference, and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills in its hands, within fifteen days after the order of reference, unless a different time is granted by a yote of the senate.

YOUR IN COMMITTEE.

32. When a vote is taken in any committee upon any bill or resolution before it, or any motion relating to the merits thereof, the chairman shall see that no person is present except the members and clerk of said committee, unless otherwise ordered by the committee.

SMOKING.

33. Smoking in the senate chamber is hereby prohibited, while the senate is in session. And any officer or employe who shall indulge in smoking while on duty in the senate chamber or doorways leading thereto shall thereby subject himself to liability of discharge.

SENATE CHAMBER, ADMISSION TO. LOBBYING.

34. Admission to the floor of the senate chamber shall be granted by the doorkeeper to the governor and his private secretary, members of the house of representatives, the state officers and their deputies, judges of the several courts, ex-members of the legislature, ex-state officers, and the regular reporters of the senate and clerks of committees. No persons, except those herein specified, shall be admitted, except upon special permission of the president of the senate, or of a member of the senate. And no person shall be permitted, by members or otherwise, to come upon the floor of the senate or into the cloak rooms to solicit or influence senators in their official action, or to sell any article or to solicit subscriptions. No officer, or employe elected or appointed by the senate or any of its committees, shall solicit or endeavor to influence members of the legislature in their official action. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed by the senate.

PRESERVING ORDER.

35. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the presiding officer shall have the power to order the same cleared.

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS. WHO PRESENT.

36. Before acting on executive business, the senate chamber shall be cleared, by direction of the president, of all persons except members, the secretary, the sergeant-at-arms, members enjoined and the secretary and sergeant-at-arms sworn to observe secrecy.

COMMITTED MEETINGS. ANNOUNCEMENT.

37. When an adjournment has been ordered by a vote of the senate and before adjournment is declared by the president of the senate, it shall be in order for the chairman of the several committees to announce in open senate the time and place of meeting of their respective committees.

SUSPENDING RULES, VOTE ON.

38. No standing rule or order of the senate shall be rescinded or suspended, nor shall any matter, tabled upon motion, be taken up, unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, except an order fixing the hour to which the senate shall stand adjourned.

RESOLUTIONS, ACTION ON SAME, REFERENCE,

39. Resolutions, including concurrent resolutions, shall not be acted upon by the senate upon the day the same are introduced or received by the senate, but shall lie upon the table for one legislative day if any member objects to the immediate consideration thereof. But if no member object, the same may have immediate consideration. Nothing in this rule shall abridge or prevent the usual right to reference to committee.

RULES OF ORDER

40. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules or orders of the senate, and joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

ADJOURNMENT.

41. The hours to which the senate shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be 9 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the senate.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYES,

42. The duties of the officers and employes of the senate are as stated in the paragraph relating thereto, and appended to these rules.

DUTIES OF SECRETARY,

The secretary of the senate shall have charge of the secretary's desk, and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the senate, except while the same are in the possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept, and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of Room 25, which is assigned to said secretary for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution the date of its introduction, and by what senator, or of its receipt from the house, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the senate. The assistant secretaries shall be under his direction and he shall assign to them their several duties in connection with the duties of the secretary's desk.

DUTIES OF SERGEANT-AT-ARMS. FILE CLERK, BILL CLERK,

The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office; shall attend the senate during its sessions; shall aid in the enforcement of order under the direction of the president of the senate; shall execute the commands of the senate from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officers; shall see that the rule prohibiting smoking in the senate chamber is strictly enforced; shall, upon the request of any five members, have the senate chamber lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.: shall see that no person, except one authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereof; shall see that the printed bills and daily journals are, at the earliest practicable period, properly distributed and filed upon the desks of senators; shall have charge of the files in the senate bill room, and shall see that no copy of a bill is given out except to or upon the order of the president, a senator, or state officers; shall see that an additional door-keeper is detailed for duty at the senate chamber upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10 p. m., but should not five members of the senate desire to occupy the chamber to that hour, the detail may be relieved at 9 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the senate and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the president of the senate any inefficiency or violations of duty on the part of said messengers. He shall direct the file clerk, and bill clerk, if any employed, in the discharge of their duties.

DUTIES OF DOORKEEPER.

The door-keeper of the senate shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the senate, and shall see that the other doors of the senate are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the senate; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper and necessary for the efficiency of the senate and the protection of property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to the admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the senate, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messengers from the governor or house.

JANITOR'S DUTIES.

The janitor of the senate shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cleak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

MESSENGERS AND THEIR DUTIES.

The messengers of the senate shall attend the senate during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. While the senate is sitting, two of their number shall be detailed for service in front of the secretary's deak. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, while the senate is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

At least four messengers shall be on duty in the senate chamber upon every day of the session, except Sundays, from 8:30 a.m. until 6 p.m., whether the senate is in session or not.

RULES OF THE HOUSE,

DUTIES TO ORDER,

CALL TO ORDER.

1. He shall take the chair every day precisely at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order, and on appearance of a quorum shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read.

PRESERVE ORDER.

He shall preserve order and decorum, and speak to points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and he shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house by any two members.

PUTTING THE QUESTION.

3. He shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

FORM OF THE QUESTION.

4. Questions shall be distinctly put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say 'aye'"; and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of a contrary opinion, say 'no." If the speaker doubts, or a division called for, the house shall be divided. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterward those in the negative.

ELECTION AND DUTIES OF SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE.

5. The house shall at its pleasure elect a speaker pro tempore. When the speaker shall from any cause be absent, the speaker pro tempore shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by either the speaker or the speaker pro tempore. The speaker or the speaker pro tempore shall have the right to name any member to perform the duties of speaker, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. The acts of the speaker pro tempore shall have the same validity as those of the speaker. In the absence of both the speaker and the speaker pro tempore, the house shall name a speaker who shall preside over it and perform all the duties of speaker until such time as the speaker or speaker pro tempore shall be present, and his acts shall have the same force and validity as those of the regularly elected speaker.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS.

All committees shall be appointed by the speaker, unless otherwise especially directed by the house.

SPEAKER'S VOTE.

7. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the speaker shall vote; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the house is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal, and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost.

SIGNATURE TO DOCUMENTS.

8. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the speaker, and all writs, warrants, subpoenas, issued by order of the house, shall be under his hand and attested by the clerk.

CLEARING THE LOBBY.

 In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby, the speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole house shall have power to have the same cleared.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- 10. After the journal is read the following order shall govern:
 - (1) Business pending at last previous adjournment.
 - (2) Petitions or remonstrances to be offered.
 - (3) Reports of committees.
 - (4) Resolutions laid over under rule 34.
 - (5) Bills to be introduced.
 - (6) Resolutions.
 - (7) Messages and communications on the speaker's table.

- (8) Bills and resolutions read a second time.
- (9) Bills on their passage.
- (10) Reports in the possession of the house shall be taken up in their order.

OF DECORUM AND DEBATE.

ADDRESSING THE CHAIR.

11. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the house, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the presiding officer by his title, saying "Mr. Speaker," and shall not proceed until he shall be recognized by the chair, and shall confine himself to the question under debate and shall avoid personalities.

POINT OF ORDER.

12. When any member in speaking, or otherwise transgresses the rules of the bouse, the speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted with leave of the house to explain; and the house shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed. If the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the house.

WHO SHALL BE RECOGNIZED.

13. Should two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall designate the member entitled to speak,

MAY SPEAK BUT ONCE ON SAME QUESTION.

14. No member shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the bouse, nor more than twice until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken, except as provided in section 26; provided further, when bills are being considered on their second reading debate thereon shall be limited to fifteen minutes to each member desiring to speak thereon, which may be extended by consent of the house.

DECORUM WHEN QUESTION IS PUT.

15. While the speaker is putting a question or addressing the house, no one shall walk out of or across the house; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the speaker.

WHO MAY NOT VOTE.

 No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is personally interested.

COUNT ON DIVISION OF THE HOUSE.

17. Upon a division and count of the house on any question, only those members standing in their places shall be counted.

DUTY TO VOTE.

18. Every member who shall be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him; but such a member must ask to be excused before commencing to take the vote on the main question,

STATING THE QUESTION.

19. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the clerk before dehated.

MOTIONS IN WRITING.

20. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing if the speaker or any member desires it, but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

ENDORSEMENT OF DOCUMENTS.

21. All bills, resolutions, petitions, memorials or other papers shall be accompanied by the name of the member presenting the same, and also the name of the county.

WITHDRAWING A MOTION,

22. After a motion is stated by the speaker, or read by the clerk, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the house, but may be withdrawn by leave of the house.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS,

23. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn; to lay on the table; for the previous question; to postpone to a certain day; to commit or amend; to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely being decided, shall again be allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting words of a bill shall have precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

ORDER OF COMMITMENT.

24. When a resolution shall be offered or a motion made to refer any subject, and different committees shall be proposed, question shall be taken in the following order: The committee of the whole house; a standing committee; a select committee.

MOTION TO ADJOURN.

25. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, or the house voting.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

26. The previous question shall always be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" When a member moves a previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments, or to the amendment or amendments only. It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and when the motion prevails its effect shall be to put an end to all debate and to bring the house to a direct vote upon the question to which the motion applies, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have ten (10) minutes in which to close the discussion before the vote is taken; when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have five minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to submitting the same, a call of the house shall be in order; but after such motion shall have been adopted no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative the house shall proceed with the matter before it the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

LAY ON THE TABLE,

27. Motions to lay on the table, to adjourn, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

INDEFINITE POSTFONEMENT.

28. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted upon during the session.

DIVISION OF THE QUESTION.

29. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for the discussion of the house. A motion to strike out being lost shall proclude neither an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

COMMITMENT.

30. Motions and reports may be committed at the pleasure of the house,

. IRRELEVANT MATTER.

31. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

RECONSIDERATION.

32. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except the consideration of a conference report, a motion to fix the day to which the house shall adjourn, to adjourn, or to take a recess, and shall not be withdrawn after the said succeeding day without the consent of the house; and thereafter any member may call it up for consideration, provided that such motion, if made during the last six days of the session, shall be disposed of when made. A motion to reconsider any vote by which a bill has passed or failed to pass the house shall require a constitutional majority to be, sustained.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS.

33. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker or a member in his place; a brief statement of the contents thereof shall verbally be made by the introducer, and shall he referred to the committee of his selection, unless otherwise ordered by the house

RESOLUTIONS TO GO OVER ONE DAY.

34. A proposition requesting information from the governor, secretary or any other state officer, and all resolutions shall lie on the table one day for consideration, and all such propositions shall be taken up for consideration in the order they were presented, immediately after the reports are called for from the select committee, and when adopted, the clerk shall cause the same to be delivered.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS.

35. Any five members, if the speaker be in the chair, shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members.

CALL OF THE HOUSE.

38. Upon calls of the house, or in taking the yeas and nays on any question, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except that "Mr. Sneaker" shall be called last.

EXCUSE FOR ABSENCE.

37. No member shall absent blusself from the service of the house without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

PROCEDURE FOR CALL OF THE HOUSE.

38. Upon the call of the house, the names of the members shall be called by the clerk, and the absentees noted after which the names of the absentees shall again be called over, and the sergeant-at-arms be directed by the speaker to compel their attendance. Any member occupying his seat during a call of the house shall be counted by the speaker and his name entered in the journal as being present but not voting, for the purpose of making a quorum,

. TIME OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

39. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the house without special leave.

QUORUM.

40. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and upon demand of any two members the yeas and nays shall be ordered; the members demanding the yeas and nays shall arise for that purpose, and their names shall be entered in the journal.

TIME OF CONVENING.

41. The hours to which this house shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be nine o'clock a. m., and two o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the house.

COMMITTEE ON PAIRS,

42. A committee on pairs may be appointed, to consist of two persons, one of whom shall be selected by the members of each of the two dominant political parties represented in the house. It shall be the duty of the committee to arrange all pairs between members, and to announce such pairs and the time for which they shall continue, to the house, which announcement shall be entered on the journal. Thereafter noither member so paired shall vote (upon any question of a political or partisan nature) until the time of pairing has expired, unless such pair is sooner dissolved by the mutual agreement of the persons so paired. When pairs are dissolved such dissolution shall be entered on the journal of the house.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

43. All bills and joint resolutions introduced in the house shall be type-written, accompanied by three carbon copies; one copy shall be marked and known as the "original" and one copy marked and designated as "printer copy." The "original" shall, after registration, be subject to delivery to the chairman of the committee to which reference is made, unless otherwise ordered, and the "printer's copy" shall be delivered to the state printer.

APPROPRIATION BILLS.

44. Bills calling for appropriations for state educational institutions, the institutions in charge of the board of control, all claims and all appropriations for clerical help in the executive departments of the state of Iowa, shall be introduced not later than February 15, 1917; no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose after March I, 1917, and no other bill of any kind after March 10, 1917, except by standing committee as a committee bill, but this exception shall not be applicable to the appropriation bills which are herein specifically required to be introduced or reported not later than certain dates herein specified.

The appropriation committee shall report back to the house not later than March 10th, all bills in its hands,

Senate bills thereafter received carrying appropriations shall be referred to the appropriations committee, but must be reported back to the house within three days, and remain on the calendar three days before final orgalization.

On or before March 10, 1917, the committee on appropriations shall prepare a schedule of all appropriations and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of the members, designating in such schedule such bills as may have already passed the house and such as remain to be considered.

READING OF BILLS.

45. Every bill shall receive three several readings, but no bill shall have its second and third reading on the same day,

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

46. The first reading of the bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question is: "shall this bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be negatived, the bill shall go to its second reading without a question.

COMMITMENT OF BILLS.

47. Upon a second reading of a bill, the speaker shall state that it is ready for commitment, amendment or engrossment; and if committed, then the question shall be whether to a select or a standing committee, or to a committee of the whole house. If to a committee of the whole house, the house shall determine on what day.

SPECIAL COMMITMENT.

48. All bills to appropriate money shall be referred to the appropriations committee, and all bills pertaining to the levy, assessment or collection of taxes shall be referred to the committee on ways and means.

BILLS ON SECOND READING.

49. After a bill has been committed and reported back it shall be considered on its second reading after the amendments of committee have been read.

RE-COMMITMENT.

50. After the commitment and report thereof to the house, or any time before its passage, a bill may be re-committed.

MNGROSSMENT,

 All bills ordered to be engrossed shall be written with typewriter with black record ribbon.

BILLS ON THIRD READING.

52. No amendment, unless by way of correcting an error or omission, shall be received to any bill on its third reading, and no debate shall be allowed on the same.

ENDORSEMENT OF BILLS.

52. When a bill shall pass it shall be certified by the clerk noting the day of its passage at the foot thereof.

AMENDING AND SUSPENDING RULES,

54. No standing rule or order of the house shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor shall the order of business, as established by the rules of the house, be postponed or changed except by a vote of at least two thirds, of the members present.

COMMITTEE ON ENCOLLED BILLS.

55. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills to report at any time when no member is addressing the house.

PRINTING.

56. All bills, memorials and joint resolutions, except legalizing bills, shall be printed for the use and information of the members, unless otherwise ordered by the house.

COMMITTEE HEARINGS.

57. When any matter is referred to a standing committee by motion of any member, it shall be the duty of the chairman if such standing committee to notify such member of the time of the sitting upon such matter referred, and such member shall be permitted to confer with such committee during their consideration of such matter, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration, and no final action shall be taken by the committee upon any bill on the day of public hearing thereon.

CLASSIFICATION OF BILLS.

58. Each standing committee of the house shall classify all bills referred to it. The bills of the greatest public importance shall be placed in the first class, and all other bills in the second class. Bills of the first class shall be first considered and reported to the house and no committee shall retain possession of any bill longer than ten days, except by consent of the house. But this shall not apply to the committee on appropriations.

ROBERTS' RULES OF ORDER.

59. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the house in all cases where they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of this house and joint rules of both houses.

JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

60. Joint resolutions shall be framed and treated as a bill.

COMMITTEE PROCEDURE.

61. The chairman or clerk of a committee to which a bill is referred shall note thereon the date of its reference and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills in its hands within ten days after the order of reference unless longer time is granted by a vote of the house, except as provided by rule 58. The minority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the journal, and said recommendation may, by vote of the house, be substituted for the report of the committee. The clerks of the different committees shall be subject to their respective chairmen.

When a motion which works a final disposition of a bill in the committee is up for adoption the rule of the committee shall be called and the yeas and nays entered in the minutes of the meeting; this last provision, however, shall not apply to the committee on appropriations and judiciary.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to see that the record of the committee meetings as herein provided, be properly kept, and that the same is deposited with the chief clerk of the house at the final adjournment of the session.

COMMITTEE QUORUM.

62. Seven members, or a majority, shall constitute a quorum of each standing committee.

DECORUM.

63. No member or officer of the house shall be permitted to read newspapers within the har of the house while the journal is being read, nor shall any person be permitted to smoke on the floor of the house during its session, or in the galleries at any time.

ADMISSION TO THE HOUSE.

64. No one shall be admitted to the floor of the house during its sessions, except members of the general assembly and employes in the performance of their duties, ex-members of the general assembly and officers of the state government, judges and ex-judges of the supreme, district and circuit courts, the families of members of the house, trustees, superintendents and officers of the state institutions, on the invitation of the member from the district in which the institution is located, and each member shall have the right to admit a friend who may be visiting him. Representatives of the press to be admitted to the reporter's gallery.

Lobbying shall not be permitted on the floor of the house while the house is in session.

CHIEF CLERK. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

65. The clerk of the house shall have charge of the clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safekeeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the house, except while the same are in the possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept and fully made up before the next day's session, and he responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of rooms four and five, which are assigned to said clerk for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution, the date of its introduction and by what member, or of its receipt from the senate, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the house. The assistant clerks shall be under his direction and he shall assign them their several duties in connection with the work of the clerk's desk.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS.

The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office, shall attend the house during its sessions, shall aid during the enforcement of order. under the direction of the speaker of the house, shall execute the commands of the house from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officer; shall, upon request of any member, have the house lighted up during any evening within the session. except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except those authorized so to do, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat; shall see that the printed bills are properly distributed and filed upon the desks of the members, shall have charge of the files in the house bill room, and shall see that no copy of the bill is given except to or upon the order of the speaker of the house, or member, or state officer; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the house upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10:00 p. m.; but should no member of the house desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9:00 p, m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the house and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the speaker of the house any inefficiency or violation of duty on the part of said messengers.

DOORKEEPER.

The doorkeeper of the house shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special, charge of the main door of the charmer during the sittings of the house, and shall see that the other doors of the house are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the house; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper or necessary for the efficiency of the house and the protection of the property within the charmer; shall see that the rule relating to admission to the floor of the charmer is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each

session of the house, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messages from the governor or senate,

JANITORS.

The janitors of the house shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the closk and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

MESSENGERS.

The messengers of the house shall attend the house during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-ams while the house is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

COMMITTEE CLERKS.

66. Committee clerks of the house shall be under the general direction of the speaker. All committee clerks shall be on duty at the house from 8:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. unless otherwise ordered. Any clerk absenting himself or herself from the house, except for the noon luncheon without permission from the speaker, shall not receive any pay for the day or days on which he or she is absent. Committee clerks shall do work for any member of the house upon request unless otherwise employed.

EXTRA COMPENSATION,

67. No employe shall receive any extra compensation or tips for services performed while on duty. Any violation of this rule shall be ground for removal.

ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.

88. In forming committee of the whole house, the speaker shall leave his chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the speaker.

PROCEDURE UPON BILLS.

69. Upon bills committed to the committee of the whole house, the bill shall be first read throughout by the clerk or chairman, and then read again or debated by the clauses, leaving the preamble to be last considered. After report, the bill shall be again subject to be debated and amended by clauses before a question to engross it be taken.

AMENDMENTS.

70. All amendments made to an original motion in committee shall be incorporated in a motion and so reported.

AMENDMENTS,

71. All amendments made to a report committed to a committee of the whole house shall be noted and reported as in the case of bills.

FILLING BLANKS.

72. In filling up blanks in the committee of the whole house, and in the house, the largest sum and the longest time and the highest number shall be first put.

RULES.

73. The rules of the house shall be observed in committee of the whole house, so far as they are applicable.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE SENATORS.

HENRY C. ADAMS.

Senator from the forty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Kossuth and Palo Alto, was born at McGregor, Iowa. Moved to Spencer, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools, and by his own exertions became a registered pharmacist at the age of eighteen years, being one of the youngest pharmacists in the state at that time.

He later located at Algona engaging in the drug business. During the Spanish-American war served as hospital steward. At the close of the war he returned to Algona and entered the real estate and farm loan business, later entering the banking business. Was married June 6, 1900, to Irma D. Clarke. Is prominent in Masonry, having attained the thirty-second degree in the Scottish Rite and is also a Knight Templar and a Shriner. Is also a member of the Knights of Pythias and Elks lodges. Elected Senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

WALLACE H. ARNEY.

Senator from the twenty-eighth district, comprising the county of Marshall, was born in Marshall county, Iowa, April 2, 1862, of American-born parents. Received his education in the public schools and Oskaloosa College. Taught school for a few years, afterwards engaging in farming and feeding, which he still follows; also interested in several banks, being president of the Iowa Savings Bank of Marshalitown and Albion Savings Bank of Albion. Elected representative in 1908, and re-elected in 1908. Elected senator in 1912 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

GEORGE W. BALL.

Representative from Jefferson county, was born in Brock county, Virginia, March 6, 1848. His father Joseph Ball was born near Harper's Ferry, Louden county, Virginia, and was a descendant from the same family as Mary Ball, the mother of George Washington. His mother was Margaret Langfitt, born in Beaver county, Pennsylvania and who was a second cousin of President James K. Polk. With his parents he came to Iowa in 1854 and settled in Jefferson county, which has been his home ever since. His education was secured in the public school and at the Fairfield University. He lives on a farm and farming and handling stock cattle has been his principal business. He is a director of the Iowa State Savings Bank and also a director of the Fairfield Chautauqua association. He was married October 31, 1872, to Miss Margaret L Laughlin of Brockville, Iowa, who died July 17, 1912. To them were born five sons and one daughter. He is a member of the Christian church and also . of Jefferson Lodge No. 4 I. O. O. F. of Fairfield. His father represented Jefferson county in the 13th general assembly. Was elected representative in the 22d, 28d and 36th general assemblies and senator in the 37th general assembly. A republican in politics.

NICHOLAS BALKEMA.

Senator from the forty-ninth district, composed of the counties of Lyon, O'Brien, Sioux and Osceola, was born in Gibbsville, Sheboygan county, Wisconsin, April 7, 1865, of Dutch parents. Attended the district school at Gibbsville and afterwards graduated from the Sheboygan Falls high school. Moved to Newkirk, Iowa, in 1884. Taught school one year and then started in the mercantile business at that place, running the postoffice in connection therewith. Sold out in 1894 and moved to Sloux Center, continuing the same business and in which he still is engaged. Also has a clothing store at Paullina. Was interested in a bank for a few years and held the office of vice president. Has served on the city council and is president of the school board, having served in that capacity ten years. Is a member of the Dutch Reformed church. Elected senator in 1908. Re-elected in 1912 and 1916. A republican in politics.

A. L. BROXAM,

Senator from the twenty-third district, composed of the county of Jackson, was born on a farm near Welton, Clinton county, Iowa, December 16, 1868, His father, Benjamin Broxam, was born near Hull, England, and his mother, Mary Linch Broxam, was born in Ohlo of Dutch-Irish parentage. Attended district and high school also business college at Dixon, Illinois, and later attended the college of pharmacy at Highland Park College, Des Moines, and has since followed this vocation at Maquoketa. Was married in 1903 to Alice Loughridge. Was president of the Jackson County Agricultural Society and a member of the city council for six years. Elected to the senate in 1916. A democrat in politics.

O. A. BYINGTON,

Senator from the twenty-fifth district, composed of the counties of Johnson and Iowa, has been a lifelong resident of Iowa City. His father, LeGrand Byington, was prominent among the early settlers of the state,

He is a graduate of the college of liberal arts and of the college of law of the State University of Iowa. Served as county superintendent of schools of Johnson county. Was a member of the house in the twenty-sixth general assembly; district judge of the eighth judicial district 1903-1907. Is president of the Citizens Savings & Trust Company of Iowa City. Has practiced law continuously at Iowa City since 1890, except while serving on the bench. Elected senator in 1916.

GRANT L. CASWELL,

Senator from the thirty-fourth district, composed of Crawford, Harrison and Monona counties, was born in Boone county, Iowa, July 18, 1869. He spent the first thirteen years of his life in Boone county, attending school at Moingona, Ogden and Boone in that county, and after attending high school at Coon Raphis, Iowa. Here he became a printer and thereafter followed that occupation until in 1889 he became proprietor of the Argus, newspaper at Ashton, Iowa. Two years later he became part owner of the Tribune, a county seat paper at Sibley, Osceola county, Iowa, which he edited for six years. While at Sibley Mr. Caswell was married to Miss Eva L. Clark at Ashton, Iowa. They removed to Denison, Iowa, in 1897, where Mr. Caswell nurchased the Bulletin, a weekly newspaper, which he still owns and operates as a semi-weekly paper. He was a candidate for state treasurer on the Democratic ticket in 1912, and was elected senator in his district in 1914 as a democratic

DANIEL CADY CHASE.

Senator from the thirty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright, was born in Webster City, Iowa, June 18, 1859, of American born parents. He attended the public schools of Webster City and later the University of Iowa, from which he was graduated. For a time after leaving the university he engaged in newspaper work, but in 1880 he began the study of law in his father's office and was admitted to practice in 1881. He was elected city attorney of Webster City in 1890 and in 1891 served as special United States attorney in the celebrated river land cases. He was a member of the house of representatives from Hamilton county in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth general assemblies. In 1892 he was a delegate-at-large from Iowa to the republican national convention and in 1896 he was elected presidential elector from the Tenth-congressional district on the republican ticket. Elected senator in 1910. Re-elected in 1914. A republican in politics.

