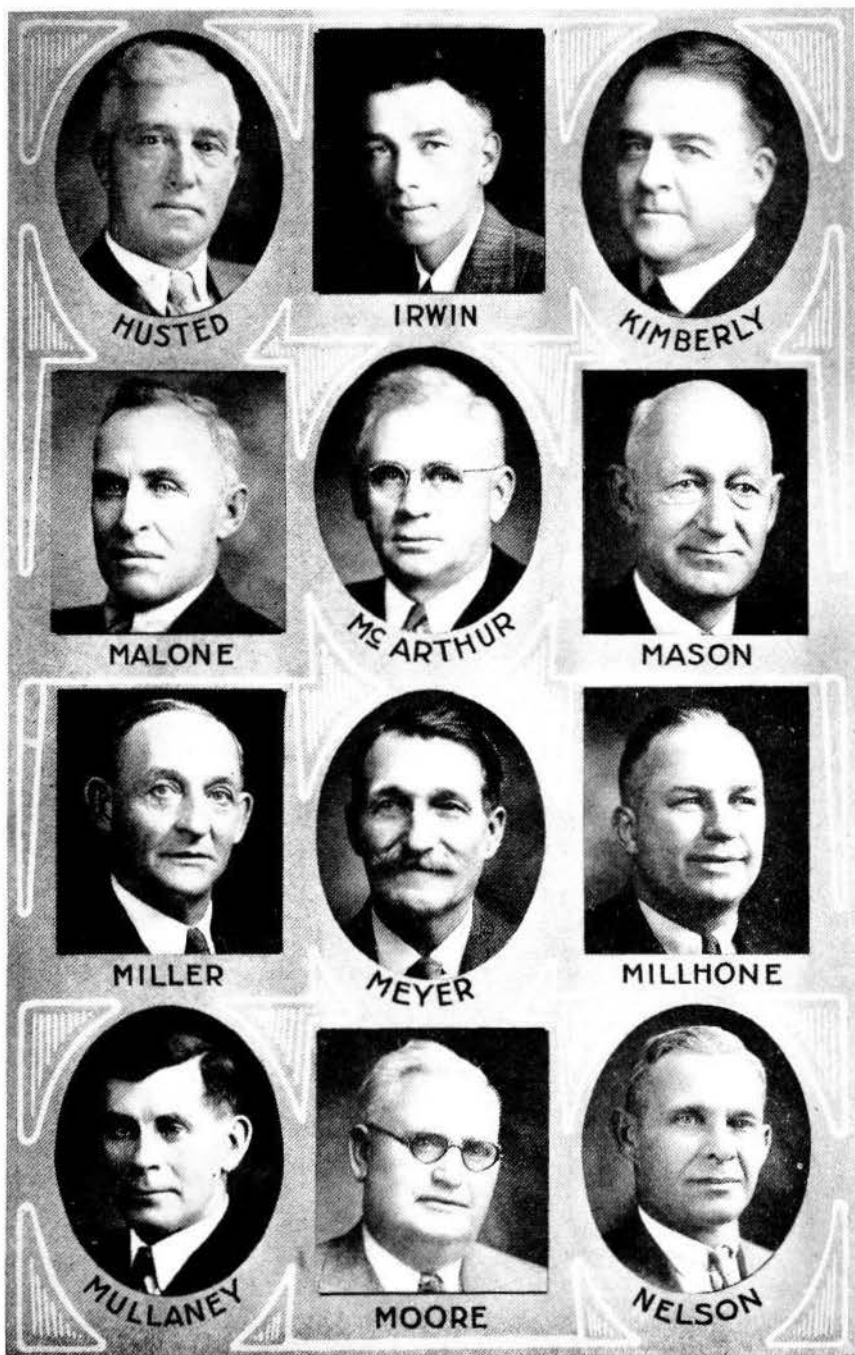

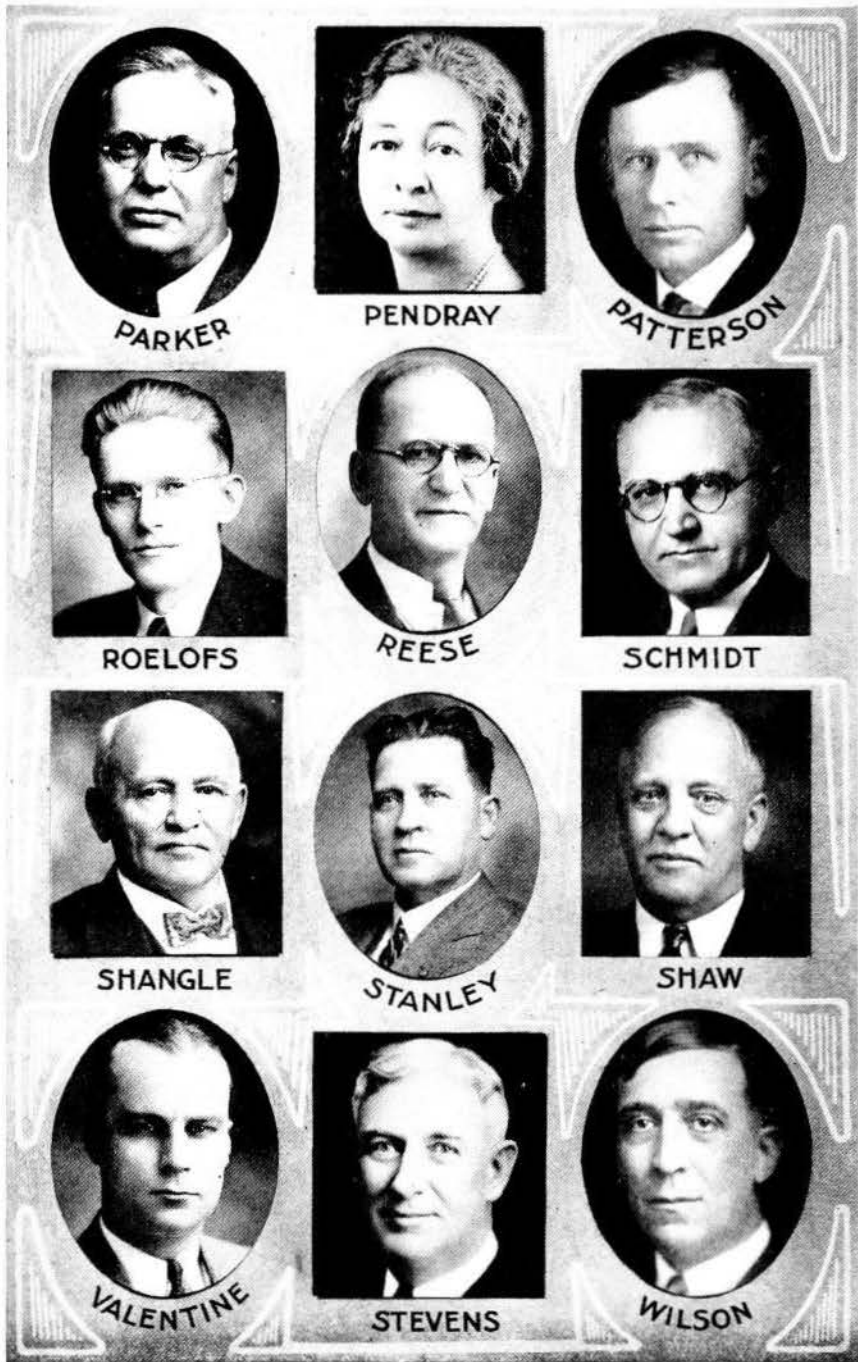

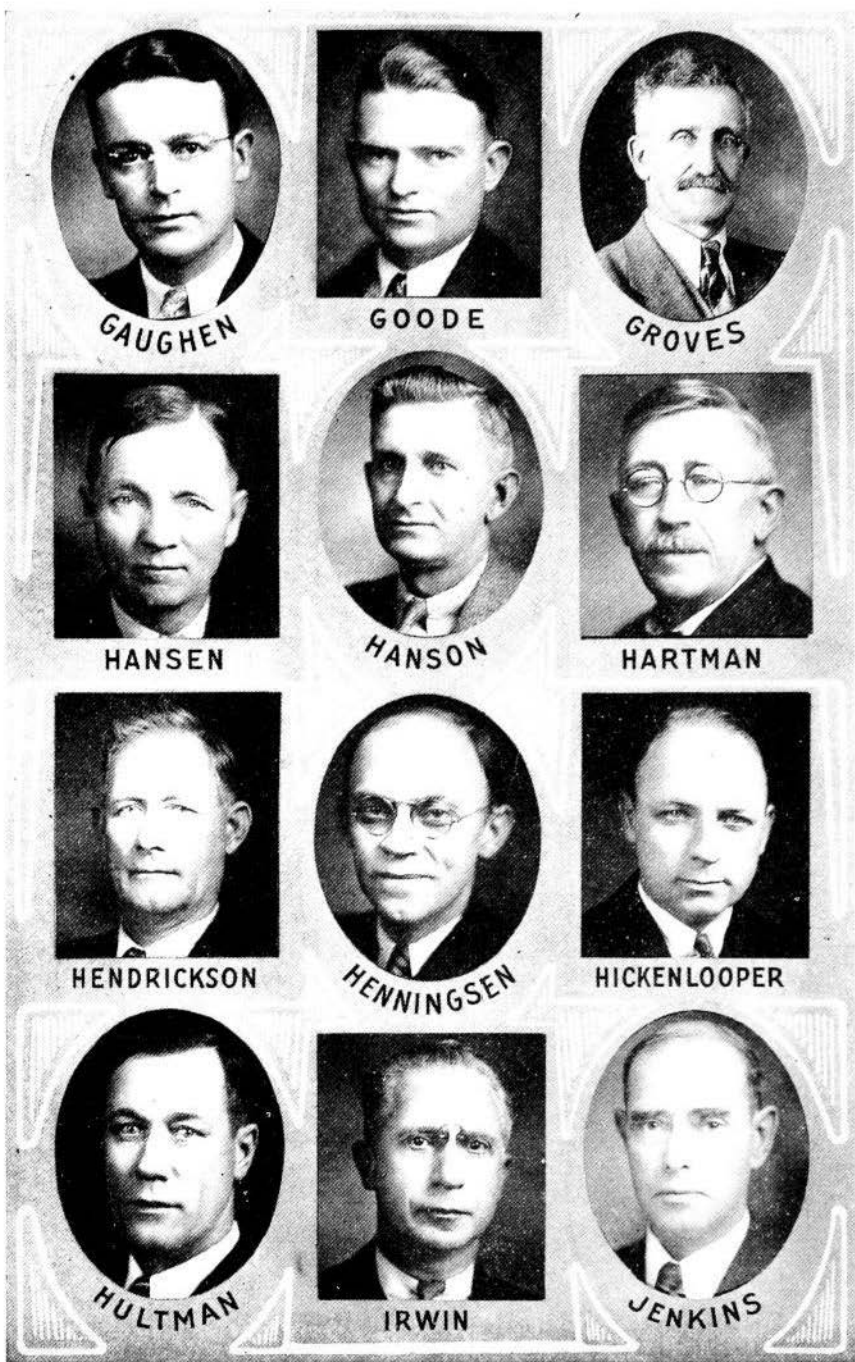

THE STATE FLOWER OF IOWA

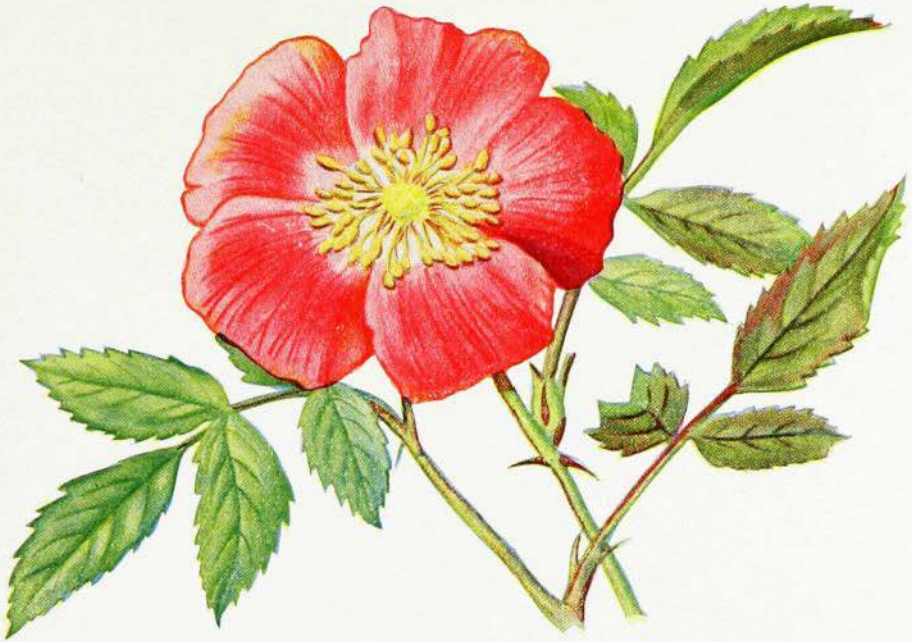
The Wild Rose was officially designated as the flower of the state by the twenty-sixth general assembly in extraordinary session. The resolution was adopted May 7, 1897.

No particular species of the Wild Rose was designated by the general assembly, but it is supposed that the legislators had in mind the "Wild Prairie Rose," or *Rosa Pratincola*, as it is the most common and most widely distributed species in the state.

THE STATE BIRD OF IOWA

The forty-fifth general assembly, by a concurrent resolution adopted March 22, 1933, designated the Eastern Goldfinch, *Spinus tristis tristis*, as the official bird of Iowa.

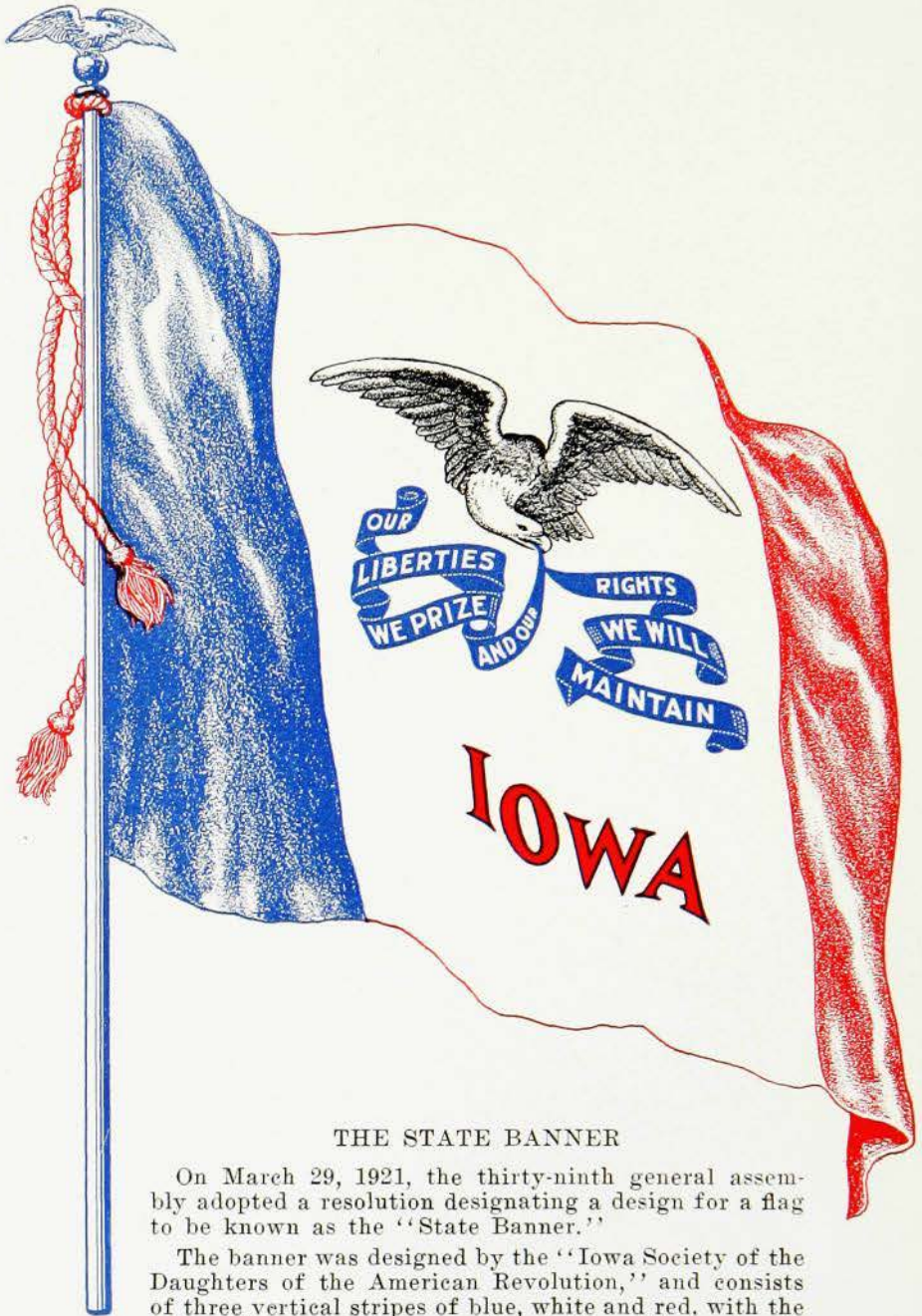
The Goldfinch is generally designated as a wild canary. The male is a bright yellow with black wings, tail and the top of its head. The female is similarly marked, but not so brilliant. These birds are rather common in the southern part of the state, but less numerous in the northern part.

THE STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the thirty-ninth general assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner."

The banner was designed by the "Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution," and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripe nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain." The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.

THE HISTORY OF IOWA¹*A Brief Summary*

The Land

MILLIONS of years ago an ocean covered what is now the Mississippi valley. As the waters receded, sand and clay were deposited upon the remains of the shell-covered animals which had lived in this sea and under pressure of successive layers the sand became sandstone and the clay turned into shale, while the animal deposits became limestone. Lead ore accumulated in the vicinity of Dubuque.

Later the climate became tropical and giant trees and ferns grew in the swamps. Their remains were, in turn, covered by clay or sand and became coal. In some places beds of gypsum were left as the water evaporated, forming a soft, gray rock now used for plaster or stucco.

In the centuries which followed, at least five great ice sheets covered the whole or some parts of Iowa. As each one melted, it left a layer of powdered rock, sprinkled with flinty boulders. In the intervals between the glaciers, plants grew and their remains mingled with the glacial deposits to make the deep, rich soil of Iowa.

The Indians of Iowa

The earliest remains of human life in Iowa are the rock-shelters and mounds of pre-historic Indians. Thousands of these mounds once existed in Iowa and hundreds may still be seen, especially in northeastern Iowa. When white men first saw the Iowa country several tribes of Indians hunted, fished, and fought here. These Indians usually lived in small temporary villages on the river terraces and their homes were tepees or wickiups made of bark or skin and nearby were the gardens where the women raised small patches of corn, beans, and pumpkins. Their weapons were bows and arrows; their implements were made of stone or bone.

When the white traders came among them, the Indians learned to sell their furs and buy guns, powder, traps, knives, blankets, calico, cooking utensils, mirrors, paint, tobacco, and whisky, but they soon discovered that settlers followed the traders and that the settlers wanted their lands.

By 1832 the van of white settlement had reached the east bank of the Mississippi river and the Sauk and Fox Indians were ordered to leave their cornfields on Rock river and cross the Mississippi. Black Hawk, a famous chief of that period, claimed that the treaty (1804) giving up the land in Illinois had been illegally signed and he and his band resisted the removal. They were defeated and compelled to surrender not only their lands in Illinois but a strip west of the Mississippi river, known as the Black Hawk purchase. The title to the land west of the river passed to the Federal government on June 1, 1833.

This was the beginning of the end for the Indians in Iowa. Keokuk's Reserve on the Iowa river was sold in 1836, and a year later an additional strip of land was added to the Black Hawk purchase. The Sauk and Fox Indians, by a treaty signed in 1842, were compelled to cede about one-third of the area of Iowa, agreeing to withdraw across the Missouri river in 1845. The Pottawattamie Indians had been given (by a treaty of 1833) lands in southwestern Iowa, but in 1846 they were moved to Kansas. The Winnebago Indians had been settled in what was called the "neutral ground," a narrow strip of land in northeastern Iowa ceded (1830) as a buffer strip by the Sioux and the Sauk and Fox. In accordance with a treaty signed in 1846, the Winnebagoes were moved to Minnesota. The Sioux retained their hunting grounds in the north and northwest until 1851 when they too were forced to cede their Iowa lands to the government.

Two later incidents connect the Indians with Iowa. In the summer of 1856, a number of white families settled in the region around the Okoboji lakes

and Spirit Lake. The following spring a band of Sioux Indians, wandering through the region, killed more than thirty of the settlers and carried off three women and a girl as prisoners.

About the same time some Sauk and Fox Indians came back to their beloved Iowa. The Iowa legislature passed a law (1856) permitting a band of these homesick Indians to remain in Tama county, and in 1857, with the assistance of Governor James W. Grimes, they bought eighty acres of land. There are now about 400 of these Indians, mostly Foxes, and they own nearly four thousand acres of land along the Iowa river. They have been made citizens and, if otherwise qualified, may vote.

Exploration

The first white men to see Iowa were Father Marquette and Louis Joliet who, with five boatmen, came down the Mississippi river in June, 1673. At some spot along the shore, probably near the mouth of the Iowa river, the party landed and Marquette and Joliet visited a nearby village of Illinois Indians. During the next century a number of white soldiers and traders came through the Iowa country.

In 1788 (five years after the close of the Revolution) Julien Dubuque, a French-Canadian trader, crossed the Mississippi river to the lead mines in the vicinity of Dubuque and established his home there. Eight years later (1796) he received from the Spanish governor a grant of land, including the lead mines, which he named the "Mines of Spain." Dubuque remained at the mines until his death in 1810. A man named Basil Giard also secured a grant of some 5 680 acres in Clayton county, and in 1799 Louis Honoré Teson was granted about 6,000 acres in what is now Lee county, where he planted the first apple orchard in Iowa.

All of these grants were obtained from the Spanish government, for France had ceded the western half of Louisiana to Spain in 1762. Napoleon, however, compelled Spain to recede Louisiana to France in 1800. In the meantime American merchants quarrelled with the Spanish officials over the commerce down the Mississippi and President Jefferson decided to buy the port of New Orleans. To the surprise of the Americans, Napoleon offered to sell the whole of Louisiana, since he felt he could not defend it against the English, and in 1803 the United States bought Louisiana, including Iowa, for \$15,000,000.

President Jefferson sent Meriwether Lewis and William Clark with a party to explore the new purchase. Sergeant Charles Floyd, one of the explorers, who died near the present site of Sioux City (August 20, 1804), was the first white man known to have died on Iowa soil. In 1805 Lieutenant Zebulon M. Pike led an expedition up the Mississippi river. Major Stephen H. Long (1819, 1820), Henry R. Schoolcraft (1820, 1832), William H. Keating (1823), and Colonel Stephen Watts Kearny (1820, 1824, 1835), were other explorers of Iowaland.

Settlement

Little by little traders, miners, and farmers edged into Iowa. Settlements were not permitted in the Indian country, but a number of white families were allowed to settle in the "half-breed tract," the triangle in southeastern Iowa at the junction of the Mississippi and Des Moines rivers which had been given to the half breeds (in 1824) by the Sauk and Fox. To the north, the lead mines of Dubuque tempted white men to cross the river as early as 1829, but United States troops drove them back across the river until after June 1, 1833, when the Black Hawk purchase became part of the public domain. When the government surveys began in 1836, there were more than ten thousand white settlers in Iowa. The first land offices were opened at Dubuque and Burlington in 1838. The land was sold by the government for \$1.25 an acre. To protect their claims before the land was offered for sale settlers often formed "claim associations."

The early pioneers of Iowa came chiefly from eastern and southeastern states, but there were also many settlers who came directly from Europe. Most of the immigrants who settled in Iowa soon learned the English

language, became American citizens, and were soon assimilated with the general population. By 1847 there were 116,454 people in Iowa and in 1860 the population was 674,913, of which 106,081 were foreign born. In 1930 the population of Iowa was 2,470,939.

There have been some interesting group settlements in Iowa. In 1846 several thousand Mormons crossed the state on their way from Nauvoo, Illinois, to Utah. They established a number of permanent camps and some of them remained in southern Iowa. One of their settlements was Kaneshville, later Council Bluffs. Ten years later some 1,300 Mormons pushed handcarts from Iowa City westward on their way to Salt Lake City. Hollanders came to Pella in 1847, and English to Le Mars thirty years later. Germans, Irish, Scandinavians, and Czechoslovakians (Bohemians) added to the immigrant total.

There were also a number of communistic settlements in Iowa. One of these was made (1855) by members of the Amana society (now a joint stock company), which owns about twenty-six thousand acres of land, chiefly in Iowa county. The members, numbering about 1,400, live in seven villages. Some French people who called themselves Icarians organized a communistic settlement at Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1849, and ten years later moved to Adams county, Iowa, near Corning, where they built a village called Icaria. After several divisions and withdrawals, the Icarian community was finally dissolved in 1895.

The History of Government in Iowa

The beginning of settlements, of course, brought up the question of government. Soon after the United States bought Louisiana (in 1803), the northern part, including Iowa, was included in the District of Louisiana and attached to the Territory of Indiana. Later the Iowa country was made a part of the Territory of Louisiana and still later (1812) it was included in the Territory of Missouri. When Missouri was admitted as a state (1821), the part of the Louisiana purchase north of Missouri was left without governmental organization until 1834, when it was attached to the Territory of Michigan. Two years later the western part of Michigan territory was organized as the Territory of Wisconsin. Through its connection with Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin, the Iowa country inherited much of the spirit of the Northwest Ordinance.

How and when was Iowa named? In 1835 a party of dragoons made a march up the Des Moines river, starting from Fort Des Moines (No. 1), near the mouth of the Des Moines river. Among the officers of this expedition was Lieut. Albert M. Lea. The next year he wrote a book in which he referred to the part of Wisconsin territory west of the Mississippi as the Iowa district. The name, he said, was derived from the Iowa river.

When congress decided to create a new territory west of the Mississippi river, the name suggested by Lea's book was adopted and a bill creating the Territory of Iowa was approved on June 12, 1838. It went into effect on July 4th. Robert Lucas, who had been governor of Ohio, was appointed governor of Iowa. The first election was held on September 10, 1838.

The act creating the Territory of Iowa named Burlington as the temporary capital, but left the choice of the permanent seat of government to the legislature. After much discussion, it was finally decided to lay out a new capital city in Johnson county and name it Iowa City. The cornerstone of the capitol building was laid on July 4, 1840, and the legislature held its first session in the new capitol (now the old capitol) in the fall of 1842.

As the white settlers increased in numbers, men began to talk of statehood, but it was not until 1844 that the first constitution was drafted and it was twice rejected by the voters. A second constitution was approved (in 1846) and on December 28, 1846, President Polk signed the bill admitting Iowa into the union. The first state election was held on August 20, 1846, and Ansel Briggs was the first governor elected. In 1857 a new constitution was adopted and the capital was moved to Des Moines.

The Iowa constitution gave the suffrage to white male citizens over twenty-one, but in 1868 an amendment extended this right to colored men. Women

vote in Iowa by virtue of the nineteenth amendment to the United States Constitution (1920). As electors women became eligible to serve on juries and to hold all offices except those in the general assembly. In 1926 a constitutional amendment removed this sex qualification for membership in the legislature.

The legislature of Michigan (in 1834) created two counties in the Iowa area—Dubuque and Des Moines. Lyon and Osceola counties, the last of the ninety-nine counties to be organized, elected their first officers in 1871. Burlington and Fort Madison, chartered by the legislature of Wisconsin (January, 1838) were the first incorporated municipalities in Iowa.

Military History

Although there are accounts of a few battles between Indian tribes, the soil of Iowa has been unusually free from bloodshed. Only one battle between whites and Indians (between French soldiers and the Sauk and Fox Indians in 1735) and one massacre of whites by the Indians (at Spirit Lake in 1857) are recorded. The first fort built in Iowa was Fort Madison erected on the site of the present city of Fort Madison in 1808. It was abandoned and destroyed during the War of 1812.

