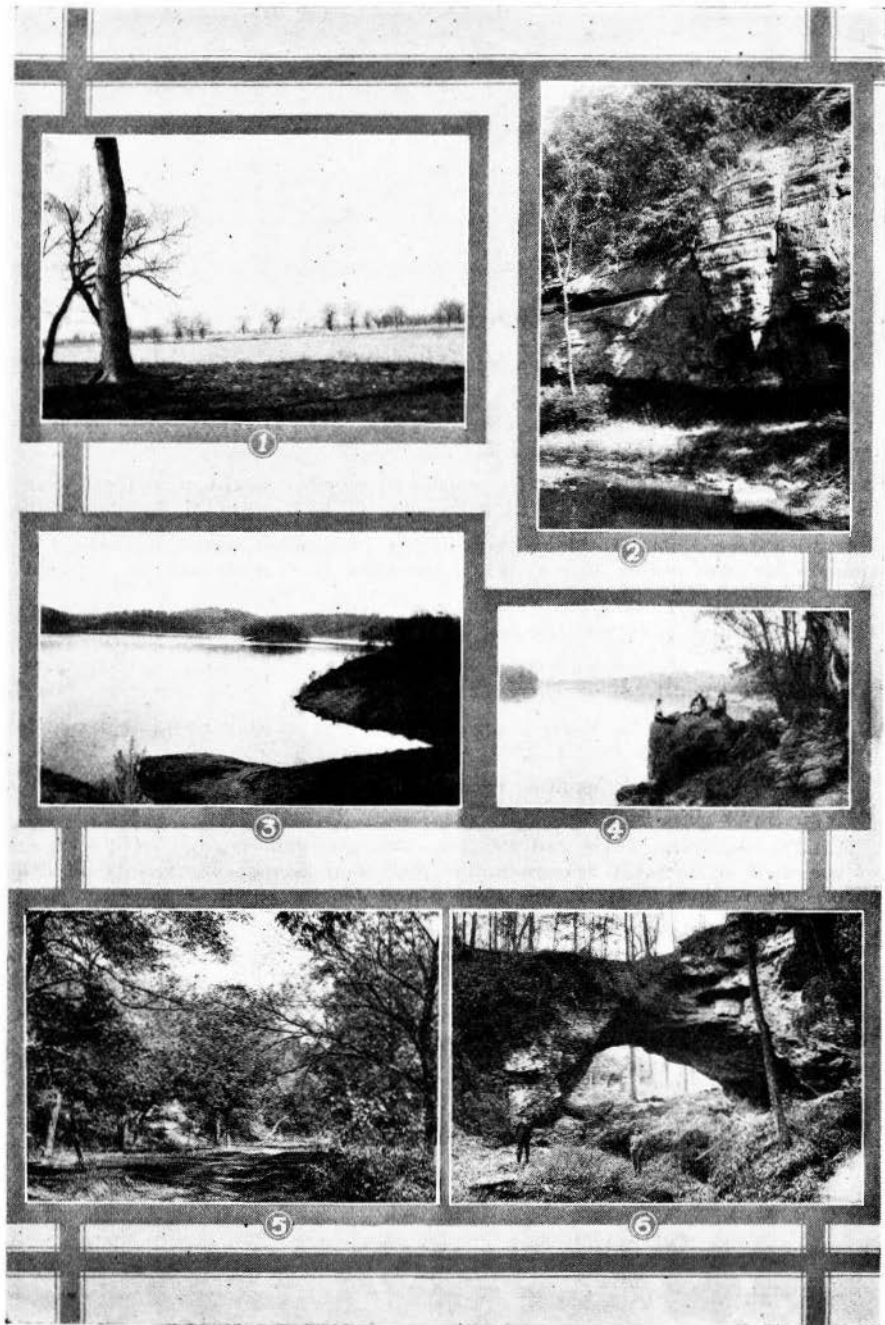

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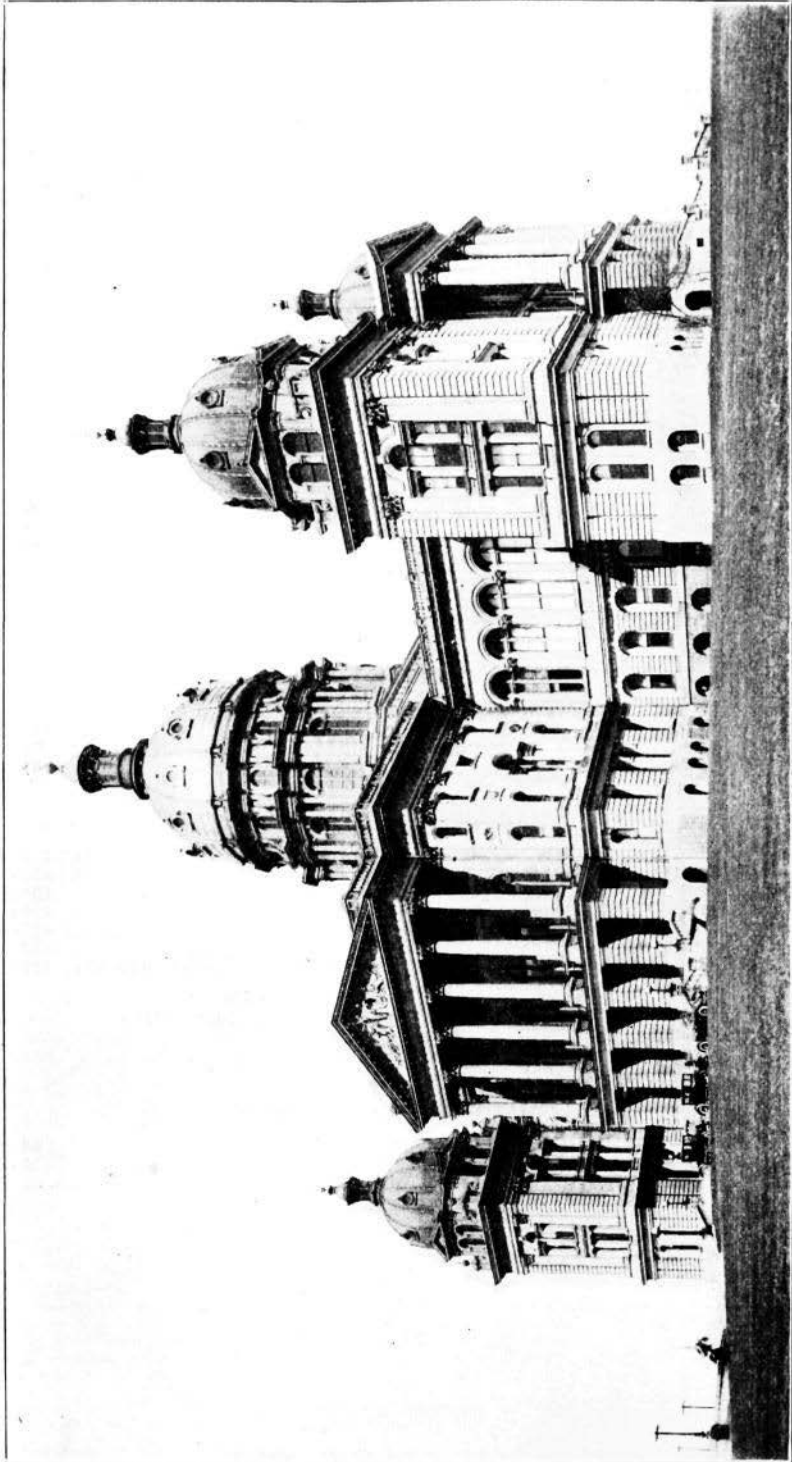

## DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In Congress, July 4, 1776.

### THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed July 4, 1776.)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such forms as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a desire to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the repository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining, in the meantime, exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation--

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislature, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely parallel in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow-citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress, in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We, must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and the right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

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[Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 11, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed Sept. 13, 1788.]

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

## ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)\* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]\*\* The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

\*The figures in brackets are inserted for convenience of reference; they are not in the original.

\*\*The foregoing clause included in brackets is amended by SEC. 2 of the 14th amendment.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

14th amendment, *post*.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of



the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate or house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States.

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting and securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post offices and post roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress.

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

Sec. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

Sec. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subjected to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

## ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term

of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, *post*.]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

#### ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity, arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

#### ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

#### ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

#### ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution of laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

#### ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the convention of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Proposed by congress, and ratified by the legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution. For dates of ratification see foot note.\*)

### ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or the press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

### ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

### ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

### ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probate cause, supported by oath or affirmation,

\*The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the states, except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed March 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 16, 1912, and was May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The eighteenth amendment was proposed December 17, 1917, and was proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on January 29, 1919, to have been duly ratified.

The nineteenth amendment was proposed June 5, 1919, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on August 26, 1920, to have been duly ratified.

and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

#### ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

#### ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

#### ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

#### ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

#### ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the state respectively, or to the people.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

#### ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the person having the highest number, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary

to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose, shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

#### ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within the jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in an insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

#### ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.



SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

#### ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by congress.

#### ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

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#### LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and vice president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president is elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

### Historical Review

The name "State of Iowa" is the result of some interesting changes in the governmental history of the territory bearing the name. It is often claimed that the word "Iowa" was taken from the name of a tribe of Indians who had been and were still dwelling in that part when the first white men came, the "Ioway Indians"; but, it is more probable that it has been named for the Ioway River. The country was first referred to as a district,—the "Iowa District," in 1836, while still a part of the Wisconsin Territory. Two years later it was organized as an independent territory, the "Territory of Iowa." When it was admitted to the Union in 1846, it became the "State of Iowa."

The Iowa territory, as part of the whole Mississippi Valley, was taken into formal possession by France in 1682, as a result of the explorations of the Frenchmen Marquette and Joliet in 1673, and Hennepin in 1680. In 1762 France ceded the western half of this valley, including Iowa, to Spain, who retroceded it to France in 1800. France ceded it to the United States in 1803, as a part of the Province of Louisiana.

Marquette and Joliet were the first explorers of the Iowa territory, going along the Iowa river as early as 1783. Beginning with the first year after its cession to the United States, explorers came quite frequently. The Lewis and Clark expedition went through western Iowa in 1804; Zebulon M. Pike explored the west bank of the Mississippi in 1805; and Albert M. Lea explored the eastern portion of the state in 1835.

Iowa government began with the Louisiana purchase in 1803. For two years it was under the government of the Indiana Territory, as a part of the District of Louisiana. In 1805 the District of Louisiana was organized as the Territory of Louisiana, and in 1812 the Territory of Louisiana was reorganized as the Territory of Missouri. In 1821, the State of Missouri, then a part of the Territory of Missouri, was admitted to the Union, thus leaving Iowa a part of the unorganized territory of the United States without a constitutional status, in which condition it remained until 1834. From 1834 to 1836 it was attached to the Michigan Territory. When the Wisconsin Territory was organized in 1836 it became a part thereof.

In 1838 the Independent Territory of Iowa was established, on the fourth day of July. It then included a large part of the present state of Minnesota, which remained as Iowa territory until 1849 when the Minnesota Territory was organized, at which time Iowa received its present boundaries.

The Territory of Iowa was the ancient abode of the Sac, Ioway, Dakota and Fox tribes of Indians, and did not have any permanent settlers until 1833. The Indians refused permission to white settlers to come in to mine and farm, and the United States troops protected their rights until 1832. The Black Hawk War resulted in letting white men in, for its conclusion in 1832 resulted in the cession of thousands of square miles of the eastern part of Iowa. During the next few years, practically the whole of the Iowa territory was secured from them through treaties.

The frontiersmen rushed in to farm and mine. The population increased very rapidly with the influx of prospectors and homeseekers from all parts of the Union. During the ten years from 1836 to 1846 the increase in inhabitants was from 10,531 to 102,388.

Government was established among the early settlers by voluntary associations. They selected their own homes and began improving them, building huts and clearing and breaking the ground. "Claim associations" and "land clubs" were formed for the protection of their claims to the land they worked. These organizations were the only government they had and their proceedings were later recognized by the United States government.

The Act of Congress of 1838, entitled "an act to divide the territory of Wisconsin and to establish the Territorial Government of Iowa" gave the Territory of Iowa its constitution. Until the formation of the State in 1846, this Constitution was its fundamental law.

Iowa having separated from Wisconsin in 1838 for the want of sufficient courts for judicial relief, the question of applying for admission into the Union as a state was recommended as early as 1839. The first recommendation brought no result, and in 1840 the question of calling a constitutional convention was voted on by the people. It was defeated by a large majority, as it was again in 1842 by those who most wished to avoid an increase in taxes. In 1844, however, the vote was in favor of a convention. Application for a state government was made. The question of boundaries, a result of the question of slavery, held back its admission as a state until 1846, when on the 28th day of December it was admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the thirteen original states. It was the sixteenth state so admitted.

The first constitutional convention was convened at Iowa City, October 7, 1844. The constitution adopted by this convention was twice voted on and each time defeated in the year 1845.

At a second constitutional convention at Iowa City, May 4, 1846, a constitution was adopted by the convention, which was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3rd day of August, 1846, there being 9,462 votes cast "for the constitution," and 9,036 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to Congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th day of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the Union.

A third constitutional convention was authorized by the people by a majority of over eighteen thousand, for the purpose of revising and amending the constitution. At the November election, 1856, delegates to the convention were elected; and the convention met at Iowa City in January, 1857. The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1857, there being 40,311 votes cast "for the constitution" and 38,681 votes cast "against the constitution" and took effect by proclamation of the governor September 3, 1857. A copy of this constitution, taken from the original records, is contained herein.

The constitution of Iowa has been amended eight times since its adoption, all of which amendments are contained herein.

## PREAMBLE.

We, the people of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river then up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, then down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

## ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law, or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.\*

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

## ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every white\*\* male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.†

## ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The session of the general assembly, shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of the respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November; and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.†

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county, or district he may have been chosen to represent.\*

SEC. 5.—Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6.—The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to re-consider it; if, after such re-consideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary; or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

- For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;
- For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
- For changing the names of persons;
- For the incorporation of cities and towns;
- For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
- For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm (as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thou-

sand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white inhabitants of the state.\*

Sec. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white inhabitants in each.†

Sec. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereinafter be formed.‡

Sec. 36. At its first sessions under this constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.§

Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Sec. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

#### ARTICLE IV.

##### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

Sec. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

Sec. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially and shall be called the great seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

#### ARTICLE V.—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time, they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts or any

change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.\*

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.†

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.‡

ARTICLE VI—MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.§

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: Provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted), shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.\*

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasions, suppress insurrection, or defend the state

in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

Sec. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

#### ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

Sec. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

Sec. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Sec. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

Sec. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

Sec. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

Sec. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional

stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

## ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS

### 1st. Education.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.



SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

*End. School Funds and School Lands.*

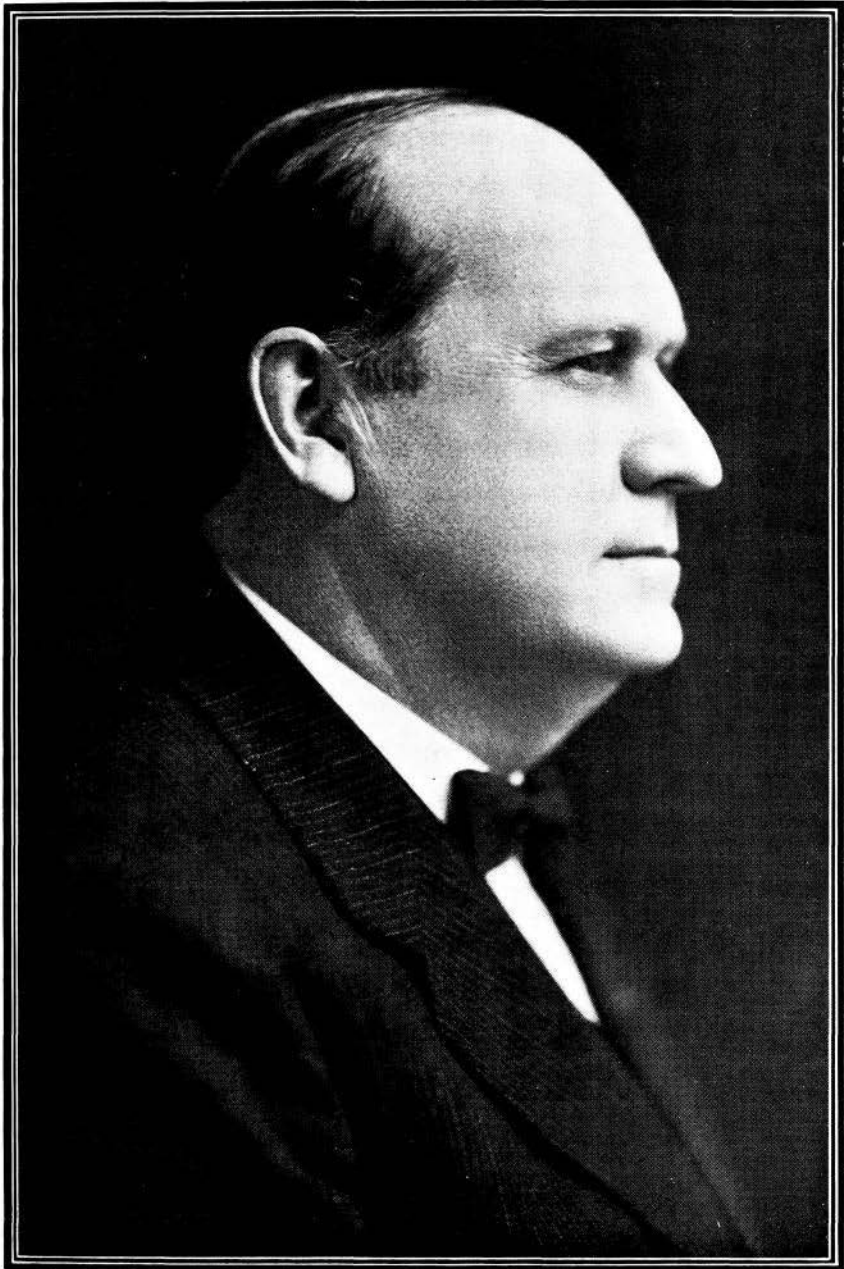
SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

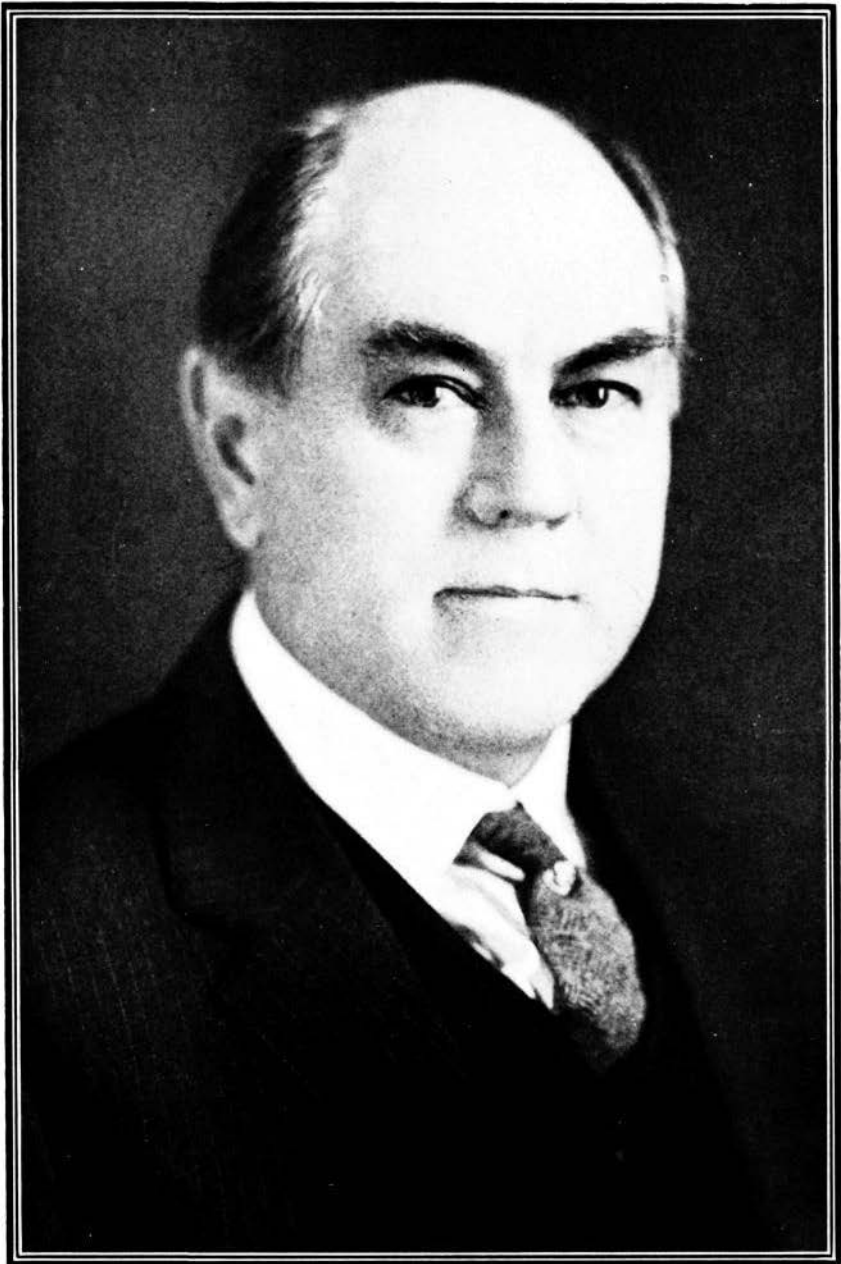
SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which said money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as



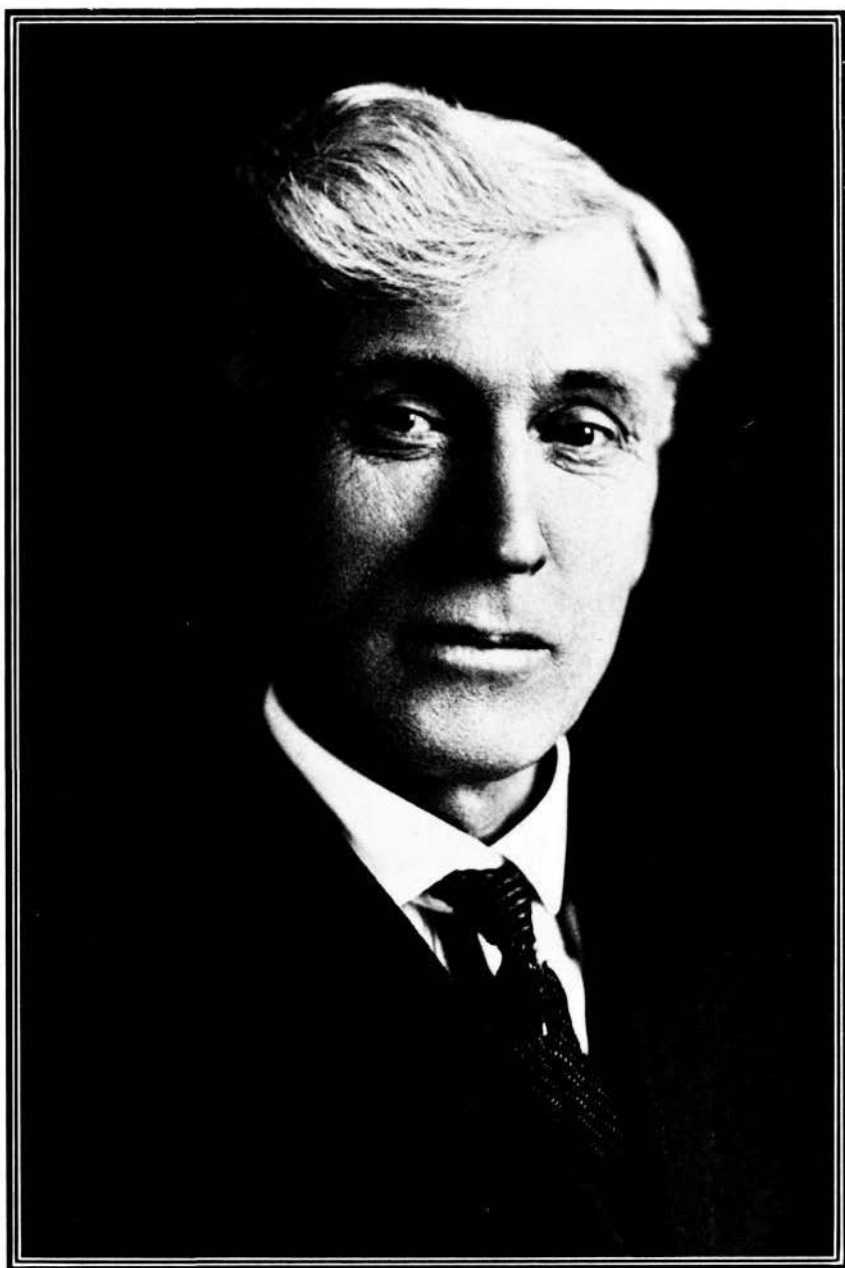

may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

#### ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

#### ARTICLE XI—MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupants, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

#### ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school funds, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under the constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the superintendent of public instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: *Provided*, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general election of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "White" from the article on the right of suffrage shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.\*

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

#### PROCLAMATION

Whereas an instrument known as the "New Constitution of the State of Iowa" adopted by the constitutional convention of said state on the fifth day of March, A. D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said state at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August, 1857, for their approval or rejection.

And whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said constitution and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and eighty-one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, JAMES W. GRIMES, Governor of said state, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said new constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the state of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Iowa.

Done at Iowa City this third day of September A. D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty-second and of the state of Iowa the eleventh.

#### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

from 1857 to 1919

##### AMENDMENTS OF 1868

1.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article II.

2.

Strike the word "white" from section 33 of article III.

3.

Strike the word "white" from section 34 of article III.

4.

Strike the word "white" from section 35 of article III.

5.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article VI.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1866; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1868; ratified at the election of November 3, 1868, and proclaimed adopted on December 8, 1868.

Sections 34 and 35 have been amended twice. The present amendment was adopted in 1904.

##### AMENDMENT OF 1880

1.

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1878; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1880; ratified at the election of November 2, 1880, and proclaimed adopted on December 3, 1880.

## AMENDMENT OF 1882.

## 1.

Add to section 26, to article I of the constitution, the following: No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1880; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1882, and ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882, and certified adopted on July 28, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the supreme court in Koehler and Lang v. Hill, 60 Iowa 543, held that owing to certain irregularities the amendment was not legally submitted to the electors, and thence did not become a part of the constitution.

## AMENDMENT OF 1884.

## 1.

The general election for state, district, county and township offices, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

## 2.

At any regular session of the general assembly the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of the said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

## 3.

The grand jury may consist of any number of members, not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

## 4.

That section 13 of article V of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

Section 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1882; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1884; ratified at the election of November 4, 1884, and certified adopted on December 10, 1884.

## AMENDMENTS OF 1904.

## 1.

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, a lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators

whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

## 2.

That section thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as herein before required.

NOTE.—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1902; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1904; ratified at the general election of November 3, 1904, and certified adopted on November 29, 1904. Section 16 is a new section.

## AMENDMENT OF 1908.

Add to section 18 of article I of the constitution the following: The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1906; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1907; ratified at the election of November 3, 1908, and certified adopted on November 23, 1908.

## AMENDMENTS OF 1916.

Repeal section 7, article II and enact in lieu thereof the following:

SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915, and ratified on November 7, 1916.

AMENDMENT OF 1917.

That the following amendment to article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be and the same is hereby proposed: To add thereto following section twenty-six (26) thereof and as section twenty-seven (27) of article one (1) of said constitution the following, to-wit:

Sec. 27. The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale, as a beverage, of intoxicating liquors, including ale, wine and beer, shall be forever prohibited within this state. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE.—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1915; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1917; defeated at the special election October 15, 1917.

Yes: 214,693; no, 215,625—932.

AMENDMENT PROPOSED 1919.

1.

Joint resolution proposing that section 1 of article II of the constitution be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one (21) years, who shall have been a resident of this state six (6) months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he or she claims his or her vote, sixty (60) days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Resolved further, that the foregoing proposed amendment be, and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the day of said election as provided by law.

NOTE.—The general assembly was convened in special session on July 2, 1919, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Federal amendment ratified on said date which made further action on the "Amendment Proposed 1919" unnecessary.

At the general election on the second day of November, 1920, in pursuance of the law as found in section 1061 of the code and in article X, section 3 of the constitution of Iowa, there was submitted to the electors the following question: "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?"

Yes: 279,652; no: 221,763—57,889.

Thirty-ninth general assembly failed to provide for constitutional convention.

NOTE.—This amendment in substantially this form was proposed by the general assembly 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915; but was not adopted by the people. It was again proposed by the general assembly of 1917, but was not published as provided by Sec. 1 of Art. X of the constitution and sec. 55 of the code of Iowa, which caused its second defeat. The present amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1919.

The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1846, there being 9,492 votes cast "for the constitution" and 9,036 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the union. The first election for state officers was held on the 26th day of October, 1846, pursuant to proclamation of Gov. James Clarke, when Ansel Briggs was elected governor; Elisha Cutler, Jr., secretary of state; Joseph T. Fales, auditor, and Morgan Reno, treasurer.

age before the Legislature convened December 2nd. He voted with the Democratic party for William F. Coolbaugh for United States Senator against James Harlan. He became Captain of a company raised in Page County, Iowa, May, 1861, which became a part of the First Nebraska Regiment. Later he became Colonel of the Thirteenth Kansas Regiment, which regiment he raised. He was breveted Brigadier-General in 1864. He was a delegate to the National Convention in Baltimore from the State of Kansas which renominated Lincoln. After the war he became a resident of Arkansas and was president of the Constitutional Convention and later a Judge of the Supreme Court. He was appointed by President Grant, Governor of the Territory of Idaho. He later moved to Colorado where he was chosen a district judge, a member of the state legislature and was elected and served as United States Senator from 1883 to 1889. He died at Pueblo, December 30, 1906.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$6,200 and an allowance of \$600 for house rent.

No person shall be eligible who shall not have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

#### LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

*Term of incumbent ends January, 1927.*

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state. He is elected by the people for a term of two years, and receives a salary of \$4,000 a year. He is ex officio a member of the executive council. He is also ex officio a member of the board of trustees of the state library and the historical department of Iowa, of the state board of health, and of the state printing board.

\*Additional employes of the motor vehicle department to the number of 30 to 35 are regularly employed at from \$85 to \$100 a month.

The secretary of state countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor, and keeps a record thereof in the executive register.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and the laws of the state, the authenticated copies of the journals of the senate and house of the general assemblies, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. He prepares for publication certain laws and resolutions passed by the general assembly.

Certificates of nomination and all papers and records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office.

All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the consolidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are transmitted to him and preserved as a part of the permanent records of his office.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations, as well as all amendments thereto, are filed and recorded in his office, and certificates of authority to transact business within the state of Iowa are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey, and other papers and documents of the state land office, are in his custody. Patents for school, university, agricultural college, railroad, swamp and other lands, are prepared in the land office, and, when signed by the governor, are countersigned by the secretary of state and recorded in the patent record books in the land department. He makes a biennial report to the governor of the transactions of this department.

Iowa corporations organized for pecuniary profit, and all foreign corporations authorized to do business in this state, are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay him an annual fee of one dollar each. The secretary of state is required to send, during May and June of each year, to each corporation of record in his office, a notice, advising as to the provisions of the law, and a blank for use of the corporation in making report. On receipt of annual report and fee, the secretary of state is required to issue to the corporation an annual permit.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state is required to be made of all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization, its agents or representatives may lawfully solicit public donations in any county, city, or township in Iowa except within the county or adjoining counties in which such association or institution is located.

An important branch of the work in the office of the secretary of state is that relating to the administration of the so-called Blue Sky Law, the same being an act passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

A record of the registration of motor vehicles is also kept by him, his office being a clearing house for the motor vehicle registration in each of the ninety-nine counties of the state.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheat estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of companies

selling bonds on the installment plan, and building and loan associations; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, is a member of the state printing board, the geological board, the bonus board, and ex officio member of the state board of health. He is also ex officio secretary of the state board of audit.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the date received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the auditor of state. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasurer until the depository receiving the deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof.

All county recorders and superintendents of schools are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month all state moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. All county treasurers are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month for the per capita costs of patients maintained in the various state institutions and who are residents of their counties, as certified to him by the county auditor, and to report to the treasurer at the same time the collection during the preceding month of taxes belonging to the state. The law provides that when the cash balance of general revenue funds in the state treasury is reduced below \$2,000,000.00 the treasurer of state may draw upon each county treasurer in proportion to the amount in his possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to increase said cash balance to an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00. The same provision governs the primary road fund except that the minimum is \$100,000.00 and the maximum \$500,000.00. The soldiers' bonus tax fund, collected by county treasurers, is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay the interest and bonds as due.

All elective and appointive state officers, boards, commissions, and departments, except the state fair board, the state board of education, and the board of control of state institutions, are required to within ten days succeeding the collection thereof, deposit with the treasurer of state 90% of all fees, commissions and moneys collected or received, the balance actually collected in cash, remaining in the hands of any officer, board or department cannot exceed the sum of \$5,000.00 and no money collected is authorized to be held more than 30 days. Each deposit must be accompanied by an itemized statement of the sources from which the money was collected and showing the funds to be credited.

The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits to be fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest on daily balances at the rate of 2½% at such times as may be agreed upon by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the auditor of state. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. During the last biennial period the disbursements amounted to \$59,179,297.71 and the receipts were \$61,131,278.03.

An act of the forty-first general assembly requires the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of two cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state for any purpose whatsoever. Provision is made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline is used for certain purposes. One-third of the fees collected is distributed to the primary road fund, one-third to county road funds and one-third to township road funds.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the state agricultural college. This fund amounts to about \$680,000.00 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. The interest only may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The accounts of the department are inspected quarterly under the direction of the governor.

The treasurer also handles funds which may be diverted under the public funds deposit guaranty act of the forty-first general assembly for covering losses of public funds deposited in any bank which may be placed in the hands of a receiver for liquidation.

The state board of audit consists of the auditor of state, the attorney general or one of his legal assistants, and the director of the budget.

This board audits all claims against the state except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the board of control and the board of education.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine: that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessarily devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof.

The Auditor of State and the Director of the Budget are ex-officio members of this board. The third member is designated by the attorney general from among his assistants.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, ex-officio a member of the state printing board, and chief of the bureau of investigation.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board, and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. The supreme court may appoint temporary examiners to serve for one examination.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that involved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant fails to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such failure. Examination fee, \$5; certificate fee, \$1.

The fortieth general assembly passed an act consolidating into one department, to be known as the state department of agriculture, the following administrative agencies of state and the laws governing same, to wit:

1. The former department of agriculture with all its statutory activities and duties, except such as relate to the state fair.
2. The dairy and food department and all the administrative agencies connected therewith.
3. The animal health commission and veterinary department and all their administrative agencies.
4. The petroleum inspection service and hotel license and inspection, and all matters pertaining thereto.
5. State horticultural society.
6. Iowa corn and small grain growers' association.
7. Iowa beef and cattle producers' association.
8. Iowa state dairy association.
9. The state weather and crop service.
10. Iowa state poultry association.

Also the office of secretary of agriculture was created, whose duties are in addition to any other duty which may be prescribed by law:

1. To encourage, promote and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool, and other kindred and allied industries.
2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.
3. To compile statistics and information, in co-operation with the federal government, relative to crop production, farm economics, the production and marketing of beef, pork, mutton, wool, poultry, milk, butter, cheese and all other agricultural products, insofar as such statistical information may be deemed of value to agriculture and its allied interests in the state, which statistics, when published, shall constitute the official agricultural statistics of the state.
4. To co-operate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in all ways that may be beneficial to the agricultural interests of the state.
5. To include in his compilation and publication, the reports of agriculture, horticultural, live stock associations and other like associations or societies organized for the promotion of the agricultural interests of the state.

*The work of the Department of Public Instruction.* The duties of the superintendent of public instruction may be classified as educational, quasi-judicial, and ex-officio.

*Educational.* Among the duties of an educational nature may be named her general supervision over the county superintendents of the state, which necessitates her meeting with these officers at least twice each year, and the publication of numerous circulars of instruction and suggestion. She is at the head of the public school system of Iowa, and her duties as such leader are to appoint institutes, and approve institute faculties. She is required by law to promote among the people of the state a proper interest in the general subject of education, including industrial and commercial education, agriculture, manual and vocational training, domestic science and continuation work. Also to classify and define various public schools belonging to her department, and to formulate suitable courses of study therefor, and to publish and distribute such classifications and courses of study. It is also her duty to collect statistics, and report on education, and educational questions, and the condition of the public schools of the state, and to publish them in reports and pamphlets. Among the publications that have become a part of the educational needs of the state and are of national note may be named: The Manual of Methods for the Elementary Schools of Iowa, Special Day Book, Educational Directory, Proceedings of the Iowa State Teachers' Association, Standards for Approved Graded and High Schools, Reference Books for the Approved High Schools of Iowa, Outlines in Agriculture, Domestic Science and Manual Training, Outlines of Psychology and School Management, Outline of Music for Normal Training High Schools and Normal Training Courses in Four Year High Schools, and Iowa Day. Many others of minor importance on various subjects are published.

In order to aid her in organizing and classifying the public schools of the state, the superintendent of public instruction is permitted by law to appoint one normal training inspector, two graded and high school inspectors, and one inspector of rural and consolidated schools. She is also empowered to distribute to the normal training schools and the consolidated schools certain aid which is set aside for these schools under certain conditions. It is her duty to pass upon them finally, and to determine what schools shall receive state aid.

For the purpose of increasing the facilities for training teachers for the rural schools by requiring a review of such common branches as may be deemed essential by the superintendent of public instruction, and for instruc-

tions in elementary pedagogy, and the art of teaching elementary agriculture and home economics, provision is made for normal courses of study and training in such approved four-year high schools as the superintendent of public instruction may designate.

She reports biennially to the governor on the conditions of the public schools of the state, and makes suggestions and recommendations as investigation and experience dictate.

*Judicial.* The quasi-judicial duties of the superintendent of public instruction include the hearing of appeals from the decisions of county superintendents, the rendering of opinions, in writing, when requested by school officials (but in fact opinions are rendered to all who request them) and publication of the school laws and notes on the same, and pamphlets containing session laws.

*Ex-officio duties.* The superintendent of public instruction is ex-officio member of the Iowa library commission, president of the educational council, president of the educational board of examiners and president of state board of vocational education.

As executive of the educational board of examiners, a great amount of responsibility is incurred since all licenses to teach are issued under authority of this board, and the work is conducted under her personal supervision.

The board of educational examiners consists of four members *ex-officio* and three members appointed by the governor for a term of four years. Of the appointive members, one must be a woman and one a representative of the privately endowed colleges of the state maintaining teachers' training courses. The nineteenth general assembly created the board of educational examiners by legislative enactment which went into effect March 24, 1882. The board originally consisted of five members. The thirty-seventh general assembly added the president of Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts to the members *ex-officio*; the thirty-ninth general assembly added the representative of privately endowed colleges.

A board for the examination of teachers was created December 20, 1861, composed of the members of the faculty of the state university. Of this board the professor of the normal department of the state university and the secretary of the board of trustees were *ex-officio* chairman and secretary. It issued life certificates to graduates of the normal department of the state university and to holders of first grade state certificates of other states without examination; it also issued certificates upon examination. This board was abolished by the adoption of the code of 1873. The certificates issued by it are still valid licenses for teaching in the public schools of the state.



The statute provides that the board of educational examiners shall meet at such times and places as the president shall direct. It is the practice to have five meetings a year.

All teachers' certificates are issued by the board of educational examiners. There are three series of certificates, viz., (1) state diplomas and state certificates, (2) high school normal training certificates, (3) uniform county certificates.

State certificates are issued upon (1) graduation from accredited Iowa colleges; (2) graduation from colleges and normal schools of other states which meet the Iowa standard; provided the applicants file proofs of two years' successful teaching; (3) state certificates of other states which meet the Iowa standard; (4) examination. The state diploma is issued only upon examination.

High school normal training certificates are issued upon graduation from approved normal training high schools and examination.

Uniform county certificates are issued only upon examination.

The board of educational examiners makes regulations for the granting of certificates to graduates of the regular and collegiate courses of the state university, the state teachers' college, and the state college of agriculture and mechanic arts, and determines what other colleges and normal schools are entitled to like recognition.

The statute makes it a duty of the board of educational examiners to prepare and publish a list of books suitable for rural school libraries, from which list the library committee of all rural schools must make selection when purchasing books for their libraries.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associates on deposit in this department on January 1, 1925, was \$204,554,372.65.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies may be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The office of director of the budget was created by the fortieth general assembly, extra session, effective May 2, 1924. The director of the budget is appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate. Under the act a temporary appointment was made to serve until July 1, 1927, after which time the term of office will be for six years.

The law provides for a state budget, for the examination, by the budget director, of the accounts of departments of state, for a review of public contracts and bond issues in certain cases, and for local budgets. The director is authorized to prescribe methods for enforcing and carrying out all of the provisions of the law, and to conduct hearings on all matters within his jurisdiction and render decisions thereon.

The first budget report to be prepared under the law was submitted to the governor and forty-first general assembly in January, 1925.

The budget report sets out in detail the actual expenditures for the preceding two bienniums, the estimated expenditures at the close of the biennium, the departmental askings for the succeeding two years and the budget director's estimates for the same period together with the governor's approval.

There is also submitted a state appropriation bill.

The director is a member of the state board of audit whose duty it is to audit claims for money due from the state.

The law further provides for an appeal board which shall consist of the director and two additional members. The two members to serve with the director are appointed by the governor in the same manner required for the appointment of the director and the term of office is four years. The director is chairman of the board. The board considers and determines appeals from the action of the state board of education, the state board of control and the state fair board, in respect to letting of contracts for buildings or other improvements in which the amount involved is in excess of \$25,000.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking, and their salaries are fixed by him within certain limits prescribed by law. One examiner to each one hundred banks or major fraction thereof and one clerk to each two hundred banks or major fraction are allowed by law. Additional examiners and office help may be employed and increases in salaries made with the approval of the executive council. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is ex-officio a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws. There are four other members, appointive by the governor, with compensation of \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in the state's business.

The reporter's duties are:

1. To submit such recommendations as he deems proper to each general assembly for the purpose of amending, revising, and codifying such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous, and to lay said recommendations before the presiding officers of each house.

2. To edit and compile the code after each even-numbered session of the general assembly so that the same may be printed as herein provided.

3. To edit and prepare for publication a series of annotations of the statutes of Iowa containing annotations of all such statutes as have been construed by the supreme court of this state or the federal courts, and cause the same to be printed in separate volumes arranged in the same manner as the titles, chapters, and sections of the code.

4. To prepare and cause to be published immediately following the issuance of the code in 1927, and every four years thereafter, a volume which shall by proper annotations show the construction placed by the supreme court of this state and the federal courts on all statutes of this state since the then existing permanent volume of annotations. The edition of 1931 and all subsequent volumes shall constitute a cumulation of the edition of 1927 and shall be so continued until said cumulation shall reach a size sufficient for a permanent volume.

5. To promptly prepare syllabi for all opinions of the supreme court and an index and proper tables for each volume of the reports.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under

terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used, consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised

the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

#### DUTIES OF COMMERCE COUNSEL

The legal advisor of the board of railroad commissioners. To investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to the board of railroad commissioners, prosecute the same before said board, or to any court to which same may be taken. To investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present the same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to the final determination. To act as attorney for and represent the board of railroad commissioners in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to the proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs; the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the assessment of railway, express, sleeping and equipment car, telegraph and telephone properties; the classification of railways; the making of tax levies for state purposes and the certification of the same to the several county auditors; the certification of tax valuations, fixed by the executive council, to the several county auditors; the adjustment of property valuations between counties; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the compilation of a state census once in ten years; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the compilation and publication of annual reports of (a) railway, express, sleeping and equipment car assessments and (b) telegraph and telephone assessments; the determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money; the making of annual settlement with all state

officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code 1913; the assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; to dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses; to approve rules for uniformity of assessments in counties; to approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; the development of the capitol grounds extension. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the board of conservation and of the board of engineering examiners.

## CUSTODIAN

The thirty-ninth general assembly adopted an act providing that the executive council shall appoint a custodian of public buildings and grounds, but failed to provide for compensation. In this situation the council designated its secretary for the place without additional pay. The forty-first general assembly made provision for an annual salary of \$2,700 beginning July 1, 1925.

This department was established in 1913 by legislative act. It has jurisdiction in the matter of adjusting claims for personal injury arising out of and occurring in course of employment where the same is not agricultural, clerical, domestic or casual. The deputy commissioner is invested with full authority of administration. In case of controversy arbitration may occur, each party in interest appointing an arbitrator, the commissioner or deputy acting as chairman of the board. This decision is subject to review by the industrial commissioner and the review decision may be appealed to the district and the supreme courts. Employers not under insurance are definitely excluded from the provisions of the act. With the approval of the insurance and industrial commissioners employers may be authorized to carry their own risks upon satisfactory financial showing.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff and acting quartermaster general, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of major, and twelve aids who have the rank of lieutenant colonel, except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the twelve aids may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aid in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and his duties. He holds office for a period of four years, first period starting July 4, 1915, and also performs the duty of quartermaster general in addition to his duties as adjutant general. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes and receives and issues all quartermaster and ordnance stores and camp

equippage upon the order of the commander-in-chief. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the organized militia are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil and Spanish-American wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the organized militia and as acting quartermaster general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the militia, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the organized militia of the state as the secretary of war may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing its organized militia or by orders and regulations.