GEORGE FRANKLIN COBURN.

Senator from the forty-sixth district, composed of the counties of Cherokee, Ida and Plymouth, was born at Beividere Illinois, May 12, 1856. He began farming in 1877 on the Elmhurst farm at Marcus, Iowa. Was married on November 7, 1879, and is the father of five children. Is a member of the Marcus Commercial Club. A Presbyterian. Was Master of Little Sloux Lodge A. F. and A. M. in 1802. R. A. M., Consistory, I. O. O. F., Representative in the 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, and Senator in the 37th general assemblies of Iowa. A republican in politics.

BEN EDWARDS.

Senator from the thirty-first district, composed of the counties of Boone and Story, was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania, May 10, 1884, of Welsh parents, His early education was received in the public schools of that city, attending regularly until 1875. In October of that year moved with his family to Beacon, Mahaska county, Iowa, where he attended the public schools for a short time. Moved to Carroll county in 1875 and engaged in farming until he was twenty-five years of age. After leaving the farm went into business first at Dedham and later at Carrollton. Was married to Maggie Brammer December 31, 1885 and has four children, one son and three daughters.

In 1905 moved to Ames. Iowa, and held the position of superintendent of grounds and buildings until 1910 when he entered the retail coal and ice business, in which he is still engaged. Has held various political offices such as township trustee and city councilman. Also served as Mayor while a resident of the city of Dedham. Was elected to the senate in 1916 on the republican ticket.

LAURITZ M. ENGER,

Senator from the forty-second district, composed of Howard and Winneshiek counties was born in Norway, November 3, 1856. He was educated in the common schools and by private instruction. At the age of fifteen he moved to Winneshiek county. Worked at farming during the summer months and attended school during the winters. He attended Decorah Institute for three years. Has engaged in various mercantile pursuits and was for a time in the

Decorah postoffice. For the past sixteen years he has been associated with the Decorah Posten, a semi-weekly newspaper. Has conducted an insurance agency for hearly twenty years. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM T. EVANS,

Senator from the thirty-ninth district, composed of the counties of Bremer and Butler, was born on a farm, near Waterloo, Iowa, November 8, 1869. His parents, John O. and Rebecca Evans, American born, came to Iowa from Pennsylvania in 1856.

He attended country school and completed the work at the East Waterloo High School as a member of the class of 1889. Entered the State University of Iowa the fall of 1892. Owned and published the Vidette-Reporter, the university newspaper, during 1895 and 1896. Was graduated from the College of Liberal Arts in 1896 and the College of Law in 1897.

Has practiced law at Parkersburg, Iowa, since June, 1897. Married Lela Phelps, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Phelps at Independence, Iowa, June 25, 1902. Was county attorney of Butter county in 1905 and 1906. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

FREDERICK WILLIAM EVERSMEYER.

Senator from the twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born in Muscatine, Muscatine county, Iowa, October 10, 1871. His parents were Bernard Henry Eversmeyer and Magdalena Kuechmann Evers-Both parents were natives of Germany, emigrating to the United States in 1851. He received his education in the Muscatine public schools, parochial schools, Muscatine Business College, and the law department of the S U. I. When a young man he learned the printer's trade in the office of the Muscatine Journal. In the year 1890 he left the Journal office and at the request of his father took up work in his insurance, loans and real estate office. In 1894 he entered the law department of the S. U. I. from which he graduated in 1896. He then started in business for himself in law, loans, real estate and insurance. Served as justice of the peace in the city of Muscatine for a period of six years, 1901-1906 inclusive. In May, 1910, he formed a business partnership with his sister, Miss Louise, who is also a graduate of the law department of S. U. I., under the firm name of F. W. and Louise Eversmeyer. In addition to his business he is interested in various enterprises in Muscatine and is one of the directors of the German-American Savings Bank. He is a member of the Masonic Order, the Elks, and Yeomen. Was married to Miss Harriet Kemptner of Muscatine June 28, 1910. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

ALBERT M. FELLOWS.

Senator from the fortieth district, composed of Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born in Allamakee county, March 1, 1864. His father was born in Vermont and came to Iowa at an early age and served as representative in the Eleventh general assembly and as senator in the Twelfth and Thirteenth general assemblies and for twenty years was judge of the Thirteenth Judicial district of Iowa. His mother was a native of New York. He obtained his education in the public schools of Lansing and the Upper Iowa University at Fayette. Served the city of Lansing for eight years as councilman and four

years as mayor. Married Miss Eisle Smith of Cresco, Iowa, in 1889. Is engaged in the lumber business and is president of the Peoples State Bank at Lansing, Iowa. Elected senator in 1912, re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

DAVID S. FLECK,

Senator from the twenty-ninth district, comprised of the county of Japer, was born in Mahaska county, Iowa, November 21, 1858, of American-born parents. Received his education in the Leighton public schools and Oskaloosa College. After leaving school engaged in the lumber and grain business, also farming and stock raising. Was married in 1889 to Miss Alta Coryell. In the same year moved to Nebraska, returning to Iowa in 1895 and located in Jasper county, where he took up his former business, in which he is engaged at the present time. He has held various township offices, Elected a member of the board of supervisors in Jasper county in 1907, re-elected in 1909. Elected senator in 1914. A democrat in politics.

HERBERT I. FOSKETT,

Senator from seventh district, composed of Page and Fremont counties. Born in Henry county, Illinois, near Kewanee, December 11, 1861, of New England parentage. Attended grade schools in Illinois and high school in Sacramento, California. Returning to Iowa in 1878 he worked in stores and post office until 1883, when he became cushier of the Commercial Bank in Essex, Iowa. In 1885 he removed to Shenandoah and engaged in the farm loan business, the firm name being Webster and Foskett. This firm was succeeded later by the present firm of Foskett and Kye.

In 1901 he was elected president of the Commercial Savings Bank of Shenandoub, which was later changed to a National Bank in 1910 consolidated with the Shenandoah National Bank of which he has since been vice president

He was married in 1893 to Miss May Tucker. Elected senator in 1914. Republican in politics.

JOHN W. FOSTER.

Senator from the seventeenth district, composed of the counties of Audubon, Guthrie and Dallas, was born and reared in Guthrie county. Educated in the state agricultural college at Ames and graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1879. Beginning in 1880 he served three terms as county auditor of Guthrie county. For many years was an abstracter of titles and practicing attorney. Owns a farm of 1,240 acres adjoining Guthrie Center and is interested largely in live stock business. Is president of the First National Bank of Guthrie Center, and First National Bank of Stuart, and director and majority stock owner in Montieth Savings Bank. Is also president of Iowa Loan and Investment Company and president of Iowa Farm Mortgage Company. Elected senator to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Anthony M. McColl.

JOSEPH R. FRAILEY,

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Senator from the first district, composed of Lee county, was born in Ft. Madison March 2, 1876. Graduated Ft. Madison high school 1898; State University of Iowa Liberal Arts, 1898; Law, 1900. Second Liberant Company F, Fiftieth Iowa Infantry, United States Volunteers, during Spanish-American

war and up to the time this regiment was mustered out of service. City solicitor of Ft. Madison from 1905 up to the time he took his seat in the senate at which time he resigned. Connected with the legal department of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad from 1900 to 1905. Practiced law in Ft. Madison since 1905. Is married, and republican in politics.

BENJAMIN J. GIBSON.

Senator from the sixth district, composed of the countles of Adams and Taylor, was born November 12, 1882. Secured his education in the common schools and the University of Nebraska, from which institution he graduated in 1906. For the past several years has been practicing law at Corning, Iowa. Was married September 5, 1905 and has two sons. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM J. GREENE.

Senator from the twenty-second district, composed of Clinton county, was born January 29, 1878, in Clinton Clinton county, Iowa, of Irish parentage. He was educated in the public and parochial schools of Clinton. His first employment was with C. Lamb & Sons of Clinton and in 1899 he became a brakeman on the Chicago and Northwestern Railway. He was elected alderman from the fifth ward of Clinton in 1906 and re-elected in 1908 and 1910. He is a member of the B of R. T. and C. O. F. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912, Elected senator in 1914. A democrat in politics.

HENRY W. GROUT,

Senator from the thirty-eighth district, composed of Black Hawk and Grundy counties, was born in Waterloo, March 24, 1858. His parents came from Massachusetts and were both descendants of Revolutionary stock. When he was six years old his parents moved to a farm near Waterloo and here he remained until of age. Educated in the rural schools and the Field Seminary at Waterloo. Went to Leadville, Colorado, in 1830, and engaged in mining, but returned to Iowa the same year. Traveled on the road for twelve years; quit that occuration to engage in the real estate business. Has served as park commissioner for six years and is a director in the First National Bank of Waterloo and of the First National Bank of Guthrie Center. Also a director in the Waterloo Saddlery and Electrical Supply Company. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics,

JOHN K. HALE,

Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties, was born August 27, 1858 in Guilford, Conn. In 1859 moved with his parents to Anamosa, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools. Was married in 1882 and has two daughters. Has been engaged in farming for many years, still owns his farm. At present is engaged in buying and selling grain and in the grocery and meat business. Served as township trustee and was county supervisor for eight years. Elected representative from Jones county in the 36th general assembly. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics,

WILLIS G. HASKELL,

Senator from the twenty-sixth district, composed of Lian county, was born June 5, 1857, in Bradford, Iowa. Attended the graded schools of Cedar Falls, Charles City and Independence. Was employed as telegrapher, station agent and traveling freight and passenger agent from 1873 to 1893, then entered the wholesale and retail coal business in which he is still engaged. Is also interested in the manufacturing business being president of the Johnson Gas Appliance Co., and is also interested in the real estate business being president of the J. S. Anderson Land Co., and the Mound Farm Land Co. Has been a director of the Merchants National Bank for a number of years. Has served as alderman of Vinton and Cedar Rapids, chairman of the park commission of Cedar Rapids, member of the republican state central committee, president of the commercial club and as postmaster from 1909 to 1913. Was married June 15, 1881 to Mae E. Williams and has four children, two boys and two girls. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and B. P. O. E. lodges. Elected on the republican ticket in 1916.

CHARLES C. HELMER,

Senator from the forty-eighth district, composed of Carroll, Greene and Sac counties, was born in Cedar county, Iowa, on August 25, 1876, of Americanborn parents. His common school education was obtained in the public schools at Tipton and Mechanicsville. Attended the State College at Ames, Iowa, and was in his senior year at the outbreak of the Spanish-American war, when he enlisted as a private in Co. F, Forty-ninth Iowa Volunteer Infantry and served with the regiment until its muster out of the service. Then entered the law department of the State University of Iowa, graduating with the class of 1901. In the same year commenced the practice of law at Manning, Carroll county, Iowa, and in 1904 moved to Carroll, where he has since been engaged in the practice of his profession. In 1904 was elected county attorney of Carroll county, serving one term. For nearly eight years was city attorney of the city of Carroll. Was married in 1905 to Jennie Willey, of Keokuk, Iowa, Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

FRED G. HENIGBAUM.

Senator from the twenty-first district, comprising the county of Scott, was horn in Albion, New York, on the 10th day of June, 1884, of German parents. Moved to Davenport, Iowa, in 1875; where he attended the public schools. After graduating from the grammar school entered into commercial life, and after an experience in various lines which took him away from Davenport and away from Iowa for a number of years, returned to Davenport in 1895, and was one of the incorporators of the Davenport Furniture & Carpet Company, which later became, and now is the Iowa Furniture & Carpet Company, of which he is vice-president and director. Is a member and director of the Davenport Commercial club, also a member of the Greater Committee of 30, and a member of various social clubs. Was married in 1897 to Miss Laura Dean. Was elected to the senate in 1914. Republican in politics.

PERRY C. HOLDOEGEL,

Senator from twenty-seventh district, composed of Webster and Calhoun counties; was born on a farm near Woodbine, Iowa, September 7, 1869. His father, Hugo Holdoegel, was of German birth and served in the federal army during the war of the rebellion. His mother, Mirlam Mendenhall, was of American

birth. In his boyhood he served as apprentice to brick mason and spent some time in the printing office. He clerked in grocery and dry goods stores and after working his way through normal school taught one year in the country school and three years in the public school in Dunlap. In 1891 he took charge of the schools in Rockwell City and served that district seven years, then he removed to Manson to take charge of the public schools, in which capacity he served three years, when he returned to Rockwell City, where he still resides, and became interested in a general line of business. He has managed the local (Central Mutual) telephone company since its organization and has been active in the anti-monopoly telephone fight. His largest financial interest is in farming and he devotes much of his time to Chesterplace, an up-to-date stock farm at Rockwell City. He is also interested in local banks. He was married in 1895 to Mattle A. Forest of Dunlap, Iowa, and to this union two children were born, Donald in 1901 and Dorothy in 1905. Served as secretary and chairman of the Republican County Central Committee. Elected to the Iowa Senate in November, 1916. A republican in politics.

GEORGE H. JACKSON,

Senator from the forty-fourth district composed of the counties of Chickasaw and Floyd. Was born November 3, 1878, on a farm one and a half miles from New Hampton, Iowa. His mother, formerly Ruth H. Stubbins, was born in England, while his father, Jerry Tyler Jackson, is of Irish-Holland descent.

He attended the district school and later the New Hampton high school, graduating from the latter in 1894. He followed farming for two years after which he became associated with the Citizens Bank of Britt, becoming assistant cashier. In 1900 he organized the Farmers & Merchants Bank at Floyd, of which he was cashier. In 1910 the above bank was reorganized into the First National Bank, he becoming president which office he now holds. He moved from Floyd to Charles City in 1912. Incorporated the Corn Belt Land & Investment Co., of Charles City, Iowa, in 1911, having been president thereof since

Was town clerk of Floyd from 1902 to 1906 and mayor of Floyd from 1905 to 1912. Was chairman of the Floyd County Republican Central Committee from 1908 to 1912. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

CLEMENT F. KIMBALL,

Senator from the nineteenth district, composed of Potawattamie county, was born in Anamosa, Iowa, August II, 1868, of American parentage. His education began in the public schools of the state. Attended Iowa State College, where he graduated in 1839. Also attended the University of Michigan, where he graduated in 1895. Married Miss Carroll Williams in 1895. Served as assistant county attorney for Pottawattamic county from 1899 to 1903 and as city solicitor for the city of Council Bluffs from 1906 to 1912. Is a member of the Masonic order, the Knights of Pythias and of the Council Bluffs Rowing Associations. Elected senator in 1912. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

THOMAS A. KINGLAND,

Senator from the forty-first district composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born on a farm in Winnebago county, Iowa, March 27, 1876, of Norwegian parentage, He attended the rural schools and later on St. Ansgar Seminary, St. Ansgar, Iowa; Augsburg Seminary, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and entered the State University of Iowa in 1896. Graduated from the College of Liberal Arts and Law in June, 1901. He located at Forest City,

Iowa, in June 1901 for the practice of law where he resided until February 1909, when he moved to Lake Mills in the same county, where he has since resided. Was elected county attorney of Winnebago county in 1904 and held the office for two terms. He represented Winnebago county in the 35th general assembly and was elected state senator in 1916, on the republican ticket.

CHARLES C. LAFFER.

Senator from the twelfth district composed of the counties of Keokuk and Poweshiek; was born in Keokuk county, Iowa, November 1, 1870.

His parents were Henry Laffer and Georgiana Crist Laffel. His father came to Keokuk county from Ohio in 1854. His mother came from Illinois. He was married February 8, 1894, to Mollie A. Crawford of Ainsworth, Washington county, Iowa.

Was elected sheriff of Keokuk county in 1897 and re-elected in 1899, being the youngest sheriff in the state at that time. He is now engaged in the harness, saddlery and banking business, being a director in the First National and Union Savings Banks of Sigourney. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

KARL M. LECOMPTE.

Senator from the fourth district, composed of the counties of Wayne and Lucas, was born at Corydon, Iowa, May 25, 1887. His parents located in Corydon at an early date and the author of this sketch has spent his entire life at Corydon. He attended the Corydon public schools, graduating from the local high school in 1905. Four years later he graduated from the State University of Iowa with a degree of Bachelor of Arts. He immediately engaged in the newspaper business as publisher of the Corydon Times-Republican, the oldest newspaper in Wayne county. He was never a candidate for any public office until he was elected to the senate in 1916, being the youngest member of the senate of the Thirty-seventh general assembly. He is single and a republican in politics.

JOHN M. LINDLY,

Senator from the tenth district, composed of the counties of Henry and Washington, was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania, in 1866. When but a few months old, was brought by his parents to Winfield, Henry county, Iowa, which has since been his home. His father, B. B. Lindly, and mother, Clarriet Hanna Lindly, are descendants from some of the earliest settlers in the American colonies. After completing the course of study in the Winfield school, he graduated from the State University of Iowa. He has been cashler of the bank of Winfield for the last twenty years; secretary of the board of education of Winfield for the last sixteen years; secretary of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association six years and its treasurer for the last four years; has been clerk of the town of Winfield, and was at one time elected mayor without opposition; was nominated for treasurer of Henry county in 1891. He has at times taken an active part in the affairs of the Iowa Bankers association of which he is a member. Elected senator in 1914. A democrat in politics.

CHARLES F. LYTLE,

Senator from the thirty-second district, composed of Woodbury county, was born on a farm near Solon, Johnson county, Iowa, September 11, 1869; son of Robert B. and Sarah E. Lytle. Moved with his parents to Euena Vista

county in 1877, remained there until 1898, then moved to Sloux City, Iowa, where he has since resided. Was married to Miss Lena E, Klingemann in 1900. They have one son, Francis K, Lytle. Has been engaged in construction work and real estate business since moving to Sloux City. Elected senator in 1916. Republican in politics.

ELMER E. MITCHELL.

Senator of the fourteenth district, Mahaska county, was born in the county which he represents, January 27, 1863. He was educated in the public schools of Mahaska county and entered Oskaloosa college at the age of seventeen, remaining two years and taking a general course.

During the six years that followed he taught in the public schools of his county, spending his vacations at work on the 1,000 acre farm owned by his father.

In 1890, he was appointed to a position in the United States census office in Washington, D. C. Two years later he was called to a position in the United States government printing office. During his incumbency of these positions he attended the University of Washington from which he graduated with Master's Degree of Law. He later took a post-graduate course in Columbian University law school, graduating with honors, and was admitted to the practice of law in the United States courts.

Upon the death of his father he returned to his home in Mahaska county and entered into the avocation in which he has since been engaged; farming and stock raising. Since then he has resided on his farm which is known throughout the country as "Mitchell Meadows."

He had never held an office until elected senator from his county in 1916 by the republican party, a political faith espoused by his father before him and the party to which he has given his life-long allegiance.

BYRON W. NEWBERRY.

Senator from the thirty-sixth district, was born in Lorain county, Ohlo, September 1, 1853. In 1855 with his parents he moved to Strawberry Point. Clayton county, Iowa where he has ever since resided. He was educated in the common schools and at the Upper Iowa University where he graduated in 1876. He attended the law department of the State University of Iowa where he graduated in 1876. In 1877 he opened a law office at Strawberry Point. In 1887 he formed a partnership with his brother Charles W. Newberry under the firm name of Newberry Bros. in the practice of law which business has since been continuous. He has also been indentified with banking and agricultural interests. He served as senator in the 30th, 31st and 32d and 32d extra session of the general assembly of Iowa.

In 1905 he was married to Miss Eva M. Buckley. They have no children. He was re-elected state senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

ADDISON M. PARKER,

Senator from the thirtieth district, was born in Guthrie county, Iowa, in 1878. His parents are Charles S. Parker and Frances Owen Parker, who came to lowa from Wisconsin in 1873. He came to Des Moines in 1896; graduated from East High School in 1898 and from Drake university in 1903. Has since been engaged in the practice of law in the city of Des Moines. Was married to Ida Louisa Lange in 1912. Elected Senator 1914. A republican in politics.

JOHN R. PRICE,

Senator from the fifteenth district, composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born in Glamorganshire, South Wales, Creat Britain, on June 23, 1875. Moved with his parents to the United States in May, 1881, and has been a resident of Marion and Monroe counties since that time, except for a period of two years spent in the state of Washington. Attended the public schools until eleven years of age at which time he secured a position in the mines, continuing his education by attending night school. At the age of eighteen years sustained an injury from which he has never fully recovered. Entered Central University at Pella, Iowa, in 1894 and attended until June 1897 then taught school for several years. During the time spent as a teacher he read law under the direction of John T. Clarkson of Albia. Was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law at Albia in 1900 which vocation he still follows at that place. Aside from being deputy clerk for about one year has never held any political office. Was married April 27, 1889 to Mary E. Welch. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

AARON V. PROUDFOOT.

Senator from the district composed of Clarke and Warren counties; was born in the village of Liberty, Clarke county, Iowa, June 13, 1862. His parents were West Virginians, and came west, settling in Clarke county, Iowa, in the spring of 1856. His father Hon. Jacob Proudfoot, represented Clarke county in the house of the 18th general assembly.

Senator Proudfoot attended the district school in the village where he was born, and completed his education at Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa,

After leaving college he entered a law and abstract office in Indianola, and in 1892 was elected clerk of the district court of Warren county, Iowa, serving six years. While in an attorney's office and serving as clerk he prepared himself for admission to the brr and at the close of his six years of service as clerk, entered the practice of law in Indianola, where he has ever since been actively engaged in that profession.

He served for many years as secretary of the school board, also as city solicitor for Indianola, and is now a member of the city library trustees, and a trustee of Simpson college.

He was a republican presidential elector for the 7th congressional district in 1898, and for many years in succession reading clerk of republican state conventions, and was before the republican primary as a candidate for governor in 1912.

He was in the 23d and 34th general assemblies as senator from the district which he is now serving.

In 1885 he married Louie L. Posegate and has a son 14 years of age, and a daughter Mrs. Charity M. Hillis, living in Indiana. Has been an official member of the Methodist Episcopal church for more than 25 years, and in politics has always been a republican.

W. C. RATCLIFF.

Senator from the eighth district, composed of the counties of Montgomery and Mills, was born at Humboldt, Iowa, May 3, 1881. Was graduated in 1897 from Rolfe, Iowa, high school; attended the State University of Iowa and was graduated from the law department in 1904. Located in Red Oak, Iowa, in 1904 and engaged in the practice of law. In 1906 was elected county attorney of Montgomery county and held that office for eight years. Was married in 1909 to May L. Wright of Cedar Falls, Iowa.

Is a member of the school board of Red Oak, Iowa; a director in, and

Is a member of the school board of Red Oak, Iowa; a director in, and Treasurer of, the Mutual Life Association of Iowa; a director in the Red Oak Building and Savings Association. Is a member of the Fresbyterian church. Is a Knights' Templar, Odd Fellow and Knight of Pythias. Elected senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

ARTHUR L. RULE.

Senator from the forty-third district, comprising the counties of Cerro Gordo, Frankin and Hancock, was born at Mason City, Iowa, January the 4, 1875 and is the son of General James Rule and Jennie A. Rule. He attended the public schools of Mason City until 1892 then he entered Shattuck School at Farlbault, Minnesota, graduating in 1895. Went to the Northwestern University until the spring of 1897 when he was forced to leave on account of ill-health and spent a year in Arizona. Later entered the State University of Iowa where he took his law course.

After the completion of his law course he located with Judge J. C. Cook of Cedar Rapids, Iowa in the law department of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad and later in the law department of the Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern, under S. K. Tracey. In 1902 he became a member of the firm of Blythe, Markley and Rule at Mason City and is now a member of the firm of Blythe, Markley, Rule and Smith engaged in the general practice of law at Mason City, Iowa.

Has always been a republican in politics and has served at various times as delegate to the state conventions and for two years was chairman of the county central committee of Cerro Cordo county. In June 1916 he was nominated as the republican candidate for the senate for the forty-third district and was elected at the November election, taking his seat January 8, 1917.

Is a member of the Masonic lodge, Odd Fellows, K. P's and Elks and has served in the Grand lodge of both the Elk's and the K. P's.

He was married in June 1901, at Cedar Rapids, to Miss Edith Brady of that place and of this marriage has been born two daughters. Edith and Margaret.

NICHOLAS J. SCHRUP,

Senator from the thirty-fifth district, comprising the county of Dubuque, was born on a farm in Dubuque county, August 23, 1853, of Luxemburger German parentage. Attended country and city schools and graduated from St. Francis Normal School, Milwaukee, in 1874. Taught country and graded schools for five terms. Was deputy county auditor for three years, resigning that office in 1833 to become secretary and later general manager of the Dubuque Fire & Marine Insurance Company, which position he still occupies. He is president of the German Savings Bank and prominently identified with other Dubuque institutions. Was a member of the Dubuque board of education for ten years and president two terms. Elected senator in 1910. Re-elected 1914. A democrat in politics.

EDWARD M. SMITH,

Senator from sixteenth district, composed of the counties of Adair and Madison, was born in Jackson county, Iowa, October 31, 1870. His parents moved to a farm in Madison county in 1886. Began teaching school in 1892 between farm seasons. Was county school superintendent 1897 to 1900. In 1899 entered the publishing business as publisher of the Winterset Madisonian, which position he still holds. Was also postmaster at Winterset, Iowa, from April, 1904, to August, 1908. Attended the Dexter Normal College, the Drake University, and is now trustee of the Winterset Carnegie Library. Married Evalyn Crossley of Peterson, Iowa, on June 1, 1898, of which union they have four children. Is a member of the Phesbyterian church, Knights of Pythias, Mason, Des Moines Consistory of Scottish Rite Mason, Za-Ga-Zig Temple and Mystic Shrine. A republican in politics.