During the period when the Indians were being crowded out of Iowa and the white settlers were coming in, a number of temporary forts or posts were established. Among these were the first Fort Des Moines on the west bank of the Mississippi river near the mouth of the Des Moines (1834); Fort Atkinson, in the "neutral ground" (1840); and the second Fort Des Moines, at the junction of the Des Moines and Raccoon rivers (1843).

The interest of Iowans in the Mexican war is indicated by the names given to Iowa counties—Mills, Guthrie, Butler, Taylor, Hardin, Ringgold, Yell, Risley, Buena Vista, Cerro Gordo, and Palo Alto. Yell and Risley counties were later united to form Webster county. During the Civil war, Iowa furnished forty-eight regiments of infantry, nine regiments of cavalry, and four batteries of artillery, nearly 80,000 men (men who reenlisted are counted twice in this figure), of whom more than 12,000 lost their lives. In the Spanish-American war in 1898, Iowa sent four regiments of infantry, two batteries of artillery, a signal corps unit, and a company of colored soldiers.

More than 113,000 Iowa men served in the army, navy, or marine corps during the World war, and more than two thousand Iowa men were killed or died of disease. Fort Des Moines (No. 3), established near Des Moines in 1901, was used for an officers' training camp and later for a hospital. Thousands of men were trained at Camp Dodge, a new cantonment established near the capital.

Transportation and Communication

The pioneers of Iowa traveled by ox-wagon, on horseback, or on foot; or, if they did not use their own conveyances, they went by stagecoach or river boat. Some attempts were made to build plank roads, but Iowans soon transferred their interest to railroad building.

The first railroad to enter Iowa was the Mississippi and Missouri in 1855. The cost of this railroad was approximately the same as that of present day paving, about \$26,000 a mile. The first railroad bridge across the Mississippi was opened at Davenport in 1856. The Union Pacific bridge across the Missouri river at Council Bluffs was completed in 1873. The first automobiles were brought into Iowa at the close of the nineteenth century and about 1920 Iowa began the program of paving its main highways. By 1935 more than 4,200 miles of roads had been paved and more than 3,200 miles had been graded.

The twentieth century brought experiments with air transportation but it was not until after the World war that the airplane was accepted as one of the important means of transporting passengers, mail, and express. The first regular transcontinental mail service across Iowa began in 1924 although mail had been carried as early as 1914.

Two post offices, the first in Iowa, were established on April 19, 1836. The one at Augusta is still in operation. The first newspaper published in Iowa

was the *Dubuque Visitor*, which made its initial appearance on May 11, 1836. The first daily paper in Iowa appeared in 1851, also at Dubuque.

As early as 1848, a telegraph line was in use between Bloomington (now Muscatine) and Burlington. Most of the early telegraph lines in Iowa were built by the sale of stock to public spirited citizens most of whom lost their money. In 1852 the rate from New York to Iowa City was \$1.75 for ten words. The first telephone line entered Iowa about 1877.

At the close of the World war radio came into use as a means of communication. WSUI at the State University of Iowa, furnishing regular programs in 1919, claims to be the oldest broadcasting station west of the Mississippi river.

Schools and Churches

The Iowa pioneers believed in schools. In 1830, Berryman Jennings taught the first school in Iowa in the "half-breed tract," at what is now Galland in Lee county. The first act concerning public schools adopted by the legislature of Iowa territory was approved on January 1, 1839. The educational system of Iowa, elementary schools and high schools with the state university as the cap stone, was outlined in a bill approved on March 12, 1858. The public schools in Iowa have always been coeducational.

The Iowa pioneers, however, were not satisfied with elementary schools; they soon established academies, seminaries, and colleges. Iowa Wesleyan college dates back to the opening of the Mount Pleasant Collegiate institute in 1844. Grinnell college continues the existence of Iowa college which first opened its doors to students in 1848. In 1847 the State University of Iowa was established at Iowa City. The State Historical Society of Iowa, established by law in 1857, is also located at Iowa City. It has published a large number of books, pamphlets, and periodicals dealing with the history of Iowa. The State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts was opened at Ames in 1868. A state normal school, now the State Teachers college, held its first session at Cedar Falls in 1876.

The first church building in Iowa was erected at Dubuque by the Methodists in 1834. This was of logs and cost \$255. The Catholics built a church there the following year. One of the events which permanently influenced Iowa history was the coming of the "Iowa Band" in 1843, a group of Congregational and Presbyterian ministers from New England. Revivals and camp meetings were popular among the pioneers, but on the whole, the religious history of Iowa has been characterized by a combination of religious fervor, good judgment, tolerance, and emphasis on education.

Social Problems

The first case to come before the supreme court of the Territory of Iowa involved the right of a master to return a slave, a negro named Ralph, to Missouri. The court decided that slavery could not exist in Iowa and Ralph was set free. In the years preceding the Civil war, there was, however, much dispute in Iowa as to the return of fugitive slaves. Many settlers, especially the Quakers and the people from New England, were opposed to slavery, and some of them organized as a part of the underground railroad and assisted fugitive slaves across the state. John Brown visited Iowa several times and some of his men spent the winter of 1857-1858 at a Quaker settlement named Springdale in Cedar county.

The first temperance society in Iowa was organized in 1838 at Fort Madison. The first statewide prohibitory law was adopted by a popular vote in April, 1855, but in 1857 this was amended to provide a license system. In 1870 a form of county local option was adopted and in 1882 a constitutional prohibitory amendment was added to the state constitution, only to be declared invalid by the state supreme court in January, 1883. Statutory prohibition was then adopted in 1884, but difficulties of enforcement led to the adoption (in 1894) of the mullet law (repealed in 1915). Beginning on January 1, 1916, Iowa had statewide prohibition, but in 1933 the general assembly authorized the sale of beer and a year later provided state stores for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

The first state institution established by Iowa was the penitentiary located at Fort Madison in 1839. An additional penitentiary, now known as the men's reformatory, was opened at Anamosa in 1873, and a women's reformatory at Rockwell City in 1918. The training school for boys, now located at Eldora, received its first inmates in 1868 and the training school for girls, located at Mitchellville, was opened in 1873.

The Civil war made necessary some provision for the care of the orphan children of soldiers. Three homes for such orphans (at Glenwood, Cedar Falls, and Davenport) were established in Iowa, but only the institution at Davenport is now in operation. A state juvenile home was opened at Toledo in 1920.

The care of persons who are defective mentally has been met in Iowa by the establishment of seven institutions. The first hospital for the insane was located at Mt. Pleasant and received its first patients in March, 1861. Similar institutions have since been opened by the state at Independence, Clarinda, and Cherokee. An institution for feeble-minded children (now including some adults) was opened at Glenwood in 1876 in the buildings formerly occupied by the soldiers' orphans home. An institution for the care of epileptics was opened at Woodward in 1917. A psychopathic hospital was established at Iowa City in 1921.

Iowa Industries

The earliest industry in Iowa was the fur trade, but agriculture was the chief occupation of the pioneers. Indeed it was the rich farming land which attracted most of the settlers to Iowa. This predominance of agriculture has continued and in 1930 approximately half of those listed as gainfully employed (not counting the farmers' wives) were connected with agriculture. Gradually horses took the place of oxen as draft animals and of late years tractors have tended to displace horses. Reapers, binders, hayloaders, and other labor-saving machinery took the place of man-power. Beginning even before the Civil war, a marked improvement has been made in the breeds of cattle, horses, hogs, and sheep, and in the strains of corn, wheat, and oats. Partly because of the ravages of the chinch bugs on the wheat fields, corn soon took the lead on Iowa farms and as a rule is marketed in the form of cattle and hogs. Agricultural societies were authorized in 1838 and county fairs were held as early as 1841. The first state fair was held at Fairfield in 1854. Since 1885, the state fairs have been held at Des Moines.

Flour, cornmeal, and lumber were necessities on the frontier and mills were soon built on many streams, the gristmills alone numbering about 600. An oatmeal mill (now the Quaker Oats plant) was established at Cedar Rapids in 1873. Pork packing began in Iowa as early as 1840. In 1877 a packing plant (now the John Morrell & Co.) was opened at Ottumwa and about the same time plants were opened at Sioux City. In normal times the packing plants of Iowa now slaughter approximately four and one-half million hogs. The first creamery in Iowa was established at Spring Branch (near Manchester) in 1872 and early in the nineties the manufacture of pearl buttons was begun at Muscatine. A washing machine factory, begun at Newton in 1900, has developed into one of the state's leading industries.

Money was scarce in early Iowa and much of it was in the form of private and state bank notes of doubtful value. In 1846 it was estimated that there was in Iowa only \$183,426 in gold, silver, and bank notes. The first bank in Iowa (the Miners Bank of Dubuque) was chartered by the legislature of Wisconsin in 1836. The first constitution of Iowa prohibited banks of issue (all banks at that time expected to issue bank notes) but the constitution of 1857 authorized the establishment of a state bank and the incorporation of other banks. The state bank went out of existence in 1865 because the national bank act made it unprofitable for banks organized under state laws to issue bank notes. The First National bank at Davenport was the first national bank in the United States.

Bibliography

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THE GOVERNMENT OF IOWA*

THE government of the state of Iowa is based upon a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the general assembly. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second one in 1857. The present constitution has been amended a number of times.

The Electorate

All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months and in the county in which they claim a residence for sixty days are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States and are twenty-one years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane, are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States Constitution.

The regular elections for national, state, district, and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the first Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, but in case

no candidate receives the necessary thirty-five per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

The Legislative Department

The legislative authority of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a general assembly which consists of a senate and a house of representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the general assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

The house of representatives consists of one hundred and eight members, elected for two years. Each of the ninety-nine counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects one additional representative. Any person who has resided in the State one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the general assembly by an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1926. The house of representatives elects a speaker and other officers.

The senate consists of fifty members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to five counties, according to population, and elects one senator. According to the constitution approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of twenty-one senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of twenty-nine in the intervening years. Senators must be twenty-five years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives.

The Executive Department

The constitution of Iowa makes provision for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, who are elected for terms of two years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the general assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years, and a board of railroad commissioners of three members and a superintendent of public instruction, chosen for four years.

The supreme executive power of the State is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the general assembly, and appoint various officers and boards. He has the power to call special sessions of the legislature and to veto acts passed by the general assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be thirty years of age or over at the date of election.

The lieutenant governor succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation, or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the senate.

In addition to the executive officers mentioned, all of whom are elected, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health, and the fire marshal, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints, with the approval of the senate, the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of education, the board of control of state institutions, the state board of assessment and review, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, and the state highway commission.

The executive council is an ex officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and secretary of agriculture. The state printing board has three ex officio members—the secretary of state, auditor,

and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. This board appoints the superintendent of printing.

The Judicial Department

The judicial department of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, district courts, and such other inferior courts as the general assembly shall provide.

The supreme court at present consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The senior in time of service is chief justice for six months until each judge has served in that capacity. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor, and a clerk. Both appointments are for four years.

The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matters, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, some administrative functions.

The state of Iowa is divided by law into twenty-one judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. Each district elects from two to six judges, there being at present seventy district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over the district court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

The general assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts, and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of five thousand or more and superior courts in cities with four thousand or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four year terms.

If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commissioned governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

Jury trials are the rule for trials of serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of twelve persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

Local Government in Iowa

The state of Iowa is divided into ninety-nine counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five, or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, coroner, and clerk of the district court are elected biennially by the voters. A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a convention composed of representatives of the school districts.

The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county, and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county. Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all their functions, except for the assessment of property for taxation by the township assessor, and the election of justices of the peace in which many townships default.

The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the general assembly and

have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Seven cities have the commission form of government; three have adopted the commission-manager form, usually known as the city manager form; and a few others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager is appointed by the commission.

All other municipalities are under the general law. They are classified according to population into cities of the first class, having over 15,000 population; cities of the second class, having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. All these municipalities have the mayor-council form of government, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year terms. A treasurer, assessor, and park commissioners, and in some cities a police, superior, or municipal court judge, are also elected.

The council is the law-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activities and in cities and towns which have neither a municipal, superior, nor police court, he serves as police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

Taxation

Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present tax system in Iowa is based largely on property, sales, income and corporation taxes, although there are taxes on inheritances, poll taxes, and sales or license taxes on gasoline, cigarettes, beer and chain stores.

Property is assessed by township assessors elected by the people, subject to revision by local boards of review and by the state board of assessment and review. The various mill levies for state, county, school, and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation and the tax money is paid to the county treasurer who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school, and municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law.

HOW IOWA LAWS ARE MADE*

THE state laws of Iowa are made by the general assembly which consists of two houses—the senate and the house of representatives. Members of the senate (50 in number) are elected by the people for terms of four years, approximately half being elected at each biennial election; representatives (108 in number) are elected for two year terms.

In general the procedure of "making" a law involves: (1) a demand for legislation; (2) the drafting of a bill which presents the desired legislation in a form to be presented to the general assembly; (3) the passage of this bill by the two branches of the general assembly; and (4) the approval of the act by the governor.

A demand for new laws or for the amendment or repeal of statutes already enacted is usually due to changes in economic conditions or to the development of new social standards or attitudes. Laws are often proposed with the intent of improving administrative procedure. There may be an almost general agreement that certain changes should be made but more often

public opinion is indifferent or uncertain until a bill is drafted and debate begins. Occasionally the question of the adoption of a proposed law becomes a campaign issue. In any case, proposed changes are usually sponsored and supported by interested groups, societies, organizations, or institutions. The motive may be an entirely unselfish interest in the public welfare or it may, on the other hand, be a desire for some advantage to individuals or groups to be benefited.

Before it is presented to the general assembly, the proposed legislation must be put in the form of a bill (in a few cases joint resolutions are used). This bill may be drafted by the senator or representative who introduces it, by a group of members, by a senate or house committee, or by a committee or commission appointed by the governor or general assembly to study some problem, or it may be formulated by persons outside the general assembly. In any case the bill must be formally presented to one house or the other by a member, a group of members, or a committee of that house. No member of the general assembly is, however, required to introduce a bill when requested to do so and no one who is not a member of the general assembly may introduce a bill, not even the governor or lieutenant governor. Formerly even a member had to secure the consent of his house before he could introduce a bill; now such consent is taken for granted. In some cases identical bills, called companion bills, are introduced in both houses.

Bills, says the constitution of Iowa, may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other, and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate. Furthermore the Iowa constitution provides that a bill may not become a law unless it receives the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature (each house voting separately). This means that at least 26 senators and 55 representatives must vote for a bill if it is to pass. The constitution also provides that the vote on the passage of a bill must be taken immediately after the "last reading." This vote shall be by yeas and nays and shall be recorded on the journal—the official record kept by each house.

The two houses make their own rules of procedure, subject to the constitutional provisions, and whenever a parliamentary situation is not covered by a rule, the procedure is governed by "Roberts' Rules of Order," as provided by statute. In the senate the usual order of business is: (1) correction of the journal; (2) presentation of petitions and memorials; (3) introduction of bills; (4) resolutions; (5) communications on the president's table; (6) reports of standing committees; (7) reports of select committees; (8) unfinished business; (9) third reading of bills; (10) reports for indefinite postponement; and (11) general order of business. The order of business in the house, after the correction of the journal, is: (1) unfinished business; (2) presentation of petitions and remonstrances; (3) reports of committees; (4) resolutions laid over; (5) introduction of bills; (6) resolutions; (7) messages and communications on the speaker's table; (8) bills and resolutions read a second time; (9) bills on their passage; and (10) reports in the possession of the house.

Much of the work in the Iowa general assembly is done in the committees. The number of members on these committees varies, but the political party in control of a house almost invariably has a majority of the members of each committee and the chairman, at least in the case of the important committees, usually belongs to the dominant party. The votes in committees are not recorded and are not made public. The number of committees varies from time to time. In the Forty-sixth General Assembly the senate had forty-one standing committees and the house fifty-one. Additional committees may be created by resolutions. For the purpose of informal debate and to avoid a record vote on a measure until an agreement has been reached, the house or senate occasionally votes to act as a committee of the whole.

Suppose we visit the state capitol at Des Moines during a session of the general assembly. (It meets in regular session on the second Monday in

January of each odd numbered year.) The senate sits in the south wing of the second floor; opposite it, across the rotunda, is the house of representatives. Just before the senate is called to order, we may see a secretary take typed copies of a bill to the desk of one of the senators. He looks them over, then beckons a page, and sends the papers to the desk of the presiding officer—the lieutenant governor, who serves as president of the senate. There the bill is numbered by the secretary of the senate in the order of its presentation and becomes, for example, "Senate File 92." At the next regular order of business for the introduction of bills, a copy is handed to a clerk who reads aloud its number, its title, and the name of the senator who presented it. The president then calls for the second reading. Again the clerk reads by title only. These two readings are purely perfunctory—what is left of the practice of reading each bill aloud at least three times in the early days of representative government when bills were not typed or printed for the use of legislators. (The senators know they will soon have a printed copy of the bill.)

After this formality the president refers the bill, now known as "Senate File 92," to one of the senate committees. The original copy of "Senate File 92" is enclosed in a paper wrapper (the senate and house use different colors for these) on which are blanks for recording the various actions taken on the bill. In the senate this record is kept by the secretary (in the house by the chief clerk). When the bill goes to the committee, the secretary gives the original copy to the chairman of the committee, taking a receipt for it.

A copy of the bill is then sent to the printer and on the following day, a printed copy of "Senate File 92" will be on the desk of each senator. Such copies are kept in a loose-leaf file furnished to each legislator. At the upper right hand corner of the printed copy is the number (Senate File 92) and the name of the senator who introduced it. On the left are the committee to which the bill was referred and the date of introduction. Below are the words "A bill for an act" followed by a brief statement indicating its purpose and content—usually referred to as the title of the bill. According to the Iowa constitution every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith, and any subject included in a law which is not "expressed" in the title is null and void. The title is, therefore, an important part of a bill, although it is not legally a part of the law after it is enacted.

Some bills (now comparatively few) contain preambles, usually short explanations of the conditions which, in the opinion of the person who drafted the bill, explain why the proposed law is needed. Then comes the enacting clause prescribed by the constitution for the enactment of legislation—"Be it enacted by the general assembly of the state of Iowa"—followed by the main part of the bill—the proposed law. This part of a bill is usually divided into sections and all lines are numbered by section to facilitate the designation of amendments.

After the original bill has been handed to the proper committee chairman and the printed copies are on the desks of the senators, nothing may be heard of "Senate File 92" for several days or weeks. Indeed, bills frequently remain in the hands of a committee until adjournment, never getting any consideration on the floor. While the committee considers "Senate File 92," other senators may file motions to amend it, but these will not be discussed until the bill itself is up for action.

The Enactment of a Law

Any number of complications may develop during the consideration of a bill, but let us assume that "Senate File 92" is enacted into law in the simplest manner possible. Suppose the committee (perhaps the committee on highways) has eleven members. A majority of this committee, we will say, decides that the bill should be passed. At the proper time the chairman of the committee on highways makes the report, recommending that "the

bill do pass." "Senate File 92" is then placed on the senate calendar (a list giving the order in which bills are to be considered) and when its turn comes (or it is called up by special arrangement) it is before the senate for debate and finally for the decisive vote.

In the old days a bill was engrossed—rewritten to incorporate any changes made—and was then given a final reading from the engrossed copy. In both the house and senate the rules now provide that a bill is to be considered engrossed when it is ordered to its third reading, unless there is an affirmative vote for its engrossment. At the present time both engrossment and the third, or final, reading are more or less vague formalities. Occasionally a clerk does read a bill, but for the most part printing and typing have displaced the voice of the clerk. According to the constitution the vote on a bill must follow immediately after the last reading, but the rules provide that certain corrections may be made. On the final vote the names of the senators are called in alphabetical order and each one votes "aye" or "no" as his name is called.

The vote on "Senate File 92" is, we will assume favorable—26 to 21, with 3 senators absent—and the bill has passed the senate. The secretary signs it and endorses on the record the date of passage. "Senate File 92" is now ready for consideration by the house to which it is sent by a messenger. Here it is not renumbered, but as "Senate File 92," it is given to the chief clerk, and at the proper time it is read twice by title and referred by the speaker of the house to a committee. Let us assume that this committee also reports favorably on "Senate File 92" and it comes before the house for a final vote. An electric voting device, operated from the desks of the representatives, is used to record the votes, a red light opposite a member's name indicating "no," while a green light shows that the member favors the measure. Let us assume that the lights indicate a favorable vote of 60 to 40 (with 8 absent or not voting) and "Senate File 92" has passed the house without change.

The act is then enrolled—copied in its final form—by the enrolling clerk of the senate (this being a senate bill) and the enrolled act is examined by a joint committee on enrolled bills. When it is reported correctly enrolled, "Senate File 92" is signed by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house. In the enrolled bill the words "A bill for" are omitted so the introduction now reads only "An act," etc. The enrollment of a bill is very important in case of dispute over the meaning of a law, since the supreme court, at least until very recently, considered the enrolled bill as conclusive evidence of legislative action.

After "Senate File 92" is correctly enrolled and signed by the two presiding officers, it is sent to the governor's office for his signature. If he approves it, he signs it and notifies the senate—the house in which it originated. Thus does the bill become part of the law of Iowa. The official copy of "Senate File 92" is then sent to the office of the secretary of state to await publication. Under ordinary procedure the law enacted from "Senate File 92" would go into effect on the following July 4th, but many bills now have publication clauses which provide that the act shall go into effect immediately following its publication in two designated newspapers. In any case "Senate File 92" will appear in a printed volume of the laws enacted at that session and will soon lose its identity in a new chapter number, later perhaps to become a section or sections of the Code.

The procedure in the case of a house bill would have been similar except that the order of consideration by the two houses would have been reversed. Few bills, however, have careers so simple or so favorable. Only about one-third of the bills introduced at any recent session of the Iowa general assembly are enacted into law, and many of those passed are amended and revised almost beyond recognition. What happens to all these bills as they are ground through the legislative mill?

Amendments

A bill may be amended in either house. Let us suppose that the committee on highways, to which "Senate File 92" is referred, believes that

certain changes should be made in the original bill before it is adopted and so recommends in its report. Amendments may also be made on the floor of the senate. Such amendments may be incorporated in "Senate File 92" by a majority vote of those present (providing there is a quorum), but the bill on its final vote must have a constitutional majority—at least 26 in the senate (55 in the house).

After "Senate File 92" (as amended by the senate) goes to the house, it may be passed as it came from the senate or it may be amended in the house before it is passed. If the house amends the bill it must be returned to the senate where a vote is taken as to whether the senate will concur in the house amendment or amendments. If the motion to concur prevails, "Senate File 92" as amended is again placed upon its passage. If adopted it is enrolled, signed, and submitted to the governor.

The senate may, however, refuse to concur in the house amendment. In this case "Senate File 92" would be sent back to the house where a motion to recede from the amendment or a motion to insist on the amendment might be made, a motion to recede taking precedence over a motion to insist. If the house votes to recede from its amendment by the required constitutional majority, the bill is passed, is enrolled in the senate, signed, and sent to the governor. A vote to insist on an amendment, defeated by a constitutional majority, is equivalent to a vote to recede.

If the house votes to insist on its amendment, it requests a conference committee, made up of four members from each house (unless otherwise specified), appointed by the presiding officers. This conference committee is really two committees acting as one for the members from each house vote separately and a majority of each group must agree to amendments proposed. It attempts to formulate some compromise on the disputed amendment or amendments acceptable to a majority in both the senate and the house.

Since the supreme court ruled (in the case involving the salary reduction act adopted in 1933) that the adoption of the report of a conference committee does not satisfy the constitutional requirement that both houses must adopt an act in exactly the same form, the general assembly has prescribed a definite rule of procedure. A report of a conference committee may be adopted or rejected, but it can not be changed. If it is rejected in either house, a new committee may be appointed or the bill may be dropped. When the report of the conference committee is approved, the bill as amended by this report is again put on its passage, but neither debate nor amendment are permitted. If the vote in both houses is favorable, the bill is adopted.

The senate may, however, decide to make an amendment to the house amendment and such a motion, if made, takes precedence over a motion to concur. If this compromise amendment is adopted by the required constitutional majority, the bill goes back to the house where the amendment may be agreed to and the bill passed. If the house refuses to agree to the compromise amendment and the senate still refuses to accept the house amendment or to recede from its compromise amendment, a conference committee is necessary. These complications merely illustrate the tangle which may develop over the enactment of disputed legislation. Motions to lay on the table or to postpone indefinitely may not be used in respect to motions to recede or to insist on amendments or motions to amend bills which have passed both houses.

Defeat

A majority of the bills introduced in the Iowa general assembly are, however, neither adopted as introduced nor passed after amendment: they fail of enactment in one way or another. Many of these bills are never reported out by the committees to which they are referred. Bills are seldom called from committees and a majority of a committee may, therefore, hold a bill indefinitely and thus prevent a vote. Sometimes the chairman does not even call for a committee vote on a bill. Since the speaker of

the house and the president of the senate appoint the committees and committee chairmen and also refer bills to these committees, it is evident that these officers can do much to help or hinder the passage of a bill by referring it to a favorable or unfavorable committee.

If a committee does decide to report a bill it may do so with various recommendations—that it pass, that it be amended and passed, that it do not pass, or that it be indefinitely postponed. Usually, however, a committee prefers to hold a bill it does not want passed. When a bill is reported out from a committee it is put on the calendar—the list of bills to be acted on by the house or senate as the case may be. Although it might be expected that bills will receive consideration in turn, it frequently happens that some are left on the calendar throughout the session and thus fail of enactment. A few bills are withdrawn by their sponsors. Others are voted on but fail to receive a constitutional majority in one house or the other. Many bills are indefinitely postponed—a decision which, under the present rules of the house prevents further consideration and in both houses is equivalent to an outright rejection. An amendment striking out the enacting clause may also be adopted. Without its enacting clause a bill can not become law. In case of disagreement between the two houses, action on a bill may be suspended and the act fail of adoption even though it has (in different forms) passed both houses. Bills not otherwise disposed of by the house or senate are often referred to the sifting committee and die there.

The Sifting Committee

Toward the end of the session it is customary for both houses to appoint a "sifting" committee, to which are referred all bills not yet acted upon, except appropriation bills and certain other measures specified by the resolution providing for the committee.

At present, sifting committees are created by the rules of the house and senate and whenever the members of either house agree that such a committee should begin to function, the members of that committee are appointed by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate, as the case may be. Although measures referred to a sifting committee may be recalled by the house or senate, such action is seldom taken and the sifting committee has a decisive influence as to which bills are passed, amended, or defeated in the final days of the session. Occasionally the work of sifting out the bills to be acted upon is given to some other committee.

Tie Votes

The Iowa constitution requires that all laws passed by the general assembly must receive the affirmative vote of a majority of those elected to each house. A tie in the case of the final vote on a bill in either the senate or the house would, therefore, defeat the measure and it would do no good to break the tie. In deciding many other questions, however, a tie vote may occur and the right to decide such a tie may be important.

The president of the senate is not a member and he votes only in case of a tie. He can thus decide votes on which the senate is equally divided, except in the case of a final vote on an act, on which a majority vote is required. The speaker of the house, being a member of the body over which he presides, may vote in all cases where the yeas and nays are called for, his name being called last. In other cases the speaker votes only when the house is equally divided or to make a tie. If his vote makes a tie, the motion is lost.

Reconsideration

Even after action is taken on a bill, some one who voted on the prevailing side (perhaps with this in mind) may move that the vote be reconsidered. Motions to reconsider a vote must be made on the day of the vote or the next legislative day and must have a constitutional majority in order to pass. To clinch a vote on a measure, a motion to reconsider

the vote is often made, with the additional provision that the motion to reconsider be laid on the table. The rules of the Iowa senate specifically require a two-thirds vote to take a motion from the table and in the house the same rule applies because that body uses "Roberts' Rules of Order" to cover this particular procedure.

Resolutions

In Iowa proposed legislation which relates to the general policy of the state, ratification of amendments to the United States constitution, and some other similar matters, is put in the form of joint resolutions, which begin "Be it resolved by the general assembly of the state of Iowa." The rules of the Iowa general assembly make the procedure in handling joint resolutions in the senate and the house exactly the same as for bills. Joint resolutions proposing amendments to the state constitution and those ratifying amendments to the United States constitution do not require the signature of the governor, although they are usually signed by him.