In addition to the duties above defined, the adjutant general also has the direction of the compilation of the roster for soldiers, sailors and marines in the Mexican border service of 1916-1917, and the World's war, 1917, 1918 and 1919, and other historical data in connection with the World's war. The thirty-eighth general assembly in passing H. F. 362, provided for a commission to be known as the "War Roster Commission" to consist of the governor as chairman, and the adjutant general as member and disbursing officer. The thirty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$20,000.00 for the estimated work, but it was found necessary to request the thirty-ninth general assembly to appropriate \$15,000.00 additional. The adjutant general, under the provisions of the bonus law, becomes a member of the bonus board, consisting of the state auditor, the state treasurer, the adjutant general, and the adjutant of the Iowa department of the American Legion.

The adjutant general is chairman of the armory board appointed by the governor to fix the armory and other allowances for the national guard units with the state. This board is composed of the following named officers:

All members of the board, with the exception of the adjutant general, are allowed for each authorized meeting, the pay of their grade and transportation.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed; thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown; Soldiers' Orphans Home at Davenport; Institution for Feeble Minded Children at Glenwood; State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale; Training School for Boys at Eldora; Training School for Girls at Mitchellville; Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant; Independence State Hospital at Independence; Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda; Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee; Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mount Pleasant; State Penitentiary at Fort Madison; Men's Reformatory at Anamosa; Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City; Hospital for Epileptics and School for Feeble-minded at Woodward; Juvenile Home, Toledo; Hospital for Male Inebriates at Independence.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners cease to exist.

The board publishes quarterly a bulletin, devoted to the scientific investigation of the treatment of insanity and epilepsy and the feeble-minded, and information embodying the experience of soldiers' homes, charitable, reformatory and penal institutions in this and other counties.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital once each month. It is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to appoint a state architect and perform other duties provided by law.

#### IOWA SOLDIERS' HOME—MARSHALLTOWN

The United States government pays to the state of Iowa the sum of \$120 per year for each male inmate of the soldiers' home who served in any war in which the United States was engaged, which amount is used as a part of the support fund of the institution. Persons who have sufficient means for their own support may be admitted to the home on payment of the cost of their support, if there be room, but pension money received by any member of the home from the United States government may not be taken from him for his support in the home. The regular appropriation by the state is \$28 per month for each member, and \$15 per month for each officer and employe not a member of the home.

#### IOWA SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME—DAVENPORT

There is in connection with this institution a school building. A kindergarten is operated for young pupils. The age limit beyond which children are not kept in the home is sixteen years. Fewer than 20 per cent remain to the age limit. A library of well selected juvenile literature is maintained. Much of the clothing of the children is manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food and a reasonable amount of luxuries. The home is supported by a regular appropriation of \$25 per month for each child and the actual transportation charges of children to and from the institution. Each county is liable to the state for the support of its children to the extent of \$12.50 per month, except soldiers' orphans, who are cared for at the expense of the state.

#### INSTITUTION FOR FEEBLE-MINDED CHILDREN—GLENWOOD

There is a regular appropriation for this institution of \$21 per month for each inmate. The purpose or objects of this institution are to provide special methods of training for the class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for

children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as nearly as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their simple wants.

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#### TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS—ELDORA

There is appropriated for the support of these schools the sum of \$24.00 monthly for each inmate at Eldora and Mitchellville.

The object of the institutions is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. They are not prisons but compulsory educational institutions where wayward boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life and where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

Any boy or girl over ten and under eighteen years of age, excepting married women, prostitutes, or any girl who is pregnant, found guilty in any court of record of any crime excepting that of murder, may be ordered committed, if a boy to the school at Eldora, and if a girl to the school at Mitchellville. Any boy or girl may be discharged, or paroled from the school, at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence or reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

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#### MT. PLEASANT STATE HOSPITAL

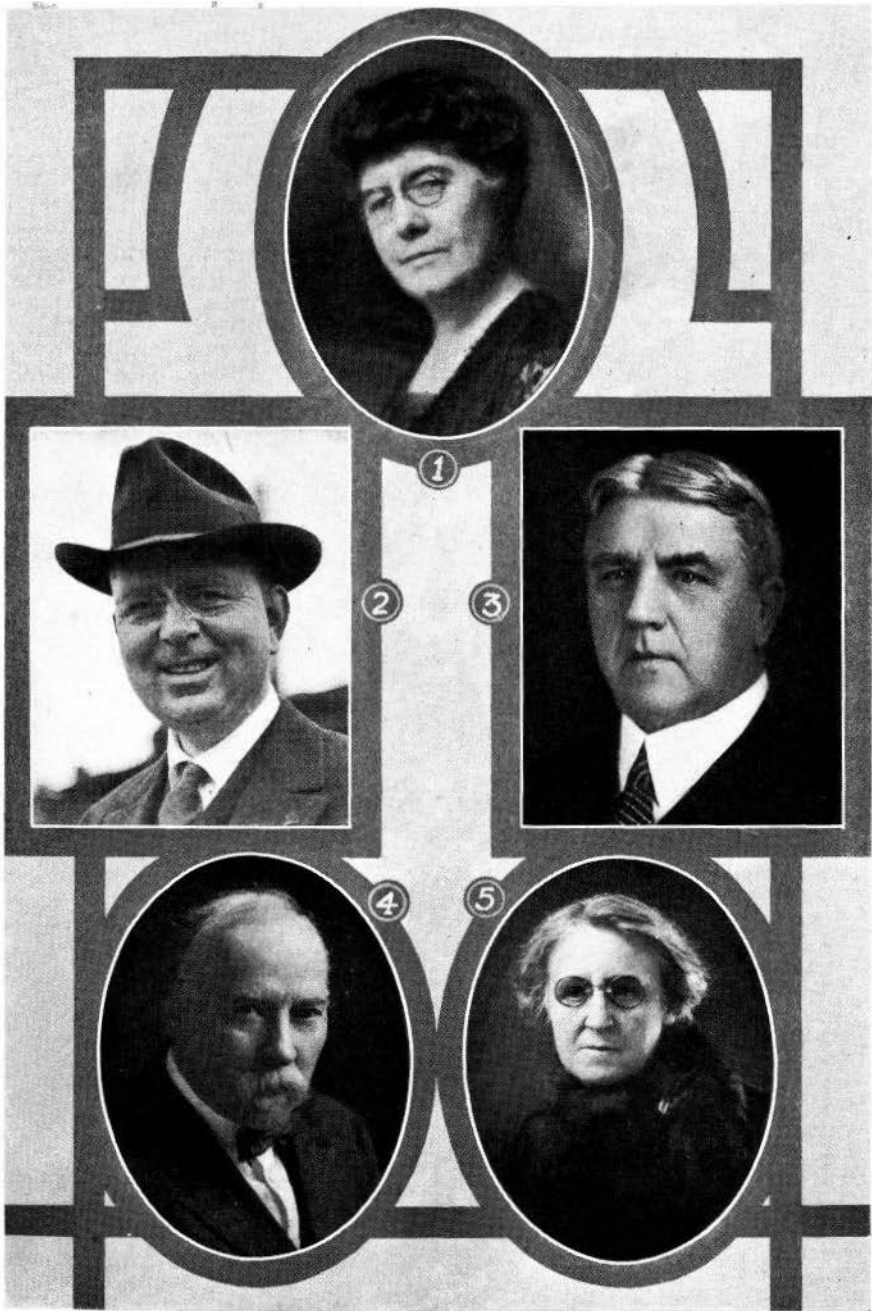

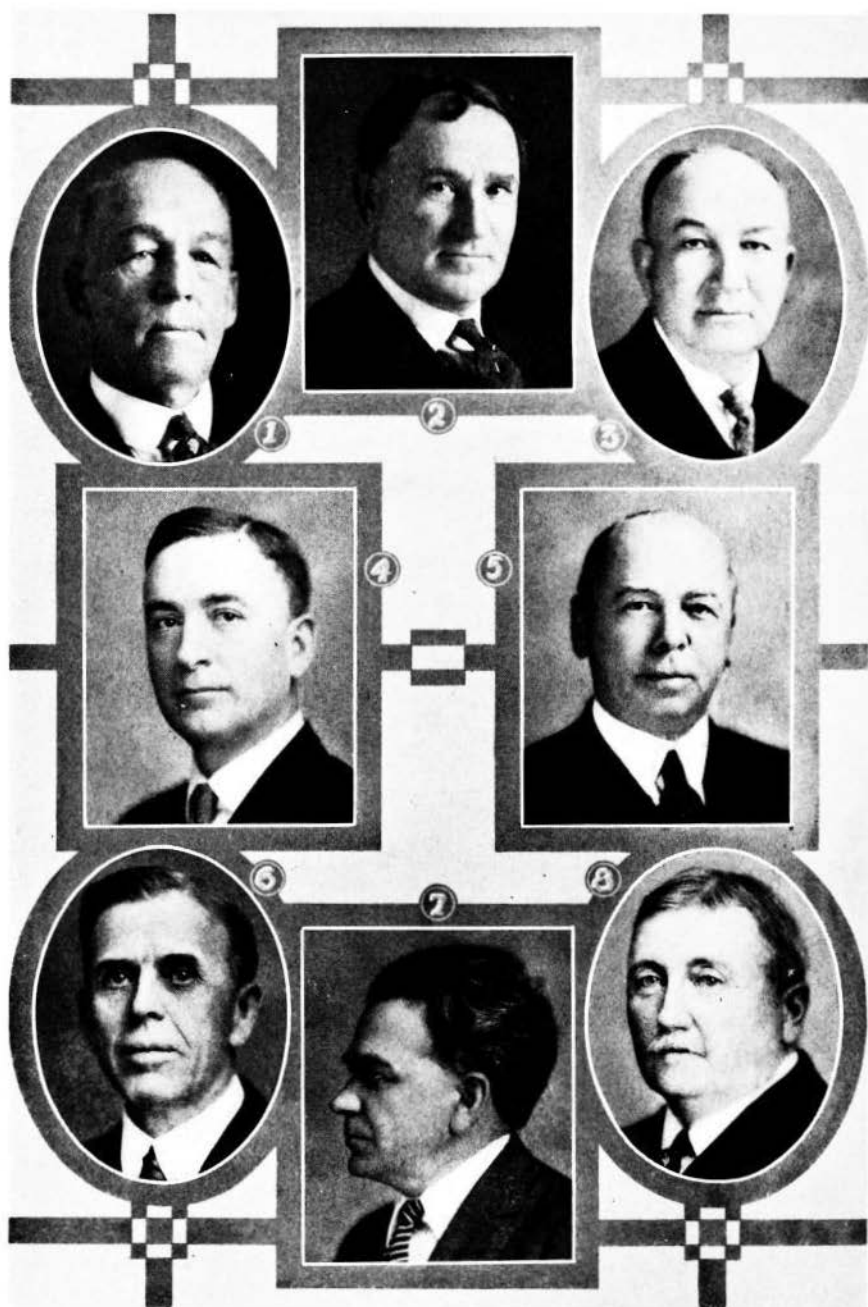

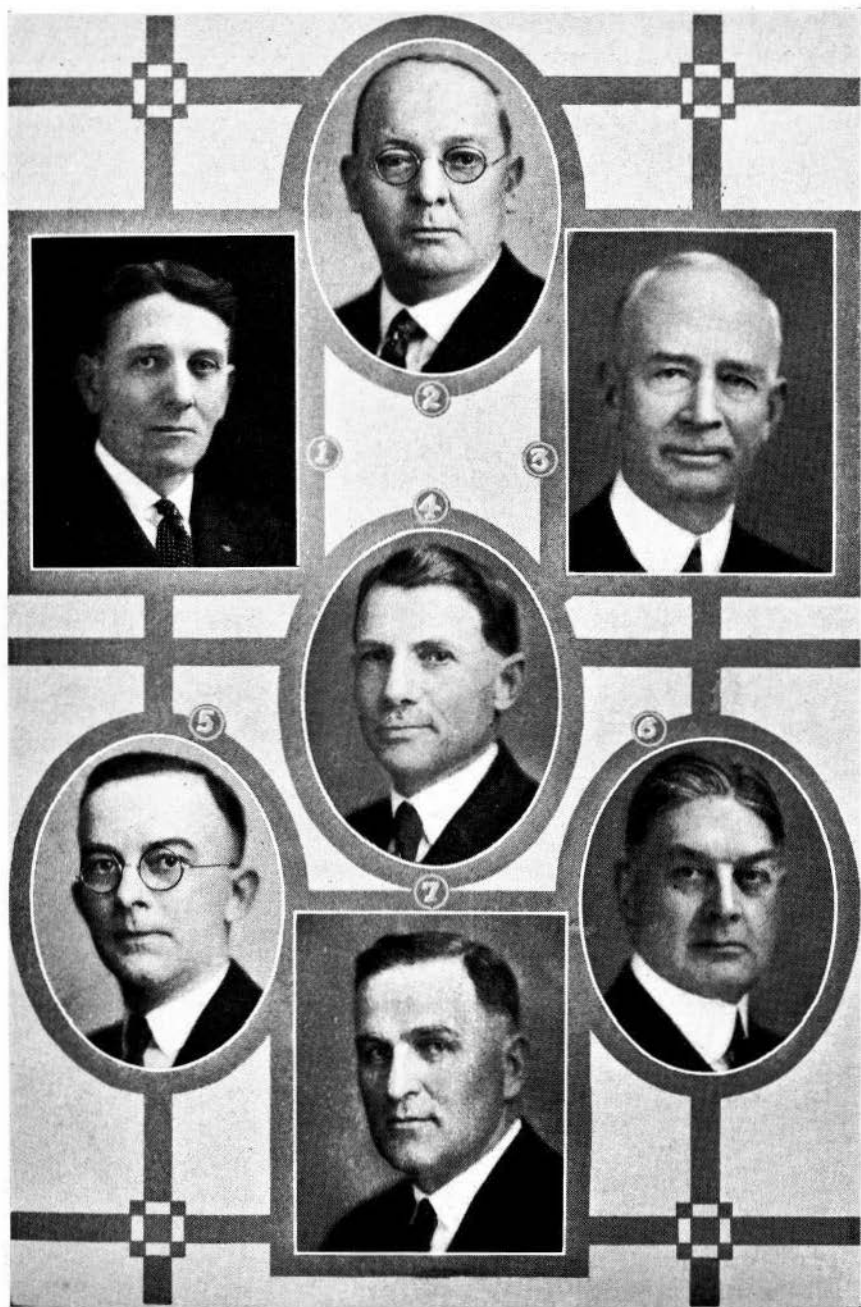
BOARD OF CONSERVATION

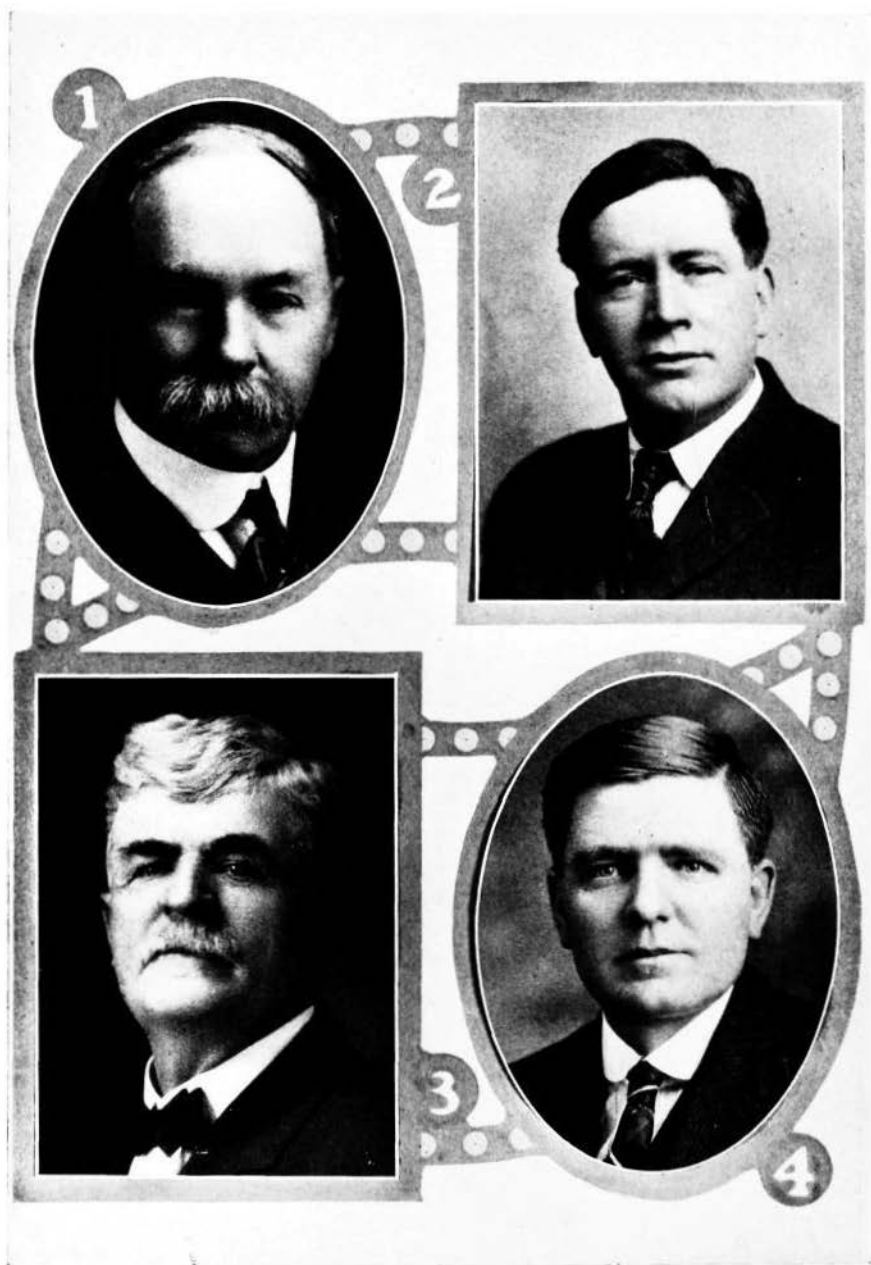

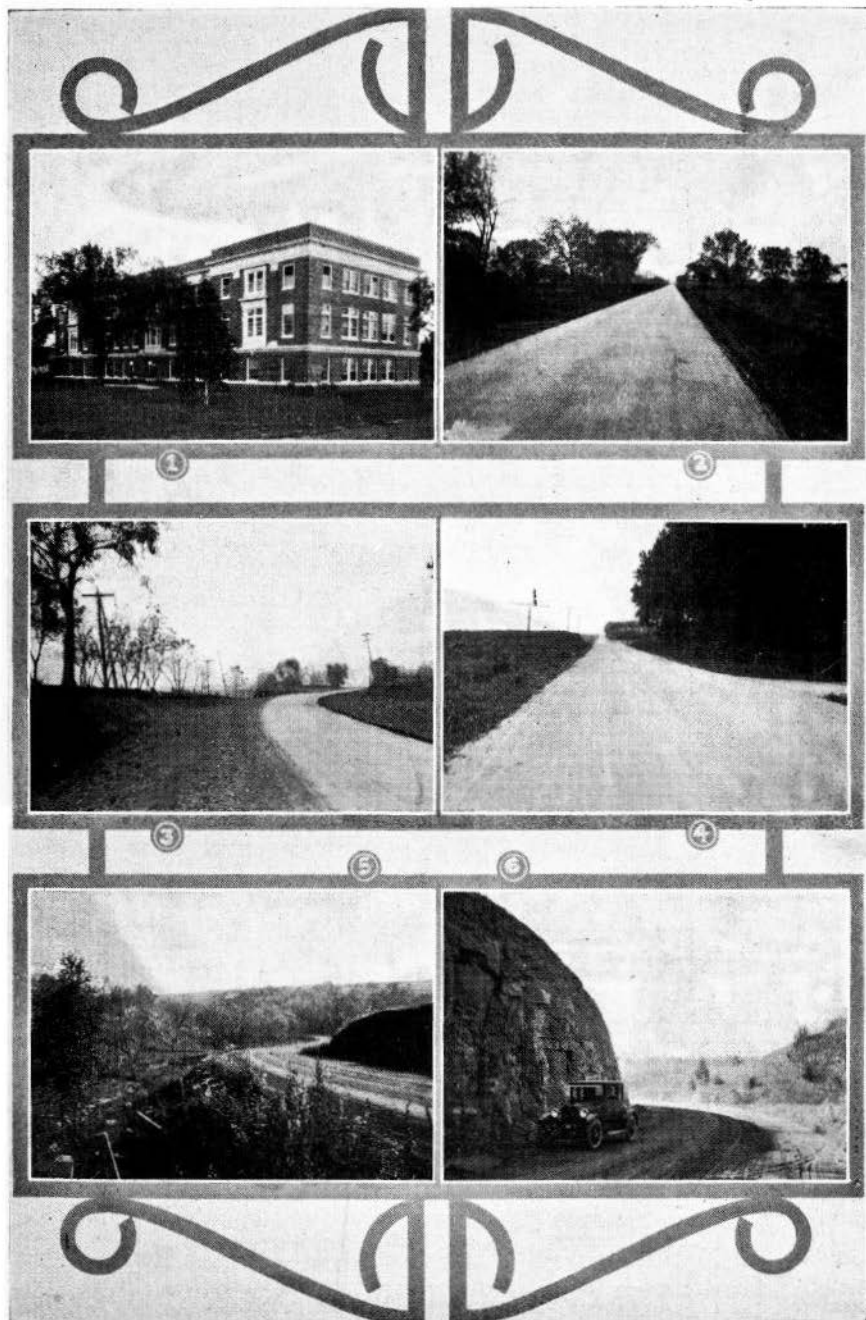

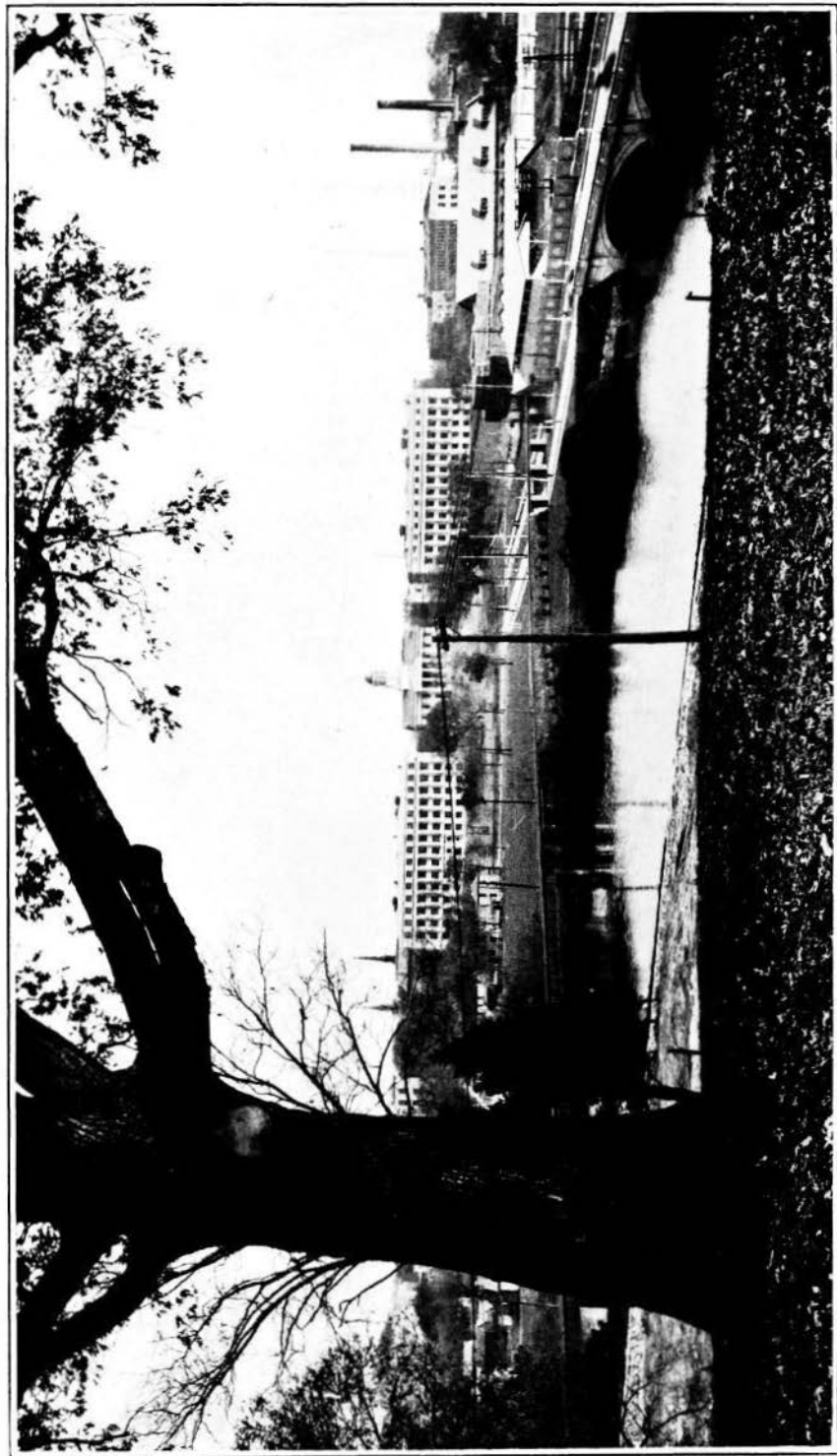
IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

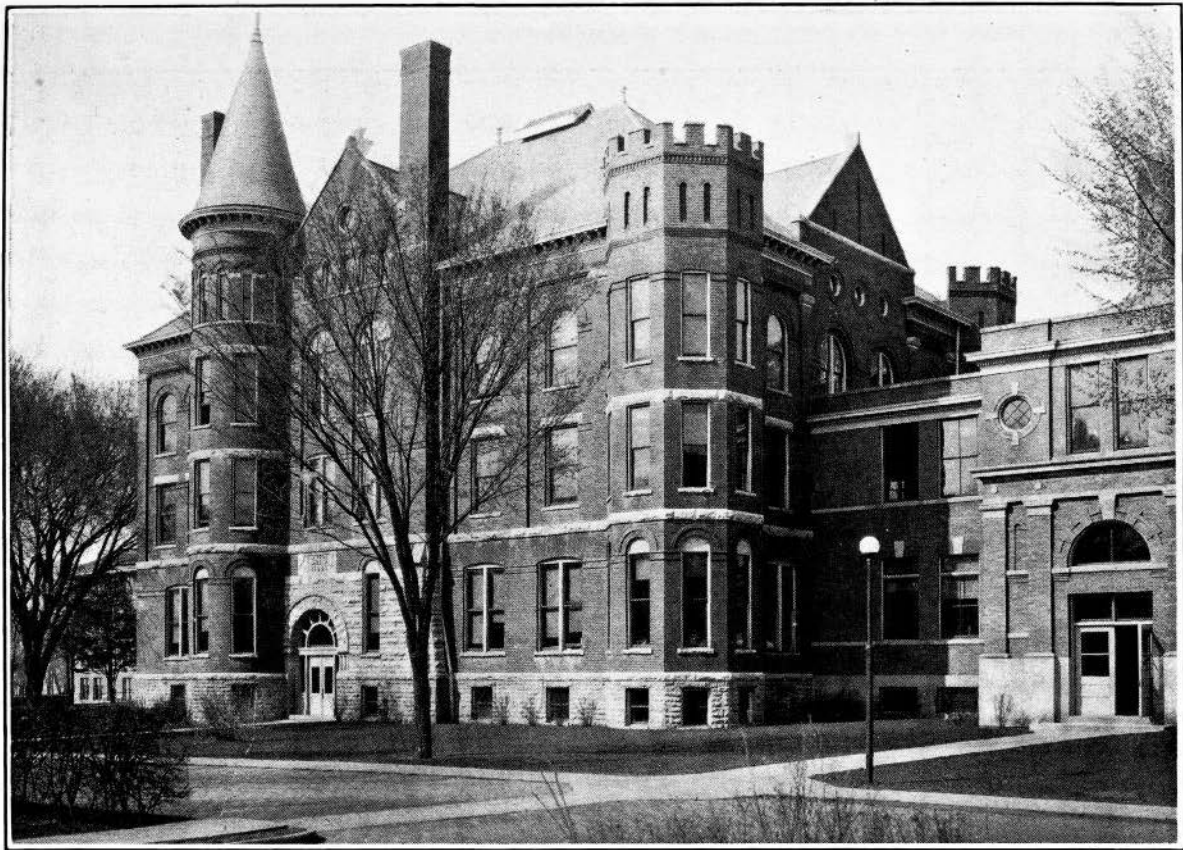


#### VIEWS OF IOWA HIGHWAYS

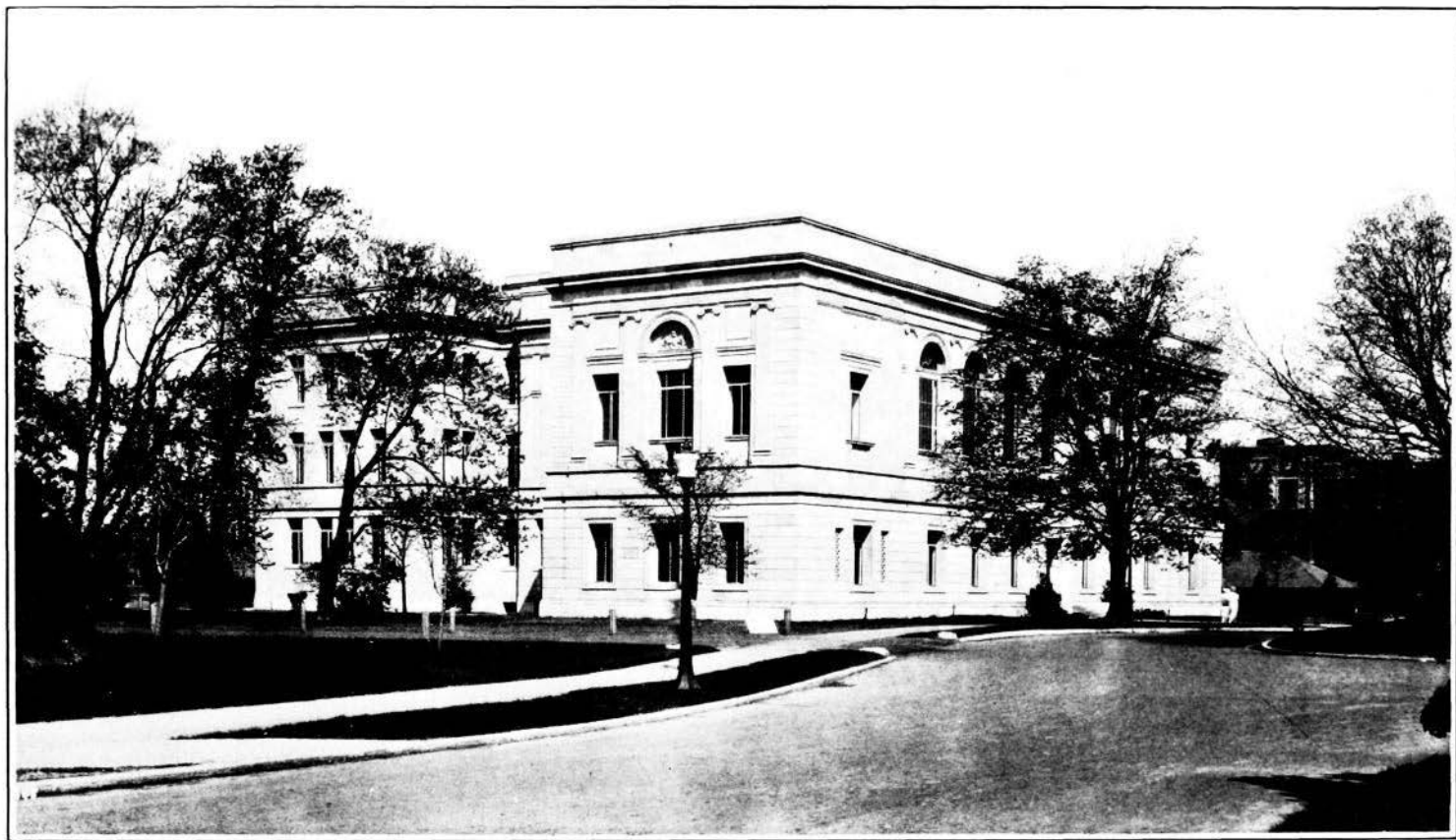

On July 1, 1909, the management and control of the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and the Iowa State Teachers' College was assumed by the Iowa state board of education. This board consists of nine members, who are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, under the provisions of an act of the thirty-third general assembly, approved by the governor March 29, 1909. By chapter 141 of the acts of the thirty-fourth general assembly, the college for the blind was placed under the control of this board, and the thirty-seventh general assembly transferred the supervision of the school for the deaf from the board of control of state institutions to the state board of education. Under the provisions of the law, not more than five members of the board may be members of the same political party; and not more than one alumnus from each of the institutions may be members of the board. As required by the act, three of the members of the board were appointed for two years, three for four years,

and three for six years. Subsequent appointments on the board, except to fill vacancies, are to be for terms of six years. Offices at the seat of the state government are to be furnished the board by the executive council, and the board also maintains an office at each of the institutions. Members of the board are not required to give bond; and they are to receive a compensation of ten dollars per day for the time actually employed in the performance of their duties not exceeding sixty days in any one year, and are also allowed travelling expenses. The board is required to have four regular meetings each year and may hold additional ones on the call of the president or secretary. The duties of the board as set out in the act are as follows:

Sec. 4. The state board of education shall have power to elect a president from its members; a president and treasurer for each of said educational institutions, and professors, instructors, officers and employes; to fix the compensation to be paid to such officers and employes; to make rules and regulations for the government of said schools, not inconsistent with the laws of the state; to manage and control the property, both real and personal, belonging to said educational institutions; to execute trusts or other obligations now or hereafter committed to the institutions; to direct the expenditure of all appropriations the general assembly shall, from time to time, make to said institutions, and the expenditure of any other moneys; and to do such other acts as are necessary and proper for the execution of the powers and duties conferred upon them by law. \* \* \*

Members of the board choose, from outside their own membership, a finance committee of three members, not more than two of whom shall be members of the same political party. Each member of the finance committee receives a compensation of thirty-six hundred dollars a year, and serves for three years unless sooner removed by the board. The board designates one of the finance committee as chairman and one as secretary, and the secretary of this committee also serves as secretary of the board. The secretary has charge of the general offices and of all books and papers of the board at the seat of government. The members of the committee, in addition to their salaries, are entitled to mileage and necessary expenses. Each member of the finance committee is required to file a bond in the sum of \$25,000, which is to be approved by the governor. The members of the finance committee are required to visit each of the institutions once a month, and to familiarize themselves with the work there being done.

This college was formally opened on March 17, 1869. Provision for maintaining its scope of work was given by state and federal legislation. In 1858 the state legislature first provided for the establishment of such an institution. In 1862 congress provided for the support of instruction in agriculture and the general assembly of Iowa accepted the federal grant and thus entered into contract with the United States government. In later years other federal and state legislation has increased the support of the institution and has enlarged and strengthened its work along its special lines.

The college is governed by the state board of education consisting of nine members appointed by the governor. The work of the college is conducted along the following five major lines:

Agriculture, Engineering, Home Economics, Industrial Science, Veterinary Medicine.

#### GRADUATE AND UNDERGRADUATE COURSES

In each of these five major lines stated above, collegiate and graduate instruction is given, leading to Bachelor's, Master's and Doctor's degrees.

Graduate instruction is adapted to the needed requirements of candidates for different degrees. Undergraduate or collegiate instruction is given in four-year, five-year, and six-year courses offered in the different divisions of the college, and jointly between divisions. Graduate and undergraduate courses are fully described in the college catalog, and include courses in agricultural education, agricultural engineering, animal husbandry, ceramics, chemical engineering, dairying, electrical engineering, farm crops and soils, farm management, forestry, home economics, horticulture, industrial science, mechanical engineering, mining engineering, structure design, and veterinary medicine.

#### NON-COLLEGIATE COURSE

These courses are offered especially for young men and women who have not completed the requirements for admission to collegiate courses. They include two-year courses in agriculture, trades and industries, and two quarter course in dairying, and two quarter course for herdsmen. Home makers.

#### SUMMER SESSION

The summer session is divided into two six-weeks periods in which some courses especially adapted to public school teachers are offered, including work in agriculture, home economics, manual training, industrial science, and vocational education, work for rural and grade teachers. Special attention is given to collegiate and graduate courses.

#### WINTER SHORT COURSES

These are given at different times on different subjects with one special week known as Short Course and Convention Week.

#### ENROLLMENT

Total attendance in 1923-1924 was 9,856, divided as follows: Collegiate agriculture, 1,062; non-collegiate agriculture, 339; collegiate engineering, 1,219; non-collegiate trades and industries, 214; collegiate home economics, 974; non-collegiate home economics, 80; industrial science, 306; veterinary medicine, 88; graduate college, 337; summer session, 2,144; music, 147; short courses, 2,946. Enrollment not including duplicates, 8,019.

#### AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION

Charles Franklin Curtiss, B.Sc., D.S., Director, Ames.

The Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station was established in accordance with an act of congress, approved March 2, 1887, for the purpose of aiding "In

acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects connected with agriculture, and to promote scientific investigation and experiments respecting the principles and application of agricultural science."

This station derives its support in part from the national government and in part from the state, as follows: For the year 1922-1923 from the national government, \$30,000.00, from the state \$250,000.00.

The work of the Agricultural Experiment Station now includes the following lines of investigation: Farm crops and soils, agricultural economics and farm management, animal husbandry, horticulture, and forestry, agricultural engineering, botany and plant pathology, dairying, entomology, chemistry, bacteriology, rural sociology, and genetics. The results of investigations and experiments along these lines are published in bulletins and circulars which are distributed free to all residents of the state who apply for them. For the year ending June 30, 1923, thirty-seven (37) different publications were issued, including nine regular bulletins, ten circulars, four research bulletins, nine soil survey reports, and one annual report. The total number of copies printed was 479,800. The total number of publications distributed during the year was 433,208.

#### ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION

Including Good Roads Experimentation.

Anson Marston, C.E., Director, Ames.

The Engineering Experiment Station was established at the Iowa State College by the legislature of Iowa in 1904 to afford a service, through scientific investigations, evolution of new devices and methods, educational information on technical subjects and tests and analysis of materials; for the manufacturing and other engineering population and industries of Iowa; for the agricultural industries of the state in the solution of their engineering problems; for the urban and rural population of the state in the solution of the engineering problems of urban and rural life.

From the first the station has carried on original investigations along lines of vital interest to the people of Iowa, including drainage, sewerage and sewage disposal, water supply, roads and road traffic, pavements, bridges, clay products, concrete materials and other materials of construction, lighting, steam and electric power, engineering economics and others. The results have been published in more than seventy-three bulletins for free distribution. Any of these bulletins not out of print will be sent free upon request addressed to Director Anson Marston, Engineering Station, Ames, Iowa.

#### VETERINARY INVESTIGATIONS

C. H. Stange, Dean.

This work is being supported by special appropriation and under its provision diseases of animals which are as yet little understood and for which we have no satisfactory means of control are studied and the most practical means of solving their control or eradication are investigated.

#### EXTENSION WORK

R. A. Pearson, President.

The extension work of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts is divided into two branches—agricultural and home economics extension and engineering extension.

#### AGRICULTURAL AND HOME ECONOMICS EXTENSION

R. K. Bliss, Director.

The agricultural extension work was established permanently by enactment of the thirty-first general assembly. This act provided for the dissemination of information concerning agriculture and home economics.

The thirty-fifth general assembly passed an act which authorized the incorporation in each county of the state of an association for the advancement and improvement of agriculture and domestic science to define the powers and rights of such association and its members and to provide for appropriations by boards of supervisors. As amended by the thirty-eighth general assembly, farm bu-

reans receiving county funds must be organized to co-operate with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

The thirty-sixth general assembly accepted the provisions of the Federal Smith-Lever Act passed by the congress of the United States in 1914 and providing federal aid for agricultural extension work in the state.

Extension work is now so organized that it reaches every community in the state.

#### ENGINEERING EXTENSIONS

D. C. Faber, Director.

The thirty-fifth general assembly of Iowa provided an appropriation for the establishment of trade school and engineering extension work. Short courses of instruction and technical institutes are conducted in industrial centers. Technical information is supplied municipalities and civic organizations. Bulletins of information are issued from time to time. The visual instruction service furnishes educational slides and films. Correspondence courses are offered in trade and industrial subjects.

#### STATE APIARIST

Appointed by the State Board of Education. Term at pleasure of board. Appropriation \$1,500 annually.

F. B. Paddock, of Ames, Story County.

By an act of the thirty-seventh general assembly of Iowa, the state board of education was authorized to appoint a state apiarist to work under the supervision of the director of agricultural extension and professor of entomology of Iowa State College. Previous to July 1, 1917, the duties of this office were carried by the inspector of bees, who was appointed by the governor.

## ORGANIZATION

An act of congress, July 20, 1820, authorized the secretary of the treasury to set apart and reserve from sale of lands in the territory of Iowa funds for the use and support of a university to be established when Iowa should become a state. In 1846 Iowa was admitted to the Union with a constitution which provided that the general assembly should take measures to care for the lands granted and for the application of the income to support the university. In accordance with this provision the first general assembly on February 25, 1847, passed an act establishing and locating at Iowa City a state university. The capitol building and the land upon which it stood were donated to the university in view of the contemplated removal of the seat of government from Iowa City. Delay in removing the capitol prevented the opening of the institution until March, 1855. The organization of departments began in the same year. From 1858 to 1860, owing to the lack of funds, the normal department was the only one in operation, and the university was reorganized in 1860. The law department was established in 1868, the medical department in 1870, the dental department in 1882, the department of pharmacy in 1885, the graduate college in 1900, the college of applied science in 1905, the college of education in 1913, and the college of commerce in 1921. In the course of the evolution of the university the various departments became, and now are, colleges.

From 1847 to 1870, the management of the university was in the hands of trustees, elected throughout most of the period by the legislature. In 1870 the legislature substituted a board of regents consisting aside from ex-officio members, of one member from each congressional district. In 1909, pursuant to an act of the thirty-third general assembly, the control of the state university of Iowa, together with that of the Iowa state teachers' college and the Iowa state college of agriculture and mechanics art, passed into the hands of a state board of education.

The state university of Iowa is an integral part of the public school system of the state. As contemplated in its establishment, the work of the university is based upon the preparation afforded by the duly accredited high schools of the state, whose students are admitted to the undergraduate and professional courses upon the presentation of the proper certificates—except in the colleges of medicine and law, which require two years, and the college of dentistry which requires one year of collegiate work in preparation. The state, through the university, undertakes to furnish instruction in the various branches requisite for an education in the liberal arts, law, dentistry, pharmacy, fine arts, nursing, commerce, journalism, etc. It also aims to encourage research work in all departments.

The Graduate College unites the university's equipment for advanced study and research, its courses beginning where the courses in the other colleges end. It offers work leading to the degrees of M.A., M.S., and Ph.D.

The College of Liberal Arts is the center around which the university has grown. It offers upwards of six hundred liberal and vocational courses in the arts and sciences, these courses leading to the degree of B.A. or B.S., the latter only in connection with combined courses in liberal arts and professional studies.

The College of Law offers a course of three years leading to the degree of LL.B. For admission two years of study in a liberal arts college are required.

The College of Medicine offers a course of four years leading to the degree

of M.D. The college is recognized by the American Medical Association in "Class A." Two years of liberal arts study are required for admission.

The College of Dentistry offers a course of four years leading to the degree of D.D.S. The college is recognized by the Dental Faculties Association of American Universities in "Class A." One year of liberal arts study is required for admission.

The College of Pharmacy offers a two years' course leading to the degree of Ph.G.; a three years' course leading to the degree of Ph.C.; and a four years' course leading to the degree of B.S. in Pharmacy.

The College of Applied Science offers courses in civil, sanitary, mechanical, electrical, chemical, and general engineering. These are each of four years and lead to the degree of B.E. Five-year and six-year courses are also arranged. Advanced degrees are given in C.E., M.E., etc.

The College of Education unites the various faculties of the university for the training of teachers, with special reference to administrative work and the higher positions. Its courses lead to the degree of B.S. in School Supervision.

The College of Commerce offers courses leading to the degree of B.S. in Commerce.

The School of Nursing is conducted in the university hospitals under the college of medicine, and affords a scientific and practical training in nursing.

The School of Public Health Nursing is organized under the college of medicine and includes also work in the college of liberal arts and the graduate college.

The School of Music is a part of the college of liberal arts. It offers courses in piano, voice, pipe organ, violin, band instruments, and in the history and theory of music, leading to the degrees of B.A. and B.M.

The School of Journalism provides a course leading to the B.A. degree and a special certificate.

The Summer Session of two terms, one of six, the other of five weeks, is a regular session of the university. The session also includes the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory and the School for Library Training.

"Combined Courses" in Liberal Arts and professional studies permit the attainment in a shortened period of the double degrees of B.S., or B.A. and M.D.; B.A. and LL.B.; B.S. and D.D.S.; B.S. and B.E.; and D.D.S. and M.D.

This institution was founded in 1876 as a school for the instruction and training of teachers for the public schools. It used the title of Iowa State Normal School from 1876 to 1909 and since that time the title Iowa State Teachers College was authorized by an act of the general assembly. It is a college in its standards as to graduating with a degree from its course, though it admits and instructs teachers and grants diplomas of special varieties for all classes of teachers, rural and elementary, needed by the public schools. For admission to college courses, graduation from an accredited high school is required. For admission to sub-collegiate courses and rural teachers work an elementary education is required.