JAMES A. STEPHENSON,

Senator from the fifth district, composed of the counties of Decatur, Ringgold and Union, was born in Greene county, Pennsylvania, May 12, 1866. Moved with his parents to lowa in 1867 and located on a farm near Mt. Ayr. Has been actively engaged in farming and stock raising all his life. In a resident of Mt. Ayr at the present time but still owns and operates his farm, Is vice-president of the Mt. Ayr State Bank at the present time. Represented his county in the thirty-fourth general assembly and was elected to the senate in 1916. A democrat in politics,

THOMAS E. TAYLOR,

Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Lake county, Illinois, June 20, 1864. He is a son of Charles H. and Elizabeth Ann (Rawson) Taylor, both of whom are of English descent. His education was acquired in the Iowa public schools and at Upper Iowa University, where he graduated in 1887. That fall he entered the Methodist ministry and has spent twenty-five years of the best of his life in that work, serving as pastor of East Janesville, Marble Rock, Greene, Cresco, Osage and Independence. In 1901 his Alma Mater conferred the degree of D. D. This was in recognition of a scries of four important text books on bible study, of which he was jointly the author. The first text book studies on the Life of Christ, the manuscript of which was prepared by him, has had a very large sale, having been adopted as the official text book of the Epworth League, the United Society of Christian Endeavor, Methodist Episcopal Church South, Presbyterian Church South and by the Canadian young people societies. Three years ago Mr. Taylor asked the conferences to relieve blm of the responsibility of a pastorate and has since that time devoted his attention to his fine farm, adjoining Independence, but speaks nearly every Sabbath, supplying for all denominations. June 12, 1889, he was united in marriage to Miss Nellie M. Huie, who is also a graduate of Upper Iowa University, Elected representative in 1914, and senator in 1916. A republican in politics.

FRANK E. THOMPSON.

Senator from the ninth district, composed of Des Molnes county, was born in Grand View, Iowa, December 13, 1873, his parents are both natives of Iowa, of Scotch-English lineage. He was educated in the public and high schools of Winfield and Muscatine, and the State University of Iowa, graduating from the law department with the class of 1896, commenced the practice of law in Burlington in 1896 and has practiced continuously in said city from that date. Has served as chairman of the republican county central committee, and county attorney of his county. Was married August 22, 1894, to Lillian Russell. Elected senator in 1914. A republican in politics.

HOWARD S. VAN ALSTINE,

Senator from the fiftieth district, composed of the counties of Buena Vista, Humboldt and Pocahontas, was born May 16, 1869 in Boone county, Illinois. Came with his parents to Pocahontas county in 1871 and has since lived in that locality. Received his education in the country and graded schools of this state. Has been engaged in the banking business since 1890. Was married in 1896 to M. Bertha Beers and to them have been born three sons two daughters. Was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Joseph H. Allen. A republican in politics.

JOHN C. VOORHEES,

Senator from the eighteenth district, composed of the counties of Cass and Shelby, was born in White House, New Jersey, May 18, 1865, of American parentage. Acquired a common school education. In 1881 when 16 years of age, he came to Anita, Iowa, where he was employed in a hardware store as clerk and general utility man receiving for his services the sum of five dollars per month. After engaging in various lines of industry he finally became interested in the banking business and is now owner of the Anita Bank, one of the most thriving banking institutions of the state. Has been very active in the interests of his home town. Is a member of the Anita Commercial Club and held the position of councilman for 16 years. Is an active Mason and a member of other fraternal organizations. His political career started when he served as page in the New Jersey senate in the years of 1877 and 1878, during which time he became theroughly inoculated with the principles of democracy. Was married to Ottumwa E, Gaylord at Anita, Oct. 1, 1884. Elected senator in 1914. A democrat in politics, being the first of that faith elected from the eighteenth district since the 28th general assem- $\mathbf{b} \mathbf{I} \mathbf{v}$

HARRY C. WHITE.

Senator from the Forty-fifth district, comprising the counties of Benton and Tama, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1889, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford Academy and was a student for one term at Cornell College, at Mt. Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. Has been vice president of the Farmers' Savings Bank of Garrison since it was organized in 1905. Was married in 1894. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914. A democrat in politics.

CHESTER W. WHITMORE,

Senator from the Thirteenth district composed of Wapello county, was born at Burlington, Iowa, January 11, 1869, son of American parents, Francis S. Whitmore and Maria E. Vreeland, of Brooklyn, New York. Educated in grade and high schools at Burlington, and Osceola, Iowa. Earned his own way through the Chicago college of law (Lake Forest University, Bachelor of Laws): being admitted to practice in supreme court of Illinois in 1896, galning practical experience in his profession in several large law offices of Chicago. In 1990 he was admitted to practice in the supreme court of Iowa. He then located at Ottumwa, where he has since been continuously engaged in the active practice of his profession. Admitted to practice in supreme court of United States in 1913. Married to Grace Simmons, of Osceola, Marcii 16, 1892, Married again April 15, 1907, to Carrie S. Hook, of Antioch, Illinois, Member State Bar association of Iowa; American Bar Association; American Society of International Law. Military service, four years in Company "G" Fifty-fourth Regiment, Iowa National Guard. A republican in politics.

JAMES M. WILSON,

Senator from the Third district, composed of Appancose and Davis countles, was born September 8, 1866. His father and mother were born in Scotland. He lived his boyhood days in Warren county, Illinois, and then moved to Centerville, Iowa, with his parents in 1882. After graduating from the Centerville high school he went to the State University of Iowa and graduated from the law department in 1896. In the year of his graduation he was elected county attorney and served four years. Later he was city attorney of Centerville for four years. Married Miss Flora M. White, December 24, 1891. At present he is a very active lawyer of Centerville. Is a Mason, an Elk and a Woodman. Elected senator in 1912, and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE REPRESENTATIVES.

J. V. ADKINS,

Representative from O'Brien county, was born November 15, 1851, near Plymouth, Illinois. Moved to Prairie City, Iowa, in 1865. Received his education in the country and graded schools, supplemented by a full course in a business college. Was married to Allie B. White, of Knoxville, Iowa, December 25, 1877, and to them have been born two sons. Moved to O'Brien county in 1883, engaging in the mercantile business, which he continued for three years, then entered the banking business in which he has been engaged for the past twenty-eight years. Never held public office until his election to the thirty-seventh general assembly in 1916. A republican in politics,

JOSEPH H. ANDERSON.

Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Winnebago county, Iowa. He received his education in the rural schools of his county and in the State Teacher's College at Codar Falls, from which institution he graduated in 1898. For two years after his graduation he was principal of the school at Fairbank, Iowa. Since that time he has been engaged in farming except between January 1, 1905, and January 1, 1913, during which time he served as clerk of the district court of his county. In the fall of 1914 he was elected to the legislature from the 95th representative district. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

REUBEN W. ANDERSON,

Representative from Davis county, was born January 4, 1854, in Pike county, Ohlo. His father was of Scotch descent and born in Virginia. His mother was of Scotch-English descent and was born in Ohlo.

Moved with his parents from Ohio to Davis county in 1856, where they located on a farm near Pulaski where he grew to manhood, alternating farm labor with teaching school. Received his education in the rural school; Troy Academy, Troy, Iowa; National Normal School, Lebanon, Ohio, and the Ohio Wesleyan University. Began teaching when 16 years of age and taught in Iowa, Missouri and Ohio, in rural, village and high schools. Was elected counts superintendent of schools in Davis county for three terms and was superintendent of Bloomfield public schools. Married Miss Celina Plank of Pulaski, Iowa, in 1821.

Is a member of the Methodist church, a Mason, an Odd Fellow, Modern Woodman of America and Son of the American Revolution. Is a farmer by occupation. A democrat in politics.

WALTER W. ANDERSON,

Representative from Greene county, was born in Jefferson, Iowa, January 7, 1872, of American parentage. He attended the high school at Jefferson and later took a business course in Des Moines. In 1898 he moved to Scranton, where he has since been engaged in the banking business and farming. He is

president of the Bank of Scranton and vice president of the city bank at Jefferson. Elected representative in 1912. Re-elected in 1914 and 1916. A republican in politics.

DALE R. ANDRE,

Representative from Des Moines county, was born June 10, 1889. He received his preliminary education in the public schools and St. Cecella cademy at Burlington. Shortly after graduation from the academy he entered Ellicit's business college, from which he graduated about two years later, then entered the law office of J. T. Illick at Burlington for the purpose of studying law. Was admitted to the bar in 1918 and has been engaged in the practice of law since that time. He is the first republican elected from Des Moines county for about twenty years. Holds memberships in the Malta lodge, A. F. & A. M., St. Omar Commandery Knights Templar, Washington lodge, I. O. O. F., and the Order of Red Men. Is a member of the Methodist Episcopal colurch of Burlington. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

JAMES W. BAILEY.

Representative from Shelby county, was born May 21, 1871, in Adams county, Illinois, of American parentage. In 1872 his parents moved to Des Moines, Iowa. In 1892 he located in Harlan, Shelby county, Iowa, where he now resides. On January 20, 1903, he was married to Miss Elizabeth McQuillen. Is a member of all the Masonic bodies at Harlan, and is also a member of the Iowa society of the sons of the American Revolution. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A democrat in politics.

EDWIN A. BALDWIN,

Hepresentative from Johnson county, was born July 10, 1889, on a farm in Johnson county. Attended public schools and the Iowa City academy. Taught in the public schools of Iowa and South Dakota. Spent four years in the State University of Iowa, one year in the College of Liberal Arts and three years in the College of Law, from which he was graduated in 1913. He has practiced his profession in Iowa City, Iowa, since his admission to the bar, as a member of the firm of Baldwin & Baldwin. Was elected representative in 1916. He is unmarried. A democrat in politics.

WILLIAM BECKER.

Representative from Clayton county, was born at Elkader in Clayton county, Iowa, March 18, 1874. Graduated from Rolfe high school June 17, 1892, from the Elkader High School in 1890, attended the University of Iowa, and became a registered pharmacist in 1891. Has been engaged in the drug business at Elkader, Iowa, continuously since 1892. Served as a member of the school board for ten years. Married Moille Schmidt in 1899. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

HOWARD W. BENN,

Representative from Washington county, was born in Washington county, June 14, 1876. Attended the country schools until 1890. Was engaged in farming and live stock business until 1910. United in marriage in 1906 to Mary E. Nelson. To them was born one son. Served as county auditor from 1910 until 1914. Elected representative in 1916. Republican in politics.

CHARLES E. BOIES,

Representative from Buchanan county, was born on a farm in Boone county, Illinois, January 15, 1859. Is a son of the late W. D. Boies, Sr., who was a brother of ex-Governor Boles. Received his education in the rural schools and the public schools of Sycamore, Illinois. Is a farmer, owning eight hundred acres of land in Buchanan county. Has been a feeder and shipper of horses and cattle for the past twenty-five years. Is a member and trustee of the Methodist church of Independence, Iowa, and a member of the Masonic lodge, the Order of the Eastern Star and of the American Revolution. Was married to Clara I. Miller January 26, 1880. Their family consists of one son and two daughters. A republican in politics.

ROBERT BRUCE,

Representative from Pocahontas county, was born in Pocahontas county. Iowa, March 18, 1875. Graduated from Rolfe high school June 17, 1892, from the law department of the State University of Iowa, June 8, 1897, and from the Iowa Business College, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1894. Was married October 11, 1899, to Carol Mirth Ritchey. Is engaged in the banking business. A republican in politics.

JOSHUA W. COAKLEY,

Representative from Union county, was born October 12, 1859, at Bangor, Maine. Moved to Madison county, Iowa, in 1873, to Adams county in 1879, Union county in 1904. Received his education in the public school at Winterset, the Bennet Medical College of Chicago and the Barnes Medical College at St. Louis, from which latter institution he graduated in 1893. Is a member of the Methodist church and of the Masonic, I. O. O. F., Elks, Eagles and Moose lodges. Married December 16, 1880, to Cynthia C. Davis. A democrat in politics.

GÉORGE W. CROZIER,

Representative from Marion county, was born near Port Royal, Juniata county, Pennsylvania, March 16, 1844. Came with his parents to Cedar county, Iowa, in 1857, and to Marion county in 1859. His early education was received in the public schools of his native state and after reaching manhood in the Central University of Pella, Iowa. Commenced the study of law with the firm of Atherton & Anderson at Knoxville in the spring of 1870 and commenced Practice in Knoxville in the spring of 1872. Was married in October, 1873, to Mary W. Parker, who died in 1884. Remartled to Marle V. Davenport in 1893. Has one daughter by the first marriage, Bertha G. Crozier, now a librarian in the public library of Brocklyn, N. Y., and by second marriage one son, Bruce D. Croxier. Served one year as a private in Co. A. Seventh Iowa Cavalry in the war of the rebellion. Served three terms as mayor of Knoxville, one term as circuit judge and four terms as county attorney. Was elected representative in 1908 and re-elected in 1912, 1914 and 1916. Is engaged in the practice of law in Knoxville. A democrat in politics.

JOHN H. DARRAH.

Representative from Franklin county, was born February 11, 1857. His parents were originally from the north of Ireland, coming to Ohio at an early age. They moved from Ohio to Franklin county, Iowa, in 1856, and have lived there ever since. Was raised on a farm and farming has been his occupation until the present time. Was married October 9, 1881, to Miss Kate Elliott. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politica.

HERBERT E. DEAN.

Representative from Osceola county, was born in O'Brien county, Iowa, December 5, 1872, of American parentage. Attended school at Primghar, Iowa, and Morntngside college, Sioux City, Iowa. Appointed deputy clerk of the court of O'Brien county, Iowa, under J. W. Walter and served two years. Appointed assistant cashier of the Primghar State Bank under J. L. E. Peck and served two years. Entered the Northern Indiana Normal School at Valparaiso, Indiana, and graduated with the class of 1896. Entered the law department of the State University of Nebraska and graduated with the class of 1898. Was married to Estella M. Bowser of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and has two sons, Wilbur M. and Forest C. Moved to Harris, Jowa, in 1899, and was elected president of the school board of that place. Moved to Ocheyedan, Iowa, in 1901. Was once appointed and three times elected mayor of that town. Devotes most of his time to looking after his farm interests. A republican in politics,

GEORGE H. DUNKELBERG,

Representative from Floyd county, was born in Niagara county, New York, October 2, 1853, of American parentage. Moved with his parents to Rochell Illinois, in 1867, receiving there his early education. He afterward attended Rock River Seminary, then taught school for several years in Ogle county, Illinois. Was married in 1882 to Mary E. Hubbard and settled in Floyd county where his six children were born. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

FRED DURBIN,

Representative from Mills county, was born on a farm in Mills county in 1876. His father and mother, Joshua and Almira Durbin, were natives of Ohio and early ploneers in Iowa. His early education was in the rural schools of his county. He graduated from the Western Normal College at Shenandoah, Iowa, in the normal and commercial courses in 1896, and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1898. He began the business of banking at Malvern in 1899. In 1906 he helped to organize the Malvern National Bank of Malvern, Iowa, and is now its cashier and a director therein.

During his whole life he has been actively engaged in farming and stock raising, being a breeder of registered Percheron horses and Short-horn cattle, and an ardent advocate of advanced agriculture.

He was married to Miss Mary Christy on November 27, 1901. They have one daughter, Dorothy.

Elected representative in 1916, and is a republican in politics.


HENRY EDGINGTON,

Is engaged in farming and in banking and is president of the State Savings Bank at Ute, Iowa. Was elected county supervisor of Monona county in 1907 and held that office for three terms, nine years. Republican in politics.













LEE W. ELWOOD.

Representative from Howard county, was born December 27, 1888, thus reaching his twenty-fourth birthday more than a month following the November election in 1912. No record has been produced to show that a younger man ever held a chair in Iowa legislature. Spent some time on a farm, dealing in live stock, before entering the law school of the University of Jowa. When twenty years of age be graduated and opened an office in his home town, Elma, Iowa. He is unmarried. Is a member of the Masonic order. Elected representative in 1912. Re-elected in 1914 and 1916. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM W. EPPS.

One of the representatives from Wapello county, was born on a farm in Ohio. September 1, 1854. He received his education in common schools and college, taught school for ten years and later took up the study of law, was first admitted to the bar by the supreme court of Ohio in December, 1881. In youth be was accustomed to all kinds of labor incident to farm life. In March, 1884, he married Miss Louie M. Roberts, near Indianapolis, Indiana, and immediately moved to Ottumwa, Iowa, they have three living children, J. Earl, Jessie Belle and A. Windsor, all of whom are graduates of the Ottumwa high school. On coming to Ottumwa he opened a law office where he has been engaged in the practice of law ever since; during said time he served the city of Ottumwa as city attorney and mayor twelve years, and as a member of the school board, was also county attorney of Wapello county. He served five years in Co. G. Second regiment, I. N. G., and was a member of the expert riffe team of said company.

He has always taken an active part in politics, having served three terms on the republican state central committee, and as chairman and secretary of the republican county central committee.

He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and has been very active in lodge circles, being a member of the Shrine, all degrees of York Rites Masonry, Elks, Knights of Pythlas and M. W. A. A republican in politics.

CHRIS ERICKSON.

Representative from Lyon county, was born in Wisconsin January 3, 1873, and came to Iowa with his parents in 1884. His parents were both natives of Norway. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1899 and has been engaged in the banking business at Inwood, Iowa, since 1991. Was elected to the thirty-fifth general assembly and re-elected to the thirty-seventh general assembly in 1916. A republican in politics.

W. S. FINCH,

Representative from Ida county. Was born February 14, 1858, on a farm in Whiteside county. Illinois. His education was acquired in the common and graded schools of that state.

He came to Iowa in 1880, locating in Ida county when the country was new and was a pioneer in the early settlement of that county. He has been engaged in farming and stock raising ever since he came to Iowa and has lived on the farm, which is the site of his present country home, for the past thirty-five years.

Was elected to the legislature in 1916, and is a republican in politics.

C. V. FINDLAY.

Representative from Webster county, was born September 12, 1866, at Paw Paw, Illinois. His parents were pioneers of Clay county, Iowa, homesteading there in 1871. The family moved to Webster county in 1877. He attended the rural school, taught several years before he entered Highland Park College, and was a member of the first class to graduate from that institution. He served as county superintendent of Webster county for eight years and quit to form a partnership with J. F. Monk for the purchase of Tobin College at Fort Dodge, a flourishing educational institution of which he is president. He was married to Miss Mabel Southwick of Lake Mills, Iowa, who is a graduate of Highland Park College; to this union two sons, Franklin and Maurice, were born. He is a Congregationalist, a republican, and a member of the Masonle order.

FRANZ S. FINLEY,

Representative from Henry county, was born in Muskingum county, Ohio, August 12, 1866. Received his early education in the country schools which he afterward taught for three years. Attended Muskingum College and the Ohio State University. Worked as a salesman for three years traveling in the United States, Canada and through Europe. Has practiced law continuously in Mount Pleasant since 1895. Is also interested in farming. Elected representative in 1916 as a republican.

HARVEY W. FLENNIKEN,

Representative from Jones county in the thirty-seventh general assembly; was born at Millville, Clayton county, Iowa, February 7, 1859. Attended the rural schools in Clayton county, and also the Elkader high school. Lived on a farm until twenty years old when he moved to Rockford, Illinois, where he entared the machine shop of the N. C. Thompson Manufacturing company for two years, leaving there and going to Springfield, Illinois, entering the Illinois Watch factory for a couple of years, leaving there with others who were starting what was known as the Aurora Watch company of Aurora, Illinois, where he remained until the winter of 1892 when he entered a co-partnership with W. J. Creglow and D. W. Hurst, starting what was known as the Bank of Delmar, Delmar, Iowa, of which he was cashier for seven years, selling out and moving to Olin, Iowa, where he organized the Citizens Savings Bank in 1899, acting as cashier up to the present time. The past few years he has been quite extensively interested in buying and selling real estate. Has always been a republican in politics.

FRANK A. GARBER,

Representative from Decatur county. Was born in Decatur county, Iowa, May 8, 1865. His grandparents were ploneers of Iowa, having settled in Jefferson county several years before Iowa became a state. His father was eight and his mother four years of age when they came with their parents to Iowa. He was educated in the rural schools and in the high school of Leon. Taught school during the winter for several years. Was married to Emma Wolff, September 7, 1892. His ancestors for two hundred years have been members of the Church of the Brethren and he has been a member of this church for many years. He has eight living children. Has been a farmer all his life. Never held an important political office. A democrat in politics.

WILLIAM N. GILBERT,

Representative from Marshall county, was born in New Milford, Connecticut, March 20, 1850. His parents moved to Illinois about 1856 and settled on a farm, and he remained on the farm until the age of 22, receiving a country school education, supplemented with two years in the high school of Ashton, Illinois. Soon after leaving the farm he engaged in the mercantile business, which he continued until 1902, at which time he engaged in the banking business, and in a short time succeeded to the presidency of the bank, which position he has since held. In 1879 he was married to Miss Florence Brayton of Mount Morris, Illinois. They have two sons, Harold and Frederick, who are both engaged in the practice of law. A republican in politics. Elected to the thirty-sixth general assembly in 1914 and re-elected in 1918.

CHARLES GILMORE,

Representative from Clay county, was born in Charlotte, Clinton county, Iowa, October 18, 1852. His father was born in Massachusetts and his mother in Illinois. Received his education in the public schools of Charlotte. Worked in the Charlotte flour mill most of the time with his father until his death in 1877, when he took charge of the mill, and operated same until 1890. Wasmarried to Clara A. Dickey of Clinton county, September 19, 1882. In 1891 moved to Clay county and located on a farm near Sloux Rapids, and has been interested in farming and stock raising on the same place ever since. Is interested in the banking business, being president of the Rossle Savings Bank. In 1895 was elected county supervisor of Clay county and served continuously until Japuary 1, 1912, being chairman of the board for twelve years. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. Is a member of the Masonic and Woodmen lodges. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM EDWARD GILTNER,

Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm near Albia, Iowa, Ortober 6, 1871. He was educated in the rural schools and the Albia Academy; attended normal institute; taught two terms; graduated from the Gem. City Business College, Quincy, Ill. in 1894, and attended Parsons College, Fafrifield, Iowa. Studied law in the office of Judge Henry L. and George W. Dashiell, admitted to practice in 1899, and has practiced in Albia ever since; also owns and operates a farm. His father was A. M. Geltner, a member of the 16th, General Assembly of Iowa, and his mother Mary E. Giltner, nec, Newell both having come from Indiana to Monroe county, Iowa, as early settlers. His family consists of wife, Hattie E. Giltner, formerly, Galliher, of Jofferson county, Iowa, and of pioneer descent, and five children, three girls and two boys. Was elected representative in 1916, and is a republican in politics.

JACOB C. GRASON.

One of the representatives from Pottawattamic county, was born in Monroe, Green county, Wisconsin, May 9, 1857. Moved with his parents to Jasper county, Missouri, in 1866, where he was educated in the rural schools of the county, the high school at Carthage, and at Park College, Parkville, Missouri. Learned the milling trade with his father, but soon gave it up for the work of teaching. Is now head of the commercial department of the Council Bluffs high school, which position he has held for the past eighteen years. On June 23, 1880, he was married to Miss Lanora M. Sayre, at Medoc, Missouri. Is a Presbyterian in religion, and a republican in politics. Was elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1216.

ROSS C. GRAY.

Representative from Calhoun county, was born at Rockwell City In said county on the nineteenth day of November, 1882. He graduated from the high school of his native town in 1900 and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1904. Upon graduation he entered the practice of law with his father, W. B. Gray, at Rockwell City, Iowa, and was so engaged up to January 1, 1909, when he became clerk of the district court of Calhoun county. He has held several minor political offices, serving as city attorney, justice of the peace and member of the board of library trustoes and is a member of several fraternal organizations. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

THOMAS F. GRIFFIN.

One of the representatives from Woodbury county, was born on a farm in Howard county. Iowa. April 19, 1865. His parents were among the early settlers in that part of the state, having come to Howard county in the early fittles. He was educated in the common schools and taught several terms of school. He studied law at the University of Notre Dame and graduated from that institution in June, 1888. He was admitted to the bar in October of the same year and has been engaged in the practice of law at Slouz City since that time. In 1891 he was married to Miss Rose Hartnett. Elected representative in 1912. Re-elected in 1914 and 1916. A republican in politics.

CHARLES A. HALL.

Representative from Taylor county, was born in Hardin county, Iowa, March 12, 1872. He moved with his parents to Taylor county in 1874 and has been a resident of Taylor county since that time. Lived on a farm for twenty years. Was educated in the public schools and Drake University. Was manager of the Bedford Mill Company for ten years. Was elected county auditor in 1910 and served as such until January 1, 1916. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

JOHN T. HANSEN,

One of the representatives from Scott county, was born at Davenport, Iowa, November 28, 1858. Moved to Sheridan township, Scott county, May 1, 1861, where he attended the country schools afterward receiving private instruction in German. Is a farmer by occupation. Was elected justice of the peace in 1886. Has been closely connected with the patrons of husbandry and is a member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

T. P. HARRINGTON,

Representative from Kossuth county, was born in Lafayette county, Wisconsin, December 17th, 1867. He came to Iowa with his parents in 1882 and settled on a farm in Wright county where he resided until 1899 when he moved to Algona, Kossuth county, and formed the law firm of "Harrington & Dickinson" of which he is still a member. He secured his legal education in the University of Iowa, was city attorney of Algona for two years and county attorney of Kossuth county for four years, and was elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics,

OTTO A. HELMING,

Representative from Allamakee county was born on a farm in Ludlow township, Allamakee county, March 9, 1868, of German parentage. He attended the rural schools near his home and for two winters attended college at Waukon, Iowa. Was married to Miss Lena Wittenberg of Wisconsin in 1902. His chief occupation has been farming, but for six years was township assessor, prior to his election to the legislature in 1912. Was a member of the Thirty-fifth general assembly. He-elected in 1914 and 1916 to the Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh general assemblies. Republican in politics.