Most of the legislation in the Iowa general assembly is presented in the form of bills. The average number of bills presented in the senate and house of the Forty-second, Forty-third, Forty-fourth, and Forty-fifth General Assemblies was 973 per session; the average number of joint resolutions introduced per session was 16.

The senate or the house of representatives may adopt a simple resolution by a majority vote of those present. Such resolutions are used only to express some sentiment or to take care of routine matters which concern that one house only. Matters which primarily concern the organization of the general assembly, such as fixing the date of recess or adjournment, or expressing the sentiment of the legislature, are frequently presented in the form of concurrent resolutions. These resolutions are not laws. They may be adopted by a majority vote of those present and voting, do not require a constitutional majority, and are not sent to the governor.

The Governor's Part in Law-Making

The governor is the chief executive officer of the state, but he has also a considerable share in the responsibility of making the laws. The increasing complexity of government and the increased importance of administrative functions have emphasized the importance of political leadership. This leadership is one of the duties of the governor and in his message to the general assembly and by his advice he may do much to secure the legislation he approves or prevent the adoption of what he considers undesirable laws.

An act which has passed both houses of the general assembly and has been properly enrolled and signed by the presiding officers of the two houses is still not law; it must go to the governor. The constitution prescribes the governor's duties in this matter. If he approves a bill sent to him by the general assembly, he signs it and thereby makes it a law.

If the governor does not approve an act, he may return it to the house in which it originated with a message stating his objections—that is veto it. In Iowa the governor may not approve one part of a bill and veto an objectionable section.

Whenever the governor vetoes a bill and returns it to the house in which it originated, his objections are entered on the journal and the bill is reconsidered. If, after such reconsideration in both houses, the bill receives a two-thirds majority vote—34 in the senate and 72 in the house—it becomes a law without the governor's approval. If the necessary two-thirds majority can not be secured, a vetoed bill fails to become law. The general assembly of the state of Iowa has not so far passed a bill over the governor's veto.

Any bill kept by the governor longer than three days (Sundays excepted) without his signature becomes a law automatically unless the general assembly adjourns before the three days elapse and thus prevents the return of the bill. All bills submitted to the governor during the last three days must be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, with his signature, if he approves them, and with his objections, if he does not approve them. Such bills, if not signed by the governor, do not become law.

The Attorney General

Although the attorney general has no part in making laws, he is the official legal adviser of state officials and is frequently called upon for an opinion as to whether certain acts are constitutional. Sometimes he is asked for his opinion during the formulation and passage of a law; more often he is consulted after the law has been adopted. In either case the opinion of the attorney general is advisory and his ruling that a law is unconstitutional or otherwise invalid does not of itself render the law inoperative.

Judicial Decisions and Interpretations

After laws have been adopted and are on the statute books, they must meet at least four possible challenges: they must not contain provisions contrary to the constitution of the United States or the constitution of Iowa; they must not conflict with laws and treaties of the United States; and they must have been legally enacted. The supreme court of Iowa may declare an Iowa law invalid for any of these reasons. In Iowa the state supreme court does not render advisory opinions and decisions are given only on cases brought before the court. Federal courts may decide cases involving the United States constitution and United States laws and treaties and other cases involving the state of Iowa and another state or the citizens of another state, a citizen of Iowa and a citizen of another state, or a citizen of Iowa and any other state. Usually the United States court follows the state supreme court in deciding whether or not a law conflicts with the state constitution.

In deciding whether or not Iowa laws have been legally adopted, the Iowa supreme court has, until recently, relied to a large extent on the enrolled bill signed by the presiding officers of both houses. In the decision made in 1934 concerning the salary reduction act the state court, however, went back of the enrolled bill and decided that the senate and house had not taken a final vote on exactly the same bill and that the law was, therefore, invalid.

Comparatively few laws are declared null and void by the courts, but there is constant demand for interpretation of laws. Just what does a law mean? How is it to be applied to a certain case? Does it conflict with another statute and if so which one is to be followed? All these questions are constantly asked in the courts. Indeed a large part of the litigation in this state, as in other states, is an attempt to interpret the meaning of laws and to determine how they are to be applied.

It is impossible, in a short sketch of this kind, to give all the details of the making of laws. For a detailed study of law-making in Iowa, the reader is referred to *Statute Law-Making in Iowa*, published in 1916 by the State Historical Society of Iowa as Volume III of the Iowa Applied History Series.

THE STATE CAPITOL

THE capitol building was dedicated in January, 1884. On the main floor are located the supreme court rooms, the offices of the governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, secretary of agriculture, attorney general, and superintendent of public instruction.

The offices on the first floor or basement floor of the state house are: Adjutant general, custodian, G. A. R., board of conservation, motor vehicle department, real estate, post office, comptroller, banking department, cigarette tax department, old age assistance commission, mine inspectors, secretary of the executive council, state veterinarian, state fair board, and the cafeteria.

The house and senate chambers are on the second floor, as well as two departments of the state library, the printing board, pharmacy commission, board of public works, and code editor.

On the balcony or third floor are located the bureau of investigation, department of vocational education, department of health engineer, barber examiners, cosmetology examiners, chiropractor examiners, nurses' examining board, and the telephone exchange.

Other Buildings

Departments of the state government are located in other buildings outside the main capitol building. In the old Amos Hiatt high school building southeast of the main building are located the board of control, railroad commission, state architect, bonus board, commerce counsel, commission for the blind, and the graves registration bureau.

In the state historical building on the north side of Grand avenue are located the offices of the library commission and the state librarian, the historical department and the curator, newspaper collection, historical library, general library, medical library, and the archives department.

Just north of the state house, across Grand avenue, is the document storage building, where official reports and documents are stored. The shipping and mailing department of the printing board is also located in this building.

At the rear is the heating plant and the carpenter shop, and just to the north of these is the printing board warehouse, the paint shop, and garages.

Just east of the warehouse and facing on Des Moines street is the old governors' mansion, containing the offices of the board of health.

Just west of the garage and facing on Des Moines street is a building known as "The flats," where the offices of the board of education and the industrial commission are located.

In the old Bryant school building west of the state house on Grand avenue are located the board of parole, bureau of labor, bureau of re-employment, fire marshal, state chemist and horticultural society.

Historical Building

The historical, memorial and art building is 260 by 110 feet in size and was commenced in 1899, at first as a home for the Aldrich collection of historical matter. It is occupied by the historical department, two departments of the state library, and the library commission.

The historical department has a large library of history and genealogy, a famous collection of autographs and photographs, many valuable historical relics, and antiquities, a vast natural history museum, a gallery of portraits of distinguished Iowa persons, a Civil war collection, portraits and information regarding Iowa boys who died in the World war, the public archives, and Iowa newspaper collection.

Decorations in Capitol Building

Over the main stairway at the east end is the large painting entitled "Westward," the work of Edwin H. Blashfield of New York, and this was placed at a cost of \$10,000. It is regarded as one of the notable American decora-

tive pictures. It shows a pioneer group traveling from the eastern fields of plenty to the far away lands of the west to make new homes.

Above the large picture are six mosaics, designed by Frederick Dielman of New York, and were made in Venice. The colors are worked out in colored stone pieces and are indestructible. The subjects represented are Defense, Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, the Judiciary, and Education. These cost the state \$10,000. They are among the finest and largest in America.

The largest reproduced or enlarged photograph in the world hangs in the south corridor of the main floor. This picture of the 168th infantry assembled on the capitol grounds upon its return from the World war, is twenty-six feet long and six feet high.

The twelve statues high within the rotunda represent History, Science, Law, Fame, Art, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth, Justice.

The eight lunettes, or half-moon shaped paintings surrounding the rotunda, are the work of Kenyon Cox, famous American artist, who was paid \$8,000 for the same. They are entitled by the artist: Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, The Forge, Commerce, Education, Science, Art. They are allegorical and indicate the progress of civilization.

Monuments and Memorials

The soldiers' and sailors' monument erected in 1889-90 is 145 feet high and cost \$150,000. It was designed by Harriet A. Ketcham, of Mt. Pleasant.

The Allison memorial, near by, was constructed in honor of the late Senator W. B. Allison, of Dubuque, and is a fine work of art.

The battle flags of Iowa regiments in the Civil war and in the Spanish-American war are preserved in niches in the rotunda of the capitol.

The monument west of the capitol on Ninth street represents "The Pioneers." It is cast in bronze.

The old guns located on the grounds were taken in the Spanish-American war. The bronze gun in front of the historical building was taken from a Spanish gun ship.

Just east of the state house is a monument honoring the Iowa citizens who served in the army, navy or marine corps during the China relief expedition, the war with Spain or the Philippine insurrection.

At the southeast corner of the grounds, near the flag pole, is a tablet which marks the grave of Wilson Alexander Scott, who gave to the state the land upon which the capitol now stands. The tablet bears the following inscription:

WILSON ALEXANDER SCOTT

BORN IN CRAWFORD COUNTY, INDIANA, NOVEMBER 20, 1818,

HE ACQUIRED SOME FIVE HUNDRED ACRES OF LAND HEREABOUTS

AND SETTLED ON THIS SITE IN 1846.

OVERWHELMED IN THE FINANCIAL CRASH OF 1857

HE DIED NEAR FORT KEARNEY, NEBRASKA TERRITORY

EN ROUTE TO PIKE'S PEAK JUNE 23, 1859.

BY HIS EXPRESSED WISH HIS BODY WAS RETURNED AND INTERRED

IN EARTH WHICH AS HIS HOMESTEAD

HAD BEEN EXEMPTED FROM SEIZURE FOR HIS DEBTS.

Filing Nomination Papers

State and national: For United States senator, representatives in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than sixty nor less than forty days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (C. '31, §537.)

County: For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least thirty days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C. '31, §537.)

Township or precinct: For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with county auditor thirty days prior to the primary. (C. '31, §547.)

Cities: For elective offices in cities of over 15,000 population, except cities under a nonpartisan form of government, to be filed with the city clerk at least thirty days before primary election. (C. '31, §§639, 640.)

Cities and towns: For elective offices in cities and towns under 15,000 population, to be filed with the clerk not more than forty nor less than fifteen days before the election. (C. '31, §655-a14.)

Cities under commission or manager plan: For all elective offices to be filed with the city clerk at least ten days before the primary or election. (C. '31, §§6495 and 6634.)

School: For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not more than thirty nor less than ten days before the election. (C. '31, §4216-c4.)

Primary Election Dates

Municipal: The primary election the last Monday in February of the year in which general municipal elections are held. (C. '31, §641.)

Cities under commission plan: The primary election shall be held the second Tuesday preceding the general municipal election. (C. '31, §6493.)

General: "The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C. '31, §533.)

Election Dates

Cities and towns: Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the last Monday in March. (C. '31, §5627.)

School: The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in March; except in cities of over 125,000 population where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in March of odd-numbered years. (C. '31, §4216-c1.)

General: The general election for state, district, county and township offices shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C. '31, §504.)

Political Convention Dates

County: Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Saturday following each primary election. (C. '31, §616.)

State: Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C. '31, §634.)

Judicial: Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one nor more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C. '31, §656.)

District: Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention. (C. '31, §663.)

Presidential or special: Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairmen of the political parties.

Assessments

Call by Auditor: The county auditor of each county shall before the third day of January annually issue a call to all the assessors to meet within ten days to receive such information as the auditor has to give and to receive their supplies. (Sections 7113, 7114, Code of 1931.)

Beginning: Each assessor shall enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office immediately after the second Monday of January each year. (Section 7106.)

Completion: The assessment shall be completed by the 1st day of April. Section 7121. The rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of April in each year for correction. In cities of 10,000 or over the rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of May each year.

Boards of Review

Townships: The township trustees shall constitute the local board of review for the township and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed, which shall be no later than the first day of May, except in townships having a population of 20,000 or

more situated within the limits of a city under special charter where the city council of said city shall be the board of review.

Cities and towns: The city or town council shall constitute the board of review for such city or town and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed which shall be no later than the first day of May, except cities having a population of 10,000 or over where such board shall meet on the first Monday of May and shall complete its duties not later than the first Monday in June. In cities of 20,000 or over, including cities under special charter, the board of review may begin on and after the first day of March each year and in cities under special charter having a population of 20,000, or more, the city council of said city shall be the board of review except that the township trustees of said township may, in the event the city council does not act as such board of review, act the same as township trustees should be in townships in which the township lines are not co-terminus with the city limits.

Raises or additions: In case the assessment of any person, partnership, corporation, or association is raised or new property is added by the board, then the clerk shall give immediate notice thereof by mail to each person, partnership, corporation or association and at the conclusion of the action of the board, the clerk shall post an alphabetical list of those whose assessments have been raised or added in a conspicuous place and the board shall hold an adjourned meeting with at least five days intervening after the posting of said notices before final action is taken on the proposed changes. (Section 7131.)

Complaints: Any person aggrieved by the action of the assessor may make an oral or written complaint to the township, city, or town board of review.

Appeals: Any party may appeal from the action of the township, city or town board of review to the district court. (Section 7133 as amended by Chapter 128—45th G. A.)

Budgets Prepared and Submitted

Preparation: All taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to August 15 each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper. (C. '31, §375.)

Certification: After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than August 15. (C. '31, §383.)

Submitted to state comptroller: As soon as taxes certified by each local board have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller. (C. '31, §384.)

County budget: On or before December 31 each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by January 31 of the year to which it applies. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds. (C. '31, §§5260-e1 and e2.)

City and town budgets: Cities and towns may adopt and levy a consolidated tax when certifying their budget in August, and prior to the beginning of their next fiscal year may apportion said consolidated tax in detail to the funds embraced therein in a ratio suitable to their requirements. The consolidated plan is optional with cities and towns.

State: "On or before October first, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of ensuing biennium * * *." (45 G. A., chs. 4, 16.)

STATE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

GOVERNOR

(Office located on main floor of capitol building)

Term of incumbent ends January, 1937

CLYDE L. HERRING, Des Moines

Salary, \$7,500 annually

Secretary to the Governor, Edith M. Johnson, Des Moines.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

The governor approves or disapproves any and all appropriations for administration, operation and maintenance.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

(Office located back of the senate chamber)

Term ends January, 1937

NELSON G. KRASCHEL, Harlan

Salary, \$2,000 each session

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president *pro tempore* of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The Secretary of State is a constitutional official, serving as the secretarial officer of the commonwealth. The secretary also is the administrative head of various statutory departments or divisions of the department of state and, in addition, is a member of the executive council, the state board of health, the state printing board, the board of trustees of the state library and state historical department and the state employment agency commission.

The functions of a general nature of the secretary of state are to attest the official acts of the governor and to serve as custodian of the original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the official copies of the laws of Iowa, the authenticated journals of the general assembly, official records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of elective state and district officials; the bonds of various elective and appointive officials, records relating to the incorporation of cities and towns and the annexation or severance of territory, documents of the state land office, articles and records of corporations operating in Iowa and registered trademarks.

The statutes make the secretary of state the administrative authority over the divisions of government having to do with corporations, securities, motor vehicles and real estate transactions.

Articles of incorporation are filed for approval with the secretary of state, who issues authorization for corporate operations in Iowa, records corporation reports and exercises a general authority over operation of domestic and foreign corporate bodies.

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered

for sale, are administered by the secretary of state through the superintendent of securities.

The motor vehicle division of the department of state has jurisdiction over the licensing of motor vehicles and motor vehicle drivers, and the enforcement, through the state highway patrol, of the state traffic laws.

Under the real estate dealers' licensing law, the secretary of state is designated as the Iowa real estate commissioner. Brokers and salesmen are licensed annually, examinations are held for persons seeking such licenses and a real estate business code is enforced under the direct supervision of a secretary to the real estate commissioner.

The Auditor of State, at least once each year, makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control, department of health, board of education and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, old age assistance commission, state fair board, board of assessment and review (including sales, income, and chain-store tax divisions), board of railroad commissioners, banking department, fish and game department, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions including schools and school districts, as well as having supervision of companies selling stock on the installment plan, and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. All reports by building and loan associations and stock companies mentioned above are made to him, and all fees, except fees for incorporation are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the auditor of state. All offices of the 99 counties and the 4,871 school districts are examined annually, as well as all cities of 2,000 population or over, and all other townships or municipal corporations are examined upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments or the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house; the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of education; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The auditor of state submits annual and biennial reports to the governor, as well as individual audit reports. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on

the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary, and the individual audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

Ex officio, the auditor of state is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus board, and department of health.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; a record being maintained showing the sources of all income, the funds to which such income applies, the date received and the amount received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issuance, date of payment, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The treasurer of state, with the consent and approval of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest at the rate adjusted by the treasurer of state with the approval of the executive council, but in no event shall such rate of interest be adjusted below 1 per cent per annum on 90 per cent of the collected daily balances, payable by the bank at the end of each month.

Chapter 82, Section 61.3, acts of the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, abolished the state levy on general property, and provided that on January 1, 1935, and quarterly thereafter, the board of assessment and review shall set aside and cause to be paid into the general fund of the state from the amount collected from the sales, income, and corporation taxes, a sum of not to exceed \$1,500,000.00 quarterly, which together with other state revenues expendable for such purpose, to pay all items of general expense of the state government for the current calendar year as authorized and appropriated for by the general assembly; the soldiers bonus tax fund collected by the county treasurers is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay interest and bonds as they become due.

The treasurer of state shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the highway commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their possession respectively, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, require the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of three cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state of Iowa, except Federal and state owned cars and equipment. Provision was made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline was used for certain purposes. Five-ninths of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, and four-ninths to the secondary road funds of the several counties of the state.

The state stamp tax, on all cigarettes, cigarette papers, wrappers and tubes sold within the state; also under the supervision of the state treasurer, is a source of revenue of no small importance; said revenue all being applied to the general fund of the state.

An important department in the office of the treasurer of state is the inheritance tax department, the administration of which pertains to the collection of inheritance taxes on estates and the revenues from which source aggregates a considerable amount.

An act of the forty-sixth general assembly provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture and sale of and taxation of certain non-intoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes be collected by the treasurer of state. All license fees and taxes collected by the treasurer of state shall accrue to the "state sinking fund for public deposits." This act also provides for the creation of the state permit board, composed of the treasurer of state, who is the chairman, the secretary of state and the auditor of state, whose duties shall be to review the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this chapter.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the State Agricultural College, which fund aggregates \$664,000.00 invested in first mortgage loans upon real estate in Iowa.

The treasurer of state also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the forty-first general assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

All accounts of the treasury department are audited daily by the auditor of state and examined quarterly under the direction of the governor.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

(Office located on main floor of capitol building)

The Iowa department of agriculture and the office of secretary of agriculture were created by the fortieth general assembly by consolidating several departments and commissions. The object of the department is set out in the code and is as follows:

"1. To encourage, promote, and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, beekeeping, forestry, production of wool and other kindred and allied industries.

"2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.

"3. To administer efficiently and impartially the inspection service of the state as is now or may hereafter be placed under its supervision."

Heretofore, the department of agriculture has been largely an inspection department or regulatory department charged with the responsibility of enforcing some thirty different laws. More recently it has become in addition to a regulatory department, one of service particularly to the farmers of Iowa. This was exemplified in the corn loan program made possible by the unbonded

agricultural warehouse law administered by the department during which time sixty million dollars in loans were made on sealed corn, by the Federal government.

The work of the department may be best explained by setting forth the activities of each of the several divisions and division heads as follows:

Animal Industry Division

DR. H. A. SEIDELL, Fort Dodge, known as state veterinarian and chief of the division is responsible for live stock disease control in the state which includes the supervision of the movement of live stock, T.B. eradication, Bang's disease control, enforcement of the hog cholera law and supervision of the veterinarian practice act and of live stock community sales.

Dairy and Food Division

JOHN A. FEENEY, Davenport, is chief of the dairy and food division and has general supervision over 28 field inspectors who enforce laws pertaining to sanitation, labeling and weights and measures concerning the processing, storage, sale, distribution and serving of food and the manufacture and sale of such products as live stock feeds, agricultural seeds, fertilizers, gasoline, oil, paint and the purchase of farm produce. Mr. Feeney is assisted in his work by C. S. Bogle, chief inspector, who has direct supervision over the field inspectors.

State Chemist

E. L. REDFERN, Des Moines, is state chemist. He and his four assistants have the important work of making all laboratory tests of official samples collected by the field inspectors.

State Entomologist

DR. CARL J. DRAKE, Ames, by virtue of his office as head of the entomology department of Iowa State College is also charged with the responsibility of inspecting all nursery stock sold in the state, issues quarantine regulations to prevent importation of crop pests and disease in the state and has charge of all crop pest control work such as chinch bugs, grasshoppers and army worms.

Weather and Crop Bureau

C. D. REED, Des Moines, is known as director of the weather and crop bureau. This bureau is operated in cooperation with the Federal government in that the director's salary is paid from federal funds. Gathering and disseminating of live stock, crop and weather statistics is the chief function of the weather and crop bureau. Township assessors, special crop reporters and weather station cooperators are used in obtaining much of the information.

Miscellaneous Division

H. C. AABERG, Orange City, assistant secretary of agriculture. In addition to the preceding divisions of the department of agriculture, there are several other miscellaneous sections all of which are under the supervision of the assistant secretary. These include the agricultural warehouse section under which farm grains are sealed and stored on the farm, stallion registration, farmers institutes, short courses and poultry shows and the five affiliated societies of the department known as the Iowa state dairy association, Iowa horticultural society, Iowa horse and mule breeders association, Iowa beef producers association and Iowa corn and small grain growers association.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly, or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also the duty of the attorney general to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, ex officio a member of the state printing board, and has charge of the bureau of investigation.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. The supreme court may appoint temporary examiners to serve for one examination.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board in compliance with the statutes and the rules established by the supreme court and the board. Examination fee, \$5; certificate fee, \$1; persons admitted on motion from other states, \$10.

The superintendent of public instruction is charged by law with general supervision and control over the rural, graded and high schools, public junior colleges of the state, and over such other state and public schools as are not under the control of the state board of education or the board of control of state institutions. This does not include private, denominational, and parochial schools. In connection with these general powers other specific duties are prescribed by law. These include promoting interest in education and recommending improvements, preparing and distributing courses of study, directing programs for the improvement of instruction in the counties, classifying, defining, and inspecting schools, prescribing reports for teachers and school officers, preparing and distributing questions for examinations for applicants for normal training certificates and the pupils completing the eighth grade in rural schools, examining and determining appeals and rendering written opinions upon questions submitted by school officers, and other duties.

The administration of these duties is carried on by the superintendent of public instruction with the assistance of a staff organized into three divisions: legal, with deputy superintendent in charge; inspectional, with three inspectors and one supervisor; research, under a director. In addition to these duties the superintendent of public instruction is president of the board of educational examiners which has charge of the certification of teachers, and is chairman of the board for vocational education which promotes a program of vocational education and rehabilitation.

The board of educational examiners consists of the superintendent of public instruction who is president and executive officer of the board, and of four additional members appointed by the governor for a term of four years, including:

The president of one of the three state institutions of higher learning.

The president of one of the privately endowed institutions of higher learning in the state that maintain teacher training courses.

A county superintendent of schools.

A city superintendent of schools.

The board is charged with the duty of administering the statutes of the state pertaining to the granting of teachers' certificates except those having to do

with high school normal training. In that function it fixes the standards for teacher training courses, accredits colleges which offer approved teacher training courses for teachers' certificates, evaluates certificates of other states and determines what recognition can be given them in Iowa.

The certification laws were revised by the forty-fifth general assembly and the board of educational examiners given additional powers and duties in connection with teachers' certificates.

The state board for vocational education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in an act accepting the terms of the national vocational education act commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Law.

Vocational education, as organized under the provisions of the national and state vocational education acts, includes education and training of less than college grade, the specific purpose of which is to equip boys, girls, men and women for the effective pursuit of occupations. Such training prepares those of regular school age for employment which they propose to follow. It helps those who are already employed to acquire the new skill and knowledge which progress demands of their occupations and consequently to do better work and to take advantage of opportunities for promotion. Vocational education is offered in three major fields, namely: agricultural, trade and industrial and homemaking education. Instruction in each of these three occupational fields may be offered to three age groups of individuals: the regular high school student, the student who attends school part of the time and works part of the time, and the adult worker.

In general, vocational schools and classes are organized in accordance with the needs of the persons to be trained. Usually the classes are held in local public school buildings. Under certain conditions, and when better facilities for vocational training exist elsewhere, instruction may be offered in places other than regular school buildings. However, under all circumstances the vocational work is under public supervision and control and is maintained as a definite part of the educational program of the state. The state board for vocational education reimburses local school districts from federal funds for salaries paid to the teachers of vocational classes.

The state board for vocational education also coöperates with the proper authorities at Iowa State College at Ames in preparing teachers of the above subjects.

The state board of vocational education also coöperates with the federal government in maintaining vocational rehabilitation programs for physically disabled persons. The thirty-ninth general assembly passed an act accepting the provisions of the national rehabilitation act and designated the state board for vocational education, which had been previously created in the state's acceptance of the Smith-Hughes Act, as the state's administrative and coöperative agency. Under certain rules and regulations the rehabilitation service provides for the vocational training and placement of physically handicapped persons 16 years of age or over with the exception of those coming directly under the training program maintained by the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in the army or navy.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable minimum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The forty-third general assembly provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for the public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini. It also provided that the cost of regulating truck operators and motor carriers and the maintenance of the motor carrier department be paid from fees and taxes collected from such carriers.

Under the act of the forty-third general assembly before an airport is acquired by any city or town plans and specifications must be approved by the board.

The forty-fourth general assembly provided that pipe lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

COMMERCE COUNSEL

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: legal advisor of board of railroad commissioners; investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to board, prosecute same before said board, or before any court to which same may be taken; investigate on his own motion, or at request of board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present same to interstate commerce commission and prose-

cute same to final determination; act as attorney for and represent board in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs; the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; approval for the repayment of inheritance taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; and the determination of the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the conservation commission and of the board of engineering examiners.

It is the duty of the custodian, except as otherwise provided by law: To have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government, and all property connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said buildings are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors, at proper hours, are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times, charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of his department in and about the capitol and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with the advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control; and to keep plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

The custodian shall, on or before September thirtieth preceding each regular session of the general assembly, make a verified report to the executive council which shall cover all transactions for the preceding biennial period.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the institutions under its management.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law.

The state board of assessment and review was created by act of the forty-third general assembly in 1929 for the purpose of bringing about a more equitable assessment of property in the state of Iowa, and with the idea in mind that gross unfairness existed in the apportionment of the tax burden to the taxpayers.

It was given very broad general powers, its duties as fixed by law not only including a supervision of the assessment of all property in the state but also that of studying and investigating all matters pertaining to the improvement of the state's revenue system.

The board was organized on July 15th, of 1929, and has been functioning since that time.

Under the law this board exercises general supervision of the tax laws, of boards of supervisors and other officers and boards in matters pertaining to assessment and taxation; it has power to order re-assessments, to prescribe and promulgate books and forms; to confer with, advise and direct those obligated by law to make levies and assessments as to their duties under the law; to require information from taxing districts as to assessment of property and collection of taxes; to hold public hearings with safeguards as to evidence there produced; to cause depositions to be taken within or without the state; to investigate the work and methods of local boards of review, boards of supervisors and other officers in tax matters; to require boards of review to make such orders as this board determines are just and necessary; to direct and order any board to raise or lower the valuation of property, real or personal; to direct the county boards of equalization to raise or lower the valuation of any class or classes of property; to raise or lower the valuation of any piece of property in any taxing district under prescribed conditions; to correct errors, irregularities or omissions in assessments of individual taxpayers under prescribed conditions; to examine into alleged evasion or violation of the law for assessment and taxation; to ascertain wherein existing laws are defective or are improperly or negligently administered, and cause remedial proceedings to be instituted in such cases; to make a summary of the tax situation in the state; to formulate and recommend legislation for the better administration of the fiscal laws so as to secure just and equal taxation; to recommend such additions and changes in the present system of taxation that in its judgment is for the best interests of the state and will eliminate the necessity of any millage levy for state purposes; to transmit biennially to the governor and to each member and member-elect of the legislature, thirty days before the meeting of the legislature, the report of the board, covering the subject of assessment and taxation, the result of the investigation of the board, its recommendations for improvement in the system of taxation in the state, together with such measures as may be formulated for the consideration of the legislature; to publish the revenue laws of the state and distribute them as

prescribed; to procure information pertaining to the discovery of property subject to taxation; to call upon any state department for technical advice and data which may be of value in connection with the work of assessment and taxation; to certify to the auditor of state on January first of each year the aggregate of each state tax for each county for said years; all former powers and duties of the state executive council as a board of review, as to valuations, levies and assessments, and determination of tax rates for state purposes are now vested in the state board of assessment and review, as are the former principal powers and duties of the auditor of state with relation to the assessment and collection of taxes.