The institution is organized to give teacher education and training and does not undertake any other kind of educational work. Its courses are planned to give efficiency and capability to the students as workers in public schools. Its field of service grants preparation to superintendents, high school teachers, to elementary and primary teachers, and to all kinds of special teachers now demanded by the public schools of the state. Its plan is that of a vocational school and everything that is done has a bearing upon the training of young men and women for service in the system of public education maintained in the state. Its degree graduates are admitted without conditions to the graduate schools of the universities and its alumni hold important positions in public service in every state where they are employed. Its diplomas are Bachelor of Arts in Education, with great variety of majors such as Language, Mathematics, Science, Art, Physical Education, Athletics, and special lines of training such as Primary Teaching, Music Teaching, etc., Special Teacher Diplomas such as Primary, Junior College Kindergarten, Art, Public School Music, Manual Arts, Home Economics, Commercial, Rural Education and Rural Teacher. In addition music teachers are granted diplomas for piano, organ, violin and voice.

The college year is divided into four quarters of twelve weeks each and a class graduates at the end of each quarter, thus giving much flexibility to the courses and a superior opportunity for candidates for graduation in their practice in teaching in the training schools. The training schools are located on the campus—all grades being organized from the kindergarten to the senior in the high school—in the school buildings at Cherokee and East Waterloo city schools and in consolidated schools at Jesup and Hudson and in rural schools in Black Hawk county. The expense of this organization gives unusual opportunities for practical development and for the acquiring of capability in instruc-

tion. Students are able to be admitted at the opening of each quarter and by continued attendance can complete a four-year college course in three calendar years.

The enrollment of students and training schools in 1923-24 was as follows: college graduates, 63; college course students, 1,173; two and three-year diploma course students, 2,445; special students, 61; sub-collegiate and rural teacher students, 905; special music students, 37; extension summer school students, 1924, 1,751; visitor students, 52. Total enrolled in institution, 7,337. Training schools; campus high schools and grades, 449; Cherokee, 150; East Waterloo, 110; West Waterloo, 35; Jesup, 35; Hudson, 35; Mason City, 110; rural schools, 80; consolidated schools, 620. Total pupils, 1,554.

The extension service consists of Saturday classes meeting in the several counties of the state, receiving all day instruction in the subjects and topics approved by the county superintendent and continuing from month to month and from year to year for the improvement in scholarship and methods of the teachers in service. In 1923-24 there were 13,707 teachers enrolled in the study center classes. Credit extension classes are organized in the cities and towns where sufficient students can be secured for one class in a college subject. In 1923-24, 545 were so enrolled as students.

The value of the permanent improvements and equipments is estimated to be \$1,500,000. The annual report, granted by the state in 1921-22, was \$683,000.00. The income from all other sources such as laboratory fees, hospital fees, student tuitions, etc., is \$215,000.00.

#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Superintendent, Francis Eber Palmer; physician, J. E. Luckey, M.D.; and visiting ophthalmic surgeon, L. W. Dean, M.D., state university.

The aim and purpose of the Iowa College for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study, and in the making of his choice he always has the guid-

ance and advice of teachers and matrons. However, the courses are so arranged that a student who chooses one course, say one of the vocational courses of study, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In fact, both literary and industrial work is required of all students.

In the music department, students are given the opportunity for thorough training in piano, violin, organ and voice; and in order to graduate from this department pupils must satisfactorily complete courses in harmony, harmonic analysis, musical history and staff notation, besides having as his major either piano, organ, voice or violin, requiring at least two hours practice a day. In addition to the major work, the student must take minor work along some other line offered in the department.

In the industrial department the girls are given work as follows: sewing, cooking, crocheting, tatting, hammock-making, basket weaving, rug and carpet weaving, both plain and art, and chair caning. The boys are given work as follows: broom-making, chair caning, rug and carpet weaving both plain and art, hammock-making, and piano tuning.

In the commercial department all students in the seventh and eighth grades are required to take typewriting; two years of typewriting are also offered in the high school department. In the high school department this is combined with dictaphone practice.

There is a well equipped hospital in connection with the school where a trained nurse is on duty during the entire time that the students are in attendance. Three or four times a year an eye specialist from the State University Hospital visits the College for the Blind for the purpose of examining the pupils and giving such advice and aid as he finds needful. The college physician visits the school as often as needed on account of sickness. Thus the health of all pupils is well guarded.

During the past year a dental room was fully equipped and each student is given careful dental attention by one of the local dentists. The teeth of each pupil are carefully examined and any needed work is done free of charge. Dr. Kelly has conducted the clinics during the past year.

A well equipped gymnasium is another asset to the work that the school is trying to do for the blind boys and girls of the state. Here all pupils, unless excused by the college physician, have at least an hour of gymnasium work each day, under a competent director.

Board and room and tuition are free to all boys and girls of the state who are eligible, and, where necessary, clothes also are furnished. The blind or those whose eyesight is so defective as to make work in the public schools impracticable, and who are of suitable age and capacity, that is between the ages of seven and twenty-one years are eligible. Others are sometimes admitted on the approval of the board of education. Boys and girls who are decidedly sub-normal are not admitted.

The school year begins the first Wednesday of September and closes the first week of May.

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#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

Superintendent, Elbert A. Gruver; physician, McM. Hanchett, M.D.; steward, John F. Schultz, and matron, Rosa Lorenz.

##### HISTORICAL

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1885 in answer to the demand that the deaf children of the state be given the same opportunity for an education that was provided for those who could hear. Because such deaf children are fewer and very much scattered, as well as to secure better grading, it was found more economical to get them together and provide board as well as tuition. The school was first located at Iowa City and later moved to Council Bluffs. In 1902 fire completely destroyed the main building. A new modern, fireproof structure has arisen in its place where sufficient room is provided for 300 pupils. A separate building to accommodate 45 of the younger pupils is also provided.

The school is under the supervision of the State Board of Education, which has under its management the five educational institutions of the state and consists of a group of modern, fireproof buildings situated just outside of Council Bluffs at the foot of the bluffs which parallel the Missouri river. Water is supplied by several wells. The buildings are high enough on the bluffs to afford good drainage and insure health. In connection with the school is a farm of 210 acres.

#### CHARACTER AND OBJECT

The school is just what its name implies and is not a home, hospital nor an asylum, and feeble-minded children will not be retained. The school is not a place of detention and the care bestowed is what would naturally be exercised over a number of pupils in a boarding school. Pupils are free to come and go, subject of course to reasonable regulations. The object of the school is to provide a thorough education for children who are too deaf to be properly instructed in the public schools of the state. Its aim is to train such children to become useful citizens.

#### METHODS OF INSTRUCTION

Upon admission each pupil is placed under oral instruction and his education continues under that method throughout the course, unless it be found impossible for him to master speech and lip-reading, in which case he is placed in a special class. Mental development, the acquisition of the English language and general knowledge are the chief aims of the instruction.

The course of instruction includes the branches commonly taught in the public schools of the state. The entire course covers a period of twelve years. Pupils who have the necessary ability are encouraged to prepare for college. The school is one of the approved schools whose graduates are admitted to Gallaudet College under the certificate plan.

The school day is divided into two periods, pupils being in the intellectual department on each day (except Saturday and Sunday) from 8 a. m. to 12:45 p. m., and in the industrial departments from 2:15 to 4:30 with a session in the industrial schools on Saturday from 9 to 11 a. m.

A gymnasium provides means of physical exercise for both boys and girls. The boys maintain football, basket ball and base ball teams, each in its season, providing for plenty of outdoor recreation. The girls also have gymnasium training and maintain basket ball teams, while the tennis club furnishes additional sport for both sexes.

The school is non-sectarian in character, but moral and religious instruction is provided, the nature of the instruction being general, such as is accepted by all churches and creeds. The pupils are allowed to attend the places of worship in the city designated by their parents.

#### INDUSTRIAL TRAINING

Vocational training is also provided and instruction given in the following: Printing, sign painting, carpentry, shoemaking, bookbinding, gardening and baking to the boys; sewing, dressmaking, embroidery, weaving, cooking and domestic science to the girls.

#### TERMS OF ADMISSION

Children 5 years of age and upward may be received from any part of the state and persons over 21 up to 35 are admitted under special conditions. All are educated in the school at the expense of the state. Tuition, board, lodging and medical attendance, including nursing, in ordinary sickness, are provided by the school. Stationery and necessary school books are also furnished.

In case parents are unable to provide railroad fare and other expenses, provision is made to secure such support from the county.

The regular time of admission is at the commencement of the term, which is about the middle of September. Upon application, new pupils will be received at other times. The summer vacation begins about the middle of June and extends to about the middle of September. A recess is given at Christmas. Special exercises and change of program characterize the celebration of the legal holidays during the school term.

## STATE COMMISSIONERS AND OFFICERS

## IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

## COMMISSIONERS

J. W. Holden, Scranton, Iowa, chairman; William Collinson, Chariton, Iowa; Dean Anson Marston, Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa.

By the act of the thirty-fifth general assembly, creating the highway commission, the Dean of Engineering of the Iowa State College is ex-officio a member of the commission. The other two members are appointed from different political parties for a term of four years and receive as compensation \$10.00 per day not to exceed two hundred days per year. The ex-officio member of the commission receives no additional compensation. All members receive actual traveling expenses.

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which constituted the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. From 1904 to 1913 the work was carried on under this law.

The thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration in the state and created a commission of three men as outlined above. The office of the commission is located at Ames, Iowa, and the duties prescribed by the law are such that an extensive organization is necessary.

Under the law as amended by the general assembly from time to time the commission is charged, with many other duties, with the duty of making all road surveys, preparing all road and bridge specifications, etc. By act of the forty-first general assembly the commission, on November 1, 1925, takes complete control of the maintenance of the primary road system. Beginning July 1, 1925, the commission has to its credit a primary road development fund of about \$4,000,000 a year to be used on any portion of the primary road system as may be deemed best by the commission.

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

The state department of health is headed by a commissioner appointed by the governor for a term of four years, and confirmed by two-thirds vote of the senate. The department is aided by an advisory body known as the state board of health, which body is headed by the commissioner. Members of the state executive council are ex-officio members. Also there are five members appointed by the governor. The terms of the incumbents expire the second Tuesday in January. They are: H. L. Saylor, M. D., Des Moines; E. M. Williams, M. D., Oskaloosa; H. E. Sugg, M. D., Clinton; W. D. Hayes, C. D. H., Sioux City; C. W. Stewart, M. D., Washington. These five appointive members receive no compensation, but are allowed traveling expenses.

## POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COMMISSIONER

The commissioner of public health shall be the head of the "State Department of Health," which shall:

1. Exercise general supervision over the public health, promote public hygiene and sanitation, and, unless otherwise provided, enforce the laws relating to the same.
2. Conduct campaigns for the education of the people in hygiene and sanitation.
3. Issue monthly health bulletins containing fundamental health principles and other health data deemed of public interest.
4. Make investigations and surveys in respect to the causes of disease and epidemics, and the effect of locality, employment, and living conditions upon the public health. For this purpose the department may use the services of the experts connected with the bacteriological and epidemiological laboratory at the state university.
5. Make inspections of the sanitary conditions in the educational, charitable, correctional, and penal institutions in the state.
6. Make inspections of the sanitary conditions in any locality of the state upon written petition of five or more citizens from said locality, and issue directions for the improvement of the same, which shall be executed by the local board.
7. Make inspections of the public water supplies, sewer systems, sewage

treatment plants, and garbage and refuse disposal plants throughout the state, and direct the method of installation and operation of the same.

8. Establish, publish and enforce a code of rules governing the installation of plumbing in cities and towns and amend the same when deemed necessary in the manner prescribed in the following section. Said rules and amendments shall be published in the same manner as other rules of the department.

9. Exercise general supervision over the administration of the housing law and give aid to the local authorities in the enforcement of the same, and it shall institute in the name of the state such legal proceedings as may be necessary in the enforcement of said law.

10. Hear and determine all appeals from the order of any local board made in connection with the enforcement of the housing law, and enforce its orders therein.

11. Establish stations throughout the state for the distribution of antitoxins and vaccines to physicians, druggists, and other persons, at cost. All antitoxin and vaccine thus distributed shall be labeled "Iowa State Department of Health."

12. Exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the venereal disease law, chapter 109, 1924 Code.

13. Exercise sole jurisdiction over the disposal and transportation of the dead bodies of human beings and prescribe the methods to be used in preparing such bodies for disposal and transportation.

14. Exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the vital statistics law, chapter 114.

15. Enforce the law relative to the "Practice of Certain Professions Affecting the Public Health," title 8.

16. Establish and maintain such divisions in the department as are necessary for the proper enforcement of the laws administered by it, including a division of contagious and infectious diseases, a division of venereal diseases, a division of housing, a division of sanitary engineering, a division of vital statistics, and a division of examinations and licenses; but the various services of the department shall be so consolidated as to eliminate unnecessary personnel and make possible the carrying on of the functions of the department under the most economical methods.

17. Establish, publish, and enforce rules not inconsistent with law for the enforcement of the provisions of this title and for the enforcement of the various laws, the administration and supervision of which are imposed upon the department.

#### POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD OF HEALTH

1. To consider and study the entire field of legislation and administration concerning public health, hygiene, and sanitation.

2. To advise the department relative to:

a. The causes of disease and epidemics, and the effect of locality, employment, and living conditions upon the public health.

b. The sanitary conditions in the educational, charitable, correctional, and penal institutions in the state.

c. The public water supplies, sewer systems, sewage treatment plants, and garbage and refuse disposal plants, and the method of installing and operating the same.

d. Contagious and infectious diseases, quarantine and isolation, venereal diseases, antitoxins and vaccines, housing, and vital statistics.

3. To recommend policies and practices to the department relative to any duty imposed upon it by law, which recommendations shall be given due consideration by the department.

4. To appoint a committee, upon request of the department, to advise with the department relative to any duty imposed upon it by law.

5. To investigate the conduct of the work of the department, and for this purpose it shall have access at any time of all books, papers, documents, and records of the department.

6. To advise or make recommendations to the governor and general assembly relative to public health, hygiene, and sanitation.

7. To adopt rules, not inconsistent with law, for its internal control and management, a copy of which rules shall be filed with the department.

8. To act by committee, or by a majority of the board.

9. To keep minutes of the transactions of each session, regular or special, which shall be public records and filed with the department.

Chapter 115, 1924 Code provides that for the purpose of giving examinations to applicants for licenses to practice the professions for which a license is required by this title, the governor shall appoint a Board of Examiners for each of said professions.

## FUNCTIONS OF STATE FAIR BOARD

The Iowa State Fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25-26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the Fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa State Fair Board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The Fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 28, 1924.

The law provides for a State Agricultural Convention to be held at the State Capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the State Fair Board; the President, Secretary or *accredited* delegate of each of the County and District Fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations: each Farmers' Institute organized according to law and receiving state aid; the State Horticultural Society; the Iowa State Dairy Association; the Iowa Beef Producers' Association and the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers' Association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a President and a Vice President for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district for a term of two years. The directors from the even numbered districts are elected on the even year and those from the odd numbered districts on the odd year. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the State Fair Board. The law fixes the compensation of the President, Vice President and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes the maximum amount to be paid the Treasurer at \$250 and the Secretary at \$4,000 annually.

By statute the State Fair Board is made the custodian of the State Fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual State Fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expense of the board and the State Fair or the maintenance of the fair grounds and buildings. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the State Fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the State will not be liable for any expense or liabilities incurred by the board. Special appropriations totaling \$714,013 have been made since 1902 by the General Assembly for the construction of permanent buildings, additional land and other improvements on the State Fair grounds not including appropriation by the general assembly of 1925, amounting to \$41,200 for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925. During this same period approximately \$766,500.00 from the receipts of the State Fair has been expended for permanent buildings and other improvements on the grounds.

The inventory taken November 30, 1924, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$1,673,531.43. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the State Fair Grounds and all property is held in the name of the State of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the auditor of State's office.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

Under jurisdiction of the Bureau of Labor are laws relating to health and safety in factories, work shops, mercantile establishments, theaters, elevators, etc., the fire escape law, child labor law, inspection of employment bureaus, both public and private, arbitration and conciliation, report of accidents.

Another service of the bureau is that rendered by the State Free Employment Bureau. Through co-operation of the state and federal governments, under direction of the Iowa commissioner of labor, the State-Federal Employment Service referred 81,424 applicants to jobs, of whom 77,173 were actually placed, during the biennial period ending June 30, 1924.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to

determine if any building or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns. For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the fire marshal has an allowance of \$6,600 for traveling expenses and \$6,400 for mileage and reporting fees.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the Traveling Library previously under the State Library was transferred to the commission.

The executive officer of the commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries, and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, books, etc.

The second activity of the commission is the Traveling Library, books from which go out (a) in fixed groups of 50 volumes each as general reading by



adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go. (b) In selected groups for reading or study in numbers to meet the needs of borrowers. Books are loaned to organizations of all kinds, to school and to individuals. For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the library commission has an allowance of \$18,500 for maintenance and operation.

The accession list of the general, law and legislative reference departments of the state library on the first day of July, 1924, included 185,767 volumes, an increase of 120,647 volumes in the last twenty-five years. The total accessions of the biennial period ending June 30, 1924, were 7,903 volumes. The mission of the general library as a reference library is that of a final resort for information in science, the mechanic arts, the fine arts, biography, gen-

eral history, literature and philosophy. A department of economics and sociology was created by the last general assembly, and the use made of the new department by legislators, legislative committee clerks, students of economics and sociology, and other persons interested, is steadily increasing. Annual appropriations for the several departments are as follows: The general department, \$6,000; law and legislative reference department, \$6,000; medical department, \$2,000; economics and sociology department, \$2,000.

The medical department has been in operation four years with a trained medical librarian in charge, and with about 6,377 volumes of books and periodicals on its shelves. By the utilization of traveling library methods of reaching remote localities and in other ways the department has become highly serviceable to the medical profession. Physicians, surgeons and medical students from all parts of the state, have availed themselves of its books and periodicals.

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This department dates from the first day of July, 1892. Its chief purpose is the collection of historical data relating to Iowa and the territory of the middle west, the care-taking of the public archives and the stimulation of private and public enterprise in noting and commemorating through artistic means notable achievements of Iowa citizens.

The department publishes the *Annals of Iowa*, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages. It is made up largely of original contributions in history and biography, most of which relate to Iowa and her people. It is sent free to every organized library in our state. Its price to subscribers is \$1 per year.

In addition to the *Annals* the Historical Department is to be credited with the following publications: thirteen biennial reports; "John Brown Among the Quakers and Other Sketches," by Hon. Irving B. Richman; "First Census of the Original Counties of Dubuque and Des Moines," edited by Dr. Benj. F. Shambaugh; "History of the Constitution of Iowa," by Dr. Shambaugh; Reprints of the laws of Iowa, 1838-39 and of 1839-40, and the hitherto unpublished journals of the council and house of representatives of the extra session of 1840; "Early Settlement and Growth of Western Iowa," by Rev. John Todd; "Rafinesque, Life and Biography," by T. J. Fitzpatrick; "Downing's Civil War Diary," by Alexander G. Downing, and "Iowa Authors and their Works," by Alice Marple. Miss Marple has also assisted in and has sponsored the following publications; "Index of Vols. 1-8 of *Annals of Iowa*," "Iowa Authors and Their Works," 2d edition, 359 pp.

The department has secured 177 portraits of distinguished Iowans, which are now on exhibition in the art gallery of the historical building, and has thousands of photographs and other black and white portraits and exhibits. In addition to these the department has acquired or accounts for the original cartoons of J. N. Darling, a collection of autograph letters, etc., from the presidents, noted men of letters, artists, etc., numbering over 5,000 items, and over 3,000 half-tones of Iowa citizens and historic scenes.

Original manuscripts of noted Iowa men and women are another feature of the historical department work and the collection of Senator Allison, Hon. John F. Lacey, Governor Kirkwood, Judge Horace E. Deemer, Charles Mason, Emerson Hough and General Grenville M. Dodge are only a part of the collections.

Some 200,000 feet of negative and positive motion picture films have been secured and organized into a library of such materials. They embrace the notable public assemblages in Iowa in 1913 and after, especially our military and state fair classics of the time.

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the late war and the collections, aimed at complete and authentic facts, have invaluable material upon the following phases:

1. A biographical census record of men and women serving their country during the world war.
2. Iowa's honor roll, records and pictures.

3. Iowa's decorated men and women, records and pictures.
4. Navy records.
5. Council of Defense activities.
6. Red Cross activities.
7. Pictures, souvenirs and relics of World War Veterans.

## LIBRARY DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy; works on the histories of all our wars from the earliest times; works relating to the North American Indians; county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies of our noted men and women, printed or in manuscript; written or printed documents relating to early settlers and settlements; reports, catalogues and broadsides relating to the churches, educational and benevolent institutions of the state; in short every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

## MUSEUM DIVISION

The museum includes nine large cases for autograph letters, manuscripts, portraits, etc.; a collection of recent, aboriginal and prehistorical pottery found in our state; a large collection of prehistoric implements, hundreds of flints; many teeth, tusks, and other bones of the mammoth and mastodons, all of which were found in Iowa, many of the larger specimens being of recent discovery. Several large cases of birds found within our state, including all the larger birds such as eagles, pelicans, loons and wild turkeys, etc.; many Iowa mammals including the moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes; a case of Indian baskets, bead work, implements and weapons, many of which were manufactured by the Musquakie Indians of Tama County; a collection of arms—cannons, mortars, swivel guns, rifles, muskets, carbines, swords and pistols, in use during the Civil, Spanish, Philippine and World Wars; and duplicates in bronze of most of the historic medals issued by the United States government. All the work of mounting of the birds and mammals is done in the department by the taxidermist, who is also the museum director.

## NEWSPAPER DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. Three hundred weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all Iowa newspapers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states, with the exception of the New York Times.

## PUBLIC ARCHIVES DIVISION

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureau, etc., and date from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal. These materials are taken from the vaults, garrets and storage places and in most cases they are a chaotic mass covered with dust and dirt. These must all be read, classified, cleansed, repaired, filed and indexed. In addition to the above work this division annually cares for some four or five hundred requests for information gleaned from these materials and the requests are constantly increasing.

There are now between ten and eleven millions of documents on file and in storage and practically eight millions of these are finished and indexed.

The thirty-seventh general assembly created the state board of conservation consisting of four members of which the curator of the state historical department was an ex-officio member. Subsequently the legislature amended the act, providing a board of five members appointed by the governor. The secretary of the executive council is ex-officio secretary of the board.

The state board of conservation makes recommendations for the purchases of park areas and has entire charge of the management of these parks. The executive council either approves or rejects the recommendations. The board also has jurisdiction over the meandered streams and lakes in the state, the construction of dams and the improvements of lakes.

For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the board has available by act of the forty-first general assembly \$140,000 for purchase, maintenance and operation of state parks and \$40,000 for maintenance of state roads at the parks.

The parks are created for three purposes; first, recreational; second, scientific; and third, historical. Considerable donations have been made by public spirited citizens as at Ft. Atkinson, Eldora, Pine Creek, Lacey-Keosauqua, Lepley, Pilot Knob, Ledges, Dolliver Memorial, Farmington, Hamburg, Harwarden, Palisades, Medium Lake, Merrick and other parks.

Members of the board are appointed for a term of three years, one member each year. All persons who shall desire to conduct the business of selling at retail, compounding or dispensing drugs, etc., for medical use, must be a registered pharmacist and their names registered in a book kept by the board for that purpose, showing also their residence, together with the date of issuing their certificate. Fee examination and certificate, \$10.00. The license fee for itinerant vendor of drugs is \$100 a year, and they are transferable upon assignment and payment of a fee of one dollar to the secretary of the board. The penalty for selling without a vendor license is \$10 to \$100.

The State Board of Vocational Education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in the act accepting the terms of the federal law on vocational education commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Act.

The membership of the board is ex-officio. The board co-operates with public schools in formation of day classes in agriculture, trade and industry, and home making. Also in each of these lines part-time and evening classes are conducted by public schools working with the board.

In all cases mentioned above the districts receive reimbursement on teachers' salaries from federal funds alone or from federal and state funds combined.

The thirty-ninth general assembly approved the federal law of June 2, 1920, called the Industrial Rehabilitation Act, for operation in Iowa. By the federal law the State Board for Vocational Education became the board for conducting rehabilitation for all eligible disabled cases excepting those coming directly under the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in army and navy.

For the work of the board for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, in addition to salaries, there is available by act of the legislature \$38,832.50, plus federal aid.

The state game warden is appointed by the governor for a term of four years. His term expires March 1, 1929. He has charge of the state fish

hatcheries, the game farm and the enforcement of the fish and game laws. He has authority to appoint as many deputy game wardens as he may deem necessary. Compensation ranging from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per diem, with actual expenses while away from their homes in the performance of their duties.

The state game warden makes a report biennially to the governor covering the entire work of the department.

The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties. All bills for the per diem and expenses are audited and allowed by the executive council and paid from fees received from applicants.

Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least once annually to examine persons desiring to practice in Iowa as certified public accountants and issues certificates to those qualifying.

The examination fee is \$25.00.

An applicant for examination must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state of Iowa; must be 25 years of age or more and of good moral character; must be a graduate of a high school with a four-year course, have an equivalent education or pass a preliminary examination by the board; must have had at least three years of practical accounting experience, at least one of which shall have been as a public accountant.

The board may register the certificate of any person who is the lawful holder of a certified public accountant's certificate issued under the laws of another state, which extends similar privileges to certified public accountants of this state, or to holders of degree or certified public accountant or chartered accountant or the equivalent thereof, issued by any foreign government provided that the requirements of such certificate or degree are, in the judgment of the board, equivalent to those provided for Iowa.

Practicing as a certified public accountant or chartered accountant or posing as such without having secured the necessary certificate is made a misdemeanor under the law.

Persons granted a certificate to practice, must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000.00.

#### BOARD OF VOTING MACHINE COMMISSIONERS.

The voting machine commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly, providing for the use of voting machines at all state, county, city, town and township elections. By this act the governor was authorized to appoint three commissioners, not more than two of whom should be from the same political party. The commissioners are appointed for the term of five years, subject to removal at the pleasure of the governor.

Individuals or corporations owning or interested in any voting machine may call upon the commissioners to examine the said voting machine. After such examination, the commissioners are to report the results to the secretary of state, giving the capacity of such machine to register the vote of the people, its accuracy and efficiency, and its mechanical perfections or imperfections.

No board is acting at the present time.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time the mining of coal in this state was in its infancy. But few large mines were in operation and the tonnage of coal was small as compared to that of the present time. Then but one inspector was needed. Owing to the growth of the coal industry, the twenty-first general assembly amended the mining law and provided for three inspectors, and gave the governor power to divide the state into three inspection districts. Today the entire time of the three inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

The first district includes the counties of Appanoose, Lucas, Taylor, Monroe (part), Wayne, Page and Adams. Mr. W. E. Holland of Centerville, Iowa, is the inspector in this district, where mines employing 5,385 men, and producing 2,160,341 tons of coal during the calendar year 1923 are located.

The second district comprises the counties of Mahaska, Marion, Monroe (part), Jasper, Keokuk, Van Buren, Davis, Jefferson and Wapello. Mr. Rhys T. Rhys of Ottumwa is inspector for this district, in which 2,302,441 tons of coal were produced by the mines of the second district in 1923 and employment was given to 4,170 men.

The third district comprises the counties of Polk, Webster, Boone, Greene, Guthrie, Warren and Dallas. Mr. Edward Sweeney of Des Moines is the inspector. During the calendar year 1923 the mines in this district produced 1,657,550 tons of coal and employed 3,574 men.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

*Organization.* Pursuant to a call signed by D. F. Wells, then of the Musca-tine schools, and seventeen others, a number of teachers met in the court house at Muscatine May 10, 1854, and organized the Iowa State Teachers' Association, adopted a constitution and elected the following officers: President, J. A.

Parvin, Muscatine; Vice President, Rev. Daniel Lane, Davenport; Recording Secretary, D. Franklin Wells, Muscatine; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; Treasurer, G. W. Drake, Oskaloosa; Executive Committee, Rev. Samuel Newberry, Dubuque; G. B. Denison, Muscatine; Rev. W. W. Woods, Iowa City; D. S. Sheldon, Davenport, and H. K. Edson, Denmark.

The real work of the association began with its second session, which convened at Iowa City December 27th and 28th of the same year. After a very important meeting, this session adjourned to meet at Davenport September 4, 1855. When the time came for this meeting, so few were present it was abandoned.

An educational convention was called to meet at Iowa City June 16 to 18, 1856. At this meeting a permanent organization was effected and the constitution of the association of 1854, somewhat modified, was adopted. Since that time a session has been held each year.

At the session in December, 1905, the semi-centennial anniversary of the association was celebrated by a special campfire program, which was participated in, either in person or by letter, by many of the veterans in education in Iowa.

In the fall of 1917 a reorganization of the association was effected by the incorporation of the five district or section associations with the Iowa State Teachers' Association and the establishment of a permanent office in the city of Des Moines with a permanent secretary in charge.

The state historical society of Iowa was organized in January, 1857. The purposes of the society are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes, a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution during the past sixty-four years. This program of activities includes (1) the discovery, collection and preservation of the materials of Iowa history, (2) researches in the field of Iowa history, (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history, and (4) the dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members.

Since its organization, the society has published a quarterly magazine of history under three different titles. From 1863 to 1874, inclusive, it published *The Annals of Iowa*, twelve volumes, now called the first series. From 1885 to 1902, inclusive, it published *The Iowa Historical Record*, eighteen volumes. From 1903 to date, the society has published *The Iowa Journal of History and Politics*, now in its twenty-third volume.

The society issues a monthly magazine entitled *The Palimpsest*, which aims to present the materials of Iowa history in a form that is attractive and a style that is popular in the best sense. This magazine is now in its sixth volume.

Numerous other publications have been issued by the society, the most important of which are the *Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa*, in seven volumes; *The Executive Journal of Iowa, 1838-1841*; the *Lucas*

Journal of the War of 1812; seven volumes in the Iowa Economic History Series; eleven volumes in the Iowa Biographical Series; three volumes in the Iowa Applied History Series; two volumes in the Iowa Social History Series; seven volumes in the Iowa Chronicles of the World War Series; the Proceedings of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Constitution of Iowa; a volume entitled Amana; the Community of True Inspiration; the Territorial Governors of the Old Northwest; the Battle of Shiloh; the Hollanders of Iowa; the Quakers of Iowa; the History of Senatorial Elections in Iowa; the History of Township Government in Iowa; five volumes on the History of Education in Iowa; Third Party Movements Since the Civil War—With Special Reference to Iowa; Marches of the Dragoons in the Mississippi Valley; Old Fort Snelling; the Spirit Lake Massacre; the Legal and Political Status of Women in Iowa; the British in Iowa; the Government of Special Charter Cities in Iowa; the History of the Sixth Iowa Infantry, and the Literature of Iowa Pioneer Life. The society has also issued a series of twenty-four numbers entitled Iowa and War.

The library of the society now contains about 67,000 titles. The membership of the society includes over twelve hundred active members and twenty-four auxiliary members. One hundred and seventy-five public and college libraries within the state have been designated as official depositories for the publications of the society, and sixty-four libraries and institutions outside of the state have been designated as exchange depositories.

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and values are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water resources, deposits of valuable minerals and other topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. In this work studies have been made of the coal and peat beds, lead and zinc, gypsum, clays and shales, limestone and sandstone, and

the surface and underground water resources. The different geological formations are being studied as units.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage prospects.

"The object of the academy shall be the encouragement of scientific work in the state of Iowa." Membership is open to all persons interested in scientific subjects. Members of the academy are divided into three groups: (1) fellows, who are actively engaged in scientific work; (2) associates, who are interested in the progress of science, but not direct contributors to original research, and (3) honorary fellows, elected by vote from original workers in science in other states. Papers of general interest in addition to those that are technically scientific are presented at each annual meeting. Meetings are held each spring, time and place fixed by the executive committee. By authority of law the academy publishes each year at state expense a volume containing the papers which have been presented at that time.

### SUPREME COURT OF IOWA

#### ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of seven judges, four of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the terms of two of the justices expire at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

#### JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken;
2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action for judgment;
3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;
5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

## TERMS

There are three regular terms in each year, held as follows, to-wit: The first term beginning with the second Tuesday in January and ending with the first Monday of May; the second beginning with the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May and ending with the third Monday of September, and the third beginning with the first Tuesday after the third Monday of September and ending with the third Saturday of December.

The time allotted to each term is divided as nearly as practicable into periods of four weeks each, the first part of each period is devoted to the argument and submission of cases, and the second to consultation and the preparation of opinions. Cases assigned for each period are called in their order as shown on the term docket but no more submissions are taken for one period than in the judgment of the court can be properly considered and determined before the next succeeding session. All causes on the docket are heard at each term unless continued or otherwise disposed of by order of court.

The regular public sessions of the court are held in the supreme court room at the capitol, commencing at 9 o'clock A. M., standard time. On Tuesday of the first and second week of each four weeks' period submission of motions are taken before calling the calendar. Motions noticed for a day when the court is not sitting are taken on the next motion day on which the court sits.

Judgments of affirmance, rulings and orders in causes submitted and orders authorized by law are made at any time regardless of the term of court.

## APPEALS IN CIVIL CASES.

Appeals from the superior, municipal and district courts may be taken to the supreme court at any time within four months from the rendition of the judgment or order appealed from, and not afterwards. No appeal shall be taken in any causes in which the amount in controversy between the parties, as shown by the pleadings does not exceed one hundred dollars, unless the trial judge shall, during the term in which judgment is entered, certify that the cause is one in which the appeal should be allowed, and upon certificate being filed the same shall be appealable regardless of the amount in controversy, but this limitation shall not affect the right of appeal in any action in which an interest in real estate is involved, nor shall the right of appeal be affected by the remission of any part of the verdict or judgment returned or rendered.

## APPEAL IN CRIMINAL CASES.

Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken in all criminal cases within sixty days after the judgment is rendered; and either the defendant or the state may appeal. Upon appeal the supreme court may affirm, reverse or modify the judgment or render such judgment as the district court should have done. It may order a new trial or reduce the punishment, but cannot increase it. If the state appeals, the court cannot reverse or modify the judgment so as to increase the punishment, but may affirm it and shall point out any error in the proceedings and its decision shall be obligatory as law.

## SALARY.

The salary of each justice is six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year, to be increased to \$7,500 a year by act of the forty-first general assembly, applicable to judges elected or re-elected after July 4, 1925. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

## THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA.

There are at the present time sixty-nine judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to five judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$4,000; also actual and necessary hotel and living expenses not to exceed \$3 per day when away from home, and transportation expenses. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$10 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$2,400, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is in sections 10761 to 10766 of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court:

The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

## MUNICIPAL COURTS.

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court, and for the purpose, the territorial limits of any such city extend to the limits

and include therein all civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located.

The salary of municipal court judge is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of city as above indicated.

*Jurisdiction.* Municipal courts have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court, in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on justice of the peace courts, mayors' courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

### SUPERIOR COURTS.

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present six such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

**THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT**

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the forty-first general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the forty-first general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant-governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state and by him bound in book form, after the close of a session.

JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE

DISAGREEMENT AND CONFERENCE

1. Whenever either house shall amend a measure and the other house shall refuse to concur in and adopt the amendment, the house which has adopted such amendment shall either insist on or recede from the same. But when a measure originating in one house is amended in the other, the house in which it originated may amend such amendment and a motion therefor shall take precedence of a motion to concur. In case said house refuses to concur, the house which adopted the amendment may either recede from or insist upon such amendment, and a motion to recede takes precedence of a motion to insist.

After a motion to recede fails of a constitutional majority, such action shall be deemed as insisting on the amendments and shall be so entered upon the Journal of the House or the Senate. In case a motion to insist on the amendment be decided in the negative, and such negative vote shall constitute a constitutional majority, such action shall be deemed a receding from the amendment and so entered upon the journal of the house. In case the amendment is insisted upon, the house so insisting shall request a committee of conference on the subject of disagreement, and shall appoint a committee therefor. The other house shall thereupon appoint such a committee. Unless another number is specified in said request, such conference committee shall consist of four members from each house.

The scope of authority vested in such committee shall be limited to the subject matter of the amendment or amendments which were insisted upon by the body requesting the conference committee. They shall meet at a convenient time, to be agreed upon by their chairman, and having conferred freely, each shall report to their respective house the result of their conference. In case of agreement, the report shall be first made, with the papers referred accompanying it, to the house which refused to concur, and there acted upon; and such action shall be immediately reported by the secretary or clerk to the other house, the papers referred accompanying the message. In case of disagreement of conference committee, the papers shall remain with the house which insisted on the amendment. The agreeing report of a conference committee shall be made, read and signed in duplicate by all the members of the committee, or by a majority of those of each house, one of the duplicates being retained by the committee of each house.

PRESENTATION OF MESSAGES

2. When a message shall be sent from either house to the other, it shall be announced at the door of the house to which it is sent by the doorkeeper thereof, and shall be respectfully communicated to the chair by the person by whom it is sent.

TRANSMISSION OF MESSAGES

3. All messages between the two houses shall be communicated by the secretary or chief clerk or their respective assistants.

ENROLLMENT OF BILLS

4. When a bill shall have passed both houses it shall be duly enrolled by the enrolling clerk of the house in which it originated, and the fact of its origin shall be certified by the endorsement of the secretary or clerk thereof.

EXAMINATION OF ENROLLED BILLS

5. When the bills are enrolled they shall be examined by a joint committee of two from the senate and two from the house of representatives, who shall be a standing committee for that purpose, and who shall carefully compare the enrollment with the engrossed bills, as passed in the house, correct any errors therein, and make report thereof forthwith to their respective houses.

AUTHENTICATION OF ENROLLED BILLS

6. After the report, each bill shall be signed, first by the speaker of the house of representatives, and then by the president of the senate, in the presence of their respective houses.

## TRANSMISSION OF BILLS TO THE GOVERNOR

7. After a bill shall have been thus signed in each house, it shall be forthwith presented, by committee of the house in which the bill originated, to the governor, for his approval, and they shall forthwith report the date of presentation, which shall be entered upon the journal of the house in which the bill originated.

## CONCERNING OTHER ENROLLMENTS

8. All orders, resolutions, memorials or other votes, which are to be presented to the governor for his approval, shall be enrolled, examined, signed and presented in the same manner as bills.

## CERTIFICATION OF BILLS AND OTHER ENROLLMENTS

9. When any bill, resolution or memorial, which shall have passed in one house, is rejected or adopted in the other, notice of such action shall be given to the house which passed the same. And each bill, resolution or memorial shall have properly endorsed thereon, at the time of its transmission, a statement, signed by the secretary or clerk, of the action which has been taken thereon by the house transmitting the same, with the date thereof.

## REINTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND OTHER MEASURES

10. When a bill, resolution or memorial which shall have passed one house is rejected in the other, it shall not be again introduced during the session without five days' notice and leave of a majority of the members of the house in which the same is sought to be introduced.

## TRANSMISSION OF PAPERS

11. Each house shall transmit to the other with any bill, resolution or memorial all papers upon which the same shall be founded.

## PRINTING OF BILLS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS

12. Bills and joint resolutions shall be printed in form as provided by law. Each house may direct the printing of an additional number of its own bills. A substitute for a bill offered by a member or by a committee, where it is entirely or substantially a complete substitute for the particular bill, unless otherwise ordered, shall be printed as a substitute for the original bill (and the caption shall so indicate, giving the substitute the same number as the original bill, but reciting "substitute for" such bill), and such substitute bill shall, by the file clerk, be included in the bill file next to the original bill, and such substitute bill shall not be printed in the journals.

Local or legalizing acts of a strictly private interest shall not be printed in the journal, but are to be printed in bill form only when the cost of such printing shall be deposited with the superintendent of printing at the rate of \$2.00 per page, and the newspaper publication of such bill shall be without expense to the state and same shall not be published until the cost of same has been paid to the secretary of state.

## CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF DOCUMENTS

13. It shall be the duty of the chief clerk of the house of representatives and the secretary of the senate, when any document, except bills and resolutions, is ordered to be printed in their respective houses, forthwith to communicate such order to the other house.

## FORM OF BILL

14. All bills and joint resolutions introduced shall be typewritten on legal cap paper, double spaced, with titles, enacting clause and body of the bill as directed by the secretary of the senate and chief clerk of the house. The written or printed lines in the body of the bill, except the last line of each paragraph, shall contain in spaces, characters and letters, approximately sixty-five (65). Each bill shall be presented securely fastened in a bill cover and be accompanied by two carbon or correct copies thereof, and by three copies of the title alone, on separate slips.

COMPANION BILLS

15. Where bills are introduced in both houses containing identically the same text, they shall be called companion bills. The senate shall designate its author in the usual way, followed immediately by the name of the house member introducing the companion bill in the house, which name shall be in parenthesis. The opposite shall be the rule for house bills. As soon as possible after the introduction of the respective bills, the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house shall ascertain the corresponding file number of the companion bill in the other house and note the same on the bill.

ROLL CALL IN JOINT CONVENTION

16. In all joint conventions of the two houses, the names of all members shall be arranged in alphabetical order, and they shall be called upon to vote in the order in which they stand arranged.

RECORDS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CLAIMS

17. It shall be the duty of the committee on claims in each house to keep a book of record, in which shall be entered each claim for money against the state referred to them, whether presented in favor of private persons or municipal or other corporations, entering therein the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim, the grounds therefor, with note of the evidence offered in support of the same, and the final conclusion of the committee thereon. At the close of the session said book of record shall be deposited with the auditor of state, to be kept by him, and he shall provide an index, showing the names of the claimants recorded therein. At any subsequent session the same shall be delivered, when desired, to the like committee having jurisdiction of such claims and shall always be open to the examination of the said committee of either house.

INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

18. No bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after the third legislative day in March, except by the committee on appropriations.

CODE REVISION BILLS

19. All communications from the Code Editor proposing bills either in the form of bills or otherwise, shall be referred immediately to the code revision committee of each house without reading the same, and the code revision committee shall report suitable bills, or their objections thereto.

RULES OF THE SENATE

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS

1. The following order shall govern:
  - (1) Presentation of petitions and memorials, addressed to the senate or the general assembly.
  - (2) Introduction of bills.
  - (3) Resolutions.
  - (4) Communications on the president's table, including house messages.
  - (5) Reports of standing committees, in order in which they stand in the rules, except the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, rules and printing.
  - (6) Reports of select committees.
  - (7) Unfinished business before the senate.
  - (8) Third reading of bills.
  - (9) General order of the day.

DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT

2. The president shall take the chair at the hour to which the senate is adjourned and call the senate to order; and, if a quorum be present, he shall proceed with the regular order of daily business, unless otherwise ordered by the senate, or unless a special order for the day shall interfere therewith. He shall preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the senate. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise

specially ordered. Immediately preceding the adjournment of each morning session, or, in case it cannot be done during that session, then as soon after the convening of the next following session as he may find most convenient, the president shall call for corrections of the journals of the last day's proceedings. He shall then cause any mistakes therein to be corrected by the secretary, and the journal shall then be approved.

#### THE PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

3. The senate shall, at its pleasure, elect a president pro tem, who shall hold his office during the remaining portion of the time for which the president was elected; and when the president shall, from any cause, be absent, the president pro tem shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by the president.

#### MESSENGERS

4. There shall be appointed by the lieutenant governor, at each session of the senate, to hold their positions during such session, but subject to be discharged by the president of the senate for inefficiency or misbehavior, or other reasons, in his judgment justifying such discharge, six messengers for the senate. And the president may appoint other messengers in the place of any discharged.

#### CALL OF THE SENATE

5. One-fourth of the members may have a call of the senate, and absent members sent for and their attendance enforced. A motion to recess or adjourn to a specified time will not raise the call.

#### DEBATE AND DECORUM

6. When a member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the senate, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. President," and shall confine himself to the question under debate, avoid personalities and the imputation of improper motives.

#### MANNER OF VOTING

7. When the vote is taken viva voce, questions shall be distinctly put in this form, viz: "As many as are of the opinion (as the case may be) say 'aye'." And after the affirmative voice is expressed: "As many as are of the contrary opinion say 'no'." If the president doubt, or a division be called for, the senate shall divide—those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative.

#### DUTY AND RIGHT OF VOTING

8. Every member present when a question is put shall vote, unless he shall, for special cause, be excused by a vote of the senate; but no member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is directly and personally interested, or except by consent of the senate, in any case where he was not present when his name was called in the taking of the vote. Provided, that any member who was absent by leave of the senate may vote at any time before the result is announced.

#### FORM AND WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

9. All motions (except to adjourn, postpone, or commit) shall be reduced to writing, if required by any member of the senate. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, provided the same has not been amended by the senate, and that no amendment is pending thereto.

#### ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, for the previous question, to postpone to a day certain, to commit or amend, to postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are named; and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill shall have the precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to the rejection of the bill.

MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE

11. A motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate, and all incidental questions of order arising after the motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided—whether an appeal or otherwise—without debate.

THE PREVIOUS QUESTION

12. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate, and bring the senate to a direct vote upon the pending amendments and then upon the main question, unless otherwise indicated by the motion and ordered by the senate, except that in case any member of the senate, who has not previously spoken on the measure under discussion, shall have sent to the secretary's desk a written request to be heard on the pending measure, the previous question shall not deny said member from being heard ten minutes on the measure under discussion. The member in charge of the measure under consideration shall have ten minutes in which to close the discussion immediately before the vote is taken upon the main question.