B. J. HORCHEM.

One of the representatives from Dubuque county is principal of the Audubon school at Dubuque, the most famous institution of learning in that part of the state. Was born December 4, 1866, the son of John and Henrietta (Plaster) Horchem both of German descent. Ills father, for four years a union soldier. died shortly after the war, and his mother, a teacher, removed to Dyersville, where she was married to a farmer in the neighborhood. In 1884 he was graduated from the Dyersville schools (of which he was afterwards principal); in 1892 from the Normal School (now University) of Valparaiso, Indiana; and in the interval, from the Business College at Cedar Rapids. He has subsequently pursued special courses in Columbia University, and the University of Chicago, his special study being sociology and psychology. He was three times elected county superintendent of Dubuque county. His great achievement has been the development of the Institution of Park Life, in connection with the public school work of his city and the successful operation of his plan for a properly proportioned educational system for the advancement of mind and body allke, has attracted nation-wide attention. He is connected with numerous societies of an educational, sociological and scientific character. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A democrat in politics.

A. W. JACKSON,

Representative from Cedar county, was born in Millersburg, Iowa, November 11, 1860. With the exception of a residence of seven years in Nebraska, has spent his entire life in the state of Iowa, having been engaged in the newspaper business in nine of its counties. At the present time is publisher of the Stanwood Hevald. Has held no political office except that of postmaster at West Liberty under President Taft. Was elected representative in 1916 as a republicant.

JOHN C. JESSEN,

Representative from Story county, was born in Chicago, Illinois, on February 10, 1878, of Danish parentage. His family moved to Oshkosh, Wisconsin, shortly after his birth and a few years later to Pine River, Wisconsin, where his father died. About the year 1885 his mother with her four children moved to Story City, Iowa, and a couple of years later married Chris Larson who owned a farm north of Nevada, Iowa, where Mr. Jessen grew to manhood on the farm and attended the rural schools, he being the first student in the township to receive a common school diploma and also received a second grade teacher's certificate while attending the rural school. He thereafter attended the Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa, and completed the one year dairy course while there and following the completion of his course operated a creamery at Shannon City, Iowa, for about three years. In 1902 he entered Drake Unit

versity Law School and graduated therefrom in 1905, and located in the practice of law at Zearing, Iowa, remaining there for about two years thereafter, locating at Story City, Iowa, where he has been actively engaged in the practice of law for the past six years. He was married June 22, 1910, to Miss Catharine Golly of Zearing, Iowa. Prior to his entering the legislature he had served as mayor of the town of Zearing, and as city attorney of Story City. He is identified with the Masonic fraternity, being at present the master of the lodge at Story City. He is a member of the Christian church and takes an active part in Sundy school work, being the teacher of a splendid organized class of young men in the Grace church at Story City, Iowa. Elected representative in 1914, re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

JAMES FOSTER JOHNSTON,

Representative from Lucas county, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, April 25, 1875. He received his early education in the country schools, and atterwards attended Western Normal College and Simpson College. For several years he taught school in the winter time and farmed in the summer. His time is now devoted altogether to farming and stock-raising. He was elected a member of the board of supervisors of his county in 1910, and served three years. He held no other public office prior to his election to the general assembly in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. He is a republican in politics.

ROBERT J. JOHNSTON.

Representative from Humboldt county, was born on the present site of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, January 19, 1856. His parents, John and Jane (Porter) Johnston, were of Scotch-Irish ancestry. He came to Iowa with his parents in the spring 1856. They settled in the vicinity of Springvale (now Humboldt) which locality has since been his home. He was educated in the public schools of Humboldt and Humboldt College. He served as deputy county treasurer for one term, resigning that office in 1883 to enter the banking business which he has since followed. He was for several years chairman of the republican county central committee. He served for a number of years as a director of the State Agricultural Society and closed his term of service with the society by serving two years as vice-president and one year as president. He is a republican in politics and is cashier of the Humboldt State Bank, Humboldt, Iowa, the oldest bank in the county. He was married June 27, 1888, to Mary H. Stoddard. He was elected representative from the seventy-sixth district of Iowa in the fall of 1914. Re-elected in 1916.

IRA W. JONES,

Representative from Cerro Gordo county, was born in Erie county, New York, February 28, 1877. His parents moved to Butler county, Iowa, in September, 1879. He lived on the farm near Allison until the fall of 1899, when he entered the Iowa State College and graduated in the Scientific course in June, 1903, when he entered the Drake Law School. After completing a two-year course there went to Yale University and graduated from the Law Department in 1905. After graduation he located at Clear Lake, Iowa, and practiced law. He served four years as chairman of the Republican County Central Committee. Was elected representative for the Eighty-seventh district in the November election of 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

PRESLEY L. KEPPLE.

Representative from Chickasaw county, was born at North Washington, Iowa, July 11, 1857. In 1854 moved with his parents to Chickasaw, Iowa. In 1854 he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Rumbaugh. They resided on a farm at Chickasaw until in 1892, when he moved to Ionia, Iowa, and engaged in the mercantile business. In 1903 he was appointed postmaster of Ionia, Iowa, which office he held for nearly twelve years. Has always been a resident of Chickasaw county. Has held offices of justice of the peace, township trustee, town councilman and has been a member of the school board of Ionia for many years. Is a member of the Congregational church and also of the I. O. C. F., Modern Woodmen, Modern Brotherhood and Masonic lodges. Is a republican in politics.

CHARLES B. KERN.

Representative from Warren county, was born in Warren county, February 1, 1867. His parents were John and Miriam Black Kern who came from Fairfield county, Ohlo to Warren county, Iowa in the year 1857. He was reared on a farm, attended the Indianola public schools and Simpson College. He was married August 25, 1893 to Mary Frances Spring, and to this union was born four children, all of whom are now living. He took up farming in early years and has been actively engaged in the same ever since. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics,

DAVID W. KIMBERLY.

One of the representatives from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1873. When six weeks old, he moved with his parents to West Liberty, in Muscatine county, his father being Amos E. Kimberly, a farmer and stock raiser of that place, and has lived on the farm most of his life with the exception of the last few years which has been spent in Davenport, Scott county, Iowa. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale High School and Bryant-Stratton's Business College, of Chicago. His mother was a daughter of David Wilson, of West Liberty, Iowa. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Crotto, Eastern Star, Fiks, Owis, Odd Fellows and Turner Society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

S. W. KLAUS.

Representative from Delaware county, was born in Delaware county, January 12, 1861. He grew to manhood on his father's farm; attended the public school until he was seventeen years of age, after which he attended Northwestern College at Galena, Illinois, from which institution he was graduated in 1832. Taught school two terms. In 1837 he entered the mercantile business at Earlville, and remains in that business to this day. He has served as mayor of his home city two terms; on the city council six terms, and as member of Board of Education for the past twelve years; chairman of Delaware County Republican Central Committee for ten years. Is a member of the Odd Fellows and K. P. lodges; member of the M. E. church. Has served as secretary of the official board of the local church for the past twenty-five years. He was married to Miss Rose Landis of Colesburg, Iowa, in 1898. Elected representative in 1916. Republican in politics.

PETER J. KLINKER,

Representative from Crawford county, was born in Germany, January 9, 1877. He came to America with his widowed mother in May, 1882, coming directly to Denison, Iowa, where he has lived ever since. He is a graduate from the Denison High School, and from the colleges of Liberal Arts and Law of the University of Iowa. He started in the practice of law at Denison, Iowa, in 1901, and in 1902 was elected county attorney for Crawford county, which office he held for ten consecutive years. He is engaged in the practice of law at Denison, Iowa. He married Garnet L. Norman, June 4, 1914. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

EDWARD H. KNICKERBOCKER,

One of the representatives from Linn county, was born near Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on November 18, 1855, and was reared in that locality. Was educated in the county schools and Fairfax High School, later attending Western College, now known as Leander Clarke College, at Toledo, Iowa. Was married to Hanna M. Johnson of Delaware county, Pennsylvania, March 22, 1882. To this union were born three children, Charles J., Sara H. and Ruth M. Has always followed the occupation of farming and stock raising and importing of Belgian and Percheron horses. Has always been a republican and was elected to the thirty-seventh general assembly on that ticket. Is a member of the Congregational church and is a thirty-second degree Mason and a Shriner.

JOHN KROUSE,

Representative from Wayne county, was born in Woodford county, Illinois, August 22, 1867. His father, Martin Krouse, was born in Germany and his mother, Caroline Felgh, in New Jersey. Moved to Wayne county in 1869 where he secured his education in the rural schools. Has held various political offices, having served as a member of the board of supervisors for six years and as township trustee for four years. He follows the occupation of farming. He is a director of the Farmers and Merchants State Bank and president of the Wayne county agricultural society. Was married December 31, 1890 to Ida A. Kah and has five children, one daughter and four sons. Elected representative in 1916. A democrat in politics.

FRANK C. LAKE,

One of the representatives from Woodbury county, was born in Golden, Colorado, April 18, 1879. He came to Iowa and located at Cedar Rapids in 1903, where he joined the reportorial staff of the Cedar Rapids Evening Gazette. After spending three years in newspaper work in Cedar Rapids, he went to Sloux City and joined the reportorial staff of the Sloux City Journal. He has made Sloux City his home since that time, and during his residence there served on both the Sloux City Journal and Sloux City Tribune as reporter and department editor. He founded, and was editor for one year, the Saturday Mirror, a weekly publication devoted to society, clubs, amusements and politics. He entered Iowa politics by being chosen Secretary of the Woodbury County Republican Central Committee, 1912, and served four years in that capacity. His grandfather, Seth Lake, was an early Iowa settler, having built one of the first houses in Waterloo. Was elected representative on the republican ticket in 1916. His lodge affiliations are Masonic, Elks and Yeoman.

JOHN N. LANGFITT.

Representative from Adair county, was born in Scott county Iowa, May 9th, 1888. His father was a native of Beaver county, Pennsylvania; his mother Caroline Gadd, was born in Morrill county. Ohio. Was educated in the rural schools, Wilton Academy and Davenport Business College. He moved to Adair county when he was twenty-one, and four years later married Clara A. Martin. Lived for six years in Snohamish county, Washington, returning to Adair in 1898, going to the farm which his father entered from the government in 1854. Has four children living. Is a Presbyterian in religion, a 32° Mason and a Shriper. Republican in politics. Was elected representative in 1916.

EMIL A. LARSON.

Representative from Montgomery county, was born in Stanton, Montgomery county, Iowa, July 20th, 1870, of Swedish parentage. His early education was acquired in the district schools, and later attended the graded school at Stanton, Iowa. Was married to Miss Emma E. Walltn in 1893. The family consists of two daughters. From 1892 to 1900 he was engaged in the mercantile business. In 1900 he was elected auditor of Montgomery county. Was reclected in 1802 and again in 1904. In 1906 he resigned from this office and became assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Red Oak, Iowa. In 1907 he engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

CURTIS ORVILLE LEE. .

Representative from Sac county, was born in Sac City, Iowa, November 18, 1860. Moved with his parents, in the spring of 1861 to a farm five miles north of this city, where he resided until he became of age. Was married March 16, 1884, to Celia E. Rogers. He farmed until February, 1893, when he moved to Sac City where he had bought an elevator, and entered the grain, coal and livestock business following this line for nine years. During this time he became actively engaged in the auction business; making a specialty of farm and livestock sales, at which business he has continued until his election to the legislature from the Sixticth district. He owns and has operated either by hired help or tenant a number of farms which have claimed a very large part of his attention. Father was M. S. Lee, formerly of Schoharle county, New York. Mother Caroline Travis of Laporte, Ind. They were among the early settlers of Sac county having come here in August, 1858. Has been a member of the school board and mayor of Sac City. An active republican in politics.

REUBEN A. LENOCKER.

Representative from Madison county, was born in Holmes county, Ohio, October 7, 1864. Moved with his parents to Henry county, Hilmois, in 1865, and to Penn township, Madison county, Iowa, in 1869. This has been his residence ever since except for seven months spent on a claim in Colorado. Was educated in the rural public schools and a short year in the Dexter normal school. Taught eight terms of country school. Has served as school secretary of Penn township for twenty-six years. Served a term as member of the board of supervisors of Madison county. Was married to Miss Mattie B. Pace, August 25, 1891. A farmer and stock raiser, a member of I. O. O. F. and a member of the Presbyterian church. A democrat in politics.

J. H LEWIS.

Representative from Clarke bounty, was born in Clarke county, Iowa, July 11, 1888. At the age of seven years he moved with his parents to Great Bend, Kansas, where he resided for twelve years. With this exception he has spent his entire life in Iowa. Has served as township clerk, township trustee and township assessor. Was married December 15, 1888 to Leona Lamb, and to them was born one child. Is a member of the Christian church. Was elected representative in 1916. A democrat in politics.

ARCH W. McFARLANE,

One of the representatives from Black Hawk county, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885. Was educated in the public schools and graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V Hawkins. Is now engaged as commercial traveler with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a members of the Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of Knights of Pythias and sentor council of United Commercial Travelers, Waterloo Council No. 29. Elected representative 1914 and re-elected in 1916. In politics he is a republican.

RUBE McFERREN,

Representative from Hamilton county, was born on a farm near Webster City, in Hamilton county, December 31, 1868. His parents were pioneer settlers. Attended school at the State University, was admitted to the bar to practice law in May, 1890. At present he is engaged in the practice of law at Webster City. Married Miss Minnie Woolsey in 1892, who died about three years later. Married Miss Minnie Klockman in April, 1992. A republican in politics.

DAVID E. MACKIE.

Representative from Benton county, was born in Benton county, Iowa, June 2, 1870. His parents were born in Scotland and came to this country in the early fiftles. He has lived almost continuously since his birth and still resides on the farm which his father originally entered from the government. He was educated in the common schools of Benton county, Iowa, and later in the academy at Vinton and business college at Dixon, Illinois. He was married in 1898 to Olive L. Graham. He is president of the Mt. Auburn Savings Bank. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. United Presbyterian in religion. Republican in politics.

HALLECK J. MANTZ,

Rpresentative from Audubon county, was born in Iowa county, Iowa, on September 23, 1877. His father was born in Pennsylvania and his mother in Ohio. At the age of five, he moved, with his parents, to Audubon county and has resided there since that time. Worked on a farm until of age and attended the country school and later attended the Audubon High School. Taught in the rural schools of Audubon county for three years and later attended the law school at Drake University and graduated with a class in 1905 and at once began the practice of law in Audubon. He served as county attorney of Audubon county for four years, beginning in 1909 and served as mayor of

Audubon following his term as county attorney. Has been in the active practice of law in Audubon county since locating there. Is a member of the Presbyterian church and belongs to the Masonic Fraternity of Audubon. A republican in politics.

OSCAR L. MEAD.

Representative from Butler county, was born on a farm in Butler county in 1875. Received his education in the rural schools and in Shell Rock High School, afterwards attending business college at Nora Springs Seminary. Was married to Gertrude Graham of Shell Rock in 1897 and to them have been born two children. Has held the offices of township assessor and member of the school board. Is interested in banking but has been an active farmer all his life. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

DAVID MEREDITH.

Representative of Jasper county, Iowa, was born in Poweshlek county, Iowa in 1887. His father was a native of North Carolina and his mother a native of Indiana. They moved to Iowa in 1857 and settled on a farm in Poweshlek county where they resided until 1881, when they moved to Jasper county, Iowa. Graduated from the high school at Lynnville, Iowa in 1887 and during the year following his graduation attended Penn College at Oskaloosa, Iowa. Leaving there he returned to Jasper county where he took charge of his father's farm and live stock husiness which has been his principal business since that time. He has filled the office of township trustee, member of the town council and other minor offices prior to his election in 1912 as representative from Jasper county. Was re-elected to that office in 1916. A republican in politics.

HARRY J. MILES.

Representative from Jackson county, was born in Miles, Jackson county, Iowa, September 13, 1869, of Scotch descent. Was educated in the graded schools of Miles, and at Grinnell College. Was married to Alice Lehman of Lyons, Iowa, in 1902. Is engaged in farming and stock raising and served four terms as mayor of Miles. Is a member of the Masonic orders, Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellows. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

W. D. MILLER,

Representative from Boone county, was born in the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, near Washington, D. C., September 4, 1878. He came west at an early age to Eldora, Iowa in 1900 where he entered the employ of the Northwestern Railroad. Came to Boone county in 1902, locating at Ogden as station agent and operator. Later engaged in banking business. Is now editor and publisher of the Ogden Reporter. Married to Anna B. Clark, December 25, 1906. Have two children, Virginia age 6 and Clark age 3. Republican in politics,

W. A. MOOTY, .

Representative from Grundy county, was born in Longford county, Ireland in May 1863, came to New York city in the spring of 1879, remained there during the summer and in the fall came west and settled in Grundy county and

has lived there ever since. He attended school in Grundy Center, Tilford Academy and Leander Clarke College at Toledo. He is a farmer and stockman. Was married April 12, 1905, to Miss May Kaufman of Morrison, Iows. To them two children were born, one son and one daughter. He has held the offices of township clerk, county supervisor and director and vice-president of the Farmers Mutual Fire and Lightning Insurance Company of his county. He is a republican in politics and elected representative in 1916.

FRANKLIN P. MOWERY,

Representative from Jefferson county, was born on the farm where he now resides in Jefferson county, Iowa, in 1853. His parents were pioneer settlers in the county. He attended the rural schools, Axeling Academy and the Iowa Business College and law school. He taught four years in the rural schools and one year as principal of Competine High School. Has been a member of the school board of the township where he resides since he was twenty-one years of age. He is a farmer by occupation. Has never held a political office before but has always taken an active part in politics and questions relative to building up the rural community. Was married to Cora Kirby, October 4, 1877, a native of Illinois. He has three sons and two daughters. Elected representative in 1916. A democrat in politics.

ROY WILLIAM MURRAY,

Representative from Buena Vista county, was born in Vernon, Marion county, Illinols, April 12, 1873. His father was the late Rev. William Morgan Murray, a noted preacher in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Illinois, who served in the Civil War with Company B 61st, Illinois Volunteers. His mother Annie E. (Green) Murray was born at Chapel Hill, Tennessee. The ancestors originally came from the Perthshire Hills of Scotland and the north of Ireland to Virginia as early as 1736. From Virginia they Immigrated to Tennessee and Kentucky and in 1832 to Eond county, Illinois.

He attended public schools at Fairfield, Illinois. High School at Owensville, Indiana. Dixon Business College, Dixon, Illinois; Purdue University, LaFayette Indiana. Moved from Owensville, Indiana to Logan county, Illinois in May 1897, where he was married the 27th day of June, 1990, to Miss Louie Ethel Keys, daughter of the late John James Keys of that county. They have five children, known as "The Murray Stairstens," namely: Ida, Estella, Grace, Virginia and William Keys.

Moved to Storm Lake, Iowa, October 19, 1908 but lived the year of 1911 in Park Rapids, Minnesota. Has followed farming and merchandising but for several years has been successfully engaged in the real estate business. Is a member of the Storm Lake board of education, a member of the Grant Club, Des Moines, a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, a Knight Templar, a thirty-second degree Mason, a Shriner and a member of the I. O. O. F. and Knights of Pythlas.

Elected representative 78th, district in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

LEWIS J. NEFF,

Representative from Pottawattamic county, was born September 21, 1868, in Livingston county, Illinois, and emigrated to Iowa with his parents when he was five years of age. His parents purchased 160 acres of land in Monroe township, Shelby county, and settled thereon. He attended the rural and Watnut public schools and aided his father on the farm until he was 18 years of

age, when he taught his first term of school in the district just north of his home district and in which he formerly attended school. Is a graduate of the Western Normal College, Highland Park College, and Drake University. He worked his way through college and the university by teaching school, and has had seven years' experience teaching and superintending Iowa schools. He now holds an Iowa state teachers' certificate which he has kept up since he quit teaching. He was admitted to practice law in October, 1899, by examination and is a member of the Pottawattamie county and the Iowa State Bar Associations. He was married to Miss Ruth W. Miller, a school teacher of Harlan, Iowa, November 18, 1908.

He has always taken an active part in politics and is a republican, having served a number of times on the election boards of Shelby and Pottawattamle counties. Has served as member of the Walnut board of education and as its president, but is now serving as secretary of the board. He served as mayor of Walnut for three terms, and is president of the Walnut volunteer fire department which he helped organize when he first became mayor.

He has been very active in lodge circles, and is serving his 30th term as secretary of his local Odd Fellow lodge, and is now lodge representative to the I. O. O. F. Grand Lodge for Pottawattamic county, and is also serving his 11th year as secretary of the local Masonic lodge of Walnut. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916.

ED, L. NEWTON,

Representative from Cass county, was born in Bureau county, Illinois, November 17, 1867. His father was born in New York state and his mother in Illinois. He first came to Iowa in 1881, at the age of 14 years, but spent part of the time thereafter in attending high school at Wyanet, Illinois, from which he graduated in 1888. He immediately thereafter came to Cass county, where, with the exception of one summer in Montana, he has resided ever since. He taught school for a number of years after which he purchased a farm near Anita where he has made his home for the past eighteen years. He married Roma S. Houck of Anita in 1891. They have four living children, three boys and one girl. He was appointed postmaster of Anita by President Taft in 1911 and served four years and one month. He is a member of the Masonic and Eastern Star lodges at present being a trustee of both orders. He is serving his ninth year as member of the Anita school board. A republican in politics.

IRA ALFRED NICHOLS.

Representative from Hardin county, was born November 12, 1869, at Traer, Iowa. Moved to Glidden, Iowa, in 1879; received the degree of B. Sc. at the State College at Ames in 1889. He taught school and in 1891 became publisher at Creighton, Nebraska. Was married April 15, 1895, at Traer, to Elsie Mae Gemmel and has four children. Was school director for several years. Is a Presbyterlan, Knight of Pythias and Modern Woodman. A republican in politics.

HOWEL P. NICHOLSON, JR.,

Representative from Winneshiek county, was born on a farm near Ossian, in said county, on April 14, 1872. His parents, Howel Powel Nicholson and Caroline (Woodward) Nicholson were natives of Crawford county, Pennsylvania, and emigrated to Iowa in April, 1855; they settled on the farm now owned by their son, the subject of this review, where they still reside. Mr. Nicholson was educated in the rural schools and the Ossian high school, being a member of the class of 1890. He has been a practical farmer since leaving school and in the later years has been secretary and manager of the Silver Springs Creamery Co., a co-operative organization of Ossian. Has always been preminent in local agricultural and dairy circles, and held the position of president

dent of the Winneshlek county short course for several years. Has served as secretary of the school board for 15 years and at the present time is interested in the Fort Dodge Portland Cement Company of Glimore City, Iowa. October 19, 1892, he was united in marriage to Margaret Harvey of Ossian, Iowa. In fraternal societies Mr. Nicholson is a member of Arcturus Lodge No. 237 A. F. & A. M. and also of the Modern Woodmen. He was elected to the legislature from the ninety-first district on November 3, 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

ROY D. NORDYKE,

Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Richland township, Keokuk county, Iowa, September 15, 1878. He first attended the rural schools and afterwards graduated from the Richland high school in 1897. He has been a farmer all his life with the exception of a little over a year in the mercantile business, but is at present engaged in farming. He was married to Miss Clare Vastine in December, 1901. He has held several township offices, and is a member of I. O. O. F. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

T. J. O'DONNELL.

One of the representatives from Dubuque county, was born in LaFayette county, Wisconsin, May 12, 1872, Rived on a farm until 1899 when he went to Dubuque, Iowa and attended Bayless Business College, graduating in 1891, then learned the machine trade and worked in the various shops in Dubuque until 1905 when he engaged in the wholesale and retail liquor business until 1916. Since that time has been commercial traveler. Married August 16, 1899 to Miss Winifred Kennedy. To them have been born four children. Elected representative in 1916. A democrat in politics.

FRANK OERTEL.

Representative from Keokuk county, was born in 1887, and has been a resident of the state of lows for twenty-five years. Graduated from the law department of Drake University, Des Moines, in 1911 and has been engaged in the practice of law at Keokuk since that time. Elected to the thirty-seventh general assembly in 1916. A republican in politics.

JAMES PETERS,

Representative from Dallas county, was born of Irish parents in Ypsilanti, Washtenau county, Mich., February 9, 1958. When he was two years old his parents moved to Cass county, Idinois, from which place his father enlisted in the Civil War. After being mustered out at the close of the war his parents moved to Warren county, Iowa. He attended school in the rural and common schools of the community in which he lived until fourteen years old. After attaining his majority he came to Dallas county and engaged in general farming, stock raising, and feeding in which business he continued for thirty-six years, also holding many local and township offices from time to time. He was united in marriage, July 13, 1881, to Mary E. Snyder of Colfax township, Dallas county, Iowa. Has six children, three boys and three girls, all of whom are living. On March 1, 1915, he moved to Perry, Iowa, but is still actively managing his farms. Is a member of the M. E. church, and also a member of the Masonie and Woodman orders. A republican in politics.

MILTON B. PITT,

Representative from Harrison county, was born June 2, 1876, on a farm in Pottawattamie county, Iowa. His father, Sidney Pitt, was born in Indiana and his mother, Patience E. Pitt, was born in Iowa. Attended district school and

Woodbine Normal. Taught school several terms. Elected township clerk two terms and three terms as county treasurer of Harrison county, Iowa. He is a farmer. Elected Speaker of the House of Representatives of the thirty-seventh general assembly. A republican in politics.

R. F. PRICE,

Representative from Dickinson county, was born at Delhi, Iowa, January 1, 1858. Educated in public school. With the exception of three years spent in New York state, from 1876 to 1879, has lived in Iowa all his life. Was in Ida county 1879 to 1880, where he worked on farm summers and taught school winters. Farmed in Delaware county during 1881. Moved to Dickinson county in 1882. Farmed eight years. Married Miss Jennie E. Jones, March 16, 1886. Have no children. Moved to Milford in 1890, where he has since resided. Was appointed postmaster July 1, 1897 and served twelve years. Was member of city council many years. Has been in the real estate business since 1900. Elected representative in 1916. Republican in politics.