Assessment of Utilities

Another highly important duty delegated to this board since its original grant of powers by the legislature has to do with the listing and assessment of privately owned utilities. This board is now required to list and assess for tax purposes privately owned property of:

Tax Revision Act

The special session of the forty-fifth general assembly enacted a law which had for its declared purpose the equalization and replacement in part of the tax on property.

Section 2 of the act provides as follows:

“Purpose or object. This act shall be known as the ‘property relief act,’ and shall have for its purpose the direct replacement of taxes already levied or to be levied on property to the extent of the net revenue obtained from the taxes imposed herein, which shall be apportioned back to the credit of individual taxpayers on the basis of the assessed valuation of taxable property as provided in division VI of this act.”

The law provides for a personal net income tax, a business tax on corporations, and for a tax on the gross receipts from retail sales, and further provides for the collection of such taxes, the distribution and use of the revenues derived therefrom, and the administration of the law.

This board is charged with the administration of the new revenue law.

Chain Store Tax

The forty-sixth general assembly passed what is known as the chain store tax act of 1935, which places a graduating tax upon all systems of chain stores operating in the state, and also imposes a graduated tax upon the gross income of all such chain stores operating within the state. This law became effective July 1, 1935, and is being administered by this board.

STATE COMPTROLLER

(Office located on basement floor of capitol building)

The state comptroller audits all demands by the state and preaudits all accounts submitted for the issuance of state warrants; controls the payment of all moneys into the state treasury and all payments from the state treasury; prescribes all accounting and business forms and the system of accounts and reports of financial transactions by all departments and agencies of the state government other than those of the legislative branch; keeps a central budget

and proprietary control accounts of the state government; establishes a reasonable cash revolving fund for each department or institution for disbursement purposes where needed; has the custody of all books, papers, records, documents, conveyances, leases and other documents appertaining to the fiscal affairs and property of the state, which are not required to be kept in some other office; apportions the interest of the permanent school fund; prepares biennially a list of all standing appropriations and furnishes a report of same to each member of the legislature; prepares the budget document and drafts the legislation to make it effective; reviews requests for allotments as are submitted to the governor for approval; determines the need for all transfers of appropriations submitted to the governor; makes such investigations of the organizations, activities, and methods of procedure of the several departments and establishments as he may be called upon to make by the governor and executive council or the legislature; furnishes any committee of either house of the legislature having jurisdiction over revenues or appropriations such aid and information regarding financial affairs of the government as it may request; prepares and submits to the governor and the legislature on or before December 15 of each year, an annual report, setting forth in detail and in summary form the financial condition and operations of the government; and prepares such other reports as the governor or the general assembly may from time to time require of him.

Local Budget

The state comptroller is charged with the duty of administering the local budget law. This involves a certain amount of supervision over the preparation of the budgets of local subdivisions and in planning and adjusting their expenditures according to their needs and funds available. He has authority to approve the transfer of funds of local taxing districts. His duties under this law require many conferences with public officials.

Public Contracts and Bonds

Under this law the state comptroller is called upon to decide questions relating to public contracts and bonds and to advise public officials regarding expenditures of public money for improvements and financing same by the issuance of bonds when necessary. When appeals are filed with him by the requisite number of taxpayers, his approval is necessary before the local board can proceed with the proposed improvement or bond issue.

The state comptroller is a member of the State Appeal Board, which body handles appeals of taxpayers in connection with certain improvements by the state government.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed, thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole either within or without the state of Iowa, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Parole rules are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Superintendent, Francis Eber Palmer; physician, Lyle W. Koontz, M.D.; and visiting ophthalmic surgeon, head of department, State University.

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects leading up to and required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare the students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study. Both literary and industrial work is required of all students, besides some music.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

O. L. McIntire, M.A., Superintendent

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902 a fire completely destroyed the main building which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fireproof structure now stands in its place where sufficient room is provided for 325 pupils. A separate building to accommodate seventy-five pupils is also provided, wherein only oral instruction is employed. Approximately ninety per cent of all pupils are taught by the oral method which employs for the purpose, speech, lip-reading and writing. The course of study is extensive and provides not only an elementary education for the deaf children of the state but also a secondary, the high school department, covering a full four years course, being on the accredited list of the North Central Association, the only school for the deaf in the country so accredited.

A well equipped vocational department is maintained for the purpose of teaching trades. Students become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state.

The Iowa liquor control commission was created under the provisions of H. F. 292 as passed by the forty-fifth general assembly in extraordinary session and signed by the governor, March 6, 1934.

The commission has sole power to buy, import and have in its possession for sale and sell liquors; to establish, maintain and discontinue state liquor stores and special distributors in such cities and towns as deemed advisable; to rent, lease and equip any building or any land necessary to carry out the provisions of the act; to appoint necessary employees; to determine the nature, form and capacity of packages kept or sold under the act and to prescribe the labels and seals to be placed on same; to license, inspect and control the manufacture of alcoholic liquors in Iowa; and to make rules and regulations necessary for carrying out the provisions of the act.

The forty-fifth general assembly in extraordinary session passed an old age assistance law, which as amended and revised by the forty-sixth general assembly, fulfills the present state requirements as set out in the national social security act.

The purpose of this law is to provide relief from want or need for our elderly citizens who are 65 years of age or over, who have maintained a domicile in Iowa for at least nine years immediately preceding date of application, who have resided in this state five of said nine years, one of which has been continuous and immediately preceding such date, and who have no responsible relative able, without undue hardship, to support said applicants.

With due regard to the condition of the individual and community in each case, and considering the earnings, aid and property holdings of the applicant, the law provides a \$25.00 maximum monthly payment to certain of our needy elderly citizens.

The Iowa old age assistance set-up is statewide. A superintendent is the department head. In turn the county boards, to whom applications are first directed, are appointed by the supervisors of each county and are bipartisan in membership.

The law did not become effective until July 1, 1935, except as was provided by section 35 whereby a tax of \$1.00 was levied on all persons 21 years of age and over to provide the revenue for the emergency period from November 1, 1934, to July 1, 1935, and during this emergency period the commission was able to grant assistance to some 10,500 of our needy citizens and of this number, 10,200 were on the assistance rolls as of June 1, 1935, some 300 having been taken from the list due to deaths, withdrawals and cancellations.

Beginning July 1, 1935, the law states that all persons 21 years of age or over must pay an annual head tax of \$2.00 to provide for this revenue. However, the forty-sixth general assembly, realizing the importance and magnitude of this cause, appropriated an additional \$1,000,000.00 for each year of the following biennium to supplement the \$2.00 head tax, thus affording old age assistance to a greater number of the elderly citizens of this state.

The board of health serves in an advisory capacity to the commissioner of public health and is empowered to make rules and regulations.

Commissioner

The commissioner of public health directs the work of the department. He formulates objectives and outlines detailed programs in public health. He serves as the executive officer of the ten boards of examiners for the various professions affecting the public health. He formulates and proposes needed legislation for the protection of the public health. He is the executive officer of the state board of health.

Deputy Commissioner

The deputy commissioner assists the commissioner and supervises and directs the statewide program for the control and prevention of syphilis and gonorrhea and for the prevention of diphtheria. He also directs the administration of the county health units.

Communicable Diseases—Epidemiology

Communicable diseases are by their very nature of vital concern to the community and the state. Reports of various infectious diseases are received daily from physicians and health officers throughout the state. These reports are surveyed and tabulated so as to make possible a study by weeks and months of the current prevalence of disease as compared with the preceding year or period of years. Field investigations are made upon request by local health officers or other officials to determine the nature and extent of illness and to assist in control measures. The department through articles, reports, literature, talks, correspondence and graphic presentations aims to inform the public about disease prevention.

Child Health and Health Education

One of the most important activities of a health department is to present information on health subjects to the public and to stimulate the community to meet the needs of the whole child in such a manner that the greatest good

will come to the greatest number. An advisory service is offered to lay organizations. This service includes guidance, direction and even supervision in planning and outlining health programs and the preparation of study course outlines. Statistical studies and analyses covering maternal, infant, tuberculosis and cancer mortality are made.

Sanitary Engineering

The department is charged with the inspection of public water supplies, sewage systems and sewage disposal plants. Other activities of the sanitary engineers include: the inspection and supervision of public swimming pools and tourist and summer camps; the investigation of the pollution of waterways; investigation of major nuisances; the administration of the state housing law and the state plumbing code and the preparation of bulletins in which problems of sanitation are presented.

Public Health Nursing

The department maintains a whole-time service for public health nurses, for boards employing nurses and for associations or committees interested in public health nursing services.

The general objectives of all public health nursing services are:

1. To assist in educating individuals and families to protect their own health.
2. To assist in the adjustment of family and social programs that affect health.
3. To assist in correlating all health and social programs for the welfare of family and community.
4. To assist in educating the community to develop adequate public health facilities.

Vital Statistics

The division is charged with the collecting, recording and filing reports of births, deaths, marriages and divorces. Statistical studies and analyses of these records are made and the results of these studies are released for the information of the public. The division supervises the work of the local registrars of vital statistics and cooperates closely with the bureau of census, department of commerce, Washington, D. C.

Law Enforcement

The work of the division of law enforcement is under the direct supervision of our attorney, who is immediately responsible for the enforcement of laws pertaining to all matters affecting the following professions under title VIII of the code: medicine and surgery, podiatry, osteopathy, chiropractic, dentistry, optometry, embalming, barbering and cosmetology.

The division provides an advisory service to the lay public, as well as to the members of professional groups, in matters relating to legal phases of public health.

Examinations, Licensure and Registration

This division is under the direct supervision of a lay-director who is not licensed to practice any of the professions. The division keeps a permanent record of all applications, examinations, licenses, reciprocal licenses and renewal of licenses of the various professions under title VIII of the code of Iowa, 1931 (except the practice of pharmacy, osteopathy, chiropractic and nursing). The director carries on all correspondence and keeps all records incident to the examining and licensing of the following professions: medicine and surgery, dentistry, embalming, podiatry, optometry, barbering and cosmetology. The respective examining boards give the examinations, the director assisting.

The highway commission's duties are three-fold:

First: Construction and maintenance of primary roads.

Second: General supervision of secondary roads.

Third: Engineering assistance to other departments.

The commission has entire charge of and responsibility for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It prepares the necessary surveys, plans and specifications for primary road improvements, lets the necessary contracts and supervises the construction work. It has charge, for the state of Iowa, of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to this state.

All maintenance work on the primary roads is under the supervision of the commission.

The annual report of the commission shows in detail expenditures for primary road construction and maintenance.

The secondary roads (county and township roads) are under the supervision of the county boards of supervisors in their respective counties. However, the law places on the highway commission certain duties and responsibilities in connection with such secondary road work. Changes in or modifications of the county trunk road system must be approved by the commission. Secondary road construction programs proposed by the county boards must receive the commission's approval. Plans prepared by the county engineers for secondary road improvements, must be submitted to the state highway commission for approval. Contracts awarded by the boards of supervisors, for secondary road work involving a cost of \$2,000 or more per mile, or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate, or more than \$2,000 for any one bridge or culvert, must be approved by the state highway commission, before becoming effective. In case two adjacent counties are unable to agree on any county line road or bridge construction or maintenance matter, either board may appeal to the highway commission to determine said controversy.

The commission, on request, renders engineering assistance to various other state departments. This includes the making of surveys and preparation of plans and general supervision of construction and maintenance of public highways upon or adjacent to lands belonging to the state at the various educational, charitable, and penal institutions and at the state parks, engineering assistance to the executive council on street improvements upon and adjacent to the capitol grounds, assistance to the national guard on projects in connection with the national guard camp, and various other technical matters which may come before such other state departments.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve of policies of Iowa life companies and associations on deposit in this department on February 1, 1933, was \$409,003,971.01.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies may be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The forty-third general assembly provided that in the event of a receivership for an insurance company the commissioner becomes receiver.

The Iowa state fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25, 26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa state fair board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 28, 1924.

The law provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The

delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the state fair board; the president, secretary or accredited delegate of each of the county and district fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations: each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving aid; the state horticultural society; the Iowa state dairy association; the Iowa beef producers' association, and the Iowa corn and small grain growers' association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a president and a vice president for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district, whose term expires the day following the convention, for a term of two years. The terms of the directors representing the first, fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth congressional districts expire December 13, 1934, and the terms of the directors for the second, third, sixth and ninth congressional districts expire December 12, 1935. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the state fair board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes the maximum amount to be paid the treasurer at \$250 and the secretary at \$5,000 annually.

By statute the state fair board is made the custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual state fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expenses of the state fair. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the state fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the state will not be liable for any debts incurred by the board. The state has appropriated since 1902, \$953,000 for buildings, \$93,013 for additional land, \$14,000 for sanitary sewer system, and \$28,280 for paving and sewer assessments against the grounds. In the same period \$348,700 has been appropriated for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings.

During this same thirty-two year period there has been expended from the fair receipts, \$954,872 for buildings and other improvements, \$243,566 for insurance premiums and maintenance of the grounds and buildings, and the entire operating expense of the fair amounting to \$6,423,418.

The inventory taken November 30, 1934, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$2,121,325. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the state fair grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the auditor of state's office.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies incorporated under the laws of Iowa, as well as all small loan com-

panies operating under the small loan act passed by the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking subject to the approval of the state banking board, and their salaries are fixed by the state banking board within certain limits prescribed by law. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is *ex officio* a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws.

The adjutant general issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil, Spanish-American, and World Wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

The forty-sixth general assembly abolished the former fish and game commission and the state board of conservation and created the state conservation commission to carry on the duties of these former agencies. The duties relating to state forests formerly under the secretary of agriculture were also assigned to this commission.

The conservation commission makes recommendations for the acquirement of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The commission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game, fur bearing animals and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the commission. The commission has jurisdiction over the state owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

Since the early part of 1933 a great number of new developments have been accomplished in the various conservation areas in connection with emergency conservation work programs through the civilian conservation corps, civil works administration, Federal emergency relief administration and other agencies with whom the state has cooperated.

Due to the above programs or in connection therewith there has been a considerable increase in the number of conservation areas over what was under the jurisdiction of the state two years ago. Some 60 areas of parks and preserves or sanctuaries, 64 meandered natural lakes with over 41,000 acres of

water surface, 11 meandered streams with some 800 miles of river bed and approximately 15 artificial lakes either under construction or completed, a number of fish hatcheries, nurseries, pools and rescue stations, and game management areas are included under the administration of the commission.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; and to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns.

The basic science law enacted by the forty-sixth general assembly establishes a State Board of Examiners in the fundamental sciences underlying the practice of the healing arts, providing for its organization and powers, and that certification by such board following examination in the six basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, bacteriology and hygiene is prerequisite to eligibility for examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathy, osteopathy and surgery, and chiropractic. It establishes uniform educational standards in the fundamental sciences for all applicants for license to diagnose and treat human ailments. The act does not apply to dentists, dental hygienists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, embalmers, podiatrists, barbers or cosmetologists practicing within the limits of their respective professions, or Christian scientists.

The personnel of the board consists of six members learned in the basic sciences, having no degrees in the healing arts. The members of the board receive as compensation \$10.00 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expense incurred in the discharge of their duties which is paid out of funds in the state treasury received as fees from applicants for examination.

The board meets in Des Moines and there conducts the examinations in the basic sciences four (4) times each year, respectively on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. The examination fee is \$10.00.

BUREAU OF LABOR

(Office located in building at Pennsylvania and Grand avenue)

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board for vocational education, rehabilitation, the Iowa emergency relief committee, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, fire escapes, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Three factory inspectors devote full time to inspection and reinspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies, and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children.

The official publication of the bureau "Iowa Employment Survey" is issued the first of each month based upon conditions as of the fifteenth of the preceding month and compared with the previous month. Statistical information is furnished by the employer on a specially prepared questionnaire which is compiled showing employment and payroll trends, building conditions, and activities in the Iowa state employment service.

The bureau issues, with the consent of the executive council, special bulletins relating to child labor, labor organizations, employment service, and manufacturing directory, etc., which is in addition to the biennial report required by law.

According to laws regulating the operation of free public employment offices, the commissioner is also director for the Iowa state employment service, a system of free public employment offices operated by the state of Iowa in cooperation with the U. S. department of labor and known officially as the Iowa state employment service affiliated with the U. S. employment service. This service is now operating in twenty-one principal cities of the state, the Federal government matching dollar for dollar any public funds used in the operations and maintenance of this system of free public employment offices.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION SERVICE

Iowa was among the first of the states to provide workmen's compensation for industrial accidents. All employers, with a few exceptions, must provide insurance, or assume responsibility for compensation benefits, based on 60 percent of the average weekly wage, and a limited liability for medical expense. The minimum is \$6 per week and the maximum \$15 per week. Provision is made for arbitration and review, and appeals may go to the courts. State and other public employes are included. Reports are made of injuries to the industrial commissioner and settlements must have his approval. Arbitration decisions now number about one hundred and forty per year, together with the filing of about forty review decisions.

HISTORICAL, MEMORIAL AND ART DEPARTMENT OF IOWA

The department, founded July 1, 1892, has for its chief purpose the collection of historical data relating to Iowa and the territory of the middle west, the care-taking of the public archives and the stimulation of private and public enterprise in noting and commemorating through artistic means notable achievements of Iowa citizens. The department publishes the Annals of Iowa, an illustrated quarterly historical magazine of eighty pages. Portraits of distinguished Iowans are secured and hung in the art gallery.

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the world war.

In the library division of the historical department special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy, war histories, works relating to the North American Indians, county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies, documents relating to early settlers and settlements and every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

The museum display includes many remarkable specimens of mammals and birds, including moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes and other animals. Eagles, owls, wild turkeys, Indian relics and handiwork, weapons used in the nation's wars, historic medals, pottery and many other items are preserved. The historical department conducts tours of teachers with pupils through the building, in specific courses illustrated by museum specimens in pioneer and American Indian themes, in compliance with law requiring the teaching of Iowa history. It also lends to Iowa schools collections of mounted specimens of common birds and smaller mammals of Iowa when applied for, and transportation provided without cost to the state.

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. About two hundred and fifty weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all official Iowa newspapers.

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureaus, etc., and dates from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal.

IOWA STATE LIBRARY

The Iowa state library's legal existence began in 1848.

Fifty years later, in 1898, when the present librarian entered upon his duties, the library had grown from a few thousand volumes, chiefly documents, to

57,501. At the close of the biennial period, June 30, 1934, the total number of volumes of record in the four departments of the library was 234,518, an increase of 177,017 volumes in thirty-six years.

The total number of additions to the several departments during the biennial period ending June 30, 1934, was 8,178.

These additions were apportioned to the four departments as follows:

These figures show the remarkable growth and present relative strength of the library. However, they do not show its growth and present strength as an informative and educational institution. While the state library was originally little more than a place of storage for documents, it now, through its four departments, general, law, medical, economics and sociology, covers the whole state with its various activities.

The library commission coöperates with local communities in the establishment and development of public libraries and aids in the organization of libraries according to modern methods, gives assistance in book selection, advice to trustees, and instruction to librarians by personal visits and correspondence.

The library commission also collects and publishes statistics of libraries in the state for guidance and information of trustees and others and furnishes blanks for keeping records and making reports to the commission, as required by law.

The library commission also issues the Iowa Library Quarterly, devoted to library purposes and news of the state, and also publishes selected lists, leaflets, and aids of various kinds.

The second activity of the commission is the traveling library from which books are loaned to schools, communities without public libraries, small libraries to supplement their own collections, clubs, other organizations, and individuals. Much reference help is given to study clubs in preparing their programs. Books for the blind, picture collections, and stereoscopic views are also loaned from the traveling library.

In 1933, 113,176 books were loaned from the traveling library and in 1934, 122,505 were loaned. Most of these books are loaned for three months and the use of the traveling books is therefore much larger than the figures indicate.

Organized in January, 1857, its purposes are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution. This includes (1) the discovery, collection, and preservation of materials of Iowa history; (2) researches in the field of Iowa history; (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history; (4) dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members. The library of the society now includes about 83,500 titles. There are more than a thousand active members and twenty-six auxiliary members. The official depositories within the state number one hundred and ninety.

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

It is the duty of the geological survey to furnish information to the public on such subjects as the mineral resources of Iowa, the geological formations present in the state and what uses may be made of them, the possibilities of investment in enterprises that involve geological materials, and any other questions that have to do with geology. In order to be able to give useful and intelligent answers to such questions as these, the Survey has made preliminary examinations of the coal beds of the state and of the strata associated with them. Additional and more detailed studies of the coal measures are now being made. Studies have been made of the rock resources of Iowa, the gypsum, the clays and shales and the sands and gravels, both of the bedrock and of the overlying loose materials. The possibilities of cement manufacture have been examined, also the deposit of iron ore at Waukon. The ground water resources of the state have been constantly studied since the organization of the survey over forty years ago. During the years 1934-1935 the survey had direct supervision of extensive field and laboratory investigations for the emergency relief administration and state planning board on underground water and subsurface geology of Iowa. The possibility of finding oil and gas in the Iowa strata has always been kept in mind, and close attention is given to all wells drilled as oil or gas prospects. The survey has always sounded a note of caution in pointing out the extreme hazard of investing funds in oil prospecting in the state.

The survey has published, as the result of its geological work, 35 large volumes, most of which are called annual reports. In addition, seven bulletins have been issued on the botany and biology of the state.

The state printing board has charge of all matters pertaining to state printing, including printing for institutions and officials outside of Des Moines. Contracts for all work and material are let on competitive bids. The laws of the State are very explicit in directing the manner of advertising for and securing bids on all items of printing and there can be no deviation from the strict and impartial adherence to this law.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board. He is *ex officio* secretary of the board and its executive officer. The law directs that the manuscript of every report or document, book, booklet, bulletin or anything to be printed shall be transmitted to the superintendent of printing as soon as it is ready for printing, and he shall edit, revise, condense and arrange the same for printing. He has the custody of and attends to the distribution and sale of codes, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the session laws, the legislative bill index, and the official register. Also the journals of the house and senate are indexed under his supervision.

Through the activities of the educational director, all accredited schools of nursing are supervised.

The board, through its executive secretary, keeps all records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state; receives all applications for licensure; collects all fees and issues all licenses.

The advisory board of the Iowa pharmacy association annually recommends to the governor a list of six persons for appointment, who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the governor in making the appointment to the board may select one of the persons so named. It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs, medicines, and poisons in the state, as well as hold examinations for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10.00. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$2.00 is required each year for the renewal of certificates. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50.00 per year.

"The object of the academy shall be the encouragement of scientific work in the state of Iowa." Membership is open to all persons interested in scientific subjects. Members of the academy are divided into three groups: (1) fellows, who are actively engaged in scientific work; (2) associates, who are interested in the progress of science, but not direct contributors to original research, and (3) honorary fellows, elected by vote from outstanding investigators in science. Papers of general interest in addition to those that are technically scientific are presented at each annual meeting. Meetings are held each spring, time and place fixed by the executive committee. The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held every two months at the state mine inspector's office. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time there was only one inspector, but now it takes the entire time of three inspectors to inspect the mines in the state to see that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the correspondence and books in the office maintained in the state house, and also a record of every inspection, accident reports, etc. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors. A general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employees, number of days worked, and other information relative to the coal industry is published every two years. This is the state mine inspector's report to the governor. Maps of the mines of the state are on file in the office of the mine inspectors and are open for public inspection.

The Iowa Commission for the Blind was created in 1926 for the purpose of helping the adult blind, educationally and industrially, in their own homes. No material aid is permitted. Under the provisions of the law, a register of the blind is maintained; assistance given in manufacturing and marketing their products; conditions ameliorated in various ways; program for the conservation of vision and prevention of blindness carried on; vocational training provided; and begging discouraged in cooperation with other agencies. Home teaching is carried on and workshops may be provided if deemed advisable.

The forty-second general assembly passed a law forming a board of architectural examiners and specifying that all persons who wish to practice archi-

lecture in Iowa under the title "architect" must secure from the board a certificate. Authority to revoke certificates is granted the board in case those holding same do not meet the requirements of the law. The board holds three regular meetings each year in May, July and October and special meetings on call. Examinations are held in Des Moines.

The office of the clerk of the supreme court is a part of the judicial branch of the state government. The law provides that the clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, that he shall file all printed matter and papers of all kinds appertaining to pending matters and cases, issue writs, orders and executions to carry out orders of the court.

The clerk shall announce by mail to one attorney on each side any ruling made or decision rendered, as soon as filed, and permit no original opinion filed to be removed by anyone except the reporter of the supreme court.

The clerk of the supreme court is required to be present in the court room when the court sits for the hearing and submission of cases, and keep a record of the cases submitted in the order of their submission. When a case is called for submission the clerk distributes to the respective members of the court a set of the pleadings in such case.

The clerk receives and files all applications for admission to the bar except those applying to be admitted on motion, prepares the lists of applicants for the bar examinations for the use of the board of law examiners, issues certificates to all successful applicants and keeps a record of the same. Collects and accounts for all fees incident to admissions to the bar. Each applicant pays to the clerk an examination fee of \$5.00. Attorneys from other states admitted on motion pay the clerk a fee of \$10.00. Out of the fees so collected the clerk pays the board of law examiners their per diem on certificate of the attorney general

REPORTER OF THE SUPREME COURT AND EDITOR OF THE CODE

It is the duty of the reporter of the supreme court and code editor to cause to be printed the official volumes of the opinions of the supreme court, with proper syllabi for each opinion; also to edit and compile the code and cause the same to be published immediately following each even-numbered session of the general assembly; also to prepare and cause to be published, biennially, annotations to the code; also to submit to each general assembly bills for the codification, amendment, and revision of such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous.

ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of nine judges, elected by the people, five of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

Through a provision passed by the forty-fourth general assembly, the senior in time of service is chief justice for six months instead of a year as formerly and so on in rotation until all judges shall have been chief justice.

JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

APPEALS FROM ORDERS.—An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken.

2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action after judgment.

3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies, a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve, an injunction or attachment, grants or refuses a new trial; sustains or overrules a demurrer in a law action; or sustains or overrules a motion to dismiss in an equitable action.

4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision.

5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time seventy judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to six judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter.

The district court shall have general and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county, and non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit court, the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is coextensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

The salary of municipal court judges is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of the city as above indicated.

JURISDICTION.—Municipal courts are courts of record and have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real state, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on district courts for the trial of misdemeanors, justice of the peace courts, mayor's courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

SUPERIOR COURT

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present five such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Iowa Falls, Keokuk and Oelwein. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which the court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

BIOGRAPHIES

ELECTIVE STATE OFFICIALS

CLYDE L. HERRING, Des Moines,—Governor, was born on a farm near Jackson, Michigan, May 3, 1879, and was educated in the public schools. Married Emma Pearl Spinney of Mobile, Alabama, September 7, 1901. They have three sons. Was rancher in Colorado. In 1908 moved to farm near Massena, Iowa, and in 1910 became automobile dealer in Atlantic. In 1912 moved to Des Moines, still continuing automobile business. He was the democratic candidate for governor in 1920, and for United States senator in 1922. Democratic national committeeman for Iowa from 1924 to 1928. Spanish war veteran. Elected governor of Iowa, November, 1932; re-elected, November, 1934. A democrat.

NELSON G. KRASCHEL, Harlan.—Lieutenant Governor, was born on a farm near Macon, Illinois, October 27, 1889. His entire boyhood life was spent on that farm, which was known for miles around for its pure bred live stock. In 1910, at the age of 21, he moved to Harlan, Iowa, where he engaged in the profession of live stock auctioneering. He was married April 2, 1913, to Agnes Johnson of Harlan, Iowa, and has three sons, Frederick 20, Dick 15, and James 11. Some of the most notable live stock auctions ever held in the United States and Canada have been under his management and direction. He has conducted sales in twenty-six states of the Union and two provinces of Canada, selling more than fifty million dollars worth of agricultural property. Several animals have passed under his hammer at more than ten thousand dollars each. Throughout his life, he has been an ardent admirer of good live stock, and on his farms has bred some of the best cattle produced in the State. In 1922, he was a candidate for state senator from the Cass-Shelby district, and in that campaign he spent much time in the support of Clyde L. Herring in his campaign for United States senator against Smith W. Brookhart. He was a candidate for the nomination for United States senator on the democratic ticket in 1932, being defeated in the primary by Louis Murphy for the nomination. He was nominated for the office of lieutenant governor at the democratic state convention July 22, 1932, to fill a vacancy and was elected at the general election in November; re-elected, November, 1934. A democrat.