When the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have five minutes to close the discussion on the amendment.

The member in charge of the measure under consideration shall have ten minutes in which to close the discussion, immediately before the vote is taken upon the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative, the senate shall proceed with the matter before it, the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

DIVISION OF THE QUESTION

13. Any member may call for a division of a question, which shall be divided if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that one being taken away, substantive propositions shall remain for the decision of the senate. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but, a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendments to the matter attempted to be stricken out, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

RECONSIDERATION

14. When a motion or question has been decided, any member having voted on the prevailing side may move a reconsideration, on the same or next legislative day.

CONCERNING THE PRINTING OF PAPERS

15. A motion to print any paper presented to the senate may, on motion, be referred to the committee on printing, whose duty it shall be to report, at the earliest time practicable, on the propriety of printing.

INTRODUCTION, READINGS, AND FORM OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

16. Every bill shall be introduced on the report of a committee, or by leave, and shall at once be given its first reading. Every bill and joint resolution shall have received three several readings previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall have its second and third reading on the same day, without a suspension of this rule; and every bill and joint resolution shall express in its title the object thereof. All rules of the senate applicable to bills shall apply with equal force to joint resolutions.

ENDORSEMENT AND PRESERVATION OF PETITIONS, BILLS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

17. Before the same is presented, there shall be endorsed on each petition a brief statement of the subject matter thereof, and on each bill and joint resolution the title thereof, and in either case the name of the senator presenting the same. In presenting a petition, the senator shall briefly state from his place in the senate chamber the subject matter to which the petition relates.

FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

18. The first reading of a bill or joint resolution shall be for information, and, if objection be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall the bill (or joint

resolution, as the case may be) be rejected?" If no objection be made, or the question to reject be lost, the bill or joint resolution shall go to its second reading without further questioning.

#### SECOND READING AND COMMITMENT

19. Upon the second reading of a bill or joint resolution, the president shall refer the bill to an appropriate standing committee, unless otherwise ordered by the senate. If ordered by the senate to be considered by the committee of the whole the senate shall fix the day for its consideration. If the bill or joint resolution be ordered to be engrossed, it shall be in order for its third reading any session after that day. No bill or joint resolution shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

#### COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

20. All bills carrying appropriations or involving the expenditure of state funds shall be referred to the committee on appropriations, which the committee shall report back to the senate not later than March 20th. After the third legislative day prior to said date, house bills shall be reported back by said committee within three days from the reference thereto.

No amendment to any bill reported by the committee on appropriations, or to any item thereof, shall be in order, except such as is germane to the subject matter of the bill, or item thereof, sought to be amended, and shall retrench expenditures and reduce the amounts of money covered by the bill or items thereof.

#### TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

21. No bills shall be introduced in the senate after March 20th, except such bills as may be reported from standing committees as committee bills.

#### SCHEDULE AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

22. On or before the first Monday after March 10th, the committee on appropriations shall prepare an itemized schedule of all appropriations recommended by the committee on appropriations, and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of members, and no appropriation bill shall be taken up for consideration and passage until the third legislative day thereafter.

#### TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF APPROPRIATION BILLS

23. Bills carrying appropriations for state educational institutions and the institutions under the charge of the board of control shall not be introduced later than February 15th, and no bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after the third legislative day in March, except by the committee on appropriations.

#### ENGROSSMENT OF BILLS

24. Every bill shall be considered engrossed when ordered to a third reading unless the senate shall affirmatively direct its engrossment.

#### THIRD READING AND PASSAGE OF BILLS

25. When a question is lost on engrossing a bill or joint resolution for a third reading on a particular day, it shall not preclude a question to engross it for a third reading on a different day. After a third reading of a bill or a joint resolution, no amendment (except to fill blanks) shall be received, except by unanimous consent of the members present; and the vote on its final passage shall be immediately taken without debate.

#### COMMITMENT OF BILLS

26. A bill or joint resolution may be committed at any time previous to its third reading.

#### THE FILLING OF BLANKS

27. In filling blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be first put.

#### HOUSE AMENDMENTS

28. On the return of a bill or joint resolution from the house, with an amendment, it shall be placed with the third reading of bills, unless the senate shall otherwise order. On the question of adopting the amendment the vote shall be

taken on the final passage of the bill, and if the amendment be adopted by a constitutional majority, no further vote is necessary.

TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS

29. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills, on rules and on printing, to report at any time, when no member is addressing the senate.

CONSIDERATION OF SPECIAL ORDERS

30. When any special order of the day is not proceeded with on the day assigned, it shall stand as a general order on each succeeding day until disposed of, unless otherwise ordered, but its consideration cannot be moved until that order of business is reached, when it shall be taken up in order of its file, and shall be taken up in order of precedence.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS AFTER A SPECIAL ORDER

31. When the pending question is interrupted by a "special order," it shall, upon the disposal of the special order, be before the senate in the same stage as if it had not been so interrupted.

COMMITTEE CLERKS

32. Committees are permitted to employ clerks by the majority vote of the whole committee. All applicants for the position of committee clerkship shall be examined by a committee of three appointed by the president of the senate. The clerk shall be selected by such vote, and in like manner may be discharged for inefficiency, or when the services of the clerk become unnecessary. All committee clerks shall be competent stenographers and of good moral character. Any clerk may be discharged for inefficiency, immorality or indecent or unbecoming conduct, whether in or out of the senate chamber; and, upon the request of any senator or the president of the senate, made to the chairman of a committee, a meeting of the committee shall be called for the purpose of considering the question of the discharge of such clerk upon any of the grounds above specified.

DUTIES OF COMMITTEE CLERKS

33. Clerks of senate committees, when not engaged in duties pertaining to such committees, or work assigned them by the committee chairman, shall be subject to the discretion of the secretary of the senate for any labor connected with the duties of his position or his assistants. The secretary shall, from time to time, make detail from said clerks to assist in preparing copy or correcting proof for the daily journal.

FORM OF COMMITTEE REPORTS

34. All reports of committees on bills or resolutions shall be made in triplicate and be accompanied with the original bill or resolution to which the report relates. Provided, that this rule shall not apply to the reports of committees on enrolled and engrossed bills.

Bills reported out by a committee recommending passage, or amendments and passage, or without recommendation, shall not be acted upon before the expiration of one legislative day after the printed journal containing such report has been placed upon the desks of the members of the senate.

TIME OF MAKING COMMITTEE REPORTS

35. The chairman or clerk of a committee, except of the appropriation committee, to which a bill is referred, shall note thereon the date of its reference, and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills in its hands, within fifteen legislative days after the order of reference, unless a different time is granted by a vote of the senate.

If a committee to which a bill was referred neglects to report it back within fifteen (15) legislative days after reference, the author of the bill may have the bill placed upon the calendar by calling the president's attention to the situation.

VOTING IN COMMITTEE

36. When a vote is taken in any committee upon any bill or resolution before it, or any motion relating to the merits thereof, the chairman shall see that



no person is present except the members and clerk of said committee, unless otherwise ordered by the committee.

#### SMOKING

37. Smoking in the senate chamber is hereby prohibited, while the senate is in session. And any officer or employe who shall indulge in smoking while on duty in the senate chamber or doorways leading thereto shall thereby subject himself to liability of discharge.

#### ADMISSION TO SENATE CHAMBER AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING

38. Admission to the floor of the senate chamber shall be granted by the doorkeeper to the governor and his private secretary, members of the house of representatives, the state officers and their deputies, judges of the several courts, ex-members of the legislature, ex-state officers, uniformed soldiers and sailors of the United States army and navy, and the regular reporters of the senate and clerks of committees. No persons, except those herein specified, shall be admitted, except upon special permission of the president of the senate, or of a member of the senate. And no person shall be permitted, by members or otherwise, to come upon the floor of the senate or into the cloak rooms to solicit or influence senators in their official action, or to sell any article or to solicit subscriptions. No officer, or employe elected or appointed by the senate or any of its committees, shall solicit or endeavor to influence members of the legislature in their official action. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed by the senate.

#### CLEARING OF LOBBY AND GALLERY

39. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery, the presiding officer shall have the power to order the same cleared.

#### EXECUTIVE SESSION

40. Before acting on executive business, the senate chamber shall be cleared, by direction of the president, of all persons except members, the secretary, the sergeant-at-arms, members enjoined and the secretary and sergeant-at-arms sworn to observe secrecy.

#### ANNOUNCEMENT OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

41. When an adjournment has been ordered by a vote of the senate and before adjournment is declared by the president of the senate, it shall be in order for the chairmen of the several committees to announce in open senate the time and place of meeting of their respective committees.

#### SUSPENSION OF THE RULES AND TAKING FROM TABLE

42. No standing rule or order of the senate shall be rescinded or suspended, nor shall any matter, tabled upon motion, be taken up, unless by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, except an order fixing the hour to which the senate shall stand adjourned.

#### CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS

43. Resolutions, including concurrent resolutions, shall not be acted upon by the senate upon the day the same are introduced or received by the senate, but shall lie upon the table for one legislative day if any member object to the immediate consideration thereof. But if no member object, the same may have immediate consideration. Nothing in this rule shall abridge or prevent the usual right to reference to committee.

#### RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE

44. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules or orders of the senate, and joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

#### TIME OF CONVENING

45. The hours to which the senate shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be 9 o'clock a. m. and 2 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the senate.

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

The duties of the officers and employes of the senate are as stated in the paragraph relating thereto, and appended to these rules.

*Secretary.*—The secretary of the senate shall have charge of the secretary's desk, and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the senate, except while the same are in the possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept, and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of Rooms 25 and 26, which are assigned to said secretary for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution the date of its introduction, and by what senator, or of its receipt from the house, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the senate. The assistant secretaries shall be under his direction and he shall assign to them their several duties in connection with the duties of the secretary's desk.

*Sergeant-at-arms, File Clerk, and Bill Clerk.*—The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office; shall attend the senate during its sessions; shall aid in the enforcement of order under the direction of the president of the senate; shall execute the commands of the senate from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officers; shall see that the rule prohibiting smoking in the senate chamber is strictly enforced; shall, upon the request of any five members, have the senate chamber lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except one authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereof; shall see that the printed bills and daily journals are, at the earliest practicable period, properly distributed and filed upon the desks of senators; shall have charge of the files in the senate room, and shall see that no copy of a bill is given out except to or upon the order of the president, a senator, or state officers; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the senate chamber upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10 p. m., but should not five members of the senate desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the senate and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the president of the senate any inefficiency or violations of duty on the part of said messengers. He shall direct the file clerk, and bill clerk, if any employed, in the discharge of their duties.

*Doorkeeper.*—The doorkeeper of the senate shall wear his appropriate badge of office, shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the senate, and shall see that the other doors of the senate are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the senate; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper and necessary for the efficiency of the senate and the protection of property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to the admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session of the senate, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messengers from the governor or house.

*Janitor.*—The janitor of the senate shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

*Messengers.*—The messengers of the senate shall attend the senate during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employes. While the senate is sitting, two of their number shall be detailed for service in front of the secretary's desk. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, while the senate is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

At least four messengers shall be on duty in the senate chamber upon every day of the session, except Sundays, from 8:30 a. m. until 6 p. m., whether the senate is in session or not.

#### VOTING IN EXECUTIVE SESSION

47. In all executive sessions the method of voting shall be as follows: The secretary shall cut the senate roll call into slips, the roll shall be called, and each senator shall obtain the slip bearing his own name. After having marked his vote, the secretary shall collect same and hand to the presiding officer, who shall then obtain the result of the vote, and shall announce the result in this way: "The confirmation of.....is agreed to," or "The confirmation of.....is refused." The president shall then place these ballots in an envelope and seal it, and retain same until the close of the legislative session, when he shall destroy them.

#### METHOD OF INTRODUCING AND READING OF BILLS

48. All bills and petitions to be introduced in the senate shall be filed with the secretary of the senate prior to the convening of the senate. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business, the secretary will proceed in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor, but members so far as practicable are requested to observe this rule.

49. Action on report for indefinite postponement. A committee report upon a bill recommending indefinite postponement shall not be acted upon until the expiration of one legislative day after the report has been made and the author of the bill notified of the report by the secretary.

50. The senate may at any time by the vote of the constitutional majority of its members remove a bill from the sifting committee and place it upon the calendar.

### RULES OF THE HOUSE

#### CALL TO ORDER

1. He [the speaker] shall take the chair every day precisely at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned; shall immediately call the members to order, and on appearance of a quorum shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be corrected.

#### PRESERVATION OF ORDER

2. He [the speaker] shall preserve order and decorum, and speak to points of order in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and he shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house by any two members.

#### DECORUM IN PUTTING QUESTIONS

3. He [the speaker] shall rise to put a question but may state it sitting.

#### PUTTING THE QUESTION

4. Questions shall be distinctively put in this form, to-wit: "As many as are of the opinion that (as the question may be) say 'aye'"; and after the affirmative voice is expressed, "As many as are of a contrary opinion, say 'no.'" If the speaker doubts, or a division is called for, the house shall be divided. Those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterward those in the negative.

#### THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

5. The house shall at its pleasure elect a speaker pro tempore. When the speaker shall from any cause be absent, the speaker pro tempore shall preside, except when the chair is filled by appointment by either the speaker or the speaker pro tempore. The speaker or the speaker pro tempore shall have the right to name any member to perform the duties of speaker, but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment. The acts of the speaker pro tempore shall have the same validity as those of the speaker. In the absence of both the speaker and the speaker pro tempore, the house shall name a

speaker who shall preside over it and perform all the duties of speaker until such time as the speaker or speaker pro tempore shall be present, and his acts shall have the same force and validity as those of the regularly elected speaker.

APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

6. All committees shall be appointed by the speaker, unless otherwise especially directed by the house.

VOTE OF THE SPEAKER

7. In all cases of a call of the yeas and nays, the speaker shall vote; in other cases he shall not be required to vote unless the house is equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal, and in case of such equal division the question shall be lost.

DOCUMENTS SIGNED BY THE SPEAKER

8. All acts, addresses and joint resolutions shall be signed by the speaker, and all writs, warrants, subpoenas, issued by order of the house, shall be under his hand and attested by the clerk.

CLEARING OF THE LOBBY

9. In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby, the speaker or chairman of the committee of the whole house shall have power to have the same cleared.

REGULAR ORDER OF BUSINESS

10. After the journal is corrected the following order shall govern:
  1. Business pending at last previous adjournment.
  2. Petitions or remonstrances to be offered.
  3. Reports of committees.
  4. Resolutions laid over under Rule 34.
  5. Bills to be introduced.
  6. Resolutions.
  7. Messages and communications on the speaker's table.
  8. Bills and resolutions read a second time.
  9. Bills on their passage.
  10. Reports in the possession of the house shall be taken up in their order.

RECOGNITION AND DECORUM IN DEBATE

11. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the house, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the presiding officer by his title, saying "Mr. Speaker," and shall not proceed until he shall be recognized by the chair, and shall confine himself to the question under debate and shall avoid personalities.

CALLING TO ORDER AND APPEALS FROM THE CHAIR

12. When any member in speaking, or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the house, the speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately sit down, but may be permitted with leave of the house to explain; and the house shall, if appealed to, decide the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to; if the decision be in favor of the member so called to order, he is at liberty to proceed. If the case requires it, he shall be liable to the censure of the house.

RECOGNITION BY THE CHAIR

13. Should two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall designate the member entitled to speak.

LIMITATION ON DEBATE

14. No member shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the house, nor more than twice until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken, except as provided in section 26; provided further, when bills are being considered on their second reading debate thereon shall be limit-

ed to fifteen minutes to each member desiring to speak thereon, which may be extended by consent of the house.

#### DECORUM DURING DEBATE

15. While the speaker is putting a question or addressing the house, no one shall walk out of or across the house; and when a member is speaking, no one shall engage in conversation or pass between him and the speaker.

#### LIMITATION ON RIGHT TO VOTE

16. No member shall vote on any question in the event of which he is personally interested.

#### COUNT ON DIVISION OF HOUSE

17. Upon a division and count of the house on any question, only those members standing in their places shall be counted.

#### DUTY OF VOTING

18. Every member who shall be in the house when the question is put shall give his vote, unless the house for special reasons shall excuse him; but such a member must ask to be excused before commencing to take the vote on the main question.

#### STATING THE QUESTION

19. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be passed to the desk and read aloud by the clerk before debated.

#### FORM OF MOTIONS

20. Every motion, except subsidiary or incidental motions, shall be reduced to writing if the speaker or any member desires it, but this exception shall not apply to motions to amend.

#### ENDORSEMENT OF BILLS AND OTHER PAPERS

21. All bills, resolutions, petitions, memorials or other papers shall be accompanied by the name of the member presenting the same, and also the name of the county.

#### WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

22. After a motion is stated by the speaker, or read by the clerk, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the house, but may be withdrawn by leave of the house.

#### ORDER AND PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

23. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received but to adjourn; to lay on the table; for the previous question; to postpone to a certain day; to commit or amend; to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged, and no motion to postpone to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely being decided, shall again be allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition. A motion to strike out the enacting words of a bill shall have precedence of a motion to amend; and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

#### ORDER ON QUESTION OF COMMITMENT

24. When a resolution shall be offered or a motion made to refer any subject, and different committees shall be proposed, question shall be taken in the following order: The committee of the whole house; a standing committee; a select committee.

#### MOTION TO ADJOURN

25. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, or the house voting.

#### PREVIOUS QUESTION

26. The previous question shall always be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" When a member moves a previous question he shall specifically state in his motion whether it shall apply to the main question and the amendments, or to the amendment or amendments only. It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and when the

motion prevails its effect shall be to put an end to all debate and to bring the house to a direct vote upon the question to which the motion applies, except when the motion applies to the main question, the member in charge of the measure under consideration, shall have ten (10) minutes in which to close the discussion before the vote is taken; when the motion applies to an amendment the person proposing the amendment shall have five minutes to close the discussion on the amendment. On a motion for the previous question, and prior to submitting the same, a call of the house shall be in order; but after such motion shall have been adopted no call shall be in order prior to the decision of the main question. If the previous question is decided in the negative the house shall proceed with the matter before it the same as though the previous question had not been moved.

**MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE**

27. Motions to lay on the table, to adjourn, and for the previous question, shall be decided without debate.

**EFFECT OF INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT**

28. When a question is postponed indefinitely, it shall not be again acted upon during the session.

**DIVISION OF THE QUESTION**

29. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for the discussion of the house. A motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither an amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible.

**COMMITMENT**

30. Motions and reports may be committed at the pleasure of the house.

**IRRELEVANT AMENDMENTS**

31. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

**RECONSIDERATION**

32. When a motion has been made and carried or lost, it shall be in order for any member of the majority, on the same or succeeding day, to move for a reconsideration thereof, and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions except the consideration of a conference report, a motion to fix the day to which the house shall adjourn, to adjourn, or to take a recess, and shall not be withdrawn after the said succeeding day without the consent of the house; and thereafter any member may call it up for consideration, provided that such motion, if made during the last six days of the session, shall be disposed of when made. A motion to reconsider any vote by which a bill has passed or failed to pass the house shall require a constitutional majority to be sustained.

**PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS**

33. All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the house shall be filed by the member with the chief clerk or his assistant prior to the convening of the house. When in the regular order of business the time is reached for presenting petitions or remonstrances, the chief clerk or his assistant shall read a list of the petitions on file, giving the member's name who filed the same and a brief resume of the contents thereof, and the same shall be referred to the committee of his selection unless otherwise ordered by the house. Each member upon filing any such petition, memorial or other paper shall endorse thereon his name and a failure to do so will cause the same to be ignored.

**CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTIONS**

34. A proposition requesting information from the governor, secretary or any other state officer, and all resolutions shall lie on the table one day for consideration, and all such propositions shall be taken up for consideration in the order they were presented, immediately after the reports are called for from the select committee, and when adopted, the clerk shall cause the same to be delivered.

## CALL OF THE HOUSE

35. Any five members, if the speaker be in the chair, shall be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members.

## METHOD OF CALLING THE ROLL

36. Upon calls of the house, or in taking the yeas and nays on any question, the names of the members shall be called alphabetically, except that "Mr. Speaker" shall be called last. This rule does not preclude the use of the voting machine for the roll call and the use of the voting machine is hereby authorized.

## ABSENCES AND EXCUSES

37. No member shall absent himself from the service of the house without leave unless he be sick or unable to attend.

## METHOD OF CALLING THE HOUSE

38. Upon the call of the house, the names of the members shall be called by the clerk, and the absentees noted after which the names of the absentees shall again be called over, and the sergeant-at-arms be directed by the speaker to compel their attendance. Any member occupying his seat during a call of the house shall be counted by the speaker and his name entered in the journal as being present but not voting, for the purpose of making a quorum.

## COMMITTEE MEETINGS

39. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the house without special leave.

## QUORUM AND DEMAND FOR THE YEAS AND NAYS

40. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and upon demand of any two members the yeas and nays shall be ordered; the members demanding the yeas and nays shall arise for that purpose, and their names shall be entered in the journal.

## TIME OF CONVENING

41. The hours to which this house shall stand adjourned from day to day shall be nine o'clock a. m., and two o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the house.

## COMMITTEE ON PAIRS

42. A committee on pairs may be appointed, to consist of two persons, one of whom shall be selected by the members of each of the two dominant political parties represented in the house. It shall be the duty of the committee to arrange all pairs between members, and to announce such pairs and the time for which they shall continue, to the house, which announcement shall be entered on the journal. Thereafter neither member so paired shall vote (upon any question of a political or partisan nature) until the time of pairing has expired, unless such pair is sooner dissolved by the mutual agreement of the persons so paired. When pairs are dissolved such dissolution shall be entered on the journal of the house.

## FORM OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

43. All bills and joint resolutions introduced shall be typewritten or printed on legal cap paper double spaced, with titles, enacting clause and body of bill as directed by the chief clerk of the house. The written or printed lines in the body of the bill, except the last line of each paragraph, shall contain in spaces, characters and letters, approximately sixty-five (65). Each bill shall be presented securely fastened in a bill cover, and be accompanied by two carbon or correct copies thereof, and by three copies of the title alone on separate slips.

## TIME OF INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. APPROPRIATION BILLS. DUTIES OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

44. The final date for the introduction of bills shall be at the end of the seventh legislative day in March, excepting appropriation bills and committee bills introduced by the appropriations committee.

No bill carrying an appropriation for any purpose shall be introduced after the seventh legislative day in March, except by the committee on appropriations.

The appropriations committee shall report back to the house not later than March 14, all bills in its hands.

Senate bills thereafter received carrying appropriations shall be referred to the appropriations committee, but must be reported back to the house within three days, and remain on the calendar three days before final consideration.

On or before March 14, the committee on appropriations shall prepare a schedule of all appropriations, other than those recommended by the director of the budget, and have the same printed and laid upon the desks of the members, designating in such schedule such bills as may have already passed the house and such as remain to be considered.

METHOD OF INTRODUCING AND READING OF BILLS

45. All bills to be introduced in the house shall be filed with the chief clerk, prior to the convening of the house. When the time for introducing bills is reached in the regular order of business, the chief clerk will proceed in the same manner as if the bills were introduced from the floor. This rule does not deny a member the right to introduce a bill from the floor, but members so far as practicable, are requested to observe this rule.

Every bill shall receive three several readings, but no bill shall have its second and third readings on the same day.

FIRST READING AND RECEPTION OR REJECTION OF BILLS

46. The first reading of the bill shall be for information; and if opposition be made to it, the question is: "Shall this bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be negatived, the bill shall go to its second reading without a question.

SECOND READING, COMMITMENT AND AMENDMENTS

47. Upon a second reading of the bill, the speaker shall state that it is ready for commitment or amendment; and if committed then the question shall be whether to a select or a standing committee, or to a committee of the whole house. If to a committee of the whole house, the house shall determine on what day.

All amendments offered to bills on file or on the calendar shall be accompanied by three copies and shall be filed with the chief clerk. Such amendments shall give the number of the bill sought to amend and the chief clerk shall number each such amendment thus: Amendment No. — to House File No. — or Senate File No. —.

COMMITMENT OF APPROPRIATION AND REVENUE BILLS

48. All bills to appropriate money shall be referred to the appropriations committee, and all bills pertaining to the levy, assessment or collection of taxes shall be referred to the committee on ways and means.

CONSIDERATION OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

49. After a bill has been committed and reported back it shall be considered on its second reading after the amendments of committee have been read.

RE-COMMITMENT

50. After the commitment and report thereof to the house, or any time before its passage, a bill may be re-committed.

ENGROSSMENT OF BILLS

51. Every bill shall be considered engrossed when ordered to a third reading, unless the house affirmatively directs engrossment.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS UPON THIRD READING

52. No amendment, unless by way of correcting an error or omission, shall be received to any bill on its third reading, and no debate shall be allowed on the same.

CERTIFICATION OF BILLS

53. When a bill shall pass it shall be certified by the clerk noting the day of its passage at the foot thereof.



## AMENDMENT AND SUSPENSION OF RULES

54. No standing rule or order of the house shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor, nor shall any rule be suspended nor shall any matter tabled upon motion be taken up except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor shall the order of business, as established by the rules of the house, be postponed or changed except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, except that a motion to make the consideration of a bill a special order shall require a constitutional majority vote.

## TIME OF MAKING CERTAIN COMMITTEE REPORTS

55. It shall be in order for the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills to report at any time when no member is addressing the house.

## PRINTING OF BILLS, MEMORIALS, AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS

56. Bills and joint resolutions shall be printed in form as provided by law. Each house may direct the printing of an additional number of its own bills. A substitute for a bill offered by a member or by a committee, where it is entirely or substantially a complete substitute for the particular bill, unless otherwise ordered, shall be printed as a substitute for the original bill (and the caption shall so indicate, giving the substitute the same number as the original bill, but reciting "substitute for" such bill), and such substitute bill shall by the file clerk be included in the bill file next to the original bill and such substitute bill shall not be printed in the journals.

Local or legalizing bills of a strictly private interest shall not be printed in the journal, but are to be printed in bill form and placed in the files of the members, the same as other bills, in the order of their introduction. The cost of such printing shall be deposited with the superintendent of printing, in advance at the rate of \$2.00 per page, and the newspaper publication of the same shall be without cost to the state and the same shall not be published until the cost of same shall be paid to the secretary of state. No legalizing act may be introduced until all of the provisions of law shall have been complied with.

## COMMITTEE HEARINGS

57. When any matter is referred to a standing committee by motion of any member, it shall be the duty of the chairman of such standing committee to notify such member of the time of the sitting upon such matter referred, and such member shall be permitted to confer with such committee during their consideration of such matter, but no one not a member of the committee shall be present when the final vote is taken on any matter under consideration, and no final action shall be taken by the committee upon any bill on the day of public hearing thereon.

## COMMITTEE CLASSIFICATION OF BILLS

58. Each standing committee of the house shall classify all bills referred to it. The bills of the greatest public importance shall be placed in the first class, and all other bills in the second class. Bills of the first class shall be first considered and reported to the house and no committee shall retain possession of any bill longer than ten days, except by consent of the house. But this shall not apply to the committee on appropriations, or code revision committee.

## RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE

59. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the house in all cases where they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of this house and joint rules of both houses.

## JOINT RESOLUTIONS

60. Joint resolutions shall be framed and treated as bills.

## COMMITTEE PROCEDURE AND REPORTS

61. The chairman or clerk of a committee to which a bill is referred shall note thereon the date of its reference and it shall be the duty of each committee to report back all bills on its hands within ten days after the order of

reference unless longer time is granted by a vote of the house, except as provided by rule 58. The majority of any committee may present its recommendations in writing with the report of the committee, and the same shall be printed in the journal, and said recommendation may, by a vote of the house, be substituted for the report of the committee. The clerks of the different committees shall be subject to their respective chairmen.

When a motion which works a final disposition of a bill in the committee is up for adoption the roll of the committee shall be called and the yeas and nays entered in the minutes of the meeting; this last provision, however, shall not apply to the committee on appropriations and judiciary.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to see that the record of the committee meetings as herein provided, is properly kept, and that the same is deposited with the chief clerk of the house at the final adjournment of the session.

COMMITTEE QUORUM

62. Seven members, or a majority, shall constitute a quorum of each standing committee; but each committee may elect to increase the number to constitute a quorum, in any number not to exceed a majority of the committee.

DECORUM DURING SESSIONS

63. No member or officer of the house shall be permitted to read newspapers within the bar of the house while the journal is being corrected, nor shall any person be permitted to use tobacco on the floor of the house during its session, or in the galleries at any time. This rule may be suspended by a majority vote of the members present.

ADMISSION TO THE FLOOR OF THE HOUSE AND PROHIBITION OF LOBBYING

64. No one shall be admitted to the floor of the house during its session, except members of the general assembly and employees in the performance of their duties, ex-members of the general assembly, the state officers and their deputies, judges of the supreme and district courts, the families of members of the general assembly, superintendents and officers of the state institutions, and each member shall have the right to admit a friend who may be visiting him.

No person admitted to the floor of the house shall, while the house is in session, lobby or attempt to exercise any influence with any member for or against any matter then pending or that may thereafter be considered by the house. Any person violating this rule shall be summarily dismissed from the floor of the house, and shall forfeit his right to admission thereafter.

It shall be the duty of each member and employee of the house who believes that this rule is being violated to report such violation immediately to the sergeant-at-arms.

Lobbyists shall not be admitted, or be permitted to remain on the floor of the house or in the cloak rooms of the house, while the house is in session.

Representatives of the press shall be admitted to the reporters' gallery.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

65. *Chief Clerk.*—The chief clerk of the house shall have charge of the clerk's desk and shall see that no one is permitted therein except himself and those assisting him. He shall be responsible for the custody and safe-keeping of all bills, resolutions and other matters laid before or introduced into the house, except while the same are in possession of the committee to whom the same shall have been referred, and when delivering the same to said committee he shall take a proper receipt therefor. He shall see that the journal of each day's proceedings is correctly and fully kept and fully made up before the next day's session, and be responsible for its safe-keeping. He shall have control of rooms four and five, which are assigned to said clerk for the use of himself and his assistants. He shall endorse on every bill or joint or concurrent resolution, the date of its introduction and by what member, or of its receipt from the senate, and also what action relating thereto is taken by the house. The assistant clerks shall be under his direction and he shall assign them their several duties in connection with the work of the clerk's desk.

*Sergeant-at-arms.*—The sergeant-at-arms shall wear the appropriate badge of his office, shall attend the house during its sessions, shall aid during the

enforcement of order, under the direction of the speaker of the house, shall execute the commands of the house from time to time, together with such process, issued by the authority thereof, as shall be directed to him by the presiding officer; shall, upon request of any member, have the house lighted up during any evening within the session, except Sunday, to an hour not later than 10 p. m.; shall see that no person, except those authorized to do so, disturbs or interferes with the desks of the members, or with the books, papers, etc., thereat; shall see that the printed bills are properly distributed and filed upon the desks of the members, shall have charge of the files in the house bill room, and shall see that no copy of the bill is given except to or upon the order of the speaker of the house, or member, or state officer; shall see that an additional doorkeeper is detailed for duty at the house upon each day within the session, except Sunday, from 8:30 a. m. to 10:00 p. m.; but should no member of the house desire to occupy the chamber to that hour the detail may be relieved at 9:00 p. m.; shall have charge of the messengers of the house and see that they severally perform their duties, and shall promptly report to the speaker of the house any inefficiency or violation of duty on the part of said messengers.

*Doorkeeper.*—The doorkeeper of the house shall wear his appropriate badge of office; shall have special charge of the main door of the chamber during the sittings of the house, and shall see that the other doors of the house are properly attended to; shall have general charge and oversight of the additional doorkeepers of the house; shall detail such of the additional doorkeepers for such general or special duties as the sergeant-at-arms may deem proper or necessary for the efficiency of the house and the protection of the property within the chamber; shall see that the rule relating to admission to the floor of the chamber is strictly enforced; shall, ten minutes before the opening of each session or the house, see that the floor is cleared of all persons not entitled to occupy the same during the session; shall attend to seating visitors, and shall announce all committees and messages from the governor or senate.

*Janitors.*—The janitors of the house shall have charge, under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms, of the cloak and retiring rooms adjoining the chamber, and shall see that the same are kept in proper order.

*Messengers.*—The messengers of the house shall attend the house during its sittings and perform the duties generally devolving on like employees. The messengers shall be under the direction of the sergeant-at-arms while the house is not sitting, and shall attend to such duties as he may assign them.

#### COMMITTEE CLERKS

66. Committee clerks of the house shall be under the general direction of the speaker. All committee clerks shall be on duty at the house from 8:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. except as herein otherwise provided. Any clerk absenting himself or herself from the house except for the noon luncheon without filing at the desk a written excuse signed by the members to whom he or she is assigned, shall not receive any pay for the day or days on which he or she is absent. Committee clerks shall do work for any member of the house upon request unless otherwise employed.

#### EXTRA COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES

67. No employe shall receive any extra compensation or tips for services performed while on duty. Any violation of this rule shall be ground for removal.

#### ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

68. In forming committee of the whole house, the speaker shall leave his chair, and a chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the speaker.

#### BILLS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

69. Upon bills committed to the committee of the whole house, the bill shall be first read throughout by the clerk or chairman, and then read again or debated by the clauses, leaving the preamble to be last considered. After report, the bill shall be again subject to be debated and amended by clauses before a question to engross it be taken.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS TO MOTION

70. All amendments made to an original motion in committee shall be incorporated in a motion and so reported.

AMENDMENTS BY COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

71. All amendments made to a report committed to a committee of the whole house shall be noted and reported as in the case of bills.

FILLING BLANKS

72. In filling up blanks in the committee of the whole house, and in the house, the largest sum and the longest time and the highest number shall be first put.

RULES IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

73. The rules of the house shall be observed in committee of the whole house, so far as they are applicable.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS

74. Bills reported out for passage, for amendment and passage, or without recommendation by the committee shall not be acted upon until at least one day after the printed journal containing said report has been placed upon the desks of the members of the house.

## BIOGRAPHIES

## BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

**JOHN HAMMILL**.—Governor, was born in Linden, Iowa county, Wis., October 14, 1875. Attended the common schools of Wisconsin until 1889, when he moved with his parents near Britt, Hancock county, Iowa. Graduated from Britt high school in 1895. Graduated from the law department of the state university of Iowa in June, 1897. Engaged in the practice of law at Britt, Iowa. He was married to Fannie B. Richards on June 7, 1899. Elected county attorney in 1902, serving two terms. Was elected as a member of the state senate in 1908. Elected lieutenant governor in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Elected governor in 1924. A republican in politics.

**CLEM F. KIMBALL**.—Lieutenant governor, was born August 11, 1868, at Anamosa, Iowa. He attended the public schools of Anamosa until the spring of 1886, not quite finishing his high school course. He then entered the State College at Ames and took a mechanical engineering course, graduating in 1889. He engaged in engineering work and teaching until 1893 when he entered the University of Michigan, taking law and specializing in the literary department. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1895 and began the practice of law in October, 1895, at Council Bluffs, Iowa. He was married to Carroll Williams of Wyoming, Iowa, in 1892. He is a member of the Congregational church, Masonic lodge, Knights of Pythias, Elks and several other organizations. He is also a member of the Country Club of Council Bluffs, and of the Lions Service Club. In 1899 he was appointed assistant county attorney of Pottawattamie county and held the office for two terms. In 1906 he was elected city solicitor of the city of Council Bluffs and served three consecutive terms. In 1912 he was elected to the state senate and served in the 35th, 36th, 37th and 38th general assemblies. He has always been a republican in politics. He has two children, a boy in law school and a girl in high school. He has been an active practicing attorney in southwest Iowa, and is interested in farming operations in Monona and Madison counties.

**WALTER C. RAMSAY**.—Secretary of State, was born in Ford county, Ill., August 15, 1878. His parents were natives of Ohio, both being of Scotch-Irish lineage. Received his early education in the graded schools of Paxton, Ill., and the high school at Owatonna, Minn. He came to Iowa in 1895, locating at Garner, Hancock county. Taught a country school four years and moved to Belmond, Wright county, Iowa, in 1901, and engaged in newspaper work. Served as postmaster, mayor, and on the school board of Belmond and as chief clerk of the Iowa house of representatives in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies. Appointed by the governor April 3, 1919, and assumed office July 1, 1919. Married October 4, 1904, to Miss Una Ames, of Minneapolis. Elected for the full term in 1920. Re-elected in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

**JAMES C. MCCLUNE**.—Auditor of State, was born May 3, 1871, in Rock Island county, Ill. He came to Iowa county, Iowa, in 1874, where he resided on a farm until 1889. He spent six months in the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa, and three and one-half years in the Northern Indiana university at Valparaiso, Ind., where he graduated in law. He was admitted to the bar in Indiana and Iowa in 1893. He practiced law at What Cheer, Iowa, until 1897, where he was elected and served as city attorney. He engaged in farming, mercantile business and banking until 1919, when he took up his residence at Oskaloosa. He was elected state representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. He was married to Lenna Morgan in Keokuk county, Iowa, on September 8, 1898, to which union were born two daughters. He is a member of the Knights of Pythias and Masonic orders. Elected auditor of state in 1924.

**RAYMOND E. JOHNSON.**—Treasurer of State was born in Wilton Junction, Muscatine, Iowa, March 26, 1886. Moved to Muscatine in 1894 and graduated from public schools there. Appointed deputy treasurer of Muscatine county in January, 1908, and in January, 1910, was appointed county treasurer to fill vacancy. He served as treasurer of Muscatine county for five terms and resigned February 1, 1920, to accept the position of secretary of the state executive council. Elected treasurer of state in 1924. Married May 22, 1907, to Edna I. Ryan, of Muscatine. A republican in politics.

**M. G. THORNBURG.**—Secretary of agriculture, was born in Linden, Dallas county, Iowa. Educated in country school in Dallas county and the Des Moines high school; entered Iowa State College in 1900; spending two years. Married Blanche Scholes, April 27, 1904. From 1902 to 1908 associated with his father in farming and stock business. Re-entered college in 1908, graduating from the animal husbandry course of Iowa State College in 1910. As a student was a member of the Royal and International Live Stock Judging teams. Received professional degree of master of agriculture in 1920 from the same institution. Member of the animal husbandry faculty of Iowa State College. Enlisted in world war in March, 1918. Commissioned captain remount service in August. After being discharged in March, 1919, took up the management of several farms in Palo Alto county. Appointed assistant secretary of agriculture in June, 1923. Appointed by Governor Kendall as secretary of agriculture in July, 1924, to fill the office made vacant through the death of Raymond W. Cassady. Elected secretary of agriculture, general election in the fall of 1924. Republican in politics.

**BEN J. GIBSON.**—Attorney general, was born in Adams county, Iowa. Educated in Adams county common schools, Corning high school, university of Nebraska liberal arts and University of Nebraska school of law. Practicing attorney, Corning, 1906-1921. County attorney, Adams county, 1908-1912. Senator, sixth district, 1916. Military record, Iowa national guard, 1901-1916; captain 3rd Iowa infantry, Mexican border service, 1915-1917; captain, 72nd United States infantry, world war service. Elected attorney general November, 1920; re-elected in 1922 and 1924; took office January 3, 1921. Married September 5, 1905, to Miss Anna Rolston, of Adams county. Has three sons, Wayne, Wendall and Ben J., Jr. A republican.

**MAY E. FRANCIS.**—State superintendent of public instruction, was born on a farm. She attended the rural schools and high school; graduated from Iowa state teachers' college with additional work in state university of Iowa and Drake school of law, and completed a year's graduate work in Columbia university, New York. Has taught in Iowa rural schools and high schools, and has been high school principal; superintendent of city schools; county superintendent of Bremer county four years, and also served for two years as Iowa state inspector of grade and rural schools.

**FREDERICK F. FAVILLE.**—Judge of the supreme court and chief justice in 1925, was born on a farm in Mitchell county, Iowa. He attended the public schools at Mitchell, Iowa, and later the Cedar Valley seminary at Osage, Iowa. He attended Iowa state college at Ames, from which he graduated with the degree of bachelor of science. He attended the law department of the university of Maryland at Baltimore and completed his course in law at the state university of Iowa in 1891. After being admitted to the bar, he began the practice of law at Sioux Rapids, Iowa, and moved from there to Storm Lake in 1895. He served two terms as county attorney of Buena Vista county. He was presidential elector from the eleventh congressional district in 1904. In 1907 he was appointed by President Roosevelt as United States attorney for the northern district of Iowa, and served in that office over six years. In 1918 he moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa, and continued the practice of law, as a member of the firm of Healy & Faville. In 1920 he was elected to the supreme bench. A republican in politics.

**THOMAS ARTHUR.**—Judge of the supreme court, is an Iowan, born and bred, a product of the farm, being born in Harrison county July 12, 1860. After attending common school and afterwards receiving an academy education, he entered the law department of the state university of Iowa, graduating in 1881, and was soon afterwards admitted to the bar. He taught school and served as clerk of the district court of Harrison county until 1891, when he entered the active practice of law at Logan. In 1911 he went upon the district bench in the fifteenth district, and served until September 15, 1920, when he was appointed a member of the supreme court of Iowa to succeed Justice Frank R. Gaynor, deceased. He was elected to the supreme bench in 1920. Was chief justice during the year 1924. Was re-elected in 1924 for a term of six years beginning January 1, 1925. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM D. EVANS.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born in Marquette county, Wis., 1852. In 1858 he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools. In 1873 he entered the state university. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the liberal arts course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879, he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the year 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the state university. In September, 1908, he was nominated for judge of the supreme court by the republican state convention to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Charles A. Bishop. He was elected at the general election and by reason of statute became chief justice of the supreme court in January, 1909. Was re-elected in 1910, again in 1916 and again in 1922. Grinnell College conferred the degree of LL.D. upon him in 1916. He is a republican in politics.

**TRUMAN S. STEVENS.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1868. Attended the public schools, the Guthrie county high school; graduated from the law department of the state university and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed judge of the fifteenth judicial district February 1, 1917, and to the supreme court May, 1917. Was elected to said office in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term. Was married in 1893 to Miss Cora Patterson. They had one daughter born to them, Velma, who died December 14, 1910, at the age of thirteen.

**LAWRENCE DE GRAFF.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born near Galena, Ill., June 1871. Educated at Morgan Park academy, Dixon college (A.B.), University of Chicago (Ph.B.), Northern Illinois college of law (LL.M.). Began the practice of law in Chicago, and removed to Des Moines in 1898, as secretary and instructor in the Highland Park college of law, and entered upon the practice in Des Moines with the firm of Miller, Wallingford and De Graff. First assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. Chas. W. Mullan, 1904-1907. County attorney, Polk county, Iowa, 1907-1910. District judge, ninth judicial district, 1910-1921. Elected justice of the supreme court, 1920. Married August 4, 1901; two children, Lawrence, Jr., age 15, and Barbara, age 9. Author of several legal textbooks. Republican in politics. Resides at 4920 Country Club boulevard, Des Moines, Iowa.

**CHARLES W. VERMILION.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born at Centerville, Iowa, November 6, 1866, son of the late W. F. Vermilion and Mary A. C. (Kemper) Vermilion. Married Clara Eloise Biddle June 2, 1897. Attended De Pauw university, and graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan in 1889. Upon graduation, entered the practice at Centerville with his father. Elected county attorney of Appanoose county in 1892, re-elected in 1894. Appointed to the district bench of the second judicial district by Governor Leslie M. Shaw January 1, 1902, to fill the vacancy created

by the resignation of Hon. T. M. Fee. Remained in that position until appointed by Governor Nathan E. Kendall, November 15, 1923, to fill the vacancy on the supreme court caused by the death of Hon. Silas M. Weaver. Elected to fill the unexpired portion of that term in 1924.

**ELMA G. ALBERT.**—Judge of the supreme court, was born June 5, 1866, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa in 1870. Graduated from the law department of Drake University in June, 1891 and entered upon the practice of law. County attorney of Greene county, Iowa, for six years commencing January 1, 1900. District judge of the 16th judicial district from January 1, 1915 until elected to supreme bench in November, 1924.

**ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.**—Reporter of the supreme court and code editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Sioux City for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914, reappointed in 1918 and in 1923. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

**BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.**—Clerk of the supreme court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. When a child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson college and St. Joseph university, from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was fourteen years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur high school. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary to Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 1, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the board of parole. He resigned to become a candidate for the office he now holds. The office being made appointive, he has twice been appointed by the court. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was president of the state missionary board of his church for seven years. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. A republican in politics.

**A. B. FUNK.**—Iowa industrial commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Ill., January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro-tem and chairman of ranking committee. President Capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Reappointed 1919 by Governor Harding and in 1925 by Governor Hammill.

**ERNEST LINCOLN HOGUE.**—Director of the budget. Born in Monroe county, Iowa, August 31, 1861. When two years old his folks moved to Warren county and located near Norwalk. Educated in the common schools and moved to Monona county in 1885. Has resided there since, engaged in the farming and live stock business. Served in the state senate in the twenty-ninth, thirtieth and thirty-first general assemblies. Chairman of the Iowa-Nebraska Boundary Commission from 1921 until July 1, 1924. Republican in politics. Married and has three children and four grandchildren.



**DWIGHT LEWIS.**—Railroad commissioner, born in Oskaloosa, Iowa, where he first attended school. Later removed to Des Moines, where he continued his education, graduating from Drake university (law) in 1893, when he was also admitted to the bar. Secretary of commission 1899 to 1911. Assistant commerce counsel, 1911 to 1917. Appointed to vacancy on commission January 3, 1917; elected to full term 1918, and re-elected for second term 1922. President of National Association of Railway and Utilities Commissioners 1922-1923. Republican.