McKERCHER J. RANDALL,

One of the representatives from Linn county, was born May 17, 1872 on a farm in Worth county, Iowa, of Scotch-Canadlan parentage. Moved to Nebraska in 1872 returning to Worth county in 1879. Secured his education in rural schools, Northwood high school, Decorah Institute, State College at Ames, Central Pennsylvania College, Cornell College, Drake University and State University, graduating from the law department of the latter institution in 1901. Practiced law in Mount Vernon and Lisbon until 1908, then moved to Cedar Rapids where he has since resided. Was married to Katherine R. Stahl of Lisbon, Iowa, February 25, 1897 and has one son sixteen years of age. Has held the offices of mayor, city attorney and president of the school board. Is a member of the I. O. O. F. and K. P. lodges. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

EDWARD D. RAYBURN,

Representative from Poweshiek county, was born at Montezuma, Iowa, July 22, 1874. His father, Amos F. Rayburn, was born in Clinton county, Onio, and his mother, Nettle Broslus, was born at Knightstown, Indiana. He is a graduate of the Montezuma high school and of the State Teachers College at Cedar Falls. Has been engaged in the banking business as an officer of the First National Bank of Montezuma. Also president of the Commercial Club of Montezuma at the present time. Was married in 1898 to Gertrude Powell. Is a member of the M. E. church, and also of the I. O. O. F., Knights of Pythias, Sons of Veterans, B. P. O. E., and Masonic lodges. Elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

SIDNEY R. REED,

Representative from the thirty-fifth district, composed of Guthrie county, in the thirty-seventh general assembly, was born in Noble county, Onio, April 29, 1859. With his parents he removed to and settled on a farm in Guthrie county, near Montieth, in 1864. Following his schooling in the public schools of his county, he finished his education in the Springer school in Chicago. Returning to Guthrie county he taught school for a number of years. Was married in 1860 to Miss Alice McClellan to whom were born three daughters. Mr. Reed is an extensive farmer and breeder of Thoroughbred Aberdeen Angus cattle, Belgian horses, and Foland China hogs. He has also been a large shipper of cattle from the western states. He is a member of the Christian church and the I. O. O. F. A democrat in politics.

SYLVESTER C. REES,

Representative from Fremont county, was born in Warren county, Iowa, May 5, 1849, on a farm near Carllele. Was educated in the common schools and graduated from high school. Came to Fremont county in March, 1868. Taught school, worked in a clothing store, drug store, general merchandise. Has served on school board, township clerk, alderman and mayor of the city of Hamburg, but farming is his business. Lives in Hamburg and works real estate and insurance. Was married in 1881 to Miss Lula Harris. Was elected a member of of the thirty-sixth general assembly as a republican. Re-elected in 1916.

ALBERT L. RICHARDS,

Representative from Muscatine county, was born in West Liberty, Iowa, December I, 1880 of American parentage. Was educated in West Liberty schools and since has been engaged in farming and stock dealing. Was married to Ethel Scott in 1906. Member of Knights of Pythias I. O. O. F., Modern Woodmen and B. P. O. E. Elected representative from Muscatine county in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

H. GUY ROBERTS.

Representative from Ringgold county, was born of American parents in Ringgold county, Iowa, Liberty township, April 13, 1878. He attended the public school until he was twelve years old. He attended Humeston Normal College for two months when he was called home by the death of his mother. He later attended Highland Park Normal College at Des Moines. He was married September 18, 1993, at Grand Island, Nebraska, to Minnie E. McDonald. He held various township offices before his election to the thirty-sixth general assembly. Re-elected to the thirty-seventh general assembly in 1916. He is a member of the Christian church and a republican in politics.

DOUGLAS ROGERS,

Rpresentative from Carroll county, was born on a farm in Shelby county, Iowa, April 2, 1867. His parents were ploneer settlers of Shelby county, where his mother still lives. He attended the rural schools, Harlan high school, and Western Normal College. He taught in the rural schools for two years, and graduated from the College of Law at the State University of Iowa, June 17, 1891. In July, 1891, he located at Manning, Iowa, and has since said data been actively engaged in the practice of Iaw. He was mayor of Manning for six and one-half years, and a member of the board of education for four years, serving as president of the board for three years. He was married in 1892 to Miss Mary E. Flannery, of Iowa City. Elected representative in 1914; re-elected in 1915. A democrat in politics.

JOHN W. ROWLEY,

Representative from Van Buren county, was born in Columbiana county, Ohio, July 23, 1846. Came with his parents to Van Buren county, Iowa, traveling overland, in December 1854, settling near Utica where his boyhood davs were spent. Was educated in the public schools of the county and the high school at Davenport. Was married to Amanda M. Thompson, October 27, 1868, who, with three sons, is living. His home was on a farm until 1875 when he was

elected county superintendent of schools. On November 15, 1879, he purchased a half interest in the Keosauqua Republican with which paper he is still connected, a period of nearly thirty-eight years. Served as United States Supervisor of census for southeastern Iowa, in 1880, 1890, 1900 and 1910. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

C. B. SANTEE,

One of the representatives from Black Hawk county, was born in Butler county, Iowa, on the 6th day of November, 1864, on a farm near where the town of Kesley now stands. He was educated in the country schools, at the State Teachers College and at Cornell College. His father and mother were pioneers in Butler county. He moved to Cedar Falls on the 10th day of April, 1890, where he since resided with the exception of about six years, or from January 1, 1895, to September 1, 1900, when he was recorder of Black Hawk county and lived in Waterloo. His time as recorder would have expired on the first day of January, 1901, but being anxious to get into business again, he resigned on the first day of September. On the 5th of April, 1899, he was married to Lulu Probert of Shell Rock, Iowa, They have five children, Harrlet M., Leslie C., Donald P., Margaret E. and Paul J. The entire family are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He is a Knight Templar, also a Shriner, and always has been a republican in politics. In 1913 he was elected as a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago as a supporter of Senator A. B. Cummins.

C. H. SCOTT,

Representative from Appanoose county, was born in Walnut township, Appanoose county, Iowa, fifty-four years ago and has spent fifty-three of them in Iowa. Received his education in the rural and graded schools of Iowa. Is engaged in farming and truck gardening. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

J. O. SHAFF,

One of the representatives of the 45th district, was born in Clinton county, January 6, 1835, of American parents whose family settled in Clinton county in 1837, taking up land from the government which is still in the family. He received his education in the rural school, Clinton high school, graduating in 1904 from the Iowa State College, and later taking further work in the University of Wisconsin. Since that time he has been actively engaged in farming, Holstein cattle being his specialty. Also handles live stock and grain business at Shafton, Iowa, and is interested as a director and officer in banks in Clinton and Low Moor. He served on the board of trustees of Camanche township for two terms, and was elected in 1916 as representative from Clinton county. A republican in politics.

FREMONT EARL SHORTESS,

Representative from Tama county, was born in Morrow county, Ohio, September 26, 1858. His father was born near Akron, Ohio, and his mother in Bennington, Vermont. Moved with his parents to Benton county, Iowa, in 1864. Was educated in the rural schools and Tilford academy. Married Elizabeth W. Keith, September 6, 1881. Moved to Traer, Tama county, in 1888, where he has since resided. Is engaged in the jewelry business; has served on the city

council and as mayor of Traer. A member of the Masonic order since 1879. Is a past master, a past high priest in the chapter and a past eminent commander of the commander of the commander of Knights of Templar. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916, A republican in politics.

ARTHUR WAYLAND SLAUGHT.

One of the representatives from Wapello county, was born at Hector, Schuyler county, New York, July 6, 1855. His grandfather, Captain Samuel Hanley, was a pioneer of this section, walking into and settling in the midst of a hardwood forest on the east shore of Seneca Lake about 1797. His father and mother were both born in Schuyler county. He was born and lived on a farm, which was a part of that hewn out of this forest by his grandfather, and received such education as was afforded in the rural schools. Later he graduated from , Colgate Academy at Hamilton, New York, and for two years served as assistant postmaster of that place, after which he took up the study of medicine and received his degree of physician and surgeon from the Chicago Homeopathic Medical College in 1887, since which time he has continuously and successfully engaged in the practice of his profession. He was twice elected coroner of Wapello county, serving from 1910 to 1914. Was married in 1883 to Mrs. Anne Matthews Chase of Chicago, Illinois. He came to Iowa in 1896, first locating in Emmet county and afterwards in Wapello county. Was elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. Republican in politics.

J. M. SLOSSON.

Representative from Worth county, was born in Kensett township, Worth county, Iowa, October 27, 1876. His parents were pioneer settlers of Worth county. He attended the rural schools, Northwood High School and Nora Springs Seminary. Was married June 1, 1899, to Sophia Savre. Served six years as county recorder of Worth county and three years as president of the Worth County Agricultural Society. He is engaged in farming, the buying and selling of farm lands and has built several dwellings and business buildings in Northwood, Iowa. Elected representative in 1918. A republican in politics.

STANLEY R. SMITH,

Representative from Bremer county, was born in Osage, Mitchell county, Iowa, January 5, 1881. Attended the Codar Valley Seminary at Osage and graduated therefrom in 1990. Attended Iowa College at Grinnell one year. Also studied law at the University of Iowa two years. Lived in Iowa all his life except three years that he spent in western South Dakota. In the lumber, grain and coal business at Tripoli, Bremer county, Iowa, also at Oran in Fayette county. This is the first political office ever held, having never before been a candidate for any office. Son of Ex-Senator Jas. A. Smith of Osage. Is a member of the Knights of Pythlas and of the Masonic order. Married to Miss Sadie E. Messenger of Waverly, Iowa, in 1912, and have one daughter, Jean Ellen. A republican in politics. Elected representative in 1916.

LEONARD E. STANLEY,

Representative from Adams county, was born April 4, 1853, near Salem, in Columbiana county. Ohio, and came to Iowa with his parents in Decomber of the same year and settled in Johnson county. In the fall of 1880 the family moved to Oskaloosa, Iowa, for better school advantages. Afterward in March,

1864, they again moved westward, this time settling in Warren county, where the subject of this sketch grew to young manhood, attending the common schools and assisting with the work on the farm. In the spring of 1872 he went with an older brother to Adams county where he engaged in teaching school, following this occupation for twelve years in Adams and adjoining counties. He was elected clerk of the district court in 1898 and re-elected in 1906. He was elected as a member of the 37th General Assembly at the fall election in 1916 as a republican.

OTTO STARZINGER,

One of the representatives from Polk county, was born in Iowa in 1882 and has always been a resident of this state. Received his education in the graded schools, East High School and Iowa State College. Is unmarried. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

D. O. STONE.

Representative from Sioux county, was born in Belpre, Washington county, Ohio, February 25, 1864. In 1867 he came with his parents to Cherokee county, Iowa, and in 1868 moved with them to Calliope, Sioux county. There were only three other families living in Sioux county at that time. He received his education in the common schools. At the age of fourteen be started to learn the printers' trade by working after school hours and on Saturdays as "devil" in the office of the Sioux County Herald, published at Orange City. In 1880 his father, Rufus Stone, established the Independent at Calliope (now Hawarden) and placed the subject of this sketch in charge of the mechanical department. Two months later his father died which left the entire management of the paper upon the young man. He was then only seventeen years of age and for several years held the distinction of being the youngest editor in the state. He is still owner and publisher of the paper established by his father. Was postmaster of Hawarden from 1885 to 1889. He was united in marriage with Miss Generaia Dunham of Albion, Marshail county, Iowa, December 25, 1884. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. Republican in politica.

WILLIAM STUART.

Representative from the ninety-sixth district, Emmet county, was born in Eintrim county, Ireland, January 10, 1851. In 1856, his parents moved to Ontario, Canada, where he gained his education in the public schools of West Monkton, Canada. In 1864, they moved to Fulton, Illinois, where he finished his education. In 1879 he came to Iowa and settled in Grundy Center, Grundy county, Iowa, and was engaged in blacksmithing and later took up the sale of agricultural implements. In 1890 he was elected mayor of Grundy Center. He was united in marriage to Miss Jennie Dunn, on December 26, 1832, and to this union four daughters were born, all of whom are living. In 1892, he moved to Armstrong, Iowa, and has served three years on the county board of supervisors, and two years as president of the school board of Armstrong. He is a member of the M. E. Church, and at present is connected with several prominent enterprises of Armstrong, Iowa. A republican in politics.

GEORGE F. TUCKER,

One of the representatives from Clinton county, was born in Princeton Green Lawr county, Wisconsin, July 18, 1888. Received his education in the rural schools of Dodge county, Minnesota, and the graded schools of Princeton, Wisconsin. Served his apprenticeship at the printer's trade in *The Republican* office, Princeton, Wisconsin, coming to Iowa in 1897. Was married in 1900 to Miss Laura Hollis, four children, two boys and two girls, having been born to them. Was twice elected to the Clinton city council. Was elected a member of the Thirty-sixth General Assembly in 1914, and was re-elected with an increased plurality in 1916. Is a member of the K. of P., W. O. W. and M. W. A. lodges. A republican in politics.

FRED G. TURNER.

Representative from Iowa county, was born in Dane county, Wisconsin, October 2, 1865. When about one year old he came with his parents to a farm near North English, Iowa, where he has since lived. His parents were of old New England stock. His education was obtained in the rural schools. On October 4, 1893, he was married to Miss Della Troger. Is a member of the Christian church. Elected representative in 1914, re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

OSCAR ULSTAD,

Representative from Wright county, was born at Leland, Illinois, October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Illinois, where he resided until twenty years of age, when he moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, for fifteen years retiring in 1913 and has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes for seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and is now president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in pollifics.

W. H. WALRATH,

Representative from Fayette county, is of American parentage. His parents were descendants of the Dutch that settled in the Mohawk valley, in the state of New York, in the early colonial times. They came to Iowa in 1856 and settled on the land, on which a part of the town of Arlington, Fayette county, is now located. As he grew to manhood he took up the work of farming and stock raising, which he followed until 1902, when he sold the farm and moved into town, and has since been engaged in real estate business. He has always taken a lively interest in public affairs, having served several terms as assessor and township trustee, and was a member of the board of education over twenty years. In 1902 he was elected a member of the board of supervisors of Fayette county, which office he held until January 1, 1916. In the fall of 1916 was elected representative. Married in 1880 to Miss Velma E. Doan who died in 1884. In 1889 was married to Miss Mary G. Hutchlson. A republican in politics.

JAMES B. WEAVER,

One of the representatives from Polk county, and the son of Gen. James B. Weaver and Clara Vinson Weaver, was born at Bloomfield, Iowa, August 19, 1861. Attended the common school at Bloomfield until seventeen years of age. Farmed from 1877 to 1879 and clerked in a general store from 1879 to 1881. Graduated from the law department of the State University in 1882 and en-

tered the law offices of Barcroft and Gatch and became a member of the firm of Gatch and Weaver in 1883, a member of the firm of Gatch, Conner and Weaver in 1885 and Conner and Weaver in 1897 and continued with this firm until 1904, since which time has continued the practice alone. Has always been active in public movements, having acted as president of the University Club, Prairie Club, Golf and Country Club, Des Moines Public Library, Iowa Press and Authors' Club and is a member of the Des Moines Town Planning Commission and Des Moines Better Housing Association. Elected representative in 1916. A republican in politics.

ALFRED WENSTRAND,

Representative from Page county, was born in Sweden, May 14, 1855; graduated from the public schools of Sweden. Came to this country with his parents in 1870 and has lived in Page county ever since. Received a further school education in the public schools of Iowa and studied law two and one-half years. He is a farmer. Was married to Miss Christin Olson in 1879. He has held the offices of road superintendent, secretary and president of the school board, assessor, township clerk, township trustee and justice of the peace. Was elected clerk of the district court of Page county for three consecutive terms. Has been a member of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Essex and president of the Commercial National Bank of same place. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. Republican in politics.

JOHN E. WICHMAN,

Representative from Hancock county, was born at Galena, Illinois, April 16, 1859, of German parentage. He was educated in the public schools of the city of Galena and in the Northwestern German-English Normal School, now known as Charles City College, Charles City, Iowa. He removed to Hancock county, Iowa, in 1879, where he has since resided. He taught school in Illinois and Hancock county for four years, and was admitted to the bar in 1884, and since that time has given his attention almost exclusively to the practice of law. Has served as county attorney of Hancock county for four terms, and held other local offices in his county and town. Was married to Mary L. Prescott in 1888, and has two daughters, Lois and Charlotte. Was elected to membership in the Thirty-seventh General Assembly in 1916. Has always been a republican in politics.

LARS O. WIGDAHL,

Representative from Palo Alto county, was born near Stavanger, Norway, on the 7th day of December, 1857. Immigrated to Columbia county, Wisconsin, in the spring of 1880. He finished the graded school in Norway and attended the Hauges Ev. Lutheran Seminary at Red Wing, Minn. In the year 1883 he took up the study of Theology at Augsburg Ev. Lutheran Seminary in Minnespolis, Minnesota, wherefrom he was graduated in 1887, and was ordained the same year on a call from the Lutheran church, Ruthven, Iowa, in which place he still serves. Married Miss Anna Osterhus of Fayette county. He was elected representative from Palo Alto county in 1914 and his politics have always been republican. Re-elected in 1916.

CHARLES E. WILSON,

Representative from Louisa county, was born near Morning Sun, Iowa, February 19, 1861. His father was born in New York and came to Jowa in 1840. His mother was born in Indiana. Educated in the common schools, Morning Sun

Academy, and Elliott's Business College, Burlington, Iowa. He is a farmer and breeder of Short Horn cattle. He was born on the farm where he now resides, his father having entered a part of it from the government in 1844. Has been assessor of his township for eleven years. Has taken a leading part in farmers' institute work, making a special study of Short Horn cattle. Married December 22, 1885, to Miss Anna J. Wilson. Is a member of the United Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. Republican in politics.

GEORGE WILSON.

Representative from Cherokee county, Iowa, was born in the city of Albany, N. Y., November I, 1853, of Scotch-Irish parentage. When he was one and one-half years old his parents moved to Benton county, Iowa, locating at Vinton and later settled on a farm near Mt. Auburn. Was educated in the district schools and Tilford Academy. Was married November 13, 1878, at Vinton, Iowa, to Miss Eilen L. Joyce. Moved to Cherokee county, Iowa, in the spring of 1879 and settled on a farm. Taught school three winters in Benton-county, and five years in Cherokee county. Was elected county auditor in 1906 and continued in office until January. 1913. Is a member of all branches of the I, O, O, F, and B, A, Y, A republican in politics.

HENRY L. WILSON,

Representative from Mitchell county, was born in Tama county, Iowa, July 12, 1858, of Scotch parentage. He was educated in the rural schools and in Traer high school and a private academy. He removed to Mitchell county in January, 1883. Served as sheriff of the county from 1891 to 1896. Was associate editor of The Mitchell County Press from 1904 to 1908. Was married in 1895 to Miss Ethel Lovejoy. Elected representative in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

THOMAS J. WILSON.

Representative from Mahaska county, born in Washington county, Iowa, October 23, 1854. Educated in public school. Moved to Mahaska county in February, 1882. Served as township trustee for twelve years and as member of the board of supervisors for three years. Assisted in organizing the Farmers National Bank in Oskaloosa in 1906 and has been a director since organization. A farmer by occupation. A republican in politics.

JOHN M. WORMLEY,

Representative from Plymouth county, was born near Macomb in the state of Illinois in 1863. Came to Newton, Iowa, with his parents in 1866, traveling in a prairie schooner, and crossing the Mississippi on a flat boat at the site of the present Keckuk dam. Received his education in the common schools of Jasper county, Hazel Dell Academy at Newton, Ames College, and is a graduate from the Law College at Iowa City, class of 1888. He began to practice law the same year at Kingsley, Jowa, from which he retired in 1916 to devote his time to his extensive real estate interests, stock raising and farming. He has held many local offices, public and private, including councilman, postmaster and was mayor of Kingsley for many years. Was elected representative from Plymouth county in 1916. A republican in politics.

REPUBLICAN PARTY

CALL FOR THE REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION OF 1916.

To the Republican Electors of the United States:

In accordance with established custom and in obedience to instructions of the Republican National Convention of 1912, the Republican National Committee now directs that a National Convention of delegated representatives of the Republican party be held in the City of Chicago, in the State of Illinois, at eleven o'clock a.m., on Wednesday, the 7th day of June, 1916, for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice-President, to be voted for at the presidential election on Tuesday, November 7, 1916, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

The republican electors of the several states and the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawali, Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands, and all other electors without regard to past political affiliations, who believe in the principles of the republican party and indorse its policies, are cordially invited to unite under this call in the selection of delegates to said convention. Said National Convention shall consist of four delegates at large from each state, and two delegates at large for each representative at large in congress; one delegate from each congressional district; an additional delegate for each congressional district in which the vote for any republican elector in 1908, or for the republican nominee for congress in 1914, shall have been not less than 7,500; two delegates each from the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands. All delegates from any state may, however, be chosen from the state at large, in the event that the laws of the state in which the election occurs so provide. Alternate delegates shall be elected to this convention for each unit of representation equal to the number of delegates elected therein. In the absence of any delegate at large or delegate from a congressional district, the roll of alternates for the state or district shall be called in the order in which the names are placed upon the roll

Delegates at large and their alternates, and delegates from congressional districts and their alternates, shall be elected in the following manner:

- (1) By primary elections, in accordance with the laws of the state in which the election occurs, in such states as require by law the election of delegates to national conventions of political parties by direct primaries; provided, that in any state in which republican representation upon the board of judges or inspectors of elections for such primary election is denied by law, delegates and alternates shall be elected as hereinafter provided.
- (2) By congressional, territorial or state conventions, as the case may be, to be called by the congressional, territorial or state committees, respectively. Notice of the call for such conventions shall be published in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in the district, territory or state. In a congressional district where there is no republican congressional committee, the republican state committee shall issue the call and make said publication.

No delegates or alternates shall be deemed eligible to participate in any convention to elect delegates to the national convention who were elected prior to the adoption of this call.

Delegates presenting certificates of election from the canvassing boards or officer created or designated by state law to canvass the returns and issue certificates of election to delegates to the national convention shall be placed upon the temporary roll of the convention by this committee.

The election of delegates from the District of Columbia shall be held under the direction and supervision of an election board composed of Charles Linkins, Charles H. Bauman and Jesse H. Foster, of the District of Columbia. This board shall have authority to fix the date of said convention, subject to the provisions of this call, and to arrange all details incidental thereto; and shall provide for a registration of the votes cast, such registration to include the name and residence of each voter.

The delegates from Alaska, Hawali, Porto Rico and the Philippine Islands shall be elected in conformity with the rules and regulations adopted by this committee, copies of which will be furnished to the governing committee of the republican party in such territory and insular possessions.

All delegates and alternates shall be elected not earlier than thirty days after the date of this call, and not later than thirty days before the date of the meeting of the Republican National Convention, for which this call is issued, unless otherwise provided by the laws of the state in which the election occurs.

The credentials of each delegate and alternate elected prior to May 24, 1916, must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Republican National Committee, at the office of the National Committee, Wilkins Building, Washington, D. C., promptly upon such election. The credentials of each delegate or alternate elected after the 23d day of May, 1916, must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Republican National Committee, at Congress Hotel, Chicago, Illinois. Where more than the authorized number of delegates is reported to the Secretary of the National Committee, a contest shall be deemed to exist, and the secretary shall notify the several claimants so reported and shall submit all credentials and claims to the whole committee for decision as to which claimants shall be placed upon the temporary roll of the convention.

All notices of contest shall be submitted in writing accompanied by a printed statement setting forth the ground of contest, which must be filed with the Secretary of the Committee twenty days prior to the meeting of the National Convention, except in cases where Delegates are chosen by law within that period, and then at any time prior to the meeting of the National Convention.

In promulgating this call the Secretary of the Republican National Committee is directed to send a copy to the members of the National Committee from each State, and enclose therewith copies of the call for the Chairman and Secretary of the State Committee, to be forwarded to said Chairman and Secretary by the member of the National Committee.

The apportionment of Delegates to the National Convention called hereby shall he as adopted by the National Committee at its meeting December 16, 1913, and ratified by Republican State Conventions of States which cast a majority of votes in the Electoral College, schedule of which is appended hereto.

Upon the basis of official election figures furnished to the National Committee, the apportionment of delegates to the convention is as follows:

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM-1916.

In 1861 the Republican party stood for the Union. As it stood for the Union of States, it now stands for a united people, true to American ideals, loyal to American traditions, knowing no allegiance except to the Constitution, to the government and to the flag of the United States. We believe in American policies at home and abroad.

PROTECTION OF AMERICAN RIGHTS.

We declare that we believe in and will enforce the protection of every American citizen in all the rights secured to him by the Constitution, by treatles and the law of nations, at home and abroad, by land and sea. These rights, which, in violation of the specific promise of their party made at Raltimore in 1912, the Democratic President and the Democratic Congress have falled to defend, we will unflinchingly maintain.

FOREIGN RELATIONS,

We desire peace, the peace of justice and right, and believe in maintaining a straight and honest neutrality between the belligerents in the great war in Europe. We must perform all our duties and insist upon all our rights as neutrals without fear and without favor. We believe the peace and neutrality as well as the dignity and influence of the United States cannot be preserved by shifty expedients, by phrase-making, by performances in language, or by attitudes ever changing in an effort to secure groups of voters.

The present administration has destroyed our influence abroad and humiliated us in our own eyes. The Republican party believes that a firm, consistent and courageous foreign policy, always maintained by the Republican Presidents in accordance with American traditions, is the best, as it is the only true way, to preserve our peace and restore us to our rightful place among the nations. We believe in the pacific settlement of international disputes and favor the establishment of a world court for that purpose.