MRS. ALEX MILLER (Ola Babcock), Washington.—Secretary of State, was born in Washington county, Iowa; daughter of Nathan L. and Ophelia Smith Babcock, the former a native New Yorker, the latter born in Illinois; wife of Alex Miller, editor of Washington Democrat, newspaper correspondent, lecturer, and democratic candidate for governor of Iowa in 1926; mother of three children; the son, Joseph, died in infancy; Ophelia (Mrs. George Gallup), lives in New Rochelle, New York; Barbara (Mrs. Edward Benson), in New York City. She was educated in public schools, Washington Academy, and Iowa Wesleyan College; taught in public schools before marriage; active in civic and club work, and the suffrage movement. Was Iowa president, and national president, of the P. E. O. Sisterhood; member of the Methodist church, Daughters of the American Revolution, Daughters of Union Veterans, Business and Professional Women's Club. Elected secretary of state in 1933; re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

CHARLES W. STORMS, Fort Madison.—Auditor of State, was born in Fort Madison, Lee county, Iowa, October 12, 1870. Educated in the public schools and business college. Married and has five children. Business man and lumber broker. Served twelve years as member of the Fort Madison city council; two terms as county chairman and twelve years on the democratic state committees. Was a member of the war board during the World war in charge of distribution of fuel. Elected auditor of state in 1932; re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

LEO J. WEGMAN, Carroll.—Treasurer of State, was born at Maries, Missouri, May 17, 1875, and educated in the rural schools with collegiate course at Columbus, Ohio. Entered railway service at an early age, holding various posts as telegraph operator or station agent with the C., M. & St. P. railway, Iowa Central and C., R. I. & P. railway. He moved with his parents to a farm near Buffalo Center, Winnebago county, Iowa, in 1895, and was educated in the local schools, graduating from Buffalo Center high school in 1909. Married January 9th, 1918, to Miss Viola Wise. Entered U. S. army as a private in battery "F", 337th field artillery. Served with A. E. F. in 1918 and 1919. Organized the legion post in his home town and has served as post, county, district and state vice-commander of that organization. Member of the State Historical Society. Father of two children, Jack and Marjorie. A Methodist. Elected secretary of agriculture, November, 1932; re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

EDWARD L. O'CONNOR, Iowa City.—Attorney General, was born in Johnson county, Iowa, Feb. 1, 1891; educated in a country school, Lone Tree high school, and State University of Iowa, receiving the following degrees: B.A., LL.B., J.D. Admitted to practice of law in 1920; practicing attorney in Iowa City from 1920 to 1933; county attorney of Johnson county 1923-1927; president of Johnson county bar association 1932; served in the national army during World war from May 14, 1917, to Feb. 9, 1919, as first lieutenant in field artillery; married Nov. 7, 1917, to Miss Florence Freeman of Iowa City; has four children, Edward, Jr., Martin, Katherine, and Marian. Elected attorney general in 1932; re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

AGNES SAMUELSON, Shenandoah.—Superintendent of Public Instruction, was born in Page county, Iowa. Graduate Shenandoah high school, Western Normal College, and State University of Iowa. Phi Beta Kappa. Experience as rural teacher, high school principal, town superintendent, county superintendent, and member of faculty of Iowa State Teachers College. Professional membership in National Council of Education, National Council of Women in Administration, National Council of State Superintendents and Commissioners of Education, and National Society for the Study of Education. In 1935, elected president of the National Educational Association. A republican.

ELMA G. ALBERT, Jefferson.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born June 5, 1866, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa in 1870. Graduated from the law department of Drake University in June, 1891, and entered upon the practice of law. County attorney of Greene county, Iowa, for six years commencing January 1, 1900. District judge of the 16th judicial district from January 1, 1915, until elected to supreme bench in November, 1924. Re-elected in 1930. A republican.

RICHARD F. MITCHELL, Fort Dodge.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Fort Dodge, Webster county, Iowa, on October 11, 1889, the son of Peter M. and Sarah F. Mitchell. He attended the German Lutheran school at Fort Dodge, and then graduated from the Fort Dodge high school. He received a B.A. degree in 1912, and an LL.B. degree in 1913 from the State University of Iowa, and was admitted to practice law in the state of Iowa in 1913. Started practicing at Fort Dodge, Iowa, and for ten years practiced in the firm of Kelleher & Mitchell. He was a candidate for congress from the tenth congressional district, and was defeated by congressman Dickinson, now senator Dickinson. In 1928, elected state chairman of the democratic state central committee, and in 1930 was elected democratic national committeeman for Iowa, and was re-elected in 1932. Was a delegate to the democratic national convention at Houston in 1928, and a delegate to the democratic national convention in Chicago in 1932. Was elected to the supreme court of Iowa in the general election of 1932. A democrat.

LEON W. POWERS, Denison.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Webster county, Iowa, June 12, 1888. He attended the State University of Iowa and was graduated in 1912 with the degree of A.B. Later he attended the law school of the University of Chicago and was graduated in 1914 with the degree of J.D. After spending about six months in a law office in Chicago, he returned to Iowa and began the practice of law with Judge J. P. Conner at Denison, Iowa, where he has lived continuously since that time. Served as a representative from Crawford county in the thirty-eighth and thirty-ninth general assemblies of Iowa. Served six months as an

assistant attorney general in 1933, and thereafter as a special assistant attorney general in charge of cases involving license fees on motor vehicle fuel. He was married in 1916 to Bland Marie Lally, and has four children, Mary Catherine, Genevieve, James and Walter. He was elected to fill a vacancy on the supreme court in November, 1934. A democrat.

JOHN W. ANDERSON, Sioux City.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Buchanan county, Iowa, July 21, 1871, of Scotch and English parentage. Attended public schools and the Upper Iowa University, and was admitted to the bar of Iowa, May 11, 1893. Has two children; Mrs. Marjora B. Schneider of Des Moines and Mrs. Elma I. Bails of Sioux City. Mr. Anderson practiced law in Woodbury and Monona counties, Iowa, since his admission to the bar. He was elected and served as county attorney of Monona county 1908-1912. He was elected judge of the fourth judicial district in 1914, re-elected without opposition in 1918, and resigned such office in 1920, and resumed the practice of law in Sioux City, and so continued until January 1, 1933. He is a past presiding officer of many fraternal organizations and has been active in the work of the various Masonic bodies and in the B. P. O. Elks. Elected justice of the supreme court in 1932. A democrat.

MAURICE FRANCIS DONEGAN, Davenport.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm near Welton, Clinton county, Iowa. He attended the local district school and Dewitt high school. He later attended Creighton College, Omaha, Nebraska, from which he received the degree of A.B., and also Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., from which he received the degree A.M. He began the study of law at Georgetown University and continued it at the State University of Iowa, where he received the degree LL.B., in 1901. He began the practice of law in Davenport, Iowa, the same year, and from 1903 to 1908 was associated with the firm of Sharon & Donegan. From 1908 to 1912 he was city attorney of Davenport, and from 1912 to 1921 he was judge of the district court, from which office he resigned and entered private practice. In 1932 he was elected justice of the supreme court of Iowa. A democrat.

JOHN W. KINTZINGER, Dubuque.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in the city and county of Dubuque, Iowa, August 12, 1870. Graduated from the public grade and high schools in the city of Dubuque. Attended the State University of Iowa and graduated from its law department in June, 1897, with the degree of LL.B., and immediately entered the practice of law in Dubuque. Was a member of the city council of Dubuque in 1900 and 1901 and was elected city attorney in 1904 and served several years. Was elected judge of the district court of the 19th judicial district, and served in that capacity for 12 years from 1911. Was a delegate to the national democratic convention at Baltimore in 1912. Was chairman of the legal advisory board of the war department for Dubuque county during the World war. Married in July, 1893, to Fannie E. Webb of Fayette county, Iowa, and has three children, Helen J., John W., Jr., and Robert H. Elected to the supreme court in November, 1932. A democrat.

W. H. HAMILTON, Sigourney.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Warren township, Keokuk county, Iowa, on May 1, 1877. He attended country school and graduated from the high school at Delta, Iowa; obtained his bachelor of laws degree from Drake University in 1900; practiced law in Sigourney until the fall of 1934. His family consists of his wife and three children. Mrs. Hamilton has for years been prominent in state and national D. A. R. circles and in the P. E. O. Sisterhood. His eldest son, Edgar C., is a practicing attorney in Sigourney. Jack is operating his father's farm near Delta, Iowa, and Martha is a student in Stephens College at Columbia, Missouri. He is a member of the Methodist church and I. O. O. F. lodge. Elected justice of the supreme court in November, 1934. A democrat.

JAMES M. PARSONS, Des Moines.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm about four miles southwest of Anamosa, in Jones county, Iowa, October 16, 1858. His father died in 1864 and his mother in 1868. He attended various grade schools and finally entered Ames college in March, 1876. In September, 1877, he entered Cornell College, taking the engineering course. In 1879 he left school and entered the office of Sheean & McCan, where he read law, and was admitted to the bar in the then circuit court October 10, 1880. He commenced the practice of law in Rock Rapids, Iowa, April, 1881, where he remained until May 8, 1906, when he removed to Des Moines

and remained in the practice there until January 1, 1935, having been elected to his present position at the 1934 election. A democrat.

PAUL W. RICHARDS, Red Oak.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Red Oak, Iowa, where he has since lived and practiced law since 1896. He served as city attorney of Red Oak, as county attorney of Montgomery county, and for eight years was referee in bankruptcy at Council Bluffs. His family consists of Mrs. Richards and two sons. His law practice in Red Oak was established by his father, C. E. Richards, in 1867. Elected justice of the supreme court in 1934. A democrat.

M. P. CONWAY, Atlantic.—Railroad Commissioner, was born in Cass county, Iowa. Attended country school, city school and business college. Spent boyhood days on farm; one year railroading. Married an Atlantic girl in 1899. Moved to Anita and became a realtor. Has four children, three girls and a boy. Moved back to Atlantic in 1908 and has lived there since, being engaged in the real estate and insurance business except during the war, at which time he was chairman of the council of defense, assisted in liberty bond drives and all war activities in Cass county, and was in a group assigned to go across when armistice was signed. Member of the democratic state central committee for sixteen years. Never ran for elective office except that of railroad commissioner, and was elected November 8, 1932. Was elected chairman of the board of railroad commissioners on January 1, 1935. A democrat.

HARRY B. DUNLAP, Ames.—Railroad Commissioner, was born in Victor, Iowa. He was reared in Perry, attending grade and high school, and C. C. C. business college, Des Moines. Was manager of the Des Moines Creamery Company from 1903-1915. In 1915 he moved to Marshalltown and became associated with the Rude Auto Company, Ford dealer, operating several places. In 1918, he organized the Dunlap Motor Company, Ames, and continued as a retail and wholesale dealer until 1932. Married Ethel M. Bailey of Perry, Iowa, June 28, 1905, and they have four children, one daughter Marjorie, and three sons, Harry B., Jr., Zac, and Norman all attending Iowa State College. Elected railroad commissioner November 6, 1934. A democrat.

GEORGE A. HUFFMAN, Des Moines.—Railroad Commissioner, was born at Madina, Ohio; resident of Iowa forty years; former newspaper publisher; former chairman democratic state central committee; delegate to democratic national convention in Baltimore, 1912; postmaster of Des Moines, Iowa, 1915 to 1924; has wife and two daughters, Bethel (deceased) and Miriam, a teacher in Roosevelt high school, Des Moines, Iowa; has two grandchildren, Barbara and Philip Nye. A Mason and Methodist. Elected railroad commissioner in 1934. A democrat.

L. J. DICKINSON, Algona.—United States Senator, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29, 1873; descendant of Nathaniel Dickinson, of Hadley, who settled in Massachusetts in 1630; graduate Cornell College, Iowa, B.S., 1898, State University of Iowa, LL.B., 1899; admitted Iowa bar 1899; located in Algona, Iowa, 1899; married, August 21, 1901, to Miss Myrtle Call; two children, L. Call and Ruth A.; served as county attorney Kossuth county two terms; committeeman tenth Iowa district on republican state central committee 1914-1918; elected to the sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, seventieth, and seventy-first congresses. Elected United States senator in 1930, term expiring March 4, 1937. Delegate-at-large to the republican national convention in 1932. A republican.

LOUIS MURPHY, Dubuque.—United States Senator, was born in Dubuque, November 6, 1876, and since has been a continuous resident of that city; third of eight children of John S. (deceased) and Ann Murphy, the former a newspaper editor; educated in public grade and high schools; newspaper reporter and editor for 20 years; collector of internal revenue for Iowa, 8 years, 1913-1920; income tax counsellor 11 years; married in 1917 to Ellen Emma McGuire; five children—Charles, Mary, Elinor Ann, Imelda and Ellen; nominated in democratic primary on June 6, 1932, in a field of five, and elected to six-year term in the United States senate on November 8, 1932. A democrat.

EDWARD CLAYTON EICHER, Washington.—Representative in Congress for the first congressional district, was born December 16, 1878, on a farm near Noble, Washington county, Iowa, son of Benjamin and Lydia Sommer Eicher; graduated from the University of Chicago in June, 1904, receiving the degree of Ph.B.; admitted to the Iowa bar in 1906 and the Illinois bar in 1907; member of the Mennonite church of Noble, Iowa, and of Alpha Delta Phi college fraternity and Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity; married on August 19, 1908, to Hazel Mount; member of governor's commission to take Iowa soldiers' vote, 1918; member Washington county, Iowa state, and American Bar Associations; delegate to democratic national convention, 1932; elected to the seventy-third congress at the November, 1932, election and re-elected to seventy-fourth congress in 1934. A democrat.

BERNHARD M. JACOBSEN, Clinton.—Representative in Congress for the second congressional district, was born in Germany March 26, 1862, coming with his parents to Clinton, Iowa, when he was fourteen years of age. At the age of twenty-three he embarked in the mercantile business in which he was continuously engaged until 1926 when he closed this out and in 1927 organized the Clinton Thrift Company of which he is now the head. Served as postmaster of Clinton from 1914 to 1923. Married, May 28th, 1886, to Miss Lena Trager of Clinton, and has five children, William S., Alma, Alvina, Marvin J. and Bernice. He is a thirty-second degree Scottish Rite Mason, member of Odd Fellows, Elks, Eagles, the Turner Society, Rotary, Kiwanis and Wapsipinicon clubs. Member of Lutheran church. Elected to seventy-second congress November, 1930, the seventy-third congress November, 1932, and the seventy-fourth congress in November, 1934. A democrat.

JOHN W. GWYNNE, Waterloo.—Representative in Congress for the third congressional district, was born in Iowa county, Iowa, October 20, 1889. Received B.A. degree in 1912 and the LL.B. degree in 1914 from the State University of Iowa. Was judge of the municipal court of the city of Waterloo for six years; county attorney of Black Hawk county for six years; served in World war with eighty-eighth division and is married and has two children. Elected to the seventy-fourth congress in November, 1934. A republican.

FRED BIERMANN, Decorah.—Representative in Congress for the fourth congressional district, was born March 20, 1884, at Rochester, Minn.; graduated from the Decorah high school in 1901; attended the University of Minnesota for three years; graduated from Columbia University with a bachelor of arts degree in 1905; attended Valder's Business College in Decorah in 1906 and Harvard Law School 1907-8; editor and publisher of the Decorah Journal, 1908-1931; married Miss Adel Rygg, January 25, 1930. During the World war was a volunteer in the United States army and served from May, 1917, until June, 1919; of this period ten months was spent overseas as first lieutenant in the eighty-eighth division. Postmaster at Decorah, 1913-1923; park commissioner at Decorah since 1923; for about twenty years was chairman of the democratic central committee of Winneshiek county, and for eight years was a member of the democratic state central committee; elected to the seventy-third congress on November 8, 1932, and re-elected to the seventy-fourth congress November 6, 1934. A democrat.

Utterback and Julia Esther Hayes (now deceased); educated in country school, Hedrick normal and commercial college, and Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa; receiving degrees of A.B. 1903, LL.B. 1906, LL.M. 1908. Member of Phi Beta Kappa, Acacia fraternity, Alpha Phi Omega, and Delta Theta Phi legal fraternity. Married October 4, 1904, to Edith Gwynne (now deceased), and they had two children—Mrs. Morris O. (Esther) Penquite and Mrs. Paul K. (Gretchen) Ashby. Married again December 25, 1934, to Mrs. Cora Alice Prine. Member of the University Church of Christ, Des Moines, Iowa; chairman, Des Moines chapter American Red Cross, 14 years;

chairman, Iowa state council Red Cross chapters, from organization to 1934, now resigned; instructor, law department, Drake University, 26 years; lecturer, Still College, 20 years; active member for Iowa of grand council, order of DeMolay for boys; chairman, court of honor, Boy Scouts of America, Des Moines, Iowa, since 1915; member Lions club; past district governor of Iowa Lions clubs; chairman, major activities committee of Lions international, 4 years; chairman; legislative committee of Iowa state conference of social work, 3 years; former vice president of Iowa humane society; lawyer; admitted to bar in 1906; police judge of Des Moines, 1912-14; judge, ninth Iowa judicial district, January 1, 1915, to January 1, 1927; elected judge, Iowa supreme court, November 8, 1932; elected to the seventy-fourth Congress in 1934; president, new members club of the seventy-fourth congress. A democrat.

OTHA D. WEARIN, Hastings.—Representative in Congress for the seventh congressional district, was born on a farm near Hastings, January 19, 1903; attended country school, graduating from Tabor Academy in 1920, and received A.B. degree from Grinnell College in 1924. GUY MARK GILLETTE, Cherokee.—Representative in Congress for the ninth congressional district, was born in Cherokee on February 3, 1879; attended and graduated from Cherokee high school, and was graduated from Drake University, Des Moines, with LL.B. degree in 1900; admitted to the bar in 1900 and commenced practice in Cherokee, Iowa; is also interested in agricultural pursuits; served as prosecuting attorney of Cherokee county, 1907-1909; member of the state senate, 1912-1916; served as sergeant in the Spanish-American war, and as captain of infantry during the World war; married Miss Rose Freeman in 1907, and they have one son; elected to the seventy-third congress in 1932, and re-elected to the seventy-fourth congress in 1934. A democrat.

Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm. For many years president of the People Savings Bank of Garrison. Was married in 1894. Elected representative from Benton county in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918, in 1922, and 1930. Appointed a member of the board of control while serving as senator in the forty-fifth general assembly. A democrat.

E. H. FELTON, Indianola.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in New Virginia, Warren county, Iowa, November 11, 1890, the son of Z. T. and Sara Felton. Educated in the New Virginia schools. Married Velda Frederick of New Virginia, March 24, 1913. Father of five children, four sons and a daughter. Is engaged in business at Indianola and New Virginia. Chairman Warren county republican central committee ten years. Selected as member Iowa republican state central committee from the seventh district in 1930. Member of the Methodist church, a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Mystic Shrine. A republican.

FRANK M. STEVENS, Garden Grove.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born on a farm near Salem, Illinois, May 14, 1872. He went to Chicago at the age of fifteen, an orphan, and became superintendent of Empire Warehouses, Inc., of Chicago, at age of 26. Married Evelyn M. Attended State University of Iowa, graduating with degree of LL.B. in June, 1906, elected police magistrate 1906 and served until 1916. Elected mayor of city of Davenport and served from April, 1924, to April, 1928. Practiced law in Davenport, Iowa, for the past twenty-seven years. Member of American Bar association; Iowa State Bar association and Scott County Bar association. HAGEMANN, Waverly.—Member of the State Highway Commission, was born December 25, 1869, in Bremer county, Iowa; graduated from the liberal arts department of the University of Iowa in 1895, and from the law school in 1896. In the early part of his career he served as superintendent of schools of Bremer county for four years; served as state senator from the Bremer-Butler district for the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies; received his party's nomination for governor in 1930 and was appointed by Governor Herring as a member of the highway commission in 1934, to complete the term of H. A. Maine. A democrat.

IRVING H. KNUDSON, Ellsworth.—Member of the State Highway Commission, was born April 27, 1896, at Jewell, Iowa. Received his education in the Jewell public schools, the Jewell Lutheran college, and the State University of Iowa. World war veteran and a member of the American Legion. Married in 1921 to Miss Leafy Bergum of Westby, Wisconsin, and they have two children living, Irving Howard and Metta Nell. Member of the Lutheran church. Engaged in the auction, real estate and general insurance business. Was elected state representative in 1924, 1926, and 1928, and state senator in 1930, and in 1934. In March 1935, while serving as state senator, received a republican appointment by the governor to the state highway commission for a four year term, beginning July 1, 1935. A republican.

Started business career as stenographer and accountant for the Iowa Pipe & Tile Co., Des Moines, in 1899, and with the exception of three years as assistant manager of the John Deere Plow Co. of Moline, has been in the clay products business continuously since 1899. Has been secretary and general manager of the Sheffield (Iowa) Brick & Tile Co. since 1923. Was the democratic nominee for the office of State Railroad Commissioner in 1928. Is a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Christian Science Church and the Hampton Rotary Club. Is chairman of the Franklin county democratic central committee and chairman of the executive committee of the Iowa Manufacturers Association. Was appointed by Gov. John Hammill to succeed Claude R. CHARLES DUMAS O'DONNELL, Des Moines.—Superintendent of Printing and ex officio Secretary of the State Printing Board, was born in St. Louis, Missouri, and at an early age became a resident of Iowa. Graduated from St. Ambrose Academy, and then became a disciple of the "art preservative of arts," i. e., a printer. Was employed on weekly and daily newspapers and in the office of the state printer as proofreader for a number of years, later as superintendent of a commercial and book publishing establishment and as manager and proprietor of a printing office. His interest in public affairs was largely manifested by activities in connection with the democratic party organization, having acted for many years as precinct committeeman, delegate to practically all county conventions for more than twenty years; a similar record for state conventions, and has participated in five national democratic conventions. Is an amateur gardener, and has served as president of the Midwest Peony and Iris Society. During the World war was volunteer K. of C. secretary at Camp Dodge. Is a charter member of the Ursa Major Society, a member of the Knights of Columbus, the Elks, and the Typographical Union. A democrat.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.—Reporter of the Supreme Court and Code Editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Woodbury county for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

A. B. FUNK.—Iowa Industrial Commissioner, was born in Adams county, Illinois, January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county, Iowa, in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900, and for three sessions was president pro tempore and chairman of ranking committee. President capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice-president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst, January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Re-appointed by Governors Harding, Hammill and Turner. A republican.

FRANK E. WENIG, Spencer.—Labor Commissioner, was born November 5, 1887, at New Albia, Iowa. When he was sixteen months of age, his parents, Jacob and Henrietta Wenig, moved to Inwood in Lyon county. He received his education in the public schools there and since 1907 has been employed by the Milwaukee railroad. Served overseas during the World war and has been post commander of the American Legion at Spencer, district commander and state vice-commander. Married and has two children: Ralph and Carolyn. He has been a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers for twenty-six years and has served on state labor legislative committees as well as being delegate to many labor conventions. Elected as a state representative from Clay county in 1932 and was appointed Labor Commissioner by Governor Herring during the session of the forty-fifth general assembly. A democrat.

J. V. PYLE, Chariton.—Fire Marshal, was born in Ottumwa, Iowa, January 27, 1903, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Pyle now living in Chariton, Iowa. Graduated from Chariton high school. Fifteen years in clothing business and active in all community activities. Member of Knights of Columbus and officer in Iowa Fireman's Association. A democrat.

JOHNSON BRIGHAM, Des Moines.—State Librarian, was born in Cherry Valley, New York, March 11, 1846. Educated at Hamilton College and Cornell University, class of 1870. Received degree of doctor of literature from Drake University, Des Moines, in 1928.

Editor, Cornell Era, 1869; editor, Cedar Rapids Republican, 1882-1893; U. S. consul at Aix la Chapelle, Germany, 1893; editor and publisher Midland Monthly, Des Moines, 1894-1899; State Librarian of Iowa since 1898; Chairman Iowa Library Commission since 1900; vice-president Farm Property Insurance Company, Des Moines; Iowa director of War Service Commission, American Library Association, 1917-1918. Author of *An Old Man's Idyll*, 1905; *The Banker in Literature*, 1910; *History of Des Moines*, 1911; *A Library in the Making*, 1912; *Life of James Harlan*, State Historical Society, 1913; *Iowa—Its History and Its Foremost Citizens*, 1916-18; *The Many-Sided Omar*, 1923; *The Sinclairs of Old Fort Des Moines*, a historical novel, 1927; *Individuality in Letters from Queen Elizabeth to Queen Anne*, 1933. Contributor to *Century*, *Forum*, *Chautauquan*, *Iowa Journal of History and Politics*, *Palimpsest*, and many other magazines.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.—Curator, son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Indiana, February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; attended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake University, completing the law course with degree of LL.B., A.M.; admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902; appointed by Charles Aldrich assistant curator of the historical department of Iowa, 1907; acting curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected curator by board of trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National Sculpture society; member American Historical association; a founder and member of board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical association; member and secretary Iowa Flag commission; member and secretary Allison Memorial commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life commission; member and director Des Moines Fine Arts association; member American Civic association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour of 1913.

WILLIAM J. CASEY, Knoxville.—Member of the State Printing Board, was born in Cambridge, Ohio, Aug. 28, 1861, only child of James K. and Hannah J. Casey. In 1867 the family removed to Knoxville, Iowa. Learned the printer's trade and worked at the case until in 1884, when he and the late Frank Steunenberg, afterward governor of Idaho, leased the Marion County Express, which they changed to Knoxville Express, and of which Mr. Casey has continued as editor to this time. Mr. Casey married Lena D. Parks, June 15, 1887, and they are the parents of three sons. James C. and William D. are associated with their father in the publication of the Express; John H. is associate professor of journalism in the University of Oklahoma. Mr. Casey was a delegate from the capital district to the democratic national convention of 1912; a delegate-at-large in 1920 and again a delegate from the district in the Madison Square Garden convention of 1924. He was postmaster of Knoxville, 1915-1923. A democrat.

LEO J. CARLE, Mason City.—Member of the State Printing Board, was born at Charles City, Iowa, August 18, 1897, son of George W. and Belle Carle. Graduated from St. Joseph's parochial school of Mason City in 1916. First job was carrier boy for Globe-Gazette, a job he held for six years. Was with pressroom for two and one-half years, in composing room four years, spent year with Cedar Rapids Gazette, six months with Cedar Rapids Republican and returned to Globe-Gazette. Married June 8, 1927, to Ethel C. Pattschull, and they have two children, Patricia Ann and Leo John. Member of St. Joseph's Catholic church; a charter member of the young democratic club of Cerro Gordo county; belongs to K. of C., Typographical Union, and has served as president of Iowa Composing Room Executives during years of 1933, 1934, 1935. A democrat.

ARTHUR ROBERT COBEY, Des Moines.—Secretary of the Iowa State Fair Board, was born July 25, 1881, in Richland county, Wisconsin. His parents moved to Kossuth county, Iowa, in 1883, where he resided on a farm until seventeen years old. He received his education in the public schools of Kossuth county and graduated from Toland's Business University in 1903. He moved to Des Moines July 1, 1908, to become clerk in the office of the State Labor Commissioner. He served in that capacity until February 1, 1908, when he was appointed assistant secretary of the State Board of Agriculture. He occupied this position until February 1, 1911, when he was elected secretary of the Iowa State Fair Board.

FRANK J. COLBY, Forest City.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born on a farm in Dane county, Wisconsin, September 13, 1884. Norwegian descent. Moved to Winnebago county, Iowa, in 1898. Graduated from the Keokuk Dental College, specializing in oral surgery. Was chief of the auxiliary to the Federal department of justice and special agent in the state department of justice during the World war. President of the Forest City chamber of commerce for three terms. Trustee of the Forest City community foundation. Member of the Lions Club, I. O. O. F. and Knights of Pythias lodges. Also member of several national and state sportsmen's organizations. Lifetime hobby has been conservation work, fishing, hunting and skeet shooting. A democrat.