**CHARLES WEBSTER.**—Railroad commissioner, was born on a farm at Waucoma, Iowa, in 1859, and still resides on the old homestead. Taught in the public schools, edited a county paper, and May 4, 1880, was appointed railway agent and operator at Waucoma. He immediately, in partnership with his brother, Ace, established the firm of Webster Brothers, who have since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain and produce. He is the president of several retail lumber companies operating in Iowa, North and South Dakota and Montana. He has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. He has promoted and built gas and electric companies in Arizona. He was a delegate to the national republican convention in 1908. Was a member of the state council of defense and later state fuel administrator. He was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding to succeed Hon. E. D. Chassell, resigned, and assumed his duties of the office November 5, 1917. He was elected for a full term in 1918.

**B. M. RICHARDSON.**—Railroad commissioner, residence Cedar Rapids. Born at Brighton, Iowa, February 19, 1896. Attended Washington county schools and Academy at Pleasant Plain. First transportation experience with the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad Company, later connected with the Western Weighing and Inspection Bureau. Married September 22, 1917, to Idamae Sieg of Topeka, Kan.; has one son, Donald. Served in World War. Is member of American Legion and Masonic Order. Republican. Elected for full term to the railroad commission November 4, 1924.

**J. H. HENDERSON.**—Commerce counsel, born in 1848 in Warren county, Iowa, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, and has ever since resided in Warren county. Received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Admitted to practice of law 1870. Member of school board at Indianola. Secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson college from 1869 until 1919, during which time was and is now a member of the board of trustees of that institution. Delegate to the republican national convention in 1904. Elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy in 1885. Elected district judge of the fifth judicial district in 1886. Re-elected in 1890, and again in 1894. Resigned January 1, 1896. In 1901 formed a partnership with his son and continued the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson & Henderson until his appointment as commerce counsel July 1, 1911. Re-appointed July 1, 1915, 1919 and 1923. Member of the state board of law examiners four years; member of the Methodist church. Belongs to the Odd Fellows, is a Mason and Knight Templar. Member of Grant club and Des Moines club.

**W. R. C. KENDRICK.**—Commissioner of insurance, was born at Malcom, Iowa, September 11, 1878. Received his collegiate education at Iowa Wesleyan university, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, and Ohio Wesleyan university, Delaware, O., and his legal education at the state university of Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in 1903, and practiced law at Keokuk, Iowa, until January 1, 1917, at which time he was appointed assistant attorney general by Attorney General H. M. Havner, serving four years. He was reappointed assistant attorney general by Attorney General Ben J. Gibson, and served two years. He was appointed commissioner of insurance, February 1, 1923, by Governor N. E. Kendall. Prior to joining the staff of the attorney general he was for six years at the head of the chamber of commerce at Keokuk, and for two years served as secretary of the Central Mississippi Valley league, composed of the commercial organizations to the principal cities from Chicago to Kansas City

and from St. Louis to St. Paul. For four years he served on the executive committee of the Upper Mississippi River Improvement association. He was formerly assistant adjutant general of Utah. He occupied a prominent position in the 1924 National Convention of Insurance Commissioners, being a member of the executive committee and other important committees.

J. A. TRACY.—State fire marshal, was born in Washington county, Iowa, May 5, 1858. At the age of thirteen he began working on the farm and at the age of eighteen engaged in the manufacture of brick, later going into the timber and building material business and real estate. He served under Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft as deputy United States marshal. In 1911 was appointed deputy state fire marshal and served under Ole O. Roe for eight years, when he was appointed state fire marshal in which capacity he is still serving. A republican in politics.

C. ED. BEMAN—Superintendent of banking, was born on a farm near Sigourney, Iowa, February 9, 1870. Was educated in the rural and grade schools. Lived on the farm until 1901 when he went into the hardware business in Delta. In 1903 he began his banking career with the organization of the Peoples Savings Bank of Delta, of which he became vice-president. He later devoted all of his time to the bank and the farm loan business. He removed to Oskaloosa in 1914 when the Peoples Trust and Savings bank was organized, of which institution he became president. In January, 1921, he went with the Mahaska State bank as vice-president, with which institution he is now associated. Was married September 28, 1893, to Lydda Hickey of Delta and has three children. For several years he was a member of the state fair board from the sixth district, for nine years treasurer of the southern Iowa fair, four years president of the Oskaloosa Y. M. C. A. and served as president of the Oskaloosa Commercial club. Affiliated with the Methodist church. A republican in politics.

GEORGE T. BAKER.—Member of board of education, was born on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Conn., McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa state university. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell university, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief consulting engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and Winona, Minn. From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

PAULINE LEWELLING DEVITT.—Was born April 10, 1877, in the Iowa state reform school for girls, which her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Lewelling, had recently organized near Mount Pleasant, Iowa. In 1887, shortly after the death of Mrs. Lewelling, the family moved to Kansas, of which state Mr. Lewelling was elected governor in 1892. Mrs. Devitt graduated from the Wichita high school and the state university of Kansas and taught in high school for four years. In 1901 she was married to J. A. Devitt of Oskaloosa, Iowa, at that time county attorney for Mahaska county. To this union three children were born. Mrs. Devitt was president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association when a special session of the legislature ratified the federal suffrage amendment. In 1920 delegate-at-large to the national republican convention, one of the first women to serve in that capacity. At the time of her appointment to the state board of education by Governor Kendall she was serving on the local school board in Oskaloosa.

**ANNA B. LAWTHER.**—Was born in Dubuque, Iowa, and is the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. She received her early education in the public schools of Dubuque. Miss Lawther was prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pa., and received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr college in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant burser of Bryn Mawr college. From 1904 to 1905 she was the Warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr college, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr college. After resigning her position at her alma mater Miss Lawther returned to Dubuque where she became interested in local activities. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque County Equal Suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly, Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa and was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920. She is at present the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. She is one of the two women appointed by Governor Kendall to serve on the state board of education.

**EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.**—Member of board of education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local school until 12 years of age. Then attended an academy in Milwaukee, Wis., later entering the manual training school in Washington university, St. Louis. In 1891 he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1896. Then followed about three years' foreign study, two of which were spent in Paris, France, at the Ecole des Beaux arts as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Member L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He then relinquished the practice of his profession and became actively connected with the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt, of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1902 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

**WILLARD C. STUCKSLAGER.**—Member of board of education, was born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. He graduated from the high school at Lisbon in 1886. Then entered Cornell college at Mount Vernon, Iowa, going in 1893 to Chicago university. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Aurachter bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present president of the bank and also of the Mount Vernon bank. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past twenty years, fourteen years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES H. THOMAS.**—Member of the state board of education, was born in Warren county, Ill., in 1860, of Welsh and Scotch parentage. The father served in the Mexican war under General Zachary Taylor, blood-relation of the mother of this sketch. Came to Iowa in 1876 and completed his education in the Cromwell public school. At twenty he left the farm to enter business and has been actively engaged in mercantile life since. Served ten years on the local school

board of Kent, Iowa. Represented Union, Ringgold and Decatur counties in the state senate 1913 to 1917. Author of the original Iowa "blue sky law," "teachers' minimum wage law," the prohibitory amendment voted on in 1918. Removed to Creston in 1916, where he is the senior member of the Creston Hardware Co., and one of the leading business men of the city. Appointed postmaster of Creston by President Coolidge in 1924. Married in 1886 to Miss Jemina I. Brown. There were four children in the family, Grace E., Hobart M., Mary I., and Carnot H., all are living except Grace E. A Methodist in church affiliation and an active republican in politics.

**HENRY C. SHULL**—Member of board of education, was born January 16, 1892, at Sioux City, Iowa, son of Deloss Carlton and Francis Edith Shull. Was educated in the Sioux City public schools and graduated from the Sioux City Central high school in June, 1914. Studied law in the University of Chicago law school and the Harvard law school and received a degree from the University of Chicago Law School in June, 1916, (J.D.) Began the practice of law in Sioux City. In August, 1917, enlisted in the service of the navy and was discharged February, 1919, retiring as an ensign, U. S. N. R. F. Returned to Sioux City and entered the law firm of Shull, Stilwill, Shull and Wadden, of which he is now a member. Was married in August, 1921, to Alice Lincoln, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Lincoln, Alton, Iowa. A member of Monahan Post No. 64 of the American Legion, the Masonic fraternity, and the First Baptist church. A republican. A member of the Iowa State Bar Association and the American Bar Association.

**CLAUDE R. PORTER**—Member of the state board of education, was born at Moulton, Iowa, July 8, 1872. Educated in the Centerville schools, Parsons college at Fairfield and St. Louis law school. Admitted to the bar in 1893. Practiced law in Centerville for years, became prominent as a worker in the democratic party. Member of the Iowa house of representatives 1896 to 1900 and of the Iowa senate 1900 to 1904. Democratic candidate for secretary of state in 1898, for governor in 1908, 1910 and 1918 and for United States senator 1908, 1909, 1911 and 1920. U. S. attorney southern district of Iowa, 1914-1918; assistant attorney general in charge of criminal business 1918, 1919; chief counsel federal trade commission July, 1919 to October 1, 1920. Removed to Des Moines and engaged in the practice of law. Member of the Presbyterian church.

**WILLIAM R. BOYD**—Chairman of the finance committee of the board of education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe college, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

**W. H. GEMMILL**—Secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa state college at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of bachelor of science. During these years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken educational work

in history and economics in Highland Park college, Drake university and Des Moines college. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center from 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and resigned to become secretary of the Iowa State Board of Education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

**JACKSON W. BOWDISH.**—Member of the finance committee of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Merwinsville, Litchfield county, Connecticut, on the border line between New York and Connecticut. His parents and all the other members of the family except himself were natives of New York state. When he was a child his parents moved from Dutchess county, New York, to Linn county, Iowa, and located on a farm in Maine township. He resided on the farm until after he was of age, having completed his education at Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Iowa. He left the farm to enter the banking business, which he pursued the greater part of his life. In 1880 he was engaged in the banking business in Canisteo, New York, where he married Charlotte Allison. On his return to Iowa in 1886, he was elected clerk of the district court of Linn county, after which he followed the grocery business for a short time. In 1892 he assisted in the organization of the Bohemian American State Bank, and the Iowa Savings Bank of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, which, by merger, became the present American Trust and Savings Bank. In politics he is a democrat.

**ANTHONY M. MCCOLL.**—Member of the board of control of state institutions, was born in Caledonia, Livingston county, N. Y., May 19, 1858. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and the lumber and grain business at Woodward, Iowa, and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired June 20, 1913. Appointed by Governor Harding for a term of six years ending June 30, 1925 and reappointed by Governor Hammill for full term ending June 30, 1931. A republican in politics.

**JOHN B. BUTLER.**—Member of the board of control, was born near London, Canada, in 1856. Came with his parents to Iowa in 1868 and settled on a farm north of Fort Dodge. Received his primary education in the country schools. Was a member of the class of 1876 of Iowa state college, but quit college near the end of the junior year on account of poor health. Taught school for several years and served as county superintendent of schools of Webster county for four years. Was admitted to the bar in 1883. Served on the board of education of Fort Dodge for twenty years, most of the time being president of the board, and at present is a member of the school board. A democrat in politics and has been the candidate of his party for the state senate and for congress.

**J. H. STRIEF.**—Member of the board of control of state institutions, was born in Galena, Ill., August 21, 1865. His parents located at Dubuque, Iowa, in 1866, a few years later moving to Chicago, Ill., and residing in the latter city until 1876; in August of that year again taking up residence in Iowa, at LeMars, Plymouth county, where he learned the printer's trade and conducted a weekly newspaper. Also published a weekly newspaper at Kingsley, Iowa, establishing the Times during the pioneer days of that town. In the years since 1876 he has been a continuous resident of Iowa. He later located in Sioux City and for years was connected with the daily newspapers of that city. He was president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor from 1913 to 1917. He married Miss Helena Bastlan, of LeMars, and has two sons, Harry J., and William B. A republican in politics. Legal residence, Sioux City, Iowa.

L. A. JENSEN.—Member of the board of parole, was born in Osage, Mitchell county, Iowa, May 21, 1869. His father made homestead entry near Lake Mills on the same farm which the subject of this sketch took over from the other heirs and still owns. Was elected clerk of the district court of Winnebago county. Served eight years in this capacity, and read law in the office of George D. Peters, and was admitted to the bar. Elected county attorney for Winnebago county, serving three terms. He has been an active member of the Lutheran church, and was one of the founders of Waldorf Lutheran college at Forest City, serving as secretary of the association from the time of its organization. He was also for many years secretary of the board of education in his home city and has been chairman of the republican central committee for many years, having been an active republican all his life. He was appointed by Governor Kendall April 8, 1921, to fill the unexpired term of W. S. Withrow on the board of parole, and also appointed to the full term of six years, commencing July 1, 1921.

ERNEST C. HAMILTON.—Member of the board of parole, was born in Walnut township, Madison county, Iowa, August 1, 1889. Attended the rural schools and graduated from Winterset high school. Graduated from State University of Iowa in 1914. For fifteen years he has been associated with his father, J. E. Hamilton, in the real estate and farm loan business. During the past ten years he has been actively engaged in farming. World War 15th Detachment, A. S. A., delegate in 1924 to American Legion National Convention at St. Paul and Democratic National Convention at New York. Democrat in politics. Appointed to the board of parole June 16, 1924, by Governor N. E. Kendall to fill the unexpired term of J. R. Murphy, which expires July 1, 1929.

LOUIS G. LASHER.—Adjutant general of Iowa, was born in Davenport, Iowa, March 17, 1873. His education was acquired in the grade and high schools of Davenport, and the military school Kemper Hall, and Griswold college. His business career began as a traveling salesman in 1891, and in 1897 he accepted the position of manager of the provision business of Swift & Co., at Alleghany City, Pa., from which place he rejoined Company B, 50th Iowa Volunteer infantry in May, 1898, for duty in the Spanish-American war. He served from May 12 to November 30, 1898, in Des Moines, Iowa, and Jacksonville, Fla. On January 5, 1899, he enlisted in the 12th U. S. infantry for service in the Philippines, and was discharged January 4, 1902. On his return to the United States, he traveled until July, 1905, when he helped organize the Lasher Manufacturing Co., of Davenport, Iowa. September 1, 1906, he accepted the general managership of the C. O. D. Cleaning & Dyeing Co., of Davenport, Iowa, and in 1910 became the president and general manager of that firm. On July 24, 1915, he was appointed by Governor Clarke as a lieutenant colonel and A. D. C., and was re-appointed to the same position by Governor Harding on February 1, 1917. On July 20, 1918, he was appointed colonel and assistant adjutant general of Iowa, and on September 1, 1918, he was promoted to be brigadier general, and adjutant general of Iowa, to fill out the unexpired term of Adjutant General Logan. A republican in politics.

ROBERT HENDERSON.—Superintendent of printing and ex-officio secretary of the state printing board, was born at Burlington, Iowa, in 1874, and has lived all his life in Iowa. He was many years engaged in newspaper work at various points in Iowa, and prior to that worked at his trade as printer. He is married and has three children. He was appointed superintendent of printing June 1, 1921. A republican in politics.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.—Son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Ind., February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake university, completing the law course with degree of LL.B., and admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as

county attorney 1898-1902; appointed by Charles Aldrich assistant curator of the historical department of Iowa, 1907; acting curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected curator by board of trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National sculpture society; member American Historical association; a founder and member of board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical association; member and secretary Iowa Flag commission; member and secretary Allison Memorial commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life commission; member and director Des Moines Fine Arts association; member American Civic association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

**W. C. MERCKENS.**—Secretary of the state executive council. Born at Lockridge, Jefferson County, Iowa, October 18, 1882. Education—high school and business course. Enlisted in World War as private, December 2, 1917, and discharged June 19, 1919, as lieutenant. Overseas 15 months. Married. Republican in politics.

**R. G. CLARK.**—Chief, division of dairy and food of the department of agriculture, was born in Massachusetts. In 1872, when ten years old, he came with his parents to Manchester, Iowa, where his father, an old-time produce merchant, embarked in the creamery, egg and poultry business. The son completed his education in the public schools, the Manchester academy and Grinnell college. In 1883 he started out for himself in the butter and egg business at Marcus, Iowa. In 1885 he went to Webster City, where he continued in the creamery, egg and butter business until appointed by Governor Kendall dairy and food commissioner May 1, 1922. He was a member of the twenty-seventh and the twenty-eighth general assemblies, and was Webster City's postmaster from 1903 to 1913. A republican in politics.

**PETER MALCOM.**—Chief of the division of animal industry of the department of agriculture, was born at St. Marys, Ont., Can. He is an honor graduate of the Ontario Veterinary college, Toronto, Can., having been graduated on April 3, 1890, and is still a member of the Ontario Veterinary Medical association. He moved to Iowa in March, 1891, locating at New Hampton, where he continued in the practice of veterinary science until July 1, 1920. On November 29, 1900, he received the appointment of assistant state veterinary surgeon from Governor Shaw; was re-appointed by Governor Cummins on April 27, 1902. On the 28th day of November of the same year he was appointed a member of the state board of veterinary medical examiners, which commission he held for six years. On July 1, 1919, he was made a member of the commission of animal health, and on July 1, 1920, was appointed state veterinary surgeon by Governor Harding.

**W. W. HAIRE.**—Pharmacy examiner, was born at Fort Dodge October 27, 1869. Attended public schools. Started as clerk in drug store July 4, 1887. Attended Iowa State university college of pharmacy 1890-91. Member of executive committee of Iowa State Pharmaceutical association, director in Druggists' Mutual Insurance association of Iowa, acting postmaster at Fort Dodge from October, 1918, to May, 1920. Appointed commissioner of pharmacy by Governor Harding April 24, 1920.

**GEORGE JUDISCH.**—Pharmacy examiner, was born near Muscatine, Iowa, in 1869. He attended the public schools of Muscatine and began his apprenticeship in 1884. He has served for more than twenty years as instructor of pharmacy and materia medica in the veterinary division of Iowa State college. Member of the pharmacopoeial convention, 1910 and 1920. Received honorary degree of doctor of pharmacy, Highland Park college of pharmacy, June, 1919. President Iowa Pharmaceutical association, 1921 and 1922. Appointed pharmacy commissioner by Governor Kendall, April 22, 1922. A republican.

**J. W. SLOCUM.**—Pharmacy examiner, born in Adair County, Iowa, August 23, 1874. Attended high school at Fontanelle. Graduated from a four year collegiate course and also a business course in Simpson college, Indianola, in June, 1898. Residence, Indianola. Has been in the drug business about twenty-five years. Served as mayor of Indianola four terms. Appointed April 23, 1923, as pharmacy commissioner by Governor N. E. Kendall to succeed F. E. Farr, resigned. Reappointed by Governor Kendall in April, 1924. Elected secretary of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association in July, 1924.

**DON M. GRISWOLD, M. D.**—Commissioner of health, was born at Sherman, Wexford County, Michigan, August 18, 1887. His grandfather was the Reverend Horace Griswold, the noted abolitionist preacher. His father, Dr. H. Dwight Griswold, served as a medical officer during the Civil War and practiced medicine in Michigan from then until the time of his death in 1898. Dr. Don M. Griswold attended public schools and later graduated from Ferris Institute, Big Rapids, Michigan. He attended the Michigan agricultural college for two years, specializing in chemistry, bacteriology and physics. Later he graduated in pharmacy and was licensed to practice this profession. He studied medicine at the University of Michigan and graduated with license to practice medicine in 1912. He served the Detroit Department of Health successively as resident physician, Herman Keifer Hospital for Contagious Diseases; director of laboratories; and director of medical service. He spent two and a half years with the Rockefeller Foundation—International Health Board, in charge of field studies on the prevention of disease in South America and the West Indies. He returned from this work to enter the army. During the World War he served as hospital epidemiologist at Camp Taylor, Louisville, Kentucky, and camp epidemiologist at Camp Cody, Deming, New Mexico. For the past five years he has been professor of hygiene and public health in the medical college of the State University of Iowa. In 1913 he married Bernice Clara Voos. One son, Don M. Griswold 2nd has blessed this union.

**H. L. SAYLOR, M. D.**—Member Iowa state board of health, was born in Illinois in 1870. Received a high school, college and medical education, graduating in medicine in 1898. Came to Des Moines in 1908. City health officer for the past fifteen years. Appointed to the Iowa state board of health in the fall of 1924.

**WILLIAM DUKE HAYES, M. D.**—Member of the Iowa state board of health, was born February 7, 1888, at Bowling Green, Kentucky. Attended public schools, the Southern Normal School, Bowling Green, and Kentucky State Normal School at Bowling Green. Later attended medical college, University of Colorado, getting a C. P. H. degree in public health at that institution. Was with the state board of health of Kentucky from 1909 to 1914, first as assistant chemist and later as chemist and bacteriologist and assistant state sanitary engineer. Was with the state board of health of Florida from 1914 to 1915 as assistant state bacteriologist and chemist. Connected with the Sioux City board of health since 1916, with the exception of the latter half of 1918 at which time he taught hygiene and sanitation or preventive medicine to prospective officers at Iowa City until the armistice was signed, returning to Sioux City at that time as health commissioner.

**EDWARD MARSH WILLIAMS, M. D.**—Member of the Iowa state board of health, graduated from the State University of Kansas in 1898. Was professor of biology at Friends University, Wichita, Kan., 1898-1900. Instructor in biology Chicago high school, 1902. Received degree of B. S. from Chicago University in 1903. Attended Rush Medical college 1902-1905. Was professor of pathology and bacteriology in the state university of Oklahoma, 1905 to 1908; instructor in pharmacology and materia medica in the medical school of St. Louis University from 1908 to 1911. Graduated in medicine in St. Louis University in 1910 and also obtained the degree of master of science. Was assistant professor in medicine in St. Louis University and chief of the



medical cut clinic from 1910 to 1913. City health officer and bacteriologist of Oskaloosa since 1917.

**HERBERT R. SUGG, M. D.**—Member of the Iowa state board of health, was born July 20, 1874, at Preston, Iowa, of American parentage. For generations back his father and grandfather were physicians. With his parents he moved to Sabula, Iowa, in 1880 and to Clinton in 1892 where he has since resided. Graduated from the Sabula high school in 1892 and the following year from the Clinton high school. Completed his medical education at Rush medical college in 1896 at the age of 21, and for the following year was house surgeon at the Chicago Polyclinic Hospital, Chicago. Has been in active practice in Clinton since 1898. Was married in 1901 to Florence Olney of Clinton. They have one son. Is a member of the staff of Jane Lamb Memorial Hospital and is past president of the staff and of the county medical society, vice president of the Wapsipincon club, member of the Clinton Country club, Rotary, De Molay Consistory and other civic organizations. Was instrumental in organizing the Red Cross chapter during the war, and has served continuously on the executive board. From 1907 to 1915 was a surgeon in the Iowa national guard. Elected health officer of Clinton in 1912 and has been reelected every two years excepting for the period of 1920-1922 while the Farmer Labor party was in control. Appointed a member of the Iowa state board of health in November, 1924. He is a republican.

### BIOGRAPHIES OF UNITED STATES SENATORS

**ALBERT BAIRD CUMMINS.**—Republican, of Des Moines, Polk county, was born near Carmichaels, Pa., February 15, 1850; was educated in the public schools, preparatory academy, and was three years in Waynesburg (Pa.) college, the latter institution conferred the degrees of M. and A. and LL.D. upon him, and Cornell college, Iowa, that of LL.D.; is a lawyer by profession; was a member of the house of representatives of the twenty-second general assembly of Iowa; a member of the republican national committee from 1896 to 1900, and governor of Iowa from January, 1902, until elected November 24, 1908, to fill a vacancy in the United States senate caused by the death of Hon. W. B. Allison. Was re-elected in 1908, 1914 and 1920.

**SMITH W. BROOKHART.**—Republican, of Washington, Washington county, Iowa, born February 2, 1869, in a log house in Scotland county, Mo. Moved in early life to Jefferson county, Iowa, and in 1882 to Van Buren county, Iowa. Educated in public schools and graduated from Bloomfield high school and the Southern Iowa normal, then at Bloomfield. Taught country schools and worked on the farm between times. Later was principal of the Bloomfield high school. Read law while teaching. Was admitted to the bar in 1892 and located at Washington, Iowa, where he has since practiced law and been interested in farming. Elected county attorney in 1894, again in 1896. Resigned in the spring of 1898 and volunteered in the Spanish-American war. Re-elected again in 1898. Married Jennie Hearne June 22, 1897, and has a family of four boys and two girls. Was a member of the Iowa National Guard after Spanish war and became expert trainer of rifle marksmen, commanding different champion teams. Served with the national guard on the Mexican border, volunteered in world war in 1917, serving until after the close of the war. Chief rifle instructor at Camp Perry, Ohio, and Camp Benning, Ga., at the close of the war. Elected United States senator to succeed Senator William S. Kenyon on November 7, 1922. Re-elected November 4, 1924. His parents, A. C. Brookhart and Cynthia Wildman Brookhart, were both American born, and his father served three years with the union forces in the war between the states.

### BIOGRAPHIES OF REPRESENTATIVES IN CONGRESS

**WILLIAM F. KOPP.**—Representative in congress from the first district. Republican, of Mount Pleasant, was born June 20, 1869, on a farm near Dodgeville, Des Moines county, Iowa; graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college, Mount

Pleasant, Iowa, in 1892, and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1894; was married December 4, 1894, to Miss Clara Bird; has actively practiced law since his graduation; served as county attorney of Henry county, Iowa, from 1895 to 1899; was postmaster at Mount Pleasant from 1906 to 1914; represented Henry county in the Iowa legislature in the thirty-sixth general assembly; was elected from the first Iowa district to the sixty-seventh congress, and re-elected to the sixty-eighth congress.

**F. DICKINSON LETTS.**—Representative in congress from the second district. Republican, of Davenport, was born April 26, 1875, on a farm in Washington county, Iowa, of parents, David Grove Letts, son of Nehemiah Madison Letts, pioneer of Louisa county, Iowa, and Hannah Letts, daughter of Ocran Dickinson, pioneer of Muscatine county, Iowa; attended district country school; Parsons college preparatory school at Fairfield, Iowa; was graduated from Parsons college in 1897, with the B. S. degree; studied law at Columbia university and the University of Iowa, graduating from the latter in 1899, with the degree of L.L.B.; admitted to the bar in 1899, and located at Davenport, Iowa, where he has since resided; was married July 20, 1916, to Josephine Nell Haney; in 1911 was appointed Judge of the district court of the seventh judicial district of Iowa, by Governor Carroll; served in the capacity of district judge from March, 1911, until February 28, 1925, with the exception of two years; elected to the sixty-ninth congress.

**THOMAS J. B. ROBINSON.**—Representative in congress from the third district. Republican, of Hampton, was born in Lafayette county, Wis., August 12, 1868, and moved with his parents to Hampton, Iowa, in the spring of 1870. Following his graduation from the high school, he entered business and has since been actively engaged in banking and farming. Was married to Miss Belle Clinton and they have five children, two sons and three daughters; is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and was elected to the general conferences of 1908, 1912 and 1916, and appointed delegate to the Ecumenical conferences in Toronto in 1911; member of the Iowa state senate 1912 to 1916; elected to the sixty-eighth congress and re-elected to the sixty-ninth.

**GILBERT N. HAUGEN.**—Representative in congress from the fourth district. Republican, of Northwood, Worth county, was born April 21, 1859, in Rock county, Wisconsin; since the age of 14, and prior to his election to congress, he was engaged in various enterprises, principally real estate and banking; was treasurer of Worth county, Iowa, for six years; was elected to the Iowa legislature, serving in the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth general assemblies; was elected to the fifty-sixth, fifty-seventh, fifty-eighth, fifty-ninth, sixtieth, sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

**CYRENUS COLE.**—Representative in congress from the fifth district. Republican, of Cedar Rapids, was born in Marion county, Iowa, and was graduated from what was then Central university at Pella; was connected with the Des Moines Register from 1888 to 1898, and with the Cedar Rapids Republican as owner and editor from 1898 to 1921. Was elected to congress to fill vacancy, July 19, 1921, re-elected November 7, 1922, and November 4, 1924.

**C. W. RAMSBERGER.**—Representative in congress from the sixth district. Republican, of Bloomfield, was born on a farm near Collinsville, Ohio, March 13, 1875. When two years old his parents moved to McLean county, Illinois, where his father died in 1881; since 1887, Davis county, Iowa, has been his home; was married to Miss Ruby Phillips June 2, 1915, and they have two children, Jane and Barbara. He is a graduate of the Southern Iowa normal, Iowa State Teachers' college, and the college of law of the State University of Iowa; taught school six years and practiced law at Bloomfield since 1906; was elected county attorney of Davis county in 1910 and 1912. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

**CASSIUS C. DOWELL.**—Representative in congress from the seventh district, composed of the counties of Polk, Dallas, Madison, Marion, Story and Warren. Republican, of Des Moines, was born in Warren county, Iowa. American parentage. Elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

**LLOYD THURSTON.**—Representative in congress from the eighth district, composed of eleven counties in the southwest part of the state. Republican, of Osceola, was born in Clarke county, Iowa, March 27, 1880, and has been a continuous resident of said county, except periods spent in Spanish-American war, Philippine insurrection and World war. Graduate of University of Iowa, 1902; county attorney Clarke county four years; served in Iowa state senate. Married. Elected to the sixty-ninth congress.

**WILLIAM RAYMOND GREEN.**—Representative in congress from the ninth district. Republican, of Council Bluffs, was born at Colchester, Conn., November 7, 1856; received a high school education at Princeton, Ill., and graduated at Oberlin college, Oberlin, Ohio, in 1879 in the classical course; read law in the office of McCoy & Pratt, Chicago, and was admitted to practice at Ottawa, Ill., in 1882; began the practice of law at Dow City, Iowa; later moved to Council Bluffs and from there to Audubon in the fall of 1886; was elected judge of the district court in 1894, and re-elected in 1898, 1902, 1906 and 1910; and was elected representative in congress at the special election held June 5, 1911, to fill vacancy caused by resignation of Hon. Walter I. Smith. Elected to the sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

**L. J. DICKINSON.**—Representative in congress from the tenth district. Republican, of Algona, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29, 1873; his early education was received in the Danbury (Iowa) high school, from which he graduated with the class of 1892; attended Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Iowa, and graduated in 1898 with the B.S. degree; then took up a law course in the university of Iowa and was graduated in 1899 with the degree of LL.B.; admitted to the bar in 1899, and located at Algona, Iowa, July 1; was married August 21, 1901, to Miss Myrtle Call, two children being born to them, Levi Call and Ruth Alice; served as county attorney of Kossuth county two terms; committeeman tenth congressional district, republican state central committee, 1914-1918; elected to sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

**WILLIAM DAYTON BOIES.**—Representative in congress from the eleventh district. Republican, of Sheldon, O'Brien county, Iowa, was born January 3, 1857, on the farm that his father homesteaded in the year 1845 in Boone county, Ill.; came to Buchanan county, Iowa, with his parents in 1873; received his education in the country schools and public schools of Belvidere, Ill.; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa with the class of 1880; was married in 1881; has two sons; located in O'Brien county, Iowa, October, 1881, where he practiced law continuously until appointed judge of the district court, fourth judicial district of Iowa, January 1, 1913; on a division of the district he became judge of the twenty-first judicial district of the state, and at the general election in 1914 was elected judge for the term of four years, which position he resigned March 31, 1918, to become a candidate for the republican nomination for congress; was elected to the sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth and sixty-ninth congresses.

#### BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE SENATORS

**WILLIAM S. BAIRD.**—Senator from the nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Council Bluffs, June 3, 1863. Parents native of Pennsylvania. Father, Rev. Samuel Baird, Methodist preacher. Mother, Matilda Hanks (Akers) Baird. Married Anna E. Wood, now de-

ceased, of Logan, Iowa, January 9, 1895, daughter of John W. and Eliza A. Wood. Children, John W., William S., Jr., Lucy W. (deceased), Robert M., Donald P. and Margaret (deceased). Graduated from high school, Council Bluffs, 1880. Graduated from Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, 1884. Admitted to practice law, 1887. Trustee free public library, Council Bluffs. Member of Masonic order and Knights of Pythias. Elected senator, 1920, re-elected 1924. A republican in politics.

C. A. BENSON.—Senator from the thirty-sixth senatorial district, Clayton county, was born on a farm in that county, where he is now engaged in general farming, cattle feeding, and breeding of pure bred Shorthorn cattle, in partnership with father and two brothers under firm name of August Benson and Sons. Received his early education in the country grade school, and took a course in banking at the Capital City Commercial College, Des Moines, Iowa. He graduated in agriculture in 1914 at Iowa State college, Ames, Iowa. Has served as deputy clerk of the district court, as secretary and manager of the Elkader Fair Association, as secretary and manager of the Highland Telephone Company, as president of the Clayton County Shorthorn Breeders Association, and as secretary of the Clayton County Farm Bureau from the time of its first organization until he resigned to run for the office of senator. He is a member of the Lutheran church, a Master Mason, and a republican.

A. H. BERGMAN.—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, composed of Jasper county, was born March 12, 1872 on a farm, eight miles north of Newton, Iowa, and lived on the farm for twenty years, graduating from the rural school. After leaving the farm he attended Capital City Commercial College at Des Moines, Iowa, and graduated in the year 1890. He then engaged in the implement business in Newton, Iowa, and in 1893 in the manufacturing business—manufacturing what was known as the Parsons hand cutter and self-feeder. In 1900 he engaged in the washing machine business and has lived in Newton ever since, being interested in manufacturing, banking and farming.

M. L. BOWMAN.—Senator from the thirty-eighth district comprising Black Hawk and Grundy counties, was born at Galesburg, Ill. His parents moved to Hutchinson, Kan., when he was four years of age. While he was still a young boy death deprived him of both mother and father. He then came to Iowa where he has resided ever since. His guardian was a stockman, farmer and banker, and at the age of seventeen years he was stationed in the Chicago stockyards buying and shipping cattle for re-sale in the rural districts. In 1903 he entered the college of agriculture at Ames where he graduated in 1905 and for a portion of that time was superintendent of the college farm, which, together with extra work in the agronomy department, furnished him the means of paying his way through college. Upon graduation he was offered chair in the farm crop department under Prof. P. G. Holden, who had taken a special interest in him, and two years later was given a full professorship in charge also of the farm crops experimental work. He was the originator of the "Seed Oats Special" trains that ran throughout Iowa and accompanied Prof. Holden on all the seed corn special trains in that educational campaign. He was for three years secretary of the Iowa Corn Growers' association. He lives on a farm adjoining the city of Waterloo, specializes in pure bred Holstein cattle and takes an active interest in the affairs of the city, being secretary of the Greater Waterloo association, at the time he was elected to the state senate.

W. J. BREAKENRIDGE.—Senator from the forty-seventh district comprising Palo Alto, Kossuth, Emmet, Clay and Dickinson counties, was born in 1892 in Wright county, Iowa. Moved to Tama county two years later where he was raised and educated in the country schools of north Tama county at Dinsdale. Was graduated from the Traer high school and from the Iowa State college in 1915. Member of the Gamma Sigma Delta Honorary Agricultural fraternity. Since 1915 has been active in operating from one to five

farms and has given much time to farm organization activities. Served as county agent in Cherokee county in 1918 and as president of the Tama county Farm Bureau in 1919. Moved to Palo Alto county in 1920 to operate a seven hundred acre farm. Has served as president of the Palo Alto County Farm Bureau since 1921. Member of the school board and co-operative elevator board. Chairman of the republican county committee. Elected to the state Senate in 1924. Was married October 20, 1915, to S. Edith McMillan of Traer, Iowa, and has three boys living, one daughter having died in infancy. A member of the Masonic lodge and Congregational church.

**A. T. BROOKINS.**—Senator from the forty-fourth district, composed of Floyd and Chickasaw counties, was born December 16, 1883, at Ionia, Chickasaw county, Iowa; graduated from the high school at Charles City in 1902; taught in rural and high schools; engaged in farming and stock raising in Chickasaw county; was married to Ruth Dodge of Orchard, Iowa, July 24, 1907; left the farm to accept position in First Savings Bank at Ionia, Iowa; a member of St. Charles Lodge 141 A. F. & A. M.; Almond Chapter 53 R. A. M.; Joppa Commandery 55 K. T.; A.:A.:O.:N.:M.:S. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. A republican in politics.

**J. L. BROOKHART.**—Senator from the tenth district, composed of Washington and Henry counties, was born September 9, 1871, in Missouri, and at an early age moved to Iowa, and in 1894 to Washington, Iowa. Attended rural schools, at the age of 17 began teaching, farming in the summer time. Graduated from the Washington academy in 1896, and was principal of the Washington school for two years. During this time he read law in the office of his brother, S. W. Brookhart. Passed the bar examination and was admitted to the bar in May, 1898, and in July of the same year was appointed county attorney. His father, A. C. Brookhart, is a veteran of the Civil war, and resides at Washington, Iowa. Elected senator in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES STEERE BROWNE.**—Senator from the twenty-third district, composed of one county, one of the oldest in the state, was born in June, 1875, at Baldwin, Iowa, where he acquired his education in the public schools. American born parents. Always lived in the county of Jackson, state of Iowa. Taught school at the age of 18 years. Buyer and feeder of live stock and farm owner. Never held an office of any description up to the year 1920. Eligible to the Sons of the American Revolution. Always a republican in politics.

**JONAS DEMOSS BUSER.**—Senator from the twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born in Louisa county, Iowa, January 15, 1867, of American born parents. He attended the public schools of Conesville, Iowa, and Iowa City academy. He also attended the collegiate department of the state university, and in 1892 completed one of the then two-year law courses in the state university. He was compelled to relinquish his school work because of serious eye trouble and engaged in farming. Served two terms as county supervisor, and was twice president of the state association of county supervisors. Elected senator in 1918. A republican in politics.

**ED. H. CAMPBELL.**—Was born on the farm near Battle Creek, Iowa, on March 6, 1882. Attended the rural school until 14 years of age. Graduated from the Battle Creek high school in 1900. Graduated from the university of Iowa in 1916, law department. Served as mayor of Battle Creek for three terms. Member of the house of representatives of the thirty-fourth general assembly. Senator for the forty-sixth senatorial district. Married Esta Fein in Los Angeles, Cal., October 25, 1913. Son, Romeo Campbell, born August 31, 1915. Republican in politics. Member of law firm of Campbell & Campbell, Battle Creek, being associated with his twin brother, Jed H. Campbell.

**E. E. CAVANAUGH.**—Senator from the twenty-seventh senatorial district, composed of Calhoun and Webster counties, was born July 29, 1881, in Lehigh,

Webster county, Iowa. Attended the grade schools and graduated from high school of that city, in 1900. Graduated from Tobin college, normal school, Fort Dodge, Iowa, in 1901. Taught school in the rural districts and was superintendent of the Lehigh schools for two years. Married to Belle M. Ingalls, of Lehigh, Iowa, in June, 1906. Elected county superintendent of Webster county, 1906. Served two terms. Entered the University of Iowa, in the school of law. Graduated from the law school, University of Iowa, in 1910. Elected county attorney in 1912, and served two terms. Elected senator, November, 1924, on the republican ticket.

T. C. CESSNA.—Senator from the twelfth district, composed of Poweshiek and Keokuk counties, born in Bedford county, Pennsylvania. Came to Iowa in 1887, and located at Grinnell. He was educated in the public schools and by private instruction. Has been actively and extensively engaged in farming and the cattle business for the past thirty years. An active member of the Corn Belt Meat Producers' association. Was chairman of the Poweshiek Council of Defense. Elected senator in 1918, and re-elected in 1922. A republican politically.

W. A. CLARK.—Senator from the fifteenth district composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born on a farm near Gallipolis Gallia county, Ohio, April 22, 1867, where he attended public schools, came to Marion county, Iowa, in the year 1886 where he has since resided with the exception of two years spent in Warren county, Iowa. He was married to Edna McQuerry in 1890. To this union three children were born, only one living to maturity, Callie E., now Mrs. H. H. Phillips of Pleasantville, Iowa. He spent several years in the mercantile business and in the year 1900 moved to the farm where he resided for twenty years. He was deputy county auditor in 1895-96; was treasurer of Marion county from 1921 to 1925 and took the oath of office as state senator January 12, 1925. A republican in politics.

GEORGE M. CLEARMAN.—Senator from the twenty-fifth district, comprising Johnson and Iowa counties, was born on a farm in Johnson county on October 5, 1870. He was educated in the public schools and has been engaged in farming and stock raising in the same locality all his life. He was married in 1892 and has three children, Ray, Harold and Stella. Was one of the charter members of the Johnson County Farm Bureau organization and has been one of the directors ever since. Is an Episcopalian and a thirty-two degree Mason. A republican in politics.

H. A. DARTING.—Senator from the eighth district, was born in Harrison county, Iowa, February 5, 1873. Moved with his parents to Thayer county, Neb. Returned to Harrison county in 1881. Received his education in the rural schools. Moved to Mills county in 1911. Is a member of the Christian church. An Odd Fellow, a York Rite Mason, including the Shrine. Elected senator in 1920, re-elected in 1924. Republican in politics.

HERBERT E. DEAN.—Senator from the forty-ninth district comprising Osceola, Lyon, O'Brien and Sioux counties, was born in O'Brien county, Iowa, December 5, 1872, of American parentage. Attended school at Primghar, and Morningside college, Sioux City, Iowa. Served two years as deputy clerk of the court of O'Brien county, under J. W. Walter. Served two years as assistant cashier of the Primghar State Bank under J. L. E. Peck. Entered the Northern Indiana Normal school at Valparaiso, Indiana, and graduated with the class of 1896. Entered the law department of the State University of Nebraska and graduated with the class of 1898. Was married to Estella M. Bowser of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and has two sons, Wilbur M. and Forest C. Moved to Harris, Iowa, in 1899, and was elected president of the school board. Moved to Ocheyedan, Iowa, in 1901. Was once appointed and three times elected mayor of that town. Devotes most of his time to his farm interests. Elected representative in 1916. Re-elected in 1918. Elected senator in 1924. A republican in politics.

**A. G. DOTTS.**—Senator from the fourth district which includes Wayne and Lucas counties. Residence Corydon. He was born on a farm near Bethlehem, Wayne county, Iowa, May 24, 1870. Received his education in the rural schools of that community. Engaged in farming, stock raising and banking. Elected county auditor in 1908 serving four years. Employed as assistant bank cashier for three years. Member Corydon lodge I. O. O. F. Elected representative in 1922. Elected senator in 1924. A republican in politics.

**LLOYD ELLIS.**—Senator from the third Iowa district, composed of Appanoose and Davis counties. Was born in Appanoose county, May 29, 1883. Lives in Centerville, Iowa. Spent most of his life in Appanoose county. Was married to Miss Blanche McCoy, July 2, 1906. Has two adopted children, Helen Virginia and Betty Jeanne. Attended the public schools of Appanoose county and Drake university at Des Moines, Iowa. Holds degree of A.B. and A.M. Has been actively engaged in the ministry for a number of years. Is a Knight Templar Mason. Was elected state senator on the democratic ticket in 1924.

**SAMUEL EDWIN FACKLER.**—Representative from Adams county, was born in Ohio in 1876. He was educated in the public schools and high school in Ohio and Iowa. His occupations have been farm operator and merchant. He was married in Ogalalla, Neb., to Mayme Allen. They have two children, Samuel Edwin, born March 29, 1901, and Theodore Allen, born January 30, 1913. He served as mayor of Prescott two terms, and as member of Prescott school board nine years. He has been secretary and auditor of the Prescott Telephone Co., and is now president. He is a member of the Masonic order, Elks, M. W. of A., and A. O. U. W. He is a member of the Christian church. Elected representative in 1920 and 1922. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES J. FULTON.**—Senator from the second district, composed of the counties of Jefferson and Van Buren, was born in Jefferson county, Iowa, January 27, 1860. His parents were American-born. He attended both common and private schools and was graduated in 1883 from Parsons college. Remained on the farm until the winter of 1891-2, when he became a member of the Loudon Machinery company. Was mayor of Fairfield from 1903 to 1907 and again in 1920. Served as chairman of the local exemption board for Jefferson county during the World War. Was president of the Fairfield Chautauqua association for thirteen years. Is a trustee of Parsons college and a trustee of the Fairfield free public library. Was a member of the house of representatives in the thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. Elected senator in 1920 and re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

**FRED C. GILCHRIST.**—Senator from the fiftieth district, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868, removed to Iowa 1871, and has lived here since. Educated in common schools and at State Teachers' college. Taught school for two years and was county superintendent of Pocahontas county 1890-92. Completed law course at State University of Iowa in 1893 and was admitted to the bar. Married Ellen Hurley in 1896 and has three children. Was a member of the house in the twenty-ninth general assembly. Elected to the senate in 1922. A republican in politics. Residence, Laurens.

**WILLIAM J. GOODWIN.**—Senator from thirtieth district was born in Beaver, Iowa, 1878; the son of Robert Goodwin and Margaret Goodwin; attended rural school and graduated from schools of Grand Junction, Iowa; was graduated from Drake university, 1899. Engaged in manufacturing clay products with factories at Des Moines and Redfield, Iowa; also interested in Iowa land. Was republican county central committee chairman Polk county, 1912. Married to Miss Grace H. Kingman, May 22, 1901, Des Moines; has two sons, Robert, born May 23, 1904, and William Junior, born December 13, 1909. Residence, Des Moines.