MEXICO.

We deeply sympathize with the 15,000,000 people of Mexico who for three years have seen their country devastated, their homes destroyed, their fellow-citizens murdered and their women outraged, by armed bands of desperadoes lead by self seeking, conscienceless agitators, who, when temporarily successful in any locality, have neither sought nor been able to restore order or establish and maintain peace.

We express our horror and indignation at the outrages which have been and are being perpetrated by these bandits upon American men and women who were or are in Mexico by invitation of the laws and of the government of that country and whose rights to security of person and property are guaranteed by solemn treaty obligations. We denounce the indefensible methods of interference employed by this administration in the internal affairs of Mexico and refer with shame to its failure to discharge the duty of this country as next friend to Mexico, its duty to other powers who have relied upon us as such friend, and its duty to our citizens in Mexico, in permitting the continuance of such conditions, first by failure to act promptly and firmly, and, second, by lending its influence to the continuation of such conditions through recognition of one of the factions responsible for these outrages.

We pledge our aid in restoring order and maintaining peace in Mexico. We promise to our citizens on and near our border, and to those in Mexico, wherever they may be found, adequate and absolute protection in their lives, liberty and property.

MONROE DOCTRINE.

We reaffirm our approval of the Monroe doctrine, and declare its maintenance to be a policy of this country essential to its present and future peace and safety and to the achievement of its manifest destiny.

LATIN AMERICA.

We favor the continuance of Republican policies, which will result in drawing more and more closely the commercial, financial and social relations between this country and the countries of Latin America.

PHILIPPINES,

We renew our allegiance to the Philippine policy inaugurated by McKinley, approved by Congress and consistently carried out by Roosevelt and Taft. Even in this short time it has enormously improved the material and social conditions of the islands, given the Philippine people a constantly increasing participation in their government and if persisted in will bring still greater benefits in the future.

We accepted the responsibility of the islands as a duty to civilization and the Filipino people. To leave with our task half done would break our pledges, injure our prestige among nations and imperil what has already been accomplished.

We condemn the Democratic administration for its attempt to abandon the Philippines, which was prevented only by the vigorous opposition of Republican members of Congress, aided by a few patriotic Democrats.

TREATY WITH RUSSIA.

We reiterate our unqualified approval of the action taken in December, 1911, by the President and Congress to secure with Russia, as with other countries, a treaty that will recognize the absolute right of expatriation and prevent all discrimination of whatever kind between American citizens, whether native-born or alien, and regardless of race, religion or previous political allegiance.

We renew the pledge to observe this principle and to maintain the right of asylum, which is neither to be surrendered nor restricted, and we unite in the cherished hope that the war which is now desolating the world may speedily end, with a complete and lasting restoration of brotherhood among the nations of the earth and the assurance of full equal rights, civil and religious, to all men in every land.

PROTECTION OF THE COUNTRY,

In order to maintain our peace and make certain the security of our people within our own borders the country must have not only adequate but thorough and complete national defense, ready for any emergency. We must have a sufficient and effective regular army and a provision for ample reserves, already drilled and disciplined, who can be called at once to the colors when the hour of danger comes.

We must have a navy strong and so well proportioned and equipped, so thoroughly ready and prepared, that no enemy can gain command of the sea and effect a landing in force on either our western or our eastern coast. To secure these results we must have a coherent and continuous policy of national defense, which even in these perilous days the Democratic party has utterly failed to develop, but which we promise to give to the country.

TARIFF.

The Republican party stands now, as always, in the fullest sense for the policy of tariff protection to American Industries and American labor and does not regard an anti-dumping provision as an adequate substitute. Such protection should be reasonable in amount but sufficient to protect adequately American industry and American labor and be so adjusted as to prevent undue exactions by monopolies or trusts. It should, moreover, give special attention to securing the industrial independence of the United States as in the case of dyestuffs.

Through wise tariff and industrial legislation our industries can be so organized that they will become not only a commercial bulwark but a powerful aid to national defense.

The Underwood Tariff Act is a complete fallure in every respect. Under its administration imports have enormously increased in spite of the fact that intercourse with foreign countries has been largely cut off by reason of the war, while the revenues of which we stand in such dire need have been greatly reduced. Under the normal conditions which prevailed prior to the war it was clearly demonstrated that this act deprived the American producer and the American wage-earner of that protection which entitled them to meet their foreign competitors, and, but for the adventitious conditions created by the war, would long since have paralyzed all forms of American industry and deprived American labor of its just reward.

It has not in the least reduced the cost of living, which has constantly advanced from the date of its enactment. The welfare of our people demands its repeal and the substitution of a measure which in peace as well as in war, will produce ample revenue and give reasonable protection to all forms of American production in mine, forest, field and factory.

We favor the creation of a tariff commission with complete power to gather and complie information for the use of Congress in all matters relating to the tariff,

BUSINESS.

The Republican party has long believed in the rigid supervision and strict regulation of the transportation and of the great corporations of the country. It has put its creed into its deeds, and all really effective laws regulating the railroads and the great industrial corporations are the work of Republican Congresses and Presidents. For this policy of regulation and supervision the Democrats, in a stumbling and piecemeal way, are undertaking to involve the Government in business which should be left within the sphere of private enterprises and in direct competition with its own citizens, a policy which is sure to result in waste, great expense to the taxpayer and in an inferior product.

The Republican party firmly believes that all who violate the laws in regulation of business should be individually punished. But prosecution is very different from persecution, and business success, no matter how honestly attained, is apparently regarded by the Democratic party as in itself a crime. Such doctrines and beliefs choke enterprise and stifle prosperity. The Republican party believes in encouraging business and will seek to advance all American interests.

RURAL CRECTIS

We favor an effective system of rural credits as opposed to the ineffective law proposed by the present Democratic administration.

RURAL FREE DELIVERY

We favor the extension of the rural free delivery system and condemn the Democratic administration for curtailing and crippling it.

MERCHANT MARINE .

In view of the policies adopted by all the maritime nations to encourage their shipping interests and in order to enable us to compete with them for the ocean-carrying trade, we favor the payment to ships engaged in the foreign trade of liberal compensation for services actually rendered in carrying the mails, and such further legislation as will build up an adequate American merchant marine, and give up ships which may be requisitioned by the Government in time of national emergency.

We are uttorly opposed to the Government ownership of vessels as proposed by the Democratic party, because government-owned ships, while effectively preventing the development of the American merchant marine by private capital, will be entirely unable to provide for the vast volume of American freights and will leave us more helpless than ever in the hard grip of foreign syndicates.

TRANSPORTATION .

Interstate and intrastate transportation have become so interwoven that the attempt to apply two and often several sets of laws to its regulation has produced conflicts of authority, embarrassment in operation and inconvenience and expense to the public.

The entire transportation system of the country has become essentially national. We, therefore, favor such action by legislation or, if necessary, through an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, as will result in placing it under exclusive Federal control.

ECONOMY AND A NATIONAL RUDGET

The increasing cost of the National Government and the need for the greatest economy of its resources in order to meet the growing demands of the people for government service, call for the severest condemnation of the wasteful appropriations of this Democratic administration, of its shameless raids on the

Treasury, and of its opposition to and rejection of President Taft's oft-repeated proposals and earnest efforts to secure economy and efficiency through the establishment of a simple businesslike budget system to which we pledge our support and which we hold to be necessary to effect any real reform in the administration of national finances.

CONSERVATION

We believe in a careful husbandry of all the natural resources of the nation—a husbandry which means development Without waste; use without abuse.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM

The Civil Service law has always been sustained by the Republican party and we renew our repeated declaration that it shall be thoroughly and honestly enforced and extended wherever practicable. The Democratic party has created since March 4, 1913, 36,000 offices outside of the civil service law at an annual cost of \$44,000,000 to the taxpayers of the country.

We condemn the gross abuse and the misuse of the law by the present Democratic administration and pledge correlves to a reorganization of this service along lines of efficiency and economy.

TERRITORIAL OFFICIALS

Reaffirming the attitude long maintained by the Republican party, we hold that officials appointed to administer the government of any territory should be bona fide residents of the territory in which their duties are to be performed.

LABOR LAWS

We pledge the Republican party to the faithful enforcement of all Federal laws passed for the protection of labor. We favor vocational education; the enactment and rigid enforcement of a Federal child labor law; the enactment of a generous and comprehensive workman's compensation law, within the commerce power of Congress, and an accident compensation law covering all Government employees. We favor the collection and collation under the direction of the Department of Labor of complete data relating to industrial hazards for the information of Congress, to the end that such legislation may be adopted as may be calculated to secure the safety, conservation and protection of labor from the dangers incident to industry and transportation.

WOMEN SUFFRACE

The Republican party, reaffirming its faith in Government of the people, by the people, for the people, as a measure of justice to one-half the adult people of this country, favors the extension of the suffrage to women, but recognizes the right of each State to settle this question for itself.

CONCLUSION

Such are our principles, such are our purposes and policies. We close as we began. The times are dangerous and the future is fraught with perfi. The great issues of the day have been confused by words and phrases. The American spirit, which made the country and saved the Union, has been forgotten by those charged with the responsibility of power. We appeal to all Americans, whether naturalized or native born, to prove to the world that we are Americans in thought and in deed, with one loyalty, one hope, one aspiration. We call on all Americans to be true to the spirit of America, to the great traditions of their common country, and above all things, to keep the faith.

OFFICIAL CALL FOR THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION TO BE HELD AT DES MOINES, JULY 19, 1916.

To the Republican Electors of Iowa:

By direction of the Republican state central committee of Iowa, a delegate convention of the Republicans of Iowa will be held in the city of Des Moines, Wednesday, July 19, 1916, at 11:00 o'clock a. m. In accordance with Section 1087-a27 of the Supplement to the Code, 1913, the duties of this convention shall be: To formulate and adopt a state platform for the Republican party: To nominate candidates for the party for any state office to be filled by voters of the entire state when no candidate for such office has been nominated at the preceding primary election, as shown by the canvass of the returns of said primary, and for which office there were persons voted for at said primary: To elect a state central committee, and to transact such other business as may properly be brought before it.

At 10 o'clock A. M. of the day of the aforesaid state convention, the delegates from the several congressional districts shall meet in caucuses to transact such busines as may properly come before them and select the usual committees of the state convention.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM-1916.

The call was issued for a National Convention at St. Louis, Missouri, to be held on June 16, 1916.

The Democratic party, in national convention assembled, adopts the following declaration, to the end that the people of the United States may both realize the achievements wrought by four years of Democratic administration and be apprised of the policies to which the party is committed for the further conduct of national affairs.

RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENT.

We indorse the administration of Woodrow Wilson. It speaks for itself. It is the best exposition of sound Democratic policy at home and abroad.

We challenge comparison of our record, our keeping of pledges and our constructive legislation with those of any party of any time.

We found our country hampered by special privileges, a victous tariff, obsolete banking laws and an inelastic currency. Our foreign affairs were dominated by commercial interests for their selfish ends. The Republican party, despite repeated pledges, was impotent to correct abuses which it had fostered. Under our administration, under a leadership which has nover faltered, these abuses have been corrected and our people have been freed therefrom.

Our archale banking and currency system, prolific of panic and disaster under Republican administrations—long the refuge of the money trust—has been supplemented by the Federal Reserve Act, a true Democracy of credit under government control, already proved a financial bulwark in a world crisis, mobilizing our resources, placing abundant credit at the disposal of legitimate industry, and making a currency panic impossible.

We have created a Federal Trade Commission to accommodate the perplexing questions arising under the antitrust laws, so that monopoly may be strangled at its birth and legitimate industry encouraged. Fair competition in business is now assured.

We have effected an adjustment of the tariff adequate for revenue under peace conditions and fair to the consumer and to the producer. We have adjusted the burden of taxation so that swollen incomes bear their equitable share. Our revenues have been sufficient in times of world stress, and will largely exceed the expenditures for the current fiscal year.

We have lifted human labor from the category of commodities, and have secured to the workingman the right to voluntary association for his protection and welfare. We have protected the rights of the laborer against the unwarranted issuance of writs of injunction, and have guaranteed to him the right of trial by jury in cases of alleged contempt committed outside the presence of the court.

We have advanced the parcel post to genuine efficiency enlarged the postal savings system, added 10,000 rural delivery routes and extensions, thus reaching two and one-half millions additional people, improved the postal service in every branch, and for the first time in our history placed the postoffice on a self-supporting basis, with actual surplus in 1913, 1914 and 1916.

ECONOMIC FREEDOM.

The reforms which were most obviously needed to clear away privilege, prevent unfair discrimination and release the energies of men of all ranks and advantages have been effected by recent legislation. We must now remove,

so far as possible, every remaining element of unrest and uncertainty from the path of the business men of America, and secure for them a continued period of quiet, assured and confident prosperity.

TARIFF.

We affirm our belief in the doctrine of a tariff for the purpose of providing sufficient revenue for the operation of the Government economically administered, and unreservedly indorse the Underwood tariff law as truly exemplifying that doctrine. We recognize that tariff rates are necessary subject to change to meet changing conditions in the world's production and trade. The events of the last two years have brought about many momentous changes. In some respects their effects are yet conjectural and wait to be disclosed, particularly in regard to our foreign trade.

Two years of a war which has directly involved most of the chief industrial nations of the world, and which has indirectly affected the life and industry of all nations, are bringing about economic changes more varied and farreaching than the world has ever before experienced. In order to ascertain just what those changes may be the Democratic Congress is providing for a nonpartisan tariff commission to make impartial and thorough study of every economic fact that may throw light either upon our past or upon our future fiscal policy with regard to the imposition of taxes on imports or with regard to the changed and changing conditions under which our trade is carried on. We cordially indorse this timely proposal and declars ourselves in sympathy with the principle and purpose of shaping legislation within that field in accordance with clearly established facts rather than in accordance with trade demands of selfish interests or upon information provided largely, if not exclusively, by them.

AMERICANISM.

The part that the United States will play in the new day of international relationships which is now upon us will depend upon our preparation and our character. The Democratic party, therefore, recognizes the assertion and triumphant demonstration of the indivisibility and coherent strength of the nation as the supreme issue of the day, in which the whole world faces the crisis of manifold change. It summons all men, of whatever origin or creed, who would count themselves Americans, to join in making clear to all the world the unity and consequent power of America.

This is an issue of patriotism. To taint it with partisanship would be to defile it. In this day of test America must show itself, not a nation of patriosans, but a nation of patriots. There is gathered here in America the best of the blood, the industry and the genius of the whole world, the elements of a great race and magnificient society to be melted into a mighty and splendid nation.

Whoever, actuated by the purpose to promote the interest of a foreign power in disregard of our own country's welfare or to injure this Government in its foreign relations or cripple or destroy its industries at home, and whoever by arousing projudices of a racial, religious or other nature creates discord and strife among our people so as to obstruct the wholesome process of unfacation, is faithless to the trust which the privileges of citizenship repose in him and disloyal to his country.

We, therefore, condemn as subversive of this nation's unity and integrity, and as destructive of its welfare, the activities and designs of every group or organization, political or otherwise, that has for its object the advancement of the interest of a foreign power, whether such object is promoted by intimidating the Government, a political party or representatives of the people, or which is calculated and tends to divide our people into antagonistic groups

and thus to destroy that complete agreement and solidarity of the people and that unity of sentiment and national purpose so essential to the perpetuity of the nation and its free institutions.

We condemn all alliances and combinations of individuals in this country, of whatever nationality or descent, who agree and conspire together for the purpose of embarrassing or weakening our Government or of improperly influencing or coercing our public representatives in dealing or negotiating with any foreign power. We charge that such conspiracies among a limited number exist and have been instigated for the purpose of advancing the interests of foreign countries to the prejudice and detriment of our own country. We condemn any political party which, in view of the activity of such conspirators, surrenders its integrity or modifies its policy.

PREPAREDNESS.

Along with the proof of our character as a nation must go the proof of our power to play the part that legitimately belong to us. The people of the United States love peace. They respect the rights and covet the friendship of all other nations. They desire neither any additional territory nor any advantage which cannot be peacefully gained by their skill, their industry or their enterprise, but they insist upon having absolute freedom of national life and pollcy, and feel that they owe it to themselves and to the role of spirited independence, which it is their sole ambition to play, that they should render themselves secure against the hazard of interference from any quarter, and should be able to protect their rights upon the seas or in any part of the world.

We, therefore, favor the maintenance of an army fully adequate to the requirements of order, of safety and of the protection of the nation's rights, the fullest development of modern methods of seacoast defense and the maintenance of an adequate reserve of citizens trained to arms and prepared to safeguard the people and territory of the United States against any danger of hostile action which may unexpectedly arise, and a fixed policy for the continuous development of a navy worthy to support the great naval traditions of the United States and fully equal to the international tasks which the United States hopes and expects to take a part in performing. The plans and enactments of the present Congress afford substantial proof of our purpose in this exigent matter.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS.

The Democratic administration has throughout the present war scrupulously and successfully held to the old paths of neutrality and of the peaceful pursuit of the legitimate objects of our national life, which statesmen of all parties and creeds have prescribed for themselves in America since the beginning of our history. But the circumstances of the last two years have revealed necessities of international action which no former generation can have foreseen. We hold that it is the duty of the United States to use its power not only to make itself safe at home, but also to make secure its just interests throughout the world, and, both for this end and in the interest of humanity, to assist the world in securing settled peace and justice.

We believe that every people has the right to choose the sovereignty under which it shall live; that the small states of the world have a right to enjoy from other nations the same respect for their sovereignty and for their territorial integrity that great and nowerful nations expect and insist upon; and that the world has a right to be free from every disturbance of its peace that has its origin in aggression or disregard of the rights of peoples and nations; and we believe that the time has come when it is the duty of the United States to join with the other nations of the world in any feasible association that will effectively serve these principles, to maintain inviolate the complete security of the highway of the seas for the common and unhindered use of all nations.

The present administration has consistently sought to act upon and realize in its conduct of the foreign affairs of the nation the principle that should be the object of any association of the nations formed to secure the peace of the world and the maintenance of national and individual rights. It has followed the highest American traditions. It has preferred respect for the fundamental rights of smaller States, even to property interests, and has secured the friendship of the people of these States for the United States by refusing to make a mere material interest an excuse for the assertion of our superior power against the dignity of their sovereign independence.

It has regarded the lives of its citizens and the claims of humanity as of greater moment than material rights, and peace as the best basis for the just settlement of commercial claims. It has made the honor and ideals of the United States its standard allke in negotiation and action.

PAN AMERICAN CONCORD.

We recognize now, as we have always recognized, a definite and common interest between the United States with the other people and republics of the Western Hemisphere in all matters of national independence and free political development. We favor the establishment and maintenance of the closest relations of amity and mutual helpfulness between the United States and the other republics of the American continents for the support of peace and promotion of a common prosperity. To that end we favor all measures which may be necessary to facilitate intimate intercourse and promote commerce between the United States and her neighbors to the south of us, and such international understandings as may be practicable and suitable to accomplish these ends.

We commend the action of the Democratic administration in holding the Pan American financial conference at Washington in May, 1915, and organizing the international high commission which represented the United States in the recent meeting of representatives of the Latin American Republics at Buenos Aires, April 1916, which have so greatly promoted the friendly relations between the peoples of the Western Hemisphere.

MEXICO.

The Monroe doctrine is reasserted as a principle of Democratic faith. The doctrine guarantees the independent republics of the two Americas against aggression from another continent. It implies, as well, the most scrupulous regard upon our part for the sovereignty of each of them.

The want of a stable, responsible government in Mexico, capable of repressing and punishing marauders and bandit bands, who have not only taken the lives, and seized and destroyed the property of American citizens in that country, but have insolently invaded our soil, made war upon and murdered our people thereon, has rendered it necessary temporarily to occupy, by our armed forces, a portion of the territory of that friendly state. Until, by the restoration of law and order therein, a repelltion of such incursions is improbable, the necessity for their remaining must continue.

Intervention, implying as it does, military subjugation, is revolting to the people of the United States, notwithstanding the provocation to that course has been great, and should be resorted to, if at all, only as a last resort. The stubborn resistance of the President and his advisers to every demand and suggestion to enter upon it, is creditable alike to them and to the people in whose name he speaks,

MERCHANT MARINE,

Immediate provision should be made for the development of the carrying trade of the United States. Our foreign commerce has in the past been subject to many unnecessary and vexatious obstacles in the way of legislation of Republican Congresses. Until the recent Democratic tariff legislation it was hampered by unreasonable burdens of taxation. Until the recent banking

legislation it had at its disposal few of the necessary instrumentalities of international credit and exchange. Until the formulation of the pending act to promote the construction of a merchant marine it lacked even the prospect of adequate carriage by sea.

We heartily indorse the purposes and policy of the pending shipping bill and favor all such additional measures of constructive or remedial legislation as may be necessary to restore our flag to the seas and to provide further facilities for our foreign commerce, particularly such laws as may be made to remove unfair conditions of competition in the dealings of American merchants and producers with competitors in foreign markets.

CONSERVATION.

For the safeguarding and quickening of the life of our own people we favor the conservation and development of the natural resources of the country through a policy which shall be positive rather than negative—a policy which shall not withhold such resources from development, but which, while permitting and encouraging their use, shall prevent both waste and monopoly in their exploitation, and we earnestly favor the passage of acts which will accomplish these objects, and we reaffirm the declaration of the platform of 1912 on this subject.

The policy of reclaiming our arid lands should be steadily adhered to.

THE ADMINISTRATION AND THE FARMER,

We favor the vigorous prosecution of investigations and plans to render agriculture more profitable and country life more healthful, comfortable and attractive, and we believe that this should be a dominant alm of the nation as well as of the states. With all its recent improvement, farming still lags behind other occupations in development as a husiness, and the advantages of an advancing civilization have not accrued to rural communities in a fair proportion. Much has been accomplished in this field under the present administration-far more than under any previous administration. In the Fedcral Reserve Act of the last Congress and the rural Credits Act of the present Congress the machinery has been created, which will make credit available to the farmer constantly and readily, and he has at least been put upon a footing of equality with the merchant and the manufacturer in securing the capital necessary to carry on his enterprises. Grades and standards necessary to the intelligent and successful conduct of the business of agriculture have also been established or are in the course of being established by law. The long-needed Cotton Futures Act passed by the Sixty-third Congress has now been in successful operation for nearly two years.

A new grain grades bill, long needed, and a permissive warehouse bill, intended to provide better storage facilities and to enable the farmer to obtain certificates upon which he may secure advances of money, have been passed by the House of Representatives, have been favorably reported to the Senate and will probably become law during the present session of Congress. Both houses have passed a good roads measure which will be of far-reaching benefit to all agricultural communities. Above all, the most extraordinary and significant progress has been made under the direction of the Department of Agriculture in extending and perfecting practical farm demonstration work which is so rapidly substituting scientific for empirical farming. But it is also necessary that rural activities should be better directed through co-operation and organization, and that unfair methods of competition should be eliminated and the conditions requisite for the just, orderly and economical marketing of farm products created. We approve the Democratic administration for having emphatically directed attention for the first time to the essential interests of agriculture involved in farm marketing and finance, for creating the office of markets and rural organization in connection with the Department of Agriculture, and for extending the cooperative machinery necessary for conveying

information to farmers by means of demonstrations. We favor continued liberal provision, not only for the benefit of production, but also for the study and solution of problems of farm marketing and finance and for the extension of existing agencies for improving country life.

GOOD ROADS.

The happiness, comfort and prosperity of rural life and the development of the city are alike conserved by the construction of public highways. We, therefore, favor national aid in the construction of post roads and roads for military purposes.

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT.

We hold that the life, health and strength of the men, women and children of the nation are its greatest asset, and that in the conservation of these the Federal government, wherever it acts as the employer of labor, should both on its own account and as an example, put into effect the following principles of just employment:

- 1. A living wage for all employees,
- 2. A working day not to exceed eight hours, with one day of rest in seven.
- 3. The adoption of safety appliances and the establishment of thoroughly sanitary conditions of labor.
 - 4. Adequate compensation for industrial accidents.
- 5. The standards of the "uniform labor law," wherever minors are employed.
- 6. Such provisions for decency, comfort and health in the employment of women as should be accorded the mothers of the race.
- An equitable retirement law providing for the retirement of superannuated and disabled employes of the civil service to the end that a higher standard of efficiency may be maintained.

We believe also that the adoption of similar principles should be urged and applied in the legislation of the States with regard to labor within their borders, and that through every possible agency the life and health of the people of the nation should be conserved.

LABOR.

We declare our faith in the Seamen's Act, passed by the Democratic Congress, and we promise our earnest continuance of its enforcement.

We favor the speedy enactment of an effective Federal child labor law and

the regulation of the shipment of prison-made goods in interstate commerce. We favor the creation of a Federal bureau of safety in the Department of Labor to gather facts concerning industrial hazards, and to recommend legis-

lation to prevent the maining and killing of human beings.

We favor the extension of the powers and functions of the Federal bureau

We favor the development upon a systematic scale of the means already begun under the present administration to assist laborers throughout the nation to seek and obtain employment, and the extension by the Federal government, by the same assistance and encouragement as is now given to agricultural training.

We heartily commend our newly established Department of Labor for its excellent record in settling industrial strikes by personal advice and through conciliating agents.

PUBLIC HEAUTH.

We favor a thorough reconsideration of the means and methods by which the Federal government handles questions of public health, to the end that human life may be conserved by elimination of loathsome diseases, the improvement of sanitation and the diffusion of a knowledge of disease prevention, We favor the establishment by the Federal government of tuberculosis sanitariums for needy tubercular patients.

SENATE RILLER.

We favor such an alteration of the rules of procedure of the Senate of the United States as will permit the prompt transaction of the nation's legislative husiness.