W. C. BOONE, Ottumwa.—Member of Iowa State Conservation, was born at Afton, Iowa, July 4, 1880, and attended high school at Leon, Iowa. He took undergraduate work at Drake University and his professional course, leading to degree of doctor of dental surgery, at the University of Pennsylvania, 1903. Located in Ottumwa, Iowa, May, 1904, having since continued practicing in this location. Past president of Ottumwa dental study club, Wapello county dental society, southeastern dental society, and state dental society. Member of the fish and game commission and acted as chairman for four years. Member of the present state conservation commission, six year appointment, starting July 1, 1935. A republican.

EVERETT E. SPEAKER, Lake View.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born December 29, 1876, at Haldans, Ogle county, Illinois, and moved to Iowa in 1881, residing on a farm in Tama county until parents moved to Toledo, Iowa, in 1889. Graduated from Toledo high school in 1892. After attending Western College, Toledo, for two years he entered the State University of Iowa, graduating in medicine in 1897. Located in Lake View, Iowa, in the same year and has practiced continually there since, and he has been health physician since 1897, and was former mayor of Lake City and present member of park commission. A democrat.

LOGAN BLIZZARD, McGregor.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Jasper county, Iowa, on September 8, 1879; educated in the public schools and the Newton Normal College at Newton, Iowa; taught school in the country schools of Jasper county for a period of 4 years; moved to McGregor, Iowa, in 1917, and has been interested in the crushed stone, sand and gravel industry since that time. Appointed a republican member of the Iowa state conservation commission, May 17, 1935, by Governor Clyde Herring. A republican.

WILLIAM ALFRED BURHANS, Burlington.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Burlington, Iowa, October 16, 1864. His ancestors came from Holland in 1660 and settled in New York state. This old Dutch stock included Jacob Burhans who was justice magistrate at Kingston, New York, and later appointed collector by order of the noble Stuyvesant. Mr. Burhans is the direct descendant of two lieutenants, three sergeants, and twenty-four privates who served their country in the Revolutionary war. Denslow Burhans, the father of Mr. Burhans, came to Iowa when Burlington had no railroads and transportation was made by water ways. As a young man of twenty-one years of age, Mr. Burhans went out to southwest Kansas to engage in the cattle business. Later in life, Mr. Burhans went to Florida where he found much interest in roaming the swamps where he found strange bird life and many game fish. When the hot Iowa sun blazes down in August Mr. Burhans seeks relief among the lakes in northern Minnesota where the wall-eyed pike abound and where the tall pines form cathedral towers affording man time to appreciate nature and all of her handiwork. Mr. Burhans has been in the candy business for nearly forty years. He is connected with the Clinton Copeland Candy Company of which firm he serves as vice president. A democrat.

MRS. HENRY FRANKEL, Des Moines.—Chairman of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Rock Island, Illinois, and attended public schools there. Graduated from Vassar College in 1909. She has two daughters, Margo and Babette, now in college. Mrs. Frankel has lived in Des Moines twenty-four years and is active in civic affairs, including musical and garden club activities and Audubon societies. She served as vice-chairman of conservation committee of Iowa Federation of women's clubs, and succeeded Mrs. Hanford McNider on board of conservation commission in January, 1927, serving as chairman of that board for two years. Rendered valuable service on conservation board until appointed to new Iowa state conservation commission on May 17, 1935.

Awarded Pugsley medal in 1933 in recognition of work in preserving scenic and historic sites. A republican.

ARTHUR E. RAPP, Council Bluffs.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born and reared in western Iowa, where he has seen the lands of that part of the state gradually come under the control of private ownership, and the streams converted into drainage ditches, and the privilege of the people to have reasonable access to public areas curtailed. His interest in conservation has therefore been of long standing. He was appointed by Governor Turner on the fish and game commission when that organization was created and was reappointed by Governor Herring and upon the merging of the fish and game commission with the board of conservation, he was again appointed by Governor Herring. Mr. Rapp is an ardent horticulturist, having a life membership in the state horticultural society. For 15 years he was building inspector having in charge the enforcing of regulatory ordinance for the city of Council Bluffs. Was vice president of the state federation of garden clubs. In his spare time Mr. Rapp devotes his time to his garden and orchard near Council Bluffs. A democrat.

M. L. HUTTON, Ames.—Director, Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born February 11, 1886, on a farm in Washington county, Iowa. Attended public schools in Columbus City and Columbus Junction. Was a student at Iowa State College, civil engineering department, during the period of September, 1905, to May, 1909, being in the employ of the C. M. & St. P. Ry. on Pacific coast extension in Montana and Washington for fifteen months of the above period; in maintenance of way department of Great Northern Railway in Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, and Manitoba, Canada, from May, 1909, to August, 1910; engaged in drainage engineering work in Humboldt county from September, 1910, to December, 1911; served as county engineer of Louisa county during 1912, 1913, and 1914; engaged in private engineering practice the first half of 1915, and in general engineering work for the Central States Engineering Company of Muscatine, Iowa, the second half of 1915; served as county engineer of Des Moines county in 1916, 1917, and seven months of 1918; in employ of Iowa State Highway Commission from June, 1919, to July, 1929, having charge of road work at state institutions under Board of Education and Board of Control at different times during this period, and performing technical work for Board of Conservation, and, at times, for the state Executive Council and fish and game department; served as head of department of road administration for four years; had charge of railroad crossing negotiations for highway commission for two years; served as administrator for Board of Conservation from July, 1929, to May, 1935; served as chief engineer of emergency conservation work for Iowa in connection with CCC camp work in state parks and preserves from April, 1933, to January, 1935; served as project supervisor of state planning board project, engaged in surveys of lakes, rivers and streams and the improvement thereof from the spring of 1934, to date; also, as technical advisor for several other planning board projects. On April 25, 1913, Mr. Hutton married Miss Tecla Johnson of Hallock, Minnesota, and has one son, Donald.

W. L. STRUNK, Decorah.—Chairman of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born in New Ulm, Minnesota, August 14, 1901. Graduate of Irving grade school, and South high school, Minneapolis, 1918; graduate of University of Minnesota, 1922, Bachelor of Arts degree and in 1923 with Master of Science degree, majors for both of above degrees being zoology and geology. From 1923 to 1925 was mine examiner for an eastern concern; from 1925 to 1927 was chemist in charge of laboratories of Twin City plant of Ford Motor Company; 1927-1928, head of department of chemistry, North Dakota State School of Science, Wahpeton, North Dakota; and from 1928 to present, head of department of biology, Luther College, Decorah, Iowa. Doctor of Science degree was obtained from University of Michigan in 1931, major for degree being biology and paleontology.

EDWARD A. BENBROOK, Ames.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born in South Orange, New Jersey, May 15, 1892. Graduated from South Orange high school in June, 1910. Graduated from the school of veterinary medicine, University of Pennsylvania with the degree M.D. in June, 1914. Assistant pathologist and instructor in bacteriology, veterinary school, University of Pennsylvania, 1914-1915. Instructor and assistant professor of veterinary science, Oklahoma Agricultural College, 1915-1918. Associate professor of veterinary research at Iowa State College,

1918-1919. Professor and head of department of veterinary pathology, Iowa State College, 1919 to date. Married Jessie C. Whittle of Millington, New Jersey, in 1917. They have two children.

JOSEPH H. HALL, Iowa City.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born in New Jersey, September 19, 1895. Received the A.B. degree in 1915 and the Ph.D. degree in 1920 from the University of Pennsylvania, where he was professor of zoology prior to 1929. Since 1929, he has been professor and head of the department of zoology at the State University of Iowa. Served in medical corps in A.E.F. during World war. A Methodist, Mason and member of Kiwanis club.

BENJAMIN H. PETERSON, Cedar Rapids.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born June 6, 1893, at Macedonia, Iowa, and attended country school and high school at that place. Graduated from Coe College in 1918. Served in the A. E. F. for one year, with the base laboratory No. 1. Received master of science degree in 1924 and doctor of philosophy degree in 1926 from the State University of Iowa. Since 1928, has served as head of the department of chemistry at Coe College. Married, 1921, to Eda Swenson, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and they have one child, Roger Franklyn. Member of the American Chemical Society, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Sigma Xi, and Presbyterian church.

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd-numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the general assembly is \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the general assembly motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are copied (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state. Following adjournment they are printed under the direction of the superintendent of printing.

Married Mabel Johnson of Webster county February 17, 1916, and has six children. Mr. Anderson is a liberal in politics and religion and a member of the B. P. O. E. A democrat.

DR. CARL ASCHENBRENNER, Pella.—Senator from the fifteenth district composed of Marion and Monroe counties, was born in 1866 in a log cabin in Benton county, Iowa. He was married in the year 1888 to Elizabeth H. Jergens from Will county, Illinois, and they have four children, two boys and two girls. He grew up on a Tama county farm near the town of Dysart and attended public school until seventeen years of age. Graduated from Iowa state college of medicine in 1894, and practiced medicine in Dysart for twelve years; moved to Pella in 1906, where he has since followed his profession. He served in the World war as captain; is a member of the American Legion, the Masonic order, and has been a member of the Welfare league in Pella for sixteen years. Serving his first term in the Senate. A democrat.

BEARDSLEY, New Virginia.—Senator from the eleventh district composed of Clarke and Warren counties, son of William and Carrie Shane Beardsley, born at Beacon, Mahaska county, Iowa, May 13, 1901. Grew to manhood at Birmingham, Van Buren county, Iowa, and graduated from the schools of that place, also a graduate in pharmacy and chemistry. At present engaged in business at New Virginia. Married Charlotte Ellen Manning of Birmingham, Iowa, and has five children: James Blaine, Charlotte Shane, Mary Jane, and Dan Richard, living, one son, William Jr., deceased. Member of several Masonic bodies and I. O. O. F. Elected to Senate in 1932. Republican caucus chairman of the forty-sixth general assembly. A republican.

ANDREW BELL, Denison.—Senator from the thirty-fourth district, comprising Crawford, Monona, and Harrison counties, was born in Aspinwall, Crawford county, Iowa, December 7, 1886. Spent entire life, with the exception of six years, in the retail drug business, in that community. For the past twenty-five years has followed the growing and shipping of Muscatine island products. Received education in Muscatine county, and attended business and normal college. Was married in 1908 to Jessie E. Smith of Chariton, Iowa, and they have two children, Donald and Marjorie. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and belongs to all the Masonic orders. Elected to the senate in 1934. A republican.

A. CLAIRE DEWEY, Washington.—Senator from the tenth district, composed of Henry and Washington counties, was born in Washington, Iowa, September 1, 1886, the son of Seneca B. Dewey and Elinora Smouse Dewey. Educated in the Washington schools, the Washington academy and graduated from Drake university, department of commerce, in 1906. T. F. DRISCOLL, Fort Madison.—Senator from the first district, Lee county, was born at Belfast, Iowa, November 16, 1896, of Irish parentage. Educated in grade schools and high school in Farmington, Iowa. Married to Margaret Rita Burke of Argyle, Iowa, and they have two sons and six daughters. World war veteran and belongs to numerous societies and lodges. Engaged in farming and the production of stone products. Elected senator in 1934. A democrat.

LEO ELTHON, Fertile.—Senator from the forty-first district, comprising Werth, Winnemago and Mitchell counties, was born in Fertile, Iowa, June 9, 1898, and is now engaged in general farming. He attended the elementary schools at Fertile and graduated from the

high school there in 1917. Later he attended the Augsburg seminary, Minneapolis, Minnesota, Iowa State Teachers college, Cedar Falls, and Hamilton's University of Commerce, Mason City, Iowa. He taught school during two years, 1918 and 1919, instructing manual training and athletics at Clear Lake, Iowa, and later as principal in the high school at Fertile. He started farming in 1920. His farming operations include truck gardening, pickle processing, and in the winter, cattle and hog feeding. He was married to Synneva Hjelmeland of Fertile, February 28, 1922, and has two sons and three daughters. A republican.

MIKE G. FISCH, LeMars.—Senator from the forty-sixth district, composed of Plymouth, Cherokee and Ida counties, was born in Germany in 1892. Immigrated to Keokuk county, Iowa, with his parents while an infant, and was reared on a farm in Keokuk county. Attended country school, and graduated from the Sigourney high school. Attended the State University of Iowa in 1912 and 1913. He has been connected with the clothing business the past seventeen years. Active in American Legion and B. P. O. Elks. Elected state senator in 1932. A democrat.

M. X. GESKE, McGregor.—Senator from the thirty-sixth district, Clayton county, was born at McGregor, Iowa, of German parents. F. F. Geske and Sophia Geske, both having migrated to the United States from Germany. He is a member of a family of fourteen and was raised on a farm and graduated from the McGregor high school. Clerked in a country store and taught country schools and with the earnings attended and graduated from the Valparaiso normal school at Valparaiso, Indiana, in 1898, after which he taught in the public schools at Windom, Minnesota, and was superintendent of schools at Lake Crystal, Minnesota, and then attended the University of Minnesota for a period of two years. Later read law with D. D. Murphy at Elkader, Iowa, and graduated from the law school at Drake university at Des Moines, Iowa, and has been in the practice of law at McGregor since his admission to the bar. He has served as a member of the public school board at McGregor, one time president of said board; also served as councilman and mayor of the town of McGregor from time to time. Main occupation has been farming and real estate business and some years in the general mercantile business. Was elected to the senate in 1934. A democrat.

H. J. GRUNEWALD, Van Horne.—Senator from forty-fifth district, composed of Benton and Tama counties, was born on a farm near Blairstown, Iowa. Attended Northern Indiana normal school for three years at Valparaiso, Indiana. Married Gertrude Helen Giesecke of St. Louis in 1913 and has two sons, John, 20, attending Iowa State college; Henry, 17, graduate of Blairstown high school; and twin daughters, Marie and Emma, 14, attending Blairstown high school. Has engaged in farming since 1900. Became a master farmer in 1930. Serving first term in senate. A democrat.

VINCENT F. HARRINGTON, Sioux City.—Senator from the thirty-second district, was born on May 16, 1903, in Sioux City, Iowa, the son of Thomas F. Harrington and Maria (O'Leary) Harrington. Attended Cathedral grammar school, Sioux City, Iowa, Trinity college academy, Sioux City, Iowa, and the University of Notre Dame, Notre Dame, Indiana, where he was graduated in June, 1925, from the college of liberal arts. Following graduation, he was employed by Columbia university at Portland, Oregon, as instructor in history, economics and athletic director. In 1927 he returned to Sioux City, where he associated with his father in the Continental Mortgage company as treasurer and assistant manager. On June 7, 1929, he was married to Catherine O'Connor of Homer, Nebraska. They have two daughters, Catherine Tim and Patricia Ann. Elected senator in 1932. A democrat.

He was educated in the rural schools and the Guthrie county high school, the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa, and the Valparaiso Normal school, Valparaiso, Indiana. He taught four years in the rural schools of Iowa and Nebraska, served seven years as principal of the Bassett village schools, eight years as county superintendent of Rock county, Nebraska, twelve years as president of the township school board and eleven years on the county board of education. He was married in 1894 to Anna Laura Green of Kirkwood, Nebraska. They have five children: Margie, Mark, Macey, Dorothy, and Donald. He has always taken an active part in politics and in the public welfare work of his community. He was elected representative in 1926, 1928, and 1930, and senator in 1932. A republican.

Has spent his entire life except seven years in the community in which he now resides, receiving his education in the schools of that county. Was married January 23, 1899, to Elna E. Kale, and to this union were born four children: Cresley, Esther, Merrill, and Maurice. Maurice died at the age of four years. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church, having served on the official board for more than thirty years. A member of the county and state Sunday school associations. Has given Sunday school talks in almost every church in Madison county and in a great many churches in adjoining counties, often being called on to fill the pulpit for pastors of his county. Active in Hi. Y. and boys' club work. Active in farm bureau and local activities. Rendered a great many years of service on township school boards. Was on local finance board during World war. He was reared on a farm and has always been actively engaged in farming and stock raising. Elected as representative from Madison county in 1930 and as senator in 1932. A republican.

H. L. IRWIN, DeWitt.—Senator from the twenty-second district, Clinton county, was born on a farm near Belle Plaine, Iowa, May 15, 1897. Educated in grade schools, graduated from high school in Belle Plaine, Iowa. Served in the field artillery, officers' training camp in Zachary, Kentucky, during the World war. B. A. degree, 1919; graduate of college of law with LL. B. degree, 1921, from State University of Iowa. Attended University of Michigan. Married to Helen Muriel Shoemith of Guthrie Center, Iowa, 1921. Practiced in the city of Cedar Rapids for a period of about one year after graduation from the state university, and thereafter practiced law in Clinton county in the town of Grand Mound, and the city of DeWitt, Iowa. Member of the state bar association, P. A. D. law fraternity, Phi Kappa Sigma literary fraternity, and Masonic and K. P. orders. Church preference, Methodist. Parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. He has lived on the farm most of his life, receiving his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant Strattons business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rite, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Eagles, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918, 1922, 1926, 1930 and 1934. A republican.

IRVING H. KNUDSON, Ellaworth.—Senator from the thirty-seventh district. (Biography appears elsewhere as a member of the state highway commission.)

CHARLES E. MALONE, Atlantic.—Senator from the eighteenth district, composed of Cass and Shelby counties, was born on a farm in Cass county, Iowa, October 24, 1881. Attended country school in that county. He has been interested in growing and exhibiting of purebred seed corn and grains for over thirty years, and served as assistant superintendent of the Iowa department of agriculture at World's fair at St. Louis, Missouri, in 1903. Married to Edna E. Harris, April 18, 1906, and has two sons: Claude and Cecil. Engaged in farming and operating seed store. Served as county treasurer for two terms, and as county supervisor for three terms in Cass county. Was elected to senate November, 1934. A democrat.

WM. MCARTHUR, Mason City.—Senator from the forty-third district, composed of Cerro Gordo, Franklin, and Hancock counties, was born in Cerro Gordo county, July 15, 1886. Attended country school and graduated in animal husbandry at Iowa State college in 1910 and given professional master degree in 1923. Member, Adelante fraternity and Alpha Zeta honorary agricultural fraternity, and the winning college corn judging team of 1908. Married December 5, 1911, to Avice L. O'Neill, Clear Lake, Iowa, and has three children: Dan Neil, Avice L., and Maxine. Managed large group of farms in Oklahoma, 1910 to 1914, and since then engaged in general farming and livestock feeding five miles northeast of Mason City, Iowa. Also specializes in seed corn, soybeans, and polled Hereford cattle. Originator of Golden King seed corn. He has judged corn and livestock at numerous county, district, and state shows and has served several years as secretary of township school board and member county board of education. Has been director of farm bureau and cooperative elevator and director and president of the North Iowa fair. Honored by Wallace's Farmer in 1926 by selection to first group of master farmers. MILLEN, Morley.—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties, born near Morley, Iowa, January 7, 1867, where he has lived all his life excepting the years from 1917 to 1926, when his business called him to live in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He was distributor for the Buick Motor company during the years 1910 to 1926, and has the distinction of being the only man or firm who shipped automobiles by the train load into the state of Iowa. Besides his farming business, he conducted a general store at Morley for a period of fourteen years, also has been interested in the banking busi-

ness during these years, and has built up and at this time maintains one of the largest and most select herd of pure bred Aberdeen Angus cattle in the world, and he is the largest individual farmer in Jones or Cedar counties. Elected to the senate in 1932. A democrat.

PAUL L. MILLHORN, Clarinda.—Senator from the seventh district, composed of Page and Fremont counties, was born in Page county, Iowa, December 8, 1892. He was educated in the public schools of Page county, Iowa, and graduated from Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, and from Western Reserve law school of Cleveland, Ohio. He has practiced law in Shenandoah and Clarinda, Iowa, since 1922. He was county attorney of Page county from 1925 to 1931. He was married to Margaret Griffith of Des Moines, Iowa, in June, 1926, and has three children: Martha Mary, Margaret Ruth, and John Paul. Lydon of Postville, Iowa, and family consists of four children: Mary, Lorretta, Ellen, Thomas W., Jr. Serving first term in the senate. A democrat.

FRED W. NELSON, Nevada.—Senator from the thirty-first district, composed of Boone and Story counties, was born April 7, 1886, in Story county, Iowa. He received his early education in the rural schools and later at Highland Park college at Des Moines, and at Iowa State college. Was married to Edna R. Smith, February 22, 1911, and has four children: Avis Vere, Richard F., Robert L., and Donald L. Served as township clerk eighteen years, as board member of the Story county farm bureau four years, treasurer three years, and president three years. He is a member of the Nevada lodge No. 99, A. F. and A. M., and was master of that order in 1926, and is also member of O. E. S. Served as a member and president of the North Grant consolidated school board, and is board member of the Farmers Elevator company and Farmers Grain Dealers association of Iowa. G. W. PATTERSON, Burt.—Senator from the forty-seventh district, including Emmet, Palo Alto, Clay, Dickinson and Kossuth counties, was born at Burt, Iowa, September 4, 1887, of Scotch parentage. Graduate of Burt high school. Graduated from Iowa State college, animal husbandry department, 1909. Married December 26, 1913, to Miss Eva

M. Stensrud, Lake Mills, Iowa. Has three children: Donald W., Virginia Mae, and Kenneth Howard. Business, farming and stock feeding. Elected to house of representatives, 1922; re-elected in 1924 and 1926. Elected senator in 1928; re-elected 1932. A republican.

CAROLYN CAMPBELL PENDRAY, Maquoketa.—Senator from the twenty-third district, Jackson county, was born at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, the daughter of the late Thomas Franklin Campbell and Harriett Emily Dutton. Her professional record of twenty years' teaching includes seven years as county superintendent of schools of Henry county and the teaching of methods in summer school sessions at Iowa Wesleyan college. She is the wife of W. J. Pendray, a merchant of Maquoketa, to whom she was married in 1920. An active worker in the democratic party, for years a member of the state central committee serving as chairwoman in the second congressional district. A member of the Congregational church, P. E. ROELOFS, Sioux Center.—Senator from the forty-ninth district, including Lyon, O'Brien, Osceola and Sioux counties, was born at Prinsburg, Kandiyohi county, Minnesota, June 6, 1900, of Dutch descent parents, Evert Jans Roelofs and Jessie de Vries. Graduated from country school, Calvin preparatory school, Grand Rapids, Michigan, in 1918, and Calvin college, in 1921; attended University of Minnesota 1919, University of Michigan 1922. Married in 1921 to Henrietta Ryskamp, Grand Rapids, Michigan, and they have two sons: Wallace Gerald and Rodman Glenn. He was admitted to the bar in May, 1889. He removed to Grand Island, Nebraska, in 1890, returning to Oskaloosa in 1895, where he has since lived. Elected senator in 1932. A democrat.

ALBERT J. SHAW, Pocahontas.—Senator from the fiftieth district, composed of Buena Vista, Humboldt and Pocahontas counties, was born in Wisconsin, son of P. J. and Jennie A. Shaw. Moved to Iowa with parents when five years of age. Educated at Cornell college and Drake university. A lawyer and served as county attorney 1910-1920. Trustee Buena Vista college. Elected senator in 1934. A republican.

CLAUDE STANLEY, Corning.—Senator from the sixth district, composed of Adams and Taylor counties, was born on a farm near Milo, Iowa, sixty-two years ago. He received his early education in a country school and graduated from Corning academy at Corning, Iowa, in 1892. Taught school 1892-1898 and was principal of school at Carlisle, Iowa, 1896-1897. During time he taught school he studied law, attending Drake university during the summer terms and graduated from that school in 1900 with degree of LL. B., and since that time he has practiced his profession at Corning as a member of the law firm of Stanley & Stanley. Served as city attorney from 1902-1904, county attorney from 1904-1908, and as member of school board, of which he was president from 1927-1932. GEO. A. WILSON, Des Moines.—Senator from the thirtieth district, Polk county. Born on a farm in Adair county. Youngest son of James H. Wilson and Martha G. Wilson. Married Mildred Zehner, December 8, 1921. Graduated from Menlo high school, attended college at Grinnell, graduate of the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907. Began practicing law immediately in the city of Des Moines. Was elected county attorney for one term. Served as judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, for a period of over two years, resigning from this position to again enter the practice of law. Elected to the senate in 1928, 1930, and re-elected in 1934. A republican.

Member of Catholic church and Knights of Columbus. Serving first term in legislature. A democrat.

MARTIN E. BENZ, Lawler.—Representative from Chickasaw county, was born May 5, 1884, on a farm near Lawler, Iowa. He married Miss Margaret C. Lundby of Harlan, Iowa, May 7, 1915. Their family consists of one daughter, Maurine. Mr. Benz spent twenty-eight years in Canton, South Dakota, in the meat business, and for six years has engaged in farming in Chickasaw county, Iowa. He is a member of the Lutheran church and the Masonic lodge. Elected representative in 1934. A republican.

LEWIS BLATTSPIELER, Manly.—Representative from Worth county, was born at Ackley, Iowa, July 29, 1886. Educated in the Ackley public schools and a graduate of the Highland Park college school of pharmacy, Des Moines. Married to Miss Amelia Halstad, August 18, 1915, and has three children, two girls and one boy. Is a member of the English Lutheran church and the Masonic order, including the Shrine.

He is now engaged in the drug business in Manly, Iowa. Elected member of the house of representatives in 1934. A democrat.

ROBERT D. BLUE, Eagle Grove.—Representative from Wright county, was born in Eagle Grove, Iowa on September 24, 1898. Educated in the public schools of Eagle Grove, the Iowa State College, and the college of law at Drake university. Has engaged in the active practice of law at Eagle Grove since 1922, served as county attorney of Wright county from October 6, 1924 to January 1, 1931, and as city attorney of Eagle Grove. Alternate delegate to the republican national convention in Chicago in 1932. Married to Cathlene Beale of Tama and has two children, Barbara and Donald. Member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Phi Alpha Delta fraternities, Masonic lodge and Methodist church. A republican.

A. H. BONNSTETTER, West Bend.—Representative from Kossuth county, was born on a farm near West Bend, Iowa, November 20, 1892. He was educated in the schools of this locality and took a two-year normal course at Highland Park college. Toland, and has one son, Virgil L. Actively identified in his home community first as school treasurer, then as secretary for twenty-five years. A member of the Union county board of education from the time of the enactment of the law creating that body to the present. Republican precinct committeeman twenty-five years. Member of the I. O. O. Father having died in 1882, moved with mother and sister to a farm in Clarke county, Iowa, in the spring of 1888. With exception of about five years, has lived in Clarke county since that time. Was married in 1905 to Luella M. Cannon, a Clarke county teacher. Has two daughters, Helen and Virginia. Attended Simpson school of business, Indianola, Iowa, and taught one year in same school and later in business schools in Maryville, Missouri, and DeSoto, Missouri. Returned to Iowa in 1908 to engage in office work and later was traveling salesman for about eighteen years. Was member and president of Osceola school board and at present is engaged in life insurance business. A member of Christian church. Serving first term. A republican.

MARLEY D. CLARK, Mt. Vernon.—Representative from Linn county, the son of Oliver and Barbara Clark, was born in Linn county. His paternal grandfather came to the county in 1837, with William Abbe, who was the first settler to bring his family

into the county. He has spent his entire life on the same farm on which he was born with the exception of three years, one year of which was spent in travel in the United States, and two of which he was salesman for the Austin Western Company, selling road machinery. At one time he owned one of the best herds of shorthorn cattle and poland china hogs in eastern Iowa. Received his education in the public schools and business courses. Has always been active in civic and patriotic organizations. Married in 1929 to Byrd Snyder of Cedar Rapids. Attends Presbyterian church. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

HARRY F. COPPLAND, Waukeo.—Representative from Dallas county, was born on a farm near Chenos, McLean county, Illinois. He attended country schools in Illinois; moved to Waukeo, Dallas county, Iowa, in 1894. Was married March 24, 1904, to Abbie E. Jones, who passed away January 6, 1926. They had two children, Wilma A. and Ralph C. Has been actively engaged in farming and stock feeding since moving to Iowa. Member of the county board of supervisors for two terms. Served as representative in the forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-sixth general assemblies. A democrat.