**O. E. CONNORSON.**—Senator from the forty-first district, composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born in Worth county, Iowa, February 25, 1875. He was educated in the rural schools, St. Ansgar Seminary and Institute, and the Northern Illinois Normal School. For several years he was engaged in farming, merchandising and teaching. In 1903 he was elected county superintendent of Worth county and served nine years. He moved to Forest City in 1913 and has been interested in farming and banking, being now an active officer of the Forest City National Bank. The communities in which he has lived have called upon him to serve as town clerk, councilman, member of the county fair board, of the city commercial club and as president of the board of trustees of the city library. In 1897 he married Gurine Finnesgard of Kenyon, Minnesota, and has two children, Esther and Harvey. Another son, Maurice, accidentally drowned at Clear Lake, August 4, 1924. Elected Senator in 1924. A republican in politics.

**GEORGE S. HARTMAN.**—Senator from the fortieth district, composed of Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born November 13, 1871, in Sharon, Wis., and moved to Iowa in the fall of 1877, locating at Fayette. He received his education in the public schools of Fayette. In 1892 he entered the mercantile business at Fayette with his father and brother under the firm name of M. J. Hartman & Sons, which continued until the death of his father in 1915. The sons still continue the business under the firm name of Hartman Brothers. Senator Hartman has served on the city council and as chairman of Fayette county republican central committee and is director and vice president of the First National bank of Fayette. He was married to Miss Gertrude Clothier, of Rockford, Ill., in July, 1907, who died in February, 1920. He has two sons. Is a member of the Modern Woodmen, Elks and Yeomen. He was elected senator in 1920 and re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

**WILLIS G. HASKELL.**—Senator from the twenty-sixth district, composed of Linn county, was born June 5, 1857, in Bradford, Iowa. Attended the graded schools of Cedar Falls, Charles City and Independence. Was employed as telegrapher, station agent and traveling freight and passenger agent from 1873 to 1893, then entered the wholesale and retail coal business, in which he is still engaged. Is also interested in the manufacturing business, being president of the Johnson Gas Appliance Co., and in the real estate business, being president of the J. S. Anderson Land Co., and the Mound Farm Land Co. Has been director of the Merchants' National bank for a number of years. Has served as alderman of Vinton and Cedar Rapids. Chairman of the park commission of Cedar Rapids, member of the republican state central committee, president of commercial club and as postmaster from 1909 to 1913. Was married June 15, 1881, to Mae E. Williams and has four children, two boys and two girls. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and B. P. O. E. lodges. Elected senator on the republican ticket in 1916, 1920 and 1924.

**B. J. HORCHEM.**—Senator from Dubuque county, the thirty-fifth district, is principal of the Audubon school at Dubuque. He was born December 4, 1866, the son of John and Henrietta (Plaster) Horchem. His father, a Union soldier, died shortly after the war. In 1884 he was graduated from the Dyersville schools (of which he was afterwards principal); in 1892, from the normal school at Valparaiso, Ind.; and from the business college at Cedar Rapids. He has subsequently pursued special courses of sociology and psychology in Columbia university and the University of Chicago. He was three times elected superintendent of the Dubuque county schools. His great achievement has been the development of the ideals of boys' problems and "social center" activities. He is connected with numerous societies of an educational, sociological and scientific character. He is especially interested in all that pertains to education, health and general "uplift." He was elected representative in 1914, was re-elected in 1916, and elected senator in 1918 and 1922.

**CHARLES FREDERICK JOHNSTON.**—Senator from the forty-third district, composed of Franklin, Cerro Gordo and Hancock counties. Resides at Sheffield,



Iowa. He was born January 17, 1866, on a farm two miles east of Hampton. His father was Irish, coming from the County Cavin, Ireland, and his mother a native of Ohio of Scotch parents. He is a graduate of the Hampton high school. Following graduation he attended the law school at the state university. Was admitted to the bar in 1891 and is at the present time engaged in banking and the practice of law in Sheffield, Iowa, being president of the Citizens Bank of that place. He was married June 29, 1892 to Delle Haecker. They have two children, a son, C. F. Jr., now associated with his father in the bank, and a daughter, Winifred, a student at the state university of Iowa. He was a member of the house in the 26th, 26th Extra and the 27th general assemblies and was the first native son to occupy the position and is the first native son to occupy a similar position in the senate. Is a member of the K. P. lodge and the Elks, also a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. A republican in politics.

**CHARLES B. KERN.**—Senator from the eleventh district, which includes Clark and Warren counties, was born at Norwalk in Warren county, February 1, 1867. His parents, John and Miriam Black Kern, came from Ohio to Iowa in the year 1857 and settled in Linn township, Warren county, on the farm now owned and occupied by Senator Kern and family. He lived on the farm, spent his school days in the country district school, Indianola public schools and Simpson college. Married August 25, 1893 to Mary Frances Spring. They have four children, all of whom are living. He is actively engaged in farming and feeding. Represented his county in the 37th and 38th general assemblies. Was elected to the state senate from the Clark-Warren district in 1924. A republican in politics.

**DAVID W. KIMBERLY.**—Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When he was six years old his parents moved to West Liberty, Muscatine county. He has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant-Stratton's business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Owls, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918 and 1922. A republican in politics.

**JOHN N. LANGFITT.**—Senator from the sixteenth district composed of Adair and Madison counties, was born in Scott county, Iowa, May 9, 1866. On his father's side he is of Scotch-Irish descent. His mother was of English descent. His early education was received in the rural schools. He also attended Wilton Academy and Davenport business college. When twenty-one years of age he went to Adair county. Four years later he married Clara A. Martin, daughter of W. B. and Lucy E. Martin of Greenfield. Mrs. Langfitt died July 14, 1924. There are four surviving children, Harry M. of Chariton, Iowa; Bernice Louise of Des Moines, Clara Mildred and John N. Jr., students in high school. He lived for several years in western Washington but returned to Adair county in 1898, purchasing the family homestead on which he still resides. He is a Presbyterian, also a blue lodge and thirty-second degree Mason. He was representative from Adair county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth general assemblies and was elected senator in 1924. In politics he is a republican.

**REDFIELD C. MILLS.**—Senator from the seventeenth district, composed of Dallas, Guthrie and Audubon counties, was born January 22, 1891, in Redfield, Iowa. Married Ella Frances Shaw in Redfield, December 30, 1920. Has one son, Clipper Eugene, born March 26, 1923. Attended both the country and town schools. Has lived about equal portions of his life on farm and in town. He farmed three years in North Dakota. Graduated from the Kansas City Veterinary College in 1915. He started practice in Redfield, Iowa. On July 24, 1917 he entered the United States army as veterinarian and first lieutenant, serving in the army twenty-two and one-half months. Following discharge

from service re-entered the practice in Redfield, Iowa, in which place he is still practicing. Has never before held a public office. He is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Sons of Veterans and American Legion. Has always attended the Methodist church. Elected state senator November, 1924. A republican.

**WM. E. MCLELAND.**—Senator from the 28th district, was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, April 16, 1867. In 1869 he moved with his parents to Marshall county, and has been a resident of that county ever since. He was educated in the public schools and in the Marshalltown high school. He was elected and served as county auditor from 1903 to 1907, and again in 1916 to 1919. Was married to Minnie M. Robinson January 25, 1889. They have four children, two boys and two girls. He is a farm owner and is engaged in general farming and breeding of registered Short Horn cattle. Elected to the state senate in 1924. A republican in politics.

**JULIUS A. NELSON.**—Senator from the eighteenth district, was born in Cass county, Iowa, January 14, 1872, and has been a resident of that county nearly all his life. Received his early education in the rural schools, after which he attended high school, and is a graduate of a business college. Was married to Miss Elizabeth Brown, January 1, 1902, and to this union three children have been born, Donald, Gaile and Margery. He has held the office of township clerk, trustee, secretary of school board and school treasurer. Is director and vice president of the Farmers' Savings bank of Atlantic, also president of Atlantic Building & Supply company. Was elected senator in 1918 and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**GEO. B. PERKINS.**—Senator from forty-eighth district composed of Greene, Carroll and Sac counties, was born at Fond du Lac, Wis., August 11, 1874. He attended the public schools of Fond du Lac, and the German and English academy. He moved to Sac City, in July, 1896, and became identified with the Sac County State bank. In 1900 was elected clerk of the district court of Sac county and held this office four years. On January 1, 1905, became president of the First National bank, Sac City. In June, 1899, was married to Lola May Early of Sac City. They have one son, George Early, and two daughters, Miriam Larrabee and Eloise Lorraine. Was elected representative in 1918 and 1920, and senator in 1922. Republican in politics.

**JOHN M. RAMSEY.**—Senator from the 39th district, composed of the counties of Butler and Bremer, was born at Clarksville, Iowa, his present home. He is a republican in politics. He was educated in the public schools, high school and private college. Early in life he learned the printer's trade and for thirty-three years, almost continuously, he has been connected with the Clarksville Star, of which he is at present editor and publisher. He was clerk for several years of his home town, assessor for ten years, and deputy county treasurer for one term. He was reared in the Presbyterian faith, and is of Scotch-Irish descent. He is a Canton Odd Fellow, thirty-two years has been a Knight of Pythias. He married Della Shafer, and they have two daughters, Georgia Edna, now Mrs. Gay Jackson, and Alice Lavon. Was elected state representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922. Elected senator in 1924.

**CARL W. REED.**—Senator from the forty-second district, Howard and Winneshiek counties, was born at Cresco, Iowa, May 6, 1873, and has always lived at Cresco; is a graduate of the Cresco high school, and of the college of law, University of Minnesota. Engaged in the practice of law at Cresco since 1896, in partnership with his father, the late Henry Thomas Reed, who was a member of the 16th general assembly from 1896 until the latter's appointment as United States district judge in 1910. Has been city solicitor of Cresco and county attorney for Howard county. Is married, and has three children. Elected to the senate in 1918, and re-elected in 1922. A republican in politics.

**S. C. REES.**—Senator, was born in Warren county, Iowa, educated in common and high school; took Horace Greeley's advice, went west and located in

Fremont county. Married Miss Lula Harris in 1881. They have four children living, two sons and two daughters. Represented Fremont county in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh assemblies; was elected to the senate in 1922. Politics, republican; business, farming; sideline, real estate and insurance.

**C. L. RIGBY.**—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties. Was born in Stanwood, Iowa, February 20, 1874. Received his early education in the Stanwood public schools. Attended Cornell college, from which he graduated in 1894. Member of the Sigma Nu fraternity. Immediately after graduation started farming, and now owns and operates eight hundred and sixty acres of land. Married Jennie Davis Billings, to which union was born two children, Edward and Isabel. Has been actively engaged in banking for about twenty-five years, and has been president of the Union Trust and Savings bank at Stanwood for the past sixteen years. Is a trustee of Cornell college, and a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges. Elected senator in 1924. Republican in politics.

**H. GUY ROBERTS.**—Senator from Ringgold county, was born of American parents in Liberty township, Ringgold county, April 13, 1878. He attended the public schools until he was twelve years old; he attended Humeston Normal College for two months when he was called home by the death of his mother. Later he attended Highland Park Normal College at Des Moines for six weeks, but returned home on account of sickness. He was married September 18, 1902, at Grand Island, Nebraska, to Minnie E. McDonald. He held various township offices before his election to the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies as a representative from Ringgold county. He is a member of the Christian church and a republican in politics. He is a farmer by occupation. He was elected to the senate in 1924 from the fifth senatorial district, composed of Decatur, Ringgold and Union counties.

**E. W. ROMKEY.**—Senator from the ninth district, was born on farm near Burlington, Iowa, July 3, 1869. Attended rural schools and business college. Resides at present on old homestead. Was married to Nellie Lloyd in 1908 and has one daughter, Helen, and one son, Donald. Has held public office almost continuously since 1900. Elected to the fortieth general assembly from the ninth senatorial district in 1922. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM SCHMEDIKA.**—Senator from the thirty-seventh district, composed of the counties of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright, was born in Shellsburg, Wis., August 19, 1869. In 1875 his parents moved to Hardin county, Iowa, settling in the western part of the county. His early boyhood days were spent on the farm and attending the rural school. Later he attended the Dexter Normal school at Dexter, Iowa. He has lived on the farm all his life, for years farming in the summer and teaching school in the winter. Later he quit teaching and farmed extensively, together with buying, feeding and shipping live stock. Also a heavy writer of fire insurance, being with the Farmers of Cedar Rapids thirty years. In 1889 he was united in marriage with Clara Awe. To them were born two boys and two girls. His wife died in 1907. He is a member of the K. of P. lodge. Was elected representative in 1914; and in 1923 was elected senator to fill vacancy caused by the death of D. C. Chase. Elected senator as an independent.

**J. O. SHAFF.**—Senator from the twenty-second district, Clinton county. Born January 6, 1885, at Shaffton, Iowa; graduate of Iowa State College and University of Wisconsin; married Gladys Melick, 1908, since deceased; married Evelyn Lillie Purcell July, 1921; member of the house in 37th general assembly; member of the senate in 40th, 40th extra and 41st sessions. Is engaged in farming and the dairy business, specializing in Holstein cattle; operates grain elevators at Shaffton, Princeton and McCausland. President Citizens Savings bank, Low Moor, Iowa, and director City National bank, Clinton, Iowa. Actively interested in republican politics for the past twelve years.

**FRANK SHANE.**—Senator from the thirteenth district; was born May 16, 1875, in Mahaska county, Iowa. He graduated from the Letts high school in 1892, attended Iowa Wesleyan college, Mt. Pleasant, and college of physicians and surgeons, Keokuk; taught school in Appanose, Van Buren and Lee counties. Started in the retail drug business at Stockport in 1900; moved to Eldon in 1902, where he owned and operated a drug store until 1912. During his residence in Eldon he served as a member of the school board, as justice of the peace and as mayor, and was elected representative from Wapello county in the thirty-fourth general assembly. He also served as president of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association. Moved to Ottumwa in 1913 and engaged in the insurance business. Has been agency manager for southeastern Iowa for the Royal Union Life Insurance company for a number of years. Served as county chairman of the Wapello county republican central committee for two terms and was elected state senator in 1922. Is a member of the Masonic, Knights of Pythias and Elks fraternities. Also a member of the Rotary club and of Wapello club. Married to Gail Walker, of Chariton, Iowa, in 1899. Two children, George W., age 18, and Elise, age 10. A republican in politics.

**A. J. SHINN.**—Senator from the thirty-fourth district, composed of Harrison, Crawford and Monona counties; was born in Pottawattamie county, Iowa, November 7, 1866. In February, 1880, he moved with his parents to a farm in Harrison county, in which county he has since resided. In 1889 he married Margaret Whiteside and to them were born two daughters, Ada and Edith. He received his education in the rural schools. Has been engaged in farming for many years. In 1901 he was elected sheriff of Harrison county, serving two terms. Also served as trustee a number of terms. Elected to the senate in 1922. He is a Mason. A republican in politics.

**LARS JOHAN SKROMME.**—Senator from the thirty-first district which includes Boone and Story counties. Residence, Roland. He was born in Norway in 1879. He immigrated to the United States in 1885 with his parents, settling on a farm near Roland, Story county, Iowa. He received his early education in a one room country school, attending school about three months during the winter and working on the farm the balance of the year. He studied at Highland Park College, now Des Moines University, Des Moines, Iowa, Red Wing Seminary, Red Wing, Minnesota, and Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois. He has served as pastor of the Lutheran church at Eagle Grove, Iowa, and Pontiac, Illinois. He has been at different times engaged in the real estate business at Clarion, Iowa, and Thief River Falls, Minnesota. Immediately following the entry of the United States into the World War he enlisted as a private in the Iowa National Guard and was later mustered into federal service. After the armistice he received honorable discharge, having attained the rank of first lieutenant of the infantry. Since the war he has been engaged in farm operations and in the seed business at Roland, where he organized the Skromme Seed Company of which he is now president. Elected to the senate in 1924. Republican.

**GEORGE F. SLEMMONS.**—Senator from the thirty-third district, including Buchanan and Delaware counties. He was born on a farm in that county on August 17, 1875. Received his education in the rural and graded schools of the county, and at Lenox college, Hopkinton, Iowa. He has spent his entire life on a farm. Was married on June 1, 1904, to Miss Mabel L. Thompson of Buchanan county. To them were born two children, John W. and Ruth Gertrude. Has held office of township trustee, assessor, bank director and numerous other offices. Served on local school board twenty-five years. Member of Odd Fellows, Masonic and M. W. A. lodges. Presbyterian in religion. Republican in politics. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Elected senator in 1924.

**I. N. SNOOK.**—Senator from Lee county in the first district of Iowa, was born in Union county, Pennsylvania, in the year 1848. At the age of six years, his parents, with the rest of the family—four girls and four boys, came

to Iowa. The family settled in Lee county, two miles north of West Point, in June, 1854, having traveled five weeks in two covered wagons. Here the senator grew to manhood with the rest of the family. He was educated in the old Farmers' college. At the age of 23 he married Rachel Box, five years his junior in age. Six children were born to this union, Ola Dell, Crilla Alice, Edward, Frank Emmet, Gertrude and Charles I. Snook. All children grew to man and womanhood. The eldest girl, when 15 years of age had the responsibility of the rest of the family, as the wife and mother died at this time. A widower and never re-married. All his life he has been in the pursuits of agriculture. Served his township sixteen years as justice of the peace. Has held all township offices. Has been state thresher president fourteen years, and is now national director for Iowa. Has threshed fifty-six years. Owns two Iowa farms of one-half section.

F. C. STANLEY.—Senator from the fourteenth district, composed of Mahaska county, was born November 26, 1881, on a small farm near Ackworth, Warren county, Iowa. Moved to Indianola in 1890. Attended the district school. Graduated from Indianola high school in 1899. Interested in general stock farming for three or four years. Graduated from Simpson college in 1907 with a degree of B.S. A partner in the Indianola Herald. Read law at odd times with O. C. Brown of Indianola. Attended the University of Wisconsin, 1909-1910. Head of the department of chemistry, Penn college, from 1910 until the present time. During the year 1916-1917, was engaged in the financial interest of the college. Spent the year 1913-1914 in Europe on leave of absence, specializing in chemistry at the University of Berlin, Berlin, Germany. Traveled extensively through Europe, Egypt, Palestine and Turkey. Was married July 27, 1915, to Ada C. Whitney and has four daughters, Isabel, Kathryn, Margaret and Barbara. Was elected senator in 1924. Republican in politics.

BETEL M. STODDARD.—Senator from the thirty-second district, composed of Woodbury county, was born at Minonk, Ill., January 21, 1871. Graduated from Illinois college, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-five years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth liberty loan campaigns. With his son he operates grain elevators at Sloan and Owego, Iowa. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He was re-elected in 1920 for the full term and again in 1924. He has always been a republican.

HARRY C. WHITE.—Senator from the forty-fifth district, comprising the counties of Benton and Tama, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1869, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford academy and Cornell college, Mount Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. For many years president of the Peoples Savings Bank of Garrison. Was married in 1894. Elected representative in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918 and again in 1922. A democrat in politics.

Served on township board for eight years. Member of the M. E. church and Masonic lodge. Elected representative in 1924. Republican in politics.

C. E. ANDERSON.—Representative from Webster county, was born on a farm near Stratford, Iowa, June 24, 1886. Received his early education in the rural schools and in the Stratford high school. Attended the Moody Bible institute in Chicago for five terms. Was appointed street commissioner in Stratford in 1914. Has served on the Stratford police force and fire department. In 1913 was married to Anna Ahlstrom. They have one child, Frank G. Is a member of the Methodist church and the Modern Woodmen of America. Elected representative in 1922. Re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

OSCAR ANDERSON.—Representative from Decatur county was born in LaSalle county, Illinois, January 22, 1872. When two months old he moved with his parents to a farm in Decatur county, Iowa, near Lamoni. He has resided in or near Lamoni ever since. Attended the rural schools, the Lamoni high school and graduated from Highland Park College of Des Moines. Taught school in Lamoni, Iowa, for three years. Is cashier of the State Savings Bank of Lamoni, having been connected with it since its organization July 1, 1898. Owns and operates a farm by hired help. Was elected mayor of Lamoni in 1920 and served for two years. Has been a member of the Lamoni school board for twenty-three consecutive years. Is chairman of the Decatur county hospital board. Married Ella Belle Kelley June 28, 1906. They have three children, Oscar Kelley, age 17; Richard Carroll, age 14 and Margaret Belle, age 12. Is a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Was elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

J. C. BAUER.—Representative from Washington county, was born in Germany, April 19, 1868. Came to Iowa in 1885, locating in Washington county. Attended the rural schools and also Elliott's Business College at Burlington. Has been actively engaged in farming since that time. Was married in 1892 to Victorine Davis. They have five children, four of whom are living. Has held the various township offices. A member of the Methodist church, also a Knight of Pythias. Elected to the legislature in 1924. Republican in politics.

JOHN H. AIKEN.—Representative from Ida county, was born at Iowa City, March 27, 1876. He was taken by his parents, Benjamin Franklin Aiken and Patience (Williams) Aiken to Ida county in 1876, where he has since resided. In October, 1903, he was married to Henrietta Hass, of Holstein, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Aiken have three daughters, Patience Louise, Thelma Norine and Virginia Helen. Mr. Aiken is a republican in politics and was elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922 and in 1924.

H. S. BERRY.—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1867; moved with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of a farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM BIERKAMP.—Representative from Cedar county, was born in Hanover, Germany, September 18, 1849. He spent his boyhood in the fatherland, coming to the United States in 1868. He attended a private school in Davenport and later entered the implement business. Accumulated several farms which he now owns and was in the real estate business for several years. Financially interested in and director of several banks. Married September 2, 1874, to Miss Minnie Feldhahn of Durant and to them were born seven children. Was mayor and councilman and has been school director for many years. Member of the Lutheran church. Republican in politics.

JOHN M. BIXLER.—Representative from Adams county, was born on a farm in Adams county, Iowa, December 23, 1867. Attended the rural schools and

later the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa. Graduated from Highland Park college, now known as the Des Moines University, in 1891. Was elected county superintendent of schools in Adams county in 1892, serving two terms. Was journal clerk in the house of representatives in the 26th and 26th extra sessions. Married Miss Fannie L. Day, March 13, 1892. They have six children, Fern, Marjorie, Mary, Carl, Neal and Blanche. At present engaged in general farming. Member of the Masonic lodge and of a community church. Republican in politics.

**AARON V. BLACKFORD.**—Representative from Van Buren county, was born December 18, 1871, on a farm in that county and has lived there continuously. His parents were natives of Pennsylvania and his father was a member of the 35th general assembly, representing Henry county. He was graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college in 1897 and is a member of the college fraternity, Beta Theta Pi. He is engaged in the hardware, implement and automobile business in Bonaparte. He is vice president of the Bonaparte State bank, and is extensively engaged in farming on the stock-partnership basis. He has one son, Kenneth. He is a Methodist, a Knight Templar, a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Mystic Shrine. A republican in politics.

**WILLIAM R. BLAKE.**—Representative from Fayette county, was born on a farm in Jo Daviess county, Ill., October 1, 1878, coming to Iowa in 1900. He is a graduate of the Elizabeth high school, Danville normal and Chicago Park Business college. He taught school and while in high school began to learn the printing trade. He had connections with several papers in Illinois and Michigan before going to Delaware county, Iowa, where he did newspaper work until the summer of 1905 when he went to Clermont, Fayette county, and started the publication of the "Enterprise" of which he is still editor and publisher. Married Miss Bessie B. Morgan in 1904 and has two children, William Burdette and Anna Lolita. Was councilman at Clermont one term and mayor for three terms; is a member of the Masonic, I. O. O. F. and Modern Woodman lodges. Was elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

**FRED R. BLYTHE.**—Representative from Iowa county, was born in 1890 of Scotch-Irish parentage, on the farm he now operates. Graduated from the University of Iowa 1913, and Columbia Law school, 1916. Admitted to Illinois bar 1916, and practiced law a short time in Chicago. Married Bertha von Schrader of Jackson county, Iowa, 1916, and has two children. Member of Presbyterian church and Masonic Order and is president of the board of education. Elected to the legislature in 1924. A republican in politics.

**DAVID BRITAIN.**—Representative from Madison county, was born in that county in 1871; attended high school at Winterset; graduated from the Madison County Normal Institute and attended Leander Clark college at Toledo, Iowa. Taught school a number of years and has since followed the vocation of farming. He was married on April 4, 1900, to Sarah E. Thompson, of Stuart, Iowa; to this union were born five children, only two of whom are now living, Mrs. Estella Brittain Mosby and Miss Mildred M. Brittain, both of Winterset, Iowa. Mr. Brittain has been active in local politics and in farm organizations, having acted as director, secretary and president of the Madison County Farm Bureau. He is also a director in the Farmer's Co-operative Association of Winterset, having served as secretary-treasurer during the construction period. He attended school in that county and later taught in the schools from 1902 to 1905. He was married to Miss Edith Wehling, of Reddick, Illinois, on January 23, 1906, when he moved to Iowa on a farm near Bremer, Bremer county. To this union four children were born, Floyd, Clarence, Mildred and Luella. Elected secretary of the Bremer Creamery Company for two years. Moved in 1913 to a farm two miles northwest of Waverly. In 1919 he was made president of the Bremer County Farm Bureau and served the following two years as vice-president. Elected twice to the Iowa federation. Chosen as state representative in the fall of 1924. He is a republican in politics.

**ROBERT S. CLARK.**—Representative from Emmet county, was born on a farm in that county, May 3, 1870. He attended rural and public schools. Was married to May E. Jones in 1893. They have two children, Margaret and William. Is a member of the Presbyterian church. He was elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**C. G. COLE.**—Representative from Delaware county, was born on a farm near South Owego, Tioga county, N. Y., October 4, 1890. Attended public school at Greeley and Dr. Holbrook's school at Ossining, N. Y. Graduated from Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., in June 1916. Enlisted in the navy and was aboard the U. S. S. *Aurore*. Returned to Greeley where he is actively interested in Delaware county land. Is president of Delaware Savings Bank, a member of the board of directors of Security Savings Bank at Greeley, president of Delaware County Bankers' Association, and treasurer of Delaware County Farm Bureau. A republican in politics.

**COY CRAIG.**—Representative from Warren county, was born at New Athens, Ohio, in 1858. Came to Iowa in 1864. Was a farm hand for five years, then bought and operated a farm. In 1900, married Anna E. Kitchell. Has one daughter and three sons. Served two terms as county supervisor. Member of Presbyterian church. Republican in politics.

**H. C. DEWAR.**—Representative from Cherokee county; was born in Will county, Illinois, December 16, 1870, and moved with his parents to Cherokee county, Iowa, in 1880. He acquired the greater part of his education in the public schools of Cherokee county. Engaged in general farming and breeding Shorthorn cattle. On May 24, 1893, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Randall, of Warren, Ill. They are the parents of eight children—five boys and three girls, all living. Mr. Dewar is an Odd Fellow, Mason, a Modern Woodman and a Presbyterian. He gives his political allegiance to the republican party and has served his township in the capacity of trustee and clerk, also on the school board for many years.

**VOLNEY DILTZ.**—Representative from Polk county. Born at Troy Mills, Linn county, Iowa, February 24, 1889. Moved to Illinois with his parents in 1891 after the death of his parents he returned to Iowa in 1899. Worked on a farm in Linn and Buchanan counties until 1908. Was educated in Hampton and North Des Moines high schools. He completed his education at Drake



university, University of Chicago and University of London. Was admitted to the bar in 1916. Enlisted in the infantry during the world war. Was commissioned a first lieutenant, he served two years and three months, was overseas fourteen months; service in Flanders, Argonne, St. Mihiel offensives. Has engaged in the practice of law in Des Moines since his return from service in 1919. Is a member of the American Legion, a Mason, a Woodman and a Yeoman. He was married to Marguerite Lambert, of Nutley, N. J., in 1921. Is a republican in politics.

R. B. ECKLES.—Representative from Butler county, was born on a farm in Marshall county, Iowa, August 6, 1876. He was educated in the rural schools, and graduated from the Iowa State college in 1896. Justice of the peace for many years, a member of the Aplington consolidated school board for twelve years, being president of the board at this time. A member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

JOHN EDEN.—Representative from Clinton county, was born December 25, 1870, on a farm in Clinton county. He lived on a farm continuously until 1921, when he moved to Calamus, his present home. Served as road boss for two years, president of school board two years, director of a rural school, three years, president of Red Cross five years, president of Farmers Elevator Company four years, county supervisor six years, and town councilman. Elected to the legislature in 1924. Received his education in the rural schools. On October 3, 1895, married Agnes B. Kuebler, to which union were born three sons, Lester J., Richard J., and Bernard William. Mr. Eden is a Thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Modern Brotherhood of America, the Modern Woodmen of America, and is a republican.

GEORGE W. EDGE.—Representative from Jasper county, was born on an old soldier's claim in Saunders county, Nebraska, March 27, 1872. Has resided in Iowa since 1877 and in Jasper county since 1883, owning and operating a quarter section of land in that county. Was married September 1, 1897, to Anna Friend. They have two children, Margaret, who is married, and Everett, who is still at home on the farm. His education was procured in the rural schools and in the Hazel Dell academy at Newton. Was in the Iowa National Guard five years, discharged in 1895, with the rank of sergeant. Belongs to the Modern Woodmen of America, Grange, B. P. E. O. and I. O. O. F., in which latter order he has been department aide to the department commander of the P. M. branch with the rank of major. Member of the Methodist church. Politically a republican. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924.

W. C. EDSON.—Representative from Buena Vista county, was born on a farm in Will county, Illinois, on September 25, 1874. Came to Iowa in 1885, residing on a farm in Sac county. Attended Buena Vista college at Storm Lake. Graduated at Iowa state college in 1898, and in law at the state university in 1901. Entered the practice of law at Storm Lake. He has served two terms as county attorney and was mayor of Storm Lake. He is president of the board of trustees of Buena Vista college and a member of the Masonic and I. O. O. F. lodges. He is married and has four children. Elected representative in 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924. Speaker of the forty-first general assembly. A republican.

ELMORE A. ELLIOTT.—One of the representatives from Polk county, was born on a farm near Louisville, Kentucky, and spent the early years of his life farming. Worked his way through school, entering Westfield college, Westfield, Ill., at the age of 23 where he spent two years, later entering old Western college at Toledo, Iowa, where he finished his education. Married Lola Shepherd of Des Moines. Elected a member of the city council of Des Moines in

1918, re-elected in 1920, serving both terms as finance commissioner. With state board of health one year. Is a minister in the Congregational church. A member of the Masonic order, the I. O. O. F., K. P., L. O. O. M. and Hapac Grotto. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**JAMES D. FLEMING.**—Representative from Crawford county, Iowa, was born September 26, 1884, of Scotch parentage. His entire life has been spent in Stockholm township, Crawford county, Iowa, where he now owns and operates a two hundred acre farm. He received his early education in the rural schools, attended and graduated from the Denison Normal college in 1907. He taught school for three years and has been actively engaged in farming since then. In August, 1913, he was married to Lillie I. Carlson and has two children, Ruth Mae and Charlotte Marie. The family are members of the Presbyterian church at Denison, Iowa. Mr. Fleming has taken an active part in matters of public interest in his home community. He has been assessor and road superintendent for a number of years. He is now a member of the school board and president of the Farmers Elevator at Deloit. He was president of Crawford County Farm Bureau for two years. Elected state representative in 1924. In politics he is a republican.

**L. B. FORSLING.**—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, March 23, 1890. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, graduated in law from Cumberland university; general practice in law in Sioux City since 1915. Police judge of Sioux City, 1918. Married Lillian Nash, February 12, 1914. Elected representative, 1920; re-elected 1922 and 1924. Republican in politics.

**MATTHEW H. FRANCIS.**—Representative from Boone county, born in Mahanoy City, Pennsylvania, April 25, 1872. Moved with his parents to Boone county, Iowa, in the fall of the same year. Received his education in the rural schools, high school of Woodward, and Highland Park college. Taught school in winter and farmed in summer for several years. President of Boone County Farm Bureau two years, served as first assistant secretary of the senate in the thirty-sixth general assembly, member of the Boone county board of education for five years—member of the Baptist church and the I. O. O. F. Occupation, farming. Elected representative in 1924. Republican in politics.

**O. GILBERTSON.**—Representative from Winneshiek county, was born in Winneshiek county, November 20, 1861, where he has resided ever since. Attended rural and common schools. Has been engaged in farming and buying and shipping horses for a period of thirty years. Was married to Emma Hovden, May 25, 1882. To them were born eight children, one girl and seven boys. Elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922 and 1924. Republican in politics. Is a Lutheran.

**S. L. GRAHAM.**—Representative from Wapello county, was born in Washington county, Pennsylvania. Attended the graded and high school, student at Washington and Jefferson college. Graduated at Waynesburg college, Pennsylvania. Took course in Yale law school in constitutional and commercial law. Was principal of a graded school, city superintendent and county superintendent, DeKalb county, Illinois. Engaged in business about fifteen years. Present business, city and farm investments. Masonic degrees including Shrine, Elks, I. O. O. F., M. W. of A., Yeomen, Commercial club. Married Lulu Stoner, 1913. Residence, Ottumwa. Elected representative 1920, 1922, and 1924.

**EDMUND A. GRIMWOOD.**—Representative from Jones county, was born on a farm in Allamakee county, on December 8, 1863, of English parents. Secured only those advantages which come through the common schools. Engaged in the drug business at Oxford Junction, Iowa, in 1887, after three years of apprenticeship at Independence, Iowa. After thirty-three years in this busi-

ness, disposed of same on July 1, 1920, and was elected to the house in November of that year, was re-elected in 1922 and 1924.

**IRA A. GRIFF.**—Representative from Union county. Born in township 71-28, Union county, Iowa, in 1867. Reared on a farm, attended the rural public schools and Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa. He was married in 1888 to Lucy R. Wilcox and lived on a farm until 1899 when he went into the mercantile business at Thayer, Iowa. He also served as postmaster there for approximately three years. In 1907 he moved to Afton. In 1912 he was elected mayor, following the expiration of which office he was elected county commissioner. In September, 1918, he enlisted in the Y. M. C. A. for overseas duty during the world war. He took five examinations and passed the physical examination, receiving his passports on November 13, 1918. During the war he was chairman of the Four Minute Men, also of the county fuel distribution organization manipulated by the government. He belongs to the First Presbyterian church of Afton, the A. F. & A. M., I. O. O. F., Encampment and Cantonment. He is the father of two children, Jacob B. and Merrill C. He is a republican in politics, and was elected representative from the fourteenth district in 1924.

**J. H. HAGER.**—Representative from Allamakee county, was born in that county, August 30, 1871. Was quartermaster sergeant, company I, 49 Iowa Vol. infantry, during the Spanish-American war. In 1895, he engaged in the farm implement business at Waukon, and in 1908 added the Buick line of cars and is continuing in that business at the present time. Was married on June 14, 1905, to Grace Falby, formerly of Burlington, Vermont. Member of the Presbyterian church, Shrine consistory and K. P. lodge, a charter member of the Kiwanis club and served for three years as president of the Chamber of Commerce. Elected representative in 1924. Republican in politics.

**ROY HANEY.**—Representative from Mills county, was born July 28, 1878, in the same county he represents in the legislature. He was educated in the rural schools in his county, later attended business college, was vice president of the Glenwood Granite Works and for the past fourteen years has been engaged in the real estate and exchange business. Treasurer of the board of education and mayor of the city of Glenwood. This position he resigned after being elected as a legislator. Was married January 16, 1907, to Pearl Mintle, Glenwood. He is an active member of the M. E. church, is a Mason, O. E. S. and Odd Fellow, also a member of the Glenwood Rotary club and of the Chamber of Commerce of Glenwood. A republican in politics.

**JOHN T. HANSEN.**—Representative from Scott county, was born in the city of Davenport, Iowa, November 23, 1858. He attended the rural schools and afterwards received some private instruction. Learned the blacksmith trade, but went to farming when he became of age. Was married March 12, 1887, to Emma Harst of Scott county, who died October 6, 1897. There were born to them four children, two boys and two girls. Both boys are world war veterans. One served with the 88th division in France. Has served eleven years on the board of education of Sheridan township, one term as justice of the peace and twelve consecutive years as vice president of the Scott county farm bureau, and also as a member of the Iowa farm bureau federation. Served in the thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth, fortieth and forty-first general assemblies. A member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

**FRANK M. HANSON.**—Representative from Hancock county, was born on a farm in Grundy county, Iowa, March 28, 1873, where he resided with his parents and attended country schools until seventeen years of age. Attended Waterloo Collegiate Institute, Waterloo, Iowa, graduating in 1891. Shortly after graduating he entered the Citizens State Bank of Goldfield, Iowa, as bookkeeper, remaining there until October 1, 1893, and from 1893 until he

organized the State Savings Bank of Kanawha, Iowa, held bank positions at Waterloo, Klemme, and Kanawha. He removed to Garner, Iowa, in July, 1905, accepting the cashiership of the First National bank of Garner, where he has since resided and is now the active president of the bank. He is a director of the First National Bank of Kanawha and the State Savings Bank, Goodell, and president of the State Savings Bank of Ventura, Iowa. Married Ada Adel Huyck on September 12, 1906, and has one son, Morris Frank, age 17, and one daughter, Jenevieve, age 13. He is a Mason, Shriner, Odd Fellow and Woodman. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

HENRY N. HANSON.—Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Webster county, Iowa, September 3, 1876. He received his education in the rural schools of his county, in Luther Academy at Bode, Humboldt county, Iowa, and at the Humboldt college, Humboldt, Iowa. He engaged in the general merchandise business with his father in 1893 until moving to North Dakota in the fall of 1902, filing on a homestead on which he lived and proved up in 1909. He then returned to Iowa and settled on a farm in Winnebago county. He served as a member of the board of supervisors, resigning to better look after his duties on the farm. Since 1914 he has acted as auditor of the co-operative elevator and creamery association at Leland, secretary of the school board, and has held other public offices in his township. In the fall of 1924 was elected to the legislature. Is a republican in politics.

ERNEST P. HARRISON.—One of the representatives from Pottawatomie county, was born at Wittman, Md., November 22, 1883. Removed to Yorkville, Ill., in 1902 and learned the printers' trade in the office of the Kendall County Record. At the age of twenty-three he became owner and publisher of the Franklin Grove Register published at Franklin Grove, Ill. Removed to Oakland, Iowa, in 1910, since which time he has been engaged in the business of printing and publishing. Editor and publisher of the Oakland Acorn, and Harrison's Home Farmer. Was married June 15, 1907, to Ethel Brubaker and has one son, John Marshall Harrison, and two daughters, Helen Virginia and Mary Louise. Was elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

F. M. HARRISON.—Representative from Clarke county, was born on a farm in Clarke county, his father having settled on the old homestead in 1856. Attended the rural schools, and received some college training. Taught in the rural schools. Has been actively interested in farming. Answered the call of the president in 1916, enlisted in Company B, 3rd Iowa infantry, was on border at Brownville, Texas, from July 24, 1916, to February 1, 1917. At the outbreak of the world war he re-enlisted in Company B, 168th infantry, Rainbow division, went to France in 1917, and served eighteen months overseas. After being discharged returned to farming. First commander American Legion post at Osceola. Elected clerk of the district court in 1920, served four years. Married Violet W. Cornell, October 18, 1921. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church. A republican in politics.

H. C. HATTENDORF.—Representative from Osceola county, was born in Lake county, Indiana. He received his education in the parochial and public schools. Learned the carpenter trade and worked at it for a number of years. He has served as township clerk for twelve years and as secretary of the school board for twenty years. He was a member of the county board of supervisors for three terms and was elected twice chairman of the board and for two years he has been township assessor. He married Louisa Glade in 1892. He has been engaged in farming and stock raising ever since. He was elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924. A life long republican.

G. E. HELD.—Representative from Plymouth county, was born on a farm in that county in 1877. Attended the rural schools and graduated from the normal department of the Le Mars Normal school in 1897. Remained on the farm, which joins the town of Hinton. At the death of his father became a

member of the firm of Held Brothers, which firm is now engaged in the pure bred live stock and general farming business. As a member of the firm made several trips abroad, importing live stock. In 1922 he married Agnes M. Eyres and since that time they have lived on the home farm and are active in the operation of the same. July 3, 1923, a son, Thomas E., was born to them. Representative Held served in the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra and forty-first general assemblies.

**J. G. HEMPEL.**—Representative from Clayton county, born at Giard, Clayton county, Iowa, December 9, 1860. Attended public schools and entered mercantile business in 1881. In 1887 was married to Emma J. Bickel, having three daughters, Mrs. Iowa H. Graf and Kathleen M., living; Johneyette G., deceased when five years old. In 1892 opened general merchandise establishment at Giard, disposing of it at the end of three years. In April, 1895, opened up clothing business at Elkader, which he has successfully conducted ever since. Served as secretary of school board, secretary of county fair, member of state board voting machine commissioners, member of state central committee, fourth district, member town council Elkader and served as county auditor for eight years. A member of Masonic and I. O. O. F. lodges. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

**LAKE HILL.**—Representative from Floyd county, was born in Kinggold county, Iowa. At the age of fourteen years was thrown on his own resources. He worked on a farm, in a brick yard and on railroad construction, attending school at odd times until about the age of eighteen, when he had saved sufficient money to enable him to enter academic and college work. During that time he read law for two years with C. W. Mullen of Waterloo, afterwards state's attorney general. He then took up teaching at Troy Mills and Walker, in Linn county, and was later superintendent of schools at Seymour and other places in southern Iowa. At the close of his school work he entered the newspaper business, and is now publisher of the Advertiser at Nora Springs. His father was a veteran of the Civil war. He was married to Florence A. Fay of Troy Mills. Their three children grew to manhood and womanhood, a daughter, Fausta, and sons, Brant and Lyle. Both sons served in the world war, and Brant gave his life for his country. **CHAS. A. HOLLIS.**—Representative from Black Hawk county, born in Black Hawk county in 1867, oldest of a family of six boys and three girls. Father enlisted in the army from Troy, N. Y., and served three years. Was married in 1887 to Miss Carrie Buck of Black Hawk county and immediately went to farming for himself, at all times handling pure bred and high grade stock. Active in all organizations for the betterment of rural conditions. Moved to Cedar Falls in 1906 to educate his children, one boy and one girl. Traveled

three years for the Independent Telephone association and promoted the first independent copper toll line between Burlington and Des Moines. Assisted in organizing and was president and manager of the Black Hawk Oil Company, Cedar Falls. At the present time is in partnership with his son in the business of raising pure bred Holsteins. Member of the First Brethren church. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924. Republican in politics.

**WILBER F. HUBBARD.**—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Neola, Iowa, March 24, 1855. Educated in the rural schools and the high school of Neola. Has followed the vocation of farming. Is president of the West Pottawattamie County Farm Bureau, and past master of the Masonic lodge. He was married to Vera Lynn Hamilton in 1909. They have four children, Joseph, Neal, Verna and Wilber Lynn. Was elected state representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**CHAS. W. HUFF.**—Representative from Cass county, was born on a farm near Anita, Iowa, October 30, 1873. When ten years old he moved with his parents to a farm near Massena, in the same county, where he has since resided. He received his education in the common schools, also graduating from the Iowa business college of Des Moines in 1894. Was township clerk, serving two years and county recorder for four years. Elected representative in 1920 and re-elected in 1922 and 1924. He is a Mason and a Shriner. A republican in politics.

**FRANCIS JOHNSON.**—Representative from Dickinson county, was born in Butler county, Iowa, August 6, 1890. His parents are F. H. and Anna Johnson of Terrill, Iowa, where he has lived since ten years of age. He was graduated from the Terrill and Spirit Lake high schools and the college of law of Iowa state university. He was admitted to the bar in 1912. Married to Sara E. Thompson in 1914. In his home county he has served as president of the farm bureau, township clerk and is director of the Terrill savings bank. Elected to the legislature in 1922 and 1924. He is actively engaged in farming and the breeding of Poland China hogs. Is a member of the Terrill Methodist Episcopal church and the Richloyd lodge of A. F. and A. M. Republican in politics.

**JOSEPH E. JOHNSON.**—Representative from Marion county, was born on a farm in that county July 26, 1878. Attended the district school, graduated from Central College at Pella, Iowa, in 1902, and from the law department of the University of Chicago in 1905. Engaged in the general practice of law at Knoxville. He is president of the board of education of the independent school district of Knoxville, and a member of the Masonic lodge. Married Pearl Eastburn July 31, 1907, and has four children. Republican in politics.

**KENNEDY, WM. S.**—Representative from Lee county, was born on a farm in that county on May 16, 1879. Educated in the rural schools. Served in the Spanish-American war with the Fourteenth U. S. Infantry, being among the first troops sent to the Philippines. Took part in numerous battles and skirmishes, being wounded in a battle near Malate on February 5, 1899. After being discharged worked in the mines through the western states until 1908, returning to Iowa at that time and engaging in farming in Lee county. Married to Julia T. Sullivan at Butte, Montana, February 28, 1905, who died on October 19, 1915. Married October 3, 1917, at Altoona, Iowa, to Emily Kennedy. Has four children, two boys and two girls. A member of the Belmont lodge, No. 541, A. F. & A. M. of Hillsboro, Iowa. Elected to the house of representatives in 1924. Republican in politics.

**JOHN W. KENT.**—Representative from Lucas county. Born in Cook county, Illinois, March 9, 1867. Moved to Lucas county, Iowa, with his parents in 1869, where he has since resided. Educated in the public schools. A farmer, stock raiser and purebred Hereford breeder. Owns three hundred and seventy acres of land. Republican in politics. Member of the Masonic fraternity; has

been trustee of Jackson township and school treasurer for a number of years; was member of board of supervisors for six years. Elected representative in 1924.

**J. A. KING.**—Representative from Clay county, was born in Clay county, Iowa, April 13, 1876. Moved with his parents to the farm on which he now lives, when about three years old. Received his early education in the common schools and afterward attended Nora Springs seminary where he graduated in 1898. Taught in the country schools of Clay county three years. Was married to Effie A. Anderson, August 28, 1902. Has two children, James Russel, born August 23, 1903, and Julia Leone, born October 21, 1909. Has been actively engaged in farming since 1901 and was president of the Clay county farm bureau three years. Member of the Odd Fellows and Masonic lodges. Elected to the legislature in November, 1922 and re-elected in 1924. A republican in politics.