ECONOMY AND THE BUDGET.

We demand careful economy in all expenditures for the support of the government, and to that end favor a return by the House of Representatives to its former practice of initiating and preparing all appropriation bills through a single committee chosen from its membership in order that responsibility may be centered, expenditures standardized and made uniform, and waste and duplication in the public service as much as possible avoided. We favor this as a practicable first step toward a budget system.

CIVIL SERVICE.

We reaffirm our declarations for the rigid enforcement of the civil service laws.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

We heartly endorse the provisions of the bill, recently passed by the House of Representatives, further promoting self-government in the Philippine Islands as being in fulfillment of the policy declared by the Democratic party in its last national platform, and we relierate our indorsement of the purpose of ultimate independence for the Philippine Islands expressed in the preamble of that measure.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

We recommend the extension of the franchise to the women of the country by the states upon the same terms as to men.

PROTECTION OF CITIZENS.

We again declare the policy that the sacred rights of American citizenship must be preserved at home and abroad, and that no treaty with any other government shall receive the sanction of our government which does not expressly recognize the absolute equality of all our citizens, irrespective of race, creed or previous nationality, and which does not recognize the right of expatriation. The American government should protect American citizens in their rights, not only at home but abroad, and any country having a government should be held to strict accountability for any wrongs done them, either to person or property. At the earliest practical opportunity our country should strive earnestly for peace among the warring nations of Europe and seek to bring about the adoption of the fundamental principles of justice and humanity, that all men shall enjoy equality of right and freedom from discrimination in the land wherein they dwell.

PRISON REFORM,

We demand that the modern principles of prison reform be applied in our Federal penal system. We favor such work for prisoners as shall give them training in remunerative occupations, so that they may make an honest living when released from prison; the setting apart of the net wages of the prisoner to be paid to his dependent family or to be reserved for his own use upon his release; the liberal extension of the principles of the Federal

parole law, with due regard both to the welfare of the prisoner and the interests of society. The adoption of the probation system, especially in the case of first offenders not convicted of serious crimes.

PENSIONS.

We renew the declarations of recent Democratic platforms relating to generous pensions for soldiers and their widows, and call attention to our record of performance in this particular.

WATERWAYS AND FLOOD CONTROL.

We renew the declaration in our last two platforms relating to the development of our waterways. The recent devastation of the lower Mississippi Valley and several other sections by floods accentuate the movement for the regulation of river flow by additional bank and levee protection below and diversion, storage and control of the flood waters above, and their utilization for beneficial purposes in the reclamation of arid and swamp lands, and development of water power, instead of permitting the floods to continue, as horetofore, agents of destruction. We hold that the control of the Mississippi River is a national problem. The preservation of the depth of its waters for purposes of navigation, the building of levees and works of bank protection to maintain the integrity of its channel and prevent the overflow of its valley, resulting in the interruption of interstate commerce, the disorganization of the mail service and the enormous loss of life and property, impose an obligation which alone can be discharged by the national government.

We favor the adoption of a liberal and comprehensive plan for the development and improvement of our harbors and inland waterways with economy and efficiency, so as to permit their navigation by vessels of stanuard draft.

ALASKA,

It has been and will be the policy of the Democratic party to enact all laws necessary for the speedy development of Alaska and its great natural resources.

TERRITORIES.

We favor granting to the people of Alaska, Hawaii and Forto Rico the traditional territorial government accorded to all territories of the United States since the beginning of our government, and we believe the officials appointed to administer the government of those several territories should be qualified by previous bona fide residence.

CANDIDATES.

We unreservedly indorse our President and Vice President, Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, and Thomas Riley Marshall, of Indians, who have performed the functions of their great offices faithfully and impartially and with distinguished ability.

In particular, we commend to the American people the spleudid diplomatic victories of our great President, who has preserved the vital interests of our government and its citizens, and kept us out of war.

Woodrow Wilson stands today the greatest American of his generation.

CONCLUSION.

This is a critical hour in the history of America, a critical hour in the history of the world. Upon the record above set forth, which shows great constructive achievement in following out a consistent policy for our domestic and internal development; upon the record of the Democratic administration, which has maintained the honor, the dignity and the interests of the United States, and at the same time retained the respect and friendship of all the nations of the world, and upon the great policies for the future strengthening

of the life of our country, the enlargement of our national vision and the ennobling of our international relations as set forth above, we appeal with confidence to the voters of the country.

PROGRESSIVE PARTY

The Progressive National Convention met at the Auditorium in Chicago, Wednesday, June 7, 1916, and its sessions lasted until Saturday, June 10th. Mr. Raymond Robbins of Illinois was selected as temporary chairman, and C. K. Davis of New York as temporary secretary. This organization was later made permanent. The committee appointed to confer with a like committee of the Republican convention then in session in Chicago, consisted of Hiram Johnson, Charles J. Bonaparte, George W. Perkins, John M. Parker and Horace S. Wilkinson. The convention resulted in the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt for president, and John M. Parker of Louisiana for vice-president. Colonel Roosevelt declined the nomination some time after the adjournment of the convention. The following platform was adopted:

PROGRESSIVE NATIONAL PLATFORM.

"This is the year of decision for the nation's future. As we now decide, so we shall go forward in righteousness and power or backward in degradation and weakness.

Of necessity we deal now with the foundation of our national life. We are facing elemental facts of force, of right and wrong, of extreme national peril. Our present choice of path will be irrevocable. The tradition of isolation has been ended. The United States is now part of a world system of civilization. We stand or fall as we prepare now to take our part in peace or war and hold our own therein.

DUTIES OF THE NATION,

As members of an international community, we are subject to certain basic duties:

To secure the rights and equal treatment of our citizens, native or naturalized, on land and sea, without regard to race, creed or nativity.

To guard the honor and uphold the just influence of our nation.

To maintain the integrity of international law.

These are the corner stones of civilization. We must be strong to defend them.

The present war shows that it is the supreme duty of civilization to create conditions which will make for permanent peace. We carnestly desire to keep the peace, but there are higher things which we must keep if we would keep the faith as Washington and Lincoln kept it. Peace at the price of submission and cowardice is not desirable, nor is it the peace of justice, which alone would make it permanent.

THREATS NOT SUFFICIENT.

Supine submission to the invasion of our rights or indifference to the wrongs of weaker nations will not long maintain peace, nor will mere threat of action enforce our rights under international law. There must be an unfaltering determination and a prepared ability to defend our rights and to fulfill our international obligations. In such a readiness lies the surest safeguard of both national honor and continued peace.

Failure to deal firmly and promptly with the menace of Mexican disorders has brought conditions worse than warfare and has weakoned our national self respect. Every resource of government should be forthwith used to end those conditions and protect from outrage the lives, honor and property of American men and women in Mexico.

Whatever our country can legitimately do to attain peace for war-stricken Europe and to aid in the procurement of equal rights without discrimination because of race or creed to all men in all lands should be done.

NATIONAL DEFENSE.

Adequate provision for the common defense has become the task of foremost national concern. We must be ready, in spirit, arms and industry.

Beneath the structure of military and economic strength there must be a unified spirit of this cosmopolitan people, a deep loyalty and undivided allegiance to America, the land which has welcomed us and our immigrant fore-fathers. Back of any adequate national preparedness in arms or in industry must remain the democratic soul of an undivided people, determined to keep America's great heritage and traditions unfalteringly in first place. America's problems must be faced and solved solely in the light of American ideals.

American political action must be taken in the service of American ends. Unwavering patriotism and unfaltering fidelity to America is the only spirit which should animate our clitzens. If in this melting pot of a hundred nations the children of any fail to find our common destiny worthy of common devotion and defense, we shall sustain irreparable loss of national character.

In this spirit of Americanism action must be taken for the common defense.

PREPAREDNESS.

Preparation in arms requires:

A navy restored to at least second rank in battle efficiency.

A regular army of 250,000 men, fully armed and trained, as a first line of land defense.

A system of military training adequate to organize with promptness, behind that first line of the army and navy, a citizen soldiery supplied, armed and controlled by the national government.

In our democracy every male citizen is charged with the duty of defending his country. This duty is not new. It has existed from the foundation of the government. Under modern conditions it cannot be performed without military training; service without training means slaughter and disaster. As the nation has always recognized and exercised the right to enforce compulsory military service in time of war, so there should be universal military training for that service during times of peace.

We believe in preparedness for defense, but never for aggression. We must not sacrifice the lives of men for the glory or gain of military conquest. And we believe that the women of the country, who share with men the burdens of the government in times of peace and make equal sacrifice in time of war, should be given the full political right of suffrage, both by federal and state action.

To make possible social justice, to maintain our position in peace and war, we must insure business and industrial prosperity. This can be done:

- By regulation of industry aimed at promoting its growth and prosperity and a just distribution of its returns and a healthy expansion of forelen trade.
- By a conservation and development of our national resources for the good of all.
- By the re-establishment of our merchant marine.
- By the development of a system of interstate national highways.
- By making a new standard of governmental efficiency through a complete civil service system, a national budget and the destruction of "pork barrel" legislation.
- By the creation of a permanent, expert tariff commission, with a view of intelligently and scientifically adjusting the tariff, so as to build up, rather than destroy, American industry,

The protective system is essential in our national prosperity. Tremendous new pressures will be thrown upon our industries after the war by the highly mobilized production of Europe. At all times conditions of competition must be equalized between our own and foreign countries.

We can only get the protection we need through the use of exact and complete knowledge, unaffected by prejudice or politics. We can secure that knowledge at all times and when needed only through such a commission.

The industrial issues are chiefly national. The present and certain future make it imperative that the regulation and promotion of industry, and especially of transportation and foreign trade, be national, not local. Only federal power can work justice to capital and labor through the nation. Only national authority can mobilize industry for defense as the nation's need demands it.

We have set forth in this platform plain essentials of national existence. They are not new in principle. Most men agree with them. Any man may propose them. The urgent and immediate need is for their performance. We have had ample experience with the promiser; with words and the bitter taste of words retracted.

"ISSUE II ONE OF MEN."

We must choose a man who, not alone by words but by past deeds, gives guarantee that he can and will make these things good. The issue is one of men. In the midst of world changes unparalleled in history, we cannot forecast the problems which will confront our government during the war and at its end. We, therefore, need as president a leader who knows the nations. A man who acts. If we continue longer to stand for words as above deeds, for fancies as above facts, we shall receive and merit the fate that surely awaits: the man or people who do not face the truth.

We will meet and work with any man or party who sees the nation's need and puts forward a leader fit to meet it. We will accept no less, in plan or in the man, and we solemnly charge upon any who place partisan politics above country the responsibility for a nation's future, sacrificed to self-interest and spoils."

The state convention of the Progressive party was held in Des Moines, on the 29th day of July, 1916, pursuant to call of the state central committee. Henry H. Griffiths of Des Moines was selected as temporary chairman, and Joseph Misbach of Algona as temporary secretary. This organization was later made permanent. A full ticket of candidates for state officers had been nomlinated at the primary with the exception of a candidate for governor Stephen H. Bashor of Waterloo was unanimously nominated for this office by the convention. Selections of the several districts of members of the state central committee were approved, and a platform adopted. The following is the state platform:

STATE PLATFORM-1916-PROGRESSIVE PARTY.

The Progressive party of Iowa, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirms its national platform of 1912, ratified in 1916; asks its serious consideration by the voters; denounces the imitation of some of its provisions by the old parties as a sham intended only to catch votes but without sincere intention to do anything; and asks support on the principles then and now held by this party.

Good government is the first alm and end of organized society. Political parties are only means to that end. They must be instruments for service, not allowed to become institutions to be served. New parties are necessary as times and issues change, and old ones must go.

We charge that both the old parties have been grossly extravagant, have given corrupt and bad government, have proven untrustworthy and inefficient, and should be superseded by new parties,

The Republican and Democratic parties of this state have shown fatal incapacity to present any issues as between themselves or any program looking to good government. Their platforms mean nothing, and present no issues, and promise remedy for no existing problems.

We call attention to the stand in favor of prohibiting the liquor traffic, in our 1914 platform, and reaffirm that stand. We question the sincerity of the Republican party in presenting wet candidates on a dry platform; and of those in the Democratic party who at this late day profess to be for prohibition in view of their past record.

We call attention to the need for reform of methods for the taxation of railroad corporations and public utilities; to the need for regulation of those corporations; to the demand for a properly regulated guaranty of bank deposits; to the desirability of a title registration act similar to the Torrens system; and ask the support of the voters that we may enact suitable legislation on these subjects.

We pledge our candidates to favor and support the following measures:

- Initiative, referendum and recall, giving the people direct control of their officers, legislation and affairs.
- Non-partisan nomination and election of county and township officers, in the interest of oconomy and efficiency.
- Immediate submission of the prohibitory amendment now pending, and the strengthening and enforcement of laws to eliminate the liquor traffic.
- Provisions for systems of state highways, and co-operation with the national government for good, well-drained, well graded roads.
- 5. Retention of the primary law; the strengthening of that and other election laws; and enactment of a corrupt practices act to prevent large expenditures of money by persons or interests to put their tools into public office, with increased provisions for publicity of expenditure by candidates and their supporters.
- Full enfranchisement of women equally with men, by state and national action.

- 7. Reform in matters of taxation and control of railroads and public utilities; in registration of titles; and in handling state and local public business.
- 8. Reform in matters of committees and clerkships in the general assembly, and in promoting economy and efficiency in public affairs.

SOCIALIST PARTY

PARTY MEMBERSHIP.

The Socialist party is a close organization of something over 100,000 members in the United States and 1,200 in the state of Iowa. To become a member of the party one must subscribe to the pledge contained in the accompanying application blank and pay 25 cents per month in dues. This amount is divided as follows: Five cents goes to the National organization, 10 cents to the state organization and 10 cents to the local. By this system of dues the funds are chiefly raised for the carrying on of party activity. Women are eligible to membership on same terms as men.

PARTY MANAGEMENT.

The Socialist party is a democratic party, governed by the membership, through the initiative and referendum. Any matter of party policy or management may be referred to the rank and file.

The National Committee consists of one member from each organized state and one additional member for each 2,000 members in good standing in the party.

The administrative affairs of the party are conducted by the executive secretary (at present Mr. Adolph Germer of Mount Olive, Ill.), and an executive committee consisting of five members as follows: Anna Maley, New York; John M. Work, Chicago; Morris Hilquit, New York; Victor Berger, Milwaukee, and John Spargo, Vermont.

NOMINATIONS -- PLATFORM AND CONVENTIONS,

The nomination of presidential and vice-presidential candidates is made by the rank and file of the party membership, Allen L. Benson of Yonkers, N. Y., and Geo. R. Kirkpatrick of Newark, N. J., being the choice respectively for these positions in the recent campaign.

The platform is drafted by the National Executive Committee and submitted to the vote of the membership. I am submitting ballot containing the majority and minority report of the present Executive Committee and the outgoing committee who jointly drafted the proposed platform. I am also submitting copy of platform as adopted by the membership. In this connection will say that between 1904 and 1908 the platform was changed twice by the initiative of the membership.

Owing to the fact that the National Committee meets once each year and as the chief work of a National convention is to nominate candidates and adopt a platform no convention was had in 1916.

STATE ORGANIZATIONS.

State organizations are framed substantially on the same plan as the National organization. The administrative power being vested in a state committee—one member from each congressional district, and a secretary,

NATIONAL SOCIALIST PLATFORM FOR 1916.

In the midst of the greatest crisis and bloodiest struggle of all history the Socialist party of America reaffirms its steadiest adherence to the principles of international brotherhood, world peace and industrial democracy.

The great war which has engulfed so much of civilization and destroyed millions of lives is one of the natural results of the capitalistic system of production. Fundamentally, it was the desire of competing national groups of capitalists to grasp and control the opportunities for profitable foreign investments and trade which brought about the war, and it is that same desire which prompts the present organized effort to fasten upon this country the crushing burdens of militarism. Not until the capitalist system of production is replaced by a system of industrial democracy will wars for markets cease and international peace be securely established.

Hideous as they are, the horrors of the far-stretched battlefield of the old world are dwarfed by the evil results of the capitalist system, even in normal times. Instead of being organized to provide all members of society with an abundance of food, clothing and shelter, and the highest attainable freedom and culture, industry is at present organized and conducted for the benefit of a parasitic class. All the powers of government, and all our industrial genius are directed to the end of securing to the relatively small class of capitalist investors the largest amount of profits which can be wrung from the labor of the ever increasing class whose only property is muscle and brain, manual and mental labor power.

The dire consequence of this system are everywhere apparent. The workers are oppressed and deprived of much that makes for physical, mental and moral well being. Year by year poverty and industrial accidents destroy more lives than all the armies and navies of the world.

To preserve their privilege and power is the most vital interest of the possessing class, while it is the most vital interest of the working class to resist oppression, improve its position and struggle to obtain security of life and liberty. Hence there exists a conflict of interests, a social war within the nation, which can know neither truce nor compromise. So long as the few own and control the economic life of the nation the many must be enslaved, poverty must coexist with riotous luxury, and civil strife prevail.

The Socialist party would end these conditions by reorganizing the life of the nation upon the basis of Socialism. Socialism would not abolish private property, but greatly extend it. We believe that every human being should have and own all the things which he can use to advantage, for the enrichment of his own life, without imposing disadvantage or burden upon any other human being. Socialism admits the private ownership and individual direction of all things, tools, economic processes and functions which are individualistic in character and requires the collective ownership and democratic control and direction of those which are social or collectivistic in character.

We hold that this country cannot enjoy happiness and prosperity at home and maintain lasting peace with other nations, so long as its industrial wealth is monopolized by a capitalist oliganchy. In this as in every other campaign all special issues arising from temporary situations, whether domestic or

foreign, must be subordinated to the major issue—the need of such a reorganization of our economic life as will remove the land, the mines, forests, railroads, mills and factories, all the things required for our physical existence, from the clutches of industrial and financial fresbooters and place them securely and permanently in the hands of the people.

If men were free to labor to satisfy their desires there could be in this country neither poverty nor involuntary unemployment. But the men in this country are not free to labor to satisfy their desires. The great industrial population can labor only when the capitalist class, who own the industries, believe they can market their product at a profit. The needs of millions are subordinated to the greeds of a few. The situation is not unlike that of a pyramid balanced upon its apex. Oftentimes this pyramid tumbles and industrial depression comes. There was such a crash in 1907. If the capitalist owners had been willing to get out of the way, industry could have been revived in a day. But the capitalist owners are never willing to get out of the way. Their greeds come first-the people's needs, if at all, afterward. Therefore, business did not quickly revive after the industrial depression of 1907. Mr. Taft was elected to bring good times, but in four years failed to bring Mr. Wilson was elected to bring good times, but not all of the measures he advocated had the slightest effect upon industry. The European war has brought to this country tremendous orders for military supplies and has created a period of prosperity for the few. For the masses of the people there is but an opportunity to work hard for a bare living, which is not prosperity, but slavery. As against the boast of the present national administration that its political programs, now fully in force, has brought prosperity to the masses, we call attention to the statement of the Federal Public Health Service that \$800 a year is required to enable a family to avoid physical deterioration through lack of decent living conditions, that more than half of the families of workingmen receive less than that amount, that nearly a third receive less than \$500 a year and that one family in twelve receive less than \$500 a year and that one family in twelve receive less than \$300 a year.

The capitalist class, for a great many years, has been trying to saddle upon this country a greater army and a greater navy. A greater army is desired to keep the working class of the United States in subjection. A greater navy is desired to safeguard the foreign investments of American capitalists and to "back up" American diplomacy in its efforts to gain foreign markets for American capitalists. The war in Europe, which diminished and is still diminishing the remote possibility of European attack upon the United States, was nevertheless seized upon by capitalists and by unscrupulous politicians as a means of spreading fear throughout the country to the end that, by false pretense, great military establishments might be obtained. We denounce such "preparedness," as both false in principle, unnecessary in character and dangerous in its plain tendencies toward militarism. We advocate that sort of social preparedness which expresses itself in better homes, better bodies and effective defense in war.

The Socialist party maintains its attitude of unalterable opposition to war. We reiterate the statement that the competitive nature of capitalism is the cause of modern war, and that the co-operative nature of Socialism is alone adapted to the task of ending war by removing its causes. We assert, however, that, oven under the present capitalist order, additional measures can be taken to safeguard peace, and to this end we demand:

MEASURES TO INSURE PEACE.

- (1) That all laws and appropriations for the increase of the military and naval forces of the United States shall be immediately repealed.
- (2) That the power be taken from the President to lead the nation into a position which leaves no escape from war. No one man, however exalted in official station, should have the power to decide the question of peace or war for a nation of a hundred millions. To give one man such power is

neither democratic or safe. Yet the President exercises such power when he determines what shall be the nation's foreign policies and what shall be the nature and tone of its diplomatic intercourse with other nations. We, therefore, demand that the power to fix foreign policies and conduct diplomatic negotiations shall be lodged in the Congress and shall be exercised publicly, the people reserving the right by referendum to order Congress, at any time to change its foreign policy.

- (3) That no war shall be declared or waged by the United States without a referendum vote of the entire people, except for the purpose of repelling invasion.
- (4) That the Monroe doctrine shall be immediately abandoned as a danger so great that even its advocates are agreed that it constitutes perhaps our greatest single danger of war. The Monroe doctrine was originally intended to safeguard the peace of the United States. Though the doctrine has changed from a safeguard to a menace, the capitalist class still defends it for the reason that our great capitalists desire to retain South and Central America as their private trade preserve. We favor the cultivation of social, industrial and political friendship with all other nations in the western hemisphere, as an approach to a world confederation of nations, but we oppose the Monroe doctrine, because it takes from our hands the peace of America and places it in the custody of any nation that would attack the sovereignty of any state in the western world.
- (5) That the independence of the Philippine Islands be immediately recognized as a measure of justice, both to the Filipinos and to ourselves. The Filipinos are entitled to self-government; we are entitled to be freed from the necessity of building and maintaining enough dreadnoughts to defend them in the event of war.
- (6) The government of the United States shall call a congress of all neutral nations to mediate between the belligerent powers in an effort to establish an immediate and lasting peace without indemnities, or forcible annexation of territory, and based on a binding and enforceable international treaty, which shall provide for concerted disamment on land and at sea, and for an International Congress with power to adjust all disputes between nations, and which shall guarantee freedom and equal rights to all oppressed nations and races.

WORKING PROGRAM.

As general measures calculated to strengthen the working class in its fight for the realization of its ultimate aim, the Co-operative Commonwealth, and to increase its power of resistance against capitalist oppression, we advocate and piedge ourselves and our elected officers to the following program:

POLITICAL DEMANDS.

- 1. Unrestricted and equal suffrage for men and women,
- 2. The immediate adoption of the so-called "Susan B. Anthony amendment" to the constitution of the United States granting the suffrage to women on equal terms with men.
- 3. The adoption of the initiative, referendum and recall and of proportional representation, nationally as well as locally.
 - 4. The abolition of the Senate and of the veto power of the President,
- 5. The election of the President and the Vice President by direct vote of the people,
- 6. The abolition of the present restriction upon the amendment of the constitution, so that that instrument may be made amendable by a majority of the voters in the country.
- 7. The calling of a convention for the revision of the constitution of the United States.

- 8. The abolition of the power usurped by the Supreme Court of the United States to pass upon the constitutionality of legislation enacted by Congress. National laws to be repealed only by act of Congress or by a referendum vote of the whole people.
 - 9. The immediate curbing of the power of the courts to issue injunctions.
 - 10. The election of all judges of the United States courts for short terms.
 - 11. The free administration of the law.
- 12. The granting of the right of suffrage in the District of Columbia with representation in Congress and a democratic form of municipal government for purely local affairs.
 - 13. The extension of democratic government to all United States territory.
 - 14. The freedom of press, speech and assemblage.
- 15. The increase of the rates of the present income tax and corporation tax and the extension of inheritance taxes, graduated in proportion to the value of the estate and to nearness of kin—the proceeds of these taxes to be employed in the socialization of industry.
- 16. The enactment of further measures for general education and particularly for vocational education in useful pursuits. The Bureau of Education to be made a department.
- 17. The enactment of further measures for the conservation of health and the creation of an independent department of health.
- 18. The abolition of the monopoly ownership of patents and the substitution of collective ownership, with direct rewards to inventors by premiums or royalties.

COLLECTIVE OWNERSHIP.

- The collective ownership and democratic management of rallroads, telegraphs and telephones, express service, steamboat lines and all other social means of transportation and communication and of all large-scale industries.
- 2. The immediate acquirement by the municipalities, the state or the federal government of all grain elevators, stock yards, storage warehouses, and other distributing agencies in order to relieve the farmer from the extentionate charges of the middlemen and to reduce the present high cost of living.
- 3. The extension of the public domain to include mines, quarries, oil wells, forest and water power.
- 4. The further conservation and development of natural resources for the use and benefit of all the people:
 - (a) By scientific forestation and timber protection.
 - (b) By the reclamation of arld and swamp tracts.
 - (c) By the storage of flood waters and the utilization of water power.
- (d) By the stoppage of the present extravagant waste of the soil and of the products of mines and oil wells,
 - (e) By the development of highway and waterway systems.
- 5. The collective ownership of land wherever practicable, and in cases where such ownership is impracticable, the appropriation by taxation of the annual rental value of all land held for speculation or exploitation.
- 6. All currency shall be issued by the government of the United States and shall be legal tender for the payment of taxes and import duties and for the discharge of public and private debts. The government shall lend money on bonds to counties and municipalities at a nominal rate of interest for the purpose of taking over or establishing public utilities and for building or maintaining public roads and highways, and public schools—up to 25 per cent of the assessed valuation of such counties or municipalities. Said bonds are to be repaid in twenty equal and annual installments, and the currency issued for that purpose by the government is to be cancelled and destroyed seri-atim as the debt is repaid. All banks and banking institutions shall be owned by the government of the United States or by the states.