W. H. CRAMER, Emerson.—Representative from Mills county, was born in Warren county, Illinois, November 27, 1870. Came to Iowa with parents, January 1, 1880, where they located on a farm in Pottawattamie county. He married Lizzie Reynolds December 23, 1894, and they have three children: Alva, Earl, and one daughter, Mrs. Gayle Greenwood. Moved to a farm in Mills county, March 1, 1900, and has been a farmer practically all his life. Has also been an auctioneer for thirty-five years. JESSE E. CUNDY, Cedar Falls.—Representative from Black Hawk county, one of a family of eleven children, was born March 23, 1876, on a farm in Taylor county, near Corning, Iowa. Received his education in the rural schools, the Iowa State Teachers college and the University of Arkansas. On December 25, 1902, he married Minnie L. Newton of Newell, Iowa, to which union was born Dorothy Jean (deceased), Mrs. Carol Walden, Lyons, Nebraska, John and Annabel at home. Mr. Cundy began teaching school in 1894, and has acted in the capacity of rural school teacher, city superintendent, county superintendent, consolidated school superintendent and instructor in Iowa State Teachers college. A member of the Methodist church. The only democrat ever to be elected to the legislature from Black Hawk county. Elected in 1934. A democrat.

JOHN CUNNINGHAM, Humboldt.—Representative from Humboldt county, was born on a farm, February 28, 1870, at Meriden, Illinois. Came to Humboldt county February, 1881. Attended public schools and lived on a farm. Attended Northern Illinois normal school and Dixon business college 1887 to 1892. Taught school in Humboldt

and Webster counties, Iowa, 1892 to 1893. Operated a farmers cooperative creamery at Badger, Iowa, 1894. Farmed in Humboldt county, 1895 to 1900. Held the offices of township trustee, township assessor and member of school board in Beaver township, Humboldt county, Iowa. Elected county auditor of Humboldt county in 1900. Served as county attorney of Humboldt county; member of town council of Humboldt; mayor of town council of Humboldt; member of school board of Humboldt; member of exemption board for Humboldt county during war. Admitted to the bar and practiced law in Humboldt since 1907. Married, 1893, to Anna Johnson of Humboldt county, Iowa, and has eight children—four boys and four girls. A Congregationalist, Mason and Odd Fellow. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

PAUL H. CUNNINGHAM, Des Moines.—Representative from Polk county, was born on a farm in Indiana county, Pennsylvania, June 15, 1890. A graduate of the University of Michigan. Married, has three children, Paul Harvey, Jr., Edward Plummer and Harriet Sarah. Wife's name Gail Walter. A lawyer. Member of the law firm of Cunningham and Scott of Des Moines, Iowa. A world war veteran. Serving second term in the legislature. A republican.

GLENN CURTIS, Cherokee.—Representative from Cherokee county, was born and raised on the farm he now operates, February 8, 1893, son of M. H. and Jane G. Curtis. His educational training was received in the rural schools of the county, high school at Cherokee, Iowa, and college at the University of Oregon. Mr. Curtis has been active in community affairs, being chairman of Pilot township school board for many years, and chairman of the Cherokee county corn-hog control association in its initial year of operation. He married Bessie Rebecca Hagan in 1914, to whom were born four children, William 20, Josephine 18, Dale 16, and Charlotte 12. He is a member of the Methodist church, and was elected to the legislature in 1934. A democrat.

DAVID A. DANCER, Lamoni.—Representative from Decatur county, was born at Lamoni, October 7, 1896, the son of David and Anna A. Dancer, pioneer Decatur county residents. He attended the public schools of Lamoni and was graduated from the State University of Iowa in 1917. He spent twenty-two months in the army holding a commission as first lieutenant. Has been actively engaged in live stock raising and farming since March 1, 1919. Married to Florence Messerli of West Union in November, 1917, and they have three daughters, Jane, Alice and Jo Ann. Charter member of Ralph A. Judson post of American Legion at Lamoni. Served on town council eight years. Member of board of directors of Farmers Grain and Seed company; president Decatur county wheat association; chairman of board, Lamoni co-op. creamery association. Serving first term in legislature. A republican.

HARRY E. DANIELS, Churdan.—Representative from Greene county, was born in Somerset county, Pennsylvania, November 18, 1867. Was married March 1, 1893, to Cora B. Warner. He has two boys, Robert and Walter. He was born and raised on a farm, and was engaged in the nursery business for ten years in Somerset county. From there he moved to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania where he entered into the jewelry business with his brother. He remained there until twenty-five years ago at which time he moved to Greene county, Iowa and he has resided there since that time. He served as mayor for two years and was active in all civic and progressive affairs. He is a member of I. O. O. F. and Rebecca lodges, Order of Eastern Star, Masonic lodge and Shrine. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

BEN B. DORAN, Grand Junction.—Representative from Boone county, was born in Beaver, Iowa, March 24, 1884, being one of thirteen children born to Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Doran. Was educated in the public school of Beaver, and attended the University of Iowa for one year. Coughlin at Georgetown, Iowa, and has four sons: L. A., in partnership with him in retail lumber business at Albia, F. P., an attorney at Albia, John D., with the Continental Illinois National bank of Chicago, and Paul J., with Standard Brands, New York. VICTOR FELTER, Indianola.—Representative from Warren county, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1877. In 1915 Mr. Felter was in charge of Iowa's famous Horn of Plenty at the San Francisco exposition. He was also president of the exposition agricultural club. He has judged agricultural and horticultural products at numerous county and district fairs, as well as our own and other state fairs. Was county agriculture agent for eight years beginning in 1918. Moved to present location in Warren county in 1926, where he has been president of farm bureau, farmers institute, school board, etc. Has a large commercial orchard. EARL C. FISHBAUGH, JR., Shenandoah.—Representative from Page county, was born in the city of Shenandoah in Page county, Iowa, December 27, 1909, the elder son of Earl C. Member Delta Theta Phi law fraternity, and affiliated with the Presbyterian church. Elected to the legislature in 1934. A republican.

JOE FLYNN, Decorah.—Representative from Winneshiek county, was born on a farm at Bumpus Ridge, Fayette county, Iowa, August 8, 1902. He was educated in the local rural schools, graduated from New Hampton high school and attended Iowa State Teachers college at Cedar Falls. In 1933 he entered newspaper work as a feature writer. He travelled extensively throughout North America as a contributor of features to newspapers and magazines. He was formerly of the adjutant general's office, war department, Washington, D. C. During his newspaper career he has been associate editor of the Decorah Journal, at Decorah, Iowa. He spent four years in publicity work for corporations in the southern half of the United States and has been actively identified with sports promotion. In 1934 he developed Niagara cave on the Iowa-Minnesota line and at present is engaged in publicity work in connection with it. Serving his first term. He is unmarried. A democrat.

LAMAR FOSTER, West Branch.—Representative from Cedar county, was born on a farm in Illinois, April 4, 1898; graduated from high school and attended James Milliken university as a member of the student army training corps. Taught in the rural schools in central Illinois for three years, and came to Downey, Cedar county, Iowa, as principal of the Downey public school in 1919. Manager, Farmers Cooperative Elevator and Exchange at Centerdale four years. Has been engaged in farming since 1925. Married to Mary Thomason in 1920, and has five children, LaMar, Jr., Derrold, Doris Jean, Mary Jeanette and Audrey Fern. Member of the Masonic order and member of the M. E. church. Elected representative in 1932 and re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

PAUL FREEBURN, Davenport.—Representative from Scott county, was born June 20, 1903, at Peterson, Clay county, Iowa. Was graduated from Sioux City high school and Morningside college, Sioux City, Iowa. Studied law for two years at Drake university, after which he taught in high school for three years. Was graduated from University of Iowa college of law in 1931 and then formed a partnership with Charles L. Baker with whom he has since practiced law. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

J. W. FRIZZELL, Brooklyn.—Representative from Poweshiek county, was born on a farm three and a half miles northwest of Brooklyn, Iowa, January 10, 1865. His parents, Thomas Frizzell and Margaret (Buchanan) Frizzell, were early settlers coming to Iowa in 1853. Educated in the rural schools and assisted his father in farming and stock raising until 1891, when he located on the farm two miles west of Brooklyn, which his grandfather had purchased from the government. Married

Miss June Sleggel, February 17, 1892. Four children were born, Wayne, Thomas Lee (deceased), Helen Sara Ritter, and Ruth Reading. Resided continuously on the home farm, two miles west of Brooklyn, until 1916, when the family moved to Brooklyn. Served on city council and board of supervisors. Is a member of all branches of the I. O. O. F., a past grand patriarch and past department commander. Also belongs to Knights of Pythias. His church preference is Presbyterian. Serving second term in the legislature. A democrat.

Member of Masonic orders, including Shrine. Serving second term in the legislature. A democrat.

C. E. R. FUESTER, Ida Grove.—Representative from Ida county, was born May 17, 1876, at Blue Island, Illinois, and shortly thereafter moved with his parents to Denison, Iowa, and two years later moved into Ida county, where he helped his parents on a farm. At the age of twenty-one he moved for himself on a farm four and one-half miles southwest of Ida Grove, Iowa, where he lived from 1897 to March, 1928, at which time he rented out his farm, moved to Ida Grove and engaged in the insurance business. In October, 1897, he was united in marriage to Mary Burk, and to this union was born three children, two boys and one girl. Mr. Fuester served twelve years as township clerk and six years on county board of supervisors, and in 1932, he was elected to the Iowa legislature. Re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

He was graduated from the North Bend high school and then attended Creighton university at Omaha and later Drake university at Des Moines. He was married in December, 1926, to Miss Roma Miller of Des Moines, and they have one child, Kathryn. He was associated with the General Motors Corporation until 1931, when he entered the banking business in Greeley where he is now in charge of the Citizens State Bank. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

DEWEY E. GOODE, Bloomfield.—Representative from Davis county, was born in Bloomfield, Iowa, June 2, 1898, the son of L. E. and Rosa Goode. He was educated in the public schools of Bloomfield and was married in 1917 to Miss Ione McIntire. The first two years after his marriage he resided on a farm in Davis county, and then went back to Bloomfield to help his father in the produce and fur business, and he has continued in the same business up to the present time. Serving his second term in the legislature. A republican.

GEORGE W. GROVES, Webster City.—Representative from Hamilton county, was born November 2, 1872, on a farm in Hamilton county, which he now owns and which has never been out of the Groves name. Son of Jackson Groves who came to Iowa from Virginia in 1863, and Jane Dressler Groves who came from Pennsylvania in 1865. Educated in the country schools of Hamilton county, and being left an orphan at nine years of age by the death of his father in 1881, was never privileged to attend even high school as he and an older brother were compelled to take charge of the farm to support a widowed mother. Married in 1893 to Mary A. Branch to whom were

born three daughters and one son. His daughter resides on the old homestead with a young daughter, thus making four generations who have made the same farm their home, and lived in the same house. Was president of the Hamilton county farm bureau six years, president, for two years, of the farmers grain company of Webster City. Served his country during the World war. Was elected in 1928 to the office of clerk of the district court of Appanoose county, and in 1934 to the forty-sixth general assembly. A republican.

J. P. HANSEN, Otranto.—Representative from Mitchell county, was born in Harris, province of Slesvig, Germany, September 30, 1878. His parents were Christian and Herlig Hansen of Danish descent. His father migrated to the United States in 1881, and J. P. and his mother and little sister followed in 1882, the family settling near St. Ansgar, Iowa, where the subject of this biography spent his childhood and attended the Spring Valley rural school. In 1905 he was married to Hannah Marie Neilson and to them were born three children, Helen, Leona, and Christian. In 1921, Mr. Hansen and his family moved to Otranto, Mitchell county and they have lived there since. He has been engaged in farming and operating machinery all his life. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

B. & Q. railroad as mechanic from 1900 to 1911, when he was promoted to supervisor. He is a member of the Masonic order. Serving his second term in the legislature. A democrat.

THOS. HENDRICKSON, Corning.—Representative from Adams county, was born in Winnebago county, Iowa, on January 25, 1871, and moved with his parents to a farm in Adams county, Iowa, in 1874. He attended the public schools and was married in 1897. Spent two years in a general store in Shelby county, Iowa, returning to farming in Adams county, Iowa. He has served as a member of the county board of supervisors, also deputy sheriff of Adams county. Is a member of the Masonic and Royal Arch orders. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

A. H. HENNINGSEN, Graettinger.—Representative from Palo Alto county, was born August 12, 1895. Attended high school at Emmetsburg and one year college in Nebraska. Served in United States army during World war. Actively engaged in mercantile business at Graettinger since discharge from army. Married to Mabel Osher in 1920, and has one child, Doris. Serving first term in legislature. A republican.

B. B. HICKENLOOPER, Cedar Rapids.—Representative from Linn county, was born in Blockton, Iowa, July 21, 1896, the son of Nathan O. and Margaret A. Hickenlooper, both of whom were born in Taylor county. Graduate of Iowa State college department of industrial science and of the law school of the University of Iowa. Entered the practice of law in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1922. Served twenty-one months in the army during the World war, a portion of which was spent over-seas with the three hundred thirty-ninth field artillery. Married in 1927 to Verna E. Bensch, and has two children, Jane Carroll and David B. Member of the Consistory and Shrine, B. P. O. E. and American Legion. Affiliated with the Methodist church. Serving first term in the general assembly. A republican.

O. N. HULTMAN, Stanton.—Representative from Montgomery county, was born in Stanton, Iowa, of Swedish descent. He attended the public school and was graduated from the Stanton high school, and began his business career as a clerk in a general store. Later he accepted a position as assistant manager of a retail lumber business, and after two years he became its manager and at present is owner of a retail lumber business. He has served as mayor and councilman of Stanton. A director of the First National bank. He is a member of the Lutheran church, American Legion, K. of P., and is a thirty-second degree Mason. He is unmarried. Serving his second term in the legislature. A republican.

JOHN R. IRWIN, Keokuk.—Representative from Lee county, was born in Keokuk, Iowa, August 24, 1888. He received his early education in the public schools of Keokuk, was graduated from Lawrenceville preparatory school, Lawrenceville, New Jersey, in 1902, and received the degree of bachelor of letters from Princeton university, Princeton, New Jersey, in 1906. He attended for a time the National University law school, Washington, D. C. In 1907 he entered the Irwin-Phillips Wholesale Dry Goods Company in Keokuk. This company was established by his grandfather, Stephen Irwin, in 1856. A democrat.

CHARLES G. JOHNSON, Marathon.—Representative from Buena Vista county, was born on a farm near Laurens, Iowa, August 10, 1886; educated in rural schools of Pocahontas county and in Laurens high school. Completed a commercial course in spring of 1908 at Highland Park college, graduated from the agronomy division

of Iowa State college in 1915. Member of Adelante fraternity and Alpha Zeta honorary agricultural fraternity. Spent the following three years as instructor and athletic coach at Waldorf junior college located in Forest City. Married August 24, 1916, to Dessie A. Walker of Knoxville, Iowa. Has three children, George, Dorothy, and Betty. In the spring of 1918, moved to Hillcrest Farm, near Albert City, Iowa, which he owns and has operated as a cattle and hog feeding unit. He received his education in the consolidated school at Orchard, Iowa, and the Capital City Commercial college, Des Moines, Iowa. In 1915 he married Miss Jessie Hole, of Marshalltown, Iowa, and to this union were born three sons, who are now attending the public schools of Mason City. He has served as president of the associated advertising clubs of Iowa, president of the retail merchants association, president of the society of Iowa florists, district governor of the Nebraska-Iowa Kiwanis club, and as a member of the Red Cross board for sixteen years. G. T. KUESTER, Griswold.—Representative from Cass county, was born January 25, 1888, in Noble township, Cass county, Iowa, where he has resided all his life. His parents, Charles and Catherine Elizabeth Kuester, were among the pioneers who located in the township in 1874. He was married on April 4, 1917 to Miss Eida G. Weaver, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. U. G. Weaver of Noble township. They have two children, a son and daughter, Dale M., age 17, a senior in Griswold high school, and Shirley V., age 9. He received the preliminary rudiments of his education in the rural schools of the township and has always been interested in the affairs of government and history. He owns and operates a farm, conducting a general farming business, and for many years has engaged in extensive hog raising and feeding operations. EDWARD J. MANIECE, Estherville.—Representative from Emmet county, was born on a farm near Fennimore, Wisconsin, in 1890. Moved with parents to the vicinity of Estherville and has lived there since. Was educated in country schools and Estherville business college. Married in 1917 to Anna O. Stammer and has two children, Ruth and Francis. Mr. Maniece is a farmer and raises pure bred live stock and he is a charter member and has been township director and county president of the Emmet county farm bureau. Member of Presbyterian church, past chancellor of Knights of Pythias and Member of B. P. O. E. ARCH W. MCFARLANE, Waterloo.—Representative from Black Hawk county, was born at Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885; educated in the public schools and was graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. He is now engaged in the wholesale fuel business, with headquarters at Waterloo. Belongs to Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of the various branches of the Masonic order, including El-Kahir Shrine; Knights of Pythias; Elks; Loyal Order of Moose; and is a supreme officer of the United Commercial Travelers. EDWIN A. MOORE, Harlan.—Representative from Shelby county, was born in Washington county, Iowa in 1872. Father, Edwin B. Moore, physician; mother, Elizabeth (Watters) Moore. Moved to Harlan, Iowa in 1878. Attended Harlan public schools. Taught school in Portsmouth, Iowa, five years. Graduated from medical department of Creighton university in 1901. Has been actively engaged in practice of medicine and surgery in Harlan, Iowa, since 1903. Has served as a member of board of education of Harlan, member of Masonic lodge, active in Kiwanis and community clubs. Married Effie Lathrop in 1897. Has one son, E. Rex, federal land bank appraiser living at Osage, Iowa. One daughter, Margaret, wife of Dr. C. F. Peck, D.D.S., of Decorah, Iowa. Elected to the legislature in 1934. A democrat.

Served two years and three months in the army air service during the World war. Member of American Legion, Masonic lodge, Methodist church. Unmarried. Serving first term in legislature. A republican.

JOHN WILLIAM MOORE, Sioux City.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Nicholas county, West Virginia, March 18, 1880. He attended public school at Cross Lanes, West Virginia and high school at Fayetteville, West Virginia. Grad-

uated in mechanical and electrical engineering, Scranton, Pennsylvania. Learned the machinist's trade in the South Side Foundry and Machine Works, Charleston, West Virginia. Came to Sioux City in 1907. At the present time is owner and operator of Moore's Machine Works, Sioux City. Married Miss Mayme Price of Charleston, West Virginia, November 6, 1913, have no children. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

EUGENE H. REILLY, Dubuque.—Representative from Dubuque county, the son of Thomas E. and Margaret Reilly was born in Dubuque, Iowa, on the 8th day of December, 1906; educated in the parochial schools of Dubuque and received high school education at Columbia academy, Dubuque, graduated from Columbia college, 1928, with bachelor of arts degree. Following graduation, served as instructor of English and history at Loyola academy, Chicago, for a year, then entered the college of law at De Paul university, Chicago, and spent the two remaining years in the law school at the State University of Iowa graduating in 1932 with the degree of juris doctor. Admitted to Iowa bar in 1932 and began the practice of law at Dubuque with George T. Lyon and is now associated with Al J. Nelson, attorney, at Dubuque. Member of the Dubuque county bar association, Knights of Columbus, Catholic order of Foresters, young democratic club, Phi Alpha Delta national law fraternity. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

CLARENCE L. RICE, Delta.—Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Mahaska county on a farm near Wright in 1889, the son of W. I. and M. A. Rice. Was educated in the schools of Mahaska county. Spent one year in Colorado and five years in Oklahoma, and has visited at different times in many of the other states of the union. Married and has four children, three sons and one daughter. With the exception of one year, has been actively engaged in farming and for the past 17 years has farmed in Keokuk county. Serving second term in legislature. A democrat.

MATT. B. RIDDLE, Ute.—Representative of Monona county, and a native thereof, born April 26, 1877, on the farm he now owns. Father, I. U. Riddle, native of Ohio, veteran of the Civil war, third Iowa infantry, pioneered in Soldier township, Monona

county, March, 1866. Mother, Mary D. Koontz, native of Pennsylvania, four of whose brothers also fought in the Civil war, one of them giving up his life. The family lived in a dugout, on the farm purchased from the government, where their four children, all sons, were born, of which Matt B. was the second. He attended country school, later Northwestern Normal of Shenandoah, Iowa, after its destruction by fire he attended Highland Park college, at Des Moines. He was married to Martha H. Hansen of Charter Oak, Iowa, April 24, 1899, and is the father of two children; Mrs. Bernice E. Kowalke, R. N., and Richard H., who attended the University of Iowa. OVE T. ROE, Waukon.—Representative from Allamakee county, was born in that county September 4, 1887. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tolef Roe, and received his early education in the rural schools and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa. He married Emma Kolsrud of Waterville, Iowa, and five children were born to them: Thomas, Melvin, Doris, Kenneth and Willard. Is president of the Paint Creek farmers telephone company. A member of the Lutheran church. Has followed the occupation of a farmer with the exception of eight years while he was engaged in partnership with his brother, A. H. Roe, in the general merchandise business. Served in the forty-fourth, forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra and forty-sixth general assemblies. A democrat.

THOMAS RUTHERFORD, JR., Audubon.—Representative from Audubon county, was born in Poweshiek county, Iowa, February 14, 1869. Moved with his parents to Audubon, Iowa, when twelve years of age, in the spring of 1881, where he has since resided. Received his education in the Audubon public schools. Has been engaged in farming continually, until recent years. Has served as township trustee and six years as county supervisor. Was married March 11, 1896, to Belle Hunt, of Dallas county, Iowa. They have four children, Clark H., Vera, Inez and Alice, all married. Is member of M. E. church, Masonic order and Easter Star. Elected to general assembly in 1934. A republican.

JOHN RYDER, Dubuque.—Senior representative from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa, and educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless business college. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers wholesale grocery firm. In 1919, he organized the Ryder Realty Company and served as vice president until January, 1925, when he retired from the firm. In March, 1925, he was elected member of the board of education of the city of Dubuque and was appointed chairman of the finance committee. He was married in November, 1917, to Miss Anna L. Killeen, who died in May, 1923. He was elected to the general assembly in 1924, re-elected in 1926, 1928, 1930, 1932 and 1934. A democrat.

GEORGE M. SCHLATTER, Bellevue.—Representative from Jackson county, was born in Bellevue, Jackson county, May 31, 1864. Graduate of the Bellevue public school and the State University of Iowa, class of 1885. Civil engineer by profession. Has

been engaged in the general grain and seed business for many years; also engaged in banking for twenty-five years, holding the offices of director and president. Served as a member of local school board, city treasurer and filled the office of mayor for three terms. Married in 1889 to Amelia Kucheman and has one daughter, Frances. Elected at a special election to fill vacancy caused by appointment of Representative F. J. Swift as deputy health commissioner and was re-elected in 1934. A democrat.

GEORGE L. SCOTT, West Union.—Representative from Fayette county, was born July 21, 1887, on a farm in said county. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Scott, were natives of Scotland. They came to America and were early settlers in northeastern Iowa. Mr. Scott has spent his entire life in Fayette county, where he received his education in the public schools. He was married November 26, 1910, to Miss Merle Saltgiver. Their family consists of two children, Donald and Robert. Mr. Scott is an extensive farmer, stock raiser and feeder. JOHN H. SELBY, Odebolt.—Representative from Sac county, was born May 12, 1892, at Villisca, Iowa. Graduated from Odebolt high school in 1910. Graduated from University of Omaha in 1914. In real estate business in Odebolt from 1914 to 1917. Attended officers training school at Fort Snelling, where he was commissioned second lieutenant. Sent from Fort Snelling to Fort Doniphan, Oklahoma, with the 35th division. Served one year in France with 138 infantry of the 35th division. Promoted to first lieutenant after Argonne. After two years in the army, returned to Odebolt and to the real estate and farm loan business. Married Della N. Nelson, Omaha, Nebraska, in 1919. Has two sons, ages 13 and 8 years. Mayor of Odebolt for six years. Member of Masonic lodge and the American Legion. Elected state representative in 1934. A democrat.

GRANT A. SHIFFLETT, Diagonal.—Representative from Ringgold county, was born in Bureau county, Illinois, December, 1890. Came with parents to Iowa in 1900, residing in Hamilton and Madison counties, where he received a rural school education and then graduated from the Earlham high school and the Cedar Rapids business college. Was married in 1914 to Mary L. Compton at Earlham, Iowa, and has one daughter, Martha Irene. In 1914 he located on a farm in Ringgold county, and since that time has followed the occupation of farming and stock raising, with the exception of about eight years, while engaged in the banking business at Tingley and Diagonal, where he also served on the city councils. He is a member of the Methodist church and has always taken an active interest in community welfare, especially the schools and churches. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

C. COLFAX SMITH, Clarksville.—Representative from Butler county, was born in Adair county, in November, 1868. His early education was obtained in the public schools, and he entered high school in Harlan, Iowa, and graduated there. He taught for a short time in the country schools, then took a college course and became superintendent of schools in Fontanelle, Iowa. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Stewart, were natives of Scotland; they moved to Maryland and later to Jasper county, where they resided until their death. TAYLOR, New Sharon.—Representative from Mahaska county, was born July 15, 1870, in Preston county, West Virginia, and was educated in public schools and institutions of higher learning of the state of West Virginia. Taught school for seven years; was a minister of the Methodist church for fifteen years; editor of newspaper for eighteen years; served as member of school board, and mayor of New Sharon, Iowa, and was postmaster of New Sharon for twelve years, from 1922 to 1934; served in the senate of Iowa in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies, from the second district of Iowa, comprising Van Buren and Jefferson counties. F., a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Eastern Star. Elected representative in 1930 and re-elected in 1932 and 1934. A democrat.

Graduated Iowa State college, 1914. Head of dairy husbandry department, University of West Virginia, Morgantown, W. Va., 1915. Served two years World war, 2d Lieutenant, balloon division, aviation section, A. E. F. Licensed balloon pilot. Beef cattle specialist, bureau of animal industry, Washington, D. C., 1919. Married Iva M. Allen, Castalia, Iowa, in 1924, has two sons, John I. and Jay D. Charter member Eta chapter, Alpha Gamma Rho, social fraternity. Member Alpha Zeta, honorary agricultural fraternity. DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION AND PLATFORM

The regular democratic state convention was held in Des Moines, Thursday, July 26, 1934. Nelson G. Kraschel of Harlan was chairman. Following is the platform adopted by the convention:

We, the democracy of Iowa, in state convention assembled, rejoice in the advancement that has thus far been made by the present democratic national administration in restoring the economic health of the nation and in recognizing that human rights as well as property rights are a proper object of national concern.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.—We commend the courage, wisdom and fidelity of our great president, Franklin D. Roosevelt. We pledge to him our unqualified support in the valiant fight he is making to secure a more equitable distribution of the national income and to obtain for all our people that economic security which is the basis of real happiness. We indorse his program of recovery and pledge to him our continued support and the cooperation of our democratic state administration.

CORN LOANS, DROUGHT RELIEF.—We commend the democratic national administration for the concern shown and the results obtained for the people of Iowa and for Iowa's greatest industry, agriculture. We came into power at a time when the morale of the people of this state was broken. Banks were closed. Our great corn crop was marketable only at ruinous prices. The policy of making corn loans gave to the people of Iowa financial relief and gave to the farmer rather than the speculator the benefit of price increase.

The concern of the present administration for the victims of the drought and the measures taken to relieve distress have given to the people of the state of Iowa a feeling and a degree of security previously unknown in a period of great adversity.

AGRICULTURE.—We believe that agriculture, our greatest national industry, should be placed on a parity with other national industries; and that the farmer is entitled to the cost of production plus a reasonable profit. We rejoice in the fact that under the present democratic national administration the first real effort to obtain that objective has been made.

Much has been accomplished. Much remains to be done. In spite of the improvement in the prices of agricultural products and in spite of the national administration's most strenuous efforts to insure parity in prices for farm products, such price levels

have not been reached. But they have been promised by our president. If they are not attained by present methods, they will be by other methods. Agriculture must be and will be restored to a firm and lasting basis of prosperity.

FEDERAL REFINANCING.—We commend the action of the democratic national administration in the creation of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation and in the extension of the credit facilities of the federal farm credit administration.

The lending facilities of these institutions have enabled thousands of our citizens to refinance their loans on homes and farms at unprecedented low rates of interest and thus escape the specter of mortgage foreclosure. We urge the further development of these credit facilities. We regret that the republican controlled appraisals by the Federal Land Bank of Omaha have failed to give proper recognition to the true value of Iowa farms.