**IRVING H. KNUDSON.**—Representative from Hamilton county, was born April 27, 1896, at Jewell, Iowa. Received his education in the Jewell public schools, the Jewell Lutheran college, and the State University of Iowa. In February, 1919, he enlisted as a private in the World War, and was discharged in April, 1919, as sergeant 1st class. Upon leaving the service, he took a position with the State Bank of Jewell, and at the same time became a partner with his father, Gilbert Knudson in the general and live stock auction business. Was secretary of a township school board fourteen years, secretary and director of farmers' elevator fifteen years, president of the Lyon County Farm Bureau 1919-1923 and treasurer of the bureau in 1924. Was married in 1905 to Ella Rohde of Inwood, Iowa. Has one daughter, Ella, who is now attending Morningside college. Was elected representative in 1924 on the democratic ticket. Member of the Congregational church, Masonic Order, I. O. O. F., and other fraternal organizations.

**CHARLES RHINEHART.**—Representative from Dallas county, was born in Dallas county, March 4, 1876; was reared on a farm; graduated from Iowa State college, 1899; married to Frances B. Schamel, 1906; has two children, Helen Louise and John Schamel. A member of the Sons of the American Revolution, Sons of Veterans, Odd Fellows and Masonic lodges. A farmer by occupation and republican in politics.

**D. FULTON RICE.**—Representative from Appanoose county, was born on a farm in that county September 13, 1889. Attended the rural schools and for short periods attended the State Normal at Kirksville, Mo., and Drake University. Taught school five years, the last year being superintendent at Dike, Iowa. Read law in the office of H. E. Valentine, attended law school at Ann Arbor, Michigan, and was admitted to the bar in June, 1917. Was nominated for congress by the democratic party in the eighth congressional district of Iowa, in 1918. After nomination, enlisted in the judge advocate general's

department of the army and served in the Seventeenth division during the World War. Has engaged in the active practice of law at Centerville, Iowa, since the war. Married Miss Ruth Rhea of Centerville, Iowa, June 22, 1919, and to them has been born one child, David Fulton, Jr. Belongs to the Methodist church. A democrat in politics.

**J. W. ROBERTS.**—Representative from Adair county was born on a farm in Adair county, July 9, 1861. Received his education in the country schools and business course at Drake university. Taught three years in rural school. Served six years as county recorder of Adair county. He married Eva Tullis in 1886, a teacher in the public schools, and to them were born three children, one girl and two boys. Engaged in farming and live stock breeding. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**HEIKE A. RUST.**—Representative from Franklin county, was born in Franklin county, December 12, 1883. Studied at the Sheffield high school, Des Moines university and Iowa State college. Occupation, farming. Was married October 8, 1921, to Miss Gladys Stubblefield of Ipava, Illinois. Elected representative in 1922 and 1924. Republican in politics.

**JOHN RYDER.**—Junior member of the house of representatives from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa. He was educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless Business college. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers' wholesale grocery firm. In 1919, he organized the Ryder Realty Co., and served as vice president until January, 1925, when he retired from the firm. For the past twelve years he has served as State Chief Ranger of the Catholic Order of Foresters of Iowa. In March, 1925, he was elected member of the board of education of the city of Dubuque, and was appointed chairman of the finance committee. He is, and has been for a number of years a director of the Hotel Julien Dubuque. He was married in November, 1917, to Miss Anna L. Killeen, who died in May, 1923. He was elected to the general assembly, November, 1924. A democrat in politics.

**WM. E. G. SAUNDERS.**—Representative from Palo Alto county, was born in Blairgowrie, Scotland, in 1865. Came to United States in 1882. Lived four years in New Mexico and moved to Emmetsburg, Iowa, in 1886. Was quartermaster 52nd Iowa volunteer infantry during Spanish-American war. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924. Republican in politics.

**H. H. SCHULTZ.**—Representative from Worth county, was born on a farm in Clayton county, November 19, 1863. Received a common school and high school education. Was married to Margaret Bierbaum February 28, 1889. In the spring of 1889 moved from Clayton county to a farm in Worth county, where they now reside. Has served as township trustee for ten terms and four years as county assessor, and has been president of the Farmers' Savings bank of Manly, Iowa, since 1911. He and his family are members of the Evangelical church. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

**GEORGE W. SMITH.**—Representative from O'Brien county, was born in Richland county, Ohio, January 24, 1868, coming to Benton county, Iowa, in 1884. He was educated in the public schools of Ohio and Tilford Academy at Vinton, Iowa. Moved to Sioux county in 1889 and was married in 1890 to Effie Troutman of Benton county. Four sons were born to them, Clarence E., Orlo H., Jesse E. and Marvin W. Jesse E. died while in S. A. T. C., Morningside college in 1902. Mr. Smith moved to O'Brien county in 1902. He has always been engaged in farming and the raising of pure bred cattle and hogs. He is a member of the M. E. church, a Thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Eastern Star and Modern Woodmen of America, and is a republican in politics.

**WARD B. SMITH.**—Representative, was born at Bradford, Chickasaw county, Iowa, March 20, 1858. Attended the common schools and Bradford Academy. For a few years was a traveling salesman. Married Rose McCreary to whom one child was born—now Hazel M. Meier of Nashua, Iowa. In 1884 moved to

the farm which he occupied for several years. Retired in 1906. Served as member of the board of supervisors from 1915 to 1921. Was married to Luna Bartsch in 1921. Elected to the legislature in 1922 and re-elected in 1924. Republican in politics.

**W. H. STEPANEK.**—Representative from Forty-eighth district, (Linn county). Was born on a farm in Johnson county May 8, 1868, and gained his early education in the public schools at Ely and the Cedar Rapids business college. At the age of twenty-one he left the farm to take a position with a hardware company, remaining there four years. In 1894 organized the Stepanek-Vondracek Hardware Company in Cedar Rapids. Was married June 11, 1892, to Josephine Chastek, and has one son, Leo. Is a member of the Peoples church. Active in civic affairs, having been a director in the old Chamber of Commerce, a city councilman, commissioner of finance under the commission plan, chairman of the court house committee that was instrumental in locating the county seat at Cedar Rapids, and is at present chairman of the mercantile bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, a director in the Western Bohemian Fraternal association, member of the Rotary club and the zoning commission, as well as all bodies of the Masonic order. A republican in politics.

**ARTHUR STOKESBERRY.**—Representative from Davis county, was born in that county February 14, 1882. Is a farmer, owning and operating his own farm. Is an ordained minister of the Christian church. A graduate of the Southern Iowa Normal school of Bloomfield and of the Chillicothe business college of Chillicothe, Mo. Has also attended Drake university. Has taught sixteen years in the public schools of Iowa and Oklahoma. Was elected clerk of the district court of Davis county in 1916 and re-elected in 1918. He is married. Elected representative in 1922. Re-elected in 1924. A democrat.

**WERNER STRIPPEL.**—Representative from Benton county. Served in the city council of Vinton, Iowa, for ten years. Was also president of the Commercial club in the city of Vinton for three years. Secretary-treasurer and general manager of the canning company at Clarksville, Iowa, and president of the Peoples Savings bank at Vinton, Iowa. A republican in politics.

**G. E. SWANSON.**—Representative from the ninety-third district, Mitchell county, Iowa. Was born February 20, 1872, at Paxton, Ford county, Illinois. Attended grade school. Learned the cigar maker's trade. Came to Iowa in 1896 and located at Clear Lake, Iowa. Moved to Osage in 1900. Established himself in the wholesale and retail cigar business. Served four years in city council. Mayor of Osage, in 1923-24. Republican in politics.

**E. B. THOMAS.**—Representative from Audubon county, was born October 9, 1884, in Marshall county, Iowa. Attended district schools of that county and the high school at Marshalltown. Graduated in 1905 from the four year course in animal husbandry at Iowa State college. Moved to Audubon county in 1909 where he has been actively engaged in the business of farming, making the breeding of Shorthorn cattle a specialty. Served as township trustee, director of the Audubon County Fair association, and as president of the County Farm Bureau. For the past seven years has served as secretary of the Iowa Beef Producers Association. In 1906 was married to Minnie Maharg and to them three children were born, Frances Ada, Elbert Maharg and Homer Earl. Member of the Presbyterian church and Masonic bodies. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**MARTIN H. TROUP.**—Representative from Story county, was born on a farm in Washington township, Polk county, Iowa, March 30, 1877, the third son of Rev. Henry H. Troup now deceased. Was reared and grew to manhood upon the farm and after marriage operated a farm for himself for some years. Upon leaving the farm engaged in the grain, coal and lumber business. From this employment accepted an opportunity to enter the banking business, which was followed for a number of years until he disposed of his banking interest and engaged in the investment and farm loan business which he now handles along banking principles. He has always been a supporter of the republican

party, is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, Masonic and Eastern Star orders.

**J. B. TRUAX.**—Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Grant county, Indiana, in 1859. In 1884 he moved to Iowa with his parents who settled on a farm in the northern part of Buchanan county. He farmed until 1884 when he met with an accident which made it impossible for him to continue. Worked in a general store for a number of years and in 1892 was elected county recorder and served in that capacity for twenty years. Following that period, he engaged in the abstract business. Was united in marriage with Ella O. Lawrence at Hazelton, Iowa, November 7, 1880. To this union was born one daughter who was united in marriage with A. J. Schuette and now resides at Independence, Iowa. He is a member of the Masonic lodge and has been secretary of same for the last twenty-four years. Is a member of the O. E. S., a member of the Methodist church, and has always been a republican in politics.

**OSCAR ULSTAD.**—Representative from Wright county, was born at Leland, Illinois, October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Illinois, where he resided until twenty years of age. He then moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, for fifteen years, retiring in 1913. Has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes for seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and was president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected representative in 1916, 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924. Speaker pro tempore of the forty-first general assembly. Chairman of the republican central committee of Wright county. A republican in politics.

**G. L. VENARD.**—Representative from Sioux county, was born in Muscatine county, Iowa, August 7, 1860. His parents came from Indiana in 1856, taking up land in Muscatine county. Received his education in the rural schools. Attended the Wilton academy two years. Since that time has been actively engaged in farming, for the past twenty years in Sioux county. Served on the board of education eighteen years, was township clerk fourteen years and assessor four years. Was elected representative in March, 1921, to fill vacancy, re-elected in 1922 and again in 1924. A republican in politics.

**EARL W. VINCENT.**—Representative from Guthrie county, born on a farm in Washington county, Iowa, March 27, 1886. Was graduated from the Keota high school in 1904, from Monmouth college in 1909, and the law school at the state university of Iowa, in 1912, and since said time engaged in the general practice of law at Guthrie Center, Iowa. Was married to Madge Lee in 1916, at Centerville, Iowa, and to them has been born one child, Marjorie Lee. Was county attorney of Guthrie county from 1919 to 1922, inclusive. President of State Association of County Attorneys, 1921-22. Is a Presbyterian and a Mason. Elected representative in 1922 and 1924. A republican in politics.

**JOSEPH WAGNER.**—Representative from Scott county, was born in Germany April 4, 1833, and came to Davenport with his parents in 1834. Educated in the public schools of Davenport. Served as deputy city clerk in 1904 and 1905, deputy county auditor from 1909 to 1917. Appointed county auditor to fill vacancy, served seven and one-half years as county auditor, elected representative in 1924. Married Elsie G. Treftz in 1902. One son, Paul, is at present studying law at Iowa university. A republican.

**WARREN WALROD.**—Representative from Clinton county, Iowa, was born October 4, 1871, on a farm in Welton township, where he resided until April, 1923. He then moved to DeWitt, Iowa. Attended the district school and completed the school course at Maquoketa, Iowa. He taught school four years. He has held various offices of trust in his township and county. When he left the farm he was president of the consolidated school board and a member of the board of trustees of the township. He has been a member of the county board of education for ten years. He married Evelyn M. Hastings November 20,

1895, to which union was born one son, Harold W., and one daughter, Hazel M. He owns the old homestead, on which the son now lives. Is a member of the M. E. church and of the Masonic order. Elected representative in 1924. A republican in politics.

**D. E. WILLIAMS.**—Representative from Wayne county, was born on a farm in Clinton county, Iowa, May 1, 1870. Attended rural school and later attended high school at Olin, Jones county, Iowa. Entered the medical department of the State University in 1894. Was interne in the University hospital in 1895-1896. Received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from the State University of Iowa in 1897. Practiced medicine in Martelle, Iowa, for five years. Located in Allerton, Wayne county, Iowa, in 1901, where he has since been engaged in the practice of medicine and banking. He is a member of the Masonic lodge, Modern Woodmen of America and has always been a republican in politics. Elected representative in 1924.

**W. WALTER WILSON.**—Representative from Tama county, was born at Franklin, Indiana, in 1869. At the age of six months he moved with his parents to Illinois. When four years of age he moved to Iowa in one of those historic prairie schooners, crossing the Mississippi on a ferry at Burlington, and settling in 1873 on a farm in Black Hawk county. At the age of nineteen he entered the State Teachers' college, from which he was graduated in 1892. In 1894 he was graduated from the State university. After teaching school five terms he was married to S. Sophie Keeler and took up the business of farming for himself, first in Hamilton county, and later in Tama county, and is still following farming. He has three children, Carl, Iris and Dorothy. He has held the office of secretary of the Buckingham Grain company since its organization and also the presidency of the Farmer's Lumber company, at Traer since its origin. He was the president of the Tama County Farm Bureau when elected to the office of representative without opposition. He was re-elected in November, 1924. He is a member of the Methodist church. He is a 32nd degree Mason. A republican in politics.

**THOMAS L. WOLFE.**—Representative from Linn county, was born in Linn county, Iowa, December 16, 1872. His parents came to Iowa in 1837 from Ohio and settled at Ivanhoe, Linn county, the present Wolfe homestead, and the ownership of which has been and is in the Wolfe family. He has been in the active practice of medicine in Mt. Vernon for twenty-five years and also engaged in farming and the real estate business in Iowa and the south.

**RAY YENTER.**—Representative from Johnson county, born in Johnson county, near Oxford, August 17, 1887. Attended the rural schools, Oxford high school, Cedar Rapids business college and graduated from the law college of Valparaiso University in 1920. He did post graduate work in law one year at Indiana University. Married November 24, 1915, to Elizabeth Rose Flannery. Served as captain, First Iowa cavalry on the Mexican Border, 1916 and 1917, and during the World War as captain, field artillery, U. S. A., during which time he commanded Battery F, 126th Field Artillery. Has served as representative from Johnson county in the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra and forty-first general assemblies. Engaged in the practice of law at Iowa City. A republican in politics.



## PLATFORM OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY, 1924

ADOPTED BY THE NATIONAL REPUBLICAN CONVENTION, CLEVELAND, JUNE 11, 1924

The delegates of the Republican Party, in National Convention assembled, bow our heads in reverent memory of Warren G. Harding. We nominated him four years ago to be our candidate; the people of the Nation elected him their President. His human qualities gripped the affections of the American people. He was a public servant, unswerving in his devotion to duty. A staunch Republican, he was first of all a true patriot who gave unstintingly of himself during a critical period of our national life. His conception and successful direction of the Limitation of Armament Conference in Washington was an achievement which measureably advanced the world along the path toward peace.

As representatives of the Republican Party, we share in the national thanksgiving that in the great emergency created by the death of President Harding there stood forth fully equipped to be his successor one whom we had nominated as Vice-President—Calvin Coolidge. As Vice-President and President, by word and deed, he has justified the faith and confidence which inspired his selection. He has put the public welfare ahead of all other considerations. He has given to the people practical idealism in office. In his every act he has won, without seeking, the applause of the people. The constantly accumulating evidence of his integrity, vision and single-minded devotion to the needs of the people of this nation strengthens and inspires our confident faith in his continued leadership.

**SITUATION IN 1921**—When the Republican administration took control of the government in 1921 there were four and a half million unemployed, industry and commerce were stagnant, agriculture was prostrate, business was depressed, the bonds of the government were selling below their par value. Peace was delayed, misunderstanding and friction characterized our relations abroad. There was a lack of faith in the administration of government resulting in a growing feeling of distrust in the very principles upon which our institutions are founded.

Today industry and commerce are active; public and private credits are sound. We have made peace; we have taken the first step toward disarmament, and strengthened our friendship with other powers. Our relations with the rest of the world are on a firmer basis, our position was never better understood, our foreign policy never more definite and consistent. The tasks to which we have put our hands are not completed. Time has been too short for the correction of all the ills we received as a heritage from the last Democratic administration, but the notable accomplishments under Republican rule warrant us in appealing to the country with entire confidence.

**PUBLIC ECONOMY**—We demand, and the people of the United States have a right to demand, rigid economy in government. A policy of strict economy enforced by the Republican administration since 1921 has made possible a reduction in taxation and has enabled the government to reduce the public debt by two and a half million dollars. This policy rigorously enforced has resulted in a progressive reduction of public expenditures until they are now \$2,000,000,000 per annum less than in 1921. The tax burdens of the people have been relieved to the extent of \$1,250,000,000 per annum. Government securities have increased in value more than \$3,000,000,000. Deficits have been converted into surpluses. The budget system has been firmly established and the number of federal employes has been reduced by more

than 100,000. We commend the firm insistence of President Coolidge upon rigid government economy and pledge our earnest support to this end.

**FINANCE AND TAXATION**—We believe that the achievement of the republican administration in reducing taxation by \$1,250,000,000 per annum, reducing the public debt by \$2,432,000,000, installing a budget system, decreasing the public expenditures from \$5,500,000,000 per annum to approximately \$3,400,000,000 per annum, thus restoring the ordinary expenditures of the government to substantially a pre-war basis and in the complete restoration of public credit, the payment of refunding of seven and a half billions of public obligations without disturbance of credit or industry—all in the short period of three years, present a record unsurpassed in the history of public finance.

The intelligent assessment of taxes, their fair and scientific collection and the efficient and economical expenditures of the money received by the government and essential to the prosperity of our nation.

Carelessness in levying taxes inevitably breeds extravagance in expenditures. The wisest system of taxation rests most lightly on the individual and economic life of the country. The public demand for a sound permanent tax policy is insistent.

Progressive tax reduction should be accomplished through tax reform. It should not be confined to less than 4,000,000 of our citizens who pay direct taxes, but is the right of the more than 100,000,000 who are daily paying their taxes indirectly through their living expenses. Congress has in the main confined its work to tax reduction. The matter of tax reform is still unsettled and is equally essential.

We pledge ourselves to the progressive reduction of the taxes of all the people as rapidly as may be done with due provision for the essential expenditures of the government administered with rigid economy and to place our tax system on a sound peace-time basis.

We indorse the plan of President Coolidge to call in November a national conference of federal and state officials for the development of effective methods of lightening the tax burdens of our citizens and adjustment of questions of taxation as between the national and state governments.

We favor the creation by appropriate legislation of a non-partisan federal commission to make a comprehensive study and report upon the tax systems of the state and federal governments to serve as a basis for an intelligent reformation of our systems of taxation and as a basis for the proper adjustment of the subjects of taxation as between the national and state governments with fairness and justice to the taxpayer and in conformity with sound economic principles.

**FOREIGN RELATIONS**—The Republican party reaffirms its stand for agreement among the nations to prevent war and preserve peace. As an immediate step in this direction we indorse the permanent court of international justice and favor the adherence of the United States to this tribunal as recommended by President Coolidge. This government has definitely refused membership in the League of Nations and to assume any obligations under the covenant of the league. On this we stand.

While we are unwilling to enter into political commitments which would involve us in the conflict of European policies, it should be the purpose and high privilege of the United States to continue to co-operate with other nations in humanitarian efforts in accordance with our cherished traditions. The basic principles of our foreign policy must be independence without indifference to the rights and necessities of others and co-operation without entangling alliances. This policy, overwhelmingly approved by the people, has been vindicated since the end of the Great War. America's participation in world affairs under the administration of President Harding and President Coolidge has demonstrated the wisdom and prudence of the national judgment. A most impressive example of the capacity of the United States to serve the cause of world peace without political affiliations was

shown in the effective and beneficent work of the Dawes Commission towards the solution of the perplexing question of German reparations.

The first conference of great powers in Washington, called by President Harding, accomplished the limitation of armaments and the readjustment of the relations of the powers interested in the Far East. The conference resulted in an agreement to reduce armaments, relieve the nations involved from the great burdens of taxation arising from the competitive construction and maintenance of capital battleships; assured a new, broader and better understanding in the Far East; brought the promise of peace in the region of the Pacific; and formally adopted the policy of the open door for trade and commerce in the great markets of the Far East.

This historic conference paved the way to avert the danger of renewed hostilities in Europe and to restore the necessary economic stability. While the military forces of America have been reduced to a peace footing, there has been an increase in the land and air forces abroad which constitutes a continual menace to the peace of the world and a bar to the return of prosperity.

We firmly advocate the calling of a conference on limitation of land forces, the use of submarines and poison gas, as proposed by President Coolidge, when by the adoption of a permanent reparation plan the conditions in Europe will make negotiations and co-operation opportune and possible.

By treaties of peace safeguarding our rights and without derogating those of our former associates in arms, the Republican administration ended the war between this country and Germany and Austria. We have concluded and signed with other nations during the past three years more than 50 treaties and international agreements in the furtherance of peace and good will.

New sanctions and new proofs of permanent accord have marked our relations with all Latin America. The long-standing controversy between Chile and Peru has been advanced towards settlement by its submission to the president of the United States as arbitrator; and with the helpful co-operation of this country a treaty has been signed by the representatives of sixteen American republics which will stabilize conditions on the American continent and minimize the opportunities for war.

Our difficulties with Mexico have happily yielded to a most friendly adjustment. Mutual confidence has been restored and a pathway for that friendliness and helpfulness which should exist between this government and the government of our neighboring republic has been marked. Agreements have been entered into for the determination by judicial commissions of the claims of the citizens of each country against the respective Governments. We can confidently look forward to more permanent and more stable relations with this republic that joins for so many miles our southern border.

The wisdom of our policy, now well defined, of giving practical aid to other peoples without assuming political obligations has been conspicuously demonstrated. The ready and generous response of America to the needs of the suddenly stricken people of Japan and the starving in Russia gave evidence of our helpful interest in the welfare of the distressed in other lands.

The work of our representatives in dealing with subjects of such universal concern as the traffic in women and children, the production and distribution of narcotic drugs, the sale of arms, and with matters affecting public health and morals, demonstrates that we can effectively do our part for humanity and civilization without forfeiting, limiting or restricting our national freedom of action.

The American people do cherish their independence, but their sense of duty to all mankind will ever prompt them to give their support, service and leadership to every cause which makes for peace and amity among the nations of the world.

We favor the holding from time to time of international conferences for the advancement and codification of international law.

**FOREIGN DEBTS**—In fulfillment of our pledge in the national platform of 1920

we have steadfastly refused to consider the cancellation of foreign debts. Our attitude has not been of an oppressive creditor seeking immediate return and ignoring existing financial conditions. Our position has been based on the conviction that a moral obligation such as was incurred should not be disregarded.

We stand for settlements with all debtor countries similar in character with our debt agreement with Great Britain. That settlement, achieved under a republican administration was the greatest international financial transaction in the history of the world. Under the terms of the agreement the United States now receives an annual return upon \$4,600,000,000 owing to us by Great Britain with a definite obligation of ultimate payment in full. The justness of the basis employed has been formally recognized by other debtor nations. Thirty-five per cent of the total foreign debt is now in progress of liquidation.

Great nations cannot recognize or admit the principle of repudiation. To do so would undermine the integrity essential for international trade, commerce and credit.

**REORGANIZATION OF EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS**—We favor a comprehensive reorganization of the executive departments and bureaus along the lines of the plan recently submitted by a joint committee of the congress, which has the unqualified support of President Coolidge.

**CIVIL SERVICE**—The improvement in the enforcement of the merit system both by legislative enactment and executive action since March 4, 1921, has been marked and effective. By executive order the appointment of presidential postmasters has been placed on the merit basis similar to that applying to the classified service. We favor the classification of postmasters in first, second and third class post offices and the placing of the prohibition enforcement field force within the classified Civil Service without necessarily incorporating all the present personnel.

**THE TARIFF**—We reaffirm our belief in the protective tariff to extend needed protection to our productive industries. We believe in protection as a national policy with equal regard to all sections and to agriculture and industry. It is only by adherence to this policy that the interests of the consumers can be safeguarded and American agriculture, American labor and American manufacture be assured a return sufficient to perpetuate American standards of life.

A protective tariff is designed to support the high American economic level of life for the average family and to prevent a lowering to the levels of economic life prevailing in other lands. It is the history of the nation that the protective system has ever justified itself by promoting industrial activity and employment enormously increasing our purchasing power, restoring confidence and bringing increased prosperity to all.

The tariff protection to our industry works for increased consumption of domestic agricultural products by an employed population, instead of one unable to purchase the necessities of life. Without the strict maintenance of the tariff principle our farmers will need always to compete with cheap lands and cheap labor abroad, and with lower standards of living.

The enormous value of the protective principle has once more been demonstrated by the effects of the Emergency Tariff Act of 1921 and the Tariff Act of 1922.

We believe that the power of the president to decrease or increase any rate of duty in the tariff act furnishes a safeguard against excessive duties and against too low customs charges, and affords ample opportunity for tariff duties to be adjusted after a hearing that they may cover the actual differences in the cost of production in the United States and the principal competing countries of the world.

**AGRICULTURE**—In dealing with agriculture, the Republican party recognizes that we are faced with a fundamental national problem, and that the prosperity and welfare of the nation as a whole is dependent upon the prosperity and welfare of our agricultural population.

We recognize that agricultural activities are still struggling with adverse conditions that have brought deep distress. We pledge the party to take whatever steps are necessary to bring back a balanced condition between agriculture, industry and labor, which was destroyed by the Democratic party through an unfortunate administration of legislation passed as war measures.

We affirm that under the Republican administration the problems of the farmer have received more serious consideration than ever before, both by definite executive action and by congressional action, not only in the field of general legislation but also in the enactment of laws to meet emergency situations.

The restoration of general prosperity and of the purchasing power of our people through tariff protection has resulted in an increased domestic consumption of food products, and the prices of many agricultural commodities are above the world price level by reason of direct tariff protection.

Under the leadership of the president at a most critical time a corporation was organized by private capital making available \$100,000,000 to assist the farmers of the northwest.

Realizing the disturbance in the agricultural export market, the result of the financial depressions in Europe and appreciating that the export field would be enormously improved by economic rehabilitation and the resulting increased consuming power, sympathetic support and direction were given to the work of the American representatives on the European reparations commission.

The revival in 1921 of the war finance corporation with loans of over \$300,000,000, averted a complete collapse in the agricultural industry.

We have established new intermediate credit banks for agriculture and increased the capital of the federal farm loan system. Emergency loans have been granted to drought-stricken areas.

We have enacted into law the co-operative marketing act, the grain futures and packer control acts; given to agriculture direct representation on the federal reserve board and on the federal trade commission. We have greatly strengthened our foreign marketing service for the disposal of our agricultural products.

The crux of the problem from the standpoint of the farmer is the net profit he receives after his outlay. The process of bringing the average prices of what he buys and what he sells closer together can be indirectly expedited by reduction in taxes, steady employment in industry and stability in business. This process can be directly expedited by lower freight rates, by better marketing through co-operative effort and a more scientific organization of the physical and human machinery of distribution and by a greater diversification of farm products.

We promise every assistance in the reorganization of the marketing system on sounder and more economical lines and where diversification is needed. Government assistance during the period of transition.

We favor adequate tariff protection to such of our agricultural products as are threatened by foreign competition.

We favor, without putting the government into business, the establishment of a Federal system of organization for co-operative marketing of farm products.

The vigorous efforts of this administration towards broadening our exports market will be continued.

The Republican party pledges itself to the development and enactment of measures which will place the agricultural interests of America on a basis of economic equality with other industry to insure its prosperity and success.

**MINING**—The mining industry has experienced a period of depression as the result of the abnormal economic conditions growing out of the Great War. This administration has accomplished much in improving the conditions affect-

ing this great fundamental industry and pledges itself to continue its efforts in this direction.

**HIGHWAYS**—The Federal Aid Road Act adopted by the Republican congress in 1921 has been of inestimable value in the development of the highway systems of the several states and of the nation. We pledge a continuation of this policy of federal co-operation with the states in highway building.

We favor the construction of roads and trails in our national forests necessary to their protection and utilization. In appropriations therefor the taxes which these lands would pay if taxable should be considered as a controlling factor.

**LABOR**—The increasing stress of industrial life, the constant and necessary efforts because of world competition to increase production and decrease costs, have made it especially incumbent on those in authority to protect labor from undue exactions. We commend congress for its prompt adoption of the recommendation of President Coolidge for a constitutional amendment authorizing congress to legislate on the subject of child labor and we urge the prompt consideration of that amendment by the legislatures of the various states.

There is no success great enough to justify the employment of women in labor under conditions which will impair their natural functions. We favor high standards for wages, working and living conditions among the women employed in industry.

We pledge a continuance of the efforts of the Republican administration to eliminate the seven-day 12-hour work week in industry. We regard with satisfaction the elimination of the 12-hour day in the steel industry and the agreement eliminating the seven-day work week of alternate thirteen and eleven hours brought about through the efforts of President Harding and President Coolidge.

We declare our faith in the principles of the eight-hour day.

We pledge a continuation of the work of rehabilitating workers in industry as conducted by the Federal Board for Vocational Education, and favor adequate appropriations for this purpose.

We favor a broader and better system of vocational education, a more adequate system of Federal Free Employment Agencies with facilities for assisting the movements of seasonal and migratory labor, including farm labor, and an ample organization for bringing the man and the job together.

**RAILROADS**—The people demand and are entitled to have prompt and efficient transportation at the lowest rates consistent with good service and a reasonable return upon the value of the property devoted to public service.

We believe that the American people demand a careful and scientific readjustment of railroad rate schedules with a view to the encouragement of agriculture and basic industries without the impairment of necessary railroad service.

The present laws regulating railroads which were enacted to meet post-war conditions should be modified from time to time as experience develops the necessity therefor.

The consolidation of railroads subject to the approval of the interstate commerce commission into fewer competitive systems will result in advantage to the public.

The labor board provisions of the present law should be amended whenever it appears necessary to meet changed conditions. Collective bargaining, mediation and voluntary arbitration are the most important steps in maintaining peaceful labor relations and should be encouraged. We do not believe in compulsory action any time in the settlement of labor disputes.

Public opinion must be the final arbiter in any crisis which so vitally affects public welfare as the suspension of transportation. Therefore the interests of the public require the maintenance of an impartial tribunal which can

In an emergency make an investigation of the facts and publish its conclusions. This is essential as a basis for popular judgment.

We favor a stable, consistent and constructive policy toward our railroads.

**GOVERNMENT CONTROL**—The prosperity of the American nation rests on the vigor of private initiative which has bred a spirit of independence and self-reliance. The Republican party stands now, as always, against all attempts to put the government into business. American industry should not be compelled to struggle against government competition. The right of the government to regulate, supervise and control public utilities in the public interest we believe should be strengthened, but we are firmly opposed to the nationalization or Government ownership of public utilities.

**COAL**—The price and a constant supply of such an essential commodity as coal are of vital interest to the public. The Government has no constitutional power to regulate prices but can bring its influence to bear by the powerful instrument afforded by full publicity. When through industrial conflict the supply is threatened, the President should have authority to appoint a commission to act as mediators and as a medium for voluntary arbitration. In the event of a strike the control of distribution should be invoked to prevent profiteering.

**MERCHANT MARINE**—The Republican Party stands for a strong and permanent merchant marine, built by Americans, owned by Americans, and manned by Americans, to secure the necessary contact with world markets for the sale of our surplus agricultural and manufactured products, to protect our shippers and importers from exorbitant ocean freight rates and to become a powerful arm of our national defense.

That part of the merchant marine which is now owned by the Government should continue to be improved by economical and efficient management with reduction of the losses now paid by the Government through taxation until it is finally placed on so sound a basis that with ocean freight rates becoming normal, due to improvement in international affairs, it can be sold to American citizens.

**WATERWAYS, FLOOD CONTROL AND WATER POWER**—Fully realizing the vital importance of transportation in both cost and service to all our people we favor the construction of the most feasible waterways from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic seaboard and the Gulf of Mexico, and the improvement and development of rivers, harbors and waterways, inland and coastwise, to the fullest extent justified by the present and potential tonnage available.

We favor a comprehensive survey of the conditions under which the flood waters of the Colorado river may be controlled and utilized for the benefit of the people of the states which border thereon.

The Federal Water Power Act establishes a national water power policy, and the way has thereby been opened for the greatest water power development in our history under conditions which preserve the initiative of our people while protecting the public interests.

**THE WORLD WAR VETERANS**—We reaffirm the admiration and gratitude which we feel for our soldiers and sailors.

The Republican Party pledges a continuing and increasing solicitude for all those suffering any disability as a result of service to the United States in time of war. No country and no administration has ever shown a more generous disposition in the care of its disabled or more thoughtful consideration in providing a sound administration for the solution of the many problems involved in making intended benefits fully, directly and promptly available to the veterans.

The confusion, inefficiency and maladministration existing heretofore since the establishment of a Government agency for administering such benefits has in the main been cured by new legislation, and plans are being actively made looking to a further improvement in the operation of the Bureau. The

basic statutes have been so liberalized as to bring within their terms one hundred thousand additional beneficiaries. The privilege of hospitalization in Governmental hospitals, as recommended by President Coolidge, has been granted to all veterans irrespective of the origin of disability and over \$50,000,000 has been appropriated for hospital construction which will provide sufficient beds to care for all. Appropriations totaling over \$1,100,000,000 made by the Republican Congress for the care of the disabled evidenced the unmistakable purpose of the Government not to consider costs when the welfare of these men is concerned. No legislation for the benefit of the disabled soldier proposed during the last four years by veterans' organizations has failed to receive consideration.

We pledge ourselves to meet the problems of the future affecting the care of our wounded and disabled in a spirit of liberality, and with that thoughtful consideration which will enable the Government to give to the individual veteran that full measure of care guaranteed by an effective administration machinery to which his patriotic services and sacrifices entitle him.

**CONSERVATION**—We believe in the development, effective and efficient, whether of oil, timber, coal or water power resources of the Government, only as needed and only after the public need has become a matter of public record, protected with scrupulous carefulness and vigilant watchfulness against waste, speculation and monopoly.

The natural resources of the country belong to all the people and are a part of an estate belonging to generations yet unborn. The Government policy should be to safeguard, develop and utilize these possessions. The conservation policy of the nation originated with the Republican Party under the inspiration of Theodore Roosevelt. We hold it a privilege of the Republican Party to build as a memorial to him on the foundation which he laid.

**EDUCATION**—The conservation of human resources is one of the most solemn responsibilities of government. There is an obligation which cannot be ignored and which demands that the Federal Government shall as far as lies within its power give to the people and the states the benefit of its counsel.

The welfare activities of the Government connected with the various departments are already numerous and important, but lack the co-ordination which is essential to effective action. To meet these needs we approve the recommendation for the creation of a cabinet post of Education and Relief.

**UNIVERSAL MOBILIZATION IN TIME OF WAR**—We believe that in time of war the nation should draft for its defense not only its citizens but also every resource which may contribute to success. The country demands that should the United States ever again be called upon to defend itself by arms the President be empowered to draft such material resources and such services as may be required, and to stabilize the prices of services and essential commodities, whether utilized in actual warfare or private activity.

**IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION**—The unprecedented living conditions in Europe following the World War created a condition by which we were threatened with mass immigration that would have seriously disturbed our economic life. The law recently enacted is designed to protect the inhabitants of our country, not only the American citizen, but also the alien already with us who is seeking to secure an economic foothold for himself and family against the competition which would come from unrestricted immigration. The administrative features of the law represent a great constructive advance and eliminate the hardships suffered by immigrants under the emergency statute.

We favor the improvement of our naturalization laws and the adoption of methods which will exert a helpful influence among the foreign-born population and provide for the education of the alien in our language, customs, ideals and standards of life.

**HAWAII-ALASKA**—We favor a continuance for the Territory of Hawaii of Federal assistance in harbor improvements, the appropriation of its share of federal funds and the systematic extension of the settlement of public lands by the Hawaiian race.



We indorse the policy of the present administration with reference to Alaska and favor a continuance of the constructive development of the Territory.

**PHILIPPINES**—The Philippine policy of the Republican Party has been and is inspired by the belief that our duty toward the Filipino people is a national obligation which should remain entirely free from partisan politics.

In accepting the obligation which came to them with the control of the Philippine Islands the American people had only the wish to serve, advance and improve the condition of the Filipino people. This thought will continue to be the dominating factor in the American consideration of the many problems which must inevitably grow out of our relationship to these people.

If the time comes when it is evident to Congress that independence would be better for the people of the Philippines with respect to both their domestic concerns and their status in the world, and the Filipino people then desire complete independence, the American Government will gladly accord it. The results of a careful study of the conditions in the Philippine Islands convinces us that the time for such action has not yet arrived.

**RECLAMATION**—Federal reclamation of the arid and semi-arid lands in the West has been the subject of intensive study in the Department of the Interior during the past fiscal year. New policies and methods of operation have been adopted which promise to insure the successful accomplishment of the objects sought. The completion of this reorganization plan is regarded as one of the achievements of the present administration in the interests of farmers immediately and of all the people ultimately.

**COMMERCIAL AVIATION**—We advocate the early enactment of such legislation and the taking of such steps by the Government as will tend to promote commercial aviation.

**ARMY AND NAVY**—There must be no further weakening of our regular army. We advocate appropriations sufficient to provide for the training of all members of the national guard, the citizens military training camps, the reserve officers corps and the reserves who may offer themselves for service.

We pledge ourselves to round out and maintain the Navy to the full strength provided the United States by the letter and spirit of the Limitation of Armament Conference.

**NEGRO**—We urge the Congress to enact at the earliest possible date a Federal anti-lynching law, so that the full influence of the Federal Government may be wielded to exterminate this hideous crime.

We believe that much of the misunderstanding which now exists can be eliminated by humane and sympathetic study of its causes. The President has wisely recommended the creation of a commission for the investigation of social and economic conditions and the promotion of mutual understanding and confidence.

**HONEST GOVERNMENT—REPUBLICAN**—We recognize the duty of constant vigilance to preserve at all times a clean and honest Government and to bring to the bar of justice every defiler of the public service, in or out of office.

Dishonesty and corruption are not political attributes. The recent Congressional investigations have exposed instances in both parties of men in public office who are willing to sell official favors and men out of office who are willing to buy them, in some cases with money and in others with influence.

The sale of influence resulting from the holding of public position or from association while in public office, or the use of such influence for private gain or advantage is a perversion of public trust and prejudicial to good government. It should be condemned by public opinion and forbidden by law.

We demand the speedy, fearless and impartial prosecution of all wrongdoers, without regard to political affiliations or positions; but we declare no greater wrong can be committed against the people than the attempt to destroy their trust in the great body of their public servants. Admitting the deep humiliation, which all good citizens share, that our public life should have harbored some

dishonest men, we assert that these undesirables do not represent the standard of our national integrity.

The Government at Washington is served today by thousands of earnest, conscientious and faithful officials and employees in every branch. It is a grave wrong against these patriotic men and women to strive indiscriminately to besmirch the names of the innocent and undermine the confidence of the people in the government under which they live. It is even a graver wrong when this is done for partisan purpose or for selfish exploitation.

The Republican Administration has already taken charge of the prosecution of official dereliction and it will continue the work of discovery and punishment, but it will not confuse the innocent with the guilty nor digress for partisan advantage from the strict enforcement of the law.

**LAW AND ORDER**—We must have respect for law. We must have observance of law. We must have enforcement of law. The very existence of the Government depends upon this. The substitution of private will for public law is only another name for oppression, disorder, anarchy and mob rule.

Every Government depends upon the loyalty and respect of its citizens. Violations of law weaken and threaten government itself. No honest government can condone such actions on the part of its citizens. The Republican Party pledges the full strength of the Government for the maintenance of these principles by the enforcement of the Constitution and of all laws.

**WOMEN DELEGATES**—We extend our greetings to the women delegates who for the first time under Federal authorization sit with us in full equality. The Republican Party from the beginning has espoused the cause of woman suffrage, and the presence of these women delegates signifies to many here the completion of a task undertaken years ago. We welcome them not as assistants or as auxiliary representatives, but as co-partners in the great political work in which we are engaged and we believe that the actual partnership in party councils should be made more complete.

**CONSTITUTIONAL GUARANTIES**—The Republican Party reaffirms its unyielding devotion to the Constitution and to the guaranties of civil, political and religious liberty therein contained.

**PARTY RESPONSIBILITY**—In our form of government, parties are essential instrumentalities. Our Government functions best when the Chief Executive is supported in the Congress by a majority of the same political faith, united by common principles and able by concerted action to carry out in an orderly way a definite, consistent and balanced program.

In urging the people to elect a Republican President and Vice President, we ask them to elect to the Senate and House of Representatives men and women who believe in the Republican principles, acknowledge party responsibility and who can be relied upon to keep faith with the people by carrying out the platform which the Republican Party now presents and pledges itself to fulfill.

#### REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Republican national convention of 1924 convened June 10 at Cleveland, Ohio, and adjourned June 12. There were 1,109 delegates of whom 118 were women. Of the alternate delegates 279 were women. Theodore E. Burton of Ohio was temporary chairman, Frank W. Mondell of Wyoming permanent chairman and Charles B. Warren of Michigan chairman of the resolutions committee.

## REPUBLICAN PARTY STATE PLATFORM

Adopted at state convention held in Des Moines, July 22, 1924.

**PREAMBLE**—We, the Republicans of Iowa, rejoice in the selection of Calvin Coolidge and Charles G. Dawes as candidates for President and Vice President on the Republican National Ticket. We have the utmost confidence in their ability to serve our nation as loyal Iowa Republicans would have such service rendered. It is with pride that we reaffirm the declaration of principles and policies adopted by the Republican National Convention. We enter this campaign with the assurance that the principles of our party will be faithfully upheld by the candidates there nominated.

In forward looking legislation for the prosecution, the safety, the health, the happiness and prosperity of her people, Iowa is second to no state in the Union; but her real Republicans have never believed and never will believe that to be progressive, they must also be Socialists or Communists or Reds or members of or in sympathy with other like organizations seeking the overthrow of the institutions which made America great and of our Constitution, which has made the United States the foremost nation of the world.

We commend and congratulate the present state administration upon its able, clean and efficient conduct of our state affairs.

We express our sympathy to the family and friends of Raymond W. Cassady, former Secretary of Agriculture, of this State, in his untimely death. He was a high type of Iowa farmer and citizen and was bringing credit to the new department over which he presided.

**AGRICULTURAL RELIEF**—Most of the economic injustices which have oppressed our farmers during the last three years have been the direct and natural results of unsound legislation by a democratic congress and unwise and incapable direction of the government by a democratic administration. Under a republican administration laws have been enacted which have done much to correct the mistakes due to democratic incompetence, such as the packers and stock yards act which insures to the producer fair treatment at the great live stock markets; the future trading act which makes it impossible to prevent undue manipulation on the grain exchange; the co-operative act which gives farmers the right to organize co-operatively for the marketing of their products; the intermedlate credit act of 1923 which for the first time provides a system of personal credit for productive purposes; the federal warehouse act which is being rapidly extended and which will make it possible for farmers to market their staple products in an orderly way; these and other acts of lesser importance constitute a foundation upon which a sound and profitable system of agriculture can be built. Notwithstanding the benefits which have resulted from the enactment of such legislation, it is the duty of the government to enact such further legislation as may be necessary to restore a normal relationship between the prices of agricultural products and the prices of other commodities. The distorted relationship is largely the result of government action and should be corrected by the agency which caused it.

We endorse the principles of the McNary-Haugen Bill, and we commend the Iowa Congressmen for their wholehearted support of the idea of "equality of agriculture" in the 68th Congress. It was defeated in the House and it will be interesting for the farmers of Iowa to remember that about twenty-five per cent more democrats voted against it than Republicans; and that the Representative who did more to kill it than any other one man was a Wisconsin insurgent, a devoted and zealous follower of Senator LaFollette, the independent candidate for President. Nor should it be forgotten that the one Socialist member of the House who is now leading his party in support of the senator from Wisconsin, voted against the bill.

We urge Congress to continue the fight until the farmers of the United States have been given legislation which will enable them to obtain economic equality with labor and industry. The restoration of the farmer's dollar to its pre-war purchasing power is the biggest problem before the people of the United States today. That labor and industry are able to function on a higher price level than the farmer is due in large measure to preferential legislation and intensive co-operation. We demand similar legislation for the farmer.

We approve the recent lowering of the re-discount rates by the federal reserve banks, and we urge on the Federal Reserve board the possibility and the desirability of maintaining a stable price level at 60 or 70 per cent above pre-war. A stable price level of this sort will permit the maximum of justice between the various classes of society.

We endorse the active, earnest and efficient work of Henry C. Wallace as Secretary of the Department of Agriculture.

**RAILWAY TRANSPORTATION**—Railway transportation should be rendered at the lowest rates consistent with sustained, adequate and efficient service. In the regulation of companies engaged in transportation, freight rates should be so adjusted from time to time as to favor those industries which may be suffering under temporary depression even though it may be necessary to add the losses in revenue to the rates upon other commodities. We stand for the

strictest regulation to the end that no more than a fair return upon actual values shall be received or retained by railway companies but we are unalterably opposed to a policy which under the guise of regulation has for its purpose the wrecking of our transportation companies in order to establish government ownership and operation.