7. Government relief of the unemployed by the extension of all useful public works. All persons employed on such work to be engaged directly by the government under a workday of not more than eight hours and at not less than the prevailing union wages. The government also to establish employment burcaus; to lend money to state and municipalities without interest for the purpose of carrying on public works, to contribute money to unemployment funds of labor unions and other organizations of workers, and to take such other measures within its power as will lessen the widespread misery of the workers caused by the misrule of the capitalist class.

INDUSTRIAL DEMANDS.

The conservation of human resources, particularly of the lives and wellbeing of the workers and their families:

- 1. By shortening the workday in keeping with the increased productiveness of machinery.
- 2. By securing the freedom of political and economic organization and activities.
- 3. By securing to every worker a rest period of not less than a day and a half in each week.
- By securing a more effective inspection of workshops, factories and mines.
 - cines.
 5. By forbidding the employment of children under eighteen years of age.
- 6. By forbfidding the interstate transportation of the products of child labor and of all uninspected factories and mines.

SOCIALIST PARTY STATE PLATFORM-1916.

The Socialist Party of the state of Iowa, in convention assembled at Des Moines, July 4, 1916, reaffirms its adherence to the principles of international Socialism and endorses the late platform of the Socialist party of the United States.

Food, clothing and shelter are the three absolute essentials of human life. The manner in which these fundamental necessities are obtained by a people determines in a very large degree their development in any direction. They will never rise higher in the scale of physical efficiency, ethical culture or intellectual growth than the measure of fairness that enters into the producing and distributing of their wealth.

The character of the tools of production determines the method of production. Formerly these tools were simple, inexpensive and individually used. The worker could accordingly own them, employ himself and enjoy his product. The product of labor always has and always will go to the owner of the means of production.

The evolution of the tool has revolutionized industry from individual hand work to collective machine work. The means of production have become so complex and expensive, the workers cannot use them individually, nor can they own them individually. Yet it is absolutely certain that if the workers are to employ themselves and get their social product they must own the means of production, and the only possible way they can own them is collectively.

The capitalist now own the means of production privately and are able therefore to dictate to the disinherited workers the terms of access to them, the time, place and manner of using them, and who shall have the product.

In spite of the fact that the modern means of production created by the joint effort of the workers has vastly increased their productive power, the struggle of the workers for food, clothing and shelter grows in intensity because the capitalists have monopolized the means of wealth production and distribution.

The working class is at the mercy of the capitalist class who have production carried on primarily for profit, regardless of the workers' needs. The improved methods of machine production becoming more widespread and thus intensifying the struggle for markets, is forcing the capitalist class to form combines and trusts and they in turn increase the uncertainty of employment for the workers.

This natural unavoidable process of centralization having reached a comparative limit in trade, manufacture and transportation, now seeks a new outlet. Agriculture offers the next and last great field for capitalist development and exploitation.

A revolution is already setting in both in the method and conditions of the farm workers. In the past ten years farm values have doubled, farms have decreased in number and increased in size, farm mortgages, tenantry and farm wage workers have increased, while the farming population has actually decreased. It has already become as impossible for the propertyless worker to become a land-owner, as for him to become a factory owner, a mine owner or a railroad owner. And those who form the industrial centers and the army of tenants and farm wage-earners have followed the exodus of recent years to the west and south in the hope of becoming land-owners have escaped the rapacious employers and landlords only to fall into the hands of the equally rapacious land speculator and money loaners.

This having been the bitter experience of a vast multitude of willing but misguided workers, who have patiently endured privation and hardships we know to be unnecessary, the collective ownership of land wherever practicable, the appropriation by taxation of the annual rental value of all land held for speculation or exploitation, is offered as a most effective remedy to combat the centralization of land in the hands of a few.

The capitalist class is able to control the destinies of society by its ownership of the industrial forces; its ownership is legal because it controls the political machinery by which laws are made and enforced, and has therefore seen to it that the laws are made to its interest. It controls the political machinery by and through political parties.

The Republican party as well as the Democratic and all other parties except the Socialist party, are the parties of the capitalist class in the United States. They are organized for the purpose of serving the interest of the capitalist class and they therefor stand for capitalism with all its legitimate fruits: Exploitation of the workers, inability to employ, feed, clothe and shelter the willing workers, periodical breakdowns called panics, widespread and increasing poverty in spite of increased production, hypocritical dispensing of degrading and repulsive charity to keep the workers quiet and salve the conscience of the capitalist, forcing of women and children into the industries and the men into idleness, prostitution, divorce, illiteracy, crime, suicide, insanity and wholesale murder by the capitalist through unsafe mechanical appliances and unsanitary conditions because these yield larger profits.

The interest of the working class lies in escaping all exploitation, employing itself and being master of its economic destiny. It is therefore impossible for the Republican and Democratic parties or their officials to serve the workers and unreasonable for the workers to hope for relief from either.

In the face of the phenomenon commonly called trusts, recent events have demonstrated that both the progressive and conservative elements in both the Republican and Democratic parties alike stand for perpetuation of capitalism, and while representing the warring groups within the capitalist class, they are a unit in their opposition to the working class interest, both of the cities and on the farms. Both the conservative and progressive element of the party in power propose that things are well enough as they are; while the progressives having been received back into the fold of the Republican

organization have become a negligible quantity; from this combination the workers can expect no relief, their sole ambition is to elevate this party back to power.

Since the Socialist party stands for the collective ownership and democratic management of industry, abolition of exploitation securing to the workers the full social value of their product; and is the political expression of working class interests, we earnestly urge all workingmen to study carefully the principles of socialism, and vote with their class.

INDUSTRIAL DEMANDS,

The Socialist party is the political expression of the economic interest of the working class, and is in favor of every movement and law which will increase wages, or better the conditions of labor for that class.

POLITICAL DEMANDS.

- 1. Equal suffrage for all adult men and women.
- 2. Equal pay for equal work to men and women employed by the state or any of its subdivisions.
- 3. The initiative, referendum and proportional representation and the right of recall without the percentage of the petition signers so large as to prevent its use by the people.
- 4. Home rule for municipalities and the express statutory powers to own and operate all public service utilities.
 - 5. We demand the use of the union label upon all public documents.
 - 6. Free textbooks for all schools, the same to be printed by the public.
- Free and speedy administration of justice. The retention and extension of our jury system, and the jurymen to be selected mechanically from all classes and parties.
 - 8. The abolition of capital punishment.
- 9. The abrogation of the power of the court and judges to nullify laws on the grounds of unconstitutionality or any other ground.
- 10. The absolute freedom of the press, speech and assemblage, including the right of civil service employes to express opinions on political questions, and that all such have the right to take part in partisan politics.
- 11. We demand the revision of our taxation and assessment laws, so that all railroads, and all property of corporations have a physical valuation. That land users should not be taxed for land they do not own. That the mortgages shall pay his just share of taxes. We demand the repeal of the one per cent capita road tax law and in its stead that a graduated income tax be enacted.
- 12. As taxation is excessive and wages low, and 70 per cent of our national revenues are wasted in war and preparation for war, we demand the mitigation and abolition of war.

MEXICAN RESOLUTION.

Whereas, More than one-half of the wealth of Mexico is owned and controlled by American and British capitalists, and

Whereas, These interests have for more than five years brought pressure on the government to force intervention, and

Whereas, The present defacto government is not satisfactory to the above named interest, and

Whereas, It is a well known fact that the Villa faction was favored by them and furnished with arms and other resources, and

Whereas, Villa boasted that the Columbus raid was designed to cause intervention, and

Whereas, The present Mexican crisis is the immediate outgrowth of the Columbus raid:

Therefore we ask the public to calmly consider these obviously related facts, to not be misled by the sentimental and thoughtless appeal to patriotism, but rather be guided by a sense of justice and fairness.

While we recognize the necessity of protecting our border against irresponsible bandits, instigated to deeds of violence by traitors at home, we believe there is no valid excuse for invasion, and that the troops now in Mexico are serving no valuable purpose but on the contrary act as a decided irritant, and should be withdrawn.

PREPAREDNESS RESOLUTION.

Whereas, The present preparedness mania is on the one hand the fruit of the war spirit inevitable in view of the war in Europe, and on the other directly cultivated by the capitalist interests that have been fattening from munition contracts, and

Whereas, In view of the exhausted condition that has come to the warring nations there is obviously less danger from invasion than at any time in a quarter of a century:

Therefore, We are unalterably opposed to the preparedness program now being advocated by the press of our land.

PROHIBITION PARTY

OFFICIAL CALL NATIONAL PROHIBITION CONVENTION, ST. PAUL, MINN., JULY 19, 1918.

This, the official call for the National Prohibition Convention for 1916, issued in the hour of great opportunity for the triumph of prohibition principles and prohibition party philosophy.

The most sanguine advocates of liquordom and the hour of postponement for making paramount the overthrow of the liquor traffic in American politics point to no remoter date than the year 1920, whereas the progressive and earnest advocates of the traffic's doorn now point to the year 1916.

Scores of men of national prominence and hundred of thousands of the rank and file have declared their intention of supporting such political party in 1916, as stands committed by state and national platform declaration to prohibition of the liquor traffic. We are justified from the course of events in looking to the St. Paul convention as a gathering of the multitude who have so declared, as an occasion of future historic interest, and a place where will be generated the forces which will lift to paramountcy the issue national prohibition, and elect an administration that will enact the same into law.

Therefore, I, the chairman of the prohibition national committee, in accordance with the instructions of that body, hereby invite the prohibitionists of the several states, without regard to past political affiliations, and all citizens who believe in the principles advocated by the prohibition party, to unite in the selection of delegates to the national convention of the prohibition party, which is called to meet in the auditorium, St. Paul, Minnesota, at ten o'clock in the morning of the 19th day of July, 1916, to nominate candidates for president and vice-president, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention. The basis of representation has been fixed by the national committee as follows:

Each state and territory is entitled to four delegates at large.

Each state is entitiled to an additional delegate for each two hundred votes, or major fraction thereof cast for Eugene W. Chafin for president in 1912.

The district of Columbia is entitled to two delegates,

Each state, territory and the district of Columbia is entitled to as many alternates as its number of delegates.

The time and manner of electing these delegates and alternates will be determined by the prohibitionists of the various states and territories subject only to this provision; that in every state where the party has an organized state committee, the delegates must be chosen by such congressional or state conventions as the state central committee may call for that purpose, or by the state committee in such manner as it may determine conforming to the laws relating thereto in force in the various states.

Complete information concerning forms for credentials, routes and rates of travel, preliminary meetings, etc., will be given in ample time through the general press.

IOWA MEMBERS OF COMMITTEE TO CONVENTION.

A. Mac Eachron of Waterloo. Fred T. Stevenson of Waukee.

PROHIBITION NATIONAL PLATFORM, ST. PAUL MINN., JULY 20, 1916. The Prohibition Party, assembled in its Twelfth National Convention in the city of St. Paul, Minnesota, on this Twentieth day of July, 1916, grateful to Almighty God for the blessings of liberty, for our institutions and the multiplying signs of the early victory for the cause for which the Party stands in order that the people may know the source of its faith and the basis of its action, should it be clothed with governmental power, challenges the attention of the Nation and asks the votes of the people on this Declaration of principles.

PROHIBITION.

We denounce the traffic in intoxicating liquors. We believe in its abolition. It is a crime—not a business—and should not have governmental sanction.

We demand—and if given power, we will effectuate the demand—that the manufacture, importation, exportation, and sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited.

To the accomplishment of that end, we pledge the exercise of all governmental power—the enactment of statutes and the amendment of constitutions. State and National. Only by a political party committed to this purpose can such policy be made effective. We call upon all voters, so believing, to place the Prohibition Party in power upon this issue as a necessary step in the solution of the liquor problem.

SUFFRAGE.

The right of citizens of the United States to vote should not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex. We declare in favor of the enfranchisement of women by amendments to the State and Federal Constitutions.

We condemn the Republican and Democratic Parties for their failure to submit an equal suffrage amendment to the National Constitution. We remind the four million voters that our party was the first to declare for their political rights, which it did in 1872. We invite the co-operation in electing the Prohibition party to power.

PEACE AND PREPAREDNESS.

We are committed to the policy of peace and friendliness with all nations. We are unalterably opposed to the wasteful military program of the Democratic and Republican Parties. Militarism protects no worthy institution. It endangers them all. It violates the high principles which have brought us as a nation to the present hour. We are for a constructive program in preparedness for peace. We declare for and will promote a world court, to which national differences shall be submitted, so maintained as to give binding force. We will support a compact among nations to dismantle navies and disband armies, but until such court and compact are established we piedge ourselves to maintain an effective army and navy and to provide coast defenses entirely adequate for national protection.

We are opposed to universal military service, and to participation in the rivalry that has brought Europe to the shambles and now imperis the civilization of the race.

Private profits, so far as constitutionally possible, should be taken out of the manufacture of war munitions and all war equipment.

In normal times we favor the employment of the army in vast reclamation plans, in reforesting hills and mountains, in building state and national highways, in the construction of an inland waterway from Florida to Maine, in the opening of Alaska and in unnumbered other projects which will make our soldiers constructive builders of peace. For such service there should be paid an adequate industrial wage.

Those units of our navy which are capable of being converted into merchantmen and passenger vessels should be constructed with that purpose inview, and chiefly so utilized in times of peace.

We condemn the political parties, which for more than thirty years have allowed munitions and war equipment manufacturers to plunder the people, to jeopardize the highest interest of the nation by furnishing honey-combed armor plate and second rate battleships which the Navy League now declares are wholly inadequate.

We will not allow the country to forget that the first step toward physical, economic, moral, and political preparedness is the enactment of National Probibition.

TARIFF AND RECIPROCITY,

The countries at war are preparing for a fierce industrial struggle to follow the cessation of hostilities. As a matter of commercial economy, international friendliness, business efficiency, and as a help to peace, we demand that reciprocal trade treaties be negotiated with all nations with which we have trade relations. A commission of specialists, free from the control of any party, should be appointed with power to gather full information on all phases of the questions of tariff and reciprocity, and to recommend such logislation as it deems necessary for the welfare of American business and labor.

MERCHANT MARINE.

The necessity of legislation to enable American ship builders or owners to meet foreign competition, on the most favorable terms, is obvious.

Materials for construction should be admitted free of duty.

The purchase of ships abroad, when low prices invite, should be allowed and, when so purchased, should be admitted to American registry.

Harbor rules and charges and navigation laws should not be onerous, but favorable to American registry.

Liberal payment should be made by the Government for the carrying of mails or for transport services,

All shippings from the United States to any of our possessions should be reserved to ships of American registry.

The people should not overlook the fact that the effect of nation-wide prohibition, on labor and industry generally, will be such as to lower the cost of ship building per unit, and at the same time permit the payment of higher wages. The increased volume of trade and commerce, which will result, when the wastage of the liquor traffic is stopped, will quicken our shipping on every sea and send our flag on peaceful missions into every port. This is urged as an incidental effect of wise action on the liquor question, but is none the less to be desired and will aid in the solution of the problem of our merchant marine.

MEXICO AND THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

Mexico needs not a conqueror, but a good Samaritan. We are opposed to the violation of the sovereignty of the Mexican people, and we will countrnance no war of aggression against them. We pledge the help of this country in the suppression of lawless bands of marauders and murderers, who have taken the lives of American citizens, on both sides of the border as well as of Mexicans in their own country.

The lives and property of our citizens, when about their lawful pursuits, either in the United States or Mexico, must be protected. In the event of a breakdown of government across the border, we would use, in the interests of civilization, the force necessary for the establishment of law and order.

In this connection we affirm our faith in the Monroe Doctrine, proclaimed In the early days of the Nation's life and unswervingly maintained for nearly a hundred years.

We cannot claim the benefits of the doctrine and refuse to assume or discharge the responsibilities and the duties which inhere therein and flow therefrom.

Those duties have long been met in Mexico. We should meet them now, acting, not for territory, not for conquest or for ourselves alone, but for and with all the nations of North and South America.

The Democratic party has blundered and four years ago the Republican party evaded and passed on the problem it now asks the opportunity to solve

THE PHILIPPINES.

The abandonment of the Philippines at this time would be an injustice to them and a violation of our plain duty. As soon as they are prepared for self-government, by education and training, they should be granted the independence on terms just to themselves and us.

CONSERVATION.

We reaffirm our declaration in favor of conservation of forests, water power, and other natural resources.

DEPARTMENTAL DECISIONS.

Departmental decisions ought not to be final, but the rights of the people should be protected by provision for court review.

THE CIVIL SERVICE.

In order that the public service may be of the highest standard, the government should be a model employer in all respects. To enforce the civil service law in spirit as well as in letter, all promotions should be non political, based only upon proven fitness; all recommendations for demotions or removals from the service should be subjected to the review of a non-partisan board or commission.

The merit system should be extended to cover all postmasters, collectors of revenue, marshals and other such public officials whose duties are purely administrative.

We reaffirm our allegiance to the principle of secure tenure of office, duing good behavior and capable effort, as the means of obtaining expert service. We declare for the enactment of an equitable retirement law for disabled and superannuated employees, in return for faithful service rendered, to maintain a high degree of efficiency in public office.

AMERICANISM

We stand for Americanism. We believe this country was created for a great mission among the nations of the carth. We rejoice in the fact that it has officered asylum to the oppressed of other lands and for those, more fortunately situated, who yet wished to improve their condition. It is the land of all peoples and belongs to any one,—it is the heritage of all. It should come first in the affections of every citizen, and he who loves another land more than this is not fit for citizenship here, but he is a better citizen, who loving this country, has reverence for the land of his fathers and gains from its history and traditions that which inspires him to nobler service to the one in which he lives.

The Federal Government should interest itself in helping the newcomer into that vocation and locality where he shall most quickly become an American. Those fitted by experience and training for agricultural pursuits should be encouraged to develop the millions of acres of rich and idle land.

MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE LAWS.

We favor the uniform marriage and divorce laws, the extermination of polygamy and the complete suppression of the traffic in girls.

CAPITAL AND LABOR.

Differences between capital and labor should be settled through arbitration, by which the rights of the public are conserved as well as those of the disputants. We declare for the prohibition of child labor in factories, mines, and workshops; an eight hour maximum day, with one day of rest in seven; for more rigid sanitary requirements and such working conditions as shall foster the physical and moral well-being of the unborn; for the protection of all who toil, by the extension of Employers' Liability Acts; for the adoption of safety appliance for the guarding of labor; and for laws that will promote the just division of the wealth which labor and capital jointly produce. Provision should be made for whose who suffer from industrial accidents and occupational diseases.

EFFICIENCY.

We pledge a business-like administration of the Nation's affairs; the abolition of useless offices, bureaus and commissions; economy in the expenditure of public funds; efficiency in government service; and the adoption of a budget system. The Fresident should have power to veto any single item or items of an appropriation bill.

We condemn, and agree when in power to remedy, that which is known as "pork barrel" legislation, by which millions of dollars have been appropriated for rivers where there is no commerce, harbors where there are no ships, and public buildings where there is no need.

ONE TERM ONLY.

We are in favor of a single presidential term of six years.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

Public utilities and other resources that are natural monopolies are at the present time exploited for personal gain under a monopolistic system. We de-

mand the public ownership or control of all such utilities by the people and their operation and administration in the interests of all the people.

FREE INSTITUTION.

We stand for the preservation and development of our free institutions and for absolute separation of church and state with the guaranty of full religious and civil liberty.

SOCIAL JUSTICE.

We stand for the rights, safety, justice and development of humanity; we believe in the equality of all before the law; in old age pensions and insurance against unemployment and in help for needy mothers, all of which could be provided from what is now wasted for drink.

AGRICULTURE.

While it is admitted that grain and cotton are fundamental factors in our national life, it cannot be denied that proper assistance and protection are not given these commodities at terminal markets, in the course of inter-state, commerce.

We favor and pledge our efforts to obtain public grain elevators to be owned and operated by the Federal Government; also to secure Federal grain inspection under a system of civil service and to secure the abolition of any Board of Trade, Chamber of Commerce, or other place of gambling in grain or trading in "options" or "futures" or "shortselling," or any other form of so-called speculation wherein products are not received or delivered, but wherein so-called contracts are settled by the payment of "margins" or "differences" through clearing houses or otherwise.

This party stands committed to free and open market manipulation. We also favor government ware-houses for cotton at proper terminals where the interests of producers require the same; and the absolute divorce of all rail-road elevators or ware-houses owned by railroad companies, either public or private, from operation and control of private individuals in competition with the public in merchandising grain, cotton, or other farm products.

We furthermore endorse all proper methods among producers of those means of co-operative mutual enterprise, which tend toward broader and better markets for both producer and consumer.

CONCLUSION.

This is the day of opportunity for the American people. The triumph of neither old party is essential to our safety or progress. The defeat of either will be no public misfortune. They are one party. By age and wealth, by membership and traditions, by platform and in the character of their candidates, they are the Conscrvative Party of the United States. The Prohibition Party as the promoter of every important measure of social justice presented to the American people in the last two generations, and as the originator of nearly all such legislation, remains now the only great Progressive Party.

The patriotic voters, who compose the Republican and Democratic Parties, can, by voting the Prohibition ticket this year, elect the Issue of National Prohibition.

To those, in whatever party, who have the vision of a land redeemed from drink, we extend a cordial invitation to join with us in carrying the banner of Prohibition to Nation-wide victory.

IOWA STATE PLATFORM OF THE PROHIBITION PARTY.

PREAMBLE.

The Prohibition party of Iowa in state convention assembled in Oskaloosa, Iowa, July 4 and 5, recognizing Almighty God and His Word as the foundation of all human laws and that this nation should be governed by laws in harmony with a Christian civilization, makes the following declarations of principles and policies:

THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

We declare for the prohibition of alcoholic liquor, its manufacture, sale, importation or use for any purpose whatsoever, and pledge cursolves if elected to power to submit to the vote of the people of Iowa a constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture, sale and importation of alcoholic liquors, excepting denatured alcohol, for any purpose whatsoever, and providing adequate penalties for any violation of the same.

ROUAL SUFFRAGE.

We demand a resubmission of the constitution of the state of Iowa for equal suffrage.

SOCIAL VICE.

We favor a uniform national marriage and divorce law for the nation, the extermination of polygamy and the white slave traffic, and adequate laws for the preservation of our youth regardless of sex,

PREPAREDNESS.

We stand for a preparedness as outlined in the national constitution and a policy of national peace instruction.

NATIONAL.

We stand for the perpetuity of our free institutions, civil and religious liberty, government inspection of all private or denominational institutions of a charitable educational or correctional character; complete separation of church and state; no public funds for sectarian purposes; free speech; free press, free public schools and a laud of free men and free women.

LABOR.

We favor the protection of the rights of those who toil, the promotion of social justice, harmony between capital and labor, a more equitable distribution of the products of labor and legislation against the exploitation of child labor.

INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM.

We declare for the initiative, referendum and recall under such restrictions as will secure calm consideration of measures submitted to the people,

TAXES AND MORTGAGES.

We demand that mortgages be given in to be assessed by the mortgagee and that the taxes on the holdings be reduced in that proportionate amount and that the mortgagor pay the tax and retain it from the interest when paid.

PRIMARY LAW.

We favor the repeal of the primary law.

BIBLE IN SCHOOLS.

We favor a law requiring daily Bible reading in all public schools.

CIVIL SERVICE.

We favor a comprehensive law for the employes of all state, county and municipal offices,

GOOD ROADS.

We favor good roads, and the application of all automobile license revenue for their construction and maintenance.

PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE PRIMARY,

By an act of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly it was provided that a primary election by all political parties should be held at the usual voting places of the several precincts, on the second Monday in April in the year 1916, and quadrennially thereafter, for the purpose of ascertaining the sentment of the voters of the state in the respective parties as to candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States. Election of delegates and

alternate delegates to the national conventions of the political parties at which candidates for President and Vice-President are to be nominated, for the election of a party national committeeman for each party, and for the election of delegates to county conventions which shall choose delegates to the state convention, is provided for at this primary. The act contained other provisions but the statute was repealed by the Thirty-seventh General Assembly.

PRIMARY ELECTION, JUNE 5, 1916.

Geo. C. White, Prog.

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several preclucts on the first Monday in June, in the year 1912 and biennially thereafter, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for Judge of the Supreme, District and Superior Courts, which shall be non-partisan), for senator in the

congress of the United States, and for the electors of the President and Vice-President of the United States in the years in which senators or president and vice-president are to be elected.

The Board of Supervisors of each county (acting as a County Board of Canvassers) meet on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvass the votes cast at the several precincts and make an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the Secretary of State for the following offices:

United States Senators.

Electors of the President and Vice-President of the United States.

All State Officers.

Representatives in Congress.

Senators and Representatives in the General Assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the Executive Council meets as a State Canvassing Board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvass, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the General Election.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1916.

AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION.

NOTE—There is, properly speaking, no popular vote for President and Vice-President; the people vote for electors, and those, chosen in each state meet therein and vote for the candidates for President and Vice-President. The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the Government, the State legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people therefore voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for president and vice-president in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

ELECTORAL VOTES.

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for President. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared President, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared Vice-President. The electoral votes for the first President of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntingdon, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President. 1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas

Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies 3. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

1796, John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Elisworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 2; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Meryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carlina, Federalist, 1 vote, John Henry Adams was chosen President and Thomas Jefferson Vice-President.

1800. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Finckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 voto. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the House of Representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which, being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him President. Burr received the votes of four States, which being the next largest vote, elected him Vice-President. There were 2 blank votes.

1804. The Constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a President and a Vice-President, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For President, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

1808. For President, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

1812. For President, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton of New York, Federalist, 89. For Vice President, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Gerry Vice-President.

1816. For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen President and Tompkins Vice-President.

1820. For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, Rapublican, 218; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen President and Daniel D. Tompkins Vice-President.