LABOR.—We take pride in the fact that the democratic party is responsible for creating the office of secretary of labor in the president's cabinet and that it was under a democratic national administration that labor was declared not to be a commodity and that the right of labor to organize was first recognized.

We rejoice in the fact that the present democratic national administration has abolished child labor and has, by the national industrial recovery act, guaranteed labor the right to bargain collectively through representatives of its own selection, and has recognized that reduced hours of labor and payment of an adequate wage scale are necessary to national recovery.

We especially commend the re-employment of millions of workers. Millions remain unemployed. The present rate of progress assures their steady and reasonably rapid re-employment. Every citizen of the United States must be assured of the opportunity to work.

EMERGENCY RELIEF.—We commend the program of unemployment relief inaugurated by the democratic national administration. The use in Iowa of federal funds under the civil works administration, the public works administration, the civilian conservation corps, the federal emergency relief administration, and other federal agencies has taken from the counties and cities the crushing burden of poor relief, has improved the morale of our people and has enabled the unemployed to earn an honest living and escape the stigma of being objects of charity. We commend the cooperation of our democratic state administration in these programs and pledge its continuance.

REPUBLICAN PARTY.—We regret the fact that the present leadership of the republican party, which was directing the affairs of state when our people suffered the greatest distress from unemployment and from lack of necessities of life ever experienced, can now do nothing but take refuge in a claimed devotion to the constitution.

When they speak of the constitution, it is always with reference to some provision relating to the protection of property or contract rights. That is the only meaning of that great instrument to them; and although millions may walk the streets and highways, as they did in 1932, without food or shelter, they fail to recognize any power in the federal government, under the constitution, to adequately deal with the situation.

They forget that the primary purpose in the adoption of the constitution, as in the founding of the nation, was to promote human happiness and permit the individual to enjoy a larger and fuller life. We rejoice that the present national administration has returned the nation to that correct original conception, and has made the welfare of the people of the nation its primary concern. In that way, only, can the interests of the nation be properly served, and the right to property ultimately be made secure and valuable.

STATE ADMINISTRATION.—We commend Governor Clyde L. Herring and other democratic state officials for the accomplishments of their administration, for their fulfillment of party pledges, for the wholehearted support given President Roosevelt and the national administration and for their untiring efforts to promote the welfare of the people of the state of Iowa. Never before in the history of this state has such a comprehensive legislative and administrative program of governmental reform been undertaken and successfully carried out.

REDUCTION IN EXPENDITURES.—We endorse, particularly, each of the following major achievements of the democratic state administration: First, during the last year of the administration of Governor Herring's predecessor, total state expenditures were within one million dollars of the all time high and were in excess of 40 million dollars. During the first year of Governor Herring's administration, total state expenditures were less than

33 million dollars, a reduction in state expenditures of over seven million dollars and such economies are being continued during the present year.

TAX REVISION.—Second, for the first time in 87 years, our antiquated taxing system was revised so as more equitably to distribute the tax load and to relieve the oppressive tax burden heretofore borne by the farms and homes of this state. This reform has been repeatedly promised to the people of Iowa by republican administrations, but never fulfilled. Because the revenue from the new tax bill must of necessity by the terms and the operation thereof, replace the present taxes on farms and homes, such taxes will, in 1935, be only 55 per cent of such taxes in 1930.

LIQUOR CONTROL.—Third, the present democratic state administration realized the futility of continuing state prohibition after the eighteenth amendment was repealed and recognized the sentiment of the people of Iowa for temperance, as expressed in their vote on repeal. It has provided for the sale of alcoholic liquors under strict state control, thereby removing the element of greed for private profit, which is recognized as being the source of the evil that flows from the liquor traffic. This program, coupled with the beer law and strict law enforcement, will eliminate the bootlegger and safeguard the health and morals of our people.

We promised a sane solution of the ever present liquor problem. That promise has been kept. In spite of the moderation of our liquor reform law and before it has been given any trial whatsoever, let alone a fair trial, a minority of the republican party saw fit to inject the prohibition issue into the coming campaign by nominating a man whose last official act as governor of the state of Iowa in January, 1933, was to advise the incoming state legislature to ignore the liquor problem—a man who pleaded with the people of this state to vote against the repeal of the national prohibition amendment in the statewide referendum last summer. His advice was overwhelmingly repudiated by republicans and democrats alike.

GOVERNMENTAL REORGANIZATION.—Fourth, the democratic state administration commenced the task of reorganizing state and local governments with the tremendous resultant economies, and more particularly secured the passage of the state budget and financial control act, under which, for the first time the expenditures of the state of Iowa are administered on a business-like basis and overdrafts and deficits made impossible.

SOCIAL LEGISLATION.—Fifth, the democratic state administration secured the passage of such social legislation as the old age assistance act, which modernizes and humanizes our outworn methods of old age relief and spreads the burden of such equally, rather than allowing it to rest entirely upon property, and procured the ratification by Iowa of the child labor amendment to the constitution of the United States, which is designed to benefit children of the nation and to increase employment of adult workers.

GASOLINE TAX.—Sixth, the present democratic state administration, through improved administration and through the strengthening by new legislation of the provisions of the law, has reduced evasions to the extent that the total collections of gasoline taxes for the first six months of 1934 exceed by \$475,000 the collections for the same period of 1932.

The refunds paid have been reduced by over \$410,000 during the same periods. As a result, by prevention of violations of the law and without increasing the rate of tax, an increase of \$885,000 net income to the state from gasoline taxes for the first six months period of 1934 has been effected.

REFUNDING PRIMARY ROAD BONDS.—Seventh, the passage of a measure providing for the refinancing of county primary road bonds removed the necessity of a tax on real estate to pay such bonds and made possible the saving of more than enough in interest charges during the current year to pay the cost of the special session, which passed this measure and many others of importance.

BANKING LEGISLATION.—Eighth, passage of the various emergency banking acts, which have become models followed by other states in supplementing national banking legislation, permitted the orderly liquidation of insolvent institutions and gave protection to the rights of depositors, and enabled Iowa state banks to take full advantage of reorganization aids and financial support extended by the federal government.

CONSERVATION.—Ninth, measures were passed furthering the conservation program in the state of Iowa and under which measures this state was enabled to receive both financial aid and the services of conservation workers from the federal government.

MORTGAGE MORATORIUM.—Tenth, Iowa led the way in the enactment of mortgage moratorium legislation. Our farm and home owners were enabled, thereby, to obtain an extension of time during which to take advantage of refinancing facilities extended by federal government.

FUTURE PROGRAM.—We advocate:

First, the continuance of the policy of efficiency and of rigid economy in governmental expenditures, which resulted in the reduction of more than seven million dollars in state expenditures in 1933 over 1932.

Second, the continuance of the policy of governmental reorganization which was initiated by the adoption of the budget and financial control act and related legislation and administrative changes in governmental departments.

Third, the adoption of legislation for the control of highway traffic and promotion of highway safety.

Fourth, a closer cooperation between the midwestern agricultural states, to the end that unified action may be taken for the promotion and protection of their common interests. We recommend frequent conferences between the chief executives of such states.

Fifth, appropriate compensation for the service-connected, disabled war veterans so that no veterans so disabled as to be unable to pursue a gainful occupation be placed upon the pauper rolls. We advocate federal and state legislation to prevent such an unhappy fate for any of our nation's wartime defenders, the continuance of the present democratic state and national administrators' policy of employment preference for war veterans, and the continuance of the present tax exemptions for Iowa's war veterans.

Sixth, unemployment insurance; the restriction of foreign immigration; the use, by state institutions, of Iowa coal and goods produced in Iowa; vocational education to meet the demands of technical progress, and the abolition of competition between prison labor and free labor and that prisoners be employed only under the state use plan.

Seventh, the elimination of double taxation, particularly as applied to mortgages on farms and homes in the state of Iowa.

Eighth, legislation to encourage and foster the organization of cooperatives in order, more efficiently and economically to market farm products to the joint benefit of producer and consumer.

Ninth, that the corn-loan policy be immediately extended to oats and other farm commodities, and that suitable measures be adopted to give to the livestock and dairy interests of this state the same protection that the corn-loan program gave to corn producers.

Tenth, the retirement of federal lands from competition with developed farms, the withdrawal of marginal lands from production, and the use thereof and of land now owned by the federal government for reforestation and game preserves, breeding grounds and refuges and the elimination of all projects for the reclamation of land for agricultural purposes.

Eleventh, a nonpartisan judiciary.

Twelfth, the changing of the present primary law to permit the selection of candidates in a manner consonant with the principles of representative government.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT.—We recognize the valuable contribution to the recovery program by members of other political parties, many of whom are out of sympathy with the leadership of their own party, who have supported by ballot our local, state and national candidates for office, and who have by unselfish contribution of their time and ability assisted in the administration of such program. Their continued support and cooperation is solicited.

Acknowledgment should be made of the invaluable services rendered the party by organized groups of democratic voters, such as the young democratic clubs, the Roosevelt clubs, the Jefferson clubs, the Iowa negro democratic league and other organizations with similar aims and purposes.

We commend Senator Louis Murphy for his statesmanship and distinguished contributions to the recovery program and his unselfish service to the president in the fulfillment thereof. We congratulate him upon carrying and voicing the real sentiment of Iowa to the United States senate.

We commend the members of the Iowa democratic congressional delegation for their loyalty to the interests of their constituents and their support of the president and his recovery program.

WOMEN.—We acknowledge the sympathetic support given to the state and the national administration by the women of Iowa, whose interest in the home and family has prompted them to give invaluable support to the recovery program.

We commend to the attention of the voters of Iowa the outstanding qualifications of Governor Clyde L. Herring, the democratic congressional candidates and other democratic candidates for state and local offices and urge their election in November.

Consummation of the recovery program in Iowa is absolutely dependent upon the continuing in office of officials who are in hearty sympathy and complete accord with the program of our peerless leader, President Roosevelt.

DEMOCRATIC STATE JUDICIAL CONVENTION

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION AND PLATFORM

The regular republican state convention was held in Des Moines, Wednesday, July 18, 1934. John M. Grimes of Osceola was chairman. Following is the platform adopted by the convention:

NATIONAL ISSUES.—In these perilous times of widespread economic distress and the bewildering uncertainty that continues to hamper and harass our people, the republicans of Iowa in convention assembled hereby reaffirm their fervent belief in the sound principles of the party and do hereby express our confidence that the guiding hand of our party must ultimately originate and administer the economic measures and policies that will restore our people to economic independence and safety.

We view with deep concern the fact that, though the democratic party has had a free hand for a period of almost 17 months to make good on its party pledges and to instill into our people a measure of confidence as regards the future, the laying of a sound foundation for our rehabilitation has not yet started.

We have observed with deep regret the emasculation of our anti-trust laws with the result that the federal government has become a party to the private business practice, which has promoted unwarranted price fixing, thereby enriching the rich by the process of making the poor poorer.

We have been amazed at the attack made on the federal constitution by this administration and the widespread disregard for the personal liberties vouchsafed to all our people

by this fundamental law of our land. We would hold up the hands of the press and all patriots who have preserved a free press and free speech—the two essentials for a free people.

The utter failure of the democratic party to redeem its pre-election pledges as regards the balancing of our federal budget and the reduction of bureaus and commissions to the end that a 25 per cent saving of federal revenues could be had, is ample cause for genuine alarm. We can see no justice in cutting veterans' allowances, and adding millions to other channels of expenditure.

We deplore the tendency toward the stifling of individual initiative among our citizens generally. Where our federal and state governments have wisely employed funds to relieve want and distress, and promote sound recovery measures, we approve. Where our government has needlessly plunged into private business to the detriment of our own people, we emphatically disapprove.

We are alarmed beyond expression in words at the vertical increase in our public debt, and we have no hesitancy in expressing fear for the ultimate financial credit of our nation if public spending on a billion dollar scale is continued.

We lament the intimidation of our congress by the most pernicious policy of party patronage ever known in our country, and we regret the usurpation of the legislative function of our government by other departments of government.

We are amazed that the democratic party has been so vacillating in the matter of establishing and maintaining a sound monetary system.

AGRICULTURE.—We recognize that the restoration of American agriculture must be the foundation of permanent national recovery. More needs to be done to restore farm buying power. The key to farm recovery is the restoration of farm prices to a normal level in relation to other prices.

We recognize further that agriculture must be restored to its proper place in the economic, social and political life of this nation. The re-establishment of agriculture, our basic industry, to its proper place of prominence in national affairs, as contemplated in the early policies of our government, is fundamentally necessary.

We unreservedly pledge our party to the achievement of these ends by cooperating in the effective administration of measures for the benefit of agriculture and by the enactment of such additional measures as is found necessary to bring about these objectives. In the formulation and administration of legislation for the benefit of agriculture, we pledge ourselves to consult with the recognized spokesmen selected by the farmers.

We are in favor of strengthening farm legislation in order to assure, as speedily as possible, the attainment of parity prices for farm products.

To attain parity prices for farm products, we urge that all the forces of state and federal government be employed in bringing to this great basic industry, agriculture, its rightful share of the national income. Such action as is taken should have the support of the active farm leadership of the nation.

We favor curtailment of agricultural production through voluntary effort as a purely emergency measure designed to help meet the urgent, immediate situation until consumers' buying power and recaptured foreign markets will pay the farmer the parity price for his farm products.

Facilities for rural credit should be strengthened and extended so that agriculture will be provided with adequate financing for capital requirements, production credit, and marketing credit, at interest rates much more favorable than at the present time, and upon terms as advantageous as other groups in the nation enjoy.

A policy of national self-containment would permanently entail terrific hardships on the corn belt and its production. It would compel the withdrawal from production of greatly increased productive acreage which would result most disastrously to agriculture and be a decided brake on industry.

We, therefore, oppose a policy of national self-containment, but rather favor the expansion of foreign outlets for our surplus agricultural commodities through reciprocal trade relations with foreign nations. We contend, however, that such agreements should be arranged by a non-partisan commission as sought by our republican leadership four years ago.

We favor immediate enactment of legislation to control speculation on farm commodities on commodity exchanges.

Iowa has pioneered in pursuing a policy of farm storage of grain under the Iowa farm warehousing act. We favor enlarging the scope of this policy to include all food

and feed grains produced on our farms suitable for such storage to the end that these products may be stored on farms and loans made on warehouse receipts against such grains in the interest of stabilizing farm grain prices and retaining the opportunity of advancing prices to those who produce the commodity.

LABOR.—Labor fully employed at good wages is the greatest guaranty of prosperity. We pledge our party to do those things which will maintain a high standard of living commensurate with the ideals of American citizenship.

We favor legislation both state and national to legalize the right of labor to organize and to bargain collectively.

We favor the continuation of our present federal policy restricting foreign immigration and demanding the extension of this policy to the Latin American countries.

We declare in favor of the principle of old age pension legislation.

We urge the continuation of vocational education and training in a way that will meet the demands of technical progress, and the readjustment for workers displaced by machines and new processes.

We declare in favor of the development of an adequate unemployment relief program suitable to the needs of the unemployment situation which now prevails.

We oppose the contracting of prison labor and favor the state use plan, and we are also opposed to prison made goods being sold in the open market in competition with free labor.

BLANKET APPROPRIATIONS.—We oppose the policy of congress in the making of blanket appropriations. We believe that congress should, as it did for more than 100 years, make only specific limited appropriations for designated purposes.

We demand that proper action be taken to save us from national bankruptcy, which is sure to come if the present practices be continued.

WELFARE.—Whereas the unemployment problem is not being solved with any degree of certainty, and continues to be the principal obstacle to a rapid return to normalcy, and in addition is becoming intolerable, the republican party believes in a plan of work relief rather than a dole.

TAX REVISION.—1. We stand for the repeal of the present state-wide sales tax. Its pyramiding of the tax burden on our citizens and more particularly on the farmers and laboring men is manifestly unfair. It is wrong in principle for the reason that it presumes that a man's tax ability is measured by the money he must spend to live, rather than upon the money he earns.

2. We favor a state income tax as pledged to the people of Iowa in the state republican platform of 1932. The fairest tax is a tax based upon ability to pay, a rigid and sensible economy of government with an equitable distribution of the tax burden would provide a new economic era for the state. We pledge ourselves to the enactment of such a program.

3. In order to safeguard the owners of real property in our state we favor a reasonable tax limit for all real property beyond which the taxing bodies cannot go. The time has come when such a guarantee must be given to the taxpayers of our state to avoid the confiscation of real property by public taxation.

LIQUOR.—We pledge our party to an adequate and effective enforcement of the alcoholic liquor laws of the state, but we condemn the manner and the wasteful extravagance with which the present law for the sale of liquor through state stores is being administered.

OLD AGE PENSION.—We favor the modification of the old age pension law to eliminate homestead confiscation, to fix a minimum and maximum benefit and to provide for the payment of benefits from the general funds.

EDUCATION.—Iowa has attained eminent leadership in the field of education. We appreciate the work of our educational institutions and especially the common school system upon which we must depend for an educated citizenry of tomorrow.

We pledge our efforts along such lines as are necessary to insure the further advancement of our schools, and the equalization of school advantages as among all of our boys and girls, both urban and rural.

INDUSTRY.—We favor the encouragement of industry throughout the state of Iowa so that the home market for farm produce may be improved.

We favor the purchase not only of Iowa farm products but of Iowa manufactured products for all our state institutions to the end that Iowa labor may reap the full benefits from our state's consumption of all goods. We especially favor the purchase of Iowa

coal, not only by our state institutions that are supported by state tax moneys, but by our people as a whole.

YOUNG REPUBLICANS.—We recognize that a very large per cent of the voters are under 36 years of age and that to them the issues of the new deal are of peculiar and vital importance.

Governmental extravagance shoulders the burden of debt upon them and generations yet unborn.

We recognize and approve the permanent organization of the young republican league of Iowa. We welcome the younger people of this state into positions of responsibility and leadership in the republican party.

DAN W. TURNER.—We desire to commend to the citizens of Iowa the candidacy of Dan W. Turner for governor of our state. His initial term of two years as our chief executive stands out as one of the most successful administrations for this great commonwealth.

An economy of public spending in excess of 20 millions, which he as governor insisted upon, is an outstanding record of achievement.

He has been recognized as a genuine friend of the farmer, the laborer and the business man of Iowa for more than two decades, and our state, now in the midst of the greatest orgy of spending it has ever known, sorely needs the sound business judgment and the unquestioned integrity of a governor like Dan W. Turner.

OUR CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATES.—We likewise commend to the voters of Iowa each and every one of our candidates for congress in the nine districts of our state. We are highly gratified at the record that has been made by our republican congressmen of Iowa during the past two years. While they were in a hopeless minority in the congress and were mercilessly over-ridden by the party in power, they have stood steadfast for all sound measures of recovery and for the relief of every distress among our people.

They have labored tirelessly to maintain the sound credit of our nation. They have been quick to lend their support and influence toward every congressional act looking toward recovery throughout the nation, and for this we commend them most heartily.

We are firmly convinced that sooner or later our federal constitution will be restored to its rightful place in the hearts and lives of our country, and the state of Iowa can best have a part in this ennobling service by placing nine republican congressmen in our congress at Washington.

OUR REPUBLICAN STATE AND COUNTY TICKETS.—We desire also to commend our entire state, county and township tickets to the voters of Iowa. Never before have republicans of this state made such a diligent effort to place men of ability, experience and trustworthiness before the people as candidates for office, and we are confident that the affairs of our great state can be best administered by placing in office the republican nominees at the coming election.

A PLEDGE TO ECONOMY.—As members of the republican party of Iowa, we desire at this time to go on record as pledging ourselves to the most stringent economy that the state of Iowa as ever known, consistent with the proper functioning of our necessary governmental agencies, and with the wholesome and efficient maintenance of our educational system.

1. We are unalterably opposed to the inordinate extension of the bureaucracy of state employes which has been promoted by the present state democratic administration. Aside and apart from such employes as have been necessary, due to various national and state recovery measures, the number of our state employes has been increased tremendously. This policy must be discontinued.

2. We are opposed to the ruthless disregard of ability in filling positions of authority and responsibility as regards our state government. Never in the history of Iowa has such a studied effort been made to build and perpetuate party power by making party fealty be the only prerequisite for office holding.

CONCLUSION.—In conclusion, we, as republicans of the state of Iowa, are altogether confident that the people not only of this state but the nation as a whole will be led out of this depression by the republican party. Every other depression that our nation has known has been put to route by the principles followed and the policies established by the party of Abraham Lincoln. Furthermore, the grievous public debts of our country incurred either by the devastating hand of war or necessitated by the recovery mea-

ures against nationwide depression have always been paid by our country under a republican leadership.

History will repeat itself.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitutions and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments;

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 17, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed and on March 4, 1789, the government commenced operations under the new constitution.

We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)¹ The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding, to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]² The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five and Georgia three.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) [The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote]³

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the

sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) [The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]⁴

SEC. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their

journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States;

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post-offices and post-roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18) To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior

to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or *ex post facto* law shall be passed.

(4) [No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken]⁵

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing the inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws as shall be subjected to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and together with the vice president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

[The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such a number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest

number of votes of the electors shall be the vice president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice president.¹⁶

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice president and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices

during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury: and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other states, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of the legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either

case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executives and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the convention of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the states except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed March 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was, December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was, July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was, March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was, February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 16, 1912, and was, May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The eighteenth amendment was proposed December 17, 1917, and was proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on January 29, 1919, to have been duly ratified.

The nineteenth amendment was proposed June 5, 1919, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on August 26, 1920, to have been duly ratified.

The twentieth amendment was proposed March 2, 1932, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on February 6, 1933, to have been duly ratified.

The twenty-first amendment was proposed February 20, 1933, and proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on December 5, 1933, to have been duly ratified.

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice president, shall be the vice president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice president; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of

life, liberty or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within the jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies; *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

ARTICLE XVIII.⁷

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XX.

SECTION 1. The terms of the president and vice president shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of senators and representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

SEC. 2. The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the president, the president-elect shall have died, the vice president-elect shall become president. If a president shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the president-elect shall have failed to qualify, then the vice president-elect shall act as president until a president shall have qualified; and the congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a president-elect nor a vice president-elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as president, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a president or vice president shall have qualified.

SEC. 4. The congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the house of representatives may choose a president whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the senate may choose a vice-president whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

SEC. 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

SEC. 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its submission.

ARTICLE XXI.

"SECTION 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

"SEC. 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

"SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by conventions in the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress."

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA.

INTRODUCTION.

Iowa was organized as a separate territory by an act of congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed state.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a state on December 28, 1846.

The constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,390 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 23,681. This constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The constitution of 1857 has, since its adoption seventy-four years ago, remained the fundamental law of the state of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

THE CONSTITUTION.

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the state of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of main channel of the Missouri river; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I.

BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to

attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury,² except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishments shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the land of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribes the method of making such condemnation.]³

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[SEC. 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.]⁴

ARTICLE II.

RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every white⁵ male⁶ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one tion, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[*The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.*]⁷

[SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.]⁸

ARTICLE III.

OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial: and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November;⁹ and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white¹⁰ male¹¹ citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county, or district he may have been chosen to represent.

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

¹¹ The word "male" was stricken from this section by an amendment adopted in 1926. shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor, or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly,

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have

been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be), that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator, (or representative, as the case may be,) according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the *white*¹² inhabitants of the state.

Sec. 34. *The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white*¹³ *inhabitants in each.*

Sec. 35. *The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white*¹⁴ *inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.*

Sec. 36. *At its first session under this constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.*¹⁵

[SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census, (but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator).¹⁶

[SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

[SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.]¹⁷

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the state of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place

of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor, and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have the power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the great seal of the state of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the state of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time, establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme court and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and sixty: after which time they shall severally receive

such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. *The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may re-organize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district, or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*¹⁸

[At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.]¹⁹

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next, after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

*Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.*²⁰

[SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]²¹

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.

[The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.]²²

ARTICLE VI.

MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied *white*²³ male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be

elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII.

STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss upon which not less than six per cent, annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrepealable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII.

CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it

assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the city of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporation, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the solvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.

EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

1ST. EDUCATION.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education,²⁴ which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution, the board shall be

divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same *per diem* during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2ND. SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and

the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new state, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty-one and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall, from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose of aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

ARTICLE X.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI.

MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university, at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.

SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment in the same manner as they would have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the

August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress, and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the superintendent of public instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight; PROVIDED, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the state, and the pollbooks shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white" from the article on the right of suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if

at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.²⁵

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state.

[SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year One thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year One thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, One thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year One thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year One thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year One thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year One thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year One thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year One thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]²⁶

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

AMENDMENTS OF 1868²⁷

- 1st. Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof.
- 2d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof.
- 3d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof.
- 4th. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof.
- 5th. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof.

AMENDMENT OF 1880²⁸

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1882²⁹

Add as section 26 to article I of said constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1884³⁰

Amendment 1. The general election for the state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section:

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904³¹

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year One thousand

nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year One thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 21st, One thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year One thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year One thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year One thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year One thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year One thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year One thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

AMENDMENT OF 1908³²

That there be added to section eighteen (18) of article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, the following:

"The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the land of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

AMENDMENT OF 1916³³

To repeal section seven (7) of article two (2) of the constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

AMENDMENT OF 1926³⁴

Strike out the word "male" from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1928³⁵

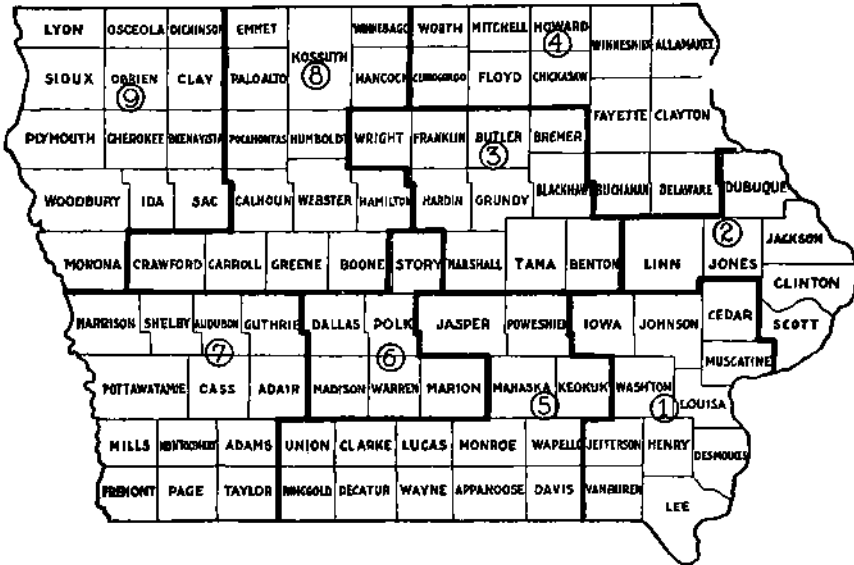
That the period (.) at the end of said section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted:

“, but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator.”

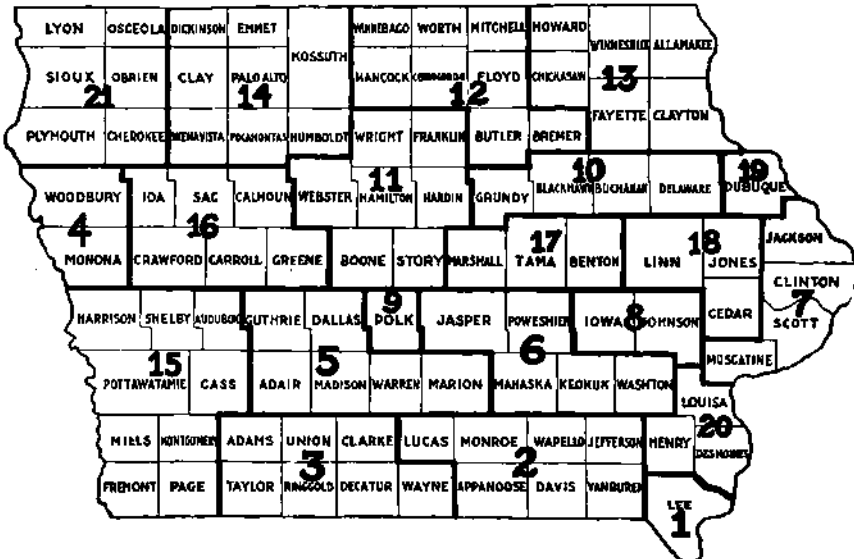