**LABOR POLICIES**—We endorse the historic policy of the republican party in securing protection for labor. Under it working men receive wages which enable them to enjoy the American standard of living which is the promise of our American government.

**CHILD LABOR**—We believe that the child labor amendment, about to be submitted by the governor to the general assembly of Iowa, should be promptly ratified.

**GOOD ROADS**—The people of Iowa want and must have their roads greatly improved. To that end we urge the Iowa legislature to meet all requirements of the federal statutes for obtaining and preserving Iowa's portion of federal aid. We recommend that the state be authorized and empowered to improve and maintain the primary roads of Iowa.

**PRIMARY LAW**—It is the cause of this Convention that the primary law should be amended so as to provide that no voter may change his party affiliation on election day.

**EDUCATION**—We take pride in the fact that Iowa stands foremost among the states of the union in the per cent of literacy and we give to the school system of the state a large measure of credit in attaining this pre-eminence. We are opposed to any measure which will in any way cripple the public school system of our state.

**DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION AND PLATFORM**

The Democratic national convention of 1924 convened at New York City June 24 and adjourned July 9. There were 1,446 delegates and an equal number of alternates. One hundred eighty-two of the delegates were women and there were 292 women alternate delegates. Byron P. Harrison of Mississippi was temporary chairman, Thomas J. Walsh of Montana permanent chairman and Homer S. Cummings of Connecticut chairman of the resolutions committee.

**DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM OF 1924**

Adopted by the Democratic National Convention, held at New York City June 24th to July 9th, 1924.

**WOODROW WILSON**—We, the representatives of the Democratic Party, in National Convention assembled, pay our profound homage to the memory of Woodrow Wilson. Our hearts are filled with gratitude that American Democracy should have produced this man, whose spirit and influence will live on through the ages; and that it was our privilege to have co-operated with him in the advancement of ideals of government which will serve as an example and inspiration for this and future generations. We affirm our abiding faith in those ideals, and pledge ourselves to take up the standard which he bore and to strive for the full triumph of the principles of Democracy to which he dedicated his life.

**DEMOCRATIC VS. REPUBLICAN PRINCIPLES**—The Democratic Party believes in equal rights to all and special privileges to none. The Republican Party holds that special privileges are essential to national prosperity. It believes that national prosperity must originate with the special interests, and seep down through the channels of trade to the less favored industries, to the wage earners and small salaried employes. It has accordingly enthroned privilege and nurtured selfishness. The Republican Party is concerned chiefly with material things; the Democratic Party is concerned chiefly with human rights. The masses, burdened by discriminating laws and unjust administration, are demanding relief. The favored special interests, represented by the Republican Party, contented with their unjust privileges, are demanding that no change be made. The Democratic Party stands for remedial legislation and progress. The Republican Party stands still.

**PARTY RECORDS COMPARED**—We urge the American people to compare the record of eight unsullied years of Democratic administration with that of the Republican administration. In the former there was no corruption. Party pledges were faithfully fulfilled, and a Democratic Congress enacted an extraordinary number of constructive and remedial laws. The economic life of the nation was quickened. Tariff taxes were reduced. A Federal Trade Commission was created. A Federal Farm Loan System was established. Child-labor legislation was enacted. A Good Roads Bill was passed. Eight-Hour Laws were adopted. A Secretary of Labor was given a seat in the Cabinet of the President. The Clayton amendment to the Sherman Anti-Trust Act was passed, freeing American labor and taking it from the category of commodities. By the Smith-Lever bill improvement of agricultural conditions was effected. A Corrupt Practices Act was adopted. A well-considered Warehouse Act was passed. Federal employment bureaus were created, Farm Loan banks were organized and the Federal Reserve system was established. Privilege was uprooted. A corrupt lobby was driven from the National Capitol. A higher sense of individual and national duty was aroused. America enjoyed an unprecedented period of social and material progress.

During the time which intervened between the inauguration of a Democratic



administration on March 4, 1913, and our entrance into the World War, we placed upon the statute books of our country more effective, constructive and remedial legislation than the Republican Party had placed there in a generation.

During the great struggle which followed we had a leadership that carried America to greater heights of honor and power and glory than she had ever known before in her entire history.

Transition from this period of exalted Democratic leadership to the sordid record of the last three and a half years make the nation ashamed. It marks the contrast between a high conception of public service and an avowed purpose to distribute spoils.

**REPUBLICAN INEFFICIENCY AND CORRUPTION**—Never before in our history has the Government been so tainted by corruption, and never has an administration so utterly failed. The nation has been appalled by the revelations of political depravity which have characterized the conduct of public affairs. We arraign the Republican Party for attempting to limit inquiry into official delinquencies and to impede, if not to frustrate, the investigations to which in the beginning the Republican Party and leaders assented, but which later they regarded with dismay. These investigations sent the former Secretary of the Interior to Three Rivers in disgrace and dishonor. These investigations revealed the incapacity and indifference to public obligation of the Secretary of the Navy, compelling him, by force of public opinion, to quit the Cabinet. These investigations confirmed the general impression as to the unfitness of the Attorney General by exposing an official situation and personal contacts which shocked the conscience of the nation and compelled his dismissal from the Cabinet. These investigations disclosed the appalling condition of the Veterans' Bureau with its fraud upon the Government, and its cruel neglect of the sick and disabled soldiers of the World War. These investigations revealed the criminal and fraudulent nature of the oil leases, which caused the Congress, despite the indifference of the Executive, to direct recovery of the public domain and the prosecution of the criminal.

Such are the exigencies of partisan politics that Republican leaders are teaching a strange doctrine that public censure should be directed against those who expose crime rather than against criminals who have committed the offenses. If only three Cabinet officers out of ten are disgraced, the country is asked to marvel at how many are free from taint. Long boastful that it was the only party "fit to govern," the Republican Party has proven its inability to govern even itself. It is at war with itself. As an agency of government it has ceased to function. This nation cannot afford to entrust its welfare to a political organization that cannot master itself, or to an Executive whose policies have been rejected by his own party. To retain in power an administration of this character would inevitably result in four years more of continued disorder, internal dissension and governmental inefficiency.

A vote for Coolidge is a vote for chaos!

**ISSUES**—The dominant issues of the campaign are created by existing conditions.

Dishonesty, discrimination, extravagance, and inefficiency exist in government. The burdens of taxation have become unbearable. Distress and bankruptcy in agriculture, the basic industry of our country, is affecting the happiness and prosperity of the whole people. The high cost of living is causing hardship and unrest. The slowing down of industry is adding to the general distress. The tariff, the destruction of our foreign markets, and the high cost of transportation are taking the profit out of agriculture, mining and other raw material industries. Large standing armies and the cost of preparing for war still cast their burdens upon humanity. These conditions the existing Republican administration has proven itself unwilling or unable to redress.

The Democratic Party pledges itself to the following program:

**HONEST GOVERNMENT**—We pledge the Democratic Party to drive from public

places all who make barter of our national honor; its resources or the administration of its laws; to punish those guilty of these offenses.

To put none but the honest in public office; to practice economy in the expenditure of public money; to reverence and respect the rights of all under the Constitution.

To condemn and destroy government by the spy and the blackmailer, as by this Republican administration was both encouraged and practiced.

**TARIFF AND TAXATION**—The Fordney-McCumber Tariff Act is the most unjust, unscientific and dishonest tariff tax measure ever enacted in our history. It is class legislation, which defrauds all the people for the benefit of a few; it heavily increases the cost of living, penalizes agriculture, corrupts the Government, fosters paternalism, and, in the long run, does not benefit the very interests for which it was enacted.

We denounce the Republican tariff laws which are written in great part in aid of monopolies and thus prevent that reasonable exchange of commodities which would enable foreign countries to buy our surplus agricultural and manufactured products with resultant benefit to the toilers and producers of America. Trade interchange, on the basis of reciprocal advantages to the countries participating, is a time-honored doctrine of Democratic faith. We declare our party's position to be in favor of a tax on commodities entering the customs houses that will promote effective competition, protect against monopoly and at the same time produce a fair revenue to support the Government.

The greatest contributing factor in the increase and unbalancing of prices is unscientific taxation. After having increased taxation, and the cost of living by two billion dollars, under the Fordney-McCumber Tariff, all that the Republican Party could suggest in the way of relief was a cut of three hundred million dollars in direct taxes; and that was to be given principally to those with the largest incomes. Although there was no evidence of a lack of capital for investment to meet the present requirements of all legitimate industrial enterprises, and although the farmers and general consumers were bearing the brunt of tariff favors already granted to special interests, the administration was unable to devise any plan except one to grant further aid to the few. Fortunately this plan of the administration failed, and under Democratic leadership aided by progressive Republicans, a more equitable one was adopted, which reduces direct taxes by about four hundred and fifty million dollars.

The issue between the President and the Democratic Party is not one of tax reduction or of the conservation of capital. It is an issue of a relative burden of taxation and of the distribution of capital as affected by the taxation of income. The President still stands on the so-called Mellon plan, which his party has just refused to endorse or mention in its platform.

The income tax was intended as a tax upon wealth. It was not intended to take from the poor any part of the necessities of life. We hold that the fairest tax with which to raise revenues for the Federal Government is the income tax. We favor a graduated tax upon incomes, so adjusted as to lay the burdens of government upon the taxpayers in proportion to the benefits they enjoy and their ability to pay. We oppose the so-called nuisance taxes, sales taxes, and all other forms of taxation that unfairly shift to the consumer the burden of taxation. We refer to the Democratic revenue measure passed by the last Congress as distinguished from the Mellon tax plan as an illustration of the policy of the Democratic Party. We first made a flat reduction of 25 per cent upon the tax on all incomes payable this year, and then we so changed the proposed Mellon plan as to eliminate taxes upon the poor, reduce them upon moderate incomes and, in a lesser degree, upon the incomes of multimillionaires. We hold that all taxes are unnecessarily high, and pledge ourselves to further reductions.

We denounce the Mellon tax plan as a device to relieve multimillionaires at the expense of other taxpayers, and we accept the issue of taxation tendered by President Coolidge.

**AGRICULTURE**—During the four years of Republican government, the economic government, the economic condition of the American farmer has changed from comfort to bankruptcy, with all its attendant miseries. The chief causes for this are—

(a) The Republican Party policy of isolation in international affairs has prevented Europe from getting back to its normal balance, and, by leaving unsolved the economic problems abroad, has driven the European city population from industrial activities to the soil in large numbers in order to earn the mere necessities of life. This has deprived the American farmer of his normal export trade.

(b) The Republican policy of a prohibitive tariff, exemplified in the Fordney-McCumber law, which has forced the American farmer, with his export market debilitated, to buy manufactured goods at sustained high domestic levels, thereby making him the victim of the profiteer.

(c) The Republican policy of high transportation rates, both rail and water, which has made it impossible for the farmer to ship his produce to markets at even a living profit.

To offset these policies and their disastrous results, and to restore the farmer again to economic equality with other industrialists, we pledge ourselves:

(a) To adopt an international policy of such co-operation, by direct official instead of indirect and evasive unofficial means, as will re-establish the farmer's export market by restoring the industrial balance in Europe and the normal flow of international trade with the settlement of Europe's economic problems.

(b) To adjust the tariff so that the farmer and all other classes can buy again in a competitive manufacturer's market.

(c) To readjust and lower rail and water rates, which will make our markets, both for the buyer and the seller, national and international instead of regional and local.

(d) To bring about the early completion of internal waterway systems for transportation, and to develop our water powers for cheaper fertilizer and use on our farms.

(e) To stimulate by every proper governmental activity the progress of the co-operative marketing movement and the establishment of an export marketing corporation or commission in order that the exportable surplus may not establish the price of the whole crop.

(f) To secure for the farmer credits suitable for his needs.

(g) By the establishment of these policies and others naturally supplementary thereto, to reduce the margin between what the producer receives for his products and the consumer has to pay for his supplies, to the end that we secure an equality for agriculture.

**RAILROADS**—The sponsors for the Esch-Cummins Transportation Act of 1920, at the time of its presentation to Congress, stated that it had for its purposes the reduction of the cost of transportation, the improvement of service, the bettering of labor conditions, the promotion of peaceful co-operation between employer and employe, and at the same time the assurance of a fair and just return to the railroads upon their investment.

We are in accord with these announced purposes, but contend that the act has failed to accomplish them. It has failed to reduce the cost of transportation. The promised improvement in service has not been realized. The labor provisions of the act have proven unsatisfactory in settling differences between employer and employe. The so-called recapture clause has worked to the advantage of the strong and has been of no benefit to the weak. The pronouncement in the act for the development of both rail and water transportation has proven futile. Water transportation upon our inland waterways has not been encouraged, and limitation of our coastwise trade is threatened by the administration of the act. It has unnecessarily interfered

with the power of the states to regulate purely intrastate transportation. It must therefore be so rewritten that the high purposes which the public welfare demands may be accomplished.

Railroad freight rates should be so readjusted as to give the bulky, basic, low-priced raw commodities, such as agricultural products, coal and ores, the lowest rates, placing the higher rates upon more valuable and less bulky manufactured products.

**MUSCLE SHOALS AND FERTILIZERS**—We reaffirm and pledge the fulfillment of the policy, with reference to Muscle Shoals, as declared and passed by the Democratic majority of the Sixty-fourth Congress in the National Defense Act of 1916 "for the production of nitrates or other products needed for munitions of war and useful in the manufacture of fertilizers."

We hold that the production of cheaper and higher grade fertilizers is essential to agricultural prosperity. We demand prompt action by Congress for the operation of the Muscle Shoals plants to maximum capacity in the production, distribution and sale of commercial fertilizers to the farmers of the country, and we oppose any legislation that limits the production of fertilizers at Muscle Shoals by limiting the amount of power to be used in their manufacture.

**REPUBLICAN CONTRACTION OF CREDIT AND CURRENCY**—We denounce the recent cruel and unjust contraction of legitimate and necessary credit and currency, which was directly due to the so-called deflation policy of the Republican Party as declared in its National Platform of June, 1920, and in the speech of acceptance of its candidate for the presidency. Within eighteen months after the election of 1920 this policy resulted in withdrawing bank loans and discounts by over five billions of dollars and in contracting our currency by over fifteen hundred millions of dollars. This contraction bankrupted hundreds of thousands of farmers and stock growers in America and resulted in widespread industrial depression and unemployment. We demand that the Federal Reserve System be so administered as to give stability to industry, commerce and finance, as was intended by the Democratic Party, which gave the Federal Reserve System to the nation.

**RECLAMATION**—The Democratic Party was foremost in urging reclamation for the arid and semi-arid lands of the West. These lands are located in the public-land states, and, therefore, it is the duty of the Government to utilize their resources by reclamation.

Homestead entrymen under reclamation projects have suffered from the extravagant inefficiencies and mistakes of the Federal Government.

The Reclamation Act of 1924, recommended by the Fact-Finding Commission, and added as an amendment to the Second Deficiency Appropriation Bill at the last session of Congress, was eliminated from that bill by the Republican conferees in the report they presented to Congress one hour before adjournment. The Democratic Party pledges itself actively, efficiently and economically to carry on the reclamation projects, and to make equitable adjustment for the mistakes the Government has made.

**CONSERVATION**—We pledge recovery of the Navy's oil reserves, and all other parts of the public domain which have been fraudulently or illegally leased or otherwise wrongfully transferred to the control of private interests; vigorous prosecution of all public officials, private citizens and corporations that participated in these transactions; revision of the Water Power Act, the General Leasing Act, and all other legislation relating to the public domain that may be essential to its conservation and honest and efficient use on behalf of the people of the country. We believe that the nation should retain title to its water power and we favor the expeditious creation and development of our water power. We favor strict public control and conservation of all the nation's natural resources, such as coal, iron, oil and timber, and their use in such manner as may be to the best interest of our citizens.

The conservation of migratory birds, the establishment of game preserves,

and the protection and conservation of wild life is of importance to agriculturists as well as sportsmen.

Our disappearing natural resource of timber calls for a national policy of re-forestation.

**IMPROVED HIGHWAYS**—Improved roads are of vital importance not only to commerce and industry but also to agriculture and rural life. We call attention to the record of the Democratic party in this matter, and favor a continuance of federal aid under existing federal and state agencies.

**DEEP WATERWAYS**—We favor and will promote deep waterways from the Great Lakes to the Gulf and to the Atlantic Ocean.

**FLOOD CONTROL AND WATER TRANSPORTATION**—We favor a policy for the fostering and building up of water transportation through the improvement of inland waterways and the removal of discrimination against water transportation. Flood control and the lowering of flood levels is essential to the safety of life and property, the productivity of our lands, the navigability of our streams, and the reclaiming of our wet and overflowed lands and the creation of hydro-electric power. We favor the expeditious construction of flood relief works on the Mississippi and Colorado rivers and also such reclamation and irrigation projects upon the Colorado river as may be found to be feasible and practical.

We favor liberal appropriations for prompt co-ordinated surveys by the United States to determine the possibilities of general navigation improvements and water-power developments on navigable streams and their tributaries, to secure reliable information as to the most economical navigation improvement, in combination with the most efficient and complete development of water power.

We favor the suspension of the granting of federal water power licenses by the Federal Water Power Commission until congress has received reports from the water power commission with regard to applications for such licenses.

**MINING**—Mining is one of the basic industries of this country. We produce more coal, iron, copper and silver than any other country. The value of our mineral production is second only to agriculture. Mining has suffered like agriculture and from the same causes. It is the duty of our government to foster this industry and to remove the restrictions that destroy its prosperity.

**FRAUDULENT STOCK SALES**—We favor the immediate passage of such legislation as may be necessary to enable the states efficiently to enforce the laws relating to the gradual financial strangling of innocent investors, workers and consumers, caused by the organizing of corporations on an inflated and over-capitalized basis, resulting already in the undermining and collapse of many railroad, public service and industrial corporations, manifesting itself in unemployment, irreparable loss and waste, and which constitute a serious menace to the stability of our economic system.

**PRIVATE MONOPOLIES**—The Federal Trade Commission has submitted to the Republican administration numerous reports showing the existence of monopolies and combinations in restraint of trade, and has recommended proceedings against these violators of the law. The few prosecutions which have resulted from this abundant evidence furnished by this agency created by the Democratic party, while proving the indifference of the administration to the violations of law by trusts and monopolies and its friendship for them, nevertheless demonstrate the value of the Federal Trade Commission.

We declare that a private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable, and pledge the Democratic party to a vigorous enforcement of existing laws against monopoly and illegal combinations, and to the enactment of such further measures as may be necessary.

**REGULATION OF CORPORATIONS CONTROLLING NECESSITIES OF LIFE**—We pledge the Democratic party to regulate by governmental agencies the anthracite coal industry and all other corporations controlling the necessities of life where public welfare has been subordinated to private interests.

**MERCHANT MARINE**—The Democratic party condemns the vacillating policy of the Republican administration in its failure to develop an American flag shipping policy. There has been a marked decrease in the volume of American commerce carried in American vessels as compared to the record under a Democratic administration.

We oppose as illogical and unsound all efforts to overcome by subsidies the handicaps to American shipping and commerce imposed by Republican policies.

We condemn the practice of certain American railroads in favoring foreign ships, and pledge ourselves to correct such discriminations. We declare for an American-owned merchant marine, American built, and manned by American crews, which is essential for naval security in war, and is a protection to the American farmer and manufacturer against excessive ocean freight charges on products of farm and factory.

We declare that the government should own and operate such merchant ships as will insure the accomplishment of these purposes, and to continue such operation so long as it may be necessary without obstructing the development and growth of a privately owned American flag shipping.

**EDUCATION**—We believe with Thomas Jefferson and other founders of the republic that ignorance is the enemy of freedom and that each state, being responsible for the intellectual and moral qualifications of its citizens and for the expenditure of the moneys collected by taxation for the support of its schools, shall use its sovereign right in matters pertaining to education. The federal government should offer to the states such counsel, advice and aid as may be made available through the federal agencies for the general improvement of our schools in view of our national needs.

**CIVIL SERVICE**—We denounce the action of the Republican administration in its violations of the principles of civil service by its partisan removals and manipulation of the eligible lists in the post office department and other governmental departments; by its packing the Civil Service Commission so that that commission became the servile instrument of the administration in its wish to deny to the ex-service men their preferential rights under the law, and the evasion of the requirements of the law with reference to appointments in the department.

We pledge the Democratic party faithfully to comply with the spirit as well as the regulation of civil service; to extend its provisions to internal revenue officers and to other employes of the government not in executive positions, and to secure to ex-service men preference in such appointments.

**POSTAL EMPLOYEES**—We declare in favor of adequate salaries to provide decent living conditions for postal employes.

**POPULAR ELECTIONS**—We pledge the Democratic party to a policy which will prevent members of either house who fail of re-election from participating in the subsequent sessions of congress. This can be accomplished by fixing the days for convening the congress immediately after the biennial, national election; and to this end we favor granting the right to the people of the several states to vote on proposed constitutional amendments on this subject.

**PROBATION**—We favor the extension of the probation principle to the courts of the United States.

**AVIATION**—We favor a sustained development of aviation both by the government and commercially.

**LABOR AND CHILD WELFARE**—Labor is not a commodity. It is human. We favor collective bargaining and laws regulating hours of labor and conditions under which labor is performed. We favor the enactment of legislation providing that the product of convict labor shipped from one state to another shall be subject to the laws of the latter state exactly as though they had been produced therein. In order to mitigate unemployment attending business depression, we urge the enactment of legislation authorizing that construction and repair of public works be initiated in periods of acute unemployment.

We pledge the party to co-operate with the state governments for the

welfare, education and protection of child life and all necessary safeguards against exhaustive debilitating employment conditions for women.

Without the votes of Democratic members of the congress the Child Labor Amendment would not have been submitted for ratification.

**ACTIVITIES OF WOMEN**—We welcome the women of the nation to their rightful place by the side of men in the control of the government whose burdens they have always shared.

The Democratic party congratulates them upon the essential part which they have taken in the progress of our country, and the zeal with which they are using their political power to aid the enactment of beneficent laws and the exaction of fidelity in the public service.

**VETERANS OF WARS**—We favor generous appropriations, honest management and sympathetic care and assistance in the hospitalization, rehabilitation and compensation of the veterans of all wars and their dependents. The humanizing of the Veterans' Bureau is imperatively required.

**CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS**—The nation now knows that the predatory interests have, by supplying Republican campaign funds, systematically purchased legislative favors and administrative immunity. The practice must stop. Our nation must return to honesty and decency in politics. Elections are public affairs conducted for the sole purpose of ascertaining the will of the sovereign voters. Therefore, we demand that national elections shall hereafter be kept free from the poison of excessive private contributions. To this end, we favor reasonable means of publicity, at public expense, so that candidates, properly before the people for federal offices, may present their claims at a minimum of cost. Such publicity should precede the primary and the election. We favor the prohibition of individual contributions, direct and indirect, to the campaign funds of congressmen, senators or presidential candidates, beyond a reasonable sum to be fixed in the law, for both individual contributions and total expenditures, with requirements for full publicity. We advocate a complete revision of the Corrupt Practice Act to prevent Newberryism and the election evils disclosed by recent investigations.

**NARCOTICS**—Recognizing in narcotic addiction, especially the spreading of heroin addiction among the youth, a grave peril to America and to the human race, we pledge ourselves vigorously to take against it all legitimate and proper measures for education, for control and for suppression at home and abroad.

**LAW ENFORCEMENT**—The Republican administration has failed to enforce the Prohibition Law; is guilty of trafficking in liquor permits, and has become the protector of violators of this law.

The Democratic party pledges itself to respect and enforce the Constitution and all laws.

**THE RIGHTS OF THE STATES**—We demand that the states of the union shall be preserved in all their vigor and power. They constitute a bulwark against the centralizing and destructive tendencies of the Republican party.

We condemn the efforts of the Republican administration to nationalize the functions and duties of the states.

We oppose the extension of bureaucracy, the creation of unnecessary bureaus and federal agencies and the multiplication of offices of officeholders.

We demand a revival of the spirit of local self-government essential to the preservation of the free institutions of our republic.

**ASIATIC IMMIGRATION**—We pledge ourselves to maintain our established position in favor of the exclusion of Asiatic immigration.

**PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE**—The Filipino people have succeeded in maintaining a stable government and have thus fulfilled the only condition laid down by congress as a prerequisite to the granting of independence. We declare that it is now our liberty and our duty to keep our promise to these people by granting them immediately the independence which they so honorably covet.

**ALASKA**—The maladministration of affairs in Alaska is a matter of concern to all our people.

Under the Republican administration of Alaska development has ceased, and the fishing industry has been seriously impaired.

We pledge ourselves to correct the evils which have grown up in the administration of that rich domain.

An adequate form of local self-government for Alaska must be provided, and to that end we favor the establishment of a full territorial form enjoyed by all the territories except Alaska during the last century of American history.

**TERRITORY OF HAWAII**—We believe in a policy for continuing the improvements of the National Park, the harbors and breakwaters, and the federal roads of the territory of Hawaii.

**VIRGIN ISLANDS**—We recommend legislation for the welfare of the inhabitants of the Virgin Islands.

**ARMENIA AND THE LAUSANNE TREATY**—We condemn the Lausanne Treaty. It barter legitimate American rights, and betrays Armenia for the Chester Oil Concession.

We favor the protection of American rights in Turkey, and the fulfillment of President Wilson's arbitral award respecting Armenia.

**REPUBLIC OF GREECE**—We welcome to the sisterhood of republics the ancient land of Greece which gave to our party its priceless name. We extend to her government and people our cordial good wishes.

**THE LATIN-AMERICAN REPUBLICS**—From the day of their birth friendly relations have existed between the Latin-American republics and the United States. That friendship grows stronger as our relations become more intimate. The Democratic party sends to these republics its cordial greeting; God has made us neighbors—justice shall keep us friends.

**WAR**—War is a relic of barbarism, and it is justifiable only as a measure of defense.

In the event of war in which the man power of the nation is drafted, all other resources should likewise be drafted. This will tend to discourage war by depriving it of its profits.

**DISARMAMENT, WAR REFERENDUM AND NATIONAL DEFENSE**—We demand a strict and sweeping reduction of armaments by land and sea, so that there shall be no competitive military program or naval building. Until international agreements to this end have been made, we advocate an army and navy adequate for our national safety.

Our government should secure a joint agreement with all nations for world disarmament and also for a referendum of war, except in case of actual or threatened attack.

Those who must furnish the blood and bear the burdens imposed by war should, whenever possible, be consulted before this supreme sacrifice is required of them.

**LEAGUE OF NATIONS**—The Democratic party pledges all its energies to the outlawing of the whole war system. We refuse to believe that the wholesale slaughter of human beings on the battlefield is any more necessary to man's highest development than is killing by individuals.

The only hope for world peace and for economic recovery lies in the organized efforts of sovereign nations co-operating to remove the causes of war and to substitute law and order for violence.

Under the Democratic leadership a practical plan was devised under which fifty-four nations are now operating and which has for its fundamental purpose the free co-operation of all nations in the work of peace.

The government of the United States for the last four years has had no foreign policy, and consequently it has delayed the restoration of the political and economic agencies of the world. It has impaired our self-respect at home



and injured our prestige abroad. It has curtailed our foreign markets and ruined our agricultural prices.

It is of supreme importance to civilization and to mankind that America be placed and kept on the right side of the greatest moral question of all time, and therefore the Democratic party renews its declaration of confidence in the ideal of world peace, the League of Nations and the supreme effort of the statesmanship and religious conviction of our time to organize the world for peace. Further, the Democratic party declares that it will be the purpose of the next administration to do all in its power to secure for our country that moral leadership in the family of nations which, in the Providence of God, has been so clearly marked out for it. There is no substitute for the League of Nations as an agency working for peace; therefore, we believe that, in the interest of permanent peace, and in the lifting of the great burdens of war from the backs of the people, and in order to establish a permanent foreign policy on these supreme questions, not subject to change with change of party administrations, it is desirable, wise and necessary to lift this question out of party politics and to that end to take the sense of the American people at a referendum election, advisory to the government, to be held officially under act of congress, free from all other questions and candidacies, after ample time for full consideration and discussion throughout the country, upon the question, in substance, as follows:

"Shall the United States become a member of the League of Nations upon such reservations or amendments to the covenant of the League as the president and the senate of the United States may agree upon." Immediately upon an affirmative vote we will carry out such mandate.

**FREEDOM OF RELIGION—FREEDOM OF SPEECH—FREEDOM OF PRESS**—The Democratic party reaffirms its adherence and devotion to those cardinal principles contained in the Constitution and the precepts upon which our government is founded, that congress shall make no laws respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances, that the church and the state shall be and remain separate, and that no religious tests shall ever be required as a qualification to any office of public trust under the United States. These principles we pledge ourselves ever to defend and maintain. We insist at all times upon obedience to the orderly processes of the law and deplore and condemn any effort to arouse religious or racial dissension.

**CONCLUSION**—Affirming our faith in these principles we submit our cause to the people.

## PLATFORM OF ROBERT M. LA FOLLETTE

Independent Progressive Candidate for President of the United States.

The great issue before the American people today is the control of government and industry by private monopoly.

For a generation the people have struggled patiently, in the face of repeated betrayals by successive administrations, to free themselves from this intolerable power which has been undermining representative government.

Through control of government, monopoly has steadily extended its absolute dominion to every basic industry.

In violation of law, monopoly has crushed competition, stifled private initiative and independent enterprise, and without fear of punishment now exacts extortionate profits upon every necessity of life consumed by the public.

The equality of opportunity proclaimed by the Declaration of Independence and asserted and defended by Jefferson and Lincoln as the heritage of every American citizen has been displaced by special privilege for the few, wrested from the government of the many.

**FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS IN DANGER**—That tyrannical power which the American people denied to a king, they will no longer endure from the monopoly system. The people know they cannot yield to any group the control of the economic life of the nation and preserve their political liberties. They know monopoly has its representatives in the halls of congress, on the federal bench, and in the executive departments; that these servile agents barter away the nation's natural resources, nullify acts of congress by judicial veto and administrative favor, invade the people's rights by unlawful arrests and unconstitutional searches and seizures, direct our foreign policy in the interests of predatory wealth, and make wars and conscript the sons of the common people to fight them.

The usurpation in recent years by the federal courts of the power to nullify laws duly enacted by the legislative branch of the government is a plain violation of the constitution. Abraham Lincoln, in his first inaugural address, said: "The candid citizen must confess that if the policy of the government, upon vital questions affecting the whole people, is to be irrevocably fixed by decisions of the supreme court, the people will have ceased to be their own rulers, having to that extent practically resigned their government into the hands of that eminent tribunal." The constitution specifically vests all legislative power in the congress, giving that body power and authority to override the veto of the president. The federal courts are given no authority under the constitution to veto acts of congress. Since the federal courts have assumed to exercise such veto power, it is essential that the constitution shall give to the congress, the right to over-ride such judicial veto, otherwise the court will make itself master over the other co-ordinate branches of the government. The people themselves must approve or disapprove the present exercise of legislative power by the federal courts.

**DISTRESS OF AMERICAN FARMERS**—The present condition of American agriculture constitutes an emergency of the gravest character. The department of

commerce report shows that during 1923 there was a steady and marked increase in dividends paid by the great industrial corporations. The same is true of the steam and electric railways and practically all other large corporations. On the other hand, the secretary of agriculture reports that in the fifteen principal wheat growing states more than 108,000 farmers since 1920 have lost their farms through foreclosure and bankruptcy; that more than 122,000 have surrendered their property without legal proceedings, and that nearly 375,000 have retained possession of their property only through the leniency of their creditors, making a total of more than 600,000 or 26 per cent of all farmers who have virtually been bankrupted since 1920 in these fifteen states alone.

Almost unlimited prosperity for the great corporations and ruin and bankruptcy for agriculture is the direct and logical result of the politics and legislation which deflated the farmer while extending almost unlimited credit to the great corporations; which protected with exorbitant tariffs the industrial magnates, but depressed the prices of the farmers' products by financial juggling while greatly increasing the cost of what he must buy; which guaranteed excessive freight rates to the railroads and put a premium on wasteful management while saddling an unwarranted burden on to the backs of the American farmer; which permitted gambling in the products of the farm by grain speculators to the great detriment of the farmers and to the great profit of the grain gambler.

**A COVENANT WITH THE PEOPLE**—Awakened by the dangers which menace their freedom and prosperity the American people still retain the right and courage to exercise their sovereign control over their government. In order to destroy the economic and political power of monopoly, which has come between the people and their government, we pledge ourselves to the following principles and policies:

**THE HOUSE CLEANING**—1. We pledge a complete housecleaning in the department of justice, the department of the interior, and the other executive departments. We demand that the power of the federal government be used to crush private monopoly, not to foster it.

**NATURAL RESOURCES**—2. We pledge recovery of the navy's oil reserves and all other parts of the public domain which have been fraudulently or illegally leased, or otherwise wrongfully transferred, to the control of private interests; vigorous prosecution of all public officials, private citizens and corporations that participated in these transactions; complete revision of the water-power act, the general leasing act, and all other legislation relating to the public domain. We favor public ownership of the nation's water power and the creation and development of a national super-water power system, including Muscle Shoals, to supply at actual cost light and power for the people and nitrate for the farmers, and strict public control and permanent conservation of all the nation's resources, including coal, iron and other ores, oil and timber lands, in the interest of the people.

**RAILROADS**—3. We favor repeal of the Esch-Cummins railroad law and the fixing of railroad rates upon the basis of actual, prudent investment and cost of service. We pledge speedy enactment of the Howell-Barkley bill for the adjustment of controversies between railroads and their employees, which was held up in the last congress by joint action of reactionary leaders of the Democratic and Republican parties. We declare for public ownership of railroads with definite safeguards against bureaucratic control, as the only final solution of the transportation problem.

**TAX REDUCTION**—4. We favor reduction of federal taxes upon individual incomes and legitimate business, limiting tax exactions strictly to the requirements of the government administered with rigid economy, particularly by curtailment of the eight hundred million dollars now annually expended for the army and navy in preparation for future wars; by the recovery of the hundreds of millions of dollars stolen from the treasury through fraudulent war contracts and the corrupt leasing of the public resources; and by diligent action to

collect the accumulated interest upon the eleven billion dollars owing us by foreign governments.

We denounce the Mellon tax plan as a device to relieve multimillionaires at the expense of other tax payers, and favor a taxation policy providing for immediate reductions upon moderate incomes, large increases in the inheritance tax rates upon large estates to prevent the indefinite accumulation by inheritance of great fortunes in a few hands; taxes upon excess profits to penalize profiteering, and complete publicity, under proper safeguards, of all federal tax returns.

**THE COURTS**—5. We favor submitting to the people for their considerate judgment, a constitutional amendment providing that congress may by enacting a statute make it effective over a judicial veto.

We favor such amendment to the constitution as may be necessary to provide for the election of all federal judges, without party designation, for fixed terms not exceeding ten years, by direct vote of the people.

**THE FARMERS**—6. We favor drastic reduction of the exorbitant duties on manufactures provided in the Fordney-McCumber tariff legislation, the prohibiting of gambling by speculators and profiteers in agricultural products; the reconstruction of the federal reserve and federal farm loan systems, so as to eliminate control by usurers, speculators and international financiers, and to make the credit of the nation available upon fair terms to all and without discrimination to business men, farmers and homebuilders. We advocate the calling of a special session of congress to pass legislation for the relief of American agriculture. We favor such further legislation as may be needful or helpful in promoting and protecting co-operative enterprises. We demand that the interstate commerce commission proceed forthwith to reduce by an approximation to pre-war levels the present freight rates on agricultural products, including live stock, and upon the materials required upon American farms for agricultural purposes.

**LABOR**—7. We favor abolition of the use of injunctions in labor disputes and declare for complete protection of the right of farmers and industrial workers to organize, bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and conduct without hindrance co-operative enterprises.

We favor prompt ratification of the child labor amendment, and subsequent enactment of a federal law to protect children in industry.

**POSTAL SERVICE**—8. We believe that a prompt and dependable postal service is essential to the social and economic welfare of the nation; and that as one of the most important steps toward establishing and maintaining such a service, it is necessary to fix wage standards that will secure and retain employees of character, energy and ability.

We favor the enactment of the postal salary adjustment measure (S. 1898) for the employees of the postal service, passed by the first session of the 68th congress, vetoed by the president and now awaiting further consideration by the next session of congress.

We endorse liberalizing the civil service retirement law along the lines of S. 3011 now pending in congress.

**WAR VETERANS**—9. We favor adjusted compensation for the veterans of the late war, not as charity, but as a matter of right, and we demand that the money necessary to meet this obligation of the government be raised by taxes laid upon wealth in proportion to the ability to pay, and declare our opposition to the sales tax or any other device to shift this obligation onto the backs of the poor in higher prices and increased cost of living. We do not regard the payment at the end of a long period of a small insurance as provided by the law recently passed as in any sense a discharge of the nation's obligations to the veterans of the late war.

**GREAT LAKES TO SEA**—10. We favor a deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the sea. The government should, in conjunction with Canada, take immediate action to give the northwestern states an outlet to the ocean for cargoes, without change in the bulk, thus making the primary markets on the Great Lakes equal to those of New York.



**POPULAR SOVEREIGNTY**—11. Over and above constitutions and statutes and greater than all, is the supreme sovereignty of the people, and with them should rest the final decision of all great questions of national policy. We favor such amendments to the federal constitution as may be necessary to provide for the direct nomination and election of the president, to extend the initiative and referendum to the federal government, and to insure a popular referendum for or against war except in cases of actual invasion.

**PEACE ON EARTH**—12. We denounce the mercenary system of foreign policy under recent administrations in the interests of financial imperialists, oil monopolists and international bankers, which has at times degraded our state department from its high service as a strong and kindly intermediary of defenseless governments to a trading outpost for those interests and concession-seekers engaged in the exploitations of weaker nations, as contrary to the will of the American people, destructive of domestic development and provocative of war. We favor an active foreign policy to bring about a revision of the Versailles treaty in accordance with the terms of the armistice, and to promote firm treaty agreements with all nations to outlaw wars, abolish conscription, drastically reduce land, air and naval armaments, and guarantee public referendums on peace and war.

#### PLATFORM OF THE SOCIALIST-LABOR PARTY

(Adopted at the National Convention, May, 1924)

The world stands upon the threshold of a new social order. The capitalist system of production and distribution is doomed; capitalist appropriation of labor's product forces the bulk of mankind into wage slavery, throws society into the convulsions of the class struggle, and momentarily threatens to engulf humanity in chaos and disaster. At this crucial period in history the Socialist-Labor party of America, in sixteenth national convention assembled, reaffirming its former platform declarations, calls upon the workers to rally around the banner of the Socialist-Labor party, the only party in this country that blazes the trail to the workers' industrial republic.

Since the advent of civilization human society has been divided into classes. Each new form of society has come into being with a definite purpose to fulfill in the progress of the human race. Each has been born, has grown, developed, prospered, become old, outworn, and has finally been overthrown. Each society has developed within itself the germs of its own destruction as well as the germs which went to make up the society of the future.

The capitalist system rose during the seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth centuries by the overflow of feudalism. Its great and all-important mission in the development of man was to improve, develop and concentrate the means of production and distribution, thus creating a system of co-operative production. This work was completed in advanced capitalist countries about the beginning of the twentieth century. That moment capitalism had fulfilled its historic mission, and from that moment the capitalist class became a class of parasites.

In the course of human progress mankind has passed, through class rule, private property and individualism in production and exchange, from the enforced and inevitable want, misery, poverty and ignorance of savagery and barbarism to the affluence and high productive capacity of civilization. For

all practical purposes, co-operative production has now superseded individual production.

Capitalism no longer promotes the greatest good of the greatest number. It no longer spells progress, but reaction. Private production carries with it private ownership of the products. Production is carried on, not to supply the needs of humanity, but for the profit of the individual owner, the company, or the trust. The worker, not receiving the full product of his labor, cannot buy back all he produces. The capitalist wastes part in riotous living; the rest must find a foreign market. By the opening of the twentieth century the capitalist world—England, America, Germany, France, Japan, China, etc.—was producing at a mad rate for the world market. A capitalist deadlock of markets brought on in 1914 the capitalist collapse popularly known as the World War. The capitalist world cannot extricate itself out of the debris. America today is choking under the weight of her own gold and products.

This situation has brought on the present stage of human misery—starvation, want, cold, disease, pestilence and war. This state is brought about in the midst of plenty, when the earth can be made to yield hundred-fold, when the machinery of production is made to multiply human energy and ingenuity by the hundred. The present state of misery exists solely because the mode of production rebels against the mode of exchange. Private property in the means of life has become a social crime. The land was made by no man; the modern machines are the result of the combined ingenuity of the human race from time immemorial; the land can be made to yield and the machines can be set in motion only by the collective effort of the workers. Progress demands the collective ownership of the land on and the tools with which to produce the necessities of life. The owner of the means of life today partakes of the nature of a highwayman; he stands with his gun before society's temple; it depends upon him whether the million mass may work, earn, eat and live. The capitalist system of production and exchange must be supplanted if progress is to continue.

In place of the capitalist system the Socialist-Labor party aims to substitute a system of social ownership of the means of production, industrially administered by the workers, who assume control and direction as well as operation of their industrial affairs.

We therefore call upon the wage-earners to organize themselves into a revolutionary political organization under the banner of the Socialist-Labor party; and to organize themselves likewise upon the industrial field into a socialist industrial union, in order to consolidate the material power necessary for the establishment of the socialist industrial republic.

We also call upon all intelligent citizens to place themselves squarely upon the ground of working class interests, and join us in this mighty and noble work of human emancipation, so that we may put summary end to the existing barbarous class conflict by placing the land and all the means of production, transportation and distribution into the hands of the people as a collective body, and substituting industrial self-government for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder—a government in which every worker shall have the free exercise and full benefit of his faculties, multiplied by all the modern factors of civilization.

### PRIMARY ELECTION

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in the year 1912 and biennially thereafter, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for Judge of the Supreme Court and District Courts, which shall be by a Judicial Convention), for senator in the congress of the United States, and for the President and Vice-President of the United States in the years in which senators or president and vice-president are to be elected.

The Board of Supervisors of each county (acting as a County Board of Canvassers) meet on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvass the votes cast at the several precincts and make an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the Secretary of State for the following offices:

United States Senators.

President and Vice-President of the United States.

All State Officers.

Representatives in Congress.

Senators and Representatives in the General Assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the Executive Council meets as a State Canvassing Board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvass, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the general election.

## PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1924

## AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION

The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the Government, the State legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people, therefore, voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for President and Vice President in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

\*The candidates starred were elected. (a) The first Republican party is claimed by the present Democratic party as its progenitor. (b) No candidate having a majority of the electoral vote, the House of Representatives elected Adams. (c) Candidates of the anti-Masonry party. (d) There being no choice, the Senate elected Johnson. (e) Eleven southern states, being within the belligerent territory, did not vote. (f) Three southern states disfranchised. (g) Horace Greeley died after election, and Democratic electors scattered their votes. (h) There being a dispute over the electoral vote of Florida, Louisiana, Oregon and South Carolina, they were referred by Congress to an electoral commission composed of eight Republicans and seven Democrats, which, by a strict party vote, awarded 185 electoral votes to Hayes and 184 to Tilden. ## ELECTORAL VOTES.

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for President. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared President, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared Vice-President. The electoral votes for the first President of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen President and John Adams Vice-President.

**1796.** John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 63; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Adams was chosen President and Thomas Jefferson Vice-President.

**1800.** Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist, 1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the House of Representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him President. Burr received the votes of four States, which being the next largest vote, elected him Vice-President. There were 2 blank votes.

**1804.** The Constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a President and a Vice-President, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For President, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

**1808.** For President, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For Vice-President, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Clinton Vice-President.

**1812.** For President, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Republican, 89. For Vice-President, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen President and Gerry Vice-President.

**1816.** For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen President and Tompkins Vice-President.

**1820.** For President, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For Vice-President, Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, 218; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen President and Daniel D. Tompkins Vice-President.

## ADDITIONAL STATE COMMISSIONS

## COMMISSION FOR THE BLIND.

The forty-first general assembly passed an act creating the Iowa commission for the blind to consist of the superintendent of the state school for the blind and two other members to be appointed by the governor. The members serve without pay but receive necessary expenses while on duty. The commission acts as a bureau of information and industrial aid for the blind, assisting the blind in finding employment, teaching them various lines of work and giving assistance in marketing their products. A complete register of the blind is kept showing their condition, cause of blindness, capacity for education and industrial training. The commission also may establish workshops for the employment of the blind and provide suitable vocational training. It is further set forth in the law that the commission shall "discourage begging, either directly or indirectly, on the part of the blind within the limits of the state." An appropriation of \$20,000 was made for this work for the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925.

## REVOLUTIONARY WAR MEMORIAL COMMISSION.

E. R. Harlan, Des Moines; H. W. Grout, Waterloo; Mrs. R. H. Munger, Sioux City. Members serve without compensation.

The forty-first general assembly provided for a revolutionary war memorial commission of three members to be appointed by the governor and to serve without compensation for the purpose of determining the location in this state of the unmarked graves of soldiers and sailors who served in the war of the American Revolution and to supervise the erection over each of the graves of a suitable marker or monument. An appropriation of \$2,500 was made for this purpose.

## SESQUICENTENNIAL EXPOSITION COMMISSION.

The forty-first general assembly authorized the governor to appoint an exposition commission to be known as the "Sesquicentennial International Exposition Commission" of five members and appropriated \$95,000 to provide for an Iowa exhibit at the Sesquicentennial exposition to be held at Philadelphia in 1926. The members are to serve without compensation but their necessary expenses are to be provided. The arts, industries and resources of the state are to be set forth in the exhibit.

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
